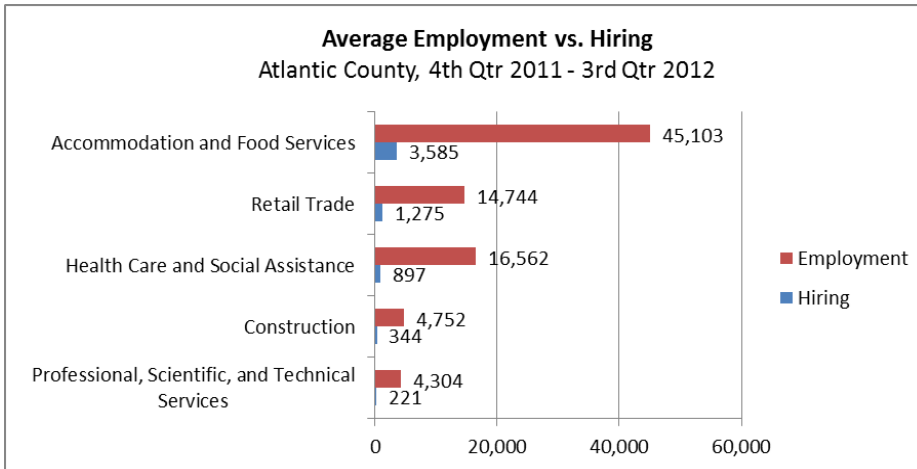


Key Industries in Atlantic County, NJ

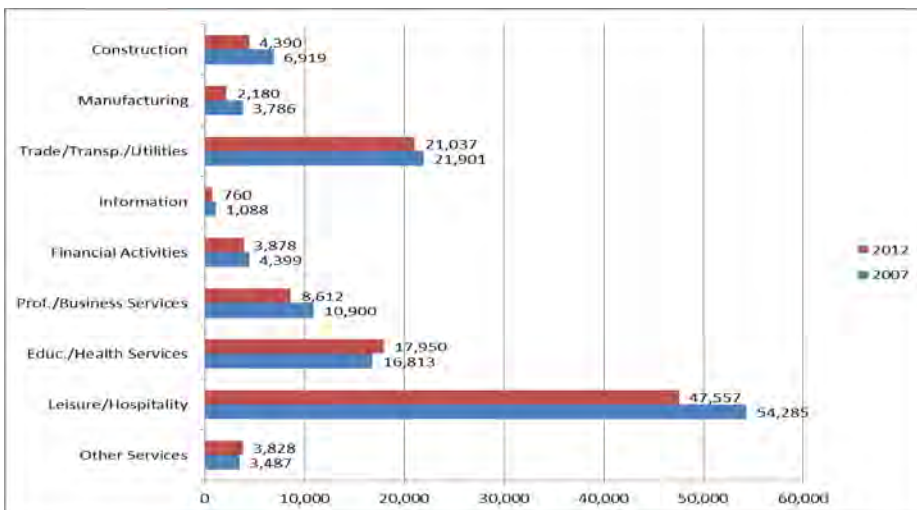
Total Jobs and New Hires in Atlantic County, by Sector

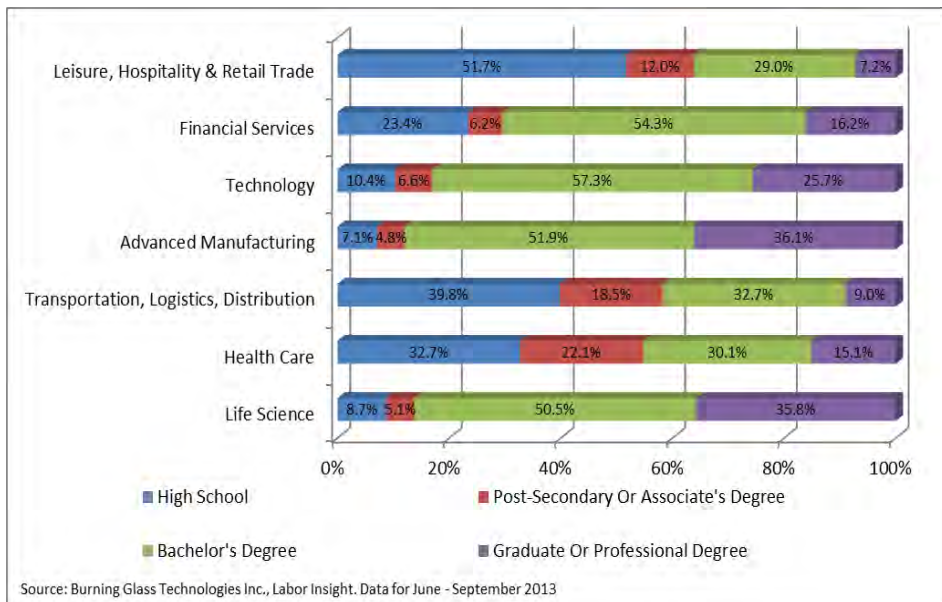

Atlantic County is projected to add 14,300 jobs from 2010 to 2020, an increase of 10.4 percent. In comparison, the state's payrolls are projected to advance by 8.0 percent. The county's accommodation and food services industry is projected to account for the majority of these new jobs (4,000).

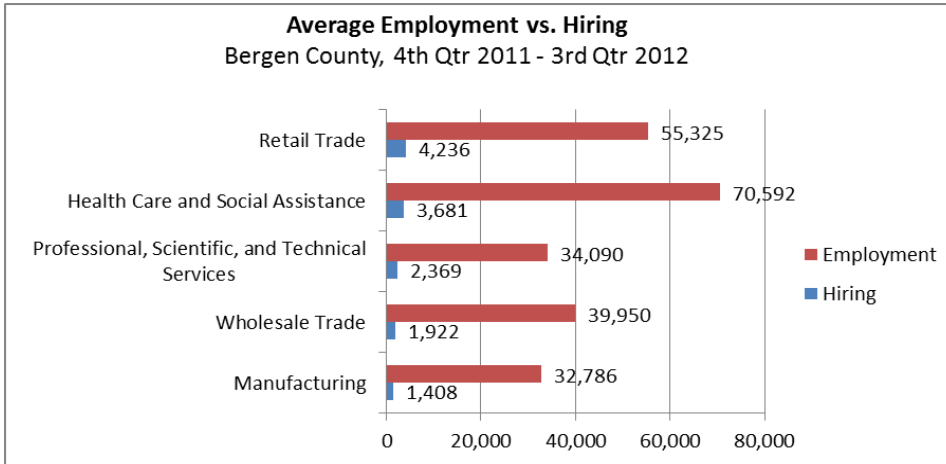

Retail trade (4,236) and health care and social assistance (3,681) each averaged over 3,000 new hires over the four most recent quarters.

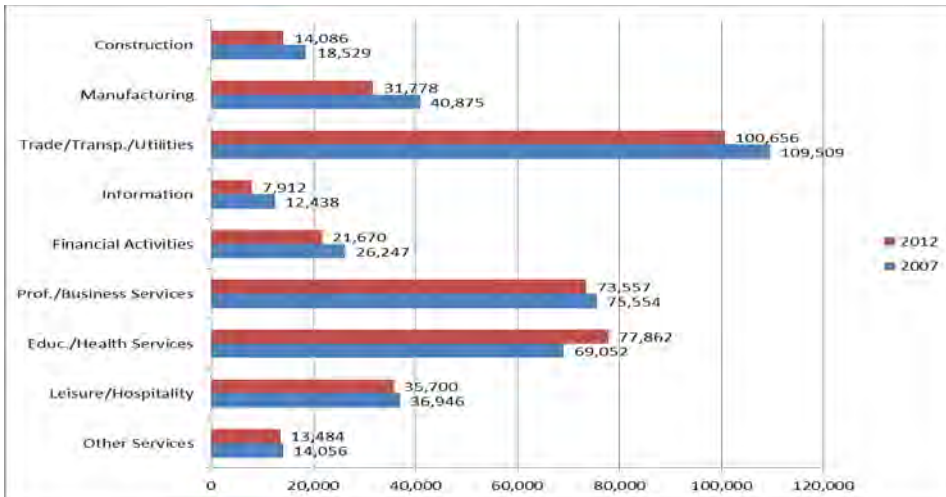
Total Jobs and New Hires in Bergen County, by Sector

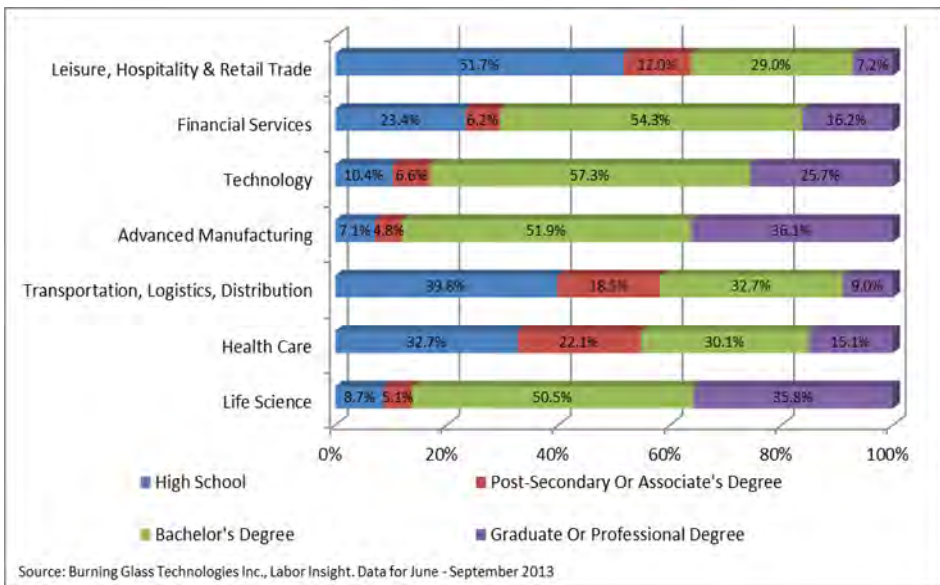

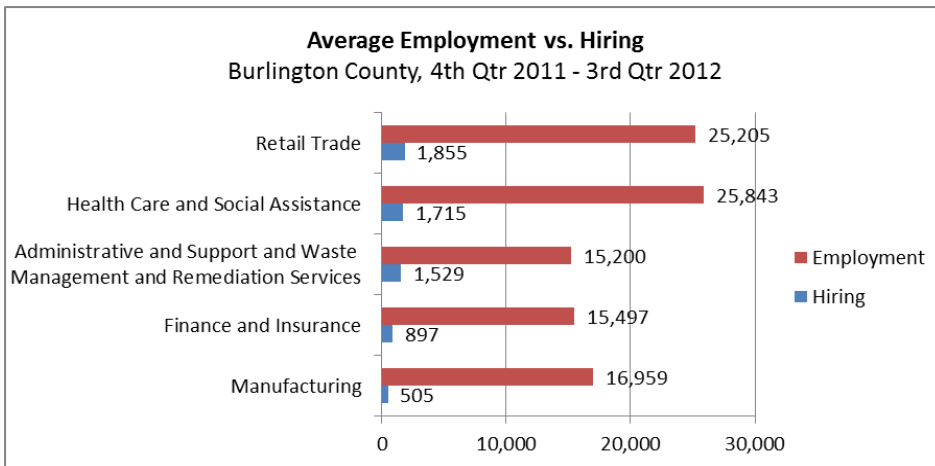

Retail trade, a component of Burlington County's largest employment sector, averaged the most hires (1,855) during the four most recent quarters.

