STATE OF NEW JERSEY
GENERAL ASSEMBLY

TUESDAY, January 14, 1969.

At 12:00 o'clock noon, Tuesday, January 14, 1969, Assemblyman Albert S. Smith of Atlantic County, called to order the One Hundred and Ninety-third session of the General Assembly (the twenty-second under the Constitution adopted by the people in 1947) by reading the following call:

The Speaker addressed the General Assembly, as follows:

In a very short while we will have the privilege of hearing our distinguished Governor outline his 1969 Legislative program. Speaking for myself and for my party I can assure you that we will listen attentively and objectively to the Governor's proposals, and that the majority members of this House are not only willing, but eager to join in a truly bi-partisan approach to the problems of the day.

It is in the same spirit that I will ask the Governor and the members of his party in this House to view my brief remarks here today.

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We meet at a time when the public standing of this Legislature has been sullied. This is not the occasion to deal in detail with the charges that have sharpened public scrutiny of our activities.

It should be the time, however, for us to face squarely the fact that in the final analysis the best answer that we individually or collectively can give our critics is a record of accomplishment at this session.

I suggest to you that an objective review of our 1968 record will produce many milestones to which we can point with pride and which reflect great credit on this Legislature. This is true in many areas, but it is especially true in the area of law enforcement. It is to our credit that we anticipated in 1968 the need for an all-out war on crime in this State. Let's look at that record.

This Legislature passed witness immunity legislation, recognized by all as a key element in successfully fighting organized crime.

This Legislature passed legislation providing for the establishment of State-wide grand juries.

This Legislature created a Commission of Investigation with powers surpassing any similar agency in the nation.

These are but some of the bills in the area of improved law enforcement that were passed or contemplated many months before the harsh attacks leveled against the integrity of this Legislature.

It was not only in the area of law enforcement improvement that this Legislature distinguished itself. In the interest of brevity I will mention but a few examples of what must go down in the history of this State as one of the most productive sessions of any Legislature. In 1968, we authorized almost a billion dollars in bond issues and actively and successfully campaigned for their acceptance by the public. We provided more than \$100 million in new aid to New Jersey's hard-pressed counties and municipalities. This help took the form of three major aid programs, a \$25 per pupil across-the-board school aid increase; the State assumption of 75% of non-federal welfare costs, and the return of 10% of sales tax revenue to municipal government.

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We did much, and we will do more for our hard-pressed cities. During the first full year the three programs are implemented, the State's six largest cities will receive more than \$20 million. Newark, our largest city and the one we agree is in the most dire need, will receive more than half of this amount, or \$10.4 million.

In addition, a \$90 million school building program, fully financed by the State, will enable these hard-pressed cities to build new elementary and secondary school buildings. This Legislature in 1968 also provided monies for Project Head-Start, for neighborhood education centers, employment programs for hard-core unemployed, and a variety of other needed urban programs. This Legislature authorized more aid to our crisis-ridden cities than any other Legislature in the history of New Jersey. I do not suggest, as will soon be abundantly clear, that we have done enough or that we can rest on our oars. I do suggest, however, that the members of this Legislature demonstrated in 1968 an ability to tackle tough problems and to come up with hard answers that required political courage of the highest order.

It is my sincere hope that in 1969, we will again rise to equally difficult challenges — that individually and collectively we will literally stretch to our full height as public officials —

It is my personal belief that these challenges will again force this Legislature to face up to the hard fiscal facts-of-life. We at the State level are being asked to do more to help local and county governments respond to the increased or improved services demanded by our citizens. I think we should respond favorably to reasonable demands in these areas, but I think we should make it clear in doing so where the tax money is coming from to pay for these new programs. Public acceptance of almost \$1 billion in Bond Issues indicated to me that the people of this State are in many respects ahead of us in recognizing the long neglected needs of New Jersey. We can expect that demands will be made on us to solve growing environmental problems. More specifically, we should heed reasonable demands by our citizenry for clean air, clean water and clean land. I hope the Governor will comment on this today, and that he will talk as well about the additional needs of our urban areas. In both these respects, again speaking for myself, he will have a sympathetic ear.

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One final comment on the session that lies ahead of us. In November the people of New Jersey will elect a new Governor and a new Assembly. The political facts of life dictate that 1969 must, therefore, be a year of intensified partisanship, and so that there is no misunderstanding, I certainly intend to participate in the partisan process at every opportunity, but not, and I repeat, but not from the Speaker's desk.

I pledge to every member of this Assembly that I will conduct myself as your Speaker with fairness, objectivity, and with respect for the point-of-view of each member. I ask your cooperation in conducting the affairs of this House in a way that will reflect credit on us all. In that spirit I accept with gratitude the responsibility you have given me today.

The Speaker named his Secretary and counsel, Anthony Speranza.

The Senate and General Assembly convened in Joint Session.

The President of the Senate Mr. McDermott called to order the Joint Session of the Legislature.

The Prayer was offered by the Reverend Samuel A. Jeanes, Pastor, First Baptist Church, Merchantville, N. J.

Governor Richard J. Hughes, delivered his annual message to the Legislature.

SEVENTH ANNUAL MESSAGE

Mr. President, Mr. Speaker and Members of the Senate and General Assembly:

There is a mysterious but wonderful force in our lives that somehow sees to it that at the very moment of our deepest discouragement, something happens to inspire in us new hope and renewed faith in ourselves, our capacity, and our direction. So it was at the end of 1968, when America—frustrated by war and an elusive peace, conscious of poverty in the midst of material prosperity, burdened with racial and ideological dissension, uneasy with the threat of rising crime and unrest, afflicted by doubts as to long-standing values and institutions—came suddenly and joyously to life.

The flight of Apollo 8 not only pierced the universe but thrilled the innermost heart of America. Three courageous young men—taught in our schools, raised in our country, molded by the strengths and weaknesses of our world, supported by thousands of dedicated Americans and a proud technology—did what no men had ever done before. This great deed taught us a crucial lesson—one that we should never again forget—that we *have* the ability to solve our toughest problems if only we have the will—that we *can* overcome the most difficult obstacles if only we are determined to do so.

This lesson should have special meaning for those of us in whom our friends and neighbors have vested another demanding mission—to operate productively the engine of State government. And what a challenging mission this is, embracing as it does the most pressing concerns of our seven million people and their basic right to be free of such evils as crime, poor education, wretched housing, inadequate transportation, spiraling local taxation, pollution, and other threats to their health and well-being—threats

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not only to our cities but, in growing measure, to every one of our communities.

In short, this mission of ours is as tough as can be. Yet I am convinced that we can overcome the problems before us, for the same hard work and determination that have already brought us so remarkably far can, if we so decide, help us achieve still more.

To those who may be tired or unconcerned I therefore say that you are out of step. For the future belongs to those who are ready to proceed with the strength and vigor that launched Apollo 8. The proposals that I shall set before you today are in precisely this spirit—bold yet carefully conceived, far-reaching yet clearly essential.

Let us then come together in that American spirit of Apollo 8 to press on with the tasks entrusted to us by the people of New Jersey.

LAW ENFORCEMENT AND CRIME CONTROL

The drive against crime in all its forms, whether organized or not, must be unremitting. Progress in our continuing battle against crime results not from partisan or sensational actions but from sheer hard work and determination on the part of government at every level.

Indeed, it is such determined effort, on a bi-partisan basis, by the executive and legislative branches of this State government that each year has made possible some major advances in our war on crime. Last year I recommended, and you enacted, a witness immunity law, a statewide grand jury bill, a measure to provide the most severe penalties against loansharking, and other laws to attack the roots of organized crime. I also signed into law a bill creating the State Investigations Commission, which will provide another powerful weapon with which to fight organized crime.

Prompt Action on Unfinished Business

This Legislature has not yet acted, however, on several other measures that I consider essential to the prosecution of our war on crime. You have not yet taken action on two extremely important

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measures that I requested in my annual message of last year: (1) an intrastate anti-trust law to protect honest businessmen against the intrusion of organized crime into legitimate business through extortion, intimidation, monopolization, or collusion; and (2) the creation of a Mid-Atlantic States Law Enforcement Compact which would establish a centralized criminal intelligence unit among the State Police agencies of New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, and Delaware to enhance interstate cooperation in the struggle against organized crime.

Furthermore, in my Special Message on Public Protection of last September, I reiterated these urgent requests and requested in addition two other measures of importance: (1) passage of a wiretapping law which, with proper judicial safeguards, could be the most effective weapon yet devised against organized criminal activity; and (2) appropriation of \$25 million to improve local police salaries and law enforcement techniques to raise the effectiveness of local efforts against crime in all its forms.

As yet you have taken action on none of these measures, and I call on you today, in the interest of our continued strong and bi-partisan attack on crime, to act on them at the earliest possible moment.

Loanshark Law—A Needed Correction

At the same time I ask you to correct a serious mistake that you made in overriding my veto of a bill that has the purported effect of inhibiting loanshark activity. This measure instead has the unintended but nevertheless real and dangerous effect of giving to loansharks a virtual license to charge up to 50% interest. I ask you to correct this serious oversight as soon as possible.

Further Proposals for Improvement

Last year, after eight days of hearings, the Joint Legislative Committee to Study Crime and the System of Criminal Justice in New Jersey recommended the creation of a new Department of State government, a Department of Criminal Justice. I stated then, and I believe now, that this proposal, in its present form, holds no promise of making more effective our fight against organized crime.

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Indeed, public hearings on this measure, which followed its announcement, have revealed several shortcomings in the bill upon which there is now widespread agreement. It is agreed, for example, that the section on rehabilitation, which would substantially dismantle the Department of Institutions and Agencies and the unselfish and dedicated citizen boards that now guide our institutions, is not advisable. Similarly, the section that would place all youth training and social development programs within this new departmental framework—and thus label all young people participating in these programs as criminal or potentially criminal—is unwise.

Moreover, a section providing for massive civil commitment of narcotics addicts cannot possibly be established with the \$1 million appropriation contemplated by the Committee bill—the true cost in fact being monumental, perhaps as much as \$50 million, in view of the fact that no facilities are now available for a mammoth effort of this kind. Finally, the section that would create a Division of Planning would merely duplicate or destroy the work of the bi-partisan State Law Enforcement Planning Agency, which already has made outstanding initial efforts in planning for a comprehensive State and local law enforcement program under the federal Safe Streets Act.

In short, it has become clear that the Committee bill proposed last year, S-802, contains several weak, even harmful, provisions that serve no useful purpose. On the other hand, it does contain several substantial proposals that could indeed help to heighten the effectiveness of law enforcement programs. I have reviewed with great care S-802 and its companion measure, S-803, and I have discussed them in detail with their principal sponsor, Senator Forsythe, who has served with great distinction as Senate President during this past year. I have reached the following conclusions:

1. The time has now arrived when full-time prosecutors and full-time assistant prosecutors, with compensation sufficient to attract high quality attorneys on a full-time basis, should be established. I say this not in criticism of the efforts of those many fine and dedicated men who serve now, and have served in the

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past, in the county prosecutor's office, but rather in recognition of the growing demands on all of our law enforcement agencies. I do not believe that the required additional cost of such a change can fairly be cast on the several counties, and I therefore feel that a program of State support, as contemplated in S-803, is in order.

2. In the fight against organized crime there is need for a greater State orientation of the prosecutorial system, as projected in S-802. A more highly State-oriented system is an essential counterpart to the recently authorized statewide grand jury, which is designed to investigate organized crime and to indict persons engaged in organized criminal activity in any part of the State. Such State direction of prosecutions in cases that have a multi-county or statewide impact would not, in my opinion, collide with the tradition of home rule since the county prosecutor would continue to exercise control over criminal prosecutions involving matters other than organized crime.

3. The State should establish, within its law enforcement framework, a program of assistance to local police departments in the planning of consolidated services.

Division of Criminal Justice

On all of these points, which I consider to be the soundest provisions of S-802 and S-803, I have advised the principal sponsor of these measures of my views. I believe that new legislation should be introduced on a bi-partisan basis to further these important objectives. Such a bill should, of course, avoid the shortcomings of the original measures. That is, rehabilitation efforts, youth programs, narcotics control programs, and comprehensive law enforcement planning should remain with those agencies now responsible for them—as public hearings have made entirely clear. Given this fact, it is unnecessary—and indeed it would be wasteful in the extreme—to create a new Department of State government to accomplish those useful and meritorious provisions of S-802 and S-803 with which I concur.

I therefore recommend the establishment within the Department of Law and Public Safety of a Division of Criminal Justice, that will be effectively financed and equipped and that will be headed by

a Director, who shall be appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate, and who shall be directly responsible to the Attorney General. This Division will contain the recently formed Organized Crime Unit, and will be manned with Deputy Attorneys General in tenure positions and with accountants, tax experts, and other specialists trained to combat the sophisticated activities of organized crime.

This Unit, which will coordinate its efforts with the State Police Intelligence Unit and with State and federal strike forces on a day-to-day basis, will assist the State Police in their ongoing investigation of the activities of organized crime in New Jersey. The relationship between the Division of Criminal Justice and the Division of State Police will be equivalent to that between the United States Attorney's office and the FBI. The Division's primary responsibility will be to bring the results of completed investigations before the statewide grand jury, which I would hope will be sitting on a year-round basis, for appropriate indictments and prosecution.

The Department of Law and Public Safety, through the Division of Criminal Justice, should also have the power to intervene in the prosecution of any criminal case—a power that does not now substantially inhere in the State. The Department should have the further power, in cooperation with the Supreme Court through the Administrator of the Courts, to assign prosecutors and assistant prosecutors to handle prosecutions in any county. Thus able prosecutors or assistants from rural or less burdened counties, for example, could from time to time assist in overcoming the backlog of criminal caseloads in other counties.

Furthermore, the Department should have the power to intervene and handle any appeal from a criminal conviction in order that the maximum possible expertise may be made available on such appeals, the argument of which is obviously as important as the trial conviction of a given defendant.

In addition, through a Bureau of Local Police Assistance, the Department would have the responsibility to supervise ongoing police training programs, and to provide assistance in planning for joint local police services in a regional attack on organized crime.

Information and Crime Control

In 1966, after several years of frustrating delay, the Legislature authorized a mandatory Uniform Crime Reporting System for New Jersey. This State thus became the first in the nation to establish such a program. Law enforcement agencies throughout the country hailed this action as a major step forward and because of it the FBI was immediately able to enter into cooperative information sharing with the State Police on a basis not available to any other police agency in the country. In 1968 alone, 5,000 separate identifications of wanted persons and stolen property, including many firearms, were made possible by this cooperative information sharing.

Last year, I asked this Legislature for a supplemental appropriation for fiscal year 1969 in the amount of \$112,000 to enhance this excellent reporting system through the establishment of a Court Disposition Reporting System. This new system will provide a fingertip investigative aid to all law enforcement agencies in the State with a fully computerized criminal history of arrested persons, and will further provide essential information for New Jersey's full and effective participation in the proposed expansion of the FBI's National Crime Information Center.

The Court Disposition Reporting System which I describe is the result of one year's study conducted jointly by the State Police and the Administrative Director of the Courts and is based on the favorable experience of a pilot program conducted in Mercer County. It is essential for us to seize on this effective mechanism in the war on crime, and I therefore urge you once again to appropriate the required funds.

The Fight Against Narcotics

Last November, in praising State Police efforts in a series of major narcotics raids, I said that I am determined to take every possible step to rid New Jersey of the narcotics evil. I have previously placed before you, in my Moral Recommitment message of last April, a clear and comprehensive program to attack narcotics traffic, to prevent narcotics addiction, and to rehabilitate present addicts. I requested several essential measures—on none

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of which you took action—and I call on you today once again to move for their adoption at the earliest possible moment. They include :

1. Authorization of sixty additional State Policemen, thirty to perform undercover work in locating and apprehending drug pushers and thirty to be assigned to the Organized Crime Unit. Undercover efforts in 1968 alone yielded nearly 1,500 separate arrests of narcotics law violators and about \$13 million in confiscated illegal drugs. I ask you to let us improve on this record.

2. Statutory authorization for a mandatory minimum confinement period of six months, with a mandatory probation period of five years, for addicts who opt for medical commitment under Chapter 226 of the Laws of 1964.

3. Authorization to establish a cadre of specially trained and carefully selected parole-probation officers to supervise addicts upon their discharge from rehabilitation centers.

4. Appropriation of funds to establish additional after-care clinics for the testing and supervision of addicts on parole.

A further request included in my Moral Recommitment message—that you appropriate funds for narcotics rehabilitation centers for the reception and housing of addicts confined for the six-month minimum period under Chapter 226—can be accommodated in view of the passage of the 1968 bond issues, which include \$6 million for this and related purposes.

Narcotics Education Program

I am pleased to report that a narcotics education program for teachers was successfully launched last summer. The Commissioner of Education has in addition circulated a comprehensive 65-page reference book on drugs for teachers in our schools. Moreover, in response to a suggestion by Senator McDermott, a speakers bureau composed of doctors, law enforcement officials, and rehabilitation experts has been formed to make appearances at local schools to discuss the dangers of drug addiction with teachers and students. Further efforts of this kind—such as, for example, a continuing seminar for physicians that could be set up by the State

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and local medical societies in conjunction with pharmaceutical firms to provide advice on the handling of medications containing narcotics—are essential.

A Civil Commitment Program

The intensification of these education efforts for our young people is especially crucial, for they must realize that experimentation with drugs can easily cause enormous problems and end in disaster. Consider, for example, the heart-rending tragedy of parents who find their child addicted to narcotics. All too often the child will refuse to submit himself voluntarily to treatment, and parents must choose between the self-destruction of their child and the almost impossible task of turning him over to the police.

In view of this serious and, most unfortunately, increasing problem, I am asking you to authorize a civil commitment program for persons under twenty-one years of age provided that parental consent, and certification by two physicians that the young person is addicted, have been obtained.

Experimental Use of Methadone

The Columbia University School of Public Health and Administrative Medicine has submitted to the Narcotics Addiction Control Commission of the State of New York a highly favorable report on the use of methadone to treat heroin addicts. This report describes the successful treatment of 750 criminal addicts by means of methadone. Experts in the field of drug addiction do not all agree on the conclusion of this report, but because efforts to rehabilitate addicts yield in general such meager results, it is essential that the methadone maintenance program, for which such success has been claimed by its proponents, be examined with great care.

Accordingly, I have requested the Commissioner of Institutions and Agencies to establish such a program on an experimental basis, and under strict medical control, and to submit his findings and recommendations for possible expansion of this program, at the earliest possible date.

The magnitude of our narcotics problems, and the extensive efforts that we have made to overcome them, are clearly detailed in the Final Report of the Narcotic Drug Study Commission, which, under the leadership of Congressman Charles W. Sandman, has devoted intense energy to this problem. I ask you today to build upon these past efforts and to authorize the crucial measures that I have proposed to help New Jersey overcome the narcotics evil.

A Stronger Rehabilitation Effort

It is a sad fact that all too many convicted offenders only return to a life of crime after their release from prison or discharge from probation.

It is essential that we build upon and strengthen our present programs for the education, training, and rehabilitation of such offenders. The financial imperative for such action is clear, for the State spends approximately \$2,100 per year for each inmate at the State Prison, \$2,900 for each inmate at the Annandale Reformatory, and \$4,900 for each inmate at the State Home for Girls, while the average annual cost of probation is estimated at approximately \$300 per probationer. And the burden on taxpayers is increased when, as is often the case, the family of a prison inmate is added to the welfare roles.

Accordingly, I call on you today to enact three measures—two of which I have asked for previously—to impel criminal offenders toward a constructive and contributing role in society:

1. Establishment of a probation aide system within the several county probation departments. This program, which I set forth in my Moral Recommitment message of last year, would develop a cadre of probation aides, who would work under supervision of professionally trained probation officers to bridge the gap that now exists between such officers—who must have a college education—and probationers in disadvantaged communities. On a cost-benefit basis this program represents an extremely sound investment for society.

2. Establishment of an urban parole corps of parole aides who would function under the supervision of officers in the Bureau of

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Parole and would likewise be extremely helpful in the proper guidance of persons released from prison.

3. Extension of the work-release program, which now applies to county institutions, to State institutions as well. This program permits certain incarcerated persons, under appropriate and carefully defined conditions, to work in gainful occupations during the day and thereby to defray the cost to the taxpayers of his keep, to help support his family, and to acquire job experience necessary for a successful adjustment upon release from prison.

In addition, we must face the fact that despite the favorable employment records of many parolees in this State, significant numbers confront formidable obstacles to gainful employment upon their release from prison. Such obstacles only make recidivism more likely. To alleviate them I shall request committees from the State Chamber of Commerce and the State AFL-CIO to develop with the State Youth Advisory Council and the State Board of Control additional behind-the-wall training programs to increase employment opportunities for released convicts. I shall also request the New Jersey Alliance of Businessmen, which has worked with such success in obtaining jobs for the hard-core unemployed, to give priority attention to the employment problems of those who have been released from prison.

A Stronger Youth Program

Among the most alarming statistics of those compiled by law enforcement agencies are those that demonstrate the increase in crimes committed by young persons. The rate of their involvement in criminal activities is estimated to be rising more than three times as quickly as the increase in population. We must therefore strengthen our efforts to reach the pre-deinquent and delinquent before he settles into a lifetime pattern of criminal behavior.

This administration has constructed programs to achieve this purpose. Above and beyond the probation and parole recommendations that I have advanced, the following measures are noteworthy:

1. The creation of neighborhood education centers, or street academies, as authorized under Chapter 182 of the Laws of 1968.

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These centers provide high school dropouts with a meaningful second chance to complete their high school education and perhaps to go still further.

2. A major expansion of our vocational education program with the help of the 1968 bond issues.

3. The Youth in Community Service Act and Youth Conservation and Recreational Development Act of 1968, which together make available to disadvantaged youth new work and recreation opportunities in the summer months.

I recommend today that the State, through the Division of Youth, undertake a program of assistance to municipalities and school districts to enable them to deal more effectively with youth problems through youth guidance commissions, a number of which are already in operation throughout the State. A modest State investment, which could be matched by federal money to become available for juvenile delinquency programs, will help establish effective programs in these local commissions to engage youth counselors where they are needed; to provide training and job placement for youths that require it; and to perform other important functions that the commissions themselves designate as useful in their fight against delinquency.

The Drive Against Gambling

According to the President's Commission on Law Enforcement and Administration of Justice, illegal gambling activities provide the greatest single source of revenue for organized crime. Here, as in so many areas of law enforcement, local government must be vigilant in its efforts to curb gambling. The State Police reinforce local efforts with continuous raids throughout the State—more than 200 separate raids resulting in 667 separate arrests in 1968 alone. These efforts will become still more effective if and when you approve my long-standing request for sixty additional State Troopers, half of whom will be assigned to the Organized Crime Unit.

I shall also request the State Investigations Commission to probe gambling activities in this State and to make recommendations as to additional methods by which such activities, and the revenue they provide for organized crime, can be dried up.

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Order and Justice: The Twin Goals

Pursuit of the twin goals of order and justice is no less important today than it was at the time of my Moral Recommitment message last year. I therefore request you once again to adopt several important proposals in this sphere on which you have failed to take action, including a scholarship program for the State Police to improve police professionalism; a police cadet program; nationwide police recruitment; and attitudinal testing of policemen.

In addition, I urge you once again, in the strongest terms, to enact a measure I proposed last year to prohibit the activities of vigilante and terrorist organizations. I urge you to make it perfectly clear to any extremist groups, whether black or white, that their illegal activity will simply not be tolerated.

HELP FOR OUR COMMUNITIES

Last year you and I joined to enact a number of important programs to provide greater State financial assistance to our communities. The need for such increased State aid is clear to every local property taxpayer in New Jersey, for the rising costs of county and local governments, and the growing burdens that they are being called upon to bear, simply cannot be accommodated without a significant increment in State aid.

For the hard and unvarnished truth is that local government must increasingly pay more even to stand still, and if local property tax rates are not to become confiscatory, other sources of revenue for local government simply must be provided. I am hopeful that a responsible plan of federal revenue sharing with state and local governments, which I have long advocated, will be adopted following the end of the war in Vietnam. But this is a hope, not an accomplished fact, and we cannot escape the clear need for action on the part of State government if we are to save our local property taxpayers.

In short, to finance the services of local government the people of this State, as of every state, must choose between spiraling local property taxes, on the one hand, or increased State aid to help abate the rise in property taxes, on the other. I have long

believed that this second alternative would serve the people of New Jersey far better than the first. For high local property taxes hurt most those who can afford them least. Moreover, they distort patterns of sound and orderly growth by inhibiting business activity and driving out ratables that are essential to community progress.

I am not suggesting that increased State aid is by contrast a totally painless solution to our problems, for additional assistance to municipalities will require additional revenues. But I am convinced that the State is in a far better position at this time than our local governments to develop sources of revenue that are fairer and more equitable to the people-at-large and that do not have the serious distorting effects of high local property taxes that I have described.

Cities and Suburbs—A Common Problem

Let us make no mistake about it. The problem to which I refer faces virtually every community in this State. Although it varies in intensity from place to place, it has nevertheless become so widespread a concern that very few, if any, local governing bodies consider it anything less than a matter of the highest urgency.

The communities involved here are not merely our older cities, although they have long been severely affected by this tight financial squeeze. A large and growing number of our suburban and rural communities are rapidly running into many of the same problems. Indeed, as a distinguished Presidential panel has recently pointed out, the quality of life in our suburbs is threatened with many of the same stresses and strains—in transportation, pollution control, education, and other governmental services—that have long afflicted our cities.

We must therefore come to grips with the clear and growing need for decisive action by the State. I have expressed these views to you on many occasions, and you will have no choice but to confront them responsibly and soon.

A Continuing Moral Recommitment

Last April I delivered to you a special message on the needs of our most overburdened communities and asked you to lead a moral recommitment to respond to them. You enacted a number of my proposals in such fields as education, law enforcement, insurance, employment, and public assistance, and I expect that you will continue to support these programs in 1969.

At the same time you ignored some of my most important recommendations for urban revitalization, including certain of my key proposals in health, housing, and education. These proposals were sound, and the need for them was well documented last year. So it is this year as well, and I ask you to reconsider these essential programs promptly.

New Proposals

My recommendations in this message in such fields as transportation, health, education, and consumer protection include a number of proposals to help fulfill the moral recommitment that I called for last April, and I urge you to examine these proposals with special care.

In addition, I ask you to consider a number of new proposals for action to revitalize our cities.

State Urban Development Bank

If the decline of our cities is to be halted, and indeed reversed, the increased participation of minority group members in the management and ownership of business is essential. Today in New Jersey, as across the nation, our white citizens are twenty times more likely to manage or own a business than our black or Spanish-speaking citizens. There must be greater participation in business activity by these citizens, based on a drive for self-help, if the revitalization of our cities, and especially the most severely depressed areas within them, is to occur.

