# JOURNAL OF THE SENATE

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STATE OF NEW JERSEY,

SENATE CHAMBER.

TUESDAY, January 8, 1980.

At 12 noon, this being the time and place apointed by the Constitution for the assembling of the Legislature, the Senate was called to order by Robert E. Gladden, Secretary of the Senate.

The session was opened with prayer by Bishop John C. Reiss, St. Francis Church, Trenton.

Upon calling the roll the following Senators answered the call and the Secretary declared a quorum present:

Bedell, Caufield, DiFrancesco, Dodd, Dorsey, Dumont, Dwyer, Errichetti, Ewing, Feldman, Foran, Gagliano, Graves, Gregorio, Hagedorn, Hamilton, Herbert, Hirakala, Kennedy, Laskin, Lipman, Maressa, Merlino, Musto, Orechio, Parker, Perskie, Rodgers, A. Russo, J. Russo, Scardino, Skevin, Vreeland, Wallwork, Yates, Zane—36.

Mr. Hagedorn offered the following resolution, which was read and adopted by voice vote:

*Resolved*, That Mr. Parker be elected temporary President of the Senate.

Mr. Parker took the Chair.

Mr. Dwyer moved to proceed to the election of a "Temporary Secretary," which motion was adopted.

Mr. Maressa offered the following resolution:

*Resolved*, That Mr. Gladden be elected Temporary Secretary of the Senate.

Mr. Yates seconded the nomination.

There being no other nominations, Mr. Gladden was duly elected to the office of Temporary Secretary of the Senate.

Mr. Dwyer moved to proceed to the election of President Pro-Tem.

Mr. Dodd offered the following resolution:

*Resolved*, That Mr. Feldman be elected President Pro-Tem of the Senate.

Mr. Scardino seconded the nomination.

There being no other nominations, Mr. Feldman was duly elected to the office of President Pro-Tem of the Senate. The vote was as follows:

Mr. Feldman stated that Mr. Merlino, having received 26 votes in the affirmative and no votes in the negative, declared him elected to Permanent President of the Senate.

Chief Justice Robert Wilentz administered the oath of office to President Merlino.

Mr. Dwyer moved to proceed to the election of a Permanent Secretary.

Mr. Maressa placed in nomination for the office of Permanent Secretary of the Senate, Mr. Gladden.

Mr. Errichetti seconded the nomination.

Mr. Merlino called for other nominations, hearing none, proceeded with the vote for Permanent Secretary of the Senate, which vote was as follows:

In the affirmative were—

Mr. Merlino stated that Robert E. Gladden having received 38 votes in the affirmative declared him elected to the office of Permanent Secretary of the Senate.

Mr. Dwyer offered the following resolution which was read and adopted:

*Be It Resolved by the Senate of the State of New Jersey (the General Assembly concurring):*

That at 2 p.m. both Houses of the Legislature meet in joint session for the purpose of receiving the Annual Message of His Excellency, Brendan T. Byrne, Governor of the State of New Jersey, which will be delivered in person.

That the printer be directed to furnish, as soon as printed and without waiting for the regular distribution, the number of copies of each bill, joint resolution and concurrent resolution introduced in the Senate and General Assembly, each

committee substitute therefor, each official copy reprint thereof, and each printed amendment thereof, herein designated to the following:

The Governor—21.

The Secretary of State—40.

The Attorney General—4.

Law Revision and Legislative Services—15.

State Library Reference Bureau, for use of said Bureau and for exchange with other states—200.

That the printer likewise furnish to the State Library Legislative Reference Bureau, 20 copies of each weekly installment of the Senate Journal and Minutes of the General Assembly.

The Secretary of the Senate and the Clerk of the General Assembly be designated request officers for the Legislature as required by law.

The legislative printer shall print and make distribution of bills, resolutions, installments of the Senate Journal and Minutes of the General Assembly as heretofore and in accordance with the legislative printing contract.

The Legislative Index and the New Jersey Legislative News for 1980 be subscribed to for the use of members of the Legislature, and for such officers of the Senate and General Assembly and other persons designated by the President of the Senate and Speaker of the General Assembly, at the subscription rate heretofore established: Legislative Index, \$60.00 for each subscription for a period not to exceed 10 weeks, and \$6.00 per copy furnished thereafter; New Jersey Legislative News: \$60.00 for each subscription.

1,000 copies of each bill, joint resolution and concurrent resolution, and each official copy reprint be printed for the use of the Senate.

The Legislative Code of Ethics as set forth in 1976 Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 104 be adopted temporarily as the Legislative Code of Ethics pending adoption by concurrent resolution of a Legislative Code of Ethics for the 1980-81 Legislature.

Mr. Dwyer offered the following resolution which was read and adopted:

*Resolved* that:

1. For the 1980 Session there be employed for each Senator, Legislative Aides, to be designated by him at an aggregate salary of \$20,000 payable in the same manner as all other Senate employees for the legislative year.

2. The 1980 Legislative Manual be distributed to the Senate on the same basis as for the 1979 session.

3. Resolved that the Rules of the 1979 Senate be adopted temporarily as the Rules for the 1980 Senate subject to the following amendment:

a. Add a new Rule to read as follows:

145A. Action by the Senate to congratulate a person or organization upon the occasion of a significant event, anniversary or accomplishment or to memorialize the death of a person shall be by issuance of a formal Citation or Memorial certificate except in a case where the President authorizes it to be the subject of a Senate Resolution. Issuance of Citations and Memorial certificates shall be authorized by adoption of a resolution to be introduced by the majority and minority leaders containing the names of the persons and organizations to be honored, the occasions or events to be cited and the name or names of the Senators requesting it. All Citations and Memorial certificates to be authorized on a particular session day may be included in a single resolution.

4. In order to carry out the aforementioned practice and procedure, William M. Lanning, H. Arthur Smith, Jr., Mary Joan Dickson, Walter Kennedy, James M. Coleman, Jr., Gertrude Erman, Maurice Gold, Albert Porroni, Leonard Lawson and Victoria Lawler be designated as counsel to the Judiciary Committee of the Senate and that the duties of such counsel shall be to conduct said preliminary examination of bills proposed for introduction in the Senate under the general supervision of the chairman of the Judiciary Committee and through the Division of Legal Services pursuant to law.

5. The appointment of officers and employees of the Senate by the President, and the payroll for such officers and employees of the Senate be adopted and the Secretary be authorized to authenticate the same as approval officer.

6. All statements of expenses of the Senate or of the Legislature on account of the Senate be referred for approval and forwarded for payment from the State Treasury as heretofore.

7. The Committee on Ways and Means be authorized to procure the necessary stationary and supplies for the use of members of the Senate.

8. Unless otherwise ordered, the daily sessions of the Senate shall begin on Mondays at 2 p.m. and on Thursdays at 11 a.m.

9. The Secretary of the Senate be directed to inform the General Assembly that the Senate has organized and elected the Honorable Joseph P. Merlino, of the County of Mercer, President and Robert E. Gladden, of the County of Camden, Secretary and has proceeded to business.

10. His Excellency the Governor be informed that the Senate has organized for 1980 by the election of the Honorable Joseph P. Merlino, of Mercer County, as President, and Robert E. Gladden, of Camden County, as Secretary, and is now ready to proceed to business and to receive any communications he may forward.

11. That the President appoint Senators Orechio, Hirkala, Hagedorn and Parker to wait on the Governor.

SENATE BILL No. 1003

*To the Senate:*

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(b) of the Constitution, I am returning Senate Bill No. 1003, with my objections, for reconsideration.

Senate Bill No. 1003 would relieve counties of their statutory liability to the State for one-half the maintenance cost of Medicaid and Medicare eligible county residents in State mental institutions which have lost accreditation. The bill would relieve such liability retroactive to December 21, 1975, when Trenton Psychiatric Hospital lost its accreditation, and would require the State to make refunds retroactive to that date to those counties which have made payments to the State for Medicaid and Medicare eligible patients at nonaccredited State psychiatric institutions. Enactment of this bill would overturn the recent decision in *Klein v. Mercer Co.* holding Mercer County liable for one-half the maintenance costs of its Medicaid and Medicare patients at Trenton Psychiatric Hospital, plus interest from the date of nonpayment.

Although I am sympathetic to the unfairness of the current situation whereby those counties which are served by an unaccredited State mental health facility must pay one-half the maintenance costs of Medicaid and Medicare eligible patients while counties served by accredited facilities pay nothing, I believe that this bill reaches too far into the past in resolving this issue.

The bill would require the State to write off \$3.7 million of anticipated revenues from those counties which have refused to meet their legal obligations and would require a refund of an additional \$4 million to those counties which have paid the State for the maintenance of their Medicaid or Medicare patients at Trenton Psychiatric Hospital. Furthermore, the bill would require the State to assume such future costs which are estimated at \$1.8 million a year.

Recognizing the inherent injustice in the existing system which penalizes those counties which must utilize an un-

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accredited State facility, I am proposing to prospectively eliminate the obligation of the counties to pay for the maintenance cost of Medicaid and Medicare eligible residents in State mental health facilities, recognizing that such action would result in an annual loss of revenue to the State of \$1.8 million. In addition, in order to provide a reasonable adjustment of the interests of the parties, I would support a forgiveness of a portion of the principal sums due for years prior to 1980. To go back the entire 4-year period would make uncertain the affairs of government. I would support a forgiveness of  $\frac{1}{3}$  of the past due principal amounts.

Accordingly, I am returning Senate Bill No. 1003 for reconsideration and recommend that it be amended as follows:

*Page 1, Section 1:* Delete in its entirety and insert the following:

"1. In the case of Medicaid and Medicare eligible patients, the maintenance costs to be paid by the counties shall be satisfied by Federal Medicaid or Medicare payments to the State. Should a State hospital for the mentally ill lose its accreditation and subsequently not receive Federal Medicaid and Medicare payments, the counties shall not be liable for the maintenance of Medicaid or Medicare eligible county patients.

In the case of any county which has incurred an obligation to the State for the maintenance of such patients between December 21, 1975 and January 1, 1980,  $\frac{1}{3}$  of its obligation shall be forgiven. Any county which has made payments on account of such obligation shall receive a credit, to the extent that such payments exceed  $\frac{2}{3}$  of its total obligation, against obligations due to the State for other patients."

*Page 1, Section 2:* Delete "December 21, 1975" and insert "January 1, 1980."

A "Statement," containing not more than three hundred words, explaining the object and the localities or persons it will affect shall be annexed to a bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution and the same shall be printed at the end of the bill or resolution under the caption "Statement."

In lieu of adding and designating a Senator as a cosponsor of proposed legislation by motion, any Senator may be added and designated as a cosponsor of a bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution by the filing with the Secretary of a written notice to that effect signed by the prime

sponsor of the bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution and by the Senator to be added and designated as a cosponsor thereof.

b. The Secretary shall number all bills and resolutions to be printed as they are presented and make a list of them. Bills and resolutions to be printed offered for introduction in the second annual session of the same Legislature shall be numbered beginning with number **[2001]** 3001.

c. After numbering and listing each bill and resolution, the Secretary shall make available one copy to the legislative correspondents, as the President may direct, and shall deliver the original and two copies to the **[Judiciary Committee]** *Division of Legal Services* for examination as to form.

d. After such examination and when it shall be indicated on the bill or resolution that it has been released, the said committee shall return the original and one copy of said bill or resolution to the Secretary, retaining one copy for the files of the **[Law Revision and]** Legislative Services Commission.

e. Thereupon, unless the President shall theretofore have so indicated, the Secretary shall present the original thereof to the President for his endorsement thereon, the committee, if any, to which it is to be referred, and return to the Secretary for introduction, after which the original and one copy shall be transmitted to the Supervisor of Bills.

f. The reading by the Secretary of the number, title and committee reference if any, of each bill and resolution delivered to him by the President shall be taken as the introduction and first reading of the bill or resolution.

g. All bills and joint resolutions and concurrent resolutions proposing an amendment or amendments to the Constitution shall, after their first reading, be referred to their appropriate committees, unless the Senate shall otherwise order and shall, unless they have been previously printed, be printed for the use of the members. Other concurrent resolutions and resolutions shall take the same course as to printing unless otherwise ordered by the President of the Senate.



8. Amend Rule 109 as follows:

109. Bills and joint resolutions which have passed their second reading, together with all amendments thereto, shall be delivered by the Secretary to the Supervisor of Bills, who shall see that they are in proper form for third reading.

The Supervisor of Bills shall forthwith have printed all such amendments and in addition he shall have reprinted all Senate bills, joint resolutions and concurrent resolutions originating in the Senate and amended therein, with the amendments included therein. The Supervisor of Bills shall also have printed Senate Reprints of all bills, joint resolutions and concurrent resolutions originating in the General Assembly and amended by the Senate. One copy of each amendment to a Senate or Assembly bill or resolution adopted by the Senate shall be delivered by the Secretary to the **[Judiciary Committee]** *Division of Legal Services* for examination immediately after its adoption.

9. Repeal Rule 114:

**[114. One copy of every amendment to each bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution amended in the Senate, after its report by the committee to which it was referred, which is ordered to be reprinted and have a third reading, shall be delivered to the Judiciary Committee for examination, and if it be found that such amendment agrees with the context of the bill, the Supervisor of Bills shall cause to be printed all such amendments and in addition if the bill or resolution originated in the Senate, he shall cause the bill or resolution to be printed with the amendments included therein.]**

10. Amend Rule 115b as follows:

115b. Whenever during the course of a two-year Legislature the demand for copies of a printed bill or resolution shall exceed or be anticipated to exceed the supply thereof, the **[Chief]** *Legislative Counsel* of the **[Law Revision and]** *Office of Legislative Services* **[Commission]** with the approval of the President, shall order a further printing thereof in such quantity as the President shall determine.

11. Repeal Rule 130:

**[130. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to have all Senate bills, joint resolutions and concurrent resolutions**

returned to the Senate after passage by the General Assembly.】

12. Amend Rule 136 to read as follows:

136. When any bill, which is of such character that public notice of intention to apply for the passage thereof is requisite, shall be proposed for introduction, the proof of publication of notice of intention to apply for the passage thereof shall be presented to the Secretary with the bill and shall be forwarded to the [Judiciary Committee] *Division of Legal Services for examination as to form*, and shall be returned to the Secretary, with the bill *upon completion of its examination*. The affirmative vote of  $\frac{2}{3}$  of all the members of the Senate shall be required to pass a private, special or local bill regulating the internal affairs of a municipality or county introduced upon petition pursuant to Article IV, Section VII, paragraph 10 of the Constitution and P. L. 1948, c. 199 (C. 1:6-10 et seq.).

13. Add a new Rule to follow Rule 136 (numbered appropriately) to read as follows:

Each passed bill or joint resolution in the custody of the Secretary of the Senate shall be presented to the Governor on the forty-fifth day following its passage or on the fifteenth day following its passage if passed on or after November 1 of a second annual session of a two-year Legislature; provided, however, that the Secretary shall not deliver any passed bill or joint resolution if so ordered by a resolution of the Senate or by the President pursuant to a request from the Governor made to the President, prior to the expiration of the prescribed time period, to hold the bill or joint resolution until a specified date. All such communications from the Governor shall be entered in the Journal of the Senate.

14. Amend Rule 137 to read as follows:

137. Whenever any member of the Senate shall desire to introduce any bill, which if enacted, would increase or decrease State, *county, municipal, school or special district* revenues or *require an increase* [State] *in expenditure by any therein* or would require the appropriation of State funds not set forth in dollars therein, he may request, in writing, the [Office of Fiscal Affairs] *Legislative Budget Officer* to prepare and certify to him a fiscal note containing an [estimate in dollars] *analysis* of the amount, by which

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State, county, municipal, school or special district revenues would be increased or decreased, or by which State expenditures would be increased, by reason of the enactment thereof, or of the amount of appropriation of State funds which would be required to carry out its purposes if it should be enacted, and he shall forward with such request a copy of said proposed bill.

15. Amend Rule 138 to read as follows:

138. Whenever any proposed bill is delivered to the [Judiciary Committee of the Senate] *Division of Legal Services* for examination as to form prior to its introduction, the [Committee] *Division* shall also determine whether such a bill, if enacted, would increase or decrease State, county, municipal, school or special district revenues or require an increase [State] expenditures or would require the appropriation of State funds not set forth in dollars therein. If the [Committee] *Division* shall determine that the bill will have such effect upon State, county, municipal, school or special district revenues or expenditures, [the Committee] it shall, upon approval of the bill for introduction, endorse upon the original and each copy of said bill, a notice stating that examination of the bill indicates that such a fiscal note may be required for said bill[, addressed to

(a) The Chairman of the Committee to which said bill is designated to be referred, or

(b) The president, if said bill is designated by him not to be referred].

16. Repeal Rules 139 to 142A:

[139. The Chairman of the Committee, or the Committee, to which any Senate bill, so endorsed by the Judiciary Committee, of the Senate, is referred, shall, before reporting the bill, request the Office of Fiscal Affairs, in writing, to cause to be prepared and certified to him, or it, a fiscal note for the bill. If such bill, so endorsed by the Judiciary Committee of the Senate, is not referred but is not immediately advanced to second reading, then the President shall request the Office of Fiscal Affairs, in writing, to cause to be prepared and certified to him, a fiscal note for the bill. If the Chairman of the Committee, or the Committee, to which any Assembly bill not so endorsed by the Judiciary Committee of the General Assembly, or any Assembly bill, is referred, shall be of the opinion that the effect of such bill,

if enacted, would be such that a fiscal note should be annexed to or accompany said bill, or that any statement in the nature of a fiscal note which is annexed to or accompanies said bill is not an accurate fiscal note for said bill, he, or it, shall, before reporting the bill, request the Office of Fiscal Affairs, in writing, to cause to be prepared and certified to him, or it, a fiscal note, or an accurate fiscal note, as the case may be, for the bill. If any Senate bill not so endorsed by the Judiciary Committee of the Senate, or any Assembly bill, is not referred, but is not immediately advanced to second reading, then the President, if he be of the opinion that the effect of said bill, if enacted, would be such that a fiscal note should be annexed to or accompany said bill, or that any statement in the nature of a fiscal note which is annexed to or accompanies said bill is not an accurate fiscal note for said bill, shall, before the bill is advanced to second reading, request the Office of Fiscal Affairs, in writing, to cause to be prepared and certified to him a fiscal note, or an accurate fiscal note, as the case may be, for the bill.

