EMPLOYMENT TRENDS

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Data through July 1982

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Nonfarm wage and salary employment in New Jersey dropped on a seasonally adjusted basis by 2,800 from June to a July level of 3,051,600. This downturn was substantially the result of losses in government, as private sector employment, up by 5,400 from June to July, posted its first over-the-month seasonally adjusted increase since January.

Since July 1981 when the recession began, New Jersey has lost 32,200 jobs on a seasonally adjusted basis. The manufacturing division, where employment dropped by 54,700 over the year was particularly hard hit. The services, government, and trade sectors have shown strength over the year, increasing on a seasonally adjusted basis by 16,500; 3,500; and 3,200, respectively. However, the nonmanufacturing increases could not offset the downward trend of factory losses.

Service employment, a mainstay of the private sector, reached another record high in July by increasing 5,300 from June to a seasonally adjusted level of 653,400 due primarily to larger-than-seasonal employment gains in hospitals, miscellaneous business services, and social services. Construction rose by 1,100 jobs over the month to a seasonally adjusted total of 110,600, reflecting some hiring in the residential building segment. The service and construction gains, however, were not enough to buffer the government decline.

Government employment dropped by 8,200 over the month to a seasonally adjusted level of 517,000, as declines were recorded in the federal, state and local government segments. However, department analysts cautioned that the decline in the government sector may be overstated by the seasonal adjustment technique. Most of the government reduction reflected fewer Summer Youth Employment Participants hired under CETA funding as compared with previous years.

Jobholdings in manufacturing decreased for the twelfth consecutive month to a seasonally adjusted July total of 721,700, which was the lowest factory employment level since February 1950. The loss of 300 jobs from June to July was primarily due to layoffs in the transportation equipment industry to accommodate model change-over in the motor vehicle segment. Layoffs also occurred throughout the nonelectrical machinery industry. The leading over-the-month manufacturing gainer was apparel, up by 1,400 jobholdings.

The Department of Labor survey also revealed that the average production worker in New Jersey's manufacturing industries earned \$341.48 during the July survey week, \$4.29 less than in June. After seasonal adjustment, the average workweek remained, for the fourth consecutive month, at 40.3 hours.

Total nonagricultural wage and salary employment decreased in July in 8 of the state's 10 major labor areas, while 2 registered increases. The most substantial loss in jobholdings was recorded in the Newark Labor Area, which dropped by 6,500 over the month, totally in the manufacturing division. The Atlantic City and Long Branch-Asbury Park Labor Areas rose by 2,400 and 1,000, respectively.

Manufacturing activity was generally depressed as New Jersey continued to feel the effects of the national recession. Scattered layoffs resulted in losses in all of the areas ranging from 200 to 8,100 jobs. The largest decline was posted in the Newark Labor Area with decreases primarily in the durable goods sector, due to layoffs in the transportation equipment industry to accommodate model change-over in the motor vehicle segment.



TECHNICAL NOTES

Nonfarm Wage and Salary Employment

Employment data refer to persons on establishment payrolls who received pay for any part of the pay period which includes the 12th of the month. The data exclude proprietors, the self-employed, unpaid family workers, farm workers, and domestic workers in households. Salaried officers of corporations are included. Government employment covers only civilian employees; federal military personnel are excluded.

Persons on an establishment payroll who are on paid sick leave (when pay is received directly from the firm), on paid holiday or paid vacation, or who work during any part of the pay period but are unemployed or on strike during the rest of the period, are counted as employed. Not counted as employed are persons who, during the pay period which includes the 12th, are laid off, on leave without pay or on strike for the entire period, or who are hired but do not work during the period.

Average Hours and Earnings

Hours and earnings data are derived from reports of payroll and man-hours for production and related workers in manufacturing. When the reported pay period exceeds one week, the payroll and man-hour figures are reduced to a weekly basis.

Average hourly earnings for manufacturing are on a "gross" basis, reflecting not only changes in basic hourly rates, but also such variable factors as premium pay for overtime and shift work, and changes in output of workers paid on an incentive plan. Excluded from average earnings are irregular bonuses, retroactive items, payments of various welfare benefits, and payroll taxes paid by employers.
