Upon taking the chair, the Speaker addressed the House as follows :

Gentlemen—Fellow members of the Ninety Sixth General Assembly of New Jersey :

Before entering upon the duties of the chair, in which it has pleased this House to place me, I desire to thank you for this mark of your confidence and for the honor which it confers. To faithfully carry out your wishes and to deserve your confidence will be my high ambition. For my success in this new and difficult position I must rely chiefly upon your courtesy and forbearance.

Among many subjects of importance, three at this session demand our closest attention : First, the improvement and extension of our educational system. Second, the increase of our revenues for internal improvement without taxing the community, and with a decrease of the present direct tax ; and thirdly, the railroad interests of our state.

A board of commissioners composed of some of the best minds in the state, authorized by the last legislature, have prepared a series of suggestions in the form of a bill, which embodies all the best of our present school laws, and many new features which have been long tried in other states. This subject leads all the rest in importance.

Our work is no easy one. It is altogether new to three-quarters of us. In this springtime season of sweeping reforms let us not be behind our sister states.

Legislative bodies in these latter days have been much condemned to have an itching palm to sell and mart their services for gold. From this charge, at least, we are bound to maintain ourselves free. By a faithful use of time let us make this session short, and finally, as we now address ourselves to our duties may the invocation of Milton to the Divine Being be our invocation :

“Thou, O Spirit that dost prefer
Before all temples the upright heart and face,
Instruct me, for Thou knowest.
What in me is dark
Illumine, what is low, raise and support.”

Mr. Fisher moved that the rules of the last General Assembly be adopted for the government of this session, until otherwise ordered.

Which was read and adopted.

Mr. Joy offered the following:

Resolved, That a committee consisting of one member from each county, be selected by the members from the several counties, to assign seats in the House to the several county delegations, and that such assignment be made as nearly as possible in conformity to the diagram of last year.

Which was read and adopted.

Mr. Joy moved that this House take a recess of fifteen minutes.

Which motion was agreed to.

A message was received from the Senate by the hands of Mr. Babcock, its Secretary, as follows:

Trenton, January 9, 1872. }

MR. SPEAKER :—

I am directed by the Senate to inform the House of Assembly that the Senate has passed the following resolution :

The committee appointed to wait upon the Governor report that they have performed that duty, and that he will communicate with them, and he sends his compliments to the members and wishes them a successful and pleasant session.

Which was read and accepted.

Mr. Leslie offered the following :

Resolved, That the Clerk of the House be directed to pro-

cure twenty dollars worth of postage stamps for the use of each of the members, officers and regular reporters of the House.

Mr. Joy moved to amend by substituting ten dollars worth of postage stamps for the reporters.

Mr. Patterson moved to lay said resolution on the table.

Which motion was agreed to.

Mr. Patterson on leave, introduced

Assembly bill No. 2, entitled

An act incorporating the Good Will Hook and Ladder Company, of Freehold, county of Monmouth.

Which was read a first time by its title, ordered to have a second reading, and referred to the Committee on Corporations when appointed.

Mr. Canfield offered the following :

Mr. Joy moved that said bill be referred to a special committee of five.

Mr. O'Neil on leave, introduced

Assembly bill No. 4, entitled

A supplement to an act entitled "An act respecting prosecutors of the pleas of the state," approved April 16, 1846.

Which was read a first time by its title, ordered to have a second reading, and referred to the Committee on Judiciary, when appointed.

Resolved, That the use of the Assembly Chamber, be, and is hereby tendered to the citizens of the State, on the evening of the 16th inst., for the purpose of organizing a citizens centennial association, to participate in the celebration of the one hundredth anniversary of American Independence, in the city of Philadelphia, in 1876.

An act to extend the cattle law to the township of Union, in the county of Bergen.

A further supplement to an act entitled "An act to incorporate the Somerville and Easton railroad company," passed February 26, 1847.

This conferring of special privileges on particular classes is hostile to the spirit of our institutions, and while it has been abolished in Great Britain, so that even

the Queen pays her own postage, it should not be continued here. If abolished, there would not only be a very large saving in the printing department of the government, but the expense of transporting the mails would be so diminished that single letter postage could be reduced to two cents, which of itself would be a great boon to the people, and at the same time the post-office department be made self-sustaining. We hereby approve the earnest and persevering efforts of Hon. John Hill to abolish this crying abuse, and we would earnestly request our Senators and Representatives in Congress to use their utmost efforts and influence in favor of its total repeal.

SIR :—The undersigned, citizens of New Jersey, and parents of deaf-mute children, desirous of obtaining for them an education equal to that which the State gives to those children who can hear and speak, without the necessity of sending them out of the State, to institutions over which we have no control, beg leave to draw your attention to the following reasons why an institution for this unfortunate class should be established and supported by the State of New Jersey within its own limits.

We presume that you will agree with us that there can be no question about the necessity of educating the Deaf, nor about the propriety of educating them, nor about the duty of the State to defray the expense of educating the indigent portion of them. They form one of the helpless classes, whom it is primarily the duty of the State to support and to educate. They can be educated to as high a degree as their more fortunate brethren; they can be made self-supporting producers instead of remaining all their lives helpless consumers.

The State of New Jersey recognized its duty to this class as long ago as the year 1821, when the first appropriation for their education was made by the Legislature, and since then annual appropriations have been made for this purpose. But, having no institution of our own, these unfortunate children have been sent out of the State, either to Philadelphia, New York, or even as far as Hartford.

There was good reason for this when the number of deaf-mutes was small, and the ability of the State to erect the necessary buildings was much less than it now is. But the time has come when there are enough deaf-mutes, of a suitable age for instruction, to form an institution.

The recent United States census gives to the State of New Jersey a population of about 900,000. According to the ratio, which, by careful examination of the statistics, is found to prevail in other States of the Union, as well as in England and on the continent of Europe, there are in this population one hundred and twenty deaf-mutes, between the ages of ten and twenty—a very good number for an institution of this kind. Indeed, of the thirty-four schools in the United States,

twenty-seven have less than two hundred pupils, and twenty-three have less than one hundred and twenty pupils each. We believe it is the universal opinion of teachers of deaf-mutes that, for the purpose of education, the collection of a large number of children in one institution is undesirable. It has also been found that, as the number of pupils in an institution exceeds two hundred and fifty, the average expense is increased rather than diminished. It is the opinion of many well qualified to judge, that the New York Institution, on Washington Heights, with its five hundred and fifty (550) pupils, is already overcrowded, and that the American Asylum at Hartford, and the Pennsylvania Institution, at Philadelphia, are full. Whenever the Directors of these institutions come to this conclusion, they will, as we think they ought to now, refuse to receive the New Jersey pupils. Indeed, we have no doubt that, if all who are entitled to the assistance of the State should be sent to these institutions, they would now be refused admission.

The State of New Jersey pays for each of the pupils whom it supports at the New York Institution the sum of \$300, for board and tuition, besides an additional amount for clothing. We believe that an institution can be conducted in this State, on as liberal a scale in every respect as that in New York, for much less money.

Moreover, it seems hard to us that, while we are required by law to pay for the education of our neighbors' children at their very doors, we are compelled to send our own little ones (who for their very misfortune are peculiarly dear to us) out of the limits of the State.

The State has discharged its duty to the insane. They are not sent abroad for that treatment which their peculiar misfortune requires. A spacious edifice has been erected for their accommodation, and a corps of physicians and assistants is liberally paid by the State to take charge of them.

By an act of the last Legislature a common school education is freely given to all the hearing and speaking children of the State. The helpless poor of every town are provided with food, shelter and clothing. For all this we pay our share of the cost. We pay it willingly, cheerfully—we do not begrudge a dollar; but we think the time has come when our fellow citizens should no longer tear our children from

their homes, and send them abroad for an education which can be better and more cheaply given them here. We feel that the State should do for our children what it has done for the insane—erect suitable buildings for their accommodation, and provide a corps of teachers for their instruction.

Hoping, sir, that you will agree with us in the sentiments expressed above, and will be willing to add your personal and official influence to our efforts to obtain what we desire.

The minutes of last meeting were read and approved.

Mr. Farrier offered the following memorial relating to the charter of the Erie Railway Company and moved that the requisite number be printed for the use of the House:

To the Honorable the Legislature of the State of New Jersey:

The memorial of Horace Dresser, a citizen of the State of New Jersey, and resident of Jersey City, respectfully sheweth that the State of New Jersey, in the exercise of comity and a generous hospitality towards the citizens of other States and their institutions, heretofore extended its favors and granted privileges to the New York and Erie Railroad Company and its successor, the Erie Railway Company, a foreign corporation; that said Company, with the declared purpose of facilitating traffic, and of contributing in many ways to the

public good, in the saving of time and distance in reaching the city of New York by the way of Piermont terminus, took assignment of certain leases and agreements made by the Paterson and Hudson River Railroad Company and the Paterson and Ramapo Railroad Company to the Union Railroad Company, bearing date the 9th day of September, 1852, which said leases and agreements were ratified and confirmed by an act of the Legislature of this State, approved March 14th, 1853, and thereupon came within the territorial limits of New Jersey, and carried on its business affairs as accustomed to do in the State of New York; that afterwards, almost simultaneously, the Legislature of the State of New Jersey, by act dated February 21st, 1856, granted leave to the New York and Erie Railroad Company to construct a terminus railroad from the Paterson and Hudson River Railroad to the Hudson River; and also by an act dated February 26th, 1856, incorporated an existing Land Company, known as the Long Dock Company, with a capital stock of \$800,000, with the like leave to construct a terminus railroad from the said Paterson and Hudson River Railroad to the Hudson River, and also to establish a ferry upon said river, connecting with the city of New York; that said act incorporating the Long Dock Company provides that the same may be modified, altered or repealed whenever, in the opinion of the Legislature, the public good so requires; that the liberty granted by said act of February 21st, 1856, to the New York and Erie Railroad Company to construct a terminus railroad as aforesaid, was upon the express condition that the State of New Jersey might take the said railroad upon an appraisement of its value at any time after the 4th of July, 1886, the said value thereof to be paid to the New York and Erie Railroad Company; that notwithstanding this legislative act of good will and kindness to said New York and Erie Railroad Company, these two companies, one in action and object, in violation of their respective charters, and conspiring to defraud the people of the State of the residuary interest in the said terminus railroad (to wit: their ownership thereof after July 4th, 1886), to be constructed on the conditions aforesaid, entered into a contract, dated July 1st, 1856, by which the Long Dock Company leased to the New York and Erie Railroad Company the land necessary for the said terminus railroad, for a period of thirty years, the utmost longevity of its own new-born charter of February 26th, 1856,

which said period expiring July 1st, 1886, four days prior to said residuary interest of the State maturing, and resulting in the right of the State to take to itself the said railroad. It is plain to see that the New York and Erie Railroad Company never having taken any steps under the act of February 21st, 1856, except to locate the terminus road on the lands of the Long Dock Company, and to file certificate thereof, and never having *purchased* the lands as required by the act, it follows that the fee is in the Long Dock Company, and that the Erie Railway Company, on the 4th of July, 1886, will have no terminus railroad "for the State of New Jersey to take upon an appraisement of its value" (*Act Feb. 21st, 1856: Sec. 3*); forasmuch as it never will have had an estate in fee, as a *purchase* would have effected, and inasmuch as the demise of the Long Dock Company will have expired, and the road, as now, belong to that Company, herein is seen the animus of the New York and Erie Railroad Company toward its kind benefactor.

The undersigned further respectfully represents to your honorable body, that said Erie Railway Company is now and ever has been in the use and occupation of the franchise of the said terminus railroad—a grant never bestowed on said alien corporation, except upon condition of a *purchase* of the land. But the Long Dock Company constructed the road. It is the owner thereof. It leased the same, at a rent of \$80,000 per annum, to the New York and Erie Railroad Company.—Neither this Company nor its successor, Erie Railway Company, owns, or is seized, in law, of any lands in the State of New Jersey by legislative leave; nor has its Legislature ever confirmed the said lease and agreement of July 1st, 1856, with the Long Dock Company, under which it claims to use and occupy lands in the State. Its tenure of the *terminus portion* of the railroads used by it in this State is alone that of squatter sovereignty; and further, the said Erie Railway Company is in the use and occupation of the ferry franchise granted to the Long Dock Company by said act of February 26th, 1856, and which the undersigned charges to be personal to, and inalienable by, said Long Dock Company without the leave of the Legislature.

The success of these companies hitherto in the avoidance of equal taxation with the citizens of the State, by reason of their combinations and conspiracies; in their departures from

their chartered limitations of territory and kind of business; in the diversions by the Long Dock Company of its entire capital stock of \$800,000 to the uses of a foreign interest, to-wit: the New York and Erie Railroad Company; in the persistent and successful use hitherto by the Long Dock Company of "the law's delay," for ten years, in avoiding payment of the just claims for the gigantic labors of construction of the tunnel through the solid rock of Bergen Hill, a mile in distance—all these, together with misuser and abuser of franchise and privilege, have created a public sentiment adverse to further legislative favor not only, but which calls for the arrest of these companies in their career of usurpation and of evil doings. Other railroad companies of conceded worth and character, with meritorious objects for the public good—not aliens, it would seem—should receive whatever of favor the Legislature have to bestow.

