

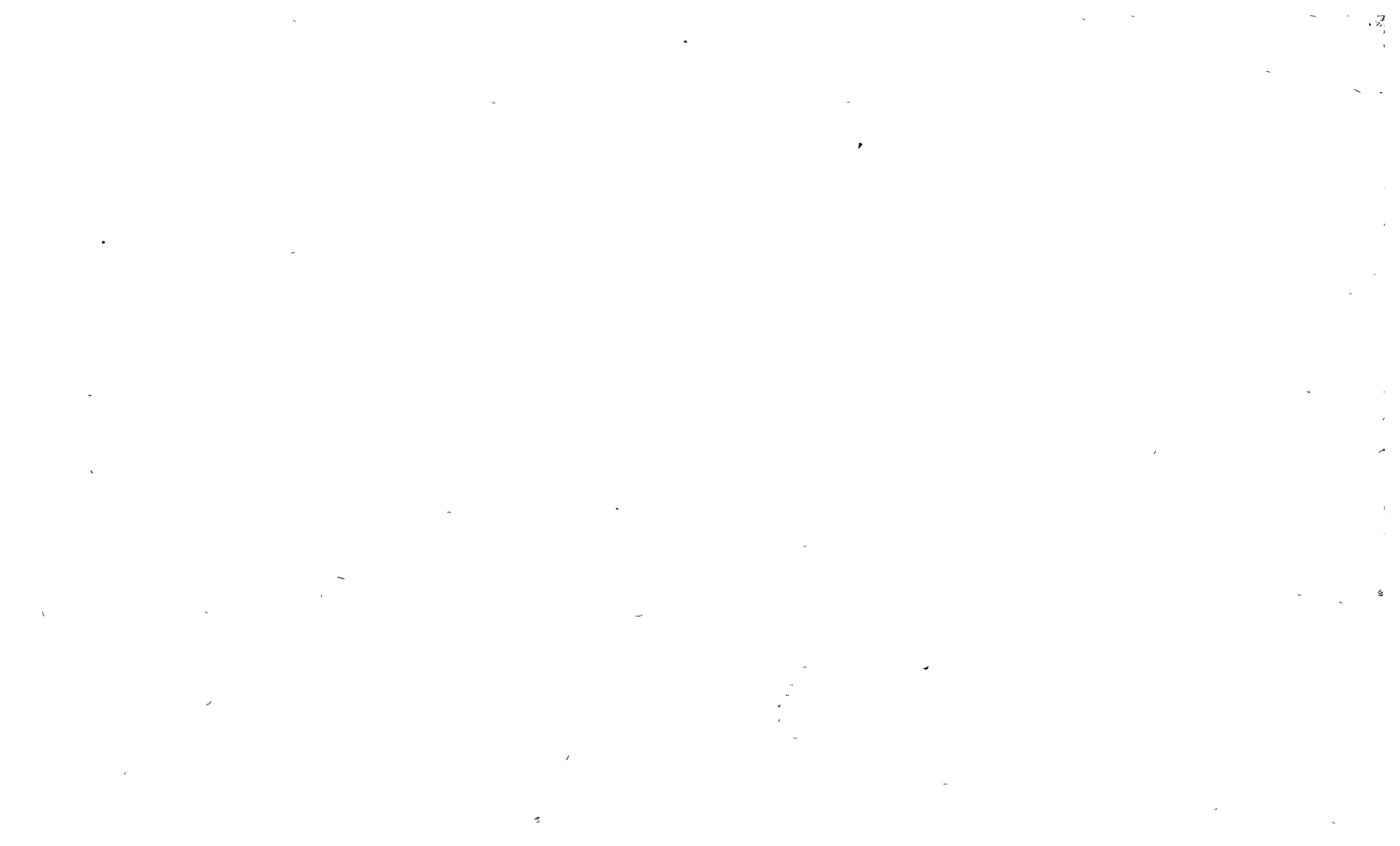

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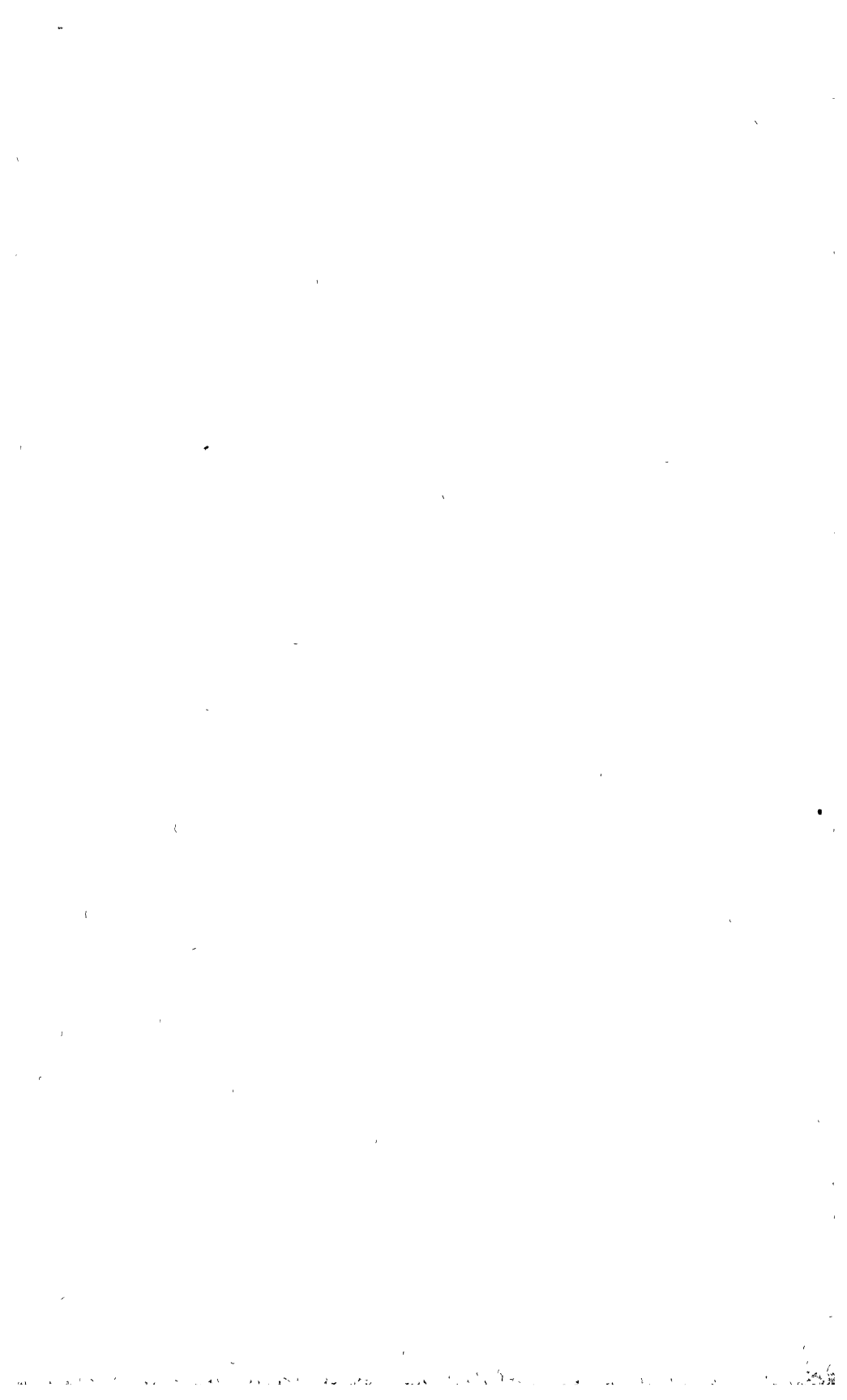

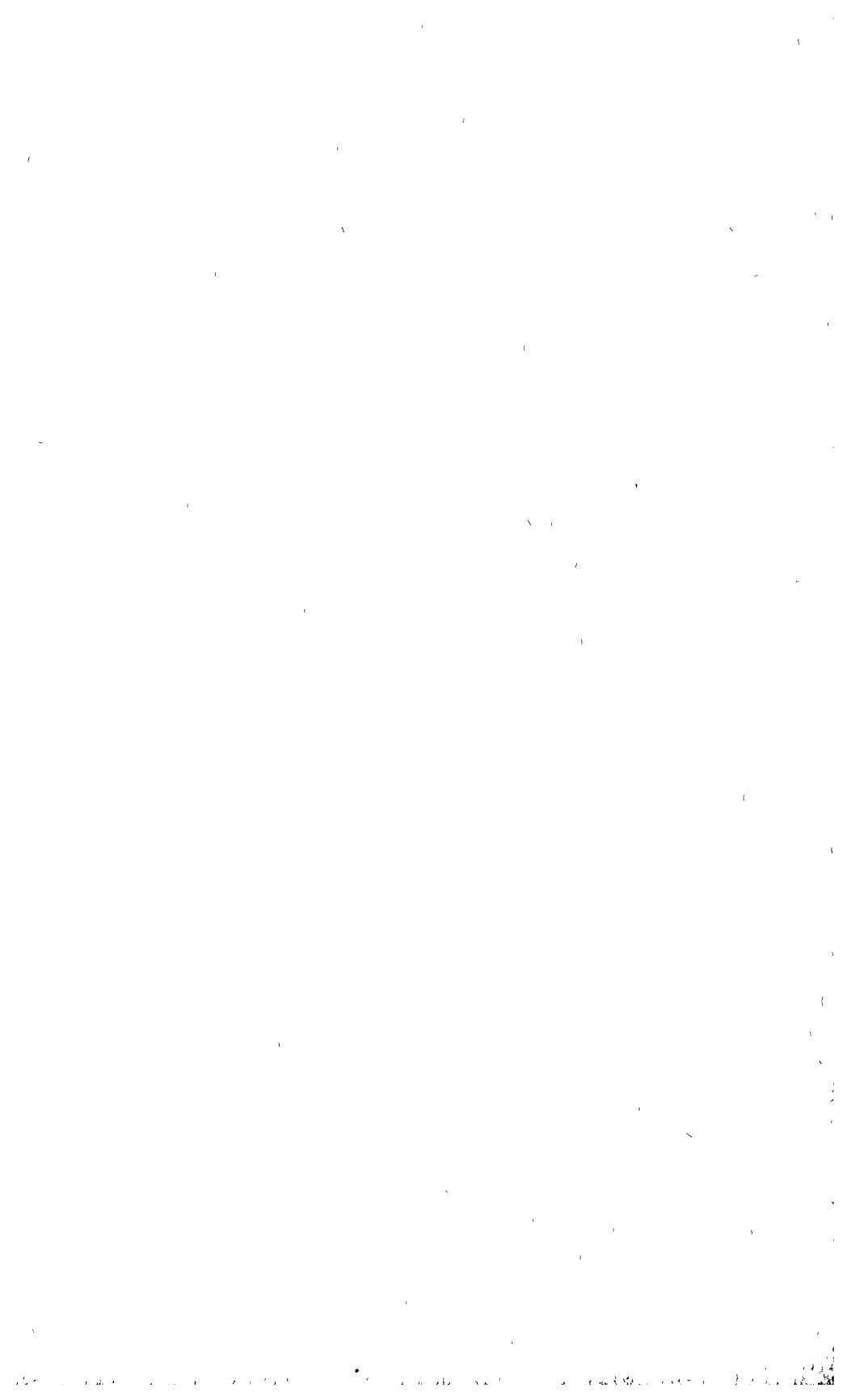

MINUTES

STATE OF NEW JERSEY
HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY

TUESDAY, January 12, 1932.

This being the day designated by the Constitution for the assembling of the One Hundred and Fifty-sixth Legislature of New Jersey, the House was duly called to order at 12 o'clock (noon) by Frederick A. Brodesser, of Union County, Clerk of the last House, who presided pending the organization of the House

Prayer was offered by the Reverend August F Bender, of Jersey City, N. J., pastor of the Second Reformed Church of Jersey City.

Which motion was adopted.

Mr. E. E. Brown offered the following resolution which was read by the clerk and adopted:

The Hon. John Dolce, of Hudson County, then requested the members-elect to rise and administered the oath of office to them.

Mr. E. E. Brown offered the following resolution, which was read by the clerk and adopted.

Resolved, That the House do now proceed with the election of Speaker for the One Hundred and Fifty-sixth Session of the General Assembly.

The clerk announced that nominations for Speaker were now in order, and recognized Mr. Bucino, of Hudson County, who placed in nomination the Hon. Joseph Greenberg, of Hudson County, for Speaker, which nomination was seconded by John J. Rafferty, of Middlesex County, and further seconded by Mr. Charles Hood, of Essex County

Mr. Thomas M. Muir then arose and placed in nomination the Hon. Charles A. Otto, Jr., of Union County, which nomination was seconded by Mr. Herbert J. Pascoe, of Union County, and further seconded by Mr. Russell S. Wise, of Passaic County, and further seconded by Mr. Anthony J. Siracusa, of Atlantic County.

The clerk called for further nominations. There being none, upon motion of Mr. E. E. Brown, nominations were ordered closed.

Upon calling the roll, Mr. Greenberg was elected Speaker of the House by the following vote:

The clerk declared the Hon. Joseph Greenberg Speaker of the General Assembly for the Session of 1932.

Mr Otto then moved that the election of Mr. Greenberg be made unanimous, which motion was seconded by Mr Wise and adopted:

The clerk appointed Mr Bucino, of Hudson County; Mr. Otto, of Union County, and Mrs Carroll, of Essex County, to act as a committee to escort the Speaker to the bar of the House, where he took and subscribed to the oath of office and was then escorted to the chair.

Upon assuming the chair, the Speaker addressed the House as follows:

Fellow-Members of the General Assembly

It is with a feeling of deep appreciation of the honor and realization of the attendant responsibilities that I assume the duties of Speaker of the One Hundred and Fifty-sixth Session of the New Jersey House of Assembly

In taking over the position of presiding officer of this body, I take a natural pride in the fact that this marks the first time in many years that the Democratic party has organized this branch of the Legislature.

The results of the last election must indicate to even the staunchest partisan observers that the people of New Jersey, in their desperation to improve general economic conditions and set up a more beneficent type of government than they have been receiving, forgot party identities and turned to the Democratic candidates for the desired relief

What else then, is there for us to do but also leave our partisanship at home when we come here, and join together to carry out the mandate of the people?

Speaking for the majority, I say that we are ready to render this service. We stand prepared to follow the leadership of the incoming Governor, whom the voters of New Jersey have so emphatically chosen to guide their destinies. I appeal to the minority to extend to us the fullest co-operation so that they, too, may share in the credit that is to accrue, and to the further end that the One Hundred and Fifty-sixth Session of the New Jersey General Assembly may go down in the history of our State as pre-eminently exemplary.

Without seeking to anticipate what the Governor will say in his message to us a week from today, but merely to present in a general way the major phases of the program that we will have to consider during the present session, I desire to offer the following:

Economy in Government and State Reorganization

It is hardly necessary for me to state that conditions at the moment demand the exercise of strict economy in the conduct of the affairs of our government. At the termination of the current fiscal year on June 30, the State of New Jersey will be confronted with a sizable deficit in the general Treasury. It shall be our task to ease this situation and to guard against its recurrence with respect to the new fiscal year.

Fundamentally, there are three phases to the impending economy program. First, as Governor-elect Moore has already stated, and as he no doubt will emphasize in his message to us next week, a sharp retrenchment in expenditures must be effectuated. This will affect every department of the State government, some more than others, perhaps. But regardless of all considerations except to guard against impairment of the functions of government, deep cutting of appropriations will be the order of the day.

The second phase of the program embodies a reorganization of the physical set-up of the State government, resulting in the elimination of costly departmental sub-divisions and overlapping

of functions and the establishment of a centralized system of government along lines of simplified control and economy in operation. You, perhaps, are familiar with this proposal in a general way from what has already appeared in the public press, and we may look forward to a more detailed outline of it from the Chief Executive.

Third, it shall be the aim of the new administration to wipe out completely the numerous useless and expensive commissions that have eaten heavily into the State Treasury during the past few years. Under the reorganization plan, a definite check will be placed on the creation of such bodies, thus closing, in my opinion, a free avenue of expenditure of the funds of the State.

Curtailement of the cost of operating the State government, however, is not all that is to be done to lighten the tax burden of the people of our State. An effective check must also be placed on county and municipal governmental expenditures, and in this connection it is proposed to substantially curb the enactment of legislation imposing mandatory expenditures upon local governments, and to repeal such existing legislation wherever it is practicable.

Prohibition

I do not hesitate to declare that every effort will be made on behalf of the people of New Jersey to bring about relief from the prohibition evil. From the very time that the State of New Jersey, in a moment of blindness, ratified the Eighteenth Amendment, our party in this State has sought to correct the mistake. In these endeavors we have been defeated by the attitude of the Republican party toward this question.

I was gratified, however, to observe in this very chamber last week that many Republicans have since seen the light, and I believe it augurs well for the success of the measures that are to be offered repealing the Hobart State Enforcement Act and petitioning Congress to abolish the National Prohibition Laws.

