

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PREFACE

The 1984-85 edition of Vital Educational Statistics is the eleventh in a series which began in 1974-75. It marks the eighth year of a revised series using data derived from updated instruments supported by detailed and illustrated instructions. It is the seventh year that the publication has been produced in two volumes. A glossary of terms is provided to define the data elements for clarity of interpretation to the reader.

As in the previous editions, Volume I contains school district and school data, including enrollments, dropouts, graduates and facilities data. Each section contains narrative and tabular data to accommodate both reader and user preferences.

Volume II of Vital Educational Statistics is exclusively certificated and non-certificated Staff data. It is available as a separate publication.

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INTRODUCTION

This introduction presents selected trend data characteristic of public elementary and secondary education in New Jersey between 1980-81 and 1984-85. The four sets of data show enrollment, dropout and graduate declines experienced over the past five years; and the schools that housed the public elementary and secondary pupils.

INTRODUCTION (CONT.)

SYNOPSIS OF TRENDS

1980-81 to 1984-85

Statewide, enrollments in this period decreased by 9.4 percent or an average of 1.9 percent per year. Elementary school enrollments decreased by 7.4 percent or an average of 1.5 percent per year. Secondary school enrollments decreased by 12.6 percent over the period or an average of 2.5 percent per year.

The number of schools decreased by 151 or 5.9 percent of the total reported in 1980-81. Schools for the handicapped decreased by fifteen (15). Secondary schools decreased by 18 or 4.2 percent of those operating in 1980-81. Elementary schools decreased by 108 or 5.9 percent of those operating five years ago.

The total number of dropouts declined by 23.1 percent between 1980-81 and 1984-85. The number of dropouts, classified as "minority" also declined by 8.4 percent. The dropout rate (1980-81) of 1.7 percent declined .2 percent to 1.5 percent in 1984-85.

Although the number of public high school graduates decreased by 9.5 percent (between 1980 and 1984) the percent of those "continuing education" increased by 1.6 percent. The percent of 1984 graduates continuing their education was 64.5 percent.

DISTRICT AND SCHOOL INFORMATION

DISTRICT AND SCHOOL INFORMATION

Section I contains the following tables: Table I, Operating and Non-Operating Public School Districts; Table II, Universe of State, County and Local Educational School Systems; Table III, Enrollment Size of New Jersey Public School Districts; Table IV, New Jersey Public Schools by Type of School; Table V, Special Selected Programs with Enrollments by County.

Table I There were no changes in the status of the number of school districts operating or non-operating from the reported 616 in the 1983-84 school year. In the 1981-82 school year there were 597 operating districts and 22 non-operating districts for a total of 619. In 1982-83, the operating districts were reduced to 593 and the non-operating increased to 23. The number of operating districts declined by one to 592 in 1983-84 and the non-operating increased by one to 24.

Table II This table was first published in the 1981-82 Vital Educational Statistics and showed 601 operating administrative units in the state. In 1984-85 there are 606 operating administrative units of which 579 are local units, 13 are county units and 14 are state operated units. Between 1981-82 and 1984-85, there was a reduction of four (4) type I units from 53 to 49, the Type II units remained constant, the county units increased by one (1), and the state units increased by ten (10).

Table III This table was introduced in the 1982-83 edition and there have been no significant changes in the size of districts over the period. Three hundred (300) or 50.6

percent of the 592 operating districts enroll between 0 and 999 students and 292 or 49.4 percent enroll between 1,000 and 54,000 students. Of these 292 operating districts, one hundred and thirty (130) districts, an increase of seven (7) from 1983-84, had enrollments between 1,000 and 1,999. The remaining 162 districts ranged from 2,000 to the high of 54,768 students.

Table IV This table shows the type of schools which compose the state's public and elementary/secondary educational system. Column 12 reports a total of 2,255 public schools which represents a decrease of thirty-three (33) from the number of 2,288 reported in 1982-83. Of the total number of public schools, 1,833 were elementary schools and 422 were secondary. Increases in school types compared with 1983-84 were as follows: seven (7) middle schools (209 to 216); one (1) four-year high school (231 to 232); one (1) six-year high school (34 to 35); one (1) vocational; and, two (2) in the secondary school category designated "other". Declines by school type were: twenty-six (26) elementary; seven (7) approved junior high; five (5) three-year secondary; three (3) handicapped elementary; and, four (4) handicapped secondary.

