To His Excellency, Robert S. Green, Governor and Commander-in-Chief:

I have the honor to submit herewith a report of the operations of this department for the year 1887. In the appendix will be found, in detailed statements, the number, kind and condition of the property loaned out, belonging to this State, and in whose hands, and the number and condition of the arms in store at the State Arsenal. A more detailed statement of the daily operations will be found in the appendix under their appropriate heads.

ARMS.

The total number of arms of different calibres belonging to the State is fourteen thousand three hundred and three (14,303).

I have to report that nine hundred and fifty-three (953) rifles have been distributed during the year, as follows: Five hundred and sixty (560) to the First Brigade, and three hundred and ninety-three (393) to the Second Brigade. In issuing arms to companies, care is taken that the corps is provided with a proper depository for the State property.

A Post of the Grand Army of the Republic, located at Morristown, and known as A. T. A. Torbert Post, No. 24, had fifty (50) Springfield rifles, cal. .45, which this department was obliged to call in, to make up deficiencies in companies of the National Guard.

RECEIPTS FROM THE UNITED STATES.

In the appendix will be found a statement of the receipts from the United States on account of the quota due this State for arming and equipping the militia. The State receives annually from the federal government, in arms, equipments and ordnance stores, eight thousand two hundred and ninety-four dollars and ninety-three cents (\$8,294.93). During the last year there were drawn on this account arms and stores to the amount of seven thousand nine hundred and fifty-two dollars and ninety-seven cents (\$7,952.97). which were distributed among the organizations of the National Guard. The balance, on the tenth of August last, to the credit of this State, was thirteen thousand two hundred and fifty-seven dollars and eight cents (\$13,257.08).

The arms and equipments bill, known as United States Senate Bill, No. 222, which appropriates four hundred thousand dollars (\$400,000) a year to provide arms, ordnance and quartermaster's stores for the militia, has at last become a law. It is earnestly to be hoped that advantage will be taken of it to begin the armament

of the State troops with the .45 cal. rifle, model of 1884.

Our State may be compelled to call upon its citizen soldiery to quell or prevent labor troubles, so lamentably frequent of late, and it is to its advantage that they should be supplied with the best arms manufactured. If, hereafter, a more perfect arm is invented, or a superior modification of any arm is adopted for the army, the fourth section of the bill provides for the return to the government of unsuitable or unserviceable arms and equipments, in which case a better supply would be issued. The stores most needed by New Jersey, under the amount assigned her Guard from the appropriation made by the general government, are rifles, because arms to interchange with government rifles cannot be obtained elsewhere, while camp and garrison equipage can be purchased in the market or manufactured at the arsenal. Rifles cost about fifteen dollars each, so that we can secure one thousand (1,000) stand. The National Guard requires more rifles. Every company in each regiment and battalion having damaged or unserviceable arms should turn them in and have new ones issued. Arms have been frittered away by careless handling and culpable losses. On the

25th of March your Excellency was informed by Captain Charles S. Smith, acting Chief of Ordnance, United States army, that the Comptroller of the Treasury had decided that the increased annual quota, provided for by the act, would not be available until July 1st, 1887.

AMMUNITION.

Ammunition used by the National Guard is manufactured at the State Arsenal, the machinery for which purpose was bought and set up in 1880.

The quantities of the different kinds of ammunition manufactured at the State Arsenal during the year, will be found in Statement D of the appendix. General Order No. 3, dated at Division Headquarters, June 14, 1887, says:

"Ammunition will be taken by the Quartermaster General from that now on storage for active duty, to be replaced by new ammunities before here."

nition before being taken."

Acting under this order the ammunition expended annually in rifle practice is drawn from the amount held by the different organizations in reserve for any emergency, (General Order No. 7, dated at Headquarters National Guard, August 14, 1877,) not, however, until fresh supplies are issued to the several organizations in place thereof, thus insuring a constant reserve of fresh ammunition for active service.

But little interest seems to be taken in armory practice.

THE NATIONAL GUARD.

One company has been recruited and organized in Orange, designated as Company C, Third Battalion, making at present fifty-six (56) companies, all of which have been armed; two of them making requisition and being supplied with arms during the past year. The National Guard is now organized into seven regiments and three battalions, with two Gatling gun companies and one company of sea coast artillery, designated as Company A. Its compact force of a single division contains many war veterans, making it an important factor in any scheme of national defense, and a guarantee for the preservation of peace in the State. Fair progress has been made in its membership and discipline, and it has two brigade organizations. All the Guard is armed with the Springfield rifles, cal. .45; all have a suitable service dress, and are supplied with

accountrements of a pattern similar to those used in the regular

army.

