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Section One

SYNOPSIS: UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING PROGRAM

THE NEW JERSEY UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING SYSTEM

DEFINITION

The New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting System is based upon the compilation, classification, and analysis of crime data reported by all New Jersey police agencies in accordance with the regulations prescribed by law.

DEVELOPMENT

The New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting Law (N.J.S.A. 52:17 B-5.1 et. seq.) was enacted on May 16, 1966, and became effective January 1, 1967. Responsibility for the establishment, direction, control, and supervision of the Uniform Crime Reporting System was assigned to the State's Attorney General. The Attorney General authorized the New Jersey State Police to collect and collate the crime data received from law enforcement agencies within the state.

At the request of the Attorney General, the New Jersey State Police researched crime systems in operation throughout the nation in order to establish a firm foundation from which to grow. The most logical approach was the paralleling of the federal crime reporting system. There was a distinct need for a compatibility feature that would enhance both the state and federal systems through the data entry at both levels.

This compatibility has, as its nucleus, the standard classification of offenses established by the Federal Bureau of Investigation. Regardless of the label placed on a particular offense in the various states' systems, *i.e.*, felony, misdemeanor, disorderly persons, if the incident meets the federal standard it will be reported as an offense.

The terms "crime" and "offense" are used interchangeably in this publication, and refer to an act committed in violation of a law which is reportable under the guidelines of the Uniform Crime Reporting Program.

The New Jersey State Chiefs of Police Association has served the program in an advisory capacity since 1966. The contributions of this association have proved valuable to the success of the program. This association works in close harmony with the State Police as a means of improving the quality of reporting through recommended program standards, policies and procedures.

COLLECTION OF CRIME DATA

As required by statute, all law enforcement agencies in the state submit monthly and annual summary crime reports to the program. During the year 2000, offense and arrest data were received from 481 full-time municipal police departments, three (3) part-time municipal police departments, and the New Jersey State Police (acting as the reporting agent for the 74 municipalities without local police services). In addition to the 481 full-time municipal police departments there are eight (8) police departments contracted by other municipalities.

In addition to the above agencies, arrest data was received from the state's twenty-one (21) prosecutors, sheriffs' departments, three (3) county police departments, and two (2) county park police departments. In order to incorporate all New Jersey law enforcement agencies under the system, the ten (10) other state agencies with law enforcement responsibilities, excluding state police, as well as thirteen (13) college campus police departments were incorporated within the program. Collectively, a total of 555 law enforcement agencies submit the reports to the New Jersey State Police.

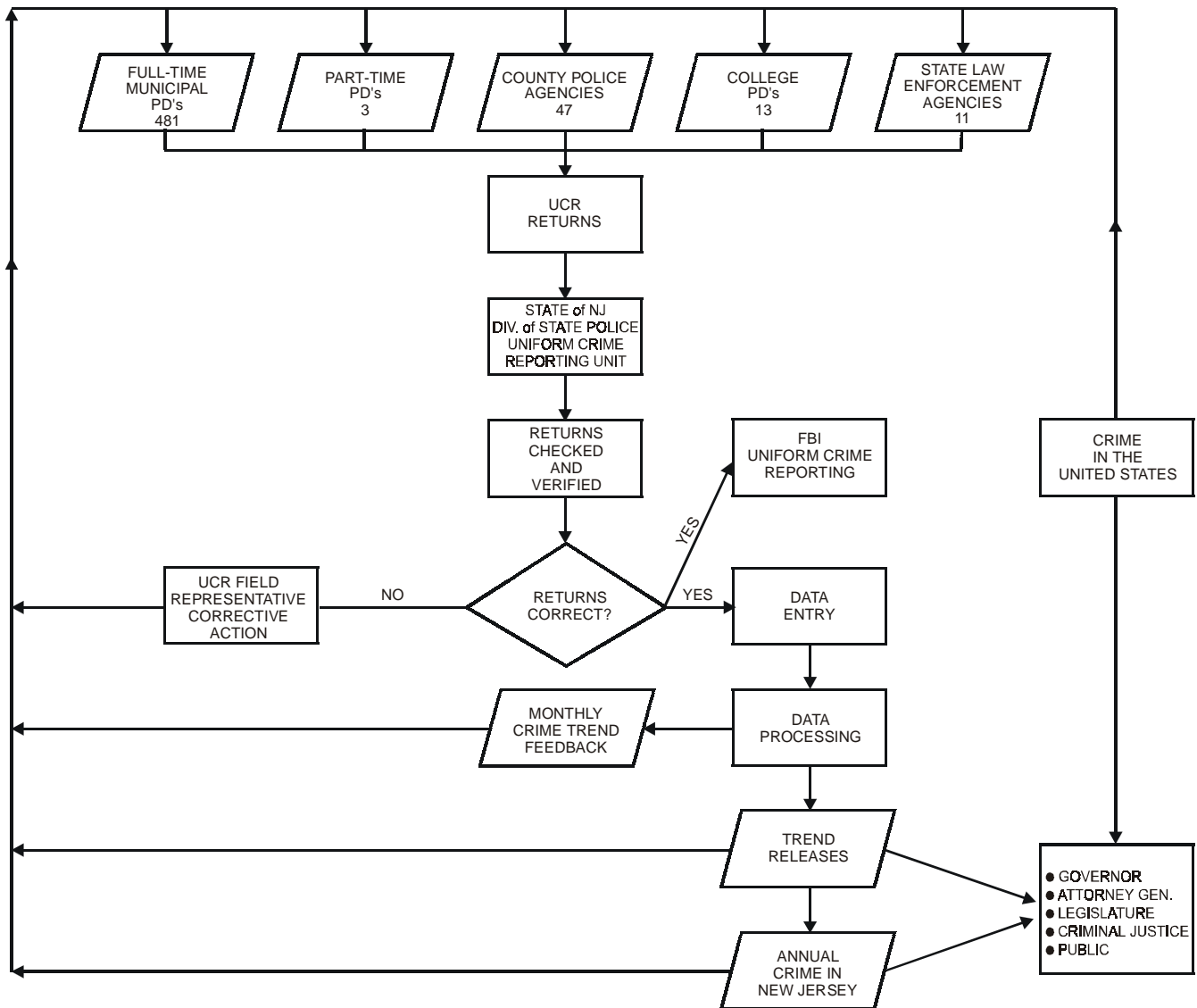
METHOD

A State of New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting Guide has been distributed to all contributors. It outlines reporting procedures in detail, and is complete to the extent of providing examples and illustrations. Field representatives provide additional instruction and clarification when required.

All reported offenses are related to the municipality in which they occur rather than to the agency which may conduct the investigation. The clearance is credited to the municipality in which the offense occurred. Each contributing agency is responsible for compiling its own reports. Law enforcement agencies report the number of known offenses according to the following categories: Homicide (Murder and Manslaughter), Rape, Robbery, Burglary, Larceny-Theft, Motor Vehicle Theft, and Arson. The "Crime in New Jersey," and the Federal Bureau of Investigation's "Crime in the United States" publications exclude manslaughters, simple assaults, and arsons from the "Index" offenses. These are further referred to as "violent" and "nonviolent" crimes as graphically illustrated in Section VII under "Municipal and County Offenses and Demographic Data," and Section II, "State Summary and Offense Analysis."

All reported offenses are compiled from a record of all criminal complaints received by police from victims or other sources, or discovered by the police during routine operations. Complaints determined to be unfounded are eliminated from this count. Analytical data pertaining to specific crime categories are also reported, *i.e.* total adult and juvenile arrests made during the month. Police killed or assaulted and arson data are also collected monthly. Police personnel information is submitted on an annual basis.

VERIFICATION PROCESSES

The uniformity and accuracy of data gathered from contributors must be safeguarded through various ways. Although guidelines and instructions are provided to each contributor, they are not the panaceas for the accuracy being sought.

The reports received by the Uniform Crime Reporting Unit are recorded and examined for mathematical accuracy and reasonableness of the interpretation of the offense classifications. Improper classifications, changes in reporting procedures, or actual change are identified in this manner. Errors of a minor nature are corrected by direct telephone contact with the contributors, while all other errors are resolved through a personal visit by a field representative to the reporting agency.

Further verification is accomplished through the analysis of statistical data accrued from the reports submitted. Fluctuations in crime rates noted from previous submissions are verified by the field representatives through their municipal counterpart.

FUNCTION

Police executives make use of this data in administrative, planning, and operational determinations for their respective jurisdictions. The State Police Uniform Crime Reporting Unit provides assistance to municipal police agencies through the individual analysis of statistics as they relate to specific crime problems within their jurisdiction. Police executives also use this data for identifying manpower and equipment needs. The Uniform Crime Reporting Program requirements not only have increased police efficiency in reporting and record keeping areas, but have helped police in their day to day operations.

Although the data collected on the offenses of manslaughter and simple assault are not presented in the annual report, they are required for the federal system. However, this data is processed and available for special research purposes.

PROFILE OF NEW JERSEY

New Jersey is situated between the major industrial markets of New York and Philadelphia and can be classified as the "Crossroads of the East." The geographic location of the state has been a major factor in its growth and development. The many miles of super-expressway facilities within the state connect New Jersey directly with the neighboring states of New York, Pennsylvania, and Delaware. Additionally, New Jersey as a corridor state, accommodates large volumes of traffic from both the eastern and western part of the United States.

The state is geographically composed of 21 counties which contain 566 incorporated municipalities. Nationally, New Jersey, although 46th in size, ranks ninth in population and first as the most densely populated state in the country. In addition to this density of 1,122.6 persons per square mile, New Jersey still has many miles of rural areas and sparsely settled communities. The areas of density show a heavy concentration around the major urban centers and those areas most accessible for commuting.

STATE, COUNTY AND MUNICIPAL PROFILES

The presentation of state, county and municipal profiles in this section is offered for the purpose of projecting, for the consideration of the reader, a group of recognizable factors which may affect the amount and type of crime that occurs from community to community. Selection of the areas of information to be related to individual municipalities was based on the immediacy and completeness of data available.

Population statistics presented here, and throughout this publication, were obtained from the Department of Labor, Division of Labor Market and Demographic Research.

Character of municipalities by urban, suburban and rural classifications, and square miles, were initially compiled by the Department of Community Affairs, Division of State and Regional Planning, Bureau of Statewide Planning, and will continue to be used for comparative purposes. Following is a list of categories used and a description of each category.

- URBAN CENTER Densely populated with extensive development.
- URBAN SUBURBAN Near an urban center but not as extremely developed and more residential areas.
- SUBURBAN Predominantly single family residential, within a short distance of an urban area.
- RURAL Scattered small communities and isolated single family dwellings.
- RURAL CENTER High density core area with surrounding rural municipalities.

Certain other socioeconomic factors present in varying degrees in all communities may have an influence on resulting crime rates. Obvious difficulties in the identification, documentation and measurement of these factors, however, precluded their application in this report.

Those factors presented were listed to affirm their existence within the county and community and to provide a base for consideration in the evaluation of that community's crime experience.

RESORT MUNICIPALITY CRIME RATES

On July 10, 1998, section 4 of P.L. 1966, c37(C.52:17B-5.4) was amended to require the Uniform Crime Report to include, in addition to the regular statistics, an alternative calculation that takes into account the seasonal population of resort municipalities.

The Department of Labor has been mandated to determine which municipalities qualify as resort municipalities and certify their annual mean population (which includes seasonal population estimates.)

CRIME FACTORS

In order to provide a meaningful statistical profile of crime within the State of New Jersey, each law enforcement agency must provide the Uniform Crime Reporting Unit with data that depicts specific crimes that are occurring within their jurisdiction. There is a need for compatibility with the National Uniform Crime Reporting System and, therefore, categories of offense classifications used within the state are identical with those of the National System. This results in equitable conclusions being drawn from the data submitted.

Reported Part 1 offenses and arrests are recorded in the municipality where they occurred, regardless of the outside investigative agency which may investigate, arrest, or otherwise dispose of the case.

The factors which influence crime rates are dependent upon characteristics of the community. When attempting to interpret the crime statistics presented herein, one should be aware of the social structure and factors that lead to or cause criminal behavior.

Crime rates in this publication are based on the stable population of the municipality. Fluctuating seasonal population figures are too inaccurate to be used as a measurement for determining crime rates. Municipalities with high seasonal populations may indicate a higher crime per one thousand than may be normal for a municipality their size. This would also be indicated in municipalities that experience high population increases due to special events or commuters.

Set forth below are some factors which, by type and volume, will affect the crime rate that occurs from place to place:

- Density and size of the community population and the metropolitan areas of which it is a part.
- Composition of the population with reference particularly to age, sex and race.
- Economic status, including job availability, and mores of the population.
- Relative stability of population, including commuter, seasonal, and other transient types.
- Climate, including seasonal weather conditions.
- Cultural conditions, such as educational, recreational, and religious characteristics.
- Effective strength of law enforcement agencies.
- Administrative and investigative emphases of law enforcement.
- Policies of other components of the criminal justice system (*i.e.*, prosecutorial, judicial, correctional, and probational.)
- Crime reporting practices of the general citizenry.
- Attitudes of the public toward crime reporting.
- The administrative and investigative efficiency of the local law enforcement agency, including the degree of adherence to crime reporting standards.
- Cooperation of adjoining and overlapping police agencies.

THE POLICE POINT OF VIEW

The New Jersey State Police Uniform Crime Reporting Unit surveyed various police agencies of the state, attempting to ascertain their opinion concerning factors contributing to the increase or decrease of specific crimes in their municipality. One of the goals of the Uniform Crime Reporting Unit is to assist police in reducing crime by first identifying its extent, type and location. The following viewpoints are offered with the expectation of reaching this goal.

ROBBERY

Decreases:

- More stringent sentencing requirements under the State Criminal Code.
- Advanced technology in communications has led to increased exchanges of information between police departments.
- Highly visible foot patrols being deployed in commercial areas and densely populated residential areas.
- Use of Anti-crime Unit in high robbery areas.

Increases:

- Resort areas have shown an increasing seasonal population.
- Our highly mobile society provides easy access to areas which were previously difficult to reach.

BURGLARY

Decreases:

- Better deployment of police personnel, such as highly visible foot patrols in high density crime areas, and increased patrols during probable time and at probable locations of burglaries.
- More stringent sentencing requirements under the State's Criminal Code have been a deterrent.
- Crime Prevention Programs are being stressed in many communities and citizens have been taking a more active part by reporting suspicious persons or circumstances.

Increases:

- Extreme increases in population in certain areas have led to new housing in suburban and rural areas.
- Husband and wife are both working; leaving homes frequently unoccupied for long periods of time.

LARCENY

Decreases:

- Public awareness programs contribute to the decrease in thefts from parked vehicles.
- Improved or additional lighting deters criminal acts from occurring in parking areas.
- "Safe Streets" Programs and Anti-crime Units have been established in many communities.

Increases:

- Shoplifting is a theft that police have little or no control over. Store security forces are under the control of the store administration, and their policies vary from strict enforcement, arrest and prosecution, to only a warning. Policy change has been directed toward prosecuting the offenders rather than warning them, causing to some extent an increase in the number of shoplifting offenses reported to the police.
- Certain types of property such as tape decks, radar detectors and radios are popular and present resale opportunities.
- Youth gang activity on the increase resulting in thefts from motor vehicles.

MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT**Decreases:**

- Stronger sentencing of career criminals has been effective.
- Modern ignition systems and anti-theft devices act as a deterrent.
- Better lighting in parking lots has helped decrease motor vehicle thefts.

Increases:

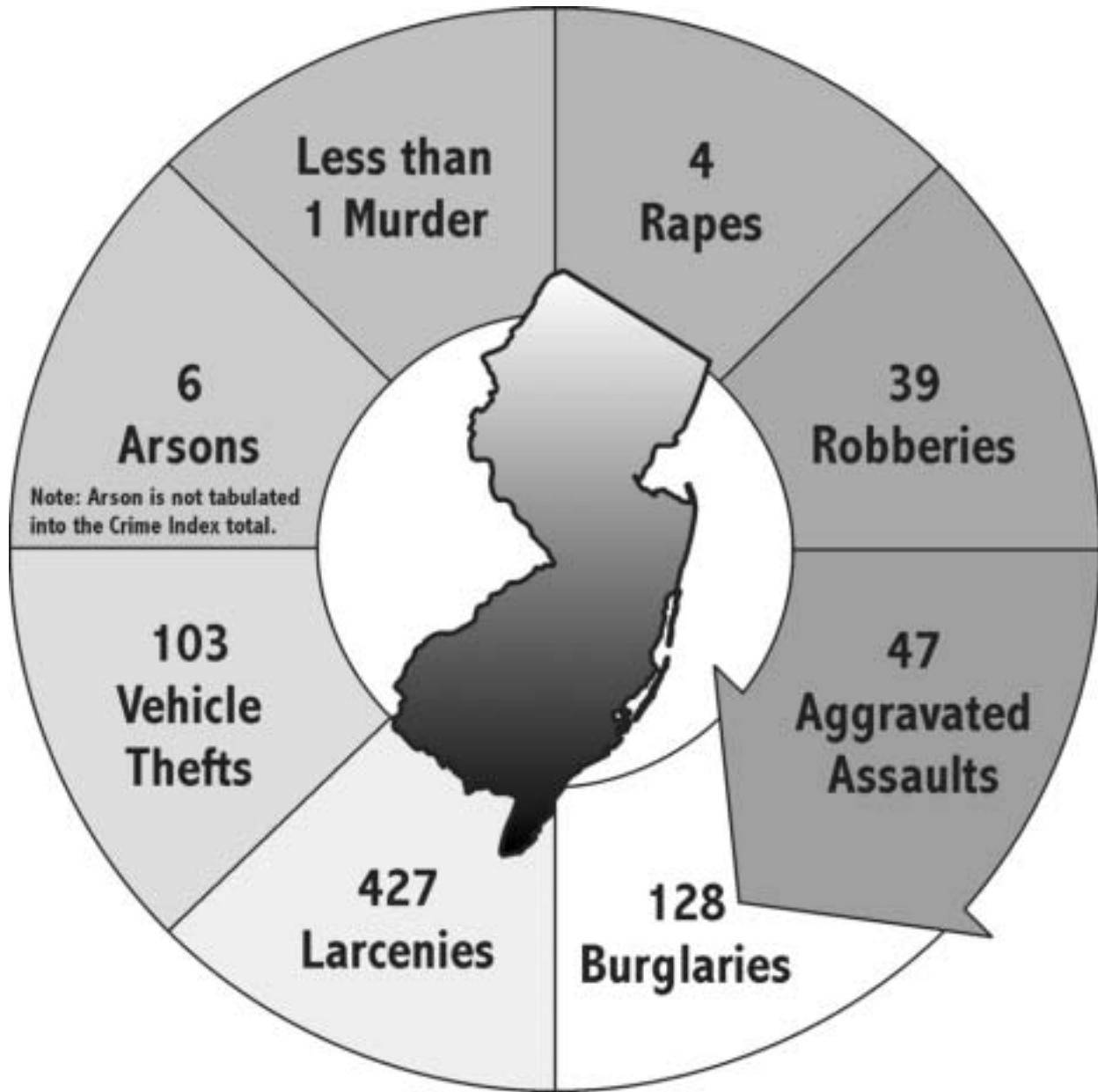
- The tremendous replacement cost of auto parts has contributed significantly to the increase in motor vehicle thefts for the purpose of auto parts resale.



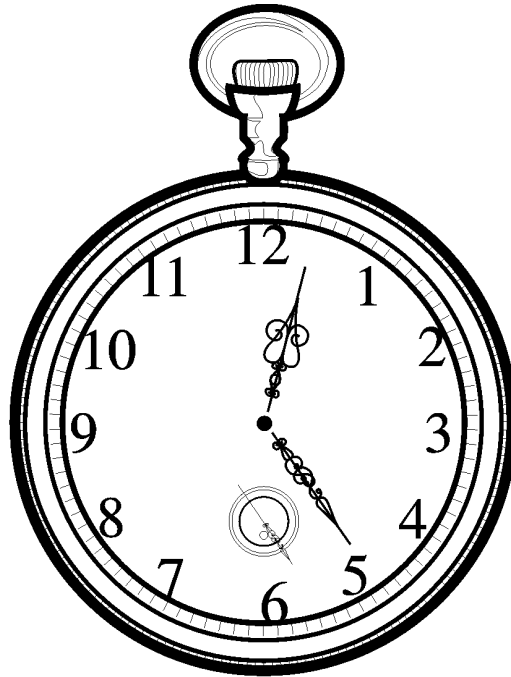

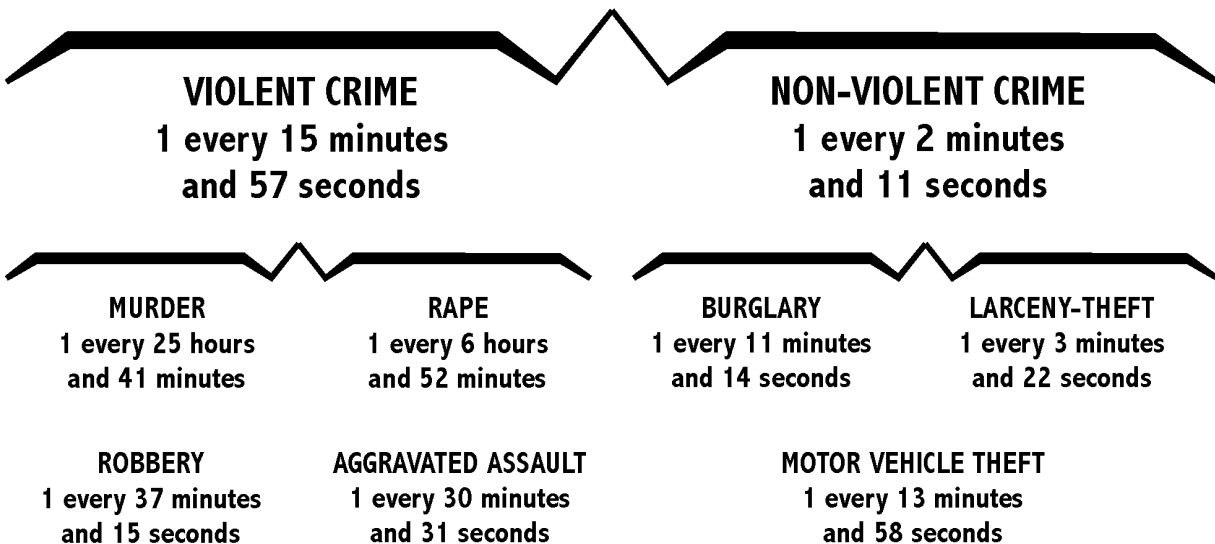
24 Hour Crime Cycle in New Jersey — 2001

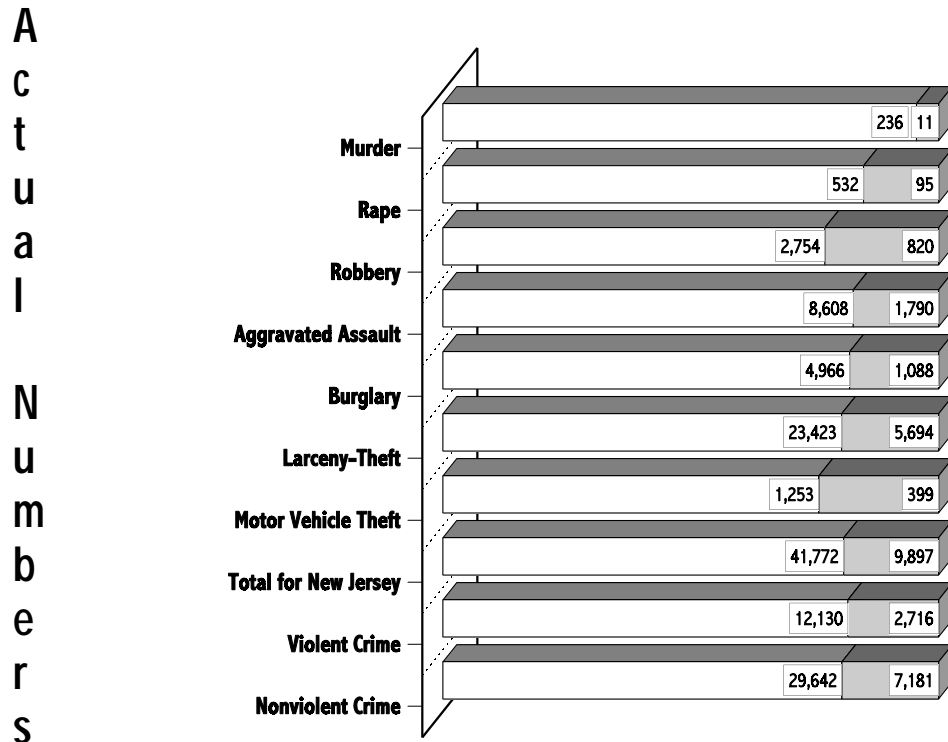
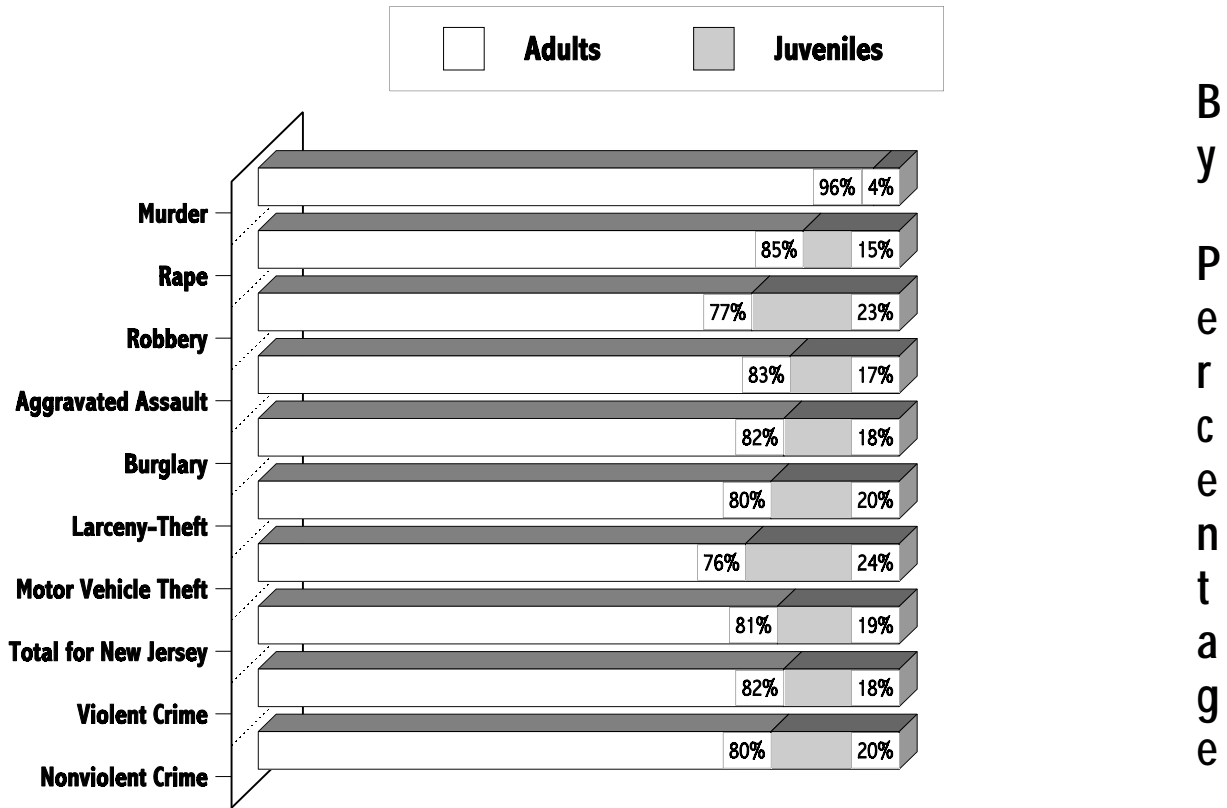

STATEWIDE CRIME SUMMARY - 2001

CRIME INDEX – VOLUME/RATE

- There were 273,201 Index offenses in 2001, a 3 percent increase compared to 2000.
- The crime rate of the state is 32.5 victims for every 1,000 permanent inhabitants, an increase of 3 percent compared to 2000.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- July with 26,612 offenses reported, recorded the highest incidence of Crime Index offenses while February was the lowest with 17,874 offenses.
- The total value of property stolen amounted to \$517.5 million in 2001, an increase of 11 percent from 2000.
- Value of property recovered was \$198.2 million, resulting in a recovery rate of 38 percent.
- Stolen motor vehicles accounted for 62 percent of stolen property and 92 percent of the recovered property value.

CRIME INDEX ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- A total of 53,670 persons were arrested for Index offenses, which represents a 2 percent decrease compared to 2000.
- Adult Index arrests increased 1 percent and juvenile arrests decreased 9 percent.
- Crime Index arrests accounted for 14 percent of the total arrests in 2001.
- Males accounted for 73 percent of the Crime Index arrests and females accounted for 27 percent.
- Fifty-seven percent of the Index arrests were white, 42 percent were black and the balance were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 17 percent of the arrests for Index offenses.
- Police cleared 19 percent of the Index offenses and juveniles accounted for 19 percent of these clearances.

VIOLENT CRIME SUMMARY

This category consists of the following Index offenses: Murder, Rape, Robbery, Aggravated Assault.

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 32,957 violent crimes reported in 2001, a 2 percent increase compared to the violent crimes reported in 2000.
- Violent crimes accounted for 12 percent of the total Crime Index.
- The violent crime rate increased 3 percent to 3.9 victims for every 1,000 permanent inhabitants.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- The highest number of violent crimes were reported in July with 3,071 offenses while the lowest number was reported in February with 2,231 offenses.
- The value of property stolen as a result of violent crime was \$13.9 million.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- Arrests for violent crime offenses increased 1 percent to 15,819.
- Violent crime arrests accounted for 29 percent of the Index arrests and 4 percent of the total arrests during the year.
- Adult arrests for violent crime increased less than one-half of one percent and juvenile arrests showed a 3 percent increase.
- Adults accounted for 79 percent of the violent crime arrests while the remaining 21 percent were juveniles.
- Males were responsible for 82 percent and females for 18 percent of the violent crime arrests.
- Fifty-two percent of those arrested were black, 47 percent were white and 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 18 percent of the arrests for violent crimes.
- Forty-five percent of all violent crimes were cleared and juveniles accounted for 18 percent of these clearances.

NONVIOLENT CRIME SUMMARY

This category consists of the following Index offenses: Burglary, Larceny-Theft, Motor Vehicle Theft.

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 240,244 nonviolent crimes reported in 2001, a 3 percent increase compared to the 233,564 reported in 2000.
- Nonviolent crime accounted for 88 percent of the total Crime Index.
- The nonviolent crime rate increased 3 percent to 28.6 victims per 1,000 inhabitants in 2001.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- The largest number of nonviolent crimes were reported in July with 23,541, while the lowest number was reported in February with 15,643.
- The total value of property stolen as a result of nonviolent crime amounted to \$503.7 million.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- There were 37,851 nonviolent crime arrests, this represents a decrease of 2 percent when compared to 2000.
- Nonviolent crime arrests accounted for 71 percent of the Index arrests and 10 percent of the total arrests during 2001.
- Juveniles were responsible for 26 percent of the nonviolent crime arrests and adults 74 percent.
- Adult nonviolent crime arrests increased 2 percent, while juvenile arrests decreased 12 percent.
- Males represented 69 percent and females 31 percent of persons arrested for nonviolent crime.
- Sixty-one percent of all persons arrested for nonviolent crimes were white, 37 percent were black and 2 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 17 percent of the arrests for nonviolent crimes.
- Fifteen percent of all nonviolent crimes reported were cleared in 2001, and juveniles accounted for 20 percent of these clearances.

TOTAL ARREST SUMMARY

- There were 396,638 persons arrested in 2001, which represents a 1 percent decrease compared to 2000.
- The arrest rate for 2001 decreased 1 percent to 47.1 persons arrested per every 1,000 inhabitants.
- Adult arrests increased less than one-half of one percent to 331,667 and juvenile arrests decreased 4 percent to 64,971 in 2001.
- Adults accounted for 84 percent and juveniles 16 percent of the total state arrests.
- Persons under 21 years of age accounted for 30 percent of all arrests.
- Males accounted for 80 percent and females 20 percent of the total persons arrested during the year.
- Fifty-eight percent of the total persons arrested in 2001 were white, 41 percent were black and 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 15 percent of the arrests.

POLICE OFFICERS KILLED AND ASSAULTED SUMMARY

- There was one police officer feloniously killed in the line of duty during 2001.
- New Jersey reported 3,253 police officers assaulted in the line of duty in 2001.

CRIME IN NEW JERSEY, UNITED STATES AND THE NORTHEAST REGION

- The Crime Index in New Jersey increased 3 percent, while the Northeast Region decreased 1 percent overall. The United States Crime Index increased 2 percent overall.
- Violent crime in New Jersey increased 2 percent, while the Northeast Region decreased 2 percent overall. Violent crime in the United States increased by less than one-half of one percent.
- Nonviolent crime in New Jersey increased 3 percent, while the Northeast Region decreased 1 percent overall. Nonviolent crime in the United States increased 2 percent overall.

MURDER

DEFINITION

Murder is defined as the unlawful killing of a human being with malice aforethought. Any death due to a fight, argument, quarrel, assault, or commission of a crime is included. This Index offense is counted by police on the basis of their investigation without regard to findings of a court, jury or the decision of a prosecutor. Attempts to kill, are scored as aggravated assaults and not as murder. Suicides, accidental deaths, negligent manslaughters, and justifiable homicides are not counted, nor reflected in the murder classification.

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 341 murders reported to law enforcement agencies of the state in 2001, an 18 percent increase compared to the 288 murders reported in 2000.
- Murders accounted for one-tenth of one percent of the reported Index offenses, and 1 percent of the violent crime.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- The age group of 20-24 accounted for 22 percent of all murder victims.
- Firearms were used in 50 percent of the murders, knives or cutting instruments in 21 percent, blunt objects in 6 percent and physical force in 11 percent.
- Twenty-eight percent of the offenders were friends or acquaintances of the victim, while 9 percent were relatives, and 18 percent were strangers.
- Felony murders accounted for 14 percent of all murder circumstances. Robbery was the motive in 79 percent of the 47 felony murders.
- Sixty-seven murders were recorded on Sunday for the high, while Monday was the lowest, with 38.
- July, October and November recorded the highest number of murders, with 34 each month, while February recorded the lowest with 23.
- Forty-six percent of the murders occurred on highways or streets, 21 percent in multi-family or apartment dwellings, and 18 percent in single family dwellings.
- The total value of property stolen because of murder amounted to \$24,944.
- Drug-related and/or alcohol related arguments accounted for 5 percent (18) of all murder circumstances.

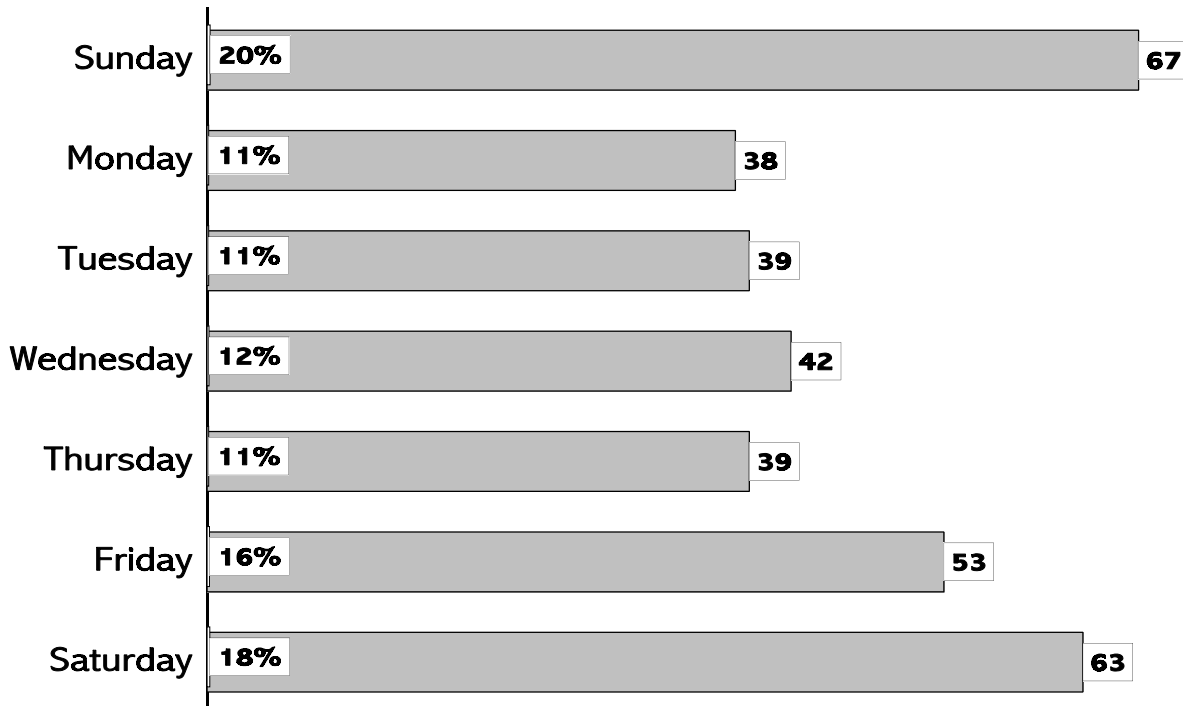
ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- A total of 261 persons were arrested for murder in 2001, a 12 percent increase compared to 2000.
- Adult murder arrests increased 10 percent (from 215 to 236) and juvenile arrests increased 39 percent (from 18 to 25).
- Sixty-seven percent of persons arrested for murder were black, 32 percent were white, and 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 13 percent of the arrests.
- Seventy-two percent of the murders were cleared in 2001 (247 out of 341). Juveniles accounted for 4 percent of those cases cleared.
- Males accounted for 93 percent and females 7 percent of those arrested for murder.

