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STATE HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT EXHIBIT

The New Jersey State Highway Department has prepared an impressive pictorial presentation showing the vast amount of traffic carried on our highways. A map has been prepared with the two wings devoted to the skylines of New York and Philadelphia. Between these two cities there is shown a road symbolic of the heavily travelled arteries of the State. As the mythical car travels over the road, fourteen colored transparencies light up showing the traffic, while cutouts, aided by sound effects, give the visitor a vivid idea of the amount of travel past a given spot in a given time.



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MONMOUTH COUNTY EXHIBIT

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The Monmouth County exhibit consists of an electrical map which is known as a vacation finder, and visitors may see the location of fishing grounds, bathing beaches, golf courses, motor boating, and other recreational activities, by watching the many lights on the map showing the various locations where these spots may be found. In this exhibit there are also moving transparencies depicting the various spots of interest in the County.

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THE GREAT SEAL OF THE STATE OF NEW JERSEY

The seal of the State of New Jersey which appears in the floor of the New Jersey State Building at the New York World's Fair was executed by Congoleum Nairn, Inc., of Kearney, New Jersey, which provided the linoleum, and Custom Floors, Inc., of New York City, which laid it.

The following is an exact description of the seal taken from the legislation which made provision for it:-

that the arms be three ploughs in an escutcheon, azure; supporters, Liberty and Ceres. The Goddess of Liberty to carry in her dexter hand a pole, proper, surmounted by a cap, gules, with band azure at the bottom, displaying on the band six stars, argent; tresses falling on shoulders, proper; head bearing over all a chaplet of laurel leaves, vert; overdress, tenne underskirt, argent; feet sandaled, standing on scroll. Ceres: Same as Liberty, save overdress, gules; holding in left hand a cornucopia, or, bearing apples, plums and grapes surrounded by leaves, all proper; head bearing over all a chaplet of wheat sheaves, vert. Shield surmounted by sovereign's helmet, six bars, or; wreath and mantling, argent and azure. Crest: A horse's head, proper. Underneath the shield and supporting the goddesses, a scroll azure, bordered with tenne in three waves or folds; on the upper folds the words "Liberty and Prosperity"; on the under fold in Arabic numerals, the figures "1776". These words to be engraved round the arms, viz., "The Great Seal of the State of New Jersey."

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ATLANTIC CITY, ATLANTIC COUNTY EXHIBIT

This exhibit shows the skyline of this world-famous health resort, showing a section of the beach and boardwalk, with palatial hotels in the background. Spotlights against this background graphically show the many recreational and interesting points of the resort.



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DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE AND NAVIGATION EXHIBIT

This exhibit takes the visitor on an imaginary sightseeing tour of the State's inland waterways. The exhibit is in the form of a ship's bridge, in front of which is an oil-painted map twenty-one feet long and four feet high, which glows with varied colored flashing lights. One hundred and twenty-five miles of the New Jersey shore line from Atlantic Highlands to Cape May is attractively pictured. Above the map, there appear fourteen colored transparencies. As the name of the town is lighted on the map, the photograph on top lights up, showing a typical scene. On each of the two wings is an animated scene viewed through a four and one-half foot elongated porthole. In the background is slowly moving scenery, in front of which pass at different speeds some thirty-two boats actually running in water.

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New Jersey is known as the "Garden State", and its agricultural advantages are shown in a diorama portrayed by six outline soil maps of the State in color, showing the important livestock and agricultural crops produced. These are dairy and dairy products, poultry and poultry products, fruits, vegetables, potatoes, and nursery stock. The background on which these maps appear consists of a photomural of farm scenes in New Jersey.

WORLD'S FAIR, NEW YORK

The New Jersey State Building in the Court of States at the World's Fair, New York, is a replica of the Old Barracks at Trenton, New Jersey. The Old Barracks was chosen because it is an outstanding example of Colonial architecture in New Jersey, which is the general type of architecture chosen for the Court of States.

The building is U-shaped, having a long exhibit hall in the center with wings at either end. The main exhibit hall is 147' long by 30½' wide, with a 20' ceiling. The wings project from the main building 37' toward the lagoon, and are 22½' wide, and two stories in height. The first floor of each wing is a reproduction of an early Colonial room, and the second floors contain the offices of the Commission.

The building itself is constructed of native stone from the Princeton Quarries, which furnished the stone used in constructing most of the buildings at Princeton University.

The roof is of slate, and is a very good reproduction of the roof on the Barracks in Trenton.

A two-story white wood portico on the front of the building adds to its beauty, and is a faithful replica of the original.

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COMMISSION ON HISTORIC SITES EXHIBIT

As you enter the building on the right wing, you find yourself in a beautiful Colonial room which contains the exhibit of the New Jersey Commission on Historic Sites. In the center of the rear wall is a large illuminated map of New Jersey showing some of the important historic sites in the State, and tracing in graphic form the routes used by General George Washington during the military campaigns of the Revolution, and his journey across the State to his inaugural as First President of the United States on April 30th, 1789.