The National Guard of New Jersey has accomplished more in substantial improvement than could have been expected of it ten

years ago.

The First Regiment, Colonel Edward A. Campbell, headquarters at Newark, is composed of six infantry companies and one gun detachment, the latter equipped with one three-inch breech-loading howitzer.

The Second Regiment, Colonel Edwin A. Stevens, head-quarters at Hoboken, is composed of five infantry companies and one gun detachment. The gun detachment has one three-inch breech-loading howitzer.

The Third Regiment, Colonel Elihu H. Ropes, headquarters at Elizabeth, is composed of seven infantry companies and one gun detachment, the latter equipped with one three-inch breech-loading

howitzer.

The Fourth Regiment, Colonel Samuel D. Dickinson, headquarters at Jersey City, is composed of six infantry companies and one gun detachment. The gun detachment has one three-inch breech-loading howitzer.

The Fifth Regiment, Colonel Levi R. Barnard, headquarters at Newark. is composed of six infantry companies and one gun detachment, the latter equipped with one three-inch breech-loading

howitzer.

The Sixth Regiment, Colonel William H. Cooper, headquarters at Camden, is composed of eight infantry companies and one gun

detachment not equipped.

The Seventh Regiment, Colonel Richard A. Donnelly, head-quarters at Trenton, is composed of six infantry companies and one gun detachment, the latter equipped with one three-inch breech-loading howitzer.

The First Battalion, Major Samuel V. S. Muzzy, headquarters at Paterson, is composed of three infantry companies and one gan de-

tachment. The gun detachment has one gatling gun.

The Second Battalion, Lieutenant Colonel James Vreeland Moore, headquarters at Leonia, is composed of three infantry companies.

The Third Battalion, Major Edward H. Snyder, headquarters at

Orange, is composed of three infantry companies.

Gatling Gun Company A, General James Madison Drake, is located at Elizabeth, attached to the First Brigade, and is armed with two gatling guns and forty rifles.

Gatling Gun Company B, Captain Robert R. Eckendorff, is

located at Camden, attached to the Second Brigade and is armed with two gatling guns and sixty rifles.

Company A, Sea Coast Artillery, Captain James Brady, is located at Atlantic City, attached to the Second Brigade and is

armed with fifty-four Springfield rifles, cal. .45.

Fortunately, there has been no occasion to call the entire Guard into active service since July, 1877, but whenever it has been ordered out the men have responded promptly, and have acted with admirable discretion, zeal and courage. Their conduct in the past is assurance for the future. When needed they can be relied upon. They give much time to the necessary military exercises. Their spirit is good. Their discipline excellent. They are ornaments to the State, no less than its strong stay in times of unlawful tumult and formidable resistance to the civil authorities. They are entitled to generous provision for their support.

The companies of the National Guard are distributed as follows: The First Congressional District with a force of reserve militia of over thirty-two thousand men has six infantry companies and one Gatling Gun Company, consisting of three hundred and ninety men. The county of Salem, in this district, is not represented by

any organization in the Guard.

The Second Congressional District with a force of reserve militia of over twenty-nine thousand men has six infantry companies and one company of Sea Coast Artillery, consisting of four hundred and ten men. The County of Ocean is not represented by any organization in the Guard.

The Third Congressional District with a reserve force of over thirty-two thousand men has eight Infantry Companies and one Gatling Gun Company, consisting of five hundred and fifty men.

The Fourth Congressional District, with a force of reserve Militia of over twenty-five thousand men, has one Infantry Company consisting of sixty men. The counties of Somerset, Sussex and Warren are not represented in the National Guard.

The Fifth Congressional District, with a reserve force of over thirty-one thousand men, has seven Infantry Companies, consisting of four hundred and seventy men. The county of Morris is not rep-

resented in the Guard.

The Sixth Congressional District with a force of reserve Militia of over thirty-six thousand men has fifteen Infantry Companies, consisting of eight hundred and ninety men.

The Seventh Congressional District with a reserve force of over thirty-seven thousand men has ten Infantry Companies, consisting

of five hundred and ninety men.