A comparison of total number of schools by county between 1983-84 and 1984-85 shows that no county reported an increase in the number of schools. In nine (9) of the counties, Atlantic, Cape May, Cumberland, Hunterdon, Mercer, Monmouth, Ocean, Sussex and Warren, there were no changes in the number of schools. In Atlantic County, the number of handicapped

elementary schools decreased by one (1) and the number of elementary schools increased by (1). In Monmouth County, there was a decrease of two (2) elementary schools and an increase of one (1) secondary vocational and one (1) handicapped elementary. In the remaining twelve counties, Bergen (7), Burlington (1), Camden (4), Essex (4), Gloucester (1), Hudson (1), Middlesex (7), Morris (2), Passaic (1), Salem (1), Somerset (2), and Union (2), there was a total decrease of thirty-three (33) schools.

Of the 422 public secondary schools in New Jersey, 39.1 percent or 165 schools had enrollments between 500 and 999 students and 24.8 percent or 105 schools had enrollments between 1,000 and 1,499. Thus, 64.0 percent of the secondary schools in New Jersey had enrollments between 500 and 1,499 students.

Of the 1,833 public elementary schools in New Jersey, 76.2 percent or 1,397 had enrollments between 0 and 499 and 21.4 percent or 392 had enrollments between 500 and 999. Thus 97.6 percent of the elementary schools had enrollments of fewer than 999.

Table V. This table appears for the first time in a Vital Educational Statistics publication. It shows the special programs that the schools of New Jersey have established to meet the educational needs identified by the communities they serve and the numbers of students enrolled in those programs. The innovative programs to serve the special needs of students are not confined to any single county or region but are statewide, an indication that public educators are sharing their concepts and willing to adapt those ideas to the benefits of their educational system. No comparisons can be made at this time of increases or decreases in program enrollments or difference between counties and regions as this is the initial report of this type of data.

SECTION II

STUDENT INFORMATION

STUDENT INFORMATION

This section contains data on student enrollments, dropouts and high school graduate follow-up information. Of the 10 tables, four contain enrollment data, three carry dropout data, and three contain high school graduate follow-up information. All of the data reported are as of September 30, 1984. The data are used to prepare enrollment projections and they are also used to develop lists of schools that have high concentrations of low income pupils. The data are supplied to the National Center for Education Statistics and are made available to the public upon request.

ENROLLMENTS

Table VI is a membership table i.e., pupils on roll during the last school day of September 1984. The data are reported for day school students and were compiled from individual school reports submitted by each district. The special education pupils (Column 17) are students on roll in self-contained classes and "Mainstreamed" special education students have been reported with the regular students in their respective grade levels. There were 1,129,223 students on roll in the public schools as of September 30, 1984.

Compared with 1983-84, there was a decline of 18,618 students. This represents the lowest one-year decline reported in the past decade. There were enrollment increases in the Pre-Kindergarten, Kindergarten, Grades 1, 2, 9,

10, Post-Grads and Self-Contained Special Education categories. Between Pre-Kindergarten and Grade 2, there were 6,286 more students than in 1983-84. Although there were enrollment increases in Grades 9 and 10, between Grades 3 and 12 there was an overall decline of 27,534 students. In Post-Grads, self-contained Special Education and Ungraded, there was an increase of 2,630 students. If current conditions continue, the declining enrollment trend will be reversed sooner than the end of the decade, which had been predicted in the past.

Table VII is the first of two tables separating students on roll into elementary and secondary school categories. Note that seventh and eighth grade students on roll appear in both elementary and secondary counts depending upon the type of school in which they are enrolled. On September 30, 1984, 716,723 elementary students were on roll, 8,890 fewer than were reported in September, 1983. Four counties, Camden, Cape May, Gloucester and Middlesex, showed increases in elementary enrollments and four counties, Bergen, Burlington, Essex and Morris, showed declines of more than 1,000 students in their elementary enrollments.

Table VIII shows that in 1984, 412,500 secondary school students were on roll in grades seven through twelve, 9,638 fewer students than were reported in 1983. Eight counties, Burlington, Cape May, Cumberland, Hunterdon, Monmouth, Ocean, Passaic and Sussex showed increases which totaled 1,985 students; while three counties, Bergen, Essex and Middlesex,

showed decreases of greater than 2,000 in each. Overall, three counties (Cape May, Gloucester and Ocean) showed increased total enrollments and one (Sussex) remained constant.

