MINUTES

STATE OF NEW JERSEY,
HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY,
TRENTON, NEW JERSEY.

TUESDAY, January 11, 1938.

This being the day designated by the Constitution for the assembling of the One Hundred and Sixty-second Legislature of New Jersey, the House was duly called to order at 12 o'clock noon by Edward J. Kelleher, of Camden county, Clerk of the last House, who presided pending the organization of the House.

Pascoe, of Union county, for Speaker, which nomination was seconded by Mr. Horace R. Bogle, of Bergen county, and further seconded by Mrs. Constance W. Hand, of Essex county, and further seconded by Mr. Samuel D. Pesin, of Hudson county, and further seconded by Mr. Fred W. DeVoe, of Middlesex county.

The Clerk called for further nominations. There being none, Mr. Wilensky moved that nominations be closed.

GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE

STATE OF NEW JERSEY,
EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT,
TRENTON, January 11, 1938.

To the Legislature:

A week from today A. Harry Moore will become my successor as Governor of the State of New Jersey. He will bring to that office the experience gained during two prior terms of service as Governor and three years as a member of the Senate of the United States. Antedating nearly a decade of distinguished service to his State and nation, he had been honored repeatedly by his neighbors of Jersey City, and in that community he acquired a valuable schooling in municipal government, vitally necessary to the understanding of the social and fiscal problems that today face the people of our State.

I am mindful of the fact that the Inaugural Message of the incoming Governor will be of great importance, and that it will hold, for our citizens, a far greater degree of interest than the parting words of a Chief Executive who is about to leave office, yet it is required, under the Constitution of our State, that the Governor "shall com-

municate by message to the Legislature at the opening of each session * * * the condition of the State, and recommend such measures as he may deem expedient."

Under this Constitutional mandate I conceive it to be my duty to refer to my own book of experience, written during these last three years in the office conferred upon me by the electorate of New Jersey and to point out, frankly and dispassionately, the things that have been accomplished and the things that have been left undone. It is well to have before us a record of achievement, in the hope that these benefits may be strengthened and continued, and to appraise, just as honestly, the unsolved problems that represent liabilities to be eliminated.

THE RECORD OF ACHIEVEMENT

It is impossible, of course, to list all of the accomplishments, gained under legislation and administrative practice, just as it would be difficult for any individual to point out, faithfully, all of the remaining problems that should be faced, and solved, but it seems to me that these achievements are worthy of mention:

We have balanced the budget each year, with a surplus in revenues that had not only helped to support the budget of the ensuing year, but which has permitted us to make a long-delayed adjustment in the compensation of our State employees.

We have reduced the over-all cost of State government, in spite of additional large commitments made necessary by the Federal Social Security Program and the withdrawal of Federal grants-in-aid for relief of the unemployed, approximately forty millions of dollars a year.

We have "pegged" borrowing for both capital and current purposes and have lived strictly within our revenue income. The practice of authorizing and issuing bonds has been stopped, and for the first time in twenty-one years,

instead of an annual increase in our State bonded indebtedness, we may proudly point to a net decrease of over twenty-five millions of dollars.

We have placed the State Highway Department upon a cash basis.

Through sound legislation and effective supervision of municipal finances there has been a continuous reduction in municipal defaults in both number and amount. In 1934 there were 94 defaults in the amount of \$56,880,835.96, as against 31 defaults in 1937 in the amount of \$15,632,552.77.

Current tax collections have increased from an average of 40% in 1934 to 55% in 1937.

Both the Local Budget Act and the Local Bond Act have proved their worth in restoring the credit of our municipalities. There has been a continuous improvement in the financial condition of local governments.

Nearly three hundred large industries and 1,000 smaller manufacturing establishments have been located in New Jersey, attracted by proximity to the great municipal markets, the absence of new and excessive business taxes, unexcelled rail and highway facilities, favorable utility rates, and, last but not least, the firm position of New Jersey governmental and judicial officials in support of law and order in industrial disputes. While conceding the right of labor to organize, to engage in collective bargaining and to strike for a betterment of working conditions, it has been the declared policy in New Jersey that these rights must be exercised only under existing laws. There has been no seizure of private property in New Jersey by lawless organizations or individuals.

We set up in New Jersey the first Commission on Interstate Co-operation. Today most of the other States in the nation have followed our example, establishing the media for the execution of compacts between the States in matters

dealing with crime, taxation, labor, water supply, vehicular traffic and other matters of territorial importance, and without surrendering the sovereign rights of the States to the Federal government.

Early in my administration a commission appointed to study the social security plan offered to the several States of the Union, submitted a report embodying its suggestions. Laws were enacted in accordance with the Federal pattern affecting and enlarging old-age assistance, aid to dependent children, assistance to the blind, aid to crippled children, and to broaden public health work in New Jersey.

An unemployment compensation law was passed, the terms of which offer a plan of economic protection for workers within the purview of the act who may find themselves without work in the future. An Unemployment Compensation Commission was set up under this act and within a year this new division of service has attained a degree of efficiency that has been nationally recognized and cited as a model for other States to follow.

During this administration our fine institutional program has been marked by further progress, especially in its pursuit of a policy of preventing ills before they reach a point where institutionalizing is necessary. Under this preventive program there have been an increasing number of patients treated at clinics for mental hygiene and tuberculosis, as well as vocational training given to mental deficientes so that the latter may become self-supporting in the highest possible measure and will be in less danger of becoming social and economic liabilities.

The new medium security prison at the Bordentown Prison Farm, begun during the administration of my predecessor, has been completed with the aid of the Federal Public Works Administration, lessening the overcrowding of the State Prison at Trenton and permitting a more adequate classification of inmates. It has been visited and commended by delegations from other States and Canada.

In a period when new and heavy expenditures were forced upon the State by reason of the unprecedented economic depression and unrest, it has been necessary to maintain strict control over governmental expenditures and to eliminate waste. This has been effectively accomplished by the Commissioner of Finance. A new high has been established in the amount of lapsed balances, which have totalled during this administration nearly \$4,000,000. The annual amounts of lapsed balances, reflecting the efficiency of fiscal control operations, has grown from \$407,820.26 in the fiscal year 1933-1934 to \$1,522,574.47 in the fiscal year 1936-1937.

In spite of the drying up of many forms of taxes in other States, New Jersey, by more intensive methods and by carefully studied changes in the law, markedly increased the net collections both in gasoline and alcoholic beverage taxes, without increasing the rates. The motor fuel tax collections increased from \$17,100,000 in 1934 to \$21,300,000 in 1937, and the beverage taxes from \$4,700,000 in 1934 to \$8,900,000 in 1937.

The Foreign Corporation Franchise Tax, enacted primarily to check the surrender of charters by New Jersey corporations, has produced \$350,000 from over 3,000 corporations in its first year of operation.

The Sales Tax, in operation less than four months, produced seven million dollars in taxes, besides \$300,000 in license fees, penalties and interest. In spite of the synthetic indignation whipped up through conscienceless propaganda, I am convinced that had this tax continued it would not have harmed a single individual in our State, and that it would have produced for everyone great benefits through making possible a reduction in real estate taxes and providing necessary funds for the relief of the unemployed. With public support and with fair consideration by the press, I am convinced that this form of taxation, spread over the four million people of our State, would have produced

almost enough money to have made possible the carrying out of the Mort Plan for public education and to have financed relief.

The supervision and condition of all State-chartered financial institutions has been measurably strengthened. Our State banks, trust companies and savings institutions have been placed in a more favorable position both as to liquidity and solvency. Unsafe institutions have been liquidated, capital structures strengthened, sound mergers encouraged, and public confidence restored.

A Banking Advisory Board has been established, comprising in its membership outstanding representatives of the various classes of financial institutions, agriculture and industry, rendering valuable assistance in insuring the continuing stability of our banking structure.

Within the Building and Loan Bureau substantial progress has been made toward the solution of the problems affecting the savings of more than a half million of our citizens. Among the first to feel the effects of the depression, and because of the frozen condition of real estate among the last to recover, much has been accomplished through the requirement of adequate reserves, a closer supervision both of management policy and real estate sales, and the elimination by merger, liquidation, or dissolution of weaker associations.

New Jersey has continued to maintain and increase its standing as one of the leading insurance States of the nation. Under adequate laws and with proper supervision, our State-chartered institutions have ably weathered the depression storm and may be expected to continue with ample resources to meet the insuring needs of their millions of policyholders in an actuarially sound and satisfactory manner.

One of the most pressing problems to which my attention was directed when I became Governor was that affecting the investment of many thousands of our citizens in the

securities of title and mortgage guaranty companies, practically every one of which was in default either as to principal or interest upon their obligations. The past three years have witnessed the sound reorganization of a number of these companies under plans considered and approved by the Commissioner of Banking and Insurance, as Trustee, and others are in the process of reorganization, with all of the remaining companies noticeably improved.

The personal finance and small loan business has been kept within sound limits, and today New Jersey enjoys an enviable reputation throughout the country for its supervision and degree of control over this class of lending institutions, which had previously grown out of all proportion in the number of licensees to actual community needs.

The rates for compensation insurance have been reduced by an average of 13% at a direct saving to New Jersey industry of more than \$2,000,000 under previously prevailing rates.

The administration of emergency relief has been reorganized, with the burden of relief distribution placed back upon the municipalities and the greater part of the cost furnished by the State through its Financial Assistance Commission. While the amount of relief is still far from adequate for deserving cases, and while there is still some inequity reflected in the absence of standards and the uneven distribution in certain municipalities, there has been no accurately reported distress and savings of many millions of dollars have been reflected.

In line with recommendations made in my Inaugural Message, a New Jersey Council has been established to advertise the industrial, residential, recreational and agricultural advantages of our State. There has been some criticism of this Council but it is not well-grounded. The members of the Council, with one or two exceptions, have been giving earnest and intelligent consideration to the problem, and when contracts are executed and the actual advertising program launched I am convinced that our citi-

zens will be delighted and satisfied with the results. May I point out that this Council, had its members been so minded, could have arranged easily, and without any personal effort, to have expended \$150,000 within twenty-four hours after organization. Instead they have been conservatively examining plans, surveying work and results carried on in other States, and interviewing advertising representatives before spending a single dollar of public funds, with a view of getting the maximum results from the appropriation that has been made available.

The State Sinking Funds have been greatly strengthened. There has been an increase in the market value of investments of nearly \$3,000,000, an increase in the surplus of approximately \$7,000,000, and a decrease in the amount of municipal obligations in default of nearly \$5,000,000, during the period of this administration.

There have been marked advances in the service rendered by the New Jersey Department of Agriculture to those engaged in agricultural pursuits. During the past year the problem of reducing tuberculosis in cattle, launched twenty years ago, reached the goal of practically complete eradication of this disease. New Jersey has been declared a modified accredited area by the Federal government, with less than one-half of one per cent infection.

The enforcement of the Fresh Egg Law, under which, last year, 25,000 inspections of retail establishments were made, has served to improve greatly the quality of eggs and to safeguard consumers against misrepresentation.

The licensing and bonding laws designed to create a group of financially responsible dealers in milk, produce and cattle have been enforced to a point where there are now 800 such dealers, with bonds aggregating over \$2,000,000 filed as evidence of good faith and to satisfy claims made against them.

In co-operation with Federal Agencies nearly 20,000 trees affected by Dutch Elm disease have been removed and

progress of the disease, which could approach the long-remembered chestnut blight in its intensity, has been effectively checked.

The establishment and operation of produce auction markets and egg and poultry markets, under the supervision of the Department of Agriculture, has been one answer to the problem caused by the competition to New Jersey growers through the great development in rail and motor transportation and refrigeration. During the last year these markets, now numbering fifteen at country shipping points, did a collective business exceeding \$5,000,000.

The more widespread acceptance of grades and standards promulgated by the Department of Agriculture, the strengthening of the cannery inspection service, field activities resulting in successful attacks upon insect pests, and many other forms of service have been rendered to those who produce, in New Jersey, agricultural products in the value of \$100,000,000 annually.

Through a series of public conferences we have developed widespread and intelligent public interest upon a number of our important problems. There have been State-wide conferences upon the important subjects of crime, adult education, and public recreation. The Interstate Crime Conference was held in New Jersey in 1935. The National Safety Congress was held in Atlantic City in 1936. The Atlantic Deeper Waterways Conference was held at Trenton during the same year. The Annual Conference of Governors for the first time in twenty years was held in Atlantic City in 1937, and the National Association of Tax Administrators and Eastern Conference of Motor Vehicle Administrators were also assembled in New Jersey last year.

For the first time since 1877 there has been a complete revision and consolidation of public statutes of New Jersey. This work was started twelve years ago, and its completion—and acceptance by the Legislature and the Governor on

December 20th was largely made possible through the untiring energy and public spirit of Merritt Lane, appointed Chairman in 1935, and Dean Frank H. Sommer, who most certainly deserve public commendation for the time and thought dedicated to the task of completing the revision and bringing about its legislative acceptance.

Co-operation with the agencies of the Federal government in extension of the work of the State Department of Health have brought about notable achievements. Federal funds, allotted to New Jersey, have been devoted to those health promotion projects deemed most advantageous to the State. These have extended considerably the health services available to the people, and have been integrated with municipal programs, thereby augmenting and improving the administrative health structure of the State.

The statute restricting sale and possession of dangerous fireworks ended a menace to our youth incidental to the observance of Fourth of July. From an unenviable position among the States, as to the number of fireworks casualties, New Jersey's record in the first year of operation of the ban on fireworks has been commendable, and the casualty list reduced to negligible proportions.

The ever-increasing duties of the Department of Labor centered chiefly around the Minimum Wage Law and the Labor Laws, having for their purpose the protection of the life and limb of the industrial workers of the State. Although the Minimum Wage Law was passed in 1933, no appropriation was made for its enforcement until 1936, when \$12,500 became available. Immediately the Minimum Wage Bureau was organized and a wage board was set up to investigate the wages paid women and children in the laundry industry. Under Directory Order Number One by the Commissioner of Labor, effective September 6, 1937, the total annual wages of laundry workers has been increased approximately \$1,000,000. Similar surveys are now being made of certain trades in the clothing and needle industries.

The New Jersey Annual State-wide Interplant Safety Contest conducted by the Department of Labor, coupled with requirements for mechanical safeguards and a safety-educational program designed to eliminate carelessness and thoughtlessness, continues to reflect a greatly reduced accident frequency and severity rate in our industries.

In my Inaugural Message I stated that there was an increasing demand for a revision of utility rates in the users' interest and I recommended certain extensions of authority for the Board of Public Utility Commissioners, designed to eliminate extending hearings and enable the Board and utility companies to negotiate and to agree upon temporary rates. The Legislature almost immediately wrote into law the recommendations of the Governor in the face of criticism that these measures were innocuous and ineffective. It is, therefore, with some degree of pride that I report during the past three years cumulative reductions to the consumers of \$27,207,888. The reduced rates are reflected in the following figures: Electric, \$21,543,582; Gas, \$3,661,582; Telephone, \$1,840,862, and Water, \$161,862. Chiefly as a result of activities of the Board, the present price of utility service to customers in this State is lower by more than twelve and one-quarter million dollars per year than it was in 1934.

During the last three years there have been total savings in the Highway Department amounting to approximately four millions of dollars. The Highway Commissioner has established a policy of making award of contracts only when the lowest bid submitted has been within the engineering estimates of his department.

Realizing that true economy necessitated the purchase of paving and maintenance materials at the prevailing market prices, the Commissioner has required counties and municipalities receiving State Highway aid to have open specifications and he has refused to approve awards when prices submitted were in excess of prevailing market prices of bituminous materials.

In the acquisition of rights-of-ways, friendly negotiations have been encouraged under an announced policy that permitted property owners to deal directly with the department, and there resulted from this policy a saving of \$1,800,000 under the estimated amounts for the acquisition of necessary parcels of land.

THE THINGS UNDONE

Since it is necessary, both from the standpoint of honesty and public interest, to also list our "sins of omission," I am obliged to direct your attention to the things that I consider important problems yet to be solved.

We have failed to revise our stupid and archaic system of taxation. We continue to levy uncollectible and unbearable burdens upon real estate owners representing less than one-third of our population, and continue to require them to assume more than three-quarters of the cost of government. This causes widespread delinquencies, the loss of homes and business properties, continued public borrowing, and the creation of a deplorable fiscal condition from which we may find it impossible to extricate our municipalities.

We have failed to do our duty to the children of the State who, under the terms of the Constitution, are entitled to free public education. The Legislature has committed itself to the policy known as the Mort Plan, guaranteeing public education to all children of school age, but this represents only inexcusable lip service, voicing our faith in a policy that we do not have the courage to put in effect.

We have up to this time followed a policy of procrastination in the enactment of legislation that will enable New Jersey to share in the funds made available by the Federal government under the Wagner-Stegall Act for the elimination of our blighted areas through slum clearance and the construction of low-cost housing.

We have likewise failed to make it possible to adequately protect New Jersey's interests in the proceedings instituted by nine of the southern States to bring about freight rates that will give their area a decided and unfair advantage over New Jersey and which will, if successful, mean the removal of many industries from our State. These industries, already considering the South because of the advantages of cheap labor and cheap power sometimes furnished through Federal subsidies, will be given a further inducement for removal from our territory if the freight rates from the south to the north are reduced in line with the desires of the southern Governors.

One of the immediately pressing tax reforms is the revision of existing laws for the taxation of intangible personalty. As this law is now being administered in certain sections, it will drive out of our State business and industry employing large numbers of New Jersey citizens. Some action should be taken along this line very promptly.

There is almost universally acknowledged need for reform in the distribution of the franchise taxes upon utility property.

Another field of taxation in urgent need of action is that of the levies made upon railway property. Over one-third of the annual taxes levied on the railroads is actually held up by pending litigation. An additional fraction has been paid under protest and may have to be refunded if the litigation should ultimately be reversed to the State, and yet no appropriation has been made for the future conduct of this litigation. Either some solution of the controversy must be found or there must be an adequate appropriation to continue the litigation. The businesslike method would be to settle the controversy.

The dark side of our municipal fiscal picture is that tax title liens have quadrupled between 1932 and 1937, the liens as of September 30, 1937, amounting to \$84,000,000. It is

imperative that a legislative plan be formulated to provide for the liquidation of those liens in a more expeditious and less expensive method than is possible under the present law.

Annual tax sales are conducted in some municipalities and are ignored in others. There should be some legislation to bring about uniformity in this procedure.

We need a less expensive and more expeditious method of foreclosure of tax title liens and at the same time provision for returning foreclosed property to taxation.

We still have before us the necessity of a definite policy of State-aid to assist a few municipalities in a plan of financial rehabilitation subject to State regulation being accepted as a condition of State-aid.

While considerable progress has been made in arresting those diseases to which our people are susceptible, there is need for more intensive public health work to improve unwholesome social conditions. Public health should be the first concern of an enlightened citizenry. Enlarged horizons envision further extension of health work in the fields of preventive medicine. A Bureau of Preventable Diseases to study cancer, tuberculosis, and other maladies, with a division for dental health, should have consideration with the sanction of Federal authorities. Immediate concerns are for a statute to enforce pre-marital examinations to detect the social diseases; provision for pneumonia sera to reduce the State's death-toll from pneumonia; authority to regulate swimming pools and for local boards of health to pool resources to improve public health services.

Decided public interest has been aroused within the last few years on the problem of Venereal Diseases. While our State and local health authorities have expanded their programs aimed to control these diseases which are now exacting such a toll from our population, their activities have been limited. An allotment of funds for further extending this work is greatly needed, not only as a safeguard to New Jersey's health but to bring our efforts in

this field to the point of favorable comparison with other neighboring States.

Public interest is directing attention to the pollution of our waterways. Intra-state pollutions can be handled expeditiously because there is ample law and enforcement machinery. There may be need in the near future for co-operative action for a program to purify inter-state streams, such as the **Delaware River**.

On December 20th I recommended to the Legislature two necessary amendments to the Unemployment Compensation Act. These changes, and particularly the one designed to modify the oppressive and unworkable penalty feature of the law, should be made immediately.

While the final figures have not yet been compiled, there are indications that in 1937 an all-time high was established in the number of deaths upon New Jersey highways. The reported figures show that during the first eleven months of the year 1,139 persons lost their lives in automobile accidents, an increase of eighteen per cent over the comparable period of 1936. Further co-operation of enforcement and judicial agencies, strict examination of motor vehicles for possible defects, and an enlarged program of safety education must be brought about if we are to reduce the number of empty chairs, empty sleeves, and empty hearts resulting from avoidable automobile accidents in New Jersey.

SERVICE VERSUS TALK

As I am about to leave the office of Governor, I must express my appreciation to those members of the Legislature who, regardless of political affiliations, supported me in an effort to bring about needed reforms in our State government—the ones who did not limit their public service to orations upon shortcomings that they made no actual attempt to correct. It has been my general experience that those who shouted the loudest the shibboleth of “economy,” designed chiefly to facilitate elections, were the most derelict

in their duty when it came to pointing out just where these economies could be affected, and in supplying the votes to effect them.

PERSONNEL

I must say, too, that I am deeply grateful for the general fine spirit of co-operation reflected in the work of State officials and public employees.

Administrative results must depend, after all, upon the quality, the capacity and the devotion of public officials and the rank and file of public employees. It is the duty of department heads and their responsible deputies and assistants to fix departmental responsibilities and objectives under the law, to plan their work and organize their working forces in such a way as will best assure the discharge of these official responsibilities. It is likewise the part of departmental management to give to the working forces fair and equitable consideration, to set an example of industry and devotion and to furnish that leadership essential to successful work in any organization whether in the public service or in private enterprise. I am glad to pay tribute to the capacity and devotion of the responsible heads in the State government and to their working forces as well. The State has many able men and women in responsible charge of its departmental affairs and I am confident that nowhere in public or private business will be found better qualified, more industrious or more loyal employees than we have in our State government. The Civil Service of the State has served the people well and it is entitled to their confidence and respect.

Public employees have been fortunate in recent years in that they have had employment, but public wage levels are not yet equal to those that prevail in those comparable businesses which have been able to continue their working forces under full-time employment. The State's business increases rather than diminishes in times of financial and economic stress. During the past three years the State has

been called upon to render, and it has rendered, a greater volume of service than at any other time in our history. The State should be an enlightened employer and the State employee is worthy of his hire. By careful financial management we were able to save from departmental appropriations during the past fiscal year enough money to provide long delayed salary increments for more than eight thousand State employees. I know that these increments are merited and I am confident that this expenditure represents a sound investment.

For the fiscal year 1934-35 there were 10,932 officers and employees on the public payroll, and the total payroll was \$17,074,881.28. In 1937 there were 11,851 officers and employees on the State's payroll which totalled \$18,548,880.80. Those who are uninformed may see in these advances evidences of carelessness and extravagance. Those who are acquainted with the real facts know that these increases are the result of the establishment of new agencies demanded by the people or by reason of the extensions of governmental activities on the part of the Federal government and affecting the State. I want to say in passing that only such employment as has been demonstrated as absolutely necessary has been authorized, and it is common knowledge among departmental authorities that hundreds of the present working forces of the State are carrying heavier loads than should be exacted of any employee, public or private.

During my term of office I have come to understand the complicated problems and difficulties involved in successful Civil Service administration. I have learned that our State, as in so many other public activities, leads all of the other States in the effectiveness of its Civil Service administration. The Civil Service Commission and its staff has done a good job in this trying period.

THE INCOMING GOVERNOR

May I urge you to give to the incoming Governor a type of friendly co-operation that will rise above the level of strictly partisan consideration and personal ambition. It is hardly to be expected that eighty-one men and women coming from various parts of the State and holding many conflicting views upon the social, political and economic problems before us can be in complete agreement upon a program of legislation that may be advanced; yet, it must be admitted that there will be chaos rather than accomplishment if every member of the Legislature should consider himself as the appointed one to do the thinking and to evolve the program that alone must be adopted.

The election of the Governor by the people of the State indicates a degree of confidence that should be accepted within reasonable bounds by members of the Legislature. A Governor is entitled to make his recommendations and to have them given fair and open consideration in an atmosphere free of bickering, heckling and carping criticism.

I urge you to give to A. Harry Moore, now on the threshold of his third term as Governor of New Jersey, all that I should have desired for myself had the Constitution and the electorate permitted me to continue in this office.

VALEDICTORY

The past three years have represented the most interesting period in a life that has largely been dedicated to government. They have been brightened by those achievements that will be recognized either presently or in the future as sound accomplishments that will mean much to the people of our State; they have been shadowed by some failures, individual and collective, but, on the whole, they have brought to me a new sense of appreciation of friendship and service. To those who have offered that friendship, and to those who have furnished that service, and to

the people of the State of New Jersey who elected me Governor so that this experience might come to me, I am deeply grateful.

RESOLUTION CONCERNING PUBLIC RELIEF DURING 1938

WHEREAS, The problem of public relief continues paramount in municipal administration, and the burden of financing relief remains undiminished and even threatens to increase during 1938; and

WHEREAS, Legislative leaders have already declared themselves in favor of casting an additional burden of the cost of relief on local taxpayers even to the extent of forcing communities to more than double their 1937 relief contributions during 1938; and

WHEREAS, New Jersey municipalities have for years been faced with critical budgetary and tax problems, and although there has been some improvement in the financial conditions of certain municipalities, others are still faced with these problems; and

WHEREAS, An increase of municipal relief expenditures, such as is suggested by some legislators is certain to bring any improvement in municipal finances to an abrupt halt and definitely set back local government; and

WHEREAS, The municipalities of New Jersey, including Trenton, cannot afford or stand an additional burden of the cost of public relief; therefore

Be It Resolved, By the city council of the city of Trenton, that the city of Trenton is unalterably opposed to any plan of legislative program which would throw an additional burden of the cost of relief of local taxpayers by requiring any greater municipal contribution toward public relief than was required during 1937; and

Be It Further Resolved, That the welfare of the municipalities and people of New Jersey requires that the Legislature co-operate, through a constructive legislative program, in lightening the relief burden of municipalities and in assisting in their financial improvement; and

Be It Further Resolved, That certified copies of this resolution be sent by the city clerk to the Governor, presiding officers of the Assembly and Senate of the New Jersey Legislature, to the Senator and each of the Assemblymen from Mercer county, and to the New Jersey League of Municipalities.

Be It Resolved by the Senate of the State of New Jersey (the House of Assembly concurring):

1. The following amendment to the Constitution of the State of New Jersey is hereby proposed, and when the same shall be agreed to by a majority of the members elected to the Senate and House of Assembly, the said amendment shall be entered on their journals, with the yeas and nays taken thereon, and referred to the Legislature then next to be chosen, and published for three months previous to the first Tuesday after the first Monday of November next in at least one newspaper of each county, if any be published therein, such newspapers to be designated by the President of the Senate, the Speaker of the House of Assembly and the Secretary of State; payment for such publication to be made by the Treasurer on warrant of the Comptroller:

PROPOSED AMENDMENT

Amend paragraph two of section seven of Article IV of the State Constitution by striking out said paragraph two and inserting in lieu thereof a new paragraph to be known as "paragraph two of section seven of Article IV of the State Constitution," which shall read as follows:

It shall be lawful to hold, carry on, and operate in this State race meetings whereat the trotting, running or steeplechase racing of horses only may be conducted between the hours of sunrise and sunset on week-days only and in duly legalized race tracks, at which the pari-mutuel system of betting shall be permitted. No lottery, roulette, or game of chance of any form shall be authorized by the Legislature in this State, and no ticket in any lottery shall be bought or sold within this State, or offered for sale; nor shall pool-selling, book-making, or gambling of any kind be authorized or allowed within this State, except pari-mutual betting on the results of the racing of horses only, from which the State shall derive a reasonable revenue for the support of government; nor shall any gambling device, practice, or game of chance, or pari-mutuel betting thereon now prohibited by law, except as herein stated and otherwise provided, be legalized, or the remedy, penalty, or punishment now provided therefor be in any way diminished.

thereof, to make a survey of all questions of public interest, including a survey of the finances and expenditures of the State, counties and municipalities, to investigate violations of law and the conduct of any State, county or municipal official; State, county or municipal department; State, county or municipal commission; State, county or municipal board; or State, county or municipal body; to investigate alleged fraudulent and illegal conduct at the general election on November second, one thousand nine hundred and thirty-seven; to investigate the alleged tampering with, and marking of, or altering of, or counting of, ballots cast at said general election; to investigate the alleged tampering with, or altering of, the permanent registration records and duplicates thereof, the poll books and other election records, used at, or provided for, said general election; to investigate alleged fraudulent and illegal conduct on the part of the county board of elections and on the part of the district board of elections at said general election; to ascertain whether the duties of such officials, departments, commissions, boards, bodies, and of such county boards of elections and of such district boards of election have been or are being lawfully and properly discharged, and to report its findings as a basis for such legislative action as the General Assembly may deem necessary and proper.”

WHEREAS, On November second, one thousand nine hundred and thirty-seven, there was held in the State of New Jersey a general election for the purpose of electing a Governor of the State of New Jersey, in which election Lester H. Clee was the candidate of the Republican party and A. Harry Moore was the candidate of the Democratic party; and

WHEREAS, After the said election the said Lester H. Clee filed a petition with the Supreme Court of the State of New Jersey for a recount of the votes cast at such election in certain districts, wards and municipalities in the county of Hudson and also filed a petition contesting the election of said A. Harry Moore by reason of alleged malconduct, fraud or corruption in the conduct of said election; and

WHEREAS, Said recount has disclosed many fraudulent and illegal acts at said general election in that ballots contained in the ballot boxes opened at said recount appeared to have been tampered with, marked, altered, erased and miscounted; and

WHEREAS, The poll books and other election records used in said election disclosed fraud, corruption and malconduct on the part of district boards and others; and

WHEREAS, The petition of contest filed by said Lester H. Clee alleged malconduct, fraud and corruption and the casting of many illegal votes in various districts, wards and municipalities in Hudson county, and further alleged that the poll books and permanent registration records and the duplicates thereof and other election records used at said election would disclose the nature and details of said malconduct, fraud and corruption and other illegal acts; and

WHEREAS, The Supreme Court has announced its decision that a motion to dismiss said petition will be granted; and

WHEREAS, Said contestant has had no opportunity to present evidence of the charges contained in his said petition for contest; and

WHEREAS, Certain political leaders and advisers of the Democratic candidate have denied that there was any malconduct, fraud, or other illegal acts in the conduct of said election and have invited a complete investigation thereof; and

WHEREAS, Said alleged acts and others which have been brought to the attention of the members of the General Assembly have shocked the public conscience and created widespread distrust in the conduct of elections in this State and call for immediate and thorough investigation for the protection of the voters and the good name of the State; therefore

Be It Resolved by the General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

1. An Assembly committee of five members of the General Assembly shall be appointed by the Speaker thereof, to make a survey of all questions of public interest, including a survey of the finances and expenditures of the State, counties and municipalities, to investigate violations of law and the conduct of any State, county or municipal official; State, county or municipal department; State, county or municipal commission; State, county or municipal board; or State, county or municipal body; to investigate alleged fraudulent and illegal conduct at the general election on November second, one thousand nine hundred

and thirty-seven; to investigate the alleged tampering with, and marking of, or altering of, or counting of, ballots cast at said general election; to investigate the alleged tampering with, or altering of, the permanent registration records and duplicates thereof, the poll books and other election records, used at, or provided for, said general election; to investigate alleged fraudulent and illegal conduct on the part of the county board of elections and on the part of the district board of elections at said general election; to ascertain whether the duties of such officials, departments, commissions, boards, bodies and of such county boards of election have been or are being lawfully and properly discharged, and to report its findings as a basis for such legislative action as the General Assembly may deem necessary and proper.

2. The members of said committee shall serve without salary and shall be entitled to receive reimbursement for necessary expenses. The Speaker of the House of Assembly shall designate the chairman of said committee.

3. The committee shall appoint a secretary, a sergeant-at-arms, and shall have power to employ necessary legal, clerical and other assistance.

4. Said committee shall sit at such times and places as the majority of the committee shall decide and shall have power to make its own rules and to determine its own procedure. At any meeting, if a quorum shall not be present, the members of the committee present, though less than a quorum, shall have power to adjourn and notice of the meeting on the adjourned day shall be given by the secretary of the committee to all the members, by mail. The said committee shall have power to compel the attendance of witnesses and the production of books, papers and records, by subpoena, to administer oath and to examine the witnesses.

5. Said committee shall report the result of its survey and investigation, together with such recommendation as may seem to be advisable, as a basis for such legislative action as the General Assembly may deem necessary or proper, to the present or subsequent session of the General Assembly.

6. Said committee shall be vested with all the powers and authority conferred upon the General Assembly by the

Constitution and laws of the State of New Jersey to the extent that may be expedient and necessary for the purpose of this resolution and also all the powers and authority of a standing committee of the House of Assembly.

7. This resolution shall take effect immediately.

That the people of the United States of America attend on the evening of January 29, 1938, the largest birthday party in the history of the United States, and do honor not only to the President on his birthday, but help support one of the greatest charitable institutions in the United States which is ministering to those in affliction and distress.

4. That the National Committee in charge of the President's birthday for the cause of charity be commended for its splendid work in making the President's birthday charity party a success.

5. That copies of this resolution be sent forthwith to the Honorable Franklin Delano Roosevelt, President of the United States, Washington, D. C., and to the National Committee in charge of the Warm Springs Foundation, Washington, D. C.

6. INAUGURAL ADDRESS

STATE OF NEW JERSEY,

EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT,

January 18, 1938.

Members of the Legislature,

My Fellow Citizens:

Today, and for the third time I take into my keeping the Great Seal of the Great State of New Jersey, as your Governor. No other citizen, in all the years of our existence as a State, has ever been given this distinction. I have no words

with which to express, in any adequate way, my real gratitude for your continued confidence and support. But, I do want you to know that I am deeply grateful for all of these honors and for that continuing confidence you have given me. I shall not forget that this preferment brings with it heavy and exacting responsibilities.

Throughout my public life I have looked upon public office as an opportunity to serve. My ambition now and my determination alike are to serve well, not individual interests nor groups, nor classes nor party, but all the people of the whole State as their Governor.

I have been proud to represent the State of New Jersey in the Senate of the United States. This has been a great privilege and a distinguished honor. I have been able to weigh the problems of national import as they affect the State, the community, and the individual citizen.

I recognize the gravity of the problems that must be dealt with by the Congress and the far-reaching effects of the actions the Congress may take and of the national policies that may be adopted.

During the past several decades, world-wide revolutions against social, economical and political tyrannies have taken place. Nations founded on constitutional democratic principles have survived the earthquake which shook apart others less securely founded. The surge of violence has nationally echoed in America. Some of our people have not been able to distinguish between an alien echo and the still small voice of the soul of this Nation. They have offered themselves in Messianic roles to lead us over the Jordan and yet, you and I know that we already live in the promised land.

The genius of the American people is that aggressive spirit of self-reliance and confidence in our capacity to work out our own problems.

It is time that we reassert our good American common sense and courage, time to stop tilting at windmills, time

to analyze our problems and our needs and get back to the business of life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness.

The outstanding characteristics of our State are its strategic position in the great battery of great States and its continuing growth—in population, in industrial development, in the complexities of our social, economic and governmental problems.

Geography has given us more than nature has denied. But we have heavy responsibilities of our own. We must work out our own problems through positive action against the favorable background that our strategic position has given us.

In my messages during my previous terms of office I have discussed all of our major State problems as I saw them and I offered specific recommendations looking toward their solution.

I shall not undertake to present now a complete program for legislative action nor of the procedure which I hope may be followed during my term of office. I shall expect to communicate with the Legislature from time to time on matters of particular importance and to offer my specific recommendations.

The platform of my own Party and the platform of the Republican Party contain, I take it, the program of action for this legislative session. Each platform recognizes much in the same way the major problems with which we have to deal and there are no fundamental differences in our professed opinions upon State matters.

The Republican platform pledges a sound and fearless reorganization of the State government.

The Democratic platform advocates a sane reorganization of the State government.

The Republican platform calls for fitness and integrity for Prosecutors and the Judiciary.

The Democratic platform pledges that same fitness and integrity.

The Republican platform declares for a sympathetic understanding of labor and for protection and fair dealing.

The Democratic platform pledges a continuance of its historic friendship for Labor and that same sympathetic policy which has caused it to be long known as the Party and the friend of Labor.

The Republican platform commits the Legislature to parole reform, which follows exactly the proposals earlier made by the Democratic Party and contained in the Democratic platform.

The Republican platform announces support of the movement to stamp out juvenile delinquency in the State.

The Democratic platform calls attention to the fact that through our Party efforts, a comprehensive study of the whole problem of juvenile delinquency is now underway, and it pledges that the Party's interest will continue until the right solution is found and effective machinery is set up in the State for dealing with this vital problem.

The Republican platform pledges the maintenance of the teachers' pension and annuity fund unimpaired, and its continuing interest in public education.

The Democratic platform renews its pledge of continued support of tenure, pension and annuity laws and the better financing of public education under the Mort Plan.

The Republican platform declares for the faithful support and observance of the civil service laws.

The Democratic platform pledges its continued and continuing interest in the welfare of public employees and its full support of the civil service system.

The Republican platform announces its support of highways and highway safety.

The Democratic platform offers the same pledge.

The Republican platform pledges support for equal opportunities for women.

The Democratic platform renews its pledge for adequate protection of the welfare of women and children, for the

elimination of sweatshops and against discrimination of any kind on the grounds of sex.

The Republican platform pledges its interest in veterans.

The Democratic platform pledges its continuing support of legislation for the benefits of veterans of all wars and their dependents.

The Republican platform announces its Party's interest in social security.

The Democratic Party has long supported and advanced the cause of social welfare and security.

The Republican platform pledges its support of agriculture.

The Democratic platform repeats its long-standing pledge of continued support of our great agricultural interests and of the general welfare of our rural population.

The Republican platform declares against new taxes.

The Democratic platform makes the same declaration and pledges a reduction in existing taxes which place intolerable burdens upon the homes and farms of our people.

The Republican platform declares for adequate relief.

The Democratic platform guarantees that all who are in actual need shall be fed and clothed and sheltered and that this shall be done without waste, but with understanding sympathy.

It is not necessary, then, for either the Legislature or for me to start over again to develop a new program and plan of procedure. Our party platforms include our program. The Legislature has received its mandate, and I have received my commission. I propose that we get to work at once in order that we may dispose of the major problems that are before us promptly and in keeping with these pledges to the people.

RELIEF

I note with satisfaction that the Legislature has recognized the continuing importance of the problem of relief and that a number of Senators and Members of the Assem-

bly with long legislative experience have already spent a great deal of time in developing plans for providing essential relief. Since your own plans are now under consideration and since this is first a legislative problem, I shall not undertake to lay down any formula for handling relief in this message, it is my concern, as I know it is yours, that we carry out our pledge that no worthy person in our State shall go without food, shelter and clothing. This pledge must be kept, and I stand ready to give my advice and full co-operation to this end.

LOCAL GOVERNMENTS

Our local governments and their problems are always of first importance. They touch the lives of all of the people more closely than any other public authority. They spend five times as much tax money as is spent by the State government. They use four-fifths of every tax dollar.

I should like to have all of the people—every person who gets a tax bill—understand that that tax bill is for the ordinary but necessary services rendered by the city or town or county government, such as streets, sewers, water, health, police and fire protection, and that none of it is used by the State for State purposes. If we could all keep this clearly in our minds, we would, I am sure, be more interested in our problems of local government and we would be better citizens.

Our municipalities are the keystones of our whole system of government because our schools and all these daily services which we receive and take for granted depend directly upon the kind of municipal government we have; its financial stability and the collection and spending of the taxpayers' money. Our county government must also depend upon funds collected in municipal tax bills.

The last few years have made us painfully aware of the ease with which our local governments can slip into precarious financial conditions. We have realized that they were not prepared to stand the shock of the storm and stress through which we have been passing.

The Legislature has from time to time taken cognizance of these conditions and has enacted several funding acts, a new bond act, and a new budget act. All of these have been helpful but, in my judgment, we have not yet gotten to the root of the matter and further important steps are necessary.

For two years the Princeton Local Government Survey has been studying this situation without any cost to the State and it has prepared a series of bills which, while aiming to protect the elements of local self-government, that we all cherish, provide, nevertheless, a regularity, guidance and restraint which promise to go far toward avoiding unsound fiscal conditions, preserving our local services and protecting our taxpayers from the adversities of excessive expenditures. I endorse these bills of the Princeton Survey in principle and commend them to your serious consideration.

REORGANIZATION

For a number of years the reorganization of the State government has been discussed by the people and considered by the Legislature. The opinion seems to prevail that extensive changes in the administrative structure of the State government will insure economy and efficiency in State administration and in some way or other solve all of our State problems.

I favor a sane reorganization of the State government and a sensible realignment of agencies and activities in keeping with sound principles of administration. I remind you, however, that change alone does not mean progress, and that the mere pushing around of established agencies and activities will neither reduce costs nor solve fundamental problems. Any reorganization that does not assure greater efficiency and actual savings is of no value.

I am satisfied that we can do a real job if we will approach this matter honestly, and in earnest, that real economies can be effected and that these rising costs and constant additions to the public payrolls can be stopped. A look at the record will show that we must find some way to control these costs.

In 1934, for example, my budget recommendations for the current operating costs of the State except highways, was \$28,211,214.66. The appropriation based upon that budget, both regular and supplemental, was \$29,794,134.22. The number of State officers and employees in that year was 10,518 and the payroll \$16,401,477.90.

In the present fiscal year the appropriations bills covering the same operating costs of the State are \$38,737,929.64. The number of officers and employees will exceed 12,000 and moneys appropriated and allotted for payrolls are just over \$21,000,000. I cite these figures not critically, but to indicate to you the necessity for serious consideration in the matter of spending the people's money. We do not need any further costly surveys or new plans. You are familiar with those that have been already made. I recommend that you make the Princeton Survey, which I initiated, the basis of your deliberations.

Today, our people are becoming more and more government conscious. There are people who demand money from the government and there are those who want to know how the money which the government takes from them is spent. In this State we not only have one budget, that cannot be understood by the ordinary man and woman, but two budgets, a general budget and a highway budget.

The State government is a single, united undertaking and it should be run as such. Let me reiterate, the people want a plan, an understandable presentation of the cost of government. Give them something that clearly shows the amounts the State receives and spends. Give them one budget and the other effective controls as recommended in the Princeton Survey, and I promise you that we will be able to take care of our people's needs, relief or otherwise, within the bounds of the State's income.

EDUCATION

Education is the biggest business of the State and one of our greatest responsibilities. Five years ago I appointed a commission to study our public educational system and

to make recommendations for its support. I was impressed with the soundness of the recommendations of that commission. Two years ago the Legislature adopted the principles of the plan of school financing proposed. It has not yet been put into effect.

The State school tax now raises two million dollars less than it did during my last term of office. Diversion and litigation has continued to reduce the money from railroad taxes available to school districts.

Last year an emergency appropriation of \$1,716,000 was required and made to meet an emergency situation in many of our rural counties and smaller municipalities. This year a similar appropriation is required.

Provision for reasonable educational opportunities for the children of New Jersey is too important a matter to depend upon emergency piecemeal procedure such as this. The State Department of Public Instruction calculates that 20 millions of dollars not in addition to but in substitution of the present State school tax is needed to apply the minimum foundation program of \$57 per year for each elementary pupil and \$97 per year for each high school pupil in the State. I urge your serious consideration of this requirement.

It is not necessary for me to give further assurances of my concern for teacher-welfare. The integrity of the teachers' tenure, pension and annuity laws must be maintained. It is important that the State continue to meet its full obligations to the teachers' pension and annuity fund.

WATER

During my last term of office I proposed legislation designed for the protection of our water supplies and for the immediate development of additional water supplies for our metropolitan area. The same need exists now as existed then. Three years have passed and no progress has been made. Further delay will not only have an adverse effect upon our further development; it is dangerous.

I repeat my recommendation that a Water Authority be set up and clothed with sufficient power to limit additional supplies before a water famine is actually upon us.

Water, much like gas, electricity and telephone service is a utility and should be paid for by the users. This is the principle that should be followed as we move toward the development of an adequate water supply. New York City has gone to the Upper Delaware for a new water supply. New Jersey has a greater stake and therefore a greater share in the Delaware waters and we must look in that direction as a potential source of supply for our own needs.

I am satisfied that we can protect our recreational resources and lake developments in Passaic, Bergen, Sussex and Morris counties, and at the same time provide for our water needs if we will go at this problem in the right way.

I shall deal with this highly important matter in a later communication.

LABOR

Ours is an industrial State. It is made up of working communities in which labor has the right to organize and bargain for better conditions and higher wages. Labor is entitled to proper working conditions and to be paid the full value of its services.

It is true in America, thank God, that the industrial leader of today was the wage earner of yesterday, and that the vast majority of men and women elected to public office are the sons and daughters of men who labored with their hands and earned their bread by the sweat of their brows.

I believe the term "Labor" means dignity and character and patriotism on the march to fulfill those guarantees afforded us in our Constitution. I denounce every effort of betrayal of the American workingman into the hands of those who are neither workingmen nor real Americans. We have had some recent demonstrations in New Jersey

of this effort to betray American workers, to defy and to bring into disrepute the orderly processes of government.

We are a plain people here in New Jersey. We speak a plain language which may be clearly understood. I say to you, to the workers and to all of the people, that the cause of Labor will never be betrayed at this State Capitol and the rights of Labor and of Industry alike will never go unprotected.

Business and industry in these days need protection and encouragement. Instead of legislation to destroy, we should legislate to build up if we ever hope to return to honest employment and remove from the relief rolls those who are unemployed. Industry and employment go hand in hand; without one, the other perishes.

There are other matters which I would like to discuss but the time now at my disposal is inadequate. They shall be dealt with later and specifically.

I should like to renew my assurance of interest in and support of our agricultural interests, milk control, our admirable institutional program, utility regulation, housing, our progress in public health administration, conservation of our soil, our coast line and our other natural resources; their development for the wider use and enjoyment of our people, and my concern in every matter that touches the public interest.

None will be overlooked or forgotten. It will be my purpose to have the whole operation of the State government proceed in orderly fashion toward the common end of adequate, economical and honest State administration.

As we face our problems of State government we find much to be done in our respective fields. We need both courage and devotion. Wise spending on public undertakings in the order of and in proportion to their precedence and necessity, the practice of sound economy, and the actual savings of public funds are the supreme tests of legislative and administrative capacity, and fortitude alike.

I say to the people and the taxpayers of the State, and we all pay taxes directly or indirectly, that so far as I can compel it, public funds in every level of government will be carefully handled and economically spent.

I say to the responsible administrative heads of every State department, board, commission and spending agency, that the fixed policy of strictest economy is from now on in effect in their several departments and agencies.

I know something about the desirable improvements that many State departments have in mind. I know, too, when necessity compels us to tighten our belts and get along with funds we have available.

I am certain that no one can doubt that that time is now.

Neither I, as Governor, nor you, as Legislators, nor the people of New Jersey, as citizens, voters and taxpayers, have the power to correct all of the social, economic and political ills that beset us. Each of us, however, in our own way and according to our opportunities and responsibilities has a major or a minor part to play in improving our common lot. If, therefore, we approach our task conscientiously and unselfishly and with an abiding faith in, and desire for the guidance of the God of our Nation, we shall be successful in our efforts.

Everyone of us has a stake in the community, the State and the Nation. We have faith in the American dream. If our people in New Jersey and the American people everywhere, will keep that faith we shall prevail.

With you, today, I dedicate myself anew to the keeping of that faith.

DEAR SIR—At a meeting of the Department of Health of the State of New Jersey held on November 16, 1937, the question of the administration of Chapter 175, P. L. 1933, as amended (Barber Registration Act), was discussed, and it was on motion voted that the Department memorialize the Legislature to relieve it from any responsibility with respect to said act, except possibly the control of sanitary conditions in barber shops. This department feels that it should not be called upon to regulate an occupation or trade as such.

In accordance with the aforesaid action of the Department, a memorial has been prepared and is transmitted to you herewith. I would appreciate it very much if you will introduce it into the House of Assembly of the New Jersey Legislature.

A memorial to the Senate and House of Assembly requesting the enforcement of the "Barber Registration Act" be vested in an independent State agency by the transfer thereto of the powers and duties now devolved upon the State Department of Health.

WHEREAS, The Legislature at the session of one thousand nine hundred and thirty-three, did enact a statute entitled "An act to regulate the occupation of barbering, to provide for the licensing of persons to carry on such occupation and to provide rules regulating the proper conduct and sanitation of the occupation of barbering for the protection of the

public health, and to provide penalties for violation thereof," approved May twenty-fourth, one thousand nine hundred and thirty-three; and

WHEREAS, Experience has demonstrated that the State Department of Health is not the proper State agency for carrying into effect the provisions thereof by reason of other and larger functions committed to its supervision by the Legislature; and

WHEREAS, In order that the said statute may be adequately enforced to the end that its purposes and objects may be accomplished, the State Department of Health respectfully petitions the Senate and House of Assembly for a transfer of the powers now vested in it to an independent State agency, or such agency as the Legislature may determine, in order that the statute may be adequately enforced.

GENTLEMEN—Attached is a copy of a draft of a proposed Relief Bill to be introduced in the Legislature the enactment of which will provide

1. State control of relief by an Administrative Board.
2. Cash payment of relief at the rate of 61 cents per day per person.
3. Supplemental relief for workers whose income either in private industry or on government work is less than the allowance embodied in the bill.

4. Payment in lawful money for all work to be performed. Rates of pay to be based upon prevailing union rates. This will eliminate the Work-for-food-Order program that exists in certain municipalities.

5. That financing of relief shall be assumed entirely by the State, thereby relieving municipalities of the present financial burden imposed upon them.

The method and plan for raising the funds necessary to carry out the provisions of this bill is by the passage of an act providing for a graduated income tax upon all incomes in excess of \$5,000.00.

You are well aware that relief in New Jersey has never been adequately administered. We, therefore, request that you heed the call of labor unions affiliated with the C. I. O., A. F. of L., the Workers Alliance, as well as numerous municipalities who are supporting this bill, and support and vote for passage of the measure when it comes upon the floor of the Assembly or Senate for consideration.

Assembly Joint Resolution No. 3, entitled "Joint Resolution memorializing the Secretary of the Navy to select the name 'New Jersey' for the next battleship authorized by Congress,"

Mr. DeVoe offered the following resolution, which was handed to the Clerk and read by the Clerk:

A supplement to Assembly Resolution entitled "Assembly Resolution appointing an Assembly committee of five members of the General Assembly to be appointed by the Speaker thereof, to make a survey of all questions of public interest, including a survey of the finances and expenditures of the State, counties and municipalities, to investigate violations of law and the conduct of any State, county, or municipal official; State, county or municipal department; State, county or municipal commission; State, county or municipal board; or State, county or municipal body; to investigate alleged fraudulent and illegal conduct at the general election on November second one thousand nine hundred and thirty-seven; to investigate the alleged tampering with, and marking of, or altering of, or counting of, ballots cast at said general election; to investigate the alleged tampering with, or altering of, the permanent registration records and duplicates thereof, the poll books and other election records, used at, or provided for, said general election; to investigate alleged fraudulent and illegal conduct on the part of the County Board of Elections and on the part of the District Board of Elections at said general election; to ascertain whether the duties of such officials, departments, commissions, boards, bodies, and of such County Boards of Elections and of such District Boards of Election have been or are being lawfully and properly discharged, and to report its findings as a basis for such legislative action as the General Assembly may deem necessary and proper," adopted January 17, 1938.

WHEREAS, The General Assembly of the State of New Jersey adopted a resolution to investigate alleged fraudulent and illegal conduct at the General Election on November 2, 1937, as a basis for legislative action which the said General Assembly may deem necessary and proper; and

WHEREAS, It is apparent that the passage of this resolution was sponsored by a group of Republicans in Essex County who figured prominently in the scandal which led to the Grand Jury investigation concerning the purchase and installation of voting machines in Essex County; and

WHEREAS, This same group is using the Assembly of the State of New Jersey as the means of foisting upon the entire State, the mandatory use of voting machines which will saddle an expense of millions of dollars upon the counties of our State; and

WHEREAS, During the Grand Jury investigation in Essex County, the following important details concerning the purchase of machines in that county were brought to light, to wit:

a. That the specifications prepared by the County Counsel, Arthur T. Vanderbilt, and adopted by the Board of Freeholders of Essex County, were deliberately drawn so as to prohibit and prevent competitive bidding and designed to enable only one bidder, to wit, the Automatic Voting Machine Corporation of Jamestown, New York, to submit a bid.

b. That the specifications were intentionally prepared by the County Counsel, Arthur T. Vanderbilt, to provide for the immediate delivery of a number of 60-column machines as well as 50-column machines with the knowledge that only one company, the Automatic Voting Machine Corporation was able to deliver and manufacture 60-column machines. And to make certain that no other company would be in a position to submit a bid, the specifications further provided that the successful bidder would be required to substitute within a stated time at the discretion of the Board of Freeholders 60-column machines for any of the 50-column machines originally delivered. That this provision was inserted because it was well known that the Shoup Voting Machine Company of Philadelphia, the only other voting machine company eligible to bid, could not possibly rearrange its machinery and plant to manufacture 60-column machines.

c. That Arthur T. Vanderbilt, the County Counsel of Essex County, and the Board of Freeholders, used this trick and device of providing for the delivery of 60-column machines despite the fact that there are 3,500 cities in the

United States using voting machines all of which use 50-or-less column machines, including the City of New York which uses only 30-column machines. Of this large number of municipalities only two, Los Angeles and Crown Point, Ind., use 60-column machines.

d. That for several months prior to the adoption of these closed specifications Durward A. Wolfe and Samuel C. Hamilton of the Automatic Voting Machine Corporation, the successful bidder, opened their headquarters in the Robert Treat Hotel, remaining until the contract was actually awarded to their company, during all of which time these persons were in constant communication with certain public officials of Essex County who were directly involved in the Grand Jury investigation concerning the preparation of the specifications and the details incident to procuring the contract.

e. That ugly rumors of graft in connection with the awarding of the contract for the voting machines in Essex County to the Automatic Voting Machine Corporation were published in every newspaper in the State and the following persons were subpoenaed to appear before the Essex County Grand Jury in connection with this scandal;

Wolfe has continued to make the Robert Treat Hotel his headquarters even up to the present time so that he could continue to be in Newark close to the scene of operations involving millions of dollars and large profits, and in close contact and communication with the Essex County group who are sponsoring this Assembly investigation; and

WHEREAS, It is significant that Durward A. Wolfe of the Automatic Voting Machine Corporation was in the Robert Treat Hotel at the time the \$10,000 in cash was deposited with the County Clerk of the County of Hudson for the purpose of initiating a recount of the ballots cast in said county; and

WHEREAS, The people of the State of New Jersey are entitled to know the real facts behind this scandal and particularly the activities of all of the persons interested in foisting voting machines upon the municipalities in this State; now therefore,

Be It Resolved by the General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

1. That the Assembly committee of five members heretofore appointed by the Speaker under the resolution to which this resolution is a supplement shall promptly and before investigating any other matter make a complete investigation concerning the activities of:

(a) the number of conferences which he had with the representatives of the Automatic Voting Machine Corporation;

(b) where said conferences were held;

(c) what matters were discussed;

(e) why the specifications provided for 60-column machines when all but two out of 3,500 municipalities using voting machines employ 50-columns or less machines;

(f) why he refused to confer with representatives of Shoup Voting Machine Corporation;

(g) why the specifications were so drawn as to prevent bidding by any company except the Automatic Voting Machine Corporation which alone could furnish 60-column machines;

(h) why he didn't consider it important to save the County of Essex a considerable amount of money by providing for the purchase of 50-or-less column machines.

3. That the Assembly Committee forthwith subpoena Durward A. Wolfe and Samuel C. Hamilton of the Automatic Voting Machine Corporation for the purpose of ascertaining:

(a) how many conferences they had with Arthur T. Vanderbilt, County Counsel of Essex County;

(b) why they opened headquarters in the Robert Treat Hotel in December, 1936, and continued to make the Robert Treat Hotel their headquarters through the time that the contract was actually awarded to their company;

(c) why Durward A. Wolfe continues to reside at the Robert Treat Hotel to the present time; and

(d) who were their visitors and with whom did they communicate by telephone, or otherwise, from their rooms at the Robert Treat Hotel.

4. That the Assembly Committee forthwith subpoena Stanley Naughtright, Essex County Republican Chairman and Register of Essex County, for the purpose of ascertaining from him

(a) what conferences were held at the office of the said Stanley Naughtright, and elsewhere, with representatives of the voting machine companies and the county officials, and what transpired at said conferences with regard to the specifications and the awarding of the contract.

(c) the bank account records of Automatic Voting Machine Corporation: Arthur T. Vanderbilt, Stanley Naughtright, Durward A. Wolfe, Samuel C. Hamilton, Ernest Reed, Curtis R. Burnett, Ralph DeCamp, Roy V. Wright, Walter Gray, Mrs. Elizabeth Harris, Russel Gates, Arthur Tench, Russel Hanford and Ray Mahoney, for the purpose of ascertaining the disposition of the funds paid by the County of Essex for the purchase of the voting machines.

7. That the Assembly Committee investigate and ascertain the source of the \$10,000 cash deposited with the Clerk of the County of Hudson for initiating the recount of the ballots cast in that county in the last general election and for that purpose to interrogate Durward A. Wolfe and Samuel C. Hamilton of the Automatic Voting Machine Corporation in order to ascertain what part of said fund, if any, was contributed by them or their company.

8. That this supplement take effect immediately.

Amendments to Assembly Rules offered by the Committee on Revision and Amendment of Laws.

Amend rule 41 so that the same shall read as follows:

41. Each bill, joint resolution and concurrent resolution shall first be presented to the Clerk for introduction, endorsed with the signature of the member offering the same. Each bill and joint resolution shall be presented in triplicate, one copy to be retained by the Clerk, one copy to be used for the regular procedure of the House, if in proper form; and one copy to be delivered to the Committee on Revision and Amendment of Laws. The Clerk shall number all bills and resolutions as they are presented and make a

list of them. After numbering and listing each bill and joint resolution, the Clerk shall deliver it to the Committee on Revision and Amendment of Laws for examination as to compliance with the form of the Revised Statutes, where such compliance is necessary. After such examination and when it shall be indicated on the bill or joint resolution that it has been approved as to title and section with the Revised Statutes for introduction, the said committee shall return said bill or joint resolution to the Clerk. Thereupon the Clerk shall deliver it to the Speaker who shall endorse thereon the committee to which it is to be referred, returning it to the Clerk. At each session of the House, the Clerk shall read the number, title and committee reference of all bills and joint resolutions returned to him by the Speaker, which shall be taken as the introduction and first reading of the bill or joint resolution, and said bill or joint resolution shall be released for printing. If any bill or joint resolution offered shall not be approved as to compliance with the form of the Revised Statutes, the committee shall return the said bill or joint resolution to the Clerk for correction by the introducer of the bill or joint resolution.

Amend rule 48 so that the same shall read as follows:

48. All bills and joint resolutions, after they shall have had first reading, shall be delivered by the Clerk to the Supervisor of Bills who shall prepare them for printing in conformity with the rules defining the duties of said officer.

Amend rule 68 so that the same shall read as follows:

68. When a bill is introduced amending an existing law, all new matter in the body of the bill must be underscored, and all portions of the law proposed to be omitted must be printed in their proper places, enclosed in black faced brackets. Each bill which amends or supplements an existing law shall have printed thereon, under the number of the bill, the number of the section or other subdivision of the Revised Statutes, or the number of the page of the Pamphlet Laws, at which is found the law proposed to be amended or supplemented.

All bills which shall have been amended shall immediately be reprinted and in the reprint the new matter must be underscored and all matter proposed to be eliminated by amendment must be included in brackets.

It shall be the duty of the Speaker to direct the Clerk to cause any bill appearing on the calendar and not complying with this rule, to be removed from the calendar. When such bill has been properly prepared and reprinted it shall be restored to its place on the calendar.

Amend rule 72 so that the same shall read as follows:

72. All bills and joint resolutions shall be presented in one original and two copies thereof, and shall be typewritten or printed. All other resolutions and all amendments to bills or resolutions shall be presented in one original and two copies thereof. Seven hundred and fifty copies of all bills and six hundred copies of all official reprints of bills shall be printed for the use of the members of the House and Senate and for public distribution.

Mr. Young offered the following report of special committee appointed under Assembly Resolution No. 1:

COMMITTEE REPORT

Mr. Speaker:

The special committee appointed under Assembly Resolution No. 1, respectfully reports that on Friday, January 28, 1938, your committee caused to be executed a subpoena *duces tecum* directed to Charles F. Stoebling, Commissioner of Registrations of Hudson County, directing him in the terms of the subpoena to produce before the committee at the Essex County Court House forthwith all of the signature copy registers of all of the districts of the first ward of Jersey City and all of the poll books used in all of the election districts of the various wards and municipalities of Hudson County at the general election on November 2, 1937.

Said subpoena was served upon Charles F. Stoebling at his home, 50 Glenwood Avenue, Jersey City, New Jersey, by David H. Wiener, associate counsel for the committee, who personally handed the subpoena to Mr. Stoebling and personally gave him the requisite legal subpoena fee. Mr. Wiener understood, and so informed the committee through

its chairman, that Mr. Stoebling was willing to produce the subpoenaed records at the Essex County Court House at ten o'clock on Saturday morning, January 29, 1938. The chairman of the committee thereupon called a meeting of the committee for the hour of ten o'clock Saturday morning, January 29, 1938, at the Essex County Court House, and at the time and place appointed all of the members of the committee were present.

There appeared before the committee the Honorable Isidor Haber, who stated himself to be the personal counsel of Charles F. Stoebling, bringing with him a letter signed by Charles F. Stoebling, stating that he was ill, that the records subpoenaed were committed to his custody under the law, and that he was unwilling that they should be delivered to the committee other than by himself personally. The committee informed Judge Haber that it did not desire the personal attendance of Mr. Stoebling, but that it insisted that the subpoenaed records be produced before it and requested Judge Haber so to inform his client. Judge Haber reported to the committee at eleven o'clock that there was no change in Mr. Stoebling's decision.

The committee then took the testimony of Mr. Benjamin Dowden, official attorney for Charles F. Stoebling, commissioner of registrations of Hudson County. Mr. Dowden testified before the committee that he and his associate counsel, Mr. Henry Pass, had conferred with Mr. Stoebling the previous evening and had been directed by him to comply with the terms of the subpoena and had themselves advised that he do so.

The committee informed Mr. Dowden that it had no desire to disturb Mr. Stoebling and no desire to avail itself of his offer to have himself examined by the committee's physician, because the committee felt it was unnecessary for Mr. Stoebling to appear personally before the committee, and therefore instructed Mr. Dowden so to inform Mr. Stoebling, and to inform him that the committee expected him to obey the terms of its subpoena. Mr. Dowden reported to the committee that Mr. Stoebling was asleep and could not be disturbed.

The committee then further questioned Mr. Dowden and found that Alice Fila, otherwise known as Alice Seglie, was the only person other than Mr. Stoebling who had access

to the subpoenaed records and that she had been in the habit of unlocking the vault in which the poll books were stored, and that it was under her supervision that the records had been rendered available to the recount held in Hudson County subsequent to the general election on November 2, 1937, and that it was under her supervision that the records of the primary election held in September, 1937, had been rendered available to the recount held subsequent to the said primary.

The committee thereupon called Alice Fila otherwise known as Miss Alice Seglie on the phone and requested her to deliver to it the subpoenaed records. She refused.

The committee then availed itself of Mr. Stoebling's invitation to attend at his home in the hope that he might interview the committee and give permission to have his records turned over in compliance with the subpoena. The committee repaired to Mr. Stoebling's home and his doctor informed the committee that Mr. Stoebling was under the influence of a sedative and could not be interviewed. The doctor stated, however, that Mr. Stoebling might be awake at three o'clock in the afternoon and that if, upon examination at that hour he determined Mr. Stoebling's condition to be such that the committee might interview him, he would permit the committee to do so.

In the meanwhile, the committee had directed that the office of Mr. Stoebling be kept open. It received information that the office was about to be closed in violation of its request. It accordingly repaired to that office and found the facts to be so; that Mrs. Alice Fila, otherwise known as Alice Seglie, was departing from the office. The committee persuaded Mrs. Fila to return and she was duly sworn and testified that she had known that the records were to be delivered to the committee; that she knew Mr. Stoebling had consented thereto; that she knew that employees of the department had been directed to come to work earlier than usual for the purpose of getting the subpoenaed records together; and that she anticipated that the directions of the committee would be complied with. She testified further that upon instructions received from Mr. Stoebling, through Mrs. Stoebling, she had not opened the vault in which the subpoenaed records were stored on Saturday morning, January 29th, her instructions being that she was not upon any account to open the vault on that

day. She further testified that she had been about to leave the office upon directions received from Mrs. Stoebing that the office should be closed.

The committee had caused to be served upon Mrs. Fila, otherwise known as Alice Seglie, a subpoena *duces tecum*, requiring her to produce the records before it. During her testimony she was seated directly in front of the vault door and upon the direction of the committee she was ordered by the chairman thereof to open the vault and to turn over to the committee the subpoenaed records. She refused to do so upon the ground that she had received contrary instructions from her superior, Mr. Stoebing.

In the course of her testimony, Mrs. Fila admitted that she and Mr. Stoebing were the only persons to whom the combination of the vault was known; that during his illness it had been her custom to open the vault and to distribute the records as needed.

The committee thereupon requested Mrs. Fila, to attend at the home of Mr. Stoebing at three o'clock so that should it be possible to interview him he might have the opportunity of allowing her to open the vault and comply with the terms of the subpoena. The committee repaired to the home of Mr. Stoebing at three o'clock and was informed that it would not be granted admittance. It awaited the arrival of the doctor until three-thirty, and the doctor not arriving, it thereupon directed Mrs. Fila, to open the vault and produce the subpoenaed records before the committee at the Essex County Court House not later than five o'clock on that afternoon. The committee then adjourned to the Essex County Court House and remained until five-fifteen, awaiting the production of the subpoenaed records in compliance with its direction. The records were not produced.

That the privileges of the floor of the House be accorded to the Honorable Robert H. McCarter for the purpose of addressing the House upon the failure of Charles F. Stoebing, Commissioner of Registration of Hudson County, to obey a subpoena *duces tecum* issued by a special committee of this House appointed pursuant to Assembly Resolution No. 1; and further to examine before the House witnesses subpoenaed to appear before the special committee thereof at 9 P. M., January 31, 1938.

Mr. Wilensky moved the adoption of the resolution.

Which motion, upon a *viva voce* vote, with the ayes and nays being called was declared carried.

Mr. Featherer moved that further consideration of the resolution be postponed until Mr. Stoebing recovers. Speaker declared motion out of order.

Mr. DeVoe asked to place on record the facts that all the committee had not been notified. Mr. DeVoe moved to reconsider the vote by which report of special committee pursuant to Assembly Resolution No. 1 was adopted.

Which motion, upon a *viva voce* vote, with the ayes and nays being called was declared lost.

Mr. Robert H. McCarter then addressed the House and outlined in detail the work of the committee appointed pursuant to Assembly Resolution No. 1.

Miss Alice Seglie, Mr. Benjamin Dowden and Mr. Jacob Levy were examined by counsel to special committee Mr. Robert H. Doherty, assistant county counsel of Hudson was granted privileges of the floor in order that he could give counsel to Miss Alice Seglie.

Mr. Young offered the following resolution, which was read by the Clerk:

WHEREAS, A special committee of the House of Assembly appointed pursuant to Assembly Resolution No. 1 has reported to the House that it has issued a subpoena *duces*

tecum calling upon Charles F. Stoebling, Commissioner of Registration of Hudson county, to produce before it all of the poll books of the various election districts and the various wards and municipalities of Hudson county and the signature copy registers of the ten districts of the first ward of Jersey City; and

WHEREAS, It appears that the said Charles F. Stoebling has neglected and failed to obey the said subpoena so directed to him; and

WHEREAS, It appears by the report of the said committee and by the testimony given at the bar of this House, under oath, by Alice Fila, otherwise known as Alice Seglie, that she is the sole person other than the said Charles F. Stoebling who has access to the said subpoenaed poll books by reason of the fact that she is the sole person other than Charles F. Stoebling to whom the combination of the vault where said poll books are stored is known; and

WHEREAS, It appears that the said Alice Fila, otherwise known as Alice Seglie, has in the past and in the absence of the said Charles F. Stoebling been in the custom and the habit of removing said poll books from said vault, notably for the purposes of the recount in the primary election held for the office of State committeeman of Hudson county in September, 1937, and for the purposes of the recount held in Hudson county of the general election held in Hudson county on November 2, 1937; and

WHEREAS, It appears by the report of said committee and by the testimony of the said Alice Fila, otherwise known as Alice Seglie, that she has been requested and directed by the said committee to deliver to it the records in her charge and custody subpoenaed by it and that she has refused to comply with the request and the direction of the said committee; now, therefore,

Be It Resolved by the House of Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

1. That the said Alice Fila, otherwise known as Alice Seglie, be and she is hereby by this resolution directed to open the said vault and to produce before the special committee of the House of Assembly at the Essex County Court House, Newark, New Jersey, Room 301, at ten o'clock in the forenoon of Tuesday, February 1, 1938, all of the signature

copy registers of all the districts of the first ward of the city of Jersey City, and all of the poll books used in the various election districts of the various wards and municipalities in the county of Hudson at the general election held on November 2, 1937; and

2. *Be It Further Resolved*, That in case of the refusal or neglect of the said Alice Fila, otherwise known as Alice Seglie, so to open the said vaults and to produce before the said committee the signature copy registers for all the districts of the first ward of Jersey City and the poll books used in all the election districts of all the wards and municipalities of Hudson county at the general election held on the second day of November, 1937, at the time and place hereinbefore directed, that the sergeant-at-arms of the House of Assembly be and he is hereby authorized and by this resolution directed to employ such necessary assistance as in his judgment may seem proper, and thereupon to repair to the office of the Commissioner of Registration of Hudson county on the seventh floor of the Spingarn Arcade Building, 591 Summit avenue, Jersey City, and there to take into his possession on behalf of the House of Assembly and the special committee thereof all of the signature copy registers of all of the districts of the first ward of Jersey City and all of the poll books of all of the election districts of the various wards and municipalities of the county of Hudson, and deliver all of the papers so taken into his possession to the special committee of the Legislature appointed in pursuance of Assembly Resolution No. 1 at the Essex County Court House, Room 301, as soon as may be possible; and

To the Legislature:

You are undoubtedly aware that the State of New Jersey is one of the few States in which satisfactory housing legislation does not exist which would permit our municipalities to participate in the nation-wide program of Federal assistance for the development of low-rent housing and the eradication of slums. Our neighboring States of New York and Pennsylvania have enacted such legislation and pursuant thereto municipalities in these States have obtained earmarkings of funds from the United States Housing Authority. Many cities in this State have indicated to me their desire to undertake slum-clearance projects with financial assistance from the Federal Government, and await only the enactment of enabling legislation before taking the necessary steps.

Under the terms of the United States Housing Act only ten per cent (10%) of the funds appropriated by Congress can be allotted to any one State. Mr. Nathan Straus, Administrator of the United States Housing Authority, has advised me that he cannot make funds available to New Jersey in the absence of enabling legislation and I fear that unless such legislation is enacted immediately the Federal funds will be exhausted by allotments to other States.

I, therefore, strongly recommend the immediate enactment of legislation granting complete local autonomy to municipalities in housing matters and authorizing the creation of local housing authorities with full powers to undertake slum-clearance and low-rent housing projects with financial assistance from the Federal Government. Such legislation will provide the machinery whereby our cities can proceed to rid themselves of their notorious slum areas and thereby wipe out much of the disease, crime, and vice which spring from such areas. Such legislation will also have a bearing on our unemployment situation. The construction of low-rent housing projects on a large scale will give employment to many men in the building trades presently unemployed.

This matter deserves your immediate consideration.

Mr. Ferster addressed the House in commemoration of Abraham Lincoln's birthday, as follows:

Mr. Speaker and Members of the House:

It is my great privilege to eulogize the personality and achievement of the greatest representative American.

In the richness of his humanity, in the simplicity of his spirit, in the kindness of his heart, in the courage of his faith, Abraham Lincoln is the epitome of true American ideals.

Born close to the soil, he rose to majestic heights.

Born in the midst of lowly ignorance, he attained the grandeur of intellectual eminence.

Born in the midst of apparent failure and sure defeat, he surmounted every obstacle and reached the summit of trust that America had to offer.

The greatest ideal of our democracy is the value of the private individual. We do not subscribe to the doctrine that submerges and eliminates the welfare of the individual for the stability and perpetuity of the State. We instead subscribe to the doctrine that holds individual personality and individual initiative of paramount value to our existence.

We do believe in the perpetual existence of Democracy.

But we believe as strongly that such existence must be founded on the individual will, on individual initiative, and on the freest individual opportunity to pursue private objectives that coincide with the public welfare.

Illustrative of this belief and faith is the life of Abraham Lincoln.

His eminence was the consequence of a soul whose spirit strove for individual realization.

The horizon toward which he traveled was the horizon of public welfare.

Ever before him, like a beacon, were the torch of Liberty, the scales of Justice, and the clasped hands of equality, but never did Lincoln yield to the philosophy of dictatorship or regimentation. To him the individual human soul possessed the value given to it by its divine creator.

To oppress it was irreligious.

To subdue it was inhuman.

To disregard it was uncivilized.

His motto might well have been, "Free people in a free land."

There have always been and perhaps always will be two theories of government in this world.

One theory is that man must be governed from above for his own welfare and protection.

On this theory have tyrants based their right to their autocratic enterprises.

On this theory have conquerors justified the destruction of free peoples.

On this theory have dictators based their abrogation of human rights, privileges, and welfares.

The second theory is the nobler one, that from a people's own consent and free will must government arise.

This theory recognizes the sanctity of the popular will, the democratic choice, and the common run of man.

It was to this theory that Lincoln in all sincerity and with every fibre of his faith adhered.

It was he who humorously but piously remarked that, "God must love the common man because he made so many of him."

The humor of Lincoln must likewise be considered.

There are two types of humor.

One that cuts and hurts, and one that is close always to sympathy and tears.

Never did Lincoln use humor as a weapon or as an acid.

One of America's greatest humorists, he used his gift to illuminate with warm love and sympathy the foibles and shortcomings of his fellow man.

His humor was not a poison but a tonic and a corrective.

It is inspiring to remember that this warm-hearted, simple statesman who was found kneeling in prayer on the night of his election, gave us the finest example of patriotic oratory known to the English language.

As long as people will appreciate beauty of language, melody of cadence, facility of thought, and happiness of phrase, the Gettysburg address will be repeated from generation to generation.

Written on the back of an envelope while the President was on the train bound for the sacred battlefield, this address born in the fire of an earnest soul will live while bronzes and marbles succumb to time.

From generation to generation school boys with lives still ahead and hoary old men whose lives lie in the ashes of memory will thrill to the promise that "This government of the people, by the people and for the people shall not perish from the earth."

Mr. Speaker, when I have concluded, may I ask you to signal the assemblage to rise and join me in memorializing the sainted figure of American democracy, the man of lowly birth, the man of warm heart, the man apparently born to unlucky fate and joyless destiny, who yet triumphed to become America's symbol of Freedom and Humanity.

A great philosopher once said that a hero's greatest gift to posterity is the memory he leaves behind him.

Perhaps something of the grandeur of his noble soul may enter ours—so that with him we may in all sincerity repeat "With malice toward none, with charity for all, with firmness in the right as God gave us to see the right, let us continue the work we are in."

Resolved: That the governing body of the city of Clifton protest against the passage of any legislation which will take from the city of Clifton any of their rights and privileges in the Wanaque Water Shed or the old Passaic Consolidated Water distribution system on the grounds that the cost for these water plants has been born by the city of Clifton along with other municipalities and that a large portion of the debt created by the purchase has been retired by taxation upon the residents of this city and the other municipalities in the water system and further that the water rates were increased to take care of the heavy original costs with the prospects that the water rates will be decreased as the debt is retired, it is only fair that the city of Clifton be permitted to retain all of its rights and interests in the Wanaque Water Shed and in the Distribution System formerly owned by the Passaic Consolidated Water Company and now owned by the City of Clifton in conjunction with the City of Passaic and the city of Paterson, and operated by the Passaic Valley Water Commission.

That the Congress of the United States be and the same is hereby requested to favorably consider one of the many bills before it to reduce the interest rate on mortgages held by the Home Owners Loan Corporation from five per centum to three or three and one-half per centum and to extend the amortization period for said mortgages from fifteen years to twenty or twenty-five years.

2. That copies of this resolution duly authenticated be sent to the President of the United States, the Vice President of the United States, the Speaker of the House of Representatives and to the Senators and Representatives in the Congress of the United States from the State of New Jersey.

WASHINGTON

Mr Speaker and Members of the General Assembly:

Tomorrow, our nation will celebrate the birthday of George Washington, the father of his country and when we say that, it is hardly a figure of speech, for truly his relations to its birth and its youth were paternal in very fact.

With time, monuments and reputations decay and crumble. Statesmen, soldiers, authors and orators fill the stage for awhile, then gradually drop out of sight and memory. Of all the men who were prominent in the 18th century only Washington remains in the thought and reverence of the world.

Born at Wakefield in 1732, of good Virginia family, it has never been known positively where he went to school. A natural aptitude for mathematics did much to advance him.

One of the most remarkable facts about his youth is that he was trusted with difficult tasks at an early age. When less than 16 years old, he had so far qualified himself as to win a commission from Lord Fairfax to make surveys of lands in northern Virginia. Accuracy of surveys is important. Washington made no mistakes. Years afterward, a lawyer declared the only surveys on which he could depend were those of Washington. He was described as a person of "distinction" by Governor Dinwiddie when selected to carry the warning to the French on the Ohio.

His early life was one of hardship and peril, exposed to constant danger from Indians, as well as the rigors of inclement weather, but this gave him experience useful in his later career, in devising ways and means of extricating himself from difficult situations.

He was a member of the Virginia House of Burgesses and a planter. He studied farming with the same conscientious thought he gave to every endeavor, experimenting in better methods of planting and treating the soil.

When Great Britain sought to collect revenue from the Colonies through a stamp duty, Washington was quick to reflect the opposition of the Virginia Assembly. Unlike many of the large land-owners, he espoused the cause of the colonists, which he believed a battle for human rights. He was not blinded by vested interests or bound to conservative action by his wealth nor station, but was ready to give unselfishly his time and fortune.

Seeking a commander for the Colonial Army, Congress unanimously choose Washington. He was faced with the difficult task of fusing the motley individual material of mutually jealous groups into a mass of national force, able to do battle not only with disciplined armies of a great nation but with the equally relentless enemies of frost, famine and disease.

In accepting command of the army he said, "I will enter upon the momentous duty and exert every power I possess in the service and support of the glorious cause."

As a military man, Washington stands in the first rank of the great commanders. From the time he assumed charge of the New England forces at the siege of Boston, he showed his ability as a leader. Hardly any other man

has ever arisen who combined a capacity for maneuvers so brilliant as the capture of Trenton, the night march on Princeton and the sudden blow at long reach which destroyed Cornwallis, with the patience to wear out years in the weary waiting which was indispensable to the success of a small and scattered population contending with a great power.

As soon as the great object for which war had been organized and the armies raised—namely, the independence of the country—had been secured, Washington resigned his commission, thus divesting himself of the great military power which had been placed in his hands and quietly returned to private life.

By choice a country gentleman, through necessity a soldier, his deep sense of patriotic duty made him a statesman.

After the close of the war there was an absence of any real government. For several years Washington proved almost the only prop of authority and law. What the crisis was, no one knows so thoroughly or so particularly as he. It consisted in the ominous fact that the army was the only organized and central power in the country and it had deep reason for discontent and insubordination. Our country came near drifting to another revolution. The need for a stronger union between the colonies was recognized and delegates were chosen to frame a national constitution. Of them all, none was more generally revered than Washington and he was elected to preside over the formal sessions. While he took little part in the debate, his opinion was of such weight in private conferences and in committees of the whole, he contributed more than any other to cause adoption of the constitution.

The choice of men everywhere turned spontaneously to Washington for the first President of the United States; he had proved himself a leader whom all the country trusted and against whom even the most bitter opponents of the new Constitution hesitated to speak in malice or detraction.

Washington realized the authority of the President in no small part depended upon him for its efficacy and prestige: "I walk upon untrodden ground. There is scarcely an action the motive of which may not be subjected to a double interpretation. There is scarcely any part of my

conduct which cannot hereafter be drawn into precedent." He must mix prudence with firmness, conciliation with command, a reasonable accommodation with the strict execution of the law and yet not abate the new authority.

Washington's first administration gave direction and presumption of permanence to the new government. In 1792, as in 1789, the vote of the electors was unanimous in choosing him President. His second term steadied the government amid its first serious difficulties and gave the country a wholesome taste of its vigor. In spite of the urgings of his friends, he declined to allow his candidacy for a third term. Perhaps for the only time in history the interest of the people centered upon the retiring President more than upon the incoming when he relinquished the office to Adams.

We do not suppose his administration to have been unerringly perfect but the measures which he adopted, while chief magistrate, were the means of preserving our country from ruin.

Invincible in resolution, firm in conduct, incorruptible in integrity, he brought to the helm of a victorious republic the simplicity of rural life. His influence is still to be found in the traditions which belong to the presidential office. With modifications such as have come naturally through the years, the dignity and influence of the position of President rest largely upon the precedents and customs Washington wisely established.

It has been given to no other man in the history of nations, to be the repository of the destinies of his country in so many and such varied crises. Washington's breadth of intelligence, the depth of his convictions, his power to apply great thoughts and principles to everyday affairs and his singular superiority to current prejudices and illusions, were the gifts in combination which make him distinguished in any company and in any age.

While strong with his own generation, he is stronger in the judgment of the generations which have followed. He is recognized as not only the most far-sighted statesman of his time, but as having had almost prophetic vision. He built for his own day and also for the great future and pointed out the rightful solution of many of the problems which were to arise in the years to come.

I am returning herewith, without my approval, Assembly Bill No. 1.

Assembly Bill No. 1 imposes upon the gross receipts of the public utility companies therein named a franchise tax at the rate of five per cent of their gross receipts, to be apportioned to the several taxing districts in which the properties of those utility companies are located, upon valuations to be fixed by the State Tax Commissioner. These companies now are required to pay such a tax, but it is apportioned to the several taxing districts upon the value of the public utility property as ascertained by the local assessors of the respective taxing districts. Under Article IV, Section VII, paragraph 12, of the State Constitution it is provided that: "Property shall be assessed for taxes under general laws and by uniform rules, according to its true value." Manifestly, if the true value of property must be used as the basis for assessing property for taxation, the same criterion should be used in ascertaining the value of property for the apportionment of a tax.

This bill, in Section 7, provides that "the State Tax Commissioner shall * * * apportion the balance of the excise tax * * * to the various municipalities in the proportion that the *value as herein defined* * * *."

“Value” is defined in this bill in Section 2, paragraph (c), as follows:

“(c) ‘Value’ or ‘valuation’ means a value or valuation fixed at a figure determined by the State Tax Commissioner for the purpose of providing a unit of measure for a fair and equitable apportionment of the excise taxes imposed by this act, to the end that the apportionment of the taxes imposed by this act shall be fairly and equitably apportioned upon a uniform basis among the municipalities entitled thereto.

It is difficult to understand what method of valuation the State Tax Commissioner is empowered to use under this bill. Obviously, it empowers the State Tax Commissioner to use any measure of value he may choose, thereby permitting him to value public utility property without regard to the true value thereof.

I am returning herewith, without my approval, Assembly Bill No. 2.

Assembly Bill No. 2 undertakes to impose, in the same bill, a franchise tax upon certain public utility companies for the use of public streets and a gross receipts tax upon these companies in lieu of taxation of their personal property, which, in effect, would violate our State Constitu-

tion, which provides that every law shall embrace but one object and that shall be expressed in the title.

This bill is subject to the same objection as Assembly Bill No. 1, in that the State Tax Commissioner is empowered to use any measure of value he may choose in fixing the value of public utility property as the basis for the apportionment of franchise and gross receipts taxes, without regard to the true value of the property.

As pointed out in the objection to Assembly Bill No. 1, if "valuation" is to be used as the basis for the apportionment of a tax, it must be the true value of the property and not any measure of value which the State Tax Commissioner might use, as he did in 1933 and subsequent years in making an apportionment of the gross receipts taxes, which was condemned by the courts.

If the bill should become a law, the personal property of the utility companies in the respective taxing districts could be valued by the State Tax Commissioner by any illegal method of valuation he might choose for the apportionment of the tax, while all other property in the taxing district must be valued in accordance with the Constitutional requirement of true value. It would mean that many taxing districts would receive a great deal less gross receipts tax revenue than that to which they were entitled, and other taxing districts would receive a great deal more than that to which they were justly entitled.

If all of the utility property is valued, in accordance with the Constitution, at its true value, and that used as a basis for the apportionment of the franchise taxes and the gross receipts taxes, all taxing districts would receive their fair and just proportion of the tax.

Under the Gross Receipts Tax Act of 1919 the State Tax Commissioner has the right to revise and equalize, in accordance with the true value of the property, the valuation of the public utility property in the respective taxing districts, as certified to him by the local assessors. By this bill, Assembly Bill No. 2, he is empowered to destroy this uniformity in determining the true value of the property in the respective taxing districts.

Assembly Bill No. 3 increases the State school tax from 2.75 mills to 2.90 mills on each dollar of valuation of the taxable real and personal property in the State, as exhibited by the last abstract of ratables of the several counties.

If Assembly Bill No. 2 becomes law, it will take certain public utility property out of the ratables for the imposition of the State school tax, and thus deprive the free public schools of this State of a large sum of money now used for their maintenance and support. This bill attempts to make up for this loss by increasing the State school tax rate upon individual taxpayers. This is no time to increase the unbearable tax burden carried by any individual taxpayer of this State.

I respectfully refer you to the fact that a most commendable bill has been introduced in the Senate, providing for the appointment of a committee to study our entire taxing situation. I suggest that it might be the part of wisdom to await the result of this survey, so that the whole system may be made the subject of legislation.

I am returning herewith, without my approval, Assembly Bill No. 1.

Assembly Bill No. 1 imposes upon the gross receipts of the public utility companies therein named a franchise tax at the rate of five per cent of their gross receipts, to be apportioned to the several taxing districts in which the properties of those utility companies are located, upon

valuations to be fixed by the State Tax Commissioner. These companies now are required to pay such a tax, but it is apportioned to the several taxing districts upon the value of the public utility property as ascertained by the local assessors of the respective taxing districts. Under Article IV, Section VII, paragraph 12, of the State Constitution it is provided that: "Property shall be assessed for taxes under general laws and by uniform rules, according to its true value." Manifestly, if the true value of property must be used as the basis for assessing property for taxation, the same criterion should be used in ascertaining the value of property for the apportionment of a tax.

This bill, in Section 7, provides that "the State Tax Commissioner shall * * *, apportion the balance of the excise tax * * * to the various municipalities in the proportion that the *value as herein defined* * * *."

