MANAGERS' REPORT.

To His Excellency Leon Abbett, Governor of New Jersey:

In obedience to the charter and in compliance with the provisions of the statute under which the New Jersey State Lunatic Asylum was organized, the Board of Managers respectfully submit their forty-third annual report. The reports of the Superintendent, Treasurer and Steward give in detail the facts relating to the general condition of the Asylum, and the management of their several departments for the fiscal year ending October 31st, 1890.

The inventory and appraisement of the personal property owned by the Asylum, made in compliance with the law by Uriel T. Scudder and John W. Brooke together with the Steward, duly appointed by the Board to appraise the same, amounted to the sum of one hundred and forty-four thousand nine hundred and eighty-six dollars and twenty cents (\$144,986.20), an increase over the inventory valuation of last year of six thousand eight hundred and nineteen dollars and sixty cents (\$6,819.60).

The new building having been completed and furnished during the past year is now entirely occupied. Over two hundred (200) patients have been removed from the old or main building to the new.

The new road which was under construction at the last report has been completed.

The officers of the Asylum have exercised the same watchful care and supervision over the institution and its inmates as in previous years, to which the neatness and orderly appearance of the buildings and the grounds surrounding them, as well as the condition and comfort of the large number of patients, bear testimony.

During the past year one hundred and seventy-seven (177) patients have been received into the institution.

Ths whole number in the Asylum at the present time is seven hundred and eighty-seven (787), and of these three hundred and ninety-one (391) are men and three hundred and ninety-six (396) are women. The whole number under care during the year was nine hundred and fifty-five (955). Of this number fifty-six (56) have been discharged as cured, thirty-one (31) as improved, three (3) as unimproved, two (2) as not insane, and seventy-six (76) have died.

The completion of the new building has given us the long-wishedfor opportunity to better classify the patients and thus facilitate the
treatment of recent and more curable cases. The Asylum has never,
during the many years of its existence, been so thoroughly equipped
for work as at the present time. From the report of the Steward it
will be readily seen that the farm, garden and dairy have been successful, and their management very satisfactory to the Board of Managers. The net profit from these sources was three thousand six
hundred and twenty-seven dollars and ninety-four cents (\$3,627 94),
which is largely in excess of previous years, and of which the Steward should be justly proud.

The several visiting committees appointed by the Board have performed their duties as required by the statute with the same untiring zeal.

The condition of the institution at the present time is such as to reflect credit upon the Superintendent and all associated with him who have so heartily co-operated with him.

The resident officers of the Asylum continue the same as at our last annual report, except in the changes made by the resignation of the Fourth Assistant Physician, Dr. Alexander F. H. Gale, and the appointment in his place of Dr. John C. Felty, and the resignation of the Matron, Mrs. S. J. Clark, and the appointment in her place of Mrs. R. L. Ball.

The Board of Managers feel that all the officers of the institution merit their kindest mention for services faithfully performed, and for the interest manifested by them in everything that has for its end the comfort and welfare of those entrusted to their care.

Thankful for the watchful care and guidance of our Heavenly Father in the past, we earnestly invoke his blessing for the future,

both upon them and ourselves, in every effort put forth for the amelioration of suffering humanity.

GENERAL RESULTS.

The number of patients at the close of the last fiscal year was seven hundred and seventy-eight (778)—three hundred and ninetyone (391) men and three hundred and eighty-seven (387) women.

The number received since, viz., from November 1st, 1889, to October 31st, 1890, inclusive, was one hundred and seventy-seven (177)—ninety (90) men and eighty-seven (87) women. The whole number of cases under care during the year was nine hundred and fifty-five (955)—four hundred and eighty-one (481) men and four hundred and seventy-four (474) women. Of this number one hundred and sixty-eight (168) have been discharged, as follows: Considered as recovered, fifty-six (56); as improved, thirty-one (31); as unimproved or stationary, three (3); as not insane, two (2), and seventysix (76) have died. The two cases discharged as not insane were cases of simple alcoholism and could not properly be classified as persons deranged in mind.

At the close of the year there remained under care seven hundred and eighty-seven (787)—three hundred and ninety-one (391) men and three hundred and ninety-six (396) women. This is an increase in the whole number under care of nine (9) over the number in the institution October 31st, 1889.

Of the number under care at this date, six hundred and seventyseven (677) are classed as indigent, and are supported by the counties from whence sent; ninety-four (94) are private and are supported entirely by friends, and sixteen (16) are supported directly by the State. Of this latter class, one (1) is from Atlantic, three (3) from Burlington, one (1) from Camden, one (1) from Gloucester, four (4) from Mercer, three (3) from Middlesex, two (2) from Monmouth, and one (1) from Salem county. Fifteen (15) are men and one (1) a woman. The largest number under care at any one time during the year was seven hundred and ninety-two (792), and the smallest number seven hundred and sixty-two (762). The daily average was about seven hundred and seventy-four (774).

During the year death resulted in seventy-six (76) cases—forty-two (42) men and thirty-four (34) women—and from the following causes, viz.:

STATE LUNATIC ASYLUM REPORT.