If the Executive Director of the Office of Fiscal Affairs, when so requested, shall determine that the effect of the bill as to which such request is made, if enacted, would be to increase or decrease State revenues, or to increase State expenditures, or to require the appropriation of State funds not set forth in dollars therein, and that no fiscal note is annexed to or accompanies said bill, or that any statement in the nature of a fiscal note, which may be annexed to or accompany said bill, is not an accurate fiscal note for said bill, he shall cause to have prepared and certified a fiscal note, or an accurate fiscal note, accordingly, and no such bill shall be reported out of Committee or have second reading until such request shall have been fully complied with, or until the Chairman of the Committee, or the Committee, or the President, as the case may be, has been notified by the Office of Fiscal Affairs that no fiscal note is required for said bill, or that any statement in the nature of a fiscal note annexed to or accompanying said bill is an accurate fiscal note for said bill.

140. Whenever any bill of the character described in Rule 139 is introduced and advanced to second reading, a fiscal note may be required to be furnished to it only by special order of the Senate and in case such an order is made the preparation of a fiscal note to said bill shall be



requested, in writing, of the Office of Fiscal Affairs by the Secretary.

141. When any request for a fiscal note is received by the Office of Fiscal Affairs, the Executive Director thereof shall thereupon make written request of the Director of the Division of Budget and Accounting in the Department of the Treasury to have such fiscal note prepared and furnish promptly to said Executive Director according to law or that he certify that no such dollar estimate can be made, stating the reason therefor as required by law.

142. Whenever any fiscal note to any bill shall be forwarded by the Director of the Division of Budget and Accounting to the Executive Director of the Office of Fiscal Affairs, the said Executive Director shall examine the same as to its accuracy and

(a) if he finds it to be accurate, he shall approve it, or

(b) if he finds it to be inaccurate, he shall prepare an accurate fiscal note for the bill

and he shall promptly have delivered in person or by certified mail, to the introducer whose name first appears upon the bill, a copy of the fiscal note so approved with a notice of such approval or a copy of the fiscal note prepared by him, together with a copy of the fiscal note prepared by the Director of the Division of Budget and Accounting, as the case may be, with a notice that such introducer may object to such fiscal note within 5 days after the receipt of such notice.

If such introducer shall so object, the Executive Director of the Office of Fiscal Affairs shall, after giving consideration to such objection, determine the final form in which such fiscal note shall be certified by him and he shall certify such determination to such introducer and he shall also certify the fiscal note so approved or determined upon by him, to the Secretary if such fiscal note was requested by an introducer of said bill or by said Secretary or to the Chairman of the Committee or the Committee to which the bill has been referred, or to the President, if, and according as, any one of them may have requested the same and said certificate shall be printed and distributed in the same manner as bills are printed and distributed.



Whenever the Division of Budget and Accounting advises the Office of Fiscal Affairs that it desires to change data previously submitted and incorporated in a fiscal note to reflect additional costs or reduced revenue, the Office of Fiscal Affairs shall immediately so advise the prime sponsor of the bill; but no such new data shall be accepted by the Office of Fiscal Affairs on the same day the subject bill is calendared for action in either House.

142A. Whenever any member of the Senate shall desire to introduce any bill, which if enacted, would increase or decrease county, municipal, school or special district revenues or require an increase in expenditures by any thereof, he shall request, in writing, the Office of Fiscal Affairs to prepare and certify to him a fiscal note containing an analysis of the amount by which county, municipal, school or special district revenues or expenditures would be increased or decreased. Such a request for a fiscal note shall be processed in the manner prescribed by Rules 137 through 142.

Whenever the preparation and certification of a fiscal note with respect to a bill which would affect county, municipal, school or special district revenues or expenditures would require an extended period of time and unduly impede consideration of the bill by the Senate, the Executive Director of the Office of Fiscal Affairs may so certify together with the best estimates of the fiscal impact of the bill as can be ascertained within a reasonable amount of time and such a certification shall constitute compliance with the requirements for provision of a fiscal note.】

17. Add a new Rule to follow Rule 145 (numbered appropriately) to read as follows:

Action by the Senate to congratulate a person or organization upon the occasion of a significant event, anniversary or accomplishment or to memorialize the death of a person shall be by issuance of a formal citation or Memorial certificate except in a case where the President authorizes it to be the subject of a Senate Resolution. Issuance of Citations and Memorial certificates shall be authorized by adoption of a resolution to be introduced by the majority and minority leaders containing the names of the persons and organizations to be honored, the occasions or events to be cited and the name or names of the Senators requesting it. All Citations and Memorial certificates to be authorized on a particular session day may be included in a single resolution.

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18. Renumber the rules to reflect the additions and repealers.

19. Amend Joint Rule 8 to read as follows:

8. If a bill shall have passed both Houses, it shall be delivered by the Secretary of the Senate or the Clerk of the General Assembly, as the bill may originate in one House or the other, [to a Joint Committee on Passed Bills appointed as a standing committee for that purpose] and it shall be presented by [said Committee] *him* to the Governor for his action. Each such bill shall remain in the custody of the Secretary or Clerk, as the case may be, of the House in which the bill originated, [acting for the Joint Committee on Passed Bills] but no action shall be taken upon such a bill[, by the Joint Committee on Passed Bills,] other than to present it to the Governor, except by the order of both Houses.

20. Add a new joint rule 8A to read as follows:

8A. Each passed bill or joint resolution in the custody of the Secretary of the Senate or the Clerk of the General Assembly, as the case may be, shall be presented to the Governor on the forty-fifth day following its passage or on the fifteenth day following its passage if passed on or after November 1 of a second annual session of a two-year Legislature; provided, however, that the Secretary or the Clerk shall not deliver any passed bill or joint resolution if so ordered by a concurrent resolution, by a resolution adopted in the House of origin, or by the presiding officer pursuant to a request from the Governor made to the presiding officer, prior to the expiration of the prescribed time period, to hold the bill or joint resolution until a specified date. All such communications from the Governor shall be entered in the Journal of the Senate or the Minutes of the General Assembly, as appropriate.

21. Add a new Joint Rule 8B as follows:

8B. a. A concurrent resolution is the form of legislation to be used to ratify an amendment to the Constitution of the United States proposed by the Congress of the United States, to petition the Congress to propose an amendment or to call a constitutional convention to propose an amendment, to the Constitution of the United States; such a concurrent resolution may be proposed in the Senate or the General Assembly.

b. At least 20 calendar days prior to a vote on such a concurrent resolution in the House in which it was introduced, the same shall be printed and placed on the desks of the members of each House. Thereafter and prior to such vote a public hearing shall be held thereon on a date and at a time and place to be publicly announced. Adoption of an amendment to the resolution shall not require the holding of a further public hearing unless the same be ordered by the House which adopted the amendment.

c. Passage of such a concurrent resolution shall require the affirmative vote of a majority of all the members of each House and the yeas and nays of the members voting thereon shall be entered upon the Journal of the Senate and the Minutes of the General Assembly.

22. Amend Joint Rule 10 as follows:

10. Bills, joint resolutions and concurrent resolutions proposed for introduction by pre-filing shall be forwarded in quadruplicate, to the [Chief] Legislative Counsel [Law Revision and Legislative Services Commission] *Division of Legal Services, Office of Legislative Services* each copy thereof endorsed with the signature of the sponsor or sponsors or with written authorization by the sponsor or sponsors that the proposal be so endorsed.

23. Amend Joint Rule 11 to read as follows:

11. The [Law Revision and Legislative Services Commission] *Division of Legal Services* shall cause each pre-filed proposal to be time-stamped, listed and numbered in the order of receipt with an appropriate Senate or General Assembly bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution number and its staff, [acting as counsel to the Senate or General Assembly Committee on Revision and Amendment of the Laws,] shall cause the same to be examined as to form and for compliance with the Rules of the Senate or General Assembly pertaining to indication of any such proposals as appropriate for a fiscal note. Upon completion of such examination as to form and endorsement thereon of a release for introduction, the Original copy shall be forwarded to the Legislative Printer for printing with the number assigned thereto and bearing the legend "Pre-filed for introduction in the 19... session." The Duplicate copy, bearing the date the Original was delivered to the Printer, shall be retained for delivery to the Secretary of the Senate

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or the Secretary to the Speaker of the General Assembly upon the convening and organization of the Senate or the General Assembly, as the case may be. One copy, marked Press copy, shall be made available to the State House Press and the remaining copy shall be retained for the files of the [Law Revision and Legislative Services Commission] *Division of Legal Services*.