Accordingly, I propose the establishment of a New Jersey State Urban Development Bank that with the help of an initial State appropriation will provide long-term loans and guarantees, under

appropriate conditions, to minority group businessmen who seek to become a productive force in the community but are unable to obtain loans from existing sources and programs. Loans from this Bank will have a multiplier effect in attracting further funds from conventional sources of capital, and the Bank will back up its loans with technical assistance to businessmen who have received them during the developmental stage of their enterprise.

The Bank will also create a system of local development corporations for inner-city areas throughout the State and will provide seed capital and technical assistance to help support such corporations. To effect this program, and to develop further important plans in this vital sector, I propose to appoint as trustees of the Bank some of our top-ranking business leaders.

New Advances in Housing

In the past two years the State has taken major steps to overcome the problem of substandard housing. Ordinarily housing is a field in which it takes years to see results. But in the space of only a few months we have seen completed housing rehabilitation projects in Newark, Hoboken and Camden. The State Housing Finance Agency, through the use of revenue bonds at no cost to the taxpayers, already has 270 dwelling units ready for occupancy, 1,134 units under construction in Newark and West New York, and more than 5,000 units in planning or financing stages. The approval of the 1968 housing assistance bond issue will make possible further progress along these lines.

But we must take further steps to eliminate slum conditions in New Jersey. State and federal housing programs have properly begun to place greater emphasis on home ownership, but these programs have encountered difficulty with the insurance of mortgages in slum areas and the availability of down-payment funds. Accordingly, I shall recommend a Home-ownership and Mortgage Guaranty Act, based on S-818 of the 1968 session, to create a State guaranty fund that will increase the resources available to low-income persons who seek to own their own home.

The improvement of substandard housing is a major objective of our housing policy. Yet a homeowner who proceeds to im-

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prove his property is penalized by an increased assessment and a higher tax. Moreover, home-improvement loans are not readily available in high risk areas of our cities. I shall therefore propose legislation granting a five-year exemption from property taxes for improvements made to bring substandard housing into conformity with the minimum standards of our housing codes.

This exemption will be added to a list of exemptions that have already been granted to various kinds of low- and moderate-income housing projects. I propose as well that you authorize adequate payments in lieu of taxes for such new housing and home improvement activities as are possible under these laws. It is unfair to penalize municipalities that are actively seeking to improve their housing situation by depriving them of a growth potential. Under this program the State would make up the difference between such in lieu of tax payments as are presently authorized by law and what would be the normal tax yield of residential property of the same kind.

New Neighborhood Developments

The federal Housing and Urban Development Act of 1968, which I consider a landmark bill, authorizes federal insurance for planned comprehensive developments on the scale of neighborhoods, or even small communities within a municipality. We in New Jersey, with the passage of a Planned Unit Development Law, already authorize municipalities to permit such developments, which may include not only housing but also the schools, roads, and community services that are required to support a complete neighborhood. These developments, which some call "new towns," will pay their own way and may well help us resolve some of the most serious problems of overcrowding and growth in our central cities.

I have requested the Housing Finance Agency to advise me of such legislation, if any, that will permit New Jersey to take full advantage of these federally insured developments. The State, of course, would assume no risk in such developments, but substantial benefits to many citizens may well accrue from them.

Housing With Dignity

Later in this message I shall request you to enact a Bill of Rights for New Jersey Consumers. Here I ask you to protect low-income tenants from unfair treatment by a small group of unscrupulous or insensitive landlords. I shall propose legislation to encourage tenants to join together in cooperatives and to buy and repair substandard housing.

In addition, I shall request legislation to clarify for tenants their rights in public housing, as the Michigan legislature has recently done. A tenant should have the right to know, for example, the reasons for his eviction from public housing, and I propose that you ensure that right.

Finally, I propose that we reconstitute the Mobile Homes Commission so that it may continue the work in this sector that it began some years ago. Recent advances in the construction of prefabricated housing and mobile homes have made necessary a review of both the laws governing them and the needs of those residing in them.

A State Land Use Act

With the enormous pressures of urbanization in this State—the most heavily urbanized state in the nation—it is essential that we wisely control land development in our communities. More than 90% of our communities now employ local planning and zoning controls, but some planning experts argue nevertheless that we are “zoning unborn generations into the Atlantic Ocean.”

The Regional Plan Association, for example, has observed that “present zoning policies are the major block to a free housing market and the main cause of the unnecessary spread of the Region.” Our present land use laws are sorely in need of revision, and I shall therefore send to you a proposed new State Land Use Act to ensure, through improved balance in land development and renewal, that we will benefit from growth rather than be victimized by it. This measure has been drafted by the Department of Community Affairs with the widest possible consultation with local officials and private groups. It merits your most serious consideration.

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Welfare—Past and Needed Improvements

In enacting my welfare proposals last year you increased to 75% the State share of county and local welfare costs and thereby greatly assisted these governments. Your adoption of federal welfare amendments, including the work incentive program, will be useful in our efforts to restore the family unit and break the welfare cycle.

But the welfare burden continues to grow heavier, and strong remedial action is essential. I have long held the view that payment of welfare costs should be a federal responsibility, but federal assumption of the full welfare burden is not now in prospect. What is clear is that the present welfare system satisfies no one—neither taxpayers nor recipients. Indeed, it is a system that cries out for change.

To determine what constructive change is possible in the public assistance program, I shall shortly appoint a distinguished Task Force on Welfare Management. I shall instruct this body to examine modifications in the present welfare system now being tested in various parts of the country and to recommend any possible improvements in the management and administration of our present welfare system. I shall consider their mission a crucially important one for the people of this State.

EDUCATION—THE NEED TO PRESS ON

The past year has seen decisive State action toward the goal of excellence in education at all levels. Funds from the 1968 bond issues will make possible dramatic advances in both higher education and vocational education and will enable New Jersey to become a dynamic force in the field of public and instructional television under the direction of the new Public Broadcasting Authority. Exciting progress and vigorous activity are the order of the day for the entire range of educational problems with which the State Board of Education, the Board of Higher Education, and the individual boards of trustees at Rutgers, Newark College of Engineering, the State Colleges, and the College of Medicine and Dentistry are concerned.

Progress in Urban Education

The past year has seen especially important progress with regard to the overwhelming problems of schools in our hard-pressed cities and suburbs. The historic Educational Opportunity Fund, through which thirty institutions of higher learning in this State have already provided some 1,600 students of exceptional financial need and high potential an unprecedented chance to attend college, has compiled an outstanding record, and I shall request you to expand its appropriation. Other educational programs that you enacted following my Moral Recommitment message of last April—such as the Project Head Start supplement, the expansion of the Newark Skill Center, the enlargement of the school lunch program, the establishment of neighborhood education centers, and expansion of the Urban Education Corps—are proceeding with effectiveness and merit your continued support.

Emergency School Building Aid

Last year you also enacted one-half of my proposed emergency school building aid program, which authorizes the State to amortize over a 35-year period local school construction bonds to meet the immediate building needs of the struggling rural community, the fast growing suburb, and the old central city—in short, all those communities which find themselves unable alone to relieve obsolete and overcrowded conditions that make first-rate education simply impossible. My original request that you authorize such school construction in the amount of \$180 million has been vindicated by detailed requests for assistance totaling slightly more than \$200 million from 60 local school districts throughout the State. The \$90 million construction program that you enacted has already been fully committed to those districts that have the most serious problems—indeed, only 60% of their request levels could be accommodated—and I request you today to authorize the balance of the construction program so that these further emergency school building needs can be met.

Regional Research Centers

Last year as well I requested you to authorize the gradual establishment of regional research and demonstration centers to

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operate in conjunction with local school systems, and where possible, with institutions of higher education, to test new approaches and new technologies in actual classroom situations. Functioning in association with the Regional Educational Laboratory of the U. S. Office of Education but addressed specifically to the special needs of New Jersey's own urban, suburban, and rural schools, these centers would be designed to apply to the enterprise of public education in this State the same research and demonstration techniques that have enabled private industry to register unparalleled achievements in efficiency and improved performance in so many fields.

I am convinced that these regional educational centers, in the same fashion, will be able to join with any local school district that expresses interest to develop improved educational programs for its children and to insure full value for every educational dollar spent by its taxpayers. Moreover, these centers would make possible a fruitful exchange of the best ideas of individual school districts. I therefore ask you once again to initiate this regional centers program.

Autonomy for State Colleges

By virtue of the historic Higher Education Act of 1966, the six State colleges—soon to become eight—have begun the challenging process of transformation into multi-purpose institutions of arts and sciences. This transformation has been guided by boards of trustees responsible by law for the governance, control, conduct, management, and administration of the colleges. These boards are composed of distinguished citizens of great capacity and integrity who are dedicated to providing leadership of a high order.

Notwithstanding the important fact that these institutions are almost wholly supported by New Jersey taxpayers—whose interests must be protected—they should nevertheless exercise that autonomy which traditionally has been the source of vigor and progress in American higher education and without which trustees and administrators cannot effectively discharge their responsibilities. I therefore support the extensive and responsible efforts now being made by Chancellor Dungan, the Board of Higher

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Education, and the Department of the Treasury to work for administrative changes that will secure a higher degree of autonomy for State colleges. Moreover, should it be necessary, I shall propose legislation to help achieve this purpose.

Student Aid—A Realignment and Major Expansion

We in New Jersey, like all other states, have experienced a tremendous growth in the demand for educational opportunity beyond high school—and this demand will grow, not slacken. Coupled with this demand is a rapid rise in the cost of attending college, in both public and private institutions.

Our student aid programs—the State scholarships, Guaranteed Student Loans, and Educational Opportunity Fund grants—have functioned well in the past to lighten the burden for many deserving students and their families. But we must be vigilant to ensure that no student is denied access to higher education because of his financial circumstances.

Accordingly, on the basis of recommendations of the Board of Higher Education and the Scholarship Commission, I shall submit to you a plan to rationalize and expand our student aid programs. This plan will entail both a major increase in the student loan program and a greater degree of flexibility in the scholarship program. I shall request your prompt action on my proposals in this crucial field.

The Bateman Commission Report

Less than one month ago the State Aid to School Districts Study Commission released its long-awaited report.

The objective of the new incentive equalization program recommended by the Commission—to enable all local school districts, regardless of their wealth, to provide educational programs of high quality without confiscatory local property tax rates—is articulated in compelling fashion in this report. I am fully prepared to work with you in a strong bipartisan manner to support the program advanced by this report.

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The distinguished chairman of the Commission, Senator Bateman, has properly called for public hearings on this revised State support program. I am especially concerned that such hearings will pay particular attention to the effect of municipal "overloads" upon the ability of a local district to finance its educational program. All school districts in New Jersey require a major increase in State aid, but any formula revision simply must take into full account the special burdens of our hardest pressed communities.

The State Board of Education will receive shortly the report of a distinguished committee which has been examining for two years the status of school district organization in New Jersey. That Board is properly concerned that quality education is not possible where a district must limit services and opportunities to students because of its uneconomical size. I urge you to give careful consideration to the recommendations to be made on this important subject by the State Board of Education.

I also expect the Bateman Commission hearings to explore the question of incentives for the consolidation of small and uneconomical school districts—a goal strongly advocated by such groups as the New Jersey Taxpayers' Association. Such incentives and efforts by school districts would have two purposes: first, to ensure education of high quality in all school districts; and second, to guarantee to overburdened local property taxpayers throughout the State a maximum return on their local school tax dollars.

A BILL OF RIGHTS FOR NEW JERSEY CONSUMERS

"Cheaters never win!" All of us can remember this stern admonition from our childhood. And yet, at the edge of our great private enterprise system, cheaters today all too often do win, and their triumphs come at the expense of those among us who can least afford it. The housewife, the working man, the poor, the elderly, and the legitimate businessman himself—all are daily victims of a small but efficient group of specialists in fraud and sharp dealing.

The loss to any citizen of \$100 because of fraud is no less outrageous than burglary from him of that same sum. In the

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interest of both consumers and the overwhelming majority of honorable businessmen, I believe that we must act firmly and promptly.

Accordingly, I request you today to enact a *Bill of Rights for New Jersey Consumers*. The first ten articles of this Bill of Rights are measures that I have recommended to you without success on previous occasions and upon which I trust that you will now act. These measures would:

The First Ten Articles

1. Guarantee that an innocent buyer will not be forced to pay full value for defective merchandise or incomplete repairs merely because his installment debt has been transferred to a third person. This unfair condition can be remedied by a modification of the present "holder in due course" rule.
2. Guarantee the presence of public members on all professional boards so that the voice of the public may be heard and the concerns of the consumer presented in connection with the regulation of professions and businesses which provide vital and essential services to our citizens.
3. Guarantee the workingman that he will not be abandoned when he is most in need of help by providing that he may not be fired from his employment solely because his wages have been garnished.
4. Guarantee that the amount of wages exempt from garnishment reflects the economic standards of 1969, rather than those of 1915, as required by present law. Specifically, I ask you to raise the weekly exemption from \$18 to \$68 and the yearly exemption from \$2,500 to \$5,000.
5. Guarantee that the innocent consumer will be fully assured by a clear and legible label that any rebuilt or reconditioned appliance is so designated.
6. Guarantee that our elderly and retired citizens will not be left penniless or homeless because of an ill-advised or un-informed investment in a dishonest "retirement community" or other such development. This purpose can be

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achieved by requiring full disclosure of the financial resources of developers dealing in this type of facilities and the approval of such projects by the State Bureau of Housing. Such legislation will be hailed by the vast majority of honest developers who now suffer from the unscrupulous practices of a few.

7. Guarantee our citizens that any door-to-door salesman who calls at their homes will have been licensed either by individual municipalities—which now have the power to so license—or by the State.
8. Guarantee that bereaved citizens will receive from morticians an itemized list of services, and charges therefor, to be included in the price of the funeral.
9. Guarantee that those seeking to borrow money on a second mortgage will not be tricked by one who, while holding himself out to be a lender, is merely a broker for a finance company located in another State, which does not meet our high standards of examination, regulation, and licensure.
10. Guarantee, by prohibiting the sending of unsolicited credit cards, that our citizens will not be forced into involuntary contracts or thereby be jeopardized by potential litigation.

Further Articles for the Bill of Rights

Above and beyond these measures, I ask you to add to this Bill of Rights for New Jersey Consumers the following articles, which would:

1. Guarantee that those of our citizens who buy on credit, especially those who are poor and uneducated, will be given true and honest information as to what their loan is costing them.

To this end, I propose that New Jersey adopt a truth-in-lending law requiring all credit merchants to set forth the *true annual interest rate*.

Truth in lending will enable our citizens to make more informed credit decisions. At present, New Jersey residents owe approximately \$5 billion in short-term consumer debt. It is estimated

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that the annual interest paid on this debt is approximately \$750 million. Should credit costs decline by even one percent as a result of this legislation, our citizens would realize a savings of \$50 million. I caution you that this is a savings that the people of this State will not allow us to ignore.

2. Guarantee that the proposed revisions in the Weights and Measures Law, which are clearly in the public interest, be promptly enacted.

3. Guarantee that any merchandise sent to a consumer without his prior consent is a "gift" which he may dispose of in any way he sees fit without being liable for payment.

4. Guarantee the expansion and clarification of the recently enacted 48 Hour Cooling Off Period Act so that cash as well as installment transactions will be covered if they are made door-to-door. Moreover, the time frame of this Act should be amended to 72 hours so that it will conform with recently passed federal legislation.

5. Guarantee that our citizens shall not be victimized by so-called "non-performance penalties" by prohibiting them. At present, purchasers are on occasion required to pay as much as 50% on a cancelled contract when no work whatsoever has taken place.

6. Guarantee our citizens protection from unethical or high-pressure tactics while providing full opportunities for legitimate debts to be recovered by providing for the licensing of all collection agencies by the Department of Banking and Insurance.

7. Guarantee to every owner of a television or radio that he will receive fair and competent repair work by requiring the licensing and bonding of all television and radio repair mechanics by the Office of Consumer Protection.

8. Guarantee the protection of every car owner in the State by requiring that all auto mechanics be examined and certified by the Office of Consumer Protection and that they provide security bonds.

9. Guarantee the full protection of every homeowner by requiring the furnishing of security bonds by all persons, firms, or corporations holding themselves out as doing home repair or home improvement work.

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10. Guarantee protection of all drivers by requiring the clear, legible, and proper labeling of all reconditioned, recapped, or re-treaded tires.

11. Guarantee that all citizens will be protected from the harsh and unjust application of our present lien laws. All too often homeowners have been forced to pay twice for the same home repairs or improvement work. Amendments to our present lien laws to remedy this unjust condition have long been warranted.

12. Guarantee that in all civil cases involving fraud in a sales transaction, the aggrieved party shall be allowed to recover punitive damages.

13. Guarantee that every effort will be made to safeguard the public from inadvertent damage to gas pipelines by requiring contractors or other persons to notify gas companies when excavating in the vicinity of gas pipes.

14. Guarantee that the public interest will be protected in all proceedings for general insurance rate increases which, in the opinion of the Commissioner of Banking and Insurance, have sufficient impact on a substantial number of the premium-paying public, by formalizing the appointment of a rate counsel to defend the public in insurance rate increase cases. The cost of the defender should be paid by the industries requesting the rate increase in a manner similar to the present practice in public utility rate applications. The potential benefit of such a public rate counsel has been demonstrated conclusively in connection with applications for increased Blue Shield rates and, most recently, for automobile insurance rate increases, the latter case having already yielded a saving of \$42 million to New Jersey motorists.

15. Guarantee that penalties imposed by the Office of Consumer Protection serve as an effective deterrent to sharp business practices by increasing the present maximum fine from \$100 per offense to \$1,000.

Divisional Status for Consumer Protection

The Office of Consumer Protection has performed its crucial function with great distinction. During the past fiscal year the Office processed to completion nearly 6,000 complaints that were

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brought to its attention by New Jersey consumers, and recovered approximately \$400,000 on their behalf. At present, the Office, although working at full capacity, has a backlog of some 6,000 cases, and the number is growing larger every day.

Moreover, the Office properly seeks to expand its role in consumer education programs in our schools and for the public-at-large. Furthermore, new responsibilities will devolve upon the Office in connection with the Bill of Rights for Consumers that I have placed before you.

Accordingly, I ask you to provide new strength for the Office by formalizing it as a Division of Consumer Protection within the Department of Law and Public Safety. Such action would enable the Office to build upon its impressive record of achievement to date and to ensure that the rights of New Jersey consumers will be fully protected.

HEALTH—THE BIRTHRIGHT OF OUR CITIZENS

Throughout my administration I have held the strong conviction that of all of my responsibilities as Governor, the protection and support of the health of the people of this State is among the very highest. With the cooperation of the Legislature, this administration has registered a long series of notable achievements in the health field, and their successful implementation has been made possible because of the deep concern and full dedication of the thousands of men and women in New Jersey whose principal concern is the health of our fellow citizens.

I have in mind not only the doctors and nurses, scientists and technicians, and all other professionals in the health field, but also the hundreds of selfless private citizens who serve as trustees of our hospitals, managers of our institutional boards, members of distinguished boards and councils, and leaders in fund-raising drives for so many worthy health purposes. Together these people have compiled a proud record in many spheres of health activity—a record for which we have reason to be grateful.

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New Problems and New Solutions

Notwithstanding these great assets, it is clear that our health system in all its parts is confronted with problems of the highest magnitude. Rapidly rising costs and severe shortages of manpower, for example, are the rule rather than the exception in many sectors of the health field. In addition, new federal programs addressed to the training of health personnel and the delivery of health services have placed on State government, as well as private institutions, new and extraordinary opportunities—and burdens as well. Those of us who do not administer but receive health care know full well—sometimes all too well—how considerable these problems really are. And we have become increasingly aware that the outstanding medical care that our health system is capable of providing simply does not reach a large number of our people.

These thorny new problems require firm and decisive action by private citizens and government alike, for we have no more precious birthright to safeguard than the health of our people. During the past year this administration has examined with care a range of possible actions to improve our performance in the health field. With the help of both State authorities and many private groups and individuals, such as the Roundtable on Health Policies of the Woodrow Wilson School of Princeton University, I have decided upon a program of essential action. The measures to which I now direct your earnest attention—and which I shall submit to you promptly in extensive detail in a special message—are as follows:

1. An increase in State aid to local health agencies effective January 1, 1970, to \$1.80 per capita in order to strengthen the effectiveness of these agencies.
2. A bill to facilitate the establishment, on a permissive basis, of county health departments and consolidated health districts in order to realize the full benefits of regional health services.
3. The expansion of the Crippled Children's program, which provides assistance to families whose children are afflicted with crippling diseases, in order to treat a greater range of these tragic illnesses.

4. The establishment of a chronic kidney disease program to provide lifesaving dialysis services to persons afflicted with this grave condition. Without such services those who suffer from this disease will die; but because of their high cost these services are at present unavailable to many persons who would otherwise be able to live a full and productive life.

5. The establishment of a series of maternal and infant care projects, to be administered by the Department of Health, to reduce the tragically high level of infant mortality in a number of our cities.

6. The extension of the highly successful recruitment and re-training program for inactive nurses.

7. The initiation of a health services research and demonstration program by the Department of Health to develop improved methods for the delivery of health care, particularly for low-income persons, by means of neighborhood health centers and other mechanisms.

8. The creation of a War Veterans Commission within the Department of Institutions and Agencies to improve the entire range of institutional services to disabled veterans.

9. The establishment of a Health Economics Unit within the new Division of Medical Assistance and Health Services in the Department of Institutions and Agencies, which will administer the Medicaid program. This Unit will evaluate the reimbursement structure for health services and, with the approval of the State Treasurer, set rates to be paid by all State agencies.

10. The passage of a Laboratory Improvement Act to ensure the high quality of work performed by clinical laboratories.

11. Consideration by the Legislature of the advisability of a program of State support for the construction and rehabilitation of hospitals and health facilities throughout the State.

12. The requirement of a certificate of need for any proposed expansion or change in physical facilities which significantly affects the program of any health care institution.

13. The extension of the Medicaid program to include, at moderate cost, those persons who should be included even in a

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modest Medicaid program, namely, children under twenty-one in families that are made medically needy by virtue of catastrophic illness; persons who would otherwise qualify for federal public assistance programs and whose income has fallen below assistance levels by virtue of illness; and recipients of general assistance.

14. Redesignation of the Commission for the Blind—which, like so many health agencies of State government performs outstanding but largely unsung services—as the Commission for the Blind and Visually Handicapped, to reflect its true role.

I shall detail these proposals—and my further ideas for action in such crucial areas as mental health, mental retardation, vocational rehabilitation, and comprehensive health planning—in my forthcoming special message.

TRANSPORTATION—A TIME FOR RAPID ADVANCE

In its first two years of operation the Department of Transportation has amply justified its creation. The Department has organized its complex programs into an overall master plan that charts the way to essential improvements in New Jersey's entire transportation network. The overwhelming public approval of the 1968 transportation bond issue testifies to public confidence in the Department's planning and objectives. Its passage will now enable the State to carry out a major highway construction program and an equally important public transportation program, particularly with regard to our commuter railroads.

Immediate Action on Bond Issue Appropriations

The Department is fully prepared to move ahead on these vital programs with dispatch. But as yet you have not appropriated any bond issue funds for this purpose. The people's vote on the transportation bond issue was a clear indication of their desire for prompt and decisive action. I therefore trust that you will proceed immediately with this program, especially in view of the fact that every working day you delay will mean a loss of \$1 million in highway construction output.

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If you take prompt action—and if the present freeze on federal highway funds does not extend beyond June 30—the Department should be able to achieve in 1969 an all-time highway construction record of \$250 million—\$175 million in actual construction contracts and the balance in right-of-way acquisition and engineering. In view of the tragic death and injury toll on our highways and the need to complete such long-delayed facilities as Interstate 80 and 280, the Department must have your full and immediate support in its drive to move forward.

Progress in Public Transit

The transportation bond issue will also enable the Department to carry out its comprehensive program to rehabilitate and re-equip the commuter rail service to our metropolitan centers. In 1969 the Department plans to order some new equipment for these lines and to start on station and parking improvements. Construction of the new high speed station on the Penn Central line at the Garden State Parkway will be started this spring. Upon its completion in less than a year, it will provide improved services for commuters and those who utilize high speed service in the New York to Washington corridor.

Improved Commuter Service

Critical policy problems, however, with regard to the State's relationship with the carriers that provide this essential rail service will have to be resolved in 1969. The Department has already conferred with these carriers to ensure that the State's investment in these facilities will in fact produce the improvements in service to which our citizens are entitled. To this end the Department will keep close watch on the management and operation of these lines, and will advise you should any legislative adjustments in this sphere be required.

Rail Link to Newark Airport

I call your attention as well to the vital question of improved access to Newark Airport. I have requested the Port of New York Authority to reexamine its position on the construction of a rail link to the airport in view of several material factors, including

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the passage of the Meadowlands redevelopment bill, the approval of the transportation bond issue, and the major expansion of Newark Airport itself. In view of the great new demands on Newark Airport that will be associated with these developments, the question of improved access to the airport must have the highest priority.

More Than Rails

Since 1959 the State's commitment to public transportation has been limited largely to the preservation of suburban rail service. This emphasis stems from threatened loss of this service when Congress relieved rail carriers of most of their financial responsibilities for passenger operations. The vital nature of this service—which affects twelve counties and provides critical relief to our highways during peak traffic hours in our most urbanized centers—has justified this attention. We must nonetheless realize that other public transportation services are also vital and merit our serious concern.

Last year, for example, the serious financial problems of local bus carriers in two counties impelled the passage of a measure to permit counties to ensure the preservation of critical bus service. It is unlikely that this action will eliminate the need for further governmental concern in the bus sector. We know, for example, that the Lindenwold line, which has just commenced service, will have a pronounced effect on the viability of bus service in the Camden area even though there is a compelling need to ensure the continuation of bus service compatible with the high speed line. The bankruptcy of the Inter-City Transportation Company in northern New Jersey; the threatened abandonment of the city subway service now operated by Public Service Coordinated Transport Company; and the interest of Public Service Electric and Gas Company in relinquishing its bus operations—all these cases are dramatic evidence of how quickly conditions in this sector are changing.

The Importance of Buses

The importance of bus transportation to this State is clear from the fact that Public Service Coordinated Transport Company

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alone carries about 700,000 riders per day in comparison with 125,000 daily trips provided by all of our rail carriers other than PATH. It is no exaggeration to state that the economic survival of many of our urban centers depends directly on the preservation of this service.

The Department has placed our urban transportation requirements under careful review so that you and I will be able to consider in an orderly fashion what action, if any, may be advisable in this sector. I have requested the Department to complete work on the urban transportation survey at the earliest possible date, and I shall transmit it to you for your consideration as soon as it is available.

An Area for Prompt Action

In one aspect of bus transportation I have asked the Department to act in advance of the completion of its report. I refer to the provision of improved public transportation facilities for low-income urban dwellers who are seeking employment in suburban locations. The Department, in conjunction with other public agencies and employer groups, has initiated the first demonstration program to provide transportation for North Jersey residents to employment centers in the Meadowlands. I have directed the Department to explore further ways to improve the transportation of low-income urban residents to employment locations.

