## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE COMMISSIONER OF EDUCATION

The report of the Commissioner of Education which is submitted herewith reviews the work of the State Department of Public Instruction for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1933, and includes a report of the activities of the various divisions of the Department. There is included as a part of the report a compilation of the more important statistics relating to public education, including statistics of enrollment, number of teachers employed, the school facilities provided, the sources of revenue for the public schools, and the public school expenditures for the fiscal year under review.

### GENERAL STATEMENT

In my last annual report I called attention to the fact that all boards of education had made provisions to operate the schools for the year ending June 30, 1932. Conscientious attention had been given to operating the schools economically, and I reported that no schools had been closed during that year.

It is a satisfaction to report that in the year under review—1932-1933—not one school in New Jersey was closed. Boards of education had made appropriations in all districts for maintenance of the schools, although there were reductions in many budgets.

The statistics presented in the sections of the report indicate that large reduction in expenditures for public education were made during the year under review. It will be noted that offerings in the trade extension courses in the vocational schools have been very much reduced. This has made it impossible to furnish instruction for many unemployed adults and others who desire this training. Other evening schools have been reduced approximately fifty per cent.

In the high schools there has been an increase of enrollment in grades IX-XII of 21,281 pupils. It has been necessary to lengthen schedules in many schools, and the increase in enrollment has resulted also in increasing the load per teacher.

During the past year there was spent for lands, buildings, and equipment \$3,596,209.28, which was \$7,920,145.74 less than the amount spent the preceding year, and this explains the need for additional facilities in some school districts.

During the past two years, boards of education and the professional staff of the schools have given particular attention to the problem of the elimination of wastes and unnecessary expenditures. Providing adequate school facilities and maintaining an efficient program of education are problems of major importance which demand careful study of administration. Detailed discussion of these items is presented in the various sections of the report and the statistical tables which accompany it.

#### DIVISION OF CONTROVERSIES AND DISPUTES

The work of this Division has been very much increased during the past year largely due to the economic depression. The amount of correspondence handled by this Division and the number of conferences which have been held with school boards and school officials have been increased.

Fifty formal controversies were heard and decisions rendered upon them. This large increase in the number of cases over previous years resulted principally from efforts of boards of education to decrease educational costs by abolishing positions. Of the cases of this type, two outstanding ones were Angelina Koch Downs, *et al.*, vs. Board of Education of Hoboken, and Vincent P. Horan, *et al.*, Viola Cook, *et al.*, vs. Board of Education of the Town of Kearny. In the former case which is pending before the Supreme Court a pupil enrollment of 6,704 in 1928-1929 had been reduced to 5,936 by June 30, 1932, and the Board dismissed 34 teachers. In the second case there was practically no reduction in the number of pupils, but through a reorganiza-

tion of the schools the services of 36 teachers were terminated, which resulted in an estimated economy of \$82,000. The rights of teachers under tenure in situations described in the above cases have been ruled upon by the Supreme Court in the case of *Seidel vs. Ventnor City Board of Education*, in which the Court held that when positions are abolished, a teacher protected by the Tenure of Office Act cannot be dismissed if there are vacancies in the school system or positions are held by teachers not protected by tenure which such teacher is qualified to fill. The *Seidel* case did not involve the right of the Board of Education to reorganize its school and decrease the number of teachers in excess of the natural diminution as contemplated in Chapter 243, P. L. 1909. In the *Kearny* case the Supreme Court on the ground of good faith and economy sustained the right of the board of education to reorganize a school system and to terminate the services of teachers protected by the Tenure of Office Act, even though there was no diminution.

Abolition of positions under the Veterans' Tenure Act included *Piper vs. Board of Education of Ventnor City*, in which it was held that a school nurse is not included among those who are protected by the Veterans' Tenure Act. In the case of *Bidgood vs. Board of Education of the City of Bayonne*, in which the Commissioner and the State Board of Education were affirmed by the Supreme Court, it was held that a chauffeur holds a position as distinguished from an employment and upon an indeterminate appointment cannot be removed without a hearing for cause.

Several cases under the Tenure of Office Act and the Veterans' Act were dismissed on the ground of laches. In these cases it was ruled that prompt action must be taken by public employees to contest what they consider illegal dismissal. Two of these cases were appealed to the State Board of Education, which affirmed the Commissioner's decision and a third case was **not appealed**. Several decisions were rendered involving contracts to other than the lowest responsible bidder and it was held that the contract must be awarded to the lowest responsible bidder unless he is given

an opportunity to be heard and it can be shown that the exclusion of his bid was justified.

In the case of Griffith *vs.* New Providence Township Board of Education it was held that a person living within the boundaries of the school district is entitled to school privileges whether or not the Legislature has exempted from taxation the property on which he resides. This was sustained by the State Board of Education.

The serious economic conditions are reflected in much of the legislation affecting schools which was passed during the past year. Up to July first there had been enacted Chapters 12, 33, 49, 51, 68, 74, 75, 130, 155, 156, 176, 194, 219, 254, 272, 289, 290, 292, 360 and 361, which relate to school financing or provide adjustments of former statutes to meet existing conditions. Chapter 12, P. L. 1933, permits boards of education to decrease salaries of employees, even though such employees are protected by a Tenure of Office Act. Other acts provide for the issuing of scrip and bonds; make valid for the payment of taxes municipal warrants issued by boards of education, make more readily available the State school funds through proportional distribution, and extend the life of bonds and other obligations maturing between 1933 and 1935 for a period not to exceed three years. Chapter 28, P. L. 1933, changed the school year which has been the same as the fiscal year, July 1 to June 30, to that of the calendar year. Prior to this year the initial entrance of children was possible three times per year. Chapter 184, P. L. 1933, limits such entrance to the first ten days immediately following the opening of school for the fall term. Prior to 1933 contracts for transportation were awarded at the discretion of local boards of education. Chapter 262, P. L. 1933, provides that contracts for transportation shall be awarded to the lowest responsible bidder after advertisement for proposals has been made by the board of education. Such advertisement must appear at least ten days prior to the date fixed for receiving such proposals.

Prior to April 27, 1933, all teachers' certificates were issued without cost to the applicant. Chapter 135, P. L. 1933, provides that after April 27, 1933, a fee of not less than \$5.00 shall be

charged for each teacher's certificate. The Legislature also increased the fees charged for "qualifying academic certificates" from \$2.00 to \$5.00 and increased the initial examination fee for such credentials to \$5.00.

