







# HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

## ONE HUNDRED AND SIXTH SESSION.

STATE OF NEW JERSEY,  
ASSEMBLY CHAMBER,  
TRENTON, January 10, 1882. }

At 3 o'clock P. M. the House met.

This being the day designated by the Constitution for the assembling of the One Hundred and Sixth Legislature of the State of New Jersey, and three o'clock P. M. being the hour appointed for the organization of the House of Assembly, the House was called to order by Cummins O. Cooper, Clerk of the last House.

Prayer was offered by Rev. Wm. H. Neilson, Jr.

*Gentlemen of the General Assembly :*

I am more particularly grateful because I came to this State thirty-six years ago alone, I may say, and unaided, except by the Divine Ruler and the beneficent institutions of our State. I, therefore, feel more grateful to you and thankful to God, who has through our free institutions made the position which I now occupy as Speaker of the House, from so humble a position in life, not only a possibility but also an accomplished fact.

It will be readily seen from the political complexion of the House and Senate that political measures cannot be profitably discussed, which fact is perhaps prudential, as it will give us time for the cool, calm and deliberate consideration of such measures as will conduce to the best interests of our honored State.

Our agricultural, manufacturing and commercial interests demand and, in the absence of partizan agitations, will no doubt receive the fullest and wisest consideration. Vast tracts of land in South Jersey and other parts of our State demand that we give attention to its development, to the end that our physical resources may receive the best possible development.

Every patriotic interest should impel us to patriotic efforts, at the same time invoking the assistance of Divine Providence to guide us aright.

Thanking you again for the honor you have conferred on me, I desire to say that I will endeavor with your assistance to use the position to which you have elected me, fairly and honorably and for the best interests of the State of New Jersey, for which every pulse and feeling of gratitude is awakened in my heart.

Mr. Bell moved to reconsider the vote by which the resolution of Mr. Herr declaring thirty-one votes requisite for the election of officers of this House, was adopted.

The following message was received from the Governor by the hands of his Private Secretary, Mr. Joseph L. Naar:

*Gentlemen of the Senate and General Assembly:*

In pursuance of my duty under the Constitution, to communicate to you the condition of the State, and to recommend such measures as I may deem expedient, I take pleasure in thus presenting the result of my observations during the past year and in making suggestions as to such of our public affairs as have a bearing upon the welfare of the State.

A kind and overruling Providence has been pleased to vouchsafe to us a period of peace, prosperity and public

happiness, unbroken, save in one instance, by any extraordinary event. The law, giving, as it does, protection and safety to the rights of all, has been regularly and wisely administered and promptly executed; the public officers and servants have, with fidelity, performed the duties and guarded the trusts committed to their care; while a drought has in some degree lessened the productiveness of our farms, yet the injury has been temporary and partly compensated for by the higher prices which the tillers of the soil have been able to secure; mercantile affairs have been active and prosperous; the manufacturers have been able to secure increased business at remunerative rates; new avenues for railroads have been opened and utilized, and those which had been compelled to go into insolvency have assumed, or are about to assume, the management of their own affairs with fair prospects of success. Turn in what direction we may, we find evidences of a natural and healthy prosperity existing with us as individuals and as a people. There has been neither pestilence nor public disorder, but as a State we have prospered and in a measure advanced.

The one dark spot upon the picture was the assassination of the President of the United States, in July last. The shock created by the horror of the act and the universal regret felt that one who had entered on a new career of public service, with such bright hopes of honor to himself and benefit to the nation, have scarcely been dulled by a recollection of the noble manliness of the victim; by the universal outburst of sympathy for him and for our country from within and without our borders, and by the overwhelming proof that it was the act, not of conspirators, but of a single individual, barely accountable for his deeds. The fairness and impartiality which have marked the trial of so villainous a criminal, at a time so near to the commission of his crime, are deserving of our own respect and that of the civilized world. I took occasion on the announcement of the wounding of the President at once to communicate with the Secretary of State, and subsequently, on his arrival in this State, I tendered to him on the part of the State whatever services could be rendered looking to his comfort and convenience; but all that sympathy and intelligent and earnest effort could do were of no avail.

He died in our State. Together with several of the officers of the State and my personal staff, I attended the funeral ceremonies which took place at Elberon and Cleveland, and joined in the last sad rites which are all the tributes which the living can pay to those who have gone before.

#### FINANCES.

The financial condition of the State is well and fully set forth in the reports of the Treasurer and Comptroller. The income and expenditures of the State are divided by the Treasurer into four general accounts, viz.: Agricultural College Fund, State Library Fund, School Fund and State Fund, and will be considered in that order.

*The Agricultural College Fund* is composed of State bonds resulting from the sale of lands donated by the general government. The income from these securities, amounting to six thousand nine hundred and sixty dollars (\$6,960), is collected by the State Treasurer and paid over to the Trustees of Rutgers Scientific School for certain specified purposes.

*The State Library Fund* consists of an unexpended balance of one hundred and twenty-eight dollars and fifty cents (\$128.50); an annual appropriation of seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$750); and a special appropriation made by the Legislature of 1881 of one thousand five hundred dollars (\$1,500); amounting to two thousand three hundred and seventy-eight dollars and thirty cents (\$2,378.30). Of this amount, there was expended during the year, one thousand seven hundred and thirty-seven dollars and two cents (\$1,737.02), leaving a balance for the coming year of six hundred and forty-one dollars and twenty-eight cents (\$641.28), in addition to the annual appropriation of seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$750) above mentioned. This account is not treated as a separate fund by the Comptroller, its income being derived exclusively from appropriations from the State Fund.

*The School Fund.*—The reports show a steady increase in the receipts and accumulations of this fund. This is due to the fact that not only is there being annually added to the principal amount a large sum of money derived from the sale and lease of riparian lands, but that the income of the fund from investments already made exceeds the only

expenditure which can, under present laws, be made from it, viz.: an appropriation of one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) to aid in the support of public schools. The assets of the fund, at the close of the fiscal year, may be stated as follows:

There should be deducted from this amount the last item of one hundred and twenty thousand four hundred and fifty-eight dollars and twenty-eight cents (\$120,458.28), because it is not properly to be considered as a part of the income of the fund, but as a change in the form of the securities from loans and leases to cash in hand. This leaves, as the actual income of the fund, one hundred and forty-six thousand nine hundred and ten dollars and seventy-seven cents (\$146,910.77). The only disbursements which can, at present, be made from these receipts is the one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000), above mentioned; and this being made, leaves a balance of nearly forty-seven thousand dollars (\$47,000) to be invested, or otherwise disposed of. There is no reason to believe that this income will decrease in future years; as the investments from which it is derived are safe and substantial. On the contrary it is reasonably certain that it will be increased because of the continued receipts from the sale and lease of riparian lands, and the expected collection of the amount due as unpaid interest on bonds and mortgages and rents on riparian leases already made. This is certainly a very favorable showing of this branch of the State's finances; and particularly so, when it is considered that the method of levying the two-mill tax for the support of public schools under the act of 1881, will produce over the yield of the previous year an increase of three hundred and four thousand nine hundred and fifty-five dollars and thirty-two cents (\$304,955.32).

That we may the better understand the means by which the State Fund has reached its present condition, it will be well to examine the reports of the Comptroller of the Treasury for several years past. The Comptroller, at the close of 1879, having an available balance in bank of two hundred and ninety thousand six hundred and eighty-eight dollars and sixty-three cents (\$290,688.63), subject to no charges for unpaid appropriations, made a very careful and liberal estimate for the expenses of the then coming year, putting them at nine hundred and ten thousand dollars (\$910,000). This estimate was in excess of the ordinary expenses of the previous year. The Legislature of 1880 authorized expenditures which caused the disbursements to amount to the sum of one million seven thousand three hundred and seventy-nine dollars and thirty-four cents (\$1,007,379.34), an excess of ninety-seven thousand three hundred and seventy-nine dollars and thirty-four cents (\$97,379.34) over the estimates. At the close of 1880, the then Comptroller, having a long and intimate acquaintance with the finances of the State, in a report remarkably clear and full, taking the expenditures of the previous year as a basis, and making ample allowances for contingencies, estimated the disbursements of the coming year at one million and twenty thousand dollars

(\$1,020,000). The authorized expenditures of that year reached the sum of one million ninety-six thousand two hundred and three dollars and ninety-three cents (\$1,096,203.93),—an excess over the estimates of seventy-six thousand two hundred and three dollars and ninety-three cents (\$76,203.93). The excess of disbursements in the two years, 1880 and 1881, over the estimates was, therefore, one hundred and seventy-three thousand five hundred and eighty-three dollars and twenty-seven cents (\$173,283.27); and the balance in bank October 31, 1881, was one hundred and sixty-seven thousand two hundred and seventy-four dollars and thirty-nine cents (\$167,274.39). The Comptroller estimates the expenditures of the coming year at one million one hundred and ninety thousand dollars (\$1,190,000)—an excess over his estimate of the receipts for the year, and the available bank balance, of two hundred and sixty-four thousand five hundred and sixty-nine dollars and thirty-six cents (\$264,569.36). Recognizing the utter inability of any possible receipts to meet these expenditures, he points out two courses of action—without recommending either of them—the sale of a sufficient account of the State's securities, or the imposition of a State tax. The first method, I agree with my predecessors, would be ill-judged; because the possession of these securities enables the Treasury to borrow money to meet any unexpected demand, as has often occurred in the past, and undoubtedly will in the future; and because it would result only in a postponement and aggravation of the evil attempted to be treated, inasmuch as the State would be deprived of the income now derived from them. As to the second plan suggested, I feel that, while it is advisable that the government of the State should be administered with reasonable liberality, it is equally clear that the people have the right to demand that that administration should be as economical as is consistent with the dignity and well-being of the State. Before resorting to the levying of a tax, therefore, our first duty should be to ascertain whether, or not, the receipts cannot be increased, and the existing expenditures from, and charges against, the State Fund be judiciously reduced.

Taking as a basis of calculation the receipts and disbursements of 1881, a careful examination leads me to the following conclusions:

*Receipts.*—The State tax has all been collected, and the receipts for next year will not include this item of one hundred and twenty thousand five hundred and sixty-four dollars and twenty cents (\$120,564.20). The State Prison receipts will in all probability be increased to eighty thousand dollars (\$80,000); there will be paid by railroad corporations on taxes of former years about thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000); the amount received from judicial fees should be increased ten thousand dollars (\$10,000); and from official fees some seven thousand dollars (\$7,000). In view of the marked appreciation in the values of railroad property in this State, it does not seem unreasonable to expect that the tax derived from railroad corporations will be considerably increased during the year. The other items will, it is believed, be substantially the same as last year. Taking the above differences into account, it seems safe to estimate the receipts for the coming year at eight hundred and twenty-eight thousand dollars (\$828,000). The balance in bank at the beginning of the fiscal year was, as stated above, one hundred and sixty-seven thousand two hundred and seventy-four dollars and thirty-nine cents (\$167,274.39)—which includes deposits in insolvent banks, to be deducted—leaving an available balance of one hundred and forty-five thousand four hundred and thirty dollars and sixty-four cents (\$145,430.64), which, added to the probable receipts gives as the total resources of the Treasury for the present year about nine hundred and seventy-three thousand dollars (\$973,000), exclusive of the possible increase of the tax on corporations.

It will be remembered that the estimated expenditures for 1880 were only nine hundred and ten thousand dollars (\$910,000).

*Disbursements.*—Among the estimated expenditures for the year from the State Fund are the items of salaries of the Riparian Commission and their officers; support of and repairs to the Normal and Farnum Schools; salaries and expenses of the State Superintendent and assistant; expenses of the State Board of Education and of Teachers' Institutes; and legal and other expenses connected with school fund investments and with suits in which the fund is interested. All of these expenses are for the purposes of public education; they have hitherto been paid

from the State Fund, but, in view of the cramped condition of that fund, in my judgment they should be borne by the fund provided for educational purposes. The income of the School Fund is sufficiently large to meet this expense without interfering with the annual appropriation of one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000). While the School Fund was weak, it was well that it should be aided by the surplus wealth of the State Fund; but these conditions have been reversed. The School Fund has reached very large proportions, and the effect of this change will simply be to impose upon it an expense fairly chargeable against it, and relieve the State Fund of an expense which otherwise must be met by taxation.

Upon the idea that the State is expected to receive the fines and costs imposed upon criminals sent to the State Prison from the several counties, it is called upon to pay the large item of transportation and costs as a matter of practice it receives nothing, and the expense should be transferred to the counties, where it properly belongs. To meet this expense by a State tax would be unequal and unjust, as will be seen by the fact that during the last year three of the counties called for no part of the expenditure; and more than one-third of the whole amount was paid to the authorities of a single county,—while another of equal size and population received less than one-third as much.

