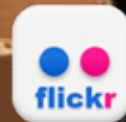

# Heroin vs. heroin: A life worth saving

Sara Kucharski is a nurse.

She is also a first lieutenant in the New Jersey Air National Guard and recently, the Infection Control Officer from the 108th Medical Group saved a man's life from a heroin overdose in Camden County last April.

A traditional drilling Guardsman, Kucharski is a community nurse with the Camden County Department of Health and Human Services. Kucharski works out of a mobile health van called Health Connection that provides health screening and disease risk assessment services to the local community.

After finishing work, Kucharski and her coworker were in traffic when a car ahead of them pulled off to the side of the road. The driver got out of the car, started to jump up and down all the while screaming "He's dying!"

"All I saw was a blue and purple arm dangling from the car door," said Kucharski. "He was tangled in the seatbelt and his entire body was blue. It was a struggle to get him out of there."

Another person stopped to help Kucharski remove the man from the vehicle as other cars passed them by.

"Once we got him loose, he fell out and hit his head," said Kucharski. "The man was pretty much dead with no pulse or breathing, and he was young, maybe in his early 20s."

Kucharski started to perform chest compressions in hopes of reviving the stricken man and learned he may have overdosed on heroin.

The man vomited and his pulse and breathing started to come back.

"He tried to get up, but I told him to relax," said Kucharski. The police and emergency medical technicians arrived, took control of the scene and called for Narcan, an opioid disruptor that took effect immediately. The man got cleaned up, waded and said thank you to Kucharski for saving his life as she drove away.

"I wished him good luck as I left," said Kucharski.

"I want to turn this into a wake-up call for kids out there and have them realize that he could have died and put my life at risk too," said Kucharski. "I worked hard and passionately on wanting him to live. If he died, it would have

impacted my life forever too - I couldn't bring him back. It would have impacted everybody around him."

"I recommend anyone who has the potential to be around those with an ad-

diction to heroin to get trained in administering Narcan," said Kucharski. "It's a choice for you to get trained to have it on your person at all times."

Narcan is approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration to be used to treat a person known or suspected to have a heroin overdose.

"I feel that people have a negative stereotype with addiction," said Kucharski. "They think it's a disease and look at the people like they're dirty. It's a mental disease like any other, and getting help from friends and family would help addicts recover. Anyone around you could be addicted to heroin and you would never know it. Addicts are everyday people like you and me."

"This was the first time I resuscitated someone on the street," said Kucharski. "All I could think about was my six-year-old son. In 14 years, this could be him; I hope that someone would save him."

# Rowan-Guard partnership yields dividends

A quick quiz: What saves the New Jersey National money, helps keep it green and leads to good jobs for smart college students?

The answer: The New Jersey National Guard's intern program with Rowan University.

The partnership began six years ago when the students from the university's nationally-recognized geographic information systems (GIS) program began helping the National Guard get a more accurate picture of its facilities. The program has since expanded into student study of the National Guard's environmental impacts, to include its utilities usage and inventories of rare species of birds and bats that live on National Guard and Department of Military and Veterans Affairs facilities.

The program has led to significant cost savings, with more to come. For example, the GIS surveys led to a \$1.4 million increase in Department of Defense reimbursements for facilities upkeep since 2010 because the department was able to present a more accurate picture of the size of its facilities. And work done by students in the energy and water internship program identified more than \$300,000 of possible savings in utility costs at seven National Guard facilities. That particular internship program,



now in its second year, is also assisting the department with its goal to eliminate its reliance on the commercial energy grid at key locations during emergencies.

"The program has been a win-win," said Chief Warrant Officer 5 Tom Comyack, the New Jersey National Guard's energy coordinator. "The department has found cost savings and efficiencies and students gained valuable experience."

The internship programs give students the specific skills employers want, said Steve Berg, who oversees the GIS interns.

Bridget Neary, a former intern who graduated in May with a degree in environmental science said the response from prospective employers interested in her experience was almost overwhelming. She landed a job with an environmental consulting firm after only two interviews.

"I truly believe it was the experience that I gained through the National Guard internship that got me hired so quickly," she said. "I felt I had an edge on other recent graduates because I have real world experience with the kind of day-to-day work that is actually done in the environmental field."

# GOODNIGHT, SMARTPHONE: POWER DOWN BEFORE BED

Checking email or flipping channels instead of sleeping? Playing video games or browsing social media in bed? Sleeping with your smartphone under your pillow?

The National Sleep Foundation reports 90 percent of adults sleep with at least one electronic device in their bedroom. Staring at your screen after nine p.m. can sap your body, turning you into a zombie the next day. To get a good night's rest, consider shutting off all electronics before climbing into bed.

## Your Body Clock

Your body functions on a 24-hour internal clock. This clock is influenced by your physical environment and daily schedule.

Light and darkness affect your body clock. Staring at the blue glow of electronic devices—computers, tablets, televisions, gaming systems, and/or smartphones—before bedtime can trick your body into thinking it's still daytime. It can make you

tired the next day instead of at night when you should be sleeping.

Studies show staring at bright screens within four hours of bedtime reduces a hormone that makes you naturally tired when it's time to sleep. This may cause difficulty falling asleep and poor quality of sleep.

## Get off the Grid

As a Soldier, it is important to get seven to nine hours of quality sleep each night. To get a good night's sleep experts recommend:

Spending 30-45 minutes technology-free before you climb into bed

Making the bedroom a technology-free zone (i.e., no smartphones, tablets, laptops, TV)

Putting caps over electrical outlets in the bedroom to discourage plugging in

Reading a book or magazine in bed instead of an electronic device

Power down tonight and don't let your technology tempt you from having a good night's rest!

# Freedom Awards nominations open

From the Employer Support of the Guard and Reserve

Nominations for the 2016 Employer Support of the Guard and Reserve Freedom Awards are open until Dec. 31, 2015.

Any Guard or Reserve service member can nominate their employer. If a service member does not have access to submit a nomination, a family member can nominate the service member's employer on their behalf.

You can nominate small, large (500+) and public employers. The employer MUST be the service member's current employer. To nominate your employer, go to <https://esgr.csd.disa.mil/fa/NominateYourEmployerView.aspx>

Click on the "Nominate" button at the top or bottom of this page. Open the form and review the questions before filling in any of the fields.

If you do not know how to answer any of the questions, print the form and gather the pertinent information before going any farther. Ask your employer or HR representative for

clarification if you need assistance answering the questions.

The form must be completed in one session, so fill out the nomination form fully and accurately. There is not an option to save your data and submit later.

For each question, please provide supporting information in the text box below each question. This is your chance to enhance your nomination by providing thorough explanations of why your employer deserves to be considered for this award. Explaining on all of the ways in which your employer supports you, your family, other service members and the military community will ensure the strongest nomination possible.

After your nomination is submitted, it will go to a review committee in your state. Once the nomination period closes, the state will select semifinalists to move forward. A



review board at HQ ESGR, a Department of Defense agency, considers all semifinalists for selection to the next round. The group of finalists goes before a National Selection Board comprised of senior Department of Defense officials, representatives from each of the seven Reserve Components, employer associations and past recipients of the Freedom Award. This selection committee makes recommendations for up to 15 recipients to the Secretary of Defense for final approval. Semifinalists are announced in early spring, and recipients are finalized by early summer.