Jury and Election Reforms

Part of the legislative program that you will have to consider embraces the all-important question of a change in the manner of selecting jury commissioners in the several counties. There have been evidences of dissatisfaction on the part of members of our high judiciary with the type of jurors selected in some of the counties, the universal objection being that politics has played too important a part in the procedure.

When the power of appointing jury commissioners rested with the Chancellor, we did, in a measure, succeed in keeping the empaneling of juries out of the realm of politics, but when the power of appointment was taken from the Chancellor and vested in the Governor, it resulted, in my opinion, in an almost complete immersion of this important function in the political sea.

Now it is proposed to transfer the power of appointing jury commissioners to the justice of the Supreme Court in the particular circuit, and this, I believe, will be a solution of the problem.

Our election machinery is in a chaotic state due to the multitude of agencies created to administer the election laws and also to the lack of uniformity in the existing laws. During this session you will be called upon to consider legislation for the repeal of the permanent registration act and the establishment of a system of personal registration throughout the State each year.

This will close the door to fraudulent voting and will make uniform the manner of registering by imposing the same requirements upon voters in all municipalities.

You will also be asked to support legislation changing the date of the primary election from May to September, thereby reducing the period of campaigning between the Primary and General Elections from six to two months.

Abolition of the Bureau of Elections, presided over by a Superintendent of Elections, in the two first-class counties of the State is also proposed. These bureaus have never served a useful purpose and have been a burden of expense to the taxpayers of Essex and Hudson Counties. The administrative duties of these departments might easily be transferred to the County Board of Elections, and the police functions turned over to the office of the Prosecutor of the Pleas.

Agriculture

The incoming Governor is pledged to aid the agricultural interests of the State. Only last week he called into conference representatives of the State Grange and the dairy farmers to ascertain from them what assistance they desire in the way of improving their business conditions. Recommendations will be received by us from the Governor on this subject during the session, and I am convinced that each and every one of us will stand ready to help the farmer out of his distress.

Conclusion

I have enumerated what I consider the high spots of the legislative program that will come before us during this session. I cannot too emphatically impress upon you the necessity for harmonious action. Let us, in our deliberations, keep uppermost in mind the fact that we are here to serve the people, who, if they ever needed consideration, need it now.

I ask the co-operation of each and every member in making this session brief and business-like. Let us remember that these are serious times, and that we have serious work ahead. Protracted sessions, as has been our experience in the past, make for ill-considered legislation. We know what we want to do, so let us go ahead and do it.

I want to assure the members of the minority that in the estimation of the Speaker, they are an important part of this House, and will be treated as such. I shall strive to be fair in every respect, feeling that every member has equal standing, and that none enjoys greater privileges than the next one.

In closing, let me pay my personal tribute to my predecessor. As minority leader during the last session, I found Mr. Wise a just Speaker. As his successor, I shall endeavor to maintain the high standard of ethics and fairness set up by him. I also want to pay my respects to Mr. Otto, who was the majority leader last year. He, too, accorded the minority every courtesy and consideration, and as minority leader this year he will find the same spirit in the ranks of the new majority.

The Speaker announced the appointment of Mr. Alexander Crawford, of Hudson, as his Secretary.

Mr. E. E. Brown offered the following resolution, which was read by the clerk and adopted:

Resolved, That the House do now proceed with the election of the Clerk of the House for the One Hundred and Fifty-sixth Session of the General Assembly.

The Hon. Charles Hood, of Essex County, placed in nomination the name of Louis Weiss, of Essex County, as Clerk of the House of Assembly, which nomination was seconded by the Hon. Charles T. Downing, of Sussex County, and was further seconded by Mr. L. B. Ballantyne, of Essex County.

Hon. Charles A. Otto, Jr., of Union County, then placed in nomination the name of Frederick A. Brodesser, of Union County,

which nomination was seconded by Hon. Clarence A. Ward, of Union County, and was further seconded by Mr. A. J. Siracusa, of Atlantic County.

Mr. E. E. Brown then moved that the nominations be closed. Which motion was adopted.

GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE

STATE OF NEW JERSEY,
EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT,
TRENTON, JANUARY 12, 1932.

To the Legislature.

Mindful of the fact that the inaugural message of the incoming Executive is of much more interest and importance than that of one who is about to leave the office, nevertheless I believe it will not be taken amiss if at this time I make such comments and recommendations as seem to me pertinent for your consideration at the outset of this legislative session.

UNEMPLOYMENT

The last two years have marked a period of great financial depression and distress. Business enterprises throughout the Nation suffered severely. Millions of working men and women were faced with unemployment, with all the attendant misery and distress which such a condition entails. While our own State fortunately suffered less severely from the general depression than other less favored localities, we did not escape the common experi-

ence. Business enterprises in New Jersey suffered. Thousands of our citizens lost their means of livelihood. Sturdy, industrious citizens and those dependent upon them found themselves in destitute circumstances, because there was no market for the labor of their hands or brains.

The hardships thus occasioned becoming so acute, I felt impelled to call the last Legislature into Special Session on two occasions this last fall, believing it the bounden duty of the State to give due recognition to the situation and such aid as might be made possible. As a result, there was created a temporary State Emergency Relief Administration with a State Director of Emergency Relief in charge; an appropriation of \$8,000,000 of State funds was made available for distribution in aid of unemployment in conjunction with county and municipal programs of cooperation, authorized through a series of acts passed to aid and assist the needy in the emergency. I am happy to report that the State Emergency Relief Administration is fully and satisfactorily functioning and that the program of unemployment relief is doing much to alleviate distress and want throughout the State. In further recognition of the situation, the several departments of the State Government have joined heartily in speeding up forced programs that might give work to those unfortunately unemployed. Much good has resulted in these activities; yet withal, I fear there is still great distress and suffering, and it behooves all of you to devise some ways and means to meet the State's responsibility in this crisis.

TAXATION

In my annual message of January 13th last, I pointed out that "we cannot have less taxation without less expenditures," that "the agricultural and manufacturing interests of New Jersey are now heavily burdened, and without a reduction of rates our industries may move to more favorable locations."

Now, a year later, we find the purchasing power of the consumer drastically curtailed, and trade and commerce suffering as a result. Under these depressing circumstances, the burden of taxation falls with greater weight upon the taxpayers, until now we find the municipalities unable to collect taxes and in turn defaulting in the prompt payment of the taxes due the county and State. It must, therefore, be clear to all of us in order to lighten this burden of taxation, that every bill or measure which comes before the Legislature carrying an appropriation of public funds should be carefully examined as to its necessity and timeliness.

Every act of this Legislature requiring an appropriation of public funds should be subjected to the test of real necessity and present urgency. This is no time for political experimentation nor for indulgence in untried legislation, fads or fancies, no matter how eloquent the appeal of their advocates may be.

I urge further that every legislative proposal submitted to you for your consideration and action be examined closely to determine whether or not it involves duplication or overlapping of functions and duties now performed, or which should be performed, by some department of our State Government.

If in the wisdom of the Legislature it is necessary for our State Government to embark upon new activities and to assume heavier responsibilities, then I urge that, wherever it be found possible, such functions shall be discharged by public offices already established and maintained, rather than through the creation of new offices which will add further to the expense of the Government.

While strict economy must prevail and every expenditure of public monies must meet the test of necessity, we would fail in our duties as public servants were a purely negative policy to be followed. There is urgent need for intelligent, constructive cooperation on the part of the State Legislature and the Executive Department, for action that will relieve the distress of unemployment among our citizens to the extent that is possible along practical lines.

The Legislature in 1929 authorized the appointment of a Tax Survey Commission which has for over two years been actively studying the question of local finances and expenditures. It has issued a series of five comprehensive reports treating of various phases of expenditure and finance, and outlining action which can and should be taken to reduce wasteful or unnecessary expenditures and debts. There seems to be general agreement that the fundamental proposals of this commission are sound. It should be possible to work out such details as may be required so that appropriate legislation may be enacted.

The municipal credit situation is especially serious. The credit of some municipalities is impaired because their financial condition deters investors. In most cases this condition can only be cured by measures which will restore the confidence of investors. This involves two steps—radical economy in expenditure, and a sufficient tax levy to place the municipality for the future on an actual cash basis, so that it will actually collect in revenue something more than its current expenditures, and leave some cash

margin for commencing to reduce its current debt. The present accumulation of borrowings on current account should be wiped out by funding over a period normally not exceeding five years. It may be necessary to extend this to ten years in the case of some municipalities, but such extension should be only on the approval of some State authority. The so-called surplus revenue must not be used in reduction of taxes unless it is actually available in cash, and no taxes or assessments which are over one full year in arrears at the commencement of the fiscal years should be available as a basis for supporting any further borrowing, nor serve as a basis for computing tax levies or bond limits.

The foregoing program will restore general confidence in municipal credit, but will not reach the temporary emergency of those municipalities whose credit is still good, but who cannot borrow or even renew maturing obligations because of the 6% interest limit. To meet the present high interest rates some temporary provision must be made to permit municipalities legally to pay over 6% in such emergencies as the present one. This permission, of course, should be carefully restricted. It should be allowed only when approved by some State official or committee, and should be limited to those municipalities which have put their finances in order. The permission might take the form of allowing the issue of bonds at a discount subject to State approval.

There will remain a few municipalities so heavily burdened with debt that they cannot be relieved except by a refunding under the Municipal Finance Commission, pursuant to Chapter 340 of the Laws of 1931.

The experience of this commission in bringing one municipality out of default has demonstrated the value of and the need for this legislation, but has also disclosed the necessity for strengthening the act. An enlargement of the powers of the commission will undeniably produce very real savings to the taxpayers, by creating sufficient confidence in the investing public to make possible the funding of the securities of a defaulting municipality at a materially lower interest rate than is possible with the present limited powers of that commission.

STATE REORGANIZATION

In my inaugural address delivered January 15, 1929, I laid emphasis upon the fact that "in the course of years and the complexity of legislation in the creation of new functions of State, various departments are created and an overlapping of functions naturally results." That "at least every decade, there-

fore, there should be a survey made of our various State departments, and State activities, with a view to better classification, co-ordination, and avoidance of duplication”

Such a Survey Commission was appointed and delved fearlessly and effectively into the very heart of the State Government, with utter disregard of partisan effects, and State reorganization to the extent covered by the actual survey of the so-called Abell Commission is now an accomplished fact. Investigation has been translated into legislation

We were not stampeded by the catch-phrase nor by the glamour and clamor for a change just for the sake of a change. We have not endeavored to fit the public business into a preconceived theoretical scheme. We have labored to evolve laws exactly to fit the government business. Those laws are not only adapted to protect the public against dishonest officials, but also have been specially designed to confer power upon honest officials to transact government business in a businesslike way. We have placed the emphasis in reorganization upon the business of the Government, and not on the system—on substance and not on form

The problem was approached with an open mind, and an eye single to the public welfare, and after first ascertaining the facts without bias or prejudice, made no snap judgment, but rather, dug down to the solid bed rock of what is best by test, and retained the good, discarded the evil, and built on that foundation.

Let me point out briefly some of the outstanding accomplishments of the reorganization:

A complete centralized accounting control, similar to that employed by private and well-managed business corporations, has been installed. This law will enable the Comptroller hereafter to render itemized statements of all fiscal operations and complete summaries of the exact standing, not only of the general State funds, but also of every one of the several dedicated funds which the people of this State have seen fit to create. These statements will be rendered monthly. This alone is a constructive advance of the first magnitude.

A complete centralized auditing system has been set up whereby the State will be able not only to verify that no money is expended except for the purpose, for the amount, and in the manner determined by the Legislature, but also—and this is the new point of emphasis—to see that everything which ought to be collected by the State is, in fact, collected—to see that the State gets everything legally coming to it.

A centralized State Purchasing Department, devoid of political alliance or interference, and designed along the lines of modern business requirements, including the standardization of all specifications according to the needs of all using agencies as far as their needs are in common, and for groups of using agencies, or even for single using agencies, so far as their actual needs differ. This department now purchases all the goods and merchandise for every State department, not merely for some of them as heretofore. Such bulk purchasing will effect heavy and demonstrable savings.

A modern and model budget system was made possible. The vast expenditures of the State Highway System henceforth will be subjected to the scrutiny and the safeguards of the Budget. Complete, up-to-date information as to every other dedicated fund will be automatically set up. Instead of two bi-partisan budget assistants as at present, there will be but a single Budget Commissioner; it does away with the existing anomaly of the incoming Governor having no voice in the fiscal policy of the State for a year and a half after his election, by providing that the incoming Governor shall deliver his own budget message; it co-ordinates transfers of appropriations and allotments from the Emergency Fund; it gives the Governor the power he lacked to prevent expenditures if he finds extravagance, waste or mismanagement; it requires budgeting of all projects running over a single fiscal year through to completion, so that open end appropriations are a thing of the past.

The State House Commission has been definitely constituted with a membership directly and currently representative of the Legislature; its sessions and all its acts are made public matters. Public business should be done in a public manner

The control of boxing has been separated from the Comptroller's office, and a separate department created to which has been added supervision over wrestling as well.

Full publicity regarding State bank deposits has been provided for.

Reorganization of the mechanics of State taxation by creating a single Tax Commissioner in charge not only of the assessment, but also of the collection of State taxes; of consolidating into one administrative bureau the functions heretofore exercised in six different departments collecting seventeen different kinds of State taxes, eliminating the duplication of work and effecting the economies running annually into thousands of dollars.

This program of State reorganization is not finished. Undoubtedly, there is still room for improvement in some of our methods of transacting State business.

BANKS

Problems arising from the reaction of the current period of depression upon the banking system of the State are in need of serious attention of the best financial minds to be found. They cannot be treated with profit to the community by those best equipped to consider them—leaders in the New Jersey banking world—unless these experts deliberately put aside all thought of benefits to accrue to the certain types of institutions in which their personal interests may happen to lie and approach these problems with the end in view of strengthening the whole fabric of banking activity.

The Economic Policy Commission of the American Bankers Association in a report signed April 15, 1931, considered the subject of bank failures at length. This report mentioned the fact that there were 1,345 banks closed during 1930. The aggregate deposits of these institutions amounted to \$865,000,000. This commission's report, in speaking on the subject of bank failures after the close of 1930 said.

"Fortunately, there has come since the opening of 1931 a very distinct change for the better. In January the number of bank failures dropped to 203, in February to 78, and in March to 89. It is a long way in but three months from the 344 suspensions of December (1930) to this figure of 89—a drop of 255, or over 74 per cent. It seems to justify the confidence that the worst is over and that banking has been relieved by this drastic process of the great bulk of its weak institutions."

Unfortunately, the hope expressed in the quotation from this report by the banking experts of the American Bankers Association was not to materialize during the year just ended. From January 1st to October 31st, 1931, figures reported by the monthly bulletin (November) of the Federal Reserve Board indicate the closing of 1,753 banking institutions throughout the country. The aggregate deposits in these institutions amounted to \$1,461,852,000. Of these closed institutions 310 were National banks maintaining deposits of \$367,088,000, and 1,443 were State chartered institutions whose deposits aggregated \$1,094,764,000.

During these ten months New Jersey fared considerably better than did the country as a whole. Banks closed totalled 24 with

aggregate deposits of \$46,878,000. Of these institutions, 11 were National banks whose total deposits were \$20,928,000, and 13 were State chartered institutions with total deposits of \$25,950,000. It should be noted that of the 13 closed State chartered banks and trust companies only two were members of the Federal Reserve system and, incidentally, that of the 1,443 closed State chartered institutions throughout the country only 82 were Federal Reserve system members.

A number of reasons why more State chartered institutions with a greater total of deposits closed than did National banks, both throughout the country and in New Jersey, may be advanced. It is desired here to point out that in our own State, without any exception, all of the State banks and trust companies closed by the Department of Banking and Insurance held, at the date of closing, substantial totals in common and preferred stock issues, obviously not bought for investment purposes and for steady income from dividends, but for such speculative increases in value as seemed likely at the date of purchase thereof before and during the early stages of the depression period.

Operations of this character form no proper part of the activity of a bank of deposit, and the buying and selling of stocks by such banks and trust companies for their own account should be prohibited by law.

The ability of State banks and trust companies in New Jersey to loan without limit against the stock of a single corporation contributed to the causes that brought about the closing of at least four banks simultaneously in this State operating as a "chain" within a single county. Placing by statute a limit of ten per cent of the total outstanding stock of any corporation that may be held at any one time to secure collateral loans in any State bank or trust company would substantially do away with the dangers of financing the capital of one institution by loans from another bank or trust company forming part of a "chain" of banks.

The statutory loan limit of State banks and trust companies with respect to advances to any one individual or corporation has long been placed at ten per cent of the banking institution's combined capital and surplus. This limitation, however, has no application to loans accompanied by collaterals. During the past year, with its troublesome banking difficulties, it has become apparent that the mere fact of accompanying collaterals has often proved a slender support to large loans. It seems clear that the ten per cent limit now applicable to unsecured loans should be extended to the so-called secured loans of banks and trust companies in the interest of a better distribution of risk of

depositors' funds. The suggested statutory revisions contained in this and the next preceding paragraph would make the New Jersey bank and trust company laws conform with the law under which National banks' loan operations are governed.

