Tuesday, January 14, 2020

At 12:26 p.m. the Senate met.

The Secretary announced:

This being the second Tuesday of January, the time fixed for the beginning of the Legislative year, the Senate of the State of New Jersey is now called to order to effect the organization for the conduct of business for the First Annual Session of the Senate of the 219th Session of the Legislature.

The session was opened with prayer by Reverend Jack Cairns of Capital Assembly of God, Trenton, NJ.

Senator Corrado led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Upon calling the roll, the following Senators answered the call, and the Secretary declared a quorum present:

The President announced:

Notice of and the calendar for this session of the Senate having been sent to the members of the Senate, the Secretary of the State, and the State House Press, and posted in accordance with the Open Public Meetings Law, I declare the Senate to be in session.

Secretary Metzger called for the nomination and the election of a temporary President. Senator Ruiz moved the nomination of Senator O'Scanlon for the office of temporary President, and the motion was adopted by voice vote.

Senator O'Scanlon called for the election of a temporary Secretary. Senator Cunningham moved the nomination of Linda Metzger for the office of temporary Secretary, and the motion was adopted by voice vote.

Senator O'Scanlon called for the election of a permanent Senate President. Senator Weinberg moved the nomination of Senator Sweeney for the position of permanent Senate President. The motion was adopted by voice vote.

Senator Sweeney was administered the Oath of Office by Chief Justice Stuart Rabner.

Senator Weinberg was administered the Oath of Office and was sworn in as Senate Majority Leader.

Senate President Sweeney called for nominations for an election of the Senate President Pro Tempore. Senator Cunningham nominated Senator Ruiz for the position of President Pro Tempore. The motion was adopted by voice vote.

Senator Sweeney administered the Oath of Office to Senator Ruiz.

Senate President Sweeney called for nominations for a permanent Secretary of the Senate. Senator Cunningham nominated Linda Metzger for the position of permanent Secretary of the Senate. The motion was adopted by voice vote.

Senator Sweeney administered the Oath of Office to Linda Metzger.

On motion of Senator Weinberg, the Organizational Resolutions and Notification to the Governor and the General Assembly that the Senate has organized for the First Annual Session of the 219th Session of the Legislature were adopted by voice vote.

Senator Weinberg moved that the Senate stand in recess to reconvene for a Joint Session at 3 p.m. to accept the Governor's State of the State Message, and the motion was adopted by voice vote.

The following bills were read for the first time by their titles and referred to committees as indicated:

Senate No. 1, by Senators Sweeney and Gopal, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--Encourages sharing of services; makes appropriations.

Senate No. 51, by Senators Singer and Diegnan, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Establishes commission to study impact of certain Medicaid reimbursement rate change on nursing homes.

Senate No. 52, by Senators Singer and Greenstein, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Establishes local drug overdose fatality review teams in each county in State.

Senate No. 53, by Senators Singer and Vitale, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Requires Attorney General to develop program to assist schools in identifying at-risk youths.

Senate No. 54, by Senator Singer, Education Committee.--Requires under certain circumstances development by school nurse of student individualized health care plan and individualized emergency health care plan for student with severe allergies.

Senate No. 55, by Senators Singer and Rice, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Requires DOH to create best practices manual for maternity care; appropriates \$950,000.

Senate No. 56, by Senators Singer and Kean, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Requires declaration of Code Blue alert when National Weather Service predicts temperatures of 32 degrees Fahrenheit or lower.

Senate No. 57, by Senators Singer and Kean, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Authorizes provision of certain health and social services to at-risk individuals during Code Blue alert.

Senate No. 58, by Senators Singer and Singleton, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Requires Division of Medical Assistance and Health Services in DHS to accept permanent change of station order for purposes of satisfying residency requirement for provision of home and community based services under certain circumstances.

Senate No. 59, by Senators Singer and Singleton, Military and Veterans' Affairs Committee.--Provides certain employment protections for National Guard members employed in New Jersey.

Senate No. 60, by Senators Singer and Singleton, Military and Veterans' Affairs Committee.--Establishes "Military Pro Bono Program" to provide pro bono legal representation to active-duty service members and veterans of military.

Senate No. 61, by Senators Singer and Singleton, Military and Veterans' Affairs Committee.--Concerns professional licensing and application fees for spouse or dependent of active duty member of United States Armed Forces.

Senate No. 62, by Senator Singer, Judiciary Committee.--Upgrades offense of criminal mischief if person damages or impairs operation of school bus in the presence of child under age 16.

Senate No. 63, by Senators Singer and Kean, Education Committee.--Requires all public school teachers and paraprofessionals working with autistic students to possess Registered Behavior Technician credential by 2020-2021 school year.

Senate No. 64, by Senators Singer and Scutari, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--"Charlie's Law"; requires pharmacy practice sites and hospice programs to furnish patients with information and means to safely dispose of unused prescription drugs and medications.

Senate No. 65, by Senators Singer and Oroho, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Provides medical cannabis is not subject to State sales tax.

Senate No. 66, by Senator Singer, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Establishes certification card for individuals diagnosed with autism spectrum disorder.

Senate No. 67, by Senator Singer, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Requires State Health Benefits Commission advertise and annually review NJWELL program.

Senate No. 68, by Senator Singer, Education Committee.--Requires students to complete free application for federal student aid as part of high school graduation requirements.

Senate No. 69, by Senators Singer and Cunningham, Education Committee.--Eliminates requirement to submit sales tax exemption form for textbook purchases.

Senate No. 70, by Senator Bateman, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Requires DOH license additional angioplasty facilities, with at least one facility in each county.

Senate No. 71, by Senator Bateman, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Clarifies that period of suspension remains in effect until driver's license is restored in certain cases.

Senate No. 72, by Senator Bateman, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Establishes farm brewery and winery-brewery beverage license and permits farm wineries to produce hard cider.

Senate No. 73, by Senators Bateman and Sarlo, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Establishes requirements for sale of home baked goods.

Senate No. 74, by Senators Bateman and Smith, Environment and Energy Committee.--Requires pesticide applicator to notify beekeeper when applying pesticide within three miles of registered honey or native beehive or beeyard.

Senate No. 75, by Senators Bateman and Smith, Environment and Energy Committee.--Requires training for pesticide applicators and operators concerning pollinating bees.

Senate No. 76, by Senator Bateman, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Authorizes school nurses to administer opioid antidotes to overdose victims on school property, with immunity from civil, criminal, and professional liability, pursuant to "Overdose Prevention Act."

Senate No. 77, by Senator Bateman, Environment and Energy Committee.--Requires DEP to adopt Statewide plan to reduce lead exposure from contaminated soils and drinking water.

Senate No. 78, by Senator Bateman, Budget and Appropriations Committee.--Exempts all transfers made to lineal relatives from the Transfer Inheritance Tax.

Senate No. 79, by Senators Bateman and Turner, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Limits time continuing care retirement communities may retain refundable entrance fee after resident vacates facility to no more than one year.

Senate No. 80, by Senators Bateman and Smith, Environment and Energy Committee.--Provides corporation business tax and gross income tax credits to farmers who develop qualified native pollinator habitat on farms.

Senate No. 81, by Senators Bateman and Greenstein, Environment and Energy Committee.--Provides corporation business tax credit to taxpayers that develop qualified native pollinator habitat on undeveloped property.

Senate No. 82, by Senators Bateman and Greenstein, Environment and Energy Committee.--Provides corporation business tax credit to public utilities that develop qualified native pollinator habitat in their rights of way.

Senate No. 83, by Senators Bateman and Codey, Environment and Energy Committee.--Establishes "Jersey Native Plants Program."

Senate No. 84, by Senators Bateman and Greenstein, Judiciary Committee.--"Timothy J. Piazza's Law", upgrades hazing; clarifies that prohibited conduct includes causing, coercing or forcing consumption of alcohol or drugs.

Senate No. 85, by Senator Bateman, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Amends "Overdose Prevention Act" to clarify that pharmacists and health care practitioners may dispense opioid antidotes pursuant to standing order, and that prescribers may issue such standing order, with immunity from liability.

Senate No. 86, by Senator Bateman, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Requires law enforcement officers to be stationed in all public schools during school hours; authorizes schools to request funding from Safe Neighborhoods Services Fund.

Senate No. 87, by Senators Bateman and Kean, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--Reforms procedures concerning provisions of affordable housing; repeals "Statewide Non-Residential Development Fee Act."

Senate No. 88, by Senators Bateman and Beach, Military and Veterans' Affairs Committee.--Expands eligibility to receive the veterans' property tax deduction and the veterans' property tax exemption.

Senate No. 89, by Senators Bateman and Gopal, Transportation Committee.--Authorizes creation of special license plates commemorating horse as State animal.

Senate No. 90, by Senators Bateman and Scutari, State Government, Wagering, Tourism & Historic Preservation Committee.--Adds member from Judicial Retirement System to State Investment Council.

Senate No. 91, by Senators Bateman and Codey, Environment and Energy Committee.--Establishes task force to study recycling streams in NJ and challenges faced by local governments in running recycling programs.

Senate No. 92, by Senators Bateman and Greenstein, Environment and Energy Committee.--Authorizes issuance of Protect Pollinators license plates.

Senate No. 93, by Senators Bateman and Corrado, Environment and Energy Committee.--Authorizes NJ Infrastructure Bank to expend additional sums to make loans for environmental infrastructure projects for FY2020.

Senate No. 94, by Senators Gill, Rice, Sweeney and Weinberg, State Government, Wagering, Tourism & Historic Preservation Committee.--Establishes "The Democracy Act" to modify various voter registration and voting procedures.

Senate No. 95, by Senators Gill and Ruiz, Education Committee.--Establishes loan redemption program for teachers to redeem loan amounts received under the New Jersey College Loans to Assist State Students Loan Program through employment in public or nonpublic schools in New Jersey.

Senate No. 96, by Senators Gill and Weinberg, Education Committee.--Provides local board of education with approval authority of charter school application.

Senate No. 97, by Senator Gill, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Establishes a regulatory program for rifle and shotgun ammunition sales.

Senate No. 98, by Senator Gill, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Strengthens State's assault weapons ban.

Senate No. 194, by Senator Connors, Labor Committee.--Excludes certain illegal aliens from workers' compensation and temporary disability benefits.

Senate No. 195, by Senators Connors and Oroho, Labor Committee.--Bars companies which hire illegal aliens from public contracts, grants, loans, or tax incentives for seven years.

Senate No. 196, by Senator Connors, Environment and Energy Committee.--Authorizes free hunting, fishing, and trapping licenses and free admission to State parks and forests for individuals with certain types of military service.

Senate No. 197, by Senators Connors and Beach, Judiciary Committee.--Requires court to consider results of domestic violence assessment before dissolving certain domestic violence restraining orders.

Senate No. 198, by Senator Connors, Military and Veterans' Affairs Committee.--Broadens eligibility for certain veterans' benefits by eliminating requirement of service during specified dates or in specified locations.

Senate No. 199, by Senator Connors, Education Committee.--Reestablishes senior citizen supplemental stabilization aid.

Senate No. 206, by Senator Connors, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Increases penalties for identity theft when victim is a senior citizen or veteran.

Senate No. 207, by Senator Connors, State Government, Wagering, Tourism & Historic Preservation Committee.--Makes public officers or employees convicted of certain crimes or found at fault in certain civil actions liable and subject to pension garnishment for public legal expenses and illegally obtained funds.

Senate No. 222, by Senator Diegnan, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--Expands deduction allowed under gross income tax for property taxes paid by homeowners and tenants to increase maximum deduction from \$10,000 to \$35,000 and to include amounts paid on second homes.

Senate No. 235, by Senator Singleton, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Permits certain managed care organizations to consider cost-effectiveness when placing prescription drug on formulary.

Senate No. 236, by Senators Singleton and Vitale, Commerce Committee.--Requires commercial Internet websites and online services to notify customers of collection and disclosure of personally identifiable information and allows customers to opt out.

Senate No. 237, by Senators Singleton and Greenstein, Education Committee.--Requires new civics instruction in middle and high schools; requires school districts to use DOE's curriculum guidelines for civics; and requires DOE to provide funding to enhance civics instruction.

Senate No. 238, by Senators Singleton and Sarlo, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Requires Director of Division of Fire Safety to promulgate regulations pertaining to training and duties of Junior Firefighter Auxiliary members.

Senate No. 240, by Senator Singleton, Budget and Appropriations Committee.--Enhances certain reporting and disclosure concerning State tax expenditures.

Senate No. 245, by Senators Singleton and Bateman, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--Requires shared service agreements to include certain provisions.

Senate No. 246, by Senators Singleton and Diegnan, Commerce Committee.--Repeals statute authorizing offering of "Basic and Essential" health benefits plans under individual health benefits and small employer health benefits plans and other statutes concerning basic health plans; makes conforming amendments.

Senate No. 247, by Senators Singleton and Lagana, Commerce Committee.--Revises certain permissible rating factors for premiums charged for individual and small employer health benefits plans.

Senate No. 249, by Senators Singleton and Turner, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Requires pharmacy benefits manager providing services within Medicaid program to disclose certain information to DHS.

Senate No. 250, by Senator Singleton, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--"Fair Chance in Housing Act"; establishes certain housing rights of persons with criminal records.

Senate No. 251, by Senator Singleton, Economic Growth Committee.--Establishes award limitations for certain EDA tax incentives related to job creation and retention.