The Act of the Legislature, approved April 21, 1887, provides

that each county in the State shall be entitled to at least one company.

It will be seen, by reference to above, that the following named

counties are without representation in the National Guard:

Sussex, Warren, Morris, Somerset,

Ocean,

Salem.

GUN DETACHMENTS.

Gun detachments have been organized in several of the organizations of the Guard, and they have been armed with six howitzers, with necessary implements, pistols and sabres, two of them being supplied this year from the two received from the government in the months of April and May. Requisition has been made upon the War Department for two more, to complete the equipment of the several regimental organizations, and we have assurances that they will be furnished as soon as the carriages are completed.

SAPPERS' AND MINERS' CORPS.

There are eight (8) sets of appliances, designed for eight organizations, each consisting of the following:

One two-wheeled hand-cart made to contain the following implements:

6 fireman's axes, or picks and axes combined.

6 shovels. 2 crowbars.

2 drag ropes, fifty feet each, with hooks.

1 battering ram.

2 scaling ladders.2 pairs cutting pliers.

6 police lanterns.

6 brass tubular lanterns with guards.

The following organizations are equipped with the above:

One to the First Regiment at Newark.

One to the Second Regiment at Hoboken.

One to the Third Regiment at Elizabeth.

One to the Fourth Regiment at Jersey City.

One to the Fifth Regiment at Newark.

One to the First Battalion at Paterson.
One to the Second Battalion at Leonia.

Leaving one complete set of the above remaining at the Arsenal.

ANNUAL RETURNS.

All the companies have complied with the law, and the returns received at this office give this exhibit:

First Regiment, three hundred and twenty-two (322) uniformed men, a decrease from the returns ending September 30, 1886, of thirty-five (35).

Second Regiment, three hundred and fifteen (315) uniformed men, an increase over the returns ending September 30, 1886, of

twenty-five (25).

Third Regiment, four hundred and eighty-three (483) uniformed men, a decrease from the returns ending September 30, 1886, of three (3).

Fourth Regiment, three hundred and seventy-one (371) uniformed men, an increase over the returns ending September 30, 1886, of seventeen (17) men.

Fifth Regiment, three hundred and five (305) uniformed men,

a decrease of three (3).

Sixth Regiment, four hundred and twenty-four (424) uniformed men, a decrease of sixteen (16) owing to a wholesome disciplining of bad material.

Seventh Regiment, three hundred and fifty-four (354) uniformed men, the same as at the last return.

First Battalion, two hundred and thirty-two (232) uniformed men, an increase over the returns ending September 30, 1886, of twenty (20).

Second Battalion, one hundred and ninety-six (196) uniformed

men, an increase over last returns of eight (8).

Third Battalion, one hundred and ninety-eight (198) uniformed men, an increase of sixty (60) owing to the organization of a new company.

Gatling Gun Company A, fifty-eight (58) uniformed men, a de-

crease of three (3) owing to local reasons.

Gatling Gun Company B, fifty-two (52) uniformed men, a loss of eight (8),

Company A, Sea Coast Artillery, forty-seven (47) uniformed men. Company not organized at date of last report.

An abstract of these returns will be found in the appendix.

UNIFORMS.

Exhibit C shows the number of active militia companies organized, equipped and attached to the National Guard, and the num-

ber of articles of uniforms furnished to each. By the provisions of the law of 1880 the State pays the entire cost of the uniforms furnished the National Guard, one-half of which is deducted, one-quarter each year for two successive years, from the annual appropriation of each organization so supplied with uniforms. During the year, under the authority of the Commander-in-Chief, acting under the section of the Act of 1886, in relation to issues of uniforms, which reads:

"And to all existing companies, after every five years of service, the Quartermaster-General is hereby directed to purchase, under the approval of the Commander-in-Chief, and to furnish the same at the contract price, upon the requisition of the regimental or battalion commander, properly approved."

The contractors proceeded with the work of making the uniforms for Companies A, B, C, D, E and F, First Regiment; Companies C, D and E, Fifth Regiment; Company B, Seventh Regiment; Companies A and B, First Battalion; Companies A, B and C,

Second Battalion, which have been supplied at this date.

During the year Mr. Cowan, the contractor, has manufactured one thousand and ninety (1,090) blouses. It is estimated that the number of uniforms required for the ensuing year, to replace those worn out, lost and destroyed after the five years of service, will be about one thousand.