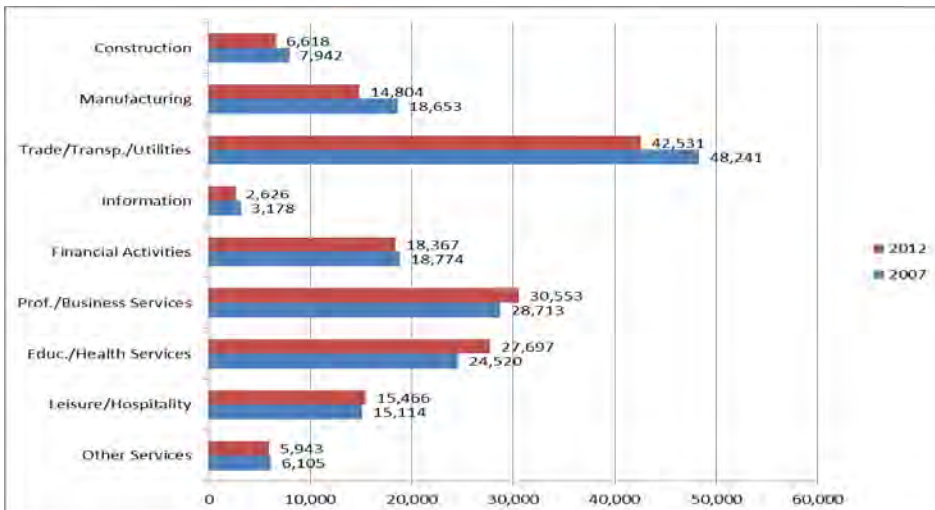
Total Jobs and New Hires in Burlington County, by Sector

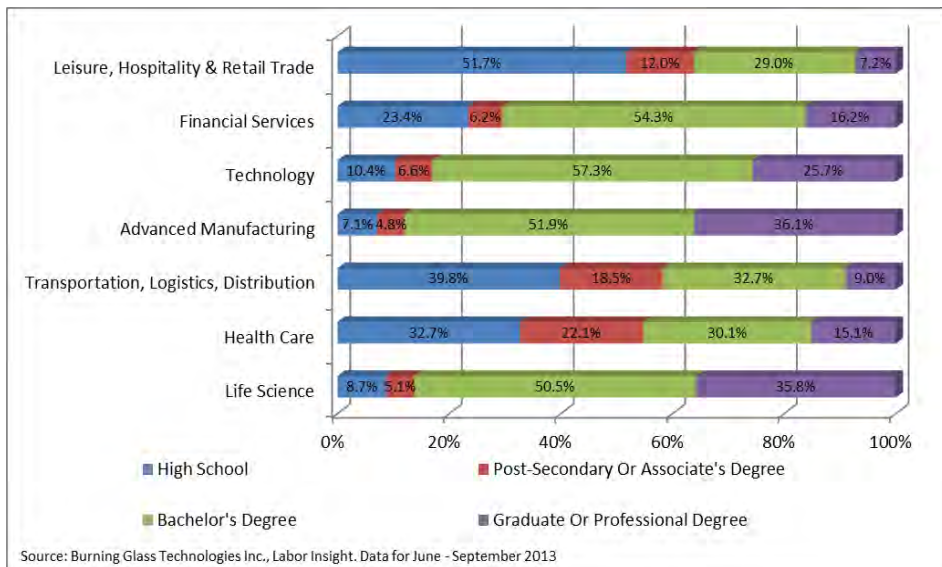

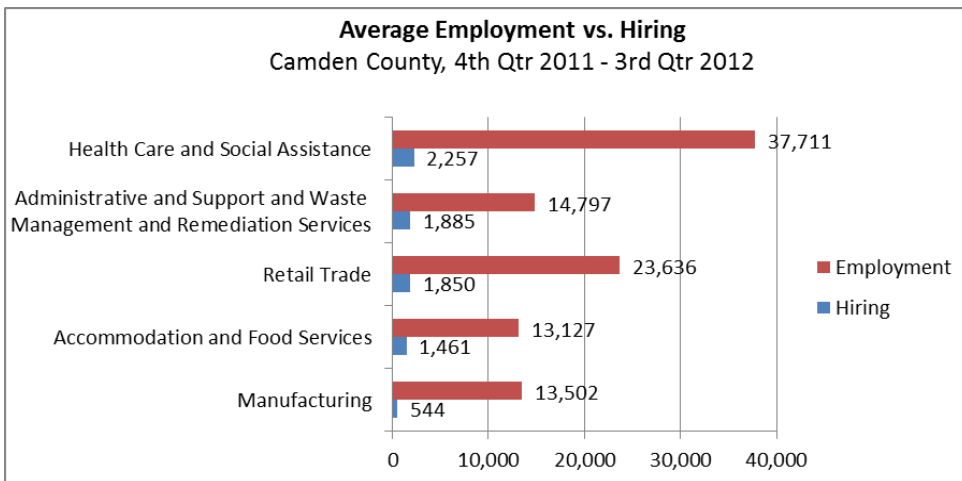

Health care and social assistance (2,257) and administrative and support and waste management and remediation services (1,885) each averaged over 1,800 new hires over the most recent four quarters.

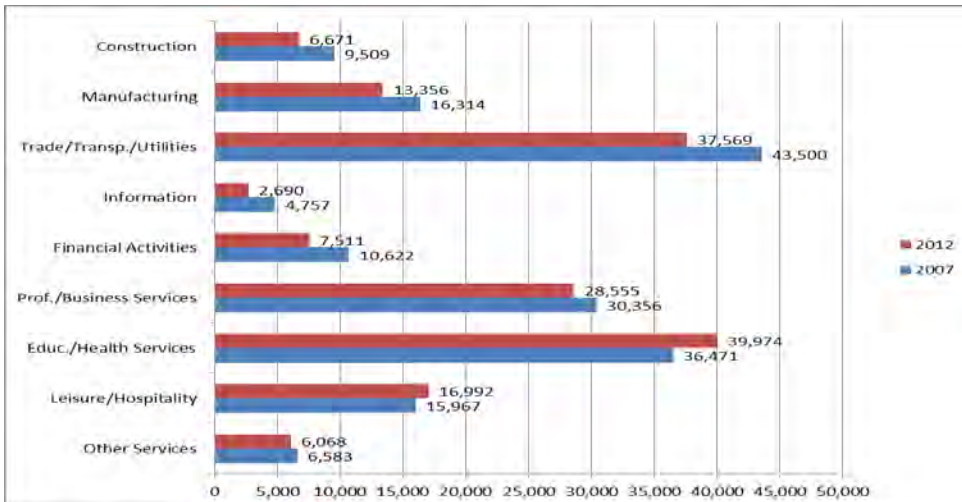
Total Jobs and New Hires in Camden County, by Sector

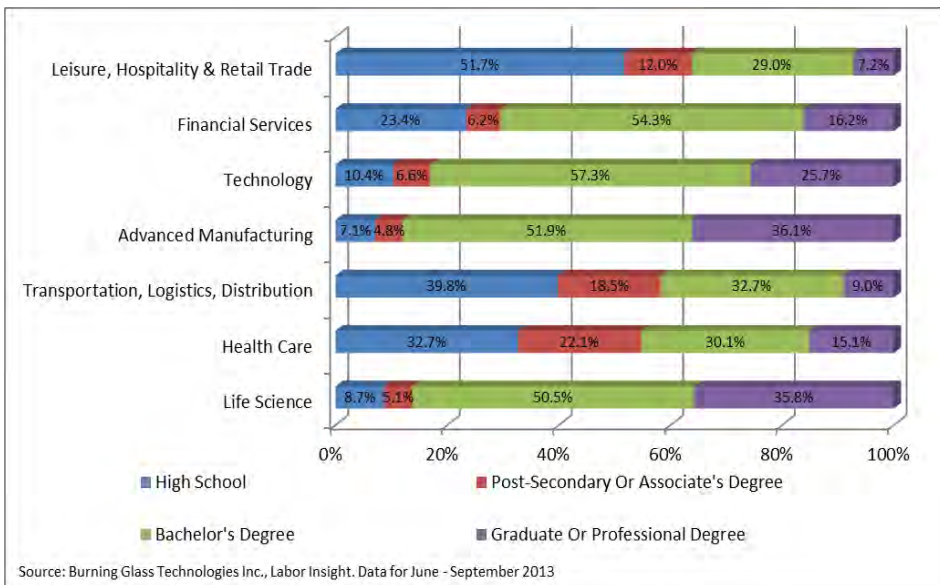

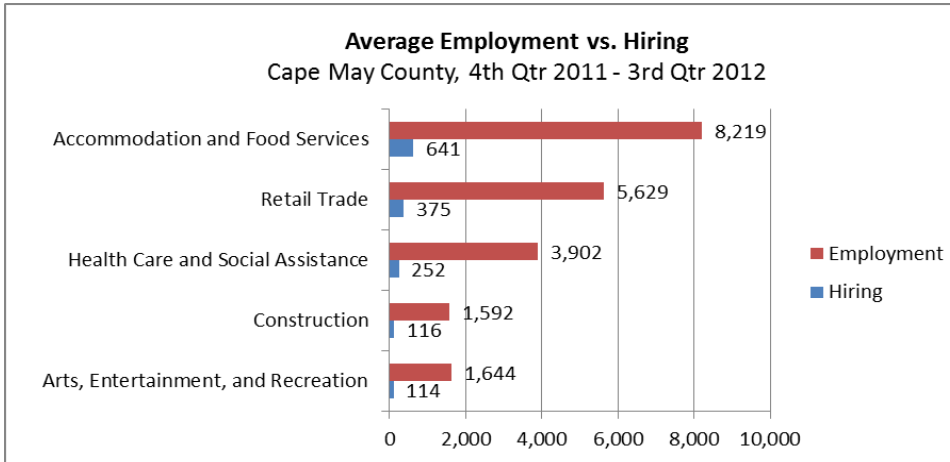

Due to the high concentration of seasonal resorts along its coastline, accommodation and food services averaged over 600 new hires over the four most recent quarters (+641).

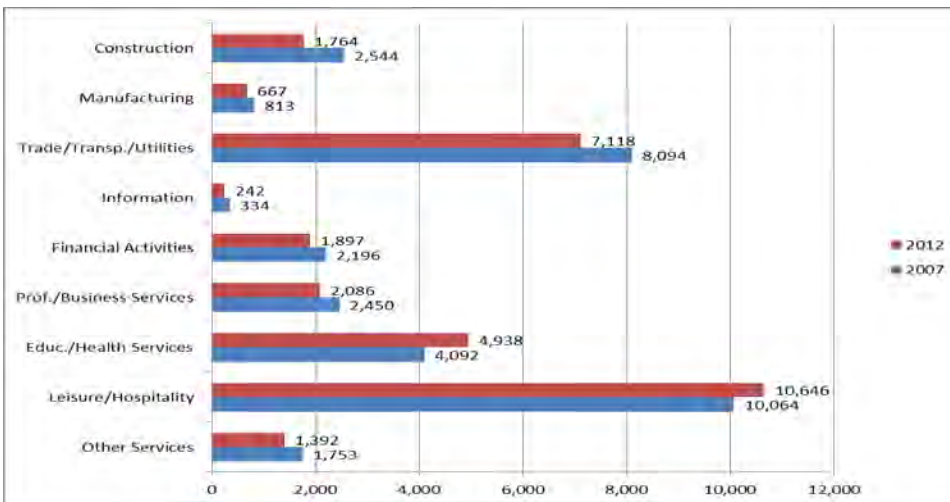
Total Jobs and New Hires in Cape May County, by Sector

