MINUTES

STATE OF NEW JERSEY
GENERAL ASSEMBLY

TUESDAY, January 8, 1974

At 12 o'clock noon, Tuesday, January 8, 1974, Assemblyman-elect Christopher J. Jackman of Hudson County, called to order the first session of the One Hundred and Ninety-sixth Session of the General Assembly (the twenty-fifth under the Constitution adopted by the people in 1947) by reading the following call:

“This being the second Tuesday of January, the time fixed for the beginning of the Legislative year, the General Assembly of the State of New Jersey is now called to order.”

Mr. Jackman read the Certificate of Election.

Mr. Jackman administered the oath of office to Mr. Richard J. Codey, who administered the oath of office to the remaining members-elect.

Mr. Jackman called the roll — the members answered to their names and advanced to sign the scroll.

Prayer was offered by Rev. Arthur Jones, Pastor, Pilgrim Baptist Church, Newark, N. J.

Mr. Jackman led in the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

The Rutgers Glee Club offered a rendition of the “Star Spangled Banner.”

A motion was made by Mr. Hamilton, seconded by Mr. McCarthy, further seconded by Mr. Hicks, nominating Mr. Deverin as temporary chairman.

Which motion was adopted.

Mr. McManimon moved that the nominations be closed.

Which motion was adopted.

Mr. Deverin was unanimously elected as temporary chairman.

A motion was made by Mr. McManimon, seconded by Mr. Perskie, further seconded by Mr. Jackman, that Mr. S. Howard Woodson be nominated as Speaker of the General Assembly for the 1974-75 sessions.

Which motion was adopted.

Mr. McManimon addressed the General Assembly:

Members of the General Assembly:

As we organize for the purpose of conducting official business over the next two years, one very sobering thought should be evermost in our minds — we are an assembly of the people—we have been directed via the ballot-box to represent the people—

And represent them we will—

But—eighty well-intentioned law makers without effective organization and direction could well defeat the very objectives that are being sought.

Such a group needs one who can organize, who can direct, who can motivate and arbitrate — one who has devoted his life to leading.

As a clergyman he has related to his people in the high traditional sense of moral persuasion. One has but to see his church and talk with his people to appreciate the degree of success he has enjoyed in his chosen profession.

He has espoused the cause of the blacks in his community ever seeking the basic fundamental concept of an equal opportunity for all minority groups.

He has represented his constituency extremely well in a position of great trust and dedication. His people have returned him to continue to perform with great dignity.

As a man he is at once — a tower of strength, ready to do battle when required, but always able to calm troubled waters with logic and rhetoric, to compromise or retreat as the case may be, should the best interests of the State be so served.

A gentleman and a gentle man.

One who will be of great courage.

One who has the respect of both sides of the aisle.

It is indeed a high honor and a rare privilege to place in nomination for Speaker of the General Assembly for the 1974-1975 sessions, the Reverend S. Howard Woodson.

A motion was made by Mr. Salkind, that nominations be closed.

Mr. Deverin appointed a committee of five: Messrs. Hicks, Bornheimer and Gallo and Assemblywomen Berman and Croce, who escorted the newly-elected Speaker to the bar of the General Assembly.

The Honorable Richard J. Hughes, Chief Justice of the New Jersey Supreme Court, administered the oath of office to the Speaker.

A motion was made by Mr. Hawkins, seconded by Mr. Sinsimer, for the nomination of John J. Miller, Jr., for the office of Clerk of the General Assembly.

Which motion was adopted.

Mr. Baer moved that the nominations be closed.

Which motion was adopted.

The Speaker requested a roll call vote for election of the Clerk.

The Speaker declared John J. Miller, Jr., elected as Clerk of the General Assembly.

Mr. Owens administered the oath of office to the newly-elected Clerk John J. Miller, Jr.

The Speaker addressed the General Assembly:

Chief Justice Hughes, fellow legislators, distinguished guests, ladies and gentlemen, it is with a great sense of precious privilege and high honor, tempered by a deep humility, that I stand here today.

Perhaps for some of you, my ascendancy to the post of Speaker is nothing more than a logical step in political succession. But to me, it is far more than that, it is indicative of a sometimes painfully slow but surely changing social and political order. It speaks in a kind of eloquent language to many in my own race, who for more years than they care to recall, have lived with frustrated hopes and disappointed dreams . . . and says to them despite what has been, the future does hold brighter hope and promise

than the past. Somehow in these years which God has given me, despite the sometimes bitter disappointments through which I have lived, I along with many others of my race, have continued to believe, that America could and would yet, live up to the hopes and dreams of her founding fathers, that this would be the land of true opportunity for all people. My standing here today, adds a bit of strength to that belief. Where else but in this beloved land has this, or could this happen.

I do not consider this to be a personal achievement, but rather one in which hundreds, yes, even thousands have participated . . . I am what I am . . . and where I am because there have been so many unsung and perhaps, unthanked people, who across my years have shared their strength with me and permitted me to dream their dreams with them. If as I am told, this is an historic occasion that I am the first Black man to even hold this post anywhere; then all of the support I have received from so many across the bounding years has helped to write this history. To the membership of my church, which has granted me the time to serve in this capacity, I will always be grateful.

In the weeks that have followed since that hour when my Democratic colleagues so graciously offered me this opportunity, I have sought in cooperation with the leadership to begin a journey toward a stronger, more responsive and more responsible Legislature. Without exception, all with whom I have conferred have agreed that we must embark at once on a self improvement course which will eventuate into a more effective body. We have reduced the number of standing committees and have discussed with the Office of Legislative Services the pressing need to seek at once, the additional staff that is necessary for those committees to function at peak efficiency. We are in agreement that the public has a right to know what we do, and we, therefore, pledge that within the framework of physical possibility, all committee meetings will be open to public scrutiny. Committee chairmen will be mandated to release from committee as quickly as feasible those bills which can be considered for a consent calendar, and we pledge to give the minority as well as the majority ample time to consider the consent calendar before it is posted for a vote. We have created several new leadership posts and responsibilities and within the next several weeks we will propose through our rules committee such changes

in our rules as we believe will make for a better operation. Within a short period of time we will put into operation a new legislative telephone room which will preclude the necessity of legislators and others using the telephones in the back rooms behind the Speaker's desk, and thus, we hope reduce the confusion which so often accompanies the steady traffic which has in the past moved in and out of these rooms. Those who will serve us as Sergeants-at-Arms will be mandated to keep all unauthorized persons out of these chambers at all times during the sessions.

The majority leadership is in complete agreement that not only adequate space must be made available to the majority, but to the minority and the same holds true for majority and minority staff.

In study after study of legislative bodies throughout the Nation, it has been found that one of the major weaknesses which too often characterizes those bodies, has been the fact that far too often they have allowed themselves the dubious luxury of simply being reactors and often rubber stampers of administrative legislative programs. Certainly our new Governor will have every right to expect that we will act responsibly and responsively to his legislative proposals. But to be simply a rubber stamp for that which this Governor or any Governor proposes is to do both the Governor and ourselves a great disservice. Just as a strong and innovative Governor is needed, particularly in these crisis laden times, so also, is a strong, innovative and resourceful Legislature.

Knowing Brendan Byrne as I do, I am confident that he agrees. This means then, that we must not only have the capability to review and evaluate and hopefully improve upon those legislative proposals which are set before us, but in addition, and of equal importance, we must be capable of seeking out and identifying on our own, those problem areas which demand legislative solution.

To allow ourselves to be simply a part-time, half hearted, impotent legislative body, in the midst of a period of dynamic social change, and increasing crisis is to do ourselves and the citizens of this State an irreparable disservice and to negate the very reason we were sent to this chamber. Sound legislative ideas must be sifted out of the myriad suggestions which our varying constituencies

feel should be considered. Our task across the next two years will be a challenging one.

There is little doubt but that we will be faced with many knotty and challenging tasks in the days ahead: the implementation of the Botter decision demanding that we find a more equitable method of financing public education; the matter of dealing more forthrightly with the most insidious of all criminals, the non-addicted drug pusher whose greedy, cancerous, diabolical, damnable tentacles reach into the homes and lives of the rich and the poor alike. Our new Governor has pledged an unrelenting war against such people and we must join him in that war. Neither time nor energy will permit a recounting of the legislative challenges we will face this session, but it suffices to say that we must prepare ourselves to handle them.

Speaking as a Democrat for a moment, permit me to say that seldom in the history of New Jersey have Democrats been afforded so great an opportunity and so correspondingly great a responsibility. Only once in the past decade have we enjoyed not only solid majorities in both houses of the Legislature, but in addition, a Governor of the same political party. Such a majority while in a sense is enjoyable, yet in another, demands that we use our numerical strength with thoughtful caution and responsible determination. Let none of us presume, that the citizens of this State have conferred their trust upon us, because we as individual candidates were far superior to our opponents. To the contrary, our victory came at a time when the citizens of this State and of this Nation for that matter, were thoroughly disenchanted . . . yes, even disgusted by the perversions of power politics. They saw how they had been maneuvered and manipulated in ways that were unconscionable, and they used the most viable way at their disposal to register their discontent and displeasure. We as Democrats became the beneficiaries of that registered discontent and displeasure, and we must confess that many a good candidate on the other side of the political arena became the hapless victims of that displeasure.