### ELEMENTARY EDUCATION

In my report of last year I outlined briefly the program of elementary education as we have sought to develop it during the past six years. In that report I indicated the point of view of an improved elementary education. It is a satisfaction to report that notwithstanding the severity of the depression it has been possible to continue the program of improving elementary education. I am satisfied that distinct progress had been made in teaching and in the selection of materials of instruction. Notwithstanding the reduction in appropriations for supplies, teachers have utilized very cheap materials and materials that they have been able to obtain without cost.

The elementary school aside from furnishing the fundamentals in the so-called tools of learning must develop proper attitudes and must lay the basis for good citizenship. The elementary school should include in its organization and instruction elementary studies of government which will enable even the graduate of our eighth grades to know about budgets and how our governmental system is operated. Children must have the opportunity to work with things and exercise their creative and expressive abilities. These are important elements in the program of elementary education in this State. Such tests as have been made, the most significant of which was the State-wide test given to the eighth grades, indicates that we may expect satisfactory results in what are known as the fundamentals in our elementary schools.

### THE CONSTRUCTION OF COURSES OF STUDY

For many years the State Department developed each year a monograph in one of the subjects taught in the elementary schools. Due to a lack of appropriations for printing this work

has been dropped. This is regrettable because the monographs which have been furnished by the State Department have been the means of bringing to the teacher suggestions for teaching and selecting materials of instruction. It should be recalled that these monographs were produced by teachers of New Jersey and the opportunity to utilize such cooperative efforts and integrate the experience of many teachers has been lost.

Through the cooperation of the New Jersey State Conservation Committee under the auspices of the Garden Club of America, the Federated Garden Clubs of New Jersey, and the State Federation of Women's Clubs we were able to distribute a pamphlet dealing with Conservation Week, which was observed during the week April 3 to 7. The week was set aside for the study of the conservation of our natural resources by proclamation of the Governor issued on March first. Through the cooperation of the New Jersey Agricultural Experiment Station we were able to have distributed among the schools "New Jersey Agriculture, Past and Present." This was purchased by the schools and consequently there was no cost to the State for the distribution.

#### IMPORTANT ELEMENTS IN THE PROGRAM OF ELEMENTARY EDUCATION THRIFT

In recent annual reports, I have called attention to the teaching of thrift. The work carried on in the classes in arithmetic and civics has yielded excellent results. Up to last year the school savings movement was carried on satisfactorily and proved to be a very important part of the work in thrift education. During the past year, however, many of our school supervisors felt it was unwise to collect money from children and place it in banks, owing to the situation which developed during the year. However, a very vital attitude has been taken toward the problem of thrift in that the children have been taught to be careful and economical in the use of all school supplies and facilities. They have been urged to help in the assembling of materials of instruction and it has been stated that the "junk man has become our personal friend and the rest of the world our source of supply."

The children have cooperated in a most helpful way and have obtained training of great value.

#### VISUAL EDUCATION

It is a well known scientific fact that learning is reinforced through the multiplicity of connections that are formed between given situations and responses. Visual aids have been found to be of great potency in reinforcing learning. The Visual Education Association of New Jersey and the State Teachers' Association have been very helpful in this field and the State Department has been aided greatly through their cooperation.

#### SAFETY EDUCATION

We have made safety education an important part of the school program. The Director of Health and Physical Education has been assigned the duty of developing safety education and a large amount of work has been done in cooperation with the division of elementary education. It is a satisfaction to report that we have had the continued cooperation of the New Jersey State Police. We believe, however, that we are serving the best interests when we refuse to allow any boy or girl in the public school system to stand on the highway directing traffic as a member of the junior patrol. We encourage activities on the school grounds and in the handling of traffic on the sidewalk. Children in the elementary school are entirely too young to direct traffic on the highways.

#### GEORGE WASHINGTON BICENTENNIAL

The celebration of the George Washington Bicentennial continued until Thanksgiving of the year under review. It was pointed out in my last annual report that the State Department cooperated with the schools to the fullest extent. The schools of New Jersey utilized this commemoration as the basis for extended work in dramatics, history, and related fields. Many exhibitions which were developed by the schools were most important in in-

stilling in the minds of the pupils the great contribution which Washington made to the development of his country. No less important was the function of this work in arousing in adults interest and enthusiasm for the contributions of the Father of our Country.

#### CHARACTER EDUCATION

The division of elementary education reports to me that interest in character training has steadily increased during the past year. It has not been possible as yet for us to develop any monograph covering this field. We shall continue to work in this field with the various school superintendents and supervisors to the end of utilizing the school program and school activities as the basis for this training until it becomes possible to issue material upon the subject.

#### RURAL EDUCATION

It is a satisfaction to report that the work of the helping teachers of New Jersey is attracting attention in various parts of the United States. The schools operated under their direction in the various counties are among the best rural schools to be found in this country. The Division of Elementary Education is responsible for the supervision of this work. It has been stated repeatedly that it is difficult to find anywhere such an able, well-educated group of teaching supervisors.

As reported before, we have given particular emphasis in our rural school program to the development of a program of education that makes the most of the interests, abilities and individual efforts of the children. We have given large place in this program to creative activities and have encouraged pupil initiative. As a result, we feel that the rural children are given rich opportunities and the results which we have obtained have been most gratifying. I visited last year the exhibits of the work in Warren and Hunterdon counties and have no hesitation in saying that they were indicative of an exceptionally well planned and executed educational program. The excellent professional attitude displayed by the helping teachers is highly to be commended and their skill in developing the teaching in the rural schools is maintaining an educational program of high order.

## SECONDARY OR HIGH SCHOOL EDUCATION

The enrollment in the public high schools of New Jersey continues to increase. In my last annual report, I called attention to the fact that in the two years preceding the date of that report the enrollment in the junior and senior high schools had increased 37,632 or 27.6 per cent over the enrollment in these schools for the year ending June 30, 1930. Last year there were enrolled in the junior high schools of the State 45,951 pupils, which was an increase of 4,199 over the enrollment for 1931-1932. There were enrolled in grades IX to XII in all high schools 167,609 pupils as compared with 146,328 enrolled in such classes the year before.

This increase of 21,281 pupils or 14.5 per cent in grades nine to twelve measures sharply the tendencies which we find at work today. The avenues of employment have been practically closed to junior workers during the last two years. The large increase in the vocational schools, which is discussed in another section, indicates the same thing. Moreover a growing recognition on the part of the public of the value of high school education in the training of intelligent citizens has no doubt contributed in part to the increase in enrollment.

## SUBJECTS TAUGHT IN THE NEW JERSEY HIGH SCHOOLS

For some years we have gathered data to indicate the type of curriculum that is offered in the New Jersey high schools and to point out trends as they appear from year to year. We collect registration statistics in all of the subjects offered in the high schools and the studies made over a series of years are valuable for diagnostic purposes.

