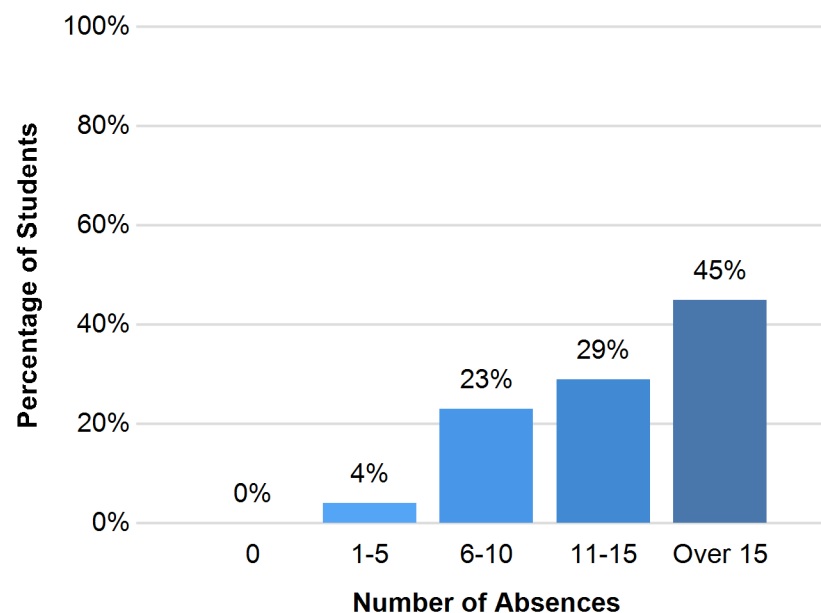

This graph shows the percentage of K-12 students by the number of days they were absent during the school year.





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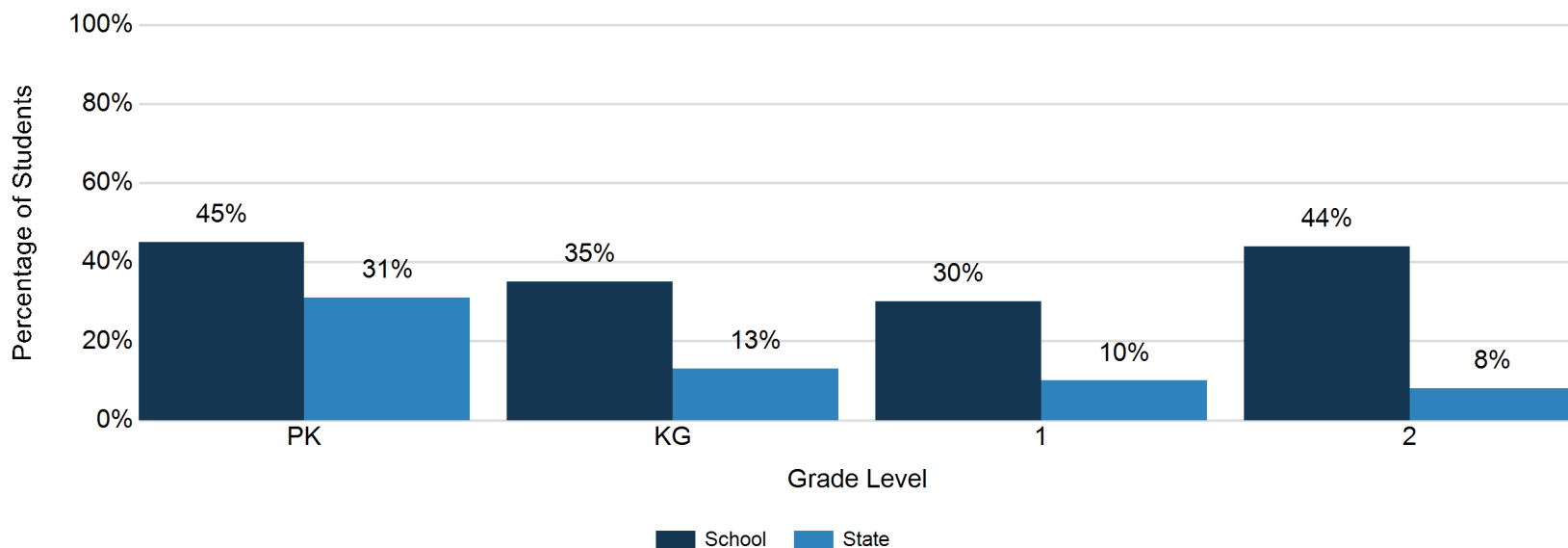
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Chronic Absenteeism by Grade

