This report has been prepared to provide reliable and comprehensive analysis of crime data for the criminal justice community. The graphic and statistical representation of the various crime factors should assist law enforcement administrators in planning programs to combat crime throughout New Jersey.

It would have been impossible to complete this report without the cooperation of New Jersey's municipal, county, state and other law enforcement agencies, 586 of which contributed to this effort in 1983. It is with appreciation to these dedicated public servants and in the interest of more effective law enforcement for all the citizens of New Jersey that this seventeenth annual Uniform Crime Report is submitted.

THE NEW JERSEY UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING SYSTEM

DEFINITION

The New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting System is based upon the compilation, classification, and analysis of crime data reported by all New Jersey police agencies in accordance with the regulations prescribed by law.

DEVELOPMENT

The New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting Law (N.J.S.A. 52:17 B-5.1 et seq) was enacted on May 16, 1966, and became effective January 1, 1967. Responsibility for the establishment, direction, control, and supervision of the Uniform Crime Reporting System was assigned to the State's Attorney General. The Attorney General authorized the New Jersey State Police to collect and collate the crime data received from law enforcement agencies within the state.

At the request of the Attorney General, the New Jersey State Police researched crime systems in operation throughout the nation in order to establish a firm foundation from which to grow. The most logical approach was the paralleling of the federal crime reporting system. There was a distinct need for a compatibility feature that would enhance both the state and federal systems through the data entry at both levels.

This compatibility has, as its nucleus, the standard classification of offenses established by the Federal Bureau of Investigation. Regardless of the label placed on a particular offense in the various states' systems, i.e., felony, misdemeanor, disorderly persons, if the incident meets the federal standard it will be reported as an offense.

The terms "crime" and "offense" are used interchangeably in this publication, and refer to an act committed in violation of a law which is reportable under the guidelines of the Uniform Crime Reporting Program.

The Committee on Uniform Crime Reporting of the New Jersey State Chiefs of Police Association has served the program in an advisory capacity since 1966. The contributions of this committee have proven valuable to the success of the program. This committee works in close harmony with the State Police as a means of improving the quality of reporting through recommended program standards, policies, and procedures.

COLLECTION OF CRIME DATA

As required by statute, all law enforcement agencies in the state submit monthly and annual summary crime reports to the program. During the year 1983, offense and arrest data were received from 482 full-time municipal police departments, twenty-six (26) part-time municipal police departments, and the New Jersey State Police (acting as the reporting agent for the 59 municipalities without local police services)

In addition to the above agencies, arrest data were received from the state's twenty-one (21) prosecutors', sheriffs' departments, four (4) county police departments, and five (5) county park police departments. In order to incorporate all New Jersey law enforcement agencies under the system, the eight (8) other state agencies with law enforcement responsibilities, as well as eleven (11) college campus police departments were incorporated within the program. Collectively, a total of 578 law enforcement agencies submit their reports to the New Jersey State Police.

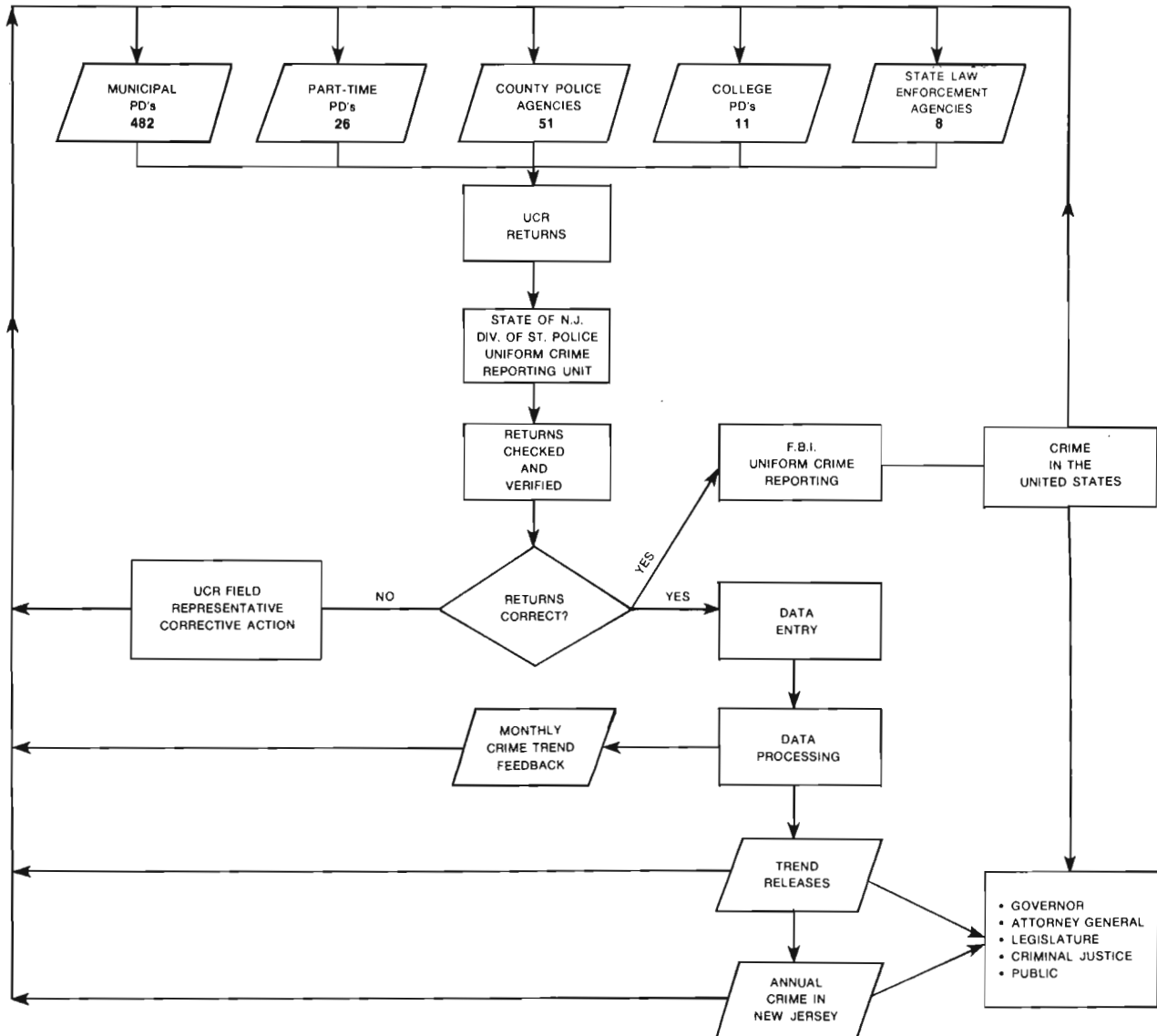
METHOD

The Uniform Crime Reporting Guide, which was revised during 1977, has been distributed to all contributors. It outlines reporting procedures in detail, and is complete to the extent of providing examples and illustrations. Field representatives provide additional instruction and clarification when required.

All reported offenses are related to the municipality in which they occur rather than to the agency which may conduct the investigation. The clearance is credited to the municipality in which the offense occurred. Each contributing agency is responsible for compiling its own reports. Law enforcement agencies report the number of known offenses according to the following categories: Homicide (Murder and Manslaughter), Rape, Robbery, Burglary, Larceny-theft, Motor Vehicle Theft, and Arson. The "Crime in New Jersey," and the Federal Bureau of Investigation's "Crime in the United States" publications, exclude manslaughters, simple assaults, and arsons from the "Index" offenses. These are further referred

to as "violent" and "nonviolent" crimes as graphically illustrated in Section VII under "Municipal and County Offense and Demographic Data," and Section II, "State Summary and Offense Analysis."

All reported offenses are compiled from a record of all criminal complaints received by police from victims or other sources, or discovered by the police during routine operations. Complaints determined to be unfounded are eliminated from this count. Analytical data pertaining to specific crime categories are also reported, i.e., total adult and juvenile arrests made during the month. Police killed or assaulted, and arson data are also collected monthly. Police personnel information is submitted on an annual basis.



VERIFICATION PROCESSES

The uniformity and accuracy of data gathered from 482 contributors must be safeguarded through various ways. Although guidelines and instructions are provided each contributor, they are not the panacea for the accuracy being sought.

The reports received by the Uniform Crime Reporting Unit are recorded and examined for mathematical accuracy and reasonableness of the interpretation of the offense classifications. Improper classifications, changes in reporting procedures, or actual change are identified in this manner. Errors of a minor nature are corrected by direct telephone contact with the contributors, while all other errors are resolved through a personal visit by a field representative to the reporting agency.

Further verification is accomplished through the analysis of statistical data accrued from the reports submitted. Fluctuations in crime rates noted from previous submissions are verified by the field representatives through their municipal counterpart.

FUNCTION

Police executives make use of this data in administrative, planning, and operational determinations for their respective jurisdictions. The State Police Uniform Crime Reporting Unit provides assistance to municipal police agencies through the individual analysis of statistics as they relate to specific crime problems within their jurisdiction. Police executives also use this data for identifying manpower and equipment needs. The Uniform Crime Reporting Program requirements not only have increased police efficiency in reporting and recordkeeping areas, but have helped police in their day to day operations.

Although the data collected on the offenses of manslaughter and simple assault are not presented in the annual report, they are required for the federal system. However, this data is processed and available for special research purposes.

PROFILE OF NEW JERSEY

New Jersey is situated between the major industrial markets of New York and Philadelphia and can be classified as the "Crossroads of the East." The geographic location of the state has been a major factor in its growth and development. The many miles of super-expressway facilities within the state connect New Jersey directly with the neighboring states of New York, Pennsylvania, and Delaware. Additionally, New Jersey as a corridor state, accommodates large volumes of traffic from both the eastern and western part of the United States.

The state is politically comprised of 21 counties which contain 567 incorporated municipalities. Nationally, New Jersey, although 46th in size, ranks ninth in population and first as the most densely populated state in the country. In addition to this density of 982.4 persons per square mile, New Jersey still has many miles of rural areas and sparsely settled communities. The areas of density show a heavy concentration around the major urban centers and those areas most accessible for commuting.

STATE, COUNTY AND MUNICIPAL PROFILES

The presentation of state, county and municipal profiles in this section is offered for the purpose of projecting, for the consideration of the reader, a group of recognizable factors which may affect the amount and type of crime that occurs from community to community. Selection of the areas of information to be related to individual municipalities was based on the immediacy and completeness of data available.

Population statistics presented here, and throughout this publication, were obtained from the Department of Labor & Industry, Division of Planning and Research, Office of Demographic and Economic Analysis. The adjusted 1982 census counts of population were used in this publication.

Character of municipalities by urban, suburban and rural classifications, and square miles, were compiled by the Department of Community Affairs, Division of State and Regional Planning, Bureau of Statewide Planning. Following is a list of categories used and a description of each category.

- URBAN CENTER Densely populated with extensive development.
- URBAN-SUBURBAN Near an urban center but not as extremely developed and more residential areas.
- URBAN CENTER RURAL Densely populated core area but surrounded by rural areas.
- SUBURBAN Predominantly single family residential, within a short distance of an urban area.
- SUBURBAN RURAL Rapidly developing area but still large tracts of open land available for development.
- RURAL Scattered small communities and isolated single family dwellings.
- RURAL CENTER High density core area with surrounding municipalities rural.
- RURAL CENTER-RURAL Small developed core area surrounded by rural areas.

Certain other socio-economic factors present in varying degrees in all communities may have an influence on resulting crime rates. Obvious difficulties in the identification, documentation and measurement of these factors, however, precluded their application in this report.

Those factors presented were listed to affirm their existence within the county and community and to provide a base for consideration in the evaluation of that community's crime experience.

CRIME FACTORS

In order to provide a meaningful statistical profile of crime within the State of New Jersey, each law enforcement agency must provide the Uniform Crime Reporting Unit with data that depicts specific crimes that are occurring within their jurisdiction. There is a need for compatibility with the National Uniform Crime Reporting System and, therefore, categories of offense classifications used within the state are identical with those of the National System. This results in equitable conclusions being drawn from the data submitted.

Reported Part I offenses and arrests are recorded in the municipality where they occurred, regardless of the outside investigative agency which may investigate, arrest, or otherwise dispose of the case.

The factors which influence crime rates are dependent upon characteristics of the community. When attempting to interpret the crime statistics presented herein, one should be aware of the social structure and factors that lead to or cause criminal behavior.

Crime rates in this publication are based on the stable population of the municipality. Fluctuating seasonal population figures are too inaccurate to be used as a measurement for determining crime rates. Municipalities with high seasonal populations may indicate a higher crime rate per one thousand than may be normal for a municipality their size. This would also be indicated in municipalities that experience high population increases due to special events or commuters.

Set forth below are some of the factors which, by type and volume, will affect the crime that occurs from place to place:

- Density and size of the community population and the metropolitan areas of which it is a part.
- Composition of the population with reference particularly to age, sex, and race.
- Economic status, including job availability, and mores of the population.
- Relative stability of population, including commuter, seasonal, and other transient types.
- Climate, including seasonal weather conditions.
- Cultural conditions, such as educational, recreational, and religious characteristics.
- Effective strength of law enforcement agencies.
- Administrative and investigative emphases of law enforcement.
- Policies of other components of the criminal justice system (i.e., prosecutorial, judicial, correctional, and probational.)
- Crime reporting practices of the general citizenry.
- Attitudes of the public toward crime reporting.
- The administrative and investigative efficiency of the local law enforcement agency, including the degree of adherence to crime reporting standards.
- Cooperation of adjoining and overlapping police agencies.

THE POLICE POINT OF VIEW

The New Jersey State Police Uniform Crime Reporting Unit surveyed various police agencies of the state, attempting to ascertain their opinion concerning factors contributing to the increase or decrease of specific crimes in their municipality. One of the goals of the Uniform Crime Reporting Unit is to assist police in reducing crime by first identifying its extent, type and location. The following viewpoints are offered with the expectation of reaching this goal.

ROBBERY

Decreases:

- Highly visible foot patrols; establishment of Safe Streets and Anti-crime Units.
- More stringent sentencing requirements under the State Criminal Code.
- Increased communications technology has led to better communication and increased exchanges of information between police departments.

Increases:

- The availability of new roadways in our highly mobile society, provide a swift avenue to and from communities previously difficult to reach; this factor has also shown a relationship with burglaries in suburban and rural areas.
- Seasonal increases of tourists to resort areas of the state is a contributing factor.

BURGLARY

Decreases:

- Citizens taking an active part by reporting suspicious persons and circumstances.
- Crime Prevention Programs are being stressed in many communities as a means of decreasing crime.
- More stringent sentencing requirements, under the State's Criminal Code has been a deterrent.

Increases:

- Husband and wife are both working; leaving homes frequently unoccupied during the daylight hours.
- Extreme increases in population, which also means new housing in suburban and rural areas.

LARCENY

Decreases:

- Use of additional or improved lighting prevent criminal acts from occurring in parking areas.
- Establishment of Safe Streets and Anti-crime Units.
- Public awareness programs contribute to the decrease in thefts from parked vehicles.
- Thefts of bicycles have decreased as a result of Safety and Security Programs implemented by police in various schools; this includes the registration and marking of bicycles with special numbers.