Regional Planning Agencies

In recent years the federal government has conditioned its grants on the existence of an adequate and comprehensive regional planning effort. Long before such planning activities were so mandated, this State moved to develop a regional planning effort to help ensure coordination of governmental actions both within New Jersey and with our neighboring states. The Tri-State Transportation Commission was created in 1961 and pre-dates even the earliest federal efforts in this sphere.

The legislation creating this Commission, however, provides for its termination on March 1, 1969, unless it is continued by action of the three member states. In conjunction with representatives of

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these states we have prepared an extender bill to continue the agency for another five years and broaden its scope so that it satisfies more recent federal requirements for regional planning. I request your immediate action on this bill to ensure the continued qualification of State and local governments for numerous federal aid programs.

There is a similar situation in respect of the Delaware Valley Regional Planning Commission, and I request extender legislation for this important Commission as well.

Action Against Traffic Congestion and Hazard

With funds from the Federal Highway Act of 1968, the Department has moved vigorously in cooperation with urban municipalities to develop programs to alleviate severe traffic congestion and hazard by means of modern traffic engineering concepts and devices. Under this program the Department has recommended that 70% of the federal funds—\$6 million—be assigned to local governments, with the remainder going for improvement of traffic control devices on the many State highways that now serve as city streets.

At present, authority over traffic control devices on county and municipal roads is vested in the Division of Motor Vehicles. But because the federal act places responsibility for approving use of federal funds in the Transportation Department, it would be advisable, in the interest of processing local projects with the maximum possible speed, to transfer approval authority for such traffic control devices to the Department, which now exercises this authority on State roads. I ask you to authorize this transfer of authority at an early moment.

Vigorous Action for Greater Highway Safety

In recognition of the frightening carnage on our highways, the federal government established a sweeping highway safety program in 1966. Through the State Highway Safety Program Liaison Office, which I created by executive order, New Jersey has moved rapidly to obtain a number of significant grants to improve highway safety. These grants will make possible projects

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ranging from the purchase of helicopters for State Police patrol of our Interstate highways, to the purchase of driver simulator devices for a local school district. These efforts, which extend as well to such important fields as emergency medical services, complement the work of outstanding volunteer ambulance and rescue squads and other groups devoted to the safety of the motoring public.

This Office has evaluated the State's highway safety program in relation to federal standards issued last year. This evaluation has revealed almost total compliance with these standards in such areas as motor vehicle inspection, registration, driver licensing, and highway design.

But at the same time there are significant gaps in important fields such as driver education. New Jersey does not at present ensure that every youth of driver age has available to him a driver education course administered by State education officials, as federal standards require, and I commend your attention to this problem. Similarly, you should examine the question of periodic driver re-examination and classified licenses, with which federal standards also deal.

The Highway Safety Office has performed its critical mission with great effectiveness during its short tenure. To date it has functioned under executive order, and I shall ask you to formalize its role in State government with appropriate legislation.

A Strengthened Division of Motor Vehicles

New Jersey's motor vehicle inspection system is widely regarded as one of the nation's best and most effective. But the enormous growth in motor vehicles in this State—more than three million vehicles are now registered—has outstripped the capacity of our present inspection facilities.

State government must always be alert to the concerns of the average citizen, and when State operations do not fully serve him, we must act with determination and dispatch.

Accordingly, I ask you to strengthen the operations of the Division of Motor Vehicles by authorizing the immediate con-

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struction of ten additional vehicle inspection facilities at critical locations throughout the State. A number of these facilities, which have been programmed in the Division's capital plan, will be multi-purpose in nature. That is, they will incorporate facilities for inspection, licensing, and driver testing under one roof in order to deliver the most effective possible service to motorists.

I believe these new facilities should be made available to the motoring public at the earliest possible date. Only a small portion of their cost, however, has been appropriated, and to finance their full and immediate construction, I ask you to authorize a loan from the Public Employees' Retirement System pension fund. This loan would be amortized over a twenty-year period at a fair and reasonable interest rate. I do not believe that this fund should become available at any time for general State construction purposes. But on an emergency basis such as here, I consider such use justified. Certainly if you intend to finance the construction of a new legislative office building by means of the pension fund, you will be prepared to utilize the fund in the interest of New Jersey's suffering motorists.

Furthermore, I shall request your full support of my budget recommendations for the Division so that the necessary additional personnel for the improved inspection and other services that I seek will be available. Those personnel are essential if present facilities, as well as new stations, are to operate at full capacity. Moreover, they will help relieve the present delay in driver testing—and this relief is another important objective of the Division. I consider these improvements in service to our motorists of top priority, and I trust that you will support my recommendations to achieve this purpose.

The Jetport—Balancing People and Progress

As New Jersey enters 1969, we are still confronted by the difficult problem of providing adequate airport facilities for our State and region. The jetport problem extends back an entire decade and presents one of the most difficult transportation problems this region must resolve. In a day and age when aviation represents the fastest growing sector of transportation, in terms of

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passengers and goods, we cannot afford to risk the economic consequences of inadequate facilities in this critical area.

A resolution of this problem, however, requires more than the selection of a site which is technically and economically suitable for development. It requires a recognition that these major projects, symbols of the interaction between rapidly growing technology and a rapidly expanding population, must be undertaken in a manner that is responsive as well to other equally important social needs, especially those of the residents of potentially affected areas. The enormous difficulty involved in striking this balance is clear to everyone who has studied the jetport question in any depth.

My desire to minimize the impact of such a major new facility on the surrounding population has prompted me to lead the efforts to locate a new jetport at McGuire, surrounded and insulated as it is by a vast military reservation, or in the Pinelands, which is also relatively free of residential concentrations. To date these efforts have encountered the obstacles of conflicting military requirements and the need that a jetport be largely or fully self-supporting. Emphasis on this latter point—economic self-sufficiency for a jetport—stems from general agreement that the taxpaying public would properly oppose underwriting the cost of any such facility if there is any possible alternative.

During the past year we received the extremely useful and comprehensive report prepared by the Economic Evaluation Committee chaired by J. Seward Johnson. I have requested the U. S. Secretary of Transportation, through the Federal Aviation Administration, to undertake an up-to-date simulation study of air space and attendant problems in view of the data in this report. I have also requested the State Department of Transportation to review and evaluate the report, and I am advised that this document should be available shortly.

Last year I asked you to authorize the establishment of a New Jersey Jetport Authority that would serve as a focal point for all the State's efforts to resolve this problem. I call on you again today to establish this Authority, which would be charged with

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the resolution of the jetport question, subject to the action of the Legislature. If you adopt this recommendation, I shall direct to the Authority the forthcoming reports from the State and federal Transportation Departments to help this body break the long-standing deadlock on this matter and bring it to final resolution.

NATURAL RESOURCES—A TIME FOR FIRM ACTION

Water Policy

The past year has demonstrated anew the need for the unified management of New Jersey's water resources. At present more than 300 agencies are responsible for delivery of water to the ultimate consumer. As the distinguished Capital Needs Commission has pointed out, no one company or supplier has either the capacity or the responsibility to develop and finance a statewide plan to protect and utilize the water resources that our people require now and in the future.

In 1958, in conjunction with the development of the Round Valley-Spruce Run reservoir system, my predecessor, Governor Meyner, recommended that the State be responsible for the development of transmission lines from those facilities to the ultimate users. The Legislature rejected this approach, and responsibility for such water transmission was later vested in the North Jersey District Water Supply Commission.

In the protracted and frustrating legal battles between the Commission and the City of Newark that have stemmed from this legislative decision, we have seen further evidence that strong water management by impartial experts who represent the interests of all the people of New Jersey is required. In recent months four bodies have examined this question in detail. The Department of Conservation and Economic Development, the Commission on Efficiency and Economy in State Government, the Capital Needs Commission, and a special bipartisan legislative committee ably chaired by Assemblyman Rinaldi have all examined this difficult problem with great care.

While the legislative committee has not yet reported, and while there are reasonable differences among the views of these other

groups, there is one unifying theme on water policy to which I adhere completely :

The State should assume responsibility for the protection of existing reservoir sites and acquisition of new sites, and ultimate responsibility for the allocation of water to all of our citizens.

The Need to Harmonize Interests

Water resources cannot be allowed to become the subject of petty squabbles among competing entities. Ultimate responsibility for the development and implementation of a master plan for water supply must be the State's. Any such plan must obviously be the product of full and objective consultation with all interested parties. It must also protect the huge financial investments and programs of the many agencies, both public and private, which have been supplying water to our citizens for many years. But in the final analysis, the State must ensure that all individual interests are welded together to preserve the larger interest of the entire State.

Accordingly, I shall present to you a water program with the following objectives :

A Water Referendum

1. Acquisition of additional reservoir sites, as proposed by the Department of Conservation and Economic Development and recommended by the Capital Needs Commission. As the Commission pointed out :

“In the past, procrastination in acquiring reservoir sites has led to the loss of sites as the land has been used for either residential or industrial purposes, and it is all too obvious that delay has increased acquisition costs tremendously. Reservoir sites are unique in that only certain areas are suitable because of their peculiar terrain. Even if we were to discount the economic effect of rising land costs, we cannot overlook the result of losing a good potential site.”

These sites should be acquired with general obligation bonds authorized by referendum.

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The Capital Needs Commission recommended such action, as well as action on the critical question of water pollution control. Last year you deferred my request to place a referendum on water pollution control and water supply before the people, but many of you expressed a strong desire to act on this urgent matter this year.

My position on this measure remains unchanged. And if you are prepared to proceed now in the same outstanding bipartisan manner that yielded such excellent results in the 1968 bond issues, I shall work with you for the passage of a single bond issue, of modest size, for these essential joint water purposes.

A reservoir site acquisition program should provide for payments in lieu of taxes to communities and counties, as with the Round Valley and Spruce Run reservoirs. Moreover, such sites should be planned and developed for multi-purpose recreational use, as contemplated by the outdoor recreation plan of the Department of Conservation and Economic Development.

Interconnection

2. Construction of major aqueducts and distribution trunk lines to interconnect existing water systems with projected new systems. As a minimum, this should include interconnection of our river basins with a pipeline from the Delaware to the Raritan and from the Passaic to the Hackensack. Such action will provide maximum flexibility in serving every area of the State and, in effect, establish a positive safeguard against drought. The cost of this distribution system can be borne either through general obligation bonds or revenue bonds issued by a State agency.

Water Plan Development Board

3. Formation of a Water Plan Development Board in the Department of Conservation and Economic Development, composed of the Commissioner of that Department as well as the Commissioners of Health and Community Affairs, the Secretary of Agriculture, and the President of the Public Utilities Commission. The Board will be charged with preparing long-term plans to ensure an adequate water supply system for all of our

citizens. It will also submit an annual comprehensive water development and management program statement. Staff work for this Board will be provided chiefly by the Division of Water Supply and Control in the Department of Conservation and Economic Development and the Division of State and Regional Planning in the Department of Community Affairs, with further assistance from other departments represented on the Board.

In passing on the diversion of water, the Water Policy and Supply Council will be guided by the Board's master plan and annual reports.

Water Board of Arbitration

4. Establishment of a permanent standing Water Board of Arbitration, an administrative agency with authority to hear and adjudicate disputes having to do with the allocation or construction of water facilities. The right of appeal to our courts would, of course, continue, but this Board can significantly increase the speed with which such disputes are settled.

I shall also submit legislation requesting extraordinary powers for the Department of Conservation and Economic Development in the event of a water emergency.

Desalinization

I am hopeful that a strong bi-partisan effort to achieve these objectives will permit us to say that this administration and this Legislature have joined together to preserve New Jersey's water assets for untold future generations. It should be noted that the State is making every possible effort to utilize desalinization processes and thus develop additional water resources. Initial studies have indicated that the cost of desalting at this time is considerably more expensive than the developing of our present water resources. By the year 2000, however, some method of reusing or desalting water may well be essential. To this end the State is engaged in joint pilot efforts with the Office of Saline Water of the U. S. Department of Interior and with the Public Service Electric and Gas Company.

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Construction of the Pipeline

One immediate problem must be resolved: construction of a water transmission line from Spruce Run and Round Valley. As I have indicated, the Legislature in 1962 mandated this task to the North Jersey District Water Supply Commission but did not provide for any State financial support. Although the City of Newark is now reappraising the feasibility and costs of its water supply authority, and although the City's position in its dispute with the Commission has consistently been found without merit by the courts, nevertheless protracted litigation threatens a further delay in construction.

Despite our statistics on projected rainfall levels, none of us can firmly guarantee that an act of God will not put our water resources in peril. We therefore cannot permit any further delay in pipeline construction. If reason cannot prevail and an end to this litigation is not immediately in sight, I shall ask you by new legislative action to provide for a prompt beginning of pipeline construction.

Wild Rivers

The State will move this year, as provided by federal law, to designate specific rivers for preservation of scenic, historic, or recreational sites. The Department of Conservation and Economic Development will include this program in the State outdoor recreation plan, and I shall ask you for legislation to provide further protection for such rivers.

Skylands

During the next decade, the need for recreational resources will increase enormously. Expanded opportunities for fishing, boating, hunting, and camping must be provided for our growing population.

I therefore call your attention once again to the Skylands plan, which I commended to you last year. Much of the land in question has already been purchased under the Green Acres program. Only the additional protection of a Skylands bill will preserve this investment and secure to our citizens these invaluable open spaces, public forests, and woodlands.

AIR AND WATER POLLUTION CONTROL— A DYNAMIC RECORD

New Jersey has rightly earned national recognition for having enacted in 1967 the country's strongest pollution control statutes, and for the fair but firm enforcement of those statutes. The Division of Clean Air and Water in the Department of Health, with substantial assistance from a pollution control task force designated by the Attorney General, has moved vigorously to prevent and abate the contamination of our environment.

In 1968 alone, the Department issued more than 750 administrative orders to persons, firms, and municipalities for the abatement of air and water pollution, and 170 penalty actions were undertaken in cases where violations were repeated or control efforts dilatory. In addition, the Attorney General, on behalf of the Department, successfully moved 48 injunctive proceedings in cases against substantial, continuing sources of air and water pollution. Upon application of the State, the court ordered nine municipalities in Morris County to cease the issuance of building permits until adequate facilities were provided to dispose of liquid wastes generated in these communities.

Improved Air Quality

Last year New Jersey adopted the first statewide regulation of the sulfur content of fuel. It is estimated that conformity with this regulation has already achieved a reduction of more than 280,000 tons per year, or 41%, of sulfur dioxide entering our northern metropolitan atmosphere. Last year as well the more than 6,000 incinerators operating in the State were brought under air pollution regulation.

In cooperation with the Department, industry in New Jersey last year implemented air pollution control devices that will prevent the emission into our atmosphere of 380,000 tons per year of solid particulates, more than 158,000 tons of sulfur compounds, and more than 25,000 tons of solvents, vapors, acids, and other contaminants. This outstanding progress must and shall continue.

Water Pollution Control

Last year the State's new water quality standards were approved by the U. S. Secretary of Interior. The key issues in water pollution control are now the regionalization of treatment facilities and the funding of capital needs. Last year the courts upheld the Department's authority to require municipalities to join together for the construction and operation of regional sewage treatment plants, rather than have each provide its own. The Department has funded and completed engineering studies for most of the State's drainage basins and has produced a plan for regionalization based on topography, population, growth trends, and costs.

As the distinguished Capital Needs Commission observed last year, the State must help defray the cost of these essential treatment facilities. This State contribution, which means so much to communities throughout the State, would be included in a water supply and pollution control bond issue, which, as I have said above, I believe you should authorize this year. Your choice is to permit water pollution in New Jersey to grow still worse, or to act now to end this scourge on our communities.

BUSINESS AND GOVERNMENT—A PRODUCTIVE PARTNERSHIP

The past year has seen dramatic evidence of the highly productive partnership between New Jersey's great business community and State government. The enactment of revisions in the corporation law has ushered in a new era of promise and progress for business in New Jersey. And other efforts by State government in such fields as transportation, education, and urban redevelopment will have enormous significance for a thriving and concerned business community. The forthcoming development of the Hackensack Meadowlands, the South Jersey Port area, and other crucial projects that resulted from our joint action last year will accrue to the benefit of business and government alike.

Landmark Measures in Banking and Insurance

You have passed the so-called branch banking bills, which are designed to provide new avenues of progress to New Jersey's financial community. I have now completed my review of the

three banking bills, and I shall sign them into law shortly at a public ceremony.

The past year has also seen New Jersey become the first State in the nation to implement a property insurance plan for urban areas in accordance with the recommendations of the President's National Advisory Panel on Insurance, of which I served as chairman. This essential program will enable homeowners and businessmen alike in our urban areas to obtain property insurance without which their economic survival would be gravely jeopardized.

Last year as well, in a landmark decision, the Commissioner of Banking and Insurance denied a request for an increase in automobile insurance rates after a vigorous and expertly litigated contest. This decision has already saved the motorists of this State some \$42 million. But severe problems in this field remain, as the increase in automobile policy cancellations has demonstrated. The Commissioner of Banking and Insurance has made it clear that he will not countenance any arbitrary cancellations. But at the root of this problem are structural pressures having to do with the nature of automobile insurance itself. This question merits your serious attention.

I also ask you to vest the Commissioner with discretionary authority to determine the frequency of State examination of insurance companies in New Jersey, while maintaining a requirement for at least one examination every five years. Present law calls for a lengthy examination every three years but fails to recognize variations among insurance companies in reliability and stability. Such legislation will enhance the Commissioner's capacity to perform his regulatory function in the public interest.

Reclaiming the Meadowslands—An Historic Start

One of our finest joint achievements in 1968 was the passage of the Hackensack Meadowslands Reclamation and Development Act, which I proudly signed into law yesterday. The Commission created by this Act can now begin to handle the enormous financial, engineering, planning, and jurisdictional problems that Meadowslands redevelopment will entail.

This Act was passed notwithstanding numerous objections by parties at interest. Indeed, the last-minute insertion into the Meadowlands bill of critically damaging amendments prompted by such objections impelled me to veto this measure conditionally, and you thereupon agreed to return to S-477. I stated at that time, however, and again yesterday, that I am prepared to consider remedial legislation to cure harmful inequities occasioned by this Act, provided that the integrity of the Act, and the capacity of the Commission to perform its duties, will not thereby be inhibited. Today I repeat that pledge.

The Act also contains provisions for the prompt and equitable determination of the State's interest in meadowlands throughout the State. The fair and reasonable process set forth in the Act will permit the settlement of this troublesome problem, which in the past has adversely affected the development of these meadowlands, and will also assure crucial revenues to the School Fund, as provided for in the New Jersey Constitution.

International Trade Corporation

The Department of Conservation and Economic Development and the State Economic Development Council have in the past initiated trade missions to help develop an international market for the businesses of this State. Nevertheless, the complex procedures and trade requirements associated with international commerce have reduced the participation of some of our businesses in this dynamic market.

I am therefore pleased to report that the State, in cooperation with the New Jersey Manufacturers Association, is moving to create a statewide international trade corporation to promote interest in overseas markets and to serve as a clearing house for licensure, documentation, and other information that will be helpful to our business community in its efforts to expand international trade.

Development of Marine Resources

I am also pleased to report that the Department is embarking on a program of oceanographic research and development to help preserve and develop our invaluable marine resources.

TO GUARANTEE OUR PEOPLE'S RIGHTS

You are well aware of the many legislative milestones we have passed on the road to the elimination of discrimination in this State. Last year I urged an accelerated shift in emphasis from legislative to programmatic attacks on the problems that beset our various racial, ethnic, and religious minorities. My proposals in the fields of education, employment opportunity, urban revitalization, and other areas all reflected this purpose—and they do again this year. These proposals require your prompt attention.

Affirmative Action

In addition, within the Division on Civil Rights itself, you authorized the creation last year of an Affirmative Action unit to promote the ability of individual citizens successfully to assert their own full rights. This year I ask you to enact a measure to eliminate the exclusive nature of Division proceedings on behalf of persons whose civil rights have been violated. While the criminal penalties provided by the Law Against Discrimination would remain exclusive of all other criminal remedies, a person whose civil rights have been violated would be free to pursue his own civil remedies or to have the Division proceed in his behalf. This measure will enhance the Division's capacity to carry out its full mandate.

I also recommend that the Law Against Discrimination be amended to authorize the Director of the Division to order reimbursement to complainants who incur provable out-of-pocket loss as the proximate result of violations of this Law. This measure would apply to the inequitable situation, for example, in which a person is denied an apartment on the grounds of race and creed and is compelled to rent other quarters at a premium over the rent he would otherwise have paid. Simple justice demands that such a person be reimbursed to the extent that violation of the Law Against Discrimination has caused him provable out-of-pocket loss.

At present the Division has no jurisdiction to deal with complaints of discrimination on the basis of sex or age. These two

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omissions of jurisdiction have put our Law Against Discrimination out of step with the federal Civil Rights Act and also with the realities of the world in which we live. Accordingly, I ask you to amend the Law to correct these omissions.

Migrant Workers—The Need for Decisive Action

This administration has taken a number of important steps to improve the lives of the migrant workers who contribute so heavily to New Jersey's rich agricultural harvest. Legislation enacted in the recent past has mandated minimum wage coverage for agricultural workers, increased floor space in living quarters, pre-certification of migrant housing, and modern sanitation and sewerage facilities for farm workers.

But as the Task Force on Migrant Labor has made clear, further decisive action is essential. To coordinate and make more effective the efforts of all concerned State agencies in this field, I have created an interdepartmental cabinet committee on migrant problems consisting of the Commissioners of Labor and Industry, Education, Health, Institutions and Agencies, and Community Affairs, as well as the Secretary of Agriculture. This administration will also pay close attention to the forthcoming Atlantic Coast Interstate Migrant Panel meeting, which has stemmed from an exchange of views on this matter between the Governor of Florida and myself. Representatives of the Governors of all states in the Atlantic Coast migrant stream will come together for the first time to discuss, from an interstate perspective, the problems of migrant labor. These problems recognize no state boundary lines, and I am hopeful that this conference may impel the states involved to develop a more highly coordinated and effective attack on them.

Legislative Action Required Now

But there are three measures upon which I ask you to act during the present session:

1. Every citizen has the right to expect that the common carrier that transports him to and from work will be adequately maintained and rigorously inspected. As far as vehicles that transport migrant workers are concerned, however, as some tragic accidents have made clear, this right is not adequately guaranteed. I shall ask you for legislation to improve this condition.

2. The New Jersey Constitution states and preserves the right of persons in private employment to organize for the purpose of collective bargaining with their employers. No distinction is made in this constitutional language between farm and non-farm workers. It is clear that, as a matter of law, seasonal farm workers in New Jersey have a constitutional right to form labor unions and to bargain with their employers. Moreover, this right exists notwithstanding the refusal of Congress to extend the protections of the National Labor Relations Act to seasonal farm workers.

I shall submit to you a proposal to ensure this right in two ways: first, by making willful interference with the exercise of rights guaranteed to seasonal farm workers by Article I, Section 19, of the New Jersey Constitution a misdemeanor; and second, by authorizing the Attorney General, upon request of the Commissioner of Labor and Industry, to seek an injunction against threatened or actual interference with the exercise of rights protected under this section. These measures will ensure that the guaranty of the highest law of our State, the Constitution, will extend to seasonal farm workers.

3. The existence of legal questions as to the status of seasonal farm workers has often served to deny these workers rights enjoyed by their non-farm fellow workingmen. There is legal question, for example, as to whether a migrant worker who lives in a camp provided by his employer during the harvest season is a tenant for a period, a tenant at will, or a mere licensee.

The unhappy consequence of these questions is that farm workers are often denied the simple right to have visitors in reasonable numbers and at reasonable hours.

I therefore ask you to grant a statutory right of reasonable visitation to seasonal farm workers. Similar legislation was enacted a year ago in Massachusetts.

I also call your attention to Senate Bill No. 553 of 1968, which would have required employers of migrant workers to insure their potential liability under the Workmen's Compensation Act. After the Senate passed this measure, the Assembly declined to take action notwithstanding expressions of support from the

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growers of this State. I ask your prompt attention to this measure in 1969.

EFFICIENCY AND ECONOMY IN GOVERNMENT

I ask you to consider today the adoption for our State government of the federal practice regarding organization and reorganization of the structure of principal executive departments. Under federal practice, the President submits to Congress a plan specifying needed changes in the organizational structure of executive programs. Congress may veto the plan within 60 days of its submission. Otherwise it becomes law.

The tradition in New Jersey of creating by legislation even small State administrative units has led to a certain inflexibility in our executive structure. Adoption of the federal procedure will enable the executive branch, beginning in 1970, to respond quickly to new responsibilities, but will preserve for the Legislature full control over the structure of government. I urge you to take this action.

Funds for the Administrative Procedures Act

Last year you adopted, and I approved in principle, a major revision of the administrative procedures of State government. This measure will enhance the public interest in all administrative actions of State government officials. You have failed, however, to provide necessary funds with which to implement this important program. I urge your prompt action on this matter.

Savings for Local Government

During the past year, the Division of Local Finance in the Department of Community Affairs has helped many municipalities maintain and improve their bond rating. Subsequent bond sales under the newly adjusted ratings have resulted in verified savings of over \$2 million in the last six months alone.

To save further local costs you should consider a measure to authorize, on an optional basis, the combination of State and local orders for equipment, books, or other materials on which bulk rate discounts can bring savings. This concept has been tested successfully in Bergen County, and you should consider author-

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izing the Division of Purchase and Property to promote State and local cost savings in this manner.

New Jersey Public Service Education Act

The growing responsibilities of State government require expert personnel, many of them in technical fields in which there is a shortage of manpower and strong competition for able professionals. For this reason, and in view of our pressing need for outstanding personnel to administer our air and water pollution control program, we established the Clean Air and Water Scholarship program.

This plan, which offers scholarship assistance to outstanding young students in the growing field of pollution control in return for work on their part in the Division of Clean Air and Water, is highly promising. Today I ask you to adopt a New Jersey Public Service Education Act that, by means of scholarship and loan assistance programs to excellent students, will extend this valuable concept to other areas of critical manpower need in State and local government. This Act will also enable professional State employees in critical fields to pursue advanced study in their field of expertise.

Commission on Efficiency and Economy

Last year you failed to provide normal appropriations for the Commission on Efficiency and Economy in State Government. This Commission has completed a number of highly useful reports on methods to improve the operations of State government. I trust that you will reconstitute the Commission and enable it to continue its important mission.

JUDICIAL ADMINISTRATION

The judicial system created by Article VI of the 1947 Constitution continues to be one which has flexibility and capacity to meet the problems of a growing burden of litigation. The streamlined procedures incident to that system, our competent bench, and the effective work of the Administrative Office of the Courts have combined to stand as a credit to the reputation of the State of New Jersey.

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There is, nevertheless, still room for innovation and change in order to secure that flexibility and growth needed to meet unprecedented pressures from increased caseloads. At this time last year I suggested that the Legislature "consider the possibility of initiating a constitutional amendment to permit the merger of the county and superior courts, bearing in mind that the judges of those two courts already exercise parallel jurisdiction in a number of areas." I renew this request even more forcefully in view of the diminishing difference in the practical exercise of jurisdiction by these two categories of courts.