Twenty-two (22) died during the first quarter, twenty-two (22) during the second, sixteen (16) during the third, and sixteen (16) during the fourth quarter of the year.

The death-rate in proportion to the whole number under care during the year was about eight (8) per centum, which is slightly above the annual average for the past decade. This, however, is but the legitimate result of the accumulation of a large number of chronic and lingering cases. From the foregoing table of causes it will be seen that very few cases were the result of acute disease. From the table given below it will also be noticed that forty (40) cases, or more than one-half of the whole number who died, had passed their fiftieth year, and that thirty-four (34), or nearly one-half, had been under care in the Asylum for a period longer than three (3) years. I would also call attention to the fact that in six (6) cases death resulted in less than one week after the admission of the patient to the institution, and two (2) were in a dying condition when brought to our care.

HEREDITY.

In fifty-one cases (twenty-six men and twenty-five women) of those admitted during the year, there was acknowledged hereditary tendency decided in thirty and a predisposition to insanity in twenty-one cases. In nineteen cases the hereditary taint was in the paternal, and in eighteen cases in the maternal line, while in fourteen cases insanity was simply acknowledged to exist in some branch of the family.

SUICIDAL TENDENCY.

In seventeen cases (twelve men and five women) there was a decided suicidal tendency, and in twenty-one cases (seven men and fourteen women) suicide was threatened.

HOMICIDAL TENDENCY.

In ten cases (six men and four women) there existed a decided homicidal tendency, and in thirteen cases (five men and eight women) homicide was threatened.

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INTEMPERANCE.

In eighteen cases (fourteen men and four women) the patient was acknowledged to be intemperate in the use of alcohol or opium, or both.

INTEMPERANCE IN PARENTS.

In twenty-two cases (sixteen men and six women) the father of the patient was intemperate in the use of alcohol, and in three cases both the father and the mother.

SOCIAL CONDITION.

Eighty-nine cases (forty-eight men and forty-one women) were married, and sixty (thirty-three men and twenty-seven women) were single, two were widowers, sixteen were widows, and three (two men and one woman) were divorced. In seven cases, the social condition was unknown or unascertained.

NUMBER OF ADMISSION.

Of the total number admitted during the year (one hundred and seventy-seven), one hundred and sixty-four were first admissions, six were second, three were third, one was fourth, one was fifth, and two were tenth admissions.

FARM, GARDEN, DAIRY, ETC.

Attention is directed to the tables in the Appendix to this report, furnished by the Steward and the Matron, the former giving detailed accounts of the operations of the farm, garden and dairy for the year, and the latter the number of articles and general character of the work accomplished by the members of the household in the sewingrooms of the institution, which are under her immediate supervision.

By reference to the Steward's statement of accounts it will be found that there remained at the close of the fiscal year, a balance in favor of the Treasurer of the institution of fourteen thousand eight hundred and one dollars and forty-nine cents (\$14,801.49).

ACKNOWLEDGMENTS, ETC.

During the year two changes have occurred in the resident officers of the institution. In November last Mrs. S. J. Clark, who held the position of Matron most acceptably for a period of nearly fourteen years, tendered her resignation, and left the institution in the month of March following. The vacancy caused by the resignation of Mrs. Clark was filled at the quarterly meeting in February by the appointment of Mrs. R. L. Ball, who soon afterward entered upon her duties. Mrs. Ball came to us well prepared for the work, having for a number of years held a similar position in an institution for the insane.

In June last, Dr. Alexander F. H. Gale, the Fourth Assistant Physician, felt compelled to tender his resignation of the position on account of ill health, and soon afterward left the institution, taking with him the sincere good wishes of the entire household and the earnest desire that he might soon be restored to health. Dr. John C. Felty was appointed in August to fill the vacancy on the Medical Staff caused by the resignation of Dr. Gale, and entered upon the duties of the position in September following. Dr. Felty is a graduate of the Medical Department of the University of Pennsylvania, and has had several years' experience in private practice. He comes to us highly recommended, both as to character and professional ability.

Dr. Kirby, the Assistant Physician, and Dr. Burroughs, the Second Assistant, still remain, and to them and the other resident officers I am under obligation for the assistance rendered me in conducting the work of the several departments of the institution throughout the year.

To the many attendants and other employes who have been faithful in the performance of the several duties assigned them, I also · desire to express my thanks.

ADMISSION OF PATIENTS.*

Private patients, or those supported by themselves or their friends, are admitted to the Asylum, when there are vacancies, on their complying with the directions and forms contained in chapters nineteen, twenty, twenty-one and twenty-two of the by-laws of the institution, which are in substance as follows:

That patients of all classes be made perfectly clean and free from any contagious or infectious disease; that they be provided with suitable clothing, and sufficient in quantity for one or more changes; that a written history of the patients be sent with them, or that they be accompanied by a person capable of giving such information; and that a "request for admission" be made by some friend or near relative; and that a "certificate of insanity," by two respectable physicians, under oath or affirmation, be brought with the patient; and lastly, that a "bond," with satisfactory sureties, be given for the payment of their expenses, such payment being made quarterly in advance, and for their removal when discharged. The forms of "request for admission," "certificate of insanity," and "bond for support," are as follows:
