Comments were raised reading potential impacts to a particular area of wetlands along the Manumuskin River, downstream from the western origin of the proposed pipeline where the commenter states there is a population of a state endangered and federally threatened species, Sensitive Joint-vetch. Commission staff review did not include this species as part of the scope of species to be investigated as the population is located quite a distance from any pipeline related construction. The pipeline route near the point where the Manumuskin crosses route 49 (Cumberland pond outfall) is going under the road, not the water and the population in question could be as much as 1000 feet downstream from the outfall. There is no construction planned near the Cumberland Pond outfall. The Cumberland Pond is a man-made lake created on the Manumuskin River, so the outfall is the discharge back into the original Manumuskin drainage way. The pipeline is being installed using HDD in this area and the nearest surface construction is over 1000 feet away east and west adjacent to Route 49.