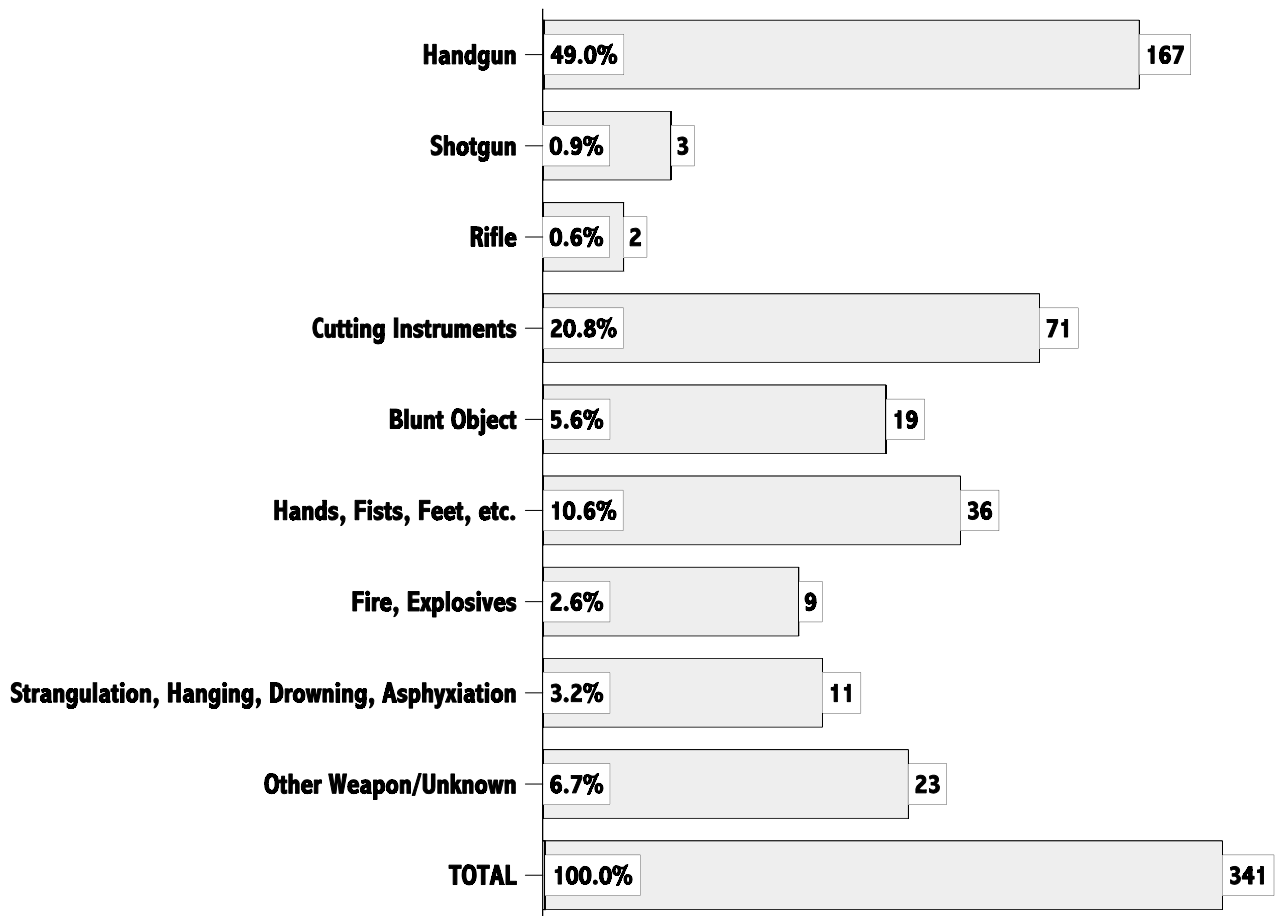

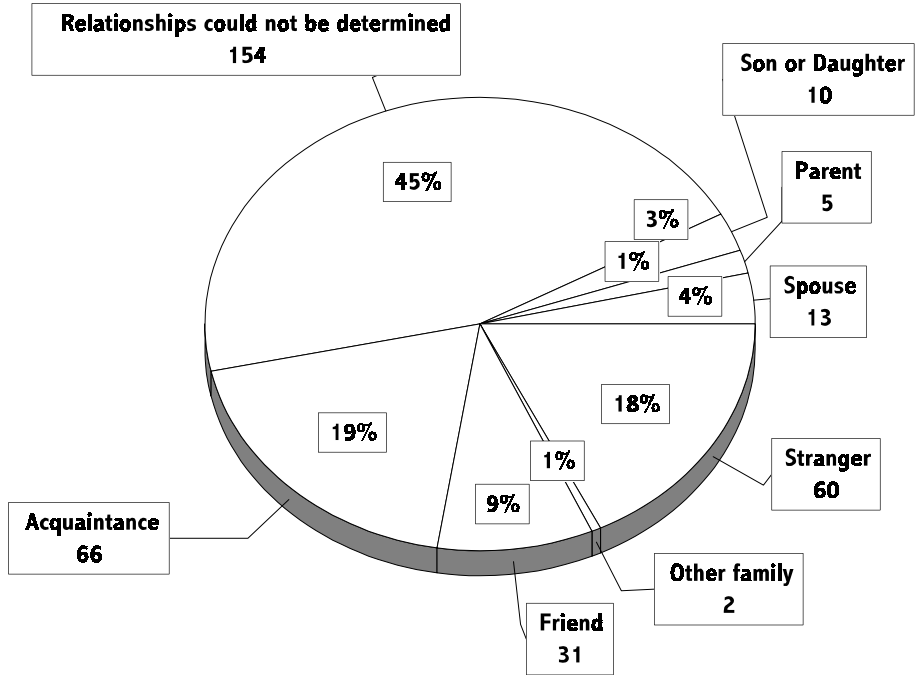

MURDER — DISTRIBUTION BY TYPE OF WEAPON



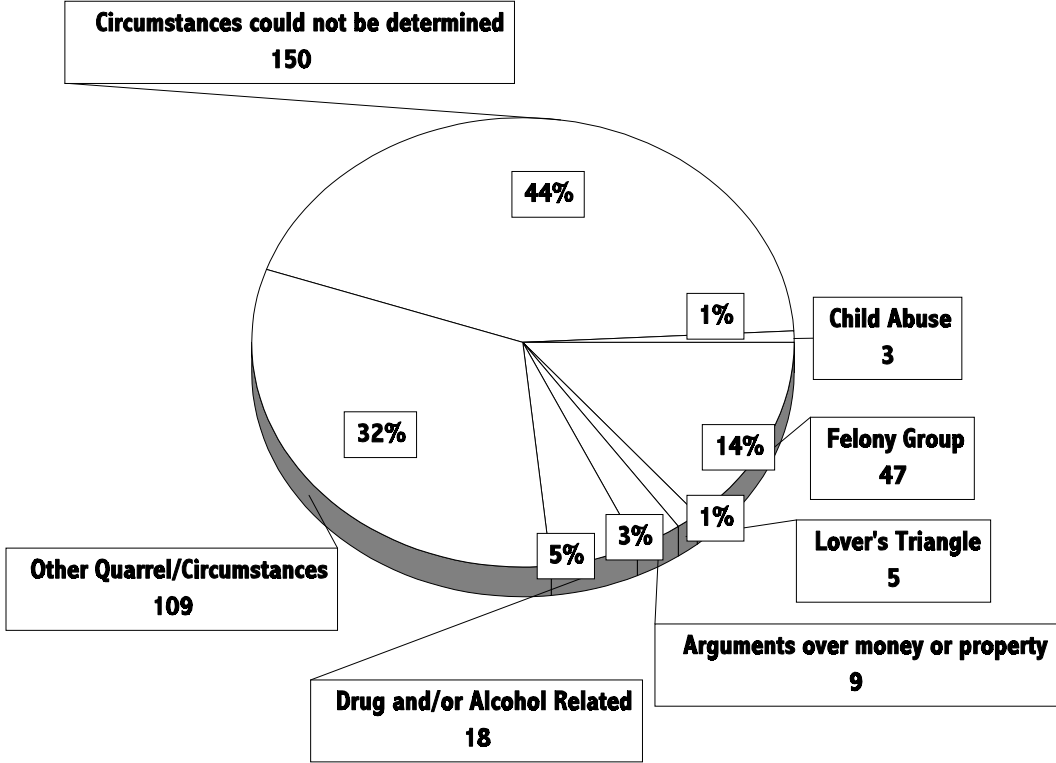

RELATIONSHIP OF MURDER VICTIMS TO OFFENDER

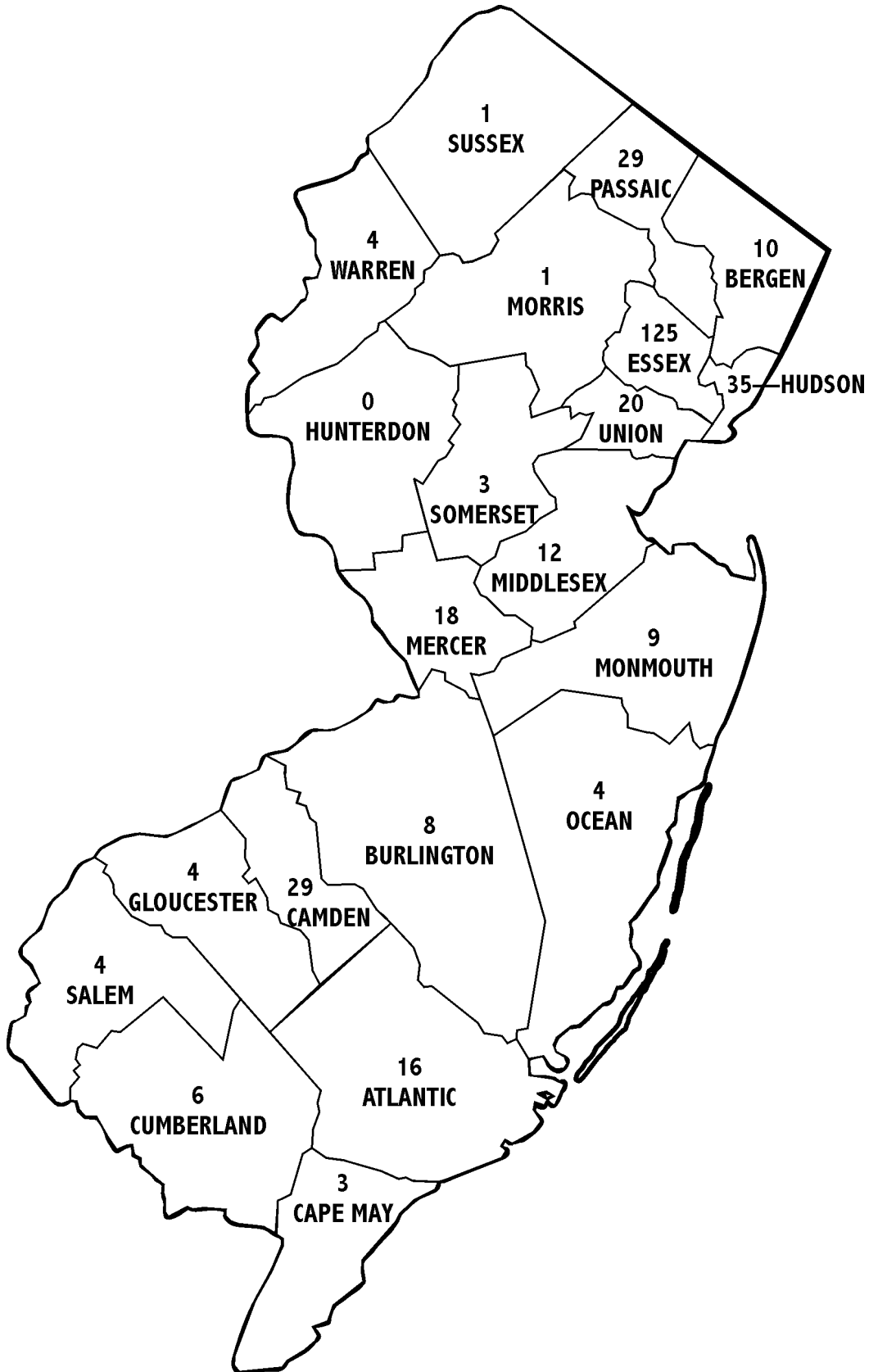

RAPE

Definition

Rape is defined as the carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will. All assaults and attempts to rape are counted, but carnal abuse, rape without force (statutory rape) and other sex offenses are not included.

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 1,277 reported rapes in 2001, a decrease of 6 percent compared to the 1,352 in 2000.
- Rape accounted for less than one-half of one percent of the total Crime Index and 4 percent of all violent crimes.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Ninety percent of the rapes were forcible, the remaining 10 percent were attempts to rape.
- The total value of property stolen as a result of rape amounted to \$6,941.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- A total of 589 persons were arrested during 2001, a 3 percent increase compared to 2000.
- Adult rape arrests decreased 1 percent, while juvenile arrests increased 25 percent.
- Fifty-three percent of the arrested perpetrators were white, 45 percent were black and 2 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 22 percent of the arrests.
- Thirty-nine percent of all persons arrested for rape were between 25 and 39.
- Forty-nine percent of all rape cases were solved during 2001. Juveniles accounted for 15 percent of those cases cleared.

ROBBERY

Definition

Robbery is defined as the felonious and forcible taking of the property of another, against his will, by violence or by putting him in fear. The element of personal confrontation is always present in this crime. Under the program, all assaults or attempts to rob are included.

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 14,112 robbery offenses in 2001, a 4 percent increase compared to 2000.
- Robbery accounted for 5 percent of the total Crime Index and 43 percent of all violent crime.
- The robbery rate was 1.7 victims per 1,000 population.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Highway robberies accounted for 64 percent of all reported robberies.
- Bank robberies decreased 18 percent and convenience store robberies increased 20 percent.
- Total value of property stolen during robberies amounted to \$13,822,078.

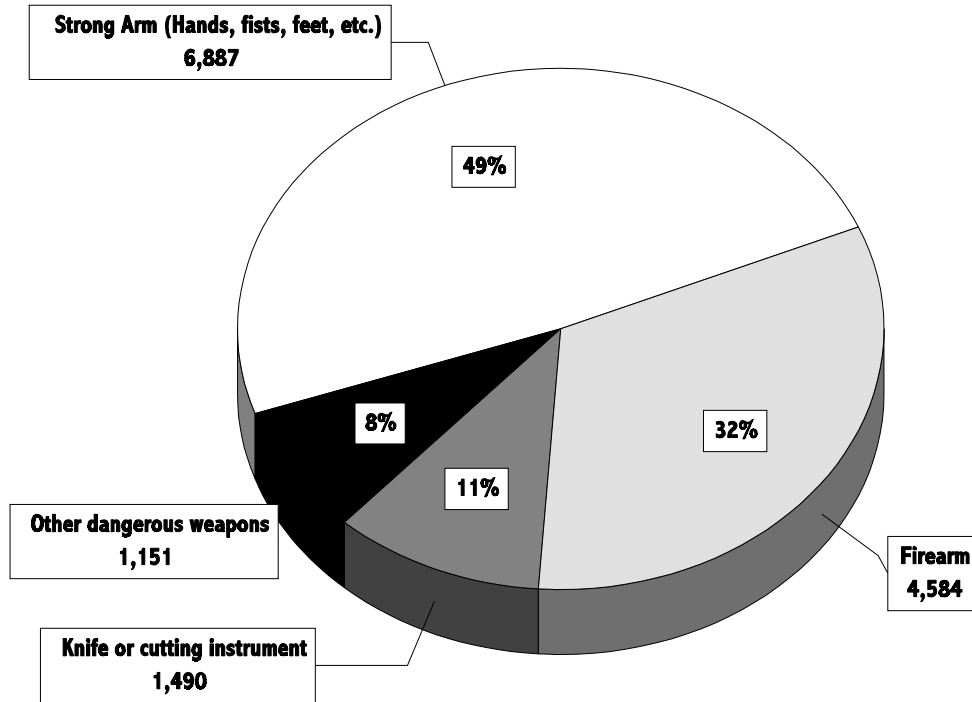

CARJACKING

- Carjacking is a form of robbery; therefore, further analysis is provided in this section for 2001.
- There were 491 carjacking offenses reported to the police; 12 were determined to be unfounded, leaving a total of 479 carjackings, involving 543 victims, including passengers.
- Carjackings increased 14% when comparing 2001 to 2000.
- Seventy-four of the 566 municipalities in New Jersey reported carjackings.
- Firearms were involved in 53% (256) of all carjackings. Sixteen percent (42) of the firearms used were assault firearms. Shootings were involved in 3 percent (15) of all carjackings.
- New Jersey registered vehicles represented 91% (436) of all carjackings. Ford, with 14% (65), was the most frequently carjacked vehicle make, while 2001, with 9% (42), was the most frequently targeted vehicle year.
- Fifty-nine percent (285) of all carjacked vehicles were recovered. The average value of a carjacked motor vehicle was \$10,424.
- Carjackings occurred in a residential area 50% (239) of the time. The hours of darkness (6:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m.) accounted for 68% (327) of all carjackings.
- Eighteen percent (86) of all carjackings were witnessed.
- The most frequent victim age group was 20-24, which accounted for 22% (122) of the victim total (543). Seventy-three percent (397) of all victims were male. Fifty-one percent (278) of all victims were white.
- The total number of offenders was 797. Insufficient analysis information was supplied on 21% (164) of the offenders. Of all known offenders (633), 20-24 was the most frequent offender age group and accounted for 45% (286). Ninety-four percent (598) of all known offenders were male. Seventy-nine percent (502) of all known offenders were black.
- Juveniles accounted for 20% (18) of the total arrests for carjacking (92), while adults accounted for 80% (74).
- December had the highest number of offenses with 54 accounting for 11% of all reported carjacking offenses.
- Sunday recorded the highest number of offenses, accounting for 18% (87) of all reported carjackings.
- Region I, which consists of Essex, Hudson, and Union counties, accounted for 70% (334) of all reported carjackings.
- No murders were reported in 2001 as the result of carjacking.
- Ten percent (48) of all carjackings (479) were cleared by arrest.

