SUPERINTENDENT'S NEWS & VIEWS

Despite extensive staffing losses
due to the Statewide employment
freeze, Vineland Developmental Center
clients and staff have experienced a
very successful summer on several fronts.
Certainly the most significant improvement
of the summer was installation of air conditioning in all dormitories and activity areas in
each East Campus non-ICF cottage. This was made
possible by acceleration of the first phase of our
comprehensive electrical distribution projects, which
is expected to upgrade electrical services to both
campuses so that all program and office areas will have
sufficient power for air conditioning.

During August VDC passed its annual ICF inspection, which was the first inspection under the new and stricter federal regulations. Congratulations are in order for all staff who contributed to this effort, which was significantly complicated by staffing shortages and upgraded regulatory demands.

Looking to the future, Vineland Developmental Center is working with key staff in the Division of Developmental Disabilities to develop a depopulation plan which will allow us to place 256 clients into community programs. Phase I of the plan is scheduled for implementation in September, 1990. Current plans call for our Parents and Friends Association to play the major roll in client placement into group homes and supervised apartments. Other non-profit agencies will be called upon as well. For all PAFA living arrangements, Vineland Developmental Center staff will fill direct care (Resident Living Specialists) roles, while the other agencies will recruit their own direct care staff. As this program is implemented we intend to close some of the older non-ICF cottages. Closure of four older cottages is currently expected.

Approximately 300 clients are expected to remain living in non-ICF cottages at Vineland when the depopulation plan is completed (scheduled for June, 1993). Additional community placements will be sought for the remaining clients at that time. I look forward to working with all Vineland Developmental Center staff in this demanding effort to improve the lives of our clients.



NEWS FROM SOCIAL SERVICES DEPARTMENT Submitted by Georgina Gaughran, ASWS

On August 2. 1989. Ms. Gloria Wilson, VDC Hospital, accompanied Ms. Karen Wojtowicz, SW II, and Ms. Georgina Gaughran, ASWS, to New Jersey State Office of Association for Retarded Citizens, North Brunswick, New Jersey. Ms. Wilson, as Client Council President, has been working along with Social Services and Mr. Jeffrey A. Bruce, Southern New Jersey Field Representative for New Jersey Self-advocacy Project, which is part of ARC, for the past year in developing the leadership skills which are necessary to chair the Client Council meetings. Ms. Wilson began her visit by meeting with Mr. John Scagnelli, Director, NJARC, and his staff, and with Ms. Mary Fioritto, Director, New Jersey Self-advocacy Project. Ms. Wilson also met with three young women who serve as Officer for the Client Council at North Jersey Developmental Center, Totowa, New Jersey. We were also joined by Mr. Jeffrey A. Bruce and the Self-advocacy Field Representative for the Northern District. After everyone was introduced, Mr. Scagnelli informed the group of the history of ARC and what ARC does. Mr. Scaquelli then introduced two of his staff members, one of whom spoke about legislation affecting the disabled, and the other about the Statewide Conference which is to be held on October 14, 1989, in New Brunswick, New Jersey. It is hoped that the two gubernatorial candidates will address the Conference. A dinner-dance is being planned for the evening of the Conference.

The group next learned about Project HIRE, which is an employment/training program for developmentally disabled adults. Through the Project, individuals are prepared for work, placed in suitable jobs and then receive the services of a Job Coach in training on the job site. The Job Coach works along with the employer as long as the client stays on the job site. We then saw a short video showing two clients who are involved with the Project. Following the video, we went to lunch where the clients had the opportunity to meet with one of the "stars" of the video and ask her questions. All four clients were treated to lunch compliments of Ms. Fioritto. After lunch we travelled to a barrier-free Group Home in Bound Brook, New Jersey, which is sponsored by Somerset ARC. There we were greeted by one of the residents, Belinda, who took us on a tour.

All good things must come to an end, and so we said our goodbyes, exchanged addresses and piled into our car for the long drive home, taking with us many pleasant memories of the day.





October 5 - Central Recreation is preparing for their Second Annual OKTOBERFEST to include music and festive foods.

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


NEWS FROM LANDIS COTTAGE



DISPELLING THE MYTHS ABOUT TICK REMOVAL

What is the best way to remove a tick? The answers are varied depending on who you ask and what part of the country you are in. Hard-bodied ticks attach themselves firmly to a host for a feeding period of several days and are especially difficult to remove. Methods such as touching attached ticks with a hot match, coating them with mineral oil, petroleum jelly, or some other substance, and/or "unscrewing" them counterclockwise are some of the home remedies that supposedly induce them to "back out".

Having been on survival training with the Air Force, I felt I could give you some background and tips for your survival. Ticks are important vectors of human disease second only to mosquitoes. They are involved in the transmission of Viral Colorado Tick Fever, Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever, Lyme Disease, and tularemia and protozoan diseases. Since the lengthy feeding period is an important factor in the transmission of disease by ticks, it is crucial that a tick be removed as soon as possible after it is discovered, to reduce the chances of infection by disease organisms.

Recently, Glen Needham at Ohio State University evaluated five methods commonly used for tick removal: petroleum jelly, fingernail polish, 70% isopropyl alcohol, hot match, and forceable removal with tweezers. Needham found the commonly advocated methods are ineffective and can cause greater problems. If the petroleum jelly is used, the tick's "cement", used for attachment surrounding the mouth parts, remains in the skin where it continues to cause irritation. Touching the tick with a hot match can cause it to burst, increasing risk of disease germ exposure. Hot objects can unduce the tick to salivate or regurgitate infected fluids into the wound. "Unscrewing" a tick leaves broken mouth parts in the host's skin. The recommended procedure is as follows:

- 1. Use a blunt tweezer.
- 2. Grasp the tick as close to the skin surface as possible and pull upward with steady, even pressure.
- 3. Take care not to squeeze, crush, or puncture the tick.
- 4. Do not handle the tick with bare hands infection agents may enter via mucous membranes or breaks in the skin.
- 5. Thoroughly disinfect the bite site and wash your hands.

I also recommend marking the day of a tick bite on your calendar. If unexpected disease symptoms occur within two weeks of this, a physician should be notified of the tick bite and the date it occurred.
