Attached please find CURRENT PROGRAM STATISTICS for December 2000. Included are TANF-oriented data, and the WFNJ Statistical Summary. Some items of interest include:

- The TANF caseload continues to decline. Since December of 1999 there has been a decrease of 14.0%.
- Food Stamp households decreased by over 6,400 since December 1999.
- For GA, recipient figures reported are for December 1999, which are 6.4% below December 1998.
- Table 4, Work First New Jersey Statistical Summary, for November 2000 is corrected.



Highlights of CURRENT PROGRAM STATISTICS

TANF

(Tables 1 and 5, Graphs 1 and 4)

[The number of single parent families is reduced by the number of companion cases listed for payment on the source table FF-012, to avoid double counting.]

As of December 2000, 45,089 eligible families in New Jersey were receiving TANF cash assistance:

- 44,260 single head of household families
- 829 two-parent families.

The largest number of TANF families receiving cash assistance, by county:

Essex — 15,200, Hudson — 7,097, Camden — 4,632, Passaic — 3,380 Union — 2,647

The number of TANF cash assistance families in the other 16 counties ranged from:

 53 families in Hunterdon County to 2,028 in Mercer County, with eleven counties below 1000 families

There were 19,587 fewer eligible TANF families receiving cash assistance in December 2000 than in December 1998, a decline of 30.3 percent.

- Single head families: 18,661 below two years ago in December 1998, a drop of 29.7%.
- Two parent families: declined by 926 or 52.8 percent from December 1998.

FOOD STAMP PROGRAM

(Tables 2 and 6, Graphs 2, 5, and 6)

At the end of December 2000, 135,583 households participated in the Food Stamp Program.

- TANF: 35,365 households with 113,712 persons.
- Other low income: 100,218 households with 183,030 persons.
- Total persons: 296,742, including 145,037 adults and 151,705 children

By County: 57.1 percent of the households were in: Essex 31,631

Hudson 19,874

Passaic 13,637

Camden 12,299

Two years ago in December 1998, 161,890 households participated in Food Stamps in New Jersey. Over the next two years the number declined by 26,307, or 16.2 percent, to 135,583 by December 2000.

- TANF(FS) households steadily declined by 32,933 from 68,298 in December 1998 to 35,365 two years later. There were 93,592 Other Low Income households in December 1998 and 6,626 more two years later.
- Total FS Recipients: were 364,200 in December 1998, and declined to 296,742 by December 2000, a drop of 67,458, or 18.5 percent.
- Adult FS Recipients: declined from 173,203 in December 1998 to 145,037 in December 2000, a drop of 28,166 (16.3 percent).
- Recipient FS Children: declined by 39,292 (20.6 percent), from 190,997 in December 1998 to 151,705 in December 2000.

EMERGENCY ASSISTANCE

(Tables 3, 7 and 9, Graphs 3, 7 and 9)

In December 2000 Emergency Assistance (EA) payments were made for 1,841 eligible TANF families and 397 SSI recipients in New Jersey. For TANF families this included payments for:

- Temporary Rental Assistance (TRA) for 216 families
- Motel placements for 272 families and emergency shelter placements for 349 families
- All other TANF-EA for 1,004 families (including back rent, back utilities, security deposits, furnishings, clothing and food allowance, or transitional housing)
- 567 families in Essex County, 169 in Passaic County, 169 in Mercer County,
 153 in Middlesex.

In the past two years, the average number of EA payments for TANF families was 1,861 in 1999 and 1,822 for 2000. Payments were made to 3.5% more families in December 2000 as compared to November 2000.

- TRA payments were 11.7 % of the number in December 2000.
- Motel payments were down from two years ago.; 281 to 272.

TANF PARTICIPATION RATES

(Table 8, Graph 8)

The TANF participation rate for December 2000 was 39.39% for the State as a whole. This is a decrease of 1.20 percentage points from November 2000.

Participation rates by county:

- Seven counties had a participation rate greater than 40 percent, Essex, Monmouth, Morris
- Passaic, Salem, Union and Warren.

GENERAL ASSISTANCE

(Table 9, Graph 9)

There were 23,895 GA recipients in December 1999, up from 23,274 in November.

■ There were 14,165 Employable GA and 9,730 Unemployable GA recipients in December 1999.

CHILD SUPPORT AND PATERNITY

(Table 10)

For FFY 2001, the total collections of the Child Support and Paternity Program was about \$184,954,628, an increase of over 6 percent over the same period for FFY 2000.




TANF PARTICIPATION RATES



Explanatory Notes

The Department of Human Services Division of Family Development provides basic income and an opportunity to achieve self-sufficiency for individuals and families served by the Division's programs. The Division provides leadership, direction and supervision to those public agencies responsible for administering those programs and plans for and develops policies to promote self-sufficiency.

WORK FIRST NEW JERSEY (WFNJ) - Fully implemented July 1, 1997, this is New Jersey's welfare reform program which responds to the requirements of the Federal Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Reconciliation Act (PRWORA) of 1996. PRWORA establishes Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF) as the replacement for AFDC cash assistance. WFNJ includes two segments, WFNJ/TANF for families with children, and WFNJ/GA (General Assistance) for single adults and couples without dependent children. The emphasis is on achieving self-sufficiency and limits lifetime receipt of financial assistance to a total of five years.

Employment Directed Activities (EDA) - From Activities Summary Report (OMEGA report # RM064). Unduplicated count of persons participating in Community Work Experience Program (CWEP), All Other Training, or Job Search.

Number of Persons Employed This Month, Still Receiving TANF – Individuals with open "empl" activity on OMEGA. Ad hoc report.

Participants Receiving Child Care Services - From Issuance Disbursement Summary (OMEGA report # RM703). Total number of active participants who show receipt of Child Care.

Number of Persons Closed on FAMIS Due to Employment- From FAMIS report # FM463.

Post TANF and Receiving Child Care - Persons no longer in receipt of TANF but still receiving child care. From Issuance Disbursement Summary (OMEGA report # RM703).

MEDICAID ONLY FAMILIES no longer receive TANF financial assistance but remain eligible for Medicaid under applicable provisions which extend coverage beyond the period of assistance. These are shown separately in these tables because cash assistance and Medicaid have been de-linked.

FOOD STAMP PROGRAM (FS) - Authorized by Congress as a nutritional supplement program to provide low income households with more food of greater variety and better nutrition. Program eligibility is based on household income, resources, and expenses for medical, shelter, and dependent care. CWA staff refer certain recipients to the New Jersey Department of Labor for participation in the Food Stamp Employment and Training Program.

EMERGENCY ASSISTANCE (EA) - Payments to those eligible for WFNJ/TANF or WFNJ/GA, authorized during the 30 consecutive days immediately following the emergency (defined as a substantial loss of shelter, food, clothing, or household furnishings by fire, flood or other similar disaster) or if the eligible individual or family is in an imminent or actual state of homelessness.