Lest we forget then, that just as we have been beneficiaries, so can we become targets of the displeasure of the citizens of this State if we do not show ourselves worthy of the office to which we have been elected. To that end let us Democrats recognize that we will fulfill our elected obliga-

tions best when we seek to represent not only the interests of our own district and our parties, but the best interest of the total State as well; and that we fail as legislators when we seek to represent only our own special interest. Let us fully understand that what we do during this legislative session, may well determine not only our own political destiny, but the destiny of this Legislature and this State for many years to come.

To our Republican colleagues, I will, of course, expect that you will be a very valuable and vocal minority. Despite our partisan differences, I view your role as that of a partnership also. A partnership which from time to time may vigorously differ with us, but a differing which is not for the sake of differing, but rather, which does not agree, in the hope that out of the debate will emerge something that is better than that which has been proposed.

I pledge to you as Speaker, that I will grant within the framework of logic, reason and equity, every opportunity to give full expression to your considered thinking. Knowing some of you as I do, I have a deep and abiding respect for your several abilities, and I shall look to you as well as to the members of my own party for help in the days ahead. I am convinced, that together, we can make of this 196th session, one of the most progressive in the history of our State.

And now, let me thank all of you once again, and express a personal note of gratitude to my family for their understanding and support across many years, and to my new wife for her willingness to allow me to spend so much of my time away from home. I will ever and always be grateful to some close and personal political friends who have not only supported me, but encouraged me in less victorious circumstances. It is my continuing prayer, that God will grant to me the wisdom, the strength, and the continuing ability to fulfill the duties and responsibilities of this office; and that when it shall come to an end as comes the end to everything, I pray that I may be able to look back and say before you my colleagues and before God my maker, I have done my best.

Thank you. . . .

That at 2:30 p.m. both Houses of the Legislature meet in joint session for the purpose of receiving the Annual Message of His Excellency William T. Cahill, Governor of the State of New Jersey, which will be delivered in person.

In which the concurrence of the General Assembly is requested.

A motion was made by Mr. LeFante, seconded by Mr. Kean, that the General Assembly concur in the foregoing resolution.

Which motion was adopted by voice vote.

Mr. Hamilton offered the following resolution which was read by the Clerk and adopted:

Be It Resolved, That the Speaker appoint forthwith a committee of six to wait upon the Governor and inform him that the General Assembly has organized by the election of the Honorable S. Howard Woodson, Jr., of Mercer County as Speaker, and of John J. Committee Statement:

This bill requires that the operator and passengers utilize the restraint system in their automobile. Experience in

Australia, which has had a mandatory seat-belt law since December, 1970, shows that traffic fatalities may be reduced by as much as 25%, with a corresponding reduction in the number and severity of injuries.

The Transportation and Public Utilities Committee recommends that the Division of Motor Vehicles, upon enactment of this bill, undertake a comprehensive public information program to insure that the citizens of this State are aware of the tremendous savings in lives, and social and economic costs that would be realized if occupants of a motor vehicle utilized their seat belts.

The Assembly Committee on Taxation has undertaken to report on Assembly No. 380 unfavorably and to attach thereto a statement as to its reasons for doing so.

A close examination of the bill indicates that it follows closely existing law 54:1-35.35 et seq. There are two differences in the proposed bill and the existing legislation: The first is that appeal at present is made to the Director of Taxation, whereas Assembly No. 380 proposes that it be made to the County Board of Taxation; the second change involves the rendering of a decision on the appeal which at present must be made within 30 days and in Assembly No. 380 would be extended to 45 days.

The Committee feels that both changes would be a step in the wrong direction. First that the Director is far more able to determine the qualifications of firms and individuals in revaluation and in fact in both existing and proposed measures establishes the qualifications in the first instance.

Insofar as the amount of time elapsing between appeal and the rendering of a decision any extension of that time would not be in the best interest of a municipality.

The Assembly Committee on Taxation today voted to release A-643aca with a statement.

In determining to release the above bill the committee took a number of factors into consideration: First, it was generally agreed that the bill had merit and that it would correct an inequity in the taxation of retail establishments.

The second factor in the committee's determination was that the retail gross receipts tax was proposed originally as a temporary measure to provide revenue for the replacement of the locally imposed business personal property tax. In view of the fact that the amount mandated for distribution to the several municipalities of the State has been far exceeded and the repeal of this tax will not bring revenues below those necessary, this tax should be repealed.

A third factor considered by the committee, yet having less cogency than the other two, was that the Bill which was a forerunner to the present bill (A-381, 1972) was acted upon favorably in the previous session.

10:10 (add) (P. 15)—*No committee shall meet in executive session except by majority vote of the members of the committee in open session.*

A motion was made by Mr. Barbour, seconded by Mr. Froude, to refer the foregoing amendment to the Rules Committee.

Which motion was adopted by voice vote.

Mr. Orechio offered the following resolution:

Be It Resolved, That the proposed Rules of the General Assembly for the 196th Legislature, First Session, 1974, be supplemented by the addition of a new rule 12:6 to read as follows:

12:6. a. If a member is unable to be present during a vote or roll call, he may file with the clerk or assistant clerk a written statement, signed by the member, declaring his support for, or opposition to, a bill or bills, the number or numbers of which shall be listed on said statement. If the member declares his support for a bill or bills, an entry shall be made in the Minutes of the General Assembly stating that the member "announced for" said bill or bills. If the mem-

ber declares his opposition to a bill or bills, an entry shall be made in the Minutes of the General Assembly stating that the member "announced against" said bill or bills.

b. After a roll call has been taken and a quorum declared, there shall be entered in the Minutes of the General Assembly the term "absent" next to the names of those members who failed to attend. However, if the Speaker excuses any members from being present, there shall be entered in the Minutes of the General Assembly the term "excused" next to the names of said members.

A motion was made by Mr. Doyle, seconded by Mr. Ruane, to refer the foregoing amendment to the Rules Committee.

Which motion was adopted by voice vote.

PROPOSED RULES OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY
FOR THE 196TH LEGISLATURE, FIRST SESSION
1974

Amend Rules 1:4 and 1:5 to read as follows:

1:4. There shall be elected, at the first annual organization meeting, a Speaker, a Speaker pro tempore and a Clerk, who shall continue in office at the pleasure of the General Assembly. *The votes of 41 or more members of the General Assembly shall be required for the election of a Speaker, Speaker pro tempore and Clerk and to remove from office any person theretofore elected to any such office.*

1:5. At such annual organization meeting such other officers and employees shall be appointed, by resolution of the General Assembly, as it shall deem to be advisable and necessary, including [a secretary] *an Executive Aide to the Speaker, Deputy Clerk, [an] Assistant Clerks, Calendar Clerk, Journal Clerk, Supervisor of Bills, Bill Clerk, Sergeant-at-Arms and Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms.* The Clerk and the Sergeant-at-Arms shall continue in office until their successors are chosen and qualified.

Amend Rules 4:1, 4:2, 4:5, 4:7 and 4:9 to read as follows:

4:1. The Speaker shall take the Chair at the hour to which the General Assembly shall have adjourned, and immediately call the members to order, and on the appearance of a quorum, shall take up the business of the meeting in the order *hereinafter* provided [in Rule 9:2].

4:2. He shall have a general direction of the Assembly Chamber and the lobby and gallery thereof, together with such rooms and corridors and passages in the State House as may be assigned to the use of the General Assembly. In case of disturbance or disorderly conduct in the gallery or in the lobby he may cause the same to be cleared *or the offending person or persons arrested or removed.*

4:5. He shall state all questions before the General Assembly and shall distinctly put such questions in *substantially* the following form, to wit: "As many as are in favor of (the question) will vote aye:" and after the affirmative is expressed, "Those of a contrary opinion, will vote no." If the Speaker doubts, or a division be called for, pursuant to the rules of the General Assembly, a roll call vote shall be taken.

4:7. He shall from day to day prepare a Calendar of Bills and Resolutions for consideration, which Calendar shall be subject to the provisions of Rule [15:2.] 15:3. *He may include as part of such Calendar of Bills and Resolutions a Consent List of Bills and Resolutions defined as Bills and Resolutions not requiring debate; but no Bill or Resolution shall appear on the Consent List without the concurrence of the Majority and Minority Leaders and the Chairman of the Standing Reference Committee, if any, which considered the bill.*

4:9. If the Speaker shall desire temporarily to vacate the Chair during any meeting, he shall request the Speaker, pro tempore, or name another member to perform the duties of the Chair. *While so acting the Speaker, pro tempore, or such other member shall have and exercise the powers and duties of the Speaker.*

Amend Rule 5:15 to read as follows:

DUTIES OF THE CLERK, DEPUTY CLERK AND ASSISTANT CLERK

5:15. The *Deputy Clerk and Assistant Clerk* shall aid the Clerk in the performance of his duties [and shall, in the absence of the Clerk, perform the duties of the Clerk]. *One of them shall, as directed by the Speaker, perform the duties of the Clerk in the absence of the Clerk.*

Amend Rules 7:1 and 7:3 to read as follows:

7:1. The [Secretary to the Speaker] *Executive Aide to the Speaker* shall

- a. Assist the Speaker at the rostrum.
- b. Prepare the list of bills ready for third reading.
- c. Number according to the time of their receipt, all bills, public and private, joint resolutions and concurrent resolutions which are to be printed.
- d. Perform such other duties as shall be requested of him by the Speaker.