Table IX shows the composition of the total enrollment by county in the five prescribed federal racial/ethnic categories. Of the total number of students on roll, 30.8 percent were reported as "minority"--an increase of 0.7 percent over 1983. In comparison to 1983, there was a decrease of 2.5 Percent or 20,227 in the White enrollment, a decrease of 1.5 percent or 3,228 in the Black enrollment, an increase of 2.3 percent or 2,431 in the Hispanic enrollment, an increase of 15.4 percent or 163 in the American Indian/Alaskan Native enrollment, and an increase of 8.5 percent or 2,243 in Asian/Pacific Islander enrollment.

Eight (8) counties exceeded the state average of 30.8 percent Minority: Hudson, 66.2 percent; Essex, 64.5 percent; Passaic, 47.0 percent; Union, 42.3 percent; Cumberland, 41.5 percent; Mercer, 37.9 percent; Atlantic, 36.3 percent; and, Camden, 33.1 percent.

DROPOUTS

Table X is the first of three tables reporting dropouts from both the elementary and secondary public schools. The data are reported by county. Table X data reports dropout "reasons" that are in conformity with Handbook V, Student and Pupil Accounting of the National Center for Education Statistics. Sixteen detailed explanations concerning reasons for discontinuing school have been consolidated into seven (7) categories for reporting purposes.

From September 1983 to August 1984, 16,519 dropouts were reported by the public schools. This was 87 fewer than the number reported last year. The data element titled, "Moved: School Status Unknown", accounted for 1,844 students who had moved to a new residence and their educational status (entry into another school) could not be determined. The category, "Moved: Status Unknown", decreased by 42 from the figure reported last year.

Three major categories (consolidated reasons) account for 89 percent of the reasons why students discontinue school: "Behavioral or Curricular," "Economic or Home Influences" and "Other Known Reasons." The detailed explanations incorporated into the "Behavioral or Curricular" category (Col. 3) include items D5 to D10 on the survey instrument. "Economic or Other Home Influences" (Col. 4) represents a consolidation of items D11 to D14. Column (7), "Other Known Reasons" is item D18.

Table XI shows the basic dropout categories of grade and sex. Slightly more than 50 percent of the total dropouts were reported in grades 10 and 11. This percent increases to 91 with the addition of the 9th and 12th grade dropouts. The 9th grade class entering high school in 1979-80 and graduating in June 1983, had a cumulative dropout percentage of 16.7% (3.3% of the 9th grade + 4.9% of the 10th grade + 5.0% of the 11th grade + 3.5% of the 12th grade). The 9th grade class entering in 1980-81 and graduating in June 1984, had a cumulative dropout percentage of 16.9% (3.6% of the 9th grade + 4.9% of the 10th grade + 4.5% of the 11th grade + 3.9% of the 12th grade). During

this same period, the percentage of Special Education students reported as dropouts had increased from 3.22% of the total to 4.85%. The ratio between the sexes has remained constant with the males accounting for slightly more than 58% of the total and the females slightly more than 41%.

Table XII shows the state's public school dropouts by racial/ethnic origin. In comparison with the 1982-83 school year, the percentage of white decreased by 0.3%, black decreased by 0.1%, Hispanic increased by 0.6%, and American Indian/Alaskan Native, Asian or Pacific Islander categories were without change.

GRADUATES

The three tables in "The Follow-UP of Graduates" series were developed using the data reported by the secondary public schools from their studies conducted in the fall of 1984 of the 1983-84 graduates. The 85,569 graduates in 1983-84 were the first since 1971-72 to drop below 90,000 and are projected to continue to decrease in the future. Of the 88,568 twelfth graders enrolled on September 30, 1983, 96.6% graduated. In comparing the past five years, this percentage ranks second to the 1982-83 high of 97.3%. When the graduates are taken as a percentage of the ninth graders reported enrolled in the schools on September 30 four years earlier, the graduation rate is 79.8%. This is the highest percentage of graduates since the 80.5% in 1975-76.

Table XIII shows the status of the 1983-84 graduates in the Fall of 1984. Of the total graduates, 64.5% or 55,213 had elected to continue with their education. This continues the trend which has been increasing since the reported 61.9% in 1979-80. A similar trend is evident in the enrollment of graduates in college or university where the percentage has risen steadily from 53.6% in 1979-80 to 56.4% in 1983-84. On the other hand, enrollments in other education rose from 8.3% in 1979-80 to 9.0% in 1982-83, dropped to 7.8% in 1983-84 and climbed back to 8.1% in 1984-85. The number employed shows a continuous decline from 28.3% of the graduates in 1979-80 to 23.9% in 1984-85.