The comparative enrollments for this year and the past three years in the various subjects which constitute the principal core of our high school curriculum, namely, English, mathematics, history, science, and studies in American government and history reveal trends that are significant.

Practically the entire membership of the high schools is enrolled in courses in English. To interpret the trends from the figures which are given in the succeeding paragraphs it should be recalled that the increase in enrollment in grades nine to twelve for the year just closed was 14.5 per cent over that of 1932.

Latin shows an increase of 1,195 students or 4.5 per cent over the previous year; French, 3,576 or 11.9 per cent; German, 1,879 or 20.2 per cent; Italian, 274 or 13.2 per cent. The increased enrollment in the foreign languages reported, with the exception of Latin, is about what one would expect in high schools, which are expanding at the present rate. It shows a shift toward the election of the modern languages.

In the mathematics group, algebra shows an increase of 4,842 students or 10.4 per cent; plane geometry, 2,455 or 12.8 per cent, and solid geometry, 925 or 33.7 per cent. Marked increases are shown in registration in general mathematics—1,826 or 62.2 per cent; in trigonometry, 1,834 or 104.8 per cent. It is evident that the subjects of algebra and plane geometry are being replaced to some extent by a course in general mathematics. Increases in solid geometry and trigonometry may indicate a greater number of persons preparing for technical fields or merely that these subjects are elected by prospective entrants to college. The statistics indicate an emphasis upon these subjects, which is somewhat unusual.

In the general field of American history and Problems of American Democracy the trends are significant. The increase in registration in U. S. history and American history courses combined is 7,208, or an increase of 14.6 per cent. In general civics courses we find an increase of only 202 students or 11 per cent, but in Problems of American Democracy, a course which is designed to give instruction in the problems of American government, we find an increase of 2,163 students or 16.8 per cent. Economics shows a significant trend, with an increase of 1,452 students or 20.2 per cent over the previous year's enrollment.

In the field of science there are interesting shifts in the registration. In general science there was an increase of 4,633 stu-

dents or 13.6 per cent; in biology, 3,968 or 18.1 per cent; in chemistry, 1,458 or 14.5 per cent, and in physics, 1,064 students or 10.9 per cent.

There has been increase also in the enrollment in home economics subjects. Approximately four thousand more girls are taking courses in clothing today than in 1929-30 and about 2,500 more are taking courses in foods. There has been a large increase also in enrollments in shop work, in mechanical drawing, and in electrical work.

These studies of the various groups of subjects in the curriculum indicate that outside of the strictly college preparatory, commercial, or vocational courses the main structure of the general courses is made of the subjects which have been in the curriculum for a long time. In mathematics in the earlier years of the high school the shift is away from the subjects of algebra and geometry to general mathematics. The percentages of increase in the sciences are indicative of a wider selection of these subjects by students who elect them in the general courses. It is noteworthy that there is an increase of 4,500 students in New Jersey high schools having the opportunity to study some of the fundamental sciences that have such important applications to present-day living. It is significant that 4,000 more students last year elected to study biology than were enrolled in the subject in 1931-1932. The trend in history and government is interesting. Whereas only 1,700 more students are studying world history than the year before, there are 7,208 more studying U. S. history. The general civics courses for the earlier years of the high school have about held their own. Problems of American Democracy enrolled 2,163 more students and economics 1,400 more than were enrolled the previous year, which indicates the growing recognition of the value of these fields for training in American citizenship. It is significant that in the subjects relating to American history, American institutions, and economics 11,025 or 20 per cent more students than were enrolled last year are receiving instruction in these important fields.

## PERSISTENCE OF CLASSES

A measure of the holding power of the high school is the persistence of enrollment by years. In my report last year I stated that in 1920-21, 60 per cent of the number who entered remained to the second year; 40 per cent to the third year, and 37.6 per cent to the fourth year. In 1932, twelve years later, of 100 who entered in 1929, 69.9 per cent remained to the second year; 53.1 per cent to the third year, and 50 per cent to the fourth year. For the year ending June 30, 1933, of 100 pupils who entered in 1930, 73.2 per cent remained to the second year; 58.1 per cent to the third year, and 51.8 per cent to the fourth year. Not only have the high schools increased in membership at a rapid rate during the past year but the percentages of students enrolled in the several years have shown significant increases.

## VALIDATION OF CREDENTIALS

Upon the Department of Public Instruction is placed the responsibility for approval of courses on transfer and making suggestions as to how the schools shall receive these credentials and apply the credit even though the school to which the student goes does not offer an identical curriculum. When the Department has validated credits appropriate individual adjustments are made by the receiving school, even though the curricula are not identical. By conferences with the schools and close study of this matter it has been possible to develop such relations among the high schools that students who transfer are able to do so without loss of credit.

## STATE HIGH SCHOOL CONFERENCE

The State High School Conference, which is held annually at Rutgers University, was conducted on May 5 and 6 at New Brunswick through the joint cooperation of the New Jersey High School Teachers' Association, Rutgers University, and the State Department of Public Instruction. For some years the Junior High School Teachers' Association of the State has cooperated in carrying out this program and although maintaining a separate

association has made valuable contributions to the program. During the session of the conference held last May the two associations were merged into the New Jersey Secondary Teachers' Association, and henceforth this new association will be the professional association of teachers cooperating in the organization and conduct of the conference.

#### RELATIONS BETWEEN RECEIVING AND SENDING DISTRICTS

New Jersey has been fortunate in her organization of public secondary education. Opportunities to obtain a high school education are not limited by district or county lines. For many years high schools located in centers of population have served not only the particular communities in which the buildings are located but also many communities in the contiguous territory.

The growth in population, since 1920, and the development of school transportation have been reflected generally in the development and enlargement of existing high schools. Relatively few new four-year high schools have been organized in the last seven years. This program has prevented the formation of a large number of small high schools with meager programs. It has also prevented duplication of facilities. Moreover, it has furnished in these areas better organized high schools and better high school education than could have been offered in a larger number of very small high schools.

During the depression we have encountered serious difficulties in maintaining relations between sending and receiving districts. Many districts have been unable to pay tuition promptly and others have not paid tuition bills at all. Last year I was able to report that most of the districts which owed tuition to other districts maintaining high schools had discharged their obligations by the end of the fiscal year. This year closed, however, with a very serious condition. Some 227 districts had failed to pay their tuition bills in full at the close of the fiscal year. Some of these accounts will be adjusted at the beginning of the next fiscal year and before the opening of school. In some instances the receiving districts which have not already done so have expressed a willing-

ness to accept an interest bearing warrant which will be redeemed as school moneys become available to the sending districts. It is our hope that we shall be able to work out adjustments so that all persons entitled to high school education will be enrolled in the high schools to which they have been assigned and that such arrangements may be made as will insure at least partial payments of the tuition accounts owed at as early a date as possible.