24. Amend Joint Rule 14 as follows:

14. Whenever two or more members or members-elect of the same House shall separately propose for pre-filing the same or substantially the same bill or resolution, the [Law Revision and] *Division of Legal Services, on behalf of the Legislative Services Commission*, shall notify such members and members-elect and seek their concurrence to cosponsorship of a single bill or resolution, but, except as provided in 13 above, no member or member-elect shall be denied the right to pre-file any bill or resolution.

25. Amend Joint Rule 19 to read as follows:

19. *a.* In addition to the duties and responsibilities imposed upon it by law, the Joint Committee on Ethical Standards shall have continuing authority to receive, investigate and report to the Senate and General Assembly with respect to allegations concerning the conduct or activities of members of the Legislature and employees of the Legislative Branch of the State Government reflecting upon the good name, integrity and reputation of the Legislature or any member thereof which may be referred to the Joint Committee by a concurrent resolution of the Legislature *or considered by the Committee upon its own initiative*. The respective members of the Joint Committee appointed from the Senate and the General Assembly shall constitute a standing committee of each House which shall have and exercise on behalf of each House the same continuing authority with respect to receipt and consideration of allegations, referred to either standing committee by resolution of the House *or by the initiative of the members of the Committee*, concerning the qualifications of the members of their respective Houses of the Legislature and the conduct or activities of members and employees reflecting upon the good name, integrity and reputation of the Legislature, a House or any member thereof. In the event any allegation *considered or* referred to the Joint Committee or to the standing committee of either House shall involve the



qualifications, conduct or activities of a member of the committee, that member shall be disqualified from participation in the committee's consideration of such allegation and the President or Speaker shall appoint a replacement to fill such vacancy on the committee, during consideration of such allegation, from among the members of the House of the same party as the disqualified member.

*b. The Joint Committee or the respective members thereof acting as a standing committee of the Senate or the General Assembly is authorized to retain and employ at the expense of the Legislature or of the Senate or General Assembly, as the case may be, the services of such experts and counsel as it shall deem necessary in connection with any investigation concerning the conduct or activities of a member of the Legislature.*

## STATEMENT EXPLANATION

Rule 17—N. J. S. 2A:135-9 was repealed by enactment of the Criminal Code. N. J. S. 2C:51-2 is the replacement section.

Rule 23—Provides that the President shall solicit and consider committee appointments recommended by the minority leader.

Rule 63—Provides a motion for the previous question shall not be in order until at least one member of the majority and the minority have spoken, if they so desire.

Rule 74—Amends the name of one committee. Increases the membership of the Judiciary Committee from 11 to 12.

Rule 86—Amended to delete phrase covered by Rule 66.

Rule 87—Repealed as duplicative of Rule 67.

Rule 102b.—Amended to number bills introduced in a second annual session as 3001 et seq. rather than 2001 et seq.

Rules 102c., 102d., 109, 115B, 136, 137, 138—Amended to conform to the Legislative Services Act of 1978 (P. L. 1979, c. 8) and to provide for the examination as to form of bills



proposed for introduction and amendments to bills by the staff of the Division of Legal Services, as such, rather than as counsel to the Judiciary Committee which never played a role in supervising the examination of bills as to form.

Rule 114—Repealed as covered by Rule 109.

Rule 130—Repealed as the Secretary cannot reasonably be responsible for bills and resolutions in the custody of the Clerk of the General Assembly.

New Rule to follow 136—Provides for delivery of passed bills and joint resolutions to the Governor.

Rules 137, 138—Amended to conform to new Fiscal Note and Fiscal Estimate procedure provided by 1980 Senate No. 287, now awaiting action by the Governor.

Rules 139-142A—Repealed as superseded by Senate No. 287, see above.

New Rule to follow Rule 145—Citations and Memorials—as adopted temporarily at the opening of the 1980 session.

Joint Rule 8—Amended to conform to Joint Rule 8 as adopted by the General Assembly. The Committee on Passed Bills has been eliminated by both Houses.

New Rule 8A—Provides for delivery of passed bills and joint resolutions to the Governor. (If also adopted by the General Assembly the new Senate Rule to follow Rule 136 would be unnecessary.)

New Rule 8B—Provides procedure with respect to consideration of amendments proposed to the U. S. Constitution or to calling of a Federal Constitutional Convention.

Rules 10, 11, 14—Amended to conform to the Legislative Services Law of 1978 and to amended procedure for examination of bills as to form, *supra*.

Rule 19—Amended to conform to Joint Rule 19 as adopted by the General Assembly in 1977.

*To the Senate:*

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(a) of the Constitution, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 294 without my approval.

Senate Bill No. 294 would require the Port Authority of New York and New Jersey to issue financial reports, in addition to the annual report presently required by law, in such forms as the Director of the Division of Budget and Accounting of the State of New Jersey and the Comptroller of the State of New York may jointly prescribe. The purpose of the bill is to enable both states to more accurately assess the financial status of the Port Authority.

While I have no argument with the goal of this legislation, I am vetoing Senate Bill No. 294 because such legislation will be ineffective without an identical bill being enacted into law in the State of New York. Although identical legislation has passed one house of the New York Legislature, its passage in the second house appears unlikely. In addition to the inutility of enacting Senate Bill No. 294 given the situation in New York, I also observe that the Port Authority has been readily forthcoming with additional financial information requested by the New Jersey Department of Treasury.

Accordingly, I am returning Senate Bill No. 294 without my approval.

SENATE BILL No. 428

*To the Senate:*

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(a) of the Constitution, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 428 without my approval.

Senate Bill No. 428 would require the Lottery Commission to report the sale of lottery tickets in each municipality on

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a monthly basis in addition to the data it currently reports each month.

This bill would impose additional expense and administrative burden on the Lottery Commission. The Lottery Commission can currently report ticket sales by zip code areas. However, the mailing addresses of lottery agents frequently do not identify the municipality in which the agent is actually located. This is a common problem with mailing addresses and is not unique to Lottery Commission data.

The Commission would have to collect additional data on all its agents and then reprogram its computers. It is estimated that this would cost from \$50,000 to \$75,000 and require additional staff time each month. This is a very significant expense when compared to the small increment in information that would become available.

For these reasons, I hereby return Senate Bill No. 428 without my approval.

SENATE BILL No. 943

*To the Senate:*

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(a) of the Constitution, I am returning Senate Bill No. 943, without my approval.

This bill permits boards of education to provide instruction in cardio-pulmonary resuscitation to high school pupils. Section 2 of the bill provides that a student may be exempted from the program if he presents a statement signed by his parent or guardian that it interferes with the exercise of the parent's or guardian's religious beliefs. In accordance with Section 3, the State Department of Education, in con-

sultation with the Department of Health, is to develop rules and regulations to implement the act.

Cardio-pulmonary resuscitation training is an important and welcomed addition to school curriculums, and this veto should in no way be construed as opposition to offering such training in our public schools. I share the sponsor's desire that more schools offer this program. I am vetoing the bill because existing law permits cardio-pulmonary resuscitation training in the public schools. In fact, I am advised that some of our schools presently offer such courses. As a result, this legislation is unnecessary.

Accordingly, I am returning Senate Bill No. 943 without my approval.

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(a) of the Constitution, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 239 (OCR) without my approval.

This bill would permit municipal officials elected to positions for which tenure is available (clerk, tax collector, tax assessor) to receive credit for time previously served in appointive municipal or county offices for the purpose of determining their benefits such as their vacation periods. The bill explicitly does not affect pension benefits or tenure requirements.

This bill would impose significant costs on certain municipalities at a time when local governments are being required to curtail expenses. Unless the affected municipalities specifically request this type of legislation, I believe it is inappropriate for this administration to mandate these expenditures.

SENATE BILL No. 536 (OCR)

*To the Senate:*

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(a) of the Constitution, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 536 (OCR) without my approval.

This bill would require the posting of schedules of charges on vehicles used for towing disabled vehicles. The Director of Motor Vehicles is given authority to publish regulations regarding the character, placement and specifications of such schedules. A fine of \$100.00 is provided for violations. The sponsor's statement indicates that the purpose of the bill is to protect consumers from price gouging that may take place, particularly during periods of emergency such as heavy snows. Municipalities may continue to regulate towing services and related matters in other ways consistent with this act and in accord with other existing law.

Certainly, protection of the consumer is a goal to pursue wherever possible. However, every good idea need not become a statute. The Division of Motor Vehicles possesses broad authority to regulate motor vehicles and may now have the authority to do what this bill would require.

Further, the bill in its current form presents certain problems. First, many municipalities regulate towing rates and many tow trucks service more than one municipality. The posting of multiple rates on one vehicle may confuse the motorist. Also, the practical logistics of posting multiple rates should be examined. Second, tow trucks may charge different rates depending upon the type of accident in which the towed vehicle is involved. It may be difficult if not impossible to anticipate all types of accidents. This, too, should be explored. Third, some further study should be done to ascertain whether the abuses which the bill seeks to correct are so widespread as to warrant government intervention. I am asking the Director to explore all these areas and to recommend to me an appropriate administrative or legislative course of action, as may be required.