7:3. The Journal Clerk shall keep a record of the entire proceedings at each session, including the action taken on bills, resolutions and motions, all business transacted and other pertinent activities, and personal appearances; *he shall be responsible for the care, custody and accuracy of the record.* Such record shall constitute the official and permanent "Minutes of the General Assembly."

Amend Rule 8:1 to read as follows:

DECORUM AND DEBATE

8:1. No person shall be allowed on the floor of the General Assembly during its business session except as follows:

Members of the General Assembly, *and one aide per member, who shall be previously approved by the Speaker, and which aide shall bear proper, visible identification.*

State Senators.

Properly accredited representatives of the Press whose credentials have been approved by the Speaker of the General Assembly.

Attaches and employees of the General Assembly and the Senate.

Representatives of the Executive Department of the State Government who have been invited by a member to sit with him in an advisory capacity during the discussion of specific legislation.

Such other persons whose official business may require their presence on the floor or who shall, by permission of the Speaker or by resolution, be granted the privileges of the floor.

The taking of still or motion pictures during sessions and the recording of proceedings of the General Assembly may be taken or made only by advance arrangements therefor approved by the Speaker.

Delete Rule 8:11 and renumber following sections as 8:11, 8:12 and 8:13.

Amend Rule 9:2 to read as follows:

ORDER OF BUSINESS

9:2. *After the Speaker has assumed the Chair the order of business shall be as follows:*

a. *Prayer*

b. *Salute to the flag of the United States*

c. *Calling of the Roll*

d. *Reading of the minutes, if called for by any Assemblyman by motion which is carried. The minutes may be corrected immediately after such reading, or at any meeting thereafter by direction of the Speaker or on motion adopted therefor.*

e. *Recognition by the Speaker of the presence of any individuals or groups visiting the Assembly. Resolutions doing no more than welcoming or acknowledging the presence of visitors shall not be debated, but the Speaker shall recognize an Assemblyman from the County or Legislative District from which the visitors come to extend greetings.*

f. *Presentation and disposal of petitions, memorials and communications.*

g. *Bills and joint resolutions on third reading.*

h. *Introduction of bills.*

i. *Reports of standing and other committees.*

j. *Bills and joint resolutions on second reading.*

k. *Unfinished business.*

Amend Rule 10:1 to read as follows:

10:1. The following Standing Reference, Administrative, Special and Joint Committees shall be appointed, by the Speaker in accordance with the provisions of Rule 4:6, at the commencement of each annual session, and shall

serve for the entire legislative year, unless otherwise ordered, that is to say:

9. *Appropriations Committee*

(Appropriation bills; State aid other than education.)

10. *Taxation Committee*

(Revenue raising.)

11. *Transportation and Communications Committee*

(Transportation including highways, passenger vehicle and truck regulation; mass transit, bus and rail; airport and aviation regulation; communications including public utilities regulation, public broadcasting system; general communications.)

(State government including State structure and powers; employee relations including pensions relations with county and municipal governments; election laws; federal and interstate relations including federal relations, interstate compacts and authorities.)

The Appropriations Committee shall consist of thirteen members; the Judiciary Committee shall consist of eleven members; the Agriculture and Environment, Taxation, Labor, County Government, and Commerce, Industry and Professions Committees shall consist of nine members; the Education, Transportation and Communications, Municipal Government, Institutions, Health and Welfare, State Government, Federal and Interstate Relations, and Banking and Insurance Committees shall consist of ten members; all Standing Administrative Committees shall consist of six members; the membership of the General Assembly on the Ethical Standards Committee shall consist of four members, and all other Joint Committees shall consist of six members; and the Conference Committee shall consist of such number of members as the Speaker shall appoint.

The Speaker shall appoint a Chairman and Vice-Chairman for each Standing Reference Committee and a Chairman of all other Committees set forth in this rule. The Vice-Chairman shall preside in case of the illness or absence of the Chairman.

Sub-Committees of each of the General Assembly Standing Reference Committees may be created, and the members thereof, including a Chairman, named by the Chairman of the Standing Reference Committee with the consent of the Speaker. Any Sub-Committee shall review and consider Bills and Resolutions referred to it by the Chairman and within a reasonable time after such reference, report its conclusions to the full Standing Reference Committee.

In addition to the standing reference committees to which they are appointed, the Speaker, the majority and minority leaders and the assistant majority and minority leaders shall be ex officio members, without vote, on all other Standing Reference Committees.

Amend Rules 10:2, 10:3, 10:5, 10:7, 10:8, 10:9, 10:10, 10:11, 10:12, 10:13, 10:14, 10:15, 10:16, and 10:18 to read as follows:

10:2. The General Assembly may, with the consent of the Senate, *if the same is required*, appoint any commission, committee or other body whose main purpose is to

aid or assist it in performing its functions. Members of the General Assembly may be appointed to serve on any such body.

10:3. All reference committees shall meet at least once each week, except when the Legislature is in extended recess or was adjourned sine die, for the consideration of measures referred to them, and all committee hearings shall be announced in open session and advertised by posting a notice thereof in a conspicuous place in the Assembly Chamber and also at some prominent point in the main corridor of the State House. *No bill or resolution shall be reported by a committee unless the same has been considered at a meeting of the committee.*

10:5. A majority of the members of a reference committee may report a bill favorably or otherwise and in writing; but no bill or resolution of either House shall be reported out of committee, except upon the signed concurrence of a majority of the members of the committee. *No committee member shall change his vote or add his concurrence except at a regular or special meeting of the committee duly convened.*

10:7 [10:8]. Any motion or resolution which will result in relieving a reference committee of a bill referred to it shall not be entertained unless twenty-four hours' notice shall be given the General Assembly of the introduction of such motion or resolution. Such a motion or resolution shall not prevail unless it shall receive an affirmative vote of the majority of all the members of the General Assembly. *No such motion or resolution which will result in relieving a reference committee of a bill or resolution referred to it may be offered on more than two occasions for any such bill or resolution during any annual session.*

10:8 [10:9]. All Committees appointed at the first sitting shall continue to act during every subsequent sitting of the same annual session of a Legislature, or until they have reported on the business committed to them, or have been discharged. *If a Committee member is absent two consecutive meetings without legitimate cause and has not been excused by the chairman, he shall be deemed to have vacated his place on the Committee and shall be replaced.*

10:9. [10:10]. No committee shall sit during the sitting of the General Assembly, without special leave.

10:10. *Meetings of Standing Reference Committees where official committee action is to be taken shall be open*

to the general public. Nothing contained herein shall preclude convening any such Committee in closed or executive session, but full discussion and consideration of all bills and resolutions by a committee and all votes thereon shall be made in the presence of interested members of the general public.

10:11. The chairman of each Standing Reference Committee shall cause to be filed with the Clerk of the General Assembly a written report of each meeting of the committee, including (1) the date of the meeting; (2) the names of the committee members in attendance; and (3) the vote of each member present on a motion to report a bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution favorably, unfavorably, with amendments, by committee substitute or without recommendations.

10:12. The chairman of each Standing Reference Committee, in reporting a bill or resolution, may cause a statement in duplicate, explaining the provisions and purposes of the bill or resolution, including any amendments thereto, recommended by the committee, to be filed with the Clerk of the Assembly, one copy of which shall be delivered to the Supervisor of Bills for printing, if required.

A statement explaining the provisions and purposes of a Senate bill or resolution on which no statement is printed, to which no Senate Committee Statement is appended or as to which the Assembly Committee desires to append supplementary or corrective statement may also accompany the report of a Senate bill or resolution.

A statement explaining the impact of amendments, or a committee substitute recommended as to a bill or resolution which originated in the Senate may similarly be filed upon the reporting of a Senate bill or resolution.

10:13. The Supervisor of Bills shall have printed, for distribution as in the case of printed bills, any statement accompanying the report by a committee of a bill or resolution unless such statement shall state that the statement appended to and printed with the bill or resolution adequately explains its provisions as reported.

10:14. The Chairman of each Standing Reference Committee shall cause notice of each committee meeting to be distributed to the membership of the Assembly and posted in a conspicuous place in the Legislative Wing or announced

in open session, all at least 3 days prior to the scheduled meeting, unless such notice requirement shall be waived by special order of the Assembly. Such notice shall state the time and place for the proposed committee meeting and a list of the bills to be there considered by the Committee. Such notice may be waived by the Speaker of the Assembly.

10:15. Each Committee may adopt rules for its own operation and the conduct of its business, provided the same are not inconsistent with these rules.

10:16. The Chairman of a Standing Reference Committee shall cause at least one week's notice to be given to the Chairman of the Appropriations Committee of his Committee's intention to report any bill which would appropriate, or appear by its terms to require expenditure or cause a reduction in revenues of \$10,000.00 or more of State funds. The Appropriations Committee may prepare and submit to the Standing Reference Committee a report on the bill and may appear before the Committee on the bill in open session. Such report shall be filed with the Clerk of the Assembly if the bill is reported and shall be printed for distribution as in the case of printed bills. This rule is not applicable when the committee report is accompanied by a motion that the bill be accorded second reading by special order.