Flanking this map on either side are twenty-two attractive transparent pictures in color of some of New Jersey's most historic buildings and monuments. These transparencies are as follows:-

RINGWOOD MANOR, RINGWOOD, PASSAIC COUNTY

Home of Robert Erskine, Geographer of the Revolutionary Army. Washington and Greene both quartered at the Manor. It was the now unused iron mines of Ringwood that contributed largely to the American cause in the Revolution when they became the main source of the iron supply of the Colonial troops. On the upper lawn now lies part of the historic chain that was stretched acrossed the Hudson River to prevent the British vessels from ascending the stream. Here also began the march of 3,000 soldiers to Yorktown. Erskine Hewitt, the last occupant of the Manor, deeded it to the State of New Jersey along with sufficient land to form a State Park. Now open to the public.

OLD TENNENT CHURCH, TENNENT, MONMOUTH COUNTY

Old Tennent, formerly Old Scots, Church built 1751. Three miles southeast of English-town and three miles from Freehold. Originally called Old Scots Church, then Freehold Church. In memory of John Tennent and William Tennent, Jr., it took the name of Tennent Church. It was the successor of an older church built 1730, which seems to have been the successor of the Old Scots Meeting House built 1682 by the

original Scotch settlers on or near the site of the Old Scots Burying Ground. The outlines of the old church can still be seen on the road leading to Englishtown



General Washington used this building owned by Colonel Theunis Day, as a headquarters from July 1st to July 28th, and from October 9th to November 24th, 1760, while the main army was encamped along Totowa Heights.

#### DRY MANSION, FREEKNES, PASSAIC COUNTY

Located at Hancock's Bridge, near Salem, in Salem County. Scene of battle massacre of about thirty patriots quartered in the house by a party of Tory Rangers on the night of March 21, 1778. Property of the State of New Jersey.

#### HANCOCK HOUSE, HANCOCK'S BRIDGE, SALEM COUNTY

Located in the Borough of River-edge, Bergen County. General von Steuben, Inspector-General of the Revolutionary Army and Military Aide to George Washington, occupied this house, which was presented to him in appreciation of his services during the Revolution. Property of the State of New Jersey.

#### STUBBEN HOUSE, NORTH HACKENSACK, BERGEN COUNTY

Located in the Borough of Haddonfield, Camden County. In the early history of the State the Legislature held frequent meetings here, and the Council of Safety for New Jersey was organized here on March 18, 1777, and the bill was passed substituting the word "State" for "Colony" in all State papers. Property of the State of New Jersey.

#### INDIAN KING TAVERN, HADDONFIELD, CAMDEN COUNTY

About two miles from Freehold, in Marlboro Township. The oldest grave in the yard is that of Rev. John Boyd, first Minister of the Church, who died August 30, 1708; the oldest in the present Tennent Church Yard is that of Alice Smith, died 1739. Rev. Wm. Tennent, Pastor of the Church for over forty-three years, who died March 8, 1777, is buried under the floor of the central aisle. At one corner is buried Lieutenant Colonel Monckton of the British Army, killed June 28, 1778.



McKONKEY FERRY HOUSE, WASHINGTON CROSSING, MERCER COUNTY

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Located at Washington Crossing Park, maintained by the State of New Jersey to commemorate Washington's crossing of the Delaware River Christmas night, 1776, on his way to victory over the Hessians at Trenton. His success marked the turning point of the War. The tavern figured prominently in the crossing of the Delaware by the Continentals. Open to the public.

SALEM OAK, SALEM, SALEM COUNTY

This oak tree, a survivor of the original forest, was standing when Salem was founded by John Fenwick in 1675. It is one of the largest in the State being 88' high, and its foliage covers one-quarter of an acre.

WASHINGTON HEADQUARTERS, SOMERVILLE, SOMERSET COUNTY

Located in the Borough of Somerville, County of Somerset. Purchased by the Revolutionary Memorial Society of New Jersey in 1897. The house was used as a headquarters by General George Washington from December, 1778, to June, 1779, while the Continental Army was encamped at Camp Middlebrook. The building is open to the public without charge daily, except Sundays, and contains a valuable collection of Revolutionary relics and old Colonial furniture and glass.

BOUDINOT MANSION, ELIZABETH, UNION COUNTY

Boudinot Mansion or Boxwood Hall. Probably built about 1750. Home during Revolution of Elias Boudinot, who, as President of the Continental Congress, signed the treaty of peace with Great Britain. The body of Rev. James Caldwell, murdered by the British at Elizabethtown Point, was exposed to the view of the Revolutionary Army on the steps of this house and Boudinot made an address. Home owned subsequently by Jonathan Dayton, Speaker of the United States House of Representatives and United States Senator, for whom Dayton, Ohio was named. WASHINGTON HEADQUARTERS, MORRISTOWN, MORRIS COUNTY

Built by Colonel Jacob Ford in 1774. Used by General George Washington as his headquarters during the winter and spring of 1779-1780. The building is now owned by the United States Department of the Interior, and is a part of Morristown National Historical Park. Open to the public.

