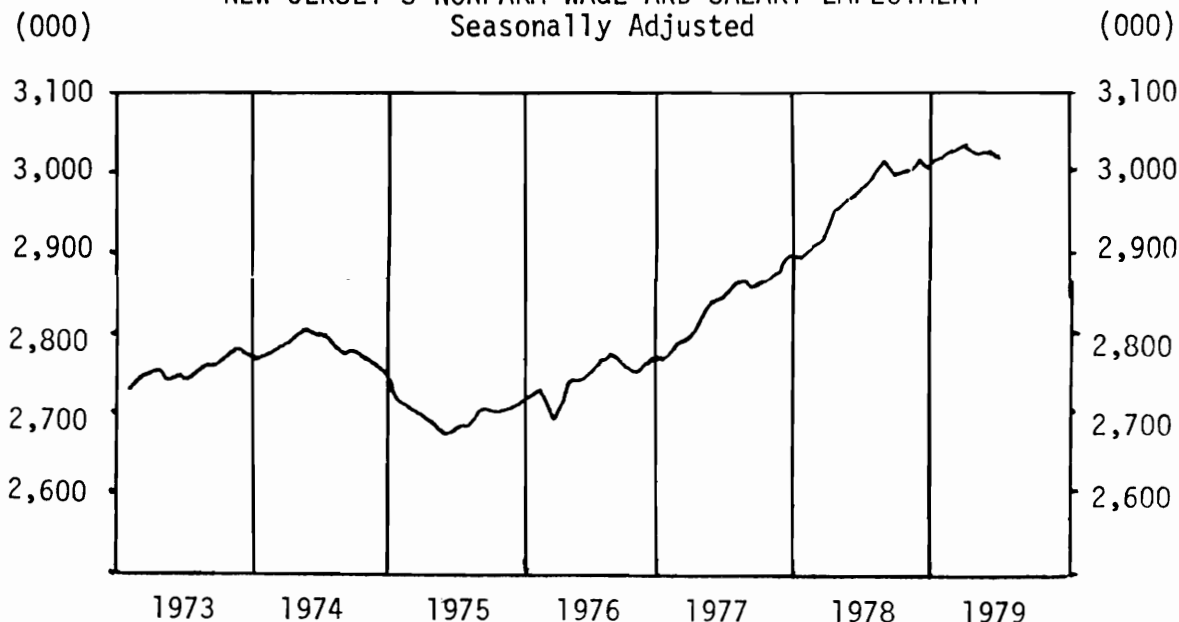

Nonagricultural wage and salary employment dropped by 7,100 to 3,015,400 in June on a seasonally adjusted basis as both the manufacturing and nonmanufacturing sectors declined. On an unadjusted basis, nonagricultural wage and salary employment rose by 47,300 to 3,076,500 in June as the manufacturing and nonmanufacturing sectors increased.

Before seasonal adjustment manufacturing employment rose by 8,200 to 805,300 as the durable and nondurable goods sectors' employment expanded over-the-month. Durable goods employment increased by 2,400 with nine out of ten component industries increasing over the month. Lumber and wood products had the only loss, dropping by 100. The largest in-

creases were due to seasonal expansions in electrical machinery and fabricated metals which increased by 600 and 400 respectively.

Among the nondurable goods, increases in seven out of ten industries caused employment to expand by 5,800 on an unadjusted basis. Seasonal increases in chemicals, up by 2,100, and apparel which increased by 1,500 accounted for 62% of the total nondurable goods growth. A return of 600 striking refinery workers increased petroleum industry payroll.

Nonmanufacturing employment on an unadjusted basis expanded by 39,100 to 2,271,200 as all major industry divisions increased from May. Seasonal growth in the trade industries led all gains by increasing 16,800. Most of the remaining expansion was in the service industries which increased by 12,900. The seasonal opening of two racetracks increased service employment by 1,400.

