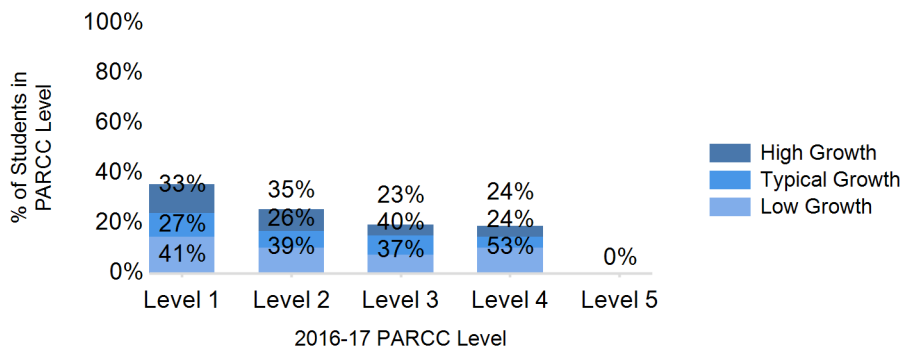

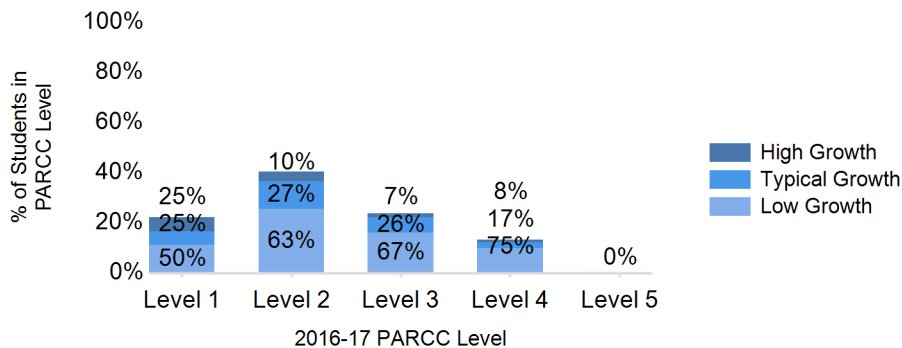
**Student Growth by Performance Level**

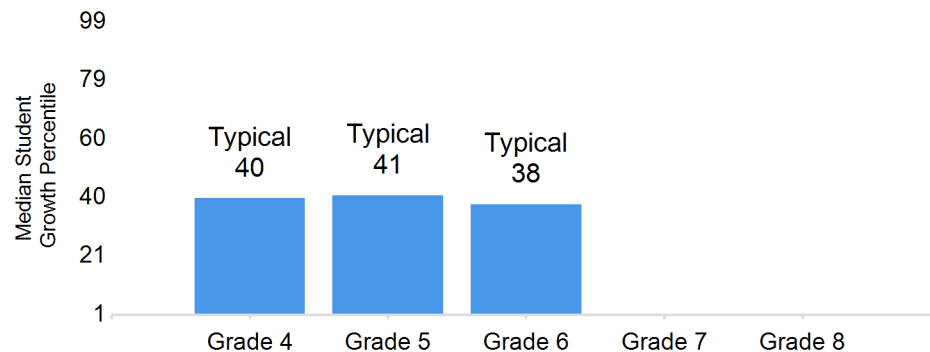