ENCAMPMENT.

Last Summer the First Brigade was ordered into camp at Sea Girt. The ground at that place was put in shape during the months of June and July for the encampment. The encampment began on the 20th of August. Although the Brigade went to Sea Girt on that day the encampment was not formally opened until Monday, the 22d, at sunrise, and continued until the evening of August 27th. The pay of the men did not begin until Monday morning, as they went voluntarily into camp on Saturday, the 20th. The Quartermaster-General, with a strong camping party, had all the tents up, the field rolled, avenues laid out, drill ground ready and bath houses and suits were furnished free to the guardsmen. An Artesian well, six hundred and seventyfive (675) feet deep, furnished a supply of drinking water, and driven wells furnished water for washing and cooking. sanitary arrangements were perfect. A new building was erected on the rifle range for the storage of ammunition, and also a hospital for medical stores and equipments in case of emergency. The Brigade was reviewed on Thursday, the 25th, at 4 P. M., by Major-General Joseph W. Plume of the Division and his staff, and on Friday, the 26th, by yourself and staff. The reviews took place daily at 4 o'clock, dress parade at 6 o'clock. The encampment was, by all accounts, one of the most creditable in the history of the National Guard. It was managed by men of

experience.

These encampments are ordered for the purpose of perfecting the men in military drill and discipline. The State pays all the costs of encampments ordered under the law. It furnishes tents and other shelter, and other expenses are provided for. Each encampment entails considerable expense upon every officer and soldier who attends them. These encampments are necessary if the troops are to be familiarized with military drill and discipline, and fitted for the duties they are expected to perform when ordered into active service for the preservation of the peace, the enforcement of the law, or the suppression of insurrection. I respectfully recommend that proper legislation be made to prevent the sale of liquors within a limit of one mile from the spot selected for the encampment of the Guard. In this connection I desire to repeat the remarks made by Deputy Quartermaster Yard in 1886, as follows:

"It would be a wise provision of law for the legislature to forbid the erection of booths or other temporary structures for the sale of drinks or refreshments, or for any other purpose, within certain prescribed limits of any encampment of the National Guard, without first obtaining the consent of the commanding officer of the division, brigade or detachment encamping, and authorizing him, at his discretion, to summarily cause to be removed any such establishment from the limits so prescribed. No serious trouble has yet arisen from this source, but experience teaches, and indications show, that a wholesome restraint put upon this matter at the start

may save much trouble in the near future."

In regard to the propriety of brigade encampments of the National Guard, important as it is to the welfare of the Guard, much can be said. From the experience gained at these encampments, it is my belief that a greater amount of efficiency and military instruction can be secured, and better discipline obtained by separate regimental encampments than by yearly brigade encampments. It is a question whether it would not be to greater advantage and more economical to hold a division encampment once in three years, and regimental encampments every year, taking half of the number of regiments and battalions each year for two years. The instruction and discipline acquired at these separate encampmens would be invaluable in a consolidated division camp. There is sufficient

space at Sea Girt, with small additional quarters, to put the division in one line conveniently. The cost of transportation would not be exceeded by this arrangement upon special rates of railroad companies. The annual encampments are not of long duration. They always occur in the Summer time, when business is slack. Our merchants and manufacturers should take a more liberal and patriotic view of the importance of these encampments, and allow their employes a holiday to participate in them, for it is to their interest for the protection of their property, to encourage these encampments, to build up a first-class National Guard. They should also permit the members of the National Guard in their employ to attend armory, battalion and regimental drills.

It is gratifying, when this department has been the recipient of mendacious and malicious newspaper attacks, to receive, unsolicited, the testimony of persons cognizant of all the facts in refutation of such attacks. From letters received at this office on the subject from officers who, from long and faithful service, can best appreciate the value of an effective and carefully-managed department, I reproduce the following for publication as a vindication as to charges touching the quality and quantity of rations and other supplies issued at the late encampment:

Brev. Maj. Gen. Lewis Perrine, Quartermaster-General:

Sir: Having read the reports published in some of the newspapers regarding the quality and quantity of the food issued to the organizations comprising the First Brigade during our late encampment, and severely criticising the efficiency of the Quartermaster-General's Department, and quoting the Commandant of the First Regiment as one of the complainants, I have to say:

First—The Surgeon of the First Regiment examined daily the rations received from the Quartermaster-General and certified to

me their excellence.