After seasonal adjustment, manufacturing employment dropped by 3,000 as durable goods employment slipped by 400 and employment in the nondurable goods industries declined by 2,600. Most decreases were offset by increases among the durable goods. The largest increase was in transportation equipment, increasing by 600, while stone, clay and glass and the miscellaneous manufacturing industries each had losses of 400.

Among the nondurable goods industries employment dropped in seven out of ten industries on a seasonally adjusted basis. The drop of 1,800 in apparel accounted for about 70% of the total loss. The largest increase was in chemical and allied products which rose by 400.

Seasonally adjusted nonmanufacturing employment dropped by 4,100 as losses outweighed gains. The return of 1,700 striking airline workers caused transportation and public utilities employment to increase by 1,600. Construction employment had the largest decline, dropping by 3,900 despite a sizeable expansion of 1,500 workers activity in Atlantic City. Government employment dropped by 2,300 reflecting declines in the state and local level.

Over the year employment on an unadjusted basis increased by 42,500 or 1.4%. Employment advances totaled 8,300 in manufacturing and 34,100 in the nonmanufacturing sector. In the manufacturing sector, durable goods employment increased by 14,400 while nondurable goods employment is down by 6,000 from last year. Among the durable goods industries, transportation equipment up by 7,100 had the largest annual increase while miscellaneous manufacturing had the largest drop, down by 800.

Among the nondurable goods industries printing and publishing had the largest over the year increase gaining 1,700 and the largest decreases were in textile mill products and apparel products which dropped by 2,700 and 2,600 respectively.

Over the year increases were registered in six out of seven industry groups in the nonmanufacturing sector. Government employment showed the only loss, down by 8,600. Services had the largest increment, up by 24,000 followed by wholesale and retail trade which has expanded by 11,500.

The weekly earnings of manufacturing production workers averaged \$271.88 in June, a decrease of \$1.85 from May and an increase of \$16.46 from a year ago. The average hourly earnings of \$6.52 were down 6 cents from May and up 38 cents from a year ago. During the June survey week, production workers averaged 41.7 hours compared with 41.6 hours a month ago.

After seasonal adjustment, the average weekly hours decreased to 41.4 hours from 41.6 hours in May and increased from 41.3 hours in June 1978.

On an unadjusted basis, 15 out of 19 primary manufacturing industrial groups had increases in weekly earnings over the month. The largest increment was in paper products, gaining \$14.27 because of increased overtime. The largest decrease was in chemicals, down by \$35.70, because of new hires at lower rates.

The highest average weekly earnings in June were in the transportation equipment industry which averaged \$431.46 for a 47.0-hour workweek. The highest hourly earnings were also registered in the transportation industry with \$9.18. The lowest average weekly earnings were in the leather products industry with \$157.41 for a 37.3-hour workweek.

TECHNICAL NOTES

Nonfarm Wage and Salary Employment

Employment data refer to persons on establishment payrolls who received pay for any part of the pay period which includes the 12th of the month. The data exclude proprietors, the self-employed, unpaid family workers, farm workers, and domestic workers in households. Salaried officers of corporations are included. Government employment covers only civilian employees; federal military personnel are excluded.

Persons on an establishment payroll who are on paid sick leave (when pay is received directly from the firm), on paid holiday or paid vacation, or who work during any part of the pay period but are unemployed or on strike during the rest of the period, are counted as employed. Not counted as employed are persons who, during the pay period which includes the 12th, are laid off, on leave without pay or on strike for the entire period, or who are hired but do not work during the period.

Average Hours and Earnings

Hours and earnings data are derived from reports of payroll and man-hours for production and related workers in manufacturing. When the reported pay period exceeds one week, the payroll and man-hour figures are reduced to a weekly basis.

Average hourly earnings for manufacturing are on a "gross" basis, reflecting not only changes in basic hourly rates, but also such variable factors as premium pay for overtime and shift work, and changes in output of workers paid on an incentive plan. Excluded from average earnings are irregular bonuses, retroactive items, payments of various welfare benefits, and payroll taxes paid by employers.