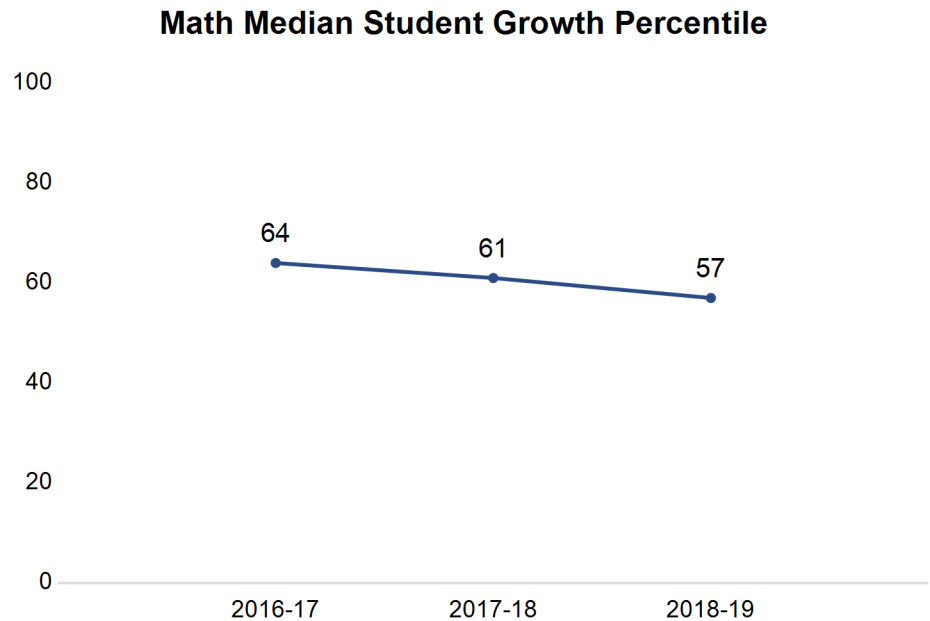

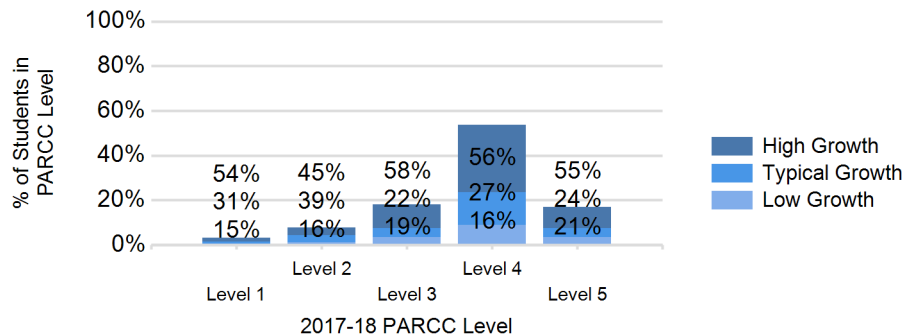

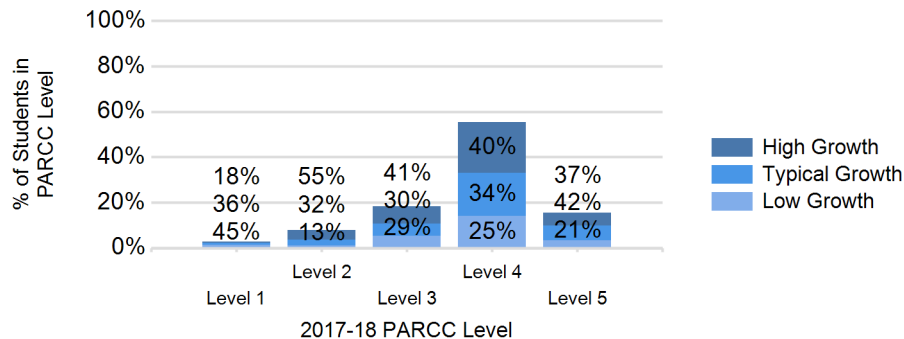
Student Growth by Performance Level

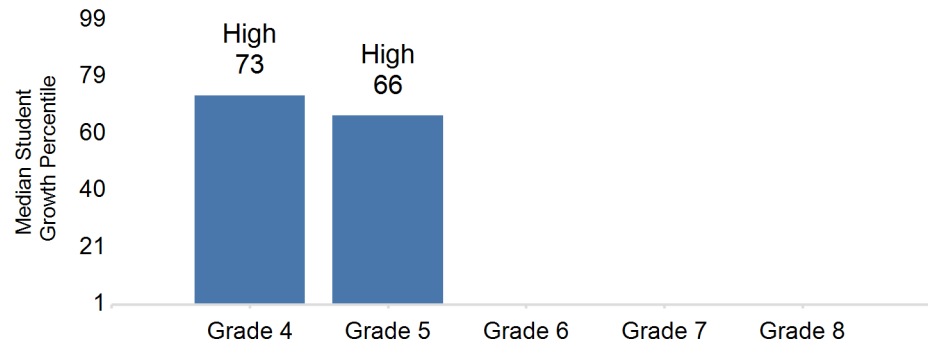

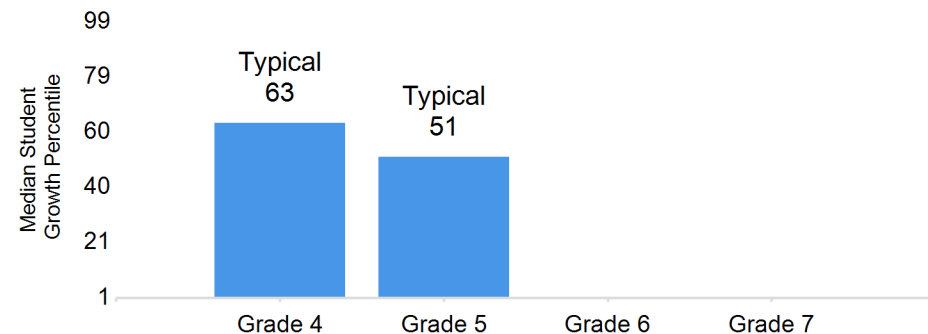
Student Growth by Grade

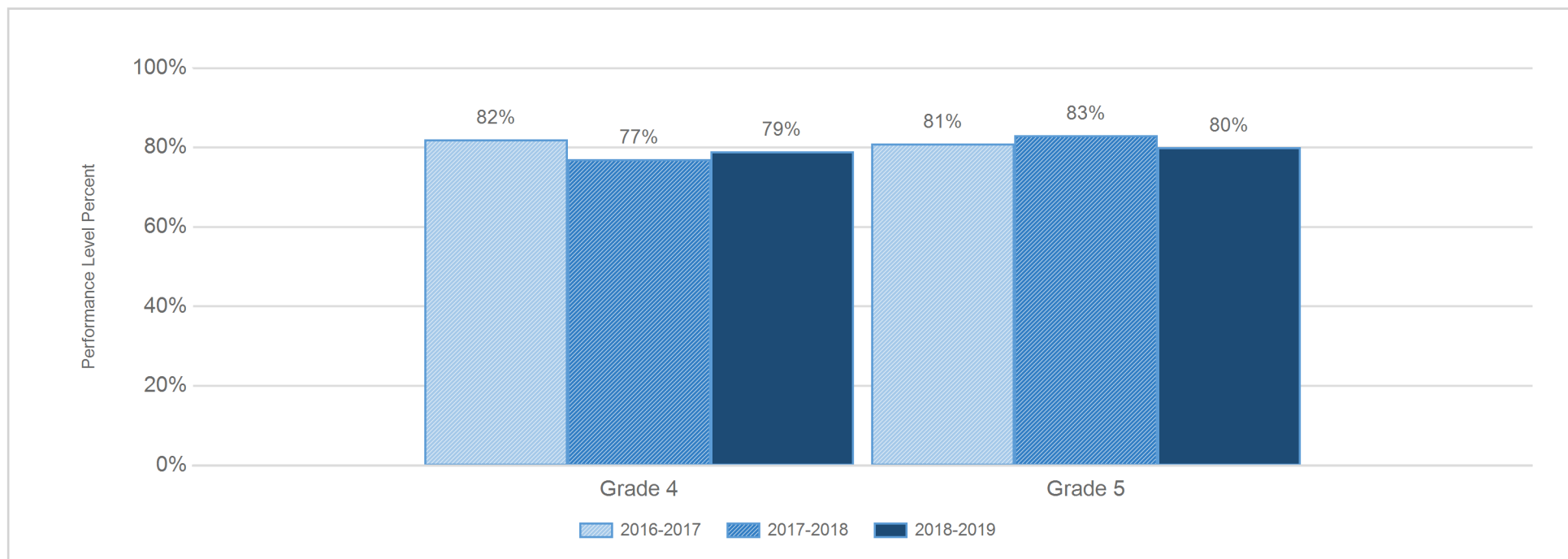

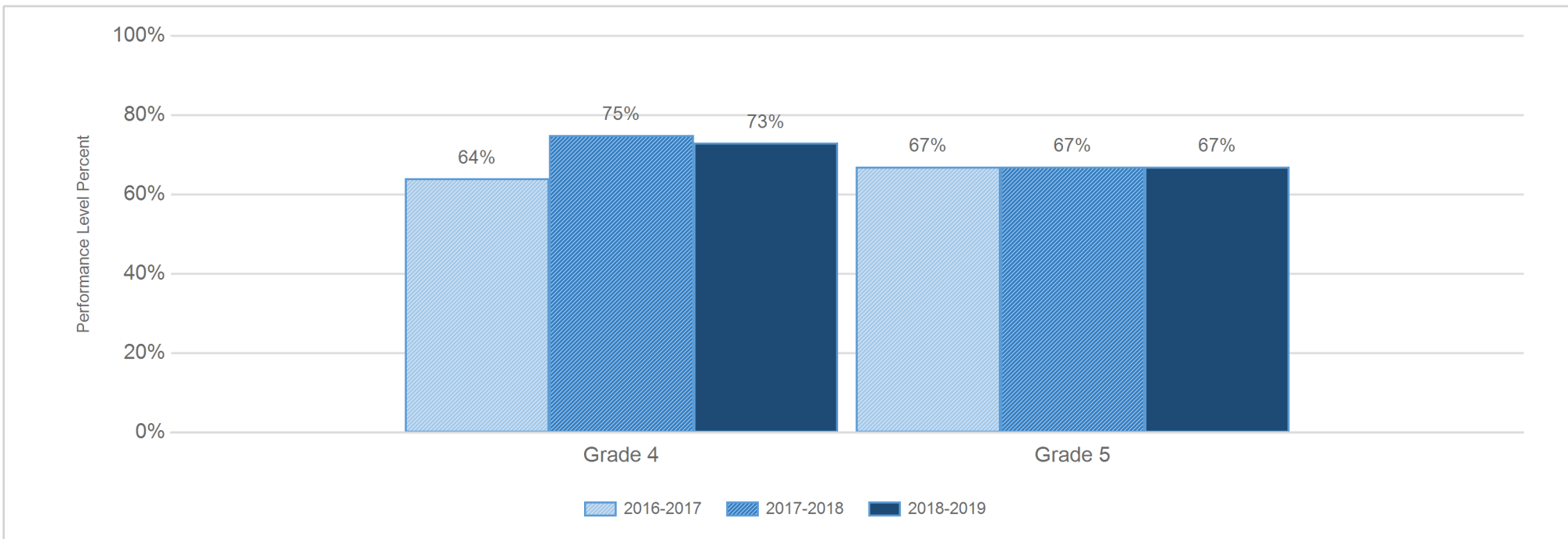

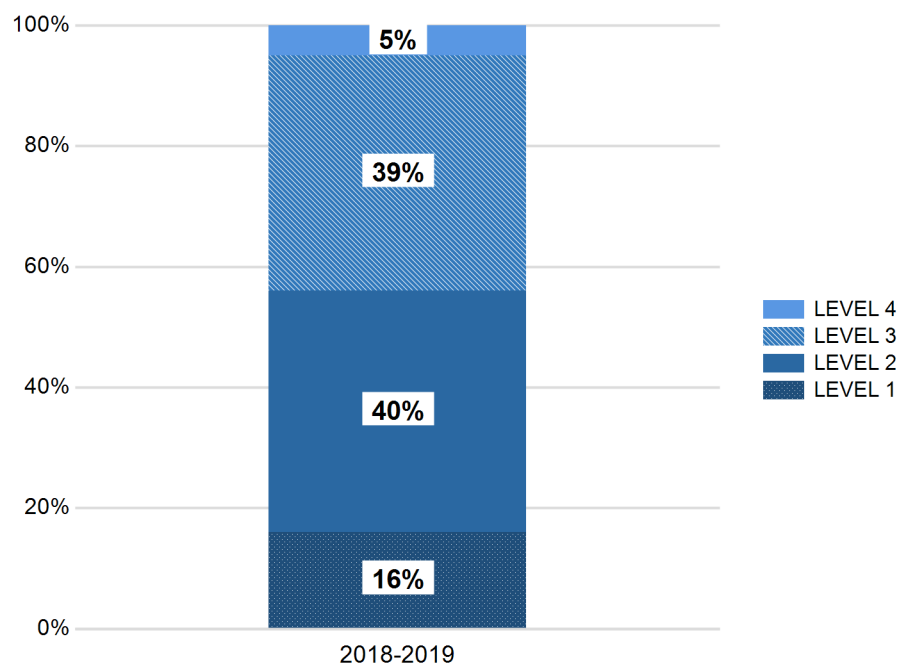

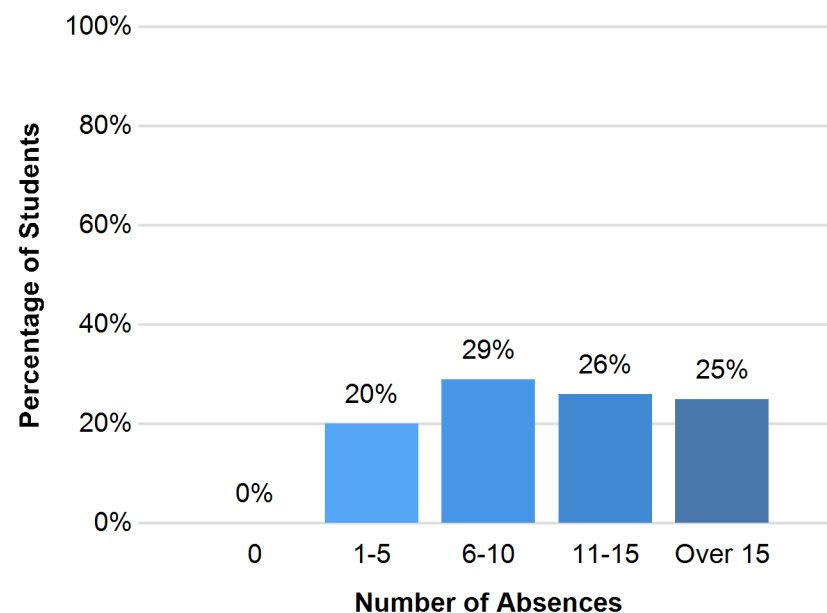

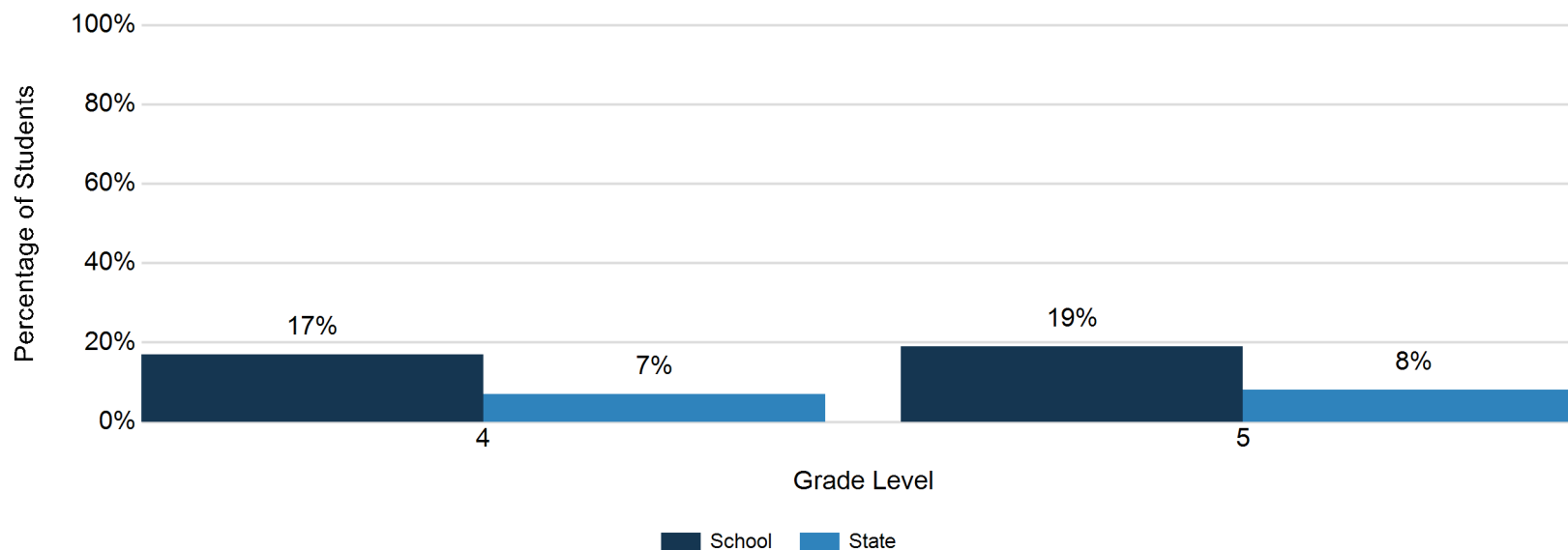
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Chronic Absenteeism by Grade