Several of the institutions of the State report considerable balances on hand, the accumulations of previous years, and if the appropriations for the year are made with a view of using up these balances and restricting them to necessary expenses, a large saving can be made. The State Prison expenses need not be so large as last year, as no extraordinary repairs, such as were then paid for, are contemplated. The reprinting of law and equity reports involves a considerable annual expenditure and may be discontinued without much disadvantage, and a saving might be made in the original publication of these reports. The salaries paid to legislative officers are largely in excess of those paid for similar services to other officers of the State, and might very properly be reduced. The cost of the inspection of fisheries is large, and the expense of the propagation of food fish might very well be dispensed with, temporarily, at least. I am advised that the expenses on account of the

militia may properly be reduced at least twenty (20) per cent. The number of newspapers publishing the laws, proclamations, &c., might very safely be cut down without materially affecting the ability of the people to be informed of the action of their representatives. The cost of printing the various reports is unnecessarily large by reason of the fact that there is much contained in some of them that is valueless; a little attention on the part of some competent persons authorized to supervise them before publication would effect a considerable saving without any detriment to the documents themselves. The further publication of historical records could well be suspended for the present. The expenditures to county lunatic asylums will necessarily be less and might be further reduced by an examination into the method of admission of patients, and the payment for such only as would be paid for in the State institutions. The pension account and the expense of repairs to buildings will be less than last year. The payment of bounties on sugar and fibrous plants should either be discontinued or provision made that they shall not exceed a small amount.

Should these suggestions be adopted by you, and the line of thought pursued, I have no doubt that it will be found that we have succeeded in placing our expenditures, including those peculiar to the present year, within the limits of our probable receipts, as stated above. The result of this action will be that we will not only have avoided the imposition of a State tax for this year, but, what is of far greater importance, we will have inaugurated such measures of economy as will enable us to avoid it in the future; or, if it then should become absolutely necessary, we can limit it to the smallest possible amount. To do otherwise would, in my opinion, be to foster and encourage the growth of habits of extravagance, which from the very nature of things will undoubtedly outstrip any probable increase of our resources. Besides, it must be remembered that while the burden of a State tax would be but light to some communities, yet there are others upon which it would fall with heavy weight. There is, unfortunately, no small part of our State which is to-day struggling along under the weight of necessary municipal and county taxes, and there are two cities which have confessed their utter inability to meet existing liabilities, and

have placed themselves at the mercy of their creditors. To impose an additional load upon these, unless it be absolutely necessary, would be alike unwise and oppressive.

#### SINKING FUND.

The report of the Commissioners gives the following statement of the assets of the fund:

The outstanding war bonds, for the security of which this fund is intended, amount to one million eight hundred and ninety-six thousand dollars (\$1,896,000). One hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) of these bonds mature each year up to 1891, and to meet them as they become due there is annually paid from the State Fund the sum of ninety thousand dollars (\$90,000), the Sinking Fund being required to provide the additional ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) of principal and the amount of interest. As will be noticed in the above statement of assets, the Commissioners have been compelled to purchase by foreclosure a considerable amount of real estate, for the protection of the fund. These properties are, in the main, considered valuable. The Commissioners have, very properly, made some expenditures, in keeping them in a saleable condition, so that when there shall be a fair market for real estate, they can be disposed of at a very little, if any, loss to the State.

#### RIPARIAN COMMISSION.

The business of the Commission for the past year was very large, and shows a considerable increase over that of the preceding year. There is evidently a disposition on the part of individual shore owners to secure by grant or lease the rights of the State in the riparian lands in front of

them. This disposition is constantly growing, and will continue to increase as public opinion becomes more settled in regard to those rights. The decisions of the Courts are gradually sweeping away all doubts as they arise, and the title of the State will soon be decided beyond dispute. The Commissioners report the following transactions during the year:

There has been received since 1864 for riparian grants the sum of one million three hundred and eighty-nine thousand nine hundred and eight dollars and thirty-four cents (\$1,389,908.34), in addition to which leases have been made of the principal amount of nine hundred and sixty-nine thousand five hundred and seventy-four dollars and nine cents (\$969,574.09). On these seven per centum rent is paid. The expenses of the Commission are paid out of the State Fund.

#### STATE PRISON.

The reports of the Keeper, Supervisor and Inspectors are full, and contain valuable information and suggestions. The number of convicts on the 31st of October, 1880, was eight hundred and thirty-six (836); four hundred and twenty-eight (428) were received during the year and four hundred and sixty-one (461) discharged, leaving the number in confinement on October 31, 1881, eight hundred and three (803). The following statement of the financial operations of the institution is given by the Inspectors, and practically agrees with the figures as presented by the State Treasurer:

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This amount is twenty-one thousand five hundred and twenty-eight dollars and sixty-seven cents (\$21,528.67) in excess of the deficiency of last year. The increase is accounted for by a combination of circumstances. 1st. There was charged against the institution this year seven thousand five hundred and fifty dollars (\$7,550) for repairs of shops injured by the fire; 2d. The sum of fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500) was paid to a contractor for loss of time and business caused by the burning of the shops, and the payment diminishes the amount of cash reported as having been paid by the Supervisor; 3d. An excess of loss in productive labor this year over that of last, pending the rebuilding of the shops, amounting to about nineteen hundred dollars (\$1,900); 4th. The abandonment by one of the contractors of his contract, three months before it would have expired, at a loss to the State of twenty-four hundred dollars (\$2,400); 5th. A loss in the employment of labor during the adjustment of the contracts under the new law, amounting to about thirteen thousand four hundred dollars (\$13,400), making a total of twenty-six thousand seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$26,750). Allowing for these losses peculiar to the year, it would seem that no greater deficit occurs this year than the last. Or, in other words, that had the opportunity been afforded to work the men as many days this year as last, the amount of earnings would have been the same, and the comparison between the income and the expenditures would have been as favorable.

The law passed at the last session of the Legislature, limiting the number of men to be employed in any one branch of labor to one hundred (100) has been strictly complied with by the authorities. Contracts have been made with different parties for the supplying of labor in

the manufacture of seven (7) different articles. These contracts, while requiring the manufacturers to pay for twenty (20), forty (40), eighty (80) and one hundred men, whether used, not, allow them to employ as high as one hundred (100) men if their business requires it. And, as a matter of fact, there have been used and paid for, at times, in the month of October last, as many as four hundred and seventy-five (475) men, with a daily average during the month of four hundred and nineteen (419). The reports of the officers point strongly to the conclusion that there would be no difficulty in employing all the available force if sufficient accommodations were provided.

The Inspectors and the Supervisor unite in the statement, however, that, at the present rates received for the labor of the prisoners, even if all the men were employed, the State would not receive more than ninety thousand dollars (\$90,000) per annum. To meet the usual and ordinary expenses of the prison one hundred and twenty thousand dollars (\$120,000) is required. An offer was made to the Supervisor in June last by a manufacturer to take all the labor of the prisoners at rates which would have produced an annual income of one hundred and ten thousand dollars (\$110,000); but he was unable to accept it because of the law above mentioned, and contracts were made as has been stated; which are expected, with other ordinary receipts, to produce some eighty thousand dollars (\$80,000). But even at the prices now obtained it is claimed to be practically impossible to employ more men than at present, because the subdivision of contracts calls for more shop room, for the storage of raw material and manufactured goods and for shipping facilities than is at the disposal of the authorities. How best to provide this is a question of importance to the institution and the State. It has been proposed that the prison walls should be extended so as to include the grounds now occupied by the arsenal. This plan would necessitate the building of a new arsenal elsewhere, and the almost entire reconstruction of workshops or other structures in the arsenal grounds, because the buildings now there would be entirely unfitted for the new purposes. This would necessarily entail a very large outlay of money, which, in the present experimental condition of the new law, I would consider it very unwise to make.

There is, however, a large plot of ground, between the prison wall and the arsenal, of which only about one-third is occupied by the new workshop and structures connected therewith. Examination and consideration of the subject convince me that it would be much better to construct on this ground buildings suitable for storage and shipping rooms, and thereby relieve the present building of much which occupies considerable space, and does not need the protection of so massive and expensive a structure. This being done, the opportunity would be afforded of employing all the men whose labor is likely to be sought for under the present system.

#### REFORMATORY INSTITUTIONS.

*Reform School for Boys.*—The reports of the managers and superintendent show the number of inmates at the beginning of the year to have been two hundred and fifty-eight (258); committed and returned to the school during the year, ninety-eight (98); total, three hundred and fifty-six (356). Of this number fifty-eight (58) were returned to relatives and friends; twenty-one (21) were put out to farmers; five (5) escaped; two (2) died; and four (4) otherwise disposed of; total, ninety (90). The number remaining in the Institution on thirty-first October last was two hundred and sixty-six (266). Of the number committed during the year thirteen (13) were over the age fixed by the law, and fifteen (15) were for minor offences, such as vagrancy, truancy and incorrigibility. The financial statement shows receipts (exclusive of balance on hand) amounting to fifty thousand seven hundred and twenty-two dollars and seven cents (\$50,722.07); of which thirty-three thousand dollars (33,000) were from the State; fifteen thousand, four hundred and ninety-two dollars and sixteen cents (15,492.16) from the labor of the boys on various contracts; one thousand nine hundred and seventy-eight dollars and eighty-two cents (\$1,978.82) from produce, material and stock sold; and two hundred and fifty-one dollars and nine cents (\$251.09) from miscellaneous sources. The discrepancy between the amount reported as received by this institution, and that paid by the State Treasurer,—three thousand dollars (\$3,000), is accounted for by the

fact, that that amount was paid and received after the close of the fiscal year.

The disbursements were fifty-six thousand three hundred and ninety-two dollars and twenty-four cents (\$56,392.24); of which forty thousand eight hundred and thirty-five dollars and seven cents (\$40,835.07) were for salaries, provisions, labor, fuel, clothing and other expenses for the support of the institution; eleven thousand four hundred and fifty-nine dollars and sixty-seven cents (\$11,459.67) for machinery, farm implements, boilers and boiler house, pumps and fire apparatus, furniture, repairs and improvements to buildings, and labor and machinery at brick yard; and four thousand and ninety-seven dollars and fifty cents (\$4,097.50) for new barns.

The health of the institution has been unusually good. The new sources discovered and utilized have yielded a plentiful supply of pure, wholesome water. Precautions have been taken against the danger of fire by the purchase of a steam fire pump and apparatus. The farm has been well worked, and at a profit of nearly five thousand dollars (\$5,000). The brick yard turned out four hundred and sixty thousand (460,000) brick and eighteen thousand (18,000) drain tile. Four hundred thousand (400,000) of the bricks were used in the construction of the barns and walks, and would have cost, if purchased, about six dollars (\$6) per thousand; and some were sold; the tile were used for drainage. The total cost of this department was one thousand one hundred and sixty-nine dollars and thirty-eight cents (\$1,169.38). The shirt manufactory and laundry, in which the labor of the boys is hired out, produced an income of fifteen thousand four hundred and ninety-two dollars and sixteen cents (\$15,492.16), a result reached without at all overworking them, as is evidenced by the fact that one hundred and seventy (170) of them have been given credit for eight hundred and forty-seven dollars and ninety-eight cents (\$847.98) for work done above the tasks set them.

The improvements in buildings and machinery heretofore authorized have been completed, and suggestions are made as to others, which, while not necessary, will tend to the convenience of the institution, but the many other subjects of expenditure, some of which are pressing, should preclude for the present any other appropriations in this direction.

*Industrial School for Girls*—The report of the operations of this institution for the past year shows a continuance of its proper management. The number of pupils at the beginning of the year was forty-one (41); received, nine (9); total, fifty (50). Of this number fifteen (15) were indentured; five (5) discharged and five (5) were returned to their relatives—leaving twenty-five (25) at the close of the year. The payment made by the State last year was three thousand dollars (\$3,000), which, with other receipts, amounted to six thousand six hundred and ninety-two dollars and seventy-two cents (\$6,692.72). Of this amount, six thousand two hundred dollars and forty cents (\$6,200.40) was expended, leaving a balance of four hundred and ninety-two dollars and thirty-two cents (\$492.32).

I call your attention to the propriety of limiting the scope of these institutions to the purposes for which they were designed: the seclusion and reformation of youthful offenders against the law, who may thus be turned from the life of crime on which they have entered, rather than the furnishing by the State of parental care and control to refractory youth. If they are kept within these bounds the present accommodations will be ample for years; if allowed to go beyond them, there will be a constant demand for money.

#### SCHOOLS.

The report of the State Superintendent gives an exhibit of the condition of the public schools. The amount raised by the two-mill tax—one million three hundred and twenty-two thousand seven hundred and forty dollars (\$1,322,740)—is an increase of three hundred and four thousand nine hundred and fifty-five dollars and thirty-two cents (\$304,955.32) over that of last year: and the number of pupils enrolled is two hundred and three thousand five hundred and forty-two (203,542)—a decrease of eleven thousand four hundred and nineteen (11,419) from that of the previous year. The law of last year, providing a new method for the assessment and distribution of the school tax, has been carried into effect without any expression of dissatisfaction.

## NORMAL SCHOOL.

This institution continues to increase in prosperity and influence. There were during the last year two hundred and thirty-six (236) pupils, and the last graduating class numbered fifty (50) persons, nearly all of whom found immediate employment in schools throughout the State. This fact bears strong testimony of the estimation in which this institution is held by the local school authorities, and is conclusive as to the need which it fills. The health of the pupils at the date of the report was good. Some improvements in the boarding houses are suggested, which are well worthy of consideration. The amount paid by the State during the last year on account of the institution was sixteen thousand and fifty-six dollars and twenty-four cents (\$16,056.24)—fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000) for support and one thousand and fifty-six dollars and twenty-four cents (\$1,056.24) for repairs.