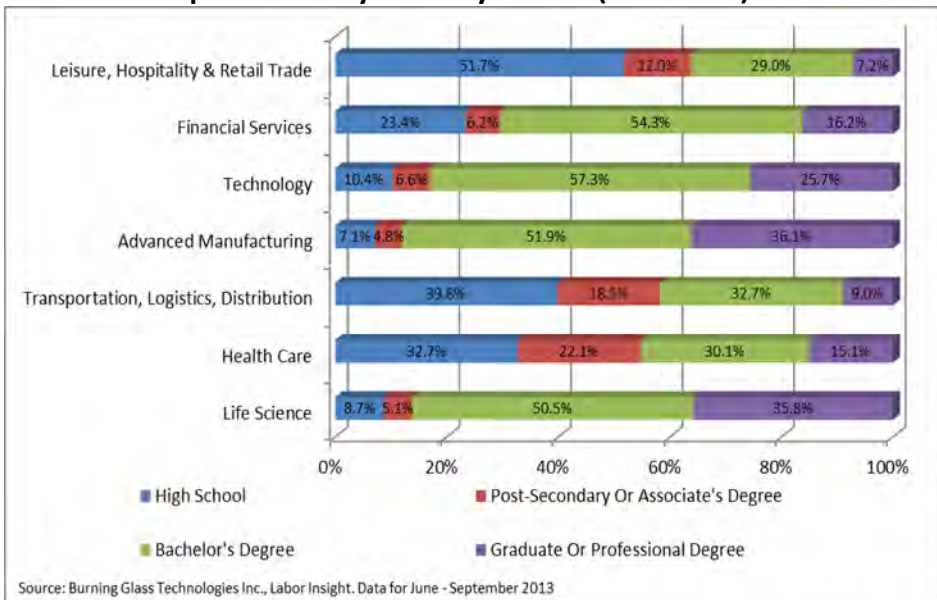

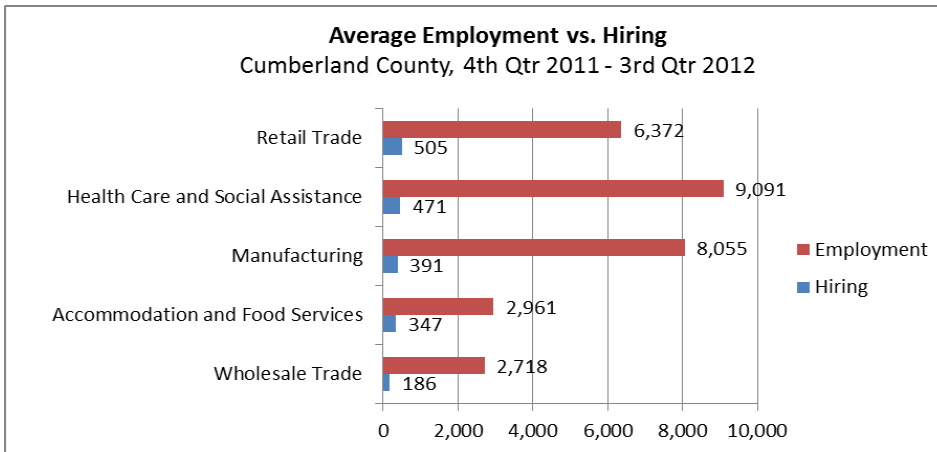

Retail trade (505) and health care and social assistance (471) were two industries which averaged the most new hires in Cumberland County over the most recent four quarters.

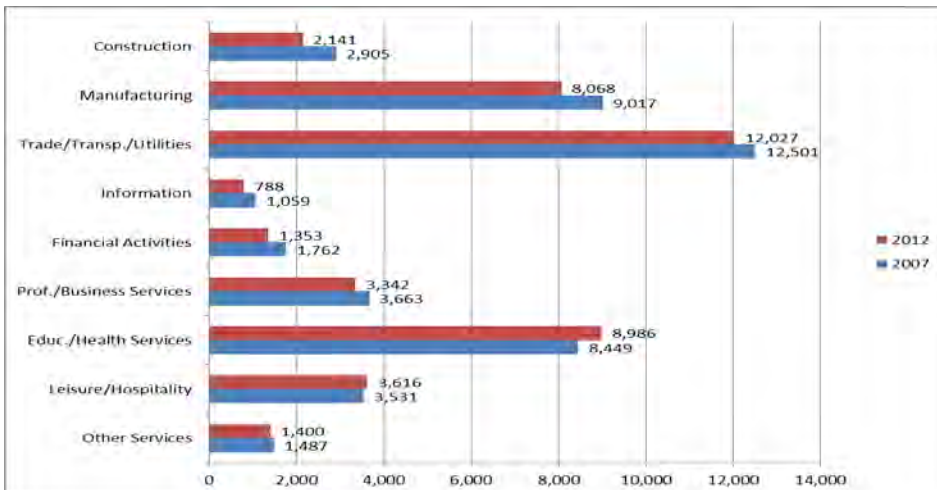
Total Jobs and New Hires in Cumberland County, by Sector

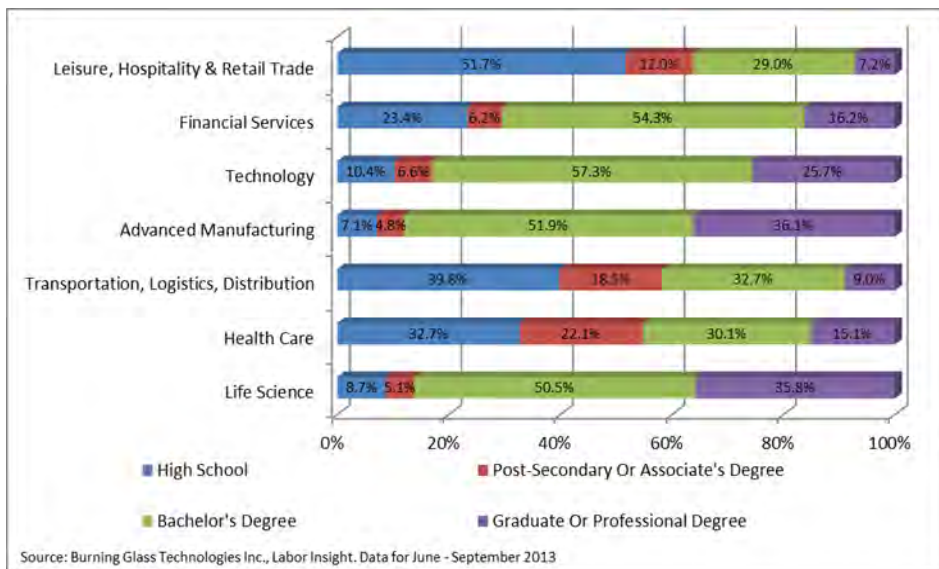

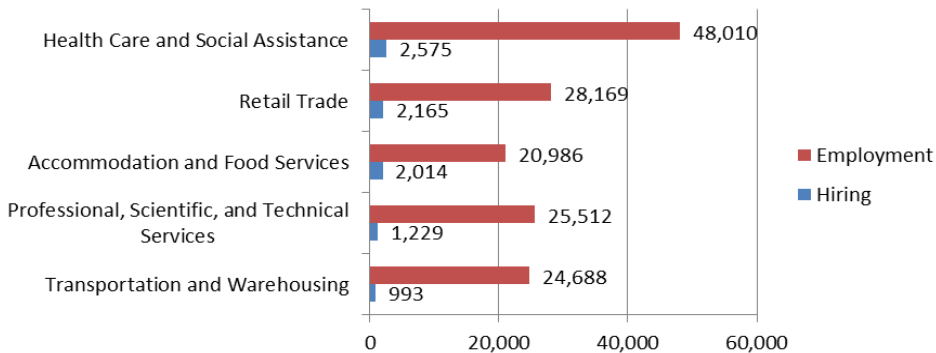

Total Jobs and New Hires in Essex County, by Sector

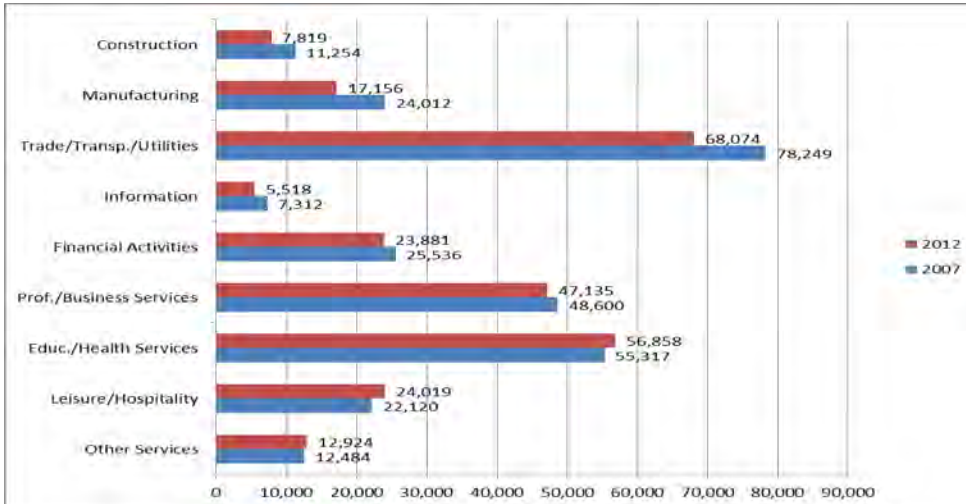
Average Employment vs. Hiring

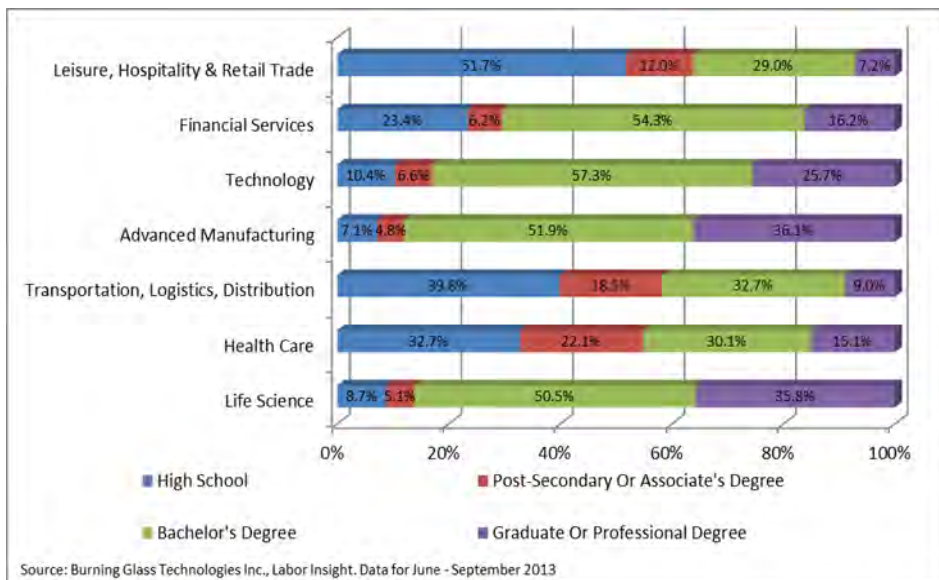

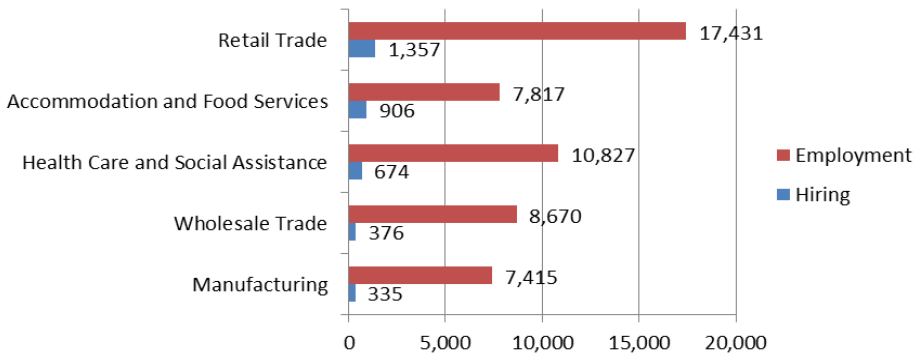

Average Employment vs. Hiring

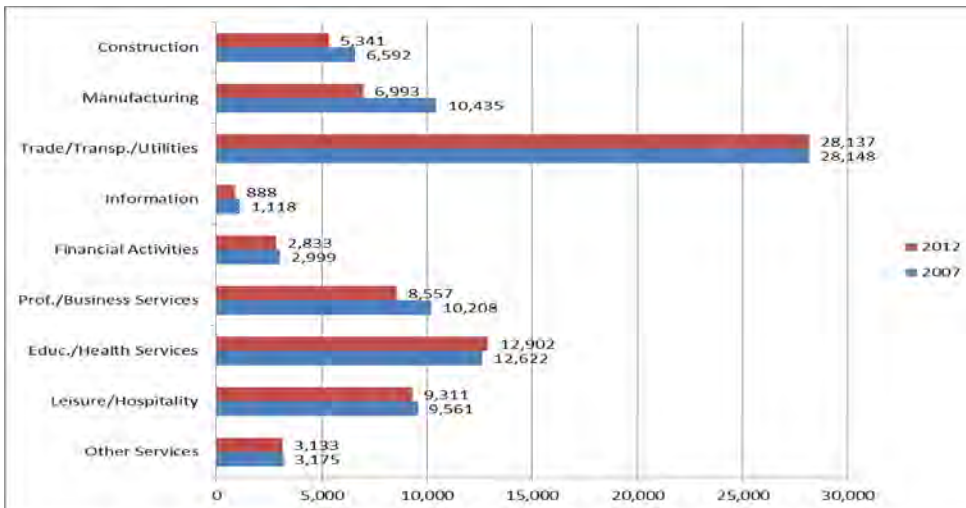
Gloucester County, 4th Qtr 2011 - 3rd Qtr 2012