In April 1968, I recommended that the functions of the present municipal court system be merged into our unified State court system. Recognizing that many practical problems were presented by this proposal, I asked the creation of a commission to study the proposed transfer and recommend the best and most effective course of action. I renew this request.

To the credit of the Legislature, it has increased the levels of judicial compensation to enable the attraction to the bench of many fine and distinguished lawyers. This process of improvement could be completed by overhauling our judicial pension system, and I recommend that course of action at the earliest possible time.

TO INCREASE PUBLIC CONFIDENCE IN GOVERNMENT

It is the public's legitimate expectation that those elected or selected to do the work of government will do so with only a single thought—the public interest. It is the unquestioned obligation of everyone in public service to conduct himself in such a manner as to justify that expectation. As a much-needed and too-long delayed reform of the governmental process, I am strongly recommending that Conflicts of Interest laws be improved.

In 1967 I signed into law Chapter 229. I stated then that this measure was no more than a meaningful first step. I now propose that we complete that journey. Chapter 229 should be amended so as to require that all legislators and all members of the Executive Branch of government having Division-head status or above, disclose for the public record the names of any and all businesses

in which they have a proprietary or substantial financial interest. This amendment would, of course, be an addition to, not a substitute for, existing requirements of disclosure for State employees or members of the Legislature who either deal directly with the State or represent other persons having interests adverse to those of the State.

Code of Ethics

In addition to the necessary improvement of the disclosure law, serious consideration should be given to the enactment of a legislative code of ethics, the violation of which would result in sanctions imposed by an impartial agency. As a minimum, such a code should include a bar against such actions by a member of the Legislature as :

1. Accepting outside employment which he has reason to believe would impair his independence of judgment as to official duties ;
or
2. Wilfully or knowingly disclosing for pecuniary gain, confidential information acquired in the course of his official duties ;
or
3. Participating by voting, or other action, in the enactment or defeat of legislation in which he has a personal interest, unless he makes that interest known to the Speaker of the Assembly or the President of the Senate, as the case may be, and certifies that in his opinion he can vote on the measure fairly and objectively and notwithstanding his personal interest.

Further, I would urge you to consider the adoption of a code of ethics which should be binding upon local officials. Manifestly, justice requires that the same norms of ethical conduct apply to these various categories of public officers.

Control of Lobbying Activities

Another matter deserving of immediate legislative attention is the strengthening of the Legislative Activities Disclosure Act. The legislative agent often provides valuable information and assistance to the busy legislator, but the public should know who approaches elected representatives for the purpose of influencing

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the course of legislation. Under the existing law, not all persons who engage in lobbying activities are required to register, nor are required reports sufficiently complete. The gaps in the existing law must be closed immediately in the public interest.

I also wish to draw your attention to the fact that under existing law many of the steadily growing number of agencies and commissions at the local government level are not required to file financial reports with the Division of Local Finance. I recommend legislation to provide the needed oversight so that the taxpayers of this State can be assured that their tax dollars are being spent in the most productive and economical way possible.

Other important matters which warrant your prompt action :

1. A return to the 60-day Rule of the Senate requiring that all gubernatorial nominations be acted upon either affirmatively or negatively within that period. No reasonable interpretation of the Senate's Constitutional responsibility to "advise and consent" can be made to justify the inexcusable burden placed upon our judicial system and many administrative agencies when important nominations are permitted to lie dormant for extended periods of time.

2. Adoption of a rule allowing the release from committee of any bill upon petition of one-third of the respective House. The public welfare demands an open and informed dialogue on the questions of the day, and worthwhile legislation should not be bottled up in committees that all too frequently fail to meet. The view that I express here was shared by Governor Alfred Driscoll, who called for a similar Rule in his Annual Message of 1953.

3. The final interment of the caucus system and all that it has come to mean in the eyes of the people of this State, who expect their laws to be written not in secret, but in full public view.

Public Employee Relations—A New Era

Last year, with the adoption of the Public Employees' Relations Act, a significant step was taken toward the establishment of a fair and equitable procedure for the resolution of legitimate public employee grievances. The Public Employees' Relations Commis-

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sion (PERC) created by this act will provide a long-needed forum for open discussion and mutually respectful dialogue between government employers and employees. PERC is reporting today to this Legislature on its progress to date, and I know that you will find this report good reason for trust and confidence in this body.

Amendments Needed

I must point out, however, that the Public Employees' Relations Act is sorely in need of amendments to facilitate its administration and to unravel certain conceptual problems that result from unclear language. I outlined many of these defects last year in my conditional veto message, and I shall now forward for your consideration a bill that will substantially improve the law.

Against Destruction of Government

But one matter cannot wait, and I respectfully point out to you today that it requires your immediate action. In my conditional veto, which you chose to ignore, I asked this Legislature to disclaim publicly any intention on its part to permit work stoppages by public employees. In light of a recent judicial development, such a statement is even more essential today. In the opinion of the New Jersey Supreme Court (*Union Beach Bd. of Ed. v. N.J.E.A.*, 53 N.J. 29), the court rebutted the longstanding belief held by many persons, including myself, that Article I, par. 19, of the New Jersey Constitution inhibits strikes by public employees. It went on to point out that while there is a common law bar to such strikes, it is clear that the Legislature has it within its power to grant such a right. The court's opinion, however, cannot be construed as encouraging such a legislative grant of authority, for it pointed out, *inter alia*, that:

“* * * Unlike the private employer, a public agency may not retire. The public demand for services which makes illegal a strike against government inveighs against any other concerted action designed to deny government the necessary manpower, whether by terminating existing employments in any mode or by obstructing access to the labor market. Government may not be brought to a halt. * * *

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“* * * Hence, although the right of an individual to resign or to refuse public employment is undeniable, yet two or more may not agree to follow a common course to the end that an agency of government shall be unable to function.
* * *”

To reassure the public and to remove all doubt, I urge, in the strongest possible terms, that this Legislature immediately declare *solemnly* and *finally* that the public employees of this State enjoy no right to strike. It is a manifest truth that the public, which is the ultimate employer of all of us, is entitled to uninterrupted service from its governmental employees, especially when one considers such vital public needs as police and fire protection, education, institutional care, and public transportation. We must exert every possible and legally permissible effort in defense of that public right, that is, the right of the government to exist at all. The establishment of PERC is clear proof that there exists an alternative means by which employees in public service can express and achieve their lawful and rightful objectives *without* bringing essential government services to a halt.

Fair Settlement of Claims Against the State

I must point out at this time my concern about the present procedure for processing claims against the State. Only today I found it necessary to use my constitutional powers to line item veto certain contested items in the Supplemental Appropriations Bill.

It seems clear that the present system of considering such claims is not fair to the claimant, to the public agency involved, to the Legislature, or to the State itself. Because of the great demand on each legislator's time, few can be involved in a claims procedure, and even these few find it difficult to devote the time and attention that some of these more complicated issues deserve.

For example, one claim approved by the Legislature which I found necessary to veto today involved nine days of hearings before the Appropriations Subcommittee on Claims, with only two members, and often just one member, regularly in attendance. No finding of component facts was made by the Subcommittee,

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aside from its eventual conclusion, and its report to the general Appropriations Committee does not contain any statement of findings of fact such as would justify, for instance, a review by any appellate court.

Unlike other items of legislation, the decision by the Claims Committee is more nearly comparable to the verdict of a court than it is to the adoption of ordinary legislation. For the fulfillment of the Governor's constitutional duty he, in fact, must agree or disagree with the judgment of the Legislature in such regard.

It is hardly possible, as in the case of one item in the present veto, to judge the merits of such a complex issue. I feel that a minimal requirement would be the recitation of factual findings which would enable the executive to understand the reasoning under which the Legislature has approved the whole or a large portion of a substantial, complicated claim. Otherwise, it is virtually impossible to fulfill the executive function of approval or disagreement with the terminal conclusion of the Legislature, as in the case of the veto to which I refer. Under present law I have no choice but to reject the issue, for the executive cannot act capriciously with \$1 million of public money.

As another example of the ineffectiveness of the present system, the claims bill to which I refer passed the Senate by a bare majority of one vote, many Senators abstaining on the issue. It is impossible to tell how the members of the Legislature would have voted on each of the unrelated items of the bill had they the full record and findings before them in the same manner that we would expect of any court or arbitration proceeding.

The courts of this State have been expressing more and more concern over the absolute sovereign immunity which now inheres in the State, no matter how much at fault it may be in any transaction.

I therefore urge you not to let another session go by without establishing an adequate claims procedure. It may be that after investigation you will decide that some type of Court of Claims or reliance upon recognized mediation or arbitration machinery is the best approach.

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I pledge my full cooperation to find a just solution which will not put the Legislature or the executive in the position of judging claims on an inadequate basis and which will not use the power of the State to abuse the just claims before it, nor to hastily grant such claims regardless of their merit.

BROADENING POLITICAL PARTICIPATION

The New Jersey Constitution states clearly that "all political power is inherent in the people." Yet certain provisions of our present election law actually have the effect of restraining our citizens from full participation in the election process and thus from exercising the power which is rightfully theirs.

It is therefore time to eliminate shortcomings in our election system in order to ensure the broadest participation of our citizens in the political process. This action is especially important in view of the fact that the last revision of our election law occurred in 1930, in the different world of nearly four decades ago. I ask your prompt action on the following measures :

1. Voting machines should be required in all counties. The inconvenience, abuse, and waste of time, money, and manpower associated with the use of paper ballots are well documented and can no longer be tolerated.
2. Mobile neighborhood registration—a system that can help encourage political participation—should be not merely permitted, as under present law, but required in all counties.
3. Registration rolls should not be closed until three weeks before election day, as is the case in New York, rather than the forty-day period that now obtains here. This change will help attract still wider participation in each and every election.
4. The unsound and unjust double standard that permits our youth to die in battle in defense of our country but denies them the privilege of voting if they are between eighteen and twenty-one should be rectified. Our young citizens today are better educated, more highly motivated, and more generously concerned than ever before, and they should have the right to vote.

5. Absentee voting requirements for those confined to hospitals or absent from the State because of college, business, or other commitments should be further simplified.

6. Permanent absentee voting privileges should be granted to all those certified by their physicians to be chronically ill, totally disabled, or permanently bedridden.

7. The burdensome statute requiring all signatures on a petition to be witnessed by five individuals should be corrected. All too often in the past, this requirement has been used to discourage those seeking broader participation within their chosen party and to discriminate against those whose political orthodoxy is questioned.

8. We must eliminate the lack of uniformity in registration and voting standards and procedures from county to county and, indeed, from community to community. To this end I urge you to establish the office of State Supervisor of Elections. I am convinced that considerable economies—and increased equities—can be realized if you will create a State office responsible for the unification, standardization, correlation, and coordination of our entire election law.

CONCLUSION

There are those who suggest that during this year, in which New Jersey will be electing a new Governor and House of Assembly, there should be a pause, a period of watching and waiting, in order not to “stir things up” lest some political advantage be lost or some political risk incurred which will manifest itself at the polls in November. These observers advise us to turn away from our problems, to maintain the status quo, and to put aside for these ten months not just our proper hopes and dreams for New Jersey, but even our plain duty and responsibility to the people. We must pretend, say these counselors, that we have done enough, that all our problems are solved or are not really pressing, that everything is all right, and that the people can be lulled into believing so.

I firmly reject this false and shallow view, and I hope that you will join me in rejecting it. For it grossly underestimates both

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the intelligence and the needs of our people, and it is degrading in the extreme to any public official with an ounce of self-respect. We are not somehow magically absolved of responsibility during an election year; our oaths of office contain no such special exception in small print.

On the contrary, I am convinced that it is the performance, not the evasion of clear duty that the people will reward at the polls in any election—including the election this November. My seven years in this State House, which many of you have shared with me, have taught me one lesson above all others—that the people of New Jersey expect their elected representatives to stand up for their rights—to stand up and be counted on the side of principle, courage, and sometimes even sacrifice.

I therefore trust that you will press ahead with me, vigorously and proudly, to do the work that we know we must do for the people of New Jersey.

A Concurrent Resolution creating a commission to investigate problems relating to solid waste disposal in the several municipalities of this State.

WHEREAS, The several municipalities of this State have experienced problems of excessive costs in providing for the removal and disposal of solid wastes; and,

WHEREAS, The problems of excessive cost in this area of municipal service have been compounded by a scarcity of available disposal sites; and,

WHEREAS, Sundry allegations have been made as to monopolistic practices of contractors with whom municipalities must deal in providing for waste removal and disposal; now, therefore,

Be It Resolved by the Senate of the State of New Jersey (the General Assembly concurring):

1. There is hereby created a commission to consist of 3 members of the Senate, no more than 2 of whom shall be of the same political party, to be appointed by the President of the Senate, and 3 members of the General Assembly, no more than 2 of whom shall be of the same political party, to be appointed by the Speaker of the General Assembly. Members shall serve without compensation, but shall be entitled to reimbursement for all actual and necessary ex-

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penses incurred in the performance of their duties. Vacancies in the membership of the commission shall be filled in the same manner as the original appointments were made.

2. The commission shall organize as soon as may be after the appointment of its members and shall select a chairman from among its members and a secretary who need not be a member of the commission.

3. It shall be the duty of said commission to make a thorough study and investigation of the problems of solid waste disposal in the several municipalities of the State, and of the condition and practices of the solid waste disposal industry in the State, and to make such recommendations to the Legislature as the commission may deem advisable for the purpose of increasing the efficiency and reducing the cost to municipalities of solid waste disposal services.

4. The commission shall have the powers granted pursuant to chapter 13 of Title 52 of the Revised Statutes.

5. The commission shall be entitled to call to its assistance and avail itself of the services of such employees of any State, county or municipal department, board, bureau, commission or agency as it may require and as may be available to it for said purpose, and to employ such stenographic and clerical assistants and incur such traveling and other miscellaneous expenses as it may deem necessary, in order to perform its duties, and as may be within the limits of funds appropriated or otherwise made available to it for said purposes.

6. The commission may meet and hold hearings at such place or places as it shall designate during the sessions or recesses of the Legislature and shall report its findings and recommendations to the Legislature, in the form of a legislative bill or bills to the present session of the Legislature.

That this House does hereby express its respect, esteem, veneration and affection for the memory of Abraham Lincoln, and does further earnestly hope and pray that the virtues which he exemplified and the principles for which he stood may continue to inspire the actions and aspirations of governments and public men in this State, our Nation and in free nations throughout the world.

1. Resolved, That the Rules of the 1968 General Assembly be adopted as the Rules of the 1969 General Assembly, subject to the following amendments thereto:

a. Amend Rule 1:4 to read as follows:

1:4. There shall be elected, at the first annual organization meeting, a Speaker, a *Speaker pro tempore* and a Clerk, who shall continue in office at the pleasure of the General Assembly.

b. Amend Rule 4:9 to read as follows:

4:9. If the Speaker shall desire temporarily to vacate the Chair during any meeting, he shall *request the Speaker, pro tempore, or name [a] another* member to perform the duties of the Chair.

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c. Amend Rule 4:10 to read as follows:

4:10. If the Speaker shall be absent for any reason he shall appoint [a] *the Speaker pro tempore or another member to act as Speaker for a period not exceeding ten days, with the approval of the General Assembly at the time the same is made; and in his absence [and] or omission to make such appointment, or at the expiration of the ten-day period, the General Assembly shall proceed to elect a temporary Speaker [pro tempore] to act during his absence.*

The temporary Speaker, so elected, shall possess all the powers and discharge all the duties of the Speaker, when the latter is absent.

d. Amend Rule 6:1 to read as follows:

6:1. The Sergeant-at-Arms shall attend the General Assembly during its sittings and such public hearings of Assembly committees as the Speaker shall direct; maintain order *and execute the commands of the General Assembly and all processes issued by authority thereof, under the direction of the Speaker or Chairman; and pending the election of a Speaker or a temporary Speaker [pro tempore], under the direction of the Clerk, execute the commands of the General Assembly and all processes issued by authority thereof[, directed to him by the Speaker].*

e. Amend the first paragraph of Rule 15:20 to read as follows:

15:20. When an Assembly bill or joint resolution is returned, amended by the Senate, the message or report thereof by the Secretary of the Senate shall be read by the Clerk and the amendment or amendments shall be spread upon the Minutes, and such an amendment or amendments shall not be referred, except upon motion, and may be concurred in *at any time, upon motion, with or without amendments, but the bill itself shall not be amended.*

f. Amend Rule 15:14 to read as follows:

15:14. Except when advanced prior to printing by special order or emergency resolution, printed copies of bills and joint resolutions and concurrent resolutions which are given more than one reading shall be used on their second and third readings, and no amendment shall be received to any bill or joint resolution on its third reading.

Upon the request of any member of the General Assembly no motion to advance a bill or joint resolution to third reading by emergency resolution in advance of the availability of printed copies thereof shall be considered until duplicated copies of the bill or joint resolution shall have been made available to the members of the General Assembly.

g. Delete Rule 17 :5 in its entirety.

2. Further Resolved, To conform and concur with an amendment adopted by the Senate on February 10, 1969, amend Joint Rule 9 to read as follows :

9. Any one or more members or members-elect of the Senate or General Assembly may, [on or after] *between* November 15 *and the first Tuesday in January*, pre-file a bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution for introduction in their respective Houses of the Legislature to be convened on the succeeding second Tuesday in January as in these rules provided. In any year in which no election is held for the election of all the members of the House, the President, in the case of the Senate, or the Speaker, in the case of the General Assembly, may fix a date earlier than November 15 for the commencement of the pre-filing period.

3. Further Resolved, To conform and concur with an amendment adopted by the Senate February 10, 1969, amend the Joint Rules by adding the following Joint Rule :

C. Ethical Standards Committee

19. In addition to the duties and responsibilities imposed upon it by law, the Joint Committee on Ethical Standards shall have continuing authority to receive, investigate and report to the Senate and General Assembly with respect to allegations concerning the conduct or activities of members of the Legislature and employees of the Legislative Branch of the State Government reflecting upon the good name, integrity and reputation of the Legislature or any member thereof which may be referred to the Joint Committee by a concurrent resolution of the Legislature. The respective members of the Joint Committee appointed from the Senate and the General Assembly shall constitute a standing committee of each House which shall have the same continuing authority with respect to receipt and consideration of allegations, referred to either standing committee by resolution of the House, concerning the qualifications of the members of their respective Houses of the Legislature and the conduct

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or activities of members and employees reflecting upon the good name, integrity and reputation of the Legislature, a House or any member thereof. In the event any allegation referred to the Joint Committee or to the standing committee of either House shall involve the qualifications, conduct or activities of a member of the committee, that member shall be disqualified from participation in the committee's consideration of such allegation and the President or Speaker shall appoint a replacment to fill such vacancy on the committee, during consideration of such allegation, from among the members of the House of the same party as the disqualified member.

ASSEMBLY BILL No. 743

To the General Assembly:

I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 743, without my approval. This bill would allow school districts to delay the issuance of permanent bonds by refinancing temporary notes for a period of up to five years, instead of the present three. For reasons set out in my statement rejecting the identical bill in 1968, a copy of my statement on the then A-302 is attached, I am vetoing this bill today.

However, I am today signing two bills which authorize both school districts and municipalities flexibility in permanent refinancing, Assembly Bill No. 816 and Assembly Bill No. 817, in the manner suggested in my message on A-302 of 1968.

It is my considered opinion that Assembly Bill No. 816 and Assembly Bill No. 817 provide the necessary safeguards to prevent unnecessary and careless speculation in the money markets.

Assembly Bill No. 743, however, provides none of these safeguards, and furthermore, it is inconsistent with the provisions of Assembly Bill No. 816 and Assembly Bill No. 817. If all three bills were to be signed, unnecessary confusion would result.

For these reasons, I am constrained to return this measure, without my approval.

ASSEMBLY BILL No. 302

STATEMENT

I am filing Assembly Bill No. 302(1968) in the State Library without my approval.

Under the provisions of Article V, Section I, paragraph 14(b) of the Constitution, this bill does not become a law if it is not signed within the 45-day period, Sundays excepted, following the adjournment sine die of the Legislature. In these circumstances there is no provision for a veto but I deem it to be in the public interest to state my reasons for deciding not to sign this bill.

Assembly Bill No. 302(1968) would extend to 5 years the present 3-year limit on temporary financing by a school district in anticipation of the issuance of permanent bonds. It would require that if the temporary financing is renewed beyond 3 years, then an amount of such temporary obligations equal to the first legally payable installment of the bonds in anticipation of which the temporary obligations were issued must be paid and retired in each subsequent year.

Experts in public debt management overwhelmingly believe that further extension of temporary financing would be a regrettable step backward. During the early 1930's when temporary financing by municipalities was permitted for a 5-year period, many municipalities found they could not permanently fund short term paper and numerous defaults resulted. The corrective legislation which was thereafter enacted included reduced limits on the periods for which school districts and municipalities could engage in temporary financing.

Historically, school districts have always tended to take the maximum period allowed by statute for temporary financing. If school districts were permitted to extend the present 3-year period to 5 years, and municipalities were permitted—as proposed by Assembly Bill No. 650(1968)—to increase from 2 years to 5 years of temporary financing, the resulting increase in the supply of temporary paper

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would tend to increase still further the interest rates on these temporary obligations.

The only valid reason for extension of the period for temporary financing would be an assumption that lower interest rates will become available for the permanent bond issues during the extended period. The bond market currently is very unfavorable and rates of interest are high. But there is no assurance that conditions will improve during the next two years. Indeed, the possibility of changes in federal tax laws which would have the effect of removing some of the advantages of tax-exempt bonds could make the market for such bonds even less attractive two years from now. In 1966, a similar proposal for extension of temporary school district financing from 3 to 5 years received strong support from some who hoped that the then high rates of interest would drop during the next 2 years. Instead, the trend of rising rates continued. If a 2-year extension had been enacted in 1966, those school districts which took advantage of the extension would have faced even higher costs in 1968. The estimated increased cost which would probably have resulted would have run as high as an additional \$2,126,250 on one Jersey City school bond issue of \$15,000,000.

If there were indications that the bond market is likely to improve within the next year or two, I would certainly consider a *temporary* extension for those districts where the 3 year limitation is about to expire. Unfortunately, however, such encouraging signs are not now in sight. In no event do I believe that a *permanent* change from a 3 to a 5-year period would be justified.

However, I would look favorably on some more minor adjustments in the limitations on temporary financing. One such change would be to provide that the 3-year period would not begin to run until a certain percentage, such as 5 per cent, of the total amount of the bond issue had been borrowed through temporary financing. At present, the first monies borrowed triggered the 3-year limit even though in many cases the first notes represent only a small fraction of the total amount. For instance, in a \$3 million bond issue the first short term borrowing might be only \$100,000 for architect fees, land acquisition, etc. A formula could be devised whereby a certain percentage of the total amount would have to be borrowed in order to start the running of the present 3-year limitation. This would result in an

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extension of short-term financing under certain limited conditions.

My staff and I stand ready to cooperate fully with the Legislature in devising reasonable adjustments of this sort. However, I am convinced that the blanket extension of temporary financing which would be allowed by this bill and by Assembly Bill No. 650(1968) would not be in the public interest.

4. (a) There shall be an X-ray technician board consisting of ~~10~~ 9 examiners which shall be an agency of the Commission on Radiation Protection and which shall report to the commission. The board shall consist of 2 commission members appointed annually to the membership of the board by the chairman of the commission, and of ~~8~~ 7 additional members appointed by the Governor. Of the members appointed by the Governor, 2 shall be radiologist who have practiced not less than 5 years; one shall be a licensed physician who has actively engaged in the general practice of medicine not less than 5 years; ~~one shall be a licensed dentist actively engaged in the general practice of dentistry not less than 5 years;~~ one shall be an administrator of a general hospital with at least 5 years of such experience; one shall be a health physicist who has practiced as such not less than 5 years; 2 shall be practicing X-ray technicians with at least 10 years of experience in the practice of X-ray technology and, except in the case of those members first appointed to the board, holders of certificates issued pursuant to this act.

(b) The term of office of the members appointed by the Governor shall be 3 years except that of the members first appointed, 2 shall be appointed for terms of 1 year, 2 for terms of 2 years, and 3 for terms of 3 years. Vacancies shall be filled for an unexpired term only in the manner provided for the original appointment.

(c) Members of the board shall serve without compensation but shall be reimbursed for their reasonable and necessary traveling and other expenses incurred in the performance of their official duties.

(d) The commissioner shall designate an officer or employee of the department to act as secretary of the board, who shall not be a member of the board.

(e) The board at its first meeting to be held within 30 days after appointment, and annually thereafter at its first

meeting in each year, shall organize and elect from its members a chairman.

(f) Within 5 days after the organization meeting of the first appointed board, the secretary shall convey to the commission and to the department in writing a report of the chairman elected, and the department shall, following the receipt of said report, issue a certificate of certification, without an examination, to each member of the board who is a practicing X-ray technician.

(g) The board, for the purpose of transacting its business, shall meet at least once every 6 months at times and places fixed by the board. Special meetings also may be held at such times as the board may fix, or on the call of the chairman or the commissioner. A written and timely notice of the time, place and purpose of any special meeting shall be mailed by the secretary to all members of the board.

(h) A majority of the members of the board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at any meeting.

3. Section 9 of P. L. 1968, c. 291 (C. 45:25-9) is amended to read as follows:

9. (a) The board shall issue a certificate to each candidate who has either successfully passed the examination, or who has paid the prescribed fee and has qualified under subsection (f) or (g) of section 8 of this act.

(b) The board may, in its discretion, issue a limited certificate to any applicant who does not qualify by reason of a restricted area or duration of training and experience for the issuance of a certificate under the provisions of sections 6, 8 or 10 of this act, but who has demonstrated to the satisfaction of the board by examination that he is capable of performing the functions of an X-ray technician in chest radiography or radiation therapy [or of acting as a dental technician]. A limited certificate shall specify the activities that its holder may engage in, and shall be issued only if the board finds that its issuance will not violate the purposes of this act or tend to endanger the public health and safety.

(c) The board may, in its discretion, issue a temporary certificate (1) to any person who qualified for examination under section 10 of this act, (2) to any person who has failed

his first examination under section 10 of this act and who applied for a second examination, and (3) to any person whose certification or recertification may be pending and in whose case the issuance of a temporary certificate may be justified by reason of special circumstances. A temporary certificate shall be issued only if the board finds that its issuance will not violate the purposes of this act or tend to endanger the public health and safety. A temporary certificate shall expire 90 days after the date of the next examination if the applicant is required to take the same, or, if the applicant does not take the examination, then on the date of such examination. In all other cases, a temporary certificate shall expire when the determination is made either to issue to the applicant, or to deny him the issuance, of a regular certificate, and in no event shall such a temporary certificate be issued for a period longer than 180 days.

(d) Every X-ray technician shall carry his certificate with him when at work. The certificate shall be displayed on request.”

