
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English Language Arts/Literacy Assessment - Performance Trends









Student Growth by Performance Level


These graphs show the percentage of students by 2015-16 PARCC performance level that fall into each of the three levels of growth based on their 2016-17 test scores.






Student Growth by Grade

This section shows information about student absences which provides important information about a school's culture and climate. In addition, research shows that student absences impact a child's ability to succeed in school. The New Jersey Department of Education selected chronic absenteeism as its measure of school quality and student success for the *ESSA* accountability plan. **Chronic absenteeism** is defined as being absent for 10% or more of the days enrolled during the school year. 












These graphs show the percentage of students by 2015-16 PARCC performance level that fall into each of the three levels of growth based on their 2016-17 test scores.






Student Growth by Grade





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




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Mathematics Assessment – Performance Trends






These graphs show the percentage of students by 2015-16 PARCC performance level that fall into each of the three levels of growth based on their 2016-17 test scores.






Student Growth by Grade








Students enrolled in one or more visual and performing arts classes














These graphs show the percentage of students by 2015-16 PARCC performance level that fall into each of the three levels of growth based on their 2016-17 test scores.






Student Growth by Grade





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












These graphs show the percentage of students by 2015-16 PARCC performance level that fall into each of the three levels of growth based on their 2016-17 test scores.






Student Growth by Grade





Overview

Facilities:

Our school building is the newest of all elementary school buildings in the Wyckoff School District, having just celebrated its 50th Anniversary this past year. Sicomac features a full size media center, gymnasium, newer multipurpose room, newly refurbished front office, professionally designed Outdoor Classroom courtyard, spacious soccer and baseball fields, newly-refurbished K-5 playground, new PreK playground, and newly upgraded security systems.



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School Narrative

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Sicomac serves students in Kindergarten through Grade 5, and also houses our district integrated, tuition-based PreK program. Kindergarten classes follow our district 3:2 schedule of 3 full days and two half days weekly. Content areas are departmentalized in Grades 4 and 5, allowing students to enjoy instruction from multiple teachers in the grade level and teachers to focus their planning and professional learning on fewer subjects. Sicomac offers 1:1 Chromebook laptop implementation in grades 3-5, with 1:1 Chromebooks available to students as appropriate in second grade. The integrated technology instruction in grades 3-5 supports best practices for technology use in the classroom and dedicated computer lab instruction for foundational skills in grades K-2. Sicomac School offers one hour special area instruction weekly for K-5 students in media, vocal music, art, physical education, technology, and Spanish (grades 3-5; K-2 enrichment as schedule allows). Sicomac's monthly schoolwide assemblies build school spirit and help support key building initiatives. Sicomac School's Annual School Theme reflects whole-child education goals. Our regular Principal and PTO eBlasts to parents facilitate timely communication and information sharing, as do regular school posts on our Twitter feed, classroom Twitter feeds, and school Facebook accounts. Sicomac's dedicated Makerspace for K-5 students incorporates hi-tech (e.g. 3-D printing) and low-tech maker activities. Staff members are trained in best practices for purposeful Block Play, reflecting our commitment to providing students with developmentally appropriate early childhood learning opportunities.