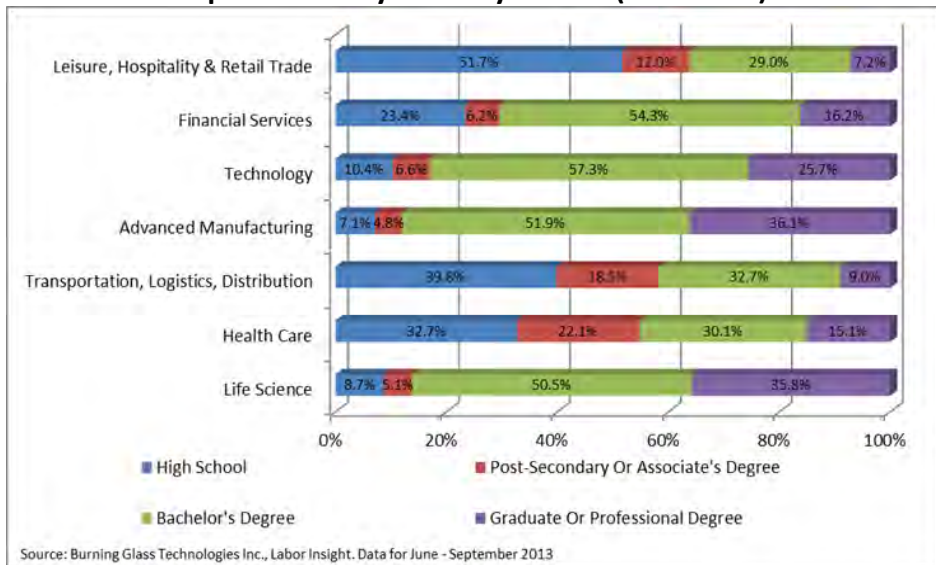

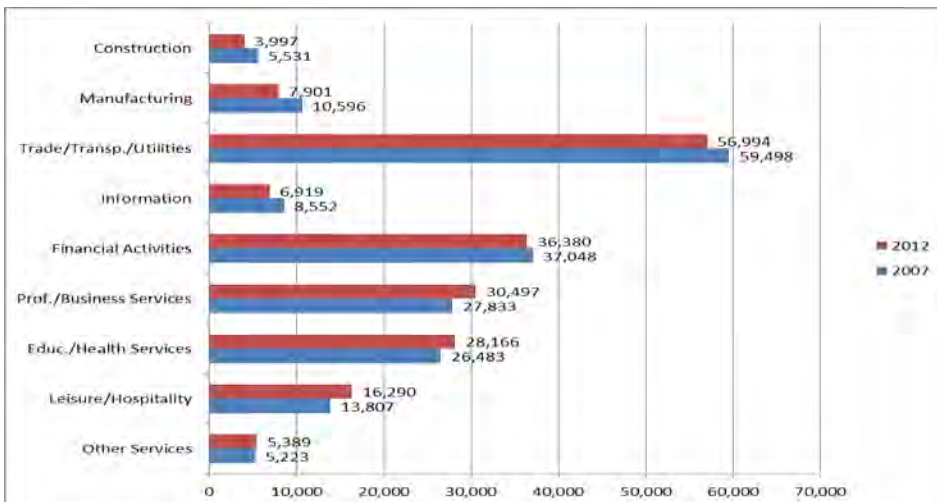
Total Jobs and New Hires in Hudson County, by Sector

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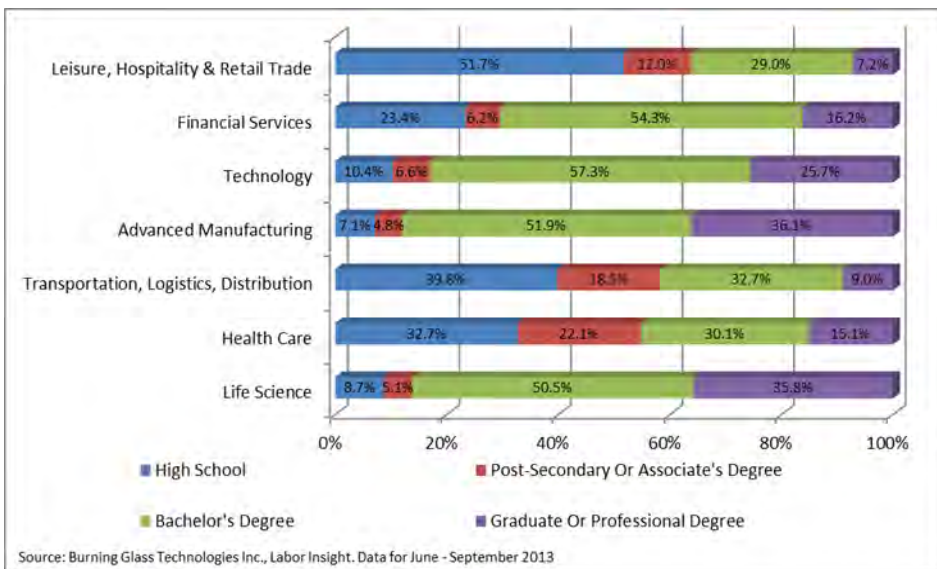

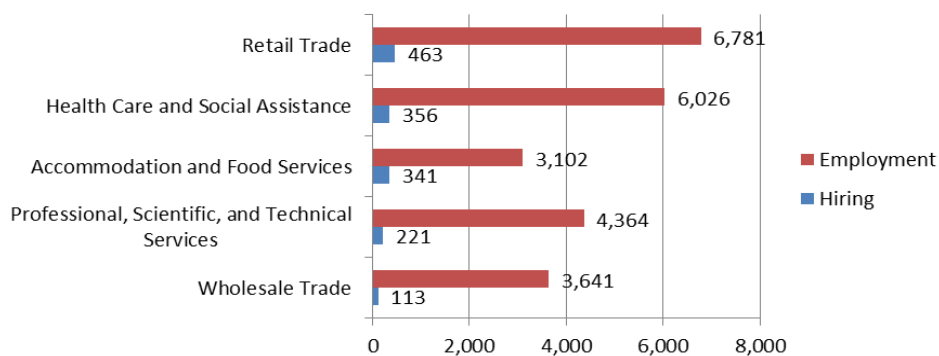

Total Jobs and New Hires in Hunterdon County, by Sector

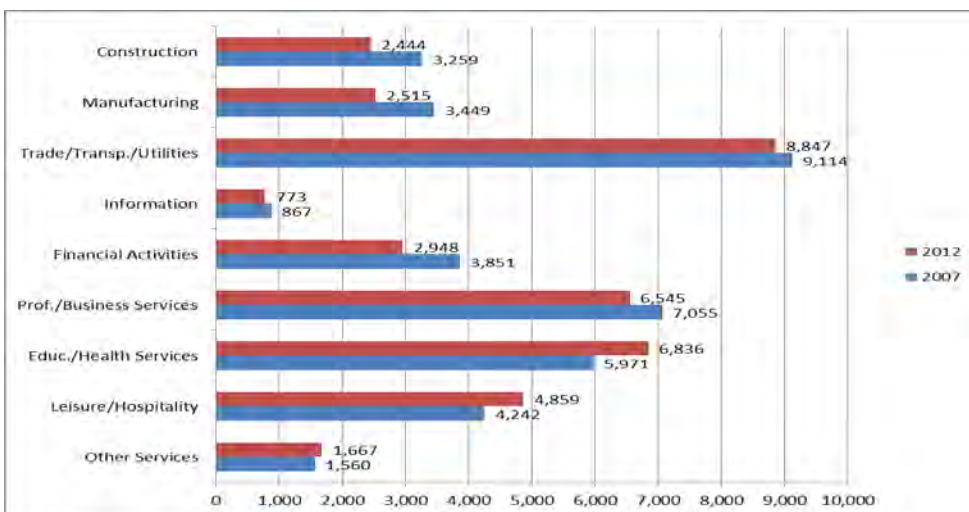
Average Employment vs. Hiring

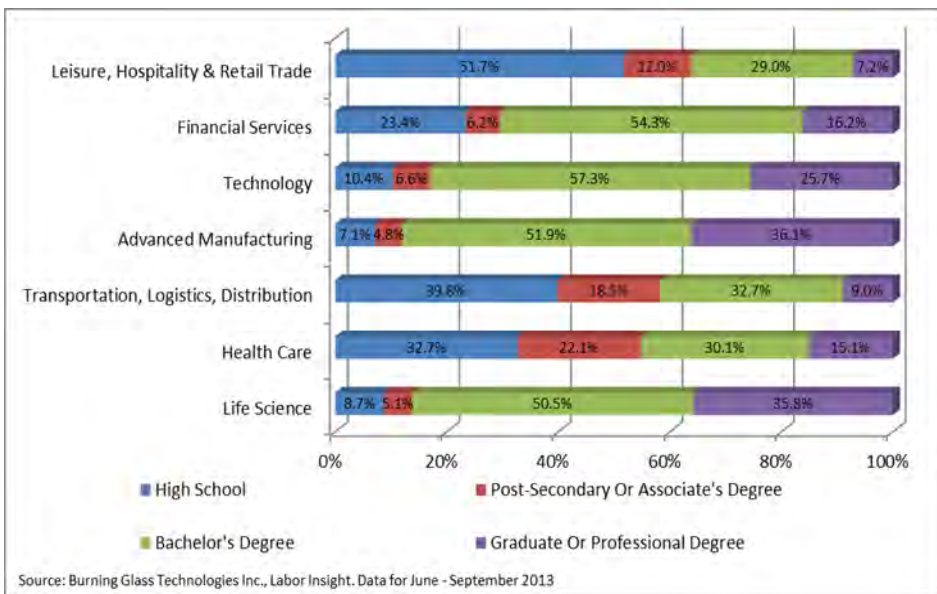

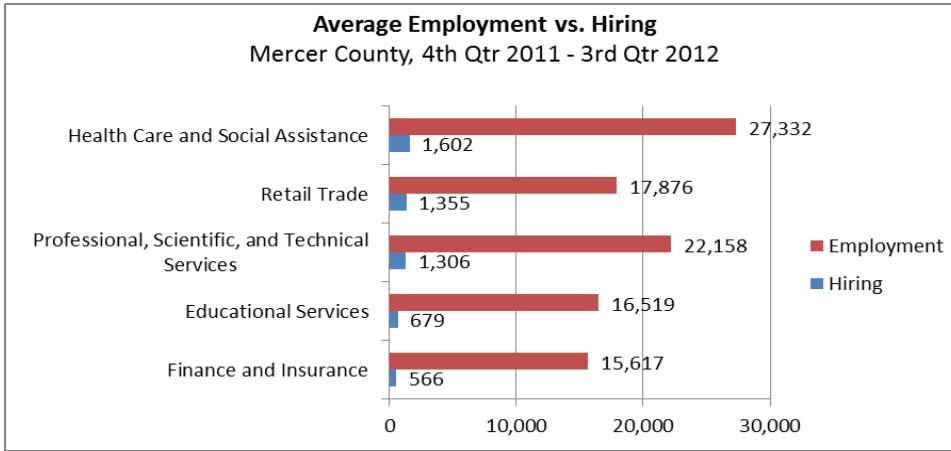

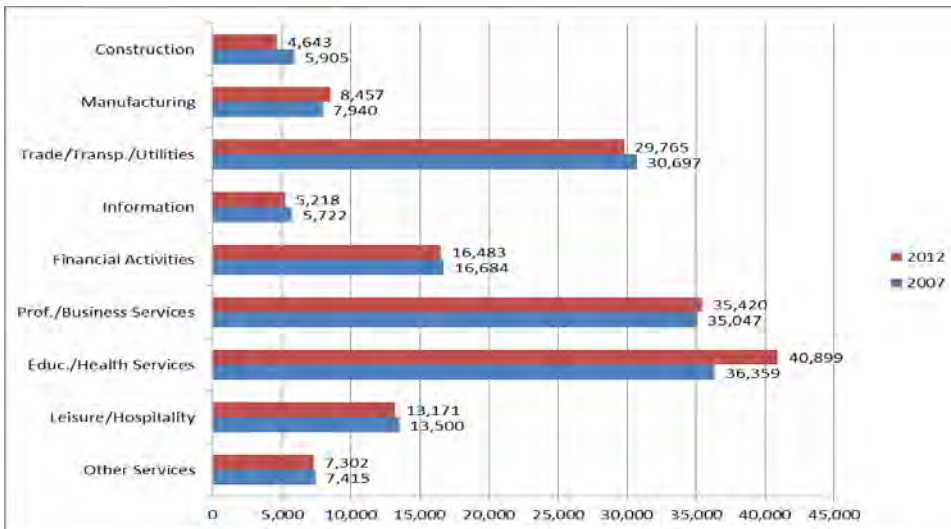
Total Jobs and New Hires in Mercer County, by Sector

