TALKING BOOK TOPICS ORDER FORM

When the Talking Book Topics arrives, it includes a handy order form to request the newest books from TBBC. Here are some helpful hints on the best way to request books and use that order form.

Any books on the Order Form are added to your request list. The books won't go out to you right away unless you call us at TBBC, or email us, and ask for it to be sent to you as soon as possible. So if it's a book you want to read "right now," please call or email and let us know! Please only check off the books you are interested in listening to. Every now and then, we get in Order Forms where all, or almost all, the titles are checked off! Each Talking Book Topics has over 500 new audiobooks on it, so that's a lot of books to request. If you listened to two audiobooks a day, it would take you over 8 months to listen to all the books in just one Talking Book Topics!

AUDIOBOOK BOOKSHELF

Want to know how to read multiple books on a cartridge or flash drive? To access the simple "bookshelf" function on your digital talking book player follow these steps:

- 1) With your player on and your talking book inserted, press and hold down the large rectangular PLAY/STOP button for two seconds until you hear a beep.
- 2) The player will announce "bookshelf" and the number of books on your cartridge or flash drive.
- 3) To move between books use the rewind or fast forward buttons. To exit bookshelf mode and play a selected book press the PLAY/STOP button again.

Need more information? Ask Reader's Services or press any button on your book player without a book inserted to learn about that buttons' function.

TBBC HOSTED INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE

TBBC was honored to host the 2016 annual conference of The International Association of Audio Information Services (IAAIS) on June 1st through 4th. Recording specialists from around the U.S. and Canada gathered in Princeton to share their expertise on recording services for those with vision impairments.

RETURNING BOOKS

Did you know that each book cartridge matches the container it comes in? That's right, the cartridge and the container need to match up! When TBBC gets back books that don't match up, it can delay that book coming off your borrowing record. It also delays other patrons being able to borrow that book.

Please make sure to put the right cartridge back in the right container! If you have more than one book checked out, TBBC recommends putting the cartridge back in its container before switching to the new book.

DID YOU KNOW - "UNRATED" BOOKS

NLS has been acquiring more and more commercially produced audiobooks. A "commercially produced" audiobook is when a publisher records a book and it is now available for any library or individual to purchase. An "NLS produced" audiobook is one that NLS records, and is only available for members of NLS.

When NLS adds a commercially produced audiobook to its collection, it means that there are more books for you to borrow and that new books are available much sooner than they were in the past. This means that here at the New Jersey State Library Talking Book & Braille Center, we have an even greater selection of books to offer readers! Because NLS is not the one recording the books, these "commercially produced" books are not rated by NLS for the presence of violence, explicit sex, or strong language. If your reading profile is set up so that books selected for you based on your favorite subjects do not include any violence, explicit sex, or strong language you will not receive these "unrated" books unless you ask for them specifically (by title or author). If you want to add books or authors to your list, or discuss your reading profile settings, please feel free to email or call us!

THE LIBRARY EQUAL ACCESS PROGRAM (LEAP) IS EXPANDING!

LEAP into learning new assistive technology! Thanks to the New Jersey Commission for the Blind and Visually Impaired, FREE assistive technology training will be available this year at seven assistive technology learning centers created at seven New Jersey public libraries. It is for all New Jersey residents 55 and older who have experienced a change in vision. FREE beginner and advanced training will be offered for the computers and iPads that offer a better way to read with magnification and speech. A mailing is on its way to you with more details!

The FREE training will be provided by Advancing Opportunities and will be held this fall at seven public libraries, September through December. You must register for a class.
