

His Excellency George B. McClellan, Governor and Commander-in-Chief :

I have the honor to submit the annual report of operations of the Quartermaster General's Department, during the fiscal year ending October 31st, 1880.

This department is charged with the duty of providing the means of transportation for troops of the National Guard when ordered out by competent authority, and the movement of all necessary stores for parades, inspections, encampments and rifle practice on the ranges of the State. It is also charged with the duty of issuing arms and accoutrements to companies of the National Guard, supplying camp and garrison equipage, commissary and other stores to troops when ordered upon active service, and furnishing uniforms under the act approved March 10th, 1880. Books of accounts of all issues to officers of the National Guard are kept in the office, and settlements made annually, and no officer is entitled to his discharge upon tendering his resignation unless his accounts are settled. Officers are negligent in response to communications in relation to the settlement of their accounts, by reason of which a great deal of property remains unaccounted for.

The money value of ordnance stores received from the United States Ordnance Department, on account of the quota of the State, during the year is five hundred and sixty-eight dollars (\$568), and the stores will be found enumerated in the Appendix, Statement C. The balance to the credit of the State, is eight thousand one hundred and eighty-two dollars and forty-four cents (\$8,182.44), subject to the requisition of the State.

During the year, two companies, B of the Fourth Regiment, Jersey City, and E of the Sixth Regiment, Camden, have been disbanded, and their places filled by newly mustered companies

stationed at Passaic and Woodbury. Two new companies have been organized at Paterson, forming a Battalion, designated First Battalion; these companies have been armed during the year from the Arsenal. The captain of Company C, First Regiment, having resigned, the arms used by the company have been returned. The present commissioned officers not having given bond for arms, no issue has been made, and the company is without arms.

At this date the State troops are composed of forty-nine (49) companies of infantry, one (1) battery of artillery and two (2) Gatling gun companies. All are armed with the Springfield rifle, breech-loader, calibre .45, except the battery of artillery and one company of the First as above stated.

The total number of enlisted men uniformed, as shown by the annual returns received at this office, is two thousand seven hundred and seventy-four (2774), having in use two thousand six hundred and sixty-seven (2667) Springfield rifles. The returns show the following condition of arms in each company, and the number of men in each corps.

The total number of rifles charged against these organizations, as enumerated above, is two thousand seven hundred and one (2701), a loss of thirty-four (34) since the issues.

The amount of ammunition on hand in each regiment and battalion, held as reserve to be used in cases of emergency only, as appears by the reports of regimental and battalion Quartermasters is as follows:

Early in January armory rifle practice, with the reduced cartridge, devised and perfected last year, was resumed at the armories of the respective companies of the National Guard, under the instruction of Regimental and Battalion Inspectors of rifle practice. The results were beneficial, and the course of instruction served to make the men better marksmen on the ranges in field practice. A full description of the reduced cartridge, and butt and shield, was given in my last annual report. The number of reduced cartridges used in the instruction during the year, is thirty thousand eight hundred and twenty-four (30,824), as appears by the following statement of issues and returns:

These cartridge cases were manufactured and reloaded at the Arsenal—the number of new ones made during the year being eleven thousand eight hundred (11,800). The total number made since commencing the manufacture in 1879, is thirty-one thousand and fifty (31,050.)

Contracts with the officers of the New Jersey State Rifle Association, the Stockton Rifle Range Association, and the Columbia Rifle Association, have been made, by which the ranges of those associations, situated at Elizabeth, Camden and Hoboken, are open for the use of the National Guard during the season, upon the payment of an annual rental and certain expenses. The amount paid during the year under the contracts, is five thousand six hundred and eighty-four dollars and sixty-three cents (\$5,684.63). Bills of expenses are submitted to this office by the New Jersey State Rifle Association, and the Stockton Rifle Association, audited and allowed, and referred to the Board of Control, consisting of the Adjutant General, General Inspector and Quartermaster General, by whom they are certified to if correct, when they are presented to your Excellency for approval. Upon approval, the amount allowed is paid by the Treasurer, upon the warrant of the Comptroller. The amount paid to the Columbia Rifle Association is one thousand dollars (\$1000), included in the above named amount, and is for the rent of the range of that association for one year only, 1880. Camp equipage is loaned for use at the ranges when application is made through the proper channel; and ammunition sold to them at the cost of manufacture.

