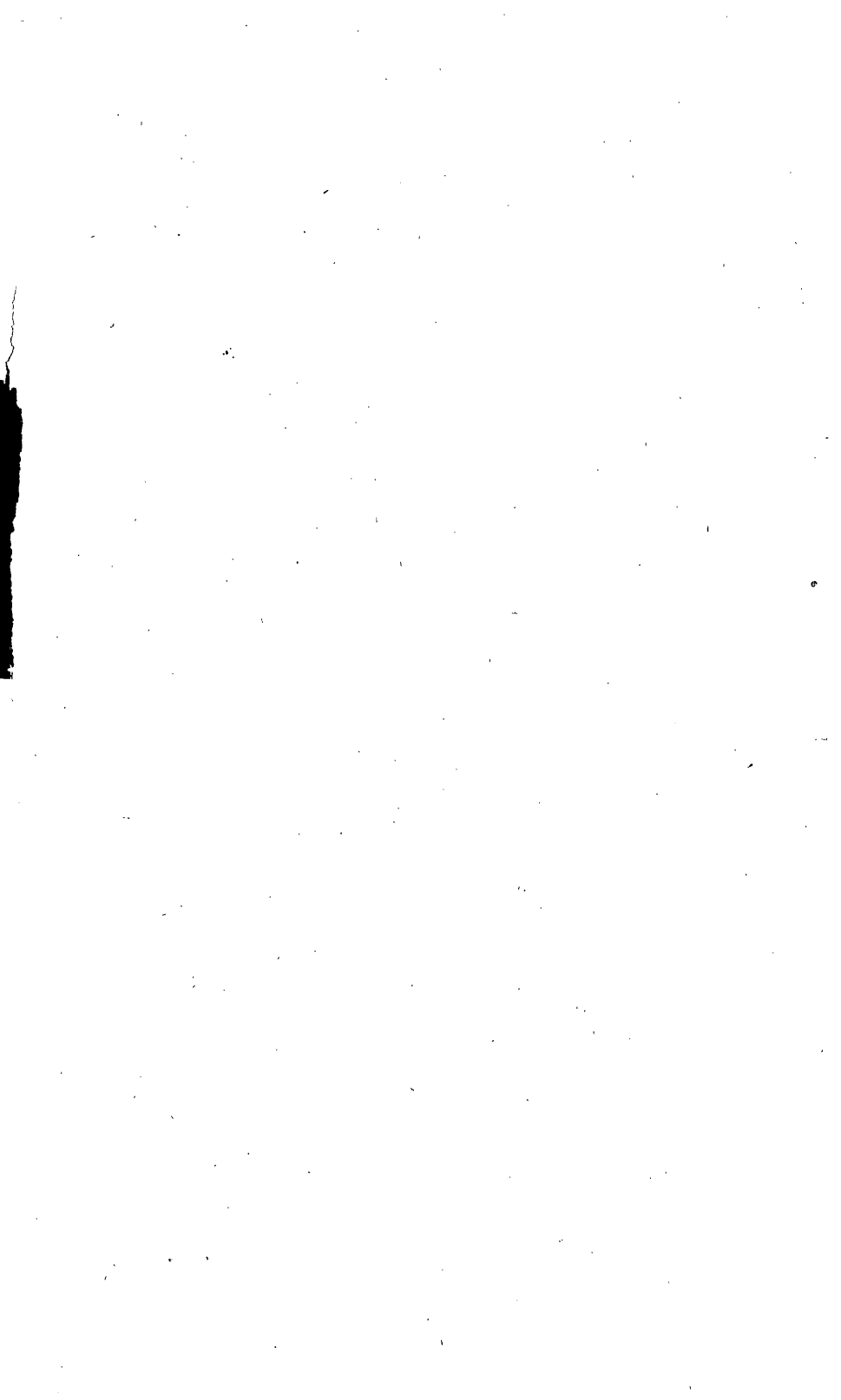