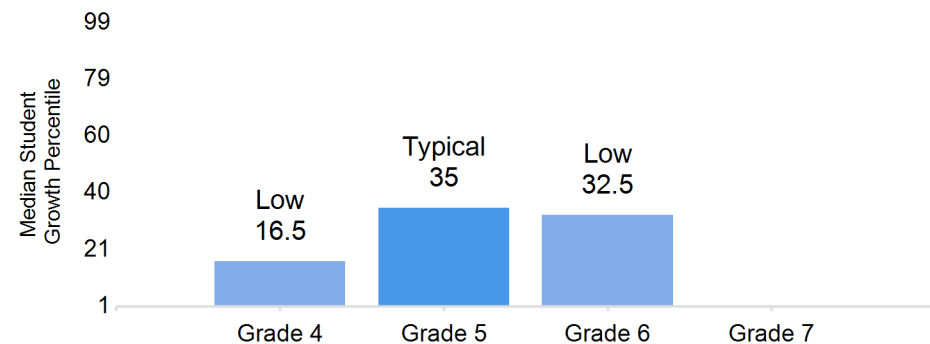
**Student Growth by Grade**

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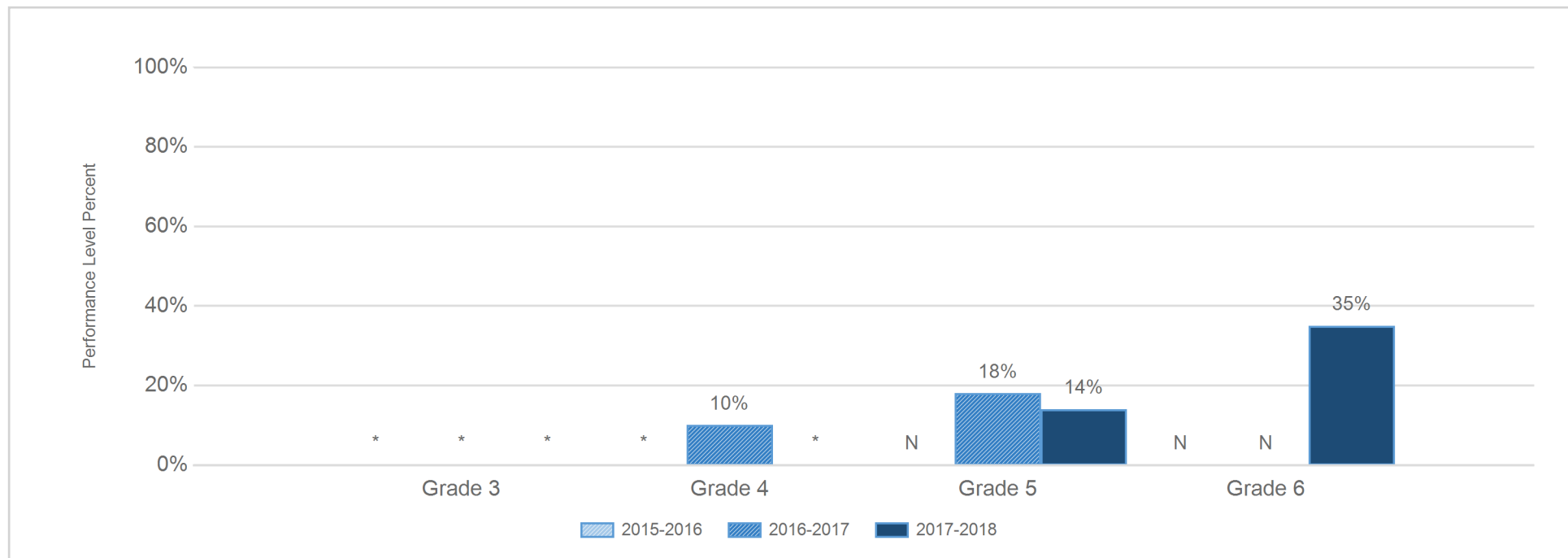

