REPORT.

QUARTERMASTER GENERAL'S OFFICE. }
TRENTON, November 30, 1866. }

To His Excellency Marcus L. Ward, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Militia of New Jersey :

SIR:—I have the honor to submit herewith my report of the operations of this department for the year 1866.

At the close of the last year, the war having terminated, there remained on hand at the Arsenal a large quantity of ordnance and ordnance stores, received from the United States upon requisitions for arming and equipping volunteer troops, and turned into the Arsenal by troops mustered out of service, to be turned over to the United States. You are referred to Statement G for a particular account of the property thus turned over.

This department has been engaged during the present year in making out returns of property purchased and issued to the New Jersey volunteers, to the accounting officer of the United States Treasury, in order to obtain a settlement of the claim of this State against the United States for expenses incurred in organizing and equipping troops for the United States service.

The 34th regiment, New Jersey Volunteers, on duty in Alabama, was retained in service until the present year. On its arrival at this place on the 2d of May, to be paid off and discharged from the United States service, it was met at the depot by the mayor of the city, accompanied by a band of music and a large body of citizens, and escorted through the streets of Trenton to the State House, where it was received by your Excellency in a speech bidding it welcome home and thanking it in the name of the people of New Jersey for the honorable, faithful and important services it had rendered to the State and nation, and tendering to it the hospitality of the State. On the day following it was escorted to Bechtel Hall, where the men were given a sumptuous dinner, at which congratulatory speeches were made in commendation of their meritorious and arduous services in behalf the Union.

On the 1st of March, under instructions from your Excellency, the New Jersey Military Agency at Washington was closed. The books,

records and papers pertaining to the Agency were turned into this office. The furniture was sold at Washington, and the proceeds, amounting to fifty-one dollars (\$51) were deposited in the State Treasury. Thus terminated the Agency, which was established in the early part of the war, by authority of the Governor. It was of great service to the State officials in furnishing a reliable communication with our troops in the field. Its beneficial results were felt and appreciated by the soldiers and the people of the State. Permit me, in this connection, to add, in justice to a faithful and meritorious officer, that Col. J. C. Rafferty, while in charge of the office, performed the duties with fidelity and zeal.

Recent events have proved to the satisfaction of military men the great superiority of the breech loading muskets over those now in use. The United States Government has recently completed a series of experiments to test the different models of breech loaders, and a great variety of plans for altering Springfield rifled muskets into breech loaders. A plan of alteration has been adopted, which is simple, efficient and durable, at a comparatively small cost. The Government is now engaged in applying this alteration to the Springfield musket, so that in a very short time all her troops will be supplied with this improved arm. This alteration requires a fixed metallic cartridge, and combines all the advantages of the celebrated Prussian needle gun in accuracy, range, and rapidity in fire, and is regarded in all respects as a superior arm. It is therefore recommended that a sufficient number of muskets now on hand be altered after the proposed plan, to arm the State Rifle Corps. It is important that the State arms shall conform as near as practicable to those in use by the troops of the United States, that in the event of our militia troops being called into the service of the United States, that one and the same manual and ammunition will answer for both classes of troops.

The active militia of this State available for an emergency, is comprised in the State Rifle Corps, organized and equipped under the act of the Legislature of March 30, 1864, entitled "An act for the more effectual organization of the New Jersey Rifle Corps," and the act of April 6, 1865, entitled "An act for the more effectual organization of the Militia." It consists of 32 companies organized into 3 regiments and 2 battalions, and the entire force forming one brigade. There was issued to this Corps in the year 1865, the following uniforms:

- 734 caps.
- 605 coats.
- 603 pairs, trowsers.
- 40 flannel sacks.

Tabular statements marked A and B, contain the issues of clothing to the rifle corps and the active militia during the years 1865 and '66, and the names of the officers to whom issued, and who are by law responsible to the State for its proper accountability. The total amount expended on account of clothing during the above periods, amounts to the sum of \$55,747.40, of which amount there was paid from the Treasury in 1865 \$6,024, in 1866 \$49,723.40. A large proportion of the clothing issued in 1865, was not paid for until the present year. This will account for the comparatively large amount expended for clothing in 1866 over that of 1865. Tabular statement C, contains all the issues to the rifle corps, of ordnance and ordnance stores, clothing, camp and garrison equipage.

Four companies of veterans have been recently recruited in Newark composed entirely of officers and men, who have seen service. These companies are organized in a battalion under Major William Ward, late of the 8th Regiment New Jersey Volunteers. The total strength of this battalion is 238. This corps has been under drill for over two months. It has received its arms and will be clothed and equipped by the 1st of February. From its composition, made up exclusively of veterans, it is expected that it will be by the time it is fully equipped, a thoroughly drilled and disciplined corps, and a credit to the military enterprise of the citizens of Newark.