Under the statute the Commissioner is empowered to grant change of designation of high schools for sending districts. It has become necessary to grant such change of designation in some cases and I have no doubt it will be necessary for us to grant a number before the schools open in September. Under the secondary school program as developed, competition among districts has been largely eliminated because of the operation of the law relating to the designation of high schools. In all of these decisions the ability of communities to pay, the kind of education which is offered by the receiving districts involved, transportation, remoteness, and other factors are given careful consideration. All decisions of the Commissioner on this question are subject to review by the State Board of Education.

In this connection, attention should be called to the fact that the high schools are becoming seriously over-crowded. Elsewhere I have called attention to the large increases in high school membership and have indicated that this trend is likely to continue. I have called attention also to the fact that very little building construction is being undertaken.

Two courses are open. Additions to present high school plants should be made as soon as economic conditions will warrant and in some instances entirely new plants should be constructed. This course should be followed in many districts because most of the sending districts would not be able to build economical units and the cost of maintaining them, if built, would lay a serious burden upon the taxpayers. It is to be hoped that under the Public Works Act grants of money for the building of schools will be made available so that school districts may receive some aid from this source.

Another method of meeting the situation will be through the creation of larger areas for high school purposes. By the development of such large consolidated districts which can be worked out under the regional school act or a modification of it, the opportunity for the establishment of high schools of sufficient size to offer worthwhile programs and at the same time to make the maintenance cost a reasonable one for the cooperating districts will be afforded.

#### PHYSICAL AND HEALTH EDUCATION

The Division of Physical and Health Education is responsible for the organization and supervision of the work in physical training and health education. During the year the division has carried on its program of supervision and service in the schools. This work is growing constantly and with the present staff it is difficult to meet all the requests that come to us.

The director of the division reports to me that everywhere there is emphasis and greater interest and more sincere concern in the development of an effective health education program. As indicative of the scope of the work carried on during the past year, the following summary is significant: During the year, the staff visited 118 elementary schools, 66 junior and senior high schools, and 88 rural schools. Twelve visits were made to normal schools and teachers colleges, 3 visits to the New Jersey School for the Deaf, and 2 visits to county vocational schools. In addition the staff held 1,014 conferences with individuals and groups. The staff conducted also 30 demonstrations in physical education and 86 demonstrations in some phase of health supervision. The members also conducted one survey of health and physical education, that at Point Pleasant Beach. The staff also addressed 118 meetings of physical education teachers, physicians, nurses, and normal school students.

In the developing of the program of health and physical education New Jersey has been fortunate in establishing relationships with a large number of organizations. In the past two years the general plan of this program has been reviewed. The New Jersey

Medical Society has given endorsement to the program for school physicians and has continued its cooperation by setting aside a page of its official journal for a school health department which is conducted by our director and by including a section on the program of its annual convention devoted to the work of school physicians.

The New Jersey State Dental Society has maintained a Mouth Hygiene Council which serves the division in an advisory capacity.

The close relationship which the division has maintained with the State Department of Health has been continued. The Bureau of Communicable Disease Control has rendered us important service in giving rulings in relation to local school situations. We have worked with the Bureau of Child Hygiene and the results promise strength to the school nursing program.

The director serves as a member of the board of directors of the New Jersey Tuberculosis League. Much valuable assistance has been given to the work with school children. Close relationships have been maintained also with the New Jersey State Police in connection with the school safety patrol program. Valuable aid has been rendered by the New Jersey Congress of Parents and Teachers. The Department of Public Instruction has maintained close relationship with this organization and has assisted in organizing the child health program of the Congress.

In addition to these major lines of cooperation, it should be stated that one or more members of the staff has served on the principal boards or committees of the State which carry on the various phases of work in physical education, medicine, and nursing.

Among the major projects of the year which have been carried out are the following:

1. Research study of the child health activities of Parent Teacher Associations
2. Development of the anti-tuberculosis campaign among school children

3. Continued efforts to strengthen the work of the physician in the school health program

4. Survey of safety activities in schools carried on by automobile clubs, county safety councils, insurance companies, the American Legion, Congress of Parents and Teachers, Public Service Corporation, State Police, Highway Department, and State Motor Vehicle Department

This survey has been carried on for the purpose of strengthening the program and eliminating duplication and overlapping.

5. Conducting institute for school nurses in twenty counties

6. Conducting sectional conferences for all physical education teachers in the State

7. Giving a large amount of attention to malnutrition and school lunches. This was carried on by means of leaflets which were issued, through radio broadcasts, and public meetings.

During the year the following publications were issued:

“Standards in Health and Safety Education”

“Standards in Physical Education”

“A School Health Program for the Physician”

“School Dental Service”

“School Safety Organizations”

In addition two publications prepared by the division were made available to the schools through the courtesy of the Milk Research Council. They were:

“The School Lunch”

“Child Health and Nutrition”

In addition to these publications, a large number of stencilled bulletins and letters were issued to schools and teachers. The division staff also contributed a monthly page to a health bulletin for teachers issued by the New Jersey Tuberculosis League. This same material was used also by Health News, the monthly journal of the Bergen County Tuberculosis and Health Association. Articles were contributed also to such national periodicals as the Public Health Nurse, Safety Education, and the Journal of

Health and Physical Education. Other articles were contributed to the magazine of the New Jersey League of Municipalities, the Education News of Burlington County, and the Journal of the Medical Society of New Jersey.

It is noteworthy that the health of school children has been maintained at a high level during the depression. This condition of general good health testifies to the alertness displayed by medical officers and nurses and others engaged in the work of health education.

Good health has come to be recognized as one of the most important and fundamental assets, and it is conceded, I think, that the school which is responsible for a large proportion of the activities of children must not neglect its responsibility in this particular. The program which is undertaken in the schools is comprehensive. The important thing is to make sure that it is adequately supervised and that teachers are so trained as to be able to carry on intelligent cooperation with nurses, physicians, and other health workers. If this is done, the program as outlined holds much promise.