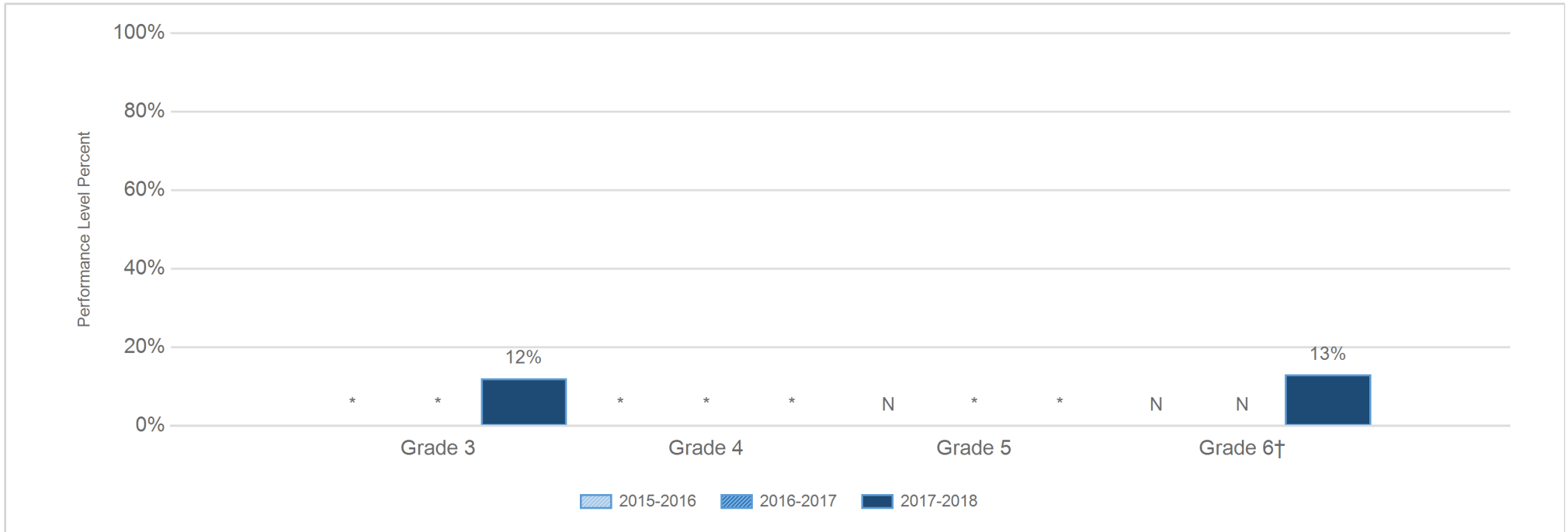

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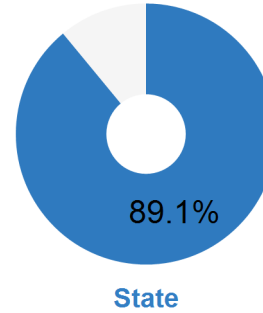

