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REPORT

To the Governor and Commander-in-Chief:

SIR:—Pursuant to paragraph 27 of the public act entitled “An Act concerning the Militia of the State”, approved May 16, 1906, I have the honor to report the operations of this department for the fiscal year ended October 31, 1910:

FIELD ARTILLERY.

I am glad to be able to report some progress in the matter of procuring suitable armories for the batteries of field artillery. The legislature at its last session appropriated \$25,000 for an armory for Battery A, Field Artillery at East Orange, and work will be commenced thereon as soon as the State Army Commission approves of the site, etc. The legislature also passed an Act authorizing the acquisition of land and the erection of an armory thereon in the City of Camden for Battery B, Field Artillery, and it is hoped that the legislature at the approaching session will provide a sum sufficient to begin work thereon. Acting under a recommendation of the War Department, a regular caretaker has been provided for each of the field batteries, whose special duty it is to keep in good condition for immediate service the valuable property issued by the Government for the equipment of these organizations.

CLOTHING AND EQUIPMENT.

The organized militia of this State is now, with the exception of regulation overcoats and shoes, practically supplied with clothing and equipment of the models, patterns and standards of the equipment of the Regular Army. The State has, however, a supply of overcoats of light blue kersey sufficient for the entire enlisted strength of the National Guard in good serviceable condition, and as it would require about \$60,000 to replace them with the Army regulation coat of olive drab, it has not been thought expedient in view of the great expense to make a change.

MARCHING SHOES.

At a meeting of the State Military Board, March 15, 1910, a resolution was adopted to the effect:

"That the Quartermaster-General of this State be directed to request of the Government on regular requisition shoes for the enlisted men of the National Guard of this State; to be furnished to the regiments upon requisitions approved by the regimental commanders".

Under this plan the shoes would be issued to the enlisted men without cost, and I am afraid would result in an annual expense to keep them in shoes for service at encampments and maneuvers, as it would be hardly possible to prevent the men from using the shoes for daily wear, so that when the period of field service arrived, it would be necessary to replace them as above. Acting under the direction of the State Military Board, twelve hundred pairs of shoes were drawn from the Government, but as yet, for the reasons given above, there has been no general issue made of them. I am of the opinion that the plan of the State Military Board should be so modified that part of the cost of shoes would be borne by the men, as in Pennsylvania, and other states, where the plan is practically as follows: Commanding officers of Division or Brigade supervise purchase for the N. C. Staff; commanding officers of regiments for the N. C. Staff, hospital corps and regimental band; commanding officers of companies, troops, batteries and signal corps for their respective organizations. Purchases are made by the commanding officers named above, direct from the contractor, the same to be paid for as follows: 1. One-half of cost of shoes per pair to be deducted from camp pay of enlisted men; each man to retain the shoes as his personal property after camp. 2. One-half to be paid from the annual appropriations for headquarters and company purposes, for which a properly itemized, receipted voucher will be filed with the financial report for the six months period ending June 30th. Of course, the shoes should be ordered in time to give the men an opportunity to break them in to conform to the foot before going into active service. Should the above plan be adopted, it could be promulgated in orders by the Adjutant-General with a view to obtaining supplies before the period of service at rifle practice and encampment. I am sure that the plan here outlined would be most satisfactory, as the men would take care that the shoes would last two seasons of active service, if not for the full period of a three years' enlistment, so as to avoid further stoppages from their pay.

STATE CAMP GROUNDS. STATE ANNUAL ENCAMPMENT AND U. S. CAMP OF INSTRUCTION.

By order of the Governor, the First Brigade, with the exception of the First Troop Cavalry, encamped at Sea Girt as follows:

Brigade Commander and Staff: July 25th to 30th, and August 1st to 6th inclusive.

First and Fifth Regiments Infantry: July 25th to 30th, inclusive.

Battery A, Field Artillery, 4th Regiment Infantry, and Signal Corps Company: August 1st to 6th inclusive.

Company E, 2nd Infantry, a new organization, was ordered into camp at Sea Girt for instruction, August 8th to 13th inclusive.

The following named organizations of the National Guard participated in the joint camp of instruction for the Regular Army and Organized Militia at Gettysburg, Pennsylvania: Second Brigade Commander and Staff; 2nd and 3rd Regiment Infantry; Battery B, Field Artillery, July 9th to 17th inclusive.

First Troop Cavalry, July 16th to 23rd inclusive.

Second Troop Cavalry, July 23rd to 30th inclusive.

The officers of Battery B, Field Artillery also attended a course of instruction under provisions of orders of the War Department, at Fort Riley, Kansas, from June 1st to 30th inclusive; and Major Arthur H. MacKie, 1st Infantry, N. G. N. J., attended the U. S. camp of instruction for infantry at Plattsburg Barracks, New York.
