ILL Net Lender Compensation Program 1990

The purpose of the ILL Net Lender Compensation Program is to encourage resource sharing by compensating those libraries that loan more materials to New Jersey Library Network members outside of their Regional Library Cooperative than they borrow.

A total of \$120,000 is available for compensation at a maximum of \$5.00 per eligible net loan for the 1990 program. Participants will report their eligible net loans both in August 1990 and in February 1991 and will receive compensation based upon these reports.

Electronic Communications Grant 1990

Participants

Funds: \$30,000

The intent of the Electronic Communications program is to encourage the use of the fastest means possible to request interlibrary loan materials and photocopies for the residents of New Jersey; to encourage the use of interlibrary loan by libraries; and to acquire reliable statistics on interlibrary loan activities. Participating libraries will be credited \$1.00 per transaction for all interlibrary loan requests which they place to New Jersey libraries through an ILL subsystem which meets State Library requirements and standards.

New Grant Programs

- Grant Program:** Library Development Aid -
Public Library 16mm Collections
- Amount Available:** \$390,000 (estimated) over a three year period
- Purpose:** To provide funding over a three year period to purchase 16mm films and provide film service to two designated areas: northern (Program A) and southern (Program B) New Jersey.
- Eligible Projects:** Those projects which provide for the purchase and circulation of 16mm films to public libraries. Film titles purchased under this program must be of the type most public libraries would use in programming for children and holidays.

Library Development Aid continued

- Eligible Applicants:** Any library or film library-related agency that owns and circulates a 16mm film collection of at least 1,200, 16mm films and agrees to make those films and those purchased with grant funds available to public libraries in the designated area.
- Priority for Award:** Applicant must achieve a total average score of 65 points or more. The applicant with the highest score within each program will be funded.

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Grant Program: Federal Library Aid -
School/Public Library Cooperation

Amount Available: \$90,000

Purpose: To provide funding to allow a planning team composed of a school library media specialist and a public librarian to develop, implement and evaluate a model which demonstrates a process for transferring from one library to another library students with unmet informational needs. For the purpose of this grant, transfer means sending a student or the information request from one library to another if the first library does not have the information the student requests.

Eligible Projects: This is a two-phase grant program. In Phase I, a planning team must be established which must be composed of at least one school/library media specialist and one public librarian. This planning team must identify the components necessary to create a model for the transfer of a student with unmet informational needs. In Phase II, grant funds will be used to implement the model developed in Phase I.

School/Public Library Cooperation continued

Eligible Applicants: Any independent school or any school district with a school library media center and a public library serving the same community may apply.

Priority for Award: Applicant must achieve a total average score of 65 points or more. Applications above the cut-off score will be funded in rank order, from highest to lowest, to the extent of available funds.

Grant Program: Federal Library Aid -
Urban Public Library Grant Program

Amount Available: \$250,000

Purpose: To provide funding to develop and implement a needs assessment tool to determine the library and information needs of the residents of the urban community.

Eligible Projects: Funding may be used to develop and/or implement a needs assessment. Needs assessment tools which may be utilized in this grant program are: a community survey, a patron survey, a focus group, or a combination of these tools.

Eligible Applicants: Any public library which serves a population of over 10,000 and meets the five characteristics used to describe an urban environment. These five characteristics can be divided into two groups. One group is made up of population factors (total population and population density) and the other group is made up of economic factors (income per capita, unemployment rate and equalized property valuation per capita).

Priority for Award: Applicant must achieve a total average score of 65 points or more. Applications above the cut-off score will be funded in rank order, from the highest to lowest, to the extent of available funds.

**Maintenance of Library Collections
Grant Program
1990 Awards**

In its third year of funding in FY 1990, the Maintenance of Library Collections Grant Program had two grant categories: the preservation and conservation of collections of Jerseyana, New Jersey imprints or unique collections of materials regardless of subject; and preservation planning.

A total of \$100,000 was budgeted, of which \$80,000 was set aside for preservation projects and \$20,000 for planning projects.

Four reviewers independently reviewed each application and assigned points according to the criteria outlined in the grant guidelines. The scores were then averaged and the applications ranked from high score to low in each grant category. To qualify for funding, an application had to earn an average of at least 65 points.

On that basis, the following awards were made:
