I am pleased to enclose the Work First New Jersey (WFNJ) Quarterly Progress Update for the quarter ending December 2008.

This report reflects the current trend of clients receiving Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) and General Assistance (GA) benefits. During this quarter, an average of about 780 clients (TANF and GA combined) left WFNJ for employment each month. The average wage of TANF clients who became employed was \$9.59 per hour.





Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF)


The number of families receiving WFNJ/TANF totaled approximately 37,800 as of December 2008.

Client Deferrals and Exemptions


Of the total TANF caseload of 37,800, about 19,700 cases (52 percent) were those with adults in the household who must comply with WFNJ work requirements.

WFNJ GA Cases Aided


•Teenaged Welfare Recipients

For the month of December 2008, TANF clients were scheduled to be engaged in more than 15,800 work activities. About 4,500 TANF clients had begun working but were still receiving a partial cash assistance payment.





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

About 12 percent of all TANF cases closed during the quarter were closed due to employment.

•Earnings of Former TANF Recipients

During the third quarter of 2008, WFNJ TANF recipients who were working were earning an average of \$9.59 per hour, an increase of 27 cents per hour over the average wage for the same quarter in 2007.

•Statewide Job Openings

According to the NJ Department of Labor and Workforce Development, there were more than 92,000 job openings statewide during the period of January 1, 2008 through December 31, 2008. The majority of positions available were in the Administration and Support, Waste Management and Remediation category, followed by the Retail Trade and Professional, Scientific and Technical Services fields.