ASSEMBLY BILL No. 144

To the General Assembly:

I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 144, without my approval, for the following reasons :

This bill would abolish the use of give-away games and trading stamps, in connection with the retail sale of gasoline.

The New Jersey Supreme Court decided on June 6, 1969, that games are already illegal under the law enacted in 1938, prohibiting gas station dealers from using "lotteries" and "games of chance" in connection with the sale of gasoline. As a result of this decision, those aspects of the bill dealing with games are moot, and I direct my comments to the question of trading stamps.

The legality of this type of sales promotion has been upheld by the New Jersey courts in *Sperry and Hutchinson v. Margetts*, 25 N. J. Super. 568, 96 A. 2d 706 (1953), aff'd 15 N. J. 203, 104 A. 2d 310 (1954). The remaining issue is then whether the consuming public of New Jersey would be well served by a ban on the issuance of stamps by gas stations.

In the trading stamps case just cited, the court quoted the following from an earlier New Jersey decision, *Reingold v. Harper*, 6 N. J. Super. 182, 78 A. 2d 54 (1951).

"It is essential that there be a substantial relation between the regulation and the protection of the common welfare in an area of action within the reach of the police power; and also that the means be reasonable and appropriate to that end.

"If the dominant purpose be the advancement of private interests under the guise of the general welfare there is a perversion of the power. Police regulation denotes such restraints upon property, trade or business as may be fairly imposed for the good of all. The power may not be exerted to serve private interests in contravention of common rights."

I believe these phrases appropriately set the standard for the wise use of the power of government to interfere in economic relationships. Unless there is a clear showing of benefit or protection to the consuming public, or unless there is evidence that any gas station operator is under coercion to buy and issue trading stamps, I feel that the use of these stamps should be left to the individual decisions of the competitive market place.

No information has been presented to me which would indicate that there is a detriment to the public at large, or an element of coercion involved in the use of trading stamps by gas stations. As a matter of fact, to judge from the volume of mail received by my office on this issue, the overwhelming majority of those who have written tend to favor the continued use of stamps.

Let me point out that both consumers and gas station operators are free in this State to make use of trading stamps or not, as they see fit, and if they choose to use stamps to select from a variety of different stamps offered.

There has been no showing that a prohibition of stamps will reduce the cost of gas to the consumer. There is already a variance in the price of gas among service stations today, and there is nothing to prohibit an individual service station operator from dropping his price and giving up stamps, if he feels this a better method of attracting business. No good reason has been presented to me to remove these decisions from the realm of competition.

The bill contains another defect, in that it would establish a discriminatory situation in our laws, whereby gas stations would be barred from the use of trading stamps, but all other forms of business would be able to continue their use. No one has indicated any reason to entertain this discrimination.

Finally, I have also given weight to the letters of opposition to this legislation, sent me by the New Jersey State AFL-CIO, the New Jersey Manufacturers Association and the New Jersey State Chamber of Commerce and others who have pointed out that 118 New Jersey manufacturers between them supply over 25 million dollars worth of redemption merchandise each year, providing jobs for thousands of people. In addition, 2 thousand people are directly employed in the trading stamp industry in New Jersey.

None of these economic statistics would be persuasive if any showing of harm to the general public or unfair business practices were present. But having no such evidence before me, I can see no reason why their use in gasoline retailing should be singled out for prohibition.

For the above reasons, I must withhold approval of this type of legislation.

I therefore return Assembly Bill No. 144 without such approval.

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section 1, paragraph 14(b) of the Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 598, with my objections, for reconsideration.

This bill would amend and supplement in many respects the "Higher Education Assistance Authority Law," chapter 72 of Title 18A of the New Jersey Statutes. The major provisions of A-598 (1969) would: (1) grant to the Higher Education Assistance Authority the power to issue revenue bonds and to pay incentive fees to co-operating lenders; and (2) obligate the Authority to purchase from co-operating lenders personal notes representing higher education loans made by the lenders. These provisions were designed to strengthen the New Jersey Student Loan Program in order that deserving students will have access to higher education loans even in the fast-paced and fluctuating money markets of today.

Ten years ago, when the Higher Education Assistance Authority Law was enacted, our Student Loan Program represented a near-perfect solution to a potentially staggering problem. Operated exclusively through decentralized, private lending institutions, our Student Loan Program has enabled thousands of young men and women to meet the expenses of their college educations. Until recent times no severe problems were encountered by prospective college students in their attempts to secure higher education loans through the joint efforts of private lending institutions and the Authority.

Within the past few years, however, several factors have contributed jointly to the development of severe pressures on our Student Loan Program. First, the post-World War II "baby-boom" has approached its crest, with greatly increased numbers of young people as potential college students. Second, the costs of college education—just as the cost of practically all other items or services—has climbed rapidly in the period of constant inflation running from the 1957-1958 parity base until today. Lastly, the mechanics of the money market today are fast grinding to a halt in this period of "tight" credit and high interest rates. While all these factors, in varying degrees, are responsible for the difficulties the Student Loan Program faces today, the primary problem lies in the money market.

It should be noted that numerous entities compete in the money market for the use of borrowed money—major corporations, individuals, small businesses, even other banks. The potential college student who seeks to enter this competition today does so under two major disabilities. First,

applicable Federal law limits the interest that may be paid on student loans to 7% of the principal amount. Accordingly, the young person who needs a student loan finds it increasingly difficult to compete with, for example, corporations that are not only willing to pay 10-14% interest, but also to maintain a "compensating balance" on deposit with the potential lender. Second, repayment of student loans must often be delayed until five years after the loan is executed—or one year after the graduation of the student-borrower. Yet, on the other hand, repayment of practically all other loans executed by a lending institution begins within three months of execution—and that as an outside date. Accordingly, the time-cost to a lending institution of student loans is clearly greater than the time-cost to it of other loans. For essentially these two reasons, then, lending institutions are increasingly reluctant to encumber large sums of their deposits in student loans.

In order that the record may be clear, however, I think it impotrant to note the significant role the lending institutions have played in our Student Loan Program. By way of example, the lending institutions of this State have made outstanding student loans of \$70,000,000.00 approximately \$38,000,000.00 of which bear only 5% or 6% interest. Great credit must go to the lending institutions of this State for the major community service they have rendered by continuing to make financially unattractive student loans. However, it is unrealistic to expect this record of past service to continue in the face of the present money market and the problems I have noted.

This bill attempts to deal with the probelms I have outlined by empowering the Higher Education Assistance Authority to issue revenue bonds. The proceeds of the bonds to be issued by the Authority would be used by the Authority to purchase outstanding student notes from lending institutions. The bill makes the obligation to purchase outstanding notes mandatory—including the 5% and 6% loans of which there are approximately \$38,000,000.00 outstanding. In today's market, however, it is painfully clear that the return on the 5% and 6% loans would not be sufficient to repay the principal and interest on revenue bonds issued by the Authority. Moreover, the bill does not provide for any suspension of the Authority's mandatory purchase obligation—a necessary provision as a hedge against even more serious money market conditions.

To correct these serious defects, I am recommending two major amendments to the mandatory purchase provisions of Assembly Bill No. 598. The first would relieve the Authority of any obligation to purchase student notes executed prior to August 3, 1968, which is the date when Federal law was amended to permit interest on student loans at 7%. The second would grant the Higher Education Assistance Authority the power to refuse to purchase student loans from eligible banks on a prospective basis. This power is necessary if the State is to be protected in the repayment of its revenue bonds from market conditions which would make the acceptance of 7% loans inadvisable.

In addition to these two important amendments, I am recommending additional amendments on the advice of bond counsel to strengthen the marketability of those bonds to be issued by the Higher Education Assistance Authority. These amendments provide for a reserve fund which would be guaranteed by the Legislature and a veto of all action by the Higher Education Assistance Authority within a ten-day period by the Governor. This latter provision is one in force for almost all State and inter-state authorities.

Assembly Bill No. 598, if amended in accordance with my recommendations, would permit the Higher Education Assistance Authority to make direct loans to students. This power is included in order that catastrophic market conditions, should they occur, will not preclude students from obtaining loans. The power to make direct loans should only be used under those conditions where it is clearly impossible for New Jersey lending institutions to issue student loans because of the unattractive rate of return.

I am also recommending amendments which would establish the independence of the reserve fund which is maintained by statute at a constant \$6 million level for guaranteeing student loans against default. This fund should be maintained separately from the reserve fund being recommended for covering the Authority's obligations in the repayment of its revenue bonds.

I note that Assembly Bill No. 598 also authorizes the Higher Education Assistance Authority the discretion to pay incentive fees to lending institutions. These fees would have the effect of increasing the rate of return to banks on student loans. However, no appropriation was made for these fees and it is not possible for the proceeds from

revenue bond sales to be used for these purposes. The Legislature should understand that a significant program of incentive fees might cost hundreds of thousands of dollars in the first year and would increase substantially in subsequent years.

In making the following recommendations, I have considered carefully the most economical approach for the State of New Jersey, the needs of our prospective college students, and the creditable service of New Jersey lending institutions. I have consulted with representatives of New Jersey lending institutions and the chief sponsor of Assembly Bill No. 598, Assemblyman Ewing. They understand the deficiencies which I have outlined and agree that remedial action must be taken in accordance with my recommendations.

Accordingly, I herewith return the measure for reconsideration and with the recommendation that it be amended as follows:

On page 1, section 1, line 9, after "includes", insert "the authority and".

On page 2, section 2, line 7, after "constitute", delete "a political subdivision of the State established as".

On page 2, section 2, line 8, after "instrumentality", insert "of the State".

On page 3, section 3, line 6, after "or", insert "(a)".

On page 3, section 3, line 8, after "or", insert "(c) as shall be loaned to the authority by any other agency or authority of the State, or (d) as shall be received by the authority from".

On page 3, section 3, line 10, after "law," insert "or (e) as shall be received by the authority from the resale of its participation notes in approved loans made pursuant to this chapter, or (f) as shall be re-

(d) For purposes of valuation, investments in the reserve fund shall be valued at the lowest of the par value, cost to the authority or market value of such investments. Valuation on any particular date shall include the amount of interest then earned or accrued to such date on any moneys or investments in the reserve fund.

(e) Notwithstanding any other provisions contained in this act, no bonds shall be issued by the authority unless there is in the reserve fund the maximum debt service reserve for all bonds then issued and outstanding and the bonds about to be issued, provided, however, that nothing herein shall prevent or preclude the

The chairman shall annually, on or before December 1, make and deliver to the Governor his certificate stating the sums, if any, required to restore said fund to the amount aforesaid, and the sum or sums so certified shall be appropriated and paid to the authority during the then current State fiscal year.

ASSEMBLY BILL No. 306

To the General Assembly:

I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 306, without my approval, for the following reasons:

This bill seeks to impose upon every passenger air carrier a "service fee" of from \$.50 to \$2.00 for each passenger embarking from an airport located in one or more municipalities with a population of 100,000 or more. Such "fee" would be in the amount of \$1.00 for each passenger to be carried within the United States, \$2.00 for each passenger for an overseas destination, and \$.50 for each helicopter passenger. The air carriers would be authorized to collect these amounts from their individual passengers.

I believe that the record of this Administration is clear with regard to the needs of our urban areas, and, particularly, our State's largest city. I have proposed time and again legislation, some of it unpopular, which would provide significant aid to our hard-pressed cities and local tax-

payers. For if we do not cure the sickness in our urban areas, it will surely spread to all of the State. My proposals have, in most instances, been rejected. Now the Legislature comes forward with a bill designed to aid the cities of Newark and Elizabeth which is clearly unconstitutional on its face and is, in effect, a cruel hoax on citizens of these communities. For if I were to sign this bill, not only would these cities never receive one nickel, but, in fact, we would actually be adding to their burden by thousands of dollars in legal fees in a futile attempt to prove a point on which the courts of the United States have not varied from 1849 to the most recent decision in 1969.

Although the amounts required to be collected under this bill are termed "service fee", there can be no question that the bill constitutes a direct tax upon interstate and foreign commerce.

It is well established that there exists as an attribute of national citizenship the right to travel in interstate and foreign commerce free of restraints or burdens imposed by the several states. This right was first recognized in *The Passenger Cases*, 48 U. S. 283 (1849), which held that a head tax imposed upon every arriving ship passenger was invalid. Mr. Chief Justice Taney, although believing that a state might validly tax aliens, held that all citizens possess "the right to pass and repass through every part of it [the United States] without interruption" and that "a tax imposed by a State for entering its territories or harbors is inconsistent with the rights which belong to the citizens of other States as members of the Union." (p. 492).

This statement became the holding of *Crandall v. Nevada*, 73 U. S. 35 (1867), which is precisely on point. Nevada levied a tax of \$1.00 upon every person leaving the state by means of common carrier. As in the proposed legislation, liability for the payment of the tax was placed on the carriers who, however, were authorized to collect it from the passengers. In striking down this law, the Supreme Court said:

"He [the citizen] has the right to come to the seat of government to assert any claim he may have upon that government, or to transact any business he may have with it. To seek its protection, to share its offices, to engage in administering its functions, he has a right of free access . . . and this right is in its nature in-

dependent of the will of any state over whose soil he must pass in the exercise of it." (p. 44)

This problem was reaffirmed as recently as the Supreme Court decision April 21, 1969, in *Shapiro v. Thompson*, 37 Law Week, 4333, invalidating residency requirements for the receipt of welfare benefits as an infringement of the right of travel and as a denial of legal protection.

This right insofar as interstate travel is concerned has been further strengthened by repeated Supreme Court decisions of great significance. Thus, *Twining v. New Jersey*, 211 U. S. 78 (1908), stated that "among the rights and privileges of national citizenship recognized by this court are the right to pass freely from state to state . . ." (p. 97). In *Edwards v. California*, 314 U. S. 160 (1941), the concurring opinion stated "the right to move freely from state to state is an incident of *national* citizenship protected by the privileges and immunities clause of the Fourteenth Amendment against State interference." (p. 178). *United States v. Guest*, 383 U. S. 745 (1966), held that "[T]he constitutional right to travel from one State to another . . . occupies a position fundamental to the concept of our Federal Union." (p. 757).

And insofar as foreign travel is concerned, the imposition of a State tax upon international passengers was held invalid in *Henderson v. Wickham*, 92 U. S. 259 (1875), *Chy Lung v. Freeman*, 92 U. S. 276 (1875), and *People v. Compagnie General Transatlantique*, 107 U. S. 59 (1883).

There are no cases to the contrary.

In addition to violating the fundamental right of the citizen to travel, the act also creates an arbitrary and invalid discrimination in violation of the equal protection clause of the Federal Constitution. This discrimination is aimed at departing commercial air passengers as opposed to arriving passengers. It also creates an arbitrary and unjustified discrimination among the subclasses of passengers covered by the act. There seems no reason, in fact or in theory, to impose a charge on departing passengers but not against others similarly situated with respect to airport facilities such as arriving passengers, general aviators, and visitors to the airport.

The bill, since it limits this tax only to Newark airport, also creates an invalid discrimination with regard to all the

other airports from which commercial passenger flights depart in New Jersey.

Finally, the tax levied by this bill, although termed a "service charge," bears no reasonable relation to the use of airport facilities or to any expenditure which may be borne by the city or the State in connection with the operation of the airport. Therefore, it is in violation of the Commerce Clause of the Federal Constitution.

It has long been held, with respect to state fees for the use of highways and other state facilities, that the formula or classification adopted by the state must bear a reasonable relation to the use of such facilities, *McCarroll v. Dixie Greyhound Lines, Inc.*, 309 U. S. 176 (1940), *Interstate Transit, Inc. v. Lindsey*, 283 U. S. 183 (1931). As noted above, the charge imposed by the act is entirely arbitrary and bears no conceivable relationship to the actual use made of airport facilities either by passengers or by carriers, nor are funds raised by it required to be devoted to airport uses. It differs significantly from highway and waterway use charges upheld as permissible, in which the amount of the fee is based on mileage, weight, or some other factor related to actual use.

The discrimination in the application of this tax makes it plain that actual use has not been considered at all. There is no tax burden whatsoever on air cargo freight or people who handle it when clearly this is a use of the airport and its facilities. Further, the sponsors of this legislation have made no showing, nor could a reasonable man make a showing, that an international traveler will somehow make greater use of the airport facilities and should, therefore, be taxed twice as much as a domestic traveler. This list of inequities, incongruities, and injustices could be developed at great length, but I believe that the unconstitutional nature of this act has already been most clearly established.

It has been argued both on the floor of the Legislature and to me personally that it is solely the province of the courts to decide constitutionality, and that it is not my function to interpose judgment but that I should merely let the courts decide. I would point out to people who hold this view that both I, as Governor, and the members of the Legislature are sworn to uphold the Constitution of the United States. It is folly, therefore, for either of us to overlook our plain duty in the face of an obviously unconstitutional act in an attempt to curry fleeting favor with

voters or to avoid the hard issues of significant aid to our urban areas.

I cannot be persuaded that I should stand aside from my constitutional duty and certify to a long costly and fruitless court battle, a measure which will never produce one cent of revenue for the cities of Newark or Elizabeth. For a court injunction would issue the very first day staying the collection of this tax until the inevitable negative decision was rendered.

Thus, for example, when the State of Indiana only last year attempted to impose a charge of \$1.00 on every departing passenger from Dress Memorial Airport in Evansville, a suit was immediately brought by the air carriers affected and the collection of that tax was permanently enjoined and the ordinance held to violate the United States and Indiana Constitutions. Not one cent was ever collected.

I believe, therefore, that it is my plain duty, as it should have been the Legislature's, to refuse to approve this obviously unconstitutional act. Other public officials in similar situations have not shied from this duty. Thus, in recent years formal opinions by the City Attorney of the City of Los Angeles, by the Attorney General of the State of North Carolina, by the Attorney General of the State of Washington, and by the Attorney General of the State of Hawaii, have all held similar legislation to be an unconstitutional burden on interstate commerce and on the right of travel of all citizens.

Nowhere is there reported one instance where such legislation has been held constitutional in any state of the United States.

I trust members of the Legislature will join with me in seeking to aid Newark and our other urban areas with real rather than false and illusory programs.

For the above reasons, I must withhold approval of this type of legislation.

I therefore return Assembly Bill No. 306 without such approval.

WHEREAS, The Honorable Albert McCay, a former member of this House, departed this life on October 21, 1969, at the age of 68; and,

WHEREAS, A native of Philadelphia, Senator McCay resided in Burlington County from infancy, was educated in the public schools of Mansfield Township and Burlington City and in 1931 became a member of the New Jersey Bar and was for 38 years, until his death, an active practicing attorney of this State; and,

WHEREAS, Senator McCay began his career of public service as municipal attorney for several Burlington County municipalities, and was elected in 1944 by the people of his County to represent them in the General Assembly, where he served for four years; and,

WHEREAS, From 1952 through 1958 Senator McCay represented Burlington County in the State Senate, where he attained positions of leadership and was majority leader in 1956 and President of the Senate in 1957, in which latter capacity he also served as Acting Governor of this State; and,

WHEREAS, A diligent, skilled and effective legislator, Senator McCay was instrumental in effecting many significant legislative enactments permanently benefitting the people of this State; and,

WHEREAS, Among the distinguished achievements of his legislative leadership was his role as chairman of the N. J. Commission on Legislative Procedure and Research, the report of which in 1954 led to various improvements in the conduct of the legislative business of the State and to the establishment of the Law Revision and Legislative Services Commission, of which Senator McCay became the first Chairman; and,

WHEREAS, In addition to his public service as legislator and as municipal attorney, Senator McCay also served for many years as a member of the Board of Education in the Borough of Palmyra; now, therefore,

Be It Resolved by the General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

That this House hereby notes with sorrow the passing of a former member and distinguished public servant, expresses on behalf of the people of New Jersey their present grief at his death and their eternal gratitude for his services, and extends sympathy to his widow, Grace M. Stang McCay and to his two sons and two daughters; and,

ASSEMBLY BILL No. 459

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 (b) of the Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 459, with my objections, for reconsideration.

This bill would permit any domestic or foreign surety company, qualified to transact business in this State, to become surety as to any guarantee arrest bond certificates issued by any automobile club or association in any amount not exceeding \$200. The form of the bond is to be pre-

scribed by the Commissioner of Banking and Insurance. The bill further provides that any guarantee arrest bond certificate so issued, shall be accepted in lieu of cash bail or other bond in all courts of this State when the person is arrested for violation of any State motor vehicle law or any municipal motor vehicle ordinance, except driving under the influence of liquors, or drugs, or any high misdemeanor. These certificates are to be subject to the same forfeiture and enforcement provisions provided by law with respect to bail bonds in criminal cases.

When automobile clubs or associations issue guarantee arrest bond certificates they really act as agents for surety companies. Surety bonds are essentially contracts of insurance against loss by reason of a breach of duty or of an obligation. In this case, the bond guarantees the appearance of a person accused of the violation of any motor vehicle law so as to enable him to enjoy personal freedom pending his trial. Accordingly, agents who procure such insurance should be subject to regulation similar to that which governs other insurance agents. NJSA 17:22-6.6. The amendment I have offered below makes clear that the Commissioner has the power to exert that minimal degree of regulatory supervision which is necessary to protect the interests of the motoring public.

Accordingly, I respectfully recommend the following change in Assembly Bill No. 459:

Page 1, Section 2, line 2: After "insurance" add ", and subject to such regulations as he shall from time to time prescribe in regard thereto,"

ASSEMBLY BILL No. 443 (OCR)

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(b) of the Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 443, without my approval, for reconsideration.

Assembly Bill No. 443 is intended to authorize licensed motor vehicle dealers to issue temporary 20-day registration of automobiles prior to permanent registration with the Division of Motor Vehicles. As originally introduced, the bill was limited to non-residents purchasing an automobile in New Jersey en route to another state. Subsequent Assembly amendments extended the terms of the bill to allow temporary registration for residents and non-residents alike.

The original intent of the bill was to allow New Jersey automobile dealers to compete effectively with those in other states who have similar privileges for out-of-state purchasers. I join completely in the effort to make it possible for our own businessmen to meet competition from other jurisdictions. Moreover, there is no reason why a non-resident—who must register in his home state—should be required to secure permanent registration in New Jersey in order to legally drive his car home. However, I cannot accept the result of the Assembly amendments which extended the temporary registration privileges provided by Assembly Bill No. 443 to New Jersey residents as well. This step would serve only to add an additional \$5.00 to the purchase price of an automobile bought by a New Jersey resident, since he would eventually still have to pay the permanent registration fee and still have to make the trip to the motor vehicle agency for permanent registration. In addition, the New Jersey resident as taxpayer would also have to pay for the cost of the supervision of some 3,500 motor vehicle dealers under this act. Not only must forms be provided, fees collected and guidelines enforced, but the problem of keeping track of the number and ownership of vehicles on our roads would be considerably complicated.

In addition, there are numerous technical defects in the bill as it is now drafted. It would appear, for instance, that a licensed dealer could issue a temporary registration certificate but the Director of Motor Vehicles could not. Furthermore, amendments of Title 39 made by P. L. 1969, c. 103 have not been incorporated. Moreover, the terms "automobile" and "motor vehicle" are used interchangeably in Assembly Bill No. 443 despite the fact that under the definitions of Section 39:1-1 of the Revised Statutes they have quite different meanings and implications.

Therefore, I respectfully recommend the following changes, which would extend the privilege of temporary registration to non-residents and correct these and other technical defects:

1. *Page 1, Section 1, Line 1:* After the word "Any" and before the word "nonresident" delete the phrase "person, resident or".

2. *Page 1, Section 1, Lines 2 and 3:* After the word "State" and before the word "from" insert the phrase "while en route to another State or Federal District".

3. *Page 1, Section 1, Line 10:* After the word "mobile" and before the word "including" delete the phrase "or motorcycle".

4. *Page 1, Section 1, Line 15:* After the word "carrier," delete the word "which".

5. *Page 1, Section 1, Lines 16 to 22:* Delete the present language and insert in lieu thereof the phrase "and said application shall contain the name of the insurer of said vehicle and the policy number."

6. *Page 1, Section 1, Line 23:* After the word "terminated," delete the phrase "the owner of such".

7. *Page 2, Section 1, Line 24:* Before the phrase "the insurer shall" delete the phrase "vehicle shall notify the director within 5 days, and".

8. *Page 2, Section 1, Line 25:* After the word "termination" delete "; pro-" and insert in lieu thereof a ".".

9. *Page 2, Section 1, Lines 26 to 34:* Delete the present language in its entirety.

10. *Page 2, Section 1, Line 35:* After the word “the” and before the phrase “licensed dealer” insert the phrase “director or”.

11. *Page 2, Section 1, Line 37:* After the word “any” and before the word “if” delete the phrase “motor vehicle” and insert in lieu thereof the word “automobile”.

12. *Page 2, Section 1, Line 40:* After the word “the” and before the word “fee” delete “\$5.00”.

13. *Page 2, Section 1, Line 49:* After the word “registration” insert the phrase “pursuant to Section 39:3-4 of the Revised Statutes, and after payment of the fees prescribed therein.”

14. *Page 2, Section 1, Line 50:* After the word “issue” and before the word “registration” insert the word “temporary”.

15. *Page 2, Section 2, Line 7:* After the word “his” and before the word “or” delete the word “right” and insert in lieu thereof the word “privilege”.

16. *Page 2, Section 2, Line 8:* After the word “plates.” insert the following sentences: “The director shall also annually determine the fee to be charged and paid pursuant to this act, except that no such fee shall exceed the actual cost to the State of New Jersey of implementing and enforcing the terms and provisions of this act. All monies received by such licensed dealers for temporary registrations, certificates and plates granted under the provisions of this act shall forthwith be deposited as received with the State Treasurer.”

17. *Page 2, Section 3, Line 2:* After the word “agency” insert the phrase “or agent designated pursuant to Section 39:3-3 of the Revised Statutes.”

ASSEMBLY BILL No. 536

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(b) of the Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 536, with my objections, for reconsideration.

Assembly Bill No. 536 would give standing to any citizen of a municipality to institute any appropriate action for the enforcement of a local zoning ordinance (RS 40:55-47). The statement appended to the bill indicates that its intent was to reverse the holding of *Cranford v. Errico*, 94 N.J. Super. 395 (Cty. Ct. 1967); *contra*, *State v. Seich*, 98 N. J. Super. 466 (Cty. Ct. 1967).

The remedies which may be invoked pursuant to RS 40:55-47 are both civil and criminal in nature. Thus, a municipality may seek to impose a fine on the theory that a violation of a zoning ordinance is a criminal violation of a municipal ordinance. This power, however, is supplemented by the power to seek an injunction, a civil order of the court directing a landowner to take certain steps in order to correct any violations of the zoning ordinance on his property, *Borough of Alpine v. Brewster*, 7 N.J. 42 (1951). The intent of the statute in question was to provide the municipality with this additional civil remedy.

