Seasonally adjusted nonfarm wage and salary employment in New Jersey increased by 15,500 from 3,041,400 in November to an all-time record employment high of 3,058,900 in December. This was the largest over-the-month increase since the March-to-April 1978 period.

Virtually all of the increase was in the private wage and salary employment sector, which increased by 14,700 after adjustment for seasonal patterns. Manufacturing increased by 8,600, nonmanufacturing other than government by 8,100, and government by 800.

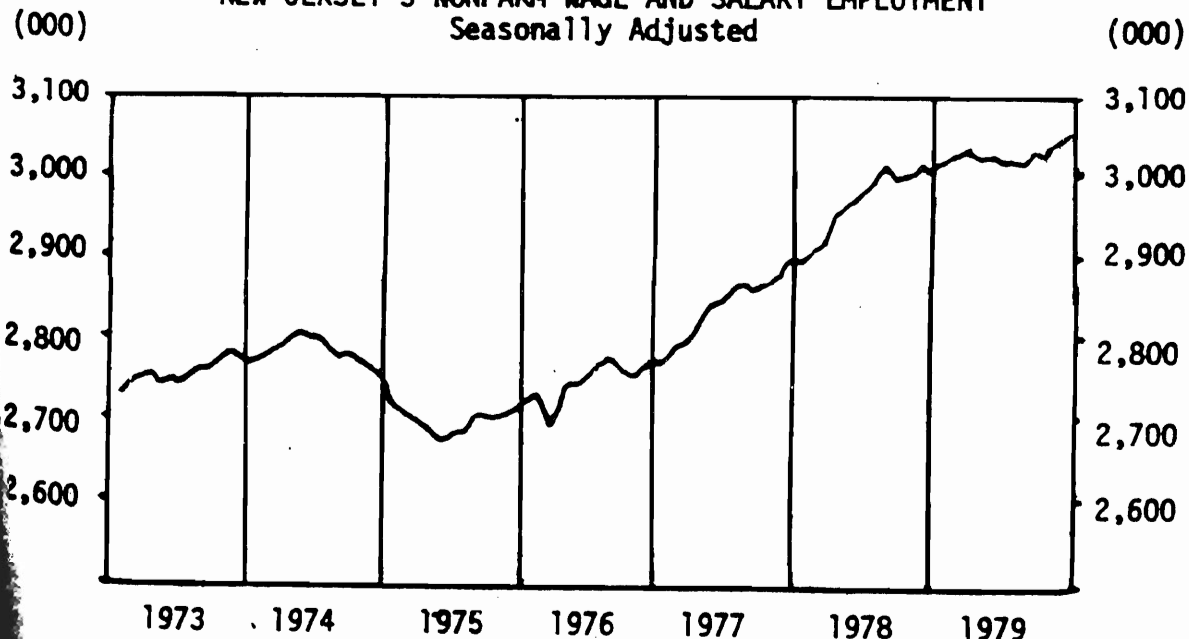
Before seasonal adjustment, nonfarm wage and salary employment increased by 7,500 to 3,065,500, as manufacturing declined by 1,700 and nonmanufacturing increased by 9,200.

The transportation equipment sector, up 5,100, had the largest manufacturing industry increase. Recalls of automotive workers from earlier layoffs accounted for this increase. Only five other factory increases, all under 600 in magnitude, were noted. All other industries declined or remained the same.

The durable goods sector increased by 2,900, due to the recall of automotive workers. The instrument industry increased by 100, while primary metals remained stable. Electrical machinery, down by 900 due to a mjaor strike, had the largest decrease. Stone/clay/glass and miscellaneous manufacturing, both down by 700, had the next largest

decrease. Layoffs totaling 450 workers at two glass firms depressed glass industry employment, while scattered employment layoffs among miscellaneous manufacturing firms accounted for the drop in the latter.

In the nondurable goods sector, only the food and printing industries had increases, up by 500 and 200, respectively. The apparel industry, down by 3,400, had the largest decrease. Smaller-than-seasonal cutbacks in employment by manufacturers of women's and children's outerwear accounted for most of the apparel loss. The rubber industry's loss of 1,000 workers, largely reflected a major strike in the Trenton area. Other changes were drops of 500 in textiles, 400 in leather, and 200 in chemicals.

In the nonmanufacturing sector, retail trade, up by 11,600, had the largest increase over the month. This increase largely reflected seasonal hiring. The government sector, up by 1,100, had the largest increase, with the local government sector increasing by 500 following the settlement of two teacher strikes. Finance/insurance/real estate and services, up by 900 and 700, respectively, had the next largest increases. The former increase reflected hiring of insurance agents, while employment in the latter industry reflected a new casino opening in Atlantic City which more than offset seasonal declines in service industries elsewhere in the State.

The contract construction industry, down by 4,700, had the largest decline. However, this decline was smaller than seasonal. The transportation/communications/public utilities division, down by 600, was the only other nonfactory division to decline.

After adjustment for seasonal influences, manufacturing increased by 8,600 to 800,700, with the recall of automotive workers accounting for 59% of the increase. Among other industries in the durable goods sector, changes in lumber, furniture, primary metals, nonelectrical machinery, and instruments were about in line with seasonal expectations.