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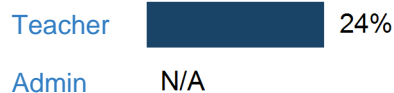

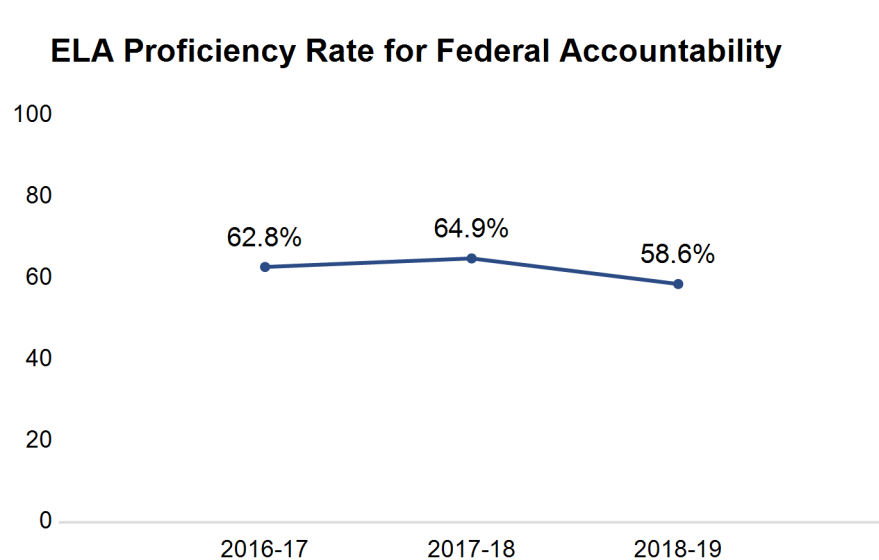
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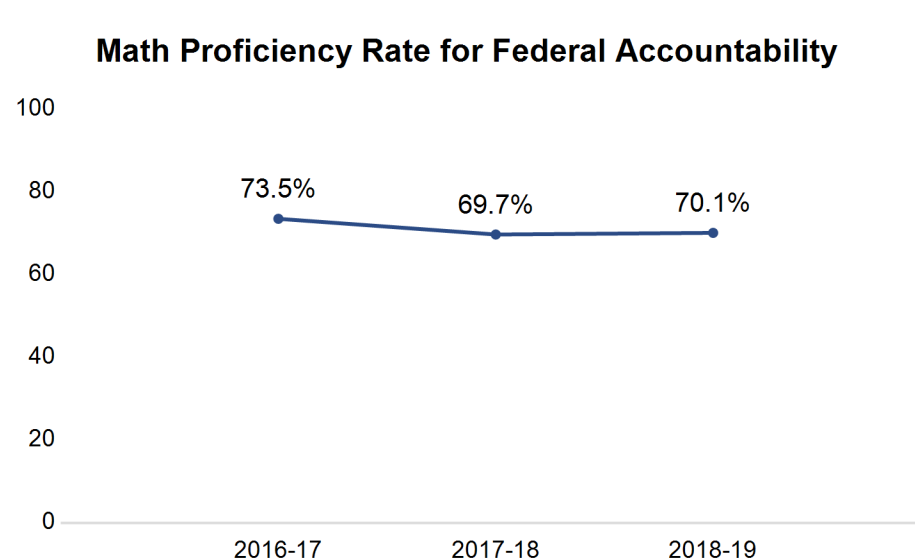

