

## CHEESE CUPCAKES

1 1/2 lbs. cream cheese

1 cup sugar

5 eggs

1/2 teaspoon vanilla

Cream cheese and eggs (adding eggs one at a time)

Beat sugar and vanilla into cheese mixture

Fill cupcake papers 2/3 full with mixture

Bake 40 minutes at 3250

# FILLING

Center of cupcakes will fall when removed from oven - make hole in cupcakes for filling.

Place the mixture in the middle of the cupcakes. Jelly can also be used for filling. Chocolate ice cream topping can also be "dribbled" over the sour cream filling.


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