AGGRAVATED ASSAULT

Definition

Aggravated assault, as defined under the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting system, is an attempt or offer, with unlawful force or violence, to do serious physical injury to another. Attempts are included since it is not necessary that an injury result when a firearm, knife, or other weapon is used which could result in serious personal injury if the crime was successfully completed.

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 17,227 reported aggravated assaults in 2001, an increase of 1 percent when compared to 2000.
- Aggravated assault accounted for 6 percent of the total Crime Index and 52 percent of all violent crimes.
- The rate for aggravated assault increased to 2.1 victims per 1,000 population.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Physical force (i.e. hands, fists, and feet) was used in 32 percent, and other dangerous weapons (i.e. clubs, bricks, tire irons, etc.) were used in 33 percent of all reported aggravated assaults.
- Firearms were used in 15 percent of all aggravated assaults committed.

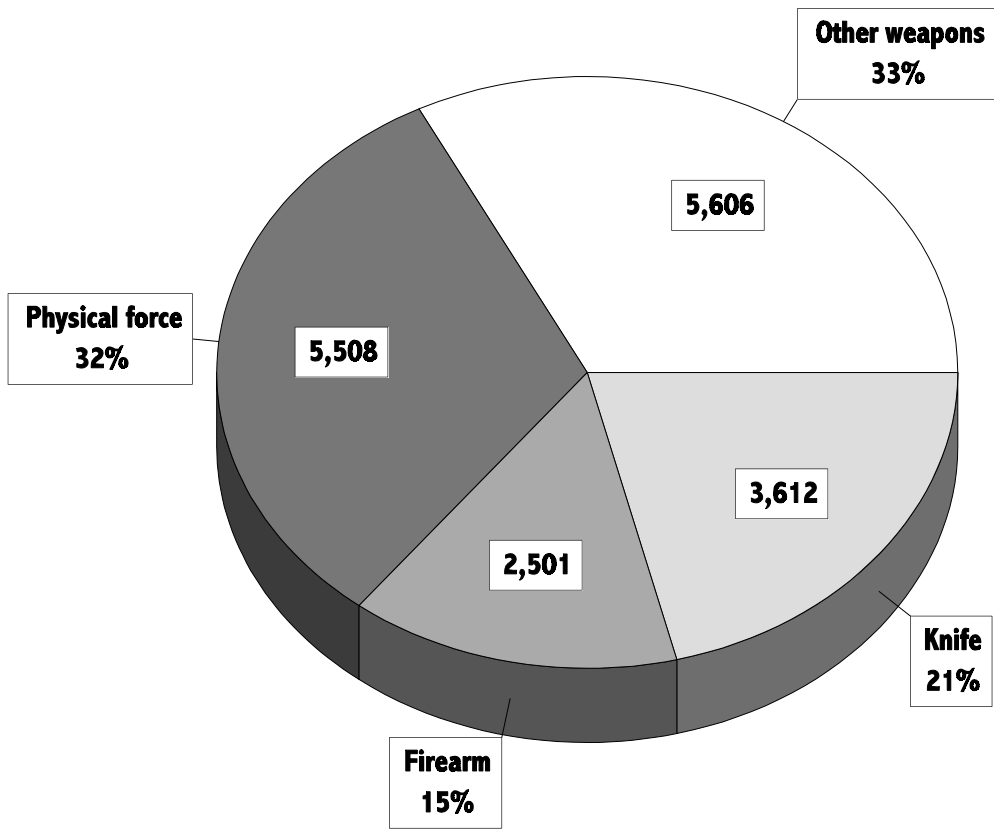

BURGLARY

Definition

Under this program, burglary is defined as an unlawful entry or attempted entry of any structure to commit a felony or larceny. Data collection for this offense is further categorized as forcible entry, unlawful entry (where no force is used) and attempted forcible entry.

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 46,768 reported burglary offenses in 2001, an increase of 6 percent.
- Burglary accounted for 17 percent of the total Crime Index and 19 percent of all nonviolent crimes.
- The burglary rate per 1,000 population increased 8 percent to 5.6 in 2001.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Sixty-three percent of all burglaries involved forcible entry, 26 percent were unlawful entry where no force was used and the remaining 11 percent were attempts to forcibly enter, during 2001.
- Residences were targets in 67 percent of the reported burglaries.
- Fifty-five percent of the nonresidential burglaries are known to have occurred between the hours of 6:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m.
- Stolen property as a result of burglary statewide, amounted to \$68.4 million, for an average loss of \$1,463.
- The average loss as a result of residential burglaries was \$1,445 and of nonresidential burglaries was \$1,499.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- Burglary arrests decreased less than one-half of one percent with 6,686 persons arrested.
- Adult arrests decreased less than one-half of one percent while juvenile arrests decreased 2 percent.
- Males accounted for 91 percent, and females 9 percent of the burglary arrests.
- Juveniles accounted for 29 percent of all burglary arrests.
- Sixty-four percent of burglary arrests were white, 35 percent were black and 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 17 percent of the arrests.
- Thirteen percent of the burglaries statewide were cleared and juveniles accounted for 18 percent of these clearances.

LARCENY-THEFT

Definition

The definition of larceny-theft, as provided under this program, is the taking of the property of another with intent to deprive him of ownership. All larcenies and thefts resulting from pocketpicking, purse-snatching, shoplifting, larcenies from motor vehicles, thefts of motor vehicle parts and accessories, bicycle thefts, etc., are included here. Embezzlement, unlawful conversions, larceny by bailee, frauds or bad checks are not included.

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 155,825 larcenies reported in 2001, an increase of less than one-half of one percent compared to the 155,480 in 2000.
- Larceny accounted for 57 percent of the total Crime Index and 65 percent of all nonviolent crimes.
- The rate for larceny remained at 18.5 victims per 1000 population, the same as in 2000.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Thefts of motor vehicle parts and accessories and thefts from motor vehicles, collectively accounted for 28 percent of all larceny-thefts reported.
- Thefts of motor vehicle parts and accessories increased 10 percent respectively in 2001, when compared to 2000.
- Pocket-picking decreased 11 percent in 2001, when compared to 2000.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- Larceny-theft arrests decreased 3 percent in 2001, with 29,734 persons arrested.
- Juvenile arrests decreased 15 percent and adult arrests increased 2 percent in 2001.
- Males accounted for 63 percent, and females 37 percent of the larceny arrests.
- Sixty-one percent of all persons arrested for larceny were white, 37 percent were black and 2 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 17 percent of the arrests.
- Nineteen percent of the larcenies were cleared, with juveniles accounting for 20 percent of these clearances.

MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT

Definition

In Uniform Crime Reporting, motor vehicle theft includes all thefts and attempted thefts of a motor vehicle. This includes the theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle which is defined as a self-propelled vehicle that runs on the surface and not on the rails. This definition excludes taking a motor vehicle for temporary use, such as family situation, or unauthorized use by others having lawful access to the vehicle. The motor vehicle theft category includes the subheadings of autos, trucks and buses, and other vehicles (motorcycles, mopeds, etc.)

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 37,651 motor vehicle thefts reported in 2001, an increase of 10 percent compared to the 34,150 in 2000.
- Motor vehicle theft accounted for 14 percent of the total Crime Index and 16 percent of all nonviolent crimes.
- The motor vehicle theft rate of 4.5 victims per 1,000 population represents an increase of 10 percent when compared to 2000.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Motor vehicles represented 62 percent of the total value of property stolen during 2001.
- Total value of stolen motor vehicles amounted to \$319.9 million during the year.
- The average value of a stolen motor vehicle was \$8,495.
- Recovered vehicle values totaling \$183.2 million represent 92 percent of the total value of recovered property.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- A total of 1,431 persons were arrested for motor vehicle theft, this represents a decrease of less than one-half of one percent compared to 2000.
- Juvenile arrests decreased 7 percent and adult arrests increased 4 percent.
- Males accounted for 89 percent, and females 11 percent of the motor vehicle theft arrests.
- Fifty-five percent of all persons arrested for motor vehicle theft were white, and 45 percent were black.
- Hispanics accounted for 18 percent of the arrests.
- Four percent of motor vehicle thefts were cleared in 2001, juveniles accounted for 24 percent of these clearances.

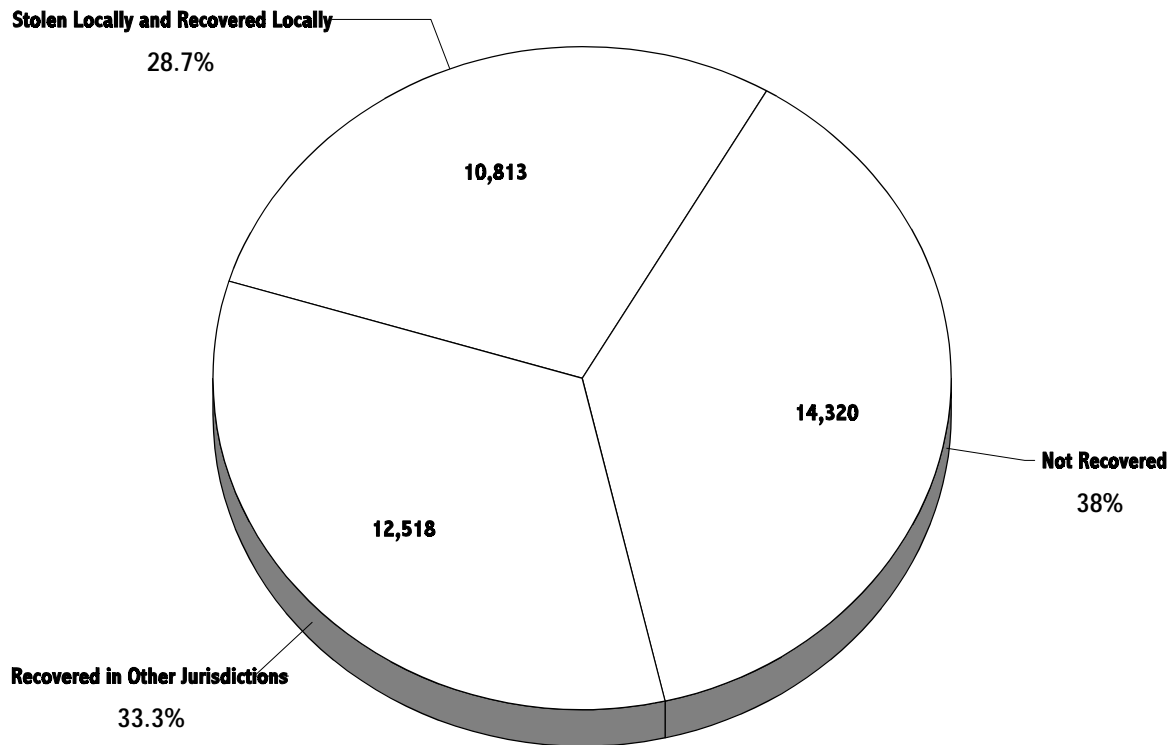

ARSON

Definition

Arson is defined by the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting program as any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling, house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property of another, etc.
 Only fires determined through investigation to have been willfully or maliciously set are classified as arsons. Fires of suspicious or unknown origins are excluded.

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 2,196 reportable arsons in 2001, which represents an increase of 24 percent compared to 1,772 in 2000.
- The arson rate was 0.3 victims per 1,000 population, the same rate as in 2000.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Thirty-nine percent of the arsons were structures, with residences accounting for 24 percent.
- Mobile property, including motor vehicles, accounted for 44 percent of the arsons in the state.
- Other property (timber, crops, etc.) accounted for 17 percent of the reported arsons.
- The total value of property damage due to arson amounted to \$38.8 million for an average dollar value loss of \$17,686.
- The average residential loss was \$20,342 while the average loss to industrial/commercial structures was \$156,637.
- The average loss to mobile property was \$7,514.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- Arson arrests numbered 500 in 2001, representing an 11 percent increase.
- Adult arrests increased 36 percent while juvenile arrests decreased 3 percent.
- Males accounted for 87 percent, and females 13 percent of the arson arrests.
- Juveniles accounted for 55 percent of the arson arrests.
- Seventy-six percent of the persons arrested for arson were white, 23 percent were black and 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 13 percent of the arrests.
- The arson clearance rate was 20 percent, and juveniles accounted for 47 percent of these clearances.

ARREST SUMMARY FOR NON-INDEX OFFENSES

MANSLAUGHTER

Definition

The unlawful killing of a human being, by another, through gross negligence. Arrests relating to traffic fatalities are included.

- There were 33 arrests reported by law enforcement agencies for manslaughter during the year, an increase of 14 percent when compared to 2000.
- Adults accounted for 88 percent and juveniles accounted for 12 percent of the arrests.
- Males accounted for 94 percent of the arrests and females 6 percent.
- Sixty-four percent of the persons arrested were white, 33 percent were black, and 3 percent were other races.
- The hispanic ethnic origin accounted for 18 percent of the arrests and 82 percent were non-hispanic.

SIMPLE ASSAULT

Definition

Simple assault, as defined under the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting System, is an assault or an attempted assault where no weapon is used and which does not result in serious or aggravated injury to the victim.

- There were 33,135 simple assault arrests in 2001, representing an increase of less than one-half of one percent when compared to 2000.
- Of the total, 19 percent were juveniles and 81 percent were adults.
- Males accounted for 75 percent and females 25 percent of the persons arrested for simple assault.
- Sixty-three percent of the persons arrested were white, 36 percent were black, and 1 percent were other races.
- Seventeen percent of the persons arrested were hispanic and 83 percent were not of hispanic origin.

ARSON

Definition

Under this program, arson is defined as the willful or malicious burning, or attempting to burn, with or without intent to defraud; a dwelling, house, building, ship or vessel, motor vehicle or aircraft, contents of building, personal property of another, etc..

- There were 500 arrests reported for arson offenses, an 11 percent increase compared to 2000.
- Juveniles accounted for 55 percent and adults 45 percent of persons arrested for arson.
- Eighty-seven percent of the total arson arrests were males while 13 percent were females.
- Seventy-six percent of the persons arrested were white, 23 percent were black, and the balance were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 13 percent of those arrested and non-hispanics accounted for 87 percent.

FORGERY AND COUNTERFEITING

Definition

The definition of forgery and counterfeiting is the making, altering, uttering or possessing or attempting to make, alter, utter or possess, with intent to defraud, anything false which is made to appear true.

- There were 1,790 arrests reported during the year for forgery or counterfeiting, a 5 percent increase compared to 2000.
- Adults accounted for 95 percent and juveniles accounted for 5 percent of the arrests.
- Males accounted for 68 percent of the arrests and females 32 percent.
- Sixty-two percent of the persons arrested were white, 36 percent were black, and 2 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 18 percent of the arrests and 82 percent were non-hispanic.

FRAUD

Definition

In Uniform Crime Reporting, fraud is the fraudulent conversion and obtaining money or property by false pretenses. This includes bad checks, confidence games, etc., except forgeries and counterfeiting.

- There were 6,037 arrests reported during the year for fraud, a 1 percent increase compared to 2000.
- Adult arrests represented 97 percent and juveniles 3 percent of the persons arrested.
- Males accounted for 63 percent and females 37 percent of the persons arrested for fraud.
- Sixty-two percent of the persons arrested were white, 35 percent were black, and 3 percent were other races.
- Twelve percent of the persons arrested were hispanic and 88 percent were not of hispanic origin.

EMBEZZLEMENT

Definition

The definition of embezzlement is the misappropriation or misapplication of money or property entrusted to one's care, custody or control.

- There were 155 persons arrested for embezzlement, a 45 percent increase compared to 2000.
- Eighty-six percent of those persons arrested were adults and 14 percent were juveniles.
- Arrests for embezzlement were divided equally at 50 percent for both males and females.
- Fifty-seven percent of the persons arrested were white, and 40 percent were black, and the balance were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 15 percent of those arrested and non-hispanics accounted for 85 percent.

STOLEN PROPERTY

(Buying, Receiving, Possessing)

Definition

Included in this class are all offenses of buying, receiving, and possessing stolen property, as well as all attempts to commit any of these offenses.

- In 2001, there were 7,728 arrests reported for stolen property, an increase of 5 percent compared to 2000.
- Of the total, 72 percent were adults and 28 percent were juveniles.
- Eighty-five percent were males and 15 percent were females.
- Fifty-nine percent of the persons arrested were black, 41 percent were white.
- Hispanics accounted for 18 percent of the arrests and 82 percent were non-hispanic.

CRIMINAL/MALICIOUS MISCHIEF

Definition

Criminal/Malicious mischief is defined as the willful destruction, injury, disfigurement, or defacement of property without consent of the owner or persons having custody or control.

- There were 8,314 arrests for criminal/malicious mischief, a decrease of 1 percent compared to 2000.
- Of the total, 51 percent were adults and 49 percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 87 percent and females 13 percent of the arrests.
- Seventy-two percent of the persons arrested were white, 27 percent were black, and 1 percent were other races.
- Thirteen percent of the persons arrested were hispanic and non-hispanics accounted for 87 percent.

WEAPONS: CARRYING, POSSESSING, etc.

Definition

Under this program, this offense includes all the violations of regulations or statutes controlling the carrying, using, possessing, furnishing, and manufacturing of deadly weapons or silencers, and attempts.