A detailed statement of ordnance and ordnance stores issued to the active militia during the present year, will be found in the appendix under Statement K. These issues have been made chiefly to the rifle corps and consist of 1,361 small arms, with the necessary accoutrements and implements. In addition to this there have been armed and equipped during the same period two artillery and one cavalry company of the active militia.

The militia companies organized prior to and during the war, as home guards, have disbanded, except companies which have been attached to the State Rifle Corps, and their arms are being turned into the Arsenal as rapidly as possible. In some localities agents have been appointed for the collection and return of arms. This has been found to be the most effectual means of collecting those which

have been issued to companies a long time since, and the officers of which are mostly deceased or removed from the State. There still remains in the hands of the militia of the State, of the issues since the year 1837, when the present system of issuing to uniform companies upon bonds was adopted, as near as can be ascertained, about 1,300 small arms. There were collected during the past year 911 stands of small arms, with the accompanying accoutrements and equipments. For the particular sources from which they have been received you are referred to Statement I.

There remains in the Arsenal at this time 7,536 new Springfield rifled muskets, and 5,290 muskets and rifles of all kinds and calibre; 1,027 pistols new, and 60 that have been in service. There are also 2,012 sabres and swords new and serviceable, and 2,580 small arms of every description unfit for service. The State has 3 four-gun batteries of light Napoleon guns, bronze, including caissons, battery wagons and forges; 1 complete four-gun battery of James guns, bronze; 4 complete four-gun batteries of Griffin guns; and 1 battery of two-guns, Griffin. For a detailed statement of the Artillery you are referred to Statement D.

The operations of the Arsenal, the present year, have been directed to receiving, inspecting and issuing clothing, arming and equipping militia companies, cleaning and repairing muskets that have been turned into the Arsenal, and to the care and preservation of military property in store. The accommodations for the storage of arms and equipments at the Arsenal are unsuitable for the purpose. The old part of the Arsenal, originally erected and used as the State Prison, is constructed of massive walls and arches, without proper ventilation, and is unfit, by reason of dampness, producing rust, mildew and mold. I would therefore respectfully recommend that that part of the Arsenal be remodeled and suitably arranged for the better preservation of the public property. The expenses required in the care of property in an improved class of buildings would be inconsiderable in comparison to that which is now expended.

An encampment of the Rifle Corps was held at Long Branch for four days, commencing on the 24th of July, in pursuance of Special Orders No; 1. There was attached to this corps on this occasion Captain Gerth's Company of Newark Cavalry and Captain Waters' Newark City Battery, in all consisting of thirty companies, numbering about sixteen hundred men, under command of Brevet Major General Theodore Runyon, commanding New Jersey Rifle Corps. This encampment was a success. The order was responded to on the part of the Rifle Corps with great promptness and unanimity. It passed off without a single accident, and although there was considerable sickness incident to a change of water and diet, there was not a single case of serious illness. A detailed statement of the expenses of the encampment, together with the total expenditure on account of the militia service, will be found in Statement M.

Considerable progress has been made during the present year by the accounting officers of the Treasury of the United States in the adjustment of the claims of this State against the United States for expenses incurred in organizing and equipping troops for the United States service. As appears by the books in this office the amount of this claim is \$1,181,487.12, and is comprised in seven instalments filed at different times, and numbering from one to seven. The several dates, amounts and conditions are as follows :

The first, second and third accounts amounting to \$501,407.88, which covers the expenditures incurred from April, 1861, to July, 1862, have been officially settled and the sum of \$356,667.49 has been placed to the credit of the State on the books of treasury, leaving a balance of this claim of \$144,740.39, suspended and disallowed for an explanation of the object and necessity of the different items of expenditures.

The fourth, fifth and sixth accounts amounting to \$665,904.01, have been examined and adjusted by the Third Auditor and forwarded to the Second Comptroller for revision and confirmation. I am assured by the Comptroller that he will be able to complete his revision and examination of this account early in January.

The seventh account amounting to \$14,175.23, is at this time under examination in the Third Auditor's office, which will be completed before the 1st of January, when it will be transmitted to the Comptroller for his revision.

