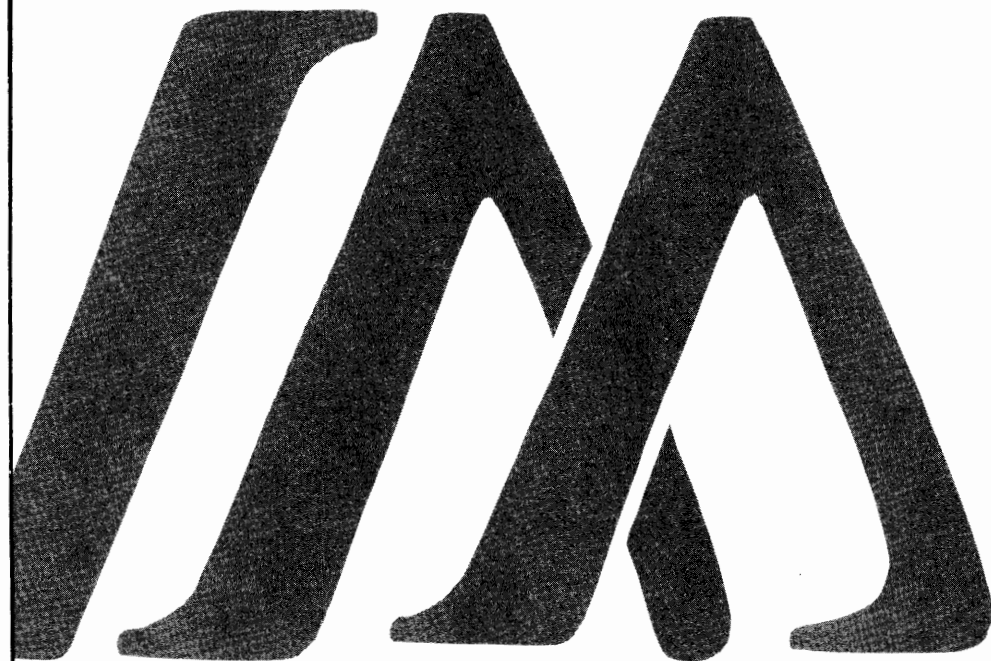

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PREFACE

The 1985-86 edition of Vital Educational Statistics is the twelfth in a series which began in 1974-75. It marks the ninth year of a revised series using data derived from updated instruments supported by detailed and illustrated instructions. It is the eighth year that the publication has been produced in two volumes. A glossary of terms is provided to define the data elements for clarity of interpretation to the reader.

As in the previous editions, Volume I contains school district and school data, including enrollments, dropouts, and graduate data. Each section contains narrative and tabular data to accommodate both reader and user preferences.

Volume II of Vital Educational Statistics is exclusively certificated and non-certificated staff data. It is a separate publication which will be available in June 1986.

The data published in the Vital Educational Statistics series are descriptive and were designed to establish a core data base to aid in reporting on the condition of education in New Jersey. Hopefully, these data, when joined with other department data, will provide insights for significant policy implications.

The back cover contains two forms the reader can complete to evaluate the publication. Users are invited to forward any comments or recommendations that would improve the value and quality of the reported data.

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INTRODUCTION

This introduction presents selected trend data characteristics of public elementary and secondary education in New Jersey between 1981-82 and 1985-86. The four sets of data show enrollments, dropouts and graduates over the past five years; and the schools that housed the public elementary and secondary pupils.

INTRODUCTION (CONT.)

SYNOPSIS OF TRENDS

1981-82 to 1985-86

Statewide, enrollments in this period decreased by 7.3 percent or an average of 1.5 percent per year. Elementary school enrollments decreased by 5.0 percent or an average of 1.0 percent per year. Secondary school enrollments decreased by 8.6 percent over the period for an average of 1.7 percent per year.

The number of schools decreased by 109 or 4.6 percent of the total reported in 1981-82. Schools for the handicapped decreased by eight (8). Secondary schools decreased by 16 or 3.9 percent of those operating in 1981-82. Elementary schools decreased by 85 or 4.5 percent of those operating five years ago.

The total number of dropouts declined by 14.7 percent between 1981-82 and 1985-86. The number of dropouts, classified as "minority" also declined by 6.2 percent.

Although the number of public high school graduates decreased by 15.1 percent (between 1981 and 1985) the percent of those "continuing education" increased by 2.3 percent. The percent of 1985 graduates continuing their education was 65.8 percent.