Senate No. 252, by Senator Singleton, State Government, Wagering, Tourism & Historic Preservation Committee.--Requires that election infrastructure vendors disclose financial ties for approval as vendor by Secretary of State; requires report of known or suspected security incidents involving election systems to Division of Elections.

Senate No. 253, by Senator Singleton, Environment and Energy Committee.--Requires public water systems to develop lead service line inventories and replace lead service lines.

Senate No. 254, by Senator Singleton, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Requires Commissioner of Human Services to apply for State plan amendment extending NJ FamilyCare eligibility to children of State employees eligible for State health benefits coverage.

Senate No. 255, by Senator Singleton, State Government, Wagering, Tourism & Historic Preservation Committee.--Makes various changes to reporting requirements for independent expenditure committees; establishes reporting requirements for policy impact committees.

Senate No. 256, by Senator Kean, Law and Public Safety Committee.--"The 10-20-Life Law."

Senate No. 257, by Senator Kean, Higher Education Committee.--Amends State college law to remove certain employees from civil service system and allow boards of trustees to conduct collective bargaining.

Senate No. 258, by Senators Kean and Stack, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--Establishes "Government Functions and Services Study Commission."

Senate No. 259, by Senator Kean, Education Committee.--"Opportunity Scholarship Act"; establishes pilot program in Department of Treasury providing tax credits to taxpayers contributing to scholarships for low-income children.

Senate No. 260, by Senator Kean, State Government, Wagering, Tourism & Historic Preservation Committee.--Establishes New Jersey General Accounting Office.

Senate No. 261, by Senator Kean, State Government, Wagering, Tourism & Historic Preservation Committee.--Eliminates requirement for State residency for public officers and employees with limited historic exceptions.

Senate No. 262, by Senator Kean, Judiciary Committee.--Establishes a Medical Malpractice Court.

Senate No. 263, by Senators Kean and Corrado, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Upgrades burglary of a residence to a crime of the second degree; requires mandatory period of parole ineligibility if residence was occupied at time of offense.

Senate No. 264, by Senators Kean and Singleton, Budget and Appropriations Committee.--Allows gross income tax deduction for charitable contributions to certain New Jersey-based charitable organizations.

Senate No. 265, by Senator Kean, Economic Growth Committee.--Requires electric public utilities to provide priority power restoration to certain medical facilities, assisted living facilities, and nursing homes.

Senate No. 266, by Senators Kean and Beach, Education Committee.--Directs Attorney General to provide annual training to public and nonpublic school students and staff on roles and responsibilities before, during, and after school emergencies.

Senate No. 267, by Senator Kean, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--Establishes "Commission on Statewide Affordable Housing Obligations" to determine Statewide need for low and moderate income housing.

Senate No. 268, by Senator Kean, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Provides alcoholic beverage tax credits to breweries for qualified capital expenses.

Senate No. 269, by Senator Kean, Commerce Committee.--Requires certain businesses to notify data subjects of collection of personally identifiable information and establishes certain security standards.

Senate No. 270, by Senator Kean, Judiciary Committee.--Expands registration requirements under Megan's Law to include persons committing human trafficking crimes or engaging in prostitution, when crimes involve minors.

Senate No. 271, by Senator Kean, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Authorizes holder of limited brewery license to engage in certain activities.

Senate No. 272, by Senator Kean, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--Requires compliance with notice and approval process under MLUL for construction of free-standing structures on certain publicly-owned property.

Senate No. 273, by Senators Kean and Lagana, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Requires reporting of opioid deaths.

Senate No. 274, by Senator Kean, Economic Growth Committee.--Requires EDA to provide loans through small business loan program at lower interest rates, with more flexible repayment terms if issued to small businesses owned or controlled by certain veterans, and prohibit certain fees.

Senate No. 275, by Senator Kean, Higher Education Committee.--Provides resident tuition rate to certain non-resident dependent children of United States military personnel attending public institutions of higher education.

Senate No. 276, by Senator Kean, Education Committee.--Provides adjustment to school district tax levy cap for expenditures associated with opening of renovated or new school facility during budget year for full-day kindergarten.

Senate No. 277, by Senators Kean and Weinberg, Transportation Committee.--"Emma's Law"; requires school buses that transport students with special needs to be equipped with certain safety features.

Senate No. 278, by Senators Kean and Cunningham, Higher Education Committee.--Requires public institution of higher education to refund course tuition and fees to certain service members and to permit late registration for veterans and service members.

Senate No. 279, by Senators Kean and Pou, Commerce Committee.--Revises requirements and process for temporary courtesy licenses and certificates issued by State Board of Examiners, NJ Board of Nursing, and other professional and occupational licensing boards to nonresident military spouses.

Senate No. 280, by Senator Kean, Judiciary Committee.--Directs the development and posting of notices containing information for victims of human trafficking.

Senate No. 281, by Senators Pennacchio and Madden, Labor Committee.--Concerns certain workers' compensation supplemental benefits for surviving dependents of public safety workers who die in the line of duty.

Senate No. 282, by Senators Pennacchio and Turner, Judiciary Committee.--Creates New Jersey Innocence Study and Review Commission.

Senate No. 283, by Senator Pennacchio, Economic Growth Committee.--Concerns baked goods sold at farm markets.

Senate No. 284, by Senator Pennacchio, Commerce Committee.--Requires consumer reporting agencies to provide a consumer with a free credit report three times during any 12-month period upon request.

Senate No. 285, by Senator Pennacchio, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--Increases income eligibility limit for reduction or abatement of municipal or county utility authority fees.

Senate No. 286, by Senator Pennacchio, Environment and Energy Committee.--Exempts construction, expansion, or renovation of public institutions of higher education, public schools, and police and fire academies from "Highlands Water Protection and Planning Act."

Senate No. 287, by Senator Pennacchio, Labor Committee.--Allows public contractors paying benefits under collective bargaining agreements to count benefit costs toward compliance with local "living wage" ordinances.

Senate No. 288, by Senator Pennacchio, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Eliminates age restriction for issuing special permits to carry handgun to retired law enforcement officers.

Senate No. 289, by Senator Pennacchio, Transportation Committee.--"Port Authority of New York and New Jersey Cargo Facility Charge Act."

Senate No. 290, by Senators Pennacchio and Brown, Budget and Appropriations Committee.--Removes income eligibility cap applicable to gross income tax pension and retirement income exclusion.

Senate No. 291, by Senators Pennacchio and Singleton, Environment and Energy Committee.--Allocates 10 percent of Green Acres funding to local government units for development of completely inclusive playgrounds.

Senate No. 292, by Senator Pennacchio, Higher Education Committee.--Prohibits public institutions of higher education from making certain payouts to departing employees that are not contractually obligated; requires Secretary of Higher Education to approve certain higher education employment contracts.

Senate No. 293, by Senators Pennacchio and Diegnan, Education Committee.--"Mallory's Law"; revises provisions required in school district's anti-bullying policy; provides for civil liability of parent of minor adjudicated delinquent for cyber-harassment or harassment; and increases certain fines against parents.

Senate No. 294, by Senator Pennacchio, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Requires person convicted, or fleeing charge, of sex offense in foreign country to register under Megan's Law; requires law enforcement to inquire about immigration status of sex offenders and cooperate with federal immigration authorities.

Senate No. 295, by Senator Pennacchio, Environment and Energy Committee.--Adds fusion to types of Class I renewable energies as defined for purposes of "Electric Discount and Energy Competition Act."

Senate No. 296, by Senators Pennacchio and Cunningham, Higher Education Committee.--Establishes scholarship program for graduate students and postdoctoral researchers in field of fusion science.

Senate No. 297, by Senator Pennacchio, Economic Growth Committee.--Provides that fusion energy and fusion technology

companies are eligible to receive benefits under certain economic incentive programs.

Senate No. 298, by Senator Pennacchio, Economic Growth Committee.--"Fusion Technology Industry Promotion Act"; establishes program to promote fusion technology industry and attract fusion technology businesses.

Senate No. 299, by Senator Pennacchio, Economic Growth Committee.--Establishes NJ Fusion Technology Industry Commission.

Senate No. 300, by Senators Pennacchio and Kean, State Government, Wagering, Tourism & Historic Preservation Committee.--Requires Division of Purchase and Property to issue annual report on public contracts awarded to women-owned and minority-owned businesses; requires Division of Revenue to operate Selective Assistance Vendor Information (SAVI) database.

Senate No. 301, by Senator Rice, Transportation Committee.--Requires notice of certain transportation-related infrastructure projects and activities to be published on Internet website, and directs State Comptroller to monitor publication of those notifications.

Senate No. 302, by Senators Rice and Gill, Environment and Energy Committee.--Establishes Clean Energy Technology Center and Alternative and Clean Energy Investment Trust Fund for purposes of creating clean energy-related employment opportunities; allocates revenues from societal benefits charge to support its activities.

Senate No. 303, by Senator Rice, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--Authorizes certain municipalities to impose a tax on the storage of empty shipping containers to fund redevelopment plan activities.

Senate No. 304, by Senator Rice, State Government, Wagering, Tourism & Historic Preservation Committee.--Requires State agencies and local government units to report certain information concerning bids on public contracts by minority- and women-owned business enterprises; prohibits discrimination against such enterprises.

Senate No. 305, by Senator Rice, Labor Committee.--Requires Center for Occupational Employment Information to share labor market information with school districts and public institutions of higher education.

Senate No. 306, by Senators Rice and O'Scanlon, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--Clarifies and expands landlord registration procedures; creates certain rights for tenants; makes certain changes concerning tenant notifications, inspections, and maintenance in multiple dwellings; permits percentage of affordable housing obligation to be satisfied by certain rehabilitation projects.

Senate No. 307, by Senators Rice and Greenstein, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Requires successful applicants for employment and current staff members of child care centers to undergo drug testing as condition of employment.

Senate No. 308, by Senator Rice, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--Requires municipal accounting of abandoned properties before receiving certain State aid; establishes State database of abandoned properties; requires owners of abandoned properties to document rehabilitation efforts.

Senate No. 309, by Senator Rice, Labor Committee.--Establishes Energy and Manufacturing Workforce Development Program in DOLWD.

Senate No. 310, by Senator Rice, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--Allows municipalities to adjust deadline to apply for short-term exemption or abatement for dwellings; requires provision of notice to purchasers of dwellings in areas in need of rehabilitation under certain circumstances.

Senate No. 311, by Senator Rice, Education Committee.--Prohibits school district from denying admittance to student due to tardiness or violation of dress code or school uniform policy.

Senate No. 312, by Senator Rice, Judiciary Committee.--Decriminalizes possession of small amounts of marijuana, hashish, and marijuana-infused products; downgrades certain distribution crimes; requires expedited expungement of certain offenses.

Senate No. 313, by Senator Rice, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Establishes Disparity in Treatment of Persons with Disabilities in Underrepresented Communities Commission in DCA.

Senate No. 314, by Senators Rice and Kean, Education Committee.--Establishes "New Jersey Out-of-School Time Advisory Commission" to review before-school, after-school, and summer programs.

Senate No. 315, by Senators Rice and Cunningham, Law and Public Safety Committee.--The "New Jersey Youth Justice Transformation Act;" annually appropriates \$100 million to Juvenile Justice Commission.

Senate No. 316, by Senator Rice, Education Committee.--Establishes the Office of Dropout Prevention and Reengagement of Out-of-School Youth in DOE, and the Student Dropout Prevention Task Force.

Senate No. 317, by Senator Rice, Commerce Committee.--Requires financial institution that has foreclosed on property to remove water service lines that contain lead.

Senate No. 318, by Senators Rice and Singleton, State Government, Wagering, Tourism & Historic Preservation Committee.--Requires entities at every level of government to conduct periodic studies of racial and ethnic disparities in public contracting.

Senate No. 319, by Senator Rice, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Establishes requirements for conducting health impact assessments of pending legislation; makes an appropriation.

Senate No. 320, by Senator Rice, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--Requires contracts for sales of residential property to address lead service lines.

Senate No. 321, by Senator Rice, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--Requires certain residential developers to replace lead service lines.

Senate No. 322, by Senators Rice and Cunningham, State Government, Wagering, Tourism & Historic Preservation Committee.--Establishes "New Jersey Reparations Task Force."

Senate No. 323, by Senator Diegnan, State Government, Wagering, Tourism & Historic Preservation Committee.--Decreases from 55 days to 21 days minimum time required to change political party affiliation prior to primary.

Senate No. 324, by Senator Diegnan, Transportation Committee.--Authorizes operators of motor vehicles to display electronic proof of registration.

Senate No. 325, by Senator Diegnan, Environment and Energy Committee.--Establishes process for recovering cost of caring for animals involved in animal cruelty violations.

Senate No. 326, by Senator Diegnan, Education Committee.--Renames "county vocational school districts" as "county career academies."

Senate No. 327, by Senators Diegnan and Ruiz, Education Committee.--Establishes grant program for school districts and charter schools to develop dual language immersion programs.

Senate No. 328, by Senators Diegnan and Weinberg, Transportation Committee.--Requires public transportation employees to complete training course on handling and responding to suspected human trafficking.

Senate No. 329, by Senator Smith, Environment and Energy Committee.--Establishes "Solar Roof Installation Warranty Program" in EDA and transfers \$2 million from societal benefits charge to initially fund program.

Senate No. 330, by Senators Smith and Greenstein, State Government, Wagering, Tourism & Historic Preservation Committee.--Prohibits investment by State of pension and annuity funds in, and requires divestment from, 200 largest publicly traded fossil fuel companies.