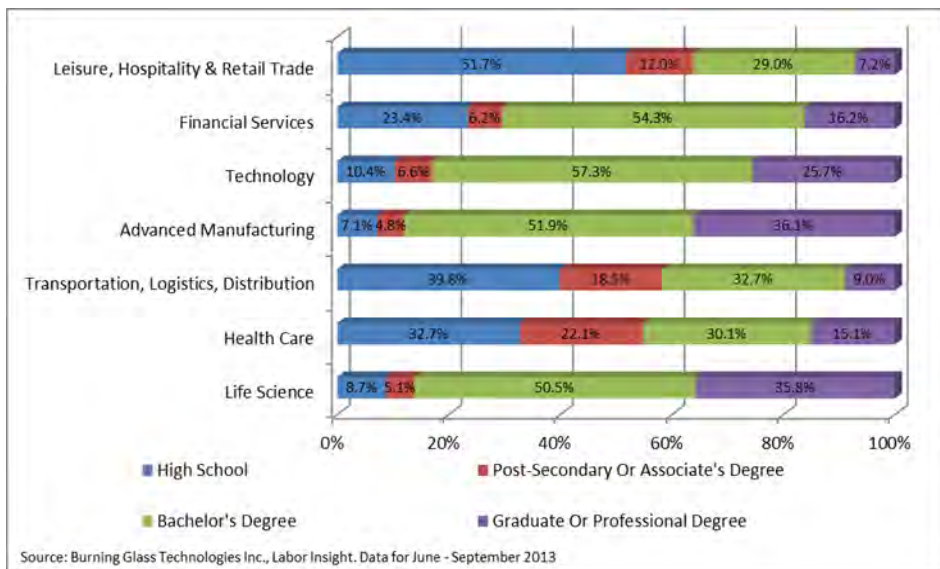

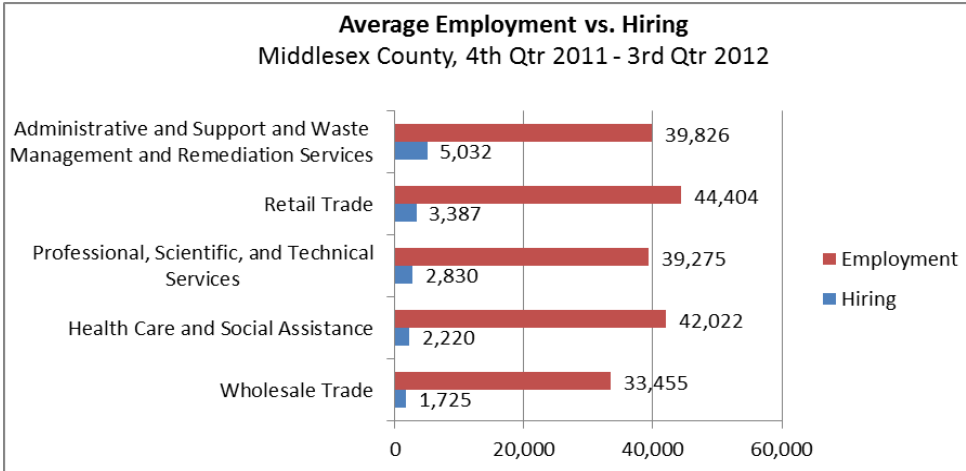

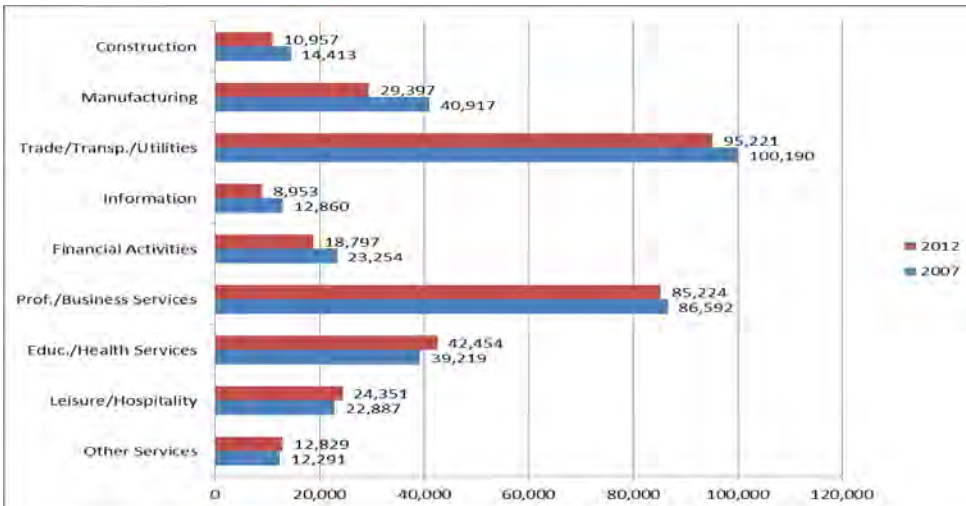
Total Jobs and New Hires in Middlesex County, by Sector

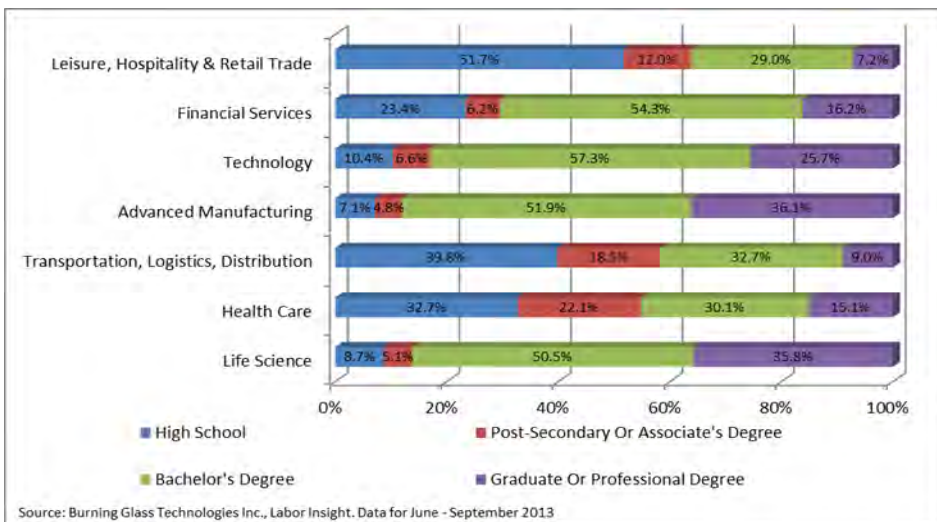

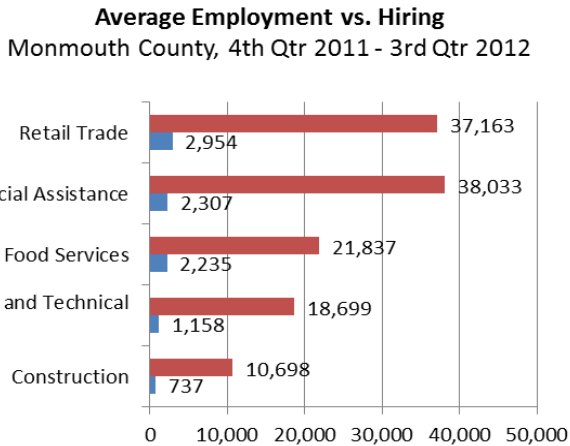

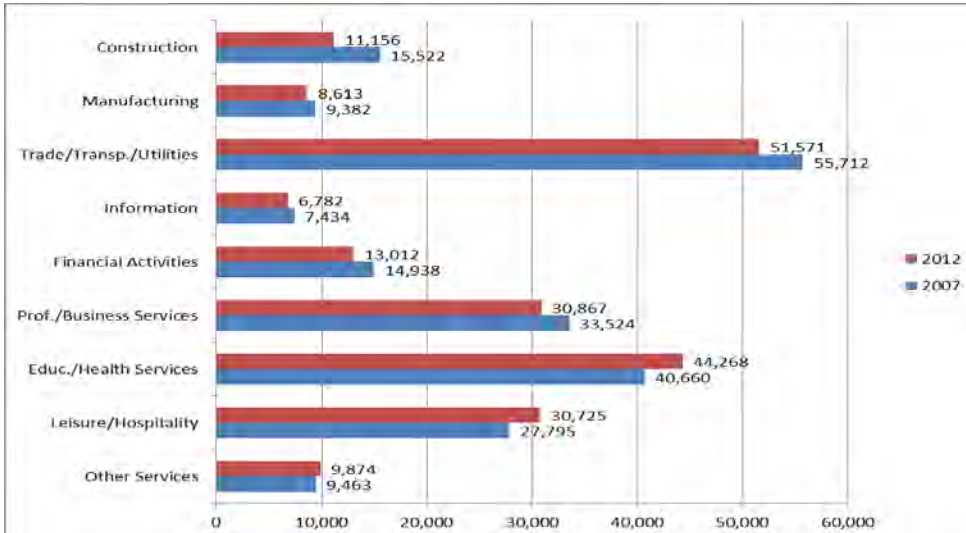
Total Jobs and New Hires in Monmouth County, by Sector