In consideration of the premises, and more especially for that it is manifest, the New York and Erie Railroad Company, by its studied neglect to *purchase* the land required by the Act of February 21st, 1856, in its own name, and by its taking instead a lease of the same, expiring July 1st, 1886, have conspired with the Long Dock Company, intending thereby to defraud the State of its residuary interest in the terminus railroad, which said interest not becoming absolute till after July 4th, 1886, your memorialist respectfully insists that the public good demands legislative interference with the charters of said companies. Sound policy and State pride, it would seem, forbid so important a gateway as the Bergen Tunnel and its approaches to be under the control of any foreign corporation, and especially one which for sixteen years has not kept faith with its accommodating host; and besides, which has treated with contempt its lavish hospitality. Hence he suggests that the State, in the exercise of its power of eminent domain for the furtherance of the public good, may divest said companies of their franchises, and of all lands necessary to the uses of said terminus railroad, and subject them to State control and direction without waiting till after July 4th, 1886. It seems to him, therefore, eminently impolitic to suffer the Erie Railway Company to demand and levy tribute or tolls longer on the railroad companies of this State, one of which, it is said, pays \$60,000 per annum for right of way along through said Bergen Tunnel.

The undersigned flatters himself that your honorable body may find it convenient, and, in furtherance of the public good, to institute an inquiry into the conduct of the aforesaid companies, which the Act incorporating the Long Dock Company (*Sec. 11*) seems to imply, as prerequisite to the formation of a legislative *opinion* upon the question of the public good of a continuance of the Act; and also, that if the Erie Railway Company shall be found lacking in obedience to the behests of the law granting unto it the hospitalities of the State, it may be speedily remanded to its terminus at Piermont by a repeal of its favors.

Copies of papers furnished the Attorney General of the State, showing misuser and abuser of privilege and franchise by both of these corporations, foundational to informations in the nature of a *quo warranto* for forfeiture of their charters, with the answer of the Long Dock Company, are appended for reference if needed for that purpose.

Mr. Schenck presented a petition from citizens of Warren township, in the county of Somerset, praying the Legislature to divide said township as hereinafter provided for, &c.

Which was read and laid on the table.

Also, Assembly bill No. 27, entitled

An act to incorporate Pavonia Club, of Jersey City.

Was taken up, and on motion, laid over until Tuesday next.

Mr. Willets moved to indefinitely postpone the further consideration of said bill.

Which motion was not agreed to.

Mr. Whiticar presented the following petition:

To the Honorable Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

We, the undersigned, residents and legal voters of the First Election District, in the township of Landis, county of Cumberland, and State of New Jersey, do most respectfully petition your honorable bodies that you pass the act now before the House of Assembly, creating a new township, to be called the township of Willow Grove, and which is bounded as per bill, and your petitioners will ever pray, &c.—*as the request is not of a political nature, in any wise.* The facts are, it is a cause of equity and justice to ourselves and our families and future posterity, as Jerseymen and old residents. A few of the causes and grievances why we petition your honorable bodies to create said new township of Willow Grove as we wish to make known, in truth and in defence of what we believe to

be wrongs done to us by what we term a floating population such as Vineland Centre is composed of: they are here to-day and gone to-morrow, or, at least, as soon as they can fill their coffers by any special acts of legislation, to answer their avaricious desires, and then leave the steadfast part of the community to bear the burthens of many obnoxious special laws which have been granted by the Legislature at the request of a few men in the centre of Landis township, at Vineland, the mass of the legal voters not being aware of the existence of such special laws until after they have been passed and the authorities have commenced, or have enforced them upon the people very much against their will. We will here state a few of them as per special laws of Landis township

1. In the law passed in 1864, creating said Landis township, section seventeen provides that no house or other building shall be built at a less distance than seventy-five feet from any public road in said township.

2. Section fifteen in the same law, provides that the sides of all public roads in said township shall be seeded with grass, and shall be kept free and clear from thistles, wild carrots, and all other noxious weeds, and that the owners of said land shall plant or set out shade trees upon the roadside, and that any one neglecting to comply with the above requirements shall be fined fifty dollars.

3. Then, by special act, passed March 10th, 1870, the township committee have more power over the setting out of shade trees, and the road superintendent has the power to enter upon any of our lands and set out shade trees where the owners had neglected so to do, and then proceed to collect the fifty dollars, and also the cost of the trees and the expense of setting them out, the same being charged to the land, and collected the same as taxes are collected—that is, it makes a lien upon the land, which we consider is exercising a despotic power over our fee simple titles, which we, as old settlers and Jersey men, have always considered good until the aforesaid special laws have been forced upon us.

4. Section seven of the township law of said Landis township gives the township committee power to issue bonds, and make the bonds good and valid against said township when any two of the township committee sign said bonds—which is a minority rule, and wrong.

5. Then again, in and by special act of 1870, dogs, in the township of Landis, are assessed two dollars per head, at the same time there never having been a sheep killed or a sheep bill presented for any damage done to sheep in said township.

6. Then, again, a special law passed in 1868, authorizes the overseers of roads in Landis township to enter upon any of our wet or swamp lands and drain the same, and then assess the cost of such drainage upon the lands drained or the owners thereof, which makes it a lien upon said lands; and when, if the owners of said lands neglect or refuse to pay the same for the space of two months, the law authorizes them to advertise and sell the land for the purpose of paying the expense of such drainage. But instead of the overseers selling the lands to pay for said drainage, they take the people's money and pay for such drainage, and at the same time the people have never voted or ordered a dollar raised for any such purpose. We, as Jersey men and old settlers, protest against all laws of like character, and which deprives us of our legal rights.

7. A special law passed in 1870 provides that any person having a claim against the township of Landis must swear to his account before he can get his money, which affidavit costs the party having such claim twenty-five cents. We believe this to be another wrong, for we think it is the business of the township committee to audit all bills, and see that they are correct before they are paid out of the funds of the township.

8. We also complain of the unlawful expenditures of the moneys and excesses over the amounts ordered to be raised by the legal voters. In the year 1870, the people voted 6000 for the use of roads, and the township committee expended \$8880.74, being \$2880.74 more than was appropriated.

9. In 1870, the people voted \$1000 for the purpose of paying the incidental expenses of the township, and the Township Committee expended \$2424.93, being \$1424.93 more than was appropriated; and these are only a few instances of the unlawful expenditures of our money, as the report of said committee will show.

10. We are also taxed to improve and beautify the Vineland Park, at Centre Vineland, to the amount of \$500 per year, which only amounts to making a trotting or race course around said park, to gratify the sporting class of Vineland Centre at the expense of the rural districts.

11. Then we are taxed heavily to improve the streets and sidewalks in Centre Vineland, and we have no redress for the unlawful expenditures of our moneys, from the fact that as it now is, we are all in one township, and the first precinct or voting district has but about one hundred and twenty voters, the second precinct, or Centre Vineland, about seven hundred and fifty voters, and the third precinct, or South Vineland, about one hundred voters. So you can plainly see gentlemen, that we have no chance to elect a single officer in said township, neither can we, as it now is, say one word or dictate to any extent how the moneys of said township shall be expended; for even if the first voting district, which we are now in, and South Vineland, should combine together, we could not overcome the heavy vote in the centre of Vineland.

12. We wish, also to call your attention to the fact some three years ago, the centre of Vineland presented a bill to the New Jersey Legislature to bond all townships, for the purpose of building the Vineland Railway through all the townships in which said railroad was to run. But, happily for the tax-payers, the passage of said law was not obtained, or, at least, it did not receive the judicial sanction of the Governor.

13. We would also call your attention to the action of the present Township Committee of Landis. In the month of December, 1871, they ordered a special town-meeting to be held, to ascertain the vote of said township, to aid manufacturing or manufacturers, as they called it; but the said Township Committee did not notify the Board of Election at all in regard to said meeting. Neither the Clerk nor the Judges of the First Election District had any notice of it until late Saturday night, and then the Clerk, on procuring the Vineland weekly newspaper, saw the notice of said election, to be held on the following Wednesday. The people then protested against said election, on the ground that no reasonable time had been given for such election, as the law

prescribes that at least eight days' notice should be given for such election. But they, the said Township Committee, would not and did not heed said protest, being governed, as we suppose, by Centre Vineland; and said election was held on the 27th day of December, 1871, the vote resulting in the First Precinct as follows: Against bonding the township, fifty-eight votes; for bonding the township, twenty-five votes; majority against bonding the township, thirty-three votes in the First Precinct or Election District, which said precinct or voting district is now asked or petitioned to be erected into a new township, to be called the township of Willow Grove.

A bill is now before the Honorable Senate to bond the township of Landis for manufacturing purposes, for \$25,000, presented by the centre of Vineland against our wishes as Jerseymen, the township of Landis being already heavily indebted, and our taxes now \$1.38 per \$100. With a debt of \$25,000 more added to it, it will be difficult to determine what the tax per centage will eventually be.

14. We see notices for many other special acts in the Vineland newspapers, which will no doubt be presented, if they have not already been: to enlarge the powers of the Township Committee, to create a police force in Centre Vineland at a heavy cost or expense; also one to bond the township of Landis for fifteen thousand dollars, to build the Vineland and May's Landing Railroad, and many other bills too numerous to mention; but by referring to said newspaper notices, you will see them more fully set forth.

And we humbly pray your honorable bodies that you grant our request, and create the said new township of Willow Grove, as per bill now before you, as a general law regulating townships in this State, and free us of the burthens of the many obnoxious special laws which we are now under in the township of Landis, and the unlawful expenditures of the township moneys, and permit us, as Jerseymen, to manage our own finances, under general laws. And your petitioners will ever pray, &c.

Gentlemen of the Senate and General Assembly.

I herewith transmit the report of the Commission appointed by the Governor under concurrent resolutions passed at the last session of the Legislature, to examine the present system of Education of this, and other states and countries, and to prepare a bill on that subject, &c.

I also enclose a copy of the bill prepared by said Commission entitled "An act to establish a system of public free instruction."

The importance of the subject and the high character, ability and educational experience of the Commissioners demand for this report and bill, special consideration.

To His Excellency, Joel Parker, Governor of the State of New Jersey :

SIR :—The commission appointed by Governor Randolph, in accordance with the concurrent resolution of the Senate and House of Assembly, to examine the present system of education of this State, and those of other States and countries, and prepare a bill to be presented to the next Legislature, that shall secure for our State a complete system of free

common schools, and, also, to consider the question of establishing a number of high schools, that shall be free to all who desire a higher course of education, and report upon the same, herewith submit the results of their labors.

These consist of

1. A body of laws, covering the whole ground of our public education, as controlled by the State.
2. An act to facilitate the establishment of high schools in this State.
3. An act in relation to State scholarships.

In regard to each of these subjects, some explanatory remarks are deemed necessary.

1. The body of school laws, herewith submitted, is substantially the same as that now in force. Few changes have been made, since it is believed that the present system is well adapted to our wants, and present stage of advancement.

The changes made are—

1. The bringing together, into one code and under their appropriate heads, of all school laws passed since the year 1867, when our present system was adopted.
2. The striking out of sections or parts of sections, the continuance of which would be the mere repetition of what was elsewhere stated.
3. Verbal alterations, making the language more definite or correct.
4. The introduction of new matter, making modifications more or less important.

All these changes are marked on the margin of the copy herewith submitted, and all new matter is, also, included in brackets.

Of these changes making modifications in our present system:

1. The first is found in section 2, article V., confirming the appointment, by the Board of Education, of a County Super-

intendent, when the Board of Chosen Freeholders allow a month to pass without taking action on the subject.

2. The second concerns the salary of the State Superintendent, (section 5) which is fixed at \$2,500 a year.

The services of this officer are onerous and most important, requiring knowledge, prudence, forbearance and courage, qualifications for which this cannot be thought an extravagant compensation.

3. At §11, §30, §67 the following is inserted: "*unless the State Board of Education shall, for good cause shown, otherwise direct.*"

It was thought that cases will sometimes arise, when the interests of a school and a district might suffer greatly, unless a wise discretion were allowed exercise. This discretion, it was felt, could be safely left with the State Board of Education, where our State legislation in a similar case (section 2, free school law) had previously left it. The cases where this discretion is to be exercised, are specifically named.

4. §19-21 are entirely new, recommending the appointment of one Inspector in each of the Congressional Districts of the State.

An inspection intermediate between that of the State and County Superintendents seems to be the great want of our present system. The Commission are of the opinion, that outside of our larger cities there is no adequate inspection of the schools. There is needed a far closer supervision of them, a constant watching of their practical working, and the immediate reporting for correction of whatever is faulty. Hon. Edward Danforth, Deputy State Superintendent of Public Instruction of New York, says: "The superiority of public elementary instruction in Holland to that of any other European State, according to the unanimous testimony of her own distinguished educators, and those of other countries, is entirely attributed to a system of inspection which, for completeness and thoroughness, is probably unequalled in any other country on the globe. W. E. Hickson, an English critic, remarks: 'The Dutch school-masters are decidedly superior to the Prussian, and the schools of primary instruction, consequently, in a more efficient state. This superiority

we attribute entirely to a better system of inspection. In Holland, inspection is the basis upon which the whole fabric of popular instruction rests.' ”

The increased expense caused by the appointment of the competent men, who will devote their whole time to this inspection, will bear no kind of proportion to the good which will be effected. Among our County Superintendents we have active and competent men, who can be assigned to this work. The Commission are of the unanimous opinion, that our schools can never become what they may and ought to be, unless the school room and its practical working are more closely watched.

5. § 43 and § 92 give school trustees power to build, repair or improve school buildings, and to borrow money or incur debt for such purpose as they may be directed by a majority of the legal voters present at any legally called meeting of the district.

It is thought that the present law, requiring a two-thirds vote, gives too much power to the ignorant and selfish, whereby they may defeat great purposes looking to the public welfare. If it is a sound principle that the majority should rule, there is certainly no majority with which the exercise of the right can be so safely left as with that which is ready to tax itself to further the cause of education.

6. § 43, VIII. orders that books shall be provided for indigent children at the expense of the district.

None can judge so well of the indigence of an individual as the people of his own district; and it is right that a district should take care of its own poor.

7. § 49 makes the twenty-second of February a school holiday.