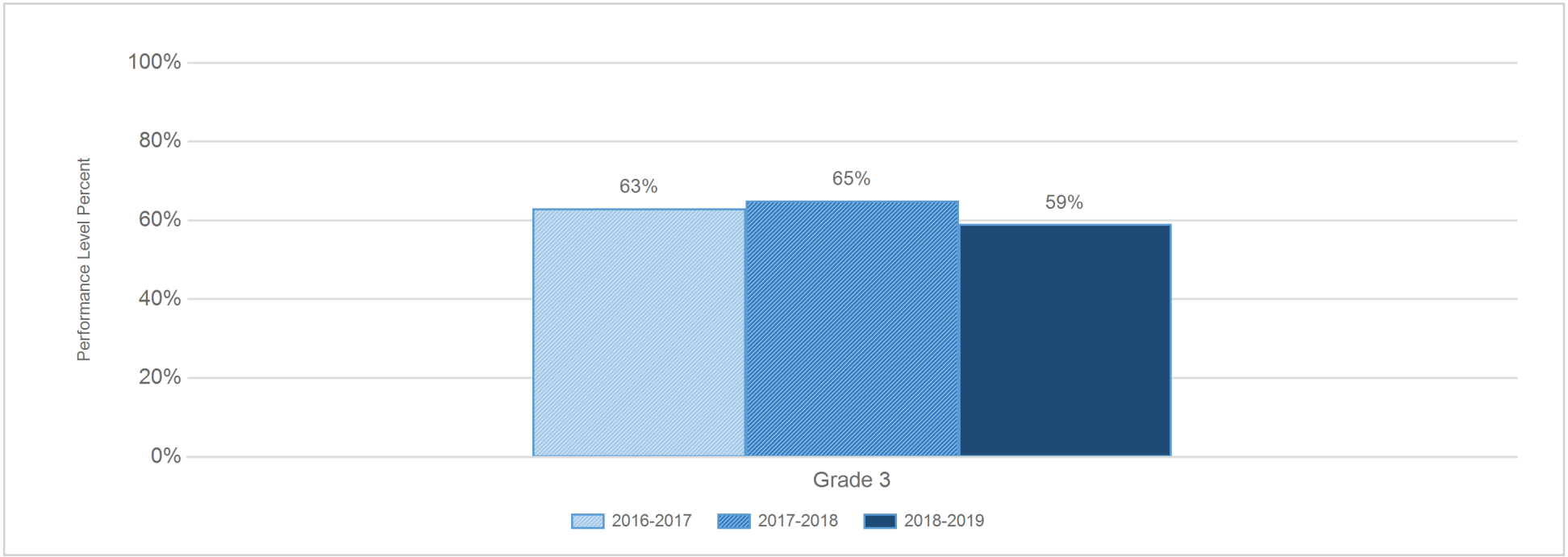

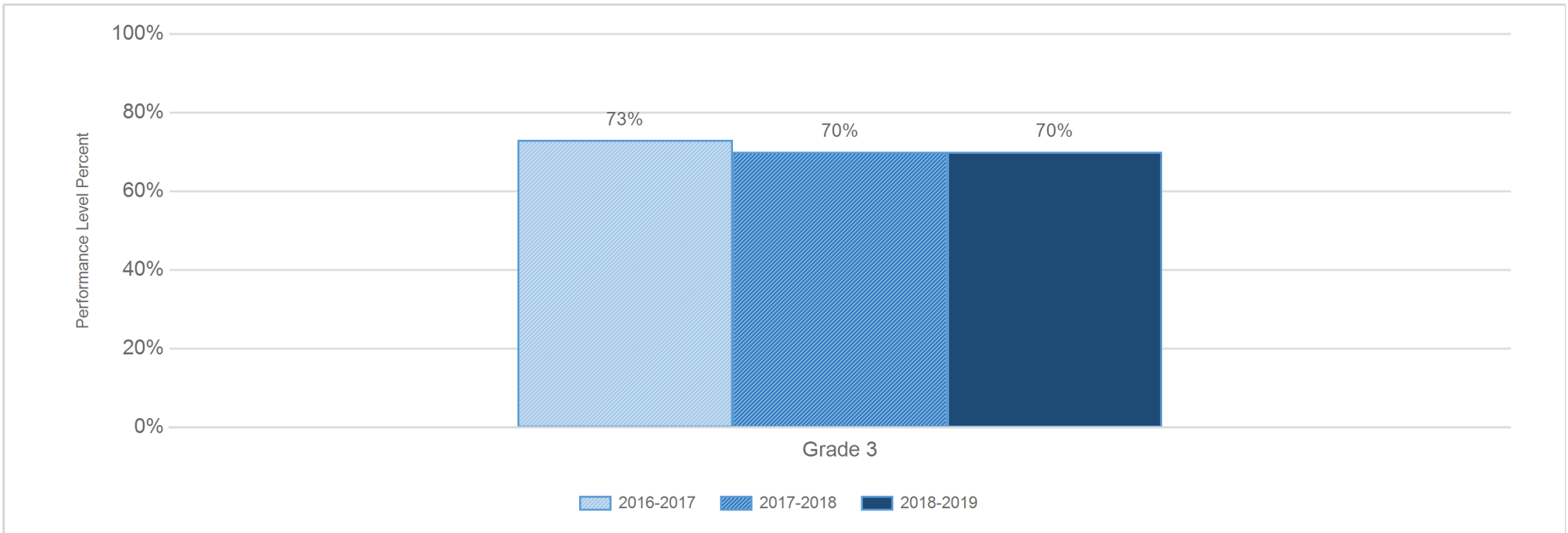

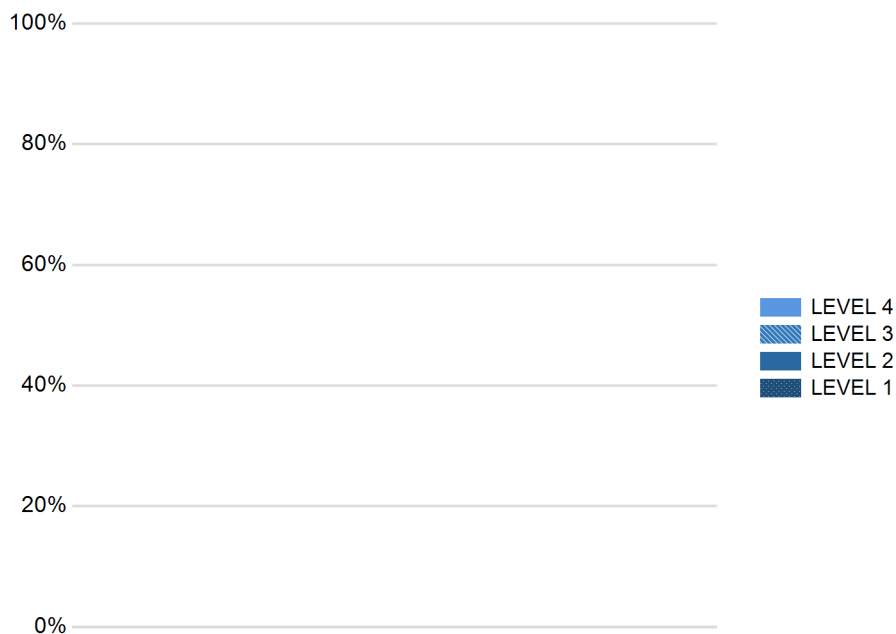

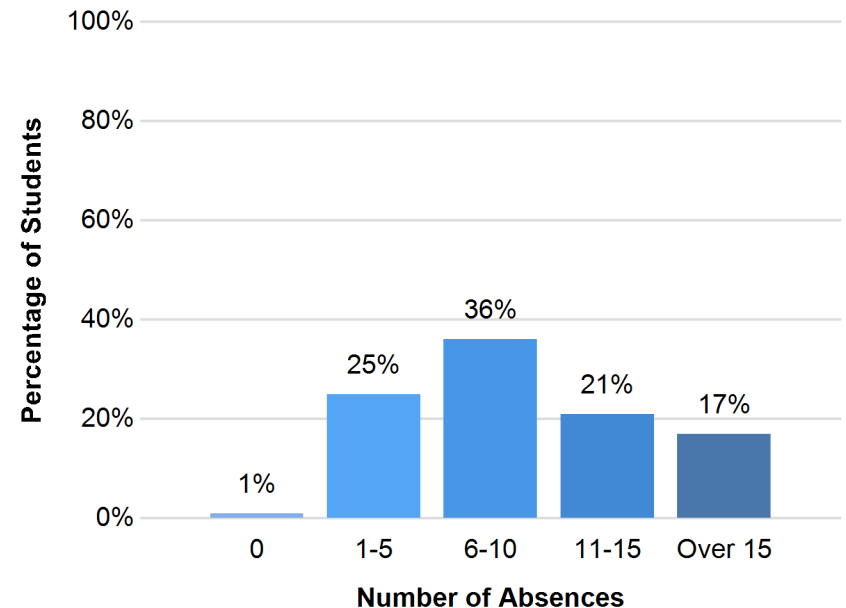

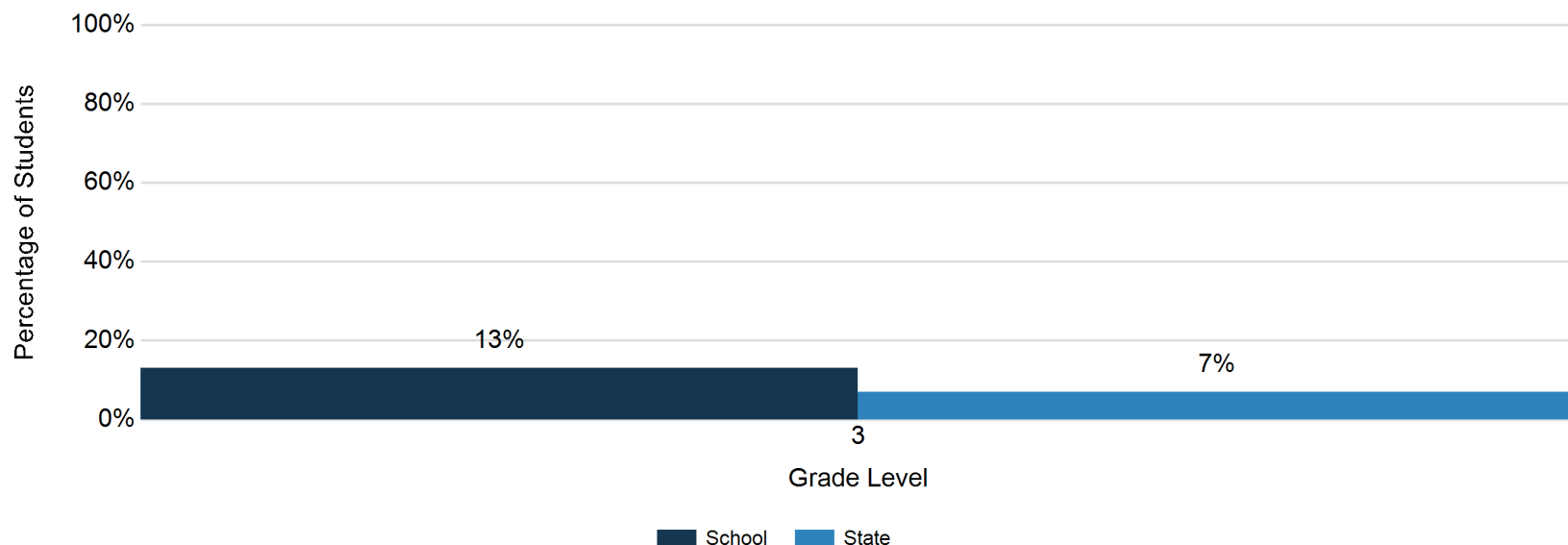
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Chronic Absenteeism by Grade

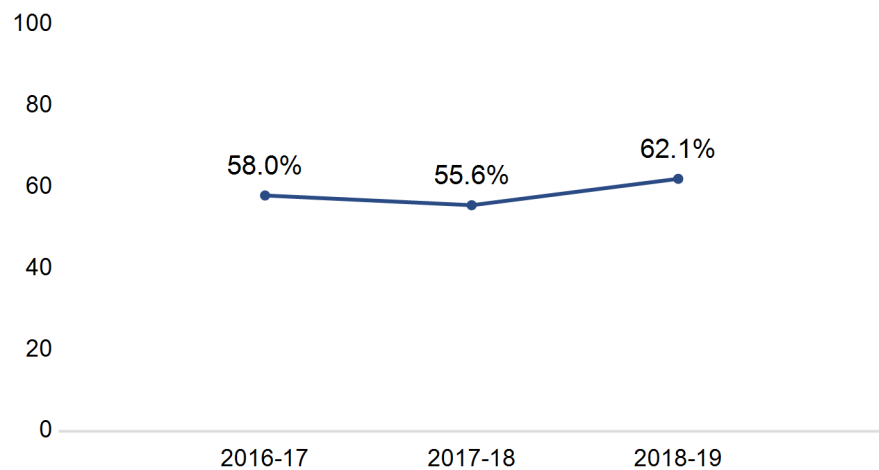
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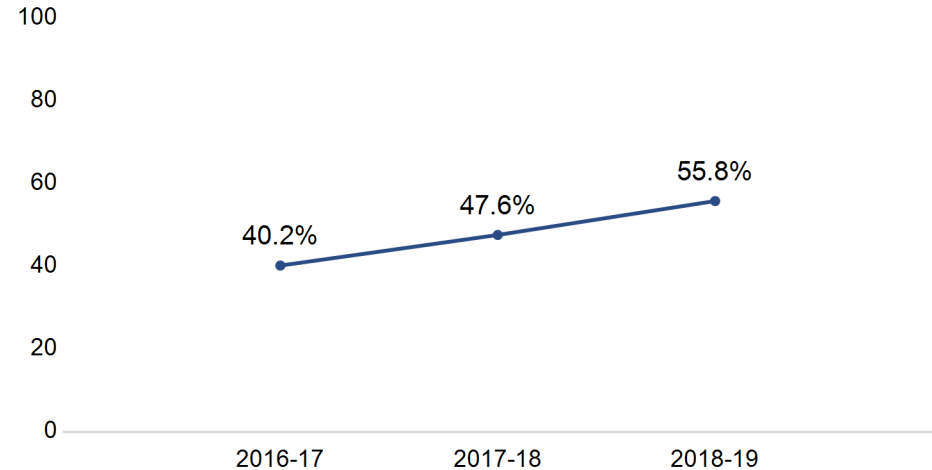