## THE INSANE.

The care of the insane in this State is entrusted to the State institutions at Trenton and Morristown and to County Asylums in the counties of Essex, Hudson, Burlington, Camden, Passaic and Cumberland. For the support of its insane the State pays one dollar (\$1) per week for each county patient in the State and county asylums, and seven dollars (\$7) per week for each convict patient in the State asylums. Each county pays three dollars (\$3) per week for each patient sent from it. These two payments are the principal sources of revenue of the State institutions.

The report of the managers of the Trenton Asylum shows that there were at the beginning of the present fiscal year five hundred and fifty (550) patients under treatment in that institution; one hundred and fifty-seven (157) were admitted, making the total number under treatment seven hundred and seven (707); one hundred and thirty (130) were discharged or died, leaving five hundred and seventy-seven (577) at the close of the year, of whom four hundred and sixty-one (461) are county, thirty-six (36) State, and about eighty (80) private patients. This number is as large as can be properly cared for and treated in the institution. The State patients are such as have been, after the

commission of a crime, either declared innocent on the ground of insanity or have become insane during the term of punishment. The managers renew their protest against the confinement of this class of patients in this asylum, because of the want of room for their classification, owing to the crowded condition of the institution, and because they are unable to make proper provision for the double duty of guarding them as prisoners and caring for them as patients. Of the fifty-nine (59) patients of this class which have been sent to the asylum seven (7) have escaped, eight (8) have died, and eight (8) have been discharged, as recovered, feigning insanity, &c. The managers have used every effort to keep the buildings and grounds in good condition with the means at their disposal. The machinery for water supply has been improved and extensive precautions taken against the danger of the building taking fire from the heating apparatus. The farm, dairy and grist mill have continued to be sources of profit to the institution, in addition to the advantage of affording a guarantee of the quality of food supply. The inventory shows property of the value of one hundred and fourteen thousand three hundred dollars (\$114,300), an increase of five thousand and three hundred and fourteen dollars (\$5,314). There has been paid from the State Treasury for the support of the institution during the past year forty-four thousand and eighty-four dollars and twenty-six cents (\$43,084.26); of which twenty-two thousand seven hundred and twenty-one dollars and fifty-six cents (\$22,721.56) was for county patients; thirteen thousand nine hundred and seventy-four dollars and seventy cents (\$13,974.70) for insane convicts; seven thousand two hundred dollars (7,200) for salaries, and one hundred and eighty-eight dollars (\$188) for appraisement of property and fees of experts in determining insanity.

The Morristown Asylum contained at the beginning of the fiscal year five hundred and eighty-six (586) patients; one hundred and eighty-seven (187) were admitted, making the total number under treatment seven hundred and seventy-three (773); of these one hundred and thirty-two (132) were discharged or died; leaving in the institution at the close of the year six hundred and forty-one (641) patients, of whom five hundred and seventeen (517) are county

patients and one hundred and twenty-four (124) private patients. There are no convict patients in this institution. The managers have just completed a storage reservoir which ensures a plentiful and regular water supply. They ask an appropriation of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000) for the completion of the building and the improvement of the grounds, in order that they may be made available for the proper exercise of the patients. The institution has been kept in good order, and the farm, garden and dairy show a net profit of nearly four thousand dollars, (\$4,000). The annual inventory shows property of the value of ninety-nine thousand four hundred and seventy-three dollars and fourteen cents (\$99,473.14); an increase of seven hundred and forty-nine dollars and ninety-eight cents (\$749.98) over last year. There has been paid from the State Treasury to this institution during the past year, thirty-five thousand four hundred and twenty-two dollars and sixteen cents (\$35,422.16); of which twenty-five thousand six hundred and ninety-three dollars and thirteen cents (\$25,693.13) was for county patients; nine thousand four hundred and fifty dollars (\$9,450) for salaries, and two hundred and seventy-nine dollars and three cents (\$279.03) for expenses of appraisalment and of the managers.

The Commissioners of the Morristown Asylum report the disbursement of six thousand one hundred and four dollars and eight cents (\$6,104.08) for expenses connected with the building of a new reservoir, &c., and a balance in hand of six thousand one hundred and twenty-seven dollars and thirty-eight cents (\$6,127.38).

Of the several county asylums no knowledge is had except as to the number of patients for whom the State is called upon to pay one dollar (\$1) per week under the act of April 4th, 1873. The amount paid to these institutions last year was forty-one thousand three hundred and twenty-nine dollars and twenty-eight cents (\$41,329.28), a part of which, however, was for previous years for which no bills had been presented. The number of patients in the several institutions at the date of their last bill presented to the Comptroller was as follows: Essex, three hundred and three (303); Hudson, two hundred and seventeen (217); Burlington, sixty-seven (67); Camden, seventy-four (74); Passaic, thirty-one (31); Cumberland, seventy-one (71)

—a total of seven hundred and sixty-three (763). How these patients are admitted, how cared for and treated and how discharged, are matters about which the State authorities have neither any knowledge nor the means of securing any. The law simply requires them to pay one dollar per week for each county patient certified by the director of the board of chosen freeholders to have been supported in such asylums.

While this law seems to be fair, yet it is subject to great abuses. If the State pays the same per capita to the county asylums as to those of the State, it should receive the same services; the beneficiaries should be only such as would be admitted to the State institutions; they should receive equally good care and treatment, and be subject to the same rules as to discharge. The subject is worthy of your examination and consideration; and I have no doubt if they are bestowed upon it, and the system is placed upon a proper basis, the result will be a considerable reduction in the expense to the State.

#### DEAF AND DUMB, BLIND AND FEEBLE MINDED.

In pursuance of a method long since established, the State provides for the care and instruction of this class of pupils in institutions located in other States. This has been done because it avoided the expenditure of a large capital amount for the purchase of land and erection of buildings, and because it is believed that the annual expenditure is not more in such establishments, than would be needed to maintain a system requiring special corps of instructors and special appliances, in addition to the ordinary expenses of the care of the pupils. All the necessities of the case are met, and the institutions to which the State's pupils are sent, are worthy of every confidence; some of them being under the charge of gentlemen who have acquired a world-wide reputation in the profession. The number of New Jersey pupils upon the rolls of the several institutions and the amounts which they were entitled to charge for the same, during the past year, were:

The institutions for feeble minded children have, in the course of the year, refused the admission of certain applicants on the ground that they were subjects of care, rather than of instruction. The law, as at present framed, is based upon the idea of the instruction of pupils of these classes, and I have been to some extent restricted by it. And yet, some of the cases of the greatest hardship and necessity are those of persons utterly incapable of receiving instruction, for whom, under the law, there is no provision. Whether or not such persons should be made the subjects of the State's care, in our Asylums or otherwise, is a matter for your consideration and decision.

#### HOME FOR DISABLED SOLDIERS.

This institution established in 1866, has continued to meet the demand for which it was created, namely, the care of soldiers of the State who have become disabled by wounds or sickness contracted in or consequent upon their service, and who are necessitous. This policy was one worthy of the State, and has been liberally maintained—the State having contributed to it in the last nine years over three hundred and sixty-nine thousand dollars (\$369,000). The report of the institution for the past year shows that there were three hundred and sixty (360) inmates on October 31, 1880; new admissions during the year, one hundred and twelve (112); readmissions, two hundred and twenty-one (221); total, six hundred and ninety-three (693.) There were discharged, two hundred and seventy-two (272); expelled, twenty-one (21), and thirty-six (36) have died, leaving at the close of the year, three hundred and sixty-four (364) inmates. Of the total number of inmates during the year five hundred and fifty-six (556) served in the New Jersey regiments, and one hundred and thirty-eight (138) in those of other States and the regular army and navy. While these figures indicate that the Home is used temporarily by many persons, yet it is also clear that it is of permanent advantage and benefit to a large number of soldiers of New Jersey, for whom it was designed. Nor are its benefits limited to those who receive care within the walls of the institution, for the report shows that out of a total expenditure of thirty-five thousand dollars (\$35,000),

nearly ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) was distributed among a class of beneficiaries known as "out-patients," that is, "persons who have some, but not sufficient means for their comfortable support." The receipts for the running of the institution, as reported by the superintendent, are made up of thirty-four thousand two hundred and ninety-five dollars and twenty-six cents (\$34,295.26) from the State, four hundred and thirty-seven dollars and thirty-five cents (\$437.35) from the sale of produce, &c., and eight hundred and forty-one dollars and two cents (\$841.02) paid by patients drawing pensions. The last item is received under the provision of the act that the applicant for admission shall give his "consent and agreement to transfer to the State for the use of the Home any pension to which he may be entitled from any State, or from the United States, during the time he shall be a patient at said Home." Three hundred and ninety-nine (399) of the beneficiaries received pensions of over eight dollars (\$8) per month from the General Government. The managers ask an allowance of eight thousand dollars (\$8,000) in addition to the regular appropriation of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000). As there remains to their credit in the hands of the State Treasurer an undrawn balance of nine thousand one hundred and seventy-four dollars and sixty-one cents (\$9,174.61), it would seem that the regular appropriation will be more than enough to meet the expense of the institution for the ensuing year.

The Legislature of last year, recognizing the fact that the lease of the premises now occupied by this institution would soon expire, adopted a resolution looking to the acquirement by the State of a suitable property and the erection of buildings thereon for the use of the Home. In this direction, I suggest, whether it would not be wise to devote to the uses of this institution the establishment formerly used as a Soldiers' Children's Home. The grounds are ample, pleasantly and healthfully located, easily accessible for all purposes and abundantly supplied with water; the buildings are commodious and well adapted to the purpose, and have, during the past year, been put in perfect repair, and the State has no other use to which they can so fittingly be devoted.

## MILITIA.

The number liable to militia duty in the State is two hundred and twenty-three thousand and ninety-four (223,094). The National Guard is organized as one division of two brigades. The First Brigade is composed of four (4) regiments, two (2) battalions of infantry and one (1) battery of artillery, numbering one hundred and fifty-six (156) officers and one thousand eight hundred and one (1,801) men, and the Second Brigade of three (3) regiments of infantry and one (1) Gatling gun company, numbering one hundred and eleven (111) officers and one thousand three hundred and seventy-four (1,374) men. One (1) Gatling gun company, with four (4) officers and fifty-four (54) men, is unattached. The entire force of the National Guard, including the general field and staff officers, is, therefore, three hundred and twelve (312) officers and three thousand two hundred and twenty-nine (3,229) men, being an increase of one hundred and thirty-two (132) over last year. It may truly be said that in no time in its history has the National Guard been in a better condition than at present. The number of members in the several companies is well and easily kept up. The composition of the force is of a high standard, and there pervades the whole body a spirit of enterprise and discipline highly commendable. These have, necessarily, resulted in an exceptional degree of efficiency. The entire force is armed with the Springfield breech-loading rifle, and is thoroughly equipped. Under the law of 1880 great progress has been made in the supplying of the entire force with the regulation service uniform. But two (2) regiments, about seven hundred (700) men, yet remain to be supplied. The furnishing of these uniforms has increased the expenses of the National Guard during the last two years, but the investment is one which will not be soon again required. Besides the ordinary tactics the force has been well drilled in rifle practice, and the returns show that more than twice as many members of the National Guard have pursued this special branch of instruction this year as last. The expenses of this branch have been very materially reduced this year, and a much larger reduction can safely be promised for the coming year. The use of one of the ranges has been abandoned, and arrangements

have been made by which the cost to the State of the other two will be materially lessened. The Arsenal is well supplied with the necessary arms and ordnance. The entire expenses of the National Guard during the past year, as reported by the Quartermaster General, was seventy-three thousand five hundred and fifteen dollars and twenty-two cents (\$73,515.22), against seventy-nine thousand two hundred and twenty-five dollars and sixty-nine cents (\$79,225.69) for the previous year.

#### YORKTOWN CENTENNIAL.

By a joint resolution, approved March 17th, 1881, I was authorized and requested to organize a provisional battalion to be composed of companies of the National Guard, which should take part in the celebration of the battle of Yorktown. The celebration of this anniversary had been determined upon by Congress, and the management of its details had been assigned to a joint committee of that body. That committee had extended invitations to France and Germany, the potential allies of our struggling nation in the event designed to be celebrated. Both of these governments responded with enthusiasm and accredited; as their representatives, the descendants of the distinguished officers participating in the memorable siege and victory which led to our recognition as an independent nation. The National Government detailed portions of its army and navy; and the larger States of the Union announced their intention to be represented. It was to such an occasion that I was requested to send a representation creditable to the State. The selection of the material of which to form the battalion was made in the manner prescribed by the resolution, and the result amply justifies the wisdom of the suggestion. The whole of the National Guard was put upon its best efforts to secure admission into the battalion. A spirit of enterprise and emulation imbued it, and when the time came for the selection to be made the whole force was in such a condition that no difficulty would have been felt in doubling the number required. The command of the battalion was assigned by me to Col. E. Burd Grubb, of the Sixth Regiment, Second Brigade, and competent officers were selected, who, under his instruction, immediately and constantly de-

voted themselves to the work assigned to them. In the early stages of the enterprise I became convinced that the safety, health and comfort of the command would depend entirely upon whatever preparation should be made by ourselves. They were to be sent to an isolated section of country subject to malarial influences, remote from all extraneous sources of supplies, and the ordinary resources of which would be more than taxed by the influx of a large temporary population. It, therefore, became necessary to take extra precautions in order to secure their safe transportation, to avoid any unnecessary exposure to the danger of sickness, more likely to occur because of the unprepared condition of the men taken suddenly from comfortable homes; to provide suitable and generous food and ample clothing and camp equipage. While nothing was stinted, care was exercised to prevent extravagance or waste, as will be noticed when you observe the statement of the expenditures required by the resolution to be submitted to you by the comptroller, and which will be filed with that officer during your present session. This important part of the work was performed through Quartermaster General Lewis Perrine, to whose experience and energy is fairly to be attributed much of the successful results. The method established for the formation of the battalion was not calculated to secure that unity of action so essential to its proper appearance as a body. But the admirable material of which it was formed, animated by a spirit of emulation and pride to worthily represent the State, was, under the excellent instruction and example of the Colonel and other officers, very soon unified. Notwithstanding the fact that they had but once before been together as a body, from their first appearance in the streets of Baltimore they became the subject of admiration and praise. Their conduct, while encamped, left nothing to be asked for and nothing to be condemned, and when the time came that they were to be brought into comparison and competition with the regiments of other States, many of which had become famous as entire organizations, the unhesitating expression was: that as individuals and as a body; in equipment and in drill; in camp and in field, New Jersey's National Guard were unexcelled. They were an honour to the State and to the Nation; and the prize which was awarded to them was honorably deserved and won.