SENATE BILL No. 1302

*To the Senate:*

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(a) of the Constitution, I am filing Senate Bill No. 1302 without my approval.

Senate Bill No. 1302 would amend the "New Jersey Corporation Takeover Bid Disclosure Law" by requiring over the counter offers by persons owning in excess of 10 percent of any class of shares who have purchased more than 1 percent during the 12 months preceding the offer to file with the Bureau of Securities in the New Jersey Division of Consumer Affairs and the target company a statement setting forth information regarding the offer.

Currently only offers made directly or through an agent are subject to disclosure requirements.

Although the purpose of Senate Bill No. 1302—to protect security holders against "creeping" takeover bids effected through over the counter purchases—is understandable, the provisions of Senate Bill No. 1302 may be inconsistent with Securities Exchange Commission Regulation 14d and therefore, preempted by federal law.

The 14d regulations, promulgated in December 1979 pursuant to the Williams Act of 1968 which amended the Securities and Exchange Act of 1934, require filings with the Securities Exchange Commission and the target company within 5 business days after the commencement of an offer by a bidder who after such purchase would own more than 5 percent of any class of stock. The commencement date is the date the offer is first published or sent or given to se-

curity holders. The public filing under Senate Bill No. 1302 may trigger the commencement of a tender offer under federal Rule 14d(2)(b). If this is the case, there would be inconsistent deadlines under federal and State law for disclosures, withdrawals, pro rata rights and other protective provisions and State law would be preempted by the federal regulations.

Although the 4th Circuit decision in *Telvest, Inc. v. Bradshaw*, 618 F. 2d 1029 (1980), can be read as upholding the "Virginia Take-Over Bid Disclosure Act" which included language nearly identical to that of Senate Bill No. 1302, this case was decided prior to the promulgation of the 14d regulations.

I am hesitant to sign a bill which would put New Jersey corporations in a position of choosing between inconsistent federal and State filing requirements.

I am further informed that the Securities Exchange Commission has drafted a new consolidated code to be introduced in the House of Representatives this fall which would clearly preempt State laws on the subject.

Accordingly, at this time I am filing Senate Bill No. 1302 without my approval.

SENATE BILL No. 1203

To the Senate:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(a) of the Constitution, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 1203 without my approval.

This bill reintroduces the concept of the legislative veto, by requiring legislative approval before any rule or regulation of any State agency may take effect. Specifically, it

supplements the Administrative Procedures Act to require that every State agency submit every proposed rule and regulation to the Senate and General Assembly. The action proposed by the agency will become effective if the Legislature does not disapprove the rule by concurrent resolution within 90 days. I have decided not to enact Senate Bill No. 1203, a bill which creates a legislative veto power, because I believe it is inconsistent with the fundamental principle, embodied in our Constitution, of the separation of powers between the three branches of our government.

The strength of this nation has grown on the foundation of its creators' wisdom, embodied in a written Constitution, the most fundamental principle of which, has proven to be the separation and balance of powers. By its passage of S-1203 this session, the Legislature ignores the well researched and documented advice rendered in the past by former Attorney General Griffin B. Bell, President Carter, myself, Attorney General Benjamin Civiletti, and by our Attorney General John Degnan which trace the state and federal constitutional history of the ingenious balance of powers concept and warn of the fundamental constitutional imbalance the institution of the legislative veto power would create. Thus, I feel compelled to once again express my strong opposition to the legislative veto concept.

As already pointed out in my previous statement, to understand the problems which may arise when a government adopts a system in which the lines of distinction between the powers delegated to the legislative, executive and judicial branches are blurred, we need not return to the pre-Constitutional era. The government of our own state suffered under just such a cloud of confusion under the New Jersey Constitution which was adopted in 1844. We lacked a reasonable system of checks and balances which would provide for responsive as well as responsible government. One such example of a blurring of the three branches lay in the Legislature's power to elect executive, administrative, as well as judicial officers. As early as 1873, Governor Joel Parker advocated the calling of a constitutional convention to clarify and separate the powers of New Jersey's tripartite system.

It was not until 1947 that the revision of New Jersey's Constitution was accomplished, however. In his Annual Message in 1948, Governor Driscoll succinctly defined what needed to be done when he said,

"It is obvious that we shall have to establish clear-cut lines of authority and definite official responsibility to the people."

New Jersey deserved a system which would be accountable for its actions. The people of New Jersey needed to be able to pin point the branch of government to which they could look for accountability. We need not now undo the work that it took our New Jersey predecessors 100 years to accomplish.

It is elementary civics that the duty of the executive in the state system is to execute the laws. The framers of both our federal Constitution and our 1947 New Jersey State Constitution vested one of the check and balance powers of the executive in the presentation clauses. Article I, section 7, clauses 2 and 3 of the United States Constitution, paralleled by Article V, section 14 of New Jersey's Constitution gives the chief executive the power and duty to veto bills presented to him by the Legislature which he believes must be vetoed. Should he decide to veto a bill, the Legislature has the opportunity to override the veto.

Attorney General Benjamin Civiletti has examined the question whether legislative vetoes unconstitutionally disrupt the balance of powers.

When recently asked to render an opinion on the constitutionality of 20 U.S.C. § 1232(d), the federal version of the legislative veto, United States Attorney General Benjamin Civiletti stated,

The legislative veto mechanism in § 1232(d) upsets the careful balance devised by the Framers. Viewed as "legislative acts," legislative vetoes authorize congressional action that has the effect of legislation but deny to the President the opportunity to exercise his veto power under Art. I, § 7 of the Constitution. Viewed as interpretive or executive acts, legislative vetoes give Congress an extra legislative role in administering substantive statutory programs that impinges on the President's constitutional duty under Art. II, § 3 of the Constitution faithfully to execute the laws. Viewed as acts of quasi-judicial interpretation of existing law, legislative vetoes arrogate to the Congress power reserved in our constitutional system for the non-political



Judicial Branch. Thus, however they may be characterized, legislative vetoes are unconstitutional.<sup>1</sup>

On the state, as opposed to federal level of government, the issue remains the same. When the New Jersey Legislature functions the only way it has been empowered to function—legislating—our Constitution is explicit in Article V, section 14 that the Governor must have the opportunity to participate in the process by vetoing the legislation. Legislative veto bills deny the Executive Branch its opportunity to serve in its constitutionally defined role. Thus, by allowing enactment of a legislative veto bill, we would be violating both the letter and the spirit of our Constitution.

Furthermore, although in some instances, a particular activity may be performed by any of three branches, Attorney General Civiletti points out that it is up to the Legislative branch to allocate that responsibility. See e.g. *Wayman v. Southard*, 10 Wheat. 1, 42-43, 46 (1825, Chief Justice Marshall). Once the Legislature has delegated the responsibility, however, it may not control or abridge the discharge of the function assigned to the Executive or Judiciary, except through the legislative process of amendment or repeal.

In addition, once the executive acts to execute the law through an executive department regulation, such regulation, unless invalidated by a court, has the force of law. Legislative vetoes effectively block the execution of a statutory program until the Executive is willing to promulgate further regulations which comport with the current views of a Legislature that may well be different from those of the Legislature which enacted the enabling bill. In such an instance, the legislative vetoes may be viewed as acts of a quasi-judicial nature.

In addition to the U.S. Attorney General's determination in his recently rendered opinion and the advice given by my Attorney General, courts in two of our sister states have found legislative vetoes to be unconstitutional as well. In *State v. A.L.I.V.E. Voluntary*, 606 P. 2d 769 (Alaska Supreme Court, February 1980), the Supreme Court of Alaska

came to the conclusion that such vetoes violate Alaska's state constitution. Similarly, in *Maloney v. Stanley* (Docket No. 20 60 51, Superior Ct., Judicial District of Hartford, July 1980), a Connecticut trial court recently struck down its state statutorily created legislative veto on the grounds that it disrupted the balance of powers and violated the Connecticut Constitution and the United States Constitution.

Like all federal and state judges deciding a case, however, it should be unnecessary to reach the constitutional question. Although I share the concerns of the proponents of the legislative veto and understand the expressed desire to resolve problems in administering the complex governmental structure that has developed, I believe that the legislative veto will compound rather than reduce the frustrations we all feel. What is needed is more precise, and not blurred lines of accountability.

As is well known, rules and regulations are adopted after months and months of hearings and are based on a volume of evidence. To act responsively, the Legislature would have to examine all of this evidence, hold its own hearings, and decide whether to overrule an agency—all in a few weeks. This task would add a heavy burden to the Legislature's agenda.

The regulatory process is justifiably criticized for being slow and creating uncertainty, however, the legislative veto would compound both problems, tying up rules and regulations in committee for, at best, months and, at worst, years. Under the legislative veto procedure, the Legislature can only block an agency's rules, they cannot rewrite them. If the Senate and the Assembly agree that a regulation is needed but disagree with the agency or each other as to what specific changes need to be made, exercise of the legislative veto could lead to more delay, less accountability and more confusion.