10:17. ASSEMBLY CONFERENCE COMMITTEE

a. The Speaker in making the appointments to the Conference Committee shall appoint members representative of all Assembly districts by indicating as to each appointee the district or districts he represents in addition to the district from which the member was elected.

b. Upon written request of twelve members of the General Assembly, representing no less than six counties, no more than three of whom shall have been elected from districts in the same county, and of whom no two members elected from the same multi-county district shall be considered to be elected from more than one county, a bill or resolution shall be withheld from the calendar for final passage until the calendaring thereof is approved by the Conference Committee by the vote of members of the Committee representing a majority of all the members of the General Assembly, provided, however, that such written request is made before the passage of one week from the

date on which the bill was released by a Reference Committee.

c. Whenever a Standing Reference Committee shall not have considered a bill or resolution and shall not have taken a vote on a motion to report it after three successive requests therefor, no two of which were made in the same week, by a sponsor or a member representing the sponsor of a measure originating in the Senate, the Conference Committee may direct that the Standing Reference Committee be relieved of further consideration thereof by the vote of members of the Committee representing a majority of all the members of the General Assembly.

d. Any matter before the Conference Committee shall be decided only by a vote of members of the Committee representing at least 41 affirmative votes of the members of the General Assembly, a quorum being present and voting thereon.

e. The rules applicable to Standing Reference Committees with respect to notices, and actions taken shall be applicable to the Conference Committee.

f. The names of those asking Conference Committee consideration of bills released from reference committees shall be made public upon request.

Amend Rules 13:9 and 13:11, to read as follows:

13:9. The previous question shall be put in this form: "Shall the main question be now put?" It shall be admitted only when demanded by [a majority] *two-thirds* of the members present, and its effect shall be, if decided affirmatively, to put an end to all debate, and bring the General Assembly to a direct vote upon amendments reported by a committee, if any, then upon pending amendments, and then upon the main question; if decided in the negative, to leave the main question and amendments, if any, under debate for the residue of the sitting, unless sooner disposed of by taking the question, or in some other manner. All incidental questions of order arising after a motion is made for the previous question, and pending such motion, shall be decided, whether on appeal or otherwise, without debate.

13:11. When a motion has been once made and carried in the affirmative or negative, or any bill has been passed or lost it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing party to move for the reconsideration thereof,

on the same day or on a subsequent day of actual meeting of the General Assembly thereafter, *provided, however, that in the case of a bill it shall be required that for any member to move for reconsideration thereof, the bill shall have obtained at least 30 affirmative votes*; all motions may be reconsidered, by a majority of the members present; but bills, to be reconsidered, must have the same majority that would be necessary to pass them; and such vote, on motion to reconsider, shall be by taking the yeas and nays.

Whenever a bill submitted by petition of the governing body of a county or municipality which pursuant to Article IV, Section VII, paragraph 10 of the Constitution requires the vote of $\frac{2}{3}$ of all the members of the General Assembly for its passage shall receive the votes of a majority but less than $\frac{2}{3}$ of all the members, the same shall not be delivered to the Senate as a passed bill and a further vote on the bill may be had at any time, on motion therefor, without adoption of a motion for reconsideration.

Amend Rules 15:1 through 15:29 to read as follows:

BILLS, JOINT RESOLUTIONS AND CONCURRENT RESOLUTIONS

15:1. a. Each bill, joint resolution and concurrent resolution shall be proposed for introduction in the General Assembly by depositing it in the Bill Box or by presenting it to the [Secretary of the Speaker] *Executive Aide to the Speaker*, in quadruplicate, each copy thereof endorsed with the signature of the member or members sponsoring the same.

b. The [Secretary] *Executive Aide to the Speaker* shall number all bills and resolutions as they are presented and make a list of them. Bills and resolutions to be printed offered for introduction in the second annual session of the same Legislature shall be numbered beginning with the number 2001.

c. After numbering and listing each bill and resolution, the [Secretary] *Executive Aide to the Speaker* shall make available one copy to the legislative correspondents, as the Speaker may direct, and shall deliver the original and two copies to the [Committee on Revision and Amendment of the Laws] *Judiciary Committee* for examination as to form.

d. After such examination and when it shall be indicated on the bill or resolution that it has been released, the said

Committee shall return the original and one copy of said bill or resolution to the [Secretary] *Executive Aide* of the Speaker, retaining one copy for the files of the Law Revision and Legislative Services Commission.

h. During the second annual session of the Legislature, no bill introduced after September 1st shall be printed except by order of the Speaker or special order of the General Assembly.

15:2a. [15:1A.] Whenever any member of the General Assembly shall desire to introduce any bill, which if enacted, would increase or decrease State revenues or increase State expenditures or would require the appropriation of State funds not set forth in dollars therein, he [may] *shall* request, in writing, the [Legislative Budget and Finance Director] *Office of Fiscal Affairs* to prepare and certify to him a fiscal note containing an estimate in dollars of the amount by which State revenues would be increased or decreased, or by which State expenditures would be increased, by reason of the enactment thereof, or of the amount of appropriation of State funds which would be required to carry out its purposes if it should be enacted, and he shall forward with such request a copy of said proposed bill.

15:2b. [15:1B] Whenever any proposed bill is delivered to the *Judiciary* Committee [on Revision and Amendment of Laws] of the General Assembly for examination as to form prior to its introduction, the Committee shall also determine whether such a bill, if enacted, would increase or decrease State revenues or increase State expenditures or would require the appropriation of State funds not set forth in dollars therein. If the Committee shall determine that the bill will have such effect upon State revenues or expenditures, the Committee shall, upon approval of the bill for introduction, endorse upon the original and each copy of said bill, a notice stating that examination of the bill indicates that such a fiscal note may be required for said bill, addressed to

(a) The Chairman of the Committee to which said bill is designated to be referred, or

(b) The Speaker, if said bill is designated by him not to be referred.

15:2c. [15:1C.] The Chairman of the Committee, or the Committee, to which any Assembly Bill, so endorsed by the

Judiciary Committee [on Revision and Amendment of Laws] of the General Assembly, is referred, shall, before reporting the bill, request the [Legislative Budget and Finance Director] *Office of Fiscal Affairs*, in writing, to cause to be prepared and certified to him, or it, a fiscal note for the bill. If such bill, so endorsed by the *Judiciary* Committee [on Revision and Amendment of Laws] of the General Assembly, is not referred but is not immediately advanced to second reading, then the Speaker shall request the [Legislative Budget and Finance Director] *Office of Fiscal Affairs*, in writing, to cause to be prepared and certified to him, a fiscal note for the bill. If the Chairman of the Committee, or the Committee, to which any Assembly bill not so endorsed by the *Judiciary* Committee [on Revision and Amendment of Laws] of the General Assembly, or any Senate bill, is referred, shall be of the opinion that the effect of such bill, if enacted, would be such that a fiscal note should be annexed to or accompany said bill, or that any statement in the nature of a fiscal note which is annexed to or accompanies said bill is not an accurate fiscal note for said bill, he, or it, shall, before reporting the bill, request the [Legislative Budget and Finance Director] *Office of Fiscal Affairs*, in writing, to cause to be prepared and certified to him, or it, a fiscal note, or an accurate fiscal note, as the case may be, for the bill. If any Assembly bill not so endorsed by the *Judiciary* Committee [on Revision and Amendment of Laws] of the General Assembly, or any Senate bill, is not referred, but is not immediately advanced to second reading, then the Speaker, if he be of the opinion that the effect of said bill, if enacted, would be such that a fiscal note should be annexed to or accompany said bill, or that any statement in the nature of a fiscal note which is annexed to or accompanies said bill is not an accurate fiscal note for said bill, shall, before the bill is advanced to second reading, request the [Legislative Budget and Finance Director] *Office of Fiscal Affairs*, in writing, to cause to be prepared and certified to him a fiscal note, or an accurate fiscal note, as the case may be, for the bill.

If the *Executive Director of the Office of Fiscal Affairs*, when so requested, shall determine that the effect of the bill as to which such request is made, if enacted, would be to increase or decrease State revenues, or to increase State expenditures, or to require the appropriation of State funds not set forth in dollars therein, and that no fiscal note is affixed to or accompanies said bill, or that any statement

in the nature of a fiscal note, which may be annexed to or accompany said bill, is not an accurate fiscal note for said bill, he shall cause to have prepared and certified a fiscal note, or an accurate fiscal note, accordingly, and no such bill shall be reported out of Committee or have second reading until such request shall have been fully complied with, or until the Chairman of the Committee, or the Committee, or the Speaker, as the case may be, has been notified by the **[Legislative Budget and Finance Director]** *Office of Fiscal Affairs* that no fiscal note is required for said bill, or that any statement in the nature of a fiscal note annexed to or accompanying said bill is an accurate fiscal note for said bill.

15:2d. **[15:1D]** Whenever any bill of the character described in Rule 15:2a **[15:1A]** is introduced and advanced to second reading, a fiscal note may be required to be furnished to it only by special order of the House and in case such an order is made the preparation of a fiscal note to said bill shall be requested, in writing, of the **[Legislative Budget and Finance Director]** *Office of Fiscal Affairs* by the Clerk of the General Assembly.

15:2e. **[15:1E]** When any request for a fiscal note is received by the **[Legislative Budget and Finance Director]** *Office of Fiscal Affairs*, **[said]** the *Executive Director thereof* shall thereupon make written request of the Director of the Division of Budget and Accounting in the Department of the Treasury to have such fiscal note prepared and furnished promptly to **[him]** (the **[Legislative Budget and Finance Director]**) *said Executive Director* according to law or that he certify to said **[Legislative Budget and Finance]** *Executive Director* that no such dollar estimate can be made, stating the reason therefor as required by law.