Senate No. 331, by Senators Smith and Codey, Environment and Energy Committee.--Requires environmental sustainability plan for State House Complex.

Senate No. 332, by Senator Smith, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--Requires Site Improvement Advisory Board to offer recommendations to encourage sustainable development.

Senate No. 333, by Senator Smith, Environment and Energy Committee.--Requires DCA to authorize municipalities to impose highly-enhanced energy conservation construction requirements.

Senate No. 334, by Senators Smith and Greenstein, Environment and Energy Committee.--Requires municipalities, public utilities, and State to use LED technology in certain street lights.

Senate No. 335, by Senators Smith and Oroho, Environment and Energy Committee.--Permits certain deer control activities; establishes check-off donation on hunting license applications to support venison donation program; authorizes issuance of multi-species depredation permit for wildlife control on farmland.

Senate No. 336, by Senators Smith and Greenstein, Commerce Committee.--Establishes standards for food date labeling; requires Commissioner of Health to establish public education program and promulgate guidelines related to food safety.

Senate No. 337, by Senators Smith and Greenstein, Environment and Energy Committee.--Authorizes NJ Infrastructure Bank to issue up to \$20 million in bonds to finance cost-effective energy efficiency improvements in State, local, and school district buildings.

Senate No. 338, by Senators Smith and Greenstein, Environment and Energy Committee.--Establishes uniform alternative assessment for commercial renewable energy systems and limits municipal construction permit fees for non-commercial renewable energy systems.

Senate No. 339, by Senator Smith, Environment and Energy Committee.--"Water Resources Protection Trust Fund Act"; establishes user fee on water consumption and diversion; utilizes fee revenue for water quality, supply, and infrastructure projects.

Senate No. 340, by Senators Smith and Greenstein, Environment and Energy Committee.--Establishes Statewide targets to reduce disposal of organic waste in landfills; requires DEP to adopt regulations to achieve targets.

Senate No. 341, by Senators Smith and Bateman, Environment and Energy Committee.--Prohibits municipal zoning ordinances from regulating solar panels under certain circumstances; limits fees for certain renewable energy installations.

Senate No. 342, by Senator Smith, Environment and Energy Committee.--Authorizes DEP rulemaking to prevent backsliding of certain State environmental regulations due to changes in federal law or regulation.

Senate No. 343, by Senators Smith and Diegnan, Economic Growth Committee.--Directs New Jersey Cybersecurity and Communications Integration Cell, Office of Information Technology, and New Jersey Big Data Alliance to develop advanced cyberinfrastructure strategic plan.

Senate No. 344, by Senators Smith, Bateman and Greenstein, Environment and Energy Committee.--Requires, by energy year 2050, all electric power sold in NJ by each electric power supplier and basic generation service provider to be from zero-carbon sources.

Senate No. 345, by Senator Smith, Environment and Energy Committee.--Authorizes local law enforcement officers to conduct certain alternative deer control methods.

Senate No. 346, by Senators Smith, Oroho and Sweeney, Education Committee.--Establishes pilot program in DOE for organization of county administrative school districts.

Senate No. 347, by Senators Smith and Vitale, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Establishes "NJ One Health Task Force."

Senate No. 348, by Senator Smith, Environment and Energy Committee.--Requires each solid waste management district to develop strategy in solid waste management plan to reduce food waste.

Senate No. 349, by Senator Smith, Environment and Energy Committee.--Requires developers to offer electric vehicle charging stations as option in certain new home construction.

Senate No. 350, by Senator Smith, Environment and Energy Committee.--Provides purchasing preference to local and environmentally responsible businesses in awarding of State contracts.

Senate No. 351, by Senator Cryan, Higher Education Committee.--Limits term of board of trustee member at public institution of higher education to four years; limits trustee to no more than two terms; provides for trustee removal from board for missing three consecutive meetings.

Senate No. 352, by Senator Cryan, Commerce Committee.--Requires continued coverage for primary care physician services for 12 months following termination or withdrawal of physician from provider network.

Senate No. 353, by Senator Cryan, Higher Education Committee.--Prohibits four-year public and independent institutions of higher education from increasing New Jersey resident undergraduate tuition and fees for nine continuous semesters following student's initial enrollment.

Senate No. 354, by Senator Cryan, Higher Education Committee.--Requires governing boards of public institutions of higher education to adopt tuition and fee schedules for ensuing academic year during Spring semester after issuance of Governor's recommended budget.

Senate No. 355, by Senator Cryan, Higher Education Committee.-- Requires New Jersey Educational Facilities Authority to annually prepare report on debt held by public institutions of higher education.

Senate No. 356, by Senator Cryan, Higher Education Committee.-- Establishes study commission to examine development of mutually beneficial relationships between institutions of higher education and municipalities.

Senate No. 357, by Senators Cryan and Vitale, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Reinstates prior property tax exemption for nonprofit hospitals with on-site for-profit medical providers; requires some of these hospitals to pay community service contributions; establishes Nonprofit Hospital Community Service Contribution Study Commission; prohibits certain third-party property tax appeals.

Senate No. 358, by Senators Cryan and Ruiz, Education Committee.--Requires public school instruction in mental health as it relates to suicide prevention and provides various elements which may be included in instruction.

Senate No. 359, by Senators Cryan and Ruiz, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Requires Medicaid cover professional violence prevention counseling services.

Senate No. 360, by Senator Cryan, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Establishes Statewide Rapid Response Emergency Group.

Senate No. 361, by Senators Cryan and Ruiz, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Provides Medicaid coverage for certain home visitation program services under certain circumstances.

Senate No. 362, by Senator Cryan, Transportation Committee.--Requires NJT to operate Access Link paratransit service during state of emergency under certain circumstances.

Senate No. 363, by Senator Cryan, Commerce Committee.--Prohibits health insurance carriers from denying payment for preauthorized covered services except under certain circumstances.

Senate No. 364, by Senator Cryan, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Provides that leaving scene of motor vehicle accident is crime of first degree if accident results in death of another person.

Senate No. 365, by Senators Cryan and Vitale, State Government, Wagering, Tourism & Historic Preservation Committee.--Requires

certain health care plans to be offered by SEHBP and local boards of education; requires SEHBP commission to establish employee contribution rates for certain plans; requires local boards of education provide certain information on health care benefits.

Senate No. 366, by Senator Cryan, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Grants certain employment protections to campus police officers.

Senate No. 367, by Senator Cryan, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Authorizes certain entities to directly bill Victims of Crime Compensation Office for counseling services provided to victims of firearm and stabbing crimes.

Senate No. 368, by Senators Cryan and Weinberg, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--Permits municipalities to require developers to make contributions for mass transit improvements.

Senate No. 369, by Senators Cryan and Vitale, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Requires DOC to ensure inmates have opportunity to participate in Medicaid pre-enrollment and enrollment sessions at least 60 days prior to release; requires applicable inmates to receive Medicaid card at release.

Senate No. 370, by Senators Cryan and Vitale, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Establishes "County Jail Rehabilitation and Re-Entry Program" to evaluate county inmate needs; assigns certain county caseworkers to assist inmates in accessing appropriate benefits, treatment, and services.

Senate No. 371, by Senators Cryan and Vitale, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Requires DOC and DHS to pre-enroll inmates in Medicaid; establishes Medicaid enrollment course for inmates within DOC.

Senate No. 372, by Senator Cryan, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Requires firearm owners who become New Jersey residents to obtain firearm purchaser identification card and register firearms acquired out-of-State.

Senate No. 373, by Senator Cryan, Budget and Appropriations Committee.--Increases sales and use tax from 6.625 percent to 7 percent for seven years, beginning July 1, 2020, and dedicates portion of sales and use tax revenue to NJT Corporation.

Senate No. 374, by Senators Cryan and Vitale, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Requires each county to establish inmate reentry services committee.

Senate No. 375, by Senators Cryan and Vitale, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Authorizes use of county inmate welfare funds for certain reentry services.

Senate No. 376, by Senator Weinberg, Commerce Committee.--"New Jersey Ticket Consumer Choice Act."

Senate No. 377, by Senator Weinberg, Labor Committee.--Requires certain subcontracted transportation center workers to be paid certain wage rates and benefits.

Senate No. 379, by Senator Weinberg, State Government, Wagering, Tourism & Historic Preservation Committee.--Makes various changes to law addressing meetings of public bodies to provide public with greater access to meetings and information about meetings.

Senate No. 380, by Senator Weinberg, State Government, Wagering, Tourism & Historic Preservation Committee.--Makes certain access changes to open public records act; requires inclusion of certain State financial information on open data website; creates program for development of local websites; makes appropriation.

Senate No. 381, by Senator Weinberg, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Establishes supervised community reintegration program in DOC for certain victims of domestic abuse.

Senate No. 382, by Senators Weinberg and Singleton, Judiciary Committee.--Requires uniform response procedures for all domestic crisis teams established or participated in by law enforcement agencies, and strengthens Statewide supervision over teams.

Senate No. 383, by Senators Weinberg and Singleton, Judiciary Committee.--Establishes standards for Batterers' Intervention Programs in domestic violence cases.

Senate No. 384, by Senators Weinberg and Singleton, Judiciary Committee.--Establishes certain requirements for domestic violence training for certain judges and judicial personnel.

Senate No. 385, by Senators Weinberg and Singleton, Judiciary Committee.--Requires training for law enforcement officers and assistant county prosecutors concerning handling of domestic violence cases.

Senate No. 386, by Senators Weinberg and Singleton, Judiciary Committee.--Establishes mandatory domestic violence training for municipal prosecutors.

Senate No. 675, by Senator Thompson, Education Committee.-- Provides supplemental appropriation to DOE to provide additional State aid to certain school districts.

Senate No. 676, by Senators Thompson and Brown, State Government, Wagering, Tourism & Historic Preservation Committee.-- Increases penalty for certain voting violations from third degree crime to second degree crime when aggravating factors apply.

Senate No. 677, by Senator Thompson, Judiciary Committee.-- Upgrades crowdfunded thefts; imposes mandatory restitution and fines; requires minimum term of imprisonment.

Senate No. 678, by Senator Thompson, Education Committee.-- Requires 11th grade students to complete civics course as part of high school graduation requirements.

Senate No. 679, by Senator Thompson, State Government, Wagering, Tourism & Historic Preservation Committee.-- Requires automatic voter registration process at agency or office providing hunting, fishing, or trapping license.

Senate No. 680, by Senators Thompson and Greenstein, Education Committee.-- Requires school districts to provide lunch period of not less than 20 seated minutes.

Senate No. 681, by Senators Thompson and Cruz-Perez, Education Committee.-- Provides emergency State school aid to certain school districts located in historic communities.

Senate No. 682, by Senators Ruiz and Turner, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.-- Expands liability of certain individuals associated with limited liability companies and other commercial entities, when acting as residential landlord.

Senate No. 683, by Senator Ruiz, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.-- Requires owners of multiple dwellings with at least nine units to provide maintenance services 24 hours a day.

Senate No. 684, by Senator Ruiz, Higher Education Committee.-- Concerns for-profit post-secondary educational institutions.

Senate No. 685, by Senators Ruiz and Cunningham, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.-- Permits municipal, county, and regional police and fire forces to establish five-year residency requirement for

police officers and firefighters; allows exceptions to requirement under certain circumstances.

Senate No. 686, by Senator Ruiz, Judiciary Committee.--Creates Mental Illness Diversion Program to divert eligible persons away from criminal justice system and into appropriate case management and mental health services.

Senate No. 687, by Senators Ruiz and Beach, Education Committee.--"Hunger-Free Students' Bill of Rights Act"; requires certain school meal information be provided to students' parents; establishes protocols for identifying eligible students for meal programs; prohibits stigmatizing student with bill in arrears.

Senate No. 688, by Senators Ruiz and Singleton, Labor Committee.--Enhances pre-apprenticeship programs and allocates funds therefor.

Senate No. 691, by Senator Ruiz, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--Requires installation of diaper changing station in certain public restrooms; appropriates \$500,000.

Senate No. 692, by Senators Ruiz and Singleton, Education Committee.--Requires school districts to provide feminine hygiene products in certain public schools and requires State to pay costs.

Senate No. 693, by Senators Ruiz and Cunningham, Higher Education Committee.--Requires Secretary of Higher Education to create and maintain database of Educational Opportunity Fund student admissions.

Senate No. 694, by Senators Ruiz, Weinberg and Cunningham, Judiciary Committee.--Reaffirms and clarifies that Attorney General and Division on Civil Rights may initiate actions in Superior Court to enforce "Law Against Discrimination."

certain buildings to take certain actions to prevent and control cases of Legionnaires' disease.

Senate No. 715, by Senators Addiego and Singleton, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Establishes Good Samaritan Law to provide immunity from civil liability for veterinarians or emergency responders who assist animals at accident scene or emergency.

Senate No. 716, by Senators Addiego and Sweeney, Education Committee.--Permits school district of residence to provide aid in-lieu-of transportation to pupil attending Marine Academy of Science and Technology provided certain conditions are met.

Senate No. 717, by Senators Addiego and Singleton, Military and Veterans' Affairs Committee.--Provides gross income tax deduction to certain surviving spouses of veterans.

Senate No. 718, by Senators Addiego, Singleton and Madden, Labor Committee.--Provides tax credits to certain employers of employees less than 18 years old.

Senate No. 754, by Senator Gopal, Transportation Committee.--Establishes program allowing NJ licensed drivers to self-identify as having been diagnosed with post-traumatic stress disorder.