In addition to exacerbating the problem of delay and accountability, the legislative veto would also have the effect of harming the regulatory process. Regulators would seek to avoid vetoes. They would tend to give more weight to perceived political power of affected groups rather than to the merits of the substantive issues. Rather than reversing a trend toward unbridled bureaucracy, the legislative veto would fortify it.

If the Executive Branch should ever misconstrue its authority and exceed the breadth of its legislative mandate, the Executive is subject to judicial review and in the last analysis, the Legislature can amend the enabling law to clarify its mandate.

Thus, for all of the above reasons, I must veto this piece of legislation. The three branches must work together to streamline the functioning of our governmental system. Significant steps toward achieving this goal have already been taken. Review of compliance with Executive Order No. 66 is approaching completion. The creation of the Office of Administrative Law and appointment of qualified administrative law judges helps to resolve many many conflicts and aids in reducing the number of actions being initiated in the Judicial branch. Under Executive Order 57, the Cabinet Committee on Permit Coordination has helped to streamline the permit process. A federal/state coordinating committee has been formed, which serves as a forum for the coordination of governmental efforts which are often directed toward similar ends.

I welcome ideas and proposals which will make government more accountable and responsive to the needs of all of the people which it serves. I cannot however, endorse legislation which is not only unconstitutional, but also will act as a roadblock obstructing progress toward delivering the most efficient, effective, and equitable government that is humanly possible to provide.

I hereby return Senate Bill No. 1203 without my approval.

SENATE BILL No. 1252 (OCR)

*To the Senate:*

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(b) of the Constitution, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 1252 (OCR) with recommended amendments.

This bill would require the Civil Service Commission to extend the term of a promotional eligibility list for any position or employment in a county, municipality or school district which has imposed a temporary freeze on promotions for economic reasons. The term of the eligibility list would be extended for a period equal to the duration of the freeze.

The Civil Service Commission is authorized by statute to set the term for eligibility lists for local jurisdictions at a minimum of one year and a maximum of three, N.J.S.A. 11:22-32. The limitations are intended to provide appointing authorities with employees who have current expertise. Extending the promotional eligibility list for years would likely result in less qualified candidates obtaining promotions.

I am persuaded, however, that strict adherence to the current law will unfairly affect certain municipal employees whose promotional eligibility lists will expire at the end of a two-year period. It is my understanding that such lists in the future will have a three-year life.

Accordingly, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 1252 (OCR) with the following recommended amendments:

*Page 1, Section 1, Line 8:* Delete "the period of time for which such ordinance," and insert "one year beyond its original expiration date".

*Page 1, Section 1, Line 9:* Delete "resolution, rule or regulation was in effect".

# CONDITIONAL VETO MESSAGE

*To the Senate:*

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(b) of the Constitution, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 1021 (OCR) with my objection for your reconsideration.

Senate No. 1021 supplements the "New Jersey Controlled Dangerous Substance Act" (L. 1970, c. 226, NJSA 24:21-1 et seq.) by prohibiting the use, possession with intent to use, distribution, dispensing, possession with intent to distribute or dispense and advertisement of drug paraphernalia.

Last February, I filed a similar bill (Assembly No. 1594) without my approval because I believed it was unconstitutionally vague. I said then, though, that I would consider signing into law a bill dealing with this subject, if it could be drafted so as not to offend the constitution. If properly enforced, I believe Senate No. 1021 will withstand constitutional attack; I am advised that similar legislation, modeled after the Model Drug Paraphernalia Act which was drafted by the Federal Drug Enforcement Agency, has been upheld by the courts in several jurisdictions.

I believe, however, that the bill will be strengthened if the Attorney General were to promulgate guidelines to instruct law enforcement officers on the specific circumstances which would warrant prosecution under this bill. This would avoid potential abuse.

Since the Attorney General will need some time to draft and promulgate the guidelines, I herewith return Senate No. 1021 (OCR) for reconsideration and recommend that it be amended so that the effective date will be 120 days from enactment. The recommended amendment is as follows:





"The municipal council shall appoint a municipal manager, an assessor, or where required by law a board of assessors, an auditor, a treasurer, a clerk, and an attorney. One person may be appointed to 2 or more such offices, except that the offices of municipal manager and auditor or assessor shall not be held by the same person. In municipalities containing more than 10,000 inhabitants the municipal attorney must have been admitted in the State of New Jersey to practice as an attorney-at-law for a period of five years or more. All such officers appointed by the council shall hold office during the pleasure of the council, *unless a specific term is generally provided by law.*"

Page 2, Section 7, line 1: Delete "7" and insert "8".

Page 2, Section 8, line 1: Delete "8" and insert "9".

SENATE BILL No. 1311

To the Senate:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(b) of the Constitution, I return Senate Bill No. 1311, with my objections, for reconsideration.

This bill would establish a general civil penalty of \$3,000 per day for violations of the Department of Energy Act (P. L. 1977, c. 146) or of any rule, regulation or order adopted pursuant thereto. Under the current statutory provisions, no such penalty is provided, and the only course available to the department to restrain such violations is the institution of a civil action for injunctive relief. The bill would also standardize the maximum penalty for violations of energy emergency rules, regulations and orders by imposing a maximum of \$5,000 per day to replace the current maximums which range from \$25 to \$10,000 per day.

MONDAY, SEPTEMBER 22, 1980

I believe that the bill should include a lower maximum penalty for first time offenders of energy emergency regulations. This would deal more equitably with persons who under present law are now subject to lower penalties for first time offenses. Likewise, a lower maximum should be established for a first time offense of an energy regulation other than an emergency regulation. Otherwise, a situation would be created in which a person who violates an emergency rule would be liable for a lower penalty than a person who violates another kind of energy regulation less serious in nature.

Accordingly, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 1311 for reconsideration and recommend that it be amended as follows:

*Page 1, Section 1, line 18:* Delete "3,000.00 for each offense" and insert "300.00 for the first offense and not more than \$3,000.00 for the second or any subsequent offense".

*Page 2, Section 2, line 22:* Delete "5,000.00 for each offense" and insert "500.00 for the first offense and not more than \$5,000.00 for the second or any subsequent offense".

since fiscal year 1975 and I appreciate the need for these contracts to reflect increasing costs, I also recognize that there are an enormous number of needs unmet by the fiscal year 1981 State budget and that the State budget cap for fiscal year 1981 permits only \$10 million more to be appropriated. Furthermore, I understand that the State Department of Human Services has been in the process of developing a schedule of fees for day care services and intends to implement such a fee schedule beginning January 1, 1981.

Recognizing the need for contract adjustments, the State budget cap constraints and the likelihood of generating some additional revenues from fees which can be utilized to provide some increases in service contracts, I am reducing this \$1.9 million supplemental appropriation to \$1.0 million.

SENATE BILL NO. 1473

*To the Senate:*

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(b) of the Constitution, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 1473 with my objections and recommendations for amendment.

This bill would amend the Casino Control Act, N. J. S. A. 5:12-52, in particular that section of the amendatory bill establishing a full-time Casino Control Commission (P. L. 1980, C. 28) which excepted the initial designation of a Chairman from the advice and consent of the Senate.

As the members of the Legislature and the public are aware, that bill was initially opposed by a number of Senators and Assemblymen. To achieve its passage, several compromises concerning the transition to a full-time Commission were necessary. The section which is the subject of the present bill is one of them.

The first four full-time members of the Commission have now been confirmed by the Senate and begun their work. In reviewing their qualifications, the Senate was aware that each was a potential chairman. Subjecting the initial designee to an additional confirmation process could possibly result in delay and disruption of the work of this important Commission, a result which we sought to avoid in fashioning the exception in question.

I would note that no less than 80 of my appointments are now before the Senate for confirmation. Many of them are to important positions, some of them have been pending for lengthy periods of time. Among the nominations upon which no action was taken for lengthy periods have been: Morris County Board of Taxation, 11 months; Civil Service Commission, 7 months; Delaware River Port Authority, 8 months; and the Delaware River and Bay Authority, 5 months.

In addition, a judicial nominee whose nomination was pending without action for 11 months has resigned from the



bench. Renominations of mine to the Pinelands Commission have been held up at the very time they are preparing for final action on the Pinelands Commission Management Plan. Such subtle pressure should not be condoned.

A number of Senators have critized this office for the period of time which has elapsed between final passage and enactment of their bills. I, in turn, ask the Senate to improve its own performance with respect to its constitutional duties and, in the case of this nomination to a most sensitive position, to act within an orderly time frame. Accordingly, I am returning Senate Bill No. 1473 with the following recommendations designed to include the Senate in the designation of the new Chairman while insuring that the confirmation process will not be unduly extended:

On Page 2, Section 1, after Line 50, insert a new section as follows:

2. The Senate shall consent to or reject any person designated by the Governor on or after November 15, 1980 as initial chairman of the commission under P. L. 1980, C. 28, within 45 days of such designation. If the first such initial designee is neither consented to or rejected, by recorded vote, within 45 days, he or she shall be deemed consented to by the Senate. If the Senate shall reject the first such initial designee within 45 days, the provisions of this section shall apply to all subsequent initial designees until one is consented to.