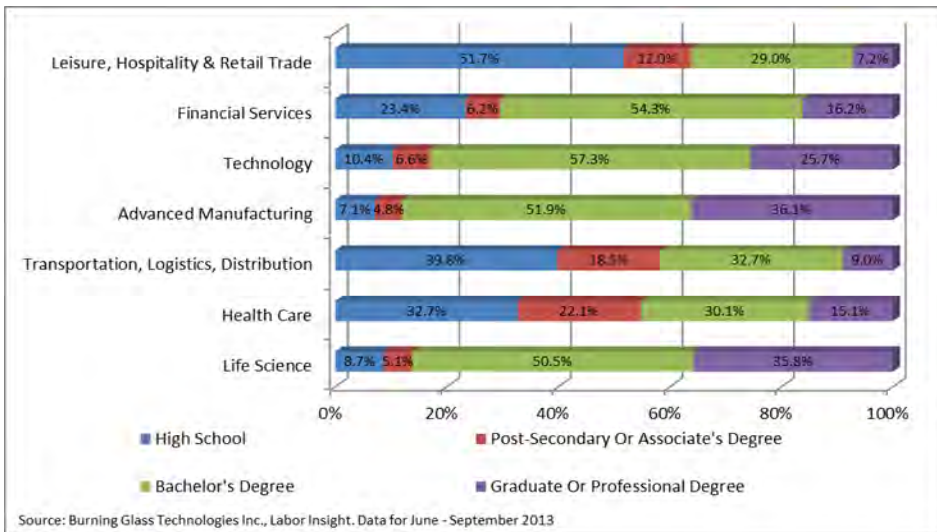

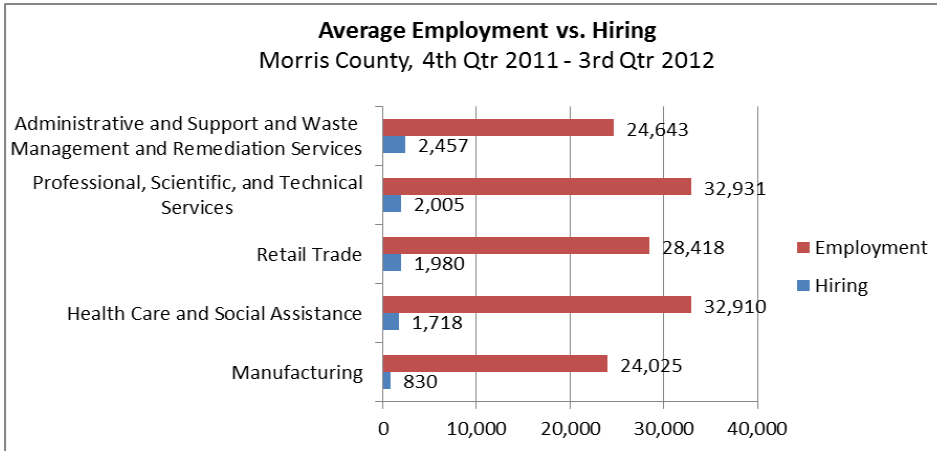

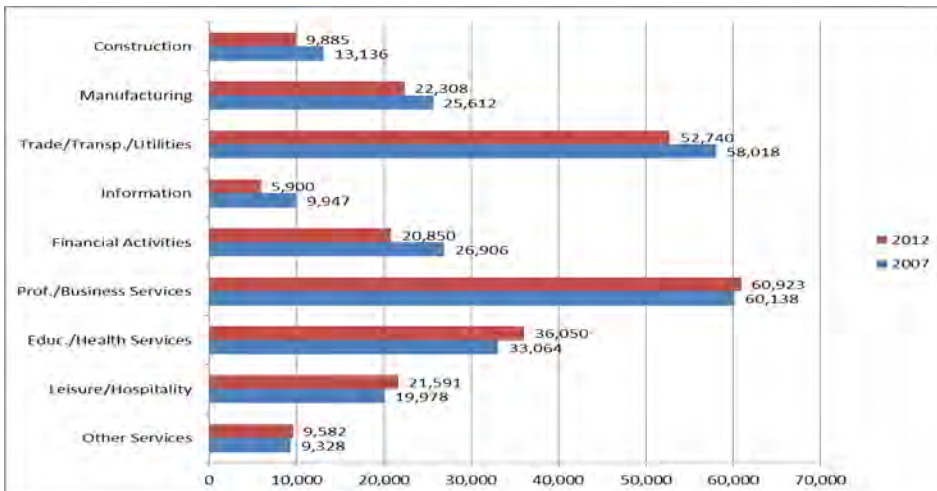
Total Jobs and New Hires in Morris County, by Sector

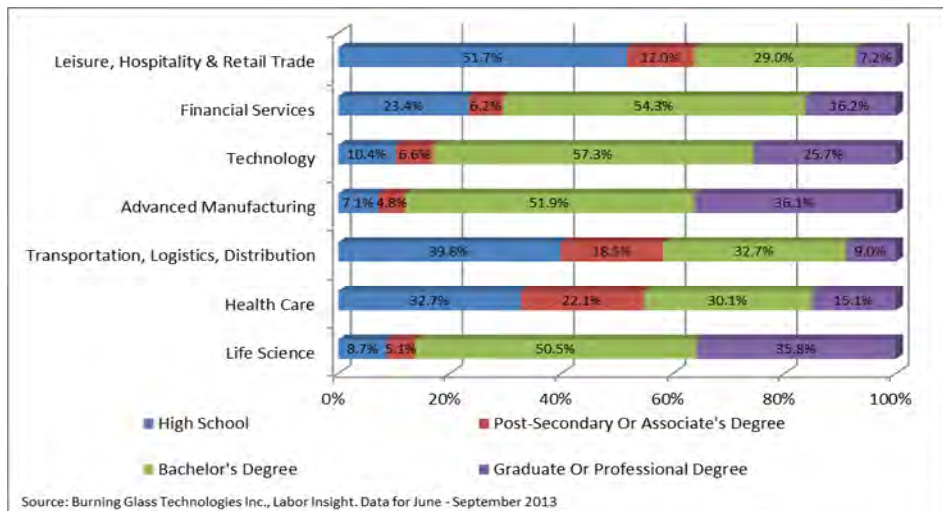

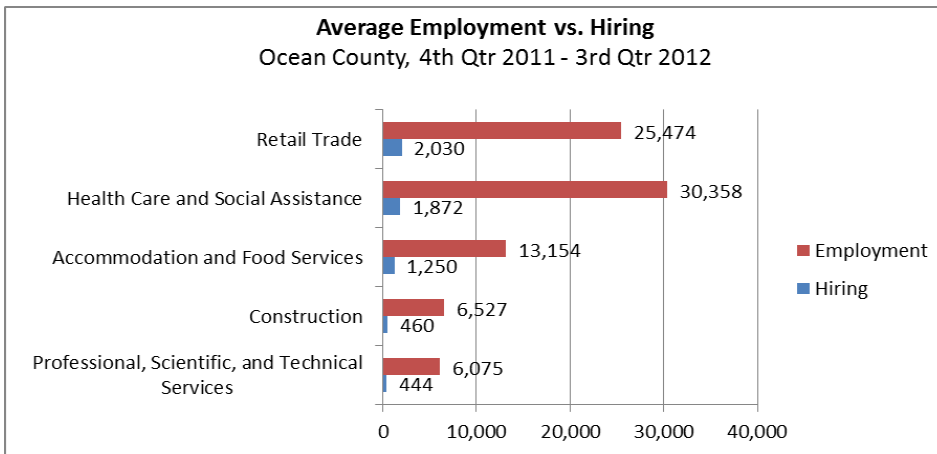

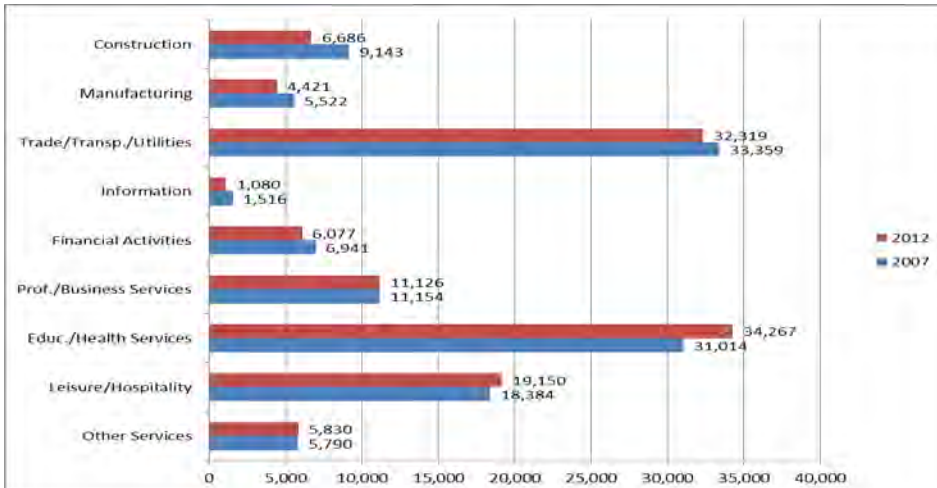
Total Jobs and New Hires in Ocean County, by Sector

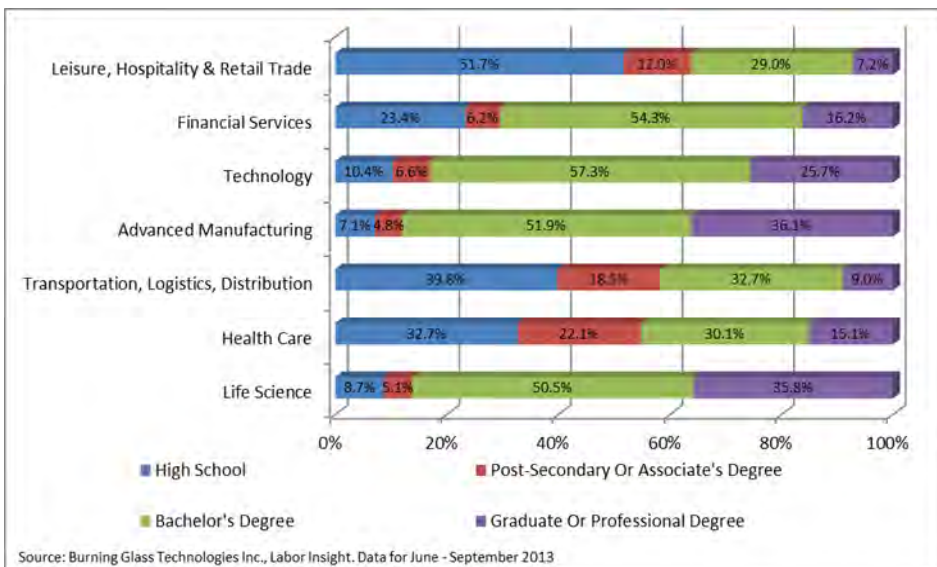

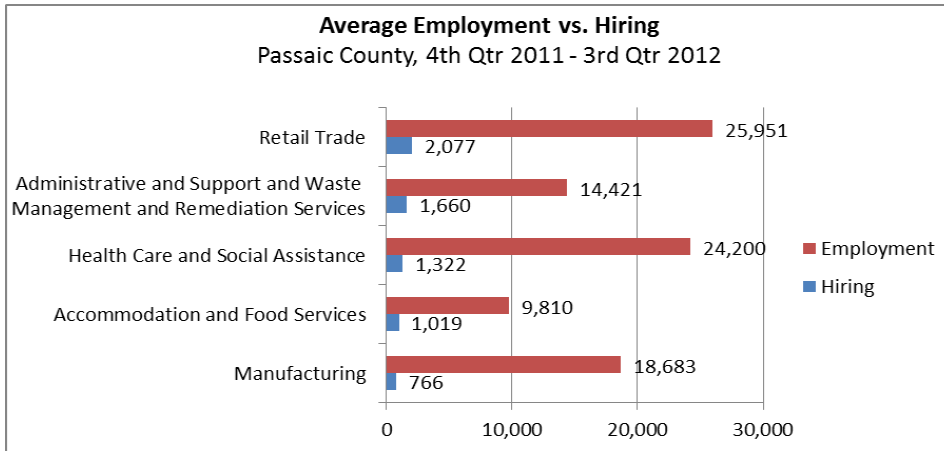

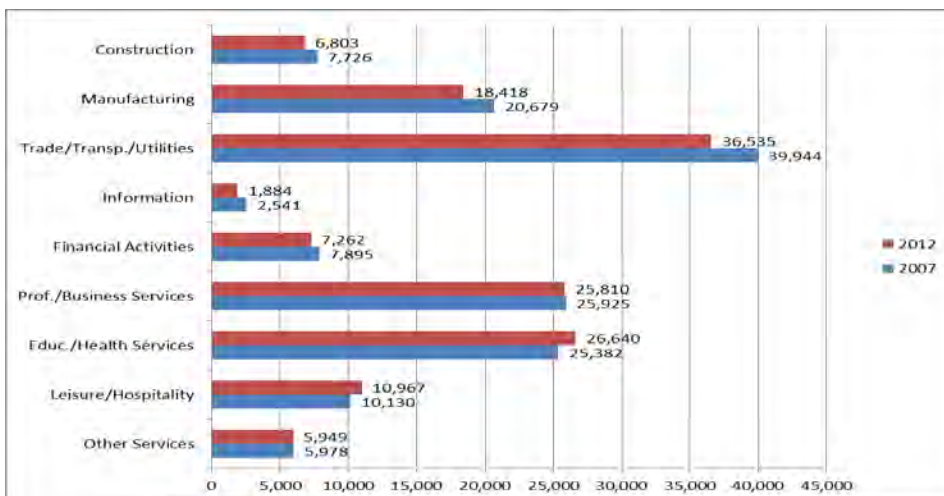
Total Jobs and New Hires in Passaic County, by Sector