- There were 5,394 arrests reported for weapon offenses, an increase of 4 percent when compared to 2000.
- Of the total, 68 percent were adults and 32 percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 91 percent and females 9 percent of those arrested.
- Fifty-one percent of the persons arrested were black, 48 percent were white, and 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 16 percent of those arrested and 84 percent were non-hispanic.

PROSTITUTION AND COMMERCIALIZED VICE

Definition

Prostitution and commercialized vice are sex offenses of a commercialized nature and attempts. Included in this category are prostitution, keeping a bawdy house, procuring or transporting women for immoral purposes, etc..

- There were 2,066 prostitution and commercialized vice arrests during 2001, representing an increase of 6 percent when compared to 2000.
- Adults accounted for 99 percent, and juveniles 1 percent of the arrests.
- Thirty-one percent were males and 69 percent were females.
- Fifty-six percent of the persons arrested were white, 40 percent were black, and 4 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 25 percent of those arrested and 75 percent were non-hispanic.

SEX OFFENSES

Definition

Sex offenses, as defined under the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting Program, do not include rape, prostitution and commercialized vice. Included in this class are offenses against chastity, common decency, morals, and the like; attempts are also included.

- There were 1,941 sex offense arrests during 2001, representing a decrease of 6 percent when compared to 2000.
- Adults accounted for 76 percent, and juveniles 24 percent of the arrests.
- Ninety-six percent were males and 4 percent were females.
- Sixty-five percent of the persons arrested were white, 32 percent were black, and 3 percent were other races.
- Twenty-two percent of the persons arrested were hispanic and 78 percent were not of hispanic origin.

DRUG ABUSE VIOLATIONS

Definition

Under the program, drug abuse violations are defined as the unlawful sale/manufacturing/possession/use of the below listed narcotics and drugs:

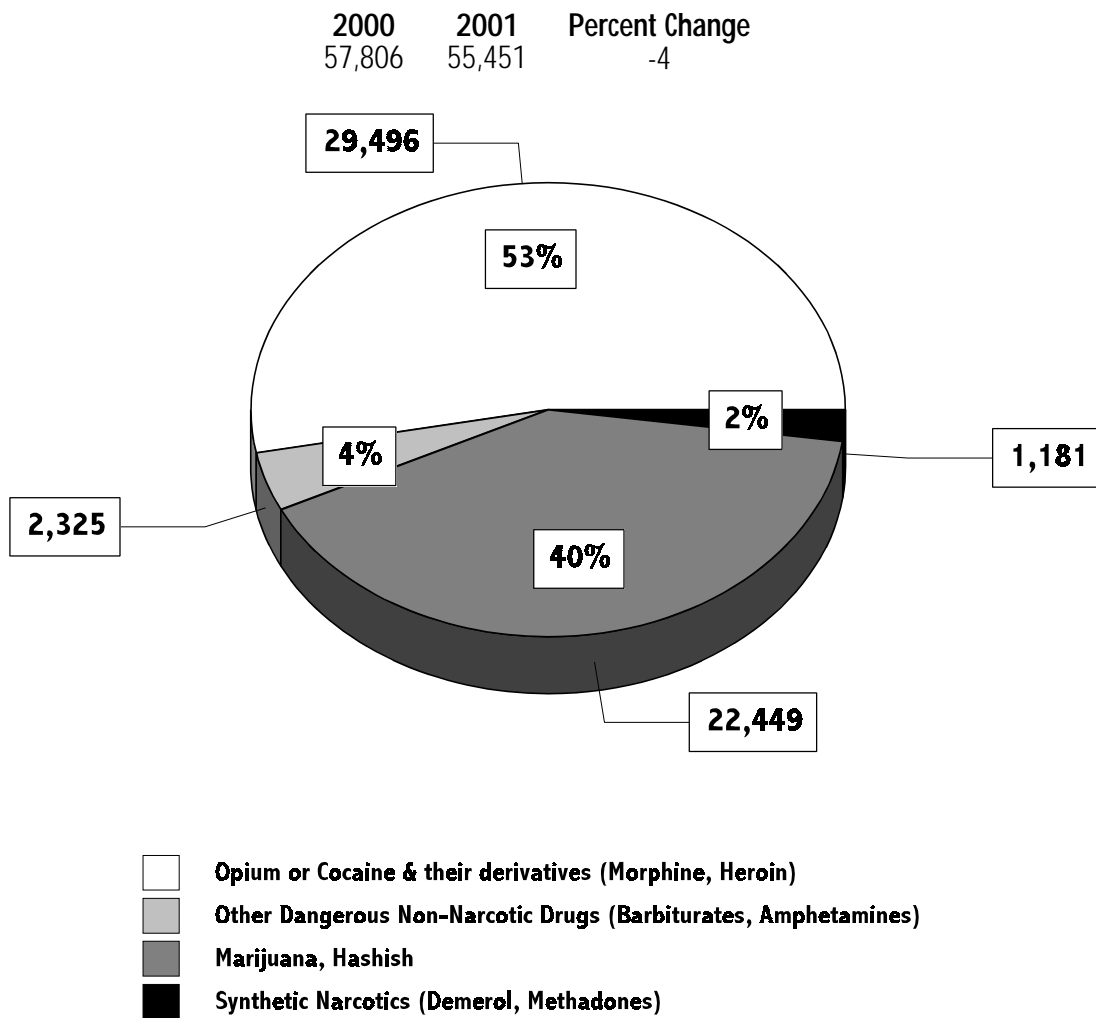
- a. Opium or Cocaine and their derivatives (morphine, heroin, codeine.)
- b. Marijuana, hashish, etc.
- c. Synthetic narcotics—manufactured narcotics which can cause true drug addiction—(demerol, methadones.)
- d. Other—dangerous non-narcotic drugs (barbiturates, amphetamines, hallucinogens.)

- There were 55,451 arrests reported by the law enforcement agencies of the state for drug abuse violations, a decrease of 4 percent when compared to 2000.
- Adults accounted for 86 percent and juveniles 14 percent of the arrests.

- Thirty-seven percent of persons arrested for drug abuse violations were under the age of 21.
- Males accounted for 84 percent of all the arrests while females accounted for the remaining 16 percent.
- Fifty-two percent of the persons arrested were white, 47 percent were black, and 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 13 percent of those arrested and 87 percent were non-hispanic.
- Arrests for possession/use of drugs accounted for 71 percent of the arrests, and the remaining 29 percent were for the sale/manufacturing of drugs.
- Arrests for opium or cocaine and their derivatives represented 44 percent of the possession/use category and 76 percent of the sale/manufacturing category. Overall, they accounted for 53 percent of the total drug abuse violation arrests.

TOTAL ARRESTS FOR ALL DRUG ABUSE VIOLATIONS

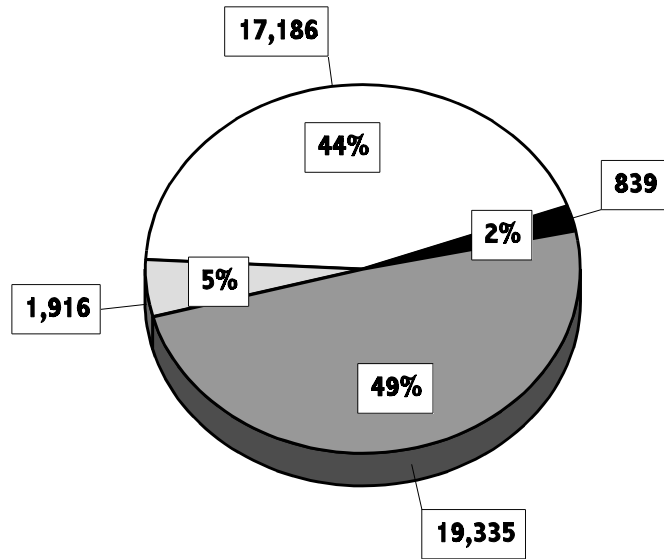

POSSESSION/USE ARRESTS

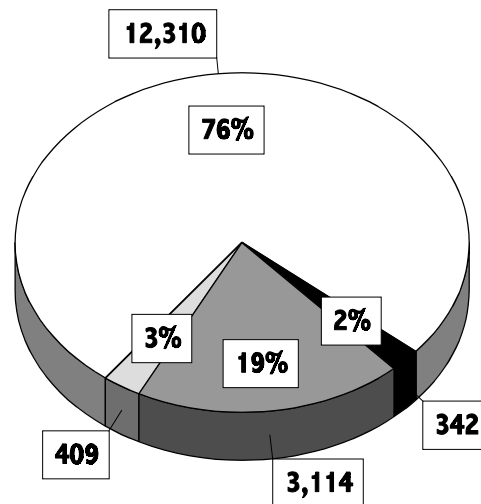

GAMBLING

Definition

Gambling violations are defined as the promoting, permitting or engaging in illegal gambling.

- There were 928 gambling arrests reported during 2001, resulting in an increase of 20 percent compared to 2000.
- Ninety-two percent of the arrests were adults and 8 percent were juveniles.
- Males represented 90 percent and females 10 percent of the gambling arrests.
- Sixty-five percent of the persons arrested were black, 31 percent were white, and 4 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 13 percent of the arrests and 87 percent were non-hispanic.

OFFENSES AGAINST FAMILY AND CHILDREN

Definition

The definition of offenses against family and children is the nonsupport, neglect, desertion or abuse of family and children.

- There were 16,445 arrests for offenses against family and children during 2001, representing an increase of less than one-half of one percent from 2000.
- Less than one-half of one percent of the arrests were juveniles, and nearly 100 percent were adults.
- Males accounted for 90 percent and females 10 percent of the arrests.
- Fifty percent of the persons arrested were black, 49 percent were white, and less than one-half of one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 11 percent of the arrests and 89 percent were not of hispanic origin.

DRIVING UNDER THE INFLUENCE

Definition

Under the New Jersey Crime Reporting Program, the offense of driving under the influence is defined as the driving or operating of any motor vehicle while drunk or under the influence of alcohol or narcotics.

- There were 29,004 arrests reported for driving under the influence in 2001, a decrease of 1 percent compared to 2000.
- Ninety-nine percent of the arrests were adults and only 1 percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 84 percent of the arrests while females accounted for the remaining 16 percent.
- Eighty-nine percent of the persons arrested were white, 10 percent were black, and the balance were other races.
- Sixteen percent of the persons arrested were hispanic and 84 percent were non-hispanic.

LIQUOR LAWS

Definition

Included in this category are state or local liquor law violations, with the exception of "driving under the influence."

- There were 11,515 arrests reported for liquor law violations, a decrease of 6 percent from the previous year.
- Adults were responsible for 72 percent of the arrests while the remaining 28 percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 79 percent of the liquor law arrests while females accounted for the remaining 21 percent.
- Eighty-six percent of the persons arrested were white, 13 percent were black, and 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 8 percent of those arrested and 92 percent were not of hispanic origin.

DISORDERLY CONDUCT

Definition

In this category are placed all charges of committing a breach of the peace (disorderly person).

- There were 24,839 arrests reported for disorderly conduct, a decrease of 8 percent from the previous year.
- Adults were responsible for 72 percent of the arrests while the remaining 28 percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 80 percent of the disorderly conduct arrests while females accounted for the remaining 20 percent.
- Sixty-one percent of the persons arrested were white, 38 percent were black, and the balance were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 14 percent of those arrested and 86 percent were not of hispanic origin.

VAGRANCY

Definition

In this category are persons charged with vagabondage, begging, loitering, etc..

- There were 2,054 arrests in this category, a decrease of 37 percent from the previous year.
- Adults were responsible for 96 percent of the arrests while the remaining 4 percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 67 percent and females accounted for the remaining 33 percent of arrests in this category.
- Fifty-nine percent of the persons arrested were black, 41 percent were white, and less than one-half of one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 15 percent of those arrested and 85 percent were not of hispanic origin.

ALL OTHER OFFENSES

Definition

Included in this category are all violations of state and local laws, except those offenses that can be categorized into one of the specific crime classifications previously mentioned.

- There were 125,735 arrests reported for all other offenses, an increase of 5 percent from the previous year.
- Adults were responsible for 93 percent of the arrests while the remaining 7 percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 81 percent of the arrests while females accounted for the remaining 19 percent.
- Fifty-three percent of the persons arrested were white, 46 percent were black, and 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 13 percent of those arrested and 87 percent were not of hispanic origin.

CURFEW AND LOITERING LAW VIOLATIONS

Definition

In this category are juvenile arrests made for violations of local curfew or loitering ordinances.

- There were 5,537 arrests reported for curfew and loitering law violations, a decrease of 13 percent from the previous year.
- Males accounted for 77 percent and females accounted for the remaining 23 percent.
- Fifty-two percent of the persons arrested were black, 47 percent were white, and the balance were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 28 percent of those arrested and 72 percent were not of hispanic origin.

RUNAWAYS

Definition

For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, this category is limited to juveniles taken into protective custody, under provisions of local statutes, as runaways.

- There were 4,367 runaway arrests reported, a decrease of 5 percent from the previous year.
- Females accounted for 59 percent of the arrests while males accounted for the remaining 41 percent.
- Fifty-four percent of the persons arrested were black, 45 percent were white, and 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 21 percent of those arrested and 79 percent were not of hispanic origin.

CRIME INDEX FOR POPULATION GROUPS – 2001

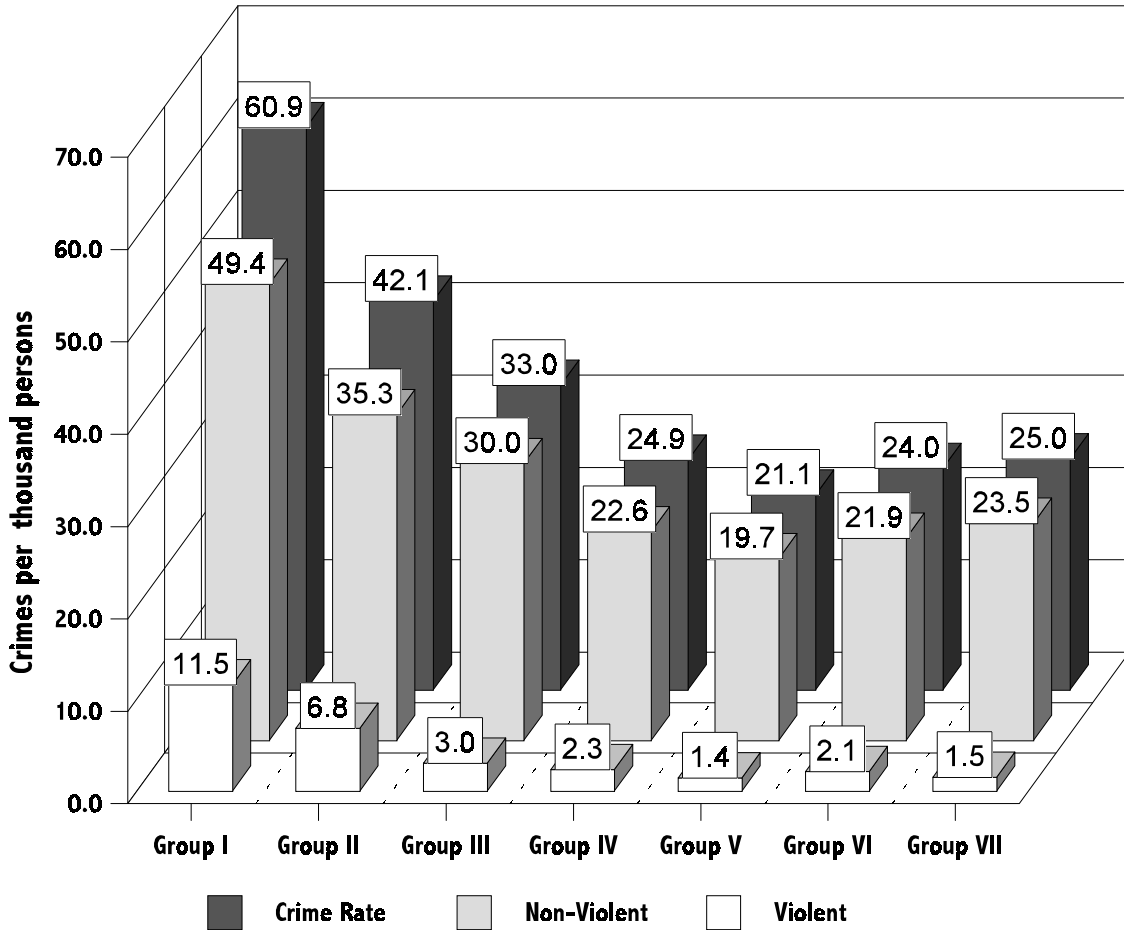
The presentation of crime statistics by population groups was made for the purpose of projecting, for consideration, the relative crime experience of communities of varying populations. Although the individual municipalities within the various groups may be geographically separated, their inclusion into a specific group was predicated by the similarity in population with the other municipalities within the group. Municipalities within the same group may differ widely when all factors are considered, but they do share the common bond of population size. The grouping of communities in this manner allows recognition of variances in the crime volumes, rates and clearances between the established groups.

CRIME IN THE CITIES

CRIME IN THE CITIES

This section deals with serious crimes reported in the large urban cities of the state. These cities represent 19 percent of the population and historically account for one third of the reported Crime Index of the state.

This analysis involves the latest ten-year period 1992-2001 and endeavors further to identify crime trends in these urban areas.

The cities included in this analysis were initially categorized as urban municipalities (i.e., densely populated with extensive development) by the New Jersey Department of Community Affairs, Division of State and Regional Planning, Bureau of Statewide Planning, and will continue to be used for comparative purposes.

The criteria used in the selection of these cities were (1) classified as urban character and (2) have a population of 50,000 or more inhabitants.

For further comparative analysis, the urban cities were subdivided into two distinct groupings.

Group number one consisted of the state's six largest urban centers with populations of 80,000 or over and is categorized as "Major Urban."

The second group included the "Major Urban" and the additional urban communities with populations of 50,000 or more inhabitants, and is referred to as the "Urban 15."

Percent Change

- During the ten-year period 1992/2001, the Crime Index in New Jersey has decreased 31 percent, while the "Urban 15" cities decreased 36 percent and the six major urban cities decreased 40 percent.
- Violent crime in the state decreased 32 percent, the 15 urban cities decreased 38 percent and the six major cities decreased 46 percent.
- Nonviolent crime in the state decreased 31 percent, the "Urban 15" decreased 35 percent and the six major cities decreased 39 percent.