Senate No. 755, by Senator Gopal, Budget and Appropriations Committee.--Converts senior freeze reimbursement program into credit program.

Senate No. 756, by Senators Gopal and Pennacchio, Budget and Appropriations Committee.--Increases gross income tax pension and retirement income exclusion for certain taxpayers.

Senate No. 757, by Senator Gopal, State Government, Wagering, Tourism & Historic Preservation Committee.--Transfers Workers' Compensation Judges from DCRP and Workers Compensation Judges Part of PERS to JRS.

Senate No. 768, by Senators Scutari and Cardinale, Judiciary Committee.--Restricts access to motor vehicle accident reports under certain circumstances.

Senate No. 769, by Senators Scutari and Cardinale, Commerce Committee.--Provides for two-year post-employment restriction on certain employees of the Department of Banking and Insurance.

Senate No. 770, by Senator Scutari, Commerce Committee.--Prohibits certain violations of terms of service for Internet ticket sales.

Senate No. 771, by Senator Scutari, Labor Committee.--Expands workers' compensation coverage to parking areas provided by employer.

Senate No. 772, by Senator Scutari, Judiciary Committee.--Makes provisions of the "New Jersey False Claims Act" retroactive under certain circumstances.

Senate No. 773, by Senator Scutari, State Government, Wagering, Tourism & Historic Preservation Committee.--Requires State contracts to include provisions imposing penalties on vendor or contractor for contract violations.

Senate No. 774, by Senator Scutari, Judiciary Committee.--Requires all attorneys engaged in private practice of law in New Jersey be covered by legal malpractice liability insurance.

Senate No. 775, by Senator Scutari, Commerce Committee.--Requires business owners and rental unit owners to maintain certain liability insurance policies.

Senate No. 776, by Senator Scutari, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--Regulates installation, maintenance, and repair of low-voltage alarm systems and battery-charged fences.

Senate No. 777, by Senator Scutari, Transportation Committee.--Requires certain sellers of used motor vehicles to notify MVC of sale; limits liability of certain sellers after sale of used motor vehicles.

Senate No. 778, by Senators Scutari and Sacco, Transportation Committee.--Requires door to operator's cabin be locked on NJT trains.

Senate No. 779, by Senators Scutari and Cardinale, State Government, Wagering, Tourism & Historic Preservation Committee.--Permits travel by legislator to foreign country to be paid for by foreign country when legislator travels in official capacity.

Senate No. 780, by Senators Scutari and Gill, Judiciary Committee.--Expands wrongful death act to allow recovery for mental anguish, emotional pain and suffering, loss of society and loss of companionship.

Senate No. 781, by Senators Scutari and Pou, Commerce Committee.--Requires motor vehicle insurance policies to include certain underinsured and uninsured motorist coverage.

Senate No. 782, by Senator Scutari, Commerce Committee.--Repeals no-fault automobile insurance law and requires mandatory liability insurance law for motor vehicles.

Senate No. 783, by Senators Scutari and Pou, Commerce Committee.--Provides that limitation on lawsuit option does not apply in accidents caused by drunk or reckless drivers.

Senate No. 784, by Senators Scutari and Cryan, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Deletes prior authorization requirements by certain insurers for accessing certain health care services.

Senate No. 785, by Senators Scutari and Beach, Education Committee.--Establishes "New Jersey STEM Scholars Grant Pilot Program" in Department of Education.

Senate No. 786, by Senator Scutari, Commerce Committee.--Prohibits pre-approval or precertification of medical tests, procedures and prescription drugs covered under health benefits or prescription drug benefits plans.

Senate No. 787, by Senators Scutari and Cryan, Environment and Energy Committee.--Requires registry of animal rescue organizations; requires animal rescue, pet shop, shelter, or pound notify person adopting or purchasing animal of animal's behavioral and medical history; designated as "Rocky's Law."

Senate No. 788, by Senator Scutari, Commerce Committee.--Increases certain minimum limits for motor vehicle and automobile insurance coverages.

Senate No. 789, by Senator Scutari, Commerce Committee.--Eliminates certain personal injury protection options available under standard automobile insurance policies; requires \$250,000 of medical expense benefits under standard and basic automobile insurance policies.

Senate No. 790, by Senators Cunningham and Ruiz, Higher Education Committee.--Requires president of public institution of higher education to regularly report on-campus criminal and fire events to the institution's governing board.

Senate No. 791, by Senators Cunningham and Pou, Higher Education Committee.--Requires undergraduate students to file degree plan and requires institutions of higher education and certain proprietary institutions to develop pathway systems to graduation.

Senate No. 792, by Senators Cunningham, Sweeney and Singer, Education Committee.--Requires State Board of Education high school graduation requirements include instruction on tuition assistance programs and student loan debt; requires high school students to meet with guidance counselor to discuss tuition assistance and dual enrollment.

Senate No. 793, by Senator Cunningham, Labor Committee.--Commits \$3 million from Supplemental Workforce Fund for Basic Skill

to NJ Community College Consortium for Workforce and Economic Development.

Senate No. 794, by Senators Cunningham and Cryan, Higher Education Committee.--Establishes process for county colleges to offer baccalaureate degree programs in certain critical-need applied science fields.

Senate No. 795, by Senators Cunningham and Kean, Higher Education Committee.--Revises standards for contracting at State colleges to mirror standards applicable to public research universities.

Senate No. 796, by Senators Cunningham and Kean, Higher Education Committee.--Increases age of dependent for whom gross income tax exemption for higher education expenses may be claimed from under 22 years to under 25 years.

Senate No. 797, by Senator Cunningham, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--Prohibits municipal licensure of children operating temporary businesses.

Senate No. 798, by Senators Cunningham and Ruiz, Commerce Committee.--Requires certain corporations to appoint women to board of directors.

Senate No. 799, by Senator Cunningham, Higher Education Committee.--Requires public institutions of higher education to temporarily suspend collection of tuition and other payments from students impacted by shutdown of federal government.

Senate No. 800, by Senator Cunningham, Judiciary Committee.--Bars the denial of expungement application in certain instances.

Senate No. 801, by Senator Cunningham, Labor Committee.--Provides that certain employees of educational institutions are eligible for unemployment benefits under certain circumstances.

Senate No. 802, by Senator Cunningham, Judiciary Committee.--Includes certain armed security officers regulated by "Detective Melvin Vincent Santiago's Law" in crimes of assault and disarming an officer.

Senate No. 803, by Senators Cunningham and Ruiz, Labor Committee.--Clarifies prohibition on discrimination against servicemembers in "Law Against Discrimination."

Senate No. 804, by Senator Cunningham, Higher Education Committee.--Prohibits academic degree-granting institutions from entering into revenue sharing arrangements with financial institutions for

consumer financial products or services and regulates consumer financial products or services marketed to students.

Senate No. 805, by Senator Cunningham, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Revises eligibility for convicted drug offenders to receive general assistance benefits under Work First New Jersey program.

Senate No. 806, by Senator Cunningham, Higher Education Committee.--Provides that New Jersey Better Educational Savings Trust (NJBEST) Program scholarship may be awarded in any semester of attendance or enrollment at institution of higher education in State.

Senate No. 807, by Senator Cunningham, Higher Education Committee.--Requires institutions of higher education to distribute information on availability of allowance for dependent care expenses in determination of cost of attendance.

Senate No. 808, by Senator Cunningham, Higher Education Committee.--Establishes Outstanding Scholars Recruitment Program.

Senate No. 809, by Senator Testa, Judiciary Committee.--Directs AG to enter into agreement with U.S. Attorney General to empower certain corrections officers to investigate immigration status of inmates.

Senate No. 810, by Senator Testa, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Prohibits release of illegal immigrants from correctional facilities.

Senate No. 811, by Senator Testa, Labor Committee.--Concerns eligibility for unemployment compensation benefits for certain seasonal employees.

Senate No. 812, by Senator Testa, Budget and Appropriations Committee.--Establishes State Debt Capacity Advisory Commission.

Senate No. 813, by Senator Testa, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Requires chief law enforcement officer or Superintendent of State Police to notify federal immigration authorities when non-citizen applies for firearms purchaser identification card or handgun purchase permit.

Senate No. 814, by Senator Testa, Education Committee.--Establishes School Funding Commission to study school funding formula and prepare report that will serve as basis of new formula.

Senate No. 815, by Senator Lagana, Judiciary Committee.--Authorizes application for dismissal of a "Strategic Lawsuit Against Public Participation" ("SLAPP").

Senate No. 816, by Senator Lagana, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Prohibits firearm possession by persons convicted of certain offenses.

Senate No. 817, by Senators Lagana and Scutari, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Prohibits medical providers from reporting certain workers' compensation medical charges to collection and credit reporting agencies.

Senate No. 818, by Senator Lagana, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--Permits transmittal of certain proposed county ordinances by electronic mail.

Senate No. 819, by Senators Lagana and Greenstein, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Prohibits leaving loaded firearm within easy access of minor under age of 18; requires law enforcement officers who observe unsecured firearms to conduct follow-up.

Senate No. 1028, by Senator Ruiz, Education Committee.--Allocates Amistad Commission in but not of DOE; requires commission to elect chairperson and appoint executive director; requires public schools to include instruction on accomplishments and contributions of African Americans to American society.

Senate No. 1029, by Senator Ruiz, Education Committee.--Requires school districts to employ at least one certified nutrition specialist, registered dietitian, or registered dietitian nutritionist.

Senate No. 1030, by Senator Ruiz, Education Committee.--Establishes pilot program to create student mental health assistance programs in selected school districts.

Senate No. 1031, by Senator Ruiz, Education Committee.--Requires certain school meal information be provided to public school students' parents and requires school districts to request that families apply for school meals under certain circumstances.

Senate No. 1032, by Senator Ruiz, Education Committee.--Requires young children entering public schools or Head Start Programs for first time to have comprehensive eye examination completed.

Senate No. 1033, by Senators Ruiz and Vitale, Education Committee.--Requires public schools to comply with more stringent school lunch and breakfast nutrition standards adopted by USDA in 2012.

Senate No. 1034, by Senator Stack, Environment and Energy Committee.--Provides for spaying and neutering stray or feral cats and establishes fund therefor; designated as "Compassion for Community Cats Law."

Senate No. 1035, by Senator Gopal, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Provides that persons between 18 and 21 years of age with disabilities are eligible to receive direct support professional services from DHS.

Senate No. 1036, by Senator Gopal, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Establishes a Personal Care Assistance Task Force in Department of Human Services.

Senate No. 1037, by Senator Gopal, Transportation Committee.--Requires MVC to enter into contract to implement electronic lien and title system; removes authority for MVC to implement system by itself.

Senate No. 1038, by Senator Gopal, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Increases hourly limit of reimbursable personal care assistant services under NJ WorkAbility Program.

Senate No. 1039, by Senator Gopal, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Authorizes pharmacists to dispense HIV prophylaxis without individual prescription under certain circumstances; mandates prescription benefits coverage.

Senate No. 1040, by Senator Gopal, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Authorizes certain Medicaid recipients residing on post-secondary school campus to participate remotely in meetings of non-medical nature regarding Medicaid benefits.

Senate No. 1041, by Senator Gopal, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Increases number of home health aide service hours provided to individual with disabilities residing on post-secondary school campus following initial assessment; requires reassessment every 6 months.

Senate No. 1042, by Senator Gopal, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Requires Medicaid managed care organizations to notify certain beneficiaries of maximum coverage for personal care service hours.

Senate No. 1043, by Senator Cryan, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Establishes pilot program in certain municipalities to make grants available to non-profit organizations to perform outreach regarding VCCO.

Senate No. 1044, by Senator Cryan, Commerce Committee.--Requires certain furniture retailers to provide notice of furniture tip over risks; requires tip restraint devices be available for purchase.

Senate No. 1045, by Senator Cryan, Commerce Committee.--"Private Vehicle Rental Modernization Act."

Senate No. 1046, by Senator Cryan, Commerce Committee.--Regulates certain practices of pharmacy benefits managers related to specialty drugs; requires disclosure of payment information related to prescription drugs.

Senate No. 1047, by Senator Cryan, Commerce Committee.--Concerns disclosure of certain information prior to sale of real estate.

Senate No. 1048, by Senator Cryan, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Establishes centralized electronic health information exchange infrastructure to facilitate reentry into civilian life for recently incarcerated persons.

Senate No. 1049, by Senator Cryan, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Establishes standard medical expense deduction under SNAP for certain senior citizens.

Senate No. 1050, by Senator Cryan, Economic Growth Committee.--Requires Business Action Center to develop single application form to determine business assistance program eligibility.

Senate No. 1051, by Senator Cryan, Transportation Committee.--Requires private bus operators that participate in NJT bus lease program, receive State funds, or are under contract with NJT to provide notice and hold public hearings for certain service changes.

Senate No. 1052, by Senator Cryan, Transportation Committee.--Requires NJT to provide notice and public hearing for alternative provisions of service related to substantial curtailment of service.

Senate No. 1053, by Senator Singleton, Labor Committee.-- Establishes waterfront wage standards.

Senate No. 1054, by Senator Stack, Environment and Energy Committee.--Requires owner notification of rabies testing protocol and owner options prior to testing of owner's animal for rabies.

Senate No. 1055, by Senator Stack, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--Permits qualified municipalities to prohibit conversion of affordable residential rental units to certain forms of ownership housing.

Senate No. 1056, by Senator Holzapfel, Environment and Energy Committee.--Waives certain adoption fees for veterans.