Second—The First Regiment made requisition for what they needed and received it promptly. Therefore, they had no cause for complaint, nor was any made of insufficiency or as to quality.

I take pleasure in certifying to these facts, and tender to you and your efficient aids my congratulations for the able manner in which you succeeded in caring for so large a body of men and performed the ardous duties connected with your department. Please accept my thanks for the courtesies extended to my command, and, if you desire, you may publish any part or all of this letter as a refutation of the unjust reports published against you, in which the papers have made me complainant, for, so far as I am concerned, they are unqualifiedly false.

GEN. LEWIS PERRINE, Quartermaster-General:

General: Since my return from encampment my attention has

been called to newspaper articles in reference to short rations, etc, and in which I am reported as fuming and storming at your Department for its shortcomings. I desire to say that I did not, at any time, complain of anything of the kind, and when, on one occasion, the rations were short, the blame lay in another quarter, and, with proper care exercised, it did not happen again. I could not procure entrenching tools until late in the week, and so informed Brigade Headquarters. That was the fault of some of your civilian employes, who would not trouble themselves to look for them, but were found by Capt. Williams of my staff. Personally, I was fully satisfied with the Quartermaster-General's Department, and the quantity and quality of rations issued.

The Sixth Regiment was inspected at Burlington by invitation of the citizens of that place. The City Council appropriated one hundred dollars (\$100) towards entertaining the Regiment.

The men at these inspections appeared in the regulation State uniform, which has always given a handsome effect. The arms, equipments and uniforms were thoroughly inspected by the Brigade

Inspectors.

These inspections cover the personal appearance and military bearing of the men, fit and condition of uniforms, condition of arms and equipments, discipline, knowledge of duties, total present at inspection and total absent. The inspections further cover the condition of armories and of the company books. The reports should further state whether armories are leased or owned. Where inspections take place by regiments, transportation is furnished to outlying or remote companies to the place of inspection, and Brigade Inspectors are supplied with transportation at the expense of the State to the points designated by orders as the inspecting grounds.

OFFICERS OF THE QUARTERMASTER-GENERAL'S DEPARTMENT.

In June last, upon my recommendation, your Excellency appointed Cyrus F. Loutrel of East Orange, to the office of Deputy

Quartermaster made vacant by the resignation of Major Frederick B. Wright. This department consists of the Quartermaster-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General, two Deputy Quartermasters, two clerks, one military storekeeper, one engineer, one in care of clothing, three cleaning arms, one carpenter, three laborers and one teamster.

Under the law of 1876 the amount of \$7,700 was allowed annually to the Quartermaster-General for the pay of the employes in his office and at the State Arsenal.

In consequence of the annual State Encampment, and issues to the Posts of the Grand Army of the Republic of this State, under the act of 1879, the services required of the employes, both at the office and Arsenal, have been largely increased; but no increase has been made either in number or pay. I would respectfully recommend that the annual appropriation for this Department be increased to \$10,000.

EXPENSES OF THE NATIONAL GUARD.

The expenses of the militia last year amounted to one hundred and eight thousand, three hundred and seventy-one dollars and ninety-two cents (\$108,371.92), against one hundred and eight thousand, nine hundred and forty-two dollars and thirty-two cents (\$108,942.32), in 1886. The principal part of these expenses has been that connected with the Sea Girt Encampment, pay of officers and enlisted men for camp duty, expenses of rifle practice and armory rent.

INDEPENDENT MILITARY COMPANIES.

The following companies, to which arms have been issued by authority of the Legislature, are not attached to the National Guard:

Hibernia Rifles, Jersey City. Lincoln Zouaves, Paterson. Transom Guards, Trenton.

The Transom Guards is a colored company. For a detailed statement of the property issued to these companies, you are referred to tabular statement D. I have heretofore expressed the views of this department and the officers of the National Guard, against the practice of making loans of arms to independent military organizations. It is detrimental to the service, and discourages enlistments in counties where there are existing companies of the National Guard, and to which the young men forming these independent organizations might otherwise attach themselves.

ARMS LOANED TO SCHOOLS AND ACADEMIES.

There are four hundred and two (402) stand of arms in possession of schools and academies in the State, issued by authority of law, and on security approved by the Commander-in-Chief, as follows:

RIFLE PRACTICE.