"Value" is defined in this bill in Section 2, paragraph (c), as follows:

"(c) 'Value' or 'valuation' means a value or valuation fixed at a figure determined by the State Tax Commissioner for the purpose of providing a unit of measure for a fair and equitable apportionment of the excise taxes imposed by this act, to the end that the apportionment of the taxes imposed by this act shall be fairly and equitably apportioned upon a uniform basis among the municipalities entitled thereto.

It is difficult to understand what method of valuation the State Tax Commissioner is empowered to use under this bill. Obviously, it empowers the State Tax Commissioner to use any measure of value he may choose, thereby permitting him to value public utility property without regard to the true value thereof.

The bill is therefore disapproved.

I am returning herewith, without my approval, Assembly Bill No. 2.

Assembly Bill No. 2 undertakes to impose, in the same bill, a franchise tax upon certain public utility companies for the use of public streets and a gross receipts tax upon these companies in lieu of taxation of their personal property, which, in effect, would violate our State Constitution, which provides that every law shall embrace but one object and that shall be expressed in the title.

This bill is subject to the same objection as Assembly Bill No. 1, in that the State Tax Commissioner is empowered to use any measure of value he may choose in fixing the value of public utility property as the basis for the apportionment of franchise and gross receipts taxes, without regard to the true value of the property.

As pointed out in the objection to Assembly Bill No. 1, if "valuation" is to be used as the basis for the apportionment of a tax, it must be the true value of the property and not any measure of value which the State Tax Commissioner might use, as he did in 1933 and subsequent years in making an apportionment of the gross receipts taxes, which was condemned by the courts.

If the bill should become a law, the personal property of the utility companies in the respective taxing districts could be valued by the State Tax Commissioner by any illegal method of valuation he might choose for the apportionment of the tax, while all other property in the taxing district must be valued in accordance with the Constitutional requirement of true value. It would mean that many taxing districts would receive a great deal less gross receipts tax revenue than that to which they were entitled, and other taxing districts would receive a great deal more than that to which they were justly entitled.

If all of the utility property is valued, in accordance with the Constitution, at its true value, and that used as a basis for the apportionment of the franchise taxes and the gross receipts taxes, all taxing districts would receive their fair and just proportion of the tax.

Under the Gross Receipts Tax Act of 1919 the State Tax Commissioner has the right to revise and equalize, in accordance with the true value of the property, the valuation of the public utility property in the respective taxing districts, as certified to him by the local assessors. By this bill, Assembly Bill No. 2, he is empowered to destroy this uniformity in determining the true value of the property in the respective taxing districts.

The bill is therefor disapproved.

I return herewith, without my approval, Assembly Bill No. 3.

Assembly Bill No. 3 increases the State school tax from 2.75 mills to 2.90 mills on each dollar of valuation of the taxable real and personal property in the State, as exhibited by the last abstract of ratables of the several counties.

If Assembly Bill No. 2 becomes law, it will take certain public utility property out of the ratables for the imposition of the State school tax, and thus deprive the free public schools of this State of a large sum of money now used for their maintenance and support. This bill attempts to make up for this loss by increasing the State school tax rate upon individual taxpayers. This is no time to increase the unbearable tax burden carried by any individual taxpayer of this State.

I respectfully refer you to the fact that a most commendable bill has been introduced in the Senate, providing for the appointment of a committee to study our entire taxing situation. I suggest that it might be the part of wisdom to await the result of this survey, so that the whole system may be made the subject of legislation.

Be It Further Resolved, That copies of this resolution, signed by the President of the Senate, attested by the Secretary, be forwarded to the President of the United States, the Senators from New Jersey and the members of the House of Representatives from New Jersey.

WHEREAS, A well balanced program of sound and equitable taxation is essential to the continuance of our system of State Government; and

WHEREAS, The property tax delinquency in our State today as evidenced by statistical data compiled by State tax authorities during the past decade furnishes abundant proof of a basic deficiency in our present system of taxation; and

WHEREAS, The future welfare of our people under the circumstances clearly demands a comprehensive and intelligent study of the State's tax needs on a long range basis including a review of existing statute law of the State with a view to a complete revision of said law to meet existing needs; now, therefore,

Be It Resolved by the Senate and General and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

1. There is hereby created a commission which shall consist of State Auditor, State Tax Commissioner, President of the State Board of Tax Appeals, Commissioner of Finance, State Treasurer, Commissioner of Education, one member to be appointed by the executive board of the New Jersey State League of Municipalities to be designated by said board, nine members to be appointed as follows:

Three members of the Senate to be appointed by the President thereof.

Three members of the Assembly to be appointed by the Speaker thereof.

Three members to be appointed by the Governor.

All members shall serve without compensation.

2. This commission shall organize as soon as may be after the members' appointment upon the call of the Governor and shall elect a chairman, vice-chairman and secretary from its members.

3. The commission shall be charged with the duty of inquiring into the subject of taxation and tax proposals generally and making a complete study of all laws relating to the assessment and collection of taxes within this State (including the tax sale revision of one thousand nine hundred and eighteen found in Title 54 of the Revised Statutes under the caption "Taxation") and of determining in what respects existing tax laws of the State may most effectively be simplified, modified, rearranged, consolidated, restated and revised to insure greater efficiency in the assessment and collection of all taxes with a resulting diminution of the ever-increasing annual accumulations in municipal liens and charges.

4. It shall familiarize itself with the functioning of all the laws relating to taxes within this State so that it may be in a better position to determine what changes, if any, may be advantageous to the people.

5. The said commission is authorized to hold hearings, call witnesses to draft necessary legal and clerical assistance from the offices of the Attorney-General of the State of New Jersey and other State departments as may be required. It shall also have authority to engage such competent counsel and expert advisors on the subject of taxation as it may deem necessary to the proper accomplishment of the purpose of this resolution; *provided*, that the compensation to be paid such counsel or advisors shall at all times be within the limits of the appropriation hereby made.

6. The commission is directed and authorized to report to any regular or special session of the Legislature of one thousand nine hundred and thirty-eight or one thousand nine hundred and thirty-nine and to cause to be introduced such bill or bills as in its judgment may be required for the proper carrying out of its objects.

7. For the purpose of carrying into effect this joint resolution there is hereby appropriated the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.00) or so much thereof as may be necessary.

8. This resolution shall take effect immediately.

To the Legislature:

I desire to call your attention to two bills pending in the Congress of the United States which seem to infringe upon the rights of the State of New Jersey to an extent which, it seems to me, would justify the Legislature in calling these matters to the attention of the Senators and Representatives from this State.

The first is S-3255, a bill to amend the Securities Exchange Commission statute by giving that Commission power which it does not now have in regulating transactions in bonds of States or political subdivisions thereof. Even though this bill does not attempt directly to regulate the issue of such bonds, which would be clearly invalid, yet any Federal regulation of subsequent transactions in such bonds would interfere with the free market for them, and would thereby, to an appreciable extent, adversely affect the issuing price, and would particularly interfere with municipal refunding operations.

The other bill is the Federal Licensing Bill, S-3072, which would require all corporations to secure a Federal license before they could engage in interstate commerce, and, as a condition of procuring such Federal license, impose regulations affecting the action of the corporation in matters that are not interstate, and are, therefore, not within the power of Congress to regulate.

Both of these bills, in the respects above mentioned, represent an unjustifiable intrusion of Federal authority in matters strictly State concern, and should be opposed by the State government if we are to retain as a feature of our Constitution the sovereignty of the States in their local spheres.

I, therefore, recommend that you call the attention of the Senators and Representatives from New Jersey to this matter, by passing immediately a joint resolution embodying your opinion.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT

Members of the Senate and General Assembly shall be elected every second year beginning with the year one

thousand nine hundred and forty-one, on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November; and the two houses shall meet separately in regular session on the second Tuesday in January next after the said day of election, at which time of meeting the legislative year shall commence; and at other times the two houses may meet separately in special session upon the joint call of the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the General Assembly, for the purpose of acting upon only such matters as are designated in the call.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT

1. Amend paragraphs one and two of section two of Article IV, to read as follows:

The Senate shall be composed of one senator from each county in the State, elected by the legal voters of the counties, respectively, for four years; *provided, however*, the terms of senators to be elected on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November of one thousand nine hundred and forty-one shall hold their said offices for four years from the commencement of their terms. All subsequent elections for members of the Senate shall be for terms of four years each. If vacancies happen, by resignation or otherwise, the persons elected to supply such vacancies shall be elected for the unexpired term only.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT

1. Amend paragraph one, section three, Article IV of the Constitution of the State of New Jersey, to read as follows:

The General Assembly shall be composed of members biennially elected by the legal voters of the counties, respectively, who shall be apportioned among the said counties as nearly as may be according to the number of their inhabitants. The present apportionment shall continue until the next census of the United States shall have been taken, and an apportionment of members of the General Assembly shall be made by the Legislature at its first session after the next and every subsequent enumeration or census, and when made shall remain unaltered until another enumeration shall have been taken; *provided*, that each county shall at all times be entitled to one member; and the whole number of members shall never exceed sixty.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT

1. Strike out paragraph seven of section four of Article IV and insert in lieu thereof a new paragraph which shall read as follows:

7. Members of the Senate shall receive annually the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) during the time for which they shall have been elected, and while they shall hold their said offices. Members of the General Assembly shall receive annually the sum of fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500.00) during the time for which they shall have been elected, and while they shall hold their said offices. Members of the Senate and General Assembly shall receive no other allowance or emolument, directly or indirectly, for any purpose whatever.

(2) A writing such as is described in Subsection (1), paragraph (i), signed by the trustee, and given in or pursuant to such a transaction, is designated in this act as a "trust receipt". No further formality of execution or authentication shall be necessary to the validity of a trust receipt.

(3) A transaction shall not be deemed a trust receipt transaction unless the possession of the trustee thereunder is for a purpose substantially equivalent to any one of the following:

(a) in the case of goods, documents or instruments, for the purpose of selling or exchanging them, or of procuring their sale or exchange; or

(b) in the case of goods or documents, for the purpose of manufacturing or processing the goods delivered or covered by the documents, with the purpose of ultimate sale, or for the purpose of loading, unloading, storing, shipping, transshipping or otherwise dealing with them in the manner preliminary to or necessary to their sale; or

It shall be lawful to hold, carry on, and operate in this State race meetings whereat the trotting, running or steeplechase racing of horses only may be conducted between the hours of sunrise and sunset on week-days only and in duly legalized race tracks, at which the pari-mutuel system of betting shall be permitted. No lottery, roulette, or game of chance of any form shall be authorized by the Legislature in this State, and no ticket in any lottery shall be bought or sold within this State, or offered for sale; nor shall pool-selling, book-making (or gambling of any kind be authorized or allowed within this State, except pari-mutual betting on the results of the racing of horses only, from which the State shall derive a reasonable revenue for the support of government; nor shall any gambling device, practice, or game of chance, or pari-mutuel betting thereon now prohibited by law, except as herein stated and otherwise provided, be legalized, or the remedy, penalty, or punishment now provided therefor be in any way diminished.

Submission to two successive Legislatures; publication; ratification at special election.—Any specific amendment or amendments to the Constitution may be proposed in the Senate or General Assembly, and if the same shall be agreed to by a majority of the members elected to each of the two houses, such proposed amendment or amendments shall be entered on their journals, with the yeas and nays taken thereon, and referred to the Legislature then next to be chosen, and shall be published for three months previous to making such choice, in at least one newspaper of each county, if any be published therein; and if in the Legislature next chosen, as aforesaid, such proposed amendment or amendments, or any of them, shall be agreed to by a majority of all the members elected to each house, then it shall be the duty of the Legislature to submit such proposed amendment or amendments, or such of them as may have been agreed to as aforesaid by the two Legislatures, to the people, in such manner and at such time, at least four months after the adjournment of the Legislature, as the Legislature shall prescribe; and if the people at a special election to be held for that purpose only, shall approve and ratify such amendment or amendments, or any of them by a majority of the electors qualified to vote for members of the Legislature voting thereon, such amendment or amendments so approved and ratified shall become part of the Constitution; *provided*, that if more than one amendment be submitted, they shall be submitted in such manner and form that the people may vote for or against each amendment separately and distinctly.

MY DEAR MR. SPEAKER:

In connection with my assignment as Chairman of the Fiscal Control Committee of the Assembly, I contacted the State Auditor, Walter R. Darby, concerning the status of the financial audits of our State departments and our municipalities.

The record of the audits of State departments for the period July 1, 1933 to January 1, 1938, shows that owing to lack of sufficient help, the auditing of State accounts has been confined almost exclusively to the auditing of revenues, whereas it should include in its scope an adequate post audit of the transactions of the State Comptroller, State Treasurer and all State departments.

The status in respect to audits made of municipalities is much better than it is with respect to the auditing of State accounts. However, the State Auditor has not enough help to properly perform his municipal work.

The problem could be largely solved if we could separate the office of State Auditor from that of Commissioner of Municipal Accounts. This was recommended by the State Finance Commissioner and by others and if Mr. Darby could be given the time to properly check the financial affairs of municipal governments there would result a vast improvement in the financial condition of these municipalities.

A summary of the status of the audit of State Departments by the State Auditor shows as follows: Number of departments whose records have not been audited beyond June 30, 1934, 28; beyond 1935, 9; beyond 1936, 11; beyond 1937, 5.

Many audits have been only partial and some departments have had no check upon them at all.

Being convinced that a separation of the duties of State Auditor from those which pertain to municipal government is urgent in order that both State and municipal accounts may be checked in proper detail, I am reporting out of committee Assembly Bill No. 244 which was introduced by me on February 14, 1938, and which I believe is the simple solution to the problem of securing an adequate supervision from an auditing standpoint of State departments and municipal governments.

MY DEAR MR. WOOD:

I have your letter of this date in which you present for my consideration several questions which have arisen in the minds of the Trustees of your Fund, respecting the proposed payment in 1942 of the sum certified by your Fund to be due from the State during the present year.

The matter, as you know, was fully discussed at a meeting with members of the Legislature and the Board of Trustees held in the State Treasurer's Office on the 22d instant, at which I was present.

The proposed bill (which has passed the Senate) provides for such payment in 1942, out of moneys which will

then be free, derived from the sale of \$7,000,000 of bonds to pay teachers' salaries and current expenses.

The questions which you have asked, it seems to me are practical ones after the legal aspect has been disposed of.

In my opinion, if the bill is enacted into a law your Board may treat the sum required to be paid by such law as a valid and existing asset of the fund. The matter of the payment of pensions, both present and future, is a practical one. Certainly out of the assets now in control of the fund payments can be made to all of those entitled to pensions, and any depletion in any reserve or fund of your Board occurring in the interval between now and 1942 can be replenished by moneys derived in that year under the act in question. I know of no more solemn obligation by which a promise to pay in the future could be made by the Legislature than is contained in the proposed bill. The holders of bonds of the State have nothing but the faith and pledge of the State to their payment, for it must be borne in mind that no suit will lie as against the State, and that money cannot be withdrawn from the treasury of the State except for appropriations made by law. If, therefore, a contract in fact existed between the State and an individual or corporation, and the Legislature declined to appropriate the money necessary to carry out the terms of the contract, such contract could not be enforced. Such is the opinion of the Supreme Court in the case of *Washington Association of New Jersey vs. Middleton, State Treasurer*, 165 Atl. 165, for no mandamus would lie to compel the State Treasurer to pay the money when there was no warrant in law for such payment.

I therefore advise you to treat the matter from a practical standpoint, continue to make payment of pensions to all members of the fund entitled thereto, and treat the act of the Legislature, when enacted into a law, as a solemn promise of the sovereign state to make payment as in said act provided. When you have done this, I am sure that the officers of your Board will find no difficulty in executing the provisions of your law.

B. Any corporation organized by a group or association of employers, which corporation employs one or more regularly licensed physicians and surgeons of this State, on a part-time or a full-time basis for any period of time and for a salary, fee or other remuneration, for the purpose of examining and/or treating employees of any one of such group or association of employers, to whom any one of such group or association of employers is or may become liable under the Wrkmen's Compensation Act (Chapter 15 or Title 34 of the Revised Statutes); or for the purpose of examining and-or treating employees of any one of such group or association or employers to whom any one of such group or association of employers is or may become liable under any law, statute or regulation of this State or of the United States; or for the purpose of examining applicants for employment by any one of such group or association of employers.

C. Any incorporated educational institution which employs one or more regularly licensed physicians and surgeons of this State on a part-time or a full-time basis for any period of time and for a salary, fee, or other remunera-

tion, for the purpose of examining and/or treating pupils in attendance at or seeking admission to such educational institution.

D. Any regularly licensed physician and surgeon of this State who is or shall be employed by or associated with any corporation in accordance with the provisions contained in paragraphs A, B and C of this section, but nothing herein contained shall exempt such physician and surgeon from the operation of the provisions contained in clauses (a), (b), (c), (d), (e), (g), (h), (i) and (j) of section 45:9-16 of this Title.

The board, or any member thereof, or its inspector, shall have access at any reasonable time or times, to the place or places where any corporation or physician or surgeon acting under the exemptions contained in this section, shall conduct such practice, in order to observe the conduct of such practice and the persons there treated.

Dear Sir:

I have received from the House of Assembly a resolution in the following form:

“Resolved, That the Attorney-General of the State of New Jersey be directed to furnish an opinion to the General Assembly interpreting section nine of the Constitution of the State of New Jersey, having particular reference to the effect of the provisions reading that ‘no amendment or amendments shall be submitted to the people by the Legislature oftener than once in five years.’”

Our Constitution, Article IX, reads as follows:

“Any specific amendment or amendments to the Constitution may be proposed in the Senate or General Assembly, and if the same shall be agreed to by a majority of the members elected to each of the two houses, such proposed amendment or amendments shall be entered on their journals, with the yeas and nays taken thereon, and referred to the Legislature then next to be chosen, and shall be published for three months previous to making such choice, in at least one newspaper of each county, if any be published therein; and if in the Legislature next chosen, as aforesaid, such proposed amendment or amendments, or any of them, shall be agreed to by a majority of all the members elected to each House, then it shall be the duty of the Legislature to submit such proposed amendment or amendments, or such of them as may have been agreed to as aforesaid by the two Legislatures, to the people, in such manner and at such time, at least four months after the adjournment of the Legislature, as the Legislature shall prescribe; and if the people at a special election to be held for that purpose only, shall approve and ratify such amendment or amendments, or any of them by a majority of the electors qualified to vote for members of the Legislature voting thereon, such amendment or amendments so approved and ratified shall become part of the Constitution; *provided*, that if more than one amendment be submitted, they shall be submitted in such manner and form that the people may vote for, or against each amendment separately and distinctly; but no amendment or amendments shall be submitted to the people by the Legislature oftener than once in five years.”

The clause to be considered is the last one in the Article and reads as follows:

“But no amendment or amendments shall be submitted to the people by the Legislature oftener than once in five years.”

The question to be determined is whether a period of five years must intervene between amendments. If the clause is all inclusive and applies to all amendments, then such interval must elapse. If, however, it refers to an amendment or amendments submitted, then other amendments not so submitted may be submitted oftener than once in five years.

In determining this matter the whole of the provision of the Article must be considered. The opening clause of the Article speaks of any specific amendment or amendments, and the last clause must be read in connection with these words, and as so read the meaning of the Article becomes clear.

Where there is no ambiguity in the language employed in either a statute or a constitutional provision there is no room for construction. *State vs. Wrightson*, 56 N. J. Law, at page 208.

I realize that for nearly one hundred years since the adoption of the Constitution of 1844, the constitutional clause in question has been assumed to prohibit the submission of amendments of any kind oftener than once in five years. To some this may seem to be a practical exposition of the matter, but I entertain a different view. It is true, and I have often seen it stated in the press, that amendments to the Constitution could not be offered except at intervals of five years, but I have not been able to find, nor has my attention been called to the fact, that the clause in question has ever been considered by the courts or by the members of the bar. At most there has been nothing but a mere statement of conclusion of law, and this, too, apparently without a careful examination of the clause in question. Having reached the conclusion that no ambiguity exists in the clause in question, I am bound to give it that construction which the words employed will bear. To me, reading the entire Article together leaves no room for doubt.

I am aware that the late Attorney-General Edmund Wilson, in an opinion to Hon. Emerson Richards, then a member of the House of Assembly, under date of February 5, 1913, in discussing the question whether a constitutional convention to amend the Constitution could be called in accordance with the terms of a legislative act, stated that "by Article 9 it is provided that the same amendment shall not be proposed oftener than once in five years."

I have examined the Minutes of the Constitutional Convention of 1844, and also the report of the proceedings of that convention as contained in the Newark Daily Advertiser, but glean nothing from them which I think would be helpful in the solution of the question propounded. The

Minutes disclose that the provision for the future amendment of the Constitution when first proposed did not contain the clause which we are considering, but that that clause was later added, and the whole amendment as it now appears approved by the delegates. It is not to be observed that the clause commences with the word "but," and is so used as synonymous with the word "except," and was so used to limit and restrain what had been said before in the article. It is in the nature of a proviso, the office of which is to restrain what precedes.

An examination of our Constitution will show that the word "but" is used in the same sense in many of its provisions. I will, however, only take the time to burden this opinion with two excerpts from the Bill of Rights.

Paragraph 7 reads: "The right of trial by jury shall remain inviolate; but the Legislature may authorize the trial of civil suits, when a matter in dispute does not exceed fifty dollars, by a jury of six men."

Paragraph 16 reads: "Private property shall not be taken for public use without just compensation; but land may be taken for public highways as heretofore until the Legislature shall direct compensation to be made."