Individual abutting landowners have always had standing to seek an injunction when their own property was affected, *Stokes v. Jenkins*, 107 N.J. Eq. 318 (1931). The language of Assembly Bill No. 536, however, would appear to extend the right to a civil remedy and an injunction to any citizen of the municipality, abandoning the requirement that an individual's property be directly affected. This appears to be too broad an expansion of the right to seek an injunction in any civil matter. Conversely, the limitation of the remedy to "any citizen of the municipality" would appear to create the possibility that a person residing in another municipality, whose property is affected and abutting, would have no remedy, simply because he is across an invisible

municipal boundary, see *Borough of Cresskill v. Borough of Dumont*, 28 N.J. Super. 26, aff'd. 15 N.J. 238 (1953).

It is my belief that this was not the intent of the sponsor. Therefore, I would respectfully recommend the following changes:

Page 1, Section 2, Lines 2 and 3: Delete the present language and insert in lieu thereof the following:

“The term ‘other interested party’ in a criminal or quasi-criminal proceeding shall include: (a) any citizen of the State of New Jersey; and (b) in the case of a civil proceeding in any court or in an administrative proceeding before a municipal agency, any person, whether residing within or without the municipality, whose right to use, acquire, or enjoy property is or may be effected by any action taken under the act to which this act is a supplement, or whose rights to use, acquire, or enjoy property under the act to which this act is a supplement, or under any other law of this State of the United States; have been denied, violated or infringed by an action or a failure to act under the act to which this act is a supplement.”

WHEREAS, In an action March 9, 1968, when the Battalion to which Captain Jacobs was attached came under devastating fire and suffered heavy casualties, Captain Jacobs, although himself wounded by mortar fire, assumed command of a company whose commander had been wounded, succeeded in establishing a defensive perimeter, and, with complete disregard for his own safety, made repeated trips across fire-swept open rice paddies to evacuate the wounded and their weapons, and on 3 separate occasions encountered and drove off Viet Cong squads who were searching for the Allied wounded and their weapons; and,

WHEREAS, Through his gallant efforts and extraordinary heroism Captain Jacobs restored the fighting effectiveness of the Allied Company and prevented its defeat, and saved

the life of 13 Allied soldiers and another United States advisor; and,

WHEREAS, Captain Jacobs, by his conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity in action in the highest traditions of military service, has reflected great credit upon himself, his unit and the United States Army, and has provided to all citizens an outstanding example of patriotic devotion; and

WHEREAS, Captain Jacobs was suitably honored by his fellow-citizens of Woodbridge Township at ceremonies on Veterans Day, November 11, 1969, on which occasion he delivered a speech which helped the people of New Jersey to appreciate the nature of this Nation's involvement in the hostilities in Viet Nam; and,

WHEREAS, Such feats of gallantry as were performed by Captain Jacobs deserve the highest honors and praise which it is possible to bestow; now, therefore,

Be It Resolved by the General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

That this House praises and commends the conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity of Captain Jacobs, and expresses on behalf of the people of New Jersey the gratitude of his fellow-citizens for his extraordinary accomplishments, above and beyond the call of duty, in the service of our country; and

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(b) of the Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 599, with my objections, for reconsideration.

This bill is intended as an amendment to Section 4 of Chapter 177 of the Laws of 1968 which I approved on July 19, 1968. Assembly Bill No. 443 is intended to authorize licensed motor vehicle dealers to issue temporary 20-day registration of automobiles prior to permanent registration with the Division of Motor Vehicles. As originally introduced, the bill was limited to non-residents purchasing an automobile in New Jersey en route to another state. Subsequent Assembly amendments extended the terms of the bill to allow temporary registration for residents and non-residents alike.

The original intent of the bill was to allow New Jersey automobile dealers to compete effectively with those in other states who have similar privileges for out-of-state purchasers. I join completely in the effort to make it possible for our own businessmen to meet competition from other jurisdictions. Moreover, there is no reason why a non-resident—who must register in his home state—should be required to secure permanent registration in New Jersey in order to legally drive his car home. However, I cannot accept the result of the Assembly amendments which extended the temporary registration privileges provided by Assembly Bill No. 443 to New Jersey residents as well. This step would serve only to add an additional \$5.00 to the purchase price of an automobile bought by a New Jersey resident, since he would eventually still have to pay the permanent registration fee and still have to make the trip to the motor vehicle agency for permanent registration. In addition, the New Jersey resident as taxpayer would also have to pay for the cost of the supervision of some 3,500 motor vehicle dealers under this act. Not only must forms be provided, fees collected and guidelines enforced, but the problem of keeping track of the number and ownership of vehicles on our roads would be considerably complicated.

In addition, there are numerous technical defects in the bill as it is now drafted. It would appear, for instance, that a licensed dealer could issue a temporary registration certificate but the Director of Motor Vehicles could not. Furthermore, amendments of Title 39 made by P. L. 1969, c. 103 have not been incorporated. Moreover, the terms “automobile” and “motor vehicle” are used interchangeably in Assembly Bill No. 443 despite the fact that under the definitions of Section 39:1-1 of the Revised Statutes they have quite different meanings and implications.

Therefore, I respectfully recommend the following changes, which would extend the privilege of temporary registration to non-residents and correct these and other technical defects:

1. *Page 1, Section 1, Line 1:* After the word "Any" and before the word "nonresident" delete the phrase "person, resident or".

2. *Page 1, Section 1, Lines 2 and 3:* After the word "State" and before the word "from" insert the phrase "while en route to another State or Federal District".

3. *Page 1, Section 1, Line 10:* After the word "mobile" and before the word "including" delete the phrase "or motorcycle".

4. *Page 1, Section 1, Line 15:* After the word "carrier," delete the word "which".

5. *Page 1, Section 1, Lines 16 to 22:* Delete the present language and insert in lieu thereof the phrase "and said application shall contain the name of the insurer of said vehicle and the policy number."

6. *Page 1, Section 1, Line 23:* After the word "terminated," delete the phrase "the owner of such".

7. *Page 2, Section 1, Line 24:* Before the phrase "the insurer shall" delete the phrase "vehicle shall notify the director within 5 days, and".

8. *Page 2, Section 1, Line 25:* After the word "termination" delete "; pro-" and insert in lieu thereof a ".".

9. *Page 2, Section 1, Lines 26 to 34:* Delete the present language in its entirety.

10. *Page 2, Section 1, Line 35:* After the word "the" and before the phrase "licensed dealer" insert the phrase "director or".

11. *Page 2, Section 1, Line 37:* After the word "any" and before the word "if" delete the phrase "motor vehicle" and insert in lieu thereof the word "automobile".

12. *Page 2, Section 1, Line 40:* After the word "the" and before the word "fee" delete "\$5.00".

13. *Page 2, Section 1, Line 49:* After the word "registration" insert the phrase "pursuant to Section 39:3-4 of

the Revised Statutes, and after payment of the fees prescribed therein.”

14. *Page 2, Section 1, Line 50:* After the word “issue” and before the word “registration” insert the word “temporary”.

15. *Page 2, Section 2, Line 7:* After the word “his” and before the word “or” delete the word “right” and insert in lieu thereof the word “privilege”.

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(b) of the Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 16 with my objections for reconsideration.

Assembly Bill No. 16 amends and supplements the General Noncontributory Pension Act as adopted in 1956, providing that retirement allowances may be increased or decreased by ordinance to reflect increases or decreases in the cost of living, based on consumer price indices of the United States Department of Labor.

Although I support the intent of this bill, the index on which such an increase or decrease is based should be uniform within the municipality and throughout the State. In 1955 the Study Commission that recommended the repeal of more than 100 special pension bills and the enactment of the General Noncontributory Act purposely provided for no discrimination between pensioners of any particular municipality or agency since this was a free pension to be provided by the taxpayers and towards which the employee had not made any contribution. The only discretion to be exercised was the enactment of the legislation with respect to its application in any particular community. Assembly Bill No. 16 would defeat this recognized need for consistency by permitting a municipality to utilize any one or a series of consumer price indices.

P.L. 1969, c. 143, now authorizes the Director of the Division of Pensions to adjust retirement allowances or pensions for any public employee participating in the Public Employees' Retirement System to reflect changes in the Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers, All Items, Series A, of the United States Department of Labor. It is this Index which should also be adopted for the purposes of Assembly Bill No. 16.

P.L. 1969, c. 143, as enacted, also establishes a ceiling of $\frac{1}{2}$ of the per centum of change in the Index on the amount of adjustment permissible in the retirement allowance. Although Assembly Bill No. 16 is merely permissive, giving the municipality or public agency the option to reflect consumer price indices, they will inevitably be under considerable pressure to exercise this option. It would not be equitable to grant public employee pensioners whose pensions are paid for entirely through tax revenues the full amount of the consumer price increase while public employees whose pensions represent monies which they have contributed during their tenure are receiving only half this adjustment.

Section 2, of Assembly Bill No. 16 would permit pension increases, through ordinance, for any employee whose

tenure was between January 1, 1942 and April 1, 1964, equal to any increase in the amount of such individual's Social Security benefit. This section is clearly designed to benefit an unreasonable class of pensioners in violation of such prohibitions in the N. J. Const., Article IV, Sec. VII, par. 7 and Article IV, Sec. VII, par. 9(5).

I am, therefore, returning Assembly Bill No. 16, for reconsideration and suggest the following amendments:

1. *Page 2, Section 1, Line 27*: Delete the word "indices" and insert after the word "Price" and before the word "of" "Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers, All Items, Series A, of the United States Department of Labor". (1957, 1959-100)
2. *Page 2, Section 1, Line 28*: Insert after the "." the words "Such adjustment in the retirement allowances or pensions shall not exceed $\frac{1}{2}$ of the per centum of change in the Index as determined by the Director of the Division of Pensions pursuant to P.L. 1969, c. 143.
3. *Page 2, Section 2, Lines 1 to 7*: Delete Section 2 in its entirety.
4. *Page 2, Section 3, Line 1*: Delete "3". Insert in lieu thereof "2".

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(b) of the Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 136 for reconsideration.

P.L. 1952, c. 299, provided for the regulation of the operation or conduct of motor vehicle races and exhibitions generally. Assembly Bill No. 136 is a supplement to that act as amended and would provide for the licensing by the Department of Law and Public Safety of any municipality for the conduct of mini-bike, mini-car or cart motor vehicle races or exhibitions. Any municipality seeking such a license must comply with the safety requirements prescribed by the law to which it is a supplement and rules and regulations issued pursuant thereto. In addition, under A-136, the Department of Law and Public Safety is to formulate and prescribe special rules and regulations applicable to mini-bikes, mini-cars and cart races in which the participants are children.

Responsible objections have been raised to this measure questioning the wisdom of encouraging local youths to race on municipal streets, albeit under supervision, and cautioning that police protection for the races will prove an additional cost to the municipality. As these are considerations which are best evaluated and resolved within each of the respective municipalities by the local community itself, I would not preclude their decision that races should be held by vetoing this bill.

Even assuming, however, that these races and exhibitions would be an appropriate response to the increasing need for youth programs and that the strictest safety requirements would be imposed by the regulations issued under this bill, I nonetheless cannot support the bill in its present form.

Assembly Bill No. 136 would permit a municipality to be granted a license "without payment of fee and without providing evidence of liability insurance". Although limited municipal revenues support the waiver of license fees, permitting races or exhibitions in the absence of any liability insurance for the participants and spectators who might be injured is completely unacceptable. The law passed in 1952 permitting the conduct of motor vehicle and race exhibitions under certain conditions was amended in 1953 to require evidence that the promoter of a race had sufficient liability insurance to cover mishaps and injuries resulting from the race. There has been no documentation accompanying the introduction of this bill or recorded during the past 17 years to indicate that such coverage and protection is unnecessary. Particularly as this bill would permit small children to be

participants in races or exhibitions, and thus increase their presence as spectators, the insurance protection can hardly be lessened.

A technical defect in the bill should also be remedied. In requiring that the applicant comply with the safety requirements prescribed by P.L. 1953, c. 174, the citation is incorrectly given as C. 5:7-13 *et seq.*

I am therefore returning this measure to the General Assembly for its reconsideration with the following suggested amendments:

1. *Page 1, Section 1, Line 5:* Delete "and without providing evidence".
2. *Page 1, Section 1, Line 6:* Delete in its entirety.
3. *Page 1, Section 1, Line 7:* Delete "this act is a supplement (C. 5:7-13)".
4. *Page 1, Section 1, Line 9:* Delete "13" and insert "10".

ASSEMBLY BILL No. 356

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(b) of the Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 356, with my objections, for reconsideration:

Assembly Bill No. 356 would require any person engaged in the business of renting or leasing motor vehicles to sub-

mit to every individual renting a vehicle a signed statement affirming that in his judgment the vehicle: (1) satisfies inspection standards and (2) is equipped with a spare tire which meets such inspection standards.

Requiring that any person who rents an automobile to an individual must sign a piece of paper indicating that "in his judgment" the automobile is safe, provides the driver of the automobile with limited guarantees, as there are no criteria which must be considered prior to exercising such judgment. It cannot be expected that the owner of an agency renting any number of cars can conduct even a cursory inspection prior to each rental. No expertise with regard to serviceability on his part is required nor are any precautionary maintenance checks imposed. Presumably, it could be successfully argued that "his judgment" need only on the fact that the car passed its annual periodic inspection.

Although it would be desirable to assure each individual renting an automobile that the vehicle is equipped with a spare tire, the requirement that this be effected by affirming the fact in a signed statement is both awkward and unnecessary.

Section 2 of Assembly Bill No. 356, rendering any person violating the provisions of this act guilty of a misdemeanor, is redundant as N. J. S. A. 45:21-12 which this bill amends establishes such a penalty for any violation of the chapter.

I am therefore returning Assembly Bill No. 356 without my approval and recommend the following:

1. *Page 1, Section 1, Lines 1 to 12:* Delete Section 1 in its entirety and insert in lieu thereof:

"Each motor vehicle rented or leased by any person engaged in the business of renting or leasing motor vehicles to any other person, shall satisfy the standards promulgated by the director for the purpose of periodic inspection of motor vehicles pursuant to Chapter 8 of Title 39 of the Revised Statutes and shall be equipped with at least one spare tire which if mounted on the vehicle, would satisfy said inspection standards."

2. *Page 1, Section 2, Lines 1 and 2:* Delete Section 2 in its entirety.

idea, it is deceptively simple. It is certainly clear that no individual today can live very well on \$2,500 a year. This standard was originally enacted in 1938 in the depths of the depression when \$2,500 went quite a bit further than it does today. In fact, \$2,500 in 1938 had the purchasing power of over \$6,000 today.

To expect that a creditor could take still more out of this minimum amount for survival without having serious unintended effects is unrealistic. No family will be benefited if so much of a person's income is garnished that a debtor is either forced to flee the jurisdiction, or enter into bankruptcy. Moreover, there would certainly be little incentive for any person to continue to hold employment if more than 10% of his \$2,500-a-year income were taken. It would be far simpler to pass on to the public assistance rolls. In short, sound public policy does not support the change made by Assembly Bill No. 566.

Other changes in our law, however, are warranted, both by sound policy reason and recent events. The entire structure of wage garnishment in New Jersey is antiquated. In fact, I believe that it may be subject to challenge under the Consumer Credit Protection Act of 1968 (82 Stat. 163; 15 USCA § 1671 *et seq.*), the "Truth in Lending Act." Section 303 of that Act limits a garnishment to 25% of the disposable earnings of any person, or 30 times the Federal minimum hourly wage, whichever is less. (It should be noted that support orders are excepted from this restriction, an exception which should be rejected by this State for the reasons stated above.) Under Section 305 of the Act, the Secretary of Labor may, by regulation, exempt from these limits any garnishment issued under the laws of any state only if the laws of the state "provide restrictions on garnishment which are substantially similar to those provided in Section 303(a)" (15 USCA § 1675).

While this portion of the Federal law does not become effective until July 1, 1970, it would appear to be appropriate to take this opportunity to correct the defects in our statutory law as soon as possible. The present Federal minimum wage is set at \$1.60 per hour. In other words, under Federal law, no garnishment will be allowed when a person's "disposable earnings" is less than \$2,500, not even the 10% presently allowed under New Jersey law.

Given these facts, and the policy of preserving to the debtor a reasonable living standard, I would strongly recommend that the limitation on garnishments of more than 10% of income, be raised from the present \$2,500 to \$5,000. Moreover, I would call the attention of the Legislature to the provisions of Section 302 (15 USCA § 1672) of the Consumer Credit Act defining "earnings" and "disposable earnings." These definitions are inconsistent with the definitions of property subject to execution contained in NJS 2A:17-50. The Federal law, in effect, computes "disposable earnings" and applies its dollar amount limitations to wages and income after taxes and other mandatory deductions. In other words, New Jersey's dollar amount limitations on garnishments probably fall below the Federal standard. I would therefore recommend that the Legislature correct this and other defects prior to the effective date of the Federal law.

I would also call the attention of the Legislature to the fact that the Truth in Lending Law prohibits any employer from discharging an employee because his wages have been garnished (15 USCA § 1674). I have frequently called for such legislation in New Jersey myself, and a bill is pending in the Legislature which would enact such a prohibition—Assembly Bill No. 205. This change in Federal law does not diminish in any way the need for enactment of this legislation. It is still necessary to insure that employers not in interstate commerce be subject to similar restrictions and that New Jersey citizens, who are their employees, be afforded similar protection.

I am also taking the opportunity in this message to correct a technical defect in Assembly Bill No. 566, resulting from the fact that it does not take into account the amendments made in the sections amended by P. L. 1969, c. 92. I therefore respectfully recommend the following changes:

1. *Page 1, Section 1, Line 8:* Delete the figure "\$2,500.00" and insert in lieu thereof the figure "\$5,000.00".

2. *Page 1, Section 1, Line 9:* After the word "percentage" delete "; provided," and insert in lieu thereof a ".".

3. *Page 1, Section 1, Lines 10 through 14:* Delete lines 10 through 14 in their entirety.

4. *Page 1, Section 2, Line 9:* Delete the figure "\$18.00" and insert in lieu thereof the figure "\$48.00".

5. Page 2, Section 2, Line 12: Delete the figure "\$18.00" and insert in lieu thereof the figure "\$48.00".

6. Page 2, Section 2, Line 14: After the word "percentage" delete "; provided," and insert in lieu thereof a ".".

7. Page 2, Section 2, Lines 15 through 19: Delete lines 15 through 19 in their entirety.

ASSEMBLY BILL No. 624

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(b) of the Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 624, for reconsideration.

Assembly Bill No. 624 would allow a domestic life insurance company to purchase an unlimited amount of the voting stock of an investment company as defined by the Investment Company Act of 1940 (15 USCA 80a-1 *et seq.*). Such investment-companies are subject to the regulation of the Securities Exchange Commission. It also allows a domestic life insurance company to sell shares in such an investment company when the life insurance company is the investment manager or adviser of the investment company. Moreover, it modifies the language relating to the manner in which domestic life insurance companies may make investments, and revises the applicability of the statute to underwriting activities. Its purpose is to allow a domestic life insurance company to establish and sell shares in a mutual fund. Numerous life insurance companies already advise and operate mutual funds.

I have no substantive objection to authorizing insurance companies to advise, operate and sell mutual funds. Through the device of variable annuity contracts, many New Jersey insurance companies have already under taken programs which are scarcely distinguishable from the activities of mutual funds under the terms of the Investment Company Act of 1940. In fact, such funds have already been held in some cases to subject insurance companies to the regulation of the S.E.C. and the terms of the Investment Company Act of 1940, notwithstanding that the statute specifically excludes insurance companies, see *Prudential Insurance Company v. S.E.C.*, 326 F 2d 383 (C.A.N.J., 1964) *cert. den'd.*, 377 US 953.

An unintended consequence of Assembly Bill No. 624, however, is the fact that it would apparently allow insurance companies to own or control corporations in areas unrelated to the insurance business through their ownership and control of an investment company. In fact, one of the reasons for the passage of the Investment Company Act of 1940 was that "such companies customarily invest and trade in securities issued by, and may *dominate and control* or otherwise affect the policies and management of, companies engaged in business in interstate commerce" (emphasis added) [15 USCA 80a-1(3)]. While insurance companies may have subsidiaries in a broad and growing range of fields (P. L. 1967, c. 201, as amended by P. L. 1969, c. 86), their power to acquire subsidiaries of any kind remains subject to the approval of the Commissioner of Banking and Insurance [NJSA 17:24-29(h)]. Moreover, insurance companies have repeatedly testified that they wish no unlimited power to acquire or control a corporation in an unrelated area.

Nonetheless, as Assembly Bill No. 624 would amend NJSA 17:24-18, through an investment company, an insurance company could buy more than 8% (i.e., potentially a controlling interest, creating a type of "de facto" subsidiary) of the stock of any type of company without the approval of the Commissioner, thereby avoiding the limitations imposed by NJSA 17:24-29 on subsidiaries. Insurance companies are presently allowed to buy the stock of non-insurance related companies without the approval of the Commissioner only if they hold less than 8% of any such class of stock, substantially less than a controlling interest. The policy limiting the nature of the enterprises which in-

surors could control remains sound today. It was not the intent of this bill to change it.

I, therefore, recommend the following changes in Assembly Bill No. 624, in order to preserve the sound separation of insurance from other lines of commerce.

1. *Page 1, Section 1, Line 5:* After the word "corporation" and before the word "an" delete ",", and insert in lieu thereof " ;".

2. *Page 1, Section 1, Lines 5 through 8:* After the word "corporation" and before the word "or" delete the phrase "an investment company within the meaning of the Investment Company Act of 1940 (15 USCA 80a-1 *et seq.*) for which such life insurance company or its subsidiary is the investment manager or investment adviser,".

3. *Page 1, Section 1, Line 10:* After the word "property" and before the word "shall" delete ", nor" and insert in lieu thereof the following " ; or an investment company within the meaning of the Investment Company Act of 1940 (15 USCA 80a-1 *et seq.*) for which such life insurance company or its subsidiaries is the investment manager or investment adviser, provided that such investment company shall not own, control or hold in its portfolio any investment which, if added to the other investments of such life insurance company, would result in such life insurance company holding more than 8% of any class of stock which entitles the holder thereof to vote at all elections of directors or any one corporation; nor shall such life insurance company hold more than 8% of any such class of stock of any investment company pursuant to this section at any time when such life insurance company could not purchase such stock pursuant to the foregoing provisions of this section. Neither".

4. *Page 2, Section 1, Line 42:* After "pany" and before the word "entering" insert "]".

5. *Page 2, Section 1, Line 43:* After the word "property," and before the word "but" insert "[]".

ASSEMBLY BILL No. 705

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, paragraph 14(b) of the Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 705, with my objections, for reconsideration.

Assembly Bill No. 705 would supplement the Disorderly Persons Act, Chapter 170 of Title 2A of the New Jersey Statutes, to prohibit certain disruptive acts in and around public schools and any college or university as disorderly persons offenses. Subsection 1(a) of the bill would make it a disorderly persons offense for any person to disrupt “. . . the orderly conduct of the activities, administration, or classes of any public school or any college or university . . .”. Subsection 1(b) of the bill would punish as a disorderly person who, for the purpose of disrupting the orderly conduct of the activities, administration or classes of any public school or any college or university, “. . . threatens, assaults, or molests any student, employee, administrator, agent or any other person lawfully in a building of or on or about the grounds of, or in the immediate vicinity of such public school or such college or university . . .”. Subsection 1(c) of A-705 provides that any person who counsels, aids or abets the violation of either subsection 1(a) or subsection 1(b) shall be punished as a principal offender. Violators of the provisions of the bill would be subject to a fine not in excess of \$500., or to imprisonment not in excess of 6 months, or both. While I have no quarrel with the apparent intent and meaning of the bill, I take this opportunity to note two objections—one a technical matter and the other one of substance.

With regard to the technical objection, the title of the bill contains a reference—probably inadvertent, but incorrect, nonetheless—to Chapter “17” of Title 2A of the New Jersey Statutes. Since Assembly Bill No. 705 is intended to describe two new disorderly persons offenses—most of which are compiled in Chapter 170 of Title 2A of the New Jersey Statutes—I have suggested below a necessary corrective amendment.

My substantive objection to Assembly Bill No. 705 centers upon the failure of the bill to specify only *willful* and *unlawful* conduct as violations of its provisions. Without such limitations, the dragnet of Assembly Bill No. 705 would sweep up both those persons whose conduct is inherently innocent as well as those whose conduct enjoys statutory or constitutional protection. For example, a disorderly persons prosecution under A-705 would lie against members of a teachers' union whose constitutionally protected picketing might "interfere" with the normal operations of a school. Since ". . . it is not within the competency of the lawgiver to render that criminal which in its very nature is innocent and essentially nonculpable . . .", *State v. Labato*, 7 N.J. 137, 148 (1951), I have concluded that the over-board sweep of A-705 was not wholly intended by the Legislature.

The amendments suggested below, by requiring that any proceeding under A-705 be bottomed upon proof of an *illegal* and *unlawful* disruption, will narrow the applicability of the measure. If accepted by the Legislature, these amendments may spare a well-intended measure from a declaration of constitutional invalidity. Accordingly, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 705 for reconsideration and recommend that it be amended as follows:

Page 1, Title, Line 4: Delete "17" and insert "170".

Page 1, Section 1, Line 1: After "who" insert "willfully and unlawfully".

Page 1, Section 1, Line 6: After "person" insert "who".

Page 1, Section 1, Line 6: Before "disrupting" insert "unlawfully".

Page 1, Section 1, Line 9: Before "threatens" insert "willfully".

Page 1, Section 1, Line 13: After "university" insert ",'".

Obviously the funds of the State or a county or municipality could not be loaned to a private agency to be used as the agency pleased. Clearly the Constitution would stand in the way. But when the loan is granted for an obvious public purpose and its use confined to the execution of that purpose through a reasonable measure of control by a public authority by means of contractual stipulation, statutory and administrative regulation, the private agency does take on the form of a special public agent . . ." *Roe v. Kervick*, 42 N.J. 191, 222 (1964).

It is apparent that a gift neither provides adequate safeguards, nor meets the test of *Roe v. Kervick*.

However, adequate safeguards can be developed. In particular, there should be a clear statement of the public purpose to be served, a fair measure of the value of the services to be rendered to the public and the explicit designation of a person or agency responsible for the supervision, evaluation and control of any expenditures made pursuant to this act. Moreover, reports of any activities in this area should be filed with the New Jersey Department of Health.

I, therefore, recommend the following changes:

1. *Page 1, Section 1, Line 3*: Delete "contribute" and insert in lieu thereof the phrase "contract to provide, for a public purpose,".

2. *Page 1, Section 2, Line 1*: Delete "This act shall take effect immediately." and insert in lieu thereof the following paragraph:

2. In the case of any appropriation made pursuant to this act for a public purpose, the resolution, in the case of a county, or the ordinance, in the case of a municipality, shall include a statement of (a) the public purpose to be served by the appropriation; (b) the names of the association or corporation who shall be the grantees; (c) the number of persons directly benefiting from the public purpose of the grant; (d) the public officer, employee or agency responsible for the general supervision and control of the performance of any contract, grant, or program undertaken pursuant to this act; (e) a requirement that the grantee annually submit a report

Increases from 60 to 65 days the period of time a board of adjustment has to render a decision on an appeal—S. B. 743—948, 949, 1351, 1352, 1415.