8. § 55 gives a city board of examiners power to recognize the certificate of a county board of examiners, and, without examination, issue to the holder a certificate of a corresponding grade.

9. § 56. Drawing and singing are required to be taught in the State Normal School.

These branches of study are becoming every day more important in the view of all sound educationists.

10. § 60 and 65 contain important new matter in regard to the pupils of the Normal School. Requiring—first, a competitive examination of candidates by the county board of examiners; and secondly, appropriates \$5,000 a year to establish fifty scholarships, of \$100 each, to be competed for by the pupils of the Normal School, the successful candidates giving satisfactory bonds to the Treasurer of the State that they will teach five consecutive years in some public school of this State.

The Commission commend these provisions, and especially the second, to the attention of the Legislature.

11. § 66 names the branches of study which shall be taught in our public schools, and permits the teaching of drawing and singing.

12. § 71 provides schools in the day or evening for persons over fifteen years of age.

The provisions of this section will commend themselves to all good men, as it cares for those whose time is chiefly occupied during the ordinary working hours of the day in the active pursuits of life.

13. § 72 and § 74 care for the physical and intellectual wellfare of children under twelve years of age, employed in any manufacturing or mechanical establishment in the State.

The Commission are sure that these provisions need no word of defence.

14. § 75 gives permission, by a majority vote, to any incorporated town or school district to make provision for the education of habitual truants, and vagrant and vicious youth, between the ages of seven and sixteen years.

It is thought that no general law on this subject, binding on the whole State, is practicable. Still, it is well known that special enactments have been most successfully tried in two or three cities of other States, and it is thought right to give this liberty of making special laws to any community in which these great evils of truancy and youthful vagrancy prevail. It is further believed that the evils can be thus met

and mastered in our large cities, and the decision of the question is left, where it should be, with the people themselves.

15. § 76 names the branches which shall be taught in a graded school.

I. The Commission have spent much time and thought in the preparation of this body of laws. They have also taken much pains to learn what the wise and good of other States and countries have done in regard to education, and wherein educational efforts have failed or been successful. And so far as they could they have submitted this body of laws to the leading educationists of our own country for their criticisms, and have carefully weighed all the replies which have been kindly made. It is proper to add that all the replies which have been received, with one exception, are commendatory of the draft which accompanies this report.

II. The act to facilitate the establishment of high schools in this State, herewith submitted, embodies, in the judgment of the Commission, what our State now needs and may safely undertake. Less than this would perhaps avail little, while to attempt more might retard rather than facilitate the end sought.

III. The act in relation to State scholarships provides that, after a rigorous competitive yearly examination, a student of high gifts and attainments shall be sent from each of the Congressional Districts of the State to any one of the colleges of the State, which the candidate, with the consent of his parent or guardian may select, and be there supported at the expense of the State. The act also provides that the candidate must maintain a high grade of scholarship in the college, or the aid of the State will be withdrawn.

It is thought that these scholarships will give a most healthful impulse to the aims and efforts of the youth of the State.

The Commission also agree with the State Board of Education that the yearly appropriation to the State Normal School should be \$15,000, exclusive of the \$5000 for scholarships in the school.

As some persons may object that the new features of these acts will greatly increase the expense of education, a tabular view of the additional expense is subjoined.

CHAPTER 651.

AN ACT to make a contribution toward the completion of the Washington National Monument.

PASSED April 20, 1871, by a two-third vote.

The People of the State of New York, represented in the Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows :

SECTION 1. The sum of ten thousand dollars is hereby appropriated as the contribution of the State of New York, to be paid by the Treasurer, on the warrant of the Comptroller, to the treasurer of the National Washington Monument Society, whenever the Governor shall certify that he is satisfied a sufficient sum has been subscribed from other sources to enable said society to resume work with a reasonable prospect of completing the obelisk or shaft.

§ 2. A copy of the foregoing shall be transmitted by the Governor to the Governors of other States of the Union, with a request that they communicate the same to the Legislatures of their respective States.

Mr. Hemmingway offered the following:

To the House of Assembly:

On behalf of the Brewers and Maltsters; and of a number of Farmers, Mechanics and others interested, citizens of New

Jersey, we respectfully and firmly protest against the passage of a bill commonly known as the Local Option Law, now before your honorable committee for consideration; and respectfully request that before it be further advanced, your honorable House would carefully examine and duly weigh the points that we present.

We do not rest our objections to the proposed enactment mainly on the great injury it would do to various important industrial interests, although the enlightend legislator would naturally consider such a point as an important element in calculating the force and consequence of any proposed measure. The interests involved are of great magnitude. So far back as 1863, when the statistics of this subject began to receive close attention, the official returns show that 1,558,083 barrels of malt liquors were made in the United States, yielding the government directly \$1,628,933.82, and indirectly much more. In 1870, there were made 6,081,520 barrels, yielding a direct revenue of \$6,319,126.90. During the year just closed the number of barrels have been over seven millions, with a corresponding increase of revenue to the Federal Government. We find in 1868, that the actual amount of capital employed in breweries was \$56,855,330; in malt houses, \$12,792,673, and in land used in growing barley and hops, \$35,392,060, making for the United States a grand total of \$105,040,063. This, to-day, from the increased production, may be reckoned safely at \$136,000,000. The business gives employment to about 53,000 persons annually; but when we add to this the coopers, blacksmiths, and other mechanics, whose services are called for by the trade, the increased hands it requires in furnaces, forges, foundries and timber yards, it is not too extravagant to more than double the number of those obtaining employment through its means. Although the brewers have never striven to avoid their share of the burthens of the State, it is not in the nature of any one to exaggerate their business, when a severe tax would be increased thereby. The statistics, under the circumstances, are not liable to a charge of error by excess. Of this large sum, New Jersey takes 6.95 per cent. which would make her capital employed about \$10,452,000. The Fifth District alone pays tax on nearly half a million barrels of beer. In proportion to the population, New Jersey brews more beer than any other State in the Union, producing 248 glasses for each

man, woman, and child in its borders, which is greater than the proportion in New York, California, or New Hampshire. Any action which tends to destroy this capital, to embarrass its owners, ruin an extensive branch of industry, and to suddenly throw into other and already-choked channels of labor, a large number of persons, should be carefully and jealously considered before it passes into the form of a statute.

But, casting aside politico-economical considerations, we object to the law as it is proposed, upon broad and unselfish grounds. We assume that it will promote intemperance, and that it is unfair in its shape, as well as certain to be injurious to the public in its results.

The law proposes to permit the inhabitants of every township, or ward of a city, or other municipality, to determine by a vote of the citizens whether there shall or shall not be sold any distilled liquors, wine or beer, within the bounds of that political division during the ensuing year. It does not include in its terms either cider, root beer or currant wine, but we suppose these are to be placed on the list in common fairness, since they each contain more alcohol, the cause of stimulation, than the kind of beer called "lager," which is the one most commonly consumed; and it does include small beer, which has so little alcohol in its composition that the Federal revenue officers do not place it on the taxable list. The object seems to be to proscribe anything, which, by the greatest excess, can produce intoxication, and to do this only at the whim or will of a majority of the community.

At first sight this is apparently carrying out that sound policy which entrusts the people of small communities with as much possible power over their local affairs as is compatible with the legitimate freedom of the individual, and not contrary to the general welfare. Actually, however, it cripples and destroys the rights of individuals, not at the dictate of a supreme sense of right and because of a natural exigency of morals, but under the caprice of the greatest number. To justify the denial to the citizen of his inherent right to pursue any branch of business, it must be shown that the prohibited occupation is wrong of itself, or inevitably causes a wrong so great that it can not be prevented by other means. A law made to this end, must be for the purpose, and in a form that will have the effect of preventing the evil at which

it is aimed. Here, the wrong to be averted is the abuse of intoxicating liquors, and the evils to be prevented, the want of immorality, and positive crime, resulting from the folly and wickedness of drunkenness. The only valid excuse for such prohibitory legislation is that it will prevent the threatened or remove the actual ills at which it is aimed; or, at least, will so modify them, as to compensate for the invasion of personal liberty, and the destruction of important branches of industry. We propose to inquire briefly if this bill made a law, would increase temperance and public virtue, or the reverse.

In a recent National Temperance Almanac, sent out under the auspices of a society which represents a large and respectable class of citizens who wage a relentless war upon intemperance, and therefore supposed to be entitled in this instance to particular credit, we are told that the value of the retail sales of ardent spirits in the United States for 1867, was nearly double that for 1860. Now, as in the former and later year, the retail price of a glass of spirits was more than three times as much as it was but seven years before, there was a falling off in consumption of 37.5 per cent., without taking into account the increase of population; while it would be 50 per cent., if we considered the increase of numbers during the interval. That this creditable diminution of consumption was not due to temperance efforts, is shown by the marked increase of malt liquors which have evidently taken the place of the more potent spirits.

As we shall presently show, the proposed law would change this state of things, and bring matters to their old condition; and hence it becomes pertinent to inquire into the effect, character and composition of the two kinds of drinks.

The stimulating, and when used to excess, the intoxicating properties of these drinks, are due to a substance called 'alcohol,' a compound made up of elements which are part of the air we breathe and the water we drink. It is enough here to say of this substance that in its uncombined state, and in large quantities, it destroys the body by paralyzing the nervous centres; and is as much a poison as strychnine, peaches, common salt, or any other substances that in excess will destroy life. In this connection we present a list, showing by the authority of Brande, Prandtl, Christison, Moulder,

and other eminent analytical chemists, the average proportion of alcohol contained in various drinks used by the residents of this State:

Bourbon and Rye Whiskey, and Cider Brandy, vary from the strength of Hollands up to that of Brandy; an Apple Jack, distilled from pomace, and Peach Brandy, are not quite so strong as the grain spirits.

It will be seen that the so-called "lager beer" has about on fifteenth part of the alcohol contained in the stronger whiskeys and the very strongest of the ales has a little over twice as much as lager.

But the alcohol in drinks fermented from malt, is in different condition from that in distilled liquors, and with such combinations as modify its action on the system. In the distilled liquors it is mixed with water, and through those taken from fruit have a small percentage of æther, all of the grain liquors are nearly or quite devoid of that, and have instead an amylic alcohol popularly known as *fusel oil*, which exerts a pernicious effect on the mucous membrane, and which is only removed by age, or most thorough rectification. In grape wines the alcohol is modified by æther, and a little extractive. In beers we have the æthers replaced by nutritive extractive and sugar. Thus, Prandl's analysis of Munich Beer shows, in a mean of three trials—Alcohol, 3.55; Extractive and Sugar, 7.99—the beer thus containing nutritive matter within four per cent. of that in cows' milk, the type of nutritive drinks. In other words there is as much to nourish life in six glasses of lager, and about five of ale, as in

our glasses of milk. The per centage in Larchel's Munich Beer, according to Van Fenneberg's analysis, is still greater, being alcohol, 4.94, and malt extractive 13.03; while the extractive in London ale is as high as 15.88, with more than three per cent. more nutritive matter than milk.* Johnston, in his "Chemistry of Common Life," while he denounces intemperance, as all sensible men must, puts the case fairly and plainly when he says that the gluten and sugar in beers, "by strengthening the system, modify and mollify the apparent action of the alcohol with which they are associated. They place malt liquors in the same relation to ardent spirits as cocoa bears to tea and coffee."

To make this still clearer, let us briefly review the process of manufacturing the fermented liquors from malt.

The base of the fermented, as of distilled liquors, is sugar. All the sugars, whether of the cane, of milk, or of the grape, and starch, and gum, and alcohol, contain the same ingredients, but in different proportions. They are solutions of carbon in water, or compounds of carbon and water, as they are liquid or solid. The dark brown substance known as humic acid, which gives the vegetable mould of our gardens its character, is one of the same series. From all the grains containing starch, beer may be made—the spiritous drink known as root beer is made from molasses—but the beer of commerce is the result of fermenting prepared barley. The grain is moistened, spread in heaps on a clean floor, in a dark room, and allowed to heat and sprout. At a certain point germination is arrested by drying in a kiln. By this process the starch in the grain is changed into a substance known as diastase, and sugar. The brewer has the malt bruised, so it will be the more readily acted on in all its parts, places it in warm water in his mash tub, where the sugar and diastase, dissolving in water, act on each other, and are converted into dextrine, and from this into grape sugar. When this is done, the solution is boiled, to separate and coagulate the albuminous matter; hops are added to clear and preserve it; the liquor is drawn off into shallow receivers, cooled and passed into a vat, yeast is added, fermentation goes on for a week or so, the sugar is mainly converted into alcohol, and the beer is made. A portion, from 7 to 8 per cent. of the nutritive matter remains unchanged. If this were all converted into alcohol,

the acetous fermentation could set in, and we should have vinegar, which possesses, though in different proportions, the same ingredients as alcohol, starch, gum, humic acid and the sugars.

It will be seen, therefore, that of all alcoholic liquors, beer is the least injurious and the most beneficial to the system. As to its effect on morals, which is a legitimate subject of investigation in this case, that must be found by a comparison of the records of beer drinking countries with those of non beer drinking countries. The greatest beer drinkers are the Germans—the next greatest, the inhabitants of the rural districts of England. Compare the criminal records of Germany, so far as drunkenness and the resulting offences are concerned with those of spirit drinking countries; or the rural districts of England, where all classes drink malt liquors with those of London, where lower orders indulge in gin and the consumers of beer shine in comparison. Perhaps Leipsic, in Germany, from its numerous visitors during its great fair, who are apt to indulge in stronger potations and more of them, than when at home, is the most unfavorable point to cite; but we take it since it consumes with its 95,000 inhabitants 400,000 barrels of beer. Yet we find the annual arrests for drunkenness there, fair time and all, do not reach eight per cent. The same arrests in the urban districts of Germany, where the law is administered with a strictness to which even in New Jersey we are strangers, show but a slight percentage; and are almost, if not quite, among the few who indulge in distilled drinks. Certainly the habitual drunkard there, or even the man who grows noisy and quarrelsome in his cups, is looked on by his next neighbors with disgust and horror. And we appeal to the good sense of any calm observer, whether the German beer drinkers of this country, in their manners, morals and observance of the duties of good citizens, compare unfavorably with any other class.