Distribution:

- Six major urban centers—Camden, Newark, Jersey City, Trenton, Paterson and Elizabeth—collectively represent 11 percent of New Jersey's total population. These same urban centers, during the period 1992 through 2001, accounted for 25 percent of the state's total crime.
- "Major Urban" centers from 1992 through 2001 accounted for 44 percent of all violent crime and 22 percent of the nonviolent crimes in the entire state.
- The 15 urban municipalities represent 19 percent of the state's total population.
- "Urban 15" municipalities accounted for 35 percent of New Jersey's total Crime Index. Violent crime was 58 percent of the state total, while nonviolent crime was 32 percent of the state total during this ten-year period.
- Nearly two-thirds of all robberies reported occurred in the "Urban 15" cities during this ten-year period.

STREET CRIME

There has never been a clear-cut definition for street crime within the criminal justice system. The nation's clearinghouse for the collection and dissemination of criminal statistics, the Federal Bureau of Investigation, has no criteria in the categorization of specific crimes to be designated or defined as "street crimes." More and more this media term has been confused with the violent crime group of murder, rape, robbery, and aggravated assault.

Although any particular crime can and does occur on the street, this analysis, because of reporting constraints within the Uniform Crime Reporting System, is limited to defining street crimes as those offenses which occur, or are most likely to occur, on streets, highways, parking lots, etc.. These crimes include highway robbery, purse-snatching, theft from autos, theft of auto parts and accessories, theft of bicycles, and motor vehicle thefts. All are crimes against property and only one, highway robbery, falls in the violent crime group.

- During the ten-year period 1992-2001, the "Urban 15" cities accounted for 41 percent of the street crimes in the state.
- Three out of every four highway robberies occurred in the "Urban 15" during the ten-year period.
- More than half of all motor vehicle thefts during the survey span occurred in these 15 urban municipalities.
- Forty-one percent of all purse-snatchings during the survey span were perpetrated in the "Urban 15" cities.
- All street crime categories increased in the "Urban 15" cities from 2000 to 2001.

Section Eight

RESORT MUNICIPALITIES

As required by P.L. 1998, c. 50, annual mean population estimates for resort municipalities in New Jersey have been used in the preparation of per capita crime statistics.

These estimates were prepared based upon the methodology prescribed in P.L. 1998, c. 50 using the latest available municipality estimates of year-round population from the U.S. Bureau of the Census. Please note that these resort population estimates should only be used for crime statistics purposes. While they fulfill the requirements of the law, the seasonal components of these estimates are not a complete measure of seasonal population because they include only those living in rental housing units or in vacant year-round housing. Not counted are the many day visitors and persons who occupy campgrounds, hotels, motels or bed and breakfast establishments or who stay with friends or relatives.

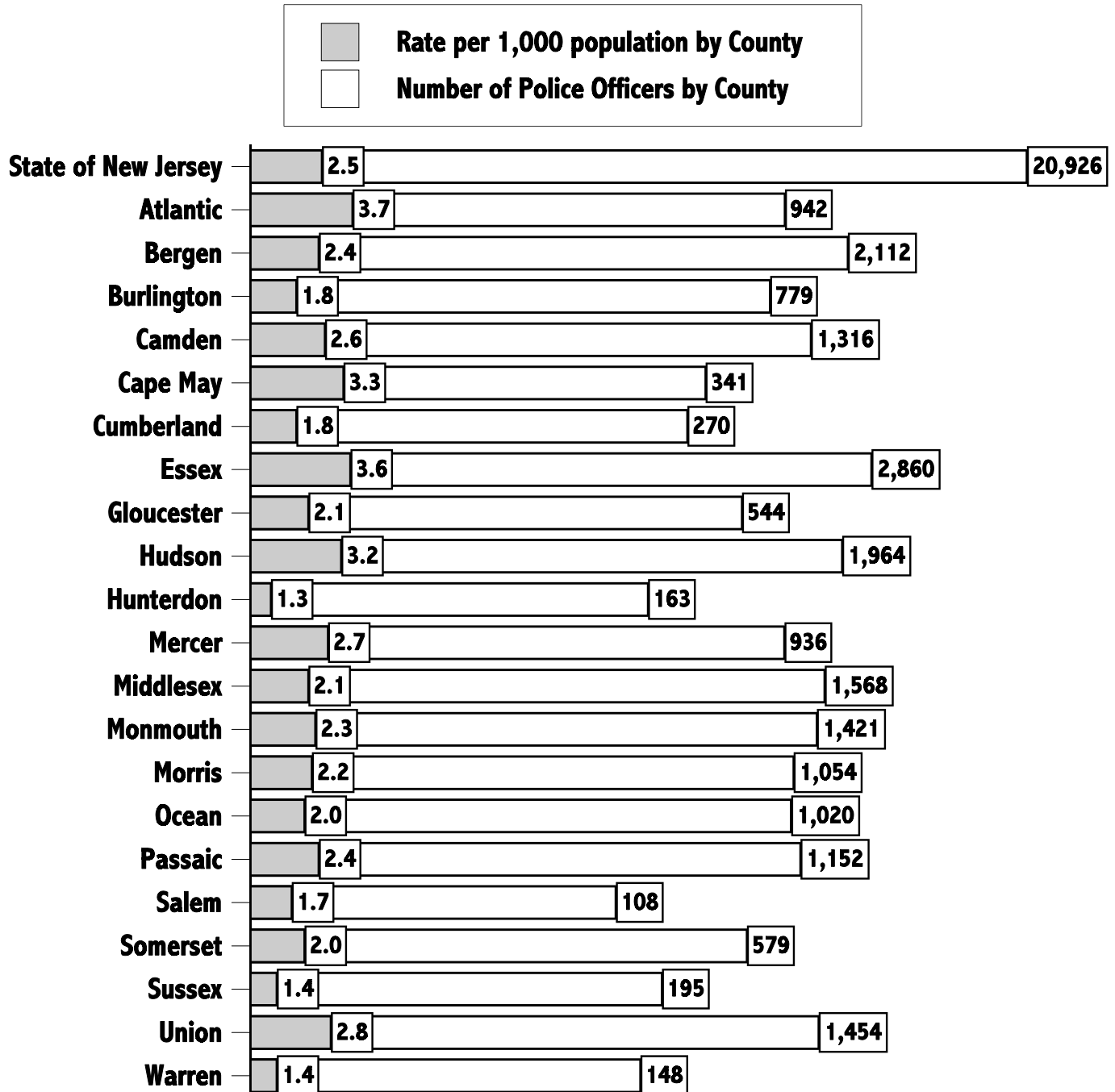

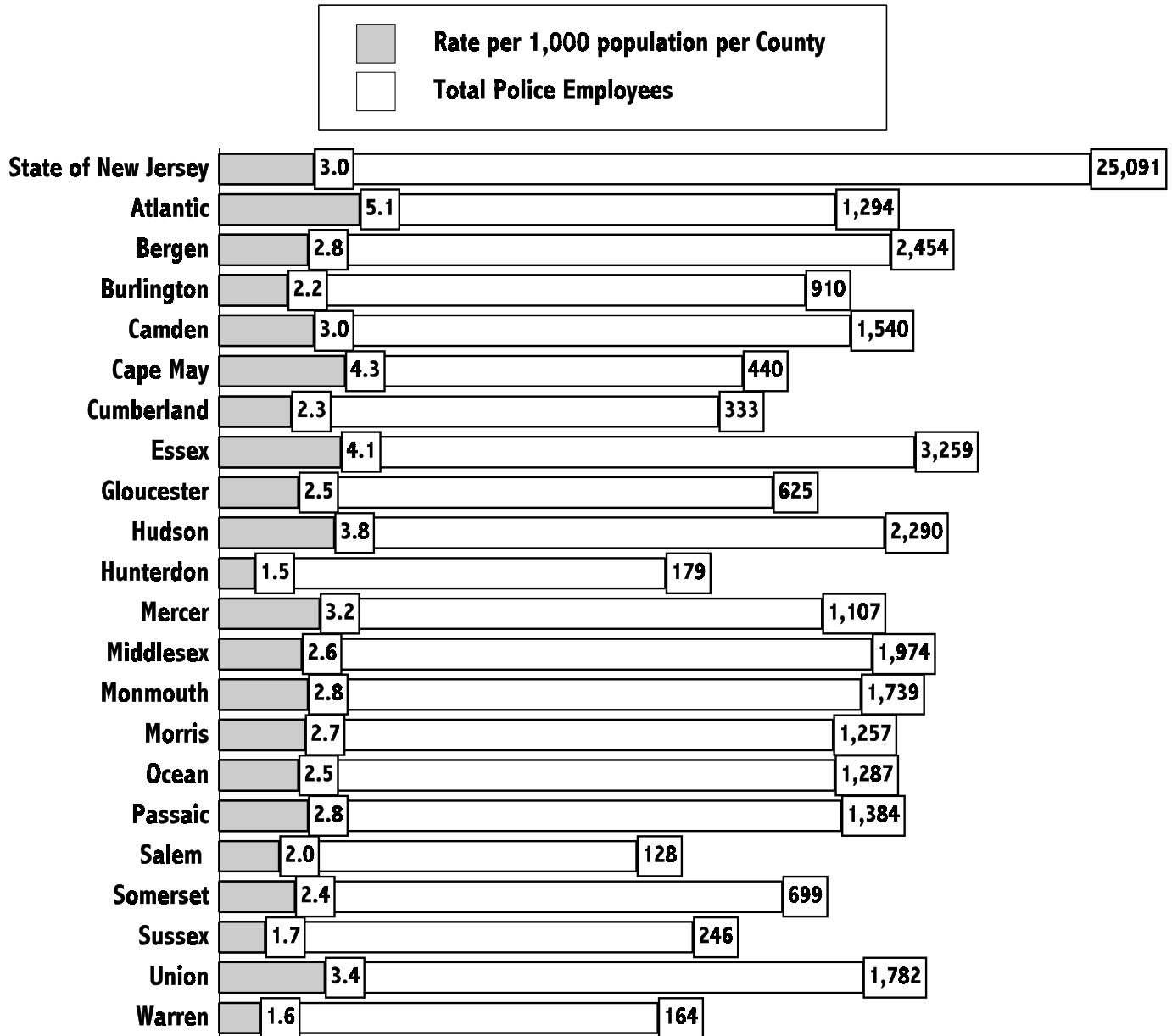

POLICE EMPLOYEE DATA

The Uniform Crime Reporting Program of New Jersey incorporates the collection of pertinent data relating to the police of the state. Information regarding police employees strength and trends are discussed in this section.

Individual listings of full-time state, county, university and college police departments are shown in tables within this section. Listings of municipal police departments will be found in Section VII.

The determination of police strength for any given area or municipality should be subject for serious consideration. Such consideration, however, should be based on the numerous factors which create the need for police services. For example, the increased need for police service in a municipality which has a highly mobile or seasonal population differs from a municipality which has a relatively stable population. Some other factors, discussed elsewhere in this publication, relate to size, density of population, geographic location, character, and proximity to metropolitan areas. The tables and charts shown in this section should not be interpreted as recommended strength for any given municipality.

TOTAL POLICE EMPLOYEES

Total police employees are defined as the total number of full-time police officers and civilian police employees (clerks, dispatchers, mechanics, etc.) employed by all law enforcement agencies in the state.

- During 2001, there were 50,105 full-time police employees in New Jersey. This represents a decrease of less than one-half of one percent compared to the 50,328 full-time police employees in 2000.
- The number of full-time police officers decreased 1 percent, from 38,312 in 2000 to 38,113 in 2001.
- The number of full-time civilian employees decreased less than one-half of one percent, from 12,016 in 2000 to 11,992 in 2001.
- Seventy-six percent were sworn officers and the remaining 24 percent were civilian employees.

MUNICIPAL POLICE EMPLOYEES

This category consists of the number of police employees, including civilian personnel, employed full-time by municipalities of the state.

- During 2001, there were 25,091 municipal police employees, an increase of 1 percent compared to the 24,777 in 2000.
- For every 1,000 inhabitants of the state there were 3.0 municipal police employees.
- Atlantic County reported the largest increase in municipal police employees, an increase of 13 percent (150 employees).
- Atlantic County recorded the highest police employee rate; 5.1 per 1,000 population; (this rate is computed on the static population and does not take into account the large influx of seasonal and recreational population).
- Hunterdon County recorded the lowest police employee rate of 1.5 per 1,000 population.

MUNICIPAL CIVILIAN POLICE EMPLOYEES

The personnel of each department differ as to the demands and responsibilities placed before them. Many police officers are fully occupied with clerical tasks and are not free to perform active police duties. Employing civilians in police departments to perform clerical duties is in line with the thinking of many police administrators who recommended the use of civilians in this capacity. Thus, freeing the sworn personnel for actual police-related services.

- There were 4,165 municipal civilian police employees in 2001, an increase of 5 percent compared to the 3,983 in 2000.
- Seventeen percent of all municipal police employees were civilians.

MUNICIPAL POLICE OFFICERS

This includes the number of sworn police officers employed full-time by municipalities of the state. The police employee rate per 1,000 population presented here should not be construed as recommended ratios. The determination of police strength for any municipality should be based on the numerous factors that create the need for police services. These factors, as crime, vary in type and degree from place to place. Some examples are: seasonal population, geographic location, density and composition of the population.

- There were 20,926 full-time municipal police officers in 2001; this represents an increase of 1 percent when compared to the 20,794 full-time municipal police officers in 2000.
- The number of full-time municipal police officers was calculated at 2.5 per 1,000 population; this represents no change when compared to 2000.
- Sworn officers represented 83 percent of all municipal police employees.
- Ocean County recorded the largest numerical increase (41) which represented a 4 percent increase of municipal police officers.
- The largest numerical decrease occurred in Essex County, a decrease of 51 municipal police officers, or 2 percent.
- Atlantic County, with 3.7 police officers per 1,000 inhabitants, recorded the highest rate of full-time municipal police officers. (This rate is computed on the static population, and does not take into account the large influx of seasonal and recreational population).
- Hunterdon County recorded the lowest rate of full-time municipal officers with 1.3 police officers per 1,000 population.

OTHER POLICE (State Agencies)

In addition to the State Police, there are ten other state agencies reporting to the system. These agencies consist of: NJ Forest Fire Service, Division of Parks & Forestry, Department of Corrections, Department of Human Services, Division of Criminal Justice, Division of Fish and Game, Office of Weights and Measures, Palisades Interstate Park, Port Authority NY/NJ, and NJ Transit Police. No rates were computed due to the variations in the types of police services rendered, and their statewide jurisdictions.

- Together, these agencies reported a total of 11,170 full-time employees; a decrease of 7 percent compared to the 12,050 police employees in 2000.
- There were 7,899 sworn police officers in 2001, a decrease of 6 percent compared to the 8,439 in 2000.
- These agencies reported 3,271 civilian police employees in 2001, representing a 9 percent decrease compared to the 3,611 reported in 2000.
- Seventy-one percent were sworn personnel, while the remaining 29 percent were civilians.

COUNTY POLICE, SHERIFFS AND PROSECUTORS

The functions of county law enforcement vary widely throughout the state. The operation of one sheriff's department may be limited exclusively to civil areas and the administration of the county jail, or they may be actively involved in criminal matters throughout the county.

County police departments are varied in their activities in that some are responsible for enforcement throughout the county, while others may have as their primary mission the policing of county parklands. The responsibilities of county prosecutors' officers include criminal investigations, trial preparation, court presentation and special probes. Because of the difference in the types of police service rendered, rates for county law enforcement agencies are not presented here.

- County law enforcement agencies reported a total of 9,020 full-time police employees in 2001; an increase of less than one-half of one percent compared to 8,994 in 2000.
- There were 6,191 full-time sworn police officers employed by county agencies in 2001. This represents an increase of Less than one-half of one percent compared to 6,172 in 2000.
- County police agencies reported 2,829 civilian police employees in 2001; an increase of less than one-half of one percent compared to 2,822 civilian employees in 2000.
- Sworn personnel accounted for 69 percent while the remaining 31 percent were civilians.

STATE POLICE

The New Jersey State Police is empowered to provide all phases of law enforcement throughout the state. It also renders, upon request, police services to all the law enforcement agencies in the state. No rates are used due to the variations in the nature and extent of the police services performed by the State Police.

- The New Jersey State Police reported 4,044 full-time police employees; an increase of 9 percent compared to 3,716 in 2000.
- State Police employed 2,727 officers in 2001, this represented an increase of 8 percent when compared to 2,534 in 2000.
- The State Police reported 1,317 civilian employees in 2001; an increase of 11 percent over the 1,182 reported in 2000.
- Sworn personnel accounted for 67 percent and civilians represented 33 percent of the total State Police employees.



Section Ten

LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS KILLED & ASSAULTED SUMMARY

POLICE OFFICERS KILLED AND ASSAULTED

The killing or assault of a police officer has a deleterious effect on society that reaches far beyond the overt act. Such occurrences constitute an immediate threat to the well-being of the community and serious breach of the internal security of the country. Today a young person who considers a career in law enforcement must also consider the very strong possibility of being killed or assaulted by a member of the very same society they are sworn to protect. This deplorable situation should be a subject of serious concern, for in truth, an attack on a police officer is an attack on society. The violence directed against law enforcement officers acting in the line of duty is clearly demonstrated by the following information.

POLICE FELONIOUSLY KILLED

VOLUME/TREND

- In 2001, one police officer was feloniously killed while in the performance of his duties.
- On July 4, 2001, Jersey City Police Officer Domenick J. Infantes Jr., while off-duty, responded to a disturbance call, possibly involving a knife, at a residence in his neighborhood. Upon arriving at the residence, the officer identified himself as a police officer and attempted to restore peace. While ordering a suspect armed with a metal pipe to turn over the weapon, a second suspect struck the officer in the head with a metal pipe, causing fatal head injuries.

ASSAULTS ON POLICE OFFICERS

Police assault statistics are important to the police administrator who attempts to identify the causative factors of this type of criminal activity. Many factors contribute to police assaults, and circumstances vary from place to place. Identifying specific reasons for these assaults is therefore extremely difficult. The following information illustrates the frequency of these events, and any attempt at analysis of these assaults should include consideration of the unique variables present in each jurisdiction. Due to the broad field of services performed by many state and county police agencies, no assault rates are computed for total police officers.