DISTRICT AND SCHOOL INFORMATION

DISTRICT AND SCHOOL INFORMATION

Section I contains the following tables: Table I, Operating and Non-Operating Public School Districts; Table II, Universe of State, County and Local Educational School Systems; Table III, Enrollment Size of New Jersey Public School Districts; Table IV, New Jersey Public Schools by Type of School; Table V, Special Selected Programs with Enrollments by County.

Table I There were no changes in the status of the number of school districts operating or non-operating from the reported 616 in the 1984-85 school year. In the 1981-82 school year there were 597 operating districts and 22 non-operating districts for a total of 619. In 1982-83, the operating districts were reduced to 593 and the non-operating increased to 23. The number of operating districts declined by one to 592 in 1983-84 and the non-operating increased by one to 24. This number remains unchanged for the third consecutive school year.

Table II This table was first published in the 1981-82 Vital Educational Statistics and showed 601 operating administrative units in the state. Between 1981-82 and 1984-85, there was a reduction in the number of Type I units from 53 to 49, the number of Type II units increased by one to 531, the county units decreased by one (1) and state units increased by ten (10). In 1985-86, there was a decrease of nine (9) operating administrative units from 606 in 1984-85 to 597 in 1985-86. Of the 597 operating units, 579 are local, 13 are county units and 5 (a reduction from 14) are state units. The reduction in state units resulted from the

transfer of the administration of nine (9) regional day schools to either a local or county unit.

Table III This table was introduced in the 1982-83 edition and there have been no significant changes in the size of districts over the period. Three hundred and five (305) or 51.5 percent of the 592 operating districts enroll between 0 and 999 students. One hundred and eighty-eight (188) or 31.8 percent of the total operating districts enroll between 1,000 and 2,999 students. The remaining ninety-nine (99) or 16.7 percent had enrollments which ranged from 3,000 to the high of 54,177 students.

Table IV This table shows the type of schools which compose the state's public elementary/secondary educational system. Column 12 reports a total of 2,255 public schools which represents a decrease of thirty-three (33) from the 2,288 reported in 1982-83. Of the total number of public schools, 1,840 were elementary schools and 415 were secondary. Increases in school types compared with 1984-85 were as follows: seven (7) middle schools (216 to 213); nine (9) four-year high school (232 to 241); one (1) in the secondary school category designated "other"; and, one (1) handicapped secondary. Declines by school type were: eight (8) elementary; nine (9) approved junior high; eight (8) three-year secondary; and, one (1) six-year secondary.

A comparison of total number of schools by county between 1984-85 and 1985-86 shows that six (6) of the counties (Hudson, Mercer,

Middlesex, Monmouth, Ocean and Salem) each increased the number of schools by one (1), and four (4) of the counties [Atlantic (2), Bergen (1), Essex (2), and Morris (1)] had decreases in the number of schools.. In the remaining eleven (11) counties, there were no changes in the number of schools. Thus, although there was no difference in the number of the schools, change did occur in the arrangement of types and locations.

Of the 415 public secondary schools in New Jersey, 39.6 percent or 165 schools had enrollments between 500 and 999 students; 24.8 percent or 103 schools had enrollments between 1,000 and 1,499; and 16.1 percent or 67 secondary schools had enrollments which ranged from 1,500 to a high of 4,292 students. Thus, 19.3 percent or 80 of the secondary schools in New Jersey had enrollments under 500 students.

Of the 1,840 public elementary schools in New Jersey, 1,404 or 76.3 percent had enrollments between 0 and 499, and 399 or 21.7 percent had enrollments between 500 and 999. Thus 37 or 2 percent of the elementary schools had enrollments which ranged from 1,000 to a high of 1,454 students.

Table V This table was introduced in the 1984-85 edition of Vital Educational Statistics Volume I and is appearing for the second year. It reports on programs that the schools of New Jersey have established to meet the identified needs of their students and the numbers being served. The following table compares the students enrolled in 1984-85 with the numbers reported enrolled in 1985-86 by showing increasing, no change, and decreasing program enrollments.

SECTION II

STUDENT INFORMATION

STUDENT INFORMATION

This section contains data on student enrollments, dropouts and high school graduate follow-up information. Of the 10 tables, four contain enrollment data, three carry dropout data, and three contain high school graduate follow-up information. All of the data reported are as of September 30, 1985. These data are used to prepare enrollment projections and to develop lists of schools that have high concentrations of low income pupils. In addition, the data are supplied to the National Center for Education Statistics and are made available to the public upon request.