Increases:

- The popularity and resale opportunities of certain types of stolen property, such as tape decks and radios.
- Lack of security provided by the various shopping malls in their own parking areas is a contributing factor.
- Shoplifting is a theft that police have little or no control over. Store security forces are under the control of the store administration, and their policies vary from strict enforcement, arrest and prosecution, to only a warning. Policy change has been directed toward prosecuting the offenders rather than warning them, causing to some extent an increase in the number of shoplifting offenses reported to police.

MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT**Decreases:**

- Increased security patrols in commercial parking lots.
- Stronger sentencing of career criminals has been effective.

Increases:

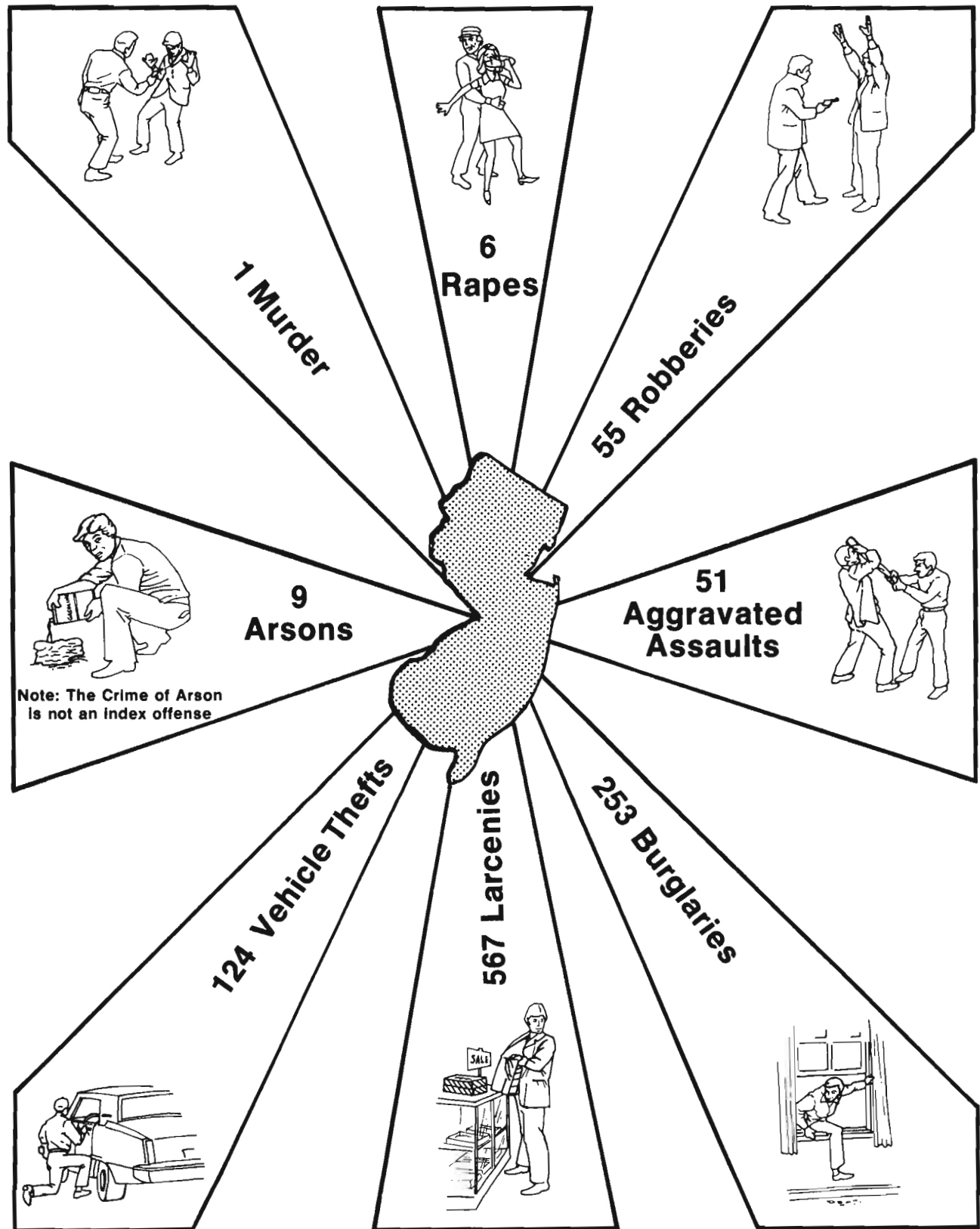
- The tremendous replacement cost of auto parts has contributed significantly to the increase in motor vehicle thefts for the purpose of auto parts resale.

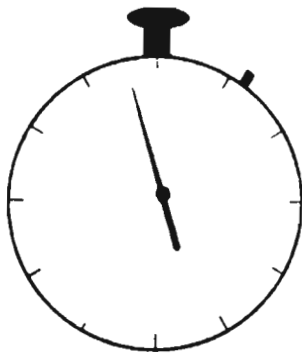

This mode of display should not be taken to imply a regularity in the commission of these offenses; rather, it represents the annual ratio of crime to fixed time intervals.

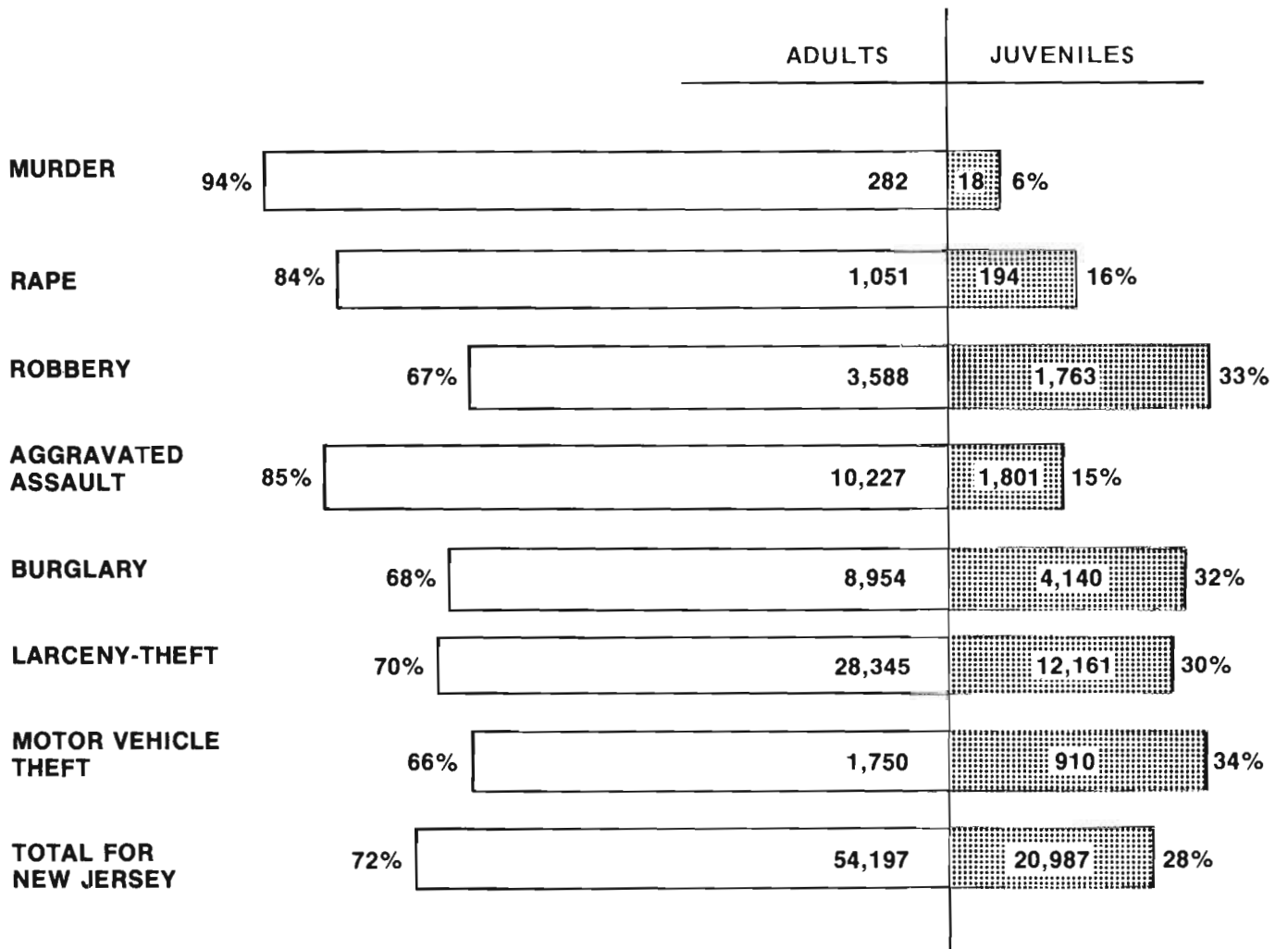

STATEWIDE CRIME SUMMARY—1983

CRIME INDEX—VOLUME/RATE

- There were 385,646 Index offenses reported in 1983, a 9 percent decrease compared to 1982.
- The crime rate of the state is 51.9 victims for every 1,000 permanent inhabitants, a decrease of 9 percent compared to 1982.
- August with 38,048 offenses reported, recorded the highest incidence of Crime Index offenses; while February was the lowest with 25,933 offenses.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- The total value of property stolen amounted to \$336 million in 1983, a 1 percent decrease from 1982.
- Value of property recovered was \$111 million, resulting in a recovery rate of 33 percent.
- Stolen motor vehicles accounted for 49 percent of stolen property, and 88 percent of the recovered property value.

CRIME INDEX ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- A total of 79,742 persons were arrested for Index offenses, which represents a 6 percent decrease compared to 1982.
- Adult Index arrests decreased 5 percent, and juvenile arrests decreased 6 percent.
- Crime Index arrests accounted for 22 percent of the total arrests in 1983.
- Males accounted for 80 percent of the Crime Index arrests, and females accounted for 20 percent.
- Fifty-five percent of the Index arrests were white and 45 percent were black.
- Hispanics accounted for 11 percent of the arrests for Index offenses.
- Police cleared 19.5 percent of the Index offenses and juveniles accounted for 28 percent of these clearances.

VIOLENT CRIME SUMMARY

This category consists of the following Index offenses: Murder, Rape, Robbery, Aggravated Assault.

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 41,303 violent crimes reported in 1983; a 9 percent decrease compared to the 45,172 violent crimes reported in 1982.
- Violent crimes accounted for 11 percent of the total Crime Index.
- The violent crime rate decreased 8 percent to 5.6 victims for every 1,000 permanent inhabitants.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- The highest number of violent crimes were reported in August with 3,880 offenses while the lowest number was reported in December (3,092 offenses).
- The value of property stolen as a result of violent crime was \$10.3 million.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- Arrests for violent crime offenses remained relatively stable; from 19,052 in 1982 to 19,087 in 1983.
- Violent crime arrests accounted for 24 percent of the Index arrests and 5 percent of the total arrests during the year.
- Adult arrests for violent crime decreased 2 percent while juvenile violent crime arrests increased 5 percent compared to 1982.
- Adults accounted for 71 percent of the violent crime arrests, while the remaining 29 percent were juveniles.
- Males were responsible for 90 percent and females for 10 percent of the violent crime arrests.
- Forty-two percent of those arrested were white, and 58 percent were black.
- Hispanics accounted for 12 percent of the arrests.
- Forty-six percent of all violent crimes were cleared and juveniles accounted for 20 percent of these clearances.

NONVIOLENT CRIME SUMMARY

This category consists of the following Index offenses: Burglary, Larceny-theft, Motor Vehicle Theft.

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 344,343 nonviolent crimes reported in 1983; a 9 percent decrease compared to the 377,098 reported in 1982.
- Nonviolent crime accounted for 89 percent of the total Crime Index.
- The nonviolent crime rate decreased 9 percent to 46.3 victims per 1,000 inhabitants in 1983.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- The largest number of nonviolent crimes were reported in August with 34,168, while the lowest number was reported in February with 22,693.
- The total value of property stolen as a result of nonviolent crime amounted to \$325.8 million.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- Nonviolent crime arrests decreased 7 percent in 1983, as 60,655 persons were arrested.
- Nonviolent crime arrests accounted for 76 percent of the Index arrests and 17 percent of the total arrests during 1983.
- Juveniles were responsible for 40 percent of the nonviolent crime arrests and adults 60 percent.
- Adult nonviolent crime arrests decreased 6 percent, while juvenile arrests decreased 9 percent.
- Males represented 77 percent, and females 23 percent of persons arrested for the nonviolent crime.
- Fifty-nine percent of all persons arrested for nonviolent crimes were white, and 41 percent were black.
- Hispanics accounted for 10 percent of the arrests.
- Sixteen percent of all nonviolent crimes reported were cleared in 1983 and juveniles accounted for 31 percent of these clearances.

TOTAL ARREST SUMMARY

- There were 360,883 persons arrested in 1983, which represents a 3 percent decrease compared to 1982.
- The arrest rate for 1983 decreased 4 percent to 48.5 persons arrested per every 1,000 inhabitants.
- Adults arrests decreased 2 percent to 261,704 and juvenile arrests decreased 8 percent to 99,179 in 1983.
- Adults accounted for 73 percent and juveniles 27 percent of the total state arrests.
- Persons under 21 years of age accounted for 43 percent of all arrests.
- Males accounted for 83 percent and females 17 percent of the total persons arrested during the year.
- Sixty-nine percent of the total persons arrested in 1983 were white, and 31 percent were black.
- Hispanics accounted for 9 percent of the arrests.

POLICE OFFICERS KILLED AND ASSAULTED SUMMARY

- There were no police officers killed in the line of duty in 1983.
- There were 4,506 police officers assaulted during the performance of duty in 1983.

- The Crime Index in New Jersey decreased 9 percent, while the Northeastern States decreased 8 percent and the United States decreased 7 percent.
- Violent crime in New Jersey decreased 9 percent, while the Northeastern States decreased 6 percent and the United States decreased 5 percent.
- Nonviolent crime in New Jersey decreased 9 percent, while the Northeastern States decreased 9 percent and the United States decreased 7 percent.

MURDER

DEFINITION

Murder is defined as the unlawful killing of a human being with malice aforethought. Any death due to a fight, argument, quarrel, assault, or commission of a crime is included. This Index offense is counted by police on the basis of their investigation without regard to findings of a court, jury or the decision of a prosecutor. Attempts to kill and assaults to kill are scored as aggravated assaults and not as murder. Suicides, accidental deaths, negligent manslaughters, and justifiable homicides are not counted, nor reflected in the murder classification.