Senate No. 1057, by Senator Turner, Environment and Energy Committee.--Requires child care centers to test for and remediate lead in drinking water, and disclose test results.

Senate No. 1058, by Senator Turner, Environment and Energy Committee.--Requires public and nonpublic schools to test for and remediate lead in drinking water, and disclose test results.

Senate No. 1059, by Senator Turner, Judiciary Committee.-- Establishes publicly accessible domestic violence Internet registry.

Senate No. 1060, by Senator Turner, Judiciary Committee.--Provides that Probation Division would file child support judgment as a lien only when amount of judgment equals or exceeds amount of child support due for a one-month period.

Senate No. 1061, by Senator Turner, Judiciary Committee.--Bars the disclosure of personal identifying information of grand jury witnesses except for name; creates a fourth degree offense for attorney disclosure.

Senate No. 1062, by Senator Turner, Judiciary Committee.-- Authorizes executor or administrator to take control of online accounts of deceased person.

Senate No. 1063, by Senator Turner, Judiciary Committee.--Upgrades assault on victims who are elderly or disabled.

Senate No. 1064, by Senators Bateman and Scutari, Judiciary Committee.--Permits certain judges and justices, if approved solely by Senate's advice and consent, to continue service upon expiration of term otherwise resulting in mandatory retirement; eliminates mandatory ages for retirement and ceasing post-retirement recall service.

Senate No. 1065, by Senator Stack, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--Allows therapy dogs in rental housing units; expands protection under "Law against Discrimination."

Senate No. 1072, by Senator Cryan, Higher Education Committee.--Applies provisions of "New Jersey College Student and Parent Consumer Information Act" to proprietary schools and independent institutions of higher education and limits eligibility for State student assistance programs.

Senate No. 1073, by Senator Cryan, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Authorizes public libraries to maintain supply of opioid antidotes and permits emergency administration of opioid antidote by librarian or other trained library employee.

Senate No. 1074, by Senator Cryan, Education Committee.--Includes administration of medication as nonpublic school nursing service.

Senate No. 1075, by Senator Cryan, Education Committee.--Makes Fiscal Year 2020 supplemental appropriation of \$3,000,000 from General Fund to DOE to support nonpublic nursing services aid.

Senate No. 1076, by Senator Turner, Judiciary Committee.--Establishes the New Jersey Task Force on Child Support Reform.

Senate No. 1077, by Senator Greenstein, Environment and Energy Committee.--Prohibits use of receipt paper containing bisphenol A.

Senate No. 1078, by Senator Greenstein, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Requires Commissioner of Human Services to streamline SNAP application process for senior citizens and conduct outreach regarding senior SNAP participation.

Senate No. 1079, by Senator Vitale, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Makes it a crime of the third degree to practice psychology without a license and prohibits certain unlicensed employees of certain entities from using title of psychologist.

Senate No. 1457, by Senator Stack, Environment and Energy Committee.--Permits certain local units and authorities, to reduce water, sewer, and stormwater fees and other charges for low-income persons.

Senate No. 1458, by Senator Oroho, Economic Growth Committee.--Expands EDA small business loan program to include certain broadband telecommunications service providers.

Senate No. 1459, by Senators Oroho and O'Scanlon, Commerce Committee.--Requires Mandated Health Benefits Advisory Commission to study financial impact of all enacted mandated health benefits.

Senate No. 1460, by Senators Oroho and Cruz-Perez, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Imposes certain requirements on operators of motor vehicles when overtaking pedestrians, bicycles, and scooters.

Senate No. 1461, by Senators Oroho and Madden, Judiciary Committee.--Establishes crime of "sexual extortion": using explicit sexual images to extort victims.

Senate No. 1462, by Senator Singer, Education Committee.--Requires school district that includes grades kindergarten through six to offer Eddie Eagle Gunsafe Program.

Senate No. 1463, by Senators Cruz-Perez and Oroho, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Requires motorists operating vehicles to maintain reasonable and safe distance when overtaking pedestrians and certain bicycles.

Senate No. 1464, by Senators O'Scanlon and Corrado, Education Committee.--"Madalyn's Law"; requires school districts to incorporate age-appropriate instruction on toxic shock syndrome and requires installation of signage in certain women's rooms to enhance public awareness of toxic shock syndrome.

Senate No. 1465, by Senators O'Scanlon and Rice, Transportation Committee.--Establishes Office of the Advocate for Private Commuter Bus Service Customers and bill of rights for customers of private carriers operating motorbus regular route services.

Senate No. 1466, by Senator Cruz-Perez, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Removes plenary retail distribution license limit for certain stores.

Senate No. 1467, by Senator Cruz-Perez, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Authorizes issuance of craft distillery license to certain other alcoholic beverage manufacturing licensees.

Senate No. 1468, by Senator Cruz-Perez, Education Committee.--Permits charter school to limit admission to single gender, students at-risk of academic failure, students with disabilities, or English language learners.

Senate No. 1469, by Senator Cruz-Perez, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--Requires emergency shelters for the homeless to admit certain persons unless they pose danger.

Senate No. 1470, by Senator Cruz-Perez, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--Requires inspection for pest infestation prior to certain demolitions.

Senate No. 1471, by Senator Cruz-Perez, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--Establishes "Security Deposit Assistance Pilot Program" in Passaic, Union, Essex, Hudson, Camden, and Gloucester counties; appropriates \$255,000.

Senate No. 1472, by Senator Cruz-Perez, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--Eliminates five percent down payment requirement for bond ordinances approved by counties and municipalities.

Senate No. 1473, by Senator Cruz-Perez, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--Provides tax credit to developers for affordable housing projects in certain neighborhoods.

Senate No. 1474, by Senators Cruz-Perez and Cunningham, Higher Education Committee.--Establishes "New Jersey College Ready Students Program Act"; provides tuition-free dual enrollment opportunities at county college for certain high school students.

Senate No. 1475, by Senators Cruz-Perez and Singleton, Economic Growth Committee.--Prohibits awarding of economic development subsidy to business if payment of principal and interest on previously awarded loan or loan guarantee is greater than 24 months overdue.

Senate No. 1476, by Senator Cruz-Perez, Economic Growth Committee.--Creates "Economic Gardening Program" in Department of State to provide customized services to certain businesses.

Senate No. 1477, by Senator Cruz-Perez, Higher Education Committee.--Establishes program to provide free tuition under State Tuition Aid Grant Program to certain students who are accepted to public four-year institutions of higher education and elect to attend county college for first two years.

Senate No. 1478, by Senator Cruz-Perez, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Removes requirement that limited brewery licensees provide tour when selling beer to consumers and permits certain food consumption on premise.

Senate No. 1479, by Senator Cruz-Perez, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--"Food Desert Elimination Act"; provides incentives to supermarkets and grocery stores that locate in "food deserts."

Senate No. 1480, by Senator Cruz-Perez, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--Applies certain public contract bid threshold amounts to pay to play and prevailing wage laws.

Senate No. 1481, by Senator Weinberg, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Regulates sale of handgun ammunition and develops system for electronic reporting of firearm information.

Senate No. 1482, by Senator Weinberg, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Requires law enforcement agencies to provide internal affairs and personnel files of law enforcement officers to other agencies under certain circumstances.

Senate No. 1483, by Senator Weinberg, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Expands rights of crime victims.

Senate No. 1484, by Senator Weinberg, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Amends "Law Against Discrimination" to include crime victims as protected status.

Senate No. 1485, by Senator Weinberg, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Criminalizes fraudulently pretending to be transportation network company driver.

Senate No. 1486, by Senator Turner, State Government, Wagering, Tourism & Historic Preservation Committee.--Sets State mileage reimbursement rate at IRS rate for business use of automobile.

Senate No. 1487, by Senator Turner, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--Permits municipality to establish restricted parking spaces for certain volunteer firefighters.

Senate No. 1488, by Senator Turner, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Prohibits the restraint of prisoners during and immediately after childbirth.

Senate No. 1489, by Senator Turner, State Government, Wagering, Tourism & Historic Preservation Committee.--Provides televisions in State buildings shall display closed captioning for programming.

Senate No. 1490, by Senator Turner, Education Committee.--Provides that salary and other costs associated with Commissioner of Education's appointment of State monitor and other staff under "School District Fiscal Accountability Act" will be paid by State.

Senate No. 1491, by Senator Turner, Education Committee.--Shortens certain school board members' terms when annual school election is moved from November to April; requires approval of both school board and municipal governing body in order to move school election from November to April.

Senate No. 1492, by Senator Turner, Education Committee.--Requires video surveillance cameras in certain special education classrooms for promotion of student safety.

Senate No. 1493, by Senator Turner, Higher Education Committee.--Prohibits public institutions of higher education from increasing resident undergraduate tuition by more than 4 percent over the prior academic year.

Senate No. 1494, by Senator Turner, Higher Education Committee.--Expands Tuition Aid Grant program to part-time undergraduates.

Senate No. 1495, by Senator Turner, Education Committee.--Requires Type I school districts and charter schools to establish citizen budget oversight committee to monitor district's or charter school's financial position.

Senate No. 1496, by Senator Turner, Education Committee.--Permits a student to participate in certain voluntary surveys if the district sends prior written notification to the student's parents; limits use of information obtained from survey.

Senate No. 1497, by Senator Turner, Education Committee.--Provides parents and adult students with simplified method for opting out of release by school district of student information to military recruiters.

Senate No. 1498, by Senator Turner, Education Committee.--Requires candidates for certain teaching certificates to pass written test on foundations of teaching reading and diagnosing reading difficulties.

Senate No. 1499, by Senator Turner, Higher Education Committee.--Phases out State tuition aid grants for students enrolled in proprietary institutions.

Senate No. 1500, by Senator Turner, Education Committee.--Requires certain documentation of needs of students with disabilities during school security drills and emergency situations and in school security plans; requires staff training on needs of students with disabilities in emergency planning.

Senate No. 1501, by Senator Turner, Education Committee.--Requires school districts to adopt policies concerning student use of sunscreen and sun-protective clothing at school and school-sponsored functions.

Senate No. 1502, by Senator Cruz-Perez, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--"Home-Based Jobs Creation Act"; classifies certain home businesses as accessory uses needing no use variances in residential zone; authorizes municipalities to limit or exclude certain warehousing, manufacturing, or retailing activities.

Senate No. 1503, by Senator Cruz-Perez, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--Authorizes COAH to credit municipalities with 1.5 units of fair share affordable housing obligation for each housing unit

occupied by a veteran; permits municipalities to satisfy fair share affordable housing obligation through 35 percent set aside for veterans.

Senate No. 1504, by Senator Cruz-Perez, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--Establishes certification program for zoning officers and land use board administrators.

Senate No. 1505, by Senator Cruz-Perez, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--Extends veterans' property tax exemption to tenant shareholders in cooperatives and mutual housing corporations.

Senate No. 1506, by Senator Cruz-Perez, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--Temporarily reinstates property tax exemption for previously exempt non-profit hospital properties; establishes "Non-Profit Hospital Property Tax Exemption Study Commission."

Senate No. 1507, by Senator Cruz-Perez, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Requires installation of grab bars in certain public restrooms.

Senate No. 1508, by Senator Cruz-Perez, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--Permits local health boards to require minimum temperature of 70 degrees from October through April in certain buildings occupied by seniors and disabled persons.

Senate No. 1509, by Senator Cruz-Perez, Economic Growth Committee.--Allows corporation business tax credits as incentives for redevelopment of distressed shopping centers.

Senate No. 1510, by Senators Cruz-Perez and Addiego, Commerce Committee.--Prohibits sale of certain products using advertisements alluding to controlled dangerous substances or analogs.

Senate No. 1511, by Senators Cruz-Perez and Addiego, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Limits rescheduling, cancellation, and no-show fees providers of health care services may charge in certain instances.

Senate No. 1512, by Senators Ruiz and Cunningham, Education Committee.--Requires DOE to maintain list of textbook vendors that use inclusive material and school districts to use textbooks from those vendors.

Senate No. 1513, by Senator Cruz-Perez, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--Establishes the "New Jersey Residential Foreclosure Transformation Act."

Senate No. 1514, by Senator Cruz-Perez, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Creates restricted distillery license; permits holder thereof to operate restaurant on licensed premises in Garden State Growth Zone.

Senate No. 1515, by Senator Cruz-Perez, Commerce Committee.--Authorizes parent or guardian to place security freeze on child's consumer report.

Senate No. 1516, by Senator Addiego, Higher Education Committee.--Requires institutions of higher education to post information on sexual assaults on website and provide information to prospective students.

Senate No. 1517, by Senator Bateman, Environment and Energy Committee.--Prohibits treatment, discharge, disposal, application to roadway, or storage of wastewater, wastewater solids, sludge, drill cuttings or other byproducts from natural gas exploration or production using hydraulic fracturing.

Senate No. 1518, by Senator Greenstein, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--"New Townhouse Fire Safety Act"; requires automatic fire sprinkler systems in new townhomes.

Senate No. 1519, by Senator Greenstein, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--"Senior Citizens Property Tax Deferral Act"; allows certain seniors to defer property tax payments.

Senate No. 1520, by Senator Greenstein, Commerce Committee.--Requires insurance coverage of diapers when medically necessary.

Senate No. 1521, by Senator Greenstein, Judiciary Committee.--Upgrades crime of false public alarm when act done knowing it will result in law enforcement response against certain persons.