VOLUME/TREND

- There were 3,253 police officers assaulted in 2001, an increase of 3 percent when compared to the 3,158 in 2000.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Thirty-one percent (1,024) of the officers assaulted sustained injury.
- Personal weapons, such as hands, fists and feet were used in 82 percent (2,661) of all police assaults.
- Twenty-nine percent of police assaults occurred when officers responded to disturbance calls.
- Fourteen percent of the assaults on police officers occurred during the 2-hour period of 8:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m.

CLEARANCES

- The police of New Jersey were successful in clearing 95 percent of the assaults directed at them.

ASSAULTS ON MUNICIPAL POLICE OFFICERS

VOLUME/TREND

- A total of 2,937 municipal police officers were assaulted during 2001, a 2 percent increase compared to the 2,879 assaulted in 2000.
- The assault rate, for every 100 municipal officers, was 14.0, a 1 percent increase compared to 2000.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Thirty-one percent of the municipal officers assaulted sustained injury.
- Personal weapons, such as hands, fists and feet were used in 81 percent of all municipal police assaults.
- Thirty-one percent of municipal police assaults occurred when officers responded to disturbance calls.
- Attempting Other Arrests accounted for 18 percent of municipal police assaults.

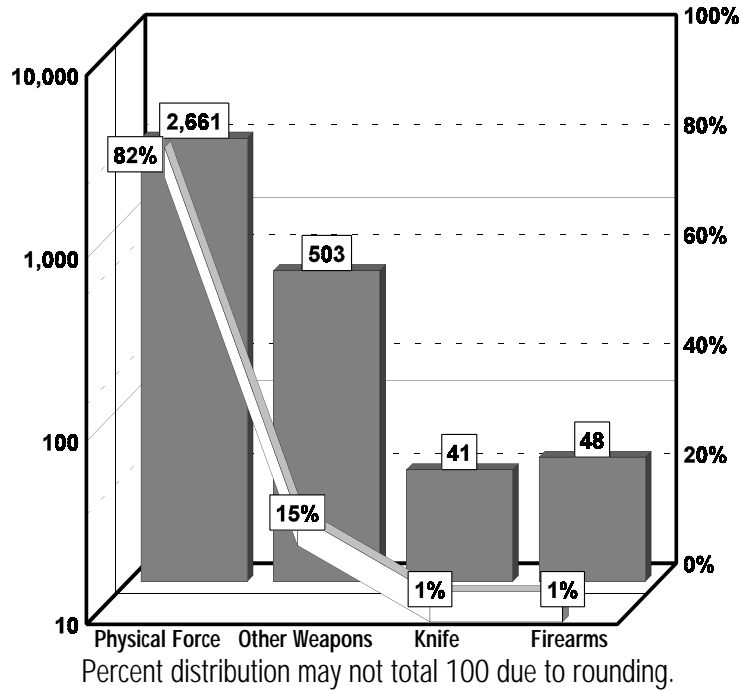
OTHER POLICE OFFICERS ASSAULTED

The following law enforcement agencies are dealt with separately and are not included when computing municipal assault rates; the services performed by these agencies vary greatly from the functions of municipal police agencies.

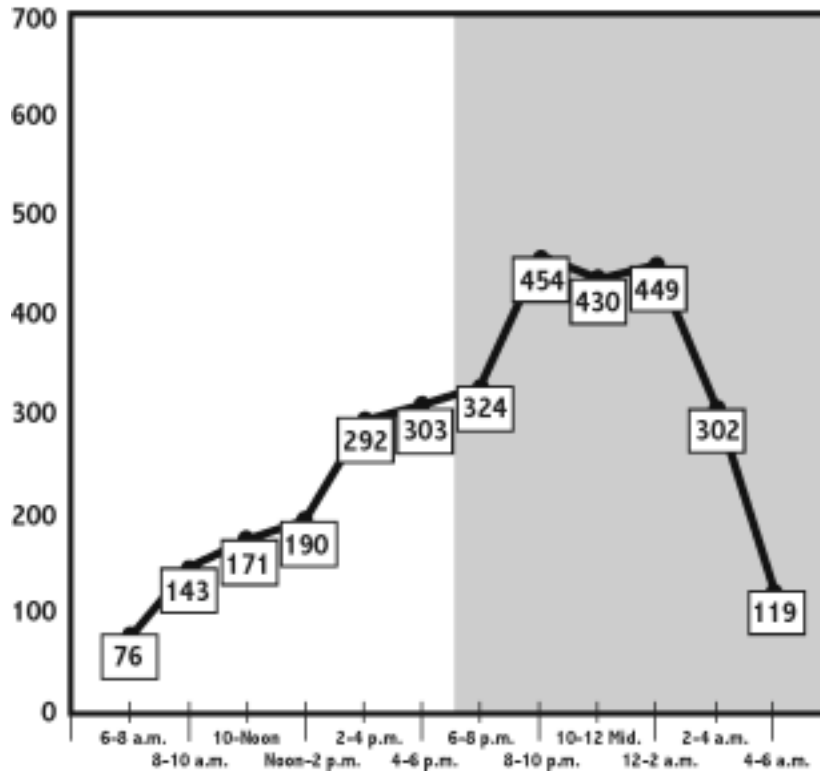
VOLUME/TREND

- County law enforcement agencies reported 103 officers assaulted with 56 sustaining injury.
- The New Jersey State Police reported 21 officers assaulted with 9 sustaining injury.
- Other state agencies, with police powers, reported 177 officers assaulted with 50 sustaining injury.
- University and college police agencies reported 15 officers assaulted with 8 sustaining injury.

Section Eleven

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

INTRODUCTION

The violence within the American domicile has been recognized for decades by elements of government and society with little done to correct the problem. Only recently has this phenomenon begun to receive the attention it deserves. In an effort to understand, identify and treat the incidents of abuse occurring in the home, the State of New Jersey, through its legislature, has provided the means to gain a meaningful insight into this issue.

In 1982, the Domestic Violence Act was instituted to protect battered victims and study the complex problems that spark such aggressive behavior. This legislation also provided the opportunity to identify the causes of violence in the home and put forth a more comprehensive effort to combat the crime of Domestic Violence.

Improvements since the implementation of the Domestic Violence Act are continuing. Pursuant to a change in N.J.S.A. 2C:25-24 enacted, June 9, 1999, arrest data is presented by county. Domestic violence restraining order violations are now captured and reported. Revised investigation and reporting procedures by the police; improved processing of domestic complaints by the courts; mandatory in-service training for police and court personnel have all enabled the victim to come forward and implement the constitutional rights granted to all Americans.

The following pages of narrative and graphics in this chapter are the result of gathered data displaying the complexities of domestic violence found within the State of New Jersey. It is through analysis of this data that, hopefully, the keys to preventing future violence can be found.

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE STATISTICAL SUMMARY

Highlights of the 2001 domestic violence statistics are listed below:

- There were 82,373 domestic violence offenses reported by the police in 2001, a 6% increase compared to the 77,680 reported in 2000.
- Murders increased 3% in 2001 (40) when compared to 2000 (39).
- Assaults accounted for 47% (39,092) and harassment accounted for 38% (31,096) of the reported offenses in 2001.
- Arrests were made in 32% (26,551) of the offenses reported for 2001, an increase of 3% when compared to 2000 (25,774).
- The most frequent day of domestic violence occurrences was Sunday (14,471).
- For the nineteenth consecutive year, the most frequent hours of domestic violence incidents were between 8:00 p.m. and midnight, when 28% (23,091) of the offenses were reported.
- Children were involved or present during 38% of all domestic violence offenses occurring in 2001. Specifically, 6% (4,831) were involved and 32% (26,474) were present.
- Wives were the victims in 28% (22,957) and ex-wives were the victims in 4% (3,154) of the reported domestic violence offenses in 2001. Overall, females were victims in 78% (63,939) of all domestic violence offenses.
- The number of domestic violence complaints that had prior court orders issued against the offender increased from 18,987 in 2000 to 19,186 in 2001. This is an increase of 1%.
- Alcohol and/or drugs were involved in 30% (24,994) of the reported offenses occurring in 2001. Alcohol involvement alone accounted for 27% (22,110) of the total domestic violence offenses reported.
- Persons age 60 or over were victims in 3% (2,402) of all reported domestic violence offenses that occurred in 2001. Elderly were the victims in 20% (8) of the domestic violence murders (40).
- Domestic violence does not occur at a regular frequency, but when viewed as a ratio of its occurrence to a fixed time interval, one act of domestic violence would occur every 6 minutes and 23 seconds.
- Domestic violence offenses arising from a dating relationship accounted for 13% (11,034) of the state total.
- There were 3,965 total arrests involving domestic violence restraining orders reported by police in 2001. Of these, 1,924 were arrests for violations of a restraining order **only**, while 2,041 were arrests for violations of a restraining order **with** an offense arrest.

- Of all the domestic violence offenses involving weapons (40,881), hands, fists, feet, etc. were used in 90% (36,822) of these offenses.
- Domestic violence offenses involving a gun decreased 5% when compared to 2000.
- Serious injuries were reported in 1,820 offenses, a 2% decrease when compared to the 1,850 reported in 2000.

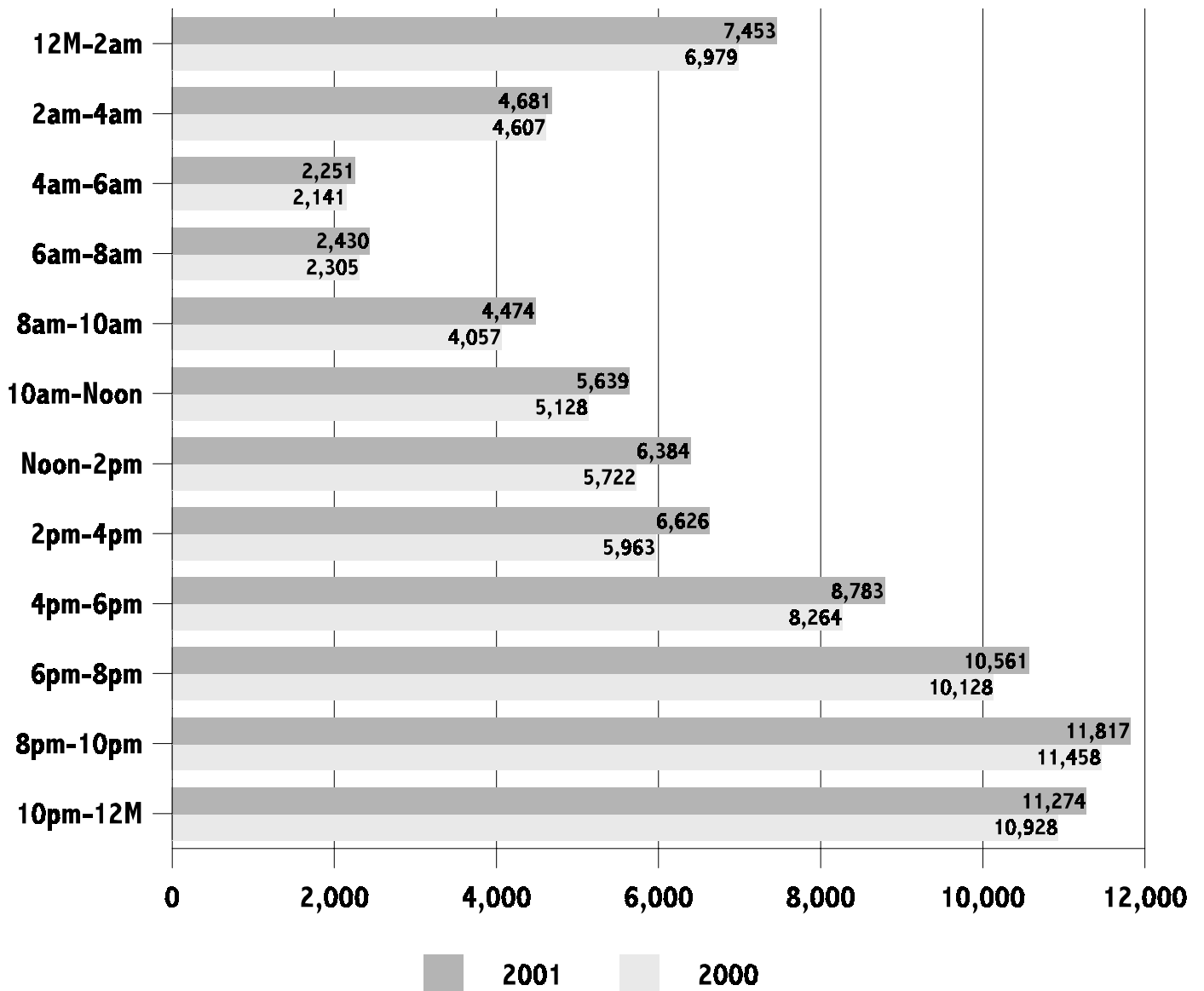

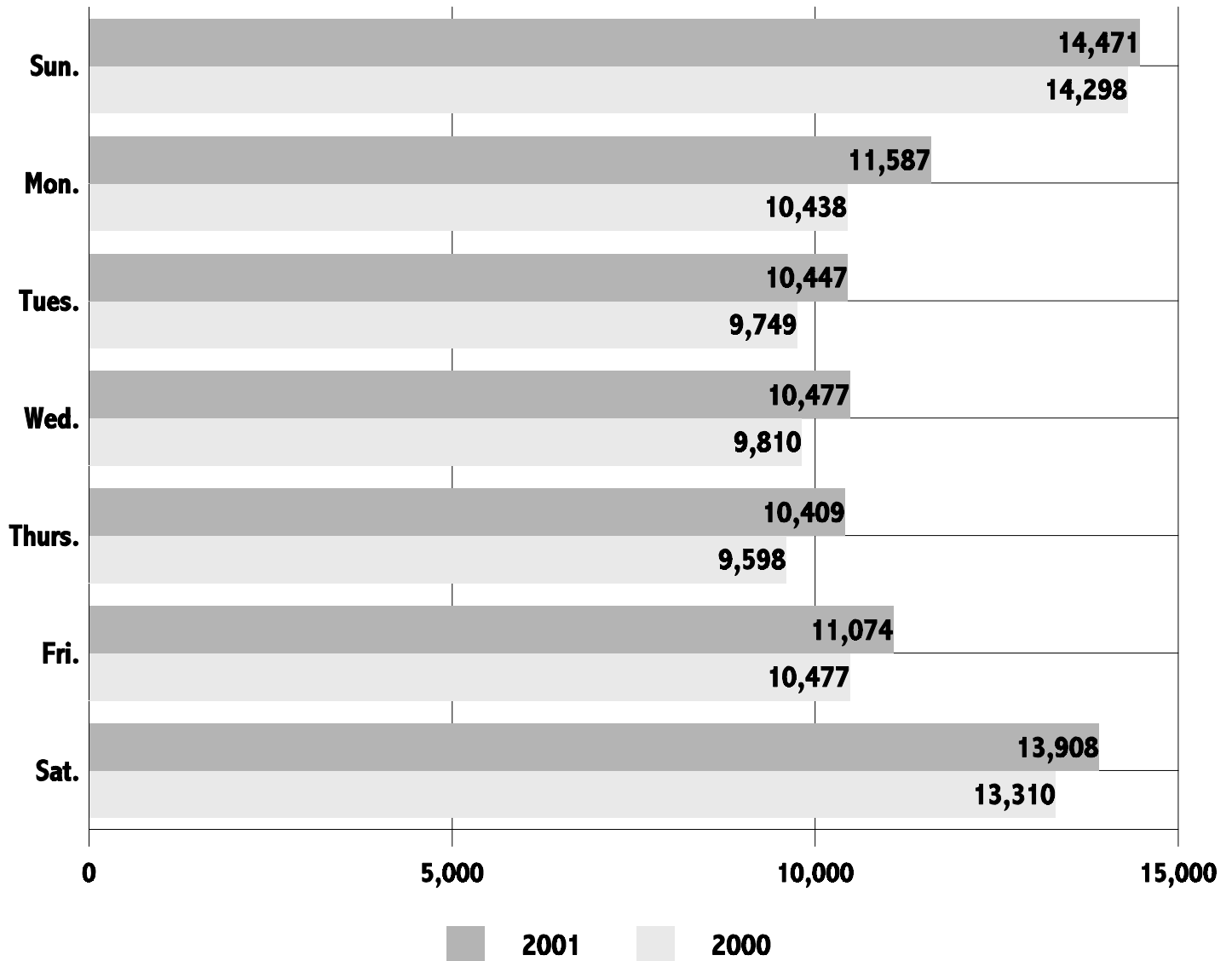
- Assaults accounted for 38% (913) of all domestic violence offenses for victims 60 years old or over.