The ranges have been occupied during the season by the National Guard, and in practice by the State Team selected for the fall meeting at Creedmoor. The result of this practice is shown by the increased number of marksmen over previous years. The total number of rounds of ammunition issued during the year for these purposes has been ninety-one thousand one hundred and sixty (91,160); returned unexpended, four

thousand nine hundred and seventy (4970), showing a total expended of eighty-six thousand one hundred and ninety (86,190) rounds, as appears by the following statement:

The number of cartridges made during the year at the Arsenal will be found in Statement C, in the appendix.

This department experienced great difficulty in procuring a supply of cartridges of special charges to meet all the requirements of armory practice. For different distances a greater or less charge is important. The service cartridge could be obtained from the trade at a reasonable price, but it was impossible to procure a special cartridge for gallery practice, unless specially ordered made, and at exorbitant rates. We were compelled, from economical considerations, to make the reduced cartridges for short ranges. The success met with in producing them, and the satisfactory results attained from their use, induced us to make the effort to adopt a plan for manufacturing bullets, believing that it could be done at a less cost than by purchase. The advantage of this course, aside from greater economy in production, would be that the State would be independent of the trade,

and confident of being always prepared to produce a supply for any emergency. With this object in view, in the spring of 1879, with your Excellency's approval, I visited several of the large manufacturers of metallic cartridges. I examined carefully the different systems, obtained the views of persons of experience in that business as to the relative advantages and costs of each, and was convinced, from the knowledge thus acquired into the details, that we could make at the Arsenal the several parts of the cartridge, with the exception of the shells and primers, as good and cheaper, at a moderate expenditure for machinery, than they could be purchased. Shells and primers are a standard article, and can always be obtained at fair prices. For some time I was unable to find any responsible parties willing to undertake to make the machines. None had been made, as far as I could learn, except by the manufacturers of metallic ammunition. They were unwilling to furnish them, except at enormous prices and with a heavy charge of royalty. I therefore adopted the system in operation at the United States Arsenal at Frankford, upon which there would be no royalty. This system is by compression, and is believed to be the best in use. Bullets made by means of compression are more "uniform in size and weight, smoother and more homogeneous," from which better results are attained than from cast and swedged bullets. The United States make their machines. The ordnance officers at that Arsenal kindly offered their assistance, and recommended Messrs. William Sellers & Co., of Philadelphia, who had done considerable work in this line for that Arsenal. Application was at once made to them. After some hesitation they were willing to undertake the work upon satisfactory terms. I gave them the order to furnish bullet machine, trimmer and rolls. They were completed and delivered during the months of February, April and May, and accepted and paid for at a cost of four thousand two hundred and seventy-six dollars and ninety-seven cents (\$4,276 97), from funds arising from sales of old ordnance deposited in the treasury of the State to the credit of the Arsenal, under the act of the legislature of 1868. The tools and machinery for making bullets are moulds, rolls, bullet machine, trimmer and lubricant. The process is briefly as follows: Of lead, sixteen (16) parts to one (1) part of tin, cast in iron moulds into cylindrical bars twenty (20) inches long by fifty-three hundredths (53-100) of an inch in diameter. The cast bars are run through a series of rolls to reduce them to a diameter of thirty-eight hundredths (38-100) of an inch, and thirty-six (36) inches in length. These bars are then fed to the bullet machine, through a vertical tube, by hand, and by an ingenious mechanism a piece is cut off of a length sufficient for a bullet, and conveyed to the die, formed in two equal sections,