It is not apparent that the double liability that attaches to ownership of national bank stock is beneficial in preventing failures, but, once a National bank in this State has closed and is put into liquidation, the Comptroller's power to assess stockholders to 100 per cent of their holdings constitutes a substantial aid to a greater possible recovery to depositors. Those doing business with State banks and trust companies lack the benefits of this provision. New Jersey is one of the few States that does not, by statute, extend this added protection to the depositors of banking institutions chartered and doing business therein.

I recommend for the serious consideration of the State Legislature the enactment of a law which will provide, where there is an impairment of capital of a bank and the bank is still in operation, the Banking Commissioner shall have the right to order and enforce an assessment to repair the capital.

Every effort is being made to speed up the liquidation process of closed banks in order that the moneys belonging to the creditors of these banks may be restored to the rightful owners and returned to circulation. Expenses of liquidation should be held down to a minimum. The pending liquidation funds of closed banks should be deposited only in banks of unquestioned solvency, and every safeguard for their protection required. In amending our banking laws, the safety of the depositors should always be given first consideration. Safety is an absolute requirement in order that our people may have the fullest confidence in our banking institutions, and absolute confidence in our banks, in turn, will help our entire business structure.

STATE PROJECTS

Of the \$100,000,000 State Bond Issue approved by the voters of the State at the election of 1930, our State highways program is being speeded up to relieve the congested condition of our city streets, to provide for the constantly increasing motor vehicle traffic throughout the State, and to give employment to the jobless. Out of this bond issue we are building new State institutions and modernizing and enlarging the capacity of the old ones. From the proceeds of the bond money we have taken the first long step toward putting into force the new State water policy by making seven million dollars available for the purchase of watersheds and reservoir sites to be conserved to provide for the needs of our municipalities for future water supplies.

When the Holland Tunnel was begun it was estimated that it would not be utilized to capacity for many years. Already it is congested, and even with the Staten Island bridges and the Bergen Point and Hudson River bridges now in operation, the ever-increasing traffic between New Jersey and New York makes it necessary to plan for additional crossings. This need has been anticipated by provision for the immediate beginning of work on the Midtown vehicular tunnels between Weehawken and 38th Street.

As a matter of business policy, the Hudson River and Staten Island bridges and tunnels have been placed under the control of a single agency, the Port of New York Authority, and the financing and revenues of these undertakings have been merged. This plan makes it possible for all these bridges and tunnels to pay for themselves, without recourse to taxation, and under its operation, these great interstate highways will eventually become the unmortgaged assets of the people of the two States, with low tolls made possible to those who use them.

To this same interstate agency has also been given authority to finance and construct a great marine terminal in Jersey City, without saddling further taxes upon the people.

The need for expanding interstate facilities and providing rapid transit between Camden and Philadelphia to encourage the commercial and residential growth of South Jersey, has been met by creation of an interstate agency similar to the Port of New York Authority in that section of the State.

Pressing problems of water supplies, sewerage, rapid transit, reclamation of wet lands and waterways and harbor development, to safeguard the lives and health of the people, and to facilitate and promote business and home development in the great metropolitan district of two and a half million population which the counties of Bergen, Essex, Hudson, Passaic and Union have become, have been the subject of study by legislative commissions, and out of these studies plans are being made for the creation of new agencies to make possible the financing and construction of essential public works without duplication of Government authority, and with maximum efficiency at minimum cost.

MAJOR LITIGATIONS

At the beginning of the present administration the State was confronted with a number of matters of interstate character and importance, the pressure of which had increased, from year to

year, and passed the point of actual necessity for action, and the Legislature, at my recommendation, adopted resolutions authorizing the Attorney General to investigate and to institute suit in the United States Supreme Court to protect the interest of the State in the matters of diversion of waters of the Delaware River, the pollution of our beaches by New York City garbage dumped at sea, and the settlement of the boundary line with the State of Delaware, and proceedings before the Interstate Commerce Commission to abate the free lightering discrimination against New Jersey.

DELAWARE DIVERSION CASE

For more than a decade past, the city of New York has been looking toward the tributaries of the upper Delaware as a source of additional water supply. Conscious of the interest of the States of Pennsylvania and New Jersey in the waters of the Delaware River, the city, in February, 1923, sought the good offices of Governor Smith of New York State in the creation of a tri-state commission for the purposes of agreement upon a division of the waters among the three States. The deliberation of that commission resulted, in January, 1925, in a proposed compact submitted to the Legislatures of those States. New York State promptly ratified, but neither New Jersey nor Pennsylvania followed suit. The commission renewed its negotiations and submitted a second proposed compact in January, 1927. Again New York State ratified, but the Legislatures of neither New Jersey nor Pennsylvania accepted its proposal. In June, 1927, New York City formulated a definite plan to take from the tributaries of the Delaware, without the consent of the other States, an immediate supply of six hundred million gallons a day and an ultimate supply of twenty-five hundred million gallons a day. The project was approved by the city authorities in July, 1927, and later in the same year by the authorities of the State of New York.

In April, 1929, the Hon. Frank H. Sommers, long vitally interested in the water problems in New Jersey, called the attention of the Attorney General to the plans of the City of New York to immediately begin work on the first section of that project involving the expenditure of \$273,000,000, and urged that unless this State should take immediate action its rights might be forever lost. At that conference a tentative resolution was prepared which was submitted to me and to the legislative leaders, authorizing the Attorney General with my approval to institute a suit in the United States Supreme Court to enjoin the proposed invasion of the rights of the State and its people in the Delaware

river. That resolution was adopted by the Legislature and approved by me April 16, 1929. The suit was promptly instituted and carried forward with considerable dispatch. The questions involved were not only water supply, but also navigation, water power, agriculture, sanitation, recreation, industrial development, fisheries and oyster culture. It was a case of great magnitude and importance and involved a very large expenditure for the services of engineers and other experts in the investigation and presentation of the facts, which included 7,500 pages of testimony and 521 exhibits, some of which were extensive and complicated.

The case reached a decision in May, 1931, in which the court held that the diversion of six hundred million gallons of water a day would cause substantial damage to the interests of New Jersey, and that not more than four hundred forty million gallons per day could be taken without causing such damage and then only on condition that New York City would provide additional reservoir capacity to maintain a minimum flow of one-half of a cubic foot per second per square mile of watershed at Port Jervis and Trenton, and construct and maintain sewage disposal facilities at Port Jervis sufficient to remove 85% of organic impurities and 90% of bacterial pollution and thus render the water of the river practically pure as it entered the State of New Jersey.

This decision not only destroyed the plan of the city of New York to take the present supply of six hundred million gallons per day and an ultimate supply of twenty-five hundred million gallons a day from the Delaware river tributaries, but the conditions attached to the taking of a maximum of four hundred forty million gallons a day were such as to cause the city to postpone its program of taking any water from that source for at least five years and to turn for additional supplies to the Hudson river watershed in its own State.

The widespread discussion of this case in the legal and engineering journals, and at the meetings of engineering societies throughout the country, indicates the importance of the decision, which, for the first time, established the rights of adjacent States in the use of waters of interstate streams under the common law rule of riparian rights which prevails in most of the States of the Union, particularly in the eastern States.

BEACH POLLUTION CASE

During the past generation the dumping of New York City garbage in the Atlantic ocean off the shore of New Jersey has caused an ever-increasing nuisance from the accumulation of

garbage and refuse on the New Jersey seashore from Atlantic Highlands southward for about 70 miles. This nuisance has materially increased, from year to year since 1918, when the city's reduction plant at Barren Island was burned and it obtained from the War Department permission to dump large quantities of garbage at sea. Active efforts were made during the terms of Governors Silzer and Moore to relieve this condition through negotiations with the War Department and the authorities of the City of New York. But in spite of these efforts the quantities dumped at sea constantly increased and the nuisance increased accordingly.

In 1927 and 1928 the Legislature adopted resolutions condemning this nuisance and demanding redress. It was the subject of a plank in the Republican platform each year from 1922 to 1929. It was the subject of a plank in the Democratic platform in 1923, 1925, 1926 and 1929. It was condemned in Governor Silzer's messages to the Legislature in 1924 and 1926, in Governor Moore's message of 1927, and in my message of 1929.

My determination to remedy this evil caused the adoption of Joint Resolution No. 16, which was approved by me, April 16, 1929, authorizing the Attorney General to institute a suit in the United States Supreme Court to enjoin the dumping of New York City garbage at sea. That suit was carried through with dispatch. Two hundred and thirty-nine witnesses were examined and 371 exhibits were presented. The decision rendered on May 18, 1931, completely sustained our contentions and announced the intention of the court to grant an injunction as prayed, as soon as it could be ascertained on further testimony when it would be possible for the city of New York to complete incinerator plants of sufficient capacity to take care of its entire garbage and refuse output. On December 7, 1931, the court entered its decree granting to New Jersey a permanent injunction against dumping of garbage or refuse at sea after June 1, 1933, which is the date fixed by the court for the completion of incinerators.

In another year it will be possible to enjoy bathing and other recreation on the New Jersey beaches without the nauseating experiences of the past from the accumulation of garbage and dead animals in the waters and on the shore, and for the first time in a generation our people may enjoy the magnificent playground of our seashore without unpleasant experiences of this kind.

DELAWARE BOUNDARY CASE

The boundary dispute between the States of New Jersey and Delaware has existed for more than two and a half centuries. The first attempt to settle it was made in 1683 when commissioners appointed by William Penn met those appointed by the Assembly of West Jersey. Other commissioners have been appointed on numerous occasions since, but they have never been able to reach an agreement. The last commission, appointed in 1927, made its report to the Legislature in May, 1929, announcing its inability to agree with the commissioners of Delaware. The increasing importance and value of the territory in dispute prompted the Legislature to enact Joint Resolution No. 25, which I approved on May 6, 1929, authorizing the Attorney General to institute a suit in the United States Supreme Court to obtain a judicial determination of this long standing controversy.

During the past century constantly reoccurring altercations between citizens of the two States over fisheries rights in the river, and during the last decade over the rights to dredge and plant oyster grounds, has brought about at times the arrest and imprisonment of citizens of one State by the other. In the year 1820 the Legislature conducted an investigation and a Senate committee made an extensive report. During the succeeding half century there were several occurrences in which the opposing contenders waged pitched battles with rifles and ball in which persons were killed and injured. The situation had become so acute in 1875 that Governor Abbott issued a proclamation, and in 1877, pursuant to instructions from the Legislature, the Attorney General instituted a suit in the United States Supreme Court and obtained a temporary injunction restraining Delaware from interfering with Jerseymen who were fishing in the river. That suit dragged along for a quarter of a century and when the testimony had been completed in 1903, before a decision was rendered, representatives of the two States entered into a compact allowing concurrent fishing rights in the river, but reserving all questions of title in the river and bay and the questions of riparian rights and the right to take oysters for future determination. When that compact was ratified by the Legislature of the two States in 1905 the suit was discontinued by mutual agreement. Since then the controversy has been repeatedly renewed over the right to take seed oysters from the natural oyster beds of about 900 acres around Ship John Light. Several commissions appointed since that time have unsuccessfully attempted to settle the dispute.

Pursuant to the resolution of the Legislature in 1929 the Attorney General instituted a suit to settle this question and that suit has been pressed forward as rapidly as was possible in view of the tremendous amount of work already in hand in the Attorney General's office in the Delaware Diversion and Beach Pollution cases which had been previously started.

There are two angles to the dispute. Within a radius of 12 miles around Newcastle, Delaware claims title to the entire river as far as the low-water mark on the New Jersey shore. In that territory this State has made 23 conveyances of riparian lands covering more than two miles of shore front and established bulkhead lines and pierhead lines extending from 200 to 1000 feet, or more in places, beyond the low water line. Upon these lands have been developed extensive industries consisting of factories, wharves, docks and other improvements of a value roughly estimated at a hundred million dollars. The entire industrial development at Pennsgrove, Carney's Point, Deep Water Point and Pennsville are involved.

There is also involved the title to something over 18,000 acres of river front property in New Jersey within the 12-mile circle held under grants from the West Jersey Proprietors.

If the claim of Delaware is sustained these lands and industries on the New Jersey side of the river are liable to taxation in whole or in part by Delaware, and the failure of title granted by the State of New Jersey would entitle the purchasers to substantial refunds.

The other branch of the case involves the entire length of Delaware bay. Delaware claims title to the geographical center, which, owing to the configuration of the shore lines, presents a very irregular line which includes about 900 acres of the Ship John oyster beds which produce seed oysters of annual value of approximately one-quarter of a million dollars, and about 19,000 acres of oyster planting grounds now partly leased, and the remainder capable of being leased, by the State of New Jersey at the present rate of 75 cents per acre for planting seed oysters for commercial development.

On part of this area New Jersey oystermen have already invested an average of \$900 per acre for shells and seed oysters in the process of development. Neither of these areas would be affected by a boundary line in the center of the main ship channel, as contended for by New Jersey.

The title to the lands in dispute in the boundary case depends upon the records and the English laws as they stood in 1682, and

the preparation of the case for hearings, which are now closely approaching completion, have involved a very extensive and complicated research in this country and England and the expenditure of a substantial amount of money for its prosecution.

Three hearings have already been held in which many witnesses have been examined and in which New Jersey has introduced 638 exhibits and the State of Delaware 227 exhibits. The hearings in the case are likely to close within the next sixty days and a decision may be expected within a few months thereafter.

LIGHTERAGE CASE

On October 26, 1929, the Attorney General, after a thorough investigation, and pursuant to the instructions of Joint Resolution No. 28 of the Legislature, approved July 2, 1929, filed a formal complaint in the name of the State of New Jersey with the Interstate Commerce Commission naming 54 railroads and one steamship company as defendants.

The purpose of this action is to remove discriminations or privileges in freight rates and service prejudicial to the commerce of the State of New Jersey.

The State of New York, the City of New York and many other municipalities, together with numerous other commercial and industrial organizations have joined to oppose the demands of the State of New Jersey.

The vital importance of this action to each taxpayer and wage-earner in the State is self-evident, involving as it does the sovereign rights of the people to demand and secure in full measure the natural, geographical and economic advantages of their State.

Specifically the action seeks an order from the Interstate Commerce Commission removing New Jersey from the New York freight rate group and a readjustment of freight rates which would compel shipments requiring costly marine service beyond the west bank of the Hudson river to bear the expense thereof.

Under the prevailing rate structure industries of New Jersey are compelled to pay the same or higher rates as industries located in Manhattan and Brooklyn to which all goods must be lightered from the New Jersey railroads. This strikes at the foundation of New Jersey commerce and navigation and the development of the natural geographical advantages of the State along its extensive waterfront.

Many months have been consumed in the taking of evidence. Hearings have been held in the cities of Newark, Boston and New

York. All of the evidence has now been submitted and all briefs have been filed. The State presented 78 witnesses and offered 157 exhibits and every phase of the case has been carefully and fully covered, and counsel for the State, after a careful consideration of the briefs filed by their opponents, are confident that a satisfactory report will be rendered by the examiners of the Interstate Commerce Commission during the latter part of March, 1932.

After the examiners' report is filed, the cause will be considered by the Interstate Commerce Commission and a final decision favorable to the State of New Jersey is expected during the early part of the summer of 1932.

These four major litigations have been cast upon the present administration as an inheritance which should have been dealt with long ago. They account entirely for the extraordinary expenditures made by the Attorney General's Department during the past three years and their accomplishment represents a monumental task which no previous administration has ever been called upon to perform. The results will bring a permanent benefit to the people of the State.

INSTITUTIONS AND AGENCIES

The past year has brought an unusual increase in the number of wards of the State and has added to the overcrowding of existing institutions and the responsibilities of those in charge.

Economic pressure is reflected in the increased number of children committed to the care of the State through the Board of Children's Guardians. That New Jersey has met these enormously increased and highly important governmental duties in these days of stress is evidence of the value of social welfare planning. This humanitarian work is a great bulwark to alleviate distress and suffering. It expresses the purpose of our people to give to the less fortunate and the needy the protection and supervision that their condition requires.

The increase in the number of persons suffering from mental disease was foreseen and, happily, the new mental hospital at Holmdel in Monmouth County was opened during the year. Already its population exceeds one thousand, and this has meant a great relief to the existing institutions. These have, however, been receiving the largest number of new patients in years. This means an unremitting pressure and strain upon the personnel of these institutions, who have responded splendidly to their heavy responsibilities.

The construction of needed facilities for State institutions has been pressed forward as an aid in meeting the unemployment situation and as a means of securing necessary building at a time when materials were below normal costs. I have urged the expediting of this work for these reasons and trust that advantage can be taken of the present extremely favorable situation for continuance of the policy of putting forward needed public building construction during this period.

The work of the Department of Institutions and Agencies is non-partisan in character and enlists the energy and abilities of representative citizens who give generously of their time to the benefit of the State and its wards. I have visited all the State institutions and have found the work practically without exception creditably and ably performed

EDUCATION

The educational work of the State has progressed most satisfactorily. School buildings have been modernized, made architecturally attractive, and adapted to the particular needs they are intended to serve. Many consolidation schools have been made possible by improved roads and public transportation, so that the rural communities are being afforded a better type of instruction than ever before.

