\* The Moon's mean distance from the Sun, is the same as the Earth's. Her mean distance from the Earth, is 239,960 miles. Sometimes the character of the moon, is varied in the following manner—New ☾, First Quarter ☽, Full ☽, Last Quarter ☾.

**CUSTOMARY NOTES.**

1. Venus (♀) will continue Evening Star until March 7th, after which it will be Morning Star until December 20th, and then Evening Star until October 8th, 1831.
2. The Moon will run highest this year, about the 5th degree of (♋) Cancer, and lowest about the 5th degree of (♏) Capricorn.
3. Latitude of Herschel (♃) about 38 minutes south this year.
4. Longitude of the Moon's (♊) Ascending Node in the middle of this year, 5 signs, 33 degrees.
5. Mean obliquity of the Ecliptic in the middle of this year 23 deg. 27 min. 42.3 sec.† True obliquity—23° 27' 32.8".

## ECLIPSES.

Six Eclipses will take place this year, four of the Sun and two of the Moon.

I. There will be an Eclipse of the Sun on Monday the 22d of February, at 11h. 40m. in the evening, invisible.

II. There will be an Eclipse of the Moon on Tuesday the 9th of March, at 8h. 35m. in the morning, invisible.

III. There will be an Eclipse of the Sun on Wednesday the 24th of March, at 9h. 48m. in the morning, invisible here on account of the moon's great south latitude.

IV. There will be an Eclipse of the Sun on Wednesday the 18th of August, at 6h. 57m. in the morning, invisible from the same cause as the preceding.

V. There will be an Eclipse of the Moon on Thursday the 2d of September, in the evening, partly visible, as follows :

This eclipse will be visible throughout Europe, Africa, and a great part of Asia. The whole duration will be 3 hours and 86 minutes, and the duration of total darkness 1 hour and 40 minutes.

VI. There will be an Eclipse of the Sun on Thursday the 16th of September, at 9h. 32m. in the evening, invisible.

The centre of the moon's penumbra will not touch the earth this year, so that none of the Solar eclipses will be central at any point on the surface of the globe.

But as the Judge was of a singular turn in almost every thing, and had taken a fancy that if a person eats light food at the same meal, and that which is more solid and harder of digestion, that the light food should be eaten first; he therefore filled his plate with some pudding, made of milk, rice and eggs, and placing himself in rather an awkward situation, with his left elbow on the table, and his head near the plate, began to eat according to his common custom, which was very fast, although he was not a great eater. And some of the gentleman near the Judge, following his example as to partaking of the pudding before the meat, of course a large deep vessel, which had contained that article, was nearly emptied, when Mary approached with her two additional terreens of gravy, according to the command of her mistress, and as she sat down the last near the Judge, he says to her in an austere manner, Girl, bring me a clean plate to eat sallad on. The abrupt manner in which he addressed her, and her disgust at seeing him there in that position, so disconcerted the poor girl, that she did not observe that any one excepting the Judge had partaken of the pudding, nor did she know what he meant by sallad; but she observed that the large pudding pan was nearly empty, and then hastened back with her utmost speed to her mistress, and addressed her with, Lord, madam, that old fellow is there yet, and he is certainly

crazy or drunk, for he is down at the table, and has eaten more than a skipple\* of the rice pudding already, and has his nose right down in a plate full now, shovelling it in like a hog: and told me, as if he was lord of the manor, to bring him a clean plate to eat sallad on. Bless me, where can we get sallad at this time of the year? And the gentlemen have done carving, and not one has begun to eat meat, much less to eat a tub full of pudding.

Aye, he'll get a clean plate, says Martha, before gentlemen want clean plates.

I'll clear him out, says the Mistress, and starts for the dining room, burning with indignation.

The Judge was remarkable for not giving unnecessary trouble to any body where he put up, and generally ate whatever was set before him without making any remarks; and seldom made use of more than one plate at a meal; but at this time he had observed near him a dish of beautiful raw white cabbage, cut up and put into vinegar, (which the Low Dutch at Poughkeepsie call *cold slaw*, and which he called *sallad*;) and he wished for a separate plate to prepare some of it for his own fancy. tumult had a little subsided, says the Judge mildly, did I chop wood to pay for my breakfast? Indeed you did, says she, and said you had no money. I told you the truth, says the Judge, but I have a beautiful shawl worth more than ten dollars, which I just now bought, and will leave it with you in pawn, if you will only let me eat dinner with these gentlemen. Here the gentlemen were biting their lips to keep from laughter. How did you buy the shawl worth more than ten dollars, without money? I bought it on credit, says he. And where did you find credit to that amount? says she. I brought it from home, said he. This is a likely story, and something like your abuse of Judge Crane this morning, said she. How could I abuse the Judge if he was not present, said he. Why, says she, you called him rusty, fusty fudge, and old codger, and said you did not care a rye straw more for him than you did for yourself. And here the whole company were in an uproar of laughter again. But as soon as it a little subsided, one of the gentlemen asked the landlady how she knew that the gentleman she was addressing was not Judge Crane? said she, he looks more like a *snipe* than a *crane*!

Here the loud laughter burst forth a third time. And after a little pause the Judge said, I must confess that I am not a bird of very fine feathers, but I assure you that I am a *Crane*, and a crane is often a very useful instrument; I saw a very good one in your kitchen this morning; and sometimes an instrument called a "crane," is of incalculable use, madam.—Before she had time to reply, some of the gentlemen with whom she was acquainted assured her that she was talking with the presiding Judge.—Astonished and confounded, she attempted some excuse, and hastily asked his pardon for her rudeness.

The robbers of the dead soon returned, and jumped into the cart perfectly satisfied with their success, when one of them for the purpose of adjusting the situation of their prize, took hold of its hand, as he supposed, and immediately exclaimed, in terrified accents, "Oh, John, he's warm," "I'll warm you," replied the fancied corpse in solemn sound; at the same time raising himself in the cart. One of the horrified resurrectionists sprang from the cart and fled with the utmost speed of fright; the other who had touched the warm hand of the late tenant of the grave, fell on his knees to supplicate mercy; but, probably encouraged by the success of his companion, after a moment of incoherent prayer for forgiveness, summoned resolution, leaped from the cart and fled. The ingenious captor remains in undisputed possession of the cart and horse.—*London paper.*

The potent hero of his own story, boasting of his exploits, tells the often repeated story of having *fixed* his antagonists; and a man who has a multitude of affairs on his hands, gets them *fixed* to his satisfaction. The devout man *fixes* himself for church; the gay belle *fixes* herself for a ball; a lover *fixes* himself to visit his sweetheart; and a soldier *fixes* himself out for military exercise.