During the entire period of absence from the State, the health of the command was good. But one accident worthy of note occurred, viz: the maiming of private Randolph F. Disbrow, of Company B, 7th Regiment, N. G., by the premature discharge of a cannon. I recommend to you the adoption of some proper means for his relief. Aside from this accident, all the circumstances of the occasion have left much cause for grateful pride and none for regret.

I take pleasure in acknowledging in this connection the respectful courtesies paid to the representatives of this State by the National authorities and the officers of the army and navy.

Considering the fact that the services rendered by the officers and members of this battalion were entirely voluntary and without any compensation whatever from the State, I suggest that the Legislature make such public recognition of those services as is deserving. I am informed that the desire of the battalion, universally expressed, is to present to the State the trophy which was awarded to them, and I trust that such arrangements will be made for its acceptance by the State as are befitting the occasion.

#### THE COWPENS CELEBRATION.

In accordance with the spirit of the joint resolution passed at the last session of the Legislature respecting the celebration of the centennial of the battle of Cowpens, and the desire of the authorities of South Carolina that New Jersey should be represented on that occasion, I requested the Hons. Senators William H. Francis, of Essex, and Thomas Lawrence, of Sussex; and Assemblymen David A. Lawrence, of Hudson, and James H. Van Cleef, of Middlesex, the Committee appointed by the Legislature, to attend the celebration as the delegation from this State. These gentlemen performed the duty thus imposed upon them with satisfaction to the authorities of the State to which they were sent, and credit to that which they represented. The event was made the occasion of an intermingling of citizens and representative men of different sections of our country and brought out an expression of community of sentiment and interest, for which there are too few opportunities. The money appropriation made for the identifi-

cation of our State with the memorial monument was paid, but a hesitancy on the part of those who were expected to take the initiative, prevented the selection of an orator to represent the Middle States. This omission was, however, well supplied by the extemporaneous effort of one of New Jersey's representatives.

ATTORNEY GENERAL.

The report of the Attorney General presents a resume of the business conducted by him on the part of the State during the past year; and shows the pendency of several suits of great interest and importance. In the case of the State of New Jersey against the State of Delaware, relative to the jurisdiction of the latter in the Delaware river, matters remain as heretofore. The Brotherton Indian tax case, involving the question of the exemption of a large tract of land in Burlington county from taxation, having been decided in our courts in favor of the right of the State to tax, has been removed to the United States Supreme Court, and is now pending. A threatened interference with the lands of the State under water, and the grants made by the State of the same, under color of a pretended claim by persons alleging themselves to be the Continental Railway Company, was promptly met by the Attorney General by an information filed in the Court of Chancery, on which an injunction was issued by that court, and the matter is there now pending. Preparations have been made for contesting an asserted claim on the part of the Proprietors of East Jersey to certain lands under water in the county of Monmouth. The matter having been placed under the charge of a committee of the Legislature, no action has yet been taken in the courts. The suit involving the right of the Secretary of State to receive certain fees has been argued in the Supreme Court, and now awaits their decision. Other cases, all of which are of importance to the State, have been considered, argued, or disposed of; for a statement of which I refer more particularly to the report. The business of the Department, which has largely increased, has been promptly and ably conducted.

## STATE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE.

The State Board of Agriculture which has now been in active operation since 1872, is accomplishing a very important work in the special branch of our material interests to which it is devoted. Its aim has been to maintain communication with all organizations in the State occupied with any branch of garden, field or forest culture with all their diversified relations to the other occupations and interests of our people, and to gather up and make available the best results of observation and experiment. The importance of maintaining a central organization of this kind is evident, and it is gratifying to learn that its work is becoming better understood and more highly appreciated. The Board suggest that permanent quarters be provided for its use at the State House, with proper provision for keeping them always open and accessible, and that all action which the State may find it desirable to adopt relating to this branch of public interests should be entrusted to its direction. In order to accomplish these ends additional legislation would be necessary.

## AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE.

This institution is supported without expense to the State, the income from the fund (derived from the sale of lands donated by the General Government) being used in part payment of salaries, and Rutgers College providing the rest. The annual report shows that the institution is well managed; there were on the rolls last year forty-six (46) pupils; thirty-seven (37) from thirteen counties of this State and nine (9) from other States. The instruction given is thorough and practical, and forms the connecting link between our public schools and the occupations of engineer, architect, and other industries requiring a knowledge of the sciences. It is to be regretted that several of the counties do not more fully avail themselves of their proportion of the scholarships awarded to them by the law, more especially since experience proves the practical advantages which a graduation at this institution confers upon those seeking employment in the higher grades of mechanical business.

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AGRICULTURAL EXPERIMENT STATION.

The second annual report of this institution is replete with information of the greatest value to the agricultural interests of the State. Organized, as it was, but two years ago, its work has been large, and so thoroughly and carefully performed as to give to its conclusions the greatest weight. It is evident that the culture of a farm can be most successfully prosecuted by a knowledge of the constituent elements of its soil; the particular crop most suitable to it; the draft which that crop will make upon that soil, and how that draft may best be met by the aid of fertilizers. The work of the station has been in this direction. Samples of over two hundred and fifty (250) different commercial fertilizers have been analyzed and their value ascertained. A series of experiments have been prosecuted in different parts of the State, tending to show the effect of eleven different fertilizers, upon seven classes of soil, in the growth of Indian corn. Numerous analyses of various foods and fodders have been made; and their effect upon the production and quality of milk has been examined into, and in a great measure ascertained. A number of trials have been made with a view of determining the best manner of cultivating the sorghum plant, involving the questions as to what varieties are most suitable to this climate, upon what character of soil it should be grown, how that soil should be fertilized, how the crop should be treated, and which variety produces the greatest yield of valuable matter. The information thus secured has been furnished to the newspapers, and directly to a large number of farmers throughout the State in form of bulletins. These have been eagerly looked for, and in many instances utilized; and have resulted in a quickening of the interest and enterprise of our agriculturists, and the adoption of measures looking to a more productive management of the farm and farm yard. The benefit of this, in view of the present condition of this important interest, can hardly be over estimated, and the money appropriated by the State to this institution could scarcely be more wisely invested.

## GEOLOGICAL SURVEY.

The report of the State Geologist shows the continuation

of the work assigned to this department, and is accompanied by a topographical map; being the first of a series intended to include the entire State. The report also contains valuable suggestions, among the most important of which is that in relation to the water supply of the State. As is stated, the gathering of population in towns and cities not only increases the demand for a system of water supply, but, at the same time, by the accumulation of filth and impurities on the surface, contaminates the ordinary sources. This is especially true of that portion of the State nearest to New York City. The two largest cities of the State, and much of the thickly settled surrounding country, derive their supply of water from a stream defiled by the emptyings of manufactories and sewers for miles above the point at which it is drawn. This condition of affairs must continue to grow worse since the natural growth of the communities increases alike the demand for pure water and the contamination of that upon which they depend. Fortunately, the evil is not irremediable. The natural channels of the Passaic river bring to within fifteen (15) miles of Jersey City, and a shorter distance from Newark, each day over four hundred million (400,000,000) gallons of pure water, gathered from streams, springs and lakes of a mountainous and thinly settled district of country. This immense quantity is delivered in a pure condition at a point one hundred and fifty (150) feet above the level of the sea, from which an easy descent can be made to the places where it is to be distributed. There is urgent necessity that this should be utilized for the benefit of the three hundred thousand (300,000) people who need it, especially as it is, at all times, liable to be pre-occupied by mills, or taken by some single municipality, or, possibly, bought to satisfy the pressing want of the neighboring metropolis. The importance of this subject cannot well be over-estimated, since it includes within itself the health and prosperity of the most densely populated and thriving portion of our State.

#### STATE BOARD OF HEALTH.

The past year has been memorable for the large recognition given by foreign governments and by the General Government to the interests of public health. Many of the

causes of disease are beyond the control of the individual, and so must come under the control of the State.

The Board of Health of this State has been diligent in its work. Besides its inquiry into local causes of disease and the information it imparts as to existing evils, it is often consulted by local boards, and is able to give wise direction to measures for limiting or preventing epidemics and for securing a better average of health. In its care over the contagious diseases of animals, it is required to exercise continued watchfulness, Pleuro-pneumonia has much diminished, but is occasionally introduced from neighboring States. The details as to it appear in the report of the State Board of Agriculture. The report of the Council on Food Adulterations, as under the supervision of the Board of Health, will be found of much value.

The Department of Vital Statistics is in accord with the best models of other countries and states. It is satisfactory to know that the General Government in preparing the mortuary tabulations for the last census relied on the returns of Massachusetts and New Jersey as their standard for comparison as to completeness. The value of these returns for legal purposes, for questions of pension and insurance, and their necessity for the study of the causes of disease and the conditions of population in the various localities is now fully conceded. Health is the capital of the workingman, and the comfort of all. The State cannot too closely guard the vital interests of its population so far as these necessarily come within its jurisdiction and are dependent upon general enactments.

#### LABOR BUREAU.

To whatever criticisms this department may have been subjected heretofore, its labors have been of great benefit to the State, and have earned for it the regard of those in whose interests it was created. The report gives a history of its transactions during the past year, and presents much valuable information as to some of the more important manufacturing industries of the State, showing, more particularly, the condition of the workingmen therein. The manner in which this department has performed the duties assigned to it, proves the wisdom of its creation, and war-

rants its continuance. By the report it is shown that there are in the State six thousand nine hundred and fifty-nine (6,959) manufacturing establishments with a capital of one hundred and five millions eight hundred and thirty-eight thousand nine hundred and fifty-one dollars (\$105,838,951); employing an average of one hundred and twenty thousand five hundred and thirty-two (120,532) persons; paying forty-three million seven hundred and fifty-seven thousand seven hundred and fifty-three dollars (\$43,757,753) in wages, and producing annually two hundred and forty-five million dollars (\$245,000,000) worth of wares.

#### PILOTAGE.

The report of the Commissioners of Pilotage presents a summary of the work performed under their direction during the year, and again calls attention to the continued improper obstruction of Newark and Raritan bays, Staten Island Sound and the Kill Von Kull by the dumping of refuse matter therein. This is a subject of great importance and deserves prompt treatment, and I suggest to you the propriety of giving to the Pilot Commissioners the power to regulate and prevent the illegal obstruction of these important highways, and bring offenders to punishment. It is of the greatest necessity that this power should be in the hands of some persons who are apt to be readily informed of the violations. The Commissioners, through the pilots, would be brought in daily contact with the facts, and, therefore, be the better able to apply the proper remedies for their correction.

#### PENSIONS.

There was paid from the State Treasury last year, on account of pensions, the sum of seven thousand eight hundred and thirty-seven dollars and twenty-two cents (\$7,837.22). The law of 1874 provided for the payment of a pension of one hundred dollars (\$100) per year to soldiers and sailors of the war of 1812, until the United States Government should take upon itself the burden. This was done in 1878; and the pensioners of New Jersey were all placed on the government rolls, except twenty-eight (28) who, while they had been mustered into the service of the State in the

defence of the coast, had not been made a part of the national forces. To these the State continues to pay the pension of one hundred dollars (\$100) per annum. It was made known to the Legislature in 1880 that there were certain persons, who, having been entitled to the pension under the act of 1874, had not presented their claims, and were, therefore, debarred from the benefits of the law of that year. By the acts of 1880 and 1881, it was provided that such persons should be entitled to receive the pension for the period between the passage of the act of 1874 and of the United States law in 1878—within a few days of four (4) years. To the Adjutant General was assigned the duty of authenticating these claims; and he has approved eleven (11) of them and rejected one (1). There was paid to these claimants the sum of four thousand two hundred and sixty-eight dollars and sixty-six cents (\$4,268.66). This, with the claims of the first mentioned list, and about two hundred dollars (\$200) expenses in collecting claims from the United States Government, makes up the amount paid from the Treasury. There is no probability that any more claims will be presented, and the pension list will be limited to the twenty-eight (28) regular pensioners; calling for the payment of about two thousand eight hundred dollars (\$2,800) a year.