On Page 2, Section 2, Line 1: delete "2" and insert "3".

SENATE BILL No. 1369 (2nd OCR)

To the Senate:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(b) of the Constitution, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 1369 (2nd OCR) with my objections and recommendations for amendment.

This bill would amend the New Jersey Conflicts of Interest Law, in particular its revision by Chapter 79 of the Laws of 1980, which became law without my signature on July 29, 1980. Chapter 79 imposes restrictions on the relationship between special State officers, that is, the part-time members of the numerous State boards and commissions, and casino licensees, applicants or holding companies. It prohibits any special State officer or his firm from representing the latter group or accepting employment as a casino key employee. Chapter 79 also prohibits special State officers, State officers who file financial disclosure statements, members of the Legislature and Judiciary, and a number of Atlantic City officials from accepting employment with, representing or acquiring more than a 1% interest in any casino licensee, applicant or holding company for a two-year period after any of them have left public office. This prohibition extends to any partnership, firm, or corporation with which the official becomes associated during that period.

This bill would modify these restrictions to some degree: the firms of special State officers could represent casino holding companies in non-gambling matters; the two-year restriction after public service would apply only to those State officers and special State officers who are required to file financial disclosure statements or who have responsibility for matters affecting gambling; and the two-year restriction would apply only to gambling matters.

I let Chapter 79 become law without my signature because only by its enactment could the reform of Casino Control Commission into a full-time body take effect. At that time, I criticized Chapter 79 for its overbreadth and warned that it would discourage service on the numerous volunteer State boards and commissions which have little or nothing to do

with casino activity. The enactment of Chapter 79, in fact, led to the resignation of 180 special State officers and has left a number of boards and commissions unable to function for lack of a quorum. It was, in addition, overturned in part by court decision for unconstitutionally including certain municipal judges within its ambit.

This bill, while an improvement over Chapter 79, continues unfairly to include all special State officers and all professional employees of the Administrative Office of the Courts regardless of their responsibility for matters affecting casino activity. Furthermore, the bill as it has passed applies to State officers and employees who have responsibility for gambling matters not in any way related to casinos. As written, it would continue to deter talented persons from devoting their time and effort to public service for limited periods.

All key State officials in both the executive and legislative branches, including the Governor and his staff, would be restricted by this bill. No useful purpose is served by extending those restrictions to volunteer officials or to law clerks who have no responsibility for gambling matters or by including those officials who have responsibility for gambling matters unrelated to casinos, such as the State Lottery or horse racing.

Accordingly, I am returning Senate Bill No. 1369 (2nd OCR) with recommendations for amendment which would limit those State officers, employees and special State officers subject to its restrictions to those with responsibility for matters affecting casino activity and would delete the approximately 200 law clerks and other professional employees of the Administrative Office of the Courts. It would, in addition, make a technical amendment to that section permitting State officers and employees to appear in various judicial or quasijudicial proceedings which, as worded, would have conflicted with other provisions of the bill:

SENATE BILL No. 280

*To the Senate:*

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(a) of the Constitution, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 280 without my approval.

This bill would delete the provision in our traffic laws that requires bicycle riders to travel on usable bicycle paths instead of on roadways when such paths are provided adjacent to the roadway.

The bill is intended to respond to concerns raised by a variety of bicycle clubs and organizations that many bicycle paths are neither properly designed nor adequately maintained. It is argued that cycling in the roadway is often safer than riding on bicycle paths, especially for high speed or long distance cyclists. Cyclists complain that it is inconvenient to shift from the roadway to a path where provided and shift back to the roadway where the path ends. They complain that paths are often congested with pedestrians or are poorly lit.

I do not believe this legislation is necessary, nor does it serve the State's interest in ensuring traffic safety. If there exists a usable bicycle path, then cyclists should use it, to alleviate congestion on the main roadway, and to limit the possibility of the grievous injury that often results from a collision between an automobile and bicycle. I do not think a change in the law is necessary to permit a cyclist to use a roadway where he would otherwise be forced to weave dangerously around pedestrians and baby carriages, or to dodge potholes beneath poor lighting. Reasonable enforcement of the current law should address such objections of the cyclists.

Therefore, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 280 without my approval.

SENATE BILL No. 315

*To the Senate:*

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(a) of the Constitution, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 315 with my objections.

This bill would require that a county board of elections establish a polling place within or near a limited geographical area whenever at least 350 registered voters, 65 years of age or older and residing in that area, petition for its establishment. The county board would have no discretion but to move an existing polling place or establish a new one.

I believe, however, that the county boards should continue to have the discretion to locate polling places. The concentration of senior citizens within a voting district is but one factor in determining the optimum location for the polling place. Public transportation, parking, ease of access and adequate space are others.

Distance from their residences to the polls is, of course, a problem for many of our senior citizens—one which regrettably often inhibits exercise of their voting rights. That problem, however, can be better addressed by passage and enactment of Senate Bill No. 1189 which would permit all citizens, 65 years of age or older, to cast absentee ballots from their residences, regardless of their state of health. The Senate has already passed the bill; I urge the Assembly to do so. With its enactment every senior citizen will be able to vote without regard to distance from the polling place, and the county boards of election will retain their



discretion to locate polling places so as to best serve the public at large.

Accordingly, I am returning Senate Bill No. 315 without my signature.

SENATE BILL No. 409 (2nd OCR)

*To the Senate:*

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(a) of the Constitution, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 409 (2nd OCR) with my objections.

This bill would amend the Pension Adjustment Act, N.J.S.A. 43:3B-7, to increase the annual adjustment to retirement allowances in the Public Employees' Retirement System (PERS), Police and Firemen's Retirement System (PFRS) and Teachers' Pension and Annuity Fund (TPAF) from three-fifths of the change in the Consumer Price Index to two-thirds. The bill would appropriate \$3,800,000—\$888,000 to the interdepartmental account for employee benefits and \$2,912,000 to the Department of Education as State aid for members of the TPAF.

The plight of pensioners living on fixed incomes is undeniable. Since 1973 there has been a 66 percent increase in the Consumer Price Index and the cost of necessities, such as fuel oil, have risen at an even greater rate.

The same inflation, however, which has reduced the purchasing power of pensions has also restricted the ability of the State to respond to this problem immediately. What little balance remains for this fiscal year under the State Expenditure Limitation Law should be appropriated to meet emergency needs.

Furthermore, as a matter of pension policy it is unwise for the State to assume the additional unfunded liability

for retirement benefits which this bill would create. An actuarially sound retirement system matches contributions by employers and system members with anticipated benefits and does not leave retirees at the mercy of the appropriation process each fiscal year. In effect, this bill would force the State government to gamble each year that the Consumer Price Index would not mandate pension benefits beyond its fiscal capacity to deliver them.

When I vetoed a similar appropriation in this year's budget, I noted:

"I am vetoing an amount of \$3.8 million, the largest single item, which would have increased the Pension Adjustment Act for retirees of both the Public Employees' Retirement System and Teachers' Pension and Annuity Fund from three-fifths to two-thirds of the percentage change in the Consumer Price Index effective January 1, 1981. During the past few years, I have appointed several groups to review the budgetary priorities of state government with an eye toward reducing costs. All of these groups have urged a comprehensive review of the pension plans for public employees; and I believe that before additional costs are incurred, we should evaluate the options available to us. The State Treasurer has begun to gather information and data on this matter, and a full report can be expected before the end of the year."

The report will be available within a matter of weeks. It is expected to suggest some fundamental alternatives in the way the State organizes its pension programs.

The unavailability of funds, the undesirability of adding to the State's unfunded liability for retirement benefits and the possibility of significant change in our pension programs leads me to conclude that this bill should not become law at this time.

Accordingly, I am returning Senate Bill No. 409 (2nd OCR) without my signature.

SENATE BILL No. 647 (OCR)

*To the Senate:*

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(a) of the Constitution, I am returning Senate Bill No. 647 (OCR) without my approval.

Senate Bill No. 647 (OCR) would authorize county clerks to issue photo-identification cards to county residents age 18 or older, upon presentation of documentation required by the Secretary of State. The identification card is to include the applicant's date of birth, physical description, photograph and signature. The bill would also repeal P. L. 1968, c. 313, which currently authorizes county clerks to issue photo-identification cards for "proof of age."

I do not believe that this bill provides the proper solution to either the lack of identification for non-drivers or the need for secondary identification for proof of age. The Division of Motor Vehicles is currently authorized to issue drivers' licenses for identification purposes only to handicapped persons who are unable to obtain a driver's license and photo-identification cards for persons aged 17 through 21. In addition, the county clerks currently may issue identification cards as secondary identification for "proof of age."

I believe that the need for identification for proof of age is more than satisfied under current law. The need for identification for those individuals, other than the handicapped, such as the aged, who are unable to obtain a driver's license, would be better addressed by expanding the authority of the Division of Motor Vehicles.