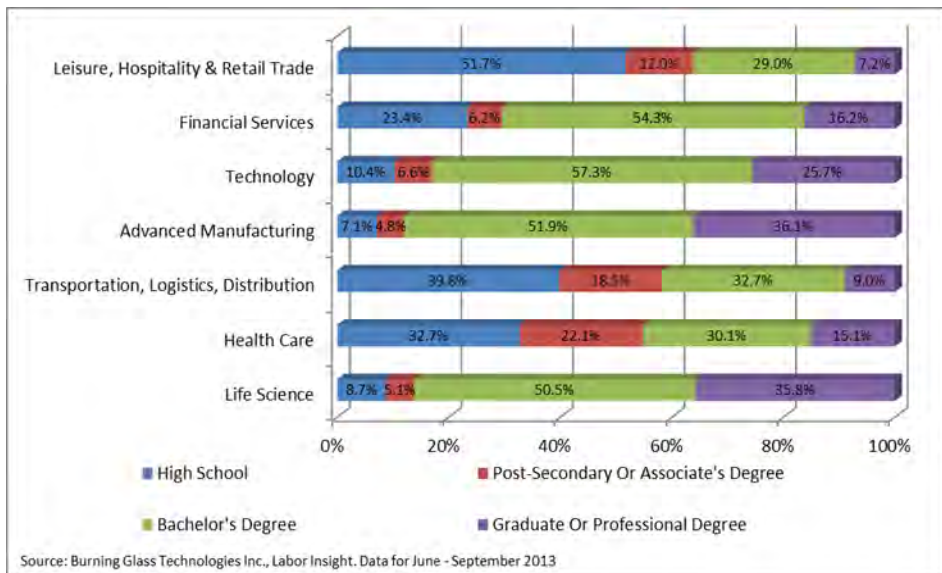

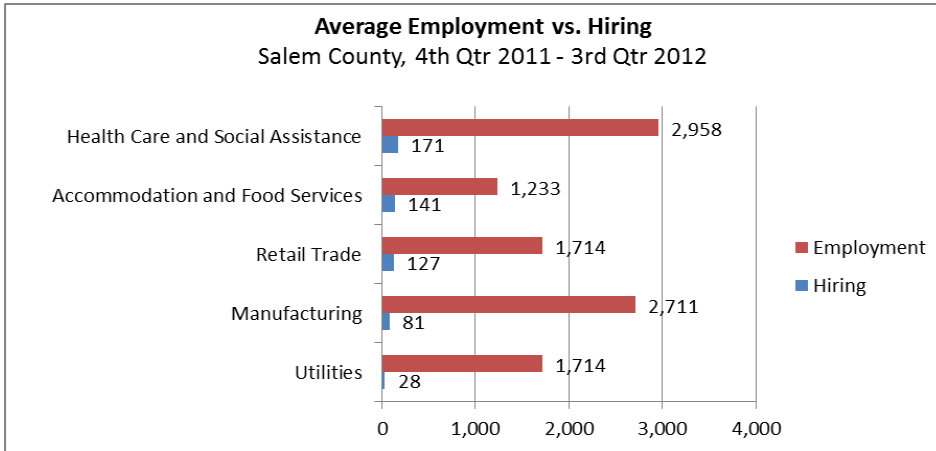

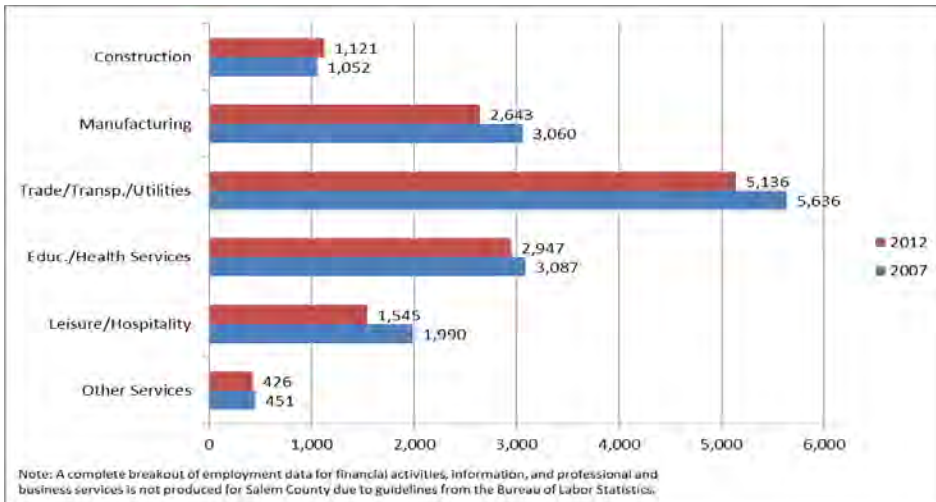
Total Jobs and New Hires in Salem County, by Sector

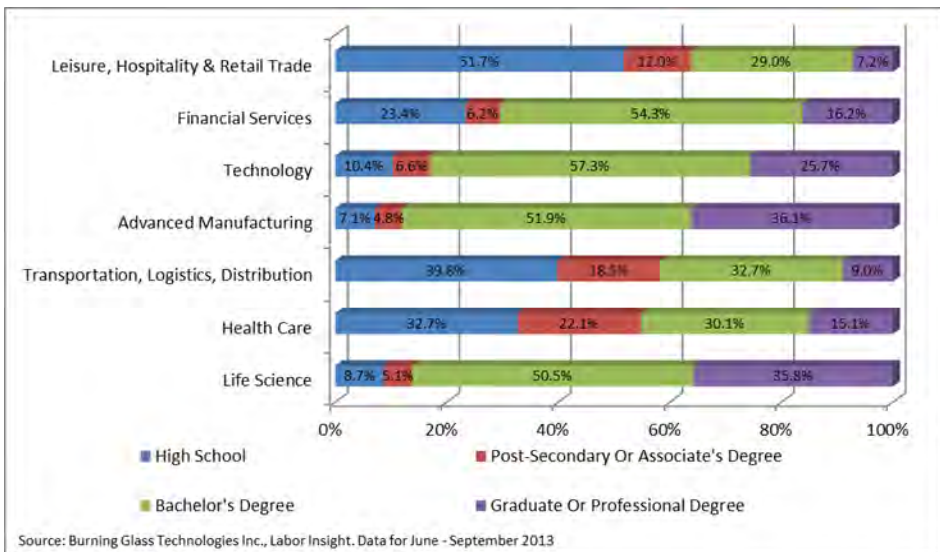

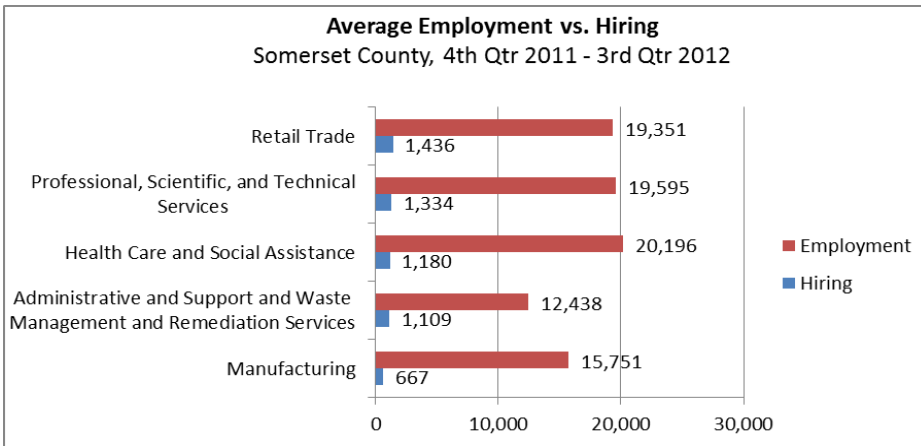

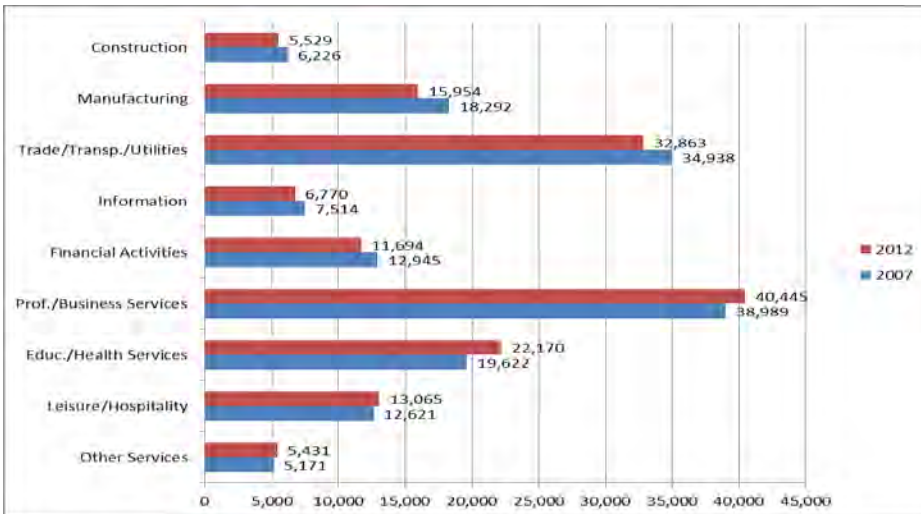
Total Jobs and New Hires in Somerset County, by Sector

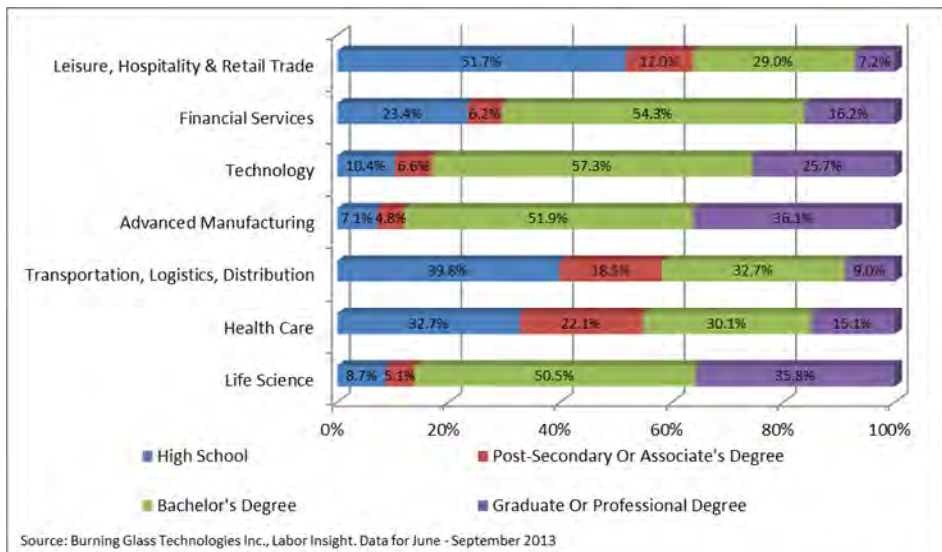

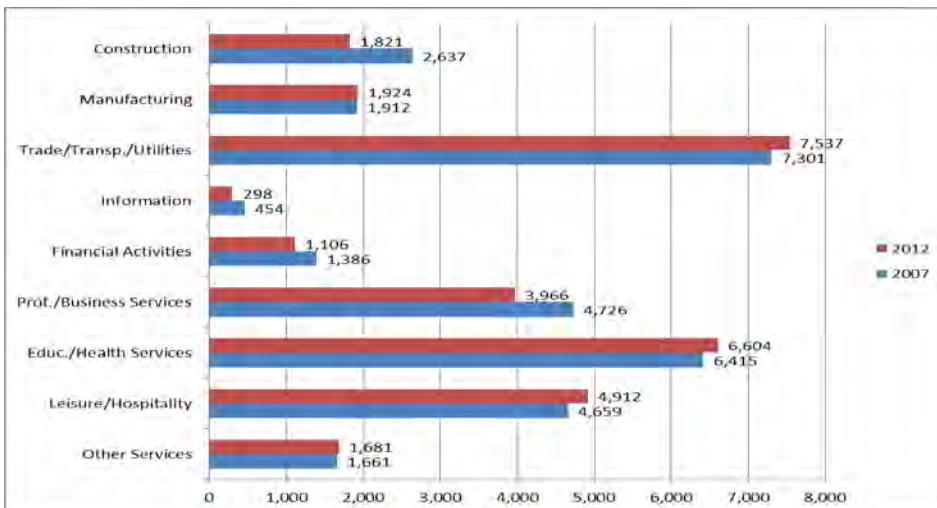
Total Jobs and New Hires in Sussex County, by Sector