ENROLLMENTS

Table VI is a membership table i.e., pupils on roll during the last school day of September 1985. The data are reported for day school students and were compiled from individual school reports submitted by each district. The special education pupils shown in Column 17 are students on roll in self-contained classes. "Mainstreamed" special education students are reported with the regular students at their respective grade levels. There were 1,116,194 students on roll in the public schools as of September 30, 1985.

Compared with 1984-85, there was a decline of 13,029 students. This represents the lowest one-year decline reported in the past decade. There were enrollment increases in the Pre-Kindergarten, Kindergarten, Grades 1, 3, 10, 11, Post-Grads and Self-Contained Special Education categories. Between Kindergarten and Grade 3, there were 7,129 more students than in 1984-85. Although there were enrollment increases in Grades 10 and 11, between Grades 3

and 12 there was an overall decline of 22,457 students. In Post-Grads and self-contained Special Education there was an increase of 2,072 students. If current conditions continue, the declining enrollment trend will be reversed sooner than the end of the decade which had been predicted in the past.

Table VII is the first of two tables separating students on roll into elementary and secondary school categories. Note that seventh and eighth grade students on roll appear in both elementary and secondary counts depending upon the type of school in which they were enrolled. On September 30, 1985, 715,358 elementary students were on roll, 1,365 fewer than were reported in September, 1984. Eleven counties, Camden, Cape May, Essex, Gloucester, Hunterdon, Mercer, Monmouth, Ocean, Passaic, Somerset and Union showed increases, which ranged from a high of 591 students in Mercer to 26 in Somerset. Of the ten counties showing a decrease in enrollments, the range was from a high of 924 in Bergen to a low of 19 in Salem.

Table VIII shows that in 1985, 400,836 secondary school students were on roll in grades seven through twelve, 11,664 fewer students than were reported in 1984. Six counties, Atlantic, Cape May, Cumberland, Ocean, Salem and Sussex showed increases which totaled 779 students; while six counties, Bergen, Essex, Middlesex, Morris, Passaic and Union showed decreases of greater than 1,000 students in each. Overall, three counties (Camden, Cape May and Ocean) showed increased total enrollments and two (Mercer and Salem) remained constant.

Table IX shows the composition of the total enrollment by county in the five prescribed federal racial/ethnic categories. Of the total number of students on roll, 31.4 percent were reported as "minority"--an increase of 0.6 percent over 1984. In comparison to 1984, there was a decrease of 16,571 or 0.6 percent in the white enrollment, an increase of 0.1 percent of the total but a decrease of 1,241 students in the black enrollment, an increase of 1,907 students or 0.3 percent in the Hispanic enrollment, a decrease of 173 students in the American Indian/Alaskan Native enrollment, and an increase of 3,049 students or 0.3 percent in the Asian/Pacific Islander enrollment.

Eight (8) counties exceeded the state average of 31.4 percent Minority: Hudson, 66.9 percent; Essex, 65.5 percent; Passaic, 47.8 percent; Union, 43.8 percent; Cumberland, 42.2 percent; Mercer, 38.5 percent; Atlantic, 36.8 percent; and, Camden, 34.2 percent.

DROPOUTS

The three tables in the "Dropout" series were developed using the data reported by the public elementary and secondary schools on the students who discontinued school before completing the prescribed course of study during the 1984-85 school year. Of the total 18,568 reported students leaving school, 16,726 or 90.1 percent were known to have discontinued school and 1,842 or 9.9 percent had moved to a new residence and the school status was unknown. In comparison with the 16,519 reported known leavers in 1983-84, the 16,726 is an increase of 1.3 percent or 207 students. There was a decrease from 1,844 to 1,842 between 1983-84 and 1984-85 in the new residence school status unknown category.

Table X reports the Known and Unknown Reasons for Dropouts by County. The reason categories reported are in conformity with Handbook V, Student and Pupil Accounting of the National Center for Education Statistics. The categories are a consolidation of some seventeen detailed explanations of reasons for discontinuing school.

Two major categories account for nearly two-thirds (63.6%) of the total dropouts. There were 7,433 or 40.0% "Dissatisfied With School/Behavioral/Academic Difficulty" and 4,385 or 23.6% due to "Economics/Entered Employment". The detailed explanations of the categories may be found in the glossary at the end of the report.