Now if the proposed bill become law, what would be the comparative effect on the consumption of liquors and the kind of liquors consumed. The key to a solution of this question is found in the fact that little or no opposition to the passage of this law seems to be made by those concerned in the manufacture or sale of ardent spirits. They know well enough that however strong may be the penalties of the law, the drinker can and will obtain his whiskey. If he can not ge

it by the glass, he will, as he has done wherever similar laws have prevailed, get in larger quantities, and drink it, not in occasional half gills in company, but by the pint or quart at home. What comes then is plain enough. A shrewd observer once said that he did not like to drink alone, for the bottle came around too often. The liquor dealers will lose little, if anything. On the contrary they will be apt to gain, for there will be no competition from the lighter beverage. Tap a barrel of beer, and it must be drunk in a little while, or it becomes stale. The carbonic acid gas which gives its liveliness to that, and to ale, and to soda water, passes off very soon, and there is not enough alcohol, in beer, or porter, to keep them from spoiling, as there is in distilled drinks. Nor from their bulk can these be carried about and drank at pleasure. The drinker is thus forced to where the spirit is in a more concentrated state, or nothing; and once getting the habit he keeps to the stronger drink. A more ingenious device than this for the encouragement of excessive drinking could not have been invented by the very Father of Evil himself. It paves the way to falsehood, deceit, evasions of the law, and drunkenness. It substitutes dealers for whom the law can reach, and control those out of the reach and control of the law. It prevents the use of the lighter and nutritious, and indirectly encourages that of the heavier and innutritious drinks. It destroys a large and important branch of industry, and by that destruction arrests a positive and growing improvement in public morals.

Nor are the political objections to the measure without force. The construction of the law is in violation of all true principals of statesmanship. If drinking anything which contains alcohol be a crime—if the man who swallows 3.55 to 3.94 per cent. of alcohol, and from 8 to 13.03 per cent. of nutritive and saccharine matter in his malt beer; or from 1 to 7.5 per cent. of alcohol and 1 per cent. of uncrystalizable sugar in his root beer; or 7.68 per cent. of alcohol and 2 per cent. of grape-sugar in his cider—be as much a victim and a bad example as the one who indulges to excess in a drink containing 54 per cent. of alcohol, aggravated by an addition of fusel oil—why allow any one to be destroyed because a majority of his neighbors expose him to the baneful influence? Why not stamp out the scourge by a general prohibitory law, sustained by the most terrible penalties, and enforced by the power of the State?

This law empowers one district to prohibit the sale of a single glass of any intoxicating drink within its borders, but permit its resident to step over an imaginary line, into a district where no such prohibition exists, and there compensate himself for this enforced trouble by taking a half-dozen drinks, when one would have satisfied him, could he have had it at home. John Smith, on one side of the street, commits an offence if he sell or give his neighbor a glass of foaming beer; but John Brown, just opposite, and forty feet distance, may dispense a gallon to the thirsty way-farer with impunity, and under the direct sanction of the very law that threatens the other John with a rod of pains and penalties. The drinker, instead of taking the milder beverage in moderation, indulges his taste and gratifies his indignation with something stronger than usual, and perhaps returns to disturb the peace and quiet of the neighborhood where there is no liquor sold, and no dealer to punish. This, however, presupposes that the law can be enforced with absolute certainty. Past experience, which forms an instructive lesson for the statesman, shows that such an enforcement is impossible, and that the attempt at it results in the substitution for licensed dealing, under the supervision of the law, of an irresponsible and uncontrolled traffic, demoralizing from its concealment, and without any check on its extravagance of action.

We do not object to the passage of any proper law that will promote temperance and guard public virtue. On the contrary, we are ready to give all such enactments not only the quiet obedience which our duties as citizens require, but an active support. But we object to a law like this, which discriminates against that least liable to objections, if objectionable at all, which promotes habitual drunkenness and all the evils that follow in its train, and which is fraught with injury to public morals as well as ruin to private interests. We therefore respectfully urge that your honorable committee will, as in your wisdom you may think best, either report unfavorably upon the proposed measure as it stands, or so carefully amend it before it is transmitted for definite action that it shall be a means of promoting temperance and good order, instead of being, as in its present shape, a scheme to paralyze important branches of industry, and pervert thousands of respectable men into debased and demoralized drunkards.

To the Senate and General Assembly:

The Joint Committee on Treasurer's Accounts, having been requested by the House of Assembly to inquire into the rumored improper disbursements of the public funds, report that they submit, herewith, statements of the Treas-

urer and Comptroller of the State, which statements the Committee have inquired into, and which they find to be full, true, explicit and satisfactory exhibits of the transactions in question. They have examined the vouchers, bonds, affidavits, and other papers referred to, and find them correct in all respects; and they find that such disbursements as have been made without specific enactment applicable to them were authorized by general statute, or were fully warranted by abundant precedent and a long and unquestioned usage; and they have been made with a jealous care for the interests of the State, worthy of the highest commendation.

The Committee find the system under which accounts are audited and paid, so exact and comprehensive as to render these two branches of the Treasury Department complete checks upon each other, and to secure to the State perfect immunity against loss; and they desire to express their entire confidence in the Treasurer and Comptroller as honest and faithful officers, conscientious in the discharge of their official duties, and worthy of the trust reposed in them by the Legislature and the people.

STATEMENT OF THE COMPTROLLER.

STATE OF NEW JERSEY,
OFFICE OF COMPTROLLER OF TREASURY,
TRENTON, February 20, 1872.

To the Joint Committee on Treasurer's Accounts of the New Jersey Legislature, Session of 1872:

GENTLEMEN:—The following resolutions were passed by the Legislature on the 14th inst.:

1. WHEREAS, The State funds having been disbursed by the State Treasurer, under a warrant from the Comptroller, without any appropriation having been made by the Legislature for said disbursements; therefore,

Resolved, That the Joint Committee on Treasurer's Accounts are hereby requested to investigate said proceedings, in view of a better system in the departments of the Treasurer and Comptroller.

2. WHEREAS, The extraordinary sum of \$5,954.32 appears in the Treasurer's Report, as paid to the Secretary of State for furnishing laws to newspapers for the session of 1871; therefore,

Resolved, That the Joint Committee on Treasurer's Accounts be and are hereby requested to investigate said charge, in view of better economy for the session of 1872.

Resolved, That the said Committee be also requested to investigate whether any improper amounts have been paid by the Treasurer under the direction of the Governor, or any person to any person in the city of Washington, or elsewhere, for collecting claims due our State from the General Government.

In response to your request for information upon the subjects referred to in these resolutions, the following statement is respectfully submitted.

The first resolution is understood to refer to the payment of certain items in the act to defray the incidental expenses of the legislative session of 1871.

This act failed to pass the Legislature, the hour fixed for the adjournment having arrived before the bill was finally disposed of. The items had been considered separately, and the bill amended in both Senate and House of Assembly.—When the bill was sent to the House with the Senate amendments, the House refused to concur in the amendments, and a committee of conference was appointed. The majority of this committee reported in favor of the bill as returned from the Senate, with the exception of one item; the minority reported adversely to the Senate amendments, and the bill was ordered to be returned to the Senate. Before this order could be executed the House adjourned *sine die*.

The failure to pass a bill to defray the incidental expenses, is by no means a novelty in the legislation of the State, and in case of such failure, it has been the custom for years past for the Treasurer to pay such items in the bill as were passed without question or dispute, and it has been the custom of the succeeding Legislature to legalize such payments.

A marked instance of this occurred in 1865-66, and the State Treasurer in his report, dated January 20, 1866, referred to it in the following language :

“By the failure of the Legislature at its last session to pass the incidental bill, a number of claims against the State for articles furnished and work done during the previous year and pending the session of the Legislature by various persons, amounting to \$31,537.45, were presented, and applications made to me to satisfy them in accordance with what had been done on a previous occasion of a similar character; representations were made of the hardship and injustice of the case, and the injury which would be done to several of the parties if what was so justly due to them should be withheld until the Legislature should again meet; and knowing as I did, that all but a single item of the bill had been approved by both Houses of the Legislature, and were not objected to by the Executive, I consented to pay the largest portion of these claims, upon receiving bonds of indemnity or other guarantees for the repayment of the sums so paid should the Legislature refuse to legalize their payment. *

* * I have no doubt, from the expressions made by members of the last Legislature, that the payments made will be approved.”

The advances here referred to by the Treasurer amounted in the aggregate to \$21,560.23, and the Legislature legalized the payments, and ordered the payment of the remaining items with interest.

Immediately after the adjournment of the Legislature of 1871, application for payment was made by parties having claims in the incidental bill. Many of these had furnished in good faith, stationery and other articles to both branches of the Legislature upon the order of officers legally appointed, which articles had been used by the Legislature; and the parties furnishing them claimed that it would be unjust to deprive them of the use of the money until another Legisla-

ture could convene and pass the bill. They could not resort to the remedy usually applied to a delinquent debtor, as the State cannot be sued by one of its own citizens, and had this been possible, it would have been to the discredit of the State to allow it to be done in such a case.

The Comptroller, therefore, in view of the established custom, after consulting with members of the Legislature, decided to draw warrants upon the treasury for such of the claims as had not been rejected by the Legislature nor by the committee of conference, taking bonds of indemnification to secure the State against loss in case the succeeding Legislature failed to pass the bill.

In no case, was a claim paid, unless it had received the approval of the incidental committee, of one or both branches of the Legislature and of the committee of conference. Every claim which did not receive such approval is still unpaid.

Especial reference having been made to the payment of "item No. 36, to Hon. John Torrey, Jr., for expenses incurred in contested election case, *Hooper v. Torrey*, one thousand dollars," it is proper to state, that in contested election cases, it has been customary for the Legislature to pass an act authorizing the payment of the amount of expenses incurred by the successful contestant. This was done in 1864, in the case of *Lathrop v. Stokes*, when Stokes (Democratic) was paid one thousand dollars for expenses incurred in contested election case (see Pam. 1864, page 769), and again in 1866, in the case of *Tyrrell v. Jones*, when Tyrrell (Republican) was paid a like amount for similar expenses (see Pam. 1866, page 1012).

The claim of Mr. Torrey having received the approval of both branches of the Legislature and of the committee of conference, the Comptroller and Treasurer, after advising with members of the Legislature, took a bond of indemnification and paid the bill.

Attention has also been called to the payment of item No. 31, to Mr. Thomas Slaight for padlocks, one thousand two hundred and fifty dollars. This bill was not paid as an item in the incidental bill, but as a just claim under the act respecting the inspection of steam boilers, approved April 16, 1868. The present Comptroller was a member of the House of Assembly when the incidental bill in question was report-

ed, and then took the position which he still maintains, that Mr. Slaughter's claim should not have been incorporated in that bill, as it was no part of the Legislative expenses, and if any further legislation were needed to authorize the payment of the bill it should be by special enactment.

Immediately after entering upon his duties as Comptroller, this claim was presented, and a searching investigation was instituted as to its legality. The act providing for the inspection of steam boilers, was approved April 16, 1868 (P. L. 1868, page 109), and repealed in 1869 (P. L. 1869, page 896).

The eighth section of the act provides that the expense of furnishing the necessary apparatus and appliances shall be borne by the State, and paid in the same manner that other State charges and expenses are paid, and that no bill for any expense or charges shall be paid, unless the same be certified by the Inspector-in-Chief to be correct. The question to be decided then was, did the claim satisfy these conditions; for the State could not properly refuse payment of bills proved to have been contracted in accordance with the provisions of the act, by the legally appointed agent of the State during the time that the act was in operation.

The former Comptroller (Mr. McDonald), declined to audit the bill, upon the ground that it was not certified by Mr. Grover (the Inspector-in-Chief) to be correct as to the delivery of the goods, as the law requires, at the prices agreed upon. "It is true," he says, in his letter returning the bill, "that the claim is accompanied by Grover's order to make the padlock, but there is no evidence before me that it was made and delivered."

This was March 22, 1871, about two weeks before his retirement from office. On or about the day he retired from office, he was informed that the required certificate had been procured, upon which he said there could then be no question as to the validity of the claim. His term of office immediately expired, and the certificate in question was submitted with the claim, to the present Comptroller; but it was not deemed sufficient to substantiate the claim, and he demanded that Mr. Grover be brought before him, to be examined under oath, in accordance with the provisions of section four of the act creating the office of Comptroller of the Treasury, approved March 17, 1865. (See Nixon's Digest, page 1003.)

This was done, and Mr. Grover stated that the order had been given by him in June, 1868, acting in the capacity of Inspector-in-Chief; that the articles were necessary to the proper carrying out of the provisions of the act under which he was appointed; and that they were furnished, inspected and accepted by him within two months after the date of the order. His statement, made under oath, is now on file in the Comptroller's Office, and it left no alternative but to audit the bill.

Concerning the amount paid to the Secretary of State for sending copies of the laws to the newspapers the facts are these: The law provides that each paper authorized to publish the laws shall be furnished with correct copies thereof by the Secretary of State, and that he shall receive eight cents per folio for making such copies.

The act authorizing this payment has been in operation many years, and the fact that a greater amount was paid in 1871 than in any previous year, is simply due to the fact that there were many more laws passed, and more papers authorized to publish them.