Rifle practice forms one of the most important military duties at the annual encampment, and the interest taken in it by officers and men alike continues unabated. There were forty-two thousand six hundred and sixty-one (42,661) rounds of metallic cartridges, calibre .45, expended in practice at the Sea Girt Range during the season of 1887.

General orders, No. 3, issued by Major-General Plume of the Division, upon the recommendation of the Inspector-General of Rifle Practice, provided that the season for rifle practice would open August 1, and continue until the close of the encampment,

August 27, 1887.

The following named officers making a score of forty-two and upwards are classified as sharpshooters, and are entitled to receive a silver bar: Col. George E. P. Howard, Division Inspector, Capt. H. Eugene Haddenhorst, Inspector of Rifle Practice, Second Regiment.

The Badges and Bars for the officers and men of the National Guard who qualified during the year 1886, were distributed during the months of January and February of the present year.

MEDICAL DEPARTMENT.

From the reports received from the Division and Brigade Surgeons, and also the several Regimental and Battalion Surgeons, the property in their possession is in reasonably good condition. A summary of these reports is submitted as follows:

In good condition.

"One hospital pannier for Seventh Regiment. The bottles are all in good condition, except two. One of these was lost at Camp, and the other has the glass stopper broken. The medicine and salves are unfit for usc.

"One Regimental case for the Hospital Steward of the Seventh Regiment; it contains eight large bottles; also a leather case with ten small bottles. These are in good condition. The medicines should be renewed, as they are unfit for service."

"There was also a hypodermic syringe and fever thermome-

ter. They were broken while in use at Sea Girt, 1886.

"Bandages, lint and adhesive plaster furnished have been used in Camp and on the Rifle Range."

ment being in good condition and none missing."

The medicines in it were furnished at my expense. Every thing is in condition for immediate use at any time."

talion. "None on hand."

Major Melancthon S. Ayers, Surgeon Second Battalion. Twenty-two surgical instruments and one case," all in good condition.

Lieutenant William H. O. Taylor, Assistant Surgeon Second

Battalion. "None on hand."

Major James Y. Simpson, Surgeon Third Battalion. Amputating case and pocket case with instruments, "all in good condition."

CAMP AND GARRISON EQUIPAGE.

We are not able to anticipate the requirements of the various

organizations during the year. Canvas for tents was needed, as the supply was being exhausted and the tents on hand at the beginning of the year were old and much worn. A quantity of this material was purchased and sent to the State Arsenal during the year, and made up so as to have a full supply of tents for the troops during the coming encampments. From this was manufactured fifty (50) common tents. These with those on hand not being sufficient for the encampment of the First Brigade, a requisition was made by your Excellency upon the Secretary of War on the 4th of August for twenty-five (25) wall, and one hundred (100) common tents, which were promptly furnished and received in August in time for the encampment.

LABOR TROUBLES.

At the request of Brigadier General Steele, of the First Brigade, and to carry out the intentions of confidential special orders of Major General Plume, cots and blankets were issued in the month of February to the guards placed on the arms of the State in Newark, Elizabeth and Hudson County, a statement of which will be found in another part of this report. This order of General Plume was issued by direction of the Commander-in-Chiefthrough the Adjutant General and directed the various commandants of organizations located in Newark, Elizabeth and Hudson County to place a guard around the armories. This measure was a precautionary one, in compliance with a rule enforced by the State. Guards were at once detailed from the companies and patrolled the City Halls, Armories and Stations day and night. The men on duty patrolled two hours and rested four, when they were relieved. The expenses attendant upon this duty, exclusive of the pay of the men, which will be found in the statement of the Paymaster General in this report, were for commutation of rations and necessary freight and incidental expenses, and amounted to one hundred and eightyseven dollars and ten cents.

CONSTITUTIONAL CENTENNIAL AT PHILADELPHIA.

The celebration in September, 1887, was held to commemorate the centennial anniversary of the promulgation of the constitution. A joint resolution appropriating two thousand five hundred dollars for the celebration passed the Senate and the House of Assembly in April and was approved by your Exellency on the 21st of April,

1887. This resolution authorizes and requested the Governor "to take such action as may be best fitted in his judgment to secure a representation of the State by its militia which shall be worthy of the occasion." The other States of the Union moved in a direction to be liberally and creditably represented on this important occasion. It was very evident that this sum would not be sufficient for payment of the necessary expenses of the militia participating in the celebration, which consisted of the following organizations of the National Guard:

Bills have been audited and paid to the amount of one thousand one hundred and twenty-five dollars and eleven cents (\$1,125.11). At this time we are unable to make an accurate estimate as to the probable amount required for payment of the balance of expenses, as bills for transportation have not been presented.