Emphasis has been laid upon the type of training given throughout the grades. The fundamental value of the citizen in the last analysis depends largely upon the knowledge, skills, habits and attitudes acquired in the course of training. More emphasis has been given to moral and civic training and character building. Never has there been manifested a more earnest effort on the part of the Department of Education and the great army of teachers to impart knowledge and to develop and train the physical, mental and moral qualities of the school boys and girls of our State.

The grip of the schools upon the pupils is evidenced by a marked increase in attendance in the secondary and higher grades. This may be accounted for by the increasing demand of commerce and industry for more adequate preparation; the ambition of parents and pupils for better educational equipment; the development of high schools in rural communities; the more thorough preparation in the elementary and lower grades; and the more effective operation of the school attendance law.

It must be borne in mind, however, that the cost of government must be kept within present revenues. Extravagance in the expenditure of money for schools and education must be stamped out. Appropriations must be limited to actual needs. Hundreds of taxpayers everywhere are defaulting on tax levies upon their homes and farms, and are abandoning them because they cannot pay. They are taking what little they have and joining the rapidly increasing army of unemployed. Government must regain public confidence.

HEALTH

The past three years have registered a period of good health. There has been a decided falling off in the number of infectious and communicable diseases. The fight against tuberculosis is having its effect in the reduced number of victims and a much larger percentage of recoveries, and the work of the State Board in the abatement of nuisances and possible sources of infection and in analyzing the public waters of our State has been a tremendous task, well done, which has proved a great safeguard to the public health in protecting public water supplies, streams, lakes and bathing beaches from pollution.

GROSS RECEIPTS TAX

In former messages to the Legislature, I called attention specifically to the Gross Receipts Tax Act of 1900 taxing public utilities (other than street railway companies) using the public streets; that for nearly thirty years this system of taxation was applied to all public utilities, including the telephone companies; that after the organization of the New Jersey Bell Telephone Company, in 1927, it challenged the gross receipts tax in so far as the interstate commerce over its line was included in the measure of gross receipts used for the ascertainment of the tax. It appears that although the New Jersey Bell Telephone Company is a corporation of New Jersey and conducts its business exclusively in New Jersey, nevertheless, approximately twenty-five per cent of its gross receipts are derived from interstate messages which it handles in connection with companies in the adjoining State, the gross receipts tax upon which for the year 1928 amounted to more than \$250,000 and for 1929 in excess of \$300,000. I further called your attention to the fact that this tax was distributed among the municipalities in proportion to the value of the line or facilities of the utility assessed within the municipalities respectively.

The gross receipts tax of the New Jersey Bell Telephone Company assessed for 1928 was reviewed in our courts on the ground that the tax was unlawful to the extent that it was imposed upon the gross receipts from interstate business. The New Jersey Supreme Court and the Court of Errors and Appeals sustained the tax. An appeal was taken to the United States Supreme Court and, on January 6, 1929, that Court reversed the New Jersey Court of Errors and Appeals and set the assessment aside to the extent that it was levied upon gross receipts from interstate business.

Nearly all of our public utilities are now engaged in interstate business of some kind or another and if this decision of the United States Supreme Court is to be applied to all other utilities subject to that Act, our municipalities will be deprived of a very large amount of revenue which they now enjoy. The Legislature should devote itself to considering some method of restoring this revenue. It may be that the gross receipts tax will have to be abandoned and some other method of taxation adopted. Certainly such companies should not be permitted to escape entirely the payment of franchise tax or taxes for the use of public streets on interstate business. The State is entitled to a fair proportion of such revenue for the support of its government. No more important problem confronts you at this session of the Legislature than that above referred to. The burden of tax must be distributed equitably and if interstate commerce over these lines is to escape taxation entirely, it is obvious that other taxpayers or the local service will have to bear an additional burden on that account unless some way is found to tax the service equally.

STATE PARKS

A legislative commission was created last year to report upon the need for a comprehensive State park system. Its report will be placed before you.

Although New Jersey has approximately 2,000,000 acres of wild lands, nearly half its total area, the State finds itself without adequate State park facilities.

A recent examination shows New Jersey has only 10 acres of State park and forest land for each 1,000 inhabitants. New York has 207 acres, and Pennsylvania 130 on the same basis.

Despite its lengthy coast line, New Jersey is without a single ocean-front State park. Its existing inland State parks are inadequately developed to accommodate the crowds that fill them in

midsummer. The overflow must find its recreation elsewhere, although it is as much entitled to State park benefits as those who succeed in getting there before the rush.

One of the most accessible and desirable of these possible beach sites is a portion of the United States Government property on Sandy Hook, adjacent to the mainland. This area would, on one side, provide a wonderful beach for ocean bathing, and, on the other side, equally desirable and valuable facilities for still-water bathing and camping sites.

It is certainly to be hoped that New Jersey can make arrangements with the War Department to take over for State park purposes a suitable portion of the Sandy Hook reservation.

The summer exodus to shore resorts, the crowded coastal highways and the increasing tendency of people to seek the ocean is a sure indication of the need of beach playgrounds. Of the small number of beach areas that remain free to the public, many are either overcrowded or poorly developed for public use. In many cases they are inadequately policed and guarded.

That the State should take a hand in meeting a part of this need is obvious to one who investigates the fees imposed by commercial interests for those privileges; another factor is the increasing number of closed or restricted beaches, and a most convincing argument for State park development is the plight of the working man whose modest means prohibit him from giving his family this recreation.

PUBLIC WELFARE

Welfare measures have received especial attention. One of the high spots is the enactment of the old-age pension law and the county welfare act. We have made permanent the crippled children's commission, established the woman's and children's bureau in the Department of Labor, revised and modernized the State probation system and the domestic and juvenile courts, begun an investigation of the problem of migratory children, and enacted laws to encourage model tenement housing projects in our larger cities. Taking as the keynote of its policy the humane and scientific purpose of preventing crime and dependency rather than punishing criminals and supporting paupers, New Jersey is steadily forging its way to the front among the States which are establishing new and more progressive ideals in welfare work.

COURTS AND PROCEDURE

A real beginning has been undertaken in the important work of reorganizing the Judiciary so necessary to relieve overburdened court calendars and to eliminate the vexatious delays

The Judicial Council was created and there has been enacted statutory reforms recommended by it, among such measures being the placing of Common Pleas Judges in the larger counties upon a full-time basis To this Council the Legislature has referred the question of needed amendments to the Judiciary article of the State Constitution Its second annual report and recommendations have been completed and copies thereof will be placed at your disposal for study and action thereon and warrants your thoughtful consideration.

CIVIL SERVICE

The economic conditions that have prevailed throughout the year have been reflected in the greatly increased numbers of persons seeking public employment and in the enlargement of the administrative work placed upon the Civil Service Commission and its staff Notwithstanding these added burdens the Civil Service Commission reports material progress in the development of a sound and effective personnel service for the State.

The 1930 general revision of the civil service law is proving its value in practical use and establishes the basis for further advancement in this important part of public administration The Commission and its staff now have a constructive participation in the administrative part of the Government and their services are proving of value not only through cooperation with State departments but to the Executive, the budget commission, the general appropriations committee and other legislative commissions and committees.

I expressed the opinion, in a former message, that more attention must be paid to the organization, supervision and assignment of public employees as a constructive step toward better and more economical government In this final message I want to again express that conviction A great proportion of governmental activity is business and is not basically unlike other business procedure I am convinced that business principles can be applied to governmental processes as I am that good personnel practice can be applied to the public service With all of the complexity, decentralization of authority and lack of coordination in our system of Government a businesslike control of the personnel will not happen of itself. It must be incorporated into a definite and con-

tinuing administrative policy. Public officers and employees not only receive, in the way of payrolls, half of the cost of current public administration but they determine in great proportion how the remainder of the public money shall be spent.

I am pleased to recognize the progress that has been made I commend the importance of this part of their Government to the continuing interest and support of the people.

PUBLIC UTILITIES

Among the important accomplishments by a State agency, is the active program of work for the elimination of dangerous railroad grade crossings, by the Board of Public Utility Commissioners. Ten projects have been ordered at an estimated cost of approximately \$20,000,000. The beginning of this work on a partnership basis with railroads, whereby the State pays fifty per cent of the cost, fulfills my recommendations to the Legislature in 1929 in which I urged the enactment of this law.

Following a referendum in which the people of New Jersey endorsed the financing of grade crossings, there has been created a fund through the sale of bonds of \$18,000,000 which will finance the State's share of the cost. I am glad to report that progress is being made along these most important lines.

Another matter which I desire to call to the attention of the Legislature is a special report prepared by the Board of Public Utility Commissioners concerning the consolidation and merger of the West Jersey and Seashore Railroad and the Atlantic City Railroad. The problem presented in this report I trust will receive your active consideration. The continuance of an efficient transportation system serving Southern New Jersey is not only important to the particular counties affected but to the entire State. I urge that consideration be given to the specific recommendations contained in this report to the end that such legislation as is required be passed to bring about a more economical and efficient continuation of railroad facilities.

LABOR

Labor has been given its full reasonable demands. We have enacted a safety code for construction work, the law to regulate home work, an act to prevent the dumping of prison-made goods from other States, laws to regulate the manufacture of fireworks, to require payment of the local rate of wages in public work and

to give preference to New Jersey citizens on works under control of State and local authorities.

PREVENTION OF CRIME

The only progressive legislation that does not have to run the gamut of the lobby is that relative to crime. It should be easy to adopt the valuable suggestions of the present crime commission for the revision of the substantive criminal law. With up-to-date legislation and an efficient State Police organization, a State Identification Bureau and the State-wide teletype system installed last year to lengthen the arm of the law and of local law enforcement officers in apprehending criminals, New Jersey will take its place as a leader among the states in the war against crime. We hear the cry for legislation to strip the criminal of his weapons and tools, to make the machinery of justice quick and certain in its processes. These appeals are the voice of wisdom born of experience and should be heeded.

CONCLUSION

Finally, for the Governor who shall on the nineteenth day of January next be inducted into office, I solicit from each and every one of you a spirit of full co-operation in all his efforts to promote the interests of the State. The public problems confronting us at this time prompt the thought, I am sure, in all your hearts that all must join together for the common good. I am sure that Governor Moore will wish to do his great and solemn duty to the people of New Jersey and I bespeak for him your co-operation.

In closing, may I suggest that you have a signal opportunity to serve the people of this State and I sincerely wish that your labors of this session may redound to the advancement of the best interests of all.

Mr. E. E. Brown moved the message be received and spread in full upon the minutes.

Which motion was adopted.

Mr. E. E. Brown offered the following resolution, which was read by the clerk and adopted :

Resolved, That unless otherwise ordered, the regular hours of meeting of this House for morning, afternoon and evening sessions shall be, respectively, at 12 :00 o'clock noon, two and eight o'clock. Until otherwise ordered adjournment of Monday evening sessions shall be until Tuesday morning at 12 :00 o'clock.

Mr. E. E. Brown offered the following resolution, which was read by the clerk and adopted :

Resolved, That the Speaker is hereby authorized and directed to appoint forthwith a committee of five members of this House to serve as a committee on rules.

The Speaker then announced that the Committee on Rules would be Messrs. E. E. Brown, Brannagan, Hood, Downing, and Otto.

The committee offered the following rules for the 1932 Session :

RULES OF HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY

ADOPTED AT SESSION OF 1932

OF THE MEETING OF THE HOUSE

1. Any member or members less than a quorum may meet and adjourn the House from day to day, when necessary.

2. Every member shall attend in his place precisely at the hour to which the House was last adjourned; and in case of neglect, he shall be subject to a reprimand from the Chair, unless excused by the House; nor shall any member absent himself from the House for more than the space of a quarter of an hour without leave previously obtained.

3. In case a less number of members than a quorum shall be present after the arrival of the hour to which the House stood adjourned, they are hereby authorized to send their Sergeant-at-Arms, or any other person or persons by them authorized, with a warrant duly executed, for any and all absent members, as the majority of such as are present may agree, and at the expense of such absent members, respectively, unless such excuse for non-attendance shall be rendered as the House, when a quorum is convened, shall judge sufficient. Immediately after the appoint-

ment of the Standing Committees, the members shall arrange among themselves their several seats appropriated to their counties; and in case of disagreement, the same shall be decided by lot.

OF THE DUTIES OF THE SPEAKER

4. He shall take the chair at the hour to which the House shall have adjourned, and immediately call the members to order; and, on the appearance of a quorum, shall cause the journal of the preceding day to be read, which may be corrected immediately after such reading, or at any session thereafter.

5. He shall preserve order and decorum, and in debate shall prevent personal reflections, and confine members to the question under discussion; but he shall not engage in any debate, nor propose his opinion on any question, without first calling on some member to occupy the chair. When two or more members arise at the same time, he shall name the one entitled to the floor.

6. He shall decide questions of order, subject to an appeal to the House, when demanded by any four members, on which appeal no member shall speak more than once, unless by leave of the House.

7. All questions before the House shall be stated by the Speaker, and distinctly put in the following form, to wit: "As many as are in favor of (the question) will say aye;" and after the affirmative is expressed, "Those of a contrary opinion, no." If the Speaker doubts, or a division be called for, the House shall divide; those in the affirmative of the question shall first arise from their seats, and afterwards those in the negative; and in case of an equal division, the Speaker shall decide.

8. All Committees shall be appointed by the Speaker, unless otherwise specially directed by the House.

9. All acts, addresses and joint resolutions shall be signed by the Speaker; and all writs, warrants and subpoenas issued by the order of the House shall be under his hand and seal, and attested by the Clerk. If the Speaker be absent, a less number of members than a quorum may appoint a Speaker pro tempore, who may sign any warrants, or perform any act requisite to bring in absent members.

10. He shall have a general direction of the hall, and he may name a member to perform the duties of the Chair; but such substitution shall not extend beyond a second adjournment.

OF THE ORDER OF BUSINESS

11. After the reading of the journal, the business of the first meeting of each day shall be conducted in the following manner, to wit:

I. Letters, petitions and memorials, remonstrances and accompanying documents may be presented and disposed of.

II. Reports of Committees may be read.

III. Original resolutions may be offered and considered; items of unfinished business referred; motions to reconsider and to appoint additional members of Committees made; and leave of absence, and leave to withdraw documents, asked.

IV. Bills and joint resolutions on a third reading may be taken up.

V. The House shall then proceed in the order of the day, preference being always given to the unfinished business of the previous sitting; after which bills and joint resolutions on a second reading shall be taken in their order; and the House, in its afternoon session, will proceed to business as though there had been no adjournment of its morning session, excepting that original resolutions, and leave to introduce bills of Committees, be the first business in the afternoon session; and shall, on demand of the majority, proceed with the order of the day.

12. The Clerk shall make a list of all public bills and joint resolutions. He shall from day to day prepare, under the supervision of the Speaker, a calendar of bills and resolutions for consideration. He shall keep a separate list of private bills. No bills for granting, continuing, altering, amending or renewing a charter for any corporation, other than a municipal corporation, shall be placed on the calendar of public bills. All bills, public and private, shall be numbered according to the time of their receipt by the Clerk. They shall be taken up and considered in the order of time in which they were reported, or ordered to a third reading, as appears by the calendar; and the calendar shall be proceeded in until all the bills thereon are called up before the commencement of the calendar anew. The Clerk shall post in a conspicuous place in his office a list of all hearings to be held on bills.

13. All messages shall be sent from this House to the Senate by the Clerk.

OF DECORUM AND DEBATE

14. When a member is about to speak in debate, or communicate any matter to the House, he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to the Speaker, confining himself to the question under debate, and avoiding personality.

15. If any member in debate transgress the rules of the House, the Speaker shall, or any member may, call him to order, in which case the member so called to order shall immediately sit down, unless permitted to explain. The House shall, if appealed to, decide on the case, but without debate; if there be no appeal, the decision of the Chair shall be submitted to. If the decision be in favor of the member called to order, he shall be at liberty to proceed; if otherwise, he shall not be permitted to proceed without leave of the House, and if the case require it, he shall be liable to censure of the House.

16. If a member be called to order for words spoken in debate, the person calling him to order shall repeat the words excepted to, and they shall be taken down in writing at the Clerk's table; and no member shall be held to answer, or be subject to the censure of the House, for words spoken in debate, if any other member has spoken, or other business has intervened after the words spoken, and before exception to them shall have been taken.

No member shall speak more than twice, or longer than five minutes each time, without leave of the House.

18. While the Speaker is putting any question, or addressing the House, none shall walk out of or across the hall; nor in such case, or when a member is speaking, shall anyone entertain private discourse; nor shall anyone, while a member is speaking, pass between him and the Chair.

19. No member shall vote on any question in the event of which he is particularly interested, nor in any case where he was not within the bar of the House when the question was put.

20. Every member who shall be in the House when the question is put shall give his vote, unless the House for special reasons shall excuse him. All motions to excuse a member from voting shall be made before the House divides, or before the call of the yeas and nays is commenced; any member requesting to be excused from voting may make a brief verbal statement of the reasons for such request, and the question shall then be taken without further debate.