In this connection it is but proper that I should direct your attention to the important work performed by the Adjutant General's department, in the matter of collecting pensions due from the General Government to indigent and meritorious persons. The duty thus assigned by the joint resolution of 1880 has been conscientiously and thoroughly performed; many pensions have been secured solely through the department, and important assistance has been rendered in many other cases. The examination of records and correspondence have been in themselves a very large addition to the work of the office; and it has been further increased by the necessity of frequent and lengthy visits to the department at Washington for the furtherance of the objects sought. This work has been performed by the Adjutant General without any extra assistance, and in a very satisfactory manner. And I suggest to you the propriety of making provision for a proper increase of the compensation of the officer performing it.

## BOUNDARY.

A vacancy having occurred in the commission on the part of this State to adjust the boundary line between this State and the State of New York, I appointed Abraham Browning, Esq., to fill such vacancy. The Legislature at its last session authorized the commissioners to ascertain and agree upon the location of the boundary line as originally established and marked with monuments. The commission has held several meetings with the commissioners on the part of New York, and with them, have taken measures to have such of the monuments as have become dilapidated replaced, and additional monuments erected. This work has not yet been concluded, and will form the subject of a future report.

## MISCELLANEOUS.

In accordance with the request of the Executive Committee of the National Conference of Charities and Correction, in July last, I appointed Messrs. Charles H. O'Neill, George W. Helme, John F. Hageman and A. S. Meyrick as delegates to represent the State at the eighth annual session of that body. Mr. Meyrick was the only one who was able to attend, and his observations and deductions were so full of interest that I requested him to make a report to me in order that it might be printed and laid before you. This has been done, and I commend it to you as containing much worthy of your careful attention.

My attention has been called to the wholesale destruction of fish along our coast by the use of purse nets in the catching of menhaden or mossbunkers, for manufacturing purposes. The result of the pursuit of this business is, that food fishes are either destroyed, or are driven from our waters in search of food; and hundreds of our citizens are deprived of their natural occupations. Every means should be resorted to prevent this injury to our people in that locality, and, if advisable, the attention of the General Government should be directed to the subject, and its interposition invoked.

I would also suggest that, through our representatives in Congress, an effort be made to secure additional compensation to the men engaged in the life-saving service. The

present pay is commensurate neither with the dangers and hardship of the work performed by those men nor with the great results of it. There is no class of public servants which is more deserving of encouragement and liberal support than this. They have displayed a heroism and daring worthy of the highest commendation.

*The State Librarian* reports the receipt of nine hundred and thirty-one (931) additional volumes during the year. The commissioners of the library directed the sending to the State Prison, for the use of that institution, of two hundred and eighty-nine volumes of miscellaneous literature, consisting of duplicates, broken sets, &c., which, while of little or no value to the library, were of considerable benefit to the prisoners. The annual appropriation to the purposes of the Library is seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$750).

The alterations in the ventilation of the Senate and Assembly chambers which were directed to be made by a joint resolution of the last Legislature, have been completed under the direction of the Treasurer and myself, and it is believed will answer the purpose of the resolution. The cost of the work was much less than the amount of the appropriation.

The report of the *Commissioner of Railroad Taxation* gives an account of the business of the last year, and also an interesting resume of the transactions of the office since its creation.

*The State Board of Pharmacy* reports the proceedings of the year, and asks for further legislation to enable them to enforce the present law.

The important juncture in our financial affairs has led me to present to you at more than ordinary length, my observations as to the existing condition of our State, and my views as to what is proper to be done in regard to it, in order that you may the better appreciate that condition, and provide for it. I will gladly join you in any effort which you may make to meet it, and trust that you will give to its consideration all the care and wisdom which its importance demands.

amendments that were presented, failed to receive the requisite vote. The amendments I have now the honor to transmit, are those which have received the assent of at least six members of the commission. In obedience to the instructions of the commission I now present the accompanying amendments as the result of our deliberations.

## PROPOSED

### AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION,

Reported by the Constitutional Commission to the Legislature of the State of New Jersey.

## ARTICLE IV.

### LEGISLATIVE.

#### *Section I.*

Strike out paragraph 3 and insert as paragraph 3 a new paragraph, as follows:

3. Members of the senate and general assembly shall be elected biennially, the former for terms of four years; and the latter for terms of two years, on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November; or on such other day as the legislature may designate by law for holding such election; their terms of office shall begin on the first day of January next after their election. If vacancies happen, by resignation or otherwise, the persons chosen to supply such vacancies shall be elected for the unexpired term only; the two houses shall meet separately on the second Tuesday in January, in the year eighteen hundred and eighty-five, and every second year thereafter.

#### *Section II.*

Paragraph 1. Strike out the word "three" and insert in lieu thereof the word "four."

Strike out paragraph 2 and insert as paragraph 2 a new paragraph, as follows:

2. The senate meeting in January, in the year eighteen hundred and eighty-four, shall so divide themselves that the seats of eleven senators shall be vacated at the expiration of said year, and the seats of the other senators shall be vacated at the expiration of the year eighteen hundred and eighty-six; the successors of the senators whose seats shall be so vacated shall be chosen at the general elections to be held in said years respectively, and every fourth year thereafter, for the term of four years.

### *Section III.*

Paragraph 1. Strike out the word "annually," and insert in lieu thereof the word "biennially."

Paragraph 7. Strike out the words "Members of the senate and general assembly shall receive annually the sum of five hundred dollars," and insert in lieu thereof the words following:

"Members of the senate shall receive the sum of one thousand dollars, and members of the general assembly shall receive the sum of five hundred dollars."

### *Section VII.*

Paragraph 11. Insert in the paragraph, after the words "may be provided for by general laws," the words following:

But until general laws regulating all the internal affairs of towns and counties shall have been passed, local or special laws may be passed for that purpose (but not for the purpose of appointing local offices or commissions to regulate municipal affairs,) with the assent of three-fifths of all the members elected to each house, which laws shall not take effect until they shall have been referred to the legislature then next to be chosen, and shall be agreed to by three-fifths of the members elected to each house thereof, and be then approved by the governor.

Insert as paragraph 13 a new paragraph, as follows:

13. That no law shall be passed, or contract made by or on behalf of the state or any municipal corporation, by

which the power of taxation shall in any way be impaired or abridged.

Insert as paragraph 14 a new paragraph, as follows:

14. That any municipality may collect by suit any tax or assessment due by any corporation, or imposed upon property owned by it, without in any way impairing the lien thereof, or any other remedy provided by law.

Insert as paragraph 15 a new paragraph, as follows:

15. That the rate of taxation for all municipal, state and county purposes (excepting for the purpose of raising the principal or interest on any debt heretofore incurred) shall in no cases exceed, in any one year, the sum of two dollars on every one hundred dollars of assessed valuation.

Insert as paragraph 16 a new paragraph, as follows:

16. No city shall lawfully use or exercise any of the powers conferred upon it by law involving the expenditure of any money, or the creating of any debt, unless its lawful authorities have previously provided for, or do simultaneously provide for raising by tax, or otherwise, all the money required for the exercise of such power, and have appropriated, or do simultaneously appropriate, the money for that purpose; and any contract or agreement, purporting to have been made with any city for furnishing materials or doing work for the same, or for any other matter in the course of the exercise by such city of any of the powers conferred upon it by law, the money necessary for the performance of which contract or agreement, or for defraying the expense of the exercise of which power has not been previously to, or is not simultaneously with, the making such contract or agreement, or the exercise of such power, provided to be appropriated and raised, shall be void and of no effect against any city or any department thereof, and that the officer or officers of such city who caused, procured, or consented to such contract or agreement, or the exercise of such power, shall be personally liable for all work done or materials furnished thereon or therein.

Insert as paragraph 17 a new paragraph, as follows:

17. That no bonds shall be issued by any city, or any office or department thereof, or any debt be created, to a greater amount in the aggregate, including any indebtedness of such city now existing, than ten per centum of the

average assessed valuation of taxable property within said city for the then next preceding five years; *provided, however*, that this prohibition shall not apply to bonds issued to renew or replace bonds heretofore issued, or to fund any floating indebtedness of such city now existing; and all bonds, obligations, or contracts made or issued, and all debts created by any municipal corporation in contravention of any of the restrictions of this constitution or of any law hereafter passed by the Legislature, shall be absolutely void and incapable of being enforced in the hands of any person whatever, and the power to raise by taxation any money to pay any such bonds, obligations, contracts or debts is expressly withheld.

Insert as paragraph 18 a new paragraph, as follows:

18. No railway or railroad, other than a surface horse car railroad, shall be constructed in or across any street or avenue of any city or town without just compensation being first made for all damages which shall result therefrom to the owners of property abutting on said street or avenue; nor shall any railway or railroad be constructed or operated in or through any public park or square of any city or town, or upon or over any drive or road in or through such park or square, without compensation to the city.

## ARTICLE V.

### EXECUTIVE.

Strike out paragraph 3 and insert as paragraph 3 a new paragraph, as follows:

3. The governor to be next elected, and his successors in office, shall hold the office for four years, to commence on the third Tuesday of January next ensuing the election for governor by the people, and to end on the Monday preceding the third Tuesday of January, four years thereafter; and he and they shall be incapable of holding that office for four years next after their respective terms of office shall have expired; and no appointment or nomination to office shall be made by the governor during the last week of his term.

Paragraph 10. Strike out the word "six" immediately preceding the words "judges of the court of errors and appeals,"

## ARTICLE VI.

## JUDICIARY.

*Section I.*

Strike out section I. and insert as section I. a new section, as follows:

*Section I.*

"1. The judicial power shall be vested in a court of errors and appeals in the last resort in all cases, as heretofore; a court for the trial of impeachments; a court of chancery; a prerogative court, and a supreme court; and in such inferior courts as now exist, or as may be hereafter ordained and established by law; which inferior courts the legislature may alter or abolish, or ordain and establish in any county of the state, or in any judicial district (court) hereafter established by law."

*Section II.*

Strike out paragraph 1 and insert as paragraph 1 a new paragraph, as follows:

"1. The court of errors and appeals shall consist of four judges, who shall be counsellors-at-law of the bar of this state of at least fifteen years' standing; a majority of their number shall constitute a quorum, and the court shall have power to try and determine, in a summary way, the eligibility of its members. The judges who shall be first appointed to be judges of this court shall hold their respective offices during the terms of seven, eight, nine, and ten years, and the duration of the term of each shall be determined by lot at the first meeting of the court after the adoption of this amendment; each succeeding judge shall hold his office for the term of ten years; the disability of any member of the court continuing for more than one year shall vacate his office, and the fact of such continued disability shall be tried and determined by the court."

Strike out paragraph 2 and insert as paragraph 2 a new paragraph, as follows:

"2. The official terms of the judges of said court, as heretofore constituted, shall expire on the third Tuesday in Feb-

ruary next succeeding the adoption of this amendment; the first term of said court shall begin on the first Tuesday in March next succeeding the adoption of this amendment; and thereafter the said court shall hold monthly terms, during ten months in each year."

Strike out paragraph 3 and insert as paragraph 3, as follows:

"3. All writs of error shall be brought only to the court of errors and appeals, and when a writ of error shall be brought, the reasons for the judgment pronounced in the court below, and the reasons for the dissenting opinion of any judge of said court, shall be assigned to the court of errors and appeals in writing; when an appeal from an order or decree of the court of chancery shall be heard, the chancellor or vice chancellor who heard the cause below, shall assign to this court, in writing, the reasons for making such order or decree."

Strike out paragraph 4 and insert as paragraph 4 a new paragraph, as follows:

"4. When a final judgment or decree shall be pronounced in a cause in the court of errors and appeals, each judge who sat in the hearing of such cause shall announce in writing his reasons for uniting in or dissenting from the rendering of such judgment or decree, and the said reasons shall be read in open court, and shall thereafter be filed in the office of the clerk of the court."

Strike out paragraph 5 and insert as paragraph 5 a new paragraph, as follows:

"5. The secretary of state shall be the clerk of this court:

Strike out paragraph 6.

#### *Section IV.*

Paragraph 1. Insert after the word "chancellor" the words following: "and so many vice chancellors as may from time to time be authorized by law to be appointed; the chancellor shall divide the State into circuits, in such manner that a stated session of the court for the final hearing of causes shall be held in each county at least twice in each year at the county town thereof, and all cases shall be heard upon the examination of the witnesses therein *viva voce* in open court, unless the parties to the hearing, or their

solicitors, agree in writing that a cause be heard upon depositions in writing as heretofore; commissions to take testimony may be issued as may be provided by law."

*Section V.*

Strike out paragraph 2 and insert as paragraph 2 a new paragraph, as follows:

"2. The existing circuit courts shall remain and continue until altered or abolished by law, and shall be held in every county of this state, so long as they continue, by one or more of the justices of the supreme court, or a judge appointed for that purpose, and shall in all cases within the county, except in those of a criminal nature, have common law jurisdiction concurrent with the supreme court, and any final judgment of a circuit court may be docketed in the supreme court, and shall operate as a judgment obtained in the supreme court from the time of such docketing."

Strike out paragraph 3.

*Section VI.*

Strike out paragraph 1 and insert as paragraph 1 a new paragraph, as follows:

"1. The existing inferior courts of common pleas shall remain and continue until altered or abolished by law, and so long as they continue there shall be no more than five judges of said court in each of the counties of this state; one judge for each county shall be appointed every year, and no more, except to fill vacancies."