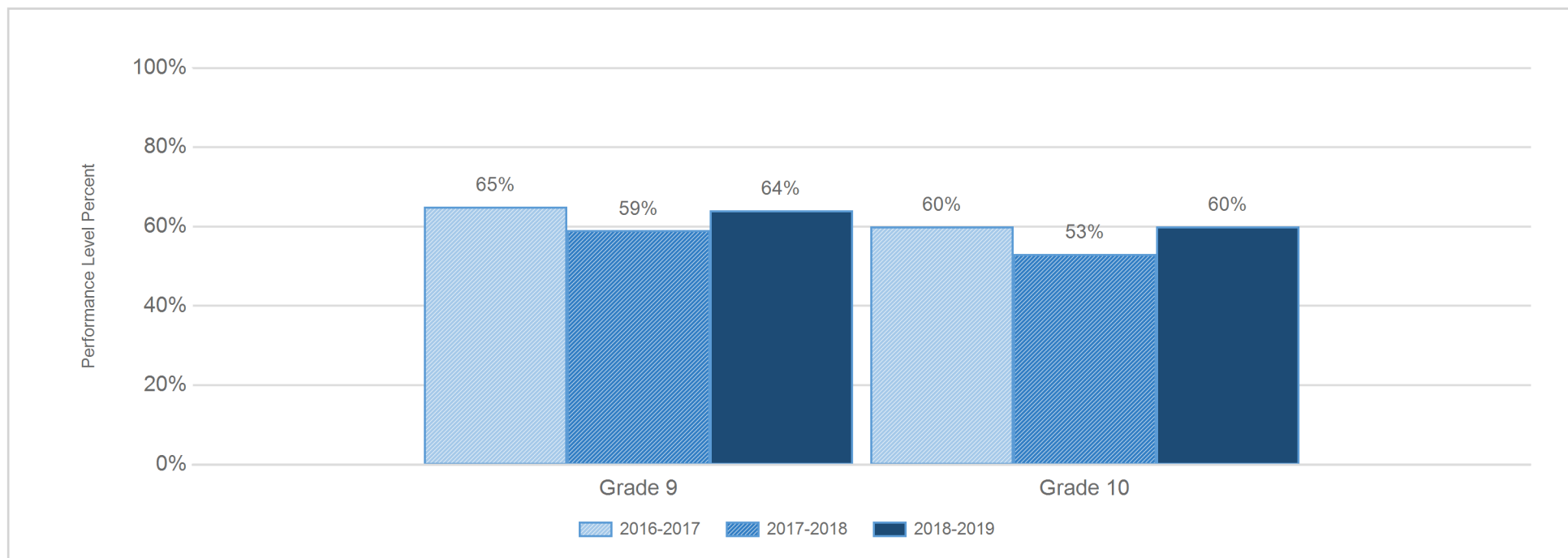

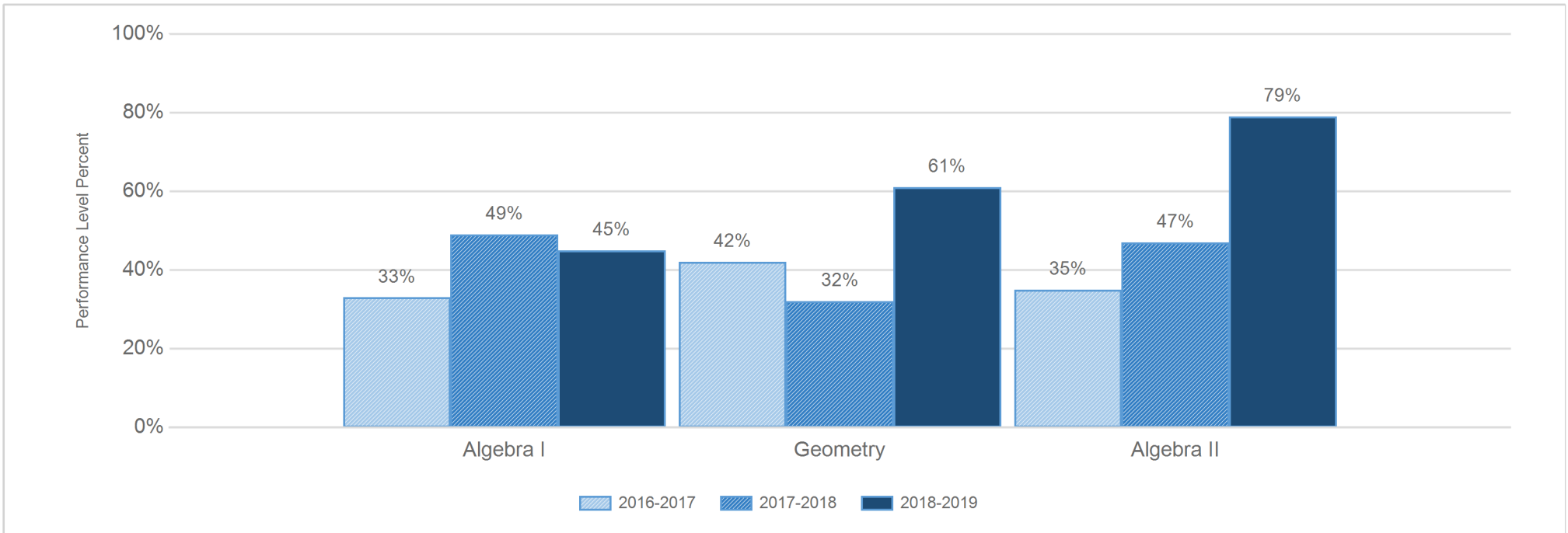

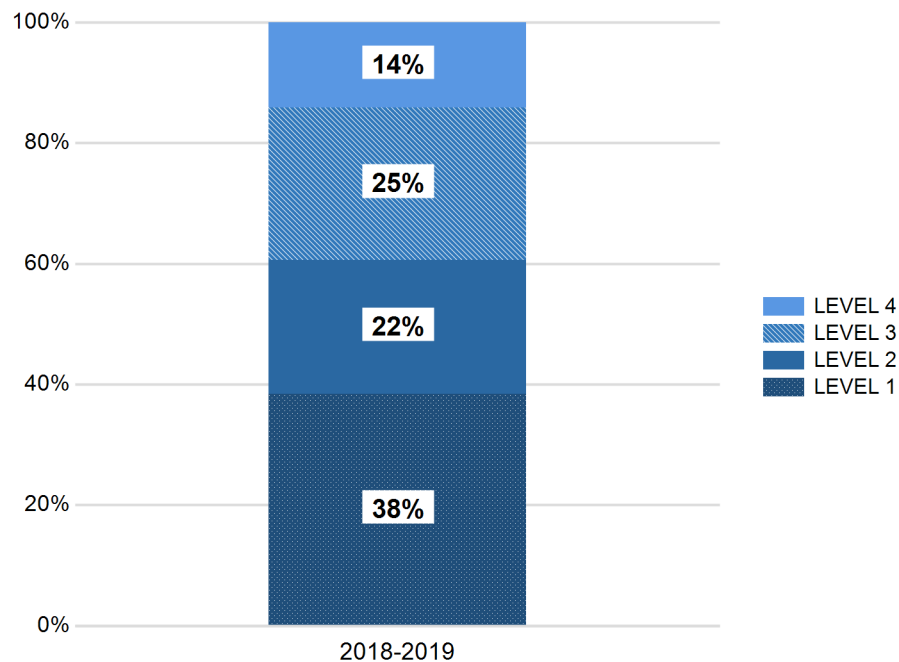

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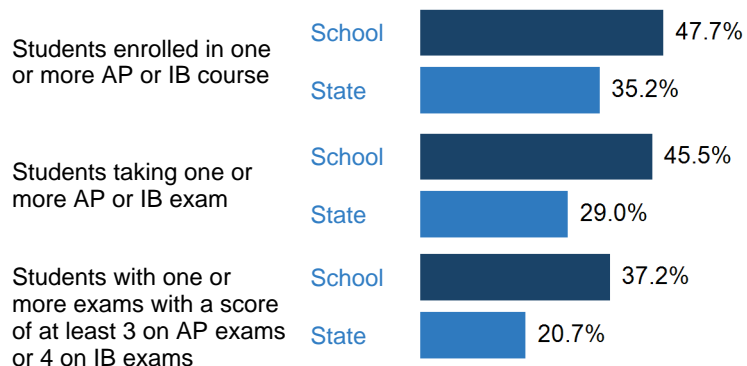

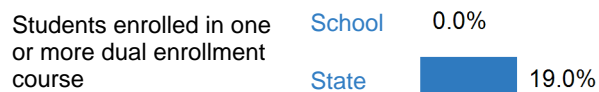
AP/IB Coursework – Participation and Performance

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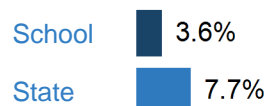

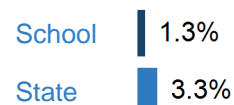

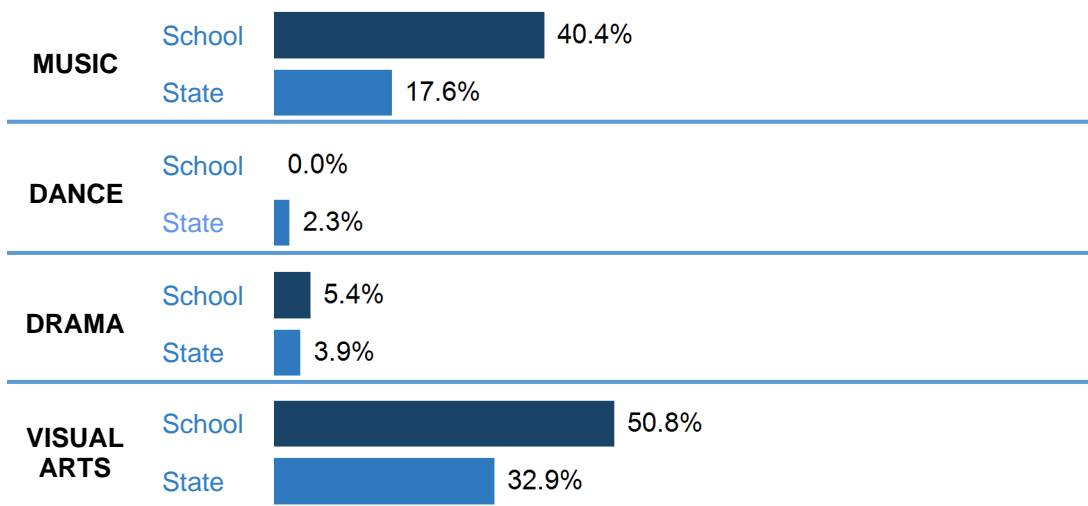

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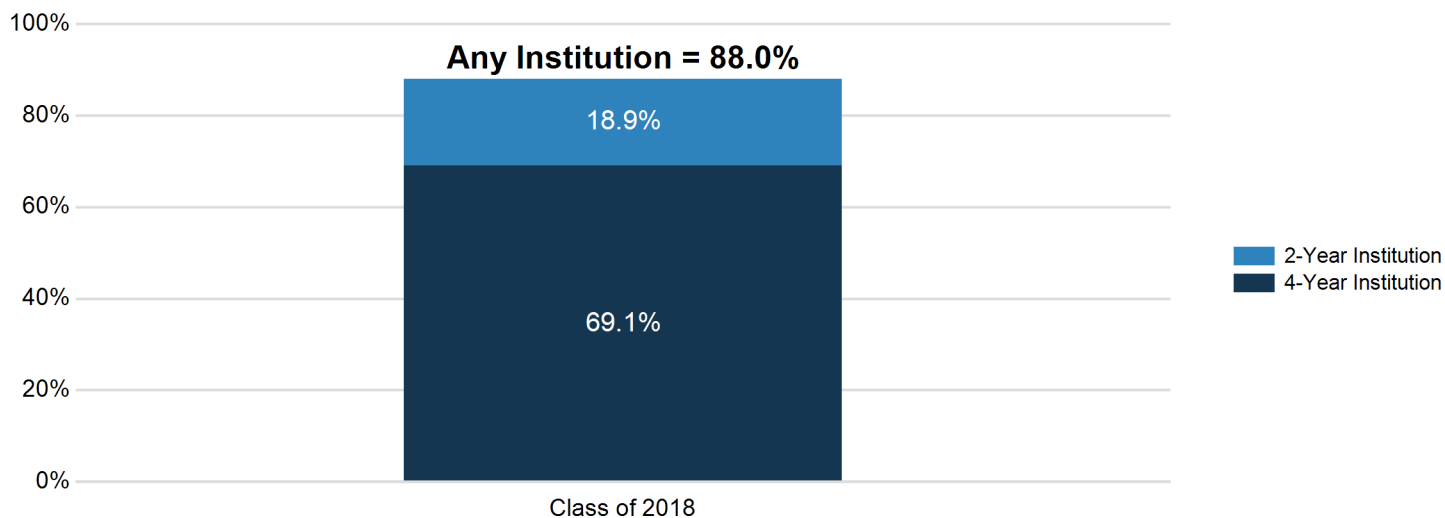

The New Jersey Department of Education used input from New Jersey communities to select chronic absenteeism as its measure of school quality and student success for the ESSA accountability plan. **Chronic absenteeism** is defined as being absent for 10% or more of the days enrolled during the school year. A student who is not present for any reason, whether excused, unexcused, or for disciplinary action, is considered absent unless permitted by state statute or regulations. Students with fewer than 45 days in membership are excluded from attendance calculations.