21. Petitions, memorials and other papers addressed to the House shall be presented by the Speaker, or by a member in his place; a brief statement of the contents thereof shall be made by the introducer, and, if called upon, he shall declare that it does not, in his opinion, contain any indecent or reproachful language, or any expressions of disrespect to the House, or any Committee of the same.

22. It shall be the duty of the Sergeant-at-Arms, at all times, not to allow any person to smoke in the Assembly Chamber.

ON MOTIONS.

23. Every motion shall be reduced to writing, if the Speaker or any member desire it.

24. When a motion is made and seconded, it shall be stated by the Speaker, or being in writing, it shall be handed to the Chair and read aloud by the Clerk, when it shall be deemed to be in the possession of the House and open to debate; but it may be withdrawn at any time before a decision or amendment.

25. When a question is under debate no motion shall be received but—

1. To adjourn.
2. A call of the House.
3. To lay on the table.
4. For the previous question.
5. To postpone indefinitely.
6. To postpone to a day certain.
7. To go into a Committee of the Whole on the pending subject immediately.
8. To commit to a Committee of the Whole.
9. To commit to a Standing Committee.
10. To commit to a Select Committee.
11. To amend.

Which several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they are stated, and no motion to postpone to a day certain, to commit, or to postpone indefinitely, being decided, shall be again allowed on the same day, and at the same stage of the bill or proposition.

26. A motion to strike out the enacting clause of a bill or joint resolution shall have precedence of a motion to amend, and if carried shall be considered equivalent to its rejection.

27. A motion to adjourn shall be always in order, except when the House is voting, or while a member is addressing the House, or immediately after the question to adjourn has been negatived; that, and the motion to lay on the table, shall be decided without debate.

28. Any member may call for a division of the question, which shall be divided if it comprehends questions so distinct that one being taken away from the rest may stand entire for the decision of the House; a motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible; but a motion to strike out being lost, shall preclude neither amendment nor a motion to strike out and insert.

29. When any motion shall be made and seconded, the same shall, at the request of any two members, be entered on the Journal of the House.

30. When a motion has been once made and carried in the affirmative or negative, it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing party to move for the reconsideration thereof, on the same day or on the next day of actual session of the House thereafter; all motions may be reconsidered, by a majority of the members present; but bills, to be reconsidered, must have the same majority that would be necessary to pass them; and such vote, on motion to reconsider, shall be by taking the yeas and nays.

31. When a blank is to be filled, the question shall first be taken on the largest sum, or greatest number, and remotest day.

32. The yeas and nays shall be entered on the Journal of the House, when moved for and seconded by five members, and in taking the yeas and nays the names of the members, including the Speaker, shall be called alphabetically.

33. The previous question shall be put in this form: "Shall the main question be now put?" It shall only be admitted when demanded by a majority of the members present, and its effect shall be, if decided affirmatively, to put an end to all debate, and bring the House to a direct vote upon amendments reported by a committee, if any, then upon pending amendments, and then upon the main question; if decided in the negative, to leave the main question and amendments, if any, under debate for the residue of the sitting, unless sooner disposed of by taking the question, or in some other manner. All incidental questions of order aris-

ing after a motion is made for the previous question, and pending such motion, shall be decided, whether on appeal or otherwise, without debate.

34. After the Clerk has commenced calling the yeas and nays on any question, no motion shall be received until a decision shall have been announced by the Chair.

35. The following Standing Committees shall be appointed at the commencement of the session, until otherwise ordered.

Which several committees shall consist of five members each, except the Committee on Appropriations, which shall consist of six members.

- A Committee on the New Jersey State Reformatory.

A Committee on State Village for Epileptics.

A Committee on Home for Feeble-Minded Women.

A Committee on School for Feeble-Minded Children.

A Committee on Sanatorium for Tuberculous Diseases.

A Committee on State Reformatory for Women.

A Committee on the Industrial Home for Colored Youth.

36. The several Standing Committees of the House shall have leave to report by bill or otherwise. No bill offered by either a member or a committee, purporting to be a substitute for a bill already in the possession of the House, shall be received or considered, unless the bill so offered as a substitute shall cover substantially the same subject matter as contained in the original bill.

37. No committee shall sit during the sitting of the House, without special leave.

38. All committees appointed at the first sitting shall continue to act during every subsequent sitting of the same Legislature, or until they have reported on the business committed to them, or have been discharged.

OF THE COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE HOUSE

39. In forming a Committee of the Whole House, the Speaker shall leave his chair, and a chairman to preside in committee shall be appointed by the Speaker.

40. The rules of proceeding in the House shall be observed, as far as practicable, in Committee of the Whole, except that any member may speak oftener than twice on the same subject, but shall not speak a second time until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken; nor shall a motion for the previous question be made therein.

41. All amendments made in Committee of the Whole shall be noted by the Clerk, but need not be read by the Speaker on his resuming the chair, unless required by the House.

ON BILLS AND JOINT RESOLUTIONS

42. Bills and joint resolutions to be introduced in the House shall be delivered to the Clerk, endorsed with the signature of the member offering the same. Said bills and joint resolutions should be delivered to the Clerk in duplicate, one copy to be retained by the Clerk for publicity purposes and the other copy to be used for regular procedure of the House if in proper form. The Clerk

shall examine them to see that they are in proper form, and shall submit them to the Speaker, who shall endorse upon each the committee to which it is to be referred, returning the bills to the Clerk. At each session of the House the Clerk shall read the number, title and committee reference of all bills returned to him by the Speaker, which shall be taken as the introduction and first reading of the bill. If any bill offered shall not be in proper form, the Clerk shall return it to the introducer for correction.

43. Every bill and joint resolution shall receive three separate readings in the House previous to its passage, but no bill or joint resolution shall be read twice on the same day, without special order of the House.

44. All bills and joint resolutions shall, after their first reading, be printed for the use of the members and referred to their appropriate committees.

45. All bills and joint resolutions may be made the order of a particular day, on which day they shall be taken up in preference to others on the calendar; and the calendar of private bills shall not be taken up until the calendar of public bills shall have been gone through with.

46. All bills and joint resolutions, previous to their final passage by the House, all petitions, motions and reports, may be committed at the pleasure of the House. And the recommitment of any bill or resolution, when the same has been ordered to a third reading, shall have the effect of placing the same upon the second reading. No motion to recommit any bill or resolution after the same has been ordered to third reading, shall be made or considered in the absence of the member introducing such bill or resolution.

47. Printed bills and joint resolutions shall be used on their second and third readings, and no amendment shall be received to any bill or joint resolution on its third reading unless by unanimous consent of the members present.

48. When bills or joint resolutions are introduced, the Clerk of the House shall forthwith deliver the same to the Supervisor of Bills, who shall prepare them for printing in conformity with the rules defining the duties of said officer.

49. Original bills and joint resolutions, after being printed, shall be delivered by the said Supervisor of Bills to the Clerk.

50. Bills and joint resolutions originating in and passed by the House and amended by the Senate, when concurred in by the

House, shall be delivered by the Clerk to the Supervisor of Bills for reprinting.

51. Bills and joint resolutions which have passed their second reading, together with all amendments thereto, shall be delivered by the Clerk to the Supervisor of Bills, who shall see that the same are in proper form for printing for third reading

52. When the Supervisor of Bills receives from the printer the bill or joint resolution ordered to a third reading and the same shall be found correct, he shall affix his official stamp to each page of the copy to be used as the official copy and intended to be submitted to the Governor for his approval and shall deliver the same to the Clerk.

53. Two copies of every bill and of every joint resolution ordered to a third reading shall be printed on good bond paper, to be approved by the Supervisor of Bills, one of which copies shall be retained in his office and the other of which shall be delivered to the Clerk, to be used thereafter as the official copy of said bill or joint resolution.

54. The Supervisor of Bills shall have printed, for the use of the members of the Legislature, at least one hundred copies of every bill or joint resolution ordered to a third reading, which shall be known and designated as "Official Copy Reprint." The Supervisor of Bills shall deliver twenty-one copies of all bills and joint resolutions designated as "Official Copy Reprint" to the Secretary of the Senate, and sixty copies to the Clerk of the House, and he shall retain the remainder in his own custody, for the use of State and Legislative officers.

55. Except as otherwise provided, the system and procedure which have heretofore prevailed shall be followed in the preparation of all bills and joint resolutions for their various readings, as far as practicable.

56. On a motion to strike out any item in the incidental bill, the question to be submitted to the House shall be, "Shall the item be retained in the bill?" and a majority of all the members of the House shall be necessary to adopt the same.

57. After the introduction of any private bill, the applicants for said bill shall, at their own expense, furnish the usual number of copies for the use of the members, unless the printing thereof be dispensed with by a special order of the House.

58. On the question of the final passage of all bills and joint resolutions, the yeas and nays shall be entered on the Journal of the House.

59. Whenever a bill or resolution that has passed the House shall be carried to the Senate, all papers and documents relating thereto, on the files of the House, shall be carried with such bill or resolution to the Senate.

OF RULES.

60. No standing rule (or order) of the House shall be rescinded or changed without one day's notice being given of the motion therefor; nor shall any standing rule be suspended except by a vote of the majority of the whole number of members of the House.

61. When an Assembly bill is returned amended by the Senate, the report thereof by the Secretary of the Senate shall be taken as the first reading, and the same be entitled to a second reading, without a motion for that purpose; after its second reading, the question shall be, "Shall the Senate amendments to Assembly Bill No. — have a third reading?" If ordered to a third reading, the amendments shall be read, but these readings shall be on different days; the question shall then be, "Will the House of Assembly concur in the Senate amendments to Assembly Bill No. —?" upon which question the votes shall be by yeas and nays. If concurred in by a majority of the whole House, the bill shall be reprinted, the amendments embodied therein, and the reprinted bill examined and reported upon by the Committee on Printed Bills, and read in open Assembly, to the end that it may be known to be correctly printed, and then signed and certified as other bills.

Cushing's Manual shall in all cases, when not in conflict with the rules adopted by the House, be considered and held as standard authority.

63. No person shall be allowed on the floor of the House during its business session, except as follows:

Present State Senators.

Present and former members of the House of Assembly.

Properly accredited newspaper representatives whose credentials have been approved by the Speaker of the House.

Attaches and employees of the House of Assembly and the Senate.

Such other persons as may be given the privileges of the floor by a pass from the Speaker.

64. No committee of this House shall report a bill adversely without notifying the introducer of the bill; nor shall such adverse report be acted upon unless the introducer of the bill is in his seat.

65. After the calling of the roll has been commenced upon any question, no member shall be permitted to explain his vote.

66. Every bill amended in the House, after its report by the committee to which it was referred upon introduction, when ordered to be printed and have a third reading, shall, if ordered by the Speaker of the House, be delivered to the Committee on Bill Revision, whose duty it shall be to examine the same, and if it be found that such amendment agrees with the context the bill shall then be printed. If in the opinion of the committee such amendment is, as to form, improper, they shall report to the House with such recommendation as they think fit. Such report shall be made promptly.

67. That hereafter any motion or resolution which will result in relieving a standing committee of a bill referred to it shall not be entertained unless twenty-four hours' notice shall be given the House of the introduction of such motion or resolution.

68. When a bill is introduced, amending an existing law, it must, in the body of the bill, have all new matter underscored, and all portions of the law proposed to be omitted must be printed in its proper place, enclosed in black-faced brackets. Every bill which amends or supplements an existing law shall have printed thereon, under the number of the bill, the page of the Compiled Statutes or the Pamphlet Laws at which is found the law proposed to be amended or supplemented.

All bills reported with amendments shall be immediately reprinted; the new matter must be underscored, and all matter proposed to be eliminated by amendment must be included in brackets.

It shall be the duty of the Speaker to direct the Clerk to cause any bill appearing on the calendar and not complying with this rule to be immediately amended and reprinted, so as to comply with the same, and when reprinted it shall be restored to its place on the calendar.

69. At each session of the House, officers, attaches, and employees, shall appear at the office of the Clerk of the House and there sign the roll call, and the Clerk of the House shall report, in writing, after each legislative session, to the Chairman of the Incidental Committee as to the attendance of said attaches, officers and employees. Any employee who is absent more than three sessions, without being excused therefrom by the Speaker, is automatically stricken from the list of employees.

70. Any three members of a standing committee may report a bill.

71. Each member when introducing a bill shall submit with each copy of the bill a statement setting out the objects proposed to be accomplished by its enactment and the localities or persons the bill will affect, which statement shall be referred to the Committee with the bill. An equal number of copies of such statement and bill shall be printed and a copy of the statement shall be attached to each copy of the bill. Such statements shall not exceed in length one printed page or four hundred and fifty words.

72. All resolutions, amendments to bills and resolutions shall be presented in one original, together with a copy thereof; and all bills shall be presented in one original and shall be typewritten or printed. Six hundred copies of all bills and six hundred copies of all official reprint bills, shall be printed for the use of members of the House and Senate and for public distribution.

73. No bill or joint resolution originally introduced in the House shall be considered on third reading and final passage until five days after the second reading thereof.

74. All standing committees shall meet at least once each week for the consideration of measures referred to them, and all committee hearings shall be announced in open session and advertised by posting a notice thereof in a conspicuous place in the Assembly Chamber and also at some prominent point in the main corridor of the State House.

75. After a majority of any committee has made its report on any bill or resolution, a minority of such committee may submit a report upon the same proposition, and any member of the House may move to substitute such minority report for the majority report of such committee.

JOINT RULES AND ORDERS OF THE SENATE AND GENERAL ASSEMBLY

1. In every case of an amendment of a bill agreed to in one House and dissented from in the other, if either House shall request a conference and appoint a committee for that purpose, and the other House shall also appoint a committee to confer, such committee shall, at a convenient hour, to be agreed on by their respective chairmen, meet in conference, and state to each other, verbally or in writing, as either shall choose, the reasons of their respective houses for and against the amendment, and confer freely thereon.

2. After each House shall have adhered to its disagreement, a bill or resolution shall be lost.

3 When a bill or resolution which shall have passed in one House is rejected in the other, notice thereof shall be sent to the House in which the same shall have passed.

4. Each House, in which any bill or resolution shall have passed, shall transmit therewith to the other House, all papers and documents relating to the same.

5. When a message shall be sent from either House to the other it shall be announced at the door of the House by the door-keeper, and shall be respectfully communicated to the Chair by the person by whom it is sent.

6 After a bill shall have passed both Houses it shall be delivered by the Clerk of the Assembly or the Secretary of the Senate, as the bill may have originated in one House or the other, to a Joint Committee on Passed Bills, of two from each House, appointed as a Standing Committee for that purpose, and shall be presented by said Committee to the Governor for his approbation, it being first indorsed on the back of the bill certifying in which House the same originated, which indorsement shall be signed by the Secretary or Clerk, as the case may be, of the House in which the same did originate, and shall be entered on the Journal of each House. The said committee shall report on the day of presentation to the Governor, which time shall also be carefully entered on the Journal of each House.

Mr. E. E. Brown offered the following resolution, which was read by the clerk and adopted:

Resolved, That the report of the Committee on Rules of the House of Assembly be adopted by the House of Assembly as the rules for the One Hundred and Fifty-sixth Session.

Resolved, That a committee of five be appointed by the Speaker to procure the attendance of clergymen to open the sessions of the House with prayer

Mr. E. E. Brown offered the following resolution, which was read by the clerk and adopted:

Resolved, That each officer and member of this House be furnished with five hundred (500) "Complimentary Slips"

Mr. E. E. Brown offered the following resolution, which was read by the clerk and adopted:

Resolved, That the Committee on Stationery, when appointed, be directed to furnish for the use of the members of the House and officers thereof file books for Senate and House bills and also minute files.

Mr. E. E. Brown offered the following resolution, which was read by the clerk and adopted:

Resolved, That the number of copies of the Legislative Manual apportioned by law to the House of Assembly be distributed by the Sergeant-at-Arms under the direction of the Clerk of the House as follows: To each member of the House forty (40) copies; to the Clerk of the House, twenty-five (25) copies; to the Assistant Clerk, Speaker's Secretary, Clerk to the majority leader, and Clerk to the minority leader, each ten (10) copies; to the Journal Clerk, Sergeant-at-Arms, Supervisor of Bills, and the Bill Clerk, each five (5) copies; to the Calendar Clerk, Assistant Journal Clerk, Assistant Bill Clerk, Assistant Supervisors of Bills, Assistant Sergeants-at-Arms, Stenographers, Doorkeepers, Pages, each one (1) copy; legislative correspondents and reporters, each two (2) copies



Governor Moore then delivered the Inaugural Address.

INAUGURAL ADDRESS

To the Legislature:

To be elected Governor of one's native State is at once a great honor and a grave responsibility; to be twice elected to that high office is a distinction which has come to but few men in the long history of our State.

I approach the great task which lies ahead with an unshakeable faith in that divinity that shapes the destiny of men and States, with a heart full of gratitude to the people for the trust they repose in me, and with a firm determination to redeem the platform pledges of my Party.