ARTICLE VII.

APPOINTING POWER AND TENURE OF OFFICE.

*Section II.*

Strike out paragraph 1 and insert as paragraph 1 a new paragraph, as follows:

"1. Judges of the court of errors and appeals, justices of the supreme court, chancellor, vice chancellors, judges of the inferior court of common pleas (so long as said courts shall continue unaltered or unabolished by law), and judges of all inferior courts of record which may be hereafter or-

dained and established by law, shall be nominated by the governor, and appointed by him, with the advice and consent of the senate; but the existing vice chancellors shall hold their respective offices until the expiration of their present current terms of office; the judges of the court of errors and appeals shall hold their offices for the term of ten years, subject to the provisions of paragraph one of the sixth article of the constitution; the justices of the supreme court, chancellor and vice chancellors shall hold their offices for the term of seven years; they shall, at stated times, receive for their services a compensation which shall be fixed by law, and shall not be diminished during their respective terms of office; and they shall hold no other office under the government of this state, or of the United States."

Paragraph 2. Strike out the paragraph and insert as paragraph 2 a new paragraph, as follows:

"2. Judges of the existing courts of common pleas shall hold their offices for five years, unless said courts shall be sooner altered or abolished by law, but when appointed to fill vacancies in unexpired terms, they shall hold for the unexpired term only."

Insert as paragraph 12 a new paragraph, as follows:

"12. No judge or judicial officer of any court of this state shall, during the term of his office, nor shall the attorney general, be a director, officer, trustee, receiver, counsel, or attorney of any railroad or canal company exercising its franchises within this state; *provided, however,* that the prohibition to act as attorney or counsel of such corporations shall not apply to the judges of the existing inferior courts of common pleas."

Mr. McAdoo, on leave, introduced,

Assembly Bill, No. 4, entitled

An Act to provide for the election of delegates to a convention to prepare a constitution for the government of this state, and for submitting the same to the people thereof for ratification or rejection.

Which was read a first time by its title, ordered to have a second reading, and referred to the Committee on Judiciary, when appointed.

Mr. Bell, offered the following resolution :

*Resolved*; That 3000 copies of the Governor's Message be printed in the German language and that the printing of the same be done by Charles F. Schmidt, of Elizabeth, N. J.

Mr. Fiedler offered the following as a substitute :

*Resolved*: That the usual number of copies of the Governor's Message be printed in the German language and that the printing of the same be done by Joseph Know of Newark.

Mr. Bell moved to lay the resolution and the substitute on the table,

Which was agreed to.

Mr. Bell offered the following concurrent resolution :

WHEREAS, the citizens residing along the sea-coast of this State have prepared a memorial extensively signed, to be presented to the present Legislature, setting forth that they have been and are much aggrieved and greatly injured by the steam-yacht menhaden fishing, with shirred or purse seines along our coast; that these steam yachts, driven from the States where owned, come in fleets to our Atlantic shores; that whole schools of fish, consisting of hundreds of barrels, are scooped in the holds of these steamers in a few minutes, and that within a few hundred yards of the beach; that these fish are not caught for food, but for mechanical and fertilizing purposes; that the better grades of food fish are thus largely driven from our shores in quest of food, and the business of the shore fishermen is being literally destroyed and the people deprived of a necessary article of food; and

WHEREAS, This occupation of fishing was one of the chief sources of revenue upon which thousands from Sandy Hook to Cape May have depended for a livelihood, thereby, supporting their families and adding to the material prosperity of the State; and the same has so greatly

depreciated since the steam yacht fishing that, whereas some years ago our fishermen would catch from 500 to 800 pounds of sea bass, or other fish, in a short day, it is now considered a good day's work if they bring on shore from 50 to 80 pounds, and

WHEREAS, There seems to be a question as to the jurisdiction, over the waters along the Atlantic coast of our State, and it seems necessary for the protection of the interests of larger numbers of our citizens that legislative aid should be secured from the power that has authority over the same; therefore,

1. *Be it resolved* by the General Assembly of the State of New Jersey (the Senate concurring), That the Attorney General of this State be directed to ascertain the rights of New Jersey in the waters referred to in the above preamble, and report the same to this Legislature at as early a date as practicable; that, if possible, such legislation may be extended and enacted as will afford protection to this class of our citizens, and vindicate the rights of New Jersey against these mercenaries who are foreign to the interests of our commonwealth.

Which was read and adopted.

Mr. Lawrence offered the following resolution:

*Resolved*, That until otherwise ordered, the rules of the last session be adopted as the rules of this body.

Which was read and adopted.

Mr. Moore offered the following resolution:

*Resolved*, That when this House adjourns, it adjourn to meet on Friday morning at 8 o'clock, and when it then adjourns, it adjourn to meet on Monday evening at 8 o'clock.

Which was read and adopted.

Mr. Shields, on leave, introduced

Assembly bill, No. 5, entitled

An act for the improvement and maintenance of certain roads.

Which was read a first time by its title, ordered to have a second reading, and referred to the Committee on Corporations, when appointed.

Mr. Durrell, on leave, introduced

Assembly bill, No. 6, entitled

An act to limit rates of ferriage.

Which was read a first time by its title, ordered to have a second reading, and referred to the Committee on Corporations, when appointed.

Mr. McAdoo, on leave, introduced.

Assembly Bill, No. 7, entitled

An Act to provide for raising taxes for the use of the state upon certain corporations, joint stock companies and associations.

Which was read a first time by its title, ordered to have a second reading, and referred to the Committee on Ways and Means, when appointed.

Mr. Matthews, on leave introduced

Assembly Bill, No 8, entitled

An Act in relation to acknowledgment.

Which was read a first time by its title, ordered to have a second reading, and referred to the Committee on Judiciary, when appointed.

Mr. Moore offered the following resolution :

*Resolved*, That a committee of three be appointed by the Speaker to invite the Clergy of Trenton to open the sessions of the House with prayer.

Which was read and adopted.

Mr. Convery, on leave, introduced

Assembly bill, No. 9, entitled

An act for the relief of Marcellus Ayres.

Which was read a first time by its title, ordered to have a second reading, and referred to the Committee on Ways and Means, when appointed.

Mr. Parsons, on leave introduced

Assembly bill, No. 10, entitled

A Supplement to an act entitled "An act to regulate the construction of sidewalks" in the townships of this state, approved April fifth, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight.

Which was read a first time by its title, ordered to have a second reading, and referred to the Committee on Municipal Corporations, when appointed.

Mr. Parsons, on leave, introduced

Assembly bill, No. 11, entitled

A Further Supplement to an act entitled "An act incorporating the inhabitants of townships, designating their powers and regulating their meetings," approved April fourteenth, one thousand eight hundred and forty-six.

*To the House of Assembly,*

I herewith return to the House of Assembly, in which it originated, Assembly bill, No. 69, entitled "An act concerning the Grand Army of the Republic," without my approval.

This bill is very broad in its terms, and has two general provisions as follows:

First, that whenever the Grand Army of the Republic shall go into encampment, the officers in charge of the encampment may issue orders, rules and regulations for the preservation of good order and military discipline within the encampment and for a distance of three hundred yards in every direction beyond such limits; a violation of such orders on the part of a member of the organization may be punished according to the discipline of the organization, and on the part of persons not members of the organization shall be considered as misdemeanors which the civil authorities are required to punish by a fine of not less than ten, nor more than one hundred dollars, or imprisonment for not less than three nor more than thirty days.

Second, That whenever a field encampment of the Grand Army shall be held, the Quartermaster General, at the request of the acting Commandment of the Department, is directed to furnish the necessary tents and camp equipage

in the same manner as they are required to be furnished to the National Guard.

Briefly stated, the proposition is, that a person unknown to the State, and beyond its control, save as a private citizen, may at his own will, and without surveillance or restriction declare what laws are to govern citizens of this State within a certain territory, and give them such publicity as he pleases. Having been issued, they are to be enforced while the encampment continues and to end with its close, but while they are in force, a violation of any of them shall constitute a crime, the punishment for which in the case of a member of the organization, shall be as the organization may direct, and in the case of non members shall be by fine or imprisonment, which the civil magistrates are required summarily to impose. In addition to this being an unwise, if not improper, delegation of the legislative powers, it is in contravention of the provision of the constitution that "no person shall be held to answer for a criminal offence unless on the presentment or indictment of a grand jury, except in cases of impeachment, or in cases cognizable (at the time of the adoption of the constitution) by justices of the peace."

The second proposition, while seeming to be fair, is not so, by any means. By it, the Quartermaster General would be compelled to issue the property of the State to an organization having no connection with it, without any security for its return. In the case of the National Guard, the fact that its officers and members are part of the State Government, responsible to it for the proper performance of their public duty, and that the authorities may withhold from the appropriations to the military companies, the value of property not returned to it, provide ample means for securing the State from loss. In the case of the Grand Army of the Republic, there is no such protection, and as a matter of experience loss had universally resulted to the State from the loan of its material to the encampments of this organization. The actual loss of material, exclusive of wear and tear, by the Deckertown encampment, was \$545 68, and it would have been much more, but for the fact that the State sent a special officer to collect the material which had been abandoned, and to return it to the Arsenal. By the encampment at Skillman's, in 1879, the

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loss was \$512 23 and by the encampment at Bordentown, in 1880, it was \$642 62. The Legislature in 1879 (see pamphlet laws 1879, page 65), provided a method by which all lawful organizations of veterans can secure the use of the military stores of the State on giving proper security for its return. That law is in force now, and is, in my opinion, as ample in its provisions as the State should go. I, therefore, am compelled to decline to approve this bill.

MR. SPEAKER:

In compliance with the resolution of the House, I have the honor to return Assembly Bill, No. 43, with the following opinion. The Eleventh Section of an act, entitled "An act for building bridges over the rivers Passaic and Hackensack, and for other purposes therein mentioned approved November 24," 1790, provided "that it may and shall be lawful for the said commissioners or a major part of them, and they or a major part of them are hereby authorized and empowered at their discretion to contract and agree with any person or persons who will undertake the same for such or for so many years, and upon such conditions as in the discretion of them," etc. The twelfth section of said act provided "that the said contract and agreement so made, signed, sealed and delivered in pursuance of and in conformity to this act shall be binding on the parties contracting as well as the State of New Jersey," etc. By virtue of said act and its supplements the said commissioners did on 19th day of February, 1793, enter into a contract with certain persons their heirs and assigns who were afterwards incorporated under the name of "The Proprietors of the Bridges over the Passaic and Hackensack" for the term of ninety-seven years (Book B. of Deeds, Essex Co., fol. 157, etc.). The said commissioners by this contract, demised, granted and

to farm let unto the said parties the said bridges, to be erected, together with the tolls appertaining thereto, which tolls were not *to exceed certain rates specified in said contract*. In 1871 the legislature passed an act entitled, "An act to provide for a free bridge across the Passaic river, at the city of Newark," by virtue of which act certain persons were authorized to purchase the bridge across the Passaic river at the foot of Bridge St., for the public use of the counties of Essex and Hudson.

This act further provided that, "in consideration of the expenses of keeping up a turnpike road east of Watkin's tavern they may charge over the Hackensack bridge the same rates of toll as are now allowed by the charter over the Passaic and Hackensack bridges." I am of the opinion that by the contract of the commissioners the legislature became legally bound to the fulfillment of the conditions therein specified. That this contract being made before the introduction into the constitution of the clause which permits alteration or repeal at the pleasure of the legislature could not be violated except in the exercise of eminent domain, without the consent of the other contracting party. In the time afforded me for examination I have been unable to find any evidence of an alteration of said contract; whether any alteration of said contract has been made by the consent of the parties thereto I cannot tell.

*Resolved*, That a copy of these resolutions be transmitted to Secretary of State Frelinghuysen for presentation to the President.

*To the House of Assembly.*

GENTLEMEN: Your committee which was appointed to inquire into and ascertain if the requirements of an act entitled a further supplement to an act entitled "An act for the government and regulation of the State Prison," approved March twenty-fifth, one thousand eight hundred and

eighty-one, report the following :

That at a stated meeting of the committee Hon. Charles B. Moore, supervisor of the State Prison appeared by invitation and reported, that contracts had been made with three different parties for the employment of the convicts, one contract calling for one hundred men at shoes, another for one hundred men at whips, and the other for three hundred men at shirts, collars and cuffs and in laundry department. As the law implies that there shall be but one hundred men employed at any one trade there was a question in the minds of your committee as to whether the manufacture of shirts, collars and cuffs and the laundrying of the same, should under the law of 1881 be considered as separate enterprises. Examination showed that the same doubt was felt by the state authorities at the time of making the contracts and before completing them, they had referred the matter to the Attorney General, and it was under his advice that the subsequent action was taken.

The opinion of the Attorney-General to your committee is hereto annexed.

In view of the opinion of the Attorney-General, your committee recommend that the Committee on State Prison be requested to prepare and introduce a bill making the said act of 1881 more definite and explicit by providing that not more than one hundred men shall at any time work upon or manufacture articles from the same material.

MY DEAR SIR: My opinion is asked as the legality of

an agreement date June 18th, 1881, between the supervisor of the New Jersey State Prison, and Daniel H. Downs and Cornelius M. Finch, in which agreement the labor and services of two hundred convicts are contracted for as follows:

Eighty men (80) in the Laundry Business.