Senate No. 1522, by Senator Greenstein, Military and Veterans' Affairs Committee.--The New Jersey Battlefield to Boardroom Act; provides corporation business tax credits and gross income tax credits for qualified wages of certain veterans.

Senate No. 1523, by Senator Greenstein, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--Facilitates identification of municipal liens on residential property of certain seniors and disabled persons.

Senate No. 1524, by Senators Cruz-Perez and Addiego, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Clarifies that compensation may be paid for expenses related to service animals required due to injuries resulting from crime against victim.

Senate No. 1525, by Senators Cruz-Perez and Addiego, Higher Education Committee.--Appropriates \$300,000 from General Fund to New Jersey Agricultural Experiment Station at Rutgers University.

Senate No. 1526, by Senator Doherty, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Exempts volunteer fire companies from charitable registration fees.

Senate No. 1527, by Senator Doherty, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Allows places of worship to establish security program to select one person to carry handgun during religious services.

Senate No. 1528, by Senator Turner, State Government, Wagering, Tourism & Historic Preservation Committee.--Prohibits investment by State of pension and annuity funds in hedge funds and derivative contracts.

Senate No. 1529, by Senator Turner, Environment and Energy Committee.--Requires boil water notices to be provided by certain public water systems via direct contact.

Senate No. 1530, by Senator Oroho, Budget and Appropriations Committee.--Establishes a joint legislative and executive branch New Jersey Revenue Advisory Board to provide consensus revenue forecasting advice for State budget purposes.

Senate No. 1531, by Senator Beach, Judiciary Committee.--Establishes procedures for determining enforceability of standard form contracts; invalidates certain indemnification clauses.

Senate No. 1532, by Senator Beach, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Requires counties to make available voluntary medical identification cards containing relevant patient health information.

Senate No. 1533, by Senator Beach, Environment and Energy Committee.--Exempts certain plenary winery licensees from filing requirements imposed on retail sellers of litter-generating products.

Senate No. 1534, by Senator Beach, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Establishes social innovation loan guarantee pilot program and study commission within New Jersey Health Care Facilities Financing Authority concerning opioid and other substance use disorders.

Senate No. 1535, by Senator Beach, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Provides for receipts for applications for Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program.

Senate No. 1537, by Senator Beach, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Provides that children under care, custody or supervision of DCPD may not be home-schooled.

Senate No. 1538, by Senator Beach, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Prohibits pharmacies from charging additional fee for processing prescriptions transmitted by telephone or electronic means.

Senate No. 1539, by Senator Doherty, Environment and Energy Committee.--Requires DEP to provide for annual suppression of black flies along Delaware River.

Senate No. 1540, by Senator Doherty, Environment and Energy Committee.--Expands eligibility for reduced-cost spaying and neutering program to any disabled State resident.

Senate No. 1541, by Senator Doherty, Environment and Energy Committee.--Provides discounted hunting and trapping license, permit, and stamp fees for senior citizens.

Senate No. 1542, by Senator Doherty, Environment and Energy Committee.--Permits DEP air quality regulation of certain outdoor wood burning units only in response to complaint.

Senate No. 1543, by Senators Cruz-Perez and Addiego, Education Committee.--Requires video camera on certain school buses with crossing control arms.

Senate No. 1544, by Senator Cruz-Perez, Commerce Committee.--Concerning the "Contractors' Registration Act."

Senate No. 1545, by Senators Cruz-Perez and Addiego, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Requires Attorney General to establish Statewide gun buyback program.

Senate No. 1546, by Senators Cruz-Perez and Addiego, Military and Veterans' Affairs Committee.--Creates housing purchase matching grant program for members of United States Armed Forces and New Jersey National Guard who have served in certain military operations.

Senate No. 1547, by Senator Sweeney, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--Permits appointment of alternate members for

county improvement authorities; permits compensation for members of these authorities.

Senate No. 1548, by Senators Smith and Bateman, Environment and Energy Committee.--Permits municipalities to require that new construction be solar ready.

Senate No. 1549, by Senator Oroho, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Requires local government notification of sex offender registration and prohibits sex offenders from living near schools, child care centers or playgrounds.

Senate No. 1550, by Senator Codey, Education Committee.--Requires school districts to include information on events of September 11, 2001 as part of New Jersey Student Learning Standards in Social Studies; requires public schools to hold annual assembly commemorating September 11, 2001.

Senate No. 1551, by Senator Codey, Education Committee.--Requires coach of interscholastic sports team to provide athletic director with certification that no one associated with team was involved in player recruitment.

Senate No. 1552, by Senator Codey, Education Committee.--Prohibits school districts from joining associations which oversee Statewide interscholastic sports unless association limits interscholastic eligibility of certain student-athletes who repeat middle school grade for athletic advantage.

Senate No. 1553, by Senator Codey, Judiciary Committee.--Provides penalties for sexually offensive or abusive communication through social networking websites.

Senate No. 1554, by Senator Pennacchio, Environment and Energy Committee.--Establishes home elevation fund and dedicates up to \$5 million of realty transfer fee revenue annually for this purpose.

Senate No. 1555, by Senator Scutari, Transportation Committee.--Establishes "Transportation Services Coordination Task Force."

Senate No. 1556, by Senator Oroho, Judiciary Committee.--Reinstates the death penalty for certain murders.

Senate No. 1557, by Senator Scutari, Labor Committee.--Requires certain physicians to perform examination for potential brain injury related to workers' compensation award; requires Commissioner of

Labor and Workforce Development to mandate brain injury training and protocol for employers and insurance carriers.

Senate No. 1558, by Senator Scutari, Commerce Committee.-- Requires automobile insurers to disclose policy limits upon request by an attorney under certain circumstances.

Senate No. 1559, by Senator Scutari, Commerce Committee.-- "New Jersey Insurance Fair Conduct Act."

Senate No. 1560, by Senator Scutari, Judiciary Committee.-- Increases amount of credit for incarceration resulting from default of court-imposed financial obligation or motor vehicle penalty.

Senate No. 1561, by Senator Scutari, Law and Public Safety Committee.-- Requires DOC to notify inmates of outstanding motor vehicle fines or penalties and permits inmate to enter into payment plan upon release from incarceration.

Senate No. 1562, by Senator Scutari, Law and Public Safety Committee.-- Increases number of sheriff's officers that may be hired as sheriff's investigators.

Senate No. 1563, by Senator Scutari, Transportation Committee.-- Provides that users of Access Link paratransit service are automatically eligible for and enrolled in motor bus and rail passenger discounted fare program.

Senate No. 1564, by Senator Madden, Education Committee.-- Requires school districts to observe Veterans Day as school holiday.

Senate No. 1565, by Senator Gill, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.-- The "Municipal Volunteer Property Tax Reduction Act"; permits certain municipal property owners to perform volunteer services in return for property tax vouchers.

Senate No. 1566, by Senator Connors, Judiciary Committee.-- Clarifies that punitive damages may not be awarded against public entities or public employees acting within the scope of their employment in any action.

Senate No. 1567, by Senator Connors, State Government, Wagering, Tourism & Historic Preservation Committee.-- Requires public hearings on proposed off-track wagering facilities to be held in municipalities contiguous to site where proposed facilities will be located.

Senate No. 1568, by Senator Turner, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Concerns private entities that own, operate or manage correctional facilities or jails.

Senate No. 1569, by Senator Connors, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Provides that trespassing in nuclear power plant is third degree crime.

Senate No. 1570, by Senator Beach, Economic Growth Committee.-Requires telecommunications companies to provide prorated refunds for service outages of longer than 24 hours.

Senate No. 1571, by Senator Beach, Military and Veterans' Affairs Committee.--Provides credits under corporation business tax and gross income tax for qualified wages of certain disabled veterans.

Senate No. 1572, by Senator Beach, Labor Committee.--"Tipped Wage Worker Protection Act."

Senate No. 1573, by Senator Beach, Labor Committee.--"New Jersey Works Act"; Permits businesses to create pre-employment training programs in partnership with nonprofit organizations or educational institutions; provides tax credit to businesses that provide financial assistance to pre-employment training programs.

Senate No. 1574, by Senator Beach, Budget and Appropriations Committee.--Establishes a gross income tax credit for attendance at New Jersey county colleges.

Senate No. 1577, by Senator Beach, State Government, Wagering, Tourism & Historic Preservation Committee.--Increases flexibility, clarity, and available tools of certain municipal consolidation processes.

Senate No. 1578, by Senator Beach, Commerce Committee.--Concerns certain actions brought under "Truth-in-Consumer Contract, Warranty and Notice Act."

Senate No. 1579, by Senator Beach, State Government, Wagering, Tourism & Historic Preservation Committee.--"Assistance to

Firefighters' Families Act"; doubles pension amounts for beneficiaries of certain deceased volunteer emergency service providers; provides for burial expenses and adjusts life insurance coverage for volunteer firefighters; permits fire code inspection surcharge.

Senate No. 1580, by Senator Beach, State Government, Wagering, Tourism & Historic Preservation Committee.--Includes e-mail addresses in list of confidential items to be redacted from public records under OPRA.

Senate No. 1581, by Senator Beach, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Enhances requirements for applicant seeking to locate substance use disorder treatment center within 500 feet of school.

Senate No. 1582, by Senator Beach, Judiciary Committee.--Permits juror donation of statutory juror compensation to New Jersey Vet2Vet Hotline program.

Senate No. 1583, by Senator Beach, Education Committee.--Prohibits distribution to students of literature that promotes, favors, or opposes candidacy of any candidate for election at any general, municipal, or school election.

Senate No. 1584, by Senator Beach, Education Committee.--"The Smarter Lunchroom Act;" promotes healthy food choices in school cafeterias.

Senate No. 1585, by Senator Beach, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Requires local recreation departments and youth serving organizations to have defibrillators for youth athletic events.

Senate No. 1586, by Senator Beach, Education Committee.--Requires certain ratios of school library media specialist to students in public schools.

Senate No. 1587, by Senator Beach, Higher Education Committee.--Requires public institutions of higher education to waive or reimburse application fees and transcript fees for veterans and members of the military.

Senate No. 1588, by Senator Beach, Commerce Committee.--Regulates pay-off of trade-in vehicles and certain vehicle title releases.

Senate No. 1589, by Senator Beach, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Prohibits private correctional facilities from detaining persons pursuant to agreement with federal immigration authorities.

Senate No. 1590, by Senators Beach and Bucco, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Designates 9-1-1 operators or dispatchers as 9-1-1 first responder dispatchers.

Senate No. 1591, by Senator Beach, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Allows alcoholic beverages to be consumed outdoors in Atlantic City Tourism District.

Senate No. 1592, by Senator Beach, Environment and Energy Committee.--Permits sale of certain alcoholic beverages and related products at seasonal farm markets.

Senate No. 1593, by Senator Beach, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Prohibits sex offenders from holding any job, position, or type of employment that primarily consists of contact with children.

Senate No. 1594, by Senator Beach, Judiciary Committee.--Makes all persons convicted of sexual assault subject to the No Early Release Act; specifies that any use of force elevates sexual assault to aggravated sexual assault.

Senate No. 1595, by Senator Beach, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Makes various changes to law governing winery salesrooms.

Senate No. 1596, by Senator Beach, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Requires Sexual Assault Response Team to include person trained in interacting with persons with developmental disabilities; designated as "Harrison's Law."

Senate No. 1597, by Senator Beach, Transportation Committee.--Permits qualified person with post-traumatic stress disorder to obtain handicapped parking placard.

Senate No. 1598, by Senator Beach, Commerce Committee.--Requires dealership to notify buyers of recalls on used motor vehicles for sale.

Senate No. 1599, by Senators Codey and Pou, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Establishes Statewide database of beds in shelters for the homeless.

Senate No. 1600, by Senators Codey and Pou, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Requires Commissioner of

Health to designate special care nursing facility to treat patients with psychiatric and substance use disorders dual diagnosis.

Senate No. 1601, by Senator Codey, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Requires suspension of driver's license for gross income tax deficiency under certain circumstances.

Senate No. 1603, by Senator Codey, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Allows law enforcement officers to scan drivers' cell phones under certain circumstances; imposes penalties for refusal.

Senate No. 1604, by Senator Codey, Commerce Committee.--Requires certification of diligent inquiry in residential mortgage foreclosure actions to be filed by attorneys.

Senate No. 1605, by Senator Codey, Commerce Committee.--Prohibits sale of certain items during certain time on Thanksgiving.

Senate No. 1606, by Senator Codey, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Revises requirements and training standards for first responders under New Jersey Highway Traffic Safety Act of 1987.

Senate No. 1607, by Senator Codey, Transportation Committee.--Authorizes creation of special license plates for sea turtle recovery.

Senate No. 1608, by Senator Codey, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Prohibits use of manufacturer coupons for certain prescription drug and prescription biological products.

Senate No. 1609, by Senator Codey, Education Committee.--Establishes commission to study effects on adolescents of smart phone and social media usage in school.

Senate No. 1610, by Senator Codey, Education Committee.--Establishes measures to deter steroid use among students; appropriates \$45,000 to DOE for New Jersey State Interscholastic Athletic Association testing of student-athletes for steroids and other performance enhancing substances.

Senate No. 1611, by Senator Holzapfel, Economic Growth Committee.--Prohibits public utility from filing rate increase petition under certain circumstances.

Senate No. 1612, by Senator Holzapfel, Economic Growth Committee.--Requires public utility to reimburse business customer during period when business ceases operations due to utility repairing or replacing its equipment on business customer's property.