15:2f. **[15:1F.]** Whenever any fiscal note to any bill shall be forwarded by the Director of the Division of Budget and Accounting to the **[Legislative Budget and Finance Director]** *Office of Fiscal Affairs*, the **[said]** *Executive Director thereof* shall examine the same as to its accuracy and

(a) if he finds it to be accurate, he shall approve it, or

(b) if he finds it to be inaccurate, he shall prepare an accurate fiscal note for the bill and he shall promptly have delivered in person or by certified mail, to the introducer whose name first appears upon the bill, a copy of the fiscal

note so approved with a notice of such approval or a copy of the fiscal note prepared by him, together with a copy of the fiscal note prepared by the Director of the Division of Budget and Accounting, as the case may be, with a notice that such introducer may object to such fiscal note within 5 days after the receipt of such notice.

If such introducer shall so object, the [Legislative Budget and Finance Director] *Executive Director of the Office of Fiscal Affairs* shall, after giving consideration to such objection, determine the final form in which such fiscal note shall be certified by him and he shall certify such determination to such introducer and he shall also certify the fiscal note so approved or determined upon by him, to the Clerk of the House if such fiscal note was requested by an introducer of said bill or by said Clerk, or to the Chairman of the Committee or the Committee to which the bill has been referred, or to the Speaker of the House, if, and according as, any one of them may have requested the same and said certificate shall be printed and distributed in the same manner as bills are printed and distributed.

15:2g. [15:1G.] Whenever the Division of Budget and Accounting advises the [Legislative Budget and Finance Director] *Office of Fiscal Affairs* that it desires to change data previously submitted and incorporated in a fiscal note to reflect additional costs or reduced revenue, the [Legislative Budget and Finance Director] *Office of Fiscal Affairs* shall immediately so advise the prime sponsor of the bill; but no such new data shall be accepted by the [Legislative Budget and Finance Director] *Office of Fiscal Affairs* on the same day the subject bill is calendared for action in either House.

15:2h. *Whenever any member of the General Assembly shall desire to introduce any bill which, if enacted, would increase or decrease county, municipal, school or special district revenues or require an increase in expenditures by any thereof, he may request, in writing, the preparation and certification to him a fiscal note containing an estimate in dollars of the amount by which county, municipal, school or special district revenues or expenditures would be increased or decreased. Such a request for a fiscal note shall be processed in the manner prescribed by Rules 15:2a through 15:2q.*

Whenever the preparation and certification of a fiscal note with respect to a bill which would affect county, municipal,

school or special district revenue or expenditures would require an extended period of time and unduly impede consideration of the bill by the Assembly, the Office of Fiscal Affairs may so certify together with the best estimates of the fiscal impact of the bill as can be ascertained within a reasonable amount of time and such a certification shall constitute compliance with the requirements for provision of a fiscal note.

15:3. [15:2.] Any bill, joint resolution, concurrent resolution, or resolution may be made the order of a particular day, on which day it shall be taken up, whether or not it is upon the Calendar for said day, in preference to any others whether or not they are on the Calendar.

15:4. [15:3.] The introducer of a bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution [may] *shall* annex thereto a brief statement explaining the object of the bill or resolution and the localities or persons it will affect, which statement shall contain no more than four hundred and fifty words and shall be printed at the end of the bill or resolution under the caption "Statement".

15:5. [15:4.] Bills [and], resolutions *and proposed changes in a Standing Rule (or Order) of the General Assembly* shall be presented in typewritten, printed or other similar form in one original and three carbon or similarly duplicated copies thereof. All amendments to bills, [or] resolutions *or Standing Rules* shall be similarly presented in one original and three copies thereof. Copies of all bills, joint resolutions, concurrent resolutions and resolutions, except concurrent resolutions and resolutions otherwise ordered by the Speaker, amendments thereto and official copy reprints thereof, *and proposed changes in any Standing Rule (or Order)* shall be printed for the use of the members of the General Assembly and Senate and for public distribution in such quantities as determined by the Clerk of the General Assembly; provided, however, that no quantity in excess of one thousand copies of all bills, joint resolutions and concurrent resolutions and official copy reprints thereof shall be printed without the consent of the Speaker or order of the General Assembly.

15:6. [15:5.] When a bill is proposed for introduction which is in the form of an amendment to an existing statute, new matter shall be underlined if the bill is written or typewritten, or printed in italics if the bill is printed, and matter

appearing in the statute to be amended, which is to be omitted in the bill, shall be included in its proper place in bold-faced brackets.

All bills which shall have been amended shall be reprinted in similar manner and form, the amendment being indicated as provided by paragraph f. of Rule 15A:1.

15:7. [15:6.] Two copies of every bill, joint resolution and concurrent resolution introduced shall be printed on good bond paper, to be approved by the Supervisor of Bills, one of which copies shall be retained in his office and the other of which shall be delivered to the Clerk, to be used thereafter as the official copy of said bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution. This rule shall not apply to concurrent resolutions that are not to be printed by order of the Speaker.

15:8. [15:7.] All bills and joint resolutions, and all concurrent resolutions that are to be printed, after they shall have had first reading, shall be delivered by the Clerk to the Supervisor of Bills who shall, unless they have been previously printed, cause them to be printed. The original of each bill, joint resolution and concurrent resolution after it is printed, with a printed copy thereof, shall be returned to the Supervisor of Bills for examination as to whether or not the same has been properly printed.

15:9. [15:8.] Bills and joint resolutions which have passed their second reading, together with all amendments thereto, shall be delivered by the Clerk to the Supervisor of Bills, who shall see that they are in proper form for third reading.

The Supervisor of Bills shall forthwith have printed all such amendments and in addition he shall have reprinted all Assembly bills, joint resolutions and concurrent resolutions originating in the Assembly and amended therein, with the amendments included therein. The Supervisor of Bills shall also have printed Assembly Reprints of all bills, joint resolutions and concurrent resolutions originating in the Senate and amended by the General Assembly. One copy of each amendment to a Senate or Assembly bill or resolution adopted by the Assembly shall be delivered by the Clerk to the Judiciary Committee for examination immediately after its adoption.

15:10. [15:9.] Every bill and joint resolution, and every concurrent resolution proposing an amendment or amend-

ments to the Constitution, shall be read three times in the General Assembly before final passage but no bill or joint resolution shall have a first and second reading on the same day without special order concurred in by a majority of all the members of the General Assembly. A concurrent resolution, other than one proposing an amendment or amendments to the Constitution, shall be before the General Assembly and may be acted upon at any time after its introduction, unless it shall have been referred to committee. Any concurrent resolution, other than one proposing an amendment or amendments to the Constitution, which has been referred to committee, shall be before the General Assembly and may be acted upon at any time after the same shall have been reported by a committee.

15:11. [15:10.] No bill or joint resolution shall be considered on third reading in the General Assembly until after the intervention of one full calendar day following the day of the second reading but if the General Assembly shall resolve by vote of three-fourths of all of its members, signified by yeas and nays entered on the Journal, that a bill or joint resolution is an emergency measure it may proceed forthwith from second to third reading.

15:12. [15:11.] Bills and joint resolutions, and concurrent resolutions that were originally printed, originating in and passed by the General Assembly and amended by the Senate, when concurred in by the General Assembly, shall be delivered by the Clerk to the Supervisor of Bills for reprinting.

15:13. [15:12.] The Supervisor of Bills shall have printed every bill, joint resolution, and every concurrent resolution that were originally printed, originating in the General Assembly which shall have been amended in the General Assembly and ordered to a third or final reading which shall be known and designated as "Official Copy Reprint." [The Supervisor of Bills shall deliver forty copies of all bills, joint resolutions and such concurrent resolutions designated as "Official Copy Reprint" to the Secretary of the Senate, and eighty copies to the Clerk of the General Assembly.] *The Supervisor of Bills shall also have printed every bill, joint resolution and every concurrent resolution, originating in the Senate and amended in the Assembly, and ordered to a third or final reading, which shall be known as "Assembly Reprint" of a Senate bill or resolution. The Supervisor of Bills shall deliver eighty*

copies of all bills, joint resolutions and such concurrent resolutions designated as "Official Copy Reprint" or "Assembly Reprint" to the Clerk of the General Assembly, and forty copies to the Secretary of the Senate.

15:14 [15:13.] All bills, joint resolutions and concurrent resolutions previous to their final passage by the General Assembly, and all petitions, motions and reports, may be committed at the pleasure of the General Assembly. The recommitment of any bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution proposing an amendment or amendments to the Constitution, when the same has been ordered to a third reading, shall have the effect of placing the same upon the second reading. The recommitment of any other concurrent resolution shall have the effect of placing the same upon the first reading. No motion to recommit any bill or resolution after the same has been ordered to third reading, shall be made or considered in the absence of the member introducing such bill or resolution.

15:15. [15:14.] Except when advanced prior to printing by special order or emergency resolution, printed copies of bills and joint resolutions and concurrent resolutions which are given more than one reading shall be used on their second and third readings, and no amendment shall be received to any bill or joint resolution on its third reading.

Upon the request of any member of the General Assembly no motion to advance a bill or joint resolution to third reading in advance of the availability of printed copies thereof shall be considered until duplicated copies of the bill or joint resolution, and fiscal note where required, shall have been made available to the members of the General Assembly.