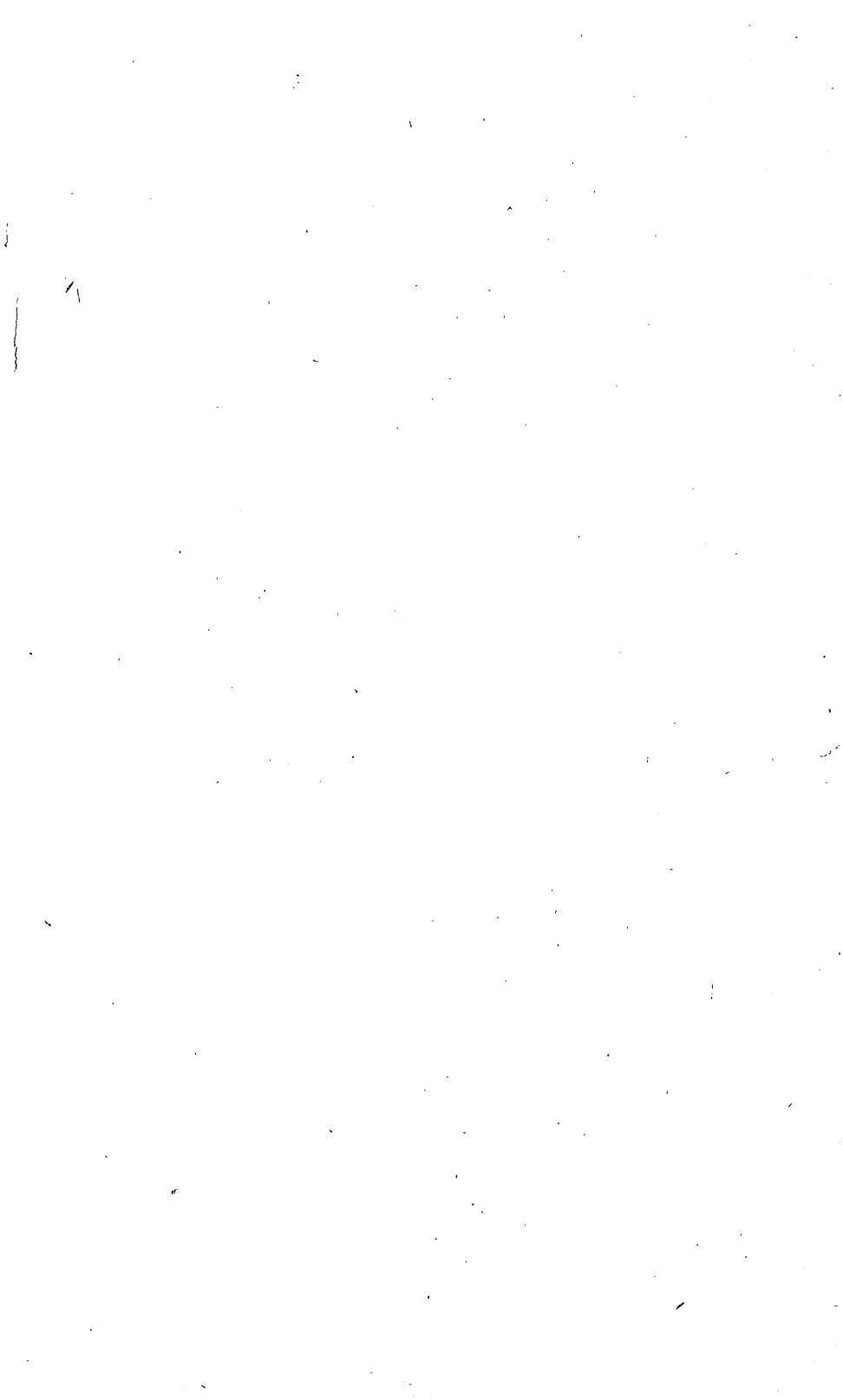

JOURNAL OF THE SENATE.