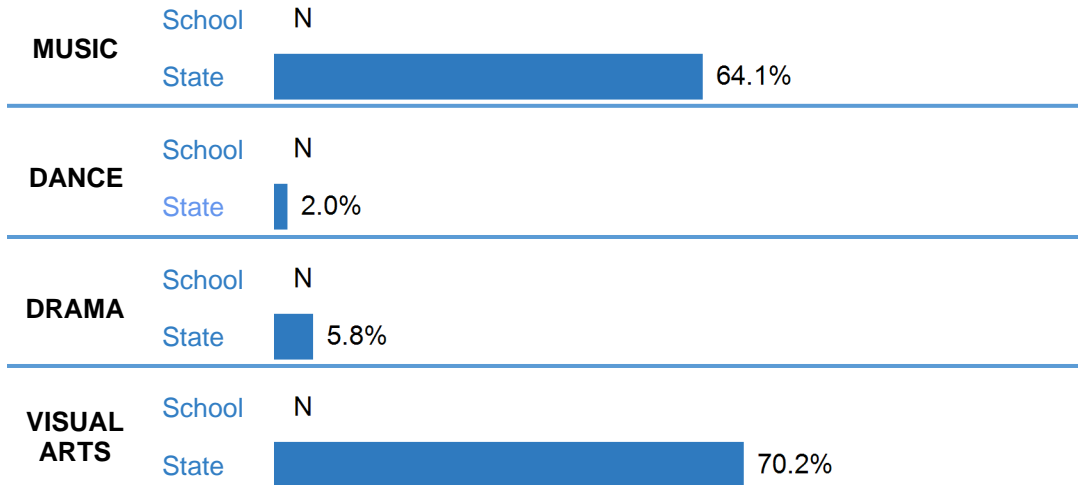

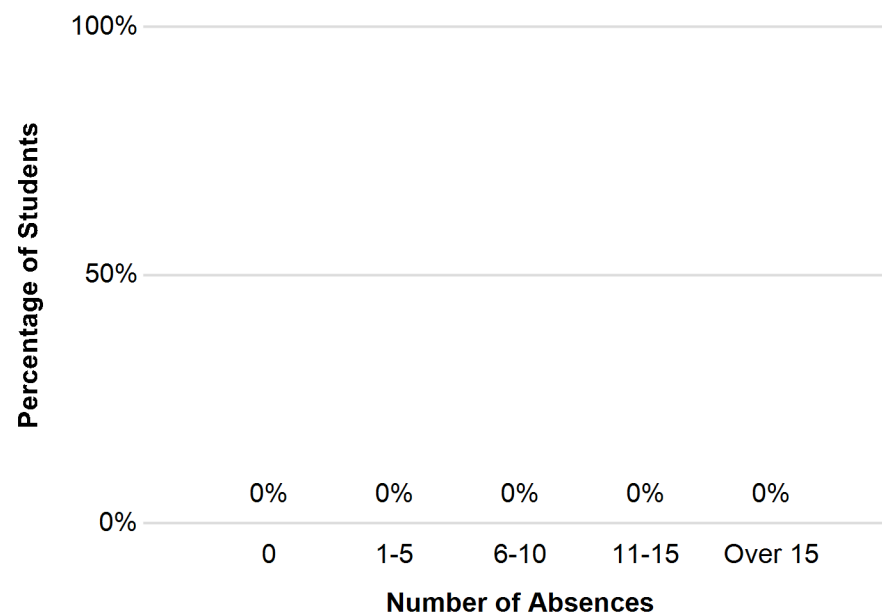

This graph shows the percentage of K-12 students by the number of days they were absent during the school year.





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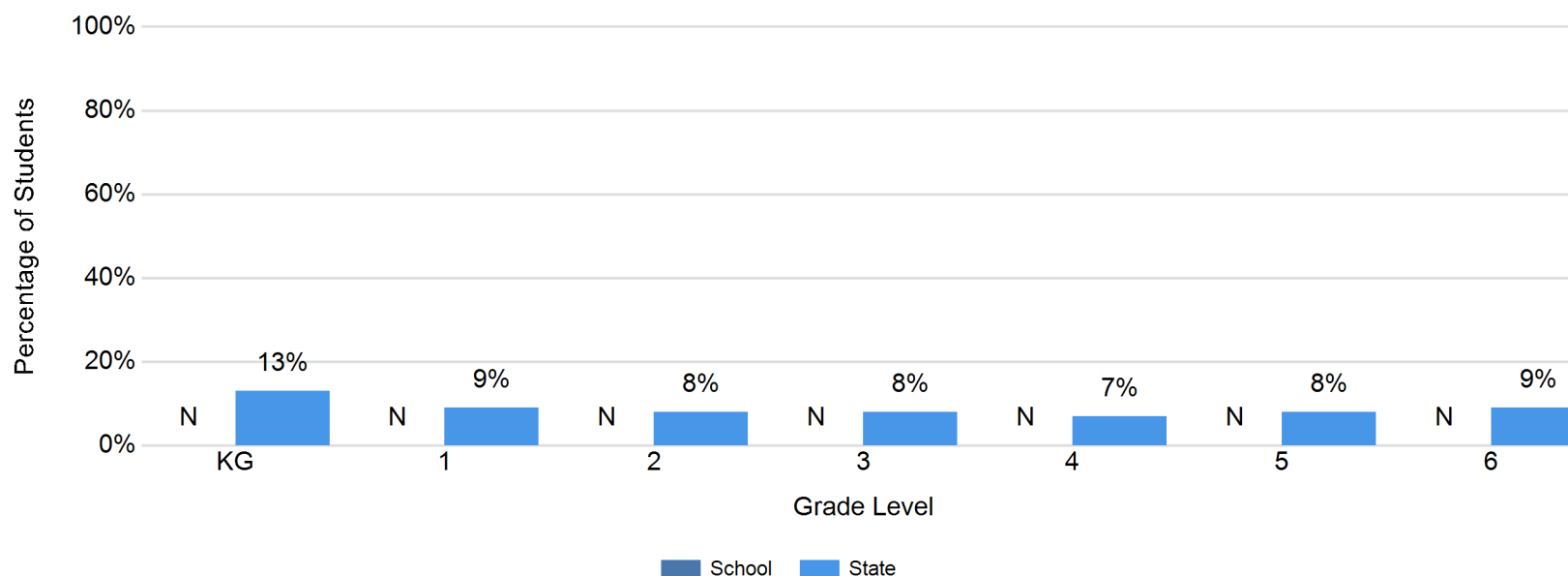