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 398 murders reported to law enforcement agencies of the state in 1983, a 17 percent decrease compared to the 481 murders reported in 1982.
- Murders accounted for one-tenth of one percent of the reported Index offenses, and 1 percent of the violent crime.
- The murder remained the same at .1 victims per 1,000 inhabitants.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

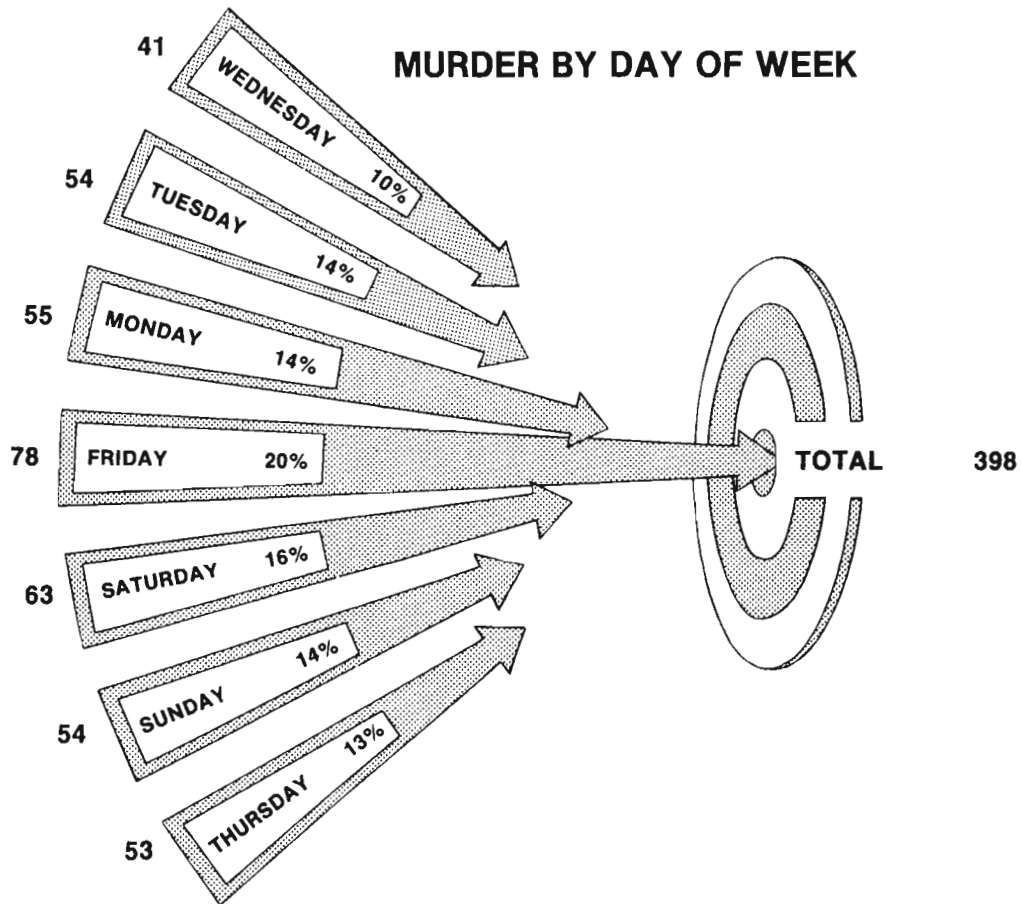
- The age group of 20-29 accounted for 33 percent of all murder victims.
- Firearms were used in 35 percent of the murders where the weapon is known. Knife or cutting instruments accounted for 31 percent, while physical force accounted for 9 percent.
- In murders where the relationship of the victim and offender is known, 54 percent were friends or acquaintances, 24 percent were relatives, and 21 percent were strangers.
- Felony murders accounted for 28 percent of the known murder circumstances. Robbery was the motive in 59 percent of the 68 felony murders.
- Friday was the highest day of the week for reported murders with 78, while Wednesday was the lowest with 41.
- September recorded the highest number of murders, with 41, while October was the lowest with 23.
- Forty-four percent of the murders occurred in private residences, 32 percent on highways or streets, and 10 percent in commercial houses.
- The total value of property stolen as a result of murder amounted to \$12,865.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- A total of 365 persons were arrested for murder in 1983, a 5 percent decrease to 1982.
- Adult murder arrests decreased 2 percent (from 332 to 324) and juvenile arrests decreased 23 percent (from 53 to 41).
- Fifty-four percent of persons arrested for murder were black, and 46 percent were white.
- Hispanics accounted for 21 percent of the arrests.
- Seventy-five percent of the murders were cleared in 1983 (300 out of 398). Juveniles accounted for 6 percent of those cases cleared.
- Males accounted for 92 percent and females 8 percent of those arrested for murder.

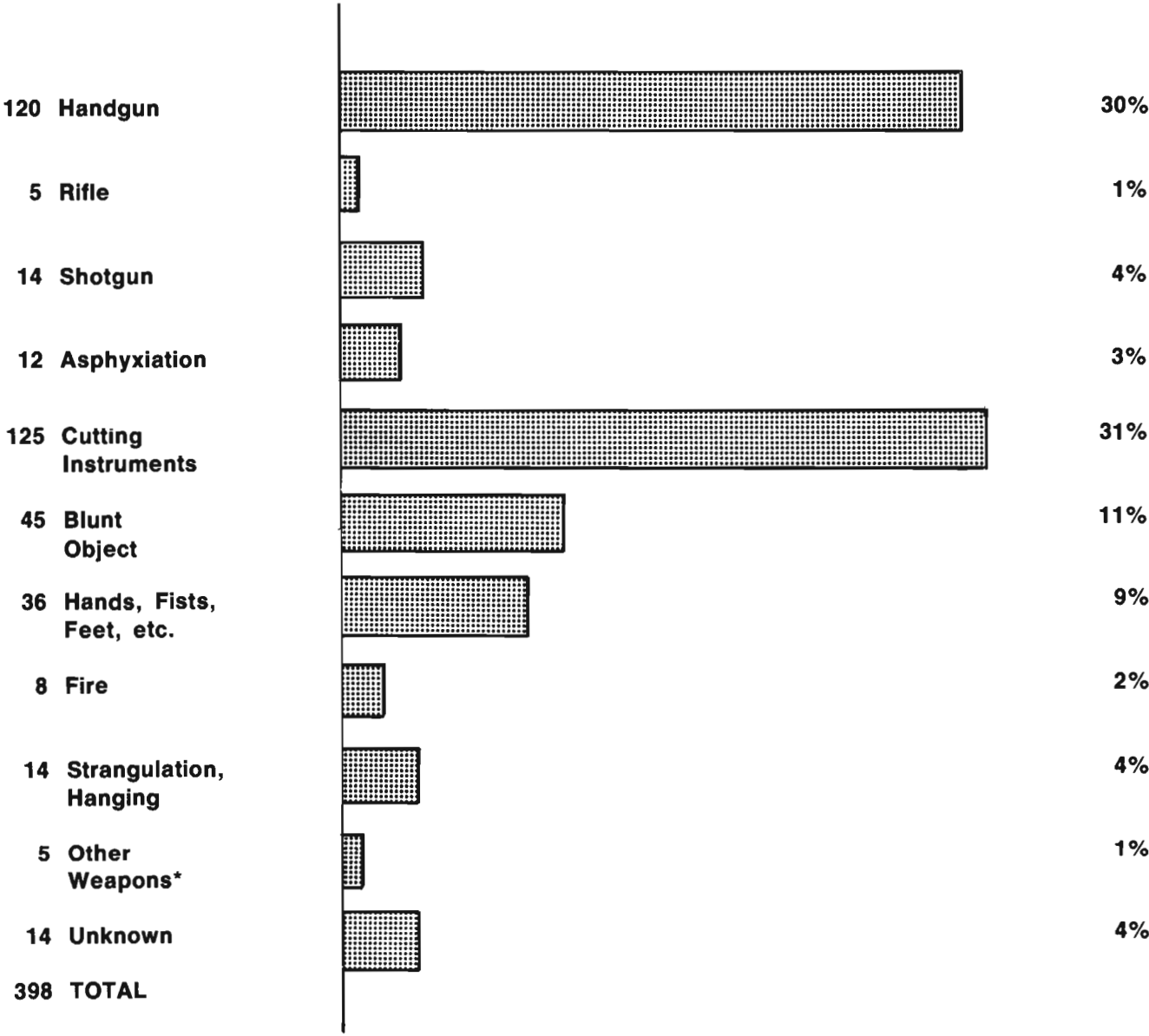

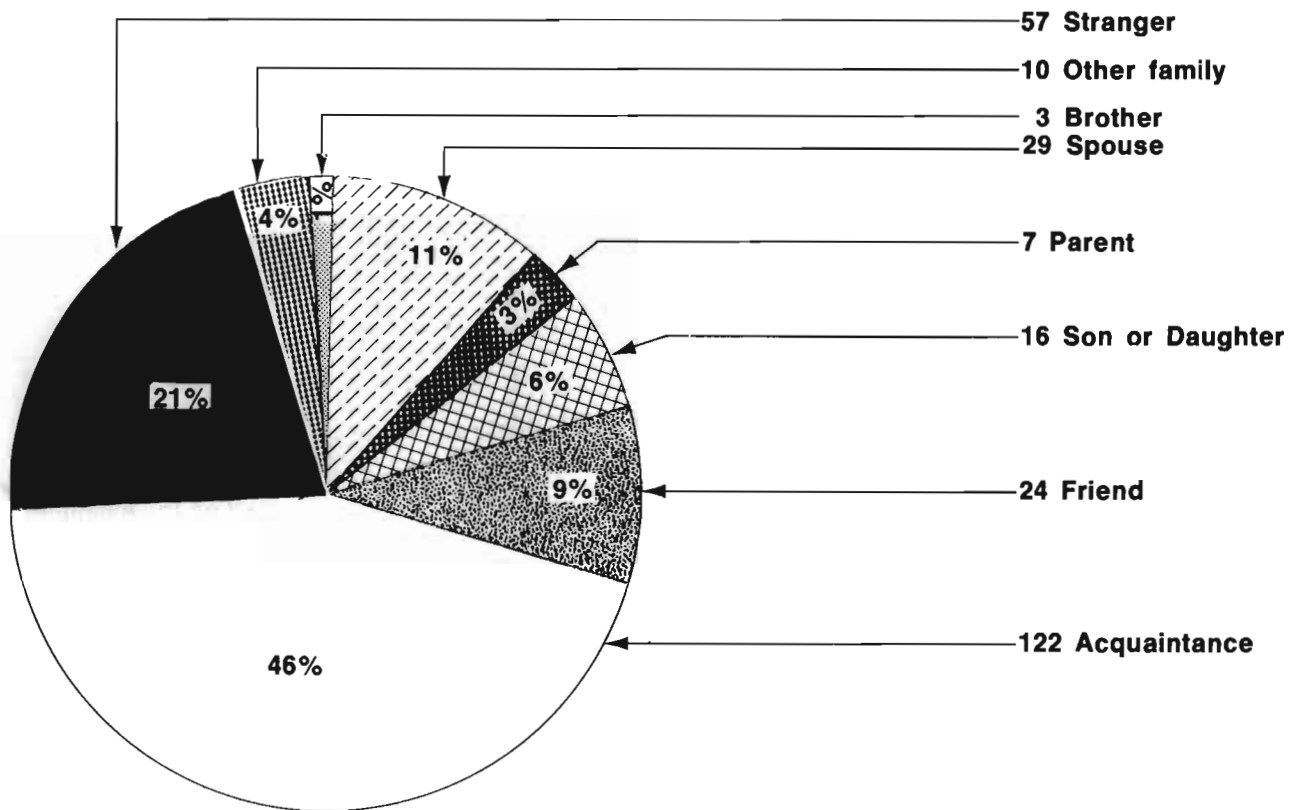

MURDER—Distribution by Type of Weapon



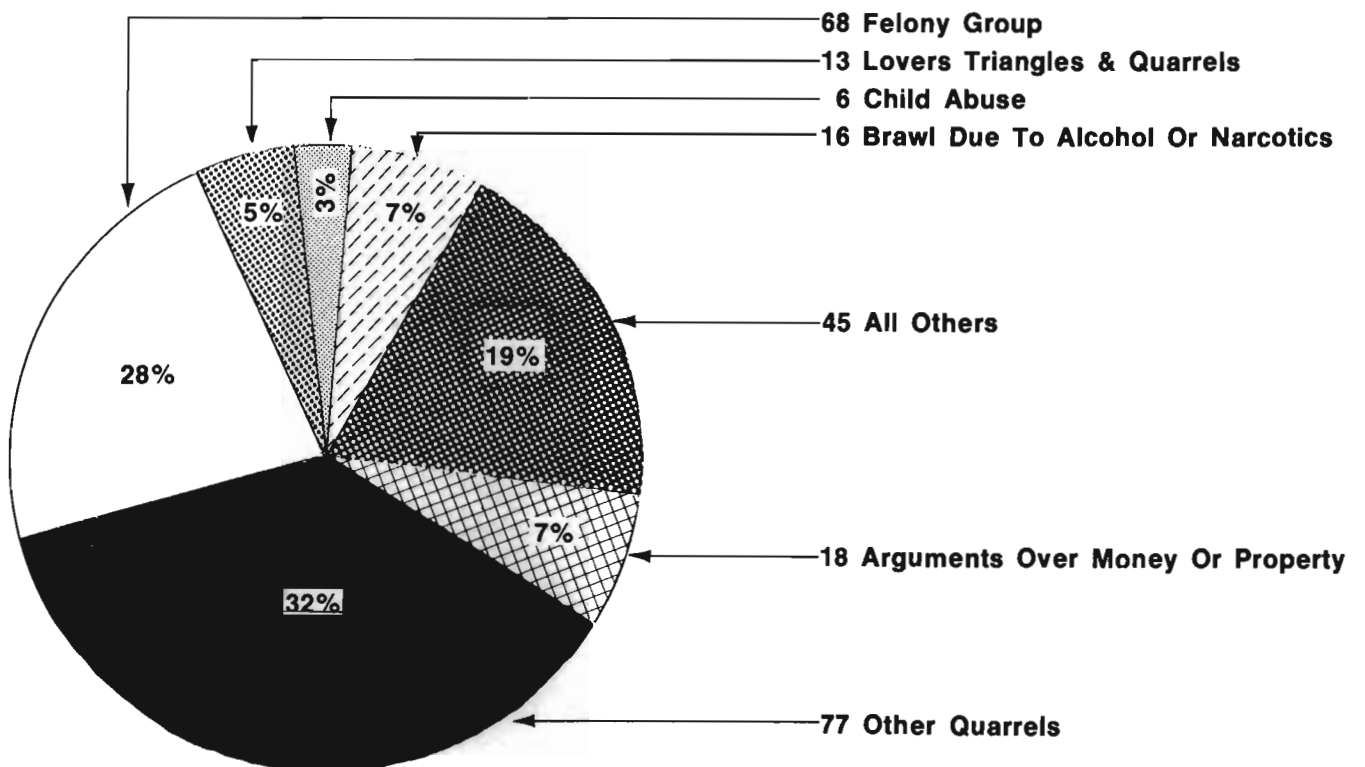

RAPE

Definition

Rape is defined as the carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will. All assaults and attempts to rape are counted, but carnal abuse, rape without force (statutory rape) and other sex offenses are not included.