STATE OF NEW JERSEY, }
SENATE CHAMBER, }
TRENTON, TUESDAY January 11th, 1870. }

This being the time and place appointed by the Constitution for the assembling of the Legislature, the Senate was called to order by Joseph B. Cornish, Secretary of the last Senate.

The roll being called by the Secretary, the following named Senators answered to their names, viz :—

Messrs. Adams, Bowne, Brinkerhoff, Cobb, Edsall, Gaskill, Hopper, Nixon, Rice, Robins, Taylor, N. D., Torrey, Woolverton—13.

Mr. Hopper moved that the Hon. John Torrey, jr., of the county of Ocean, be appointed President *pro tempore*.

Which motion was agreed to, and the President *pro tempore* took the chair.

The same Senator presented the credentials of the Hon. Calvin Corle, a Senator from the county of Somerset.

Which was read and approved, and the oath prescribed by law having been duly administered to Mr. Corle by the President *pro tempore*, he took his seat in the Senate.

Mr. Woolverton presented the credentials of the Hon. James T. Wiley, a Senator from the county of Union.

The same Senator presented the credentials of the Hon. Edward Bettle, a Senator from the county of Camden.

Mr. Bowne presented the credentials of the Hon. Edward H. Bird, a Senator from the county of Warren.

Mr. Nixon presented the credentials of the Hon. John W. Taylor, a Senator from the county of Essex.

The same Senator presented the credentials of the Hon. Samuel Hopkins, a Senator from the county of Gloucester.

Mr. Hopper presented the credentials of the Hon. Henry S. Little, a Senator from the county of Monmouth.

Mr. Nixon presented the credentials of the Hon. John C. Belden, a Senator from the county of Salem.

Which were read and approved and the oaths prescribed by law having been duly administered to the several Senators, by the President *pro tempore*, they severally took their seats in the Senate.

Under the direction of the President *pro tempore*, the Secretary called the Senate, when the following Senators answered the call :

Messrs. Adams, Belden, Bettle, Bird, Bowne, Brinkerhoff, Cobb, Corle, Edsall, Gaskill, Hopkins, Hopper, Little, Nixon, Rice, Robins, J. W. Taylor, N. D. Taylor, Torrey, Wiley, Woolverton—21.

The President *pro tempore*, announced the next business to be the election of a President.

Mr. Hopper nominated the Hon. Amos Robins, of the county of Middlesex.

Mr. Nixon nominated the Hon. Edward Bettle, of the county of Camden.

Under the direction of the President *pro tempore*, the Secretary called the Senate, with the following result :

For Mr. Robins, were

Messrs. Bettle, Bird, Bowne, Brinkerhoff, Corle, Edsall, Gaskill, Hopper, Little, Rice, Taylor, N. D., Wiley, Woolverton—13.

For Mr. Bettle, were

Messrs. Adams, Belden, Cobb, Hopkins, Nixon, Robins, Taylor, J. W., Torrey—8.

Mr. Robins having received a majority of the votes cast, was declared by the President *pro tempore*, duly elected President of the Senate for the ensuing year, and was conducted to the chair by Messrs. Bettle and Little.

On taking the chair the President addressed the Senate as follows :

Gentlemen of the Senate:—For the manifestation of confidence which you have exhibited in calling me to preside over your deliberations, although not unexpected, I desire to return you my humble acknowledgments, assuring you, that by your co-operation, all business coming before this Senate shall meet with proper dispatch. Again I thank you for the honor conferred, and shall endeavor to reciprocate.

The Senate then proceeded to the choice of Secretary.

Mr. Hopper nominated John C. Rafferty, of the county of Hunterdon.

Mr. Nixon nominated John F. Babcock, of the county of Middlesex.

Under the direction of the President, the Secretary called the Senate with the following result :

For Mr. Rafferty, were

Messrs. Bird, Bowne, Brinkerhoff, Corle, Edsall, Gaskill, Hopper, Little, Rice, Robins (President), Taylor, N. D., Wiley, Woolverton—13.