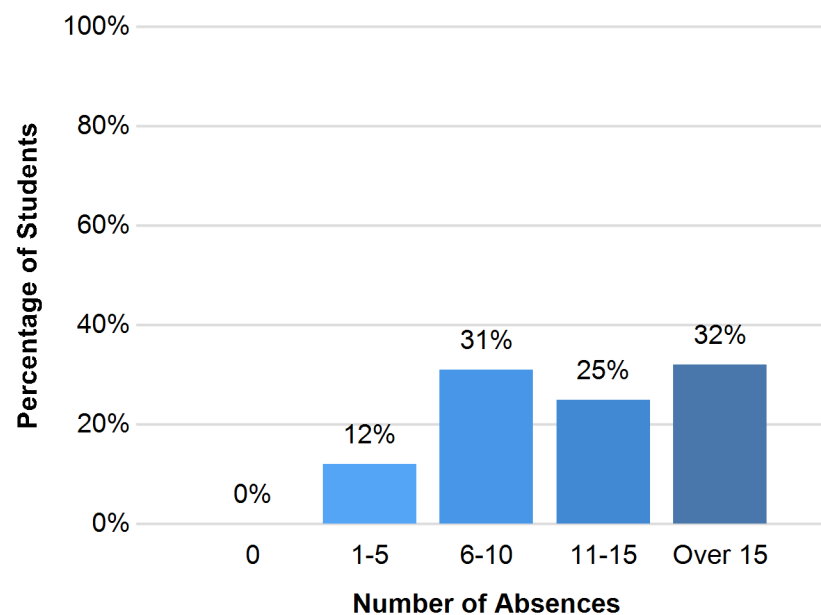

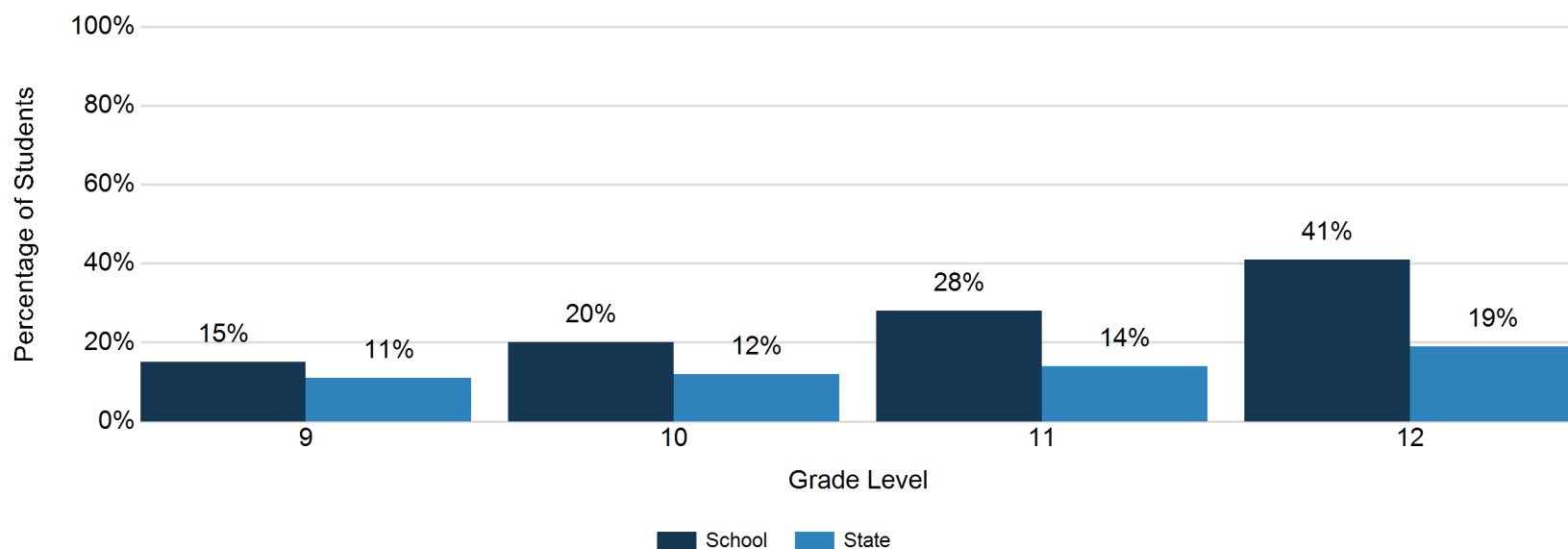
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Chronic Absenteeism by Grade

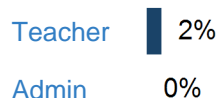

Music lessons and science labs run out of either lunch a or lunch b during the common lunch. School safety measures include wo security guards, over 100 security cameras, radios for all administrators and office, alarm system, raptor security system and outdoor and large space horns and strobes. Upgrades from our most recent federal security audit are being put in place across the district. The Sparta School District does take tuition students. This year we have both elementary and high school students attending on tuition. We also have a pre-school program housed in the Pre-2 building.

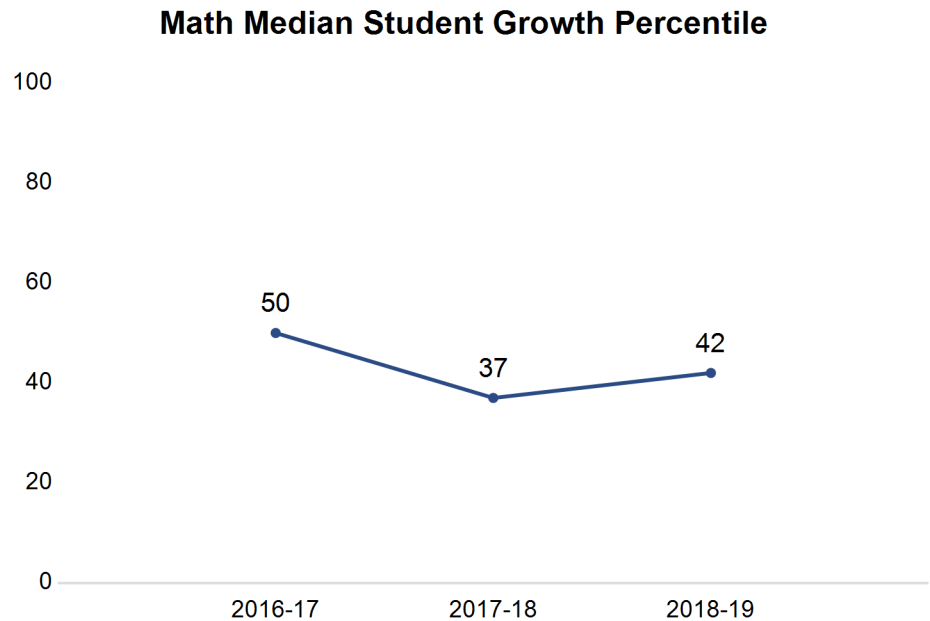
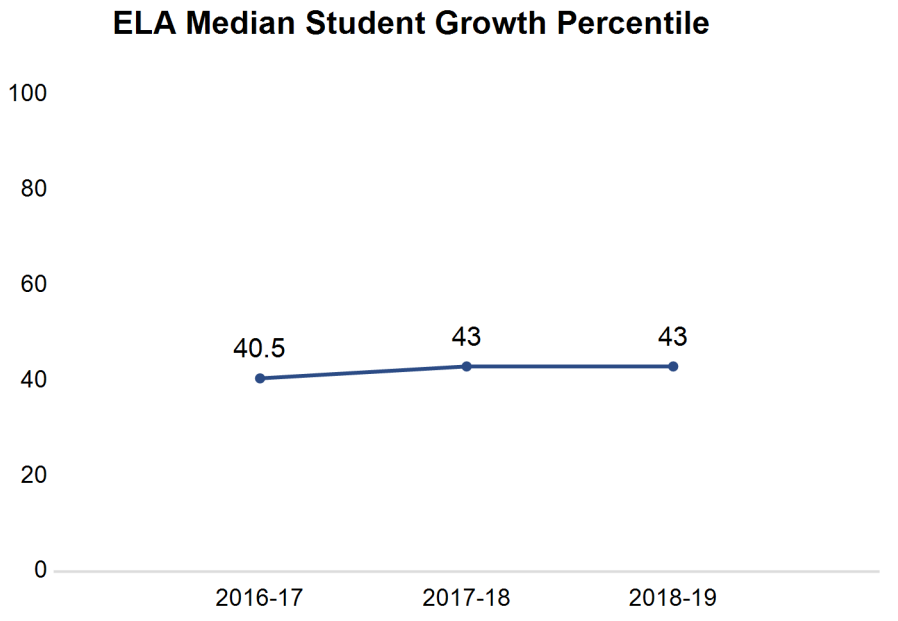


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Student Growth Trends and Progress

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Student growth is a measure of how much students are learning each year. Each student receives a Student Growth Percentile (SGP) for English Language Arts (ELA) in grades 4 through 8 and for Mathematics in grades 4 through 7 that explains their progress compared to students who had the same test scores in previous years.