15:16. [15:15.] The Supervisor of Bills shall affix his official stamp to each page of the copy, to be used as an official copy and intended to be submitted to the Governor for his approval of each bill or joint resolution ordered to a third reading when the same is found to be correct and shall deliver the same to the Clerk.

15:17. [15:16.] Original bills and joint resolutions, and concurrent resolutions that are printed, after being printed, shall be delivered by the said Supervisor of Bills to the chairman of the committee to which each such bill or resolution has been referred. If any such bill or resolution has not been referred to a committee, then such bill or resolution after being printed, shall be delivered by the Supervisor of Bills to the Clerk.

15:18. [15:17.] No bill [or], joint resolution *or concurrent resolution ratifying an amendment to the Constitution of the United States proposed by the Congress*, shall pass the General Assembly, unless there shall be a majority of all the members of the House personally present and agreeing thereto, and the yeas and nays of the members voting on such final passage shall be entered in the Journal, that is to say, the Minutes, of the General Assembly.

15:19. [15:18.] The certification of the passage by the General Assembly of every bill and joint resolution and concurrent resolution when directed shall be signed by the Speaker and thereafter shall be delivered forthwith by the Clerk to the Senate, with all documents incident thereto, with the request, in the case of every Assembly bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution, that the Senate concur therein. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to have all Assembly bills, joint resolutions and concurrent resolutions returned to the General Assembly after passage by the Senate.

15:20. [15:19.] When a bill originating in the Senate shall have been delivered to this House, with a message that the Senate has passed the same and requesting the concurrence of this House therein, and a bill identical therewith, originating in this House, is then pending in this House, the Senate Bill may be substituted for such Assembly Bill, on motion of a sponsor of such Assembly Bill, upon or after the second reading of the Assembly Bill and the Senate Bill may then be advanced to, and have, third reading and be passed in substitution for the Assembly Bill and take the usual course of passed bills and the sponsors of the Assembly Bill may, upon the motion of one of them, be added as co-sponsors of the Senate Bill, with the Senator or Senators who were sponsors of the Senate Bill in the Senate and the names of such co-sponsors shall be endorsed upon the jacket containing the Senate Bill. The provisions of this Rule are expressly subject to the provisions of Rule 15:11.

15:21. [15:20.] When an Assembly bill or joint resolution is returned, amended by the Senate, the message or report thereof by the Secretary of the Senate shall be read by the Clerk [and the amendment or amendments shall be spread upon the minutes], and such an amendment or amendments shall not be referred, except upon motion, and may be concurred in at any time, upon motion with or without amendments, but the bill itself shall not be amended.

If the motion is for the General Assembly to concur in the Senate amendments without amendment, the question shall be "Will the General Assembly concur in the Senate Amendments to Assembly Bill or Joint Resolution No. . . .?"

If upon said question being put, a majority of the whole General Assembly shall, by a vote of yeas and nays, entered upon the Journal, concur, the bill or joint resolution with the amendments so concurred in shall be delivered by the

Clerk to the Supervisor of Bills for reprinting under the supervision of the Committee on Printed Bills and it shall then be signed and certified as are other bills or joint resolutions.

If the motion is to concur in the amendments by amending them, the proposed amendments to the amendment shall be read by the Clerk [and shall be spread upon the Minutes] and the question shall be "Will the General Assembly concur in the Senate Amendments, as amended, to Assembly Bill or Joint Resolution No. . . .?"

If upon said question being put, a majority of the whole General Assembly shall by a vote of yeas and nays, entered upon the Journal, concur, the bill or joint resolution, with the Senate amendments as amended by the General Assembly printed separately, shall be certified as other bills or joint resolutions and be returned forthwith to the Senate for its action thereon.

15:22. [15:21.] When a Senate bill or joint resolution has been amended by the General Assembly and the Senate shall refuse to concur therein, the message and report thereof by the Secretary of the Senate to this House shall be read by the Clerk and spread upon the Minutes and, if the General Assembly desires to recede from said amendment, the question shall be "Will the General Assembly recede from the Assembly Amendment or Amendments to Senate Bill or Joint Resolution No. . . .?"

If, upon such question being put, a majority of all the General Assembly shall, by a vote of yeas and nays, agree to recede from the amendment said vote shall constitute the final passage of the bill without amendment or the amendments from which the House has receded.

15:23. [15:22.] When a bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution proposing an amendment or amendments to

the Constitution, originating in the Senate, shall have been delivered to the General Assembly with a message that the Senate has passed the same and requesting the concurrence of this House therein, the reading of the message shall be taken as the introduction and first reading in this House of such bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution and it shall then be referred, unless the House shall otherwise order, and shall take the same course as is taken by bills originating in this House, but it shall not be reprinted.

15:24. [15:23.] When a concurrent resolution, other than one proposing an amendment or amendments to the Constitution, is returned amended by the Senate, the message or report thereof by the secretary of the Senate shall be taken as its first reading and, unless it shall be referred to a committee, it shall be entitled to a final reading on the same day, without a motion for that purpose.

15:25. [15:24.] One copy of every amendment to each bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution amended in the General Assembly, after its report by the committee which it was referred, which is ordered to be reprinted and have a third reading, shall be delivered to the *Judiciary* Committee [on Revision and Amendment of the Laws] for examination, and if it be found that such amendment agrees with the context of the bill, the Supervisor of Bills shall cause to be printed all such amendments and, in addition, if the bill or resolution originated in the General Assembly, he shall cause the bill or resolution to be printed with the amendments included therein.

15:26. [15:25.] No private, local or special bill shall be introduced in the General Assembly unless and until proof of publication of notice of intention to apply for its passage, as required by R. S. 1:6-1 et seq., shall have been filed with the Clerk of the General Assembly.

15:27. [15:26.] When any bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution proposing an amendment or amendments to the Constitution shall have passed third reading in the General Assembly,

(a) the Speaker shall certify thereon as of the date when the same passed third reading as follows:

This (bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution),
having been three times read in the General Assembly,

Resolved, That the same do pass.

By order of the General Assembly.

.....
Speaker of the General Assembly.

unless the same shall have so passed amended, in which case
the Speaker shall so indicate in the resolution as so cer-
tified, and

(b) the Clerk shall endorse thereon the date when said
bill was introduced in the General Assembly, if it originated
in the Senate and the date upon which it had each of the
three readings in the General Assembly and the number
of votes cast for and against this passage and also if the
same originated in the General Assembly that said bill,
joint resolution or concurrent resolution did so originate,
and

(c) the Clerk shall forward such bill, joint resolution
or concurrent resolution to the Senate with a written
message informing the Senate that the General Assembly
has passed it and, if the same originated in the General
Assembly, requesting the concurrence of the Senate therein,
but if the same, having originated in the Senate, has been
amended in the General Assembly, the Clerk shall request
a concurrence by the Senate in such amendments in his said
message.

15:28. [15:27.] All Senate and Assembly bills pending
before the General Assembly upon the adjournment sine die
of the first annual session of a Legislature shall maintain
their status and be pending before the second annual
session of the same Legislature upon its convening and
organization.

15:29. [15:28.] Upon the adjournment sine die of the first
annual session of a Legislature, the Clerk of the General
Assembly shall cause to be made an inventory of those
printed Assembly bills and resolutions which will remain
pending before the second annual session and shall order

a further printing of those in short supply for the use of the members and the public, in such quantity as he shall determine, not in excess of the number prescribed in Rule [15:4]15:5.

PRINTING OF BILLS, JOINT RESOLUTIONS AND
CONCURRENT RESOLUTIONS

15A:1. In printing legislative bills, joint resolutions and concurrent resolutions:

a. The numbers 10 and above shall be expressed in Arabic figures, except where a number begins a sentence. Words shall be used for the numbers one through nine except that Arabic figures shall be used when any of these numbers is used as a section or paragraph number of legislation, as part of a date or in a statement of dollars and cents, time of day or measurement or as part of an authorized abbreviation or citation.

b. Material enclosed in bold-faced brackets shall be printed without change in all copies of the bills, joint resolutions and concurrent resolutions notwithstanding that by subsequent amendment part of the material so enclosed is to be included in the bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution.

c. A footnote shall be annexed to the first page of each bill which contains material enclosed in bold-faced brackets to the following effect:

“Explanation—Matter enclosed in bold-faced brackets [thus] in the above bill is not enacted and is intended to be omitted from the law.”

d. Material underlined shall be printed by substituting italics for the underlined material and omitting the underlining, and material included in italics shall be so printed.

Amend Rule 15A:1.e. and f. to read as follows:

e. Amendments to bills, joint resolutions and concurrent resolutions adopted during their progress through the House shall be printed separately [but a Senate bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution, so amended by the Assembly, shall not be reprinted with such amendments included therein unless and until such amendments shall have been concurred in by the Senate]. *A Senate bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution amended by the Assem-*

bly shall be reprinted with such amendments included therein as an "Assembly Reprint" of the Senate bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution. When such amendments shall have been concurred in by the Senate, there shall be a further printing as the "Official Copy Reprint" of the bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution as passed by both Houses.

f. In printing bills, joint resolutions and concurrent resolutions which have been amended, with the amendments included, *and proposed changes in Standing Rules (or Orders)*, all material intended to be omitted by the amendment shall be printed in the bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution in its proper place enclosed in stars or asterisks and bold-faced brackets thus—

[thus]

and all material intended to be added by the amendment shall be printed in its proper place in italics enclosed in stars or asterisks—

thus

notwithstanding that the material to be added is part of the material enclosed in bold-faced brackets in the original bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution or in any amendment thereof previously adopted by the House and if the bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution is amended a second time, double stars or asterisks shall be used and additional stars or asterisks shall be used in the same manner as successive amendments are adopted.