For Mr. Babcock, were

Messrs. Adams, Belden, Bettle, Cobb, Hopkins, Nixon, Taylor, J. W., Torrey—8.

John C. Rafferty having received a majority of all the votes

cast, was declared Secretary for the ensuing year and thereupon took and subscribed the oath of office.

The Senate then proceeded to the election of an Assistant Secretary of the Senate.

Mr. Hopper nominated Charles Townsend, of the county of Cumberland.

Mr. Nixon nominated William J. James, Jr., of the county of Ocean.

Under the direction of the President, the Secretary called the Senate with the following result:

For Mr. Townsend, were

Messrs. Bird, Bowne, Brinkerhoff, Corle, Edsall, Gaskill, Hopper, Little, Rice, Robins (President), Taylor, N. D., Wiley, Woolverton—13.

For Mr. James were

Messrs. Adams, Belden, Bettle, Cobb, Hopkins, Nixon, Taylor, J. W., Torrey—8.

Charles Townsend having received a majority of the votes cast, was declared duly elected Assistant Secretary of the Senate.

The Senate then proceeded to the election of an Engrossing Clerk.

Mr. Hopper nominated Alexander H. Rickey, of the county of Mercer.

Mr. Nixon nominated James Moore, of the county of Gloucester.

Under the direction of the President the Secretary called the Senate, with the following result:

For Mr. Rickey, were

Messrs. Bird, Bowne, Brinkerhoff, Corle, Edsall, Gaskill, Hopper, Little, Rice, Robins, (President), Taylor, N. D., Wiley, Woolverton—13.

For Mr. Moore, were

Messrs. Adams, Belden, Bettle, Cobb, Hopkins, Nixon, Taylor, J. W., Torrey—8.

Mr. Rickey having received a majority of the votes cast, was declared duly elected Engrossing Clerk of the Senate.

The Senate then proceeded to the election of Sergeant-at-Arms.

Mr. Hopper nominated Bernard Connolly, of the county of Monmouth.

Mr. Nixon nominated George E. Dunlap, of the county of Cumberland.

Under the direction of the President, the Secretary called the Senate, with the following result:

For Mr. Connolly, were

Messrs. Bird, Bowne, Brinkerhoff, Corle, Edsall, Gaskill, Hopper, Little, Rice, Robins, (President), Taylor, N. D., Wiley, Woolverton—13.

For Mr. Dunlap, were

Messrs. Adams, Belden, Bettle, Cobb, Hopkins, Nixon, Taylor, J. W., Torrey—8.

Bernard Connolly having received a majority of all the votes cast was declared duly elected.

The Senate then proceeded to the election of Doorkeeper of the Ladies' Gallery.

Mr. Hopper nominated William B. Midmer, of the county of Hudson.

Mr. Nixon nominated John W. Wood, of the county of Essex.

Under the direction of the President the Secretary called the Senate, with the following result:

For Mr. Midmer, were

Messrs. Bird, Bowne, Brinkerhoff, Corle, Edsall, Gaskill, Hopper, Little, Rice, Robins, (President), Taylor N. D., Wiley, Woolverton—13.

For Mr. Wood, were

Messrs. Adams, Belden, Bettle, Cobb, Hopkins, Nixon, Taylor J. W., Torrey—8.

William B. Midmer, having received a majority of all the votes cast, was declared duly elected.

Prayer was then offered by the Rev. Mr. Thorn.

Mr. Rice offered the following resolution :

Resolved, That the Secretary inform the House of Assembly that the Senate has met, formed a quorum, and elected the Hon. Amos Robins, Senator from Middlesex, President, and John C. Rafferty, Secretary, and have proceeded to business.

Which was read and adopted.

Mr. Woolverton offered the following resolution :

Resolved, That Naar; Day & Naar of the *True American*, be employed to do the current printing of the Senate, until otherwise ordered.