STATE ARSENAL.

At the session of 1884 a special appropriation was authorized, of five thousand dollars (\$5,000), for the purpose of making necessary improvements in the buildings. Of this appropriation the sum of three thousand six hundred and forty-four dollars and seventy-seven cents (\$3,644.77) has been drawn, leaving a balance available of one thousand three hundred and fifty-five dollars and twenty-three cents (\$1,355.23).

The current expenses of the Arsenal for the year amounts to two hundred and twenty-six dollars and thirty-eight cents (\$226.38). The increase, as compared with the preceding year, in the expenditures for the Arsenal is chiefly due to painting the tin roof and the purchase and setting out of plants and trees.

STATE WAR CLAIMS.

On the 8th of February, after making repeated efforts to obtain a re-examination of the suspended and disallowed war claims, I determined to send for Doctor Trimble, claim agent in Washington, who had been previously in our service and was familiar with the accounts, to come immediately to Trenton, that I might confer with him and obtain his opinion of the explanations and arguments necessary to secure a favorable decision on the adverse ruling of the department, and the probable amount that would be allowed to the State on her war claims. After considerable labor expended in the preparation of the accounts and explaining the same, stating the object and necessity of the expenditure, they were filed with the Treasury Department. On the 4th of April I was notified by the Third Auditor of the Treasury that the sum of six thousand five hundred and forty-eight dollars and forty-five cents (\$6,548.45) was found due this State under the Act of Congress approved July 27, 1861. This settlement has been approved by the Second Comptroller of the Treasury, to whom, according to law, all the

papers were referred for decision. The amount has been placed to the credit of the State of New Jersey on the books of the Third Auditor to await an appropriation by Congress for the payment of the same.

GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC.

In the appendix will be found a statement of all the issues made to the Grand Army and Veteran Associations during the year. In October an application was received from Augustus C. Lindsley, formerly of the Third New Jersey Volunteers, secretary of a committee of citizens of Somerville, for muskets and accourrements, battle-flags and quartermaster stores to be used at a re-union of all Somerset county soldiers, whether they wore the blue or the gray. Nothing of the kind had ever been had in the county. The stores were loaned under the act concerning veteran associations, approved February 27, 1879, upon your approval, and the stores were forwarded to Somerville on the 14th of October. All the flags were

returned in good condition on the 24th. The muskets were retained under bond by Wadsworth Post No. 75, Grand Army of the Republic The battle-flags were taken to Somerville by an agent of this department and returned by him.

LOANS OF BATTLE-FLAGS.

Loans of battle-flags, by authority of a resolution of the Legisture, concurred in March 12, 1880:

May 30, 1887. Colors of the Twenty-eighth Regiment, New Jersey Volunteers, at a re-union of the survivors at Paterson.

June 16, 1887. Colors of the Eleventh Regiment New Jersey Volunteers, at a re-union of the survivors at Plainfield.

August 26, 1887. Colors of the Fourteenth Regiment New Jersey Volunteers, at a re-union of the survivors at Toms River.

September 13, 1887. Colors of the Ninth Regiment New Jersey Volunteers, at a re-union of the survivors at Trenton.

September 14, 1887. Colors of the Thirteenth Regiment New Jersey Volunteers, at a re-union of the survivors at Paterson.

EXHIBIT A.

Freehold, N. J., August 31, 1887.

To General Lewis Perrine, Quartermaster-General of New Jersey:

GENERAL: In obedience to your order of the 9th inst., I reported at your headquarters at Camp Green on the 17th inst., when I was assigned to duty as Post Quartermaster. I remained on duty during the encampment of the First Brigade, and until the 27th inst., when the camp having been dismantled and the equipments and stores not required for the use from time to time of the several regimental detachments engaged in target practice, were turned over to the Military Store-keeper or shipped to the Arsenal.