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 2,268 reported rapes in 1983, an increase of 5 percent compared to the 2,151 in 1982.
- Rape accounted for six-tenths of one percent of the total Crime Index and 5 percent of all violent crimes.
- For every 1,000 persons in the state, there were .3 rape victims. When calculated on the estimated female population, the rape rate increases to .6 per 1,000 females.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Seventy-seven percent of the rapes were forcible, the remaining 23 percent were attempts to rape.
- The total value of property stolen as a result of rape, amounted to \$55,192.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- A total of 1,303 persons were arrested during 1983, an 11 percent increase to 1982.
- Adult rape arrests increased 9 percent, while juvenile arrests increased 23 percent compared to 1982.
- Fifty-eight percent of the arrested perpetrators were black, and 42 percent were white.
- Hispanics accounted for 13 percent of the arrests.
- Fifty-one percent of all persons arrested for rape were under the age of 24.
- Fifty-five percent of all rape cases were solved during 1983. Juveniles accounted for 16 percent of those cases cleared.

ROBBERY

Definition

Robbery is defined as the felonious and forcible taking of the property of another, against his will, by violence or by putting him in fear. The element of personal confrontation is always present in this crime. Under the program, all assaults or attempts to rob are included.

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 20,091 robbery offenses in 1983, a 12 percent decrease compared to 22,880 in 1982.
- Robbery accounted for 5 percent of the total Crime Index and 49 percent of all violent crime.
- The robbery rate was 2.7 victims per 1,000 population.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Highway robberies accounted for 75 percent of all reported robberies.
- Residence robberies decreased 17 percent in 1983 and accounted for 8 percent of all robberies in the state.
- Total value of property stolen during robberies amounted to \$10,243,012.

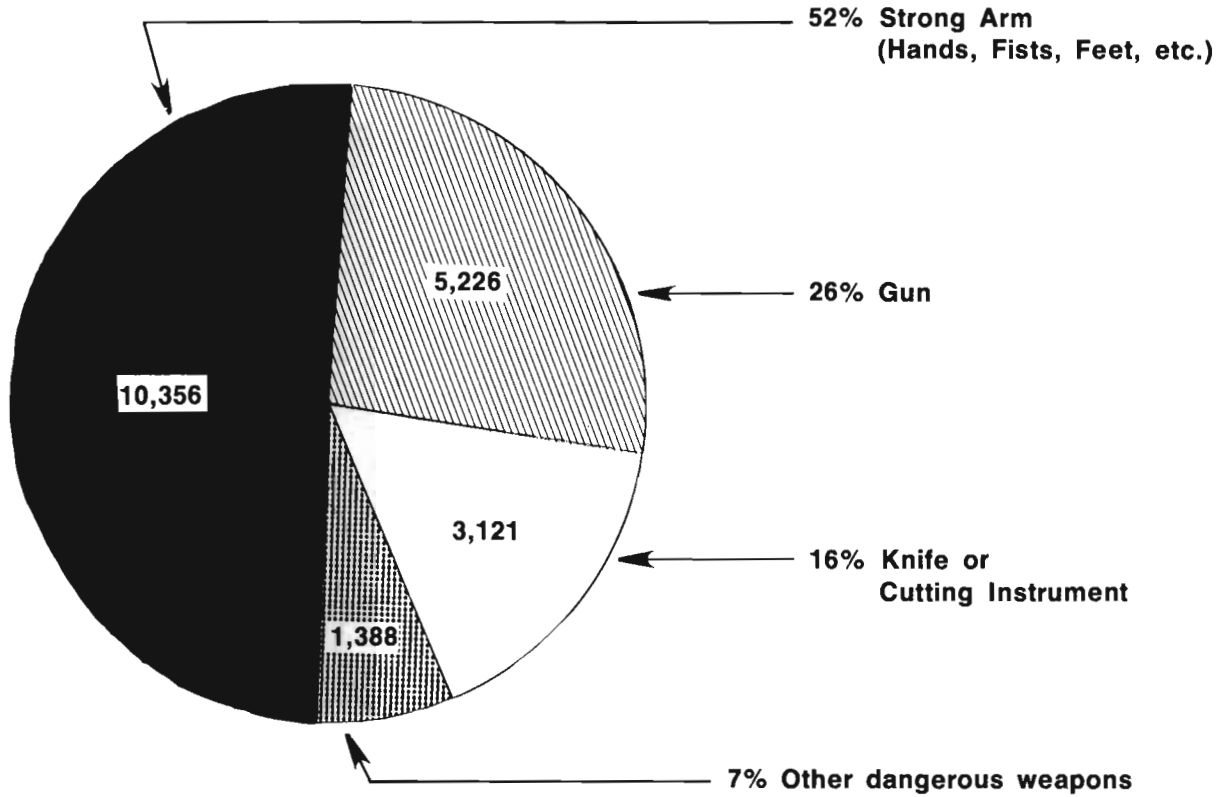

AGGRAVATED ASSAULT

Definition

Aggravated assault, as defined under the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting System, is an attempt or offer, with unlawful force or violence, to do serious physical injury to another. Attempts are included since it is not necessary that an injury result when a gun, knife, or other weapon is used which could result in serious personal injury if the crime was successfully completed.

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 18,546 aggravated assaults reported during 1983, a decrease of 6 percent when compared to 1982.
- Aggravated assaults accounted for 5 percent of the Crime Index and 45 percent of all violent crimes.
- The rate for aggravated assault decreased 7 percent to 2.5 victims per 1,000 population.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Physical force (i.e. hands, fists, and feet) was used in 31 percent and other dangerous weapons (i.e. clubs, bricks, tire irons, etc.) were used in 29 percent of all reported aggravated assaults.
- Aggravated assaults committed with a gun decreased 13 percent compared to 1982.

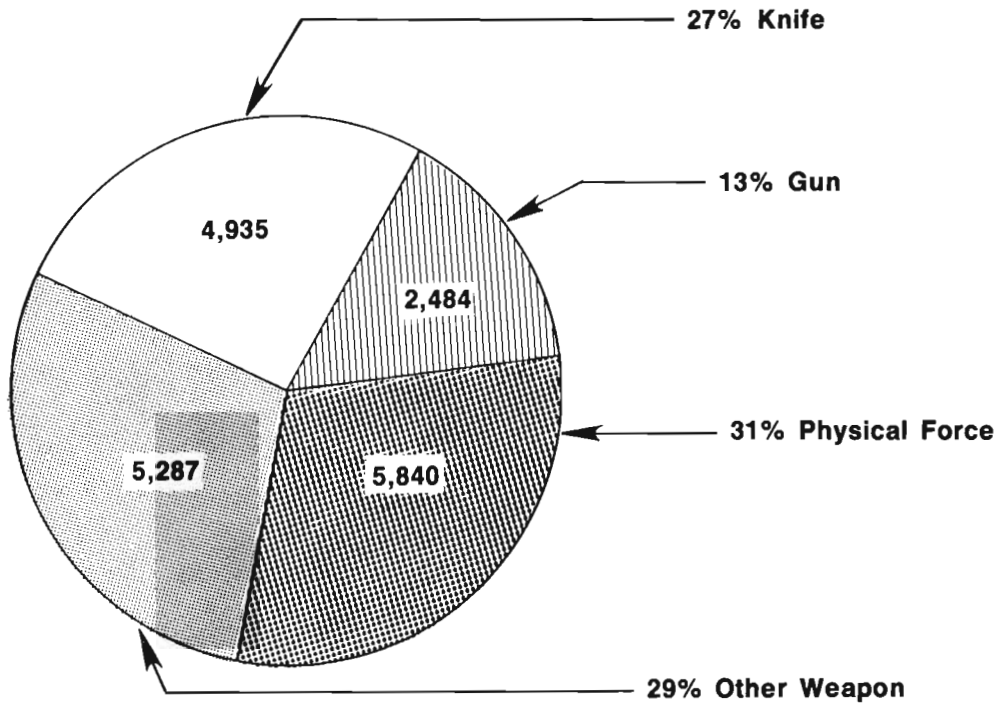

BURGLARY

Definition

Under this program, burglary is defined as an unlawful entry or attempted entry of any structure to commit a felony or larceny. Data collection for this offense is further categorized as forcible entry, unlawful entry (where no force is used) and attempted forcible entry.

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 92,424 burglary offenses reported in 1983, a 13 percent decrease compared to the 106,447 reported in 1982.
- Burglary accounted for 24 percent of the total Crime Index and 27 percent of all nonviolent crime.
- The burglary rate per 1,000 population decreased 14 percent to 12.4 in 1983.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- During 1983, 74 percent of all burglaries involved forcible entry, 14 percent were unlawful entry where no force was used, and the remaining 12 percent were attempts to forcibly enter.
- Residences were targets in 66 percent of the reported burglaries.
- Eighty-five percent of the nonresidential burglaries, where a time could be established, occurred at night.
- Stolen property value as a result of burglary statewide, amounted to \$81 million, for an average loss of \$882.
- The average loss as a result of a residential burglary was \$914, while nonresidential burglary loss was \$817.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- Burglary arrests decreased 11 percent in 1983, with 14,617 persons arrested.
- Adult arrests decreased 9 percent, while juvenile arrests decreased 14 percent.
- Males accounted for 95 percent and females 5 percent of the burglary arrests.
- Juveniles accounted for 47 percent of all burglary arrests.
- Sixty-one percent of burglary arrests were white, and 39 percent were black.
- Hispanics accounted for 11 percent of the arrests.
- Fourteen percent of the burglaries statewide, were cleared and juveniles accounted for 32 percent of these clearances.

LARCENY-THEFT

Definition

The definition of larceny-theft, as provided under this program, is the taking of the property of another with intent to deprive him of ownership. All larcenies and thefts resulting from pocket-picking, purse-snatching, shoplifting, larcenies from motor vehicles, thefts of motor vehicle parts and accessories, bicycle thefts, etc., are included here. Embezzlement, unlawful conversions, larceny by bailee, frauds or bad checks are not included.

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 206,799 larcenies reported in 1983, an 8 percent decrease compared to the 224,025 in 1982.
- Larceny accounted for 54 percent of the total Crime Index and 60 percent of all nonviolent crime.
- The larceny victimization rate decreased 8 percent to 27.8 victims for every 1,000 population in 1983.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Thefts of motor vehicle parts and accessories and thefts from motor vehicles, collectively accounted for 36 percent of all larceny-thefts reported.
- Purse-snatchings decreased 12 percent in 1983 compared to 1982, while pocket-picking increased 17 percent.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- Larceny-theft arrests decreased 6 percent in 1983, with 43,475 persons arrested.
- Juvenile arrests decreased 6 percent and adult arrests also decreased 6 percent in 1983.
- Males accounted for 71 percent and females 29 percent of the arrests.
- Fifty-eight percent of all persons arrested for larceny were white, 42 percent were black, and 1/2 of one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 10 percent of the arrests.
- Twenty percent of the larcenies were cleared with juveniles accounting for 30 percent of the clearances.

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MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT

Definition

In Uniform Crime Reporting, motor vehicle theft includes all thefts and attempted thefts of a motor vehicle. This includes the theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle which is defined as a self-propelled vehicle that runs on the surface and not on rails. This definition excludes taking a motor vehicle for temporary use, such as family situation, or unauthorized use by others having lawful access to the vehicle. The motor vehicle theft category includes the subheadings of autos, trucks and buses, and other vehicles (motorcycles, mo-peds, etc.)

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 45,120 motor vehicle thefts reported in 1983, a 3 percent decrease compared to the 46,626 reported in 1982.
- Motor vehicle thefts accounted for 12 percent of the total Crime Index and 13 percent of the nonviolent crime.
- The motor vehicle theft rate of 6.1 victims per 1,000 population represents a 3 percent decrease compared to 1982.

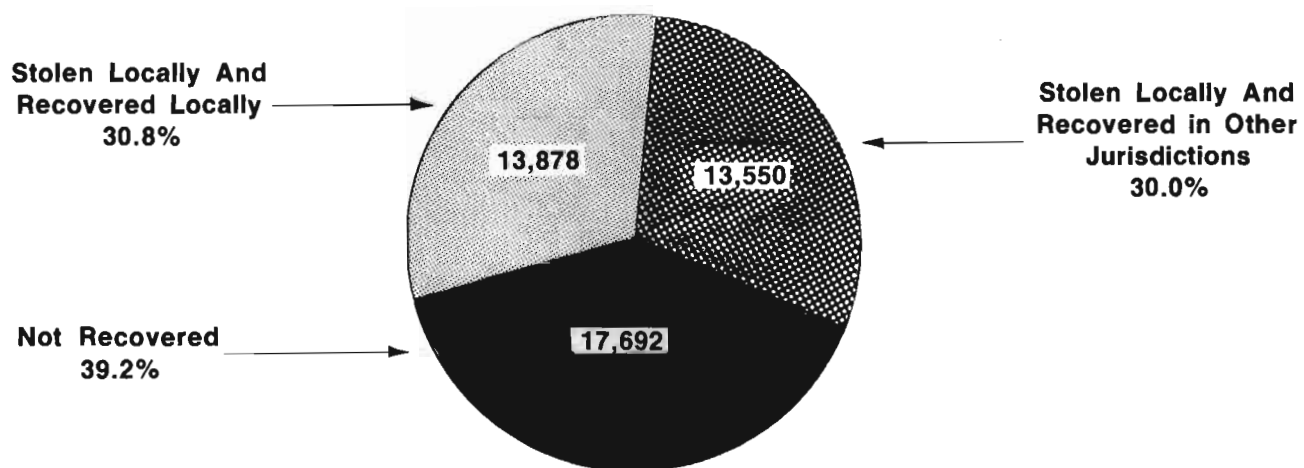
MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT VALUES

ARSON

Definition

Arson is defined by the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting program as any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property of another, etc.

Only fires determined through investigation to have been willfully or maliciously set are classified as arsons. Fires of suspicious or unknown origins are excluded.

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 3,462 reportable arsons in 1983, which represents a 24 percent decrease compared to 4,577 in 1982.
- The arson rate decreased to 0.5 victims per 1,000 population.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Sixty-eight percent of the arsons were structures, with residences accounting for 44 percent.
- Mobile property including motor vehicles, accounted for 23 percent of the arsons in the state.
- Other property (timber, crops, etc.) accounted for 9 percent of the reported arsons.
- The total value of property damage due to arson, amounted to \$31.8 million for an average dollar value loss of \$9,184.
- The average residential loss was \$8,557 while the average loss to industrial/commercial structures was \$36,475.
- The average motor vehicle loss was \$3,628.

- Arson arrests numbered 728 in 1983, representing a decrease of 12 percent when compared to 1982.
- Adult arrests decreased 6 percent, while juvenile arrests decreased 19 percent.

ARREST SUMMARY FOR NON-INDEX OFFENSES

MANSLAUGHTER

Definition

The unlawful killing of a human being, by another, through gross negligence. Arrests relating to traffic fatalities are included.

- There were 41 arrests reported by law enforcement agencies of the state for manslaughter during the year. This represents a 24 percent decrease compared to 1982.
- Adults accounted for 93 percent and juveniles accounted for 7 percent of the arrests.
- Males accounted for 83 percent of the arrests and females 17 percent.
- Seventy-six percent of the persons arrested were white, 22 percent were black, and 2 percent were other races.
- The Hispanic ethnic origin accounted for 10 percent of the arrests.

SIMPLE ASSAULT

Definition

Simple assault, as defined under the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting System, is an assault or an attempted assault where no weapon is used and which does not result in serious or aggravated injury to the victim.