Eighty men (80) in the Shirt Mf'g Business.

Twenty men (20) in the Collar Mf'g Business.

Twenty men (20) in the Box Making Mf'g Business.

The act of March 25th, 1881, provided against hiring or contracting with any person or corporation the labor of prisoners or any part of them exceeding one hundred persons in number at any time in the prosecution or conduct of any special branch of industry, trade or business, or making or manufacturing goods, wares or merchandise of any kind. It is manifest that the question of the meaning of "*a specified branch of industry*," is more properly a question for an expert than for legal judgment. In one sense the expression would include the manufacturing of all articles made out of the same material; in a more limited sense it would divide the branches as numerous as the fabrics into which the raw material can be manufactured. My own opinion is, that the legislature have left the determination of the question to the discretion of the supervisor and inspectors, and that the contract is legal.

I herewith return to the House of Assembly in which it originated

An act relative to the adulteration of sugar and syrup without my approval.

This bill provides that manufacturers of sugar and syrup who shall mix or compound therewith any Glucose or Grape Sugar must mark the package with the word "adulterated," under a penalty of five hundred dollars for the first offence, and from one to ten thousand dollars for each subsequent offence, one half of said fine to be paid to the informer.

It will be observed that there is no penalty attached to the sale of these mixed sugars or syrups, and therefore the practical effect of this bill must be to prevent the manufacture of them within this state, and at the same time allow the products of foreign manufacturers to be sold without restriction. This is evidently to the detriment of the people and capital of the state without any protection to the citizens, if indeed they need such.

The manufacture of Glucose or Corn Sugar is an enterprise yet in its infancy; it will if successful mechanically as it has every promise of being, result in the utilization of the corn crop of the country; the increase of the sugar supply and the consequent employment of a large amount of capital and labor.

Scientists of acknowledged ability and integrity have declared it to be a healthful article of food, and there is no reason why the result of its mixture with Cane Sugar should be marked "adulterated," as if it were a debasement or pollution. If it is thought best that the combination should be branded as such there is ample provision in the law relative to the adulteration of food and drugs. See pamphlet laws of 1881, page 283.

STATE OF NEW JERSEY,

TRENTON, March 22, 1882. }

TO THE SENATE:

I herewith return to the Senate, without approval, Senate bill 167, entitled "An act to establish and protect the rights of the grantees, lessees and licensees of this State from easements on lands now or heretofore lying below high-water mark, in the tide-waters in this State, and to maintain the revenues derived therefrom and appropriated to the support of free schools."

Under this somewhat pretentious title this act provides that in all cases in which, either by grant by the Riparian Commissioners or by license, persons have or may obtain authority to possess and improve lands lying below the ancient natural high-water mark, whether such lands have been reclaimed or not, they may hold the lands so conveyed free and discharged from any easement heretofore imposed on such lands, and no street or highway laid out or dedicated on said lands shall continue to exist, but every easement connected with and attached to such opening or dedication shall be abrogated and discharged.

This is the broad provision of the bill, and while it is subject to some provisos, their restrictions are of so shadowy

and immaterial a character as not essentially to affect or limit the immense privileges granted.

This bill is universal in its application, within the limits of the State, and, therefore, while the vast interests involved are beyond the ordinary powers of realization, yet the consideration of its effects upon one or two localities will enable us to appreciate its great importance and to understand how baneful may be its effect upon very large interests in the State. Without attempting, therefore, to study out the practical bearings of the policy of this bill upon the State at large, allow me to call your attention to its effects upon that part which may be most seriously affected, viz: the shore opposite the City of New York.

As applied to the very large part of the county of Hudson, the purpose and effect of this bill is simply this: To wipe out and destroy the conditions under which original proprietors sold, and the present owners purchased, their lands. Those proprietors, on occupying the lands of which they were possessed, divided them up into lots and parcels, and in order to make them available for small owners, set aside and dedicated to public use and the private advantage of the lot owners, certain portions of the tracts as streets and avenues as a means of communication between the several lot owners and the surrounding territory, including access to the highway common to all—the river, which brought within their reach the commerce of the world.

So far as it did this, this dedication included not only the right of the public to use these streets and avenues, but also the separate and distinct right of the individual owner to communication with his neighbours, and with those beyond his immediate locality, by land or water.

The right was not only a valuable one, but it was under the dedication an inseparable one, except so far as it might be inconsistent with public necessity or public advantage, when it might be taken by proper adjudication, on the payment of sufficient compensation.

This right of the public to use, and of private owners to have access, to the water front, was not impaired or curtailed by the filling in of the land beyond the former limits, because our courts had repeatedly maintained the prin-

ciple laid down by Justice Depue in the case of the Hoboken Land and Improvement Company vs. The Mayor and Common Council of the City of Hoboken, (7th Vroom, page 540), "that an act of the Legislature incorporating a land and improvement company and authorizing it to fill up, employ, possess and enjoy all land covered with water-fronting and adjoining lands that might be owned by the corporation, and to construct thereon wharves, piers, slips and other structures for commercial and shipping purposes, will not extinguish the public right of access to the navigable waters by a street on land purchased by the company, which, by the dedication, terminated at the high-water line, as it was when the dedication was made; but the connection of the street with the navigable waters will be continued over lands reclaimed by filling in under such legislative permission."

In both Hoboken and Jersey City what may be called the original proprietors purchased large tracts of land bordering on the water front, the chief value of which consisted in its location upon a navigable stream, and its proximity to, and consequent easy communication with the neighboring metropolis. That land, held in bulk was of small value, and to enhance that value the proprietors divided it up into blocks and lots and dedicated to the use of individual lot owners and the public generally, a certain portion of the land as public streets running to, and in some cases extending beyond the then water front. A large part of the streets thus laid out and dedicated was beyond the ancient natural high-water mark. The policy of the proprietors in so doing was a wise and profitable one. The public bought those lots at remunerative prices, built upon the faith of those dedications and have expended large sums of money in their improvement. The proprietors grew rich and the community increased in size and importance. The successors of those proprietors, particularly those in Hoboken, forgetful of the advantages they have already derived, have sought from time to time, through our courts, to secure an amelioration of the conditions of their dedications, but the judiciary have firmly interposed its protecting hand and refused to break down the bulwark which sheltered the public and the individual owners.

The case cited above is a very recent and comprehensive one, and states fully the principle upon which the decisions of the Courts have been rendered. It is a principle founded on right and justice.

It is this principle which the bill before me overthrows and destroys by abrogating all those dedications, closing the streets at the very door of those who have purchased land and built houses on the faith of those dedications, and saying to these owners: If you want these streets the city may lay them out again, if it can, and under the State's right of eminent domain, if it can be invoked, may purchase of the proprietors the land which they have already disposed of as a consideration for your purchasing their lots.

Having made their bargain with the lot owners on their own terms and to their own advantage, and the Courts, having on the ground of public justice and honesty, held them to those bargains, they now appeal to a higher power, and ask that while they retain all the benefits of the agreement, the purchasers may be deprived of the rights which they acquired that they may be given to them.

This bill is the result and the embodiment of that appeal.

Can anything be more unfair than this?

Is it not taking the property of one individual to give it to another without any pretence of public necessity or any other sufficient reason?

Is it not, under the circumstances, an abuse of the legislative power and a violation of the principles of fair dealing and justice?

It seems so to me, and I, therefore, decline to give my approval of it.

Shinn, being duly sworn, on his oath, saith, That he is a member of the General Assembly of this State, from the county of Atlantic; that during Monday night, 27th instant, he was called upon by a man well known to him, who said that he had come to talk about Senate Bill 167, and during the conversation he offered this deponent \$300 to vote for Senate Bill 167, over the Governor's veto; that this deponent refused, and he was then asked to call at a certain room on Tuesday morning, 26th instant, at half-past eight o'clock, but did not do so, and later he was met

by the same party, whom complained because this deponent did not call at the room as agreed upon; that this deponent then stated that he would vote to sustain the Governor; that in the meantime this deponent had called upon William McAdoo, from the county of Hudson, and after informing him of the facts above stated, it was agreed that if any more offers of money were made to this deponent for his vote on Senate Bill 167 that the money should be accepted and the whole affair exposed in the House of Assembly; that while this deponent was in his seat he was told that a man wanted to see him, and went out into the lobby where he found the party referred to in this affidavit, who said that he had a mathematical problem to submit to this deponent which was as follows: "Your vote is to 167 as \$500 is to your answer;" that this deponent stated that double the amount might make him answer, at which the party who submitted the problem stated that the other members who were voting for the bill only received \$500, except those who were engaged as attorneys for the bill, but that he would see me again; that this deponent then went to his seat and remained a short time, when he was again called out by a messenger, who informed him that a party wanted to see him; that this deponent then went out and found the party there who had submitted the mathematical problem, and he submitted it again in the following shape: "As your vote is to 167 so is \$1,000 to your answer;" that this deponent answered "All right—if the money is left in my room at dinner time." That after this deponent returned to his seat again, he was told he was wanted again, and on going out was told that he would get \$500 in his room at dinner time, and \$500 after the bill was passed; that he would get it all now, but that the party who furnished it had used more among others than he expected. This deponent said all right, and on going to his room in his hotel after the adjournment, he sat down, when a man came there with a package, saying he was instructed to give it to Mr. Shinn. That this deponent then opened the envelope, and found that it contained five one hundred dollar bills, which this deponent still has in his possession.

# REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE

To Investigate the Charges against the Grand Army of the Republic.

To the Honorable Members of the House of Assembly,

GENTLEMEN:—Your special committee, appointed by resolution of the House to investigate the charges against the

Grand Army of the Republic, would most respectfully report as follows:

In regard to losses, amounting to \$545.68, sustained by the State at encampment of the Grand Army at Decker-town in 1878: that after a careful examination of the officers of the Grand Army and of the National Guard and others connected with said encampment, they are satisfied that the Grand Army, as an organization, is not and never was responsible for said loss, all of the military stores claimed to have been lost being issued to the National Guard. In regard to the loss sustained at Camp Skillman in 1879, amounting to \$512.23, your committee find \$397.83 charged as being paid for cleaning camp and garrison equipage and arms, repairing tents, etc., this work having been done by men regularly employed at the State Arsenal by the year. This amount, your committee think should not have been charged against the Grand Army, as the employees engaged on this work would have been paid, whether employed on this work or not. Your committee also find \$87.50 charged as loss of camp and garrison equipage. The amount charged for these articles is largely in excess of what the United States pay for the same articles. At regular army prices the articles lost would amount to \$30.66, making a difference of \$56.93. The amount of ordnance and ordnance stores lost, as claimed by Quartermaster's books, is \$26.81. Of this amount there must be deducted \$16.50 for a musket and three ramrods bought by the commander of the Grand Army to replace those lost, and for which credit is afterwards given him by the State, amounting to \$18.81, leaving a balance of \$8.00 due the State; making the entire loss of camp and garrison equipage and ordnance \$38.66. This amount the Quartermaster General, by letter to the commander of the Grand Army, requested him to cancel by an affidavit as being lost, thus wiping it all out. At the encampment at Bordentown the amount of loss claimed amounted to \$642.62. Of this amount \$260.68 was paid the regular employees for cleaning arms and repairing camp and garrison equipage, etc., which amount your committee think should not be charged to the Grand Army. The amount of camp and garrison equipage lost at prices claimed by the State was \$147.00, at regular army prices \$71.00, making a difference of \$76.02; amount of ordnance

furnished and not paid for was \$173.91; ordnance stores, \$1, making a net loss to the State of \$245.07.

In regard to the ordnance furnished the Grand Army, your committee find that at Camp Skillman the amount paid the State by the Grand Army was \$286.22. As this was consumed by the Grand Army, not for its own use, but for the amusement of the public, your committee are doubtful if it should be charged to the Grand Army. Counting the ammunition used at Bordentown, your committee find the result of their labors to be as follows: Amount of loss to State, at Deckertown, nothing; at Camp Skillman, nothing; at Bordentown, \$245.07.

In conclusion we would say that, by order of Governor McClellan, every cent of indebtedness of the Grand Army was cancelled, and would not have been retained on the books of the Quartermaster General as a charge against the Grand Army, except for the exceedingly precise and particular method of keeping accounts as to the issue and return of ordnance and ordnance stores, &c., from the department.

Your committee find that the action of his Excellency, the Governor, in vetoing the bill was based upon the facts as presented to him, and that on these facts it could not have been otherwise in justice to himself and the State.

Your committee recommend that the veto of the Governor be sustained.

Mr. Cator rose to a question of privilege, stating that as Chairman of the Special Committee appointed to investigate the charges of bribery preferred by the member from Atlantic (Mr. Shinn), he desired to submit a report, and thereupon sent said report to the Clerk's desk.

Mr. Bell rose to a point of order, "that the report of a committee was not in order while amendments to a bill were pending."

The Speaker ruled that Mr. Cator under a question of privilege had a right to present the report and ordered the same received.

Mr. Bell appealed from the decision of the chair.

The Speaker denied the right of an appeal from the decision of the chair on a question of high privilege like the report of a special committee, where the honor of the House was concerned.

Mr. Cator insisted on the consideration and reading of the report.

Mr. Bell rose to a point of order that he had yielded the floor only for the purpose of permitting action on

Mr. Robertson rose to a point of order, "that the consideration of the report was not in order."

Mr. Robertson appealed from the decision of the chair.

Mr. Cator insisted that the point of order could not be raised during the reading of the report.

The Speaker said: "An appeal can be made at any time, but that the point of order was not well taken and he would so rule until the gentleman produced authority to substantiate his position." He directed the Clerk to proceed with the reading of the report.

Messrs. Bell, Robertson, Parsons, Herr and several others rose to points of order.

The Clerk at the direction of the Speaker proceeded to read.

Mr. Bell rose again to a point of order "that the only question before the House was the consideration of the resolution offered by himself."

The Speaker said he had already decided that point, and unless he was shown authority to the contrary of such decision, he would so continue to hold.

Mr. Bell again appealed from the decision of the chair, but the chair denied the right to appeal and held to his ruling.

Mr. Robertson appealed from the ruling of the chair and proceeded to discuss his right of appeal, and to quote from Cushing's Manual, the adopted authority of the House. Pending his remarks

*Thereupon*, at the hour of twelve o'clock, noon, being the hour fixed for adjournment, the House of Assembly proceeded to the Senate Chamber, the Speaker announced the adjournment of the House, and the President of the Senate declared the One Hundred and sixth Legislature adjourned *sine die*.

## CONCURRENT RESOLUTIONS.

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WHEREAS, Frauds on a large scale have recently been exposed within the borders of the State, and men held in high esteem have confessed themselves defaulters, while systems for preventing speculation have proved of no avail; and

WHEREAS, These frauds could have been prevented or their extent greatly reduced but for the excessive confidence reposed in officials; and

WHEREAS, Too much care cannot be exercised in the supervision of the public funds; therefore be it

*Resolved* (House of Assembly concurring); That on account of the excited state of public feeling in certain sections of this community, an investigation into the system of public accounts and an examination of the State finances be made forthwith; and

*Resolved*, That a Joint Committee of five members on the part of the House be appointed to take the subject into consideration and report upon it by bill or otherwise at an early date; and

*Resolved*, That it be the sense of the Senate (House of Assembly concurring) that this action is the result of recent exposures elsewhere, and should not in any way be construed as a reflection upon the financial management of this State or any part thereof, 31, 93-94, 117, 169.

WHEREAS, During the interim which has elapsed since the last meeting of this Legislature a nation has been called to pass through a season of calamity and grief over the assassination of our late President, James A. Garfield, therefore,

*Resolved* (House of Assembly concurring), That in the life and character of President Garfield, we recognize the true type of an American citizen, soldier, and statesman; he so maintained himself as to merit the plaudits not only of his fellow citizens of all parties, but of the civilized world; and

*Resolved*, That as representatives of New Jersey in Legislature assembled we denounce and condemn the act of the vile assassin, 32, 94-95, 118.

WHEREAS, Judson Kilpatrick, a distinguished citizen of this State, whose service in behalf of his country made his name illustrious, and conferred honor upon our commonwealth, recently departed this life while representing the Government of the United States at the Republic of Chili; and

WHEREAS, The people of New Jersey desire that his remains should be brought from that distant land and be deposited in the soil of his native state; therefore be it

*Resolved*, (The Senate concurring), That our Senators and Representatives in Congress be, and they are hereby respectfully requested to secure the early action of the National Government in the premises in order that our wishes in this respect may be gratified, 36, 105.

WHEREAS, the citizens residing along the sea-coast of this State have prepared a memorial extensively signed, to be presented to the present Legislature, setting forth that they have been and are much aggrieved and greatly injured by the steam-yacht menhaden fishing, with shirred or purse seines along our coast; that these steam-yachts, driven from the States where owned, come in fleets to our Atlantic shores; that whole schools of fish, consisting of hundreds of barrels, are scooped in the holds of these steamers in a few minutes, and that within a few hundred yards of the beach; that these fish are not caught for food, but for mechanical and fertilizing purposes; that the better grades of food fish are thus largely driven from our shores in quest of food, and the business of the shore fishermen literally destroyed and the people deprived of a necessary article of food; and

WHEREAS, This occupation of fishing was one of the chief sources of revenue upon which thousands from Sandy Hook to Cape May have depended for a livelihood, thereby supporting their families and adding to the material prosperity of the State; and the same has so greatly depreciated since the steam-yacht fishing that, whereas some years ago our fishermen would catch from 500 to 800 pounds of sea bass, or other fish, in a short day, it is now considered a good day's work if they bring on shore from 50 to 80 pounds, and

WHEREAS, There seems to be a question as to the jurisdiction over the waters along the Atlantic coast of our State, and it seems necessary for the protection of the interests of large numbers of our citizens that legislative and should be secured from the power that has authority over the same; therefore,

1. *Be it resolved* by the General Assembly of the State of New Jersey (the Senate concurring), That the Attorney General of this State be directed to ascertain the rights of New Jersey in the waters referred to in the above preamble, and report the same to this Legislature at as early a date as practicable; that, if possible, such legislation may be extended and enacted as will afford protection to this class of our citizens, and vindicate the rights of New Jersey against these mercenaries who are foreign to the interests of our commonwealth, 84-85.

WHEREAS, The gallant men engaged in the life saving service of the United States are deserving of the encouragement and gratitude of the American people, for the heroism and courage they have exhibited and for the hardships and sufferings they have endured in rescuing many thousands of human lives and preserving millions of dollars of property, and

WHEREAS, the compensation paid to these men for their valuable services is not sufficient to provide them and their families with a decent support, and is alleged to be less than paid to any other class of public servants, and

WHEREAS, a bill is now pending before Congress, having for its object the increase of the pay of these men to an extent commensurate with the dangers and hardships of the service, and the great benefits derived therefrom,

1. *Be it resolved* (House of Assembly concurring), that the senators and representatives in Congress from this State are requested to use all honorable efforts, to secure the early passage of said bill.

2. *Be it resolved*, That the Governor be requested to transmit to each of the senators and representatives from New Jersey, a copy of these resolutions, 104, 110

WHEREAS, there appears among the published laws of this State a certain act, approved March 14th, 1879, entitled "a supplement to an act regulating proceedings in criminal cases" (Révision), approved March 27th, 1874; and

WHEREAS, persons have been tried and imprisoned under the said act, and it has been publicly asserted in our courts that the said act of March 14th, 1879, is not, nor ever has been, one of the laws of this State, and should not be upon the statute books; therefore, be it

*Resolved*, (the Senate concurring), that a special committee of five, composed of two members of the Senate and three members of the House, be appointed to investigate as to the passage of the said act above referred to, and whether the same was enacted as one of the laws of this State; and that said committee have authority to send for persons and papers, 114.

*Resolved* (the Senate concurring), that a conference committee of three members of the House of Assembly and three members of the Senate, be appointed to fix upon the time for holding a joint session of both houses, and report the same at an early day, that prompt action may be taken thereupon, 211, 228, 229, 251.

*Resolved*, (the Senate concurring), that a committee of five members of this House, of whom the Speaker shall be one, and three of the Senate, be appointed, whose duty it shall be to visit the various county lunatic asylums and investigate their relations to the State, and the basis upon which payments from the State are made to them, and to suggest reform in the laws regulating such payments, if the same be found necessary, and any other reforms in their management so far as State expenditures to them are concerned, and that said committee report to the present session of the Legislature by bill or otherwise, 257.

WHEREAS, in the engrossing of Assembly bill, No. 25, entitled "An act to set off from the township of Lawrence, in the county of Mercer, a new township, to be called the township of Millham," clerical errors were committed, viz., in line 10, section 1, the word "line" after the word "straight" and in line 14 and 15, same section, the words "thence westerly along the centre of the Delaware and Raritan Canal" after the word "Canal" in line 14 were left out,

AND WHEREAS, the said bill has passed both Houses with the said error in it, therefore,

*Resolved*, That the unanimous consent of this House be given the Engrossing Clerk to correct the said error and that the consent of the Senate be also requested, 303; 311-312.

WHEREAS, The people of our State complain very much of excessive taxation, which is owing mainly to the fact that the various railroad, canal, banking and other like corporations are exempt, more or less, from the payment of taxes on property as required to be paid by individual taxpayers;

AND WHEREAS, various bills have been introduced and remedies suggested by this and former Legislatures as a remedy for the excessive taxation referred to without practical results. Therefore, to the end that some practical and advance steps may be taken for the relief of the poor and overburdened taxpayers of this State, which may meet the approbation of both Houses,

*Resolved*, (Senate concurring), That a committee, to consist of three members of the House and two of the Senate, be appointed to inquire into what rate of taxation is paid by the corporations aforesaid, where and to whom paid, and report, by bill or otherwise, such remedy or measure as will compel such corporations to pay taxes on their properties at rates commensurate with their real values, and that the Comptroller furnish to this House the names of all railroad companies occupying or using railroads in this State, as lessees, or otherwise, liable to taxation; the date at which the

board of railroad commissioners estimated the taxable value of such companies, and the amount at which such values were established at the several dates; the amount of tax charged against each company in each year, and the time at which it was paid; and the amounts due from each company at the present time, when they become due, and what steps have been taken for their collection, 309, 315-316, 337-338.

WHEREAS, The Committee of Conference of the two Houses of this Legislature to agree upon a time for the holding of a joint meeting of this Legislature have unanimously agreed upon Tuesday, the 28th day of February inst., at twelve o'clock, now therefore be it

*Resolved* (the House of Assembly concurring), that a joint meeting of the two Houses of this Legislature be held in the Assembly Chamber at twelve o'clock noon, on Tuesday, the twenty-eighth day of February inst. for the election of such officers as it is proper for said joint meeting to elect. In which the concurrence of the House of Assembly is requested, 312.

WHEREAS, The investment of capital and the application of labor and skill are prime elements, contributing to the growth and prosperity of the State of New Jersey, whose mining, manufacturing, agricultural, mechanical, and artistical productions are diversified and important in their utility and extent, and prominent among which are the construction of all kinds of machinery, the development of the wealth of our mines and the manufacture of glass, of pottery, and the various fabrics of silk, cotton and wool, and

WHEREAS, The subject of a revision, by commission or otherwise, of the present tariff and revenue laws is now under consideration in Congress and it is desirable that our artisans, operatives and mechanics shall have continual labor and remunerative wages, and also that by an unity of interests between employer and employed there may be a suitable remuneration both for capital invested and labor performed.

WHEREAS, There are now imprisoned in British prisons in Ireland without hearing, indictment, trial or conviction of any crime or alleged crime American citizens, some of whom evidenced their devotion to this Republic by imperiling their lives and sinking their fortunes in the defence of the integrity of this Union, and

WHEREAS, Their further imprisonment under these circumstances, without inquiry or protest from the federal government is well calculated to lessen respect for our government abroad and reverence and love of it at home, and

WHEREAS, We owe to those who cast their lot amongst us and assumed the obligations of American citizenship the reciprocal duty of defending and elevating such citizenship, therefore be it

*Resolved*, By the House of General Assembly of the State of New Jersey that the representatives of this state in the House of Representatives of the Congress of the United States, and our Senators in the Senate of the United States, be and they are hereby requested to urge upon the proper Federal authorities the duties of an immediate and zealous investigation into the causes of such imprisonment of American citizens and if the same are found to be illegally and unjustly detained, to take such steps as shall secure their prompt deliverance; and be it

*Resolved*, That a copy of the resolutions signed by the Speaker of this House, his Excellency the Governor of this State, and the President of the Senate, be sent to each of said representatives and Senators as aforesaid, 392.

*Resolved*, That we, the members of the House of Assembly of New Jersey recognize with pride the sentiments enunciated by Representative A. A. Hardenbergh in his speech in the House of Representatives lately, delivered on the resolution of Hon. W. Robinson, of New York, calling the attention of the United States government to the cases of American citizens confined in British dungeons; and further resolved that our said representative Mr. Hardenbergh, in said speech pronounced the sentiments of this House in his sympathy expressed for a liberty-loving people struggling for their rights, 392-393.

WHEREAS, In certain parts of Europe, and notably in Russia, the members of the Hebrew race are now being subjected to persecution of the most dreadful description, their homes being invaded, their property pillaged, and the sanctity of their families being violated by ruthless mobs;

AND WHEREAS, These outrages are committed, if not with the connivance, at least without the energetic opposition of the Russian government;

AND WHEREAS, We, the favored citizens of a free and enlightened country, where all races and all nationalities are gathered in peace, happiness and safety under one common flag, cannot but view with horror these unpunished outrages upon a defenceless race; therefore,

*Resolved*, That this Assembly deprecate in the most positive manner the action of the Russian government in failing to protect these oppressed and down trodden people, from the causeless persecution by lawless mobs, and that we urgently protest against the further continuance of these outrages upon the Russian Jews, and that we further demand in the name of freedom and humanity that immediate steps be taken by the Russian government to bring to proper punishment the perpetrators of these outrages and to prevent a recurrence of similar persecutions in the future, 403-404.

WHEREAS, The Governor has sent to the House a message vetoing Assembly bill, No. 69, entitled, an act concerning the grand Army of the Republic, and

WHEREAS, From the text of that message, it would seem that under the operation of an act concerning veteran associations, approved Feb. 27th, 1879, and now in force, that the State of New Jersey has incurred a direct loss in the aggregate of \$1,700, arising from damage alleged to have been done to State property while temporarily loaned to the Grand Army of the Republic under the provisions of said act; therefore, be it