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE OFFENSES BY TIME OF DAY 2000/2001



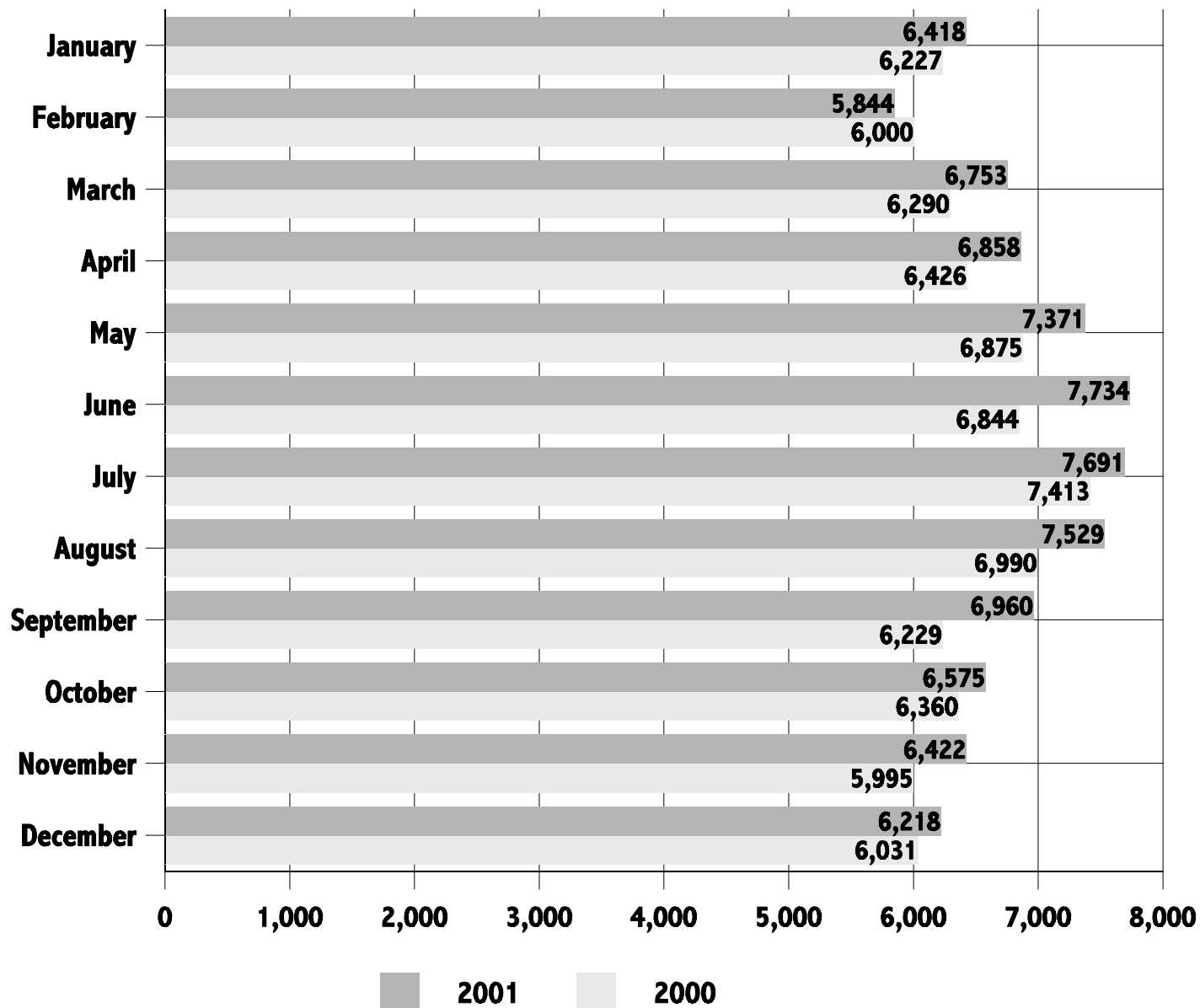
- During 2001, 28% (23,091) of the reported domestic violence offenses occurred between 8:00 p.m. and 12 midnight.

Section Twelve

BIAS INCIDENT SUMMARY

INTRODUCTION

Crimes motivated by hate and bias tend to erode the basic fabric of society. Bias incidents having a racial, religious, ethnic, sexual or gender component as well as crimes against individuals with a handicap, manifest themselves in a wide spectrum of criminal activities. These bias incidents jeopardize the active and open pursuit of freedom and opportunity. They attack our citizens based on their race, religion, ethnic heritage, sexual orientation, handicap, or gender. Closely linked to such heritage are individual values, beliefs, and identities.

Realizing that no agency within the state was collecting complete data on bias incidents, a broad-based Ad Hoc committee was created to develop a comprehensive statewide reporting system. As a result of the committee's recommendation, Attorney General Executive Directive No. 1987-3 was issued mandating all New Jersey law enforcement agencies to begin reporting bias incident offenses to the Division of State Police, Uniform Crime Reporting Unit, on a monthly basis, effective January 1, 1988. On August 15, 1996, legislation was enacted which enhanced the state's definition of a bias incident to include crimes that are gender or handicap-motivated.

The directive was instituted to capture vital data in an effort to identify the problem. This information permits proper evaluation of progress in preventing bias crime and assist with necessary planning for the future.

This is the fourteenth annual publication concerning bias crimes, which contains comparisons to the previous year's statistics. The published statistics and graphs are the result of data submitted by the police community of New Jersey.

Hopefully, the information contained in this publication will be of value to various segments of society and serve its intended purpose.

BIAS INCIDENT STATISTICAL SUMMARY

Highlights of the 2001 bias incident offense statistics are listed below:

- New Jersey law enforcement agencies reported 777 individual bias incidents, resulting in 815 specific bias incident offenses in 2001, a 15% increase compared to 2000.
- Harassment accounted for 39% (318) of all bias incident offenses.
- Criminal mischief and damage to property accounted for 44% (356) of all bias incident offenses.
- Racial bias accounted for 40% (324) of all bias incident crimes in 2001.
- The target category of person accounted for 54% (440) of all bias offenses.
- The Black race represented the most frequent racial group victimized by bias crime, accounting for 33% (272) of all bias offenses.
- The Jewish religion represented the most frequent religious group victimized by bias crime, accounting for 24% (193) of all bias offenses.
- The Arab ethnicity represented the most frequent ethnic group victimized by bias crime, accounting for 11% (92) of all bias offenses.
- The most frequent day of occurrence was Wednesday (138 offenses).
- The most frequent month of occurrence was September (190 offenses).
- The most frequent place of occurrence was a residence, where 27% (223 offenses) of all bias incidents occurred.
- Thirty percent (245) of all bias incident offenses were cleared with 56% (138) being cleared by arrest, and 44% (107) being exceptionally cleared.
- A total of 187 arrests (100 adults and 87 juveniles) were made resulting from bias incidents. Compared to 2000, arrests increased 8 percent.

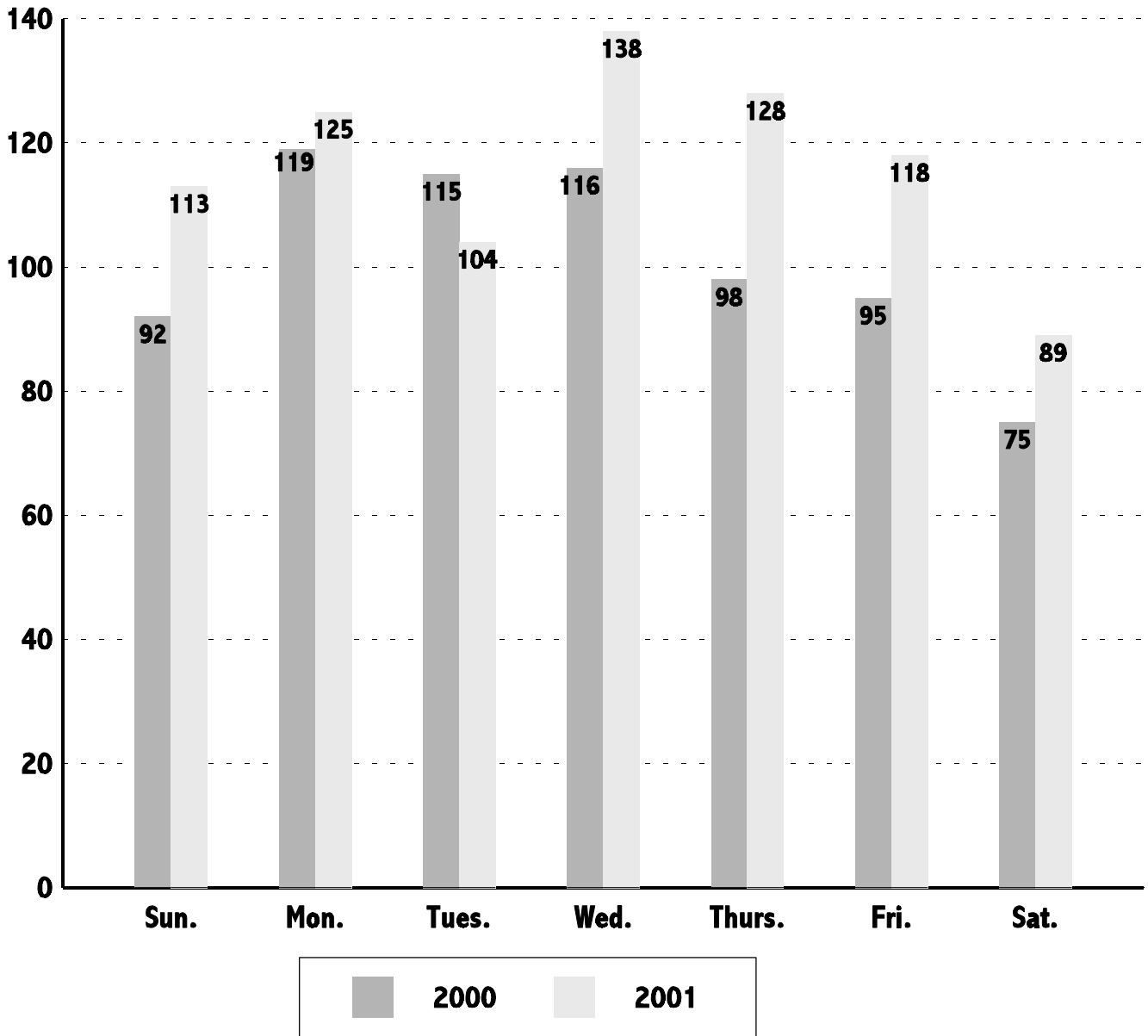

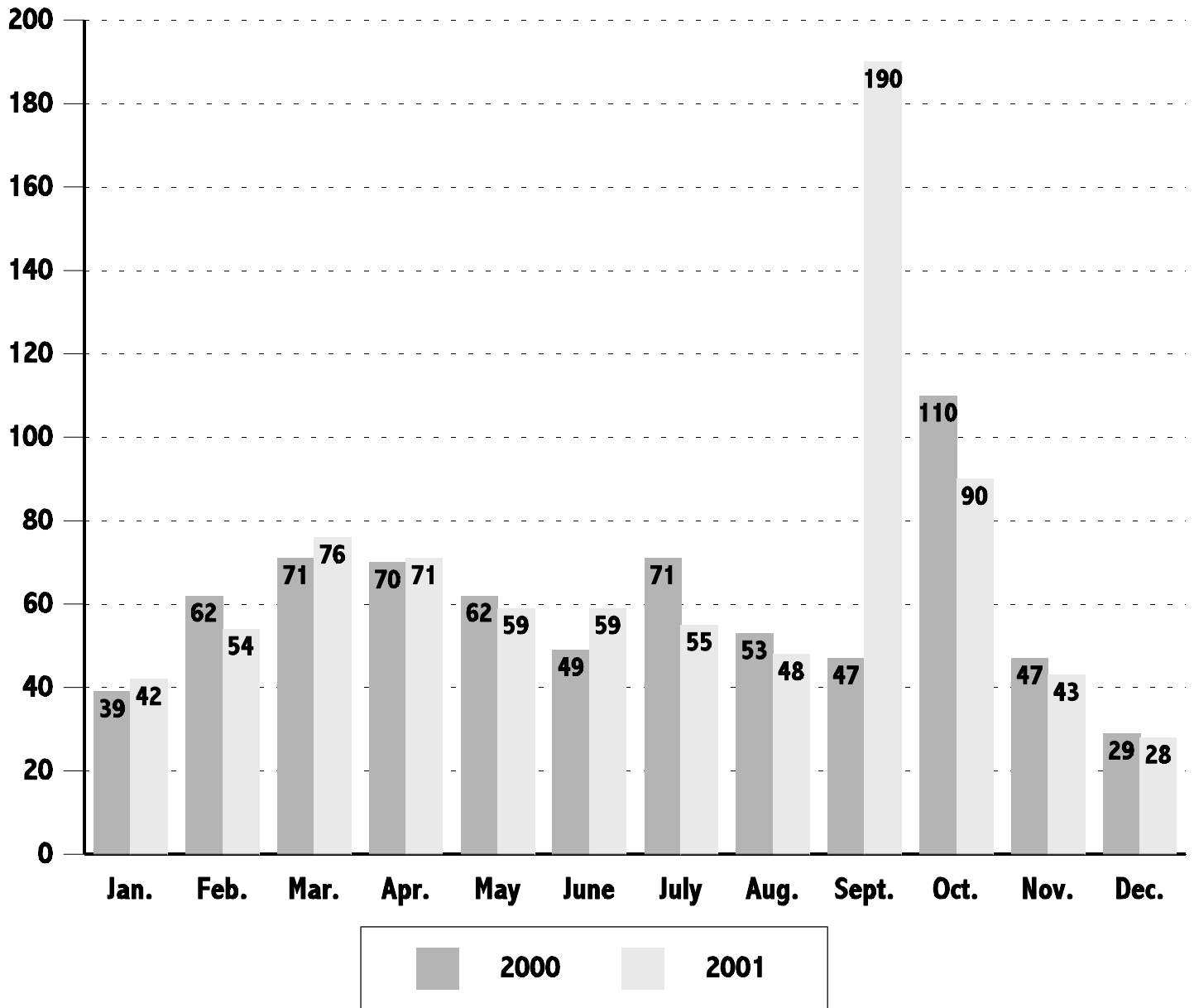
BIAS INCIDENTS BY DAY OF WEEK

GLOSSARY OF TERMS

ADULT	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, a person aged 18 or over.
AMERICAN INDIAN or ALASKAN NATIVE	A person having origins in any of the original peoples of North America, and who maintains cultural identification through tribal affiliation or community recognition.
ARREST RATE	The number of arrests for Part I and Part II offenses for each unit of population, generally per 1,000.
ASIAN or PACIFIC ISLANDER	A person having origins in any of the original peoples of the Far East, Southeast Asia, the Indian subcontinent, or the Pacific Islands. This area includes, for example: China, India, Japan, Korea, the Philippine Islands, and Samoa.
BLACK	A person having origins in any of the black racial groups of Africa, characterized by dark skin pigmentation.
CLEARANCE	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, the solution to a particular crime, usually by the arrest of the offender.
CLEARED BY ARREST	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, an offense is cleared when the offender has been identified, sufficient evidence has been obtained to formally charge and the offender has been ordered to appear in court.
CRIME INDEX	The total of the seven major offenses used to measure the extent, fluctuation and distribution of crime in a geographical area. The following crimes make up the index: Murder, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft; these offenses are referred to as Index offenses.
CRIME RATE	The number of Index offenses reported for each unit of population per 1,000.
CRIMES AGAINST PERSONS	Consists of the following Index offenses: Murder, rape, and aggravated assault.
CRIMES AGAINST PROPERTY	Consists of the following Index offenses: Robbery, burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft.
DAY	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, the hours from 6:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.
ETHNIC ORIGIN	Having or originating from linguistic or cultural ties with a specific group.
EXCEPTIONAL CLEARANCE	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, an offense is cleared exceptionally when an offender has been identified or located and sufficient evidence to charge has been obtained, but there is some reason beyond police control that prohibits the offender from being brought before the court.
HIERARCHY RULE	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, each crime or attempted crime is counted in only one offense category. If several offenses are committed, simply glance down the list of Part I offenses and stop at the first offense recognized from the facts given; this offense is the correct classification for this criminal activity.
HISPANIC	A person of Mexican, Puerto Rican, Cuban, Central or South American, or other Spanish culture or origin, regardless of race.
JUVENILE	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, a person under the age of 18.
JUVENILE CLEARANCE	Those crimes where the offenders are identified as juveniles.

NIGHT	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, the hours from 6:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m.
NONVIOLENT CRIME	Consists of the following Index offenses: Burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft.
POPULATION	Is the year-round population of the municipality shown in the most recent State population estimates published by the Department of Labor, except that in the year of promulgation of a Federal decennial census, the census figures shall be used.
RESORT MUNICIPALITY	Is a municipality which, because of its recreational, entertainment or amusement characteristics or facilities or its close proximity to such characteristics or facilities, experiences a total increase during the seasonal period in the number of persons temporarily resident therein of 25 percent or more of its population.
SEASONAL POPULATION	Is the average of the estimated number of persons temporarily resident in the municipality during the three consecutive months when the temporary population is greatest.
TEMPORARY RESIDENT	Means the occupying for any period of time during the seasonal period by any person not counted as a resident of the municipality for population purposes of an accommodation in a rented residential unit or vacation home.
UNFOUNDED	Classification of reported crimes that are found to be false or baseless.
VIOLENT CRIME	Consists of the following Index offenses: Murder, rape, robbery, and aggravated assault.
WHITE	A person having origins in any of the original peoples of Europe, North Africa, or the Middle East.

CALCULATIONS OF RATES AND TRENDS

1. **Crime Rate per 1,000 inhabitants:** This represents the number of Index offenses per 1,000 inhabitants. For example: What is the crime rate for a municipality with 513 Index offenses (murder, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny-theft and motor vehicle theft), with a population of 8,280?

$$513 \text{ (Index offenses)} \div 8,280 \text{ (population)} = .061957 \times 1,000 = 62.0 \text{ (crime per 1,000 inhabitants)}$$

2. **Crime Trend:** A crime trend shows the extent to which crime increased or decreased. This is done by comparing a period of the current year with the same period of a previous year. For example: A municipality experienced 264 Index offenses in a previous year and 513 Index offenses in the current year. What is the percent of the increase?

$$513 \text{ (current year Index offenses)} - 264 \text{ (previous year Index offenses)} = 249 \text{ (numerical increase)}$$
$$249 \text{ (numerical increase)} \div 264 \text{ (previous year)} = .943 \times 100 = +94\% \text{ (percent change)}$$

NOTE: If there were more Index offenses in a previous year than in the current year, we would have a percentage decrease.

3. **Number of Police personnel per 1,000 inhabitants:** This is calculated in the same manner as a crime rate. For example: A municipality with a population of 8,280 and 28 police personnel. How many officers are there per 1,000 population?

$$28 \text{ (police personnel)} \div 8,280 \text{ (population)} = .00338 \times 1,000 = 3.4 \text{ (police personnel per 1,000 inhabitants)}$$

NOTE: This formula can be applied to either total police personnel or just police officers per 1,000 inhabitants.

4. **Police Assaulted Rate:** This is calculated at a rate per 100 police officers. For example: A municipality with 25 officers had five of them assaulted during the month. What is the police assaulted rate?

$$5 \text{ (police officers assaulted)} \div 25 \text{ (police officers)} = .2 \times 100 = 20 \text{ (police assaulted per 100 officers)}$$

5. **Clearance Rate:** This refers to the percent of Index offenses cleared (solved), over a specific period of time. For example: A municipality with 513 Index offenses in a chosen time frame, cleared 95 of these offenses. What is the clearance rate?

$$95 \text{ (Index offenses cleared)} \div 513 \text{ (Index offenses)} = .185 \times 100 = 18.5 \text{ (percent cleared)}$$

6. **Annual Mean Population:** Is determined for each municipality designated a resort municipality by use of the following formula:

$$AMP = \frac{12P + 3SP}{12}$$

Where **AMP** equals Annual Mean Population; **P** equals Population; **SP** equals Seasonal Population.
