




Gutenberg's Printing Press





GENEALOGY OF THE PROPRIETORSHIP OF NEW JERSEY


New Jersey divided into East and West, 1676






Stephen Daye Press. First printing press in America, brought to Cambridge from England in 1638.

William Bradford printed the first New Jersey government document in 1704.









That the remotest of His Subjects, as well as those under His more immediate Administration, are equally the Objects of His Royal Care; and I doubt not will produce in you Sentiments fuitable to the Opportunity you now have (almost beyond your Expectation) given you to express in the most proper and agreeable Manner.

Gentlemen of the Assembly;

THE Duty of my Station obliges me to aquaint you, That the Support of the Government has been for Time some expired, and it is necessary that proper Provision be made for it I have been often a Witness of the Willingness and

Houses for the meeting of the Assembly, Councils, and Courts, not far distant from the Place that shall be pitch'd upon for his Abode. In the doing of which, the publickGood and conveniency, and not the privateAdvantage or Banesit of any Place or Men, should solely Instuence your Debates.

WHAT Endeavours have been used and Proposals made in this Province, to obtain a Distinct Governour from that of New-York, you or some of you,

I believe well know.

THE Thing is done, and at no small Expence, which I perswade my self will be duly consider'd of by you.