Delete Rule 16A :2 and renumber 16A :3 as 16A :2.

Amend Rule 22:3 to read as follows:

22:3. The term "concurrent resolution" shall mean a formal resolution passed by a majority of the members of the General Assembly, the Senate concurring therein, which expresses the sentiment of both Houses or accomplishes some purpose with common interest to both Houses. *A concurrent resolution is also the form of legislation used to propose an amendment or amendments to the State Constitution and to ratify an amendment to the Constitution of the United States proposed by the Congress. No action by the Governor is required with respect to a concurrent resolution.*

Amend Joint Rule 14 to read as follows:

14. Whenever two or more members or members-elect of the same House shall separately propose for pre-filing the same or substantially the same bill or resolution, the Law Revision and Legislative Services Commission shall notify such members and members-elect and seek their concurrence to co-sponsorship of a single bill or resolution, but, except as provided in [5] 13 above, no member or member-elect shall be denied the right to pre-file any bill or resolution.

1. That February 7-9, 1974 shall officially commemorate the establishment of the New Jersey Committee of Correspondence, and the citizens of the State of New Jersey are urged to take part in ceremonies in Burlington on February 8.

2. That the Governor is requested by appropriate proclamation to establish February 7-9, 1974 as the official commemoration of the formation of the New Jersey Committee of Correspondence.

WHEREAS, They have suffered through the use of child labor, a system of labor contracting which exposes them to the cruel treatment of exploitative labor contractors, uncontrolled pesticide use, substandard housing and health and safety protections, and an average yearly income of \$2,400 per family, and

WHEREAS, Under no protection from the laws of the land but under the leadership of Cesar Chavez and the United Farm Workers, AFL-CIO, farm workers have been able to organize themselves into a union of their own and non-

violently influence corporate growers through the great grape strike and boycott, and

WHEREAS, Through the contracts signed with lettuce and grape producers in 1970 the United Farm Workers instituted the hiring hall system to end child labor and the labor contractor practice, banned the most dangerous pesticides, established health clinics and guaranteed field workers a human wage, and

WHEREAS, These contracts having expired have not been renewed, nor have elections been held to determine the will of the farm workers, and farm workers have again been forced to strike, and to avoid violence inflicted upon them have resumed their non-violent boycott of California iceberg lettuce, and table grapes as their only means to defend their union, and

WHEREAS, The United Farm Workers of America, AFL-CIO is presently conducting another international boycott of these products and this union is asking for public, church, political, and labor support for their struggle, therefore

Be It Resolved, That the Legislative Assembly of the State of New Jersey goes on record as endorsing the UFW boycott of non-United Farm Workers lettuce and grapes, from California, and

Be It Further Resolved, That the State Assembly urges the citizens of New Jersey to refrain from purchasing non-UFW lettuce and grapes from California until growers grant their workers the right to choose their own representation, and

Be It Further Resolved, That the State Assembly will urge the Honorable Brendan T. Byrne to likewise endorse the UFW boycott of these products and to enforce the boycott in all State institutions under the fiscal responsibility of this body, and

Be It Further Resolved, That the State Assembly recommends a special week commencing April 28, 1974 to be set aside with the designation of "United Farm Workers Week" in the State of New Jersey, and

Be It Further Resolved, That copies of this resolution be sent to the offices of the following chain stores that they might realize the importance of the Farm Workers Boycott to the future of poor people in these United States: A & P,

Grand Union, Pathmark, Shop-Rite, Acme, Pantry Pride, Penn Fruit, Stop & Shop, Finast, and Mid-Eastern, and

In order to preclude the interpretation of the bill to prohibit individual assessors from updating their assessment lists and added assessments, the language "throughout a" taxing district was added.

To provide a definite cut off date for the moratorium, the date December 31, 1975 was substituted for the two-year provision.

The committee is in total accord with the revaluation of any taxing district, but in the light of the existing effort toward reform of the property tax structure, the members believe a moratorium on directed revaluations should be made at the discretion of the Director of the Division of Taxation until such time as the form and substance of such reform is determined. Statement to Assembly No. 804:

The intent of this bill, as amended by the Municipal Government Committee of the General Assembly, is to assure that a local redevelopment agency will not be abolished upon the adoption of a new form of government under the Optional Municipal Charter Law. At the same time, the committee amendment grants the new governing body total discretion in appointing the commissioners of a local redevelopment agency.

Statement to Assembly No. 498:

The bill concerns the enactment of an ordinance by the process of popular initiative in municipalities with a commission form of government.

The original bill amended the present law so as to require that at least 50% of the qualified electors cast ballots at such elections.

The committee amendment requires that the 50% of the qualified voters actually cast their ballots on the question of the proposed ordinance. The amendment is designed to avoid a situation where an ordinance is adopted by popular referendum merely because 50% of the qualified voters cast ballots on some other question which may be submitted to the voters at the same election as the proposed ordinance.

The committee believes this amendment to be consistent with the main objective of the sponsor, which is to reduce the possibilities of a small and unrepresentative group of voters substituting their will for that of the popularly elected representatives of the general community.

Benefits, paid directly to the approved educational institution, would amount to the lesser of full tuition or:

a. For educational institutions operating on a semester system, \$200.00 per semester.

b. For educational institutions operating on a quarter system, \$100.00 per quarter.

c. For institutions not operating on the semester or quarter system, \$400.00 per full school year.

d. For veterans in a part time program, the amount shall be determined by the Commissioner of Institutions and Agencies.

The duration of the educational benefit depends upon the amount of time the veteran spent on active duty after December 31, 1960, and before the date of termination of such benefit as will be proclaimed by the Governor. The maximum benefit of four years of education is achieved after serving 18 months on active duty. Those serving less than 18 months would receive the full amount provided above but for a reduced period of time.

In order to receive such benefits, a veteran would have to be a resident of New Jersey and eligible for Veterans Educational Assistance under Federal Law and (1) have been domiciled in the State either at the time of his induction into the armed forces or at the time of his discharge therefrom, or (2) been domiciled in New Jersey for a period of not less than two consecutive years exclusive of any time spent on active duty.

WHEREAS, Because of the intimate connections which exist between the states of New York and New Jersey as a result of their numerous relationships in the metropolitan New York - New Jersey area, there is a pressing need to coordinate the governmental actions of both states so as to maximize mutual benefits and avoid potential conflicts; and,

WHEREAS, There are at present highly critical pending questions regarding the bi-state transportation system, common problems of pollution, environmental protection and economic development of the bi-state area, and mutually acceptable adjustment of tax burdens upon persons and business functioning across state lines; and,

WHEREAS, The aforesaid problems and others which the proximity and close economic and social involvement of the two states make inevitable now and in the future dictate the need for close cooperation through regular and dependable channels at all times; and,

WHEREAS, It is the duty of this House to assure its understanding of and communication with the Legislative branch of the government of the State of New York, to the end that proper coordination may exist between the two states in approaching those aspects of our mutual problems which require concurrent or complementary legislative action; now, therefore,

Be It Resolved by the General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

1. The members of the General Assembly Standing Committee on Intergovernmental Relations are authorized and directed to take all necessary and appropriate steps to provide for adequate liaison with the New York Legislature, through such arrangements not inconsistent with the laws or constitution of this State or the rules of this House as may be acceptable to the New York Legislature or those members of either House thereof designated or empowered to enter into such arrangements.

2. The aforesaid committee is authorized to meet with the designated representatives of the New York Legislature,

or either House thereof, jointly, for purposes of discussion of matters of mutual interest to the two States, and to participate in public hearings at any time or place in either State as may be mutually agreeable.

3. For the purpose of carrying out the duties and functions prescribed by this resolution the said committee shall be entitled to call to its assistance and avail itself of the services of any State, county or municipal board, bureau, department or agency as may be available to it for such purpose, and to employ such stenographic and clerical assistants and incur, such traveling and other miscellaneous expense as may be necessary to carry out the purposes of this resolution and as may be within the limits of funds appropriated or otherwise available to it for such purposes.

4. The said committee shall report to the General Assembly from time to time, as it may see fit or as the General Assembly may request, upon the progress and results of its discussions pursuant to this resolution, and may wish to recommend for enactment.

5. A duly authenticated copy of this resolution shall be transmitted forthwith to the Speaker of the New York Assembly and the President Pro Tempore of the New York Senate.

This bill provides a formula for distributing State aid to certain municipalities with small but densely concentrated population and distinctly low taxing capacity. These municipalities may generally be described as the former "town centers" of rural (or formerly rural) areas; and such

centers have lost or are losing their economic vitality because of changes in the patterns of transportation, commerce and land development. Except for size (5,000 or less population) the municipalities which this bill would aid suffer from the same pattern of decline which has afflicted the larger urban centers. To qualify for aid under this bill a small municipality would have to have a population density which is (1) not less than 1,000 per square mile and (2) not less than four times that of the neighboring municipalities of its area; and its tax ratables per capita would have to be more than $\frac{4}{5}$ the average of the county in which it is situated.

All the municipalities qualifying under those criteria would receive a proportion of whatever amount is appropriated for the purpose. The share of each qualifying municipality would bear the same proportion to the total amount distributed as its population bears to the total population of all qualifying municipalities. The actual amounts involved depend upon the appropriation made by law, which is not specified in this bill.