The disbursements to an agent of the State at Washington are explained by the following letter from Quartermaster General Perrine:

Hon. Albert L. Runyon, Comptroller of New Jersey, Trenton N. J.:

DEAR SIR:—I was commissioned Financial Agent for the adjustment and collection of State war claims against the United States government by Governor Olden, on the twelfth day of August, 1861, and have been continued by his successors.

In May, 1869, there was a large balance of suspended and unsettled claims against the United States that required adjustment and explanation, and a person resident at Washington familiar with the business to prosecute the same with almost constant importunity to effect an early settlement. By the consent of Governor Randolph, I appointed Dr. John Trimble an assistant for that purpose, the rate of compensa-

tion to be fixed by the Governor in proportion to the amount of labor performed and the amount of moneys collected.

To the Joint Committee on Treasurer's Accounts :

GENTLEMEN :—My reply to the several questions mentioned in the joint resolutions, passed by the Legislature, and which you are directed to examine into and report, is as follows, viz :

The act of the Legislature, approved March 17, 1865, requires the Comptroller to examine and audit all claims presented against the State, and certify the same to the Treasurer for payment.

The law makes it the duty of the Treasurer, on receipt of warrants from the Comptroller, certified by him, and sworn to and receipted by claimants, to pay the amount so certified and sworn to be due, unless he has reason to believe that the claims upon which the warrants are based are improper and illegal.

My attention was particularly directed to most of the claims referred to in said resolution, and being satisfied that they were just and proper, I paid them, on the presentation of the Comptroller's warrant, properly executed. I have had no reason to doubt the correctness of any claim audited by the Comptroller, and have paid them when presented.

TRENTON, March 7, 1872.

To the House of Assembly:

In compliance with the following resolution of your honorable body :

Resolved, That the Quarter Master General be requested to furnish to the House of Assembly information upon the following points :

Whether any application was made to him during the administration of Governor Randolph, for the purchase of arms and munitions of war for foreign parties.

Whether any arms or munitions of war were sold, and if so, to whom, and what time, and if not sold, for what reason,

I beg leave to report, that during the months of September and October, 1870, I received repeated applications from different parties representing themselves as agents of the French Government, for the purchase of ordnance and ordnance stores of various kinds; and that on or about the twentieth (20th) of October, I did conclude a sale of ten thousand (10,000) muskets, at ten dollars (\$10) per musket, the purchaser to pay all expenses of cartage and transportation to Messrs. Schuyler, Hartley and Graham, subject, however, to the approval of the Governor, as provided in the act entitled "An act relative to the public arms in the State Arsenal," approved April 17, 1868.

At this time Governor Randolph was absent, and failing to obtain his approval by telegram, and believing that the sale was a very advantageous one for the interest of the State, I had an interview with him at his residence at Morristown, to urge upon him his approval, and to permit me to accept an offer from parties in the same interest for the purchase of a lot of artillery and harness. This I failed to do, the Governor alleging for reasons that it was an interference with our relations with a friendly power; that it would be a just cause for complaint against the State by a large and respectable body of German citizens, and that he believed that the muskets were worth the sum named as the consideration for conversion to breech-loaders upon the plan adopted by the United States.

For these and other reasons he could not consent to the sale of any ordnance stores to any parties on account of foreign interests. Respectfully,

WHEREAS, The Federal Government is at peace with the whole world; our national grievances referred to arbitration, and in due process of settlement; our people prosperous, and the development of our territory and national resources progressing with an unparalled success: AND WHEREAS, The time is not far distant, when under the provisions of the Constitution of the United States, a National Executive for a term of years from 1873 to 1877 is to be chosen; and

WHEREAS, Many of the blessings which we are to-day enjoying, are in a great measure due to the wise, firm, vigorous, economical, and patriotic administration of the present Executive, His Excellency, Ulysses S. Grant, President of the United States; therefore,

Resolved, That the House of Assembly of New Jersey, coming as it does fresh from the people of our beloved State, and therefore expressing the wishes, desires and purposes of the people of the same, do hereby express their entire approbation and endorsement of the administration of our Federal affairs by President Grant, and regard the many wise acts of the Government in his hands, as the expression of a patriotic desire upon his part, to make the country united, free, prosperous, great and happy.

2. *Resolved*, That in the proposed Civil Service Reform we see a wise determination to root from the Government of the Republic the abuses and corruptions which have held full sway for over half a century, which abuses materially aided in culminating the Rebellion of 1861 by the misguided Southern Democracy.

3. *Resolved*, That in the unprecedented reduction of a public debt, as shown in the payment of the extraordinary sum of three hundred millions of dollars since March, 1869, and a saving thereby, during that time, in the payment of interest alone, amounting to \$18,203,915, aggregating at the rate of \$273,600 payment per day for every day of and during the present administration, is an exhibit challenging at once the admiration of the world, and commending itself to the friends of economy of the faithful collection and disbursements of the revenue and consequent good to all classes of people.

4. *Resolved*, That in the action of General Grant in the matter of the purchase of the Island of San Domingo, we recognize that sterling integrity characteristic of the true patriot in which he, by his course therein, has shown that his belief is, that the President is not the master but the servant of the people.

5. *Resolved*, That as we have his sentiment "Let us have peace," recorded as the early keynote of his Administration, he has proven that he fully intended it so to be, by the maintaining of peace and amity between the Republic and the nations of the earth, despite the desperate efforts of interested, intriguing and designing men to precipitate a war between the United States and at least one European power.

6. *Resolved*, That the proposed postal reform commends to the action of the law making power, as calculated to do much good for the entire people.

7. *Resolved*, That in completing the work of reconstructing the Government, the Administration has, in our judgment, been eminently successful, and by the prompt enforcement of what is known as the Ku-Klux act, the strong arm of the Government has proven to be a terror to the workers of murder and other species of iniquity.

8. *Resolved*, That the financial procurement of a treaty with the Kingdom of Great Britain upon the Alabama question, reflects much credit upon the Administration, and we trust that with the adjournment of the Geneva Arbitration, this vexed question will be satisfactorily and permanently settled.

9. *Resolved*, That in our belief the agitation of the relative positions held in our country between labor and capital, is at this particular time working to the injury of the capitalists and the laboring men alike, for the reason that, by distracting the classes from their usual line of political action, the success of the wisest financial system of the government is endangered in the possible repeal of the protective tariff in the event of the defeat of the dominant party of the land; and thus cause the entailment of the same scenes of misery and desolation which followed the reverses of 1837 and 1857, when the American system was stricken down, the business interests of the country prostrated and our people brought to idleness and starvation.

10. *Resolved*, That we record our full confidence in the Congress of the nation, endorsing its many acts of wisdom, and express the hope that it will continue to labor for the best interests of the entire country.

To the House of Assembly :

A certified copy of the following resolution, adopted by the House on the 28th Ultimo, has been received.

WHEREAS, The annual report of the New Jersey State Prison, dated October 31, 1871, states that there is due to the State from the Contractors for convict labor, in said Prison the sum of \$32,625.55. Which sum is wrongfully and unjustly withheld from the State, by the Contractors ; therefore,

Resolved, That the Supervisor of the State Prison be requested to inform this House, whether any further sums are due from said Contractors, and what measures have been, or are being taken to collect said claims.

It will be observed that there are two questions asked in

the resolution. The first is, "Whetner any further sums are due from said contractors?" and second, "What measures have been, or are being taken, to collect said claims?"

To the first I answer that since July 1st, 1871, when the claim amounted to \$32,627 55, the debt has increased about \$3700, making the sum due on the 1st inst. \$36,327 55, besides interest. To the second question I reply that repeated applications for payment were met by various excuses until excuses were exhausted, and then they flatly refused to pay the claim. It was evident, therefore, that more effective measures were necessary to enforce payment, and these were about to be instituted when the Counsel for the Contractors applied to be heard before the Board of Supervisors as to their reasons why the claim should not be paid. This was cheerfully accorded to them, and their Council received an attentive hearing. To the arguments and reasons thus presented on behalf of the contractors, as well as to the whole subject at issue, the Board gave an earnest and patient consideration which lead to the conclusion that the Contractors had entirely failed to show any just cause for withholding payment of the debt. In order to procure still further delay they sought to obtain the interposition of the Governor, who, however declined to take any action, but suggested a reference of the matter to a distinguished citizen for his opinion. The board readily consented to listen to such an opinion with respectful attention, and to give to it due weight, but declined to accept it as binding so long as they regarded the claim clearly equitable and just. With this understanding of the character of the reference, the counsel of the contractors expressed themselves entirely satisfied, and named a day to submit the case. When the time thus appointed by themselves arrived, they failed to appear or to give any reason for their absence. Another day was then chosen by them and with the same result. Believing that the contractors were not only trifling with the representatives of the State, but were also seeking merely to obtain delay, the President of the Board sought an interview with their senior counsel, who asked that the matter might be stayed for three or four weeks until the return of the contractor's agent, who was absent in a distant state. But when from this alleged cause, the delay, already great, was protracted to several months, the Board believed the contractor's altogether insincere in their professed willingness to submit

the case either to a referee or to the courts. This conclusion being forced upon us by the conduct of the contractors, the Supervisor was directed to bring an action against them for the recovery of the debt. This has been done, and a suit is now pending in the Mercer Circuit Court, and will be tried at the May term of that court.

The Congress of the United States has recently passed the act authorizing the erection in the city of Trenton, of a building for the use of the United States Courts, &c., and appropriated for that purpose the sum of two hundred and fifty thousand dollars.

Such a building has long been needed, and it is desirable

that every obstacle in the way of its speedy erection shall be removed.

Before any part of the appropriation made by Congress can be drawn from the treasury, the Legislature must cede jurisdiction (under certain restrictions) over the land that may be purchased for the purpose. The act passed at the last session of the Legislature is not sufficiently full and explicit.

The recent law of Congress seems to require additional action of the Legislature.

I herewith transmit the form of act usually passed by the States under similar circumstances. You will perceive by its terms that the State retains concurrent jurisdiction with the United States in and over the land, so that the civil and criminal process of the State of New Jersey be executed thereon.

A message was received from the Governor, at the hands of Mr. Hall, his Private Secretary, as follows:

STATE OF NEW JERSEY,
EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT,
TRENTON, March 15, 1872. }

Gentlemen of the Senate and General Assembly :

It is the duty of the Executive, from time to time, to communicate to the Legislature upon subjects which he may deem important, and to make such recommendations as to him may seem for the public good.

It has been decided in one of the states of the Union, that legislation which takes from the people of a municipality the right to govern themselves and choose their local officers, is unconstitutional. But waiving that question at this time, I am satisfied that such legislation is wrong in principle and pernicious in practice. The true principle of government is that they who pay the taxes should select not only their agents who assess and collect the funds to defray the expenses of administration, but also those who authorize, contract for and superintend improvements and disburse the money therefor. Officers should be responsible to the people immediately interested. The fear of popular displeasure will often keep officials from practices into which many fall where there is no responsibility to the people. The ballot-box is an effective monitor, and corrector of abuses. In other States where the Legislature has assumed the appointment of municipal officers the grossest misgovernment and most astounding frauds have been the result. Direct responsibility to the people, and frequent elections have been found to be the best preventive of official fraud.

Since the establishment of our State Government up to a recent period, the people of every municipality in New Jer-

sey, have controlled their local affairs. At the present time, the people of every city and township in this State, with a single exception, select their own officers. That exception is Jersey City. By an act passed at the last session of the Legislature the most important officers of the city government are appointed by the Legislature of the State. The Board of Public Works, the Board of Police Commissioners, and the Board of Fire Commissioners are composed of members not selected by the voters of the city, nor by their representatives, but by the members of the State Legislature, a majority of whom reside in distant parts of the State and have no means of knowing the wants and wishes of the citizens of Jersey City. The people are permitted to vote for a Mayor and Aldermen, but all the important functions usually vested in such officers are taken from them. The three Boards of Legislative Commissioners above named, compose the governing power of Jersey City. They disburse more money and have more patronage than the Legislature and all the State officers of New Jersey combined.

Why should Jersey City be governed by a rule different from that which prevails in all the other cities of the State? What have her people done that they should be deprived of the rights enjoyed by others? Why should the Legislature continue to hold and exercise the power over that city which belongs to her people? There can be no doubt that a large majority of the tax-payers of Jersey City desire a repeal of the present charter. That sentiment is almost unanimous with those who have no pecuniary interest in the continuance of the present law.

The alleged fraudulent practices of some of the members of the Boards it is not proper for me herein to discuss. The finding of indictments against them should not cause us to prejudice the accused. But whether caused by fraud or extravagance, it is a fact that Jersey City is now in debt nearly one-sixth the amount of the value of her taxable property, and that public works are projected which, if prosecuted at the same rate of cost as those now under way, will eventually bankrupt the city.

Under these circumstances I deem it my duty to call the attention of the Legislature to this subject. The people of Jersey City, groaning under the weight of taxation, have not

the power to relieve themselves. They appeal to the Legislature for relief. They ask only what our forefathers asked—the privilege of taxing themselves and the liberty of choosing their own rulers. Your session is drawing to a close, and unless something be done soon, the evils of which they complain will exist another year.

Some of the amendments now pending might perhaps mitigate those evils, but the only effectual cure is, to repeal all the sections of the present charter, which provide for the appointment of Commissioners by the Legislature. No remedy short of the absolute restoration of the Government to the citizens, will avail. I therefore recommend that all the Legislation of last year in respect to the Local Government of Jersey City, which authorizes Legislative Commissioners be repealed, and the control of her Municipal Affairs be restored to her people. Then will they enjoy the same privileges as their fellow-citizens in other sections of the State, and in common with them exercise the inestimable right of Local Self-Government.