Permits alternate members of a board of adjustment to participate in the board’s decision—S. B. 745—861, 862, 863, 1351, 1418.

Board of Beauty Culture—

Increases from 6 to 7 the number of members of the Board of Beauty Culture; deletes the requirement that applicants for beauty culture licenses be high school graduates; effective 60 days after enactment—A. B. 335—202.

Boating—

Prohibits the mooring, grounding, attaching or fastening of flat-bottomed boats, barges, scows or rafts to certain lands or waters within the territorial jurisdiction of a municipality without municipal permission—A. B. 130—105, 156, 413, 457, 952, 1247.

Boats—

Provides that whenever a vessel is abandoned in any waters of the State for a period of 15 days, the State may have same removed—A. B. 493—264, 855, 856, 1052.

Borough of Alpine—

Permits the Borough of Alpine, Bergen County to make permanent the appointment of James Jordan to the police department—A. B. 1101—1225, 1226, 1227, 1245, 1246, 1370.

Borough of Beachwood—

Authorizes the Borough of Beachwood, Ocean County to make permanent the appointment of Walter P. Kubiak to the police department—A. B. 1066—1169, 1224, 1244, 1245, 1385.

Borough of Bradley Beach—

Permits the Borough of Bradley Beach to make permanent the appointment of Harry Holmes and Marvin Rosen to the police department—A. B. 906—665, 1031, 1060, 1310.

Borough of Cresskill—

Permits the Borough of Cresskill to make permanent the appointment of Michael Engel to the police department—A. B. 841—540, 1224, 1243, 1244, 1356.

Borough of Dumont—

Acknowledges the intention of the Borough of Dumont to petition the Legislature for the annexation of certain lands now within the Borough of Bergenfield—A. C. R. 92—1035.

Borough of Longport—

Permits the Borough of Longport to make permanent the appointment of Joseph A. Melchionna and George F. Campbell to the police department—A. B. 845—535, 541, 642, 952.

Bridges—

Requires maximum bridge load signs to be posted far enough away from the bridge to enable an overloaded truck to take an alternate route—A. B. 514—266.

Brielle—

Permits Brielle to make permanent the appointment of William T. Harvey to the police department—A. B. 1045—961, 963, 1060, 1310.

Business Incentive Act—

Designated "The Business Incentive Act (1969)" provides for guaranteed or insured bank loans to deprived persons for the purposes of establishing or re-establishing themselves in small businesses or professions; appropriates \$3,000,000; effective July 1, 1969—S. B. 287—453, 454, 887, 1095, 1267, 1363, 1364.

C

Cemeteries—

Permits the use of certain cemetery property for non-cemetery purposes in certain instances—A. B. 941—705.

Cemetery Associations—

Permits a cemetery association to lease unused cemetery land for non-profit, religious, educational or charitable purposes—S. B. 768—865, 866, 867, 1104.

Charitable Solicitations—

Designated the "Charitable Solicitation Act of 1969," provides for the registration of charitable organizations, professional fund raisers and professional solicitors; appropriates \$25,000; effective 30 days after enactment—A. B. 1102—1281.

Child Abuse—

Provides that abuse of a child shall include the care and custody of a child by a parent or other person convicted of any crime or offense relating to the use, possession, sale, transportation or other dealing in or with narcotic drug; prescribes persons who may originate proceedings concerning child abuse—A. B. 1046—961.

Chiropractic—

Requires every applicant for a license to practice chiropractic to have completed at least 2 years' study in a school or college of arts and science no less than 1½ years of which shall have been completed prior to commencing his courses of study in the approved school of chiropractic—S. B. 424—342, 343, 854, 900.

City of Cape May—

Permits the City of Cape May to make permanent the appointment of Robert L. Greene and Clarence F. Lear to the police department—A. B. 396—213, 282, 291, 338, 629.

Permits the City of Cape May to make permanent the appointment of Robert L. Greene and Clarence F. Lear to the police department—A. B. 682—351, 424, 573, 629.

City of Plainfield—

Congratulates the city of Plainfield on the 100th anniversary of its corporation—A. R. 8—301, 650.

Civil defense—

Increases for \$25.00 to \$45.00 the weekly benefits and from \$1,500 to \$3,000 the death benefits for civil defense volunteers who suffer injury as a result of participation in authorized civil defense service—S. B. 742—813, 815, 816, 1302, 1304, 1410.

Civil Rights—

Includes in the definition of “employer” in the “Law Against Discrimination,” the state, any political or civil subdivision thereof, all public officers, agencies, boards or bodies—A. B. 233—142.

Extends the jurisdiction of the Division on Civil Rights to complaints of discrimination on the basis of sex; effective July 1, 1969—A. B. 469—251.

Deletes limit on the number of hearing examiners in the Division of Civil Rights—A. B. 686—402.

Establishes, protects and insures the civil rights of persons who have applied for enrollment or who are enrolled, as students in any public or private school, college, university—A. B. 697—441, 697, 730.

Permits the appointing authority to set the term of the executive or deputy executive director appointed to assist local commissions on civil rights—S. B. 228—338, 339, 944, 945, 996.

Civil Service—

Permits the Civil Service Commission to waive citizenship requirements in certain cases—A. B. 539—271.

Grants permanent civil service status to correction officers in the Department of Institutions and Agencies who were employed in a temporary capacity before July 1, 1964 and who were so employed on January 19, 1968—S. B. 247—192, 687.

Civil Service Day—

Designates May 16, 1969 as “Civil Service Day”—S. J. R. 15—568, 570, 573, 591.

Clinical Laboratories—

Designated the “New Jersey Clinical Laboratory Improvement Act of 1969,” provides for the licensing and regulating of clinical laboratories; effective January 1, 1970—A. B. 1020—872.

Cold Spring Inlet—

Memorializes the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers to withhold approval of the proposed expansion by the Coast Guard of the existing gunnery range impact area to the west jetty at Cold Spring Inlet, Cape May County—A. C. R. 12—75, 148.

Collection Agencies—

Designated the “Collection Agency Act of 1969,” provides for the licensing and regulating of collection agencies; effective January 1, 1970—A. B. 263—166, 886, 887.

Commerce and Economic Development—

Creates the Department of Commerce and Economic Development—
A. B. 249—145.

Commission for the Blind—

Redesignates the Commission for the Blind as the Commission for the
Blind and Visually Handicapped—A. B. 945—706.

Community Affairs—

Establishes a Women's Division in the Department of Community
Affairs—A. B. 1—82, 154, 319, 373, 432, 452, 745.

Congressional Districts—

Creates a 1 member bipartisan Redistricting Commission 5 each to be
appointed by the chairman of the 2 State political committees to establish
Congressional districts—A. B. 111—102.

Conservation—

Provides for the regulation of dredging, filling, removing or otherwise
altering or polluting coastal wetlands—A. B. 4—83, 154, 155, 228, 229, 254,
278, 289, 1338, 1339.

Designated the "Department of Conservation and Natural Resources
Act (1969)," changes the name of the Department of Conservation and
Economic Development to the Department of Conservation and Natural
Resources; effective January 1, 1970—A. B. 248—145.

Permits any county or municipality to install one or more traffic control
signals, provided the need for the same is based upon a study of the project
volume of traffic for a 2 year period—A. B. 345—204, 319, 365, 372, 432,
467, 917.

Designated the "New Jersey Green Acres Bond Act of 1969" authorizes
the State after a referendum, to issue bonds in the sum of \$60,000,000 to
provide money for public acquisition of lands for recreation and conserva-
tion purposes—A. B. 411—216.

Designated the "Costal Wetlands Conservation Act of 1969," provides
for the protection of natural resources in coastal wetlands—A. B. 768—448,
559, 604.

Constables—

Requires constables to file amonthly report of their official activities—

Constitutional Convention—

Provides for a Constitutional Convention to consider proposals to revise
and the provisions of the present State Constitution relating to the repre-
sentation of the people by a full time Legislature composed of 1 or 2
chambers—A. B. 1105—1281.

Consumer Credit Sales—

Prohibits deficiency judgments in certain consumer credit sales—A. B.
626—391.

Consumer Credit Sales (continued)—

Prohibits a rebate or discount on any consumer credit sale in consideration of his giving the seller the names of prospective purchasers—A. B. 631—392.

Provides for the applicability of the Federal laws pertaining to consumer credit transactions in lieu of certain provisions of the State law which are inconsistent with and are superceded by Federal law—A. B. 850—544, 692, 917.

Consumer Fraud—

Increases the penalties for consumer fraud—A. B. 964—754.

Courts (continued)—

Provides that appeals from judgments of a judge of compensation shall be made to the Superior Court, Appellate Division—A. B. 360—207, 273, 520.

Permits a notary public to take their oath before a judge of a municipal court—A. B. 425—243, 746, 763.

Increases the price of original and copies of court stenographic records—A. B. 458—249, 922, 981.

Abolishes the defense of contributing negligence as an absolute bar in causes of action predicated on negligence, establishes a rule of comparative negligence—A. G. 488—294, 747, 775.

Provides that in any civil action brought in any court involving the operation of a motor vehicle registered in the State, if service cannot be made in accordance with the rules of court then process may be served upon the director of the Division of Motor Vehicles—A. B. 492—294, 747, 860.

Prescribes the procedure for admission to bail to persons charged with a criminal offense—A. B. 523—267, 886, 982.

Requires the assignment judge of each county, with the approval of the chief justice to appoint a clerk to the jury commissioners—A. B. 552—299, 848.

Eisenhower—

Memorializes Congress to authorize the issuance of currency commemorating our former President, the late Dwight D. Eisenhower—A. J. R. 12—579, 637, 693.

Elections—

Provides for the election of delegates to national nominating conventions and controls vote of delegates on the first ballot—A. B. 15—85.

Permits a covilian absentee ballot to be issued up to noon of the fourth day before any election; effective September 1, 1969—A. B. 99—99.

Elections (continued)—

Provides for a recorder to be assigned to each polling place who would under the supervision of the bi-partisan district board, maintain a running tabulation of the registered voters who had already voted, and make the information available to the challengers—A. B. 152—109.

Designated the "Environmental Protection Act (1969)," creates a Division of Environment Protection in the Department of Conservation and Economic Development; appropriates \$50,000; effective 90 days after enactment—A. B. 184—134.

Escheats—

Designates the Director of the Division of Budget and Accounting as the State's representative to make application to Federal government agencies for reports of all grants-in-aid to the State—A. B. 449—247.

Gubernatorial Transition Act—

Health—

Regulates the manufacturing, sale and distribution of frozen desserts and special frozen dietary foods; provides for the inspection, sanitation and licensing of frozen dessert plants; effective July 1, 1970—A. B. 142—107, 414, 458, 808.

Provides for the regulation of medical care facilities and related medical care services—A. B. 582—387.

Requires sanitary rest room facilities for public use at all motor vehicle inspection stations; effective 180 days after enactment—A. B. 616—389.

Requires the disclosure of the generic and brand name, if any, of prescription drugs, compounds and medicines; effective 30 days after enactment—A. B. 638—393.

Increases the penalties for violation of health ordinances—A. B. 663—398.

Increases the maximum and minimum penalties which may be prescribed by local boards of health—A. B. 703—447, 1259, 1356.

Prohibits the manufacture, distribution and sale of eyeglasses and sunglasses containing highly inflammable materials, specifies the minimum thickness of the lenses—A. B. 713—446, 853.

Provides for medicaid to a child in foster placement under supervision of the Bureau of Children's Service whose maintenance is being paid in whole or part from public funds, and a person who meets the standard of need applicable to his circumstances under a categorical assistance program but is not receiving such assistance and applies for medical assistance only—A. Provides for a survey by the Department of Health of nutritional deficiencies within the State; appropriates \$75,000—A. B. 1021—872.

Permits the Highway Authority to award certain contracts over \$2,500 without advertising for bids—A. B. 720—445.

Memorializes the Highway Authority to reopen the Springdale Ave., Essex County exit of the parkway—A. C. R. 53—300.

Requires the Highway Authority to issue commuter tickets at a discount—S. B. 309—352, 681, 682, 735, 1308, 1383, 1403.

Highways—

Provides for the extension of State Highway Route 17 from its junction with Route 7 in North Arlington to Newark—A. B. 50—91.

Provides for a study to determine the practicability and feasibility of extending either the Parkway or Turnpike or both into Warren and Sussex Counties—A. B. 326—201, 636, 677, 1012.

Provides for a new State highway route in Middlesex County beginning at Route 18, New Brunswick crossing the Raritan River in the Leupp lane-Metlar lane area and intersecting with Route 287 in the township of Piscataway—A. B. 408—206.

Prohibits the use or erection of any rotating or flashing light within 100 feet of the roadway of a highway—A. B. 408—216.

Add to the State highway system a prescribed route in Cape May County—A. B. 418—242.

Highways (continued)—

Prohibits parking on the roadway portion of any highway the lanes of which are marked, to prohibit passing, or in such a manner as to obstruct any driver's view of an official traffic direction or warning sign—A. B. 426—243.

Add Route No. 2 in Bergen County to the State Highway System—A. B. 445—246.

Provides for a feasibility study of adding to the State highway system, two roads in Bergen County—A. B. 769—497.

Designated the "Highway Safety Act of 1969," implements the National Highway Safety program in the State—A. B. 903—635, 744, 943, 953, 1004, 1029.

Holidays—

Provides for the observance of certain holidays on Mondays; effective January 1, 1971—A. B. 7—83.

Provides for a celebration on Mondays of Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Columbus Day and Veterans Day, creates a Monday holiday in February to replace Lincoln's and Washington's Birthday, President's Day, in honor of the Presidents of the United States—A. B. 30—88.

Provides that all public offices of this State, and of the counties and municipalities shall be closed on legal holidays—A. B. 413—217.

Provides for the observance of certain holidays on Monday—S. B. 77—149, 151, 994.

Home Repair Contracts—

Provides that no home repair contract shall contain any provision relieving the holder, or other assignee, from liability for any legal remedies which the owner may have against the home repair contractor under the home repair contract or under separate instrument executed—A. Hospitals—

Requires every hospital emergency room to have in attendance at all times one person who speaks and understands the English language—A. B. 285—170, 787, 1082.

Household Appliances—

Requires household appliances to have the year of manufacture attached on a tag or label—A. B. 684—402.

Housing—

Requires every "tenement house" having elevator service available to the occupants to have no less than one watchman therein during the hours of 7:00 p. m. and 3:00 a. m. to be stationed in the area of the elevator entrance on the ground floor—A. B. 510—296, 744.

Provides for certain reports in conjunction with general assistance and public assistance programs under the jurisdiction of the Department of Institutions and Agencies—A. B. 961—695, 696, 743, 769, 1002.

Provides for an agreement of compromise and settlement between for the support of a patient in a State or county institution—A. B. 998—822.

Designates the responsibility for maintenance of indigent relatives in State institutions; establishes a procedure whereby county adjusters and courts will use a uniform formula in determining the amount of maintenance—A. B. 1008—811, 989, 1236.

Designated the “Humane Treatment of Prisoners Act of 1969,” provides for humane treatment of inmates of State, county and local correctional institution—A. B. 1100—1202.

Permits medical psychiatric, surgical and dental treatment for legally disabled incompetents and minors in State and county mental and correctional institutions upon proper certification of a physician, psychiatrist, surgeon or dentist—S. B. 222—340, 673, 732.

Prohibits the commitment of sex offenders to mental hospitals without separate facilities for such persons; effective July 1, 1970—S. B. 614—656.

Insurance—

Prohibits the issuance of an automobile liability insurance policy unless it contains a non-cancellable clause; effective January 1, 1970—A. B. 42—90.

Permits any hospital service corporation to include in their contract benefits for all employees, for health care services and supplies as are approved by the Commissioner of Banking and Insurance—A. B. 145—108, 318.

Permits hospital service corporations to include in its contracts benefits for such other health care services as are approved by the Commissioner of Banking and Insurance—A. B. 188—134, 190, 1030, 1081, 1082, 1242.

Provides for health and accident insurance coverage for services performed by a physician or duly licensed practicing psychologist, psychiatrist or psychiatric social worker within a community mental health center—A. B. 468—250.

Provides for group accident and health insurance coverage for services performed by a physician or duly licensed practicing psychologist, psychiatrist or psychiatric social worker within a community mental health clinic—A. B. 471—251.

Provides that lawfully practicing psychologists, psychiatrists and psychiatric social workers shall have the privileges and benefits in the scope of their practice as are afforded to licensed physicians and surgeons in the scope of their practice collecting under health and accident insurance—A. B. 473—252.

Prescribes the authority an insurance company has to sell contracts based upon investments in the shares of an investment company—A. B. 624—391, 944, 984, 1356, 1429.

Investments—

Permits the Division of Investment to invest in evidence of indebtedness guaranteed or insured under the Higher Education Assistance Authority Act—S. B. 43—338, 339, 946, 1083.

Junk Yards—

Repeals the requirement for the Director of the Division of Motor Vehicles to hold a public hearing prior to the issuance of a junk yard license—A. B. 61—93.

Extends the time for a junk yard owner to put a fence around his yard—A. B. 402—214, 324, 362, 691.

Designated the "Junkyard Control Act," provides for the control of Junkyards adjacent to the Interstate and Federal Aid Primary Systems—A. B. 983—753.

Labeling—

Labor—

Revises the unemployment compensation and temporary disability benefits; effective October 1, 1969—A. B. 72—95.

Deletes gratuities and other wage substitutes such as food and lodging from the definition of "wages" in the "Wage and Hour Law" (P. L. 1966, c. 113)—A. B. 79—96.

Increases from \$18 to \$40 the amount of wages exempt from a wage execution—A. B. 118—103, 190, 374, 456, 573.

Increases Unemployment Compensation and Temporary Disability benefits; effective October 1, 1969—A. B. 174—113, 566.

Prohibits purchases and assignments of salary, wages, commissions, pay and other compensation for services—A. B. 199—137.

Legislature—

Permits the transfer and acquisition to the State of the library, or library system established in any 1st class city having a population in excess of 350,000—A. B. 513—266.

Permits the board of trustees of free public libraries to expend monies received from library fines for library purposes—S. B. 549—652, 653, 1304, 1412.

Licenses—

Permits a person who has declared his intention of becoming a United States citizen to apply for an engineer's and firemen's license—A. B. 166—112.

Exempts from having a building material license any person engaged in the hardware business with a gross volume of sales in excess of 51% in hardware—A. B. 298—172, 413, 472.

Exempts from licensing requirements persons purchasing agricultural commodities from State farmers and making payment in full in United States currency at the time of the transaction—A. B. 501—265, 785, 818, 844, 1003.

Provides for certain 2nd grade sanitary inspectors to be issued a 1st grade sanitary inspectors license without examination—A. B. 999—820, 1247, 1248, 1277.

Permits a person who has declared his intention of becoming a United States citizen to apply for an engineer's and firemen's license—S. B. 351—488, 751, 770.

Liens—

Provides that a wage execution for support and maintenance of a wife or children shall have preference over all other writs—A. B. 565—312, 383, 476, 691.

Provides that the percentage limitations of a wage execution shall not apply to an execution for support of a wife or children—A. B. 566—312, 412, 475, 1426, 1439.

Permits any governmental body to deduct 5% from every payment made pursuant to a wage execution—S. B. 235—342, 894, 1293.

Increases from \$18 to \$50 the amount of wages exempt from a wage execution—S. B. 635—861, 862, 863, 1351.

Loans—

Requires every "lender" to furnish the borrowers a copy of the instrument evidencing the loan or a written memorandum thereof—A. B. 44—90.

Prohibits a lending institution from denying an extension or renewal of a loan pending on June 6, 1968—A. B. 96—99.

Lobbyists—

Requires every lobbyist to wear a descriptive name tag while in the State house; effective 45 days after enactment—A. B. 28—88, 155, 489.

Requires the Secretary of State to develop and prescribe methods and forms for statements required to be filed by persons seeking to influence legislation; prohibits a contingency fee—A. B. 440—245.

Local Emergency Aid Fund—

Designated the "Local Emergency Aid Act of 1969" creates the Local Emergency Aid Fund to reimburse municipalities for emergency expenditures necessary for the protection of the public safety; appropriates \$2,000,000—A. B. 982—739, 740, 827, 828, 935, 1003.

Local Government—

Changes from March 1 to January 26 in the case of a county and not later than February 10 in the case of a municipality after the close of the fiscal year, the date on which the verified statement of the financial condition of the local unit must be filed—S. B. 264—276, 1286, 1411.

Lotteries—

Prescribes the penalties for conducting lotteries—A. B. 384—211.

Manasquan—

Permits Manasquan to make permanent the appointment of Jack G. Malone to the police department—S. B. 440—276, 277, 323, 357.

Manufacturing—

Regulates the use of glazing material—A. B. 484—263, 614, 646 1012.

Mechanics Liens—

Requires a prescribed notice to accompany a copy of a mechanics notice of intention—A. B. 265—166.

Prohibits a mechanics lien on labor performed or materials furnished for or used in the modernization, rehabilitation, repair, alteration or improvement of real property pursuant to a home repair contract relating to a single or double family residence—A. B. 266—166.

Medicaid—

Requires the State Medicaid Commission to approve and accept the lowest responsible bid submitted—A. B. 957—695, 696, 700, 802.

Medical Technology—

Requires the licensing of persons who carry on the practice of medical technology; creates a Medical Technology Advisory Committee; effective July 1, 1969—A. B. 3—82.

Medicine—

Provides that all physicians are liable at common law or otherwise on account of any injury or death of any person who, at the time such injury or death occurred, was in the same employ as the person injured or killed—A. B. 633—392.

Establishes conditions under which a license to practice medicine or surgery and chiropractic may be suspended—A. B. 690—403.

Provides for the construction of a planned Community Mental Health Center by the New Jersey College of Medicine and Dentistry in Newark—S. B. 337—415, 657, 693.

Milk—

Requires all milk containers to be legibly marked in dark ink with the day of the week on which the milk was pasteurized—A. B. 646—395.

Permits any school or hospital to purchase milk or milk products from the lowest responsible bidder—A. B. 929—703.

Mines—

Provides for protection as is necessary to prevent injury to persons or property at the site of abandoned mines—A. B. 689—402.

Minors—

Provides that a contract signed by any minor after reaching his 20th birthday shall be valid—A. B. 393—213, 365, 433.

Increases from \$10,000 to \$15,000 in any one judgment the amount of a minor's estate that the guardian need not post a bond—A. B. 450—247, 850, 889, 902, 903, 953, 1012.

Provides for child labor identification cards issued by the State Department of Education authorizing the employment of or engagement in gainful occupation by a minor of age 12 to 18—A. B. 996—791, 794.

Provides for the issuance of identification cards and health certificates to minors over the age of 12 years for use in establishing eligibility for acceptance of gainful occupation and employment—A. B. 997—791, 794.

Miscellaneous Commissions—

Creates a 9 member bipartisan commission; 2 Senators, 1 citizen appointed by the President of the Senate, 2 Assemblymen, 1 citizen appointed by the Speaker of the General Assembly, 3 citizens appointed by the Governor to study obscenity and depravity in public media; appropriates \$15,000—A. B. 162—111, 155, 188, 364, 382, 431, 465, 952.

Creates a 12 member bipartisan commission, 2 Senators, 2 Assemblymen, 4 citizens each appointed by the President of the Senate and the Speaker of General Assembly to study the regulation of campaign expenditures by candidates for office; appropriates \$15,000—A. B. 658—397.

Creates a 12 member bipartisan commission, 2 Senators, 2 Assemblymen, 2 citizens each appointed by the President of the Senate and Speaker of the General Assembly, 1 citizen appointed by the Governor, 3 Uniform Law Commissioners to study the Uniform Consumer Credit Code; appropriates \$25,000—A. B. 692—440, 650, 679, 1236.

Extends from July 1 to 1969 to July 1, 1971, the due date for the report of the commission on Open Space Policy (P. L. 1968, c. 312); appropriates \$25,000—A. B. 763—497, 885, 1009, 1064.

Increases from 9 to 15 the membership of the Sports and Athletic Facilities Study Commission created by S. J. R. 15, 1968—S. J. R. 13—234, 255.

Creates a 19 member bipartisan Mobile Homes and Prefabricated Housing Commission, 2 Senators, 2 Assemblymen, 1 representative from the Departments of Community Affairs, Health, Law and Public Safety, 12 citizens appointed by the Governor, to study mobile homes, mobile parks and construction of prefabricated housing—S. Miss New Jersey—

Provides that no driver's license of any driver who must, as a condition of continued employment, operate a motor vehicle in the course of his employment, shall be suspended or revoked, unless he has acquired a total of 24 or more points within a 3 year period—A. B. 46—90.

Provides that a special motor vehicle driver's license may be issued to a person 18 instead of 21 years of age; permits a special or regular license to be retained when one or the other is suspended—A. B. 83—96.

Requires the certificate of motor vehicle ownership to indicate the number of owners the vehicle has had—A. B. 90—75, 98, 189, 431, 573, 594.

Regulates the business of auto dismantling, establishes an Auto Salvage Finance Fund; creates a State Auto Salvage Board; appropriates \$50,000—A. B. 95—99, 1236, 1280.

Provides that there shall be a presumption that a driver's ability to operate a motor vehicle, is impaired if there is in excess of 0.5% instead of existence but less than 0.10% by weight of alcohol in the defendant's blood—A. B. 105—100.

Provides that any driver who must, as a condition of continued employment, operate a motor vehicle, shall not have his license suspended pursuant to any point system, unless and until he has accumulated 18 or more points in a 3 year period—A. B. 217—139, 191.

Permits a child to sue his parents, for an injury caused by negligence of his parents in operating an automobile, provided the parent has liability insurance—A. B. 334—202.

Provides for the issuance of special motor vehicle registration plates containing not more than 6 letters, numerals or combinations thereof—A. B. 338—203.

Authorizes the Director of Motor Vehicles to charge an additional fee of \$5.00 for the renewal of the registration of a vehicle for which special license plates have been issued—A. B. 340—203.

Requires the Director of Motor Vehicles to set standards in regard to bus stops, taxi stands and parking in the public streets—A. B. 343—204.

Requires all rented or leased vehicles to satisfy the standards of motor vehicle inspections and be equipped with a spare tire—A. B. 356—206, 564, 595, 1310, 1424.

Prescribes conditions under which a person shall be found guilty of driving until the influence of intoxicating liquor—A. B. 358—206.

Prescribes the penalty for being found guilty while driving under the influence of intoxicating liquor—A. B. 359—207.

Exempts from paying a motor vehicle registration fee by any duly authorized municipal, county, regional or district water commission or sewerage authority—A. B. 370—208.

Requires approval of the municipality to be forwarded to the director of motor vehicles prior to the issuance of a license for the sale of motor vehicles out of doors—A. B. 381—210.

Prescribes the maximum noise limits that a motorcycle may produce and be sold in the State; effective 90 days after enactment—A. 390—212.