Which was read and adopted.

Mr. N. D. Taylor offered the following resolution :

Resolved, That a committee of two be appointed to wait on His Excellency the Governor, and inform him that the Senate has organized and elected the Hon. Amos Robins, President, and John C. Rafferty, Secretary, are now ready to proceed to business and also to receive any communication he may please to make.

Which was read and agreed to, and Messrs. Taylor and Bettle appointed said committee.

Mr. Rice offered the following resolution :

Resolved, That a committee of three be appointed by the President to procure stationery for the use of the members and officers of the Senate.

Which was read.

Mr. Cobb moved to amend the same by adding the following :
"not to exceed the sum of thirty dollars each."

Mr. Hopper moved to lay the amendment on the table.

Upon which the yeas and nays were called with the following result :

In the affirmative, were

Messrs. Belden, Bird, Cobb, Hopkins, Little, Torrey, Woolverton—7.

In the negative, were

Messrs. Adams, Bowne, Brinkerhoff, Corle, Edsall, Gaskill, Hopper, Nixon, Rice, Robins, (President), Taylor, N. D., Wiley—12.

So said motion was not agreed to.

The yeas and nays were then called upon the question of agreeing to the amendment, with the following result:

In the affirmative, were

Messrs. Belden, Bird, Bowne, Brinkerhoff, Cobb, Corle, Edsall, Gaskill, Hopkins, Little, Robins, (President), Taylor, J. W., Torrey, Woolverton—14.

In the negative, were

Messrs. Adams, Hopper, Nixon, Rice, Taylor, N. D., Wiley—6.

So said amendment was agreed to, and the resolution as amended agreed to.

Mr. Bettle offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the rules of the Senate at the last session be adopted as the rules of this Senate until otherwise ordered.

Which was read and adopted.

The same Senator offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the President be authorized to select a page for special attendance as messenger, in addition to the usual number appointed for the accommodation of the Senate.

Which was read and adopted.

The Annual Message of His Excellency the Governor was received by the hands of his Private Secretary, which was read as follows:

On motion of Mr. Bettle, the usual number of copies were ordered to be printed.

Mr. Woolverton offered the following resolution :

Resolved, That the morning session be opened with prayer, and that a committee of three be appointed to invite clergymen to officiate in performance of that duty.

Which was read and adopted.

Mr. Bettle offered the following resolution :

Resolved, That a committee of three be appointed by the President to prepare and report to the Senate suitable rules for its government.

Which was read and agreed to.

Mr. Rice offered the following resolution :

Resolved, That the Treasurer be authorized to furnish each member and officer of the Senate with a copy of Nixon's Digest, Forms and Cushing's Manual.

Mr. J. W. Taylor moved to amend the same by adding the following :

“And each new member of the Senate a copy of the Laws of 1869.”

Which amendment was agreed to, and the resolution as amended agreed to.

Mr. Little offered the following resolution :

Resolved, That the President of the Senate designate three Senators who shall be empowered to employ a stenographic reporter during the present session of the Legislature, whose reports shall be free to the press of New Jersey.

Which was read and laid upon the table.

A message was received from the House of Assembly by the hands of their Clerk announcing that they had organized by the election of Hon. Leon Abbett, of Hudson, Speaker, and Alexander M. Johnston, of Mercer, as Clerk, and had proceeded to business.

Mr. Little offered the following resolution :

Resolved, That so much of the Governor's Message as refers

to the subject of General Laws, be referred to a committee of three, who shall report at an early day, said committee shall have power to employ counsel to aid in preparing such General Laws as are deemed expedient.

Which was read and laid upon the table.

Mr. Bettle offered the following resolution :

Resolved, That when the Senate adjourns, it adjourn to meet to-morrow morning, at ten o'clock, and that shall be the hour of meeting until otherwise ordered.

Which was read and adopted.