Table XI shows the basic categories of grade and sex. Slightly less than half (49.7%) of the total reported dropouts were reported in grades 10 and 11. This percent is increased to 90.6% when grades twelve (20.9%) and nine (20%) are added. The ninth grade class entering high school in 1980-81 and graduating in June 1984, had a cumulative dropout percentage of 16.9 percent (3.6% of the 9th grade plus 4.9% of the 10th grade plus 4.5% of the 11th grade plus 3.9% of the 12th grade). The ninth grade class entering in 1981-82 had a cumulative dropout percentage of 17.2 percent (3.4% of the 9th grade plus 4.5% of the 10th grade plus 4.7% of the 11th grade plus 4.1% of the 12th grade). The remaining 9.4% are distributed over Special Education (5.4%), grades seven and eight (2.9%) and Pre-K thru six and Ungraded (1.1%). The ratio between the sexes shows little change. Males discontinuing school were 58.9% of the total dropouts, an increase of 0.3% from the 58.6% reported for 1983-84. The percentage of females of the total decreased from 41.4% in 1983-84 to 41.1% in 1984-85. In the past six

years there has only been a 2% variance in the ratio: from the 1979-80 59.1% male - 40.9% female to the 1982-83 57.1% male - 42.9% female in 1982-83.

Table XII shows the state's public school dropouts by racial/ethnic origin. In comparison with the 1983-84 school year, the percentage of white decreased by 0.4%, black decreased by 1.0%, Hispanic increased by 1.3%, and American Indian/Alaskan Native, Asian or Pacific Islander categories were without change.

GRADUATES

The three tables in "The Follow-Up of Graduates" series were developed using the data reported by the public high schools from their studies conducted in the fall of 1985 of the 1984-85 graduates. The 81,547 graduates in 1984-85 was a decrease of 4.7 percent or 4,022 from 85,560 reported in 1983-84. Of the 84,357 twelfth graders enrolled on September 28, 1984, 96.7% graduated. In comparison over the past five years, this percentage ranks second to the 1982-83 high of 97.3%. When the graduates are taken as a percentage of the ninth graders reported enrolled in the public secondary schools in September four years earlier, the graduation rate is 79.7%. This percentage is the third highest in the past decade following the 80.5 percent in 1975-76 and the 79.8 percent in 1983-84.

Table XIII shows the status of the 1984-85 graduates in the Fall of 1985. Of the total graduates, 65.8% or 53,682 had elected to continue with their education. This continues

the upward trend of percentage of graduates continuing their education which began with the 61.9% reported in 1979-80. A similar trend is evident in the enrollment of graduates in college or university where the percentage has increased annually from 53.6% in 1979-80 to 56.4% in 1983-84 to 57.8% in 1984-85. On the other hand, the percentage of graduates enrolling in other education in this period has fluctuated between a low of 7.8% and a high of 9.0% with the 1984-85 percent of 8.0% decreasing 0.1 percent from the 8.1% in 1983-84. The percentage of graduates employed continued to decline from the 28.3% reported in 1979-80 to 23.7% in 1984-85.

Table XIV shows the racial/ethnic distribution of the public high school graduates. Of the 81,547 graduates, 21.9% or 17,819 were classified as minorities. This was an increase of 0.2% over the 21.7% reported in 1983-84. Eight counties in 1984-85 exceeded the statewide average of 21.9% minority graduates. They were: Hudson, 58.0%; Essex, 49.5%; Cumberland, 33.3%; Union, 32.0%; Passaic, 31.9%; Mercer, 27.9%; Atlantic, 26.4%; and Camden, 22.8%.

Approximately fourteen (14.2) percent of the graduates were black, six (5.9) percent were Hispanic and the remaining minority groups accounted for two (1.6) percent of the total graduates.

Table XV shows the racial/ethnic distribution of the public high school graduates who enrolled in colleges or universities. Of the 47,137 graduates enrolling in colleges or universities, 38,857 (82.4%) were white, 5,029 (10.7%) were black, 2,040 (4.3%) were Hispanic,

1,179 (2.5%) were Asian or Pacific Islander, and 32 (0.1%) were American Indian/Alaskan Native.

Of the graduates attending colleges and universities, the percentage attending In-State decreased from 56.4% in 1983-84 to 55.7% in 1984-85. Graduates attending out-of-state colleges increased from 43.6% in 1983-84 to 44.3% in 1984-85.