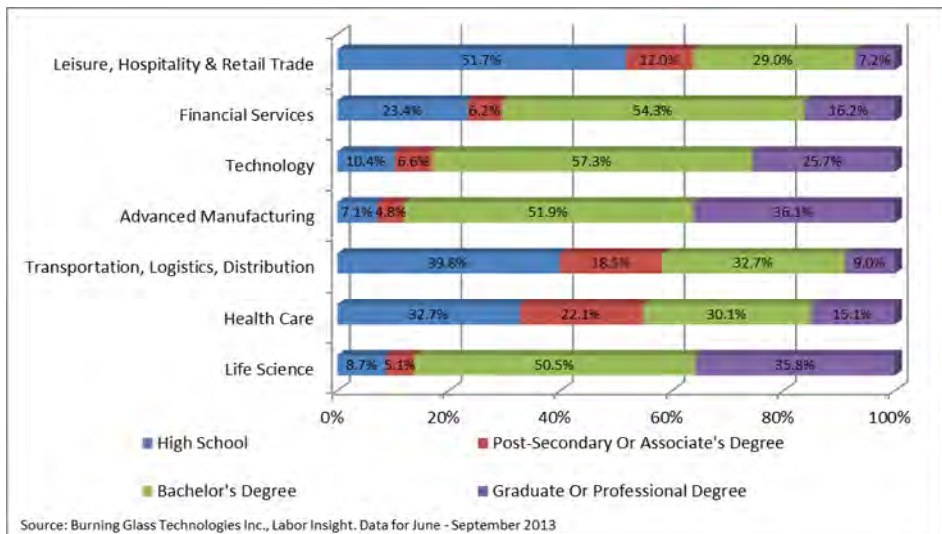

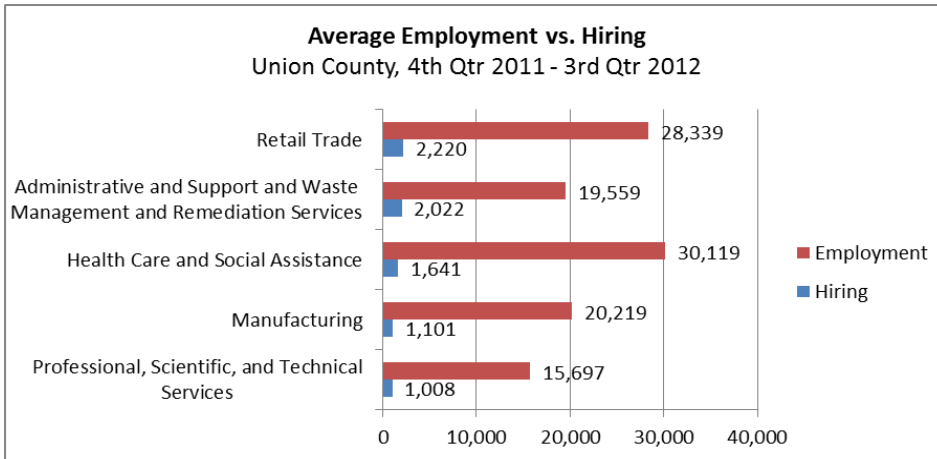

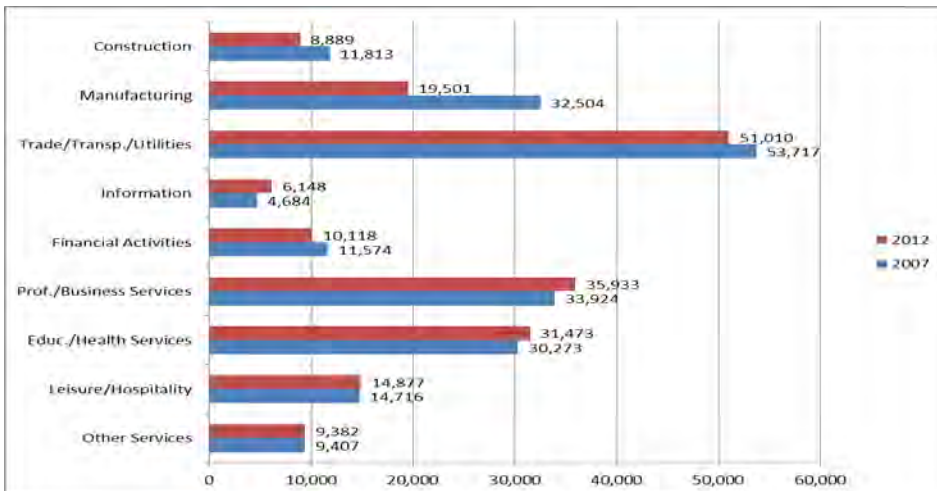
Total Jobs and New Hires in Union County, by Sector

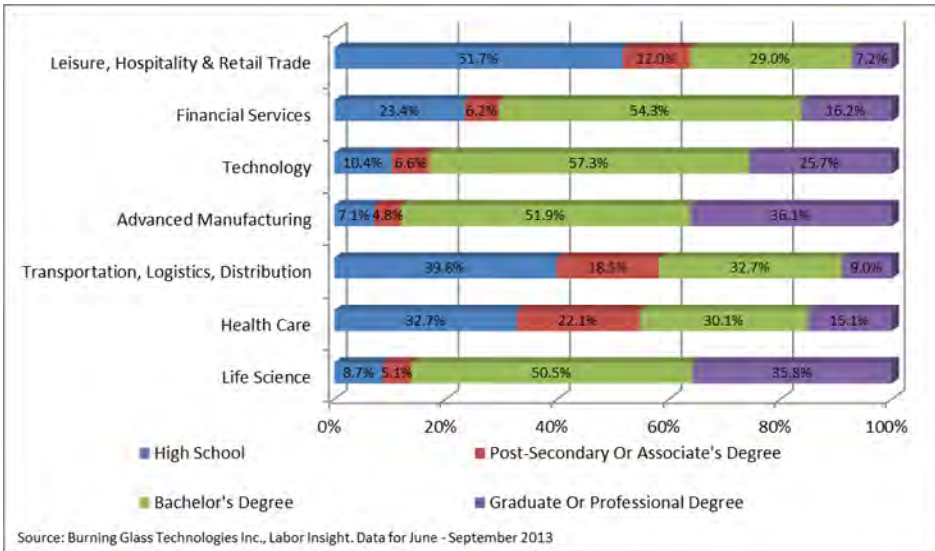

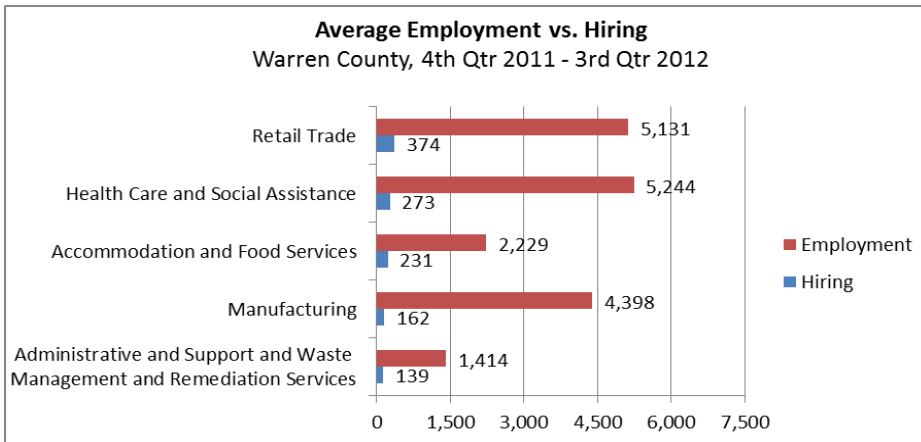

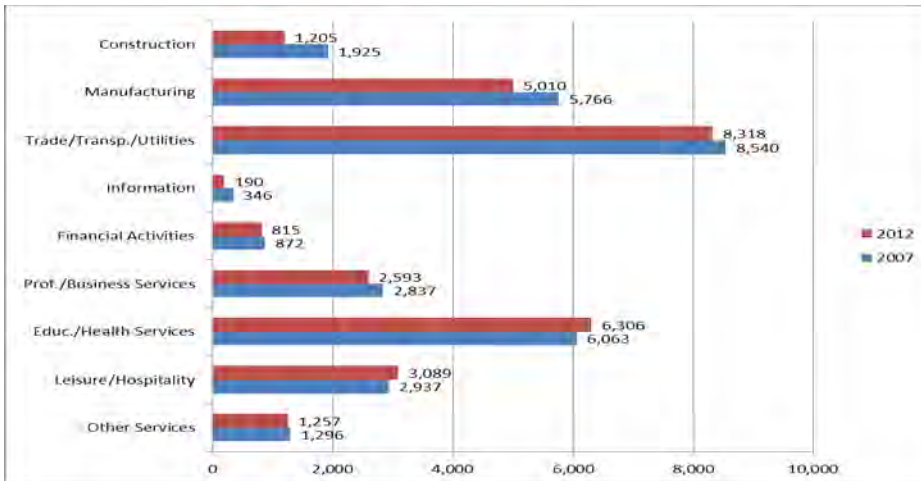
Total Jobs and New Hires in Warren County, by Sector

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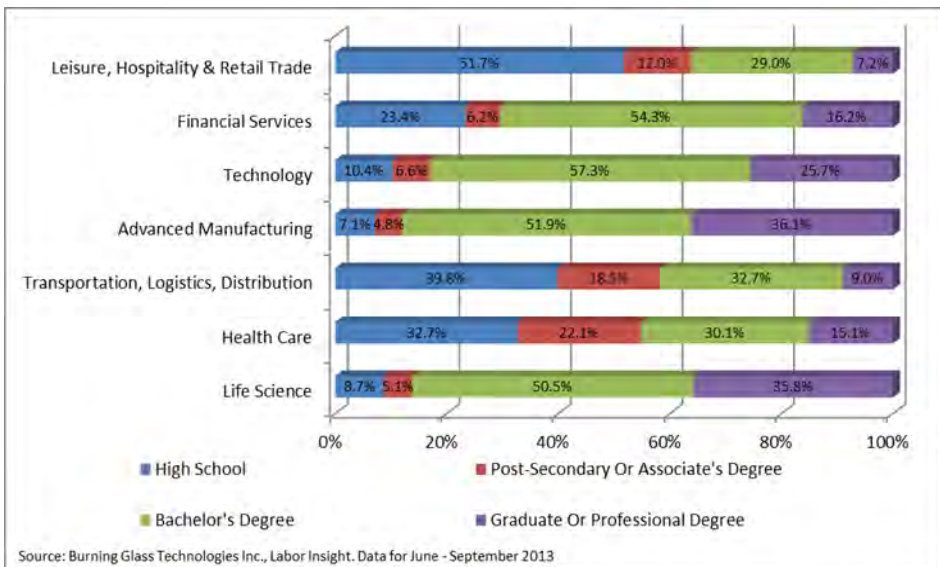