A student's SGP falls between 1 and 99 and can be grouped into three levels: **Low Growth: Less than 35** **Typical Growth: Between 35 and 65** **High Growth: Greater than 65**

If the student growth percentiles for all students in the school are ordered from smallest to largest, the median student growth percentile (mSGP) for the school is the percentile in the middle of that list. 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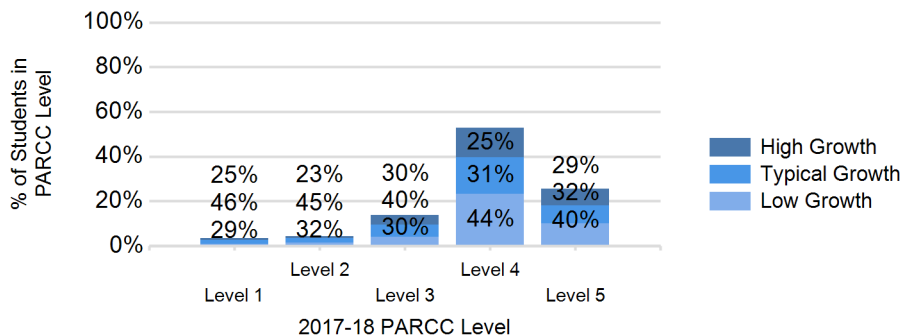
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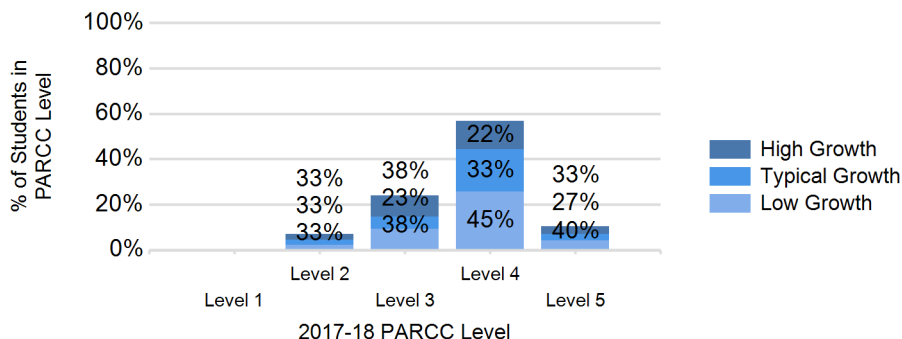
Student Growth by Performance Level

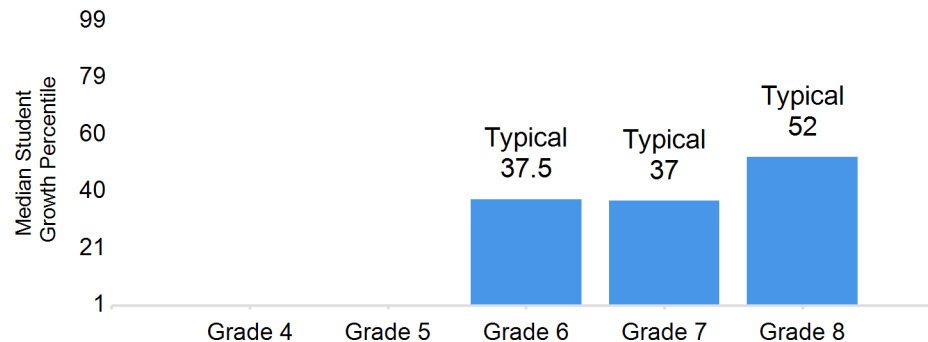

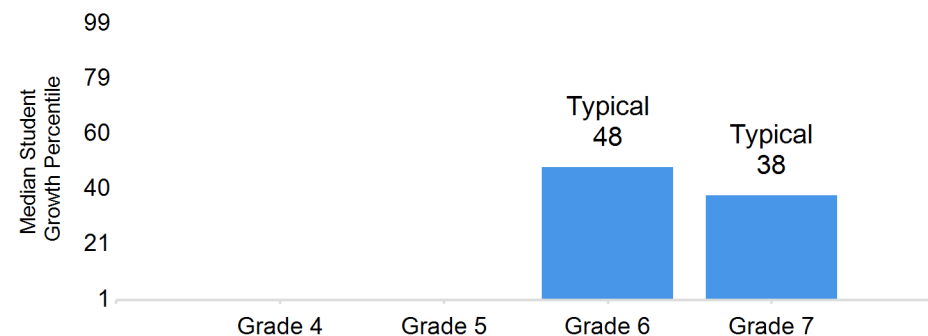
Student Growth by Grade

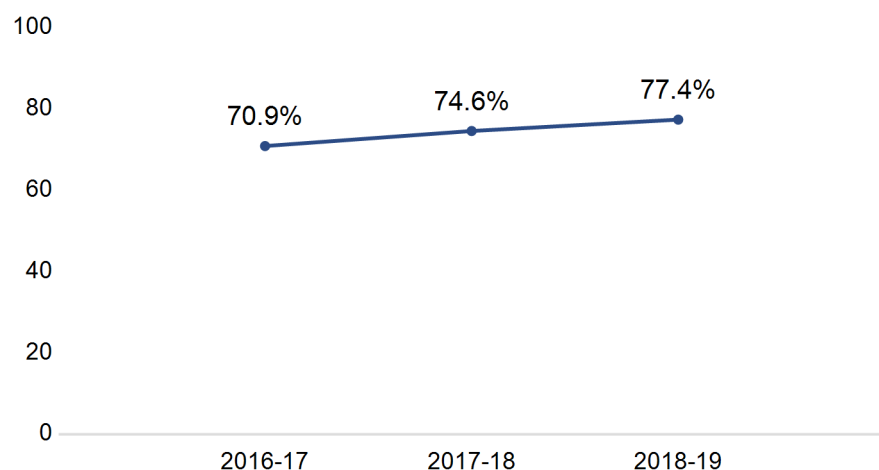
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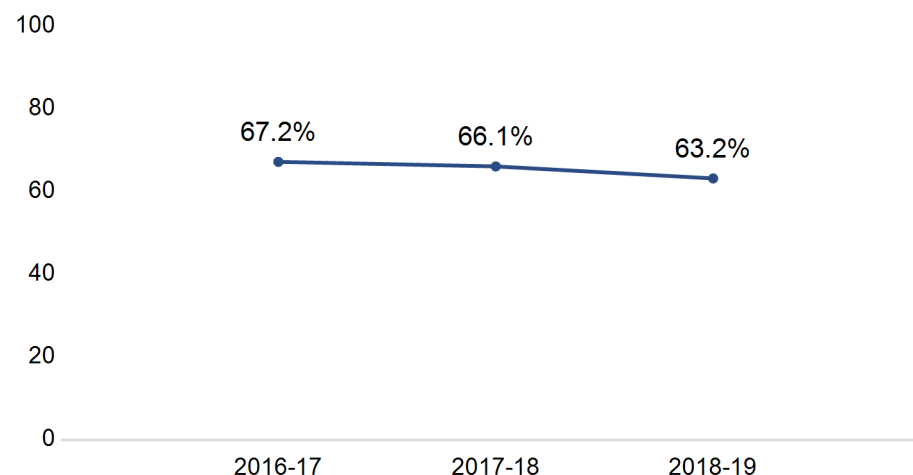