Provides that a discharge in bankruptcy under the Motor Vehicle Security-Responsibility Law (P. L. 1952, c. 173), shall relieve the judgment debtor from any of the requirements of act, provided that the underlying judgment was not based on a willful or malicious tort—A. B. 427—243.

Requires all motor vehicle tires to be inspected during motor vehicle inspections; prohibits a vehicle to be on the highway with unsafe tires—A. B. 442—246, 372, 469.

Motor Vehicles (continued)—

Permits temporary registration of motor vehicles for out-of-State purchasers; effective 90 days after enactment—A. B. 443—246, 375, 376, 463, 917, 1322, 1397, 1398, 1399, 1400, 1440.

Exempts non-profit corporations or associations organized to aid the blind from paying the fee to register a motor vehicle—A. B. 462—249.

Requires motorcycles to have license plates on front and rear—A. B. 517—267.

Reduces from \$10.00 to \$5.00 the registration fee for motorcycles; effective August 1, 1969—A. B. 519—296.

Eliminates motorcycle protection helmets from the regulations of the director of motor vehicles—A. B. 520—267.

Provides that a commercial drivers license shall be suspended or revoked only after he has accumulated a total of 18 or more points within a 3 year period—A. B. 571—302, 431, 479, 808.

Designated "The Motor Vehicle Sales and Distribution Act" regulates the sale and distribution of motor vehicles; establishes a motor vehicle sales and distribution board; appropriates \$100,000—A. B. 573—313, 365, 699, 700.

Provides that a person who is convicted in another State of drunken driving or driving under the influence of narcotics and who subsequently is convicted of the same crime in the State shall be sentenced as a second offender—A. B. 588—316.

Prescribes the specifications of drivers licenses; requires a colored photograph of the licensee; effective January 1, 1970—A. B. 592—312, 365, 920, 1062.

Regulates the sale, possession or use of motor vehicle tires equipped with non-rubber protuberances; effective 90 days after enactment—A. B. 604—387.

Provides effectually for financial responsibility and indemnification of victims in connection with damages caused by operation of motor vehicles; increases the required amount of automobile insurance to \$25,000/\$50,000; effective January 1, 1970—A. B. 619—390.

Requires exhaust gas ventilation devices on passenger automobiles—A. B. 657—397, 745.

Exempts the organization "We Must Care Incorporated" from payment of motor vehicle registration fee—A. B. 659—397.

Requires every new motor vehicle, prior to sale, to be road tested and thoroughly inspected for mechanical and operational defects; violation is guilty of a misdemeanor—A. B. 669—399.

Provides for merit points for good driving years for a driver whose driver's licenses is being considered for revocation—A. B. 707—403, 406, 489, 565, 604.

Requires the Director of Motor vehicles to assign a month in which commercial motor vehicles will be inspected; effective January 1, 1970—A. B. 709—446.

Motor Vehicles (continued)—

Permits attendance at a Division of Motor Vehicles Driver Improvement School in lieu of all or part of the period of suspension of a driver's license—A. B. 726—444, 849, 933, 1064.

Prohibits as a misdemeanor the falsification and forgery of motor vehicle registration certificates—A. B. 744—427, 886, 985.

Requires a driver's license to be issued upon the certification by a teacher certified by the Department of Education as authorized to instruct in an approved automobile driving education course—A. B. 751—448, 888.

Provides for a program of driver education in public and private schools in the safe operation of motor vehicles; effective January 1, 1970—A. B. 770—497.

Requires a lessee of a motor vehicle to file with the owner an instrument appointing the owner or his agent to acknowledge service or notice of process for and on behalf of the lessee in respect to any matters connected with the operation of the motor vehicle—A. B. 780—499.

Provides for a "temporary" marked license plate to be used by any person engaged in the business of renting or leasing motor vehicles—A. B. 795—484, 1229, 1255, 1356.

Requires the driver's license of a decedent to be delivered to the Division of Motor Vehicles—A. B. 808—538.

Imposes a \$.05 service charge for each motor vehicle using a toll tunnel or bridge; effective July 1, 1969—A. B. 833—537.

Requires a driver's license to be issued upon the certification by a teacher certified by the Department of Education as authorized to instruct in an approved automobile driving education course—A. B. 837—540.

Permits the Director of Motor Vehicles to revoke a registration of a motor vehicle or a driver's license for a period of not more than 2 years for a misstatement or fictitious name or address—A. B. 853—581, 613, 855, 934, 1064.

Permits special motor vehicle identification lights for volunteer firemen and civil defense-disaster control personnel—A. B. 866—584.

Prohibits the abandoning of a motor vehicle in any 1st class city having a population in excess of 350,000 inhabitants—A. B. 889—634.

Permits a member of a recognized volunteer fire company to display on a motor vehicle owned by him and registered in his name a fire or police identification light; prescribes size and color and when they may be used—A. B. 892—619, 651.

Designated "The Motor Vehicle Sales and Distribution Act" regulates the sale and distribution of motor vehicles; establishes a motor vehicle sales and distribution board; appropriates \$100,000—A. B. 904—658, 819.

Revises the speed limits; increases maximum to 70 miles an hour—A. B. 907—665.

Permits members of volunteer fire companies and first aid or rescue squads to display specified emergency warning lights on their motor vehicles—A. B. 914—667.

Provides for the inspection of new motor vehicles by the dealers, provides for the issuance of certificates of approval valid for 3 years or 30,000 miles; inoperative until September 1, 1969—A. B. 958—707.

Motor Vehicles (continued)—

Declares a moratorium on the inspection of noncommercial passenger vehicles which have been driven less than 30,000 miles—A. B. 959—707.

Provides that any person who, with intent to defraud the owner of any motor vehicle, or any person in lawful possession thereof, obtains possession of such motor vehicle by agreeing to pay a rental for its use based in whole or in part upon the distance such motor vehicle shall have, is a disorderly person—A. B. 992—792, 793.

Requires every used car sold to be guaranteed to pass inspection; effective January 1, 1970—A. B. 1007—823.

Provides for the inspection of motor vehicles by licensed official inspection stations; abolishes State motor vehicle inspection stations—A. B. 1011—871.

Requires every applicant for a motor vehicle driver's license, every 6 years, to submit to and pass a hearing and eye examination; effective July 1, 1969—A. B. 1050—1108.

National Safety Agency—

Memorializes Congress and the National Safety Agency to take certain remedial action for the promotion of traffic safety—A. J. R. 2—116, 279, 307, 527.

National Wildlife Week—

Designates the period March 16-22, 1969 as "National Wildlife Week"—S. C. R. 35—236, 255.

New Jersey General State Authority—

Designated the "New Jersey General State Authority Law of 1969," creates the New Jersey General State Authority to facilitate the construction and improvement of capitol facilities for use by the State; appropriates \$100,000—S. B. 762—927, 928, 929.

North Jersey Water Supply Commission—

Permits the State to enter into a contract with the North Jersey Water Supply Commission—A. B. 987—821.

New Shrewsbury—

Permits New Shrewsbury to make permanent the appointment of William Brown to the police department—A. B. 1082—1189, 1192, 1223, 1385.

Noise Control—

Designated the "Noise Control Act (1969)" provides for a Noise Control Council; empowers the Department of Health to promulgate codes for control of noise; appropriates \$100,000—A. B. 114—102, 805.

Oaths—

Revises the oaths of allegiance—A. B. 341—203.

Revises the oath of allegiance and office—A. B. 349—205.

Ombudsman—

Designated the "New Jersey Ombudsman Act"; establishes the office of ombudsman; appropriates \$150,000—A. B. 211—138.

Ophthalmology—

Requires a candidate for examination and certification as an ophthalmic dispenser to be a high school graduate—A. B. 446—247, 853, 854, 953.

Optional Municipal Charter Law—

Includes the laws relating to redevelopment agencies within the exceptions to the "general law" provisions set forth in the "Optional Municipal Charter Law"—S. B. 697—864, 865.

Optometry—

Includes in the definition of the practice of optometry any person who shall offer and market for sale at retail to the general public spectacles or eye-glasses containing other than plano lenses; effective 91 days after enactment—A. B. 951—706.

Osteopathy—

Provides that any individual who has been given a certificate by the National Board of Examiners for Osteopathic Physicians and Surgeons may, in the discretion of the State board of medical examiners be granted a license to practice medicine and surgery without further examination—S. B. 481—652, 942, 1012.

P

Packaging—

Requires all fresh meats packaged or wrapped in advance of being exposed or offered for sale by the retailer to be in an entirely transparent tray container or other package; prescribes penalty for violation as a disorderly person—A. B. 38—89.

Requires all packages of meat for retail sale to be wrapped in a packaging that is colorless and transparent on all sides—A. B. 272—155, 168, 316, 365, 430.

Requires all packaged perishable items to have imprinted “do not use after” followed by the date, prohibits the use of colored lights by food establishments engaged in selling food for off premises consumption—A. B. 688—402.

Palisades Interstate Park Commission—

Requires certain undeveloped land held by the Palisades Interstate Park Commission to be used for park purposes in its natural state—S. B. 660—654, 655, 1306.

Parks—

Pensions—

Permits pension increases equal to the increase in social security benefit or cost of living increases—A. B. 16—85, 155, 179, 191, 221, 1003, 1230, 1332, 1420.

Grants a pension to the widow and minor children of a State prison officer who died as a result of injuries received or incurred in the performance of his duties—A. B. 239—143, 381, 459, 745.

Increases the benefits of the State prison officers pension system—A. B. 483—263, 317, 617, 641, 807.

Provides for an increase in pension benefits for certain judges upon showing that the salary pertaining to his judicial office has been increased since his retirement. (FN-\$192,500)—A. B. 644—394, 876, 1072.

Makes technical correction in P. L. 1968, c. 45, changing word from death to retirement—A. B. 729—444, 614, 643, 1064.

Grants a pension to any county court judge who has served at least 2 years as a county judge and who has attained the age of 60 years or more and who shall have served 25 or more years in the aggregate in State, county or municipal office, position or employment, including election to the Legislature—S. B. 777—865, 895, 1361, 1362.

Provides for increases in the pensions of retired public employees—A. B. 879—579.

Provides that the widow of any judge, shall receive a pension regardless of the judge's age at the time of marriage—A. B. 823—535.

Deletes the income limit for a person to receive a pension increase under the "Pension Increase Act." (P. L. 1958, c. 43)—A. B. 1108—1225, 1227, 1298, 1301, 1350.

Provides for an increase in retirement benefits for members of a city employees retirement system in 1st class cities having a population in excess of 400,000 inhabitants; effective July 1, 1970—A. B. 1067—1169.

Provides for an increase in retirement benefits for members of a county employees' pension fund in counties having a population exceeding 800,000 inhabitants; effective July 1, 1970—A. B. 1068—1170.

Provides for an increase in pension benefits for members of a Pension Fund of School District Employees in 1st class counties; effective July 1, 1970—A. B. 1069—1170.

Provides for an increase in pension benefits for members of a county employees' pension fund in counties having a population of from 300,000 to 325,000 inhabitants; effective July 1, 1970—A. B. 1070—1170.

Provides for an increase in pension benefits for county employees in counties having a population of less than 800,000; effective July 1, 1970—A. B. 1071—1171.

Provides for an increase for members of a retirement system in 1st class cities having a population of less than 400,000; effective July 1, 1970—A. B. 1072—1171.

Provides for a pension to a widow of a retired member of the State police, retroactive to July 1, 1961—S. B. 764—950, 952, 1351, 1352, 1405.

Pesticide Control Act—

Designated the "Pesticide Control Act," creates a Pesticide Control Commission in the Department of Health to regulate and control the use and sale of pesticides—A. B. 1099—1202, 1203.

Philadelphia-Baltimore-Washington Stock Exchange—

Invites the Philadelphia-Baltimore-Washington Stock Exchange to locate all or a portion of its activities in New Jersey—A. C. R. 16—132, 191, 304, 333, 365.

Pipelines—

Provides that a person excavating in any private place, or excavating with non-powered hand tools near a pipeline transmitting natural gas need not give notice of excavating—A. B. 800—502.

Pharmacy—

Regulates the ownership of pharmacies—A. B. 538—270.

Permits the board of pharmacy to grant reciprocal registration, without examination, to any applicant who has practiced pharmacy for 25 years in another State—S. B. 543—652, 653, 887, 998.

Planning Boards—

Permits a planning board to extend the original 3-year period from the date of the tentative approval of a plot showing new streets or roads or the subdivision of land along a mapped street, for an additional reasonable period of time up to 3 years provided the specific terms and conditions shall not be changed—A. B. 135—105.

Plumbing—

Prohibits plumbing inspectors from engaging in the business of plumbing within the municipality in which they are inspectors—A. B. 89—97, 155.

Police and Fire—

Includes a representative of the New Jersey State Lodge, Fraternal Order of Police, on the membership of the State Police Training Commission—A. B. 8—83, 156, 893, 894, 1056, 1369.

Permits in the event of an emergency for any municipal fire or police department or any county park police department to assist any municipality—A. B. 27—87, 178, 188, 189, 221, 338.

Permits a policeman or fireman to retire upon years of service rather than a particular age; increases pension benefits—A. B. 41—89.

Provides retirement benefits to policemen and firemen upon completion of 25 years of service—A. B. 48—91, 432.

Permits sheriff's officers to act as police officers for detection and arrest of offenders—A. B. 71—318, 578, 645.

Prohibits discrimination in volunteer fire departments, fire companies, fire patrols and volunteer ambulance, first aid and rescue organizations—A. B. 157—110.

Police and Fire (continued)—

Establishes uniform residency requirements for appointees to and members of municipal police and fire departments; effective on the 90th day after enactment—A. B. 158—110.

Prohibits unreasonable and arbitrary restrictions upon the off-duty activities of municipal policemen and firemen—A. B. 161—111, 921, 922, 979.

Provides that any condition or impairment of health of members of paid police or fire departments caused by hypertension, heart disease, or tuberculosis of the respiratory system, developed during the period of employment shall be deemed to be an occupational disease—A. B. 214—139, 191.

Increases to \$3,000 the minimum retirement pension for municipal police and firemen—A. B. 260—147, 191, 317, 921, 922, 1051.

Trading Stamps—

Requires merchants to offer cash or a cash discount in lieu of trading stamps—A. B. 789—501.

Transportation—

Extends the Tri-State Commission until March 1, 1970—A. B. 734—439,

Transportation—

Prohibits parking or standing of any vehicle within any area designated as a "bus stop" by local ordinance—A. B. 806—537.

Comments the commanding officer and ship's company of the U. S. S. New Jersey—A. C. R. 97—1193.

Unsatisfied Claim and Judgment Fund—

Permits property damage caused by a hit-and-run driver to be collected from the Unsatisfied Claim and Judgment Fund—A. B. 329—201.

Unsolicited Goods—

Provides that the acceptance of an unsolicited offer, made by mail, for the sale of goods or services, shall be in writing and signed by the offeree or his agent—A. B. 75—95, 156.

Requires that the acceptance of an unsolicited offer, made by mail, be in writing, any unsolicited goods shall be deemed an unconditional gift—A. B. 405—215, 316, 346.

Provides that unsolicited goods sent to a person shall be deemed an unconditional gift to such person, prohibits any civil action to be instituted for the recovery of the value of the goods—A. B. 1042—961, 964.

Provides that unsolicited goods sent to a person shall be deemed an unconditional gift to such person—S. B. 53—192, 193, 947, 964, 1094.

Urban Loan Authority—

Designated the "New Jersey Urban Loan Authority Act"; creates an Urban Loan Authority to promote the development of urban areas through capital loans to qualified businessmen in depressed areas; appropriates \$1,000,000—A. B. 863—583.

Urban Renewal—

Amends the definition of "Urban renewal corporation"—A. B. 503—295.

Validates certain deeds or conveyance by a substituted administrator of a decedent's estate—A. B. 507—296, 747, 802, 1012.

Validates certain proceedings for the issuance and sale of municipal bonds and any bonds issued or sold pursuant to such proceedings—A. B. 810—507, 508, 573.

Validates certain sales of land by municipalities—A. B. 894—619, 637, 645, 649, 807.

Validates certain proceedings at elections of school districts and any bonds or other obligations issued or to be issued pursuant to such proceedings—S. B. 375—194, 195, 308, 322.

Validating Acts (continued)—

Validates certain proceedings of school districts and any bonds or other obligations issued or to be issued pursuant to such proceedings—S. B. 465—523, 524, 726.

Validates certain proceedings at meetings or elections of school districts and any bonds or other obligations issued or to be issued pursuant to such proceedings—S. B. 793—948, 1008.

Veterans—

Increases the compensation for blind soldiers, sailors and marines; effective January 1, 1970—A. B. 17—85.

Increases from \$50 to \$100 the amount of a veteran's real estate tax deduction—A. B. 67—94, 190, 659.

Defines Vietnam conflict dates for civil service, pension and tax deductions laws for veterans—A. B. 245—144, 189, 883.

Grants civil service status to any airman who has been awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor, the Distinguished Service Cross, Air Force Cross or Navy Cross—A. B. 297—172, 380, 460, 796.

Grants experience credit to any veteran who served in the armed forces and was detailed for 6 months or more to assignments in investigations, intelligence, security or safety procedures for that period, toward the required 5-year period of experience for any applicant for a license as a private detective—A. B. 307—174.

Provides that any person who prior to July 1, 1963, passed a civil service examination and was entitled to a veteran's preference on the basis of service in the Korean emergency, shall on request be certified for appointment, notwithstanding that he didn't serve 90 days between June 23, 1950 and July 27, 1963—A. B. 308—174, 1168.

Creates a Veterans Vocational Rehabilitation Program for disabled Vietnam veterans; appropriates \$100,000—A. B. 336—202.

Permits veteran teachers to purchase credit in the Teachers' Pension and Annuity Fund for up to 5 years of military service—A. B. 368—298.

Provides that the time a person served in the armed forces shall be deducted from the person's actual age when applying for public employment—A. B. 438—245.

Permits any veteran public or school employee who has a service-connected disability of 10% more to retire at age 50 or 52 years—A. B. 444—246.

Defines the Vietnam conflict with respect to the veterans' tax deduction—A. B. 653—396.

Defines the terms "Korean Conflict" and "period of war-like conditions" with respect to the Civil Service veterans preference law—A. B. 867—584.

Defines the Vietnam conflict for civil service, pension and tax deductions for veterans—S. B. 250—621, 883, 1289, 1339.

Veterans (continued)—

Includes in the definition of World War I for a veteran's tax deduction, the period April 6, 1917 to April 1, 1920 for service with military forces in Russia—S. B. 388—340, 787, 898.

Provides that a professional librarian's certificate shall be issued to a World War II veteran who has held a professional librarian's office or position since November 1, 1957, provided application is made within 30 days of enactment—S. B. 397—486, 747, 846.

Extends to Vietnam conflict veterans' eligibility for promotional examination in the police and fire departments of 1st class cities; retroactive to February 28, 1968—S. B. 636—1024, 1025, 1026.

Memorializes Congress to locate a veterans hospital in southern New Jersey—S. C. R. 45—352, 353, 407.

Vocational Opportunity Loan Act—

Designated the "Vocational Opportunity Loan Act of 1969," creates the Vocational Opportunity Loan Fund to make loans to impoverished persons to obtain vocational training; appropriates \$1,000,000—A. B. 515—266, 318, 659.

Vocational Rehabilitation Act—

Permits non-State residents to qualify for benefits under the Vocational Rehabilitation Act—S. B. 819—1043, 1057, 1058.

Permits non-State residents to qualify for benefits under the Vocational Rehabilitation Act—A. B. 829—522, 651.

W

War Games—

Memorializes the Federal government to take appropriate action to prohibit the Department of Defense from staging war games activities for children of visitors at Fort Dix on Armed Forces Day—A. C. R. 26—176.

Water Conservation Bond Fund—

Allocates the proceeds of the Water Conservation Bond Fund—A. B. 939—704, 708, 744, 809, 810, 829, 830, 848, 916, 917.

Water Conservation Bond Act—

Designated the "Water Conservation Bond Act"; provides for a \$271,000,000 bond referendum for water resources—A. B. 940—705, 707, 744, 810, 811, 841, 842, 926, 1020, 1021.

Allocates the proceeds of the Water Conservation Bond Fund—S. B. 807—926, 927.

Waterfront Commission—

Amends the definition of "longshoremen" and "stevedore" in the Waterfront Commission Act, requires the licensing and registration of container consolidating companies and their employees—S. B. 705—865, 866, 1049, 1110, 1166, 1167.

Waterfront Commission (continued)—

Establishes standards of physical fitness and job qualifications for long-shoremen and checker applicants—S. B. 706—865, 866, 1049, 1110.

Grants the Waterfront Commission the power to designate any employee to be an investigator with all the powers of police officers in the State and New York State—S. B. 708—865, 866, 1049, 1110, 1179, 1180.

Water Policy and Supply—

Directs the Commissioner of Conservation and Economic Development to acquire certain property for water supply, and to cause to be constructed a tidal dam on the South River, Middlesex County—A. B. 81—96.

Requires the Department of Health to approve all plans and specifications for the construction of new water supply systems—A. B. 392—212.

Permits the State to acquire land in Monmouth and Middlesex Counties for water supply purposes—A. B. 497—264, 318, 942, 1033.

Provides that district water supply commissions shall consist of 7, instead of 5 members—A. B. 665—398, 921, 984.

Permits the disposal of water supply facilities—A. B. 724—445, 921, 1074.

Designated the "Clean Water Bond Act," provides for a \$222,000,000 bond issue for water supply—A. B. 819—539.

Designated the "New Jersey Water Resource Development Authority Act of 1969," provides for the construction of water resource development projects; appropriates \$500,000—A. B. 851—581.

Appropriates \$29,000,000 from the Water Conservation Fund for the development of future water supply facilities—A. B. 1115—1282.

Requires the State to pay for a substitute potable water supply when the water supply of municipality is contaminated by the State—S. B. 305—149, 150, 151, 152, 489, 506, 656, 657, 713.

Prohibits the State Sanitary Code to contain any regulation which requires or directs the mandatory fluoridation of any public potable water supply—S. B. 413—416, 1285, 1394.

Permits the State to acquire land in Monmouth and Middlesex Counties for water supply—S. B. 499—568, 569, 944, 1033, 1096.

Requires the State to pay for a substitute potable water supply when the water supply of a municipality or a school is contaminated by the State. (FN-\$105,000)—S. B. 534—523, 524, 887, 1101, 1308, 1309, 1356.

Weapons—

Prohibits the possession of pistols or revolvers unless specified by law—A. B. 93—98, 148.

Increases the minimum penalty for possession of a loaded firearm when committing certain crimes—A. B. 165—112, 154, 504, 549, 566.

Designated the "Firearms Registration Act of 1969," provides for the registration of all firearms—A. B. 258—147.

Permits a person to carry a firearm provided he is voluntarily surrendering his firearm to the sheriff or chief of police—A. B. 406—215.

Regulates the sale and purchase of firearms and other weapons, repeals Chapter 151 of Title 2A of the Statutes; effective 60 days after enactment—A. B. 441—246.

Weapons (continued)—

Provides that a person may carry any firearm from the place of purchase to his home or place of business provided the purchase is made in the State—A. B. 467—250.

Provides that any person convicted of a high misdemeanor or misdemeanor with a pistol or revolver without having a permit shall be punished upon conviction by imprisonment for not less than 10 or more than 20 years—A. B. 634—392.

Includes in the definition of a shotgun and rifle a short-barreled shotgun or rifle—A. B. 755—495.

Prohibits the possession of firearms while on the premises of a public or private school, college or university—A. B. 930—682, 683, 698, 699, 716, 1064.

Permits licensed retail dealers in firearms to carry on their business in the normal manner, without subjecting them to possible arrest for carrying a firearm without a permit—A. B. 963—754.

Permits any member of a legally licensed detective agency while in uniform and in the performance of his duties, to carry weapons—A. B. 970—755.

Provides mandatory additional punishment for offenses involving the use of firearms—S. B. 230—526.

Permits retired State police to carry firearms—S. B. 603—1024, 1026.

Permits any guard in the employ of any permit holder conducting pari-mutuel wagering to carry a weapon—S. B. 772—1024, 1025, 1026.

Weights and Measures—

Designated the “Weights and Measures Act of 1969”; effective 180 days after enactment—A. B. 435—245.

Welfare—

Provides that no petition for home life assistance shall be approved for a child or mother where it appears that such child is the third, or subsequent, illegitimate child, unless bastardy proceedings have been instituted—A. B. 138—106, 572, 611.

Provides that a child must be a resident of the State for 1 year to receive assistance for dependent children—A. B. 139—106, 572, 616.

Deletes reference to “New Jersey Medical Assistance Act” regarding parents in statutes pertaining to aid to dependent children—A. B. 180—115, 184, 191, 226, 1310.

Deletes reference to “New Jersey Medical Assistance Act” regarding parents in statutes pertaining to aid to dependent children—A. B. 180—115, 184, 191, 226, 1310.

Deletes reference to “New Jersey Medical Assistance Act” in statutes pertaining to old age assistance—A. B. 181—115, 184, 191, 227, 1310.

Deletes the 1 year residency requirement for a resident to receive old age assistance—A. B. 990—792, 793, 1056, 1310.

Welfare (continued)—

Provides that any resident of the State who has attained the age of 65 years who is not eligible to receive medical assistance pursuant to P. L. 1968, c. 413, and whose income and resources are insufficient to meet the costs of health services, shall be entitled to receive medical assistance for the aged—A. B. 991—792, 793, 988, 1310.

Requires the Director of the Division of Employment Security to notify the Director of the Division of Public Welfare when any recipient of aid or assistance under any public assistance or general assistance programs under the jurisdiction of the Division becomes gainfully employed—A. B. 1124—1352.

Memorializes Congress to enact legislation to improve the administration of the welfare system—A. C. R. 71—495, 502.

Wire Tapping—

Prescribes those that are authorized to request permission to wire tap—A. B. 597—335, 920, 1066.

Workmen's Compensation—

Provides that a doctor of medicine shall be liable to anyone at common, for any injury or death compensable under workmen's compensation—A. B. 618—390.

Provides for workmen's compensation for "Occupational hearing loss"; effective January 1, 1970—A. B. 706—447.

Provides that an individual shall be disqualified for unemployment compensation benefits where he has left work voluntarily without good cause not attributable to such work—A. B. 846—580.

Increases the workmen's compensation benefits—S. B. 57—273.

Prohibits a review of a workmen's compensation award, on the ground that the disability has diminished where the injured employee has submitted to rehabilitation—S. B. 58—273.

Provides that judges of the Division of Workmen's Compensation shall be full time, salary shall be the same as a county district court judge—S. B. 59—273.

Provides that workmen's compensation settlements are binding when an entry of "Order Approving Settlement" is made by a supervising judge of compensation—S. B. 60—273.

Worthington Tract—

Provides for the reacquisition of "Worthington Tract," Warren County by the State; effective January 1, 1971—A. B. 268—167, 379, 431, 470.

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