A similar matter was fully considered by the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania in *Commonwealth vs. Lawrence*, reported in 193 *Atlantic Reporter*, at page 46. The provisions of the Constitution of Pennsylvania are similar to the provisions in the Article of our Constitution. The last clause in the Pennsylvania Constitution is identical with the last clause in our Constitution under consideration. In this case the court treats the last clause as in the nature of a proviso and says:

"The proviso does not pertain to any possible unrelated amendments that might be offered at a future time to other articles. It is limited to an amendment that has been submitted to the people and voted on. Evidencing this thought, the proviso begins with 'but' and is separated from the rest of the sentence only by a semicolon. It is not a new sentence, but is part of what precedes it and is linked with it in meaning, the entire sentence carrying through a single thought. Thus understood it means that after a particular amendment, or amendments, has been once submitted another like amendment, or one similar in substance, to the

same article cannot be proposed or submitted within five years. The word 'oftener' substantiates this conclusion. It is sometimes defined as 'more frequently,' and implies repetition, i. e., repetition of the same amendment or subject-matter. The words 'than once' following 'oftener' show that the only reference intended by the proviso is to an amendment, the substance of which has already been submitted 'once.' It prohibits the 'submission' of such an amendment 'oftener' than once in five years. The only logical explanation of this manner of drafting article 18 is that the electors intended to permit the submission of amendments as frequently as they properly passed through the prescribed steps with the sole prohibition that after an amendment had been once submitted, it or one substantially related could not again be submitted until a period of five years has elapsed."

The Pennsylvania case quotes from an earlier decision in Long vs. School District of Cheltenham Township, 36 Montg. Co. Law Reporter, 253, at page 258, where the court said:

"As we view it, the language of the article is clear in meaning and entirely free from doubt or ambiguity. * * * The clause 'but no amendment * * * shall be submitted oftener than once in five years' * * * clearly refers to such as has already been submitted and rejected in light of the language used * * * it refers to an amendment that has been submitted before and rejected and not to one that was never before submitted."

I have no doubt of the soundness of the view expressed in the Pennsylvania case. It comports with my reading of the Article of our own Constitution.

I therefore advise you that if an amendment or amendments to the Constitution have once been submitted to the people, the same amendment or amendments may not again be submitted to the people until the lapse of five years has occurred from the time of submission, and that the provision of the Constitution in question has no relation whatever to an amendment or amendments of the Constitution not so submitted to the people.

In re: Records and the like, Commission on Revision and Consolidation of the Public Statutes.

GENTLEMEN.—In the report of the Commission on Revision and Consolidation of the Public Statutes supplemental to the letter of transmittal accompanying the final draft of the proposed revision, which was sent to the Legislature with the draft and which resulted in the adoption of Chapter 188 of the Laws of 1937, approved December 20, 1937, which adopted the Revised Statutes, a copy of which report is herewith sent to you, the Commission directed attention in paragraph 10 to the fact that it believed that “a permanent commission of some type should be established, upon which in some form or another there should be legislative representation * * *.” And in paragraph 14 the Commissioners stated that “as individuals” they believed that “they have completed the task which was assigned to them.”

When the revision came up for action by the Legislature all concerned agreed that the matter of any permanent set-up should not be considered by the Legislature then in existence but that it should be left for the present Legislature. The Commission was continued by appropriate legislation for the purpose of completing the index and also to render such service to the Legislature as it might be called upon to render and an appropriation was made to it for that purpose. The work on the index has been proceeding and I am advised by the technical staff that it will be completed as contemplated and within the appropriation. In the meantime the Commission has also rendered such assistance as it could with respect to current legislation as it might affect the Revised Statutes and has dealt with questions arising under the Revised Statutes propounded by legislators, members of the bar and others, and it has also drafted bills correcting errors which have manifested themselves in the Revised Statutes, the possibility of the existence of which it pointed out in its report above mentioned, paragraphs 7 and 9. The members of the Commission have conceived that the matter of any permanent com-

mission is one strictly for the Legislature and have not, therefore, in any respect attempted to inject themselves into the situation.

A matter has been brought to my attention now which is the reason for this communication. Mr. McIntosh points out that when the index shall have been completed the Legislature undoubtedly will not be in session. There are in the possession of the Commission at its office in Trenton most valuable records representing intensive investigation of the statute law of the State over a period of upwards of ten years. The records also indicate the views taken by the Commission with respect to existing legislation, that is to say, what statute law actually was in effect, its construction and the like, which are the bases for the language used in the Revised Statutes. These records are of great importance and should be held intact and subject to use by those who would be benefitted by the use. During the past three months during which the Revised Statutes have been in effect, many questions which have been raised have been solved without difficulty by reference to this material. It is of such nature as that, unless steps are taken to preserve it, it will be dissipated. You all know what happens when files of this nature are considered as dead files. When the Commission shall have finished with the index there will be no one to take charge of these files and this material. The Commission will be obliged to close its office and, in my judgment, unless some arrangements are made this will mean the destruction of the material as a working plant.

four months after the adjournment of the Legislature, as the Legislature shall prescribe; and if the people at a special election to be held for that purpose only, shall approve and ratify such amendment or amendments, or any of them by a majority of the electors qualified to vote for members of the Legislature voting thereon, such amendment or amendments so approved and ratified shall become part of the Constitution; *provided*, that if more than one amendment be submitted, they shall be submitted in such manner and form that the people may vote for or against each amendment separately and distinctly.

Members of the Senate and General Assembly shall be elected every second year beginning with the year one thousand nine hundred and forty-one, on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November; and the two houses shall meet separately in regular session on the second Tuesday in January next after the said day of election, at which time of meeting the legislative year shall commence; and at other times the two houses may meet separately in special session upon the joint call of the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the General Assembly, for the purpose of acting upon only such matters as are designated in the call.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT

1. Amend paragraphs one and two of section two of Article IV, to read as follows:

The Senate shall be composed of one senator from each county in the State, elected by the legal voters of the counties, respectively, for four years; *provided, however*, the terms of senators to be elected on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November of one thousand nine hundred and forty-one shall hold their said offices for four years from the commencement of their terms. All subsequent elections for members of the Senate shall be for terms of four years each. If vacancies happen, by resignation or otherwise, the persons elected to supply such vacancies shall be elected for the unexpired term only.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT

1. Amend paragraph one, section three, Article IV of the Constitution of the State of New Jersey, to read as follows:

The General Assembly shall be composed of members biennially elected by the legal voters of the counties, respectively, who shall be apportioned among the said counties as nearly as may be according to the number of their inhabitants. The present apportionment shall continue until the next census of the United States shall have been taken, and an apportionment of members of the General Assembly shall be made by the Legislature at its first session after the next and every subsequent enumeration or census, and when made shall remain unaltered until another enumeration shall have been taken; *provided*, that each county shall at all times be entitled to one member; and the whole number of members shall never exceed sixty.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT

1. Strike out paragraph seven of section four of Article IV and insert in lieu thereof a new paragraph which shall read as follows:

7. Members of the Senate shall receive annually the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) during the time for which they shall have been elected, and while they shall hold their said offices. Members of the General Assembly shall receive annually the sum of fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500.00) during the time for which they shall have been elected, and while they shall hold their said offices. Members of the Senate and General Assembly shall receive no other allowance or emolument, directly or indirectly, for any purpose whatever.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT

Amend paragraph two of section seven of Article IV of the State Constitution by striking out said paragraph two and inserting in lieu thereof a new paragraph to be known as “paragraph two of section seven of Article IV of the State Constitution,” which shall read as follows:

It shall be lawful to hold, carry on, and operate in this State race meetings whereat the trotting, running or steeplechase racing of horses only may be conducted between the hours of sunrise and sunset on week-days only and in duly legalized race tracks, at which the pari-mutuel system of betting shall be permitted. No lottery, roulette, or game of chance of any form shall be authorized by the Legislature in this State, and no ticket in any lottery shall be bought or sold within this State, or offered for sale; nor

shall pool-selling, book-making, or gambling of any kind be authorized or allowed within this State, except pari-mutuel betting on the results of the racing of horses only, from which the State shall derive a reasonable revenue for the support of government; nor shall any gambling device, practice, or game of change, or pari-mutuel betting thereon now prohibited by law, except as herein stated and otherwise provided, be legalized, or the remedy, penalty, or punishment now provided therefor be in any way diminished.

To the House of Assembly:

I return herewith, without my approval, Assembly Bill No. 601.

The Board of Trustees of the State Employees' Retirement System advises me that this bill will compel the payment to one individual of fourteen thousand dollars (\$14,000.00), against which no reserves are now set up. However, there are others or their heirs who would benefit under the provisions of the bill.

The enactment of this bill into law would undoubtedly establish a very dangerous precedent, in that it will mandatorily require payments from the State Employees' Retirement Fund which have been carefully guarded against in the original set-up of the system, and also on the recommendations of their actuaries on their annual inspection of the financial condition of the fund.

If this precedent is established there is immediately before the consideration of the board the payment of another lump sum amounting to twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000.00), and there will undoubtedly be many other cases of a similar character.

I desire to call attention to the fact that if bills such as this, making mandatory large payments to individuals, are enacted into law, then the time will soon approach when the

fund will no longer be actuarially sound. In the interest of the many State employees who are paying into the fund, it is unfair to them to single out by legislative enactment any individual to receive greater payments or special privileges than those enjoyed by the membership as a whole.

Co-operation with the Board of Trustees would, no doubt, work out a satisfactory adjustment of the matter without imperiling the funds of the State Employees' Retirement System, and without imposing an added and unnecessary burden upon the State.

This bill increases the salaries of judges of the courts of common pleas in certain counties two thousand dollars per year.

Oftentimes, when the tax rate goes up, local officials claim that the increase is due to mandatory legislation over which they have no control. This is mandatory legislation.

If the judges of the courts of common pleas are entitled to this increase, why not give the freeholders of the counties the power to make such increase, and thus fix the responsibility where the people of the county, who pay the bill, may take due notice thereof?

At this time, when every municipality is put to it to raise money for relief, I am sure that this bill will meet with scant approval.

Such special election shall be held at the time and place so appointed and shall be conducted by the Board of Registry and Election of the Township of South Hackensack which conducted the general election next preceding the holding of such election in said township, and shall be by ballot. The registry of voters used at the last general election in said township shall be used at said special election, and the said Board of Registry and Election shall meet one week next preceding the day fixed for said special election at the place where the same is to be held from one o'clock P. M. to nine o'clock P. M., for the purpose of revising and correcting the registry lists in the manner provided under the general election laws of this State. The clerk of the Township of South Hackensack shall give public notice of such meeting of said Board of Registry and Election at the time and in the manner hereinbefore provided for the giving of the notice of the time and place of holding of said special election, and shall provide a suitable place for the holding of said special election and the necessary ballots for the electors voting thereat, upon which ballot shall be printed the proposition to be submitted to the voters, with instructions in the following form:

If you favor the proposition printed below, mark an X mark in the square to the left of and opposite the word "Yes"; if you are opposed thereto, make an X mark in the square to the left of and opposite the word "No."

If the voter makes an X mark in black ink or black pencil in the square to the left of and opposite the word "Yes," it shall be counted as a vote in favor of such proposition.

If the voter makes an X mark in black ink or pencil in the square to the left of and opposite the word "No," it shall be counted as a vote against such proposition; and in case no mark shall be made in the square to the left of and opposite the word "Yes" or "No," it shall not be counted as a vote for or against such proposition.

The officers holding said election shall, within two days after such election, make a return in duplicate of the result

of such election by statements in writing and under their hands; one of which certificates or returns shall be filed forthwith with the clerk of the Township of South Hackensack and entered in full upon the minutes of the Township Committee of the Township of South Hackensack, and one of which certificates or returns shall be filed forthwith with the clerk of the County of Bergen.

In 1934, during my previous term as Governor, I submitted a Special Message to the Legislature, dated February 26, 1934, in which I outlined the necessity for additional water supplies for the North Jersey metropolitan district to meet the ever-increasing demands for additional water. In that Message I outlined a plan of ultimately placing the various major water supplies in the North Jersey district in charge of a Water Authority with duties and powers similar to those of the Port of New York Authority. Such a plan is, I believe, the only one that offers a thoroughly complete and workable set-up to administer our metropolitan water supplies.

The question of additional water supply is one that always seems to excite controversial discussion whenever it is raised. This should not be. The various divergent interests which participate in these controversies should join in giving this matter mature deliberation, so that it may be solved permanently and fairly to all parties concerned and for the common good.

The need for ample water supplies for the fast-growing metropolitan section cannot be reasonably disputed, and it is imperative that water supplies be prepared well in advance to meet the growing needs. If we err, it should be on the side of safety, even to the extent of providing a surplus. I cannot conceive of any greater catastrophe that could befall our metropolitan district than to suddenly, in a dry year, find itself insufficiently supplied with this all-important and health-giving commodity.

During my previous terms as Governor I have rigidly adhered to the policy that water supplies, like any other public utility, should be paid for by those who are benefited by their development, and that no part of the cost of development should be laid upon the taxpayers of the State who are not benefited thereby. I have also, from time to time, stated that I do not believe in drawing any water supplies from the lake regions in our northwestern counties. These lake developments are a capital asset of our

State and are fast increasing in value and importance. We can find streams from which to draw our water supplies without jeopardizing or injuring these important resources. With these thoughts in mind; I make the following suggestions and recommendations:

The Legislature, at the Session of 1934, passed a law, (Chapter 139), which was approved on May 3, 1934, taking title to the Delaware and Raritan Canal and its feeder, also all appurtenances thereto and works and improvements erected thereon, and stated that the title to these was to be vested in the State of New Jersey and thereafter used and disposed of as the Legislature might deem proper. Later in that Session the Legislature passed an amendment to this act, (Chapter 238), approved June 11, 1934, in which the operation of the canal was turned over to the Department of Conservation and Development, with instructions that it keep the same in repair until the Legislature shall have further directed the use and disposition of said canal and feeder. Under this act and the amendments thereto the State of New Jersey has come into the possession of not only a valuable water course, capable of carrying water from the Delaware River across the State of New Jersey to the metropolitan areas, but also the right to divert from the Delaware River, at Bull's Island above Stockton, a quantity of water that will supply the needs of the metropolitan district for many years to come, together with the possibilities of augmenting it to meet the ultimate needs of the metropolitan section.

The Legislature has attempted, from time to time, by memorializing Congress, to convert this canal into a part of an inland waterways system. However, this has met with no encouragement on the part of the Federal Government. The Legislature in 1936 abandoned the use of the canal from its connection with the feeder southerly to Bordentown, by permitting Trenton and other cities adjacent to that part of the canal to fill in same and use it for road purposes. However, the twenty-two miles making up the feeder and the thirty-seven miles from its point of juncture with the feeder to New Brunswick are still intact and in use. We thus have an artificial waterway from the Delaware River to New Brunswick, capable of carrying upwards of 150 million gallons of water daily to the metropolitan area.

It is my thought that this part of the Raritan Canal and its feeder can now be made to serve as an aqueduct or water

course for the development of our next major water project. By taking advantage of an existing waterway the people will save many millions of dollars.

I have been advised by competent legal authority that the State of New Jersey may, without qualifications, divert this water for other public uses, such as for water supply purposes. I have given the matter much study and have taken the advice of competent engineering authority, and I recommend that the Legislature, by suitable legislation, set aside and designate the Delaware and Raritan Canal and feeder as an integral part of our next major water supply development, together with all of its appurtenances and rights, and that the waters of the Delaware River, through this waterway, be pumped from the canal at or near Bound Brook to a moderately-sized reservoir to be located in the hills back of Bound Brook and Plainfield, possibly in Dock Watch Hollow, or a site equally good, and be there filtered and transmitted to the cities in the metropolitan section through suitable mains or aqueducts.

The plan which I propose converts the Delaware and Raritan Canal and the waters thereof to their highest use; no damage is done to the lake regions in our northwestern counties, and no great areas of our agricultural lands are flooded for reservoir purposes. No great sums will be required for property, rights-of-way or water rights, and the controversies that have grown up around previous plans will be obviated.

I have been assured by authorities in the State Department of Health that, both before and after its treatment, this water compares favorably with any of the other waters used in the metropolitan area. Indeed, it is the same water used by Trenton, Philadelphia and the other Delaware River cities and towns.

One of the advantages of converting the Delaware and Raritan Canal and its waters into a water supply lies in its ready availability and the rapidity with which it may be converted into a public water supply.

I have caused estimates to be made of this plan, and I believe that its ultimate cost will be well within twenty-eight million dollars for a supply of 150 million gallons daily. This may be compared to an estimated cost of forty million dollars for the proposed Chimney Rock develop-

ment and forty-five million dollars for the proposed Bunnvale development, with yields of 120 and 130 million gallons daily, respectively.

In view of the fact that practically all of this money will be spent for labor and materials, the project will do much to relieve our unemployment situation. Not only would local labor be employed in the construction of this project, but the cement, sand, stone, pipe and other materials entering into its construction are produced in New Jersey factories, which employ New Jersey labor.

The time is now opportune to apply to the Federal Government for a loan or grant in the full amount to immediately undertake the construction of this project. In view of the efforts being made by the Federal Government to create projects to take care of the unemployed, and with the large sums of money being appropriated by the Congress for this purpose, I think we can reasonably expect to receive the funds for the purpose, especially since, in a short time, this project will be self-liquidating.

It is my purpose to submit shortly for your consideration a bill which I am having prepared to carry out the recommendations herein contained.

There is no reason why this work could not be done much better by the Department of Institutions and Agencies, which is already familiar with the situation. The supplemental appropriation bills now passed and submitted amount to twenty million dollars. Of the making of supplemental appropriation bills there seems to be no end, and it really is a misleading practice, because there just isn't any money with which to meet these bills. We are still millions of dollars short in our relief fund. It hardly seems the part of wisdom to pile up a lot of supplemental appropriations when we shall be put to it to find money to meet the demands for food on the part of our people.

While it is desirable to help every class of tradesman, yet I am persuaded that this should not be done at the price of placing an unbearable burden upon the entire population.

This bill has received the support of some grocers of the State, yet the bill itself affects all commodities and all products sold in the State. It strikes at the very necessities of life. There are thousands of people seriously affected by the depression, and yet they are making a valiant fight to keep from going on relief. They are striving to get, as indeed they must, the most they can for their money. They must make a dollar go as far as it possibly can, and it would be cruel to add to the burdens of the men, women and children who are trying so hard to keep their heads above water.

This bill would diminish the purchasing power of those already on relief at a time when it is difficult to obtain funds to take care of the needy without increasing or levying new taxes.

It would add to relief rolls or partial relief rolls a great number of those whose savings and resources have been greatly diminished, by increasing the cost of necessities.

It would place manufacturers, wholesalers, distributors and retail merchants of New Jersey at a competitive disadvantage with those in our neighboring states where no similar price-fixing legislation is in vogue. This would particularly affect retail merchants in both sections of our State adjacent to the metropolitan areas of New York and Philadelphia, and would divert business from these merchants to metropolitan areas of bordering states.

Under section 8, the exceptions to the application of the act would give rise to the use of chicanery by those who are unethical in the conduct of their business and who would seek to take advantage of the exceptions therein provided; particularly as the act does not provide an impartial State agency for the enforcement of the same, and to provide such an agency would require a great number of employees and add considerable to the payroll of the State without providing additional revenue for the payment of these salaries. The number of employees required to enforce this act would not be comparable to that of such agencies as the Board of Pharmacy, State Board of Medical Examiners and State Board of Registration and Examination in Dentistry, as this act would affect all merchants in the State.

By making the State of New Jersey the plaintiff in cases instituted under the act it would greatly increase the court costs, as there is no provision made for taxing the costs on the actual complainant.

By reason of permitting a case to be instituted the filing of a verified complaint *upon information and belief* (not of their own knowledge), it creates a powerful weapon of malicious oppression, which might fall into unscrupulous hands, or even into the hands of well-meaning but misinformed people.

It would interfere with individuality of competition, business initiative and the right of making advantageous contracts.

RESOLUTION

At a meeting of the Executive Committee of the New Jersey State Federation of Labor, held at 8 P. M. on the 2nd day of June, 1938, the following resolution was adopted:

“WHEREAS, The legislative representatives of the State Federation of Labor, have during the 1938 session of the Legislature of the State of New Jersey, expended their efforts to secure legislation favorably to labor; and

“WHEREAS, As a result of their efforts there is now under consideration a bill known as substitute for Assembly Bill 60 and Senate Bill 31, which is proposed as the New Jersey Labor Relations Act; and

“WHEREAS, An examination of this bill, with the new amendments shows a radical modification of the original bill known as Senate Bill 31, which was introduced into the Senate by Senator Foran, except insofar as Sections 3 and 4 of the said substitute are concerned; and

“WHEREAS, In the opinion of the Executive Committee of the State Federation of Labor, Section 3, relating to the registration of the State and Regional Officers of local Labor Unions, and Section 4, relating to the commission of unlawful acts, have no proper place in a bill intended to define and enforce the rights of organized labor, but, nevertheless, said sections as presently modified do not in their present form adversely affect the organized labor in the State of New Jersey; but

“WHEREAS, Misinformation and misinterpretation of the phraseology used in some sections of this proposed substitute, have resulted in some undue opposition to the bill; and

“WHEREAS, It is the opinion of the executive committee that public opinion should be permitted to crystallize upon the basis of more complete information before further action should be taken; now therefore

“Resolved, By the Executive Committee of the State Federation of Labor that it express to the Legislature of the State of New Jersey its desire that a commission be appointed by the Governor or the Legislature, or jointly, to give further study to the question of the enactment of a Labor Relations Act which will give to organized labor in New Jersey, the free and untrammled right to organize and bargain collectively in such form as would best serve the interests of organized labor and of the public in general;

“Further Resolved, That pending the report of such a commission it is recommended to the Legislature that no further action be taken upon the proposed substitute for Assembly Bill 60 and Senate Bill 31; and

“Finally Resolved, That the Executive Committee of the State Federation of Labor express to its legislative representatives, on behalf of organized labor in the State, its gratification and recognition of the intensive work and of accomplishments performed by these legislative representatives.”

The law now provides that every board of education shall employ a competent physician to be known as the Medical Inspector.

This spending measure proposes to amend the statute by providing that every board of education shall employ a competent medical physician or osteopathic physician licensed to practice medicine and surgery in New Jersey, to be known as the Medical Inspector.

An osteopathic physician, as such, is not licensed to practice medicine and surgery in New Jersey, but if he complies with the educational requirements and takes the necessary examination he may obtain such license. If he does so, he then becomes a physician, as required by the present law, and thereby qualifies for appointment under the statute.