The same Senator offered the following resolution :

Resolved, That an additional Standing Committee of the Senate be created to be known as the Committee on Railroads, Canals and Turnpike Roads, to whom shall be referred all bills relating to corporations of that character ; also that there shall be another Standing Committee to be called the Committee on Banks, to whom shall be referred all bills relating to Banks and Insurance Companies, and that all bills in relation to Miscellaneous Corporations be referred to the Standing Committee now known as the Committee on Corporations.

Which was read and agreed to.

On motion of Mr. Little, the Senate then adjourned.

WEDNESDAY, January 12, 1870.

At 10 o'clock the Senate met.

Under the direction of the President, the Secretary called the Senate, when the following Senators appeared and answered the call:

Messrs. Adams, Bettle, Bird, Bowne, Brinkerhoff, Corle, Edsall, Gaskill, Hopkins, Hopper, Little, Nixon, Rice, Robins, (President), Taylor, J. W., Taylor, N. D., Torrey, Wiley, Woolverton—19.

The Journal of Tuesday was read and approved.

Mr. Wiley presented a petition from owners of low meadow lands along a branch of Elizabeth Creek, Union county, to drain the same at their own expense.

Which was read and laid upon the table.

Mr. Rice, on leave, introduced

Senate bill No. 1, entitled

A further supplement to an act entitled "An Act to incorporate the city of Cape Island," approved February twenty-eight, eighteen hundred and fifty-one.

Which was read for the first time by its title, and ordered to have a second reading.

Mr. Bowne, on leave, introduced

Senate bill No. 2, entitled

An act to incorporate the Readington Farmers and Citizens Mutual Life Insurance Company of New Jersey.

Which was read for the first time by its title and ordered to have a second reading.

Mr. J. W. Taylor, on leave, introduced

Senate bill No. 3, entitled

A further supplement to an act entitled "An act to facilitate judicial proceedings in the county of Essex," approved March fifteenth, eighteen hundred and fifty-nine.

Which was read for the first time by its title and ordered to have a second reading.

Mr. Hopper, on leave, introduced

Senate bill No. 4, entitled

An act to incorporate the New Jersey Academy.

Which was read for the first time by its title and ordered to have a second reading.

The same Senator, on leave, introduced

Senate bill No. 5, entitled

An act to incorporate the Guaranty and Trust Company of the United States.

Which was read for the first time by its title and ordered to have a second reading.

Mr. Hopper moved that the bills introduced be referred to their appropriate committees, when said committees shall have been appointed.

Which motion was agreed to.

Mr. Little, on leave, introduced

Senate bill No. 6, entitled

A supplement to an act entitled "An act to incorporate the Long Branch and Sea Shore Railroad Company," approved March twentieth, eighteen hundred and sixty-three.

Which was read for the first time by its title and ordered to have a second reading.

The President laid before the Senate the annual report of the State Treasurer.

Mr. Hopper moved that the report be received and laid upon the table.

Which motion was agreed to.

The President announced the following Special Committees :

Which was read for the first time by its title and ordered to have a second reading.

Mr. Torrey offered the following resolution :

Resolved, That the Committee on Stationery furnish twenty dollars worth of postage stamps to each member and officer of the Senate.

Which was read and agreed to.

On motion of Mr. Edsall the Senate then adjourned.

THURSDAY, January 13, 1870.

At 10 o'clock the Senate met.

Under the direction of the President, the Secretary called the Senate, when the following Senators appeared and answered to the call :

WHEREAS, the people of the island of Cuba, believing, as did our forefathers, that freedom from an aggressive power would be conducive to their present and future welfare; and whereas, the people of the island of Cuba did, on the tenth day of April, eighteen hundred and sixty-nine, at a meeting of the Cuban congress, held at Guyamos, the provisional capital of the republic, officially adopt a constitution presented by a constitutional convention of the people, the members whereof were duly elected by said people of Cuba, that the constitution was promulgated and in due form announced to the Cubans and to all civilized nations; and whereas, the principles of their constitution are in harmony with the principles of our own; and whereas, the Monroe doctrine, the criterion guide of our foreign policy, that European powers ought not to be allowed to extend their acquisitions of territory and political power in the American hemisphere, has become the fixed policy of this republic; therefore, be it

1. *Resolved* (if the Senate concur), That this legislature, representing the people of the state of New Jersey, do sympathize with the people of Cuba in their effort to establish the inalienable right of self-government.