Upon my arrival at the camp, I found the tents in position and the arrangements for the reception of the troops nearly completed, under the direction of Captain John Makechney, of your department. This work was well done, and the handsome appearance of the camp was the subject of very general remark. The artesian well, recommended in my report of last year, was also in course of completion, and already yielding a supply of sweet and wholesome water sufficient for drinking and culinary purposes for the entire encampment. A system of drainage, also recommended in my report of last year, was in course of construction. These improvements, I understand, were carried into effect under your own immediate supervision, and will, doubtless, be referred to in detail in your report.

The troops arrived on Saturday, the 20th, and found their tents pitched, and their camp equipage generally upon the grounds assigned to the several organizations. Such other articlesas were found, after their arrival, to be necessary to their comfort, were supplied upon proper requisition, from the stores under my charge.

In the discharge of my duties, which for a time were quite arduous, I was very efficiently supported by Military Store-keeper, Charles F. Snowden and the men in his department, who are entitled to much credit for their diligence, and their patient and unremitting attention to the work of distributing the stores and

afterwards collecting and storing or reshipping them to the Arsenal. This latter work was commenced on Saturday afternoon, the 27th, as soon as the tents were vacated, when all the loose articles, such as cots, cooking utensils, table furniture, etc., were stored the same

evening.

When the troops left, the usual camp-guard was withdrawn, and the small force belonging to your department was inadequate to prevent the intrusion of tramps and other marauders from the neighborhood, several of whom were apprehended in the act of collecting surplus commissary stores and other articles left in the tents and kitchens, with a view of carrying them away. These articles were recovered and the persons were allowed to depart, with a warning. A sufficient fence around the property to prevent such incursions seems to be a necessity that should be immediately provided for.

It affords me much pleasure to say that this encampment of the National Guard was a most gratifying one. The practical knowledge of camp duties heretofore acquired by officers and men in all the various organizations and departments, enabled them to discharge their duties with ease and satisfaction. Besides, it was evident from their soldierly behavior in camp that the general character of the men is improving. There was less disposition to rowdyism than has been observed heretofore, and a higher tone of intelligence and respectability discernible; consequently there was less complaint and grumbling, and a disposition to make the best instead of the worst of the discomforts that must inevitably be met and endured in camp. The experience of this year was unusually severe because of the heavy rains during the first four days, and the men deserve all the more credit for their patient endurance and generally excellent behavior on that account.

My observation during this encampment leads me to believe that it has been productive of much good to the organization, not only in the insight that officers and men have gained of camp life and the tactical instruction they have obtained, but the association of the several organizations under one head has tended to break down local jealousies and to cultivate a feeling of comradeship throughout the whole brigade,—an esprit de corps—that is no longer confined to the regiment or battalion, but comprehends the consolidated organization. This spirit is a very desirable one to cultivate in our uniformed militia, and no method for doing so is so effectual as that of bringing them together in camp. It would promote the efficiency of the service to occasionally bring the entire body of the National Guard of the State together in this way, and thus teach them practically that they are comrades of one grand organization,

engaged in a common cause. Rivalries there will be, and in a proper direction ought to be, but local jealousies and envious feelings between subordinate organizations of the same corps ought to be

carefully weeded out and discouraged by all possible means.

It is a matter of congratulation to the people of the State, as well as to the National Guard, that the camping ground occupied for the last three years has been purchased by the State, and the ground thus permanently secured. It is generally conceded by all who are acquainted with its location and advantages that there is not another tract in the State, in all respects so well adapted to the purpose.

CAMP GREEN, SEA GIRT, Aug. 30, 1887.

General: I have the honor to report that, in pursuance of an order from you, I reported for duty at your headquarters, at Camp Green on August 17, and was assigned to duty as Post Commissary. I commenced issuing the rations in the regular form upon the arrival of the troops of the First Brigade, on Saturday, the 20th. The arrangements already perfected in your department, in obedience to your orders, were of such an efficient character that they helped me greatly in performing my duties as Post Commissary. On my departure from camp on the 30th I turned into your headquarters at Sea Girt all papers and vouchers pertaining to the department under my supervision. During the encampment from the 20th to the 27th, I failed to find any cause for complaint in regard to the quality or quantity of rations issued to the troops. supplies received were carefully inspected before being issued to the troops, and when they were found not up the standard they were promptly condemned. I am greatly indebted to Lieutenant George G. Felton, Quartermaster of the Sixth Regiment, detailed to the Post Commissary Department, for his valuable assistance in the discharge of my official duties, and also acknowledge the efficient and energetic manner in which he carried out all my views and wishes.