#### VOCATIONAL EDUCATION

##### IMPORTANT ASPECTS OF THE WORK OF THE VOCATIONAL SCHOOLS DURING THE DEPRESSION

In the last two annual reports I have called attention to the manner in which vocational schools have met the problems of the economic depression. In September, 1931, the Commissioner held a conference of directors of vocational schools for the consideration of the problem of training unemployed workers. A second conference was held in September, 1932, in which the same problem was considered and in which very definite planning was undertaken to provide an efficient program with reduced budgets. It has been found necessary during the year to charge fees in some of these courses in order to cover the cost of materials. Vocational schools during the year have increased approximately nineteen per cent in membership. They have been obliged to meet

the problems of largely increased enrollments and reduced staffs. The schools have met the situation in various ways—principally by reducing shop and classroom supplies, reducing the salaries of the teachers, and increasing the size of classes.

The amounts saved in the total budgets for vocational education appear mainly in the appropriation for day schools, but the cuts in the evening school budgets have been proportionately much higher. The total amount spent for evening vocational schools has always been relatively small and has amounted to about eight per cent of the total expenditures. The budget decrease for the evening vocational schools last year was sixty per cent. Twenty districts have been maintaining evening industrial classes and eight of these discontinued all instruction of this type during the last year. This is regrettable because such classes constitute practically the only school activity provided for industrial workers both employed and unemployed.

Notwithstanding the fact that the various vocational schools, the vocational evening classes, and the classes in practical arts have been forced to operate on reduced budgets the work described in the last annual report dealing with aid to local communities for the relief of economic distress has been much expanded. Teachers of these subjects have had experience over a long period with the problems arising from certain needs of their pupils, such as food, clothing, and employment, and their experience has enabled them to be of great assistance in the present economic crisis. Courses have been modified to fit the times and more time has been given practical work using the immediate needs of the pupils as the basis of the instruction. In carrying out this work the schools have operated through such organizations as the Red Cross, the Needlework Guilds, and various local relief agencies. In a number of districts the teachers of home economics worked with directors and committees of the emergency relief in planning food orders for distribution to needy families. Conservation has been emphasized. A preliminary report from 23 schools shows that 13,331 jars of fruit, vegetables, and jellies were preserved. Many thousands of dollars have been saved also in the renovation of garments and in helping pupils to prepare nutritious dishes for home consumption from left-overs.

Agricultural departments of the schools have contributed in numerous ways to community relief. In nearly all of the schools surplus farm products have been collected for distribution to the various relief agencies. Aside from the material assistance they have rendered to many families in need of help, the schools have rendered very important service in maintaining the morale of students whose home conditions have been demoralizing under the present emergency.

#### HOME ECONOMICS EDUCATION

There has been no decrease in the number of day vocational schools and departments and no reduction in the teaching staff. In Paterson, Newark, Atlantic City, and Middlesex County all evening classes in home economics were eliminated.

In the high schools, two districts have added home economics, two have made provision for instruction in new buildings but have not yet installed equipment, three districts have added to their present facilities newly equipped departments. However, instruction in home economics has been eliminated in the day schools in five districts and part-time work has been discontinued in six districts. There has been curtailment of the program in a number of districts but when it is recalled that home economics instruction is maintained in one hundred eighty-three districts of the State this summary indicates that the value of the instruction is recognized.

The work of the home economics departments has been well done and has met very definitely certain problems of the depression. The present emergency is somewhat similar to that which existed during the World War when there was need for food conservation. The present situation is no less an emergency and the home economics teachers are aiding their communities in many ways and very efficiently.

The home economics departments have very much increased the purchasing power of the teacher's fund which has been supplied for needy children by planning and preparing meals for undernourished children and by constructing garments in the clothing

nourished children and by constructing garments in the clothing classes. The home economics classes have done a great deal of work with family budgets. Such budgets have been made class lessons and students have learned how to make economical budgets. It has been reported by mothers that their daughters are now asking for less and taking better care of what they have as a result of this instruction.

The work in foods referred to above has been significant and in many cases it has been possible for pupils to take home fruits and vegetables much needed by their families for winter use. Frequently a daughter who has received her instruction at school has canned the entire winter supply of fruits and vegetables at home. Not only has instruction in clothing been utilized by girls in their homes but in the classes very much work has been done to meet community needs.

The work which has been done in the home economics departments of the schools is not limited to the pupils in the classes as the teachers have prepared menus, recipes, and market lists for distribution. This material has been sent out in mimeographed form through pupils, district nurses, and relief organizations wherever needed. In one of our schools in order to help the community the sewing room is kept open three days a week after school hours so that pupils may work in making clothing needed by themselves and their families.

#### TRADE AND INDUSTRIAL EDUCATION FOR GIRLS AND WOMEN

Girls seek admission in large numbers to classes which offer training for a wage-earning occupation. Aside from the large number of trade classes operated for women, the vocational schools have recognized that girls as well as boys who do not qualify as skilled workers need a special type of occupational training. Accordingly, there have been organized what may be termed pre-employment or multi-occupational courses. The best courses of this type are offered in the Essex County Trade School for Girls. They aim to develop dexterity in a wide variety of simple industrial processes.

## AGRICULTURAL EDUCATION

During the past year vocational agricultural classes were conducted in 48 centers in the State. The total enrollment in the classes was 2,300, an increase of 601 over the previous year. In addition to instruction in the subjects of agriculture these teachers gave instruction in other subjects relating to agriculture to 1,143 pupils. This enrollment includes the high school pupils in all year attendance, courses for pupils who have left school but returned for instruction during the winter months, and classes for adults.

All of the pupils have conducted some type of farm project under the direction of the agricultural teachers. Those for the younger members of the classes are production enterprises. Other projects, particularly those for adults, represent projects in improving farm processes designed to help the men to become more efficient farmers. Accurate farm accounts covering the operation of production enterprises have been kept by the pupils. From the projects completed during the year, \$108,502.68 was realized. It is interesting to note that the total salaries of teachers of agriculture during the year were \$79,446.84. This indicates that for every dollar spent for salaries there has been returned to the community \$1.37 in actual farm income.

The purpose this year has been to show how production costs of farm enterprises may be reduced to the minimum. Lower feed costs, selection of better stock, prevention of disease, and similar problems have been stressed in all work in poultry, dairying, and other fields considered. In crop production attention has been given to spraying and dusting and other processes as a means of combating pests, reducing losses, and producing quality products.

Cooperative buying, cooperative seed treatment, and cooperative selling have been made an important part of the instruction in the agricultural classes. Students have done group buying and selling under the direction of the school. Efficient marketing practices other than cooperative selling have also been taught in the classes. This has included better grading, choice of markets, selling at retail where practicable, and selection of varieties.

The boys in the classes in agriculture have been active in direct relief by bringing surplus products to the school for distribution through the regular relief agencies.

