*Extract of a letter from General WASHINGTON, dated  
Head-Quarters, near York, October 27, 1781.*

**S I R,**  
I DO myself the honour to enclose to your Excellency copies of returns of prisoners, artillery, arms, ordnance and other stores, surrendered by the enemy in their posts of York and Gloucester on the 19th instant, which were not completed at the time of my despatches, and but this moment handed to me: A draft of these posts, with the plan of attack and defence, is also transmitted; and twenty-four standards, taken at the same time, are ready to be laid before Congress.

My present despatches being important, I have committed to the care of Colonel Humphry, one of my Aids-de-Camp, whom, for his attention, fidelity and good services, I beg leave to recommend to Congress and your Excellency.

**H A G U E,** (Holland) August 12.  
Count Welderen, Commander of the Ajax cutter, arrived at the Texel the 9th inst. and came express in the night of the 10th, to the country seat, with the news of an engagement between the English and Dutch fleets, which happened on the 5th inst. in the North Sea; the particulars and authenticity of which will be found in the following relation of Rear-Admiral Zoutman.  
Report of the under-signed Rear-Admiral to His Serene Highness the Prince of Orange, Hereditary Stadtholder, Captain and Admiral-General of the United Provinces, &c. &c.  
SUNDAY the 5th of August, 1781, at break of day, between three and four o'clock in the morning, we saw a great number of strange ships in the N. N. W. we prepared for battle, the wind was N. E. and very light; our course was N. W. I made the signal to form the line at one cable's length distance from each other, and advanced. The Ajax cutter, Count Welderen, came and informed me, that the fleet in fight was our enemy's convoy, which had failed the 26th of last month from the Sound, under the escort of eleven ships of war, and four cutters.—At 7 o'clock the said ships of war hoisted English colours, among which was a Vice-Admiral; they came down upon us; their convoy kept their wind; I made signal to wear, and formed our line with heads to the E. S. E. leaving our merchant ships a little to the westward; we now saw that the English line consisted of 8 ships of 40, 60, 70, and 90 guns: At 8 o'clock the English Admiral being upon the other tack to the windward of me, he tacked, and the action began; in an instant the fire was brisk from every quarter, and the whole of our line engaged. It was composed of the following ships, viz. The Erf-Prins (or Prince Hereditary) 54 guns, Capt.—Admiral de Ruyter, 68, Rear-Admiral Zoutman. Admiral-General, 74, Capt. Van Kingbergen. Argo, 44, Capt. Staringh. Batavia, 54, Capt. Baron Van Bentinck. Admiral Piet-Hein, 54, Capt. Van Braam. Holland, 64, Capt. Dedel (all belonging to the department of the Admiralty of Amsterdam.) I was

closely engaged for some time by two large ships; the engagement continued till half after eleven o'clock, very obstinate and bloody. Our ships, my own included, were very much disabled, and had received so much damage that they were not capable of being manœuvred any longer. The English Admiral undoubtedly suffered equally, for he hauled his wind to the eastward. At noon I hauled down the signal for engaging, and stood to the westward, in order to repair our damages as much as possible, which were very considerable. At half after twelve the British Admiral wore his ships with their heads to the N. W. and lay by to repair their damages also, one of which, a three decker, had lost her main top mast overboard. At noon we observed in 55: 56 north latitude, the point of Teracus, in Norway, bearing N. N. E. 1-3 N. distant thirty Dutch miles. As the ships of war were in a bad state for defence, I made a signal for the convoy to proceed with the frigates Medenblik and Venus, and take best advantage of circumstance to evade an enemy. The Batavia falling a little off from the wind, having lost her mizen-top mast, which like to have fallen on board, and her fore-yard being entirely disabled, the officer informed me that the Captain was wounded, and that the ship was so much shattered, she could not be governed; I sent two frigates to assist her, and to tow her, if necessary; but before they reached her, she fell off before the wind, and came very near us. Capt. Kingsbergen sent a boat with Capt. Aberfon, in which was also Capt. Starvingh, to report the bad state of their ships; I informed them that as soon as we should be a little more refitted, that we might be able to work our ships, we should proceed back again. Capt. Dedel made a signal of being much damaged: Capt. Van Braam of being in a bad situation. I ordered the Zephyr to them, who reported that Capt. Van Braam had received several shot under water. I directed her to relieve them with all they should require; notwithstanding which Capt. Dedel fired several signals of distress, and stood away to the southward towards the coast of Holland; I made a signal to speak with Capt. Van Woensel, and detached him to the aid of Capt. Dedel, and continue with him till his arrival in port. Between four and five o'clock I gave the signal to make sail to return, which being repeated, all the ships made what sail they could. I passed near Capt. Braam, who informed me he had several shot under water, and that it had come in upon him very fast, but since he had rather diminished by his pumps. By the approach of evening every ship was under tolerable sail with us.

The Admiral de Ruiter has a great number killed and wounded, and is, as are all the other ships, very much damaged in the hull, masts and rigging; but I hope, with a favourable wind and the assistance of God, to gain some port in the Republic.

I send the present by Count Welderen, who will be personally able to give your Serene Highness a more particular account.

On board the State Ship Admiral de Ruiter, being under sail in the North Sea, the 7th of August, 1781, Kykduyn bearing S. by E. 18 Dutch miles distant.