Table XIV shows the racial/ethnic distribution of the public high school graduates. Of the 85,569 graduates, 21.7% or 18,592 were classified as minorities. This was an increase of 1.5% over the preceding year. Nine counties in 1984-85 exceeded the statewide average of 21.7% minority graduates. They were: Hudson, 57.1%; Essex, 48.5%; Cumberland, 33.7%; Passaic and Union, 32.1%; and, Camden, 21.9%.

Approximately fourteen (14.3) percent of the graduates were Black, six (5.9) percent were Hispanic and the remaining minority groups accounted for two (1.6) percent of the total graduates.

Table XV shows the racial/ethnic distribution of the public high school graduates who enrolled in colleges or universities. Of the 48,227 graduates in colleges or

universities, 39,724 (82.4%) were White, 5,223 (10.8%) were Black, 2,176 (4.5%) were Hispanic, 1,081 (2.2%) 2,343 Asian or Pacific Islander, and 23 were American Indian/Alaskan Native.

Of the graduates attending colleges and universities, the percentage attending In-State dropped from 58.9% in 1983-84 to 56.4% in 1984-85. Graduates attending Out-of-State colleges increased by 341 from the 20,701 in 1983-84 to the 21,042 in 1984-85.

SECTION III

FACILITIES INFORMATION

SCHOOL FACILITIES

This section contains a series of three tables designed to report on the status of the physical facilities of the New Jersey public elementary and secondary schools. The first two tables in the series related to instructional space from the points of availability and need. The third table shows the estimated costs of the capital improvement projects which are being planned over four years to meet the operating and maintenance needs of the school districts.

Table XVI shows the instructional space available by count in the New Jersey public school system. The table refers to available space by school buildings and classrooms. Buildings are district-owned structures which in the past served as schools but as of September 30, 1984 were not being used and/or had been converted to serve a different function. Classrooms are instructional spaces in operating schools which were not being used on September 30, 1984.

Eight counties--Middlesex (18), Essex (16), Bergen (13), Burlington (13), Morris (13), Union (13), Monmouth (12), and Somerset (11)--accounted for 69% or 103 of the reported 158 district-owned schools not being used for instructional purposes in 1984-85. In the period beginning with the 1972-73 school year to 1984-85, these nine (9) counties had the highest declines in student enrollments ranging from 22.6% in Burlington to 37.9% in Bergen and closed a total of two hundred and three (203) schools.

The major uses reported of the converted buildings were administrative offices; rental and/or leasing to private companies, other municipal agencies and/or service organizations; and, warehouse/storage areas.

A total of 232 or 10.3% of the 2,255 operating public schools reported 1,180 available classrooms for an average of 5.1 available classrooms per school. Of these 1,180 classrooms, 85.8% or 1,012 were located in ten (10) of the twenty-one (21) counties--Bergen (219), Essex (212), Middlesex (131), Somerset (106), Morris (85), Camden (63), Hudson (61), Atlantic (53), Monmouth (46) and Passaic (36). These ten counties accounted for 75% or 174 of the 232 schools reporting available classrooms.

Table XVII shows the instructional space needed by county in the public schools. Need is shown by schools on split sessions and the utilization of approved substandard/emergency classrooms to provide instruction. On September 30, 1984, there were sixteen (16) schools located in nine (9) counties on split sessions. This is less than 1% of the operating public schools in New Jersey.

There were 2,745 reported County Offices of Education approved substandard/emergency classrooms being utilized in New Jersey on September 28, 1984. These classrooms were located in all twenty-one (21) counties with five (5) counties reporting more than two

hundred (200)--Hudson (349), Essex (344), Union (299), Monmouth (256), and Camden (255).

Of the 2,745 substandard/emergency classrooms, 87.3% or 2,396 were district-owned facilities and 12.7% were leased or rented by the districts.

Table XVIII shows that between 1984-85 and 1987-86 school districts across New Jersey may be soliciting some 5,408 bids to do 4,778 planned projects at an estimated cost in excess of five hundred and seven million dollars (\$507,851,144).

Of the \$507,851,144 total, 70% or 3,350 of the 4,778 projects are planned building projects i.e., new schools, additions =s, renovations, repairs and remodeling, at an estimated cost of \$453,735,083 or 89.3% of the 507 million. For site additions and improvement, 8.2% or \$41,852,167 is the estimated cost for nine hundred and seventy-nine (979) projects. The remaining 2.5% or \$12,253,894 is the estimated cost of 449 instructional equipment projects.