We are passing through troublous times, and I address myself to you not as representatives of any political party but as representatives of the people, hoping that you realize, as I do, that the hour is not one for political maneuvering but rather one which demands the application of common sense and such ability as we may possess in an effort to lighten the load of an already overburdened people. There should be no dissension amongst us in carrying out the major pledge of both political parties to reduce the cost of government by economy in administration.

There are many matters of importance which should have your attention, but I will refer to a few of them only at this time and leave the rest for submission at a later date

ECONOMY AND TAXATION

Never before in my experience have the people of this State watched so anxiously for relief from the burden of taxation. As I have heretofore said, the dire results of the business depression are being bitterly experienced in every State, city and corner of the country. Millions of men and women are walking the streets in search of work. Destitution has taken possession of the American home, ever-lengthening bread lines and countless soup kitchens are now familiar spectacles.

Unless unnecessary expenses are eliminated and the burden of taxation relieved and reduced, return to prosperity will be immeasurably delayed. We must be ruthless. The only way to reduce expense is to apply ourselves to the problem sincerely and earnestly. The frills and furbelows must go. Budgets must be cut to the bone. Not only must that be accomplished, but it seems to me vital that every governmental service, the execution or completion of which is not essential at this time, should be postponed. In another part of this communication I have made that recommendation with respect to the State Water Policy Commission, and I reiterate it with reference to all departments of the State Government. All improvements not contracted for and which are not absolutely necessary now should be delayed.

Useless commissions and boards should be abolished. An examination of the records indicates that on August 1, 1931, there were in existence the following commissions, which in my judgment may well be wiped out:

- Commission to Collect and Compile Material of Interest Relating to New Jersey's participation in World War
- Commission to Mark Historical Sites of Camden County from Colonial to Revolutionary War Period, created in 1920
- Commission on Uniform Legislation—created in 1909
- Commission to Purchase and Maintain Old Steuben Home
- Port Raritan District Commission
- Commission on Resources of Delaware River
- Traffic Commission, created in 1930
- Princeton Battle Park Commission
- Monmouth Battle Monument Commission
- Commission on Mortgage Laws
- Commission to Mark Historical Sites

They are some thirty-five in number. Only a few seem to be carrying on any activity, and in most instances those activities can, without impairing the service, be transferred to some other department. For illustration, I see no good reason for continuing the New Jersey Real Estate Commission as such. Its duties could be placed in the Department of Banking and Insurance, as is suggested in the Survey and Report made by the National Institute of Public Administration. Likewise, the power and responsibility of the High Point Park Commission could be placed in the Department of Conservation and Development, and those of the State Horticultural Society in the Department of Agriculture. The work carried on by the Commission for the Rehabilitation of Physically Handicapped Persons should be placed under the Department of Labor.

In addition to the foregoing list of commissions, there are some seven others which, although not listed as existing at present, were created or recreated in 1929, 1930 and 1931. They are as follows:

Projects
Commission to Study Inter-Municipal and Inter-County and

Newark Bay, etc., created in 1929. This I believe was
the Meadow Reclamation Commission
Commission to Investigate the Subject of Taxation and Tan-
gible Personal Property.

It may be that many commissions included in both lists have passed out of existence and will not be entitled to function after the convening of the present Legislature, without some legislative action to extend their life. The whole subject matter should be turned over to the Attorney General, it seems to me, for his opinion as to whether or not any of the foregoing commissions continue. If so, he should be requested to draw the appropriate measure, either bill or resolution, to abolish them and to transfer their duties and powers to other existing departments. Surely, elimination of a great majority of the foregoing commissions, with the consequent simplification, must result not only in more efficient discharge of their functions, but in considerable saving of money.

Under the particularly harsh conditions that now prevail, it is not enough to merely reduce State expenses. The taxpayer needs aid and must be helped. The State's expenses, as we all know, are met out of State's revenues, which, with the exception of the Road Tax, Tax for the Soldiers' Bonus and School Tax, are not raised by direct imposition upon the taxpayer. Such revenues result from Inheritance Taxes, Corporation Taxes and a variety of miscellaneous taxes.

I am in favor of passing back to the taxpayer some of the money that may be saved by postponement of all non-essential State activities. Have we not arrived at the point where the further extension of the highway system of the State may be reduced for a year or two and the moneys thus saved out of motor vehicle license fees and gasoline taxes returned in part to the taxpayer? Road work in this machine age employs comparatively few men. No substantial increase in unemployment will be caused by delaying all highway work not vitally necessary.

Summarized, the anticipated revenues of the Highway Department for 1932 will be approximately:

From the sale of Bonds	\$18,000,000
From U. S. Government	1,125,000
From Motor Vehicle Fees	16,000,000

By Chapter 239, P. L. 1930, being an amendment of the Gasoline Tax Act, the sum of five million dollars is directed to be returned to the several counties in the State in proportion to their tax ratables for distribution upon the same basis among the various municipalities in such counties.

Under the statutes, which together created the one hundred million dollar bond issues for highway improvement, for new facilities for State Institutions and for State Water Supply, there were appropriated from the gasoline taxes such funds as might be necessary to meet the interest and principal payment requirements. I am advised that up to the present time there have been sold of such bonds so authorized only twenty-three million dollars, and that the amount necessary to be set aside for those purposes for the next two years is \$1,372,500 for 1932 and \$2,597,500 for 1933. This amount may have to be increased, but not considerably, contingent upon the sale of additional bonds.

While the Legislature of 1931 appropriated \$3,000,000 of the gasoline taxes to help provide a fund for relief of the unemployed available for substantially immediate use, it was in the nature of a loan to be repaid upon the receipt of \$6,500,000 approximately from the Delaware River Joint Commission. That Commission should be compelled to sell its bonds and pay the State. When such moneys so taken from the gasoline tax are restored, there should be available for distribution among the municipalities from such source a substantial increase over the five million dollars now distributed. I believe that such additional sum will amount to at least eight million dollars. I propose that the increased sum of thirteen million dollars be returned to the taxpayers in each of the years 1932 and 1933, the period for which I advocate restricted highway development. The purposes for which such fund is remitted may be changed so that instead of being expended for the control of traffic and the repair and improvement of streets, the manner of its use may be left to the discretion of the governing body of each municipality.

Notwithstanding the diversion of such increased sum to relieve the taxpayers, there should be left out of the gasoline taxes for use by the State Highway Commission in each of the years 1932

and 1933 in the construction and reconstruction of roads, the sum of \$3,500,000.00.

As stated heretofore, the estimated receipts for Motor Vehicle fees for 1932 are.....\$16,000,000.00

From that sum under the laws and appropriations as they presently exist will have to be deducted the following items:

To the above total of \$9,936,800 should be added the sum borrowed from Motor Vehicle fees for unemployment relief. 3,500,000

And the cost of general administration expenses of State Highway Commission 3,500,000

 \$16,936,800

Apparently nothing will be left out of the Motor Vehicle fees with which to carry on road work unless the sum borrowed for unemployment relief is repaid. As I have said, the Delaware River Joint Commission should be forced to sell its bonds and pay the money to the State.

The need of the taxpayer is so great that I believe the schedule of appropriations and allocations of the Motor Vehicle fees above outlined should be reduced. It will be observed that under Chapter 178 of the Laws of 1930, Chapter 377 of the Laws of 1931, and Chapter 64 of the Laws of 1931, over \$3,000,000.00 is to be returned to the counties for construction and repair of county and township roads.

Further, under the law providing for the State's contribution to the maintenance of county roads, over \$4,000,000.00 is set apart for that purpose.

It is my conviction that these appropriations should be cut in half and the saving thus effected distributed to the taxpayer along with the \$13,000,000.00 taken from the gasoline taxes. This will make a grand total of approximately \$16,500,000.00—saving to the taxpayer of approximately \$2.50 per thousand of ratables.

I further recommend the postponement of the grade crossing elimination program, so that the sum of two million dollars set apart under the said Highway Bond Act for meeting the public share of the cost thereof may be saved for the time being. Retarding institution of this work will not result in any loss or hardship to the State and if the bonds be not sold will save the amortization and interest charges.

The humane treatment of the inmates of our State institutions is a subject in which all good citizens are interested.

I believe that proper housing and creature comforts, in addition to medical care where necessary, should be provided. I am absolutely opposed to the expenditure of the taxpayers' money for extravagant buildings or equipment. I feel that we can easily transgress the bounds of common sense by too great an emphasis on expensive programs which theoretically make for the mental rehabilitation where the subject is required to make good on tests which would bother not a few of us.

Also, I feel that \$47,593.31 is too much to spend for the residence of an institution superintendent.

It is my belief that excessive supervision and the employment of specialists for problems which most of us in our private affairs would solve by the application of ordinary common sense will do much to hasten the day when those who pay the bill will no longer be able to do so. To cite a case in point. The State Board of Children's Guardians has for many years past been performing a task which has won the admiration of all who know of the vast amount of good it has accomplished. Self-sacrificing men and women in the past have given freely of their time either without pay or for compensation which has been trifling compared to the good they have accomplished in rescuing children and widowed mothers from the drear and almost unbearable conditions they would otherwise have faced. And in the years that have passed the former wards of this Board have been singularly free from social transgressions in adult life. This may undoubtedly be credited to the wholesomeness of their upbringing.

Now it is proposed to submit these thousands of children to psychological examinations before placement with families. Just what disposition is to be made of those who fail to pass the tests I do not know. But it may be inferred that they will be marked for permanent State supervision.

Psychologists, like lawyers and doctors, do not always agree, and the system carried to an ultimate conclusion may be unfortunate for the children and expensive for the taxpayers.

Under the State Institutions Ten Million Dollar Bond Act, Chapter 227, P. L. 1930, bonds in that amount have been authorized to provide a fund for institutional construction and equipment. The expenditure is to be made out of the gasoline taxes.

I would recommend the postponement of the expenditure of any more such funds as are not already contracted for, and that no more bonds be sold for a period of two years. This will relieve the gasoline taxes to the extent of amortization and interest requirements on the bonds yet remaining unsold. Inquiry should be made to determine whether or not amortization and interest requirements of the bonds already sold can be met out of the savings effected through a modification of the program of improvement.

The ability of the banking institutions of our State to meet and finance the credit requirements of business are, in the critical times through which we are passing, considerably hampered by the demands made upon them by the many municipalities of the State. The present system of collecting taxes is responsible for this condition. As you know, the Budget Act of 1917 requires that, in the case of counties the budget must be adopted not later than the fortieth day after the beginning of the fiscal year, and in the case of all other municipalities not later than the fifty-fifth day. It is usual, however, for counties and other municipalities to adopt their budgets as early in the year as is possible. Under the Tax Act of 1918, the taxes for the fiscal year are payable in two parts, the first half on the first day of April, which if not paid on or before the first day of June becomes delinquent on that date, and the second half on the first day of December, after which date, if unpaid, said second half becomes delinquent.

Hence, it will be observed that from the commencement of the fiscal year until taxes are collected the municipalities are required to live on borrowed money. Such borrowing is accomplished by means of the issuance and sale of tax anticipation notes. A heavy drain on bank resources results therefrom. Under normal conditions there is no difficulty in meeting that demand. However, it

seems to me that in view of the conditions now existing the banking institutions of this State as well as the taxpayers are entitled to relief.

I would suggest that the respective county boards and taxing authorities speed up the completion of the steps necessary to be completed before the mailing of tax bills to taxpayers can be begun, so that shortly after the first day of April, the date upon which the rate is required to be struck, the payment of taxes may be commenced.

I would further suggest that the law be amended so as to provide for the payment of taxes in four installments rather than two, such payments to be required on the first days of April, July, October and December, one-quarter of the year's taxes being paid on each of the first days of April, July and October and the remaining quarter on December first, each payment but the last becoming delinquent and subject to penalties one month after it is due. In this way the drain upon our banking system, already overtaxed because of heavy withdrawals due to a variety of causes, will be considerably lessened and such institutions enabled to meet such emergencies as may develop until the present crisis shall have passed.

Too, the taxpayer will be benefited, in that smaller payments will be exacted of him, and in many instances moneys will not have to be withdrawn from savings banks to pay taxes, with consequent loss of interest.

I am fully persuaded that the people will be immeasurably relieved from burdensome taxation if every municipality and county government will co-operate in reducing the cost of government by the elimination of needless and wasteful expenditures.

This is a time, too, when municipalities may well give heed to the thought of consolidation with other municipalities and thus open the way for a tremendous saving in the cost of government and a resultant lowering of the tax rate.

REORGANIZATION OF STATE GOVERNMENT

The movement for reformation in State Government began to attract attention approximately twenty years ago. Its growth, at first slow but latterly more rapid in its spread, has been recognized and accepted in some fifteen States. The subject is now under consideration in many other commonwealths.

As originally constituted, State Governments generally confined their functions to the making of laws and administering jus-

tice under those laws. The development of modern life has led to a wide ramification and extension of State activities, resulting usually in the creation of new agencies to administer new activities as the State embarked upon them. New Jersey has been no exception, and consequently a variety of governmental agencies are now administering the Government of this State.

I quote from a report made for the Governor and the State Audit and Finance Commission of this State by the National Institute of Public Administration:

"It (our State Government) consists of no less than thirty-two single, independent officials and seventy-two boards and commissions, making a grand total of ninety-four agencies. In addition, there are some twenty temporary agencies. Of the single officials only the Governor is elected; * * * the others are appointed by various authorities and for sundry terms, thus defeating executive responsibility and adding to administrative complexities. As a matter of fact, some of these officials are constitutional; a few are appointed by the Legislature; many are practically independent of the Governor, either because of the nature of their appointment or the length of their terms of office. The seventy-two boards and commissions consist in the aggregate of approximately 500 members, a group almost as large as the Congress of the United States * * *. These boards and commissions constitute, from an administrative point of view, a great encumbrance of paraphernalia, more or less immobile in meeting the urgent day-to-day demands of State administration.

* * * Many of the most important functions of the State government are permanently shunted off by this system from the direct line of executive authority and control. The Governor, even if he should so desire, could have very little to say about the actual administration of these functions."

The State Government is now spending annually in its operation approximately ninety million dollars. It would seem to require no argument to demonstrate that an administrative organization which is to be charged with the responsibility for the disbursement of such an enormous sum of money should be modeled upon lines calling for official responsibility which cannot be evaded, and for methods in keeping with the demands of modern business.

The Survey of the State Government, to which I have referred, was transmitted to the Governor on December 31, 1929. Hence

the study is quite recent. This report cost the State of New Jersey approximately \$75,000. Very few of these recommendations, if any, have been acted upon. In the short time which has elapsed between election day and now I have endeavored to study the Report and Survey so made. I agree with many of the recommendations. Generally speaking, they rest upon certain principles:

1. Administrative agencies, classified according to their functions.
2. Fixed and definite lines of responsibility for all departmental work.

The departments comprehend a major function of government, and are to be presided over by a single officer appointed and removable by the Governor.

With some of the recommendations I do not agree. Such differences, however, are of minor importance and do not prevent the general and substantial but complete acceptance of the scheme proposed by the survey. For illustration, I see no particular virtue in disturbing the present plan under which the Board of Public Utility Commissioners operates. Nor do I see any value, except to change the term of office of each, in removing the offices of Secretary of State and the Attorney General from the Constitution. Probably, however, to effect the consolidation of the offices of Quartermaster General and Adjutant General it will be necessary to make those offices statutory. I cannot agree that the State Comptroller should be selected by the Legislature. Selection of occupants of that office more likely would be based upon political considerations were the choice to be made by the Legislature rather than by the Governor, and removal of an inefficient or corrupt Comptroller would be difficult of accomplishment.

Appended to this communication is a schedule of the changes which would have to be made to carry out the recommendations of such survey modified in accordance with my views. Such of them as require amendment of the Constitution need not delay the adoption of the remainder of the program, for its substantial operation does not depend upon them and they are but minor parts of it. It is my hope to shortly present to you measures which will carry into execution the suggestions herein outlined.

Companion to these measures will be resolutions to effectuate the plan; that when once agreed upon these changes in the administration of the State's business shall be walled up in the Constitution, proof against tinkering and ill-considered change and modification. As new demands arise for the extension of the State's

functions and enlargement of those activities, responsibility for the administration or execution of power will have to be placed in existing departments. In this way, and only in this way, can the State be guaranteed and protected against a resumption of the impulse to create new agencies for spending money.

STATE WATER POLICY COMMISSION

By virtue of Chapter 267, P. L. 1929, there was created the State Water Policy Commission. It followed a temporary water policy commission which was created to investigate the subject of water supply, to formulate a comprehensive State policy with respect to the development of the waters of the State, to recommend the instrument or instruments by which such policy should be carried into effect and the ways and means of financing the same. The present Water Policy Commission had transferred to it the rights and duties of the Department of Conservation and Development that relate to water supply, dams and flood control. The Commission was given substantial authority over all water supplies of the State, except, however, the North Jersey District Water Supply Commission, still remaining as the constructing agency of the State to build and construct new water supplies upon the application of municipalities.