After the revision of accounts has been made by the Comptroller, he will return them to the Third Auditor, when the balances allowed will be credited to the State, and a statement of differences furnished this office of the reasons for the disallowance or suspension of the different items for explanation. I confidently believe that a very large proportion of suspended and disallowed accounts will, upon the explanations which can readily be furnished, be allowed upon a revision. The State received on the 31st day of August, 1861, an advance on the first account of \$74,000. The proportion of the United States Tax for 1861, assumed and collected by this State, amounting to \$382,613.90, is charged against the State on the books

of the Treasury. Deducting these two amounts leaves a balance in favor of the State of \$724,873.22. The claim of New Jersey is now in a condition to be settled at an early day, and I have the assurance of both the Auditor and Comptroller that the examination and settlement will be prosecuted with as much expedition as possible.

Statement J, Clothing, Camp and Garrison Equipage issued to the uniformed companies of this State, upon requisitions approved by the commandants of the corps to which said companies are attached, during the year ending November 30, 1866.

Statement K, Ordnance and Ordnance Stores issued to the uniformed companies of this State, upon their giving bond according to law, during the year ending November 30, 1866.

Statement L, the quantity of ammunition expended during the year ending November 30, 1866.

Statement M, shows the names of all persons from whom articles have been purchased, and the amounts paid to each under the several descriptions of expenditures incident to the recruiting, organizing, equipping &c., of troops mustered into the service of the United States, and the militia service of this State.

Statement N, shows the total amount of Ordnance and Ordnance Stores, Clothing, Camp and Garrison Equipage, &c., in hands of the New Jersey Militia on the 30th of November, 1866.

Statement O, Ordnance and Ordnance Stores, Clothing &c., in hands of the Newark Cavalry, 4 batteries of Artillery, and the veteran battalion.

Statement P, Ordnance and Ordnance Stores in hands of sundry persons.

RESOLUTIONS

IN CASE OF

CHARLES F. RUH,

AND

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE.

REPORT.

The Special Committee appointed to consider Resolutions concerning the case of Charles F. Ruh, present the following :

Your Committee to whom was referred the Resolution offered in this House, in reference to the recommendation of the pardon of Charles F. Ruh, would respectfully report, that they have investigated the facts set forth in the preamble to said resolution, and they believe, so far as they can ascertain, that the same are in substance correctly set forth. They also annex to their report a copy of the letter of Rynear A. Staats to the Governor. Mr. Staats appears to have been the only witness against Charles F. Ruh ; and his statements therein, together with the recommendation of two of the members of the court, eleven of the jurors before whom he was tried, and the numerous petitions of citizens of various parts of the State ; and also, taking in view all the facts and circumstances connected in the case of Ruh, your Committee are induced to believe that the law has been vindicated by the punishment he has already endured. They therefore offer as a substitute for the resolution referred to your Committee the following Preamble and Resolution for consideration and adoption :

WHEREAS, Charles F. Ruh, a member of the last Legislature of this State, has been convicted of the crime of indirectly offering to bribe a brother member of the same Legislature, and is now confined in the State Prison for that offence ; and

WHEREAS, Rynear A. Staats, appearing to be the only witness against Mr. Ruh, has recently written to Governor Ward stating the doubts in his mind as to the identity of Mr. Ruh, with the person who committed the offence ; and

WHEREAS, two of the judges of the court who sentenced him, eleven of the jurors who convicted him and recommended him to mercy, and numerous citizens of the State, have with extraordinary unanimity indicated an earnest desire that clemency should be exercised in this case ; therefore,

Be it resolved by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey, That His Excellency the Governor be earnestly requested to convene a special session of the Court of Pardons, to consider the case of Charles F. Ruh; that it be, and hereby is, recommended to the Governor and the Court of Pardons, that Charles F. Ruh be pardoned.

His Excellency Marcus L. Ward, Governor of the State of New Jersey :

DEAR SIR: I desire to make a statement to you and the Court of Pardons in the case of Charles F. Ruh, now in the State Prison, having been convicted for indirectly attempting to bribe me to vote for the Newark Railroad. I have always been uncertain as to whether it was Mr. Ruh who spoke to me on the subject, and when I went before the Grand Jury, the question was suddenly asked me without my having time to reflect upon the matter, and as an immediate answer was required, I stated my impression was that Mr. Ruh talked to me about the bill. After I left the Grand Jury I began to turn the matter over in my mind, and I felt that I could not be positive that Mr. Ruh was the man who made me the offer, and I so stated under oath at the trial. I was surprised when the jury convicted him, because I never meant to say at the trial that I could positively swear that Mr. Ruh ever made me any offer. The more I think of the case the more I am convinced that my impressions stated before the Grand Jury that Mr. Ruh was the man were erroneous. I am not intimate with Mr. Ruh. I never spoke to him three times in my life, and I fear that injustice has unwittingly been done to him through my instrumentality.

I earnestly hope and pray that he will be pardoned at once.