WASHINGTON HEADQUARTERS, ROCKY HILL, SOMERSET COUNTY

Located at Rocky Hill, Somerset County.

Formerly called Rockingham, and was the property of Judge John Berrien. This house was used by General Washington as a headquarters during the Revolution from August 25, 1783, to November 10, 1783. General Washington wrote his "Farewell Address to the Army" here. Property of the State of New Jersey. Open to the public.

PRINCETON BATTLE MONUMENT, PRINCETON, MERCER COUNTY

Located in the Borough of Princeton, Mercer County. Commemorates the Battle of Princeton in the Revolutionary War. Funds for its erection were contributed by the United States, the State of New Jersey, and private subscriptions. Property of the State of New Jersey.

NASSAU HALL, PRINCETON, MERCER COUNTY

First college building in Princeton of the College of New Jersey, now Princeton University. Erected 1756, and named at the request of Governor Jonathan Belcher, in honor of William of Nassau, Prince of Orange, William III of England. During the Revolution it served at different times as hospital and barracks for American and British troops. First Legislature of the State of New Jersey met here in 1776 and the first Governor of the State was inducted into office and the Great Seal of the State adopted. Here from June to November 1783 the Continental Congress sat, and here on August 26, Washington received the thanks of Congress for his conduct of the war. In October the Hon. Peter Van Buren, the first foreign minister accredited to the United States after independence had been acknowledged, was received here by Congress. The original building was partially destroyed by fire in 1802 but the stone walls remaining standing were utilized in its re-erection. The building is now used entirely for administrative purposes.

OLD CURRONS, RUTGERS UNIVERSITY, NEW BRUNSWICK, MIDDLESEX COUNTY

Rutgers University was the sixth college founded in the American colonies. The charter was granted in 1766 by Governor William Franklin, and it was originally called Queens College. The charter was revised in 1770, and in 1825 its name was changed to Rutgers in honor of Henry Rutgers a colonel in the Continental Army.

COOPER HOUSE, CAMDEN, CAMDEN COUNTY

Built about 1709, home of Joseph Cooper, son of first William Cooper, founder of Camden. Old house still standing in Camden County. Preserved by the City of Camden.



ST. MARY'S CHURCH, BURLINGTON, BURLINGTON COUNTY

St. Mary's P. E. Church, founded and building erected in 1703, chartered as St. Anne's October 4th, 1704. By second charter the name was changed in 1709 to St. Mary's. The Rev. Jonathan Odell, a grandson of Jonathan Dickinson, first President of Princeton University, was Rector in 1767 to 1777. The Communion Service of the Church was presented by Queen Anne. In the graveyard are the graves of Elias Boudinot, President of the Continental Congress, and William Bradford, Attorney General of the United States under President Washington.

CASTLE POINT, STEVENS INSTITUTE, HOBOKEN, HUDSON COUNTY

Built about 1784. Home of Colonel John Stevens. Colonel Stevens' workshop, where he experimented and built the Phoenix Steamboat was on or near the site of Stevens Institute.

HISTORIC HIGHWAY MARKER ERECTED BY THE COMMISSION ON HISTORIC SITES

One of the chief functions of the Commission on Historic Sites is the placing of markers along the highways of New Jersey calling attention to the important events of our history associated with the places through or near which these highways run. 125 markers have been erected to date.

The marker is made of aluminum, the finish is polychrome bronze, the lettering is in gold leaf, and the plaque itself is surmounted by the seal of the State in colors.

WALT WHITMAN HOUSE, CAMDEN, CAMDEN COUNTY

Located in Camden, Camden County. This is the house in which the "Good Gray Poet" spent the last years of his life. Property of the City of Camden. Open to the public.

## TRENTON BATTLE MONUMENT, TRENTON, MERCER COUNTY

Located in Trenton, Mercer County. Marks the site of the main gun emplacement selected by George Washington at the Battle of Trenton, December 26, 1776. This monument is one hundred and sixty-seven feet high, and was erected with national and State aid and popular subscription. ~~Property of the State of New Jersey~~ From the top of the monument a fine view of the surrounding country can be had. Property of the State of New Jersey.

MONMOUTH BATTLE MONUMENT, FREEHOLD, MONMOUTH COUNTY

Located at Freehold, Monmouth County. Commemorates the Battle of Monmouth, June 28, 1776. Property of the State of New Jersey.

Set out in attractive form in a maple cabinet are twelve pieces of glass made in Salem County in the old glass factory formerly at Waterburg, which is celebrating its 200th anniversary this year. This glass consists of the following:-