Proceedings of a Public Meeting held in Gloucester County, March 6th, 1872, on the Proposed School Law now pending before the Legislature :

At an adjourned meeting of the Tax Payers of the County of Gloucester, held in Woodbury, March 6th, 1872, to take into consideration the proposed School Law, now pending before the Legislature, and to give expression to public opinion in relation thereto, the Committee appointed at the previous meeting to prepare resolutions, presented the following, which were adopted :

WHEREAS, We have been led to view with increasing concern the efforts making (already but to successful) to establish a central, absolute and uncontrollable power over the educational affairs of our State and assuming the right to dispense the funds raised for school purposes in such manner as is by them approved ; therefore,

1st. *Resolved*, That whilst we heartily approve of general education, and that all children should have an opportunity to acquire sufficient to fit them for the business of life, we recognize the pre-eminent right of the people to govern, under proper law the public schools, and we have full faith in the

virtue and intelligence of Jerseymen in all parts of the State, and in their capacity to manage the educational interests and to use their portion of the public moneys to educate their own children therein.

2. *Resolved*, That viewing some of the provisions of the existing school law as encroachments on the rights of the people to direct their own local affairs, and by its complication and costly machinery tending to a centralization of power, and imposing heavy burdens on tax payers who have already as much as, in the present depressed state of the Agricultural interest, can well be borne, we view with strong disapprobation the new features sought to be introduced tending to the increased centralization of power and much higher expense of our educational system.

3. *Resolved*, That we believe a plain, simple enactment providing for the application of the school moneys directly to the end proposed without adding costly and unnecessary officers, would be hailed with joy by a large majority of the people; and while we approve of the present mode of raising school moneys, we deem it right to point out some of what we consider mistakes in the proposed law now pending before the Legislature. First, on page 11, in report of the Educational Commission, the provision that all schools shall positively be kept open nine months in the year. Many in the rural districts not being able to spare their children so long, having to work for a living and to pay the heavy taxes, we think they should be kept open eight months; discretionary, however—to be left with trustees as to a longer period. Second page, 13; The provision for the appointment by the *Central Power* of Seven District Inspectors, which we believe entirely supernumerary and involving needless expense. Thirdly, We believe the county superintendents should give their undivided attention to the business and be properly paid therefor; at the same time we object to the almost absolute power given them to alter and divide districts irrespective of the rights or wishes of the people; and to their power to withhold moneys belonging to districts independent of trustees, and much prefer the law as it now stands in present law—Sec. 1, 26. Fourthly, on page 19; That part authorizing a mere majority to vote unlimited taxes or debts of which they may not pay one cent. We believe the provision as now existing, that all extraordinary assessments shall require a two-thirds

vote is the only safe one, unless coupled with the proviso that an equitable proportion thereof be raised by poll tax. Fifthly, page 21; We believe the restriction from all corporal punishment an unwise one. Sixthly, page 23; We view the State Normal School, as now conducted, a costly failure of the ends proposed, being mostly a local benefit, and chiefly useful to the few who can afford to attend it, while the great bulk of the taxpayers receive little benefit therefrom. Seventhly, page 26: The provision that no district shall be formed with less than seventy-five children, we consider unsuited to many sparsely settled rural districts. We think districts can best judge of their own circumstances, but would not propose that less than fifty should form one. Eighthly, page 27: Any provision making it obligatory to study singing and drawing, we deem an arbitrary requirement, subversive of individual rights. Ninthly, page 36: The proposal to establish high schools, the liberal and benevolent in theory, we believe, will practically result in taxing the working man who cannot afford to send his children to school one fourth of the time that his neighbors who can afford it may send his all the time, and may obtain a collegiate education, thus increasing instead of decreasing the disparity in the literary acquirements of the children of the State. Tenthly; We disapprove of the proposal to maintain some twenty-eight students at sectarian colleges, as oppressive to the already burdened tax payers and subversive of the boasted unsectarian character of our public instruction.

Resolved, That a copy of the proceedings and resolutions of this meeting be respectfully furnished to each member of our State Legislature, and be published in the papers of the county.

Mr. Parker, from the Special Committee, to whom was referred the subject of the Public Printing, presented the following report :

MAJORITY REPORT.

To the General Assembly :

The Special Committee appointed to investigate the Public Printing of the past three years and present session as to exorbitant prices and unnecessary amount of printing done, in view of better economy, respectfully report :

That they have carefully investigated and find that the printing expenses of the State for the three past years have not differed materially as to prices awarded by the Legislature, style of work done, or per centage of loss to the State through manner of giving it out (as shown in the usual shape of printing bill passed annually), and in manner of doing work (as shown in the minutes of the House and Journal of the Senate in past years) :

In view of better economy the committee submit the following offers to do the State printing of the present year.

Messrs. Pangborn, Dunning & Dear offer to do the whole of the printing of the State at thirty-five per cent. discount upon prices named in Senate bill No. 39, of the present session ; or to take parts of it at the following rates of discount upon prices named in said bill.

To print the Laws at ten per cent. discount.

To print the Legislative Documents at fifteen per cent. discount.

To print the House and Senate Journals at twenty per cent. discount.

To print the Current Printing at twenty-five per cent. discount.

All other work not herein enumerated, including all the job work of the executive departments twenty-five per cent. discount and give security if required for due performance of work.

J. R. Freese offers to do all the State printing, *or any part thereof*, for thirty-five per cent. discount upon the prices named in Senate bill No. 39, of the present session, and give bonds to the State in the sum of fifty thousand dollars for faithful performance of contract.

Thomas T. Kinney, of the *Newark Daily Advertiser*, will do the whole or any reasonable part of the State printing, at thirty-five per cent. discount.

Messrs. Murphy & Bechtel offer to do the whole of the State printing at thirty-five per cent. discount.

H. L. Bonsall offers to do the whole of the State printing at forty per cent. discount.

It is the opinion of the committee that it is desirable to give the whole of the State printing into the hands of any one person or firm, if economy can be otherwise accomplished.

At the rates named in the foregoing offers, as compared with the old rates, it is estimated that seven thousand eight hundred and twenty-seven dollars and five cents per annum may be saved to the State on the same amount of printing done, (see statement forward).

The Committee would further report that there has been an "*unnecessary amount*" of printing done, resulting in great waste and loss to the State; particularly under a joint resolution, in the year 1870, by which the public documents have been unnecessarily twice set up in type—once for distribution by members to their constituents, and again to furnish

the bound volumes—when one setting of type would answer both purposes, at a saving to the State of nearly five thousand dollars per annum, an expense now entailed upon the State by the joint resolution referred to.

The Committee recommend that the said joint resolution be repealed.

Likewise other necessary printing has been done in useless expansion of the bound volumes, particularly the minutes of the journal; and this unnecessary expense has been entailed upon the State by the provisions in the present shape of the annual printing bill, that “the printing shall be in the style in which the work was done in the year 1870.” A considerable sum of money may be annually saved by printing the volumes in a more condensed form; and the Committee recommend that the printing of *all* the volumes be done in the condensed style in which the *laws* of 1870 were printed; and further, that all the volumes and documents be paid for per 1000 ems and per token of 250 impressions, instead of per sheet of 16 pages.

The provisions of present form of act relative to the public printing, do not seem to be desirable in respect to the furnishing of paper.

Also, a needless quantity of the minutes and journal are printed, at a mere waste of money to the State.

The Committee therefore submit to the consideration of the Legislature a new form of an act relative to public printing, herewith, by which the waste shown may be saved and general economy carried out.

Unnecessary printing is also done in excessive supplies of miscellaneous matter, such as envelopes, diagrams, slips, &c. The Committee recommend that some more stringent rules be adopted in the Legislature, by which some one person shall have supervision of ordering the required quantity of such matter, and no more.

Publishing of the laws in the newspapers is an item of heavy expense to the State, and the matter therefore deserving the careful consideration of the Legislature, as to whether the publication of the laws in the newspapers had better be continued or not.

The Committee suggest that the State can save over \$40,000 per annum by abolishing the printing of the laws in the newspapers (costing, in 1871, \$45,194.70), and instead thereof, furnishing to every justice of the peace, every chosen freeholder, every commissioner of deeds, and every lawyer in the State, a bound copy of the laws. The Committee find that it would take 3000 copies to supply said parties; and consider that the present annual expense in the office of the Secretary of State for furnishing the laws to the newspapers (amounting, in 1871, to \$5,954.32), would be ample to cover all cost of increased number of volumes of the laws and expense of sending them out. It might, then, if desirable, be made a part of the enactment of all public laws of a local nature that they shall be published in the papers of the county or township that they affect, at expense of said county or township; and only statute laws published at State expense. Such a plan would seem no more than justice to taxpayers at large; it being of no interest to taxpayers at one end of the State to publish a law entirely of a local nature at the other end of the State. There seems to be no reason why the State should publish anything but statute laws, and it is probable that a distribution of volumes as suggested would obviate any necessity of publishing them.

The Committee are not prepared to *recommend* the change herein suggested in relation to publishing the laws in the newspapers as the best change that can be made, but having in view the enormous expense of the present system, submit one plan by which the expense can be very greatly reduced, and still furnish the laws to all of the public that have any special need of reference to them; and the committee trust to the wisdom of the Legislature to adopt the most judicious plan for better economy in the now very expensive plan of publishing the laws. If the present plan is continued, a saving of most of the sum now expended in the Secretary of State's office for furnishing the laws to newspapers (amounting in 1871 to \$5,954.32), may be made by enacting a supplement to an act relative to the office of Secretary of State and Register of the Prerogative; the present laws admitting of charges being made for proof copies of the laws furnished to each paper printing the laws, when actually but one proof copy is made and printed slips of same sent to various papers. The laws were printed in eighty-six papers last

year, and consequently one job paid for eighty-six times, or at that rate.

If publication of the laws in the newspapers be continued at all, the committee recommend that a supplement to the "Act relative to the office of Secretary of State and Register of the Prerogative" be enacted, by which only the actual work performed be paid for, instead of its being paid for eighty-six times as at present.

It is shown that the adoption of all the foregoing recommendations and suggestions would save to the State—

SUMMARY.

To accomplish the savings that it is shown may be made, the points of action would be to give the printing out to lowest bidder in parcels; to repeal the joint resolution of 1870; to adopt a new shape of printing bill, herewith submitted; to repeal the law by which the laws are published in the newspapers; or if continued, enact a supplement to the "Act relative to the office of the Secretary of State and Register of the Prerogative," wholly or in part, as may be desirable.

MINORITY REPORT.

To the General Assembly of the State of New Jersey :

The Special Committee appointed to investigate the State Printing for the past three years, respectfully report :

The printing for the past three years has been done in accordance with an act of the Legislature, and, upon careful examination and consultation with practical printers, they are of the opinion that the prices paid have been but fair and just. They are of the opinion that the form in which the Minutes of the Assembly and Journal of the Senate have been printed should be changed, and that the work should be done in a more compact manner, thus making a more convenient volume for use, and saving the State money now paid for work done in a manner not desirable to those who are compelled to use the volume so printed. But they find that the manner of printing this volume has been strictly in accordance with the act of the Legislature relating thereto. At a public meeting of the committee, several responsible parties proposed to do the entire printing of the State at a reduction of thirty-five per cent. on the price now charged. Two parties agree to take any part of the work at thirty-five per cent. less than the prices fixed by the last Legislature.—But your committee are of the opinion that it is not advisable to give any party a monopoly of the work, and do not believe the interests of the State would be subserved thereby. Your committee are of the opinion, that a large sum could be saved to the State by reducing the amount of printing, and that this could be done without materially reducing the circulation of pamphlets and documents published and distributed among the people of the State; and by prohibiting the twice setting up of documents and pamphlets in type, as we are informed has been done heretofore, when one setting up would have answered all purposes. Publishing the laws in the newspapers is an item of considerable expense to the State; but your committee deem this a wise provision of the Legislature, believing it right and proper that all the people should have an opportunity to see what laws have been passed in relation to all matters pertaining to the rights and

privileges of the people. A saving might be made in this and do no injustice to the people—viz.: by limiting the number of newspapers in each county in which the laws shall be published by the direction of the Legislature. We find no violation of the law on the part of those employed to do the work, nor does any fraud appear in the matter; and they do not find that the public printing has grown to “enormous proportions,” as alleged. The facts in the case are, that the amount paid in 1871 was but slightly in excess of the amount paid in 1867 or the intervening years; and we do not find that any work has been done except as ordered by the Legislature, and the charges always in accordance with the rates fixed by law—and the rates are no higher than would be charged to private parties for similar work, and your committee are of the opinion that a reduction of the price on press-work or composition would be unfair and unjust to the working man. Your committee are of the opinion that the contract system would not be advantageous, and that the State would not be benefitted thereby; at least, it has been found so in States where it has been practically tried.

Gentlemen of the Senate and General Assembly:

On the fourth day of April, eighteen hundred and sixty-six, a Joint Resolution was passed, authorizing the Governor to appoint a trustee to represent New Jersey in the establishment of a cemetery at Antietam, and to secure the removal and deposit therein of the remains of all the soldiers of this State, who were interred on or near that battlefield; provided the expense to the State should not exceed the sum of five thousand dollars.

Under a law of the State of Maryland incorporating the Antietam National Cemetery, New Jersey united with several of her sister States in this patriotic work, and has removed and reburied her dead soldiers at an expense of two thousand eight hundred and forty-six dollars and forty cents, leaving in the Treasury an unexpended balance of two thousand one hundred and fifty-three dollars and sixty cents.

The law passed by the Legislature of Maryland provides for the erection of a monument by the States that should join in the establishment of the cemetery. The monument is contracted for and will be placed in position during the present year. To aid in defraying the expenses of the monument the authorities of New Jersey have been called upon for the balance of the appropriation.