Other important work which has been performed by the teachers of agriculture follows: The interpretation of the rulings of the Milk Control Board, assisting county agents in the work of the Agricultural Adjustment Act, giving help and direction to the unemployed who were operating gardens, and giving advice to many inexperienced farmers who were endeavoring to farm with little capital.

#### THE DAY VOCATIONAL SCHOOLS

From 1930-1933 there has been an increase in the enrollment in the day schools of 3,075 pupils. During this period there have been significant changes in the courses of study. The change in instruction has been in the direction of giving more attention to technical knowledge and less to manipulative skills in a number of the trade courses. In the Bayonne Vocational School the beginnings of vocational technical high school work have been made. A new building will be required for this work. In the meantime, this course imposes an additional load upon an overcrowded plant. The increase in the enrollment in these schools has not been accompanied by an increase in facilities and the result is that the shops and classrooms are crowded. Only 44 additional teachers have been engaged to meet the demands of increased enrollment. An attempt has been made to meet the situation in some schools by eliminating regular classes for instruction in such subjects as English and science and combining them with the shop instruction. This is not proving satisfactory and should be regarded only as an emergency measure.

#### TRADE EXTENSION EDUCATION

A study of the enrollments in the evening trade and industrial classes for the four-year period 1929 to 1933 shows that we had a decided drop of 3,600 in the enrollment in 1930 which is accounted for by the withdrawal of building trade mechanics and

apprentices who were eliminated when the building industry collapsed. The enrollment increase for 1931-1932 was due to the enrollment of workers from the manufacturing plants. These workers recognized the need for additional training which would enable them to hold the new jobs to which they were assigned. Adult workers also enrolled for retraining purposes. By 1932 the extension classes had increased to 1,420 over the enrollment in 1930. But in 1933 there were 2,466 fewer persons enrolled than in 1932. Our study of the situation indicates that this drop in enrollment is due principally to the failure of local boards of education to provide funds for these classes. Paterson, Atlantic City, and Middlesex County eliminated their classes, and a number of other school districts which have no all-day trade schools but which usually conduct two to four trade extension courses found it impossible to operate them last year. There has been much demand in these cities for organization of these courses.

We cannot give detailed information as to how many workers have been continued on payrolls because they have had the advantage of trade extension classes. There is every reason to believe that the percentage is large. In some districts approximately twenty-five per cent of the enrollment in trade extension courses is made up of unemployed mechanics who are preparing for the first employment opportunities that may arise.

There is apparently little prospect of trade extension instruction being resumed in the near future in districts which discontinued it during 1932-33. Unless economic conditions improve many budgets for 1933-34 will not provide for it. This is an unfortunate situation. With the increase in employment resulting from operation of the N. I. R. A. many workers are already finding new jobs in industry. Those well-equipped in trade skill and technical knowledge are finding little difficulty. Others who lost jobs early in the depression because of lack of adaptability will need training and guidance that will enable them to fill acceptably many places that will open. Trade extension schools and classes are practically the only agency available to render such assistance to trade and industry.

## SERVICE ACTIVITIES

Each year the Vocational Division is called upon to render service of some kind to the industries of the State. During the past year we have conducted courses in foremanship training. In addition to this we conducted for the Elizabeth Safety Council a series of conferences dealing with industrial safety problems. Also we conducted two training programs for volunteer fire departments.

## CONTINUATION SCHOOLS

The enrollment in the continuation schools during the past year has been the lowest on record. Thirty-three districts and two counties enrolled 2,450 boys and 4,286 girls making a total of 6,736. This was a decrease of 2,445 pupils from last year and represented a decrease of four districts offering this instruction. It was pointed out in the report of last year that the principal reason for this small enrollment was the lack of employment opportunities. It means, further, that large numbers of children have returned to full-time attendance in the day schools. Since it has been estimated that over 12,000,000 people in the United States are unemployed it is remarkable that even 6,736 boys and girls under sixteen have found employment in this State during the past year.

As the number of employed minors who are subject to the provisions of the continuation school laws has declined we have recommended the organization of full-time classes for the pupils who would have entered employment if jobs were available. Such classes have been formed in the following places: Newark, Hoboken, Elizabeth, Paterson, Passaic, and Atlantic City. The Essex County Vocational Schools have developed similar classes under the name "multi-occupational groups."

## INDUSTRIAL ARTS

The work in industrial arts usually known as manual training has been of great importance during the depression. There has been a slight decrease in the enrollment for the State as a whole.

On the other hand there has been a marked increase in the class load because of the amount of time devoted to shop work. The shop work in these schools has been made practical and it has included the construction of a large number of articles useful in connection with the class instruction and has been marked throughout the State by the development of courses in home mechanics for boys.

All through the State the size of classes in industrial arts has been increased. In many instances space has been provided so that one teacher may readily supervise approximately the number of students that are enrolled in the academic classes.

It must be remembered also that large numbers of pupils in our schools, representing as they do a wide range of abilities and interests, will profit from this kind of instruction. We had begun to get a group of this type when the law raised the age for working certificates to fifteen years, and the almost total lack of unemployment opportunities has caused many young persons in the age group 14-18 to return to school.

#### REHABILITATION

The State Board of Education is charged with the responsibility for administering the joint State and Federal funds that are provided for the rehabilitation of persons injured in industry. The program of training is set up in a State plan approved by the Federal Board for Vocational Education. This plan of training and the payment for services are administered by the Commissioner of Education for the State Board of Education.

The State Rehabilitation Commission is charged with the responsibility of developing the program for training, guidance, and placement authorized under the Federal Rehabilitation Act and provided in the plan approved by the State Board of Education. For the fiscal year 1932-33 the Federal funds allotted to New Jersey amounted to \$48,544.86. Of this sum \$33,047.63 represented the annual allotment based on population. The remaining \$15,497.23 was the supplementary appropriation from the unused balances returned to the Federal government by other

states. The total expenditure for vocational rehabilitation for 1932-33 from State and Federal funds was \$115,675.37 which represented an increase of \$2,549.58 over the preceding year.

The total number of persons who completed training during the year was 325. Of this number 282 are still awaiting employment. The corresponding figures for the preceding year were 378 and 141 respectively. In addition to the number of persons trained, 463 persons were placed in employment during the past year.

#### THE TRAINING OF TEACHERS

In common with other activities of public education the expenditures for the State normal schools and teachers colleges were much reduced for the year ending June 30, 1933. The total expenditures were \$1,167,580.19. Of this amount \$168,010.71 represented income from tuition receipts; \$996,731.72 was appropriated by the Legislature. For the preceding year the total expenditures for these institutions from State appropriations amounted to \$1,455,176.75. The Legislature of 1932 passed an act making obligatory a charge of \$50 to each pupil for normal school education. Other acts require the purchase of textbooks by students and also provide that students may be required to purchase supplies for use in their classwork.