- There were 30,344 simple assault arrests in 1983, representing a 2 percent decrease when compared to 1982.
- Of the total, 27 percent were juveniles and 73 percent were adults.
- Males accounted for 82 percent and females 18 percent of the persons arrested for simple assault.
- Sixty-nine percent of the persons arrested were white, and 31 percent were black.
- Eight percent of the persons arrested were Hispanic.

ARSON

Definition

Under this program, arson is defined as the willful or malicious burning, or attempting to burn, with or without intent to defraud; a dwelling house, building, ship or vessel, motor vehicle or aircraft, contents of building, personal property of another, etc.

- There were 728 arrests reported for arson offenses; a 12 percent decrease compared to 1982.
- Juveniles accounted for 44 percent and adults 56 percent of persons arrested for arson.
- Eighty-nine percent of the total arson arrests were males, while 11 percent were females.
- Seventy-three percent of the persons arrested were white, 26 percent were black, and one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 9 percent of those arrested.

FORGERY AND COUNTERFEITING

Definition

The definition of forgery and counterfeiting is the making, altering, uttering or possessing or attempting to make, alter, utter or possess, with intent to defraud, anything false which is made to appear true.

- There were 1,307 arrests reported by the law enforcement agencies of the state for forgery or counterfeiting during the year. This represents a 13 percent decrease compared to 1982.
- Adults accounted for 95 percent and juveniles accounted for 5 percent of the arrests.
- Males accounted for 68 percent of the arrests and females 32 percent.
- Sixty-one percent of the persons arrested were white, 39 percent were black.
- Hispanics accounted for 9 percent of the arrests.

FRAUD

Definition

In Uniform Crime Reporting, fraud is the fraudulent conversion and obtaining money or property by false pretenses. This includes bad checks, confidence games, etc., except forgeries and counterfeiting.

- There were 7,683 arrests reported during the year for fraud, a 6 percent decrease compared to 1982.
- Adult arrests represented 98 percent and juveniles 2 percent of the persons arrested.
- Males accounted for 53 percent and females 47 percent of the persons arrested for fraud.
- Sixty-eight percent of the persons arrested were white, and 32 percent were black.
- Six percent of the persons arrested were Hispanic.

EMBEZZLEMENT

Definition

The definition of embezzlement is the misappropriation or misapplication of money or property entrusted to one's care, custody or control.

- There were 151 persons arrested for embezzlement; a 35 percent increase compared to 1982.
- Ninety-one percent of those persons arrested were adults, and 9 percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 62 percent and females 38 percent of the persons arrested for embezzlement.
- Seventy percent of the persons arrested were white, 29 percent were black, and one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 3 percent of those arrested.

STOLEN PROPERTY (Buying, Receiving, Possessing)

Definition

Included in this class are all offenses of buying, receiving, and possessing stolen property, as well as all attempts to commit any of these offenses.

- In 1983 there were 9,292 arrests reported for stolen property—a decrease of 11 percent compared to 1982.
- Of the total, 67 percent were adults and 33 percent were juveniles.
- Eighty-nine percent were males, and 11 percent were females.
- Fifty-two percent of the persons arrested were white, and 48 percent were black.
- Hispanics accounted for 15 percent of the arrests.

CRIMINAL/MALICIOUS MISCHIEF

Definition

Criminal/malicious mischief is defined as the willful destruction, injury, disfigurement, or defacement of property without consent of the owner or persons having custody or control.

- There were 13,494 arrests for criminal/malicious mischief, a decrease of 3 percent compared to 1982.
- Juveniles accounted for 62 percent, and adults 38 percent of persons arrested for criminal/malicious mischief.
- Males accounted for 91 percent and females 9 percent of the arrests.
- Seventy-seven percent of the persons arrested were white, and 23 percent were black.
- Seven percent of the persons arrested were Hispanic.

WEAPONS: CARRYING, POSSESSING, etc.

Definition

Under the program, this offense includes all the violations of regulations or statutes controlling the carrying, using, possessing, furnishing, and manufacturing of deadly weapons or silencers, and attempts.

- There were 8,090 arrests reported for weapon offenses; a 3 percent decrease compared to 1982.
- Of the total, 75 percent were adults, and 25 percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 94 percent and females 6 percent of those arrested.
- Sixty-three percent of those arrested were white, and 37 percent were black.
- Hispanics accounted for 14 percent of those arrested.

PROSTITUTION AND COMMERCIALIZED VICE

Definition

Prostitution and commercialized vice are sex offenses of a commercialized nature and attempts. Included in this category are prostitution, keeping a bawdy house, procuring or transporting women for immoral purposes, etc.

- There were 1,648 arrests reported for prostitution and commercialized vice during 1983; no significant change compared to 1982.
- Ninety-seven percent of the arrests were adults, with the remaining 3 percent being juveniles.
- Females accounted for 72 percent and males 28 percent of the arrests.
- Sixty-one percent of those arrested were black and 39 percent were white.
- Hispanics accounted for 6 percent of the arrests.

SEX OFFENSES

Definition

Sex offenses, as defined under the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting Program, does not include rape, prostitution and commercialized vice. Included in this class are offenses against chastity, common decency, morals, and the like; attempts are also included.

- There were 2,127 sex offense arrests, during 1983, representing a decrease of 2 percent when compared to 1982.
- Adults accounted for 74 percent, and juveniles 26 percent of the arrests.
- Ninety-five percent were males, and 5 percent were females.
- Seventy-two percent of the persons arrested were white, and 28 percent were black.
- Twelve percent of the persons arrested were Hispanic.

DRUG ABUSE VIOLATIONS

Definition

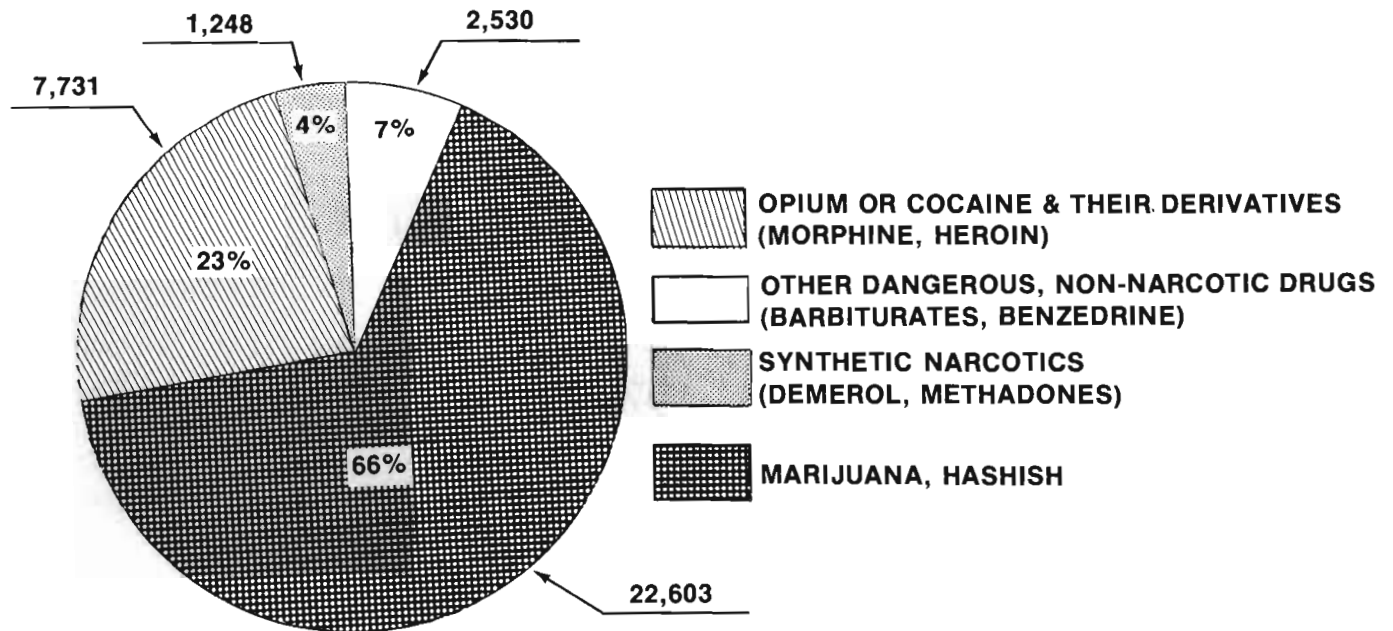
Under the program, drug abuse violations are defined as the unlawful sale/manufacturing, possession/use of the below listed narcotics and drugs:

- a. Opium or Cocaine and their derivatives (morphine, heroin, codeine).
- b. Marijuana, hashish, etc.
- c. Synthetic narcotics—manufactured narcotics which can cause true drug addiction—(demerol, methadones).
- d. Other—dangerous non-narcotic drugs (barbiturates, amphetamines, hallucinogens).





- There were 34,112 arrests reported by the law enforcement agencies of the state for drug abuse violations; no significant change compared to 1982.
- Adults accounted for 84 percent and juveniles 16 percent of the arrests.

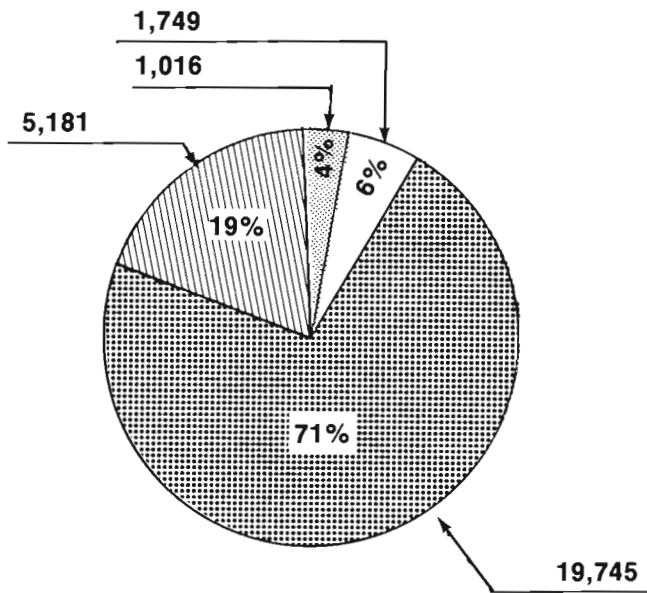
- Fifty-eight percent of persons arrested for drug abuse violations were between the ages of 16 to 24.
- Males accounted for 87 percent of the arrests while females accounted for the remaining 13 percent.
- Sixty-five percent of the persons arrested were white, and 35 percent were black.
- Hispanics accounted for 12 percent of those arrested.
- Arrests for possession/use of drugs accounted for 81 percent of the arrests, and the remaining 19 percent were for the sale/manufacturing of drugs.
- Arrests for marijuana/hashish represented 71 percent of the possession/use category and 45 percent of the sale/manufacturing category. Overall, they accounted for 66 percent of the total drug abuse violation arrests.

TOTAL ARRESTS 34,112**

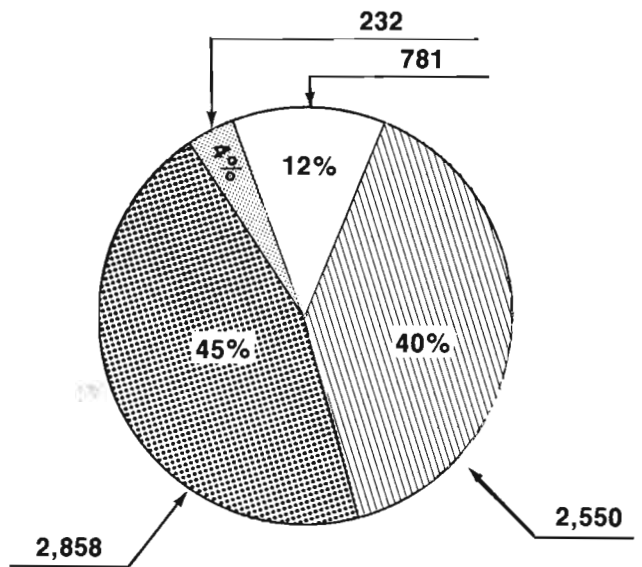

GAMBLING

Definition

Gambling violations are defined as the promoting, permitting, or engaging in illegal gambling.

- There were 567 gambling arrests reported during 1983, resulting in a 14 percent increase compared to 1982.
- Ninety-eight percent of the arrests were adults, and 2 percent were juveniles.
- Males represented 85 percent, and females 15 percent of the gambling arrests.
- Sixty-four percent of the persons arrested were white, and 36 percent were black.
- Hispanics accounted for 27 percent of the arrested.

OFFENSES AGAINST FAMILY AND CHILDREN

Definition

The definition of offenses against family and children, is the nonsupport, neglect, desertion, or abuse of family and children.

- There were 4,956 arrests for offenses against family and children during 1983, representing an increase of 11 percent from the previous year.
- All arrests for this offense were adults.
- Males accounted for 93 percent and females 7 percent of the arrests.
- Sixty percent of the persons arrested were white, and 40 percent were black.
- Hispanics accounted for 8 percent of the arrests.

DRIVING UNDER THE INFLUENCE

Definition

Under the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting Program, the offense of driving under the influence is defined as the driving or operating of any motor vehicle while drunk or under the influence of alcohol or narcotics.

- There were 40,363 arrests reported for driving under the influence in 1983, a decrease of 4 percent compared to 1982.
- Ninety-nine percent of the arrests were adults and only 1 percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 89 percent of the arrests, while females accounted for the remaining 11 percent.
- Eighty-nine percent of the persons arrested were white and 11 percent were black.
- Six percent of the persons arrested were Hispanic.

LIQUOR LAWS

Definition

Included in this category are state or local liquor law violations, with the exception of "driving under the influence."

- There were 12,832 arrests reported for liquor law violations; an increase of one percent over the previous year.
- Adults were responsible for 58 percent of the arrests, while the remaining 42 percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 82 percent of the liquor law arrests, while females accounted for the remaining 18 percent.
- Ninety percent of the persons arrested were white, and 10 percent were black.
- Hispanics accounted for 5 percent of those arrested.

DISORDERLY CONDUCT

Definition

In this category are placed all charges of committing a breach of the peace (disorderly person).

- There were 40,753 arrests for disorderly conduct in 1983, a decrease of one percent compared to 1982.
- Seventy percent of the arrests were adults while the remaining 30 percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 84 percent and females 16 percent of the disorderly conduct arrests.
- Seventy-six percent of the persons arrested were white, and 24 percent were black.
- Hispanics accounted for 8 percent of the arrests.

VAGRANCY

Definition

In this category are persons charged with vagabondage, begging, loitering, etc.

- There were 140 arrests in this category during the year, a 43 percent decrease compared to 1982.
- Juveniles accounted for 44 percent of the arrests while adults accounted for the remaining 56 percent.
- Males represented 69 percent and females 31 percent of the arrests in this category.
- Eighty-four percent of the persons arrested were white, and 16 percent were black.
- Five percent of the persons arrested were Hispanic.

ALL OTHER OFFENSES

Definition

Included in this category are all violations of state and local laws, except those offenses that can be categorized into one of the specific crime classifications previously mentioned.