The Comptroller of this State, doubting if the Joint Resolution of eighteen hundred and sixty-six authorized the payment of moneys for the erection of a monument, submitted the question to the Attorney General, who has given an opinion that it is advisable to have further authority from the Legislature.

I herewith transmit letter of the Comptroller, the reply of the Attorney General, the correspondence with officers of the Cemetery Association, and a photographic design of the Proposed Monument.

It is evident that the trustees of the Antietam Cemetery contracted for the monument under the impression that each of the states that joined in the establishment of the cemetery, intended that part of the moneys appropriated should be expended on a monument.

The peculiar phraseology of the joint resolution passed in New Jersey, in the opinion of the Attorney General, does not clearly authorize the expenditure of money for a general monument, although a liberal construction might authorize a monument to the New Jersey dead, and we think that it would be better to have additional legislation.

There are now buried in this cemetery the remains of four thousand six hundred and seventeen Union Soldiers. Of these, about fourteen hundred are unknown, and as it is impossible to ascertain how many of these were citizens of the respective States, it is proposed to apportion equally among the States interested in this class of dead, whom the monument is especially designed to commemorate.

Under these circumstances I direct the attention of the Legislature to the subject, and recommend that so much of the aforesaid unexpended balance as will defray New Jersey's proportion of the expense of erecting the proposed monument, on the battle field of Antietam be appropriated for that purpose.

The Joint Committee met on Monday at noon. Present, Messrs. Williams, Taylor and Cole, of the Senate, and Messrs. Horn, Marter and Smalley, of the House.

The Committee investigated the charges brought forward by a certain P. McCowan against the Superintendent of the Home, Captain Wackenshaw, and also in part against the surgeon, Dr. Dougherty, thoroughly, by calling and examining witnesses, as well as by personal inquiry from the inmates, and thereupon unanimously come to the conclusion that the charges aforesaid were made without the least shadow

of truth, and have no foundation whatever. On the contrary, they find that the Home is conducted in an admirably good manner, and its condition in regard to cleanliness, discipline and wise economy are excellent. The food is sufficient in quantity and of good quality, there being a satisfactory variety to secure the health of the inmates. The Committee are also of the opinion that, as the number of inmates of the Home is necessarily increasing every year, on account of old age and infirmities caused from wounds received in defence of this country, the Legislature should help this benevolent institution with proper legislation. The Committee furthermore state that they consider it wise and proper to ask the authorities in Washington to continue the Home, believing it a great benefit for the old crippled soldiers of New Jersey to be thus provided for in their native State, near their homes and friends.

At a special meeting of Trenton Typographical Union, No. 71, held March 23d, 1872, the following Preamble and Resolutions were unanimously adopted :

WHEREAS, We, the members of Trenton Typographical Union, No. 71, as well as a large majority of our fellow craftsmen throughout the State, have been watching the progress of our present Legislature in its investigation of the "Printing Frauds," so called, with a great deal of interest, as we consider its action in the matter will have a great deal to

do with the future progress of the "Art Preservative" in this State; and whereas, the report of the majority of the Investigating Committee would seem to favor the idea of saving money to the State Government at the expense of the laboring class, rather than by a due discretion in the quantity of printing the State may have executed:

AND WHEREAS, The contract system, or giving the work to the lowest bidder, will have the effect either to reduce the grade of the work to such an extent as to prove a disgrace to the State, or, eventually, take from the pockets of the laboring man, whose interests the State should protect, the profits the contractor *must have* on his work;

AND WHEREAS, We know the work for the State, as now done, at its own price, will compare favorably, both in quality and price, with that of any of our sister states, and believing if the contemplated reduction in price is made, or the work given out to the lowest bidder, the reverse will be the case, and eventually seriously operate against our interests; therefore, be it

Resolved, (1), That, while we have no objection to any condensation or reduction in the amount of Printing the Legislature may see fit to make, in order to economize and lighten the expense of the Government, yet we, in common with our typographical brethren throughout the State, do most emphatically protest against any reduction in the prices now paid, deeming them no more than sufficient to enable the printer to do the work well, and make a fair profit.

Resolved, (2,) That this Preamble and Resolutions be placed in the hands of our Representatives in the Legislature, and be published in the newspapers throughout the State.

WHEREAS, The Federal Government is at peace with the whole world; our national grievances referred to arbitration, and in due process of settlement; our people prosperous, and the development of our territory and national resources progressing with an unparalled success; AND WHEREAS, The time is not far distant, when under the provisions of the Constitution of the United States, a National Executive for a term of years from 1873 to 1877 is to be chosen; and

WHEREAS, Many of the blessings which we are to-day enjoying, are in a great measure due to the wise, firm, vigorous, economical, and patriotic administration of the present Executive, His Excellency, Ulysses S. Grant, President of the United States; therefore,

Resolved, That the House of Assembly of New Jersey, coming as it does fresh from the people of our beloved State, and therefore expressing the wishes, desires and purposes of the people of the same, do hereby express their entire approbation and endorsement of the administration of our Federal affairs by President Grant, and regard the many wise acts of the Government in his hands, as the expression of a patriotic desire upon his part, to make the country united, free, prosperous, great and happy.

2. *Resolved*, That in the proposed civil service reform we see a wise determination to root from the government of the republic the abuses and corruptions which have held full sway for over half a century, which abuses materially aided in culminating the rebellion of 1861 by the misguided Southern Democracy.

3. *Resolved*, That in the unprecedented reduction of a public debt, as shown in the payment of the extraordinary sum of three hundred millions of dollars since March, 1869, and a saving thereby, during that time, in the payment of interest alone, amounting to \$18,203,915, aggregating at the rate of \$273,600 payment per day for every day of and during the present administration, is an exhibit challenging at once the admiration of the world, and commending itself to the friends of economy of the faithful collection and disbursements of the revenue and consequent good to all classes of the people.

4. *Resolved*, That in the action of General Grant in the matter of the purchase of the Island of San Domingo, we

recognize that sterling integrity characteristic of the true patriot in which he, by his course therein, has shown that his belief is, that the President is not the master but the servant of the people.

STATE OF NEW JERSEY,

To the House of Assembly:

I return to the House of Assembly, where it originated, Assembly Bill No. 129, entitled "An act to revise and amend the charter of the City of Elizabeth, approved March 4, 1863, and the several supplements thereto," with my objections.

My first objection to this Bill is, that it requires *three fourths* of all the members of the City Council to pass certain ordinances. The present charter of the City of Elizabeth requires that every ordinance passed by the City Council shall, before it take effect, be presented to the Mayor, and if he does not approve the same, he shall return it with his objections, and that in such case the ordinance shall not take effect unless *two thirds* of all the members of the City Council pass the same, and that the ayes and nays shall be entered on the

journal. The law of 1863 also requires that before the final passage of any ordinance involving the expenditure of money it shall be published for two weeks in a paper printed in the City of Elizabeth, between its second and third reading. No city charter in this State gives greater security against hasty legislation or the improper appropriation of money. The ordinance must be published for two weeks before it comes up for final action, in order to give the people information as to its object, and enable them to be heard in protest if it be objectionable, and if, after favorable action by the votes of a majority of all the members of Council, the Mayor should veto, *two-thirds* of all the members are necessary to make it take effect. To require *three-fourths* of all the members to pass an ordinance in the first instance would often block the wheels of city government in respect to legitimate and proper legislation. I know of no State, County or City government, where such a vote is required. The Constitution of the State of New Jersey might with equal propriety have required three-fourths of all the members of the Legislature to make an appropriation. Indeed, the present charter of Elizabeth gives greater security to the people than does the constitution of our State, for a bill or joint resolution appropriating money can be passed, after its return by the Executive, by a mere majority of all the members of each House of the Legislature, while in the city of Elizabeth, after the veto of the Mayor, the vote of two-thirds of all the members of Council is required. To demand that the votes of three-fourths of all the members of a legislative body before the interposition of a veto shall be necessary to pass a law or ordinance, is against the spirit of that foundation principle of popular government which gives the majority the right to rule.

I also object to this Bill because of the extraordinary expense the creation of the new officers under it will bring upon the tax-payers of the city. There is a disposition in all departments of government, National, State, and Municipal, to create offices, often with high salaries, and unless the office be necessary an additional burthen is thereby placed upon the people. This Bill provides for a Comptroller at a salary of four thousand dollars, with clerical aid without limit for himself and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and still retains all the present salaried officers with but little to do, because under this Bill with the extraordinary powers

given the Comptroller, he absorbs most of the duties of the other officers. If I were satisfied that the majority of the people of the City of Elizabeth desired and needed the expensive Department of Finance provided for in this Bill, I would not interpose the objection of expense, but in the absence of such conviction, and with the protest of a large number of citizens against this feature of the proposed law, I, for this reason, among others, return the Bill for reconsideration.

Every municipality which is in debt should have a Sinking Fund to provide for the liquidation of that debt. If provision had not already been made for a Sinking Fund in the City of Elizabeth, I would think that part of this Bill which provides for the appointment of Commissioners of Sinking Fund important, but the Act of March 31, 1864, expressly provides for a Sinking Fund for the city of Elizabeth, and constitutes certain officers elected by the people or appointed by the immediate representatives of the people of that city, such Commissioners.

In the present bill there is no provision for an official oath or bond to be given by the three Commissioners of the Sinking Fund. I am informed that an amendment has been or will be inserted in a bill now pending in the House of Assembly to remedy this defect, and if it should become a law before the reconsideration of this Bill, it would meet this objection. It is possible that the twenty-second section of the Charter of 1863 would also cure this omission. That would depend upon a legal construction of the question whether that Act would apply to officers created after the passage of the Act; but the requirement to compel bond of the Commissioners should be clear and explicit. The powers given by this bill to the Commissioners, in conjunction with the Comptroller, are very great, and large amounts of money are placed in their custody and control. Under such circumstances, in this day of large city expenditures and temptation to improper use of the public moneys, the law-making power should be certain that every security is required to be given by public officers entrusted with the public moneys. Not only the Comptroller, but each Commissioner should be required to give bond.

The last objection is to the large powers given to the Comptroller and Commissioners of the Sinking Fund. I

will not refer to all the provisions of the bill on this head, but call attention to the fact that, among other things, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund can direct the Treasurer, who is an officer giving bond, where to deposit the funds of the city, they can deposit the funds of the city, not only in any bank or banks, but in any place or places in the City of Elizabeth, whether a public depository or not, to be under their control and custody, and paid out by their direction. This bill also gives them power to buy and sell the bonds of the city and to loan the public moneys on demand or call, without any provision as to rate of interest. These and other provisions of this bill clothe the Comptroller and these Commissioners with authority over the moneys of the city more absolute and more dangerous than any other city charter in New Jersey gives, so far as I have been able to discover.

There is no doubt the present charter of the City of Elizabeth needs some amendment, and I would very cheerfully sign a bill properly framed for that purpose, but I can not affix my name to a bill which, in my opinion, has so many objectionable features as the one now under consideration.

With the veto power of the Mayor, which cannot be overridden in any case but by a two-third vote of all the members of Council, with the additional protection of publication in case of a proposition to appropriate money, and with the further restriction that not a dollar can be drawn from the treasury without warrant signed by the Mayor, the people of Elizabeth, under the oversight of the present careful, honest and prudent incumbent of the Mayoralty of that city, will certainly be protected until an amendatory law can be passed without the objectionable features of this bill.

MAJORITY REPORT.

To the House of Assembly :

The Committee of the House appointed to inquire into the expediency of establishing an Asylum for the Deaf and Dumb of this State respectfully report, that they find the number of these unfortunates in the State to be about one hundred and twenty, of whom forty-nine are now maintained and taught at institutions in other states. The laws of this State appropriate three hundred dollars per annum for the maintenance and tuition of each pupil, and an additional thirty dollars for the clothing of such pupils as are not possessed of sufficient means to provide suitable clothing.

The expense, therefore, of the support and tuition of the forty-nine persons who avail themselves of the benefits of the law is about fifteen thousand dollars per annum.

That it is eminently right and proper for the State to assume the care and tuition of these afflicted people, there can be no question. A large proportion of them are the children of indigent parents, and when large sums are annually expended for the education of the other children of the State, it is but just that the comparatively small sum required should be expended to extend the benefits of education to those who by their peculiar affliction are shut out from the enjoyment of the advantages of our educational system.

Many of these children and their parents naturally object to their being sent to the institutions of other States, and their objections have heretofore been met by the statement that the number of deaf mutes in the State was insufficient to warrant the establishment of a State asylum, and that they could be maintained more economically in institutions already established.

In the opinion of the committee both of these objections have lost whatever force they may once have had. Doubtless many more children would avail themselves of the benefits of such an institution were it once established in the State, and after the first outlay, the annual expense of the maintenance of all who might apply would be but little greater than the amount now expended for the benefit of a limited number.

The committee therefore recommend that the Legislature authorize the establishment of a State asylum for the deaf and dumb, and they herewith present a bill with that object.

MINORITY REPORT.

To the House of Assembly :

I most respectfully dissent from the views, and am unable to concur in the recommendations of the majority of the committee appointed by your honorable body to take into consideration, and report upon the expediency of establishing an asylum for deaf mutes, for the following reasons :

First. The whole number of deaf mutes, for which provision is made, is only forty-eight ; not a sufficient number to warrant the establishing of a home institution for their care and instruction.

Second. Ample provision is now made for these unfortunate persons, in the institutions of other states, of high character, and to which, admission is easy.

Third. The expense attending the care and instruction of the deaf mutes is much less, under the present arrangement, than it would be in any institution which might now be established by the State ; while no new institution, inaugurated at the present time, could offer the inmates any such facilities and advantages as those of the institutions where they now are. As the deaf mutes are, at present, liberally provided for by the State, in a manner that gives them all the protection, care, and instruction that their unfortunate condition demands ; and as the building now used by the Soldier's

Children's Home, in a short time will be no longer required for the purpose at present used, it would seem expedient to let this matter rest until that time, when the State can quickly and economically establish, at that place, such an asylum as is required for the deaf and dumb.