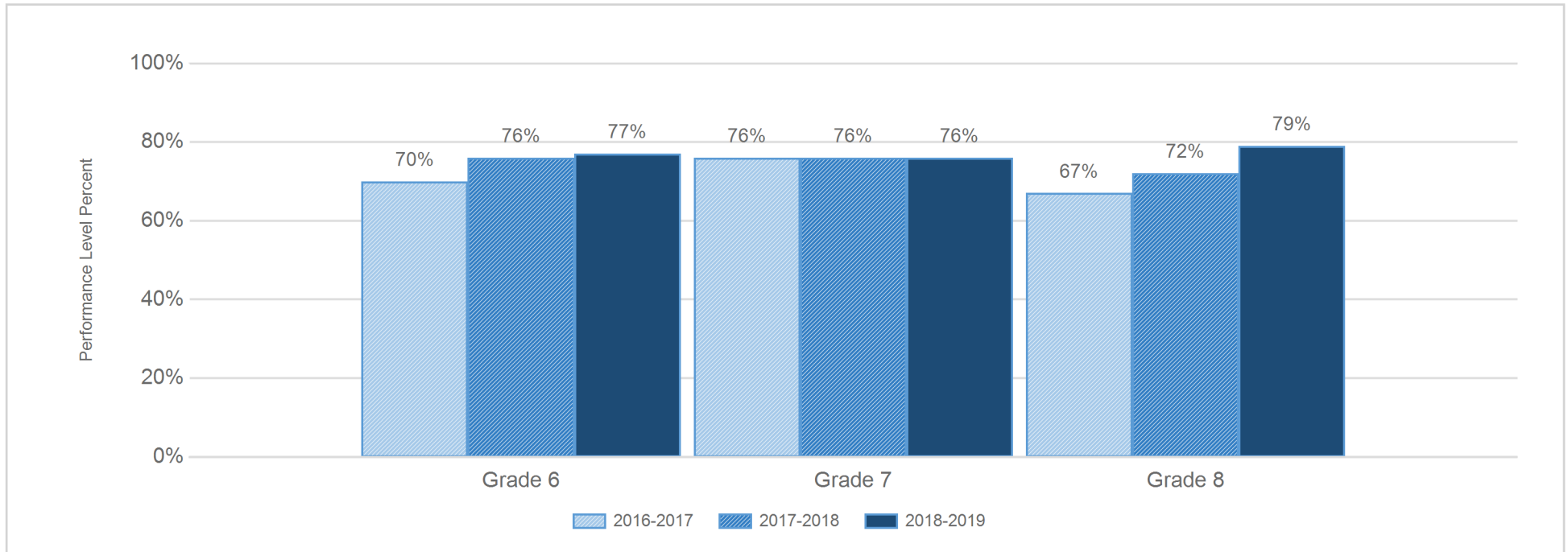

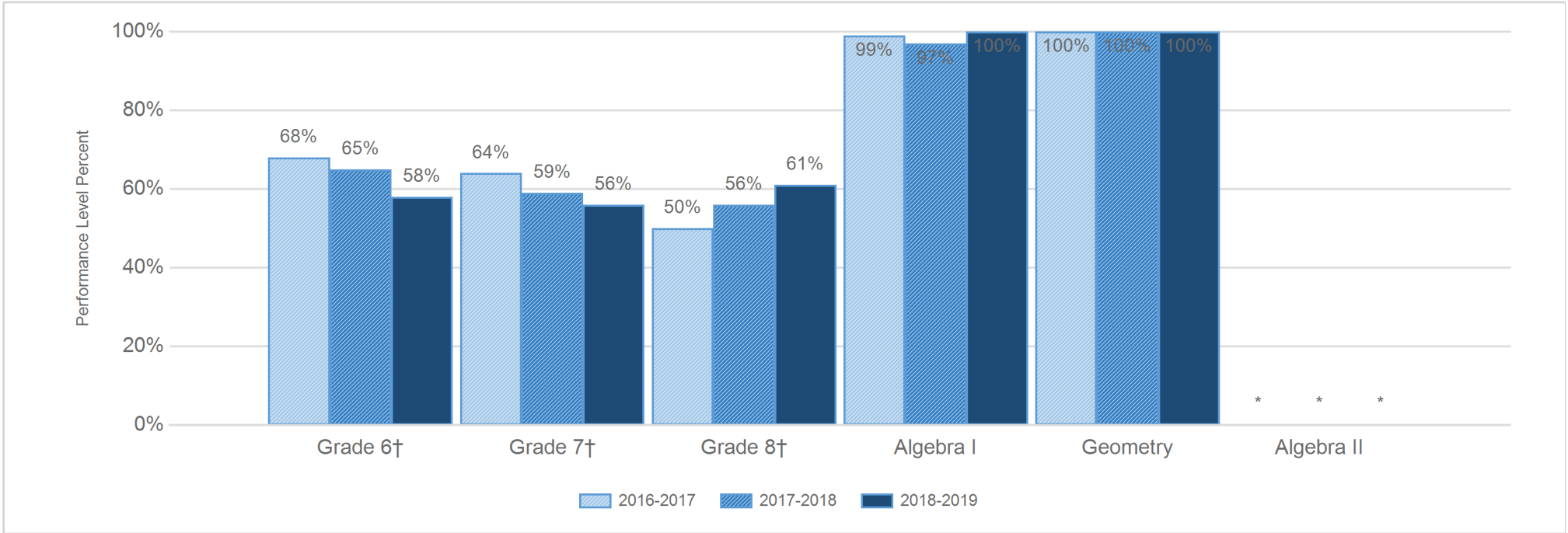

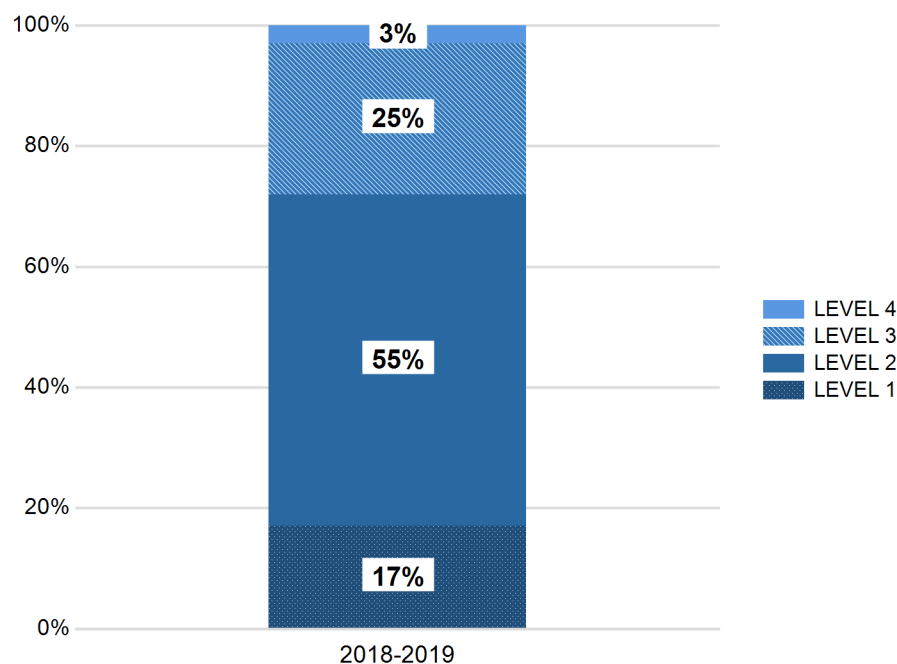

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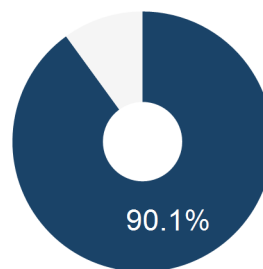

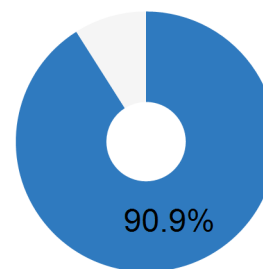

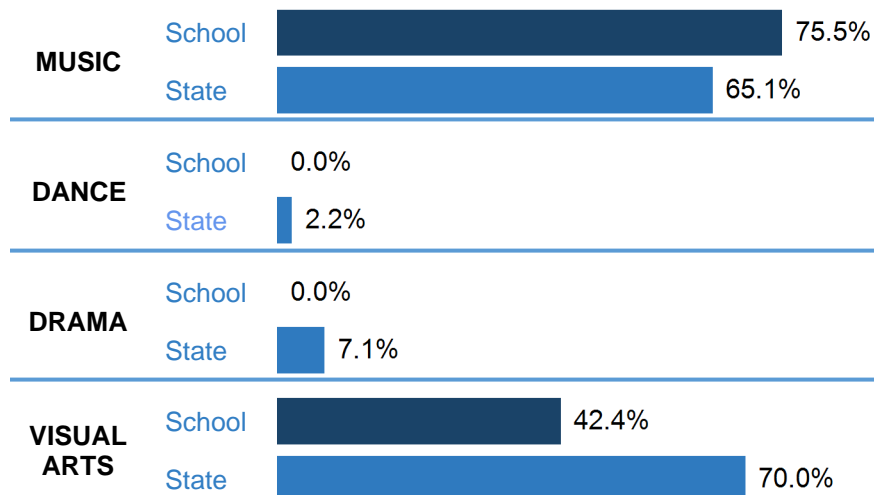

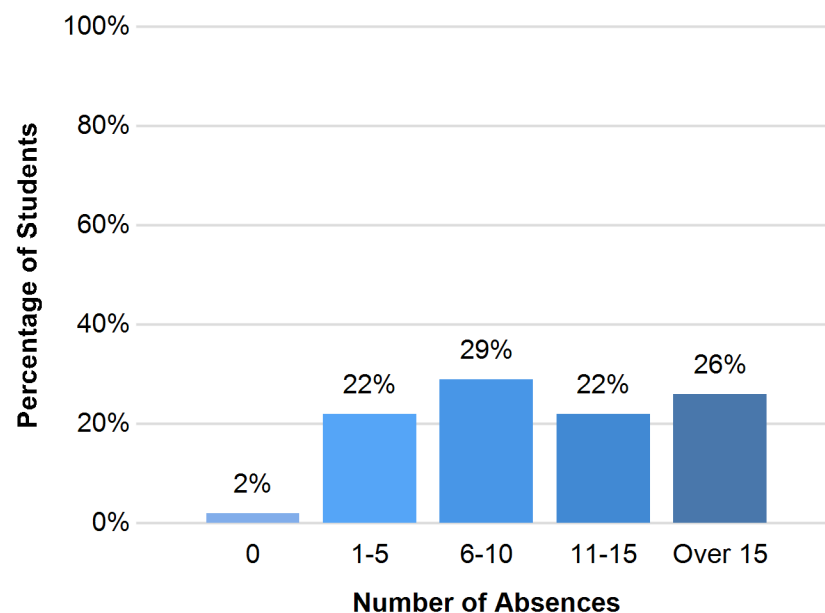

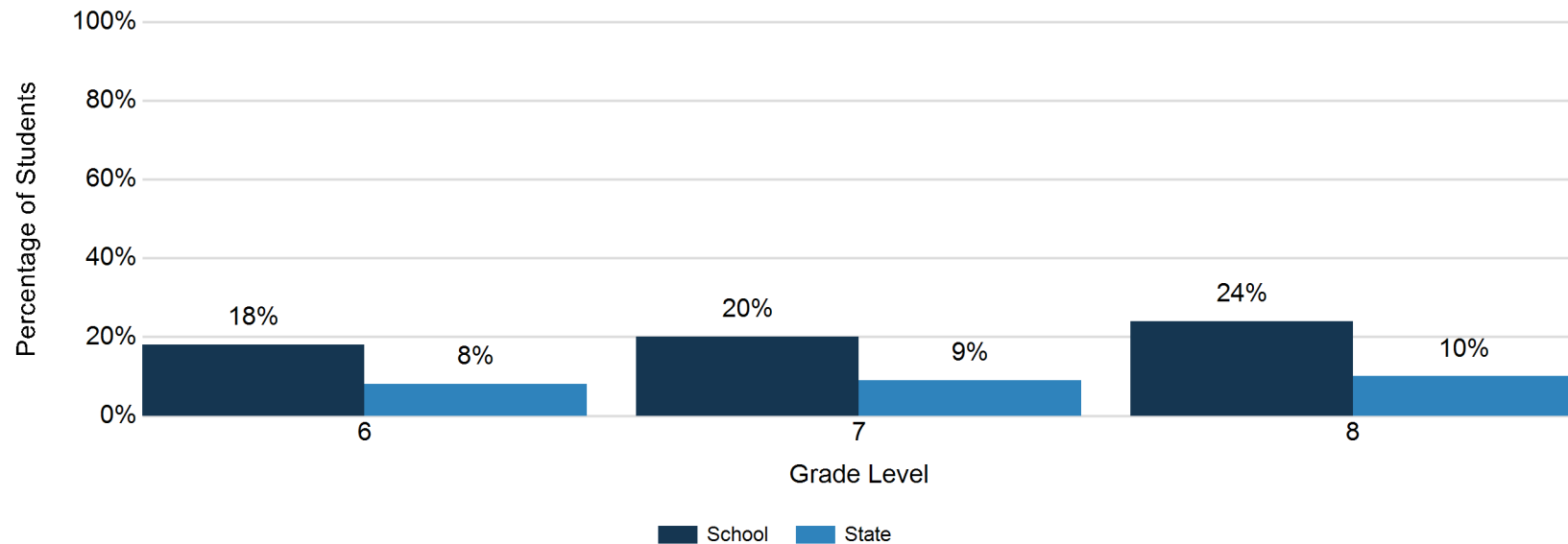
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Chronic Absenteeism by Grade

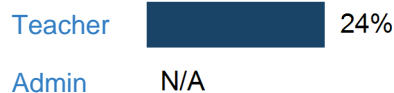