Such being the case, there is no necessity for this legislation, as an osteopathic who is licensed to practice medicine and surgery is a physician within the terms of the original act.

If the act is designed to accomplish some latent purpose or to vary existing regulations, then it overshadows the main object of the bill, and it seems to me unwise and imprudent to enact it into law.

There is no reason why this work could not be done much better by the Department of Institutions and Agencies, which is already familiar with the situation. Then, again, it might be placed in the hands of the Financial Assistance Commission, which has the organization, and if necessary, could add a colored assistant or two.

The supplemental appropriation bills now passed and submitted amount to twenty million dollars. Of the making of supplemental appropriation bills there seems to be no end, and it really is a misleading practice, because there just isn't any money with which to meet these bills. We are still millions of dollars short in our relief fund. It hardly seems the part of wisdom to pile up a lot of supplemental appropriations when we shall be put to it to find money to meet the demands for food on the part of our people.

While it is desirable to help every class of tradesman, yet I am persuaded that this should not be done at the price of placing an unbearable burden upon the entire population.

This bill has received the support of some grocers of the State, yet the bill itself affects all commodities and all products sold in the State. It strikes at the very necessities of life. There are thousands of people seriously affected by the depression, and yet they are making a valiant fight to keep from going on relief. They are striving to get, as indeed they must, the most they can for their money. They must make a dollar go as far as it possibly can, and it would be cruel to add to the burdens of the men, women and children who are trying so hard to keep their heads above water.

This bill would diminish the purchasing power of those already on relief at a time when it is difficult to obtain funds to take care of the needy without increasing or levying new taxes.

It would add to relief rolls or partial relief rolls a great number of those whose savings and resources have been greatly diminished, by increasing the cost of necessities.

It would place manufacturers, wholesalers, distributors and retail merchants of New Jersey at a competitive disadvantage with those in our neighboring States where no similar price-fixing legislation is in vogue. This would particularly affect retail merchants in both sections of our State adjacent to the metropolitan areas of New York and Philadelphia, and would divert business from these merchants to metropolitan areas of bordering States.

Under Section 8, the exceptions to the application of the act would give rise to the use of chicanery by those who are unethical in the conduct of their business and who would seek to take advantage of the exceptions therein provided; particularly as the act does not provide an impartial State agency for the enforcement of the same, and to provide such an agency would require a great number of employees and add considerable to the pay roll of the State without providing additional revenue for the payment of these salaries. The number of employees required to enforce this act would not be comparable to that of such agencies as the Board of Pharmacy, State Board of Medical Examiners and State Board of Registration and Examination in Dentistry, as this act would affect all merchants in the State.

By making the State of New Jersey the plaintiff in cases instituted under the act it would greatly increase the court costs, as there is no provision made for taxing the costs on the actual complainant.

By reason of permitting a case to be instituted the filing of a verified complaint *Upon Information and Belief* (not of their own knowledge), it creates a powerful weapon of malicious oppression, which might fall into unscrupulous hands, or even into the hands of well-meaning but misinformed people.

It would interfere with individuality of competition, business initiative and the right of making advantageous contracts.

The reason for this repealer is obscure.

The present law provides that whenever any duly authorized board or body shall notify any person to cease polluting any river, stream or watercourse with the effluent from the factory or premises of such person and there is no sewer in the municipality, but there is a sewer in an adjoining municipality, such effluent may be discharged in the manner in the act provided.

The statute authorizes an application to the governing body of an adjoining municipality for permission to discharge said effluent, and the governing body may grant permission upon such terms as it may determine. Should, however, the governing body of the adjoining municipality refuse, an application may be made to the Justice of the Supreme Court of the county in which the premises are situate, who shall appoint commissioners to determine the terms upon which the petitioner may use such sewer and for the confirmation of the report of the commissioners.

The present statute would seem to be in the interest of public health, and no explanation is offered for its repeal nor is any substitute method provided to meet the situation for which the original statute was passed.

This measure would compel each county to establish an additional pension fund. The act makes no provision for exempting counties wherein Superintendents of Weights and Measures and their assistants are now members of a pension fund. It would make these officials members of a second fund. I believe this is carrying the pension idea much beyond its limits.

The manner of creating the fund is unsound. A person sixty years of age and having served for a period of twenty years would be eligible for retirement by the making of a single payment. Obviously, this runs counter to sound pension ideas.

The act further provides that in addition to the contributions made by the public, any deficit shall be included in the tax levy. This is a vice of many of our present pension systems, and imposes an unwarranted and indefensible burden upon the public.

"His Majesty's Government view with favour the establishment in Palestine of a national home for the Jewish people, and will use their best endeavors to facilitate the achievement of this object, it being clearly understood that nothing shall be done which may prejudice the civil and religious rights of existing non-Jewish communities in Palestine, or the rights and political status enjoyed by the Jews in any other country;" and

WHEREAS, This Declaration was endorsed by the principal Allied powers and the statement of principle embodied therein played an important part in the definition of the terms of the League of Nations' Mandate for Palestine and the resulting administration in that territory; and

WHEREAS, The Balfour Declaration received recognition in the United States in 1922 through joint resolution, reading as follows:

"Resolved, By the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the United States of America favors the establishment in Palestine of a national home for the Jewish people, it being clearly understood that nothing shall be done which may prejudice the civil and religious rights of Christian and all other non-Jewish communities in Palestine, and that the Holy places and religious buildings and sites in Palestine shall be adequately protected;" and

WHEREAS, The American-British Palestine Mandate Convention of December 3, 1924, stated the mutual desire of Great Britain and the United States to reach a definite understanding with regard to the rights of the two governments and their respective nationals in Palestine, the United States consenting to the administration of Palestine by his Britannic Majesty, and it being agreed in Article 7 of the said Mandate Convention, "Nothing contained in the present convention shall be affected by any modification which may be made in the terms of the mandate, as recited above, unless such modification shall have been assented to by the United States"; and

WHEREAS, This agreement induced the Jewish citizens of the United States and the rest of the world to send millions of dollars into Palestine for the development of its agricultural and industrial resources, and for the establishment of a Jewish national life in the ancient Jewish Homeland; and

WHEREAS, In the last few years Palestine has absorbed more than half of the entire world immigration of Jews; and

WHEREAS, Palestine as a haven for the oppressed Jews of the world is of greater importance now than ever before, in view of the present wave of intolerance raging across Central Europe; and

WHEREAS, It is reported that Great Britain is contemplating the abandonment of its promise, as expressed in the Balfour Declaration, to establish a national homeland for the Jews in Palestine; and

WHEREAS, It is also reported that Great Britain is about to stop further immigration into Palestine; and

WHEREAS, Hundreds of thousands of Jews in Europe find themselves homeless and with no other refuge of escape from lands of intolerance and oppression; and

WHEREAS, Persecution of the Jews in Europe is not alone a Jewish problem, but one affecting all minority groups; and, in its larger scope, one which indicates a growing tendency to hold lightly standards of human conduct long established by civilized people throughout the world;

Be It Resolved, By the House of Assembly of the State of New Jersey, that, in the tradition of our ancestors who founded this nation in their attempt to secure political liberty and religious freedom, we memorialize His Excellency, Honorable Franklin D. Roosevelt, President of the United States, and Secretary of State Cordell L. Hull, to make representations to the British Government that the United States does not desire modification of the American-British Covenant, and that it expects the British Government to observe its international covenants to complete the Jewish National Homeland in Palestine, and, to that end, that immigration into Palestine be continued as heretofore.

My dear Mr. Speaker:

I received from the House of Assembly a copy of the following resolution, which your Clerk has certified was adopted by that body on Monday, June 6th last.

“WHEREAS, Assembly Concurrent Resolution No. 2 of 1937 has passed both the General Assembly and the Senate, and therefore, by virtue of Article 9 of the Constitution of the State of New Jersey, it is now the duty of the Legislature to submit such proposed amendment to the people of the State of New Jersey; and

“WHEREAS, Such public referendum will cost several hundred thousand dollars if held on a date when no other matter is voted upon, except such proposed amendment; and

“WHEREAS, Assembly Concurrent Resolutions Nos. 1, 3, 5 and 6, all introduced in 1938, have passed the General Assembly; and

“WHEREAS, Some or all of these resolutions may pass the Senate in 1938; and

“WHEREAS, Some or all of these resolutions may pass both the General Assembly and the Senate in 1939, in which case it will again be the duty of the Legislature to submit such proposed amendment or amendments to the people of the State of New Jersey;

“*Resolved*, That the Attorney-General of the State of New Jersey be directed to furnish an opinion to the General Assembly of the State of New Jersey as to whether or not the public referendum to be held on Assembly Concurrent Resolution No. 2 of 1937 may be held on the same date and in the same polling places as the public referendum which will be held on such of the Assembly concurrent resolution, proposing amendments to the State Constitution as may pass both Houses in 1938 and 1939, and if so, under what conditions?”

Of the resolutions introduced at the present session of the Legislature, only No. 1 was favorably acted upon by both Houses. Our Constitution, Article IX, provides as follows:

“Any specific amendment or amendments to the Constitution may be proposed in the Senate or General Assembly, and if the same shall be agreed to by a majority of the members elected to each of the two houses, such proposed amendment or amendments shall be entered on their journals, with the yeas and nays taken thereon, and referred to the Legislature then next to be chosen, and shall be published for three months previous to making such choice, in at least one newspaper of each county, if any be published therein; and if in the Legislature next chosen, as aforesaid, such proposed amendment or amendments, or any of them, shall be agreed to by a majority of all members elected to each House, then it shall be the duty

of the Legislature to submit such proposed amendment or amendments, or such of them as may have been agreed to as aforesaid by the two Legislatures, to the people, in such manner and at such time, at least four months after the adjournment of the Legislature, as the Legislature shall prescribe; and if the people at a special election to be held for that purpose only, shall approve and ratify such amendment or amendments, or any of them by a majority of the electors qualified to vote for members of the Legislature voting thereon, such amendment or amendments so approved and ratified shall become part of the Constitution; *provided*, that if more than one amendment be submitted, they shall be submitted in such manner and form that the people may vote for, or against each amendment separately and distinctly; but no amendment or amendments shall be submitted to the people by the Legislature oftener than once in five years."

It is clear that Concurrent Resolution No. 2, introduced in 1937, and acted upon favorably by the Legislature of the present session, is now ready to be submitted to the people.

Concurrent Resolution No. 1, introduced at the session of 1938, under the Constitution, has been referred to the Legislature which will meet in the year 1939, and no one can tell at the present time whether both Houses of the Legislature, when it convenes in January next, will act favorably upon the resolution. If the Legislature which will convene in January next fails to act favorably upon Resolution No. 1 of the session of 1938, then the question presented in the resolution of the House of Assembly cannot arise. To me that question at the present time is purely academic, and is one which ought to be considered by both Houses of the Legislature which will convene in January, 1939. It is my view, however, that Concurrent Resolution No. 2 of the session of 1937, which, as I have pointed out, has been acted upon favorably by both Houses of the Legislature for the year 1938, must be submitted by the Legislature of that year. The Legislature which will convene in the year 1939 must determine when Concurrent Resolution No. 1 of the session of 1938, if acted upon favorably by both Houses in 1939, shall be submitted.

It is to be observed that our Constitution provides that if more than one amendment shall be submitted, they shall

be submitted in such manner and form that the people may vote for, or against each amendment separately and distinctly. That provision has reference to a situation where two successive Legislatures have proposed more than one amendment. Here we have a situation where we have two separate amendments submitted in two separate legislative years, and it is my view that the only safe course to pursue is to have these amendments passed upon separately by the people at separate and special elections, one election to be designated by the Legislature of 1938, for Resolution No. 2 of 1937, and the second election for Resolution No. 1 of the session of 1938, to be designated by the Legislature in 1939, should that amendment be acted upon favorably by the Legislature in that year.

DEAR SIR—The undersigned railroad companies have been litigating with agencies of the State of New Jersey for a number of years past, the assessments levied by those agencies upon the properties of these companies. There are now pending in the United States District Court for the District of New Jersey suits brought by these companies against the agencies of the State involving taxes for the years 1934 to 1936, inclusive, and before the State Board of Tax Appeals involving taxes for the years 1937 and 1938.

Recently the United States Circuit Court of Appeals for the Third Circuit affirmed the decision of the United States District Court for this district in respect of such taxes for the years 1932 and 1933. Unless an adjustment of the amounts claimed to be due can be made with promptness, it will be necessary for the railroad companies to apply to the United States Supreme Court for a review of the decision of the Circuit Court of Appeals. To effectuate a valid and binding settlement it may be necessary for the Legislature to act upon such settlement.

It seems to the undersigned that it is in the interest of the State of New Jersey, that the litigation between it and the undersigned be terminated as promptly as possible, so that moneys needed for the State may be paid over to it. It is equally important for the railroad companies concerned to know as promptly as possible whether or not a settlement of the litigation is possible. If the Legislature, which we understand is to meet tonight, should adjourn *sine die* then all chance of reaching a settlement of the litigation would be lost. Hence we respectfully suggest to you that those who are responsible for the determination of the question should have laid before them our suggestion

that the present Legislature be kept in existence by adjourning it to some date in December, preferably before the 15th, and that a committee be designated to meet with representatives of these companies for a discussion of the subject matter.

A reply to the undersigned railroads addressed to any one of the officers signing this letter is respectfully requested.

WHEREAS, In the setting up of the Relief Program for the year 1938 municipalities were led to believe that they would be required collectively to provide as their share of relief costs the sum of four million dollars (\$4,000,000) in addition to the cost of administration and that the balance would be furnished by the State and municipal budgets were prepared in accordance with such understanding; and

WHEREAS, The State has found it impossible to reimburse municipalities for relief expenditures beyond the month of June and as a result most municipalities find themselves with their funds exhausted and are compelled to borrow through emergency notes or deny relief to the needy; and

WHEREAS, The failures of the State to reimburse municipalities for relief costs in excess of four million dollars (\$4,000,000) forces them to issue emergency notes which must be included in the municipal budgets for 1939 and greatly increase tax rates; and

WHEREAS, The New Jersey State League of Municipalities, through its President and Executive Secretary have presented to the Republican caucus of each branch of the State Legislature the following plan:

1. Municipal contributions for 1939 relief expenditures to be definitely set by the Legislature at four million dollars (\$4,000,000) plus costs of administration, the balance to be borne by the State. Municipalities to be reimbursed for total outlay as soon as State funds are available.
2. An amendment to existing law which will permit municipalities to anticipate in their 1939 budgets the amount to be paid by the State through reimbursement. This would offset the amount which must be included in 1939 budgets to retire emergency notes issued to cover the State's share of relief expenditures.
3. Enactment of Senate Bill No. 340, introduced by Senator Powell, and which provides for the escheat of personal property which does not belong to any person or which has no rightful owner and which dedicates the funds arising therefrom to relief.

And,

WHEREAS, This proposed plan would alleviate this grave situation;

Therefore, *Be It Resolved*, by the Board of Commissioners of the city of Newark that the Legislature of the State of New Jersey be and it is hereby requested to remain in session until the above outlined plan has been adopted.

That the State Treasurer is hereby instructed to furnish the Legislature, on or before January 10, 1939, with a certified statement of the cash balances to the State's credit in the banking institutions, used as depositories throughout the State, and that there be included in this statement all of the funds collected or due from all departments of the State government considered as income for the calendar year, ending December 31, 1938, or for the period from July 1 to December 31 in the fiscal year 1938-39 considered as income for this period.

2. That the Comptroller prepare a statement showing the State's liabilities, as they affect expenditures or commitments authorized to be made in the calendar year ending December 31, and all expenditures or commitments authorized in the fiscal year, July 1 to December 31, 1938, for the fiscal year 1938-39, such statement to be prepared in detail so as to show the free and unencumbered balances in the State's depositories or any accounts held by units of State government for the account of the State Treasurer.

3. That the State Commissioner of Finance prepare a Statement showing the State's liabilities as they affect expenditures or commitments authorized to be made in the calendar year ending December 31, 1938, and all expendi-

tures or commitments authorized in the fiscal period, July 1, 1938, to December 31, 1938, such statement to be prepared in such a manner so as to show the free and unencumbered balances or accounts held by units or other agencies of the State government.

4. That the State Auditor be instructed to make a financial survey of the Highway Department and other departments included in the highway budget showing the balances in these funds, including all cash or bond appropriations; setting forth the commitments against these balances; setting forth any other commitments to indicate, if actual contracts have been made, the following details: date of contract, location of work and amount committed; indicating the percentage of performance on the contract and showing when the State will be called upon to pay any balances due thereon; setting forth all of the details as they affect any portion of the funds to be used for right-of-way acquisition, indicating the routes on which these acquisitions are to be made and relating these acquisitions to contracts made on these particular routes as against the contemplated acquisition or lands for right-of-way purchases on routes where contracts have not as yet been made; and furnishing any other information that may be deemed necessary to show the exact status of all highway funds.

5. The State Auditor is hereby empowered to employ the necessary help to complete this survey, on or before January 10, and the funds necessary to cover this expenditure are to be transferred from highway fund balances.

DEAR MR. PASCOE—The compromise plan for taxation of railroad property which has been offered to your Committee is so ridiculous and insincere as not to require any deep consideration. Evidently the railroads, after exhausting every legal means at their disposal to thwart the desire of the State to assess them at a fair valuation, have determined that the result of the litigation, which has been

decided by the State and Federal Courts entirely in favor of the State and the municipalities, is without any force and effect. With that reasoning in mind, they have come before your Committee with the specious argument that, because of the decrease in their revenues, they are entitled to a subsidy through special consideration. Of course, anyone with a thorough knowledge of the history of the railroad tax fights in the past will realize that this is not a new procedure on their part.

When I first became Mayor of the City of Jersey City in 1917, I undertook to make an investigation of the valuations which had been placed upon railroad property within the limits of Jersey City. My investigation disclosed that the railroads had been assessed at approximately one-fifth of the value placed for taxation purposes upon similar property owned by individuals. The railroads had managed, through some means, to obtain a consistent discrimination in their favor, to the detriment of all other taxpayers. The private property owners were thus carrying the tax burden for the railroads. It was this inequitable state of affairs which I fought to remedy at the time. After many years of effort, I succeeded in having a fair valuation placed upon railroad property, which, of course, added millions to the ratables of our city. The matter was not disposed of so easily, however, as the railroads immediately instituted extensive litigation to set aside the valuations.

The litigation was taken through State and Federal Courts step by step, and at every turn the decision was in favor of Jersey City, and the final result was that the valuations placed upon them by the City were declared to be fair and equitable, and the railroads were forced to pay their proper share of governmental expenses.

They continued to abide by the decisions of the Courts until the year 1932. At that time, as your Committee well knows, the State, counties and municipalities were facing difficult times, with tax revenues reaching a new low. Sensing the emergency these governmental bodies faced, the railroads immediately decided to capitalize on the situation and use it as a basis for bargaining purposes. They therefore instituted a tax strike, with the principal exception of the Pennsylvania Railroad System. These railroads knew that the taxes due were for the use of the State, Teachers' Pension Fund, school system and county and

municipal purposes, yet they deliberately withheld, in many cases, more than 60 per cent of the amount due. The State was forced to divert revenues to replace that usually obtained from the taxation of railroad property, and the municipalities were compelled to issue tax anticipation notes in the amounts which were rightfully due them at that time. This resulted in the payment of hundreds of thousands of dollars in interest charges, which would have been unnecessary had the railroads fulfilled their duties as set forth by the Courts. At the same time, they started litigation which was similar to that which had been decided against them in the year 1927.

In 1937, the Federal Courts refused to hear the appeals of the railroads from adverse decisions in our State Courts, unless each company paid at least 60 per cent of the taxes levied in the year 1932 and following years. This decision was reached because it was apparent that, if the railroads were wholly successful in their ridiculous claims, they would have to ultimately pay at least that amount.

It is obvious that this tax strike was designed to multiply the financial difficulties of the taxing bodies, in order to bring about a speedy capitulation. Their tactics have seriously affected the governmental functions which are normally dependent upon revenues from this source. I can candidly state that, in the case of Jersey City, where railroad valuations on second class property alone approximate 20 per cent of the total valuations, the result was almost disastrous. We have survived a period when voluntary salary deductions at one time ran as high as 52 per cent. Today we still have salary deductions up to 10 per cent, and we have not appointed any firemen in almost eleven years, nor any policemen in almost ten years. Our personnel in other departments is 15 per cent to 20 per cent less than in 1931. Most other municipalities in the State have faced the same difficulties.

Despite the handicaps imposed by the unfair tactics of the railroads, Jersey City and all but approximately 50 municipalities of the State have, by dint of considerable sacrifice, gone on a cash basis in the operation of their budgets. This has meant, however, that other property owners have been forced to contribute and make up the tax revenues which the railroads have been withholding since 1932, resulting in increased tax rates. The ordinary

taxpayers have therefore, for the past five years, been carrying the load for the railroads, in addition to paying their own share of taxes. The burden has not been an easy one.

As you know, the railroads have suffered defeat in every State and Federal Court, with the exception of the United States Supreme Court, which has not been reached as yet. It is difficult to understand their effrontery, therefore, in offering a settlement on a 66-2/3 per cent basis, as reported by the public press. The railroads have made it appear that their offer will result in a net payment of approximately \$7,500,000 to the State. An analysis of the figures shows that this is absolutely false.

At the end of 1938 the railroads will owe \$34,846,326.44 in principal and \$11,946,116.40 in interest, a total of about \$46,792,442.84. Under the plan proposed by the railroads, this whole \$46,792,442.84 would be wiped off the books. In addition, there would actually be refunded to the railroads \$10,999,941.01 in cash or in credits under Chapter 5 of the Laws of 1934. The railroads, as a whole, would thus be \$57,792,383.85 better off, after having failed at every turn in the State and Federal Courts and after having imposed unnecessary hardships upon the taxpayers of the State during a period of deepest economic distress. Of the \$10,999,941.01 which would be refunded to the railroads, approximately \$7,000,000 would come from the State and \$4,000,000 from the municipalities.