Chapter 226, P. L. 1930, authorized a bond issue of seven million dollars for the acquisition of lands and interests, water rights, etc., for the purpose of appropriating, conserving and protecting the potable water supplies of the State. The proceeds of such bond issue are to be held for the demand of the State Water Policy Commission and to be drawn from the State Treasury for projects and in amounts which have first been approved by the State Commission.

To meet the expenses of the Commission for the year 1930 in administering the duties imposed upon it, the Legislature appropriated \$120,210, of which sum approximately \$105,000 were for salaries and traveling expenses of the engineering staff; for administration expenses to be incurred in 1931 there were appropriated \$169,600, of which \$92,000 were for salaries and traveling expenses, plus a flat sum of \$50,000 for preliminary investigations; so that since its creation there have been appropriated for expenses of administering its department nearly \$300,000.

A report was made by the Water Policy Commission in November, 1931, recommending the acquisition of certain property along the south branch of the Raritan River for the construction

of a reservoir ten miles in length extending from Bunnvale in Hunterdon County to Four Bridges in Morris County, inundating the villages of Califon, Long Valley, Middle Valley and Four Bridges, and tapping the waters of Lake Hopatcong and Budd's Lake. To carry out the proposed program will mean the purchase of a minimum of eight thousand acres of land, the destruction of 670 buildings, the relocation of 14.3 miles of the Central Railroad of New Jersey and the relocation of 14.6 miles of highways. The total cost of the project is estimated at thirty-seven million dollars, which is to be paid by Newark, Jersey City, Bayonne, Elizabeth, Kearny and some of the smaller municipalities in the western part of Essex County.

Following the publication of the report, bitter opposition to the plan developed, resulting in a hearing before the State House Commission, at which considerable acrimony developed. Opposition to the location of the proposed reservoir was vigorously registered by representatives of the communities concerned. Others have questioned the business wisdom of the policy of having two agencies such as the Water Policy Commission and the North Jersey District Water Supply Commission with overlapping activities and powers. It is claimed that the functions of the Water Policy Commission should have been left with the North Jersey District Water Supply Commission. Friction and continuation of jockeying for place have resulted, to say nothing of the additional expense incurred.

I am more concerned with what seems to me to be a more pressing question, namely, in view of the economic situation, should the Water Policy Commission proceed any further with its plans? I am of the opinion that we can safely postpone the acquisition of lands as a site for reservoirs until the depression now distressing the people of the State shall have passed. The State will not lose the benefit of the Commission's investigation and study of the State's facilities. Its reports are a matter of record, the data gathered by its engineers can be preserved, and in my judgment no harm can be suffered by the postponement of the program for two years. All other duties of the Commission may well be transferred or turned back to the Department of Conservation and Development. The engineering and clerical and legal staff may be dispensed with. The unexpended balance of the appropriation for the current fiscal year can be turned back into the State Treasury, and the State saved the burden of making any appropriations for the next two years. I have no doubt that if this suggestion is accepted and carried out the State will be saved several hundred thousand dollars.

SHORT SESSION OF THE LEGISLATURE

Consideration of economy forms no small part of the reason which dictates the shortest possible legislative session. I will undertake as soon as possible the consideration of the budget message so that it may be in your hands no later than February tenth.

I recommend the fixation of an early limit upon the introduction of bills. Following the expiration of that time, I suggest that the legislative printer be required, if the contract or his work permits it, to complete the furnishing of copies of the bills and resolutions to the members of the Legislature within one week after the expiration of the time limited for the introduction thereof.

Upon the Legislature assembling, after the furnishing of the bills, I would suggest sessions commencing Monday afternoon of each week at two o'clock and continuing until Thursday evening in each week, so that a very early adjournment may be made possible. Indeed, I would suggest that as soon as the time has expired to introduce bills, the Legislature fix a day for adjournment approximately thirty days after the last day for receipt of bills. Continuous service for four days and nights a week for a full month, with the interests of the State as the sole consideration, ought to be sufficient guard against the passage of ill-conceived legislation or that which is inimical to the State's welfare. Certainly in one month's time those measures which are deserving of attention and consideration should be disposed of. The people of the State, I believe, would welcome such a demonstration of attention to their business.

ELECTION REFORM

Criticisms of the Permanent Registration Act of 1926, that it encouraged fraud, have been demonstrated by experience under it. There is vast dissatisfaction with the act. Each year throughout the State there have to be stricken from the permanent registration lists thousands of names of persons who for various reasons are no longer eligible to vote. The act does not apply to municipalities under 15,000. In my judgment, election laws should be uniform and should apply to all municipalities alike. I believe that personal registration for every general election would mean an improvement and reduce the danger of fraudulent registration and voting, which would require of course the elimi-

nation of registration by canvass. I also believe that the election laws should be changed in other respects, namely, the restoration of the Fall Primary in substitution for the present Spring Primary.

The people of the State have long sought to elect Assemblymen by districts. This formerly was the basis of representation in the lower House. The statute which authorized it was declared unconstitutional by the courts of this State. A constitutional amendment seems to be necessary, and I advocate the passage of a resolution submitting the question to the electorate.

HOME RULE

Our Constitution contains no guarantee of home rule to the several municipalities of the State. Apparently the people have been content to permit themselves to be governed by legislative mandate, unrestricted by any constitutional limitation other than the prohibition of special legislation regulating the internal affairs of towns and counties, which because of the abuse of the practice was incorporated in the Constitution of 1875. Of late years there has developed at an alarming rate the tendency to regulate the affairs of our municipalities by legislative enactment mandatory in character and binding upon the municipalities to which such provisions apply. Political caprice and exigency have dictated the passage of laws ousting officials chosen by the people as their administrators.

The practice of this evil has developed to such an extent that it seems to me to call for remedy by constitutional interdiction

JURY REFORM

Under the Jury Commission Act of 1913, Commissioners of Juries were chosen by the Chancellor. That system was found to work satisfactorily in the main, and there were but few criticisms of the Commissioners so chosen. It continued in effect until when, for reasons unknown to me but ascribed by others to be based upon political considerations, the power of appointment of Jury Commissioners was transferred from the Chancellor to the Governor. Since that time there have arisen in some of our counties scandals growing out of the presence on juries of unsuitable persons. The conditions became so bad in at least two of the counties, that the Supreme Court Justices sitting therein were required to take drastic action. In one instance a

number of office holders were removed from a grand jury panel by order of the Supreme Court Justice. In another instance, the Supreme Court Justice stated, according to the public press, that "among the unsatisfactory features of recent jury lists, was the presence upon them of the names of office holders and of members of the county committees of the two major parties." Politics in jury selection has become a public scandal so serious as to require, it seems to me, the selection of jurors by a Commissioner chosen by a member of the State's judiciary. I prefer to have the selection made, not by the Chancellor, but by the Supreme Court Justice holding the circuit in the county in which the appointment is to be made. The Supreme Court Justice is more likely, by reason of contact and closer association with the affairs of the respective counties in his circuit, to be familiar with the conditions in the various counties and with the qualifications of those who are suitable for appointment.

THE JUDICIAL SYSTEM

Our judicial system is not functioning effectively. Litigants are entitled of right to reasonably prompt action in the trial and the appellate courts. Due in part to an antiquated judicial system, and in part to inefficiency in the operation of the courts, litigants are now compelled to suffer long and unreasonable delays. The undue delays in the trial courts are followed by equally unreasonable delays in the appellate courts, with consequent loss to those seeking a judicial determination of their controversies. This condition, already intolerable, is rapidly growing worse, and duty requires that we take prompt and effective action to secure the remedy. To delay justice is to deny justice.

The delays in the appellate courts are chiefly due to the failure of the system, devised in 1844 when the population of the State was less than 500,000, to adequately function now when our population is in excess of 4,000,000. Its outstanding defect with respect to such courts is that the law judges in the Court of Errors and Appeals, with the exception of the Chancellor, constitute the Supreme Court. The obvious remedy, therefore, is to relieve the judges of the court of the last resort of all other duties, and thus enable them to devote their undivided time and attention to the work of that court.

I therefore recommend legislative action to secure the necessary constitutional amendment to accomplish the foregoing, and such other revisions of our present system as may be necessary to secure

speedy action in the appellate courts, such, for instance, as an intermediate appellate tribunal whose decisions under given circumstances would be final.

In the meantime, and until the necessary constitutional changes are effected, the Legislature can render invaluable assistance by relieving the Supreme Court Justices of some of the duties now resting upon them. Although the tendency in recent years has been in this direction, the Legislature during the past year took a contrary course when it abolished appeals to the common pleas courts in workmen's compensation cases, and provided for a review by certiorari only of judgments rendered in the Workmen's Compensation Bureau.

I recommend the immediate repeal of this act and the restoration of appeals from such judgments to the common pleas courts.

Relief from congestion in the trial courts does not depend upon a revision of the Constitution. It is within the power of the Legislature to furnish the remedy, and study of the problem has convinced me that the desired result may be accomplished without creating additional judgeships. The proposal to add to the personnel of the Circuit Court and to vest limited judicial powers in designated Supreme Court Commissioners, I regard with disfavor because it contemplates the placing of additional and unnecessary burdens upon the taxpayers, and I doubt the adequacy of the measure.

When it was proposed a year ago to increase the personnel of the Circuit Court by four, the circuit judges, who are in intimate touch with the problem, gave voice to the opinion that the difficulty could be remedied by the present circuit judges with the assistance of the available common pleas judges. This plan may provide the remedy, and I am convinced should be tried before assuming the expense of additional circuit court judges. The Chief Justice has recently been vested with authority to assign the various common pleas judges to the conduct of the circuit court in counties other than those of their appointment. He should be vested with unlimited power also to assign the circuit court judges, and thus charged with the responsibility of assigning to the congested areas the judges necessary to dispose of the untried cases. The real need is not more judges, but a full utilization of the services of the available judges and a general speeding up of legal machinery.

As a further aid, I recommend that the jurisdiction of the district courts be extended to make cognizable therein all claims and demands and matters in dispute which do not exceed the sum or

value of \$1,000. The circuits would thereby be relieved of a mass of litigation that the district courts can speedily and competently dispose of.

PROHIBITION

For many years the party of which I am a member has endeavored to secure enactment of various measures designed to remedy the conditions consequent upon the incorporation of the Eighteenth Amendment in the Federal Constitution. Consistent efforts have been made to repeal the State Enforcement Act and to pass resolutions calling for the exclusion of the Eighteenth Amendment from the Federal Constitution, and for a National Constitutional Convention. A more liberal attitude has been indicated by many members of the Republican Party, but still no action has resulted. It is my hope that this year members of that party sufficient in number to insure the passage of such resolutions and repealer will be found to join with members of the Democratic Party in voting for the passage thereof. I earnestly urge upon you prompt consideration and disposition of such measures which will be presented to the next session of the Legislature following the receipt of this communication. For economic reasons, if not because of the plain morals of the situation, the present restrictive regulations should be done away with.

AGRICULTURE

In this period of industrial depression we must turn attention to our agricultural resources, determinedly seek methods and resolutely adopt procedures that will promote the full utilization of these resources. My analysis of the agricultural situation in this State shows that there has been a decline in our agricultural status and that this decline has been accentuated recently. The decline has occurred in spite of the best efforts of our farmers and the effective work of the Department of Agriculture and other agricultural agencies. It is my purpose to recommend to the Legislature definite legislative action that will relieve a large part of this unfortunate situation and that will at the same time be thoroughly consistent with the best interests of the general public

Beside furnishing employment for farmers and their families, our agricultural industry usually pays \$14,000,000 a year for labor and this sum is but slightly curtailed during periods of low prices. In addition, our farm population purchases millions of

dollars' worth of manufactured products each year. My information is that the agricultural output of New Jersey could be easily doubled, provided needed help is given.

We should develop a program of providing for our own needs from our own products in so far as possible. A program of this kind is essential to our well-being and is one in which all our citizens can participate. It can be made constructive for ourselves and without discrimination against citizens of other States. Such a program simply means the adoption of the principle of "New Jersey First."

Dairying is one of the principal industries in the State and there are large areas particularly adapted to it. Due to several causes beyond the control of the milk producer of New Jersey, the existence of the industry on an adequate scale is definitely threatened. The State's milk producers are among the most efficient in the country. As the result of conflicting and varying health regulations, the requirement that cattle be tuberculin tested which causes the slaughtering of thousands of animals; the importation of milk and cream of unknown standards from a third of the United States, and the highly competitive distribution system that has brought the price of milk to the dairyman below the cost of production—as the result of these and other factors, including high taxes, the dairymen have appealed to the Legislature for aid and have asked for action by the State that would correct some of these admittedly unfair practices and at the same time serve the interests of consumers. Nothing of consequence has yet been done.

I have consulted with hundreds of dairymen in the State and know their problems. In so far as legislation can help in the solution of these problems, prompt action must be taken. The necessary bills for this purpose have been prepared for introduction under my direction, and they will have my active support. Through these measures the present producers of milk will be benefited, the industry expanded and the consumers' interest safeguarded.

The co-operation of the State Health Department and the health officers of the various municipalities is, of course, essential in carrying out this program, and conferences are now being held with a view to arriving at a satisfactory agreement.

A survey of our entire rural road system should be made with the idea of rapidly adding to the county systems those township or borough roads that progressively fit into them. The cost of road maintenance will thus be spread over broader taxable areas.

and the predicament of the rural township without adequate ratables that is trying to maintain hundreds of miles of roads used by the general public will be relieved

SOUTH JERSEY RAPID TRANSIT

This is a matter of such importance as to warrant a special reference to you at an early date.

It has been studied long enough and it seems to me that the time for appropriate action has arrived.

It is my purpose at an early date to call a conference of the interested parties together with the Public Utilities Commission.

GENERAL MATTERS

Many suggestions containing no doubt a great deal of merit have been drawn to my attention. Among them are plans for a Free State University, utilization and improvement of the meadow lands of the State, State Parks along our sea coast. Under normal conditions I might be willing to submit them to your consideration, but I am firm in my determination not to encourage the expenditure of the State's moneys upon any project which can be delayed or postponed. In these times a dollar saved is certainly a dollar earned.

CONCLUSION

May I say in conclusion that even the most partisan among you cannot evade the fact that the people have, by an overwhelming majority, delivered to me a mandate to carry out these ideas of economy. To do so I must have your co-operation. I shall welcome your advice and assistance. Working together, we can accomplish much for New Jersey.

THE MAJORITY REPORT OF THE SMALL LOAN COMMISSION
PURSUANT TO JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 9 OF 1931

To the Legislature of the State of New Jersey:

The 1931 session of the Legislature of the State of New Jersey passed Joint Resolution No. 9, directing the appointment of a commission of five members for the purpose of inquiring into the subject of the regulation of the small loan business, including the

proper rate of interest to be charged by persons or corporations engaged in such business.

Under date of September 29, 1931, the members of the commission were appointed and the organization meeting of the commission was held on October 20, 1931. Further meetings were held on October 26th, November 23d, December 18th and January 27th, 1932. The meeting of November 23d, 1931, was in the form of a public hearing and was held in the Assembly Chambers in the State House at Trenton. This public hearing was preceded by announcements through the press of the State, designating the time and place of the hearing and extended an invitation to all interested parties to attend and submit their views. Several speakers availed themselves of this opportunity and some of them filed with the commission briefs supporting their contentions.

Thoughtful study and consideration has been given to the mass of information and facts presented to the commission through the files of the Department of Banking and Insurance and the transcript of the proceedings of the aforementioned public hearing, together with the briefs as filed.

It is the opinion of the undersigned members of the commission that there is a social necessity for the existence of credit facilities for the benefit of the large number of people who cannot avail themselves of the facilities offered through banking operations. These facilities are not now available, except in a qualified degree.

The undersigned members of the commission are further of the opinion that in order to provide these facilities, a charge which will return a reasonable amount of net profit must be permitted in order to attract responsible capital. In view of this opinion the following recommendations are offered:

- (1) That a flat rate of $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent per month computed on unpaid balances be permitted to licensed small loan operators;
- (2) That a proper regulatory act, substantially similar to the bill introduced in the 1931 Legislature by Senator Powell (known as Senate No. 209), with the following additions, be proposed:
 - a, Discretionary powers to the Commissioner of Banking and Insurance as to the granting of small loan licenses;
 - b, Requirement that a minimum cash capital of \$50,000 be paid in before a charter is granted by the commissioner;
 - c, A nominal license fee for branch offices in towns of less than 15,000 population at the last Federal census.

The formal record and the original of all briefs, exhibits and other data filed with the commission during the course of its study are, of course, available to the Legislature, the committees thereof and the members of the Legislature.

MINORITY REPORT OF DAVID YOUNG, JR.

To the Members of the Legislature of the State of New Jersey

Pursuant to Chapter J. R. No. 9 Laws of 1931 I hereby submit my report. While I have the highest regard for the brains and ability of my fellow members of this commission, I cannot agree with all the conclusions and recommendations of this report.

First: To begin with, but one public hearing was held, at which the loan companies were represented. A mass of statistics and reports was submitted and a great deal of information was obtained. However, it appears to me that other interests are involved and should have been heard. These are three distinct interests, namely, the loan companies, the local stockholders of loan companies, and last but not least the borrowers, the people themselves, and I think all should have been heard or at least been given an opportunity to have been heard before any report should have been submitted to you.