While the care of deaf mutes is a noble charity, and it is incumbent on the State to deal generously in the disposition of its public bounties, it does not seem, to the undersigned, that any motive of state pride would justify the expenditure that would be involved in any plan for now establishing an institution for the care and instruction of deaf mutes.

To the House of Assembly :

I return to the House of Assembly, where it originated, Bill No. 147, entitled "A further supplement to the act entitled 'An act to create from parts of the Town of Orange, and the Townships of Caldwell and Livingston, in the county of Essex, a new Township to be called the township of Fairmount,' approved March 11, A. D., 1862," with my objections thereto.

This bill empowers the Township Committee of the township of West Orange, to divide certain territory named therein, into one or more police districts. It creates the office of Police Justice of the township of West Orange, and enacts that the said Police Justice shall be entitled to use and exercise the like power, authority and jurisdiction in all criminal matters and complaints arising in said township as the justices of the peace in and for the several counties of this State, are or may be by law, entitled to use and exercise.— The bill then provides that the Governor of this State shall from time to time appoint some fit person to be the police justice of said township, who shall hold his office for the like term, and be entitled to the like fees as justices of the peace.

I object to this mode of appointment of a police justice. The Constitution of New Jersey provides that justices of the peace shall be elected by the people of the several townships and wards. Whether the term "Justice of the Peace," as used in the Constitution means the magistrate as he originally existed, clothed only with criminal powers, and divested of the civil jurisdiction which has been given by statute is a mooted question. If this be so, in what does the Police Justice to be appointed under this bill differ from Justice of the Peace except in name, and why should not the mode of election which the Constitution prescribe be adhered to?

But suppose there be no Constitutional objection to the method of appointment provided for in this bill, it is in

violation of the very principle condemned in my recent special message on the subject of Legislative Commissions. Centralization of power is dangerous, whether it be vested in the Legislative or Executive Department of Government. If the Governor be authorized to appoint a Police Justice for the township of West Orange, upon the same principle, authority may be given him to appoint similar officers throughout the State, and his immense patronage in respect to officers whose duties are local, would be an infringement upon the spirit of the Constitution, and in antagonism to our popular form of government. There is safety in confining each branch of government within its legitimate sphere.

I am unwilling to sign a bill which gives to the Executive powers that encroach on the legitimate province of the people in the selection of their local officers. I think the legal voters of the township of West Orange should be trusted to elect their police justice, and therefore I return this bill for reconsideration.

Mr. Canfield from the Committee appointed to investigate the cost of a new wing of the State Prison, made the following report:

To the House of Assembly :

The Committee appointed to investigate the cost of the new wing of the State Prison, would respectfully report:

That they have given considerable time and attention to the matter of the investigation authorized by the resolution adopted by this House. That upon looking over the books of account and vouchers contained in the Treasurer's Office, your Committee decided to confine their labors to the bills for work, stone and materials furnished on account of the masonry of said wing.

1st. Because these items constitute by far the greater amount of expense incurred in constructing said wing, amounting in the aggregate to the sum of \$39,022.37 for materials furnished, and \$39,112.86 for work done, making *in toto* the sum of \$78,135.23, for the item of masonry alone.

2nd. Because the parties connected with the mason work reside in Trenton, and the necessary examinations could be held without expense to the State.

Your Committee would further report that they have examined all the vouchers on file, item by item, have taken copies of the same, and that upon examination of the same they were of the opinion that actual measurement of the building should be made, and they therefore designated Mr. Samuel Prior to make such measurements, and that he has performed the duty assigned to him to the satisfaction of your committee. That this measurment was prompted by the fact that the vouchers showed on their face an amount of masonry too great for such a building to contain under the plans and specifications. That upon the report of Mr. Prior being handed in, your committee found large discrepancies in the amount of rough masonry and in the amount of flagging between said report and the vouchers on file. These discrepancies were afterwards explained by Mr. Galager, the architect, and by Mr. Johnson, the mason, who did the brickwork.— Their explanations were that the excess of rough stone work charged for, over what appeared by actual measurement, was accounted for by the fact that the old cellar under a portion of the floor of the building had been filled to the depth of eight feet with solid masonry, the plans calling for but four feet in

depth, and that this was deemed advisable and ordered to be done by the commissioners in charge of the building.

The excess of flagging was accounted for by Mr. Galager, by stating that the flags first procured for the floors were deemed unsuitable for that purpose, not being of the proper shape, being of such size and shape that the Masons, in laying them, could not break joints, and were afterwards laid down outside of the building, and others were procured for the floors, and that the amount charged for the flags used outside, and for laying the same had been deducted from the cost of the wing, and charged to "outside work," and that this fact would appear in the Treasurer's Report of next year. These explanations were deemed satisfactory, although they did not appear from the vouchers at all, and your Committee would suggest that the vouchers in future, be made out more fully, stating on their face, facts such as these which were understood only after examination and explanation. Your Committee would state that after careful investigation, they are of the opinion that no false or fraudulent charges have been made in the matters herein before referred to, and that the east wing of the State Prison is a building contracted in a substantial and workmanlike manner, and although costing so large a sum, amounting in the aggregate, to between \$140,000 and \$150,000, the vouchers for which are not all in, yet, from the evidence before them, they cannot say that in the matters they have examined, the charges are exorbitant.

Your Committee would call attention to the cost of what might be called the supervision or superintending of the construction of the building in question, which cost to them appears large. From the report of the Treasurer, there appears to have been paid on this account the following sums, to wit:

To the Commissioners of the new wing,	\$7,170 00

If there be added to the last named sum the amount paid to R. P. Gallager, Architect,	3,500 00

Paid on this account up to January 19th, 1872, as per vouchers on file. This amount paid for supervision of a building costing, say \$150,000, and built by contract, to your Committee appears large. By the act authorizing the extension of the State Prison, Pamphlet Laws, 1869, p. 1446, the Treasurer was authorized to pay upon the warrant of the Comptroller to the Commissioners for their services, "at the rate of five dollars per day, for every day they may be *necessarily and actually engaged therein*." This pay appears to your Committee to have been running on from day to day from the passage of said act, whether they were necessarily and actually engaged therein or not, and they understand that on some days the Commissioners, or at least all of them, were not so engaged. The right to so charge, while it appears to be customary by State Commissioners, seems unwarranted by the said act.

Your Committee were empowered to report by bill, if they so desired.

As to the matter of the masonry first herein before referred to, they think no legislation can affect it, or is necessary. As to the matter of the supervision last referred to, the act of 1869 is explicit in its wording, as much so as any your Committee could offer. Therefore none is necessary in this particular.

Your Committee would recommend the payment of twenty-five dollars to Mr. Prior for measuring the east wing, which amount they agreed to pay him, and that the item be inserted in the Incidental bill of this year.

WHEREAS, Experience teaches that it is necessary for the preservation of the principles of any government which is intended to secure public liberty, that new guards against the mischievous inroads of corruption, should from time to time be erected, and new guarantees of the safety of the people established.

AND WHEREAS, The recent progress of events in this State has shown that the inestimable right of local self government is threatened with complete overthrow.

AND WHEREAS, By some unaccountable oversight, the present Constitution, though in spirit requiring it, makes no provision in express terms, for the submission to the Governor of joint resolutions, by which legislation of the most important character has been and may be accomplished, and money without limit has been and may be drawn from the public treasury.

AND WHEREAS, The law passed in 1846, which required such resolution to be submitted to the Governor has just been attempted to be repealed by an act to be passed over the executive veto, and a great safeguard against unwise legislation thereby prostrated.

AND WHEREAS, Our present Constitution has proved ineffective to stay the march of irresponsible power, or to protect the rights and property of the citizen.

AND WHEREAS, All political power is inherent in the people, and government is instituted for the protection, security and benefit of the people, and they have the right at all times to reform the same whenever the public good may require it; therefore be it

Resolved, That it is expedient to call without delay a Convention to prepare a Constitution, which will secure the citizens against the recurrence of those evils which present constitutional guarantees, have been found insufficient to prevent, and provide a system of government for the people in the State, and in subordinate communities more regardful of private right and public freedom, and more suitable to increased population and wealth, and more in accordance with advanced political knowledge than that which was framed twenty-eight years ago.

The deliberations of the Ninety-Sixth General Assembly, will close in a few moments.

Let me first thank you for the kindly sentiments expressed toward myself in the resolutions just adopted. The assistance which I have received during the session at one time or another, from every gentleman of this House, has done much to relieve the Speaker, and to aid him in the discharge of his arduous and often times perplexing duties. With a full heart, all I have to say in reply can be said in three words "I thank you."

Every face here that I have been daily watching for three months is fixed in memory, and each will hereafter revive some pleasant association.

It is a source of regret to all of us that while we have done some service in behalf of Education, we have left much undone in postponing to the next session the adopting of the general educational bill proposed by the Commissioners.

Had the people of the State become familiar with the admirable provisions of this bill, as they will become familiar with them before another Legislature meets, its adoption at this session might have been certain.

Its system of visiting or inspecting schools is one of its most attractive features, and one that has steadily increased in popularity wherever it has been adopted.

If the bill is defective in any one particular, it would seem

to be in not providing that every child of the State SHALL, in one way or another, receive, at least, a fair education. The right of the State to demand the education of its children, and to see to it, is a Divine Right, and should be religiously exercised.

In conclusion, let me remind you how much we are all indebted to our gentlemanly and trusty Clerk, Mr. Sinnickson Chew, for the regular, correct and careful manner in which the business of the House has been conducted.

I now declare this House adjourned *sine die*.

Mr. Dutcher moved that the House do now proceed to the Senate for the purpose of adjourning *sine die*.

The Speaker and members then proceeded to the Senate Chamber, and informed the Senate that the General Assembly had adjourned without day.

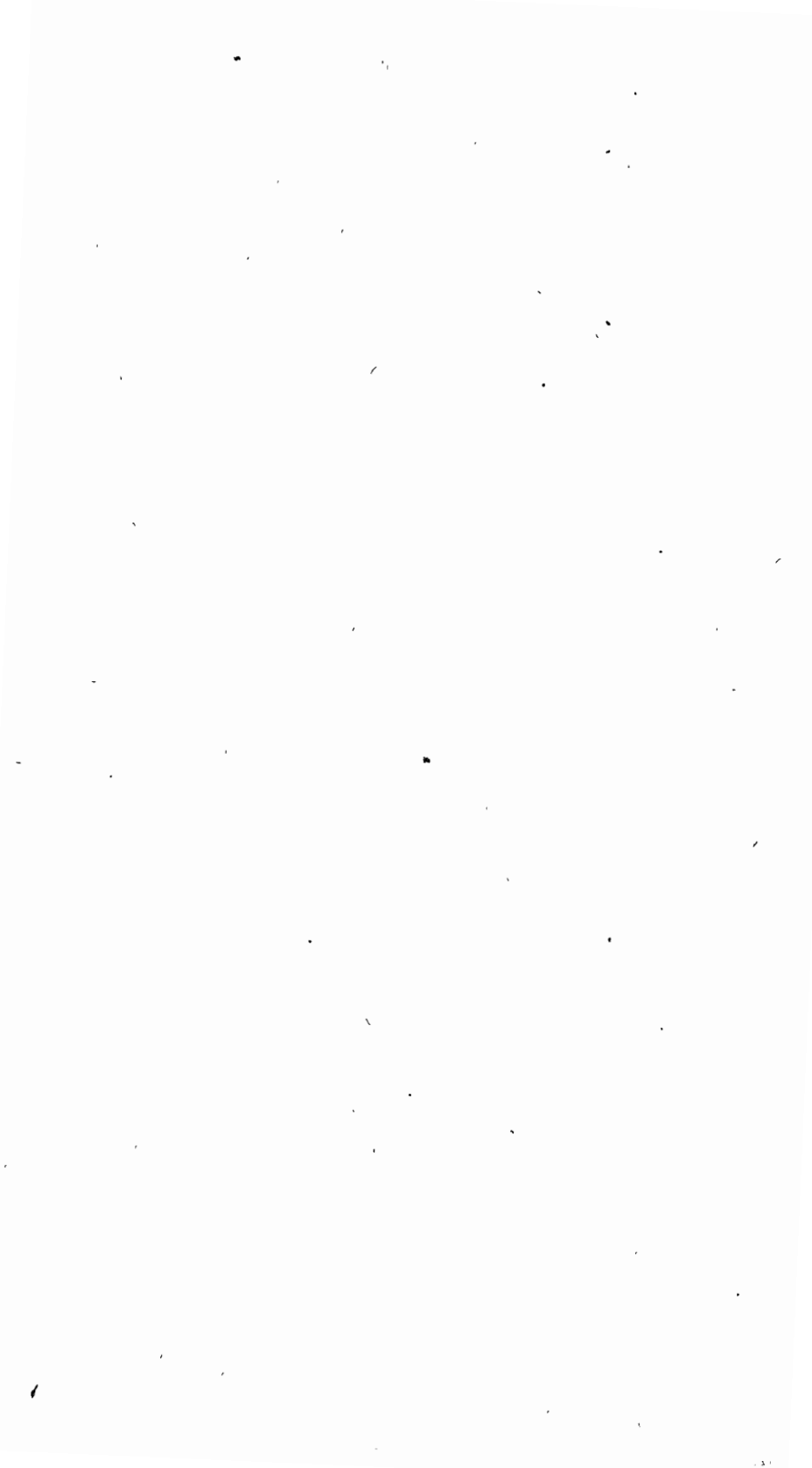