Senate No. 1613, by Senator Holzapfel, Economic Growth Committee.--Prohibits utility from billing customer for costs incurred for certain upgrades to utility infrastructure; allows costs for certain upgrades to utility infrastructure be recovered in utility's rate base.

Senate No. 1614, by Senator Holzapfel, Economic Growth Committee.--Requires electric distribution lines to be located underground in areas affected by severe weather or natural disasters.

Senate No. 1615, by Senator Madden, Education Committee.--Requires school districts take certain actions to increase participation in free or reduced priced meal programs; prohibits shaming students with school meal bills in arrears; prohibits certain district actions in collecting unpaid school meal fees.

Senate No. 1616, by Senator Holzapfel, Environment and Energy Committee.--Prohibits sale, distribution, and use of urea as an ice melt.

Senate No. 1617, by Senator Holzapfel, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Increases fines for failing to have required markings on commercial vehicles.

Senate No. 1618, by Senator Holzapfel, Environment and Energy Committee.--Requires State park and forest restroom facilities to include an exclusive family restroom.

Senate No. 1619, by Senator Holzapfel, Judiciary Committee.--Clarifies crime of unlawful access concerning certain password protected communications in electronic storage.

Senate No. 1620, by Senator Holzapfel, Judiciary Committee.--Provides certain immunities from spectator-based lawsuits arising from youth sports events.

Senate No. 1621, by Senator Holzapfel, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Establishes training for law enforcement officers interacting with pregnant women.

Senate No. 1622, by Senator Holzapfel, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Establishes mandatory penalties for committing burglary and theft during a state of emergency.

Senate No. 1625, by Senator Cryan, Judiciary Committee.--Requires DCA, in consultation with Commission on Human Trafficking, to establish Statewide initiative for Red Sand Project.

Senate No. 1626, by Senator Cryan, Budget and Appropriations Committee.--Establishes net operating loss carryback deduction under corporation business tax.

Senate No. 1627, by Senator Cryan, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Requires retired law enforcement officers to qualify in use of firearm once a year.

Senate No. 1628, by Senator Cryan, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Clarifies that law enforcement officers employed by educational institutions may possess firearms on campus.

Senate No. 1629, by Senator Bateman, Transportation Committee.--Limits instances when license suspension may be reduced or eliminated for driving without motor vehicle liability insurance; requires proof of motor vehicle liability insurance prior to reinstatement of license.

Senate No. 1630, by Senator Bateman, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Prohibits victims from being charged certain costs and fees and clarifies victims' right to obtain certain interviews.

Senate No. 1631, by Senator Bateman, Transportation Committee.--Clarifies when penalty points are to be assessed for convictions of driving in an unsafe manner.

Senate No. 1632, by Senator Gill, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Requires AG oversight of transfer of federal surplus military equipment to local law enforcement agencies; establishes review and reporting requirement.

Senate No. 1633, by Senator Gill, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--"Corporate Disinvestment Property Tax Relief Act"; appropriates \$13.5 million.

Senate No. 1634, by Senator Doherty, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Raises maximum eligibility age for exempt fireman certificates and membership in New Jersey State Firemen's Association.

Senate No. 1635, by Senator Doherty, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Authorizes certain security officers to carry large capacity ammunition magazine capable of holding 15 or less rounds of ammunition.

Senate No. 1638, by Senator Cruz-Perez, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--Expands municipal authority to license and inspect residential rental property.

Senate No. 1639, by Senator Cruz-Perez, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--"New Jersey Transit Villages Act."

Senate No. 1640, by Senators Cruz-Perez and Singleton, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--Authorizes political subdivisions to require recipients of economic development incentives to enter into community benefits agreements.

Senate No. 1641, by Senator Cruz-Perez, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--Authorizes proportional property tax exemption for honorably discharged veterans having a service-connected permanent disability.

Senate No. 1646, by Senators Cruz-Perez and Addiego, Higher Education Committee.--Prohibits institution of higher education that provides child care from charging student-parent who receives child care voucher under "New Jersey Cares for Kids Program" an amount for child care in excess of voucher amount.

Senate No. 1647, by Senator Lagana, Education Committee.--Requires boards of education and school bus contractors to designate individuals as certain school bus safety personnel.

Senate No. 1648, by Senator Lagana, Judiciary Committee.--Immunizes from civil liability first responders who forcibly enter property to provide emergency assistance.

Senate No. 1649, by Senators Cruz-Perez and Oroho, Economic Growth Committee.--Establishes Main Street Assistance Program to encourage business development in small municipalities.

Senate No. 1650, by Senator Madden, Commerce Committee.--Requires health benefits coverage for buprenorphine and buprenorphine/naloxone for pain treatment without step therapy or fail-first protocols.

Senate No. 1651, by Senator Greenstein, Environment and Energy Committee.--Permits small businesses to qualify for loans from EDA for costs of energy audit and making energy efficiency or conservation improvements.

Senate No. 1652, by Senator Greenstein, Commerce Committee.--Provides consumer protections under certain telecommunications service provider contracts.

Senate No. 1653, by Senator Greenstein, Education Committee.--Establishes Autism Education Council.

Senate No. 1654, by Senator Greenstein, Transportation Committee.--Allows NJ E-ZPass customers to opt to receive electronic notification of use of E-ZPass system at toll plazas operated by NJTA and SJTA.

Senate No. 1655, by Senator Greenstein, Transportation Committee.--Requires transportation network companies to share information concerning sexual misconduct investigation of driver; authorizes transportation network company to ban drivers from accessing digital network during and following investigation.

Senate No. 1656, by Senator Greenstein, Economic Growth Committee.--Requires CATV companies to provide free broadband Internet service and associated equipment to public libraries and, under certain circumstances, other municipal buildings.

Senate No. 1657, by Senator Greenstein, Commerce Committee.--Prohibits commercial mobile service providers and mobile application developers from disclosing customer's location data to third parties.

Senate No. 1658, by Senator Greenstein, Economic Growth Committee.--Prohibits telecommunications, utility or cable television companies from charging certain customers prior to actual billing due date.

Senate No. 1659, by Senator Greenstein, Economic Growth Committee.--"Innovate New Jersey Act"; establishes tax-free business incubators at institutions of higher education.

Senate No. 1661, by Senator Greenstein, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Establishes prisoner reentry peer support hotline.

Senate No. 1668, by Senator Greenstein, Judiciary Committee.-- Provides rental and lease protections for victims of domestic violence, sexual assault, or stalking.

Senate No. 1669, by Senator Greenstein, Judiciary Committee.-- Authorizes issuance of restraining orders for situations in which domestic violence statutes do not apply.

Senate No. 1670, by Senator Greenstein, Environment and Energy Committee.--Creates Office of Sustainability.

Senate No. 1675, by Senator Madden, Transportation Committee.-- Authorizes special license plates for members of the United States Coast Guard.

Senate No. 1676, by Senators Smith and Vitale, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Allows hospitals to construct housing and provide wrap-around services for homeless persons.

Senate No. 1677, by Senators Cruz-Perez and Addiego, Economic Growth Committee.--Provides incentives for certain businesses associated with military installations.

Senate No. 1678, by Senators Cruz-Perez and Addiego, Economic Growth Committee.--Directs certain unclaimed electric and gas utility deposits in Unclaimed Utility Deposits Trust Fund and societal charge revenues be paid to Statewide nonprofit energy assistance organizations designated by BPU.

Senate No. 1683, by Senators Vitale and Madden, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Authorizes State and local law enforcement entities to contract for bulk purchasing of heroin antidote.

Senate No. 1684, by Senator Holzapfel, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--Permits county board of chosen freeholders to appoint interim member of county tax board under certain circumstances.

Senate No. 1685, by Senator Holzapfel, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--Permits short-term tax exemption for certain improvements to dwellings damaged by natural disasters.

Senate No. 1686, by Senator Holzapfel, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--"Homestead School Property Tax Reimbursement Act"; provides State reimbursement for 50% of school property taxes paid by seniors, 65 years and older.

Senate No. 1701, by Senator Kean, Commerce Committee.-- Establishes registration requirement for mold inspection and remediation contractors.

Senate No. 1702, by Senator Kean, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Requires testing for infectious disease for certain persons who have been administered opioid antidote by first responder.

Senate No. 1711, by Senator Weinberg, Labor Committee.--Establishes procedures and standards regarding public services privatization contracts.

Senate No. 1712, by Senator Weinberg, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Allows municipality to issue permits to sell alcoholic beverages in residential redevelopment areas.

Senate No. 1713, by Senator Weinberg, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Transfers probation employees from Judiciary to State Parole Board.

Senate No. 1714, by Senator Bucco, Commerce Committee.-- Prohibits pre-approval or precertification of cancer treatments, tests, procedures and prescription drugs covered under health benefits or prescription drug benefits plans.

Senate No. 1715, by Senator Lagana, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--Requires new flooring for schools and child care centers to be certified mercury free.

Senate No. 1716, by Senator Lagana, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Requires rate review study of provider reimbursement rates provided by Medicaid and Children's System of Care for pediatric and adult psychiatry services.

Senate No. 1717, by Senator Lagana, Budget and Appropriations Committee.--Modernizes the distribution of gross income tax refunds by making direct deposit the default distribution method.

Senate No. 1718, by Senator Lagana, Budget and Appropriations Committee.--Allows modernization for the form of disbursement for certain State government and local unit payments to individuals and business entities.

Senate No. 1732, by Senator Lagana, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.-- Permits import of Canadian prescription drugs.

Senate No. 1733, by Senators Testa and Gopal, Military and Veterans' Affairs Committee.-- Removes principal place of business requirement of "Set-Aside Act for Disabled Veterans' Businesses."

Senate No. 1734, by Senators Pennacchio and Testa, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.-- Revises requirements for administration of vaccines to patients.

Senate No. 1735, by Senator Beach, Commerce Committee.-- Requires telemarketers making sales calls to display their name and telephone number on any caller identification service.

Senate No. 1736, by Senator Beach, Transportation Committee.--Allows Chief Administrator of MVC to enter into cooperative arrangements with foreign countries for reciprocal recognition of certain motor vehicle driver licenses.

Senate No. 1737, by Senator Singleton, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--Restores property tax exemption for nonprofit hospitals with on-site for-profit medical providers; requires these hospitals to pay community service contributions to host municipalities; establishes Nonprofit Hospital Community Service Contribution Study Commission.

Senate No. 1738, by Senators Oroho and Addiego, Economic Growth Committee.--Allows commercial farmer to recover reasonable costs and attorney fees of defending against unreasonable complaints under "Right to Farm Act."

Senate No. 1739, by Senators Oroho and Beach, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--Establishes "Electronic Permit Processing Review System."

Senate No. 1740, by Senators Oroho and Greenstein, Transportation Committee.--Requires MVC to place notation on vehicle's registration certificate indicating registrant is deaf.

Senate No. 1744, by Senators Pennacchio and Sweeney, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Provides for certain group home licensees to obtain Medicaid reimbursement for reservation of beds used by residents on therapeutic leave.

Senate No. 1745, by Senators Singleton and Oroho, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Adds 9-1-1 system regionalization costs to funds

appropriated from "9-1-1 System and Emergency Response Trust Fund Account."

Senate No. 1746, by Senators Singleton and Corrado, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--Authorizes grants to purchase and rehabilitate abandoned homes for homeless veterans.

Senate No. 1747, by Senator Cruz-Perez, Commerce Committee.--Provides exemption from 3-day cancellation provision of home improvement contract in case of bona fide emergency.

Senate No. 1748, by Senator Cruz-Perez, Labor Committee.--"Garden State Manufacturing Jobs Act."

Senate No. 1749, by Senator Cruz-Perez, Commerce Committee.--Requires licensure of dog trainers.

Senate No. 1750, by Senators Cruz-Perez and Kean, Judiciary Committee.--Provides for process to vacate and expunge certain arrests, charges, complaints, convictions, other dispositions, and DNA records, associated with violations by certain human trafficking victims.

Senate No. 1751, by Senator Turner, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--The "Owners' Rights and Obligations in Shared Ownership Communities Act."

Senate No. 1797, by Senator Ruiz, Education Committee.--Requires DOE to develop and implement strategies to increase number of State-approved high school equivalency test centers at sites in less populated areas with access to public transportation.

Senate No. 1798, by Senator Ruiz, Education Committee.--Requires public school to provide timely notification to parents concerning results of any health screening conducted by school physician, school nurse, or other trained employee.

Senate No. 1799, by Senator Ruiz, Higher Education Committee.--Provides additional State aid to county colleges for students enrolled in postsecondary career and technical education certificate programs.

Senate No. 1800, by Senator Ruiz, Judiciary Committee.--Prohibits juror disqualification based on gender identity or sexual orientation; codifies procedures when discriminatory use of peremptory challenges is alleged.

Senate No. 1801, by Senator Ruiz, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--Requires disclosure of cellular telephone transmitters upon sale or lease of certain residential property.

Senate No. 1802, by Senator Ruiz, Economic Growth Committee.--Provides corporation business tax and gross income tax credits for value of certain fruit and vegetable donations made by commercial farm operators.

Senate No. 1803, by Senator Ruiz, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--Requires State to reimburse counties for portion of holiday pay to county employees performing State services on certain holidays.

Senate No. 1804, by Senator Ruiz, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--Requires municipalities, counties, school districts, and local authorities to regularly meet to discuss shared service agreements.

Senate No. 1805, by Senator Ruiz, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--Requires fire suppression systems in new single and two family homes.