The above numbered bills together with Assembly No. 649, Assembly No. 650 and Assembly No. 651 which are presently on second reading in the General Assembly are called to the attention of the members of the General Assembly as a package of bills which in the Committee's view are necessary to improve assessments and assessment procedures and appeals in all matters of taxation.

The present appeal structure is such that many appeals are not decided for 3 or 4 years. Such a condition is an imposition upon the taxpayer who pays the bills for he should have quick disposition of any appeal.

If we are to have tax reform it is not enough to alter the tax structure but it is also necessary to improve the procedures in the administration of all taxes. The assessment of real property and the administrative supervision of assessment procedure by the State leaves much to be desired. The Taxation Committee of the General Assembly believes that it is in the interest of the taxpayer, of the local assessor and of the State to give thorough and serious consideration to the bills aforementioned.

JOINT RULES GOVERNING LEGISLATIVE DISTRICT OFFICES

Pursuant to the provisions of the General Appropriations Act for 1974-75 (P. L. 1974, c. 58) the following joint rules are established to govern establishment of and expenditures for District Offices for members of the Senate and General Assembly.

1. Definitions.

a. "District Office" means the office from which a member or group of members of the Legislature conduct legislative business. A district office need not be within the

geographical limits of the member's legislative district provided it is in a location convenient to the constituents of the member's district.

b. "Rent" means and includes (1) the amount the State will pay under a lease for district office space, and (2) the installation and basic monthly charge the State will pay for telephone service in a district office.

c. "Furnishings" means and includes the monthly charge the State will pay for a copier machine in a district office including the specified monthly use thereof as set forth in the rental agreement and the items of office furniture and equipment the State will purchase and provide for a district office. A sample guideline list of office furnishings is annexed to these rules. All furnishings supplied by the State are the property of the State of New Jersey. "Furnishings" does not mean or include airconditioning units, carpet, rugs, shades, draperies, signs, pictures or other decorative items or installations.

d. "Director" means the Director of the Division of Purchase and Property in the Department of the Treasury to whom is delegated the authority and responsibility for negotiating leases and rental agreements and the purchase and delivery of furnishings for district offices and to whom all requests for district office rentals and purchases shall be directed.

2. Within the limits of appropriations therefor and in accordance with these rules each member of the Senate and General Assembly is authorized to establish and maintain with State support a district office. Senators and Assemblymen representing the same Legislative District are encouraged to establish a joint district office.

State expenditures for any member's district office during the year commencing July 1, 1974 shall not exceed a total of \$5,000 for rent and furnishings nor more than \$3,000 for either rent or furnishings. Furnishings, telephone service and a rental copier may be supplied for use in a district office located in premises owned or rented by a member.

3. Responsibilities of members in re District Offices.

a. A member will execute and deliver to the Director a receipt for all State-owned property installed in his district office and shall agree to make the same available

for return to the State in good condition, fair wear and tear excepted, upon termination of his membership in the Legislature.

b. It is not necessary for members to insure furnishings supplied by the State for loss occasioned by fire; the State is a self-insurer for such furnishings.

c. A member will be billed for and shall pay charges for copier use in excess of those authorized for payment by the State.

d. On receipt of periodic telephone toll charges the member will pay the State for all personal calls charged to his district office phone and shall account for official toll calls as heretofore.

e. Paper and other office supplies may not be ordered through the Director of the Division of Purchase and Property.

4. Responsibilities of the Director.

a. State leases for office space shall not exceed the square feet specified in the annexed list and shall be for the remainder of a member's elective term and shall provide for cancellation in the event a member ceases to be a member of the Legislature. Public liability insurance will be a subject of lease negotiation. Options for renewal may be included.

b. The Director may accept a member's assignment of an existing lease if the terms thereof meet the State's requirements.

c. District office telephone installations shall be one line and two instruments per member.

d. To permit standardization within a district office the Director is authorized to approve and purchase or rent approved items of furnishings of a make or manufacture other than as listed on the annexed list.

e. The Director will supply the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the General Assembly with a duplicate record of items and services supplied each Senator's or Assemblyman's district office.

f. The Director is not authorized to purchase furnishings owned by a member.

Be It Resolved by the General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

1. Extend to all the citizens of the State who have journeyed to Trenton to bring to the attention of the Governor and the Legislature their concern regarding the worsening economic conditions in New Jersey, its cordial welcome; and

2. Request all members of the General Assembly, and particularly the Speaker of this House, to assure all representatives of labor, industry and commerce assisting us today that this House accepts fully its responsibility to promote, by all legitimate means, full employment for all its citizens.

WHEREAS, His great accomplishments, expert knowledge, varied experience and outstanding personal qualities gave promise of ever-growing achievement, and his untimely death has deprived the State of New Jersey of a public servant whose rank and acclaim might one day have grown to match his merits; now, therefore,

Be It Resolved by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey, in Joint Session:

That the Legislature hereby pays tribute to the memory of Joseph A. Gannon, honors his outstanding record of brilliant and devoted service to his party, to the Legislature and to the State of New Jersey, and laments his sudden and untimely death; and,

ASSEMBLY BILL No. 90

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(a) of the Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 90, without my approval.

Assembly Bill No. 90 would supplement Chapter 14 of Title 52 of the Revised Statutes so that the Director of the Division of Budget and Accounting in the Department of the Treasury would be required to advance certain funds for the travel expenses of State employees. Under section 1.2 of the State Travel Regulations currently in effect, the Director may, in his discretion, advance 75 percent of anticipated travel expenses between \$100 and \$250, and may advance 90 percent of anticipated travel expenses in excess of \$250. Assembly Bill No. 90 would require the Director of the Division of Budget and Accounting to advance anticipated travel expenditures of less than \$100.

This bill would substantially increase the flow of documents regarding travel expenses as well as require con-

siderable bookkeeping for each employee's advance travel account. It would thereby impair the efficiency of governmental operations. It is estimated that in order to provide, and account for, small advances for day-to-day travel, the Division of Budget and Accounting would have to add several employees for each of the major departments. The cost of this bill to the State is, therefore, unreasonable.

In addition, the Director of the Division of Budget and Accounting is currently reevaluating the present State travel regulations in all respects. As part of that reevaluation, I have directed the Director to explore the possibility of revising the regulations to permit the advance of some anticipated expenditures of less than \$100, but not the advance of the smallest sums.

I, therefore, must return Assembly Bill No. 90 without my approval.

This bill amends Title 36 of the Revised Statutes so as to change Veterans Day from the fourth Monday in October to the eleventh day of November. After the United States Congress established a series of Monday federal holidays through 5 U. S. C. § 6103, the New Jersey Legislature did likewise for State holidays. Since then, some 40 states have, primarily at the urging of veterans organizations, returned to November 11 as the Veterans Day holiday for State purposes. I understand the emotional support behind this bill, from Veterans and Veterans' Organizations, and have read the letters of support which have flowed into the Executive offices. The Veterans often do not get the public recognition and support they deserve.

This bill is certain to result in some confusion however. With regard to the State, employees of the Department of Defense, at the very least, would continue to observe the fourth Monday in October as their Veterans Day holiday by virtue of the preemptive effect of 5 U. S. C. § 2105, which defines those persons subject to 5 U. S. C. § 6103. In addition, in this energy conscious era, many institutions, such as the public schools, would consume more energy in shutting down and reopening in the middle of a week than in shutting down for a three-day weekend. With regard to the private sector, the banking industry especially would be affected, because of the federal and State character of the industry. More importantly, I have learned that a number of labor union contracts leave open the possibility that if the State were to change Veterans Day, a viable claim could be made that the union membership would be entitled to two paid holidays called Veterans Day.

I note that if the popular support for this type of legislation is as strong as its proponents describe, the United States Congress should not be reluctant to amend 5 U. S. C. § 6103 so as to change the date of observance of Veterans Day. I would, of course, then urge the New Jersey Legislature to conform State law to the amended federal law. Under present circumstances, however, I feel that I must return Assembly Bill No. 91 without my approval.

ASSEMBLY BILL No. 1168 (OCR)

To the General Assembly:

I return Assembly Bill No. 1168 (OCR) without my approval, pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(a) of the Constitution, for the following reasons.

This bill exempts from service on any panel of grand or petit jurors any individual enrolled as a student or intern on a full-time basis in any high school, college, university, graduate school, seminary, vocational school or other educational institution. I am not persuaded that good reason exists to exempt students from jury service, which is one of the most important of any citizen's duties. Indeed, jury service could be considered an important part of any student's education.

Moreover, this bill further narrows the range of persons to be found in any jury pool, a range already narrow because of the absolute exemptions written into N. J. S. 2A:69-2 and because of the operation of the challenge system to exclude persons of unusual income or education. In view of the reduction of the age of majority from 21 years to 18 years, this bill is particularly inappropriate in that a defendant falling within that age group would find it virtually impossible to have one of his peers as a juror. A good number of recent judicial decisions have focused on claims by defendants relating to this very point. As a practical matter, it should be emphasized that judges currently possess considerable authority to exempt from jury duty persons, such as students during the actual school year, for whom such duty would constitute an unusual hardship. This existing flexibility is superior to the absolute exemption provided by this bill.

I am, therefore, returning Assembly Bill No. 1168 (OCR) without my approval.