An increase of 400 in fabricated metals reflected expansion at a number of firms; however, a layoff of 200 at an automotive parts manufacturer partially offset this expansion. The miscellaneous manufacturing sector, up by 1,300, had the largest increase. The electrical equipment industry had the most significant drop because of a large strike.

Changes in the nondurable sector followed seasonal trends, with the exception of the apparel industry, which had a smaller-than-seasonal decline among women's and children's outerwear firms.

Nonmanufacturing jobholding, increased by 8,900 after seasonal adjustment. The service, trade, and construction sectors significantly exceeded seasonal expectations. Construction activity increased for the fourth consecutive month, as relatively mild weather and activity in the Atlantic City area bolstered jobholding. Payrolls in the wholesale trade sector were at an all-time high while retail trade also showed an over-the-month increase. The service sector largely reflected a new casino opening in Atlantic City and a return of 200 striking hospital workers. The government sector, up by 800, reflecting gains in state and local government, and finance/insurance/real estate, up by 900, also exceeded seasonal expectations.

The transportation/communications/public utilities sector, down by 1,000 employees, was the only division with a decline after seasonal adjustment. The drop largely reflected jobholding declines in the non-rail transportation sector.

Over-the-year nonfarm wage and salary employment increased by 50,100, or 1.7%, with the nonmanufacturing sector accounting for most of the growth.

In manufacturing, the durable goods sector increased by 1,500, while nondurable goods decreased by 400. In the durable goods sector primary metals, electrical machinery, instruments, and miscellaneous manufacturing advanced from a year ago. In the nondurable goods sector, the chemical industry, up by 2,300, largely reflecting expansion in the organic chemicals sector, had the largest increase. The largest decrease was in rubber and plastics, down by 2,100, which reflected a decline in the plastics sector.

Over-the-year gains were noted in all nonmanufacturing divisions but mining, which remained unchanged. The largest increase was in the services division, up by 30,200.

LABOR AREA EMPLOYMENT COMMENTS

Before seasonal adjustment, nonfarm wage and salary employment increased from November to December in six of the State's ten major labor areas.

The Hackensack Labor Area, up by 4,500, had the largest increase, due to expansions in the manufacturing segment. The New Brunswick-Perth Amboy-Sayreville Labor Area followed closely with an increase of 3,000, also due to expansions in the manufacturing segment. The Paterson-Clifton-Passaic Labor Area, down by 1,800, had the largest decrease, due primarily to declines in durable goods.

In the manufacturing sector, seven areas recorded decreases, while three areas had increases. The Newark Labor Area, down by 1,500, the largest decrease, because of strikes in the electrical machinery industry. The largest increase occurred in the Hackensack Labor Area, up by 2,800, mainly in the durable goods sector because of a recall in the motor vehicle segment of the transportation industry.

In the nonmanufacturing segment, six areas registered over-the-month increases. The Newark Labor Area, up by 2,400, had the largest increase due to expansions in trade, followed closely by the Camden

HOURS AND EARNINGS

The weekly earnings of manufacturing production workers averaged \$294.83 in December, an increase of \$4.92 from November and an increase of \$20.50 from a year ago. The average hourly earnings of \$6.97 were up ten cents from November and up 50 cents from a year ago. During the December survey week, production workers averaged 42.3 hours, compared with 42.2 hours a month ago. The average weekly hours in December registered a decrease of 0.1 hour from one year ago.

After seasonal adjustment, the average weekly hours decreased to 41.8 hours from 42.0 hours in November and from 41.9 hours in December 1978.

On an unadjusted basis, 11 out of 19 primary manufacturing industrial groups had decreases in weekly earnings over the month. The largest decrease was in the petroleum industry, which dropped by \$50.08 because of new hires at lower rates and decreased overtime. The transportation industry has the largest increase, rising by \$56.76 because of increased overtime, returns from layoffs, and wage rate increases.

The highest average weekly earnings in December were in the transportation industry, which averaged \$500.76 for a 53.5 hour workweek. The highest hourly earnings of \$9.36 were also in the transportation industry. The lowest average weekly earnings were in the leather products industry, with \$150.10 for a 36.7 hour workweek.

TECHNICAL NOTES

Nonfarm Wage and Salary Employment

Employment data refer to persons on establishment payrolls who received pay for any part of the pay period which includes the 12th of the month. The data exclude proprietors, the self-employed, unpaid family workers, farm workers, and domestic workers in households. Salaried officers of corporations are included. Government employment covers only civilian employees; federal military personnel are excluded.

Persons on an establishment payroll who are on paid sick leave (when pay is received directly from the firm), on paid holiday or paid vacation, or who work during any part of the pay period but are unemployed or on strike during the rest of the period, are counted as employed. Not counted as employed are persons who, during the pay period which includes the 12th, are laid off, on leave without pay or on strike for the entire period, or who are hired but do not work during the period.

Average Hours and Earnings

Hours and earnings data are derived from reports of payroll and man-hours for production and related workers in manufacturing. When the reported pay period exceeds one week, the payroll and man-hour figures are reduced to a weekly basis.

Average hourly earnings for manufacturing are on a "gross" basis, reflecting not only changes in basic hourly rates, but also such variable factors as premium pay for overtime and shift work, and changes in output of workers paid on an incentive plan. Excluded from average earnings are irregular bonuses, retroactive items, payments of various welfare benefits, and payroll taxes paid by employers.