2. *Resolved* (if the Senate concur), That the permitting of an armed fleet to sail from one of our principal ports to the island of Cuba, for the purpose of preventing a people from establishing a form of government parallel to that of our own, was an act as unbecoming, as it was unjust and unkind.

3. *Resolved* (if the Senate concur), That the senators and

representatives in congress from this state be instructed to urge upon the president and general government to proclaim in legal form the existence of a state of belligerency between the Cuban patriots and the Spanish nation.

4. *Resolved* (if the Senate concur), That a copy of these resolutions be forwarded to each representative of the state of New Jersey in the senate and house of representatives at Washington.

5. *Resolved* (if the Senate concur), that the senators and representatives in congress from this state, be instructed to urge upon the president and general government to use its friendly mediation with the government of Great Britain, for the full and speedy release of all the political prisoners now incarcerated in British dungeons for endeavoring to establish a republican form of government in Ireland.

"The right of way over the said dike to the navigable water in front thereof, is hereby reserved free to all the owners of the marsh land to be enclosed, and reclaimed from the tidal flow, at such points and crossings as the said commissioners may locate for proper bridges over the ditch and its accompanying embankment, and all such crossings shall be kept in good condition for the convenience of the said owners, and without injury to said dike, or in any way interfering with or impairing the water levels of said embankment, or the works of the said company connected therewith; and no other privileges or encroachments shall be allowed upon the property or works of the

said company, or openings or cuts permitted to be made through the said embankment or dike, except for the purpose of sluice-gates in carrying out the drainage of said lands, without the consent of the said Company having first been had and obtained."

The same Senator moved to further amend, by inserting at the end of the twelfth section, the following:

"The said company or any riparian owner, shall pay or secure to be paid to the treasurer of the state, such an amount as shall be ascertained by a commission, to be appointed by the governor of this state at such time as he shall deem expedient or upon the request in writing by the said company or said riparian owner, to be a fair value of the lands of the state lying within or between the said dikes and the present shore line, as well as the lands lying below high water mark in front of the lands now owned by the said incorporators or said riparian owners, or that may hereafter be owned by them or either of them, and the said commissioners so appointed by the governor shall first take and subscribe an oath well and truly to perform the duties of their appointment, which oath shall be filed in the office of the secretary of state, and the said company or the riparian owner upon paying or securing to be paid to the state the award of the said commissioners, in ten years from the time of the award, with interest annually, the said treasurer shall give to the said company or riparian owner a certificate thereof, with the boundaries of the lands of the state covered with water, awarded by said commissioners, and the same being duly acknowledged by the treasurer, may be recorded in the office of the clerk of the county where such lands lie as an evidence and record of title, and the title of the state shall vest in the said company or said riparian owners."

Which amendment was agreed to.

Mr. Torrey moved to amend the ninth section by inserting after the word "company," in the second line, the following, "or with any other party," and by striking out in the sixth line the word "company" and inserting in place thereof the word "contractors."

select from the two townships or towns, or town and township having the greatest number of votes, the one they deem best for the interests and conveniences of the said county; and the one so designated by the board of freeholders shall be the county seat of said county.

2. *Resolved* (if the Senate concur), That the permitting of an armed fleet to sail from one of our principal ports to the island of Cuba, for the purpose of preventing a people from establishing a form of government parallel to that of our own, was an act as unbecoming, as it was unjust and unkind.

3. *Resolved* (if the Senate concur), That the senators and representatives in congress from this state be instructed to urge upon the president and general government to proclaim in legal form the existence of a state of belligerency between the Cuban patriots and the Spanish nation.