Photo-identification cards are costly and inconvenient to obtain. To have such cards issued by each county clerk would establish a fragmentary and duplicative system of issuing identification, which may be subject to abuse. Furthermore, county identification cards may not be accepted as a primary source of identification cards.

I am, therefore, filing Senate Bill No. 647 (OCR) without my approval.

SENATE BILL No. 1071

*To the Senate:*

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(a) of the Constitution, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 1071 without my approval.

Senate Bill No. 1071 would provide for the imposition of mandatory minimum sentences upon anyone who uses or possesses a firearm during the commission of certain enumerated crimes.

I agree wholeheartedly with the underlying purpose of this bill; namely, to reduce significantly the rate of violent crimes committed with firearms by insuring that those convicted of such offenses are sentenced to prison. I share the Legislature's and the general public's concern and outrage at the ever-increasing crime rate in our State, which surely prompted this legislation. I disagree, however, that the means to achieve that purpose is to strip judges of the ability to use discretion when imposing sentences in the cases described above.

Our Criminal Justice Code has been in effect now for a little over a year. In adopting that Code, which was the product of many years of study, debate and development, we rejected mandatory sentences because in general they are unworkable and, in some cases, unjust. Instead, the Code put in place a sentencing scheme designed to be tough on violent criminals, while preserving the discretionary aspects of sentencing. Our State Police, Department of Corrections and the Administrative Office of the Courts

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have been keeping a close watch on sentences imposed under our new Code. All three agencies' statistics show that our judges have been following that "get-tough-on-crime" spirit of the law to which I referred earlier. The number of commitments has increased considerably, as has the length of sentences. In addition, in roughly 25% of all cases, judges are imposing minimum parole ineligibility terms as part of the sentence. I mention all this to emphasize two points:

(1) that our Code already permits the types of sentences mandated by this bill; and

(2) that a review of sentences under the Code evidences no sign that the use of weapons has not been subjected to stiff sentences.

Under these circumstances, I find no reason to amend our newly enacted sentencing statutes in the drastic manner proposed by this bill.

Additionally, I note that S-1071 does not prohibit plea negotiations between prosecutors and defendants with regard to "while armed" charges. This means, of course, that all of the discretion that must and should be exercised in imposing sentence will rest with the prosecutors. Again, I find no reason to take discretion away from judges and turn it over to prosecutors. By this I do not imply that plea bargaining should be eliminated or curtailed; I believe that the delicate balance that now exists in this area should be preserved, absent proof that the system is not functioning as the Legislature intended it to when it adopted the Criminal Justice Code.

Finally, I must mention that enactment of S-1071 would naturally have a very serious impact on our correctional facilities. And, while I have and will continue to support the building of more jails to accommodate those in our society who prey on our law-abiding citizens, I would be remiss if I did not recognize the practicalities and realities involved in the building of prisons in our State. We ought not to institute a system that will have such drastic effects on our correctional facilities without carefully planning and providing for it.

I also offer the following comments for the benefit of legislators who may wish to consider legislation similar to S-1071. The list of offenses in S-1071 for which minimum terms must be imposed if the defendant possesses a firearm



includes some which I believe do not have a great potential for violence, such as 2C:20-3 (Theft by Unlawful Taking); 2C:20-5 (Retaliation for Past Official Action); 2C:20-7 (Receiving Stolen Property); and 2C:33-1b (Failure to Disperse).

S-1071 does not require a mandatory minimum term for illegal possession of a firearm. If the Legislature is interested in eradicating illegal guns from New Jersey, legislation in this area should include such a provision.

For these reasons, I am returning Senate Bill No. 1071 without my approval.

SENATE BILL No. 1299

*To the Senate:*

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(b) of the Constitution, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 1299 with recommendations for amendment.

This bill would permit a member of the Police and Firemen's Retirement System (PFRS) to remain a member of the system without change in his rate of contribution after assuming elective public office. His new public employer would have to contribute the employer's share based on the member's previous salary plus any additional required contribution based on his salary as a public official. Under current law, the elected official may continue as a member of PFRS during his term of office but must make both his own and his employer's contributions.

The bill would benefit a small number of officials with long service in law enforcement who, under the present law, are having financial difficulty in making the required double contributions from their salaries as public officials.

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As a matter of policy, I have opposed special pension bills and would prefer to see a more comprehensive treatment of inequities. The Department of Treasury will submit a report in the near future addressing such problems and suggesting changes in our present pension systems.

Comprehensive reform will take time, however, and these deserving officials should be given the opportunity to receive the benefits the Legislature has intended in this bill.

Accordingly, I return Senate Bill No. 1299 and recommend the following amendments:

*Page 1, Title, Line 2:* After "amending" insert "and supplementing".

*Page 2, Section 1, After Line 33:* Insert a new section as follows:

"2. (New Section) Any member of the retirement system who on the effective date of this act is an elected official and whose membership in the retirement system has been continued pursuant to the provisions of the act to which this act is amendatory and supplementary shall notify the Division of Pensions within 180 days of the effective date of this act to adjust his rate of contribution as provided in this act. In the absence of notification to the division, the member shall continue to be a member during the time he remains in his public office only upon the payment of any and all contributions required on behalf of member and employers by Section 15 of P. L. 1944, c. 255 (C. 43:16A-15), which shall be made either in a lump sum or by installment payments of amounts calculated in accordance with the requirements and regulation of the board of trustees."

SENATE BILL NO. 1395

*To the Senate:*

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(b) of the Constitution, I am returning Senate Bill No. 1395 with my objections, for reconsideration.

This bill amends the Local Housing Authorities Law to permit the governing bodies of a county or municipality to increase the membership of a housing authority board from 7 to 9 commissioners. The two additional commissioners must be tenants of the authority, one to be appointed by the county or municipal governing body and the second to be appointed by the county chief executive or mayor, as appropriate. Such a resolution or ordinance increasing board membership is to be subject to the approval of the Department of Community Affairs.

I am advised that the main purpose of this bill is to enable tenants to serve on housing authority boards. While the present law does not specifically preclude tenants from doing so, some question whether tenants may serve on such boards due to the restrictions on commissioners having an "interest" in the housing project set forth in Public Law 1975, Chapter 239, Section 2. While I have no opposition to having tenants serve on housing authority boards, I see no necessity for expanding the size of boards to do so. However, the law should be clarified so that tenant eligibility to serve on the boards is established. As vacancies occur, tenants can be appointed to the position in accordance with existing law.

Accordingly, I am returning Senate Bill No. 1395 for your reconsideration and recommend that it be amended as follows:

*Page 2, Section 1, Lines 31-38: Delete.*

*Page 4, Section 3: Insert new Section 3:*

"Section 2 of P. L. 1975, c. 239 (C. 55:14A-6) is amended to read as follows:

Not more than one commissioner of any authority may be an officer or employee of the municipality or county for

which the authority is created. All commissioners shall hold office until their successors have been appointed and have qualified. A certificate of the appointment or reappointment of any commissioner shall be filed with the clerk and such certificate shall be conclusive evidence of the due and proper appointment of such commissioner. A commissioner shall receive no compensation for his services but he shall be entitled to the necessary expenses, including traveling expenses incurred in the discharge of his duties. The powers of each authority shall be vested in the commissioners thereof in office from time to time. Four members shall constitute a quorum of the authority for the purpose of conducting its business and exercising its powers and for all other purposes. Action may be taken by the authority upon the affirmative vote of the majority, but not less than three, of the commissioners present, unless in any case the bylaws of the authority shall require a larger number. The authority shall select a chairman and a vice-chairman from among its commissioners, and it may employ a secretary (who shall be executive director), technical experts and such other officers, agents and employees, permanent and temporary, as it may require, and shall determine their qualifications, duties and compensation. For such legal services as it may require, an authority may call upon any chief law officers of the municipality, municipalities or the county, as the case may be, or may employ its own counsel and legal staff. An authority may delegate to one or more of its agents or employees such powers and duties as it may deem proper. No commissioner or employee of an authority shall acquire any interest direct or indirect in any housing project or in any property included or planned to be included in the project nor shall he have any interest direct or indirect in any contract or proposed contract for materials or services to be furnished or used in connection with any housing project. If any commissioner or employee of an authority owns or controls an interest direct or indirect in any property included or planned to be included in a housing project he immediately shall disclose the same in writing to the authority and such disclosure shall be entered upon the minutes of the authority. Failure so to disclose such interest shall constitute misconduct in office. Upon such disclosure such commissioner or employee shall not participate in any action by the authority affecting such property. For inefficiency or neglect of duty or misconduct in office, a commissioner of an authority may be removed by

the appointing authority which made the original appointment, but a commissioner shall be removed only after he shall have been given a copy of the charges at least ten days prior to the hearing thereon and had an opportunity to be heard in person or by counsel. In the event of the removal of any commissioner, a record of the proceedings, together with the charges and findings thereon, shall be filed in the office of the clerk.

*Nothing set forth herein shall preclude a tenant residing in the housing project from serving as a commissioner provided the tenant is otherwise qualified to serve."*