Second: While I would recommend the *strictest* requirements before any license for a loan company be granted, and I believe the stricter these requirements be, the better, still providing they are fulfilled I object as a matter of principle that absolute discretionary power be given the Commissioner of Banking and Insurance to then refuse a license for no more necessary reason than a personal like or dislike. I regard this recommendation, if written into law, as despotic and arbitrary and as a delegation of legislative authority and as such to be unconstitutional.

Third I agree with the majority that the small loan business is a social and economic necessity in the State of New Jersey and especially so at the present time. I believe it is a necessity, however, in the smaller cities and towns and the rural sections as well as the larger cities. I am unalterably opposed to the flat rate recommended, believing it to be unfair and unjust to those requiring the small loans and those requiring loans in the rural sections of this State. With a flat rate that will not permit a profit on the smaller loans, managers of loan companies would as a matter of business endeavor to force upon the borrowers as large a loan as possible irrespective of the borrower's actual desire or need. The cost of investigating, making and collecting a loan is the same whether the loan is for \$50.00 or \$300.00 and a flat rate would as a matter of good business force the highest possible loan upon the borrower. I believe that the interest rate should remain the same as it is now, and that in addition a service charge for investigating, making and collecting the loan should be allowed. Practically all the banks in New Jersey are now making a service charge for those of us who are unfortunate enough to have only a small balance on hand to cover the cost of handling the account. The actual amount of this service charge on small loans I do not know and would have to be worked out by expert and unprejudiced accountants of whom the State of New Jersey has many in its employ.

If this method is unsatisfactory to you, then I would strongly recommend that a graduated rate be permitted depending upon the amount loaned so that there will be no discrimination in regard to the willingness of lenders to make a loan between the man wishing to borrow a small amount and the one willing to borrow the maximum, and so that the service be given to the rural sections of this State where naturally on account of the scarcity of the population the total amount of gross business must be small.

MINORITY REPORT OF SENATOR ARTHUR N. PIERSON.

I agree with the Commission's findings as to the necessity of the small loan type of credit to meet the demand of those not able to obtain financial assistance from banks.

It is generally recognized that the cost of handling loans for less than \$100.00 is greater than for loans from \$100.00 to \$300.00.

It is my view that the loaning agent should be allowed, in some manner, to cover the cost of handling the smaller loans by an increased rate, or a service charge.

It is evident that a flat rate covering all amounts largely forecloses this type of credit to the small borrower for the reason that such types of loans are unprofitable.

Time has been too limited to determine what the proper rate or charges should be for this type of credit. Consequently, I am unable to concur as to the rate suggested by the majority of the members of the Commission. Otherwise, I concur in their findings and recommendations.

BUDGET MESSAGE

To the Legislature:

In accordance with the Budget Act, Chapter 142, Laws of 1931, I am submitting recommendations for State expenditures in the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1932.

Despite the formidable difficulties with which the task was beset in the beginning, I have achieved my objective of balancing the Budget and have turned an anticipated deficit into a cash reserve.

It is not difficult to balance a budget if one resorts to the simple expedient of advocating the imposition of a new general tax or additions to special taxes already in force.

It is not so easy, however, if one limits the amount recommended to the funds available from established sources of State income as I have done. This is especially true when such funds are abnormally low, as at present.

BUDGET REQUESTS TOTAL \$36,565,165.90.

DEDUCTIONS OF \$9,375,462.96 HAVE BEEN MADE BY ME FROM THE REQUESTS.

MY TOTAL RECOMMENDATIONS ARE \$27,189,702.94.

THE COMPTROLLER ESTIMATES THAT THE AMOUNT AVAILABLE FOR EXPENDITURE IN THE COMING YEAR FROM GENERAL STATE FUNDS, AFTER ANTICIPATING A PRESENT YEAR DEFICIT OF \$731,282.82 AT JUNE 30 NEXT, WILL BE \$20,403,619.48.

EXPENDITURES I HAVE RECOMMENDED FROM THE GENERAL STATE FUND TOTAL \$20,284,542.25.

IT WILL THEREFORE BE SEEN THAT IF MY RECOMMENDATIONS ARE CARRIED OUT THERE WILL BE LEFT IN THE GENERAL STATE FUND A FREE BALANCE OF \$119,077.23.

IN CASE IT IS DECIDED TO DEFER THE OPERATION OF THE OLD AGE PENSION ACT FOR ANOTHER YEAR, AS IS NOW PROPOSED, THE FREE BALANCE REFERRED TO WILL AMOUNT TO \$2,775,877.23.

OLD AGE RELIEF

Notwithstanding the fact that I have allocated \$2,656,800.00 for old age relief, an item appearing for the first time, my total recommendations are \$7,695,893.36 less than the regular and supplemental appropriation bills (exclusive of bond issues) enacted by the Legislature of 1931.

In the event of the postponing of the old age pension act, this budget will be \$10,352,693.36 below the appropriations of last year.

The amount I have set aside for the old age pensions is \$250,200.00 less than originally requested and is based on revised estimates of the Old Age Pension Division.

Reductions necessarily made in requested amounts will in no instance render it impossible for a spending agency to function, excepting in cases where such intention is frankly indicated. In some instances it will be necessary to mark time in comparison with the activities of other years but there need be no disruption of basic organizations.

I am fully convinced that thousands of dollars could be saved annually by abolishing scores of printed forms and reports, most of which are called for by acts of the Legislature.

We are approaching the time when some departments will be unable to perform their proper functions because the larger part of their time will have to be devoted to the compiling of inter-departmental reports at which no one ever looks. These reports are expensive to print and require additional clerks to work on them.

In the account of the Department of Agriculture, I am recommending \$300,000.00 for Tuberculosis Eradication. Lack of adequate support for this highly important work may result in the loss of Federal Aid which would be regrettable in the extreme.

Recently I went on record as advocating the abolishing of the dairy at Greystone Park State Hospital and the supplying of milk to this institution by the North Jersey Branch of the Agricultural Experiment Station. This plan would remove between 2,000 and 3,000 quarts of milk a day from competition with Sussex County dairymen. It would divert the milk produced by the Experiment Station from public sale.

AGRICULTURAL PROJECTS

I am withholding approval of a number of items in the budget requests of the Agricultural Experiment Station and the Department of Agriculture. In so doing it is not to be inferred that I am unmindful of the interests of the farmers but rather that I am keenly alive to their interests. In any State expenditure they have to bear their share of the cost.

Some of the projects I have eliminated should, **in my opinion**, be self-supporting from fees charged to the special interests benefited.

It is my plan to refer the deleted items to the agriculturists of the State and I promise to support any bill presented to the Legislature embodying a new and less expensive plan for some of the amounts cut out. The proposed bill, however, must conform to certain specifications covering the following points:

Items included in any bill must be shown to be necessary despite the investigations carried on by the Federal Department of Agriculture, the results of which are readily available to all interested residents of our State.

They must be shown to be required for the good of the general farming interests. If for the benefit of special branches, the projects should be considered on the basis of fees which would cover the cost.

I am not censuring the Agricultural Experiment Station nor the State Department of Agriculture. In not a few instances they have had projects not of their own seeking thrust upon them.

Most of the professions are becoming overcrowded and I do not consider it advisable to manœuvre the business of agriculture into this category by overemphasizing the "professional farmer." It has been my experience that the average farmer is fully competent to win out on his own if given a reasonable amount of scientific aid.

The Agricultural Experiment Station started with an appropriation of \$15,000.00 and last year's cost of operation was \$879,788.19.

The State Board of Agriculture at one time operated on \$7,500.00 and last year's cost of operation was \$883,834.28

In the interest of the farmer who must pay a share of the bills, I feel the time has come to inaugurate a new plan by means of which the burden will for the most part be borne by those who get a major share of the benefits.

Travel expense items are reduced. It is my opinion that State officials should personally bear the expense of car compartments or Pullman reservations if they consider such expense necessary. Vouchers listing charges for hotel suites will not, in the future, be approved unless special reasons are given. As the State's chief budget officer, I will require the filing of a copy of all expense vouchers in my office.

TIME FOR FILING BUDGET MESSAGE

Chapter 142, Laws of 1931, provides for the submission by the Governor of a Budget Message to the Legislature on or before February fifteenth in the year in which he is inaugurated. In other years the Message is presented on the second Tuesday of January.

I recommend that the law be amended to permit the Governor to send in his Budget Message "on or before February fifteenth each year."

This would make possible a more accurate estimate of the State's financial condition for the ensuing fiscal year and it would make for more scientific budgeting where commodity prices have to be estimated months in advance of contemplated purchases. It would at once relieve the Governor of the onerous task of preparing his annual and budget messages for presentation on the same day and enable members of the Legislature to devote more time and attention to each document. Experience this year has proven that the February date is not a hindrance to the Joint Appropriations Committee in the prompt undertaking of its allotted task.

During the interval between your receipt of this Budget Message and the final drafting of the Appropriation Bill, changed conditions or the lowering of commodity prices may make it possible for the Joint Appropriations Committee to reduce further the amounts I have recommended. I would ask your honorable

committee to endeavor zealously to win by such reductions the sincere gratitude of a people sorely in need of a lightening of their financial burden.

It is my opinion that some of our State buildings are over-insured against fire and there are cases where no coverage is needed.

There has been allocated to a separate account, \$126,300.00 to defray the cost of policies expiring in the next fiscal year. Part of this money is to come from interest earnings of our Fire Insurance Fund. Direct appropriations for fire insurance have been made for renewal of policies on the Capitol and the State Office Building.

CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 4.

Concurrent resolution adopting and ratifying proposed amendment to the Constitution of the United States of America, changing the dates of commencement of terms of office of the President, Vice-President, Senators and Members of the House of Representatives.

WHEREAS, There is now pending a proposed amendment to the Constitution of the United States of America, duly adopted by both Houses of the Congress of the United States of America, which reads as follows:

“ARTICLE

“Section 1. The terms of the President and Vice-President shall end at noon on the twentieth day of January, and the terms of Senators and Representatives at noon on the third day of January, of the years in which such terms would have ended if this article had not been ratified; and the terms of the successors shall then begin.

“Sec. 2. The Congress shall assemble at least once in every year, and such meeting shall begin at noon on the third day of January, unless they shall by law appoint a different day.

“Sec. 3. If, at the time fixed for the beginning of the term of the President, the President-elect shall have died, the Vice-President-elect shall become President. If a President shall not have been chosen before the time fixed for the beginning of his term, or if the President-elect shall have failed to qualify, then the Vice-President-elect shall act as President until a President shall have qualified; and the Congress may by law provide for the case wherein neither a President-elect nor a Vice-President-elect shall have qualified, declaring who shall then act as President, or the manner in which one who is to act shall be selected, and such person shall act accordingly until a President or Vice-President shall have qualified.

“Sec. 4. The Congress may by law provide for the case of the death of any of the persons from whom the House of Representatives may choose a President whenever the right of choice shall have devolved upon them, and for the case of the death of any of the persons from whom the Senate may choose a Vice-President whenever the right of choice shall have devolved upon them.

“Sec. 5. Sections 1 and 2 shall take effect on the fifteenth day of October following the ratification of this article.

“Sec. 6. This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by the Legislatures of three-fourths of the several States within seven years from the date of its submission.”

Therefore be it resolved by the Senate of the State of New Jersey (the House of Assembly concurring):

Section 1. That the Legislature of the State of New Jersey does hereby ratify the proposed amendment to the Constitution of the United States of America on behalf of the State of New Jersey.

Section 2. That the Secretary of State of the State of New Jersey be and he is hereby instructed and authorized to notify the proper officials of the Government of the United States of America of the action taken by the Legislature of the State of New Jersey.

DEAR SIR:

We represent thousands of silk workers in the State of New Jersey who are in the direst need at the present hour.

They are unemployed, and have been so for many months. Ironically enough, they worked so hard in the past, at such long

hours and at such miserable wages, that they turned out more product than they and their fellow-workers could buy back.

In our city of Paterson, the funds raised by the city and by "drives" are parodies of the sums actually needed for relief of only the 12,000 who have registered, not to mention the many who have not entered their names on the registry roll.

If this were an earthquake, or did it effect the population of Russia, China or Italy, our government would long ago have acted in an adequate manner. We urge that it act as speedily and surely now that Americans are involved in a great economic earthquake, to which they see no present hope of an ending.

We appeal for children who have been kidnapped by Want. These children of the silk workers, and of many other workers in this commonwealth, are suffering from malnutrition, with insufficient clothing and deficient medical aid.

We speak for so-called "red-blooded Americans" who were told of the strength and wealth and initiative of this country when they were sent to war.

The condition of these, our fellows, is desperate. They behold the bankers of the country granted huge sums in subsidies, and themselves denied the primitive needs of life.

We demand of the Legislature of New Jersey that it act and act speedily for effective relief for the unemployed thousands facing starvation of this commonwealth. With that in mind, we urge:

1. That the Legislature speedily adopt adequate relief measures whereby the rich of this State shall be taxed to aid the unemployed.

2. That public utility rates be reduced, and the small consumer get the benefit of such reductions.

3. That the Legislature, by resolution, call upon the Federal Congress to do its duty by the people of this country, by passing adequate Federal relief legislation, providing for its distribution to the States.

4. That a sweeping investigation be made of the failure to enforce the labor laws, whereby the manufacturer, racketeering on the workers, sweats them by long hours of work—making the depression worse—amid vile shop conditions.

The complete breakdown of the labor laws in this State is a sad commentary on our commonwealth.

In Paterson, New Jersey's chief silk center, the hours are miserably long, the wages miserably low and the working conditions miserably filthy.

Racketeering upon the workers is the most vicious of evils, as it preys upon those most unable to bear it, and exploits their children, who grow up anemic, rickety and insufficiently equipped for life.

Our demand is that such practices be halted at once.

WHEREAS, Such bonds were issued for thirty years with a callable privilege in fifteen years from date of issue; and

WHEREAS, There is at the present time assets of the Sinking Fund set aside sufficient to pay all such bonds, therefore,

Be it Resolved by the Senate (the House of Assembly concurring)

That the Governor, the Comptroller of the Treasury and the State Treasurer, being the Sinking Fund Commission provided by law for such Highway Extension Bonds, be advised that it is the recommendation of the Legislature of the State of New Jersey that such bonds be retired as early as possible, and that same be called for payment at their callable dates, and that the Sinking Fund Commission be urged to invest and reinvest such moneys as may come within their control so that the funds may be on hand at the several callable dates, to pay and retire such bonds, and that this Resolution be transmitted to each member of the Sinking Fund Commission and the Secretary of the said Commission by the Secretary of the Senate.

MEMORIAL

Of Organized Silk Workers of New Jersey, representing all local unions affiliated with A. F. of L.

Hon A Crozer Reeves, President State Senate, Hon Joseph Greenberg, Speaker of the Assembly; the Honorable Senate and Assembly of the Legislature of the State of New Jersey

This committee of eighty union silk workers are official representatives, chosen by the local unions of the American Federation of Silk Workers, the United Textile Workers—loom fixers, warpers, twisters, weavers and winders—and the Conference for Progressive Labor Action.

The grave conditions confronting the silk workers of this commonwealth could not be worse. Ninety per cent of them are unemployed. The children of these jobless are subject to the diseases which malnutrition and improper feeding bring.

The few of our fellow workers who are at work are subject to the most degrading conditions of work—hours that run from 10 to 14 and more per day, and wages that average around \$12 to \$15 per week.

Such a state of affairs is insulting to us as Americans, and cannot be allowed to continue.

With that in mind, we recommend for your consideration and action the following emergency measures:

1. Adequate unemployment relief, through income and inheritance taxation. We are opposed to a sales tax. It will bring on a buyers' strike and make the depression worse. It is a tax that "soaks the poor." If the door is opened to this form of taxation, there will finally be no end to it. Income and inheritance taxation places the burden where it properly belongs, and aids to bring about that goal so earnestly to be desired: a more equitable distribution of wealth.

2. Permanent unemployment insurance, in order that the utter unpreparedness which was ours in this depression may be ended once and for all.

3. Drastic regulation of the hours of labor, for both men and women workers, and enforcement of the labor laws. We most emphatically insist that the labor laws can be enforced, if volunteer worker deputies will be appointed, to enforce the laws as is done with the motor vehicle legislation.

Manufacturing devices to meet the depression are making it worse. Hours are being lengthened. The speed-up is being introduced. Wages are being cut. Every one of these steps makes for readditions to the army of the unemployed and further reduced purchasing power.

We submit that the police powers of the State must be widened, as was their intent, by legislative action and judicial interpretation, in order that industry may be drastically regulated in the interest of the **common welfare**.

Beyond emergency measures, we urge permanent action for the reconstruction of industries of this State, and particularly the seriously ill silk industry.

For that purpose we propose the creation by resolution of a State Commission, representing the two Houses of the Legislature, to draft (after public hearings) far-reaching legislation with the industrial reconstruction and with workers' protection in view.