4. *Resolved* (if the Senate concur), That a copy of these resolutions be forwarded to each representative of the state of New Jersey in the senate and house of representatives at Washington.

5. *Resolved* (if the Senate concur), That the senators and representatives in congress from this state, be instructed to urge upon the president and general government to use its friendly mediation with the government of Great Britain, for the full and speedy release of all the political prisoners now incarcerated in British dungeons for endeavoring to establish a republican form of government in Ireland.

This bill alters, and I have no doubt in many respects improves, the practice of the Court of Chancery; but the fourth section seems to have been hastily drawn, and instead of accomplishing the manifest object of the section, at least leaves it open to a construction which could not have been intended.

It provides that "all suits to which the Chancellor may be a party, either individually or in a representative capacity, and all proceedings therein, shall be heard by the Chief Justice, or if there be no Chief Justice, by such Associate Justice of the Supreme Court as may be senior in office, or by such Justice of the Supreme Court or Master in Chancery as may be designated by the Chief Justice, or such senior Justice, by an order made and filed in the cause, *unless some other person shall be designated by the Chancellor for that purpose.*"

May not the closing words, (which I have italicised), be so construed as to practically defeat the evident purpose of the Legislature? instead of providing for the mere authentication of the order or decree by the signature of the Chancellor, to orders and decrees in causes where he is a party individually or in a representative capacity, it requires his *approval* of the order or decree, which he is advised to sign by the officer who heard the cause and pronounced the decree.

Amend section seventy-three by striking out in the fourth line all after the word "the" to the word "it" in line five, and insert in lieu thereof the following, "twentieth day of December of each year;" same section, line eight, strike out all after the word "the" to the word "provided" in the ninth line, and insert in lieu thereof the following, "twentieth day of December as aforesaid."

Amend section one hundred and fifty-eight by striking out in line two the word "thirteen" and insert in lieu thereof the word "fifteen."

"208. *And be it enacted*, That the act to consolidate said cities of Jersey City, Hudson City and Bergen, and other parts of Hudson county into one city, approved April second, eighteen hundred and sixty-nine, be and the same is hereby repealed: such repeal to take effect immediately, and said act shall not be so construed as to repeal or to have repealed the charters of said cities of Jersey City, Hudson city or Bergen, or the supplements or amendments thereto or either of them, but this act shall repeal the same on and after the first Monday of May next, and it is hereby declared and enacted that such charters, supplements and amendments have remained and do remain in full force so far as the effect of said act is concerned,

5. *And be it enacted*, That in any suit for the foreclosure of a mortgage upon, or which may relate to real or personal property in this state, all persons claiming an interest in, or an encumbrance or lien upon such property, by or through any conveyance, mortgage, assignment, lien or any instrument which by any provision of law could be recorded, registered, entered or filed in any public office in this state, and which shall not be so recorded, registered, entered or filed at the filing of the bill in such suit, shall be bound by the proceedings in such suit, so far as said property is concerned, in the same manner as if he had been made a party to and appeared in such suit, and the decree therein made against him as one of the defendants therein; but such person before causing such conveyance, mortgage, assignment, lien, claim or other instrument to be recorded, registered, entered or filed as provided by law, may cause himself to be made a party to such suit by petition in the same manner as is by this act provided in the case of persons acquiring an interest in the subject matter of a suit after its commencement; the petition in such case must set forth such instrument at length, and the title and interest of such party in such manner as to show that he has an interest in the subject matter, and is a proper party in that suit.

6. *And be it enacted*, That in the cases hereinbefore provided for, any person may be made a party either before or after a final or interlocutory decree therein, but such decree shall not be opened or set aside thereby, and in all cases where the person so made a party does not dispute the claim of the complainant or any part of it, the complainant, or any defendant whose prior right is not disputed, shall not be delayed by the admission of such party; but his claim shall be fully heard and investigated in disposing of the residue of the subject matter of the