N. B. All the ships officers and people have shewn an intrepid courage, and fought like lions, as well on board my own ship, as throughout the fleet; indeed, through the whole, I have the greatest reason to applaud their bravery.

Note, Two of the above frigates, with the Spy, Zephyr, and Ajax cutter, attended on the fleet during the engagement, while the other two frigates guarded the convoy.

All the fleet of men of war under Admiral Zoutman arrived in the Texel in safety, except the Holland; and the convoy all got into the Fly without any being lost. The cause of their return to their own ports is evident; having advanced on their voyage only 18 Dutch miles from the Texel, and about 12 from the Fly, so that their ports must be almost within sight, and the wind being right a-head to proceed, and fair to return.

BOSTON, October 25.

Extract of a letter from Paris, of the 6th of August.

By a courier just arrived from Cadiz we learn, that the fleet consisting of 36 Spanish ships of the line, and 19 French, sailed the 21st of last month, and that the same day the fleet under the command of

the Duke de Crillon, likewise put to sea with an embarkation of 10,000 troops.—The combined fleets steered westward, but could not discover what course the Duke de Crillon took."

Yesterday arrived here the Brig Favourite, Capt. Somes, from Copenhagen, after a passage of 7 weeks.

PROVIDENCE, October 20.

Capt. Mansfield, in the schooner Jolly Bacchus, of Philadelphia, arrived here from Nantz on Thursday last, after a passage of 61 days. Two gentlemen who came passengers with him advise, that 57 sail of the line, French and Spanish, were to sail from Cadiz, in August last, for Gibraltar, the siege of which place was going on with the greatest vigour, and with every apparent prospect of success, 60,000 land troops being employed.—They further inform, that there was not any fleet in the channel when they sailed. A British fleet was supposed to be in the North sea, where the Dutch had 15 sail of the line.

FISH-KILL, Nov 8.

Extract of a letter from a gentleman in Albany, dated November 3.

"We have just now received an account, that Colonel Willet has had a second engagement with Major Ross, in Tryon county, about 14 miles above Fort Dayton; in which Captain Walter Butler, and eight others, were killed and scalped, and twenty taken prisoners. Our loss, only one, out of Captain Moody's company. The Oneida Indians behaved well in the action, and deserve much credit."

BALTIMORE, October 16.

Extract of a letter from Nantz, August 15.

"Lately arrived here from America—Captains Cole, Hanfon, Dashiell, Carty, Thomas, Josiah, and —, in the ship Delaware."

Captain Folger, who arrived here yesterday, in the schooner Antelope, in 35 days from Nantz, advises that the combined fleets of France and Spain, commanded by the Count de Guichen, and Don Louis de Cordova, consisting of 48 sail of the line, were cruising, when he sailed, between Ushant and Cape Clear, and it was reported, had taken a number of rich British merchantmen from the West-Indies—That the British fleet of 28 sail of the line, under the command of Admiral Darby, lay at Torbay—That an embarkation of 4000 French troops was taking place at Rochfort, destined for the protection of the Dutch settlement at the Cape of Good Hope, and that 40,000 Spaniards were vigorously besieging Gibraltar, and had destroyed almost every house in the garrison.

PHILADELPHIA, November 7.

On Monday last, pursuant to the Articles of Confederation, a sufficient number of delegates for the states having met, the United States in Congress assembled proceeded to the choice of a President for the ensuing year, and the ballots being taken, the Honourable JOHN HANSON was elected.

On Saturday last arrived here Col. Humphry, Aide-Camp to His Excellency General Washington, with despatches to Congress, containing returns of the prisoners, &c. taken at York and Gloucester. This gentleman brought with him the 24 standards mentioned in the returns as belonging to the different British and German regiments. They were met on the commons by the city troop of horse, and by them paraded through two or three streets of the city, preceded by the colours of the United States and of France, to the State House, and there laid at the feet of Congress, to the great joy of a numerous concourse of spectators.

TRENTON, Nov. 14.

Letters from a gentleman of good information in Holland, dated the last of August, mention, That the interests of the United States of America advanced with great rapidity in the United Provinces, and from some late acts of the States-General, the highest hopes of a political connection between the two countries were entertained. The following acts are taken notice of.—Their ordering a number of British prisoners, brought into one of their ports by an American cruiser, to be detained in their gaols, in order that they may be exchanged for Americans or returned to the captors.—Their licensing vessels to sail to the ports of Boston and Philadelphia.—Their instructions to their cruisers to act in conjunction with their allies the French, Spaniards and Americans, and to carry their prizes into any of the ports of France, Spain, the United States of America or Sweden, as may be most convenient.—The writer observes, that from the nature of their constitution, the Republick of the United Provinces are slow in their publick measures, but firm and persevering in whatever they have once agreed upon; and that the negotiations seem to be ripening much faster than is customary in matters of such consequence.

The Honourable the Congress, by a Proclamation dated the 26th day of October last, has recommended to the several states to set a part the THIRTEENTH day of DECEMBER next, to be religiously observed as a day of THANKSGIVING and PRAYER.

Hyler, of New-Brunswick, with a gun-boat, and a small party of men, went to the Narrows, where he captured a ship with 14 or 15 hands, and brought her off, with an intent to run her up Karitan River, but near the mouth she unluckily got aground, where, as the enemy approached in force, he was obliged to set her on fire. She was loaded with rum and pork, several hogheads of the former he got out and brought off, with the prisoners.

The British fleet returned to the Hook about a week ago.