GLOSSARY

Administrative Exclusion: A legal action of an authorized party that compels a student to leave school before completing the prescribed course of studies. The legal action may be taken for reasons such as extreme misbehavior, incorrigibility and/or incarceration in a correctional institution.

Advanced Placement Program: A series of courses for upper grade secondary school students intended to provide college level instruction. Successful completion may enable the student(s) to bypass the usual initial college courses in the subject area and begin the student's college work with a more advanced course and possibly with college credit. (This category does not include students enrolled in special programs for the talented or gifted.)

Alternate School: A school that offers a student a choice between it and the traditional school which most students in the district attend. The alternate school is frequently typified by modified curricular content, nonstandard classrooms, and/or instructional techniques based on individual students needs.

Apprenticeship/On-The-Job Training: Supervised training program for a beginner who wishes to learn, a semi-skilled or skilled trade. At the apprenticeship level, two or more years work experience on the job, supplemented by related classroom experience.

Art School: A non-degree granting, post-secondary institution offering courses of varying length in preparation for occupations related to drawing, painting, sculpture, design, and similar arts.

Bilingual Program: A state board of education approved instructional program conducted in English and a second language. . Such programs are intended to meet the special needs of students who have a native language other than English or who have limited English speaking ability .

Business or Secretarial School: A non-degree granting, post-secondary institution offering courses of varying length in preparation for technical business occupations.

College (four-year): A post-secondary institution offering a four-year curriculum and empowered to confer a bachelor's degree.

College (two-year): A post-secondary institution offering a two-year curriculum and empowered to confer an associate's degree.

Community Service Program: Programs through which students gain insight and experience in the problems and operation of such community services as recreation programs, civic activities, public libraries and community welfare agencies.

Compensatory Education Program: A program approved by the State Board of Education to provide preventive and remedial activities and services, supplemental to the regular school program, to meet the special needs of students performing below minimum levels of student proficiency as required by NJAC 6:8-1.1 and 3.8.

Continuing Education: A program extending opportunities for reading, study and training to young persons and adults following completion of or withdrawal from full-time school or college programs.

Cosmetology or Barber School: A non-degree granting, post-secondary institution offering courses of varying length in preparation for qualifying examinations and licensing.

Course: An organization of subject matter and related learning experiences provided for the instruction of pupils on a regular or systematic basis, usually for a predetermined period of time. Credit toward graduation or completion of a program of studies is given pupils for the successful completion of a course.

Credits Required for Graduation: Units of value awarded to all or some pupils for the successful completion of the work of a course or series of courses. (The minimum number of credits to be established by each high school are set forth in NJAC 6:27-1.4.)

Dissatisfied with School/Behavioral/Academic: The student withdrew from school before completing the prescribed course of studies for any one and/or combination of the following reasons: behavioral difficulty, academic difficulty, poor student/staff relationships,

poor peer relationships, lack of appropriate curriculum, and/or an active dislike of one or more aspects of his/her school experiences.

Dropout: An elementary or secondary school student who has been in membership during the regular school term and who withdraws from membership before graduating from secondary school (Grade 12) or before completing an equivalent program of studies. Such an individual is considered as having discontinued schooling, whether this occurs before or after the student has passed the compulsory school attendance age and, where applicable, whether or not the student has completed a minimum required amount of school work.

Economic/Entered Employment: The student withdrew from school before completing the prescribed course of study for any one and/or combination of the following reasons: needed at home, encouraged by parents to leave school, inability to pay expenses associated with school attendance, to seek employment and/or had accepted employment.

Expulsions: The action taken by a board of education compelling a student to withdraw from school for reasons such as extreme misbehavior, incorrigibility, or unsatisfactory achievement or progress in school work.

Family Income: The combined incomes of all members of the student's family. Possible sources for this information are: the School Lunch Programs, Chapter I, County Welfare Boards or local survey.

Government Service: Enlistment in the armed forces, the Job Corps or another government sponsored program.

Homemaking: Spending full-time establishing and managing a household.

Industrial Arts Program: A program of instructional and laboratory experiences which provide basic education related to the industrial and technological aspects of life through experiences with tools, materials and processes.

Industry Sponsored School: A technical, trade or vocational school sponsored by a private industrial firm, primarily to train prospective employees.

Introduction to Vocations Program: A guidance program to enable students in Grades 7 through 10 to explore occupational opportunities. The program includes classroom instruction, "hands-on" activities, field trips, job visitation days and speakers from business and industry.

Married or Pregnant: The student withdrew from school before completing the prescribed course of studies to establish a household.