To give you an idea of disastrous effect upon Jersey City alone, we would have to surrender \$13,000,000 in principal and interest now owed to us, and would, in addition, be actually required to refund or credit the railroads with \$2,150,000. We will also have over \$780,000 of Special Tax Notes outstanding at the end of this year, which were issued in anticipation of the collection of these delinquent railroad taxes by express authorization of the Legislature. The refund or credit and the payment of these notes would mean a rises in the 1939 tax rate of over \$8.00 per \$1,000 valuations.

I note from the press reports that the railroads, in dealing with your Committee, have apparently abandoned any request for consideration based on legal grounds, but are relying mainly on a plea of poverty. You are entirely familiar, of course, with the fact that hundreds of thousands

of property owners throughout the State are entitled to the same plea and consideration. The reduction of income has by no means been confined to the railroads. Every penny taken from the tax bills of the railroads, whether owed or to be owed, will be passed on to the shoulders of all other taxpayers of New Jersey. Of that there can be no doubt.

It is evident that the railroads, in presenting its so-called compromise to the State, have no concern for the best interest of the State. While the railroads are a vital industry, even such a compromise by the State will not cure the situation for them. Their difficulties run much deeper and are far-reaching. Yet they are, in effect, asking New Jersey, only one of the many States through which they operate, to subsidize them for the benefit of their bondholders and stockholders, to the detriment of all other property owners of this State. Such a proposal is inconceivable. Certainly, after the Courts have passed upon this matter and determined that these payments are fair and must be met, no one has the right to sit down and barter away the money which rightfully belongs to the taxpayers of the State and municipalities.

After the State has spent thousands of dollars in litigation to determine the right to collect these taxes on the basis of present valuations, that right should not now be ignored by some entrance through the back door. There is absolutely no reason why the taxpayers of this State should be called upon to bear the burden which the State and Federal Courts have said, time and again, the railroads should rightfully assume, and which has been increased by the railroads as the result of their own tactics in deliberately piling up such large sums in delinquent taxes.

I understand that your Committee was formed solely for the purpose of reporting back to the Legislature the compromise offered by the railroads, without any recommendations on your part. I feel, however, that it is incumbent upon me to briefly present to you the unfair features of such an offer as has appeared in the public press.

To the Honorable A. Harry Moore, Governor and to the Senate and General Assembly:

Since the submission of my November 21st report, no new monies have been transferred to the credit of this Commission. The \$2,000,000 transferred on November 18th, has practically all been paid out to municipalities in reimbursement of their June and prior relief commitments. At present we have a balance of approximately a quarter of a million dollars in our relief fund all of which is committed and will be disbursed immediately upon receipt of audited vouchers from the municipalities.

As stated in our November 21st report, relief is liquidated for the first half of the current calendar year only.

No change in relief conditions has occurred which we believe will greatly change the amount of our last estimate of \$23,400,000 as the cost of relief for the calendar year 1938 excluding administration. Of this amount, municipalities have been reimbursed to the extent of \$10,000,000 so that if no additional funds are provided, municipalities will be called upon to pay a total sum of \$13,400,000. This latter amount represents the estimated cost of relief for the last six months of \$11,400,000 plus a municipal contribution of \$2,000,000 towards the cost of relief for the first six months.

As of December 1st, our best estimate is that municipalities have paid out for relief between \$3,000,000 and \$4,000,000 for which they have not been reimbursed and in addition are indebted to local vendors for relief given to the extent of between \$5,000,000 and \$6,000,000.

We repeat the statement made in our report of November 21st. The municipalities will be required to pay a minimum of 25 per cent of the estimated total of \$23,400,000. On this basis the State share or contribution will be approxi-

mately \$17,550,000. As \$10,000,000 so far has been paid through reimbursement, \$7,550,000 additional is required as the State share.

Which motion, upon a *viva voce* vote, with the ayes and nays being called was declared adopted.

The following report was sent to the desk and read by the Clerk:

The Special Assembly Committee created by the House of Assembly presents herewith its report and findings as a result of its investigation, together with a copy of all testimony taken at the hearings of the Special Committee.

REPORT OF SPECIAL ASSEMBLY COMMITTEE APPOINTED BY THE
HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY, UNDER ASSEMBLY RESOLUTION
NUMBER 1

Your Committee was appointed by the House of Assembly of the State of New Jersey for the purpose of investigating election conditions and alleged violations of law and misconduct in elections in order to ascertain whether or not elections were being conducted in a fraudulent and illegal manner. Your Committee proceeded to the appointment of counsel and other necessary assistants in order that a full and impartial investigation might be had to the end that proper legislation could be recommended.

Your Special Assembly Committee, after choosing its counsel and assistants, proceeded to plan its investigation of election conditions in Hudson County and provided for a series of hearings at which testimony concerning such conditions could be made known.

During the course of the eighteen hearings held by your Committee, a large number of persons were subpoenaed and examined by Committee Counsel in the presence of your Committee. Most of the testimony taken by the Committee was taken at regular sessions held at the Court House in the city of Newark. However, some testimony was taken in Jersey City and in Trenton.

There are accompanying herewith seventeen volumes containing 1618 pages of testimony gathered by the Committee, which testimony is hereby made a part of the Committee's report.

The persons examined by the Committee can be classified in the following groups: Hudson County employees, Jersey City employees, members of the various local Boards of Election, members of the Hudson County Board of Election, Superintendent of Election and members of his staff, Special Deputies of the office of the Superintendent of Election, who served on election day, police officers in various branches of police service in Jersey City and Hudson County, physicians, State Chairman of the Republican Party, employees of the office of the Commissioner of Registration of Hudson County, members of the Attorney-General's staff, and the State Superintendent of Police.

There being charges that the Hudson County registry lists and poll books in the possession of Charles Stoebling, were polluted with thousands of false registrations, dead voters, nonresident and disenfranchised voters, the Committee decided to bring before it such registry lists and poll books and examine the same with the aid of handwriting experts who were to compare the registry lists with the poll books and other evidence in order that the number of floaters, repeaters, etc., could be ascertained.

On Thursday, January 28, 1938, the Commissioner of Registration who is the custodian of these records, agreed to produce same before the Committee on January 29, 1938, having been properly served with a subpoena to produce. The representative of your Committee left the Commissioner of Registration after orders were given to the Commissioner's staff to produce before your Committee the signature copy registry binders and the poll books used in the General Election of 1937. Nevertheless without any plausible justification, the Commissioner of Registration and the members of his staff thereafter refused and still refuse to produce the records. The said Commissioner suddenly became confined to his bed and was prohibited by his physician from seeing anyone. His apartment at 50 Glenwood Avenue, Jersey City, N. J., was immediately surrounded by a squadron of Jersey City police. The Committee and its counsel called at Mr. Stoebling's apartment but the police refused to permit anyone access to the apartment. The Committee immediately thereafter went to the office of the Commissioner of Registration, at 591 Summit Avenue, Jersey City, and found the vault in which the records were stored, surrounded by police. Counsel for Commissioner of Registration appeared before the Committee and stated that he had advised the Commissioner of Registration that he would have to produce the records before the Committee and that he did not know why the Commissioner changed his mind. Counsel for the Commissioner of Registration also produced a letter from the Commissioner of Registration in which letter the Commissioner stated that as soon as he left his sick bed he would personally produce the records before the Committee. Although Mr. Stoebling returned to his office several months ago and although the Committee has written him on numerous occasions requesting him to produce the records, there has been no attempt by the Commissioner of Registra-

tion or any of his assistants to make these public records available to the Special Assembly Committee.

Your Committee thereafter called upon the State Police to help it gain access to the vault in which the records were stored, but the State Police, under an opinion of the Attorney-General, refused to give the necessary assistance in order to obtain the aforesaid public records. Thereafter, various employees in the office of the Commissioner of Registration were examined and although it was shown that the Commissioner's assistants carried out all duties in the absence of the Commissioner, all of the said employees refused to co-operate with the Committee in all its attempts to examine the registers and poll books.

Your Committee subpoenaed and examined Dr. Robert Stockfish, the personal physician of Mr. Stoebling. Dr. Stockfish testified that his patient's condition was such that he would not permit any visits. Some time later, Dr. Frederick A. Alling, a well known heart specialist, examined Mr. Stoebling at the request of the Committee and he subsequently testified that he did not believe Mr. Stoebling's condition to be as serious as described by Dr. Stockfish, and that he believed Mr. Stoebling was not too ill to confer and that he would be over his illness within a period of not more than three weeks.

Your Committee thereafter proceeded to examine the Chief of the Jersey City Police Department and the Supervisor and Chief of the Hudson County Boulevard Police in order to ascertain who had ordered police into the office of the Commissioner of Registration and the office of the Hudson County Board of Election at 591 Summit Avenue, Jersey City, where the records were located. The examination of these witnesses disclosed that neither Mr. Stoebling nor any member of his staff, had ordered a police guard, but that the guard was posted at the request of John J. Corcoran, a Democratic member of the County Board of Elections.

Your Committee thereafter subpoenaed twenty-four Election Board members, both Republicans and Democrats, in various election districts in Jersey City, only three of whom were females.

In the first district only one female election board member appeared and the three male members did not appear. The Committee thereafter issued the necessary warrants and had the warrants served by the State Police. Thereafter, these three men were brought before the Committee, at which time they refused to answer any of the questions put to them concerning their conduct as election officers. In the five other districts subpoenaed by the Committee, there were only two women in the group of twenty election districts. These women testified before the Committee and all the men refused to testify. The twenty-one male election officers, among whom were several with criminal records, were arrested for their refusal to testify as a result of the complaint of the Committee, and they were taken before magistrates who were also judges of the Common Pleas Courts of Essex County. These men were held under bail pending the finding of the Essex County Grand Jury.

Testimony of the three women Election Board witnesses disclosed an utter disregard by their respective Boards, of the Election Laws. Their testimony clearly shows that challenge sheets and strike out lists were shelved and not used, that a person's right to vote was never challenged, that there was a wholesale distribution of ballots to alleged illiterate voters, with no attempt to question the right of illiterates to vote, that no signatures of voters were compared, that no attempt was made to record such illiterate votes in the place provided in the back of the poll books, that an abnormal amount of assistance was given to voters, and that police officers and others having no official function at the polls interfered with and intimidated voters. The judge of the District Election Board was invariably a Democrat who ran the polls as he pleased rarely consulting the remaining member of the Board. It was also disclosed that the judge called off the ballots and often refused to permit challengers or Superintendent of Election men from seeing the ballots, that it was the common practice to put all the ballots on a table and separate them into three piles, *i. e.* one for straight Democratic ballots, another for straight Republican ballots, and the third for split ballots, after which the judge would give the total straight ballots for each party and he would then read the split ballots and in some instances, no split ballots were recorded at all, all ballots being treated as straight ballots. The polling places

were invariably crowded with hangers on who not only interfered with the voting during the day but took part and often interfered with the counting of the votes after the closing of the polls.

The Committee heard the testimony of a number of Special Deputies of the Superintendent of Elections, who testified that at the general election held on November 2, 1937, the District Election Boards failed to challenge illegal voters, did not use challenge sheets or strike out lists, permitted illiterate voters to vote without making necessary inquiry of records, giving of assistance to voters in wholesale fashion, that Democratic poll workers were assisted by hangers on, who in many instances were Hudson County or Jersey City employees, who also interfered with, intimidated, embarrassed and deprived voters of secrecy in casting their ballots, and said hangers on intimidated, threatened and in many instances, Republican challengers and poll workers were assaulted and battered when attempting to carry out their duties. That the counting of the votes took place under a strange procedure ballots being hidden, torn, thrown about, marked on their face with pencils, and in many instances, police removed everybody but themselves and the Board from the polling booths before the counting of the votes took place.

The Committee examined witnesses relative to special investigations made in the First District—First Ward, and Ninth District—Third Ward of Jersey City. These investigations showed that names of people who had moved out of the State were recorded as having voted; people who were confined in hospitals and institutions and were unable to vote appear in the poll books as having voted; and in several instances, deceased persons appear on the poll books as having voted.

The Committee also examined the contents of several ballot boxes and in many instances the ballots were torn, mutilated, soiled, and appeared to have markings showing an attempt to disfigure and alter the original intent of the voter. Each district had at least several ballots on which markings for Republican candidates were erased and Democratic candidates noted. A great many of the ballots in the various districts appeared to have been marked by the same hand and the tally sheets in the districts examined by the Committee after comparison with the recount of the

ballots, showed a difference of as many as forty-seven votes in favor of Democratic candidates in a single district.

The following resume relative to the examination of district election returns in order to ascertain the conduct of the local Election Boards in the tabulation of votes, is set forth as an example although in district after district, the same type of return was made for the candidates. In examining the tabulations for previous years, the same results were found. Your Committee, for brevity, cites as examples nine of the ten districts in the First Ward of Jersey City:

Thereafter, the Court of Chancery issued an injunction enjoining the committee, raising the question as to your Committee's valid existence. The matter was heard by one of the Vice Chancellor's at a final hearing, and an opinion was handed down by the Chancery Court declaring that your Committee was invalid.

Counsel for the committee immediately moved to appeal to the Court of Errors and Appeals, the court of last resort, which court in due course, received all records of the pro-

ceedings heard counsel, and some time later handed down its decision in which the majority of the court confirmed the decision of the Court of Chancery and a minority handed down a strong dissenting opinion.

Your Committee finds that:

1. The strange and continued refusal of the Commissioner of Registration of Hudson County to produce for examination the signature copy of the register and poll books can leave but one inference as to the contents of these public records.

2. The Commissioner of Registration has failed miserably in purging the registry lists of dead, insane, illegal and nonresident voters.

3. The office of the Commissioner of Registration maintains a heavily padded payroll, said office is full of confusion and its present manner of administering its duties is of no value.

4. There is an utter and complete disregard of the provision of the election law by the local district election boards in Hudson County.

(a) Such election boards made no attempt to challenge the vote of voters on the challenge or strike out list, no affidavits were demanded from voters appearing on challenge lists.

(b) Such election boards in giving wholesale assistance to voters, forced their way into the polling booths, thus destroying the secrecy and sanctity of the ballot.

(c) Such election boards failed to compare the signatures of prospective voters signing the poll books with the signature copy registry book.

(d) Such election boards failed to interrogate illiterate voters and did not make any statements of identification provided in the back of the poll books.

(e) Such election boards permitted electioneering, intimidation, rowdiness, interference, loitering by hangers on and ward heelers.

(f) Such election boards permitted outsiders to work as election officials giving out ballots, counting and tallying ballots.

(g) Such election boards made no attempt to stop floaters, repeaters and illegal registrants from voting.

(h) Such election boards committed many errors in the counting, tallying of the votes in the several districts examined by your Committee.

(i) Such election boards failed to explain the abnormal number of erasures, crossouts and similarly marked ballots.

(j) Such election boards misconducted themselves in that ballots were torn, soiled, mutilated and the markings on tally sheets were confusing and often differed with the result.

(k) District election returns in many instances showed a similar number of votes for all Republican candidates as well as a similar number of votes for all Democratic candidates.

5. Police failed to assist election officers and Superintendent of Elections' deputies in the carrying out of the election law.

6. Police and other public employees made illegal use of their offices at elections.

7. Known criminals and thugs were either appointed as election officers or challengers or as workers in election districts.

8. There was no unity of purpose or co-operation between the Hudson County Board of Elections, Commissioner of Registration and the Superintendent of Elections.

9. Floaters and repeaters were given a free hand in certain parts of Hudson County.

Your Committee respectfully recommends the following remedial legislation:

1. The immediate installation of voting machines in first class counties.

2. Consolidating under one head the office of the Commissioner of Registration and the office of the Superintendent of Elections.

3. Making it a misdemeanor for any person convicted of any crime which disfranchises him from voting, to be found loitering in a polling place or partaking in an election as a worker.

4. No person employed by any municipality, county, State or federal agency shall be permitted to serve as an election official.

5. The records of any local, county or State agency shall be made subject to a subpoena issued by both or either House of Legislation, or any joint committee of both Houses, or any committee, or special committee of either House. If such subpoena is dishonored or cannot be served, the State Police shall be authorized to use any means or force to procure such records.

6. Permanent registrations in all municipalities in first class counties.

7. Municipal clerks to notify Commissioner of Registration and the Superintendent of Elections of all deaths recorded.

8. Sheriff of each county shall furnish to the Commissioner of Registration and to the Superintendent of Elections, not later than twenty-six days before each election, a list containing the names and addresses of persons incarcerated in all county penal institutions.

9. The Board of Chosen Freeholders of each county shall furnish to the Commissioner of Registration and to the Superintendent of Elections, not later than twenty-six days before each election, a list containing the names and addresses of all persons legally declared insane and admitted to any county institutions for mental diseases.

10. No person employed by either the Commissioner of Registration or the Superintendent of Elections shall be permitted to serve as an election officer or as a member of the County Committee.

11. No person other than a blind voter shall be given assistance. The registry binder shall note such blindness.

12. All local election board members must have voted in their Party's Primaries at least three years before they can qualify as an election officer.

13. The duties of all local election officers should be made familiar to them and such election officers should be required to pass an examination in order to qualify.

14. The penalties for illegal voting and furnishing false information to election officials or investigators should be made more stringent.

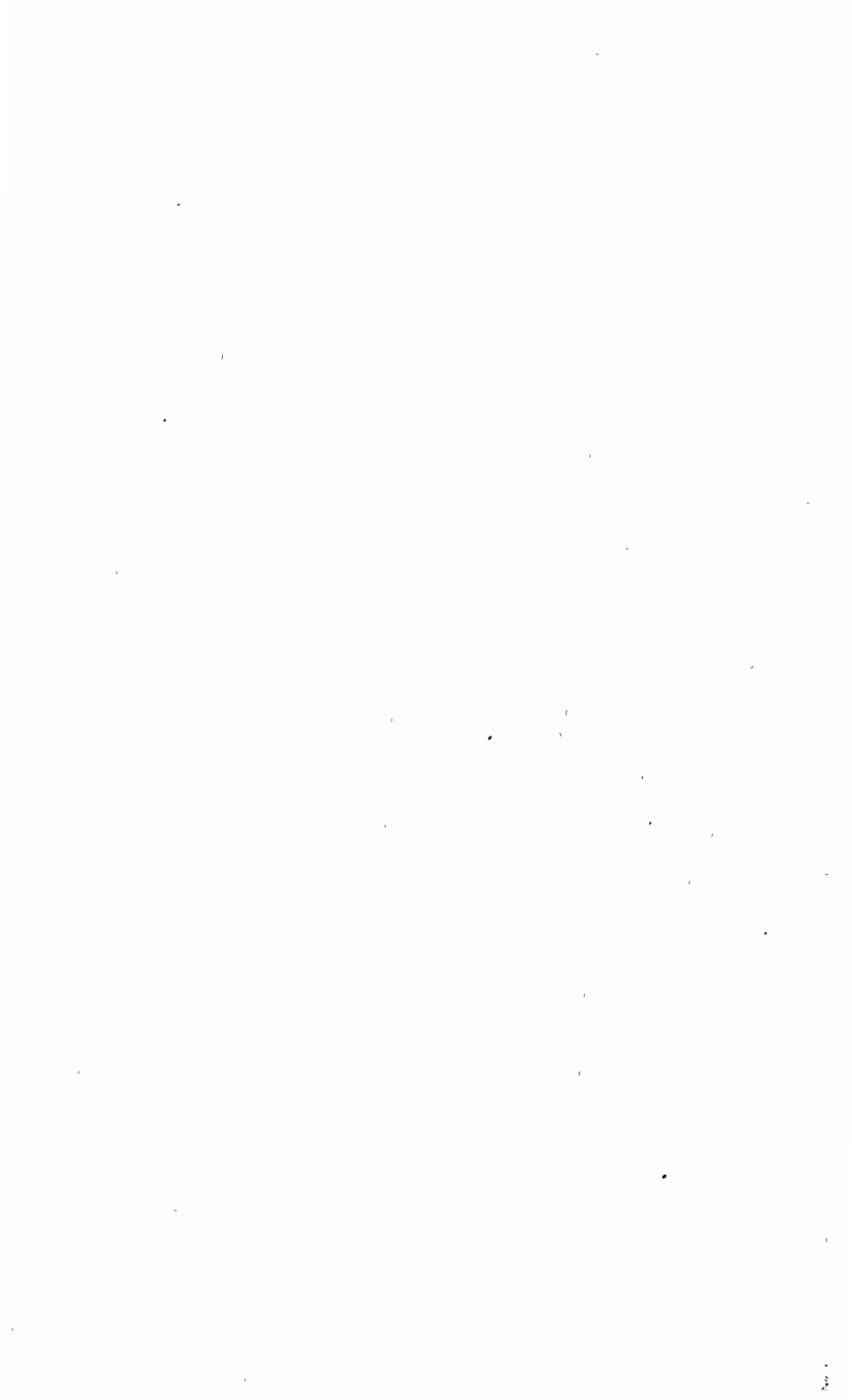

- Workmen's compensation—establishes presumption under Workmen's Compensation Act that death of employe injured at work has arisen from his employment—A. B. 388—320.
- Workmen's compensation—defines pneumoconiosis as compensable under Workmen's Compensation Act—A. B. 94—111.

- Workmen's compensation—permits Common Pleas Courts to transfer Workmen's Compensation cases to Workmen's Compensation Bureau—A. B. 440—328, 821, 1187.
- Workmen's compensation—makes persons or corporations employing contractors not carrying workmen's compensation insurance liable for compensation awards to injured workmen of contractors—A. B. 669—921.

- Workmen's compensation—permits employes contracting compensable occupational diseases to file a workmen's compensation petition within two years after exposure to disease has stopped—A. B. 332—329.
- Workmen's compensation—bars claims for workmen's compensation because of occupational disease unless petitions are filed within two years after exposure to disease has stopped—A. B. 333—329.
- Workmen's compensation—provides procedure in failure of employers or insurance carriers to report accidents involving employes—A. B. 293—230.