GLOSSARY

Academic Difficulty: The student left school or was required to leave because of academic difficulty.

Advanced Placement Program: A series of courses for upper grade secondary school students intended to provide college level instruction. Successful completion may enable the student(s) to bypass the usual initial college courses in the subject area and begin the student's college work with a more advanced course and possibly with college credit. (This category does not include students enrolled in special programs for the talented or gifted.)

Alternate School: A school that offers a student a choice between it and the traditional school which most students in the district attend. The alternate school is frequently typified by modified curricular content, nonstandard classrooms, and/or instructional techniques based on individual students needs.

Apprenticeship/On-The-Job Training: Supervised training program for a beginner who wishes to learn, a semi-skilled or skilled trade. At the apprenticeship level, two or more years work experience on the job, supplemented by related classroom experience.

Art School: A non-degree granting, post-secondary institution offering courses of varying length in preparation for occupations related to drawing, painting, sculpture, design, and similar arts.

Behaviorial Difficulty: The student was required to withdraw from school because of behavioral difficulty.

Bilingual Program: A state board of education approved instructional program conducted in English and a second language. Such programs are intended to meet the special needs of students who have a native language other than English or who have limited English speaking ability .

Business or Secretarial School: A non-degree granting, post-secondary institution offering courses of varying length in preparation for technical business occupations.

College (four-year): A post-secondary institution offering a four-year curriculum and empowered to confer a bachelor's degree.

College (two-year): A post-secondary institution offering a two-year curriculum and empowered to confer an associate's degree.

Community Service Program: Programs through which students gain insight and experience in the problems and operation of such community services as recreation programs, civic activities, public libraries and community welfare agencies.

Compensatory Education Program: A program approved by the State Board of Education to provide preventive and remedial activities and services, supplemental to the regular school program, to meet the special needs of students

performing below minimum levels of student proficiency as required by NJAC 6:8-1.1 and 3.8.

Continuing Education: A program extending opportunities for reading, study and training to young persons and adults following completion of or withdrawal from full-time school or college programs.

Cosmetology or Barber School: A non-degree granting, post-secondary institution offering courses of varying length in preparation for qualifying examinations and licensing.

Course: An organization of subject matter and related learning experiences provided for the instruction of pupils on a regular or systematic basis, usually for a predetermined period of time. Credit toward graduation or completion of a program of studies is given pupils for the successful completion of a course.

Credits Required for Graduation: Units of value awarded to all or some pupils for the successful completion of the work of a course or series of courses. (The minimum number of credits to be established by each high school are set forth in NJAC 6:27-1.4.)

Dislike of School Experience: The student left school because of an active dislike or one or more aspects of his or her school experience other than physical illness, behavioral difficulty, academic difficulty, lack of appropriate curriculum, poor student/staff relationships and poor relationships with fellow students.

Dropout: An elementary or secondary school student who has been in membership during the regular school term and who withdraws from membership before graduating from secondary school (Grade 12) or before completing an equivalent program of studies. Such an individual is considered as having discontinued schooling, whether this occurs before or after the student has passed the compulsory school attendance age and, where applicable, whether or not the student has completed a minimum required amount of school work.

Economic Reasons: The student left school because of economic reasons, including inability to pay school expenses and inability of parents to provide suitable clothing.

Employment: Working full-time or part-time in one of the following categories cited in the Dictionary of Occupational Titles: Professional, Technical or Managerial; Clerical; Sales; Service; Farming, Fishing, Forestry and Related Processing; Machine Trades; Bench Work; Structural; Miscellaneous.

Expulsions: The action taken by a board of education compelling a student to withdraw from school for reasons such as extreme misbehavior, incorrigibility, or unsatisfactory achievement or progress in school work.

Family Income: The combined incomes of all members of the student's family. Possible sources for this information are: the School Lunch Programs, Title I, County Welfare Boards or local survey.

Government Service: Enlistment in the armed forces, the Job Corps or another government sponsored program.

Homemaking: Spending full-time establishing and managing a household.

Industrial Arts Program: A program of instructional and laboratory experiences which provide basic education related to the industrial and technological aspects of life through experiences with tools, materials and processes.

Industry Sponsored School: A technical, trade or vocational school sponsored by a private industrial firm, primarily to train prospective employees.

Introduction to Vocations Program: A guidance program to enable students in Grades 7 through 10 to explore occupational opportunities. The program includes classroom instruction, "hands-on" activities, field trips, job visitation days and speakers from business and industry.