The same Legislature passed an act which provides that fees may be charged for summer school and extension courses. The summer schools of 1932 were made entirely self-supporting, and extension courses conducted during the past year have been entirely self-supporting. This legislation marks a distinct departure from the policy which had been pursued for many years. It makes the students responsible in part for the cost of teacher training education and makes possible the maintenance of summer school and extension activities on a self-supporting basis. At the April meeting of the State Board of Education a resolution was adopted which makes the fee for normal school and teachers college students \$100 for the year 1933-1934.

The total enrollment in all of the teacher training institutions reached 3,466 last year. Of these 1,168 were new students and 973 were graduated in June.

The depression has had a marked effect upon the number of teachers employed in the schools during 1932-1933. In 1932 there were approximately 2,500 teachers new to their positions. In the year under review only 1,300 were employed. Half of these were experienced teachers and half inexperienced. Of the teachers new to positions with experience, sixty-two per cent represented shifts from one position to another within the State and thirty-eight per cent came from other states. Of those without experience fifty-six per cent were trained in the New Jersey normal schools and teachers colleges, fourteen per cent in other New Jersey institutions, and thirty per cent in institutions located in other states. One-half of the last group were graduates of New Jersey high schools but had attended a higher institution in another state.

#### INSTRUCTION IN THE NORMAL SCHOOLS

For the past several years the Department has made a determined effort to improve the instruction in the normal schools. We have attempted to do this by developing new curricula for the normal schools and teachers colleges and through the activities of the supervisor of teacher training to (a) actually visit the classes in the normal schools as frequently as possible, and (b) to encourage the principals of the normal schools to carry on a program of continuous supervision.

The construction of the curriculum of the normal schools and the development of bibliographies was begun in 1930. During this year a course of study developed for the three-year general curriculum was completed and mimeographed. This was the course entitled "Problems in Teaching English" and is the last of the series. These courses of study have been prepared by committees which included representatives of all the normal schools. They are being used as a basis of instruction. We expect the faculty members to accumulate suggestions for a revision of these courses which will be undertaken in the next year or so.

During the past year the supervisor of teacher training carried out a definite program of supervision of all the six teacher training institutions. He spent two days in three of the institutions and three days in each of the others. He thus remained in each institution long enough to observe the teaching of nearly all of the instructors, inspect the physical plant, and to hold a round-table conference with the entire faculty. In these faculty conferences the discussion centered in two large issues: (a) The teaching procedures which had been observed by the supervisor and (b) a presentation by each instructor of his program. In this cooperative way it has been possible to encourage the instructors to view their particular teaching programs in relation to the entire teacher training program of the State. Suggestions were developed for the synthesis of the whole program in each school, and problems which should be the basis of cooperative endeavor among the schools were defined.

Extended conferences were held with the principals and suggestions developed were embodied in letters to them. As a result I am certain that there has been a new and worthwhile consideration of the programs of instruction in the various schools and of the important problem of making the normal school serve efficiently the schools in the area in which it is located.

The supervisor of teacher training has spent a day also with each supervisor of practice teaching and visited the schools in which practice teaching is conducted. The training which students receive during the period they are teaching under actual school conditions is in many respects the most important part of the student's program, and no efforts should be spared to maintain this work at the highest efficiency. From the results that have been reported to me I am certain that this procedure should become a part of our program of teacher improvement.

In my last annual report I called attention to the method of administering admissions to the normal schools. The standards outlined in the report are being maintained. Under regulations passed by the State Board of Education the enrollment of mid-year entering classes was abolished this year. The last mid-year

entering classes were admitted in February at Jersey City, Paterson, and Glassboro. Although this procedure may be accompanied by a slight reduction in the enrollment, it should result in economies and in more efficient instruction.

In that report I called attention also to the necessity for relating the work of the normal schools and teachers colleges to the public school system of the State. We have encouraged conferences with the superintendents and teachers in schools located in the areas served by each normal school and teachers college, and I am glad to report that the general outline of procedure recommended in last year's report has been faithfully carried out by all of the schools.

#### DIVISION OF BUSINESS

The Division of Business is responsible for compiling the statistics which form the basis of the annual apportionment of school moneys, keeps the accounts of the various funds that are to be apportioned, and is responsible also for the accounts of the Department. On the basis of the statistics compiled, this Division prepares the annual apportionment of school funds.

Inspection of the minutes and financial records of boards of education constitute an important part of the work of this Division. These inspections are provided by law and this service furnishes to the school districts of the State a check upon awarding of contracts and upon all of their financial transactions.

During the year under review the use of school orders for the payment of obligations was very much increased. The fact that receipts from local district taxes and from State apportionments were in many districts not sufficient to meet the current expenses of the schools forced many of the districts to take advantage of the provision of the law which permits them to issue interest bearing orders to meet such obligations. Fifty-five school districts in the State used interest bearing orders last year for the payment of some part of their current expenses. In fifteen other school districts municipal scrip, baby bonds, or other evidences of indebtedness were used for the payment of all or part of the

salaries and other current expenses. Directions were issued from the Department clarifying the procedure to be followed in issuing these orders. During the session of the Legislature an act was passed which makes possible the acceptance of school orders for the payment of taxes up to the amount of money due the board of education from the municipality, provided the governing body of the municipality passes an appropriate resolution.

#### ENROLLMENT IN THE DAY SCHOOLS

The total enrollment in the day schools for 1932-33 was 825,827, an increase of 12,936 pupils over the enrollment of the previous year. The enrollment in the kindergartens shows a decrease of 938 pupils or 2.1 per cent; the enrollment in grades one to eight (with the exception of the enrollments in the seventh and eighth grades in approved junior high schools) showed a decrease of 9,316 pupils or 1.6 per cent. Approved junior high schools showed an increase in enrollment of 4,199 pupils or 10.1 per cent; senior high schools (grades ten to twelve) showed an increase in enrollment of 5,029 or 22 per cent. High schools organized on the four-year plan (grades nine to twelve) showed an increase of 13,402 pupils or 12.13 per cent.\* The decline in elementary school enrollment is widely distributed in approximately 17,000 class-rooms and does not have significant effect in the membership of many of the individual classes. During this period of depression, however, the tendency has been to combine classes where possible and increase class size. This has resulted in the reduction in the total number of teachers indicated in the statistical tables.

#### STATE SCHOOL TAX

In my report of last year I pointed out that at the end of the fiscal year 1932, only \$1,174,782.97 of State school tax out of a total of \$17,978,774.14 remained unpaid. But at the close of the fiscal year under review there remained unpaid \$7,238,297.29

of the State school tax. On the same date there was still unpaid \$934,994.20 of the previous year's school tax.

Under an act approved March 23, 1933, municipalities may pay their State school tax in installments and the act further provides that ninety per cent of such payments shall be made available immediately to the various districts in proportion to the amounts appropriated to such districts. Chapter 156, P. L. 1933, provides that municipalities may pay up to ninety per cent of their State school tax in municipal scrip. They receive their share of the taxes in their own or county scrip depending upon the manner in which scrip is issued in the municipality and the county. Such municipalities are required, however, to pay ten per cent of the State school tax in cash.

Under the statute when counties are delinquent in the payment of State school taxes they are required to pay a six per cent penalty. Uncollected interest on the State school tax due this year amounted on June 30 to \$259,341.70.

#### THE RAILROAD TAX

In October, 1932, there was allotted to the counties for distribution \$529,353.99 of the railroad tax. This left a balance of \$1,863,850.30 still due the counties for distribution from the 1931 railroad tax. This amount is withheld at present by writs of certiorari issued by the Supreme Court of New Jersey.

Of the 1932 railroad tax which is subject to distribution to the school districts in September, 1933, we are informed that \$2,150,-772.47 of the amount is withheld on writs of certiorari issued by the Federal Court.

#### SCHOOL ATTENDANCE

During the last fiscal year, the total number of days' attendance reported by the Department was 132,637,489. This was an increase of 2,020,220 days. Last year there was a decrease of 1,239,649 days from the preceding year. Last year was one of three years in the last thirty-three in which there was a decrease in attendance. It is a matter of satisfaction to be able to report

this increase. The percentage of attendance this year is 93.1 per cent as compared with 93.4 per cent for last year.

#### OTHER ACTIVITIES OF THE DIVISION

The rules of the State Board of Education require that drinking water from such sources as wells, springs, and cisterns shall be tested at least once during each school year. Some 225 school districts depend upon these sources for their water supply. In these districts water samples are collected by the district clerk, medical inspector, or some other agent of the board of education and sent to the State Board of Health for analysis. All test records showing the character of the water were submitted to the Commissioner of Education. During the year 1932-33, 575 samples of water from 188 districts were tested. The results of these tests were communicated to the county superintendents who notified the local boards of education. These conditions were usually remedied by obtaining an entirely new source of supply.

The Division of Business maintains the mailing service of the Department and distributes all printed and stencilled matter which is sent from the Department. During the past year there were mimeographed 65,854 copies of 248 letters; 15,825 copies of 22 legislative bulletins; 14,100 copies of various forms; 175 copies of courses of study; 350 copies of decisions of the Commissioner; 755 copies of the annual reports of the Department; and 200 copies of the apportionment of school moneys. This constitutes an important part of the administrative work of the Department.

#### REDUCTIONS IN EXPENDITURES FOR PUBLIC EDUCATION

1932-1933

During the past year the schools have been operated on reduced budgets. By referring to the summary of expenditures and receipts in the statistical tables appended to this report, it will be noted that the total available funds for the year 1932-33 were \$26,797,787.52 less than the amounts available for the preceding year. This includes funds derived from public revenues for all educational purposes.

The total expenditures for public education in the counties and school districts of the State amounted to \$101,276,061.64, which was \$17,275,955.00 less than the expenditures for 1931-32. The following items reflect the type of reductions: Day school expenditures decreased approximately eight and three-quarter million dollars; maintenance declined a little over a million dollars; expenditures for manual training declined \$364,092.64; expenditures for vocational schools were reduced over \$235,249.48 or about 15 per cent. The cost of summer schools in the various school districts declined from \$508,806.66 to \$132,956.96 or a gross reduction of 73.9 per cent. Total evening school expenditures declined from \$986,507.12 to \$604,222.73 or a reduction of 38.8 per cent. Expenditures for vocational evening schools were reduced from \$266,985.94 to \$152,622.26 or a reduction of 42.8 per cent. Expenditures for lands, buildings, and equipment were reduced from \$11,556,216.96 to \$3,616,609.83, a decrease of 68.7 per cent. Debt service showed an increase of \$216,266.56 which was 1.2 per cent more than for the preceding year. This year the total amount of bonds and notes which were redeemed was more than twice the amount issued. During 1932-33 notes and bonds in the amount of \$8,902,442.45 were redeemed from taxes and sinking funds. In the same year there were issued bonds and notes in the amount of \$3,882,014.95.

### STATISTICAL SUMMARY

The total enrollment of pupils in all of the various departments of the public schools, including evening schools but not including summer schools, was 873,248 for the school year 1932-33. This was an increase in the day schools of 12,936 boys and girls and a decrease of 1,722 in the other divisions of the public schools. To instruct these 873,248 pupils there were required 28,804 teachers. The children were housed in 2,291 school buildings, a decrease of 14 from the preceding year. All were furnished not only with teachers, but with books, supplies, and the necessary apparatus free of cost.

There were transported to schools at public expense 77,830 children because no suitable school facilities were available near the homes of these children. Of this number there were transported to high schools outside of their respective school districts 25,600 pupils.

In the day schools there were enrolled 425,483 boys and 400,344 girls, making a total in the day schools of 825,827. In addition to these day school pupils, 16,726 were enrolled in other day schools. There were enrolled in evening schools, 30,695, making a total enrollment in all schools of 873,248.

There were 44,329 children enrolled in the kindergartens. In the first four grades, or what are commonly known as the primary grades, there was an enrollment of 319,531. The total number of pupils in grades five to eight inclusive was 285,139.

The total number enrolled in the high schools, grades IX to XII, was 167,609. This was an increase of 21,281 over the enrollment in 1932. The high school enrollments for the past five years are given below by years:

The total number of pupils enrolled in one-room rural schools was 7,871, an increase of 88. The number in two-room rural schools was 10,222, an increase of 480. There was a decrease of 5 in the number of teachers in one and two-room rural schools.

The average daily attendance in day schools was 697,067, an increase of 10,905. The average absence of pupils was 12 days.

There was a decrease of men teachers in all the schools of the State of 222 and a decrease of women teachers of 1,043, making a total decrease of 1,265 teachers.

SALARIES OF TEACHERS

The total amount of salaries paid day school teachers during the current year, including manual training, vocational, special summer school teachers, superintendents, assistant superintendents, and evening school teachers of all kinds was \$57,-498,124.96.

The average salary per year paid to all day school teachers (27,859) not including superintendents, assistant superintendents, or evening school teachers of any kind, was \$1,996.64 a decrease over the preceding year of \$158.57.