- There were 65,022 arrests reported for all other offenses during 1983, a 2 percent decrease compared to 1982.
- Adults accounted for 76 percent and juveniles 24 percent of persons arrested for all other offenses.
- Eighty-two percent of the arrests were males, while 18 percent were females.
- Seventy percent of the persons arrested were white and 30 percent were black.
- Hispanics accounted for 7 percent of those arrested.

CURFEW AND LOITERING LAW VIOLATIONS

Definition

In this category are juvenile arrests made for violations of local curfew or loitering ordinances.

- There were 2,013 arrests reported for curfew and loitering law violations during the year; this represents a 36 percent decrease compared to 1982.
- Males represented 79 percent and females 21 percent of the arrests.
- Eighty-one percent of the persons arrested were white, and 19 percent were black.
- Hispanics accounted for 6 percent of the arrests.

RUNAWAYS

Definition

For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, this category is limited to juveniles taken into protective custody, under provisions of local statutes, as runaways.

- There were 5,478 runaway arrests reported in 1983; a 9 percent decrease compared to 1982.
- Females accounted for 57 percent and males accounted for 43 percent of the arrests.
- Seventy-seven percent of the persons arrested were white, and 23 percent were black.
- Eight percent of the persons arrested were Hispanic.

- The county's solution rate was 17 percent; 32 percent of those solved cases were cleared by the arrest of juveniles.

WARREN COUNTY

VOLUME/RATE

- During the year, police of the county reported 2,379 Index crimes, a decline of 14 percent when compared to 1982.
- Violent crimes registered an increase of 3 percent, and nonviolent crime declined 15 percent.
- The Index crime rate was 28.0 victims per 1,000 inhabitants, a 14 percent decrease compared to 1982.
- Robbery decreased 40 percent (from 25 in 1982 to 15 in 1983), burglary decreased 24 percent and aggravated assault increased 15 percent.
- The dollar loss of stolen property amounted to \$1.4 million, of which 34 percent was recovered.
- May recorded the highest frequency of Index offenses; the month of February had the lowest incidence.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- There were 4,057 persons arrested during the year, a 5 percent decrease when compared to 1982.
- Adult arrests registered a 1 percent decrease, while juvenile arrests decreased 17 percent.
- Police of the county cleared 23 percent of all Index offenses, and juveniles accounted for 31 percent of those solved cases.

CRIME INDEX FOR POPULATION GROUPS—1983

The presentation of crime statistics by population groups was made for the purpose of projecting, for consideration, the relative crime experience of communities of varying populations. Although the individual municipalities within the various groups may be geographically separated, their inclusion into a specific group was predicted by the similarity in population with the other municipalities within the group. Municipalities within the same group may differ widely when all factors are considered, but they do share the common bond of population size. The grouping of communities in this manner allows recognition of variances in the crime volumes, rates and clearances between the established groups.

CRIME IN THE CITIES

CRIME IN THE CITIES

This section will deal with serious crimes reported in the large urban cities of the state. These cities represent twenty-one percent of the population and historically account for one third of the reported Crime Index of the state.

This analysis involves the latest ten year period (1974-1983) and endeavors to further identify crime trends in these urban areas.

The cities included in this analysis have been categorized as urban municipalities (i.e., densely populated with extensive development) by the New Jersey Department of Community Affairs, Division of State and Regional Planning, Bureau of Statewide Planning.

The criteria used in the selection of these cities were (1) to be classified as urban character and (2) have a population of 50,000 or more inhabitants.

For further comparative analysis, the urban cities were subdivided into two distinct groupings.

Group number one consisted of the state's six largest urban centers with populations of 80,000 or over, and categorized as the "Major Urban."

The second group included the "Major Urban" and the additional urban communities with populations of 50,000 or more inhabitants, and referred to as the "Urban 15."

CRIME IN THE CITIES

Summary

Distribution

- Six major urban centers—Camden, Newark, Jersey City, Trenton, Paterson and Elizabeth—collectively represent 13 percent of New Jersey's total population. These same urban centers, during the period 1974 through 1983 accounted for 23 percent of the state's total crime.
- The six centers from 1974 through 1983 accounted for 51 percent of all violent crime and 20 percent of the nonviolent crimes in the entire state.
- The 15 urban municipalities represent 21 percent of the state's total population.
- For the period 1974 through 1983, these 15 urban municipalities accounted for 32 percent of New Jersey's total Index, 60 percent of all violent crime, and 29 percent of the state's nonviolent crime.
- Nearly 7 out of every 10 robberies reported occurred in the "Urban 15" cities during this ten year period.

- During the ten year period (1974-1983), the Crime Index in New Jersey has increased 10 percent, while the "Urban 15" cities increased 15 percent and the six major urban cities increased 10 percent.
- Violent crime in the state increased 40 percent, the 15 urban cities increased 36 percent and the six major cities increased 29 percent.
- Nonviolent crime in the state increased 7 percent, the "Urban 15" increased 11 percent and the six major cities increased 6 percent.

STREET CRIME

There has never been a clear-cut definition for street crime within the criminal justice system. The nation's clearing house for the collection and dissemination of criminal statistics, the Federal Bureau of Investigation, has no criteria in the categorization of specific crimes to be designated or defined as "street crimes." More and more this media term has been confused with the violent crime group of murder, rape, robbery, and aggravated assault.

Although any particular crime can and does occur on the street, this analysis, because of reporting constraints within the Uniform Crime Reporting System, is limited to defining street crimes as those offenses which occur, or are most likely to occur, on streets, highways, parking lots, etc. These crimes include highway robbery, purse-snatching, theft from autos, theft of auto parts and accessories, theft of bicycles, and motor vehicle thefts. All are crimes against property and only one, highway robbery, falls in the violent crime group.

- During the ten year period 1974-1983 the "Urban 15" cities accounted for 35 percent of the street crimes in the state.
- Three out of every four highway robberies occurred in the "Urban 15" during the ten year period.
- Almost half of all motor vehicle thefts during the survey span, occurred in these 15 urban municipalities.
- Fifty-three percent of all purse-snatchings were perpetrated in the "Urban 15" cities.
- Street crime increased 21 percent since 1974, in the "Urban 15" cities.

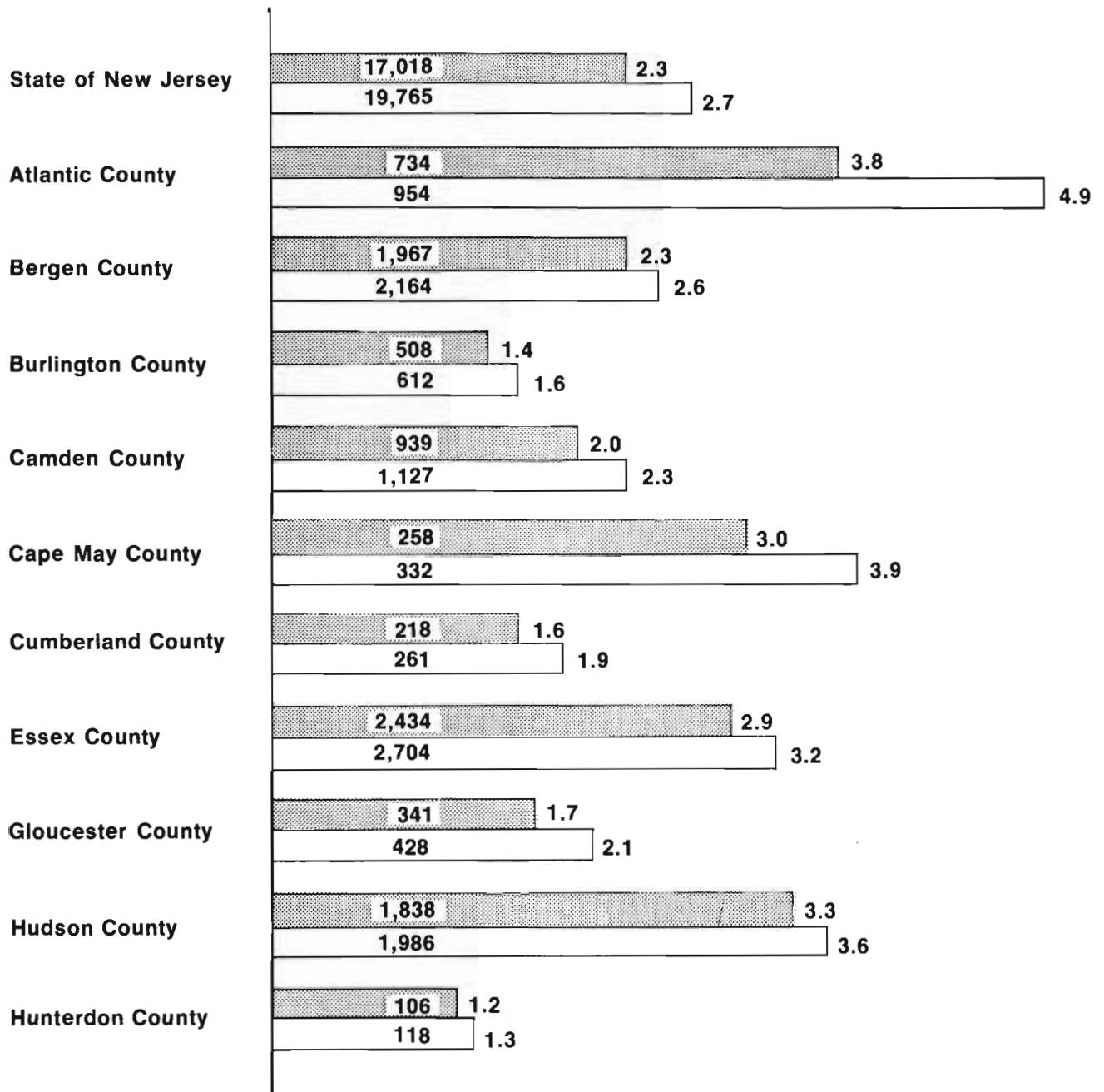
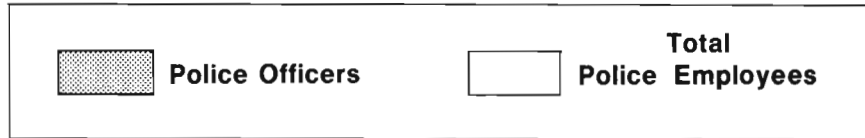

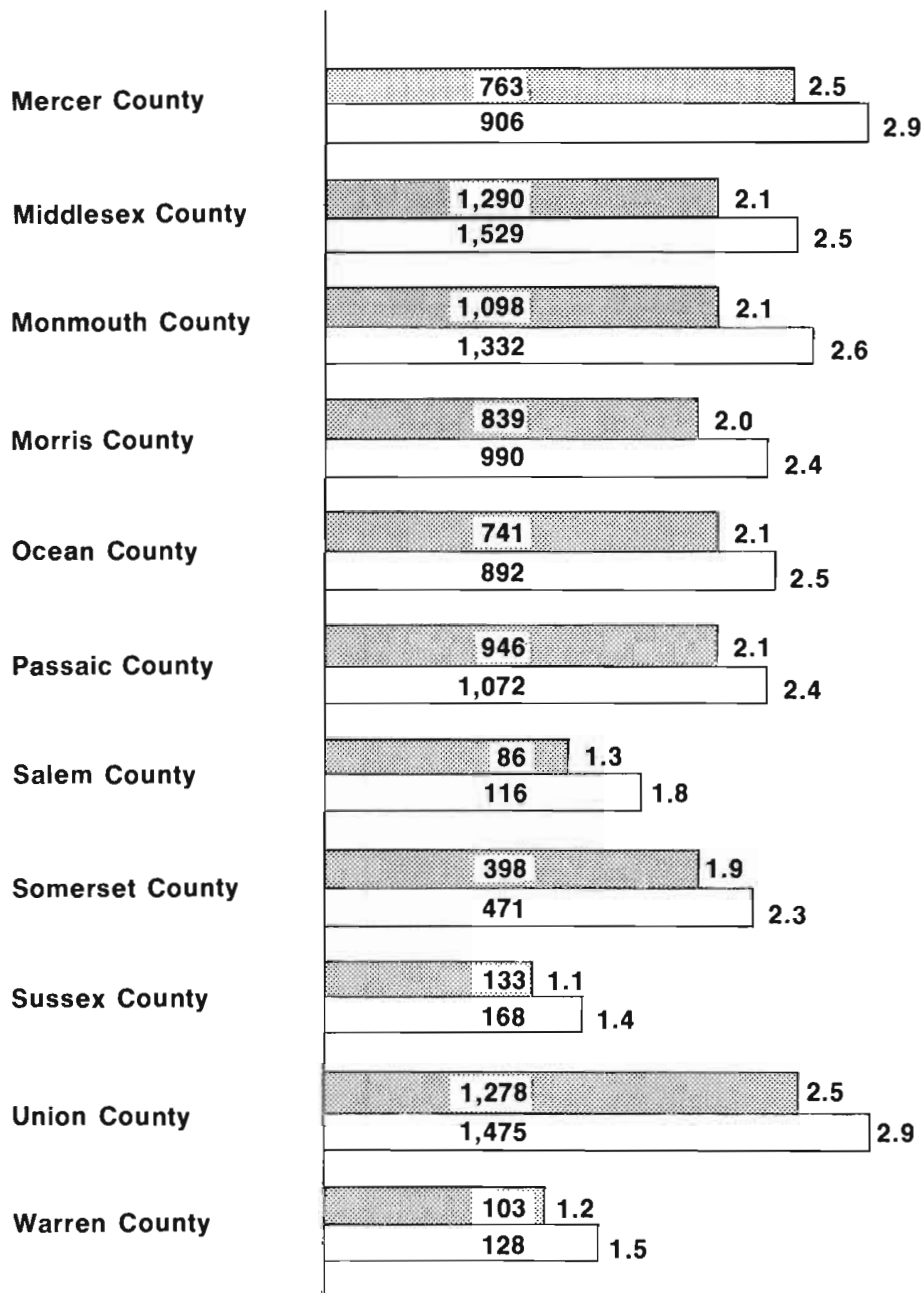
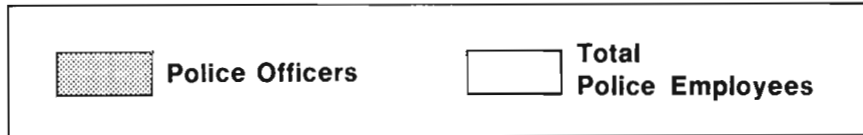

POLICE EMPLOYEE DATA

The Uniform Crime Reporting Program of New Jersey incorporates the collection of pertinent data relating to the police of the state. Information regarding police employee strength, and trends are discussed in this section.

Individual listings of full-time state, county, university and college police departments are shown in tables within this section. Listings of municipal police departments will be found in Section VII.

The determination of police strength for any given area or municipality should be subject for serious consideration. Such consideration, however, should be based on the numerous factors which create the need for police services. For example, the increased need for police service in a municipality which has a highly mobile or seasonal population, differs from a municipality which has a relatively stable population. Some other factors, discussed elsewhere in this publication, relate to size, density of population, geographic location, character, and proximity to metropolitan areas. The tables and charts shown in this section should not be interpreted as recommended strength for any given municipality.