New Residence: School Status Unknown: The student left school upon moving to a new residence. It is not known if the student entered a new school.

Nursing School: A non-degree granting, post-secondary institution usually associated with a hospital which prepares students to be nurses.

Open Classroom: A relatively large instructional area or multiclassroom space not separated by walls as in a traditional classroom. More important than these physical aspects is the accompanying philosophy of an

open curriculum cooperatively developed by teachers and students without the constraints inherent in the usual prescribed curriculum.

Other Post-Secondary School: Any non-degree granting, post-secondary school other than the foregoing.

Other Type College: Any post-secondary degree granting institution other than the foregoing.

Physical, Mental, Social or Emotional Disability: A physical illness and/or a sensory disability, disturbance which causes a student to withdraw from school before completing the prescribed program of studies.

Post-Graduate: Students who after graduating from high school (Grade 12) re-enroll in the same or another secondary school for additional high school level courses.

Pre-Kindergarten: Students in a group or class organized to provide educational experiences for children during the year or years preceding the kindergarten which are part of the elementary school program and are under the direction of a professionally qualified teacher.

Program Completion: Curricular activities or program set by the local board of education as a prerequisite for graduation. The activities or programs shall be based on specific instructional objectives for an individual and/or group of individuals. In New Jersey, often described as "Plan B".

Program for Gifted and Talented: A program for students identified by professionally qualified personnel as being advanced in mental development and/or capable of high performance

in one or more areas of special competence. Among these areas of competence are creativity, leadership ability, social adeptness and facility in the productive and performing arts. (This category does not include students enrolled in enrichment courses leading to advance placement.)

Program for Pregnant Students: A program for students who would otherwise dropout of school because of pregnancy. In addition to meeting all curricular requirements, such programs usually provide special personal and educational counseling services.

Program of Studies: A program is a combination of related courses and/or self-contained classes organized for the attainment of specific educational objectives e.g., a program of special education for handicapped pupils or a program of occupational (vocational) education.

Racial/Ethnic Groups: A pupil may be included in the group to which he or she appears to belong, identifies with or is regarded in the community as belonging to. However, no person should be counted in more than one racial/ethnic category. The categories are: White, Not Hispanic Origin, Black, Not Hispanic Origin, Hispanic, American Indian or Alaskan Native and Asian or Pacific Islander.

Reason Unknown: The student withdrew from school before completing the prescribed course of studies for reason(s) which are not known.

School District: A legal entity established in accordance with New Jersey Statutes Title 18A Education Chapter 8.

Type I is the legal classification of a local school district in accordance with

New Jersey Statutes Title 18A Education Chapter 9-2.

Type II is the legal classification of a local school district in accordance with New Jersey Statutes Title 18A Education Chapter 9-3.

School Year: The "school year" begins on July 1 and ends on June 30.

Service Academy: An institution of higher education maintained by the federal government to prepare students for a professional career as officers in one of the armed services.

Shared Time Vocational: An arrangement whereby a student regularly and concurrently attends two schools which share direction and control of the student's studies. In this report, the time sharing relationship is between a public secondary school and an area vocational school.

Special Education: Students on roll in self-contained special education classes. (Special Education students who are mainstreamed are reported in their respective grade levels.)

Special Education Program: A special program for any student who is mentally retarded, visually handicapped, auditorily handicapped, communication handicapped, neurologically or perceptually impaired, orthopedically handicapped, chronically ill, emotionally disturbed, socially maladjusted or multiply handicapped.

Suspensions: Temporary dismissals (at least one school day) of students from school by a principal. These are official suspensions

reported to the chief school administrator. Count each pupil only once regardless of the number of times he or she was suspended.

Technical, Trade or Vocational School: A non-degree granting, post-secondary institution offering courses to prepare individuals for employment as skilled workers or draftsmen.

Technology for Children Program: A program to provide children with individualized, experimental learning and opportunities to develop interests and self-awareness. Technological world-of-work activities are integrated throughout the traditional curriculum with emphasis on the needs and interests of individual students.

Total Enrollment: A count of students on roll on the last school day of September.

Unemployed: Not employed at any paid work.

Ungraded: Students in a class which is not organized on the basis of grade and has no standard grade designation. (Students in special education classes should not be reported here, but on the special education line.)

Vocational Education Program: Programs offering education and training in such semi-skilled, skilled or technical occupations as agriculture, home economics, office occupations, distributive education and technical education.