Senate No. 1806, by Senator Ruiz, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--Authorizes local tax on storage of empty shipping containers.

Senate No. 1807, by Senator Ruiz, Higher Education Committee.--Establishes tuition reimbursement program for students enrolled in certain private postsecondary educational schools.

Senate No. 1808, by Senator Ruiz, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Requires certain ultrasounds on pregnant women to be performed by licensed health care professionals.

Senate No. 1809, by Senator Ruiz, Labor Committee.--Prohibits employers from inquiring about gender of job applicants under certain circumstances.

Senate No. 1810, by Senator Ruiz, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Establishes two-year pilot program requiring certain law enforcement agencies to coordinate with local school districts to identify and assist at-risk youths.

Senate No. 1811, by Senator Ruiz, Commerce Committee.--Establishes certain requirements for banks that serve as depositories of public funds.

Senate No. 1812, by Senator Ruiz, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Requires various State departments to provide linkages to information on "baby boxes" and safe sleep education on their websites.

Senate No. 1813, by Senator Ruiz, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Requires DOH to encourage health care facilities and licensed health care professionals to develop a "Reach Out and Read Program."

Senate No. 1814, by Senator Ruiz, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Requires 60 day notice concerning tuition rate changes by licensed child care centers.

Senate No. 1815, by Senator Ruiz, Judiciary Committee.--Exempts nursing mothers from jury duty.

Senate No. 1816, by Senator Ruiz, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Establishes Working Group on End-of-Life Care and Palliative Care in DOH.

Senate No. 1817, by Senator Ruiz, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Requires Commissioner of Children and Families to apply for State waiver for State demonstration project establishing Safe Babies Court Team program.

Senate No. 1818, by Senator Ruiz, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--"Listening to Mothers Survey Act"; requires DOH to establish survey to evaluate and improve maternity care access and services.

Senate No. 1819, by Senator Diegnan, Economic Growth Committee.--Directs BPU to develop and implement electric school bus pilot program.

Senate No. 1820, by Senators Greenstein and Turner, State Government, Wagering, Tourism & Historic Preservation Committee.--Establishes ranked-choice voting procedure for elections for Governor, State Senate, State General Assembly, United States Senate and House of Representatives, and presidential primaries and general elections for electors for United States President and Vice-President.

Senate No. 1821, by Senator Ruiz, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Revises criteria for payment of charity care to certain hospitals.

Senate No. 1822, by Senator Greenstein, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Authorizes special Ancient Order of Hibernians license plate.

Senate No. 1823, by Senator Cunningham, Higher Education Committee.--Requires institutions of higher education to provide

graduating students with information on income-contingent student loan repayment programs.

Senate No. 1824, by Senator Ruiz, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Permits payments in subsidized adoption until child becomes 21 years of age under certain circumstances.

Senate No. 1825, by Senator Madden, Labor Committee.--Concerns labor harmony agreements for hospitality projects.

Senate No. 1826, by Senator Ruiz, Commerce Committee.--Provides that certain fraudulent arbitration agreements are invalid.

Senate No. 1827, by Senator Lagana, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Allows gross income tax deduction for certain qualified charity care services provided by qualified physicians.

Senate No. 1828, by Senators Lagana and Corrado, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Requires opioid antidote dispensation to be monitored under Prescription Monitoring Program, and authorizes certain entities to submit info regarding opioid antidote administration for inclusion in secondary, linked database; designated as "John Wagner's Law."

Senate No. 1829, by Senator Lagana, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Establishes task force to study presence of mercury in floors of certain facilities.

Senate No. 1830, by Senator Diegnan, Commerce Committee.--Revises "Athletic Training Licensure Act."

Senate No. 1831, by Senator Cryan, Environment and Energy Committee.--Requires institutions of higher education to test for lead in drinking water and disclose test results.

Senate No. 1832, by Senator Greenstein, Commerce Committee.--Prohibits commercial mobile service providers from disclosing customer's global positioning system data to third parties.

Senate No. 1833, by Senator Greenstein, Environment and Energy Committee.--Provides that solar and photovoltaic energy facilities and structures on farmland are not an inherently beneficial use, per se, for purposes of zoning approvals.

Senate No. 1834, by Senator Greenstein, Environment and Energy Committee.--Establishes additional requirements for operation and oversight of animal shelters, pounds, and kennels operating as shelters or pounds.

Senate No. 1835, by Senators Cruz-Perez and Oroho, Economic Growth Committee.--Provides limited civil liability immunity to farmers hosting agritourism activities.

Senate No. 1836, by Senators Cruz-Perez and Greenstein, Environment and Energy Committee.--Requires State entities to recycle certain materials and provide recycling bins in State buildings.

Senate No. 1837, by Senator Cruz-Perez, Economic Growth Committee.--Establishes loan program and provides corporation business tax and gross income tax credits for establishment of new vineyards and wineries.

Senate No. 1838, by Senator Greenstein, State Government, Wagering, Tourism & Historic Preservation Committee.--Changes designation on official State logo denoting manufacture of products in New Jersey.

Senate No. 1839, by Senator Gopal, Economic Growth Committee.--Establishes "Comprehensive State Plan for Economic Development."

Senate No. 1840, by Senator Cryan, Economic Growth Committee.--Requires certain economic incentive recipients to pay penalty for nonperformance.

Senate No. 1841, by Senator Cryan, Environment and Energy Committee.--Establishes "Residential Water Quality Assurance Program" in DEP; requires certain disclosures from residents and property owners regarding lead in drinking water.

Senate No. 1842, by Senators Cryan and Scutari, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Establishes "New Jersey Nonprofit Security Grant Program."

Senate No. 1860, by Senator Oroho, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Revises eligibility criteria for reimbursement from "Emergency Medical Technician Training Fund."

Senate No. 1861, by Senator Gopal, Commerce Committee.--Requires DOBI to provide certain information concerning self-funded health benefits plans and out-of-network services.

Senate No. 1862, by Senator Gopal, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Requires Commissioner of Corrections to institute 30-minute shift overlap in State correctional facilities.

Senate No. 1863, by Senator Gopal, Judiciary Committee.--Expands duties of Commission on Human Trafficking to include studying connection between human trafficking and illicit massage parlor businesses.

Senate No. 1864, by Senator Gopal, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Extends from six to 12 months compensation program for injured law enforcement officers and other employees.

Senate No. 1865, by Senator Gopal, Military and Veterans' Affairs Committee.--Increases days of paid military leave for certain public employees who serve in United States Reserves.

Senate No. 1866, by Senator Gopal, Military and Veterans' Affairs Committee.--Establishes price preference program on State contracts for service-disabled veteran-owned businesses.

Senate No. 1867, by Senator Lagana, Higher Education Committee.--Provides tuition reimbursement to certain psychiatrists who contract with DCF.

Senate No. 1868, by Senator Lagana, Higher Education Committee.--Establishes gross income tax credit and corporation business tax credit for student loan payments.

Senate No. 1869, by Senator Singleton, Judiciary Committee.--"Uniform Partition of Heirs Property Act"; provides alternative process for handling partition actions filed in court concerning real property with multiple owners, at least one of whom had acquired title from relative.

Senate No. 1909, by Senator Cruz-Perez, Transportation Committee.--Requires DOT to compensate local government entities for contractual delay damages resulting from shutdown of transportation projects funded by Transportation Trust Fund; authorizes local government entities to use certain funds for transportation projects.

Senate No. 2081, by Senators Codey and Vitale, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Establishes cap on amount that hospital can charge patients for laboratory services to 150% of Medicare.

Senate No. 2082, by Senator Codey, State Government, Wagering, Tourism & Historic Preservation Committee.--Prohibits public member on State Ethics Commission from holding interest in or employment with business entity that has contract with State agency.

Senate No. 2083, by Senator Stack, Education Committee.--Makes supplemental appropriation of \$15,100,000 from General Fund to DOE to increase per pupil funding for nonpublic security aid from \$150 to \$250.

Senate No. 2084, by Senator Stack, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--Makes supplemental appropriation of \$100,000 to DCA for disbursement to Jersey City to examine mass transit and green space needs at Bergen Arches.

Senate No. 2085, by Senators Sweeney and Oroho, Community and Urban Affairs Committee.--"Electronic Construction Procurement Act."

Senate No. 2086, by Senator Cryan, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Establishes Medicaid demonstration project to cover room and board services for certain terminally ill patients in the home or other non-institutional setting.

Senate No. 2087, by Senator Cryan, Commerce Committee.--Permits payment of only one co-payment or deductible for follow-up care or treatment after surgery or illness under certain health benefits plans.

Senate No. 2088, by Senator Cryan, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Requires certain facilities to set aside beds for Medicaid-eligible individuals.

Senate No. 2089, by Senator Cryan, Commerce Committee.--Prohibits insurers, SHBP, and SEHBP from charging fee for paper bills and notices.

Senate No. 2090, by Senators Testa and Corrado, Military and Veterans' Affairs Committee.--Excludes Armed Services combat zone pay from gross income taxation.

Senate No. 2091, by Senators Brown and Gopal, Transportation Committee.--Designates mile 22 of State Highway Route 9 in Dennis Township as "Charles Richard Ingram III and the Fallen Veterans of Suicide Memorial Mile."

Senate No. 2092, by Senator Doherty, Commerce Committee.--Concerns certain business requirements for motor vehicle dealers.

Senate No. 2093, by Senators Singleton and Kean, Judiciary Committee.--Expands scope of activities constituting hazing; increases penalties for hazing resulting in injury; requires institutions of higher education and public and nonpublic high schools and middle schools to adopt anti-hazing policies.

Senate No. 2094, by Senator Singleton, Environment and Energy Committee.--Prohibits dumping dredge spoils on and around certain islands without municipal approval.

Senate No. 2095, by Senator Holzapfel, Environment and Energy Committee.--"Barnegat Bay Protection Act"; establishes Barnegat Bay Protection Fund, dedicates portion of sales tax on fertilizer, authorizes special license plates, and provides for donations.

Senate No. 2096, by Senator Holzapfel, Commerce Committee.--Revises polysomnography license fees.

Senate No. 2097, by Senator Holzapfel, Education Committee.--Provides that school districts spending below adequacy will not be subject to certain State school aid reductions.

Senate No. 2098, by Senator Holzapfel, Environment and Energy Committee.--Requires labeling of ingredients and restricts phosphorus in household cleansing products.

Senate No. 2099, by Senator Holzapfel, Environment and Energy Committee.--Provides State income tax credit for removal of lawns near Barnegat Bay.

Senate No. 2100, by Senator Holzapfel, Labor Committee.--Permits minors to work until 11 p.m. between Memorial Day and October 1 of each year in certain circumstances.

Senate No. 2101, by Senator Rice, Judiciary Committee.--Decriminalizes possession of 10 grams or less of marijuana and personal-use amount of regulated marijuana-infused products; requires substance abuse treatment under certain circumstances.

Senate No. 2102, by Senator Holzapfel, Commerce Committee.--Requires mortgage lenders to maintain vacant, age-restricted dwelling units during foreclosure.

Senate No. 2103, by Senator Corrado, Higher Education Committee.--Requires county colleges and four-year public institutions of higher education to award college credits to police officers for certain courses completed at county police academies.

Senate No. 2104, by Senator Corrado, Higher Education Committee.--Requires public institutions of higher education to grant at least six academic credits to certain veterans.

Senate No. 2117, by Senator Doherty, Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee.--Requires physicians and other prescribers to obtain informed consent from parents or guardians of minors for certain medications with "black box warnings."

Senate No. 2118, by Senator Doherty, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Requires Motor Vehicle Commission to issue exempt certificates for motor vehicles not required to be inspected.

Senate No. 2119, by Senator Doherty, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Authorizes chiefs of part-time municipal police forces to issue firearms ID cards and handgun purchase permits.

Senate No. 2120, by Senator Doherty, Education Committee.-- Requires school district to allow graduating student to wear military sash while participating in high school graduation ceremony.

Senate No. 2121, by Senator Doherty, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Allows dogs in sampling and tasting areas of breweries.

Senate No. 2122, by Senator Ruiz, Labor Committee.--Concerning certain unemployment insurance benefit claims.

Senate No. 2123, by Senator Doherty, Judiciary Committee.-- Requires secure location in courthouse for taking deposition of person protected by domestic violence restraining order; designated the "Lydia Peikon-Cotz Act."

Senate No. 2124, by Senator Doherty, Labor Committee.--Establishes the "New Jersey Right to Work Act"; prohibits payroll deduction of union dues from wages or salaries of public employees.

Senate No. 2125, by Senators Gopal and Oroho, Commerce Committee.--Permits chair or booth rentals for the purpose of providing cosmetology and hairstyling services or ancillary services.

Senate No. 2126, by Senator Gopal, Education Committee.--Requires school district to close schools on religious holiday included on list of holidays promulgated by Commissioner of Education if 10 percent or more of students observe holiday.

Senate No. 2200, by Senator Bateman, Law and Public Safety Committee.--Requires all sex offender registration information to be published on Internet registry.

Senate No. 2201, by Senator Bateman, Education Committee.--Excludes certain increases in school security expenditures from the tax levy cap applicable to school districts.

Senate No. 2202, by Senator Bateman, Commerce Committee.--Modifies recordkeeping requirements for secondhand jewelry and precious metal transactions; increases penalties for violations.

Senate No. 2203, by Senator Bateman, Transportation Committee.--Revises certain motor vehicle fines imposed on motor vehicle drivers or operators for failing to have required documentation.