Lack of Appropriate Curriculum: The student left school because the curriculum was not appropriate for his or her needs.

Marriage: The student left school because of marriage.

Need at Home: The student left school to help with work at home, including work on the family farm.

New Residence: School Status Unknown: The student left school upon moving to a new

residence. It is not known if the student entered a new school.

Nursing School: A non-degree granting, post-secondary institution usually associated with a hospital which prepares students to be nurses.

Open Classroom: A relatively large instructional area or multiclassroom space not separated by walls as in a traditional classroom. More important than these physical aspects is the accompanying philosophy of an open curriculum cooperatively developed by teachers and students without the constraints inherent in the usual prescribed curriculum.

Other Post-Secondary School: Any non-degree granting, post-secondary school other than the foregoing.

Other Type College: Any post-secondary degree granting institution other than the foregoing.

Parental Influence: The student left school as result of parental encouragement to do so.

Physical Illness: The student left school because of physical illness.

Poor Relationships with Fellow Students: The student left school because of poor relationships with fellow students.

Post-Graduate: Students who after graduating from high school (Grade 12) re-enroll in the same or another secondary school for additional high school level courses.

Post-Secondary: Students who after graduating from high school (Grade 12) enroll for advanced study at the Grade 13 level or higher.

Pregnancy: The student left school because of pregnancy.

Pre-Kindergarten: Students in a group or class organized to provide educational experiences for children during the year or years preceding the kindergarten which are part of the elementary school program and are under the direction of a professionally qualified teacher.

Program Completion: Curricular activities or program set by the local board of education as a prerequisite for graduation. The activities or programs shall be based on specific instructional objectives for an individual and/or group of individuals. In New Jersey, often described as "Plan B".

Program for Gifted and Talented: A program for students identified by professionally qualified personnel as being advanced in mental development and/or capable of high performance in one or more areas of special competence. Among these areas of competence are creativity, leadership ability, social adeptness and facility in the productive and performing arts. (This category does not include students enrolled in enrichment courses leading to advance placement.)

Program for Pregnant Students: A program for students who would otherwise dropout of school because of pregnancy. In addition to meeting

all curricular requirements, such programs usually provide special personal and educational counseling services.

Program of Studies: A program is a combination of related courses and/or self-contained classes organized for the attainment of specific educational objectives e.g., a program of special education for handicapped pupils or a program of occupational (vocational) education.

Racial/Ethnic Groups: A pupil may be included in the group to which he or she appears to belong, identifies with or is regarded in the community as belonging to. However, no person should be counted in more than one racial/ethnic category. The categories are: White, Not Hispanic Origin, Black, Not Hispanic Origin, Hispanic, American Indian or Alaskan Native and Asian or Pacific Islander.

Religion: The student left school due to religious convictions of the student and/or the student's parents.

School Year: The "school year" begins on July 1 and ends on June 30.

Service Academy: An institution of higher education maintained by the federal government to prepare students for a professional career as officers in one of the armed services.

Shared Time Vocational: An arrangement whereby a student regularly and concurrently attends two schools which share direction and control of the student's studies. In this report, the time sharing relationship is between a public secondary school and an area vocational school.

Special Education: Students on roll in self-contained special education classes. (Special Education students who are mainstreamed are reported in their respective grade levels.)

Special Education Program: A special program for any student who is mentally retarded, visually handicapped, auditorily handicapped, communication handicapped, neurologically or perceptually impaired, orthopedically handicapped, chronically ill, emotionally disturbed, socially maladjusted or multiply handicapped.

Suspensions: Temporary dismissals (at least one school day) of students from school by a principal. These are official suspensions reported to the chief school administrator. Count each pupil only once regardless of the number of times he or she was suspended.

Technical, Trade or Vocational School: A non-degree granting, post-secondary institution offering courses to prepare individuals for employment as skilled workers or draftsmen.

Technology for Children Program: A program to provide children with individualized, experimental learning and opportunities to develop interests and self-awareness. Technological world-of-work activities are integrated throughout the traditional curriculum with emphasis on the needs and interests of individual students.

Total Enrollment: A count of students on roll on the last school day of September.

Unemployed: Not employed at any paid work.

Ungraded: Students in a class which is not organized on the basis of grade and has no standard grade designation. (Students in special education classes should not be reported here, but on the special education line.)

Vocational Education Program: Programs offering education and training in such semi-skilled, skilled or technical occupations as agriculture, home economics, office occupations, distributive education and technical education.