TOTAL POLICE EMPLOYEES

Total police employees are defined as the total number of full-time police officers and civilian police employees (clerks, dispatchers, mechanics, etc.) employed by all law enforcement agencies in the state.

- During 1983, there were 36,330 full time police employees in New Jersey. This represents a 5 percent increase compared to the 34,439 full time police employees in 1982.
- The number of full time police officers increased 5 percent, from 26,158 in 1982 to 27,477 in 1983.
- The number of full time civilian employees increased 7 percent, from 8,281 in 1982 to 8,853 in 1983.
- Seventy-six percent were sworn officers and the remaining 24 percent were civilian employees.

MUNICIPAL POLICE EMPLOYEES

This category consists of the number of police employees, including civilian personnel, employed full time by municipalities of the state.

- During 1983, there were 19,765 municipal police employees, no significant change compared to the 19,855 in 1982.
- There were 2.7 municipal police employees for every 1,000 inhabitants of the state; no change since 1976.
- Union County reported the largest increase in municipal police employees, an increase of 3 percent (37 employees).
- Atlantic County recorded the highest police employee rate; 4.9 per 1,000 population; (this rate is computed on the static population and does not take in account the large influx of seasonal and recreational population.)
- Hunterdon County recorded the lowest police employee rate of 1.3 per 1,000 population.

OTHER POLICE (State Agencies)

In addition to the State Police, there were eight other state agencies reporting to the System. These agencies consist of: Bureau of Forest Fire Service, Bureau of State Parks, Department of Corrections, Division of Criminal Justice, Division of Fish and Game, Division of Weights and Measures, Palisades Interstate Park and N.J. Transit Police. No rates were computed due to the variations in the types of police service rendered, and their statewide jurisdictions.

- Together, these agencies reported a total of 7,201 full-time police employees; a 30 percent increase compared to the 5,521 police employees in 1982.
- There were 3,645 sworn police officers in 1983, an increase of 43 percent compared to the 2,553 in 1982.
- These agencies reported 3,556 civilian police employees in 1983, representing a 20 percent increase compared to the 2,968 reported in 1982.
- Fifty-one percent were sworn personnel, while the remaining 49 percent were civilians.

MUNICIPAL CIVILIAN POLICE EMPLOYEES

The personnel of each department differ as to the demands and responsibilities placed before them. Many police officers are fully occupied with clerical tasks and are not free to perform active police duties. Employing civilians in police departments to perform clerical duties is in line with the thinking of many police administrators who recommend the use of civilians in this capacity, thus freeing the sworn personnel for actual police related services.

- There were 2,747 municipal civilian police employees in 1983. No significant change compared to the 2,744 in 1982.
- Fourteen percent of all municipal police employees were civilian.

MUNICIPAL POLICE OFFICERS

This includes the number of sworn police officers employed full-time by municipalities of the state. The police employee rate per 1,000 population presented here should not be construed as being recommended ratios. The determination of police strength for any municipality should be based on the numerous factors which create the need for police services. These factors, as crime, vary in type and degree from place to place. Some examples are: seasonal population, geographic location, density and composition of the population.

- There were 17,018 full-time municipal police officers in 1983; this represents 1 percent decrease compared to the 17,111 full-time municipal police officers in 1982.
- The number of full-time municipal police officers was calculated at 2.3 per 1,000 population; no change since 1974.
- Eighty-six percent of all municipal police employees were sworn officers.
- The largest numerical increase occurred in Monmouth County; an increase of 30 municipal police officers, or 3 percent.
- The largest numerical decrease occurred in Essex County; a decrease of 67 municipal police officers or 3 percent.
- Atlantic County, with 3.8 police officers per 1,000 inhabitants, recorded the highest rate of full-time municipal police officers. (This rate is computed on the static population, and does not take into account the large influx of seasonal and recreational population.)
- Sussex County recorded the lowest rate of full-time municipal police officers with 1.1 police officers per 1,000 inhabitants.

COUNTY POLICE, SHERIFFS, AND PROSECUTORS

The functions of county law enforcement vary widely throughout the state. The operation of one sheriff's department may be limited exclusively to civil areas and the administration of the county jail, or they may be actively involved in criminal matters throughout the county.

County police departments are varied in their activities as well, in that some are responsible for enforcement throughout the county, while others may have as their primary mission the policing of county parklands. The responsibilities of county prosecutors' officers include criminal investigations, trial preparation, court presentation and special probes. Because of the difference in the types of police service rendered, rates for county law enforcement agencies are not presented here.

- County law enforcement agencies reported a total of 5,718 full-time police employees in 1983; an increase of 5 percent compared to the 5,454 in 1982.
- There were 4,288 full-time sworn police officers employed by county agencies in 1983. This represents an increase of 7 percent compared to the 3,995 in 1982.
- The county police agencies reported 1,430 civilian police employees in 1983; a 2 percent decrease compared to the 1,459 in 1982.
- Seventy-five percent were sworn personnel while the remaining 25 percent were civilians.

STATE POLICE

The State Police total includes personnel from the Highway Patrol, Marine Police, Alcoholic Beverage Control Enforcement Bureau, Capital Police, and Fire Marshals. The breakdown for each bureau is depicted on the State Police Personnel chart.

The New Jersey State Police is empowered to provide all phases of all enforcement throughout the state. It also renders, upon request, police services to all the law enforcement agencies in the state. No rates are used due to the variations in the nature and extent of the police services performed by the State Police.

- The New Jersey State Police reported 3,273 full-time police employees; an increase of 2 percent compared to the 3,224 in 1982.
- There were 2,318 State Police officers in 1983; an increase of 2 percent compared to the 2,282 in 1982.
- The State Police reported 955 civilian employees in 1983; an increase of 1 percent compared to the 942 in 1982.
- Seventy-one percent of the total State Police employees were sworn personnel, while the remaining 29 percent were civilians.

SUMMARY

POLICE OFFICERS KILLED AND ASSAULTED

The killing or assault of a police officer has a deleterious effect on society that reaches far beyond the overt act. Such occurrences constitute an immediate threat to the well-being of the community and serious breach of the internal security of the country. Today a young man who considers a career in law enforcement must also consider the very strong possibility of being killed or assaulted by a member of the very same society he is sworn to protect. This deplorable situation should be a subject of serious public concern, for in truth, an attack on a police officer is an attack on society. The violence directed against law enforcement officers acting in the line of duty is clearly demonstrated by the following information.

POLICE FELONIOUSLY KILLED

VOLUME/TREND

- This is the second consecutive year there were no New Jersey police officers killed as a result of criminal action.
- Since the inception of the Uniform Crime Reporting Program in January 1967, thirty-eight police officers have been feloniously killed in the line of duty.

ASSAULTS ON POLICE OFFICERS

Police assault statistics are important to the police administrator who attempts to identify the causative factors of this type of criminal activity. Many factors contribute to police assaults, and circumstances vary from place to place, it is therefore extremely difficult to identify specific reasons for these assaults. The following information illustrates the frequency of these events, and any attempt at analysis of these assaults should include consideration of the unique variables present in each jurisdiction. Due to the broad field of services performed by many state and county police agencies, no assault rates are computed for total police officers.

VOLUME/TREND

- There were 4,506 police officers assaulted in 1983, a 6 percent decrease compared to the 4,787 officers assaulted in 1982.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Twenty-nine percent (1,314) of the officers assaulted, sustained injury.
- Personal weapons, such as hands, fists and feet were used in 88 percent of all police assaults.
- Thirty-one percent of police assaults occurred when officers responded to disturbance calls.
- Thirty-two percent of the assaults on police officers occurred during the four hour period of 10:00 p.m. to 2:00 a.m.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- The police of New Jersey were successful in clearing 98 percent of the assaults directed at them.

ASSAULTS ON MUNICIPAL POLICE OFFICERS

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 4,071 municipal police officers assaulted during 1983, a six percent decrease compared to the 4,333 assaulted in 1982.
- The assault rate, for every 100 municipal officers, was 23.9; a six percent decrease compared to 1982.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Twenty-seven percent of the municipal officers assaulted, sustained injury.
- Personal weapons, such as hands, fists and feet were used in 89 percent of all police assaults.
- Thirty-four percent of municipal police assaults occurred when officers responded to disturbance calls.
- Attempting Other Arrests accounted for 21 percent of municipal police assaults.

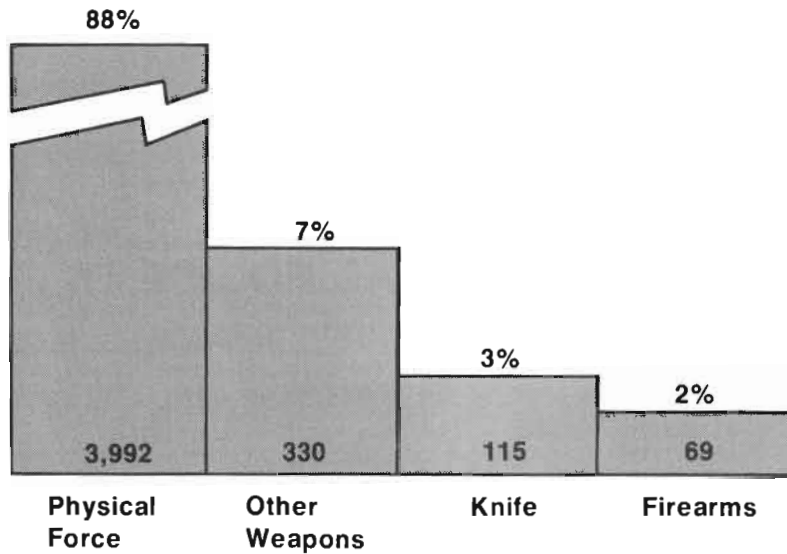
OTHER POLICE OFFICERS ASSAULTED

The following law enforcement agencies are dealt with separately and, are not included when computing municipal assault rates; the services performed by these agencies vary greatly from the functions of municipal police agencies.

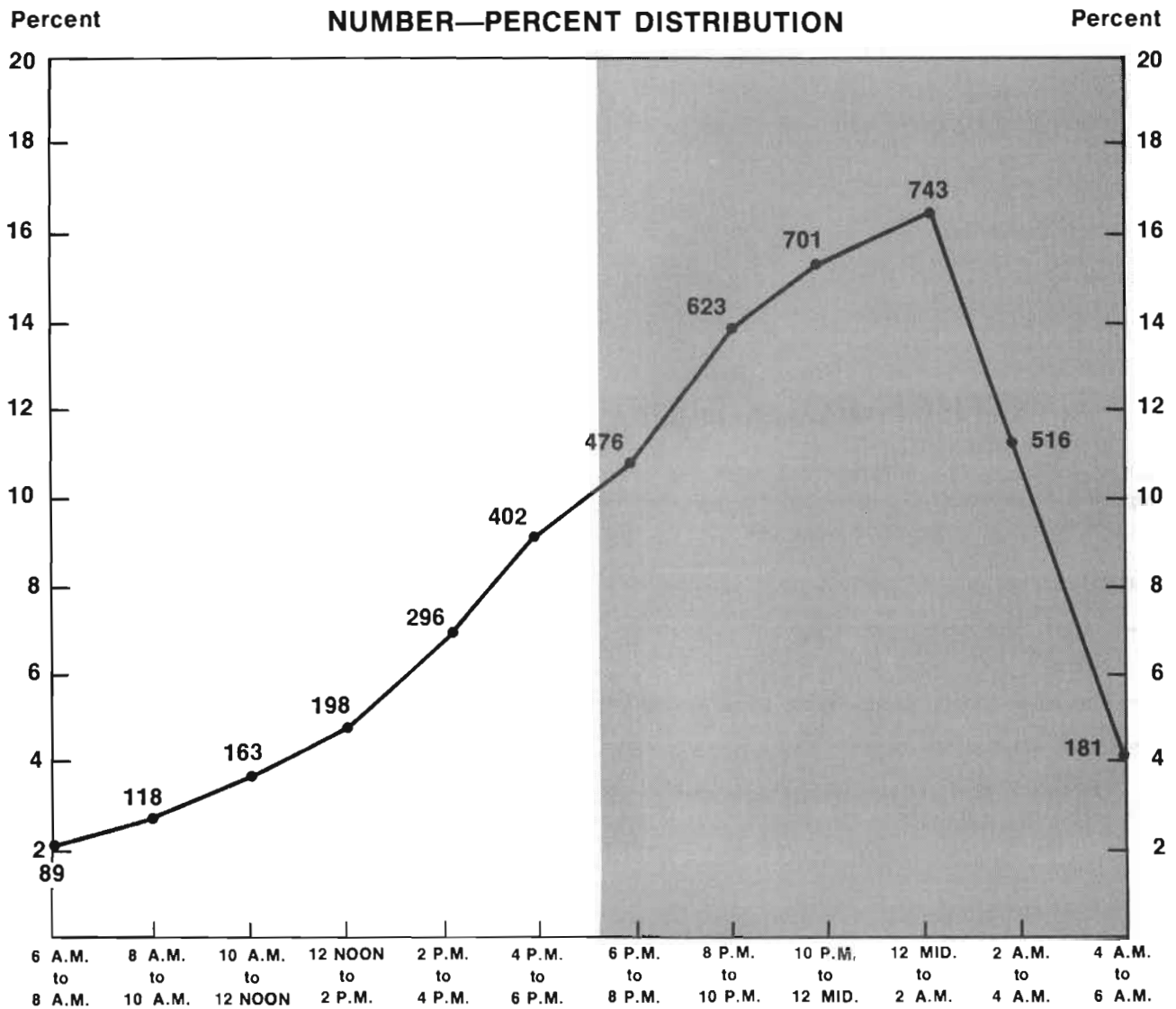
VOLUME

- County law enforcement agencies reported 228 officers assaulted, with 75 sustaining physical injury.
- The New Jersey State Police reported 88 officers assaulted, with 24 sustaining injury.
- Other state agencies, with police powers, reported 109 officers assaulted and 93 sustaining injury.
- University and college police agencies reported 10 officers assaulted with 4 sustaining injury.

SECTION X
DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

INTRODUCTION

The violence within the American domicile has been recognized for decades by elements of government and society with little done to correct the problem. Only in the recent past has government made more than a cursory examination of atrocities occurring within the home. The Domestic Violence Act of 1983 provided the means to gain a meaningful insight into this issue.

The State of New Jersey, through its legislature, has sought to alleviate the root causes of violence in the home, as well as other relevant problems in this complex, changing, interdependent society. Our legislators agreed we can no longer wait for the resultant damages to become irreparable before examining them and implementing a remedy. Piecemeal reactions were deemed inadequate, and they enacted legislation to gather the information necessary to provide a clearer picture of this social disorder.

One of the goals in mind is the development of data identifying violence occurring behind closed doors. These revelations might be helpful in the eventual prevention or marked reduction of this horrible interaction. Hopefully this data can be utilized by society through our governing bodies to lessen the incidents of domestic violence. Through an enlightened society, the possibility exists of controlling this sad commentary on contemporary America.

The following pages of graphics and narratives are a result of gathered data and display the complexities of domestic violence found within the modern State of New Jersey. A comparative analysis cannot be provided, since 1983 is the first year of collecting domestic violence data.

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE STATISTICAL SUMMARY

Highlights of the 1983 Domestic Violence statistics are listed below:

- There were 24,477 Domestic Violence Offenses reported by the police in 1983.
- Assaults occurred in 70% (17,027) of the reported offenses.
- Arrests were made in 19% (4,655) of the offenses reported.
- The most frequent days of Domestic Violence incidents were Saturday (4,337) and Sunday (4,305).
- Females were the victims in 85.2% of the reported Domestic Violence incidents.
- The most frequent hours of occurrence were between 8:00 p.m. and midnight, when 30% of the offenses were reported.
- Children were involved or present at 55% of all Domestic Violence Offenses reported.

- Of the 10 types of Domestic Violence Offenses, Assault was the most prominent.
- 20,870 or 85.2% of Domestic Violence Victims were females.
- The remaining 3,607 or 14.8% of the victims were males.
- The offense of Harrassment was second in volume, while False Imprisonment and Lewdness combined, accounted for less than 1/2 of 1%.
- The number of Domestic Violence Complaints that had prior court orders amounted to 2,510, or 10.3% of the total offenses.
- Children were involved in 3,211, or 13.1% of the Domestic Violence Offenses. In addition, children were present at 10,347, or 42.2% of the Domestic Violence Offenses.
- Although Murder was not included as a Domestic Violence Offense in 1983, 57 Domestic Violence type murders were identified through our Uniform Crime Reporting Program.

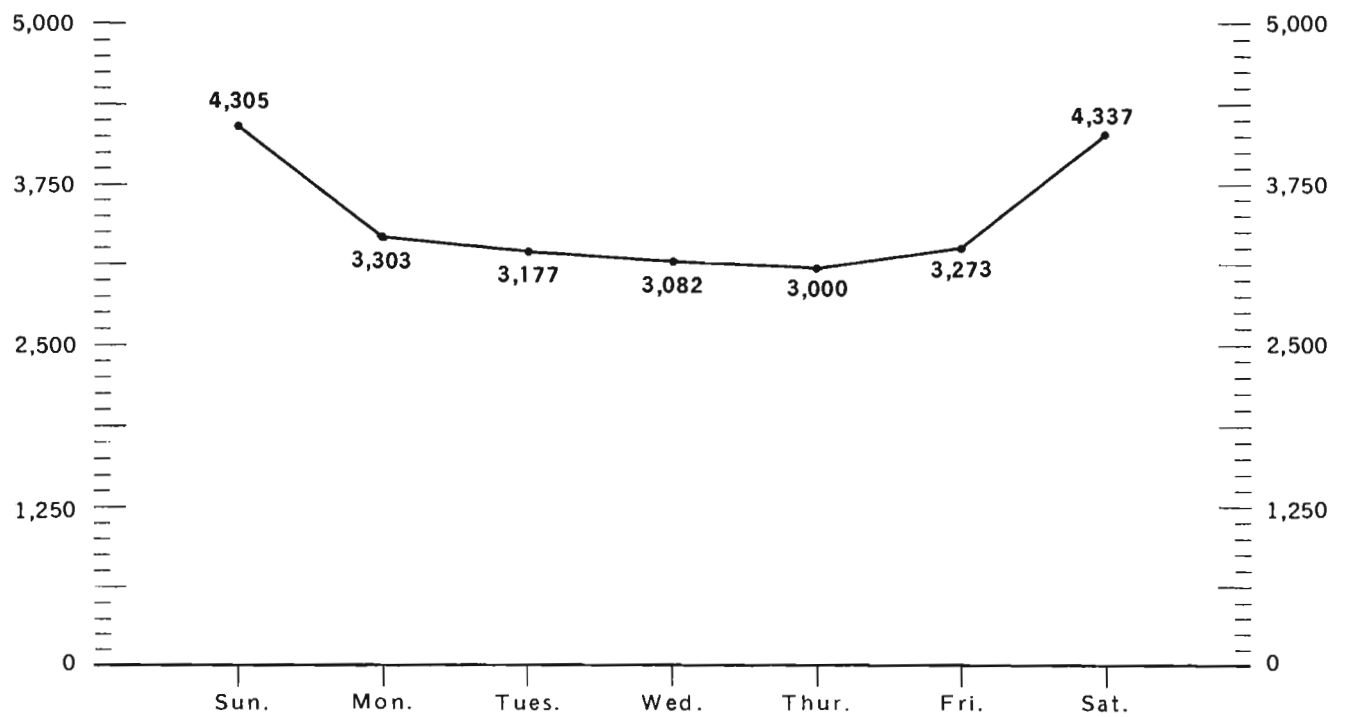

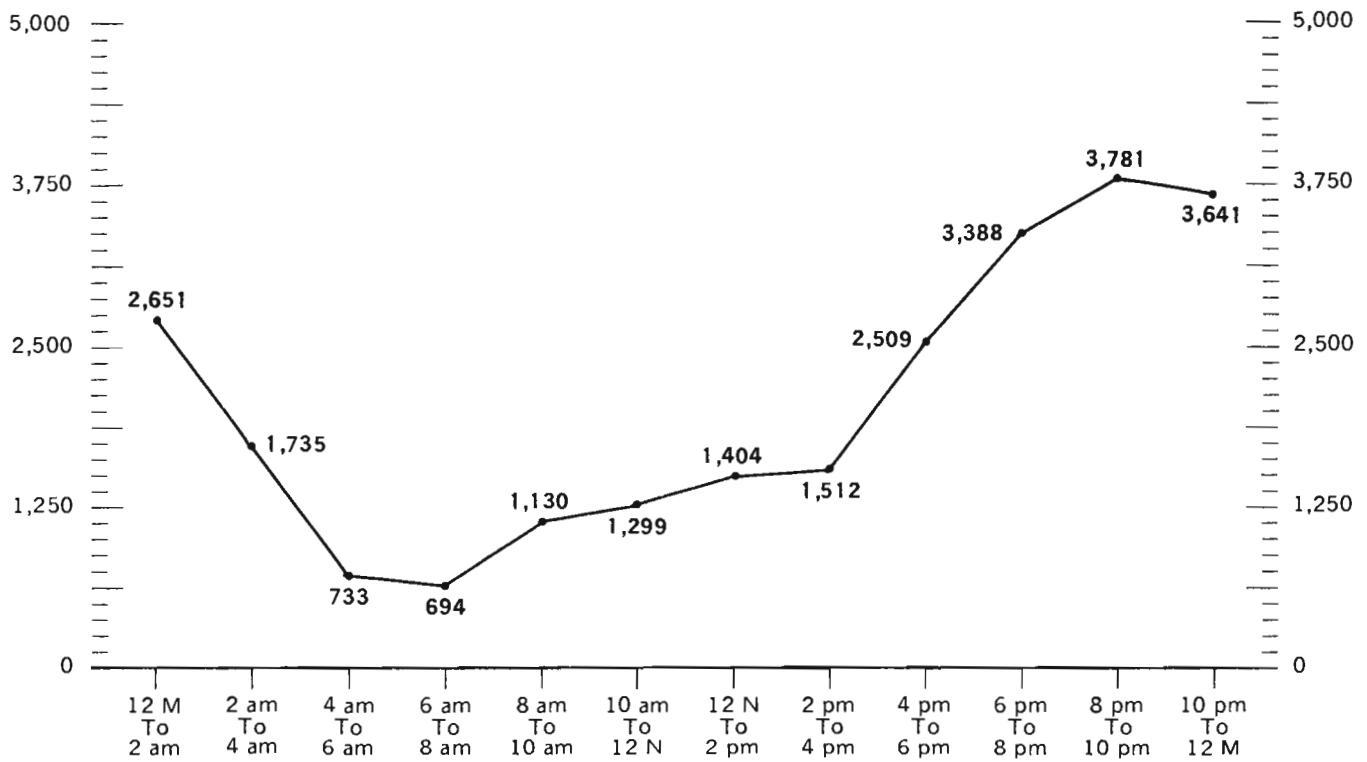

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE OFFENSES BY DAY OF WEEK 1983



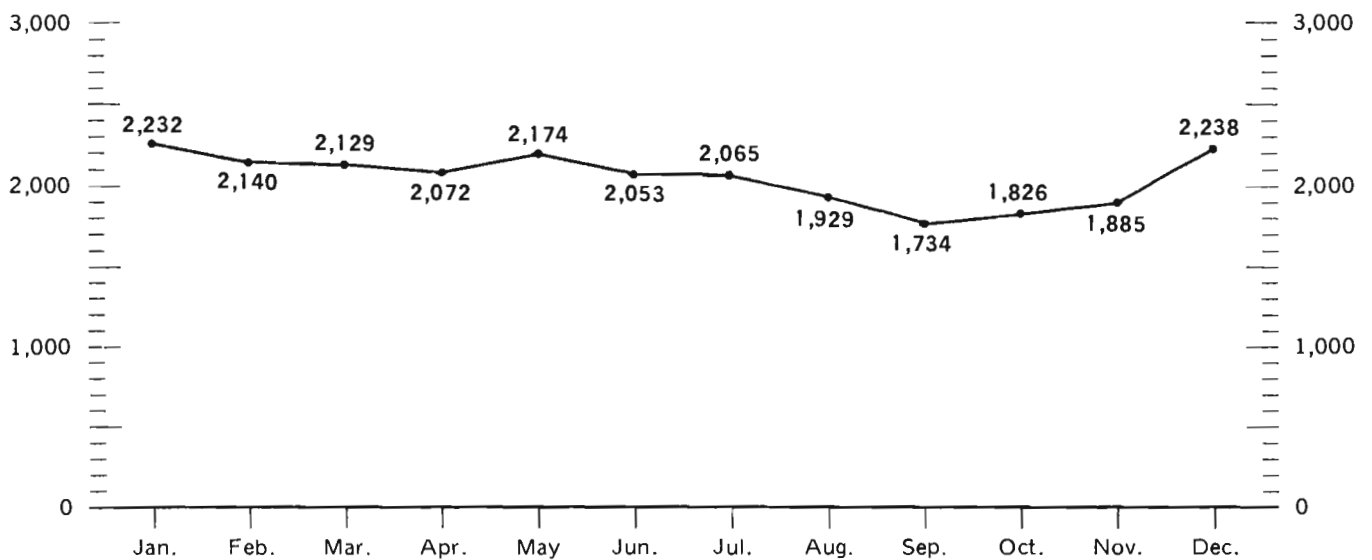

GLOSSARY OF TERMS

ADULT	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, a person aged 18 or over.
AMERICAN INDIAN or ALASKAN NATIVE	A person having origins in any of the original peoples of North America, and who maintains cultural identification through tribal affiliation or community recognition.
ARREST RATE	The number of arrests reported for Part I and Part II offenses for each unit of population, generally per 1,000.
ASIAN or PACIFIC ISLANDER	A person having origins in any of the original peoples of the Far East, Southeast Asia, the Indian subcontinent, or the Pacific Islands. This area includes for example; China, India, Japan, Korea, the Philippine Islands, and Samoa.
BLACK	A person having origins in any of the black racial groups of Africa, characterized by dark skin pigmentation.
CLEARANCE	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, the solution to a particular crime, usually by the arrest of the offender.
CLEARED BY ARREST	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, an offense is cleared when the offender has been identified, sufficient evidence has been obtained to formally charge and the offender has been ordered to appear in court.
CRIME INDEX	The sum total of seven major offenses used to measure the extent, fluctuation and distribution of crime in a geographical area. The following crimes make up the index: Murder, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft; these offenses are referred to as Index offenses.
CRIME RATE	The number of Index offenses reported for each unit of population per 1,000.
CRIMES AGAINST PERSONS	Consists of the following Index offenses: Murder, rape, and aggravated assault.
CRIMES AGAINST PROPERTY	Consists of the following Index offenses: Robbery, burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft.
DAY	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, the hours from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m.
ETHNIC ORIGIN	Having or originating from racial, linguistic, or cultural ties with a specific group.
EXCEPTIONAL CLEARANCE	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, an offense is cleared in this manner when an offender has been identified, located and sufficient evidence to charge has been obtained but there is some reason beyond police control which prohibits the offender from being brought before the court.
HIERARCHY RULE	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, each crime or attempted crime is counted in only one offense category. If several offenses are committed, simply glance down the list of Part I offenses and stop at the first offense you recognize from the facts given; this offense is the correct classification for this criminal activity.
HISPANIC	A person of Mexican, Cuban, Central or South American, or other Spanish culture or origin, regardless of race.

JUVENILE	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, a person under the age of 18.
JUVENILE CLEARANCE	Those crimes where the offenders are identified as juveniles.
NIGHT	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, the hours from 6 p.m. to 6 a.m.
NONVIOLENT CRIME	Consists of the following Index offenses: Burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft.
VIOLENT CRIME	Consists of the following Index offenses: Murder, rape, robbery, and aggravated assault.
WHITE	A person having origins in any of the original peoples of Europe, North Africa, or the Middle East.

CALCULATIONS OF RATES AND TRENDS

1. **Crime Rate per 1,000 Inhabitants**—This represents the number of Index offenses per 1,000 inhabitants.

For example: What is the crime rate for a municipality with 513 Index offenses (murder, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft), with a population of 8,280?

$513 \text{ (Index offenses)} \div 8,280 \text{ (population)} = .061957 \times 1,000 = 62.0 \text{ (crime rate per 1,000 inhabitants)}$

2. **Crime Trend**—A crime trend shows the extent to which crime increased or decreased. This is done by comparing a period of the current year with the same period of a previous year.

For example: A municipality experienced 264 Index offenses in 1980 and 513 Index offenses in 1981. What is the percent of increase?

$513 \text{ (1981 Index offenses)} - 264 \text{ (1980 Index offenses)} = 249 \text{ (numerical increase)}$

$249 \text{ (numerical increase)} \div 264 \text{ (previous year)} = .943 \times 100 = +94\% \text{ (percent increase)}$

Note: If there were more Index offenses in 1980 than in 1981, we would have a percentage decrease.

3. **Number of Police Personnel Per 1,000 Inhabitants**—This is calculated in the same manner as crime rate.

For example: A municipality with a population of 8,280 and 28 police personnel. How many police officers are there per 1,000 population?

$28 \text{ (police personnel)} \div 8,280 \text{ (population)} = .00338 \times 1,000 = 3.4 \text{ (police personnel per 1,000 inhabitants)}$

Note: This formula can be applied to either total police personnel or just police officers per 1,000 inhabitants.

4. **Police Assaulted Rate**—This is calculated at a rate per 100 police officers.

For example: A municipality with 25 officers had 5 of them assaulted during the month. What is the police assaulted rate?

$5 \text{ (police officers assaulted)} \div 25 \text{ (police officers)} = .2 \times 100 = 20 \text{ (police assaulted per 100 police officers)}$.

5. **Clearance Rate**—This refers to the percent of Index offenses cleared (solved), over a specified period of time.

For example: A municipality with 513 Index offenses in 1981, cleared 95 of these offenses. What is the clearance rate?

$95 \text{ (Index offenses cleared)} \div 513 \text{ (Index offenses)} \times 100 = 18.5 \text{ (percent cleared)}$.



To reduce crime, you must first identify its extent, type and location