into which it is forced by a vertical punch, simultaneously with the closing of the sections of the die, compressing the lead into the form of a bullet with grooves, the surplus lead being forced upward and out at the sides of the punch. The bullet, having small fins at the base and sides, is taken to the trimmer to remove any surplus lead. Here it is fed into a circular plate with holes for receiving it, revolving horizontally, carrying it under a vertical punch, where it is forced through a die, which removes the fins from its sides, and at the same moment a knife passes over the base of the bullet, cutting off the surplus lead and reducing it to the proper size and weight. The bullet is then taken to the lubricator, and fed to it by hand, placing it in a vertical circular plate with holes for the bullet, revolving over a stationary plate, carrying it to a point opposite, to a punch moving horizontally. It is forced through the opening in the plate and through a die with several holes, through which the lubricant is forced upon the bullet, fed from a column by means of a heavy weight, and pressing into the die at the same time of the passage of the bullet, the lubricant is compressed into the grooves of the bullet. The office of the die is also to size the bullet as well as the die of the trimmer, reducing it to a perfectly exact diameter and of uniform weight. For loading and reloading cartridges the following tools or bench machines are employed: A primer, powder filler, bullet seater and crimper, a re-sizer and primer extractor. The last two are used in reloading old shells—the extractor to remove the spent primer and the re-sizer to size the shell, expanded by frequent firing—and to remove any indentations to adjust it to the chamber of the rifle. Three sets of these tools have been made by Mr. Snowden, at the Arsenal, from drawings and patterns kindly furnished by the patentee, Mr. J. H. Gill, to whom we are under great obligations for the tools, as well as for valuable assistance and instructions imparted at different times during the progress of the work.

Although no authority for the payment of expenses of a State Team in the contests at Creedmoor, existed by law, a team was formed, with Colonel Howard, Inspector First Brigade, as Captain, and Captain DeMott, Inspector Rifle Practice Second Battalion, as Quartermaster. Ammunition was furnished by the State and the team transported to and from New York. All other expenses incident to the matches have been settled by representatives of the team. It is believed that a claim for reimbursement will be presented. I would respectfully suggest that it be favorably considered, and repeat my recommendation of last year, “that the legislature be requested to pass an act empowering the Commander-in-Chief to cause one or more teams, at his discretion, to be selected and entered for competi-

tion in rifle matches at ranges, either within or without the State, and that he be authorized to make his requisition upon the Comptroller to meet the expenses incident thereto." The team of 1880 was eminently successful, being the winner of one of the first prizes offered for competition by the National Rifle Association.

The total number of small arms, of all calibres, serviceable and unserviceable, belonging to the State, is twenty-one thousand three hundred and seventeen (21,317). There are also twelve (12) light Napoleon guns, smooth bore; four (4) three and a half inch Ames guns, smooth bore; four (4) three and a half inch James guns, rifled; and eighteen (18) three inch Griffin guns, rifled. These are serviceable, with gun carriages, limbers, caissons, battery wagons, traveling forges and implements complete for six (6) gun batteries. There are also eight Gatling guns, complete; two (2) Billingham and Requa batteries, and two (2) mountain howitzers, twelve-pounders. Also the following unserviceable, dismounted: two (2) bronze guns, six-pounders, French; two (2) bronze guns, four-pounders, English; five (5) bronze guns, six-pounders, smooth bore, United States, and five (5) iron guns, six-pounders.

The majority of muzzle loading rifles and muskets are in good condition, but not adapted to the wants of the service of the present day, breech loaders being exclusively used. They will be sold as soon as a fair and adequate price is offered for them. During the year six thousand and forty (6,040) muskets, calibre sixty-nine, altered from flint locks, have been sold, and two thousand and forty (2,040) have been delivered, the balance of the sale being held subject to the purchaser's order. The proceeds of the sale, amounting to six thousand and fifteen dollars and seventy-five cents (\$6,015.75), have been deposited in the treasury to the credit of the State Arsenal, under the act of the legislature, approved April 17th, 1868, entitled, "An act relative to the public arms in the State Arsenal."

The following statement will show the amount of money on hand at the close of the year 1879, and amount received during the present year from sales of ordnance stores and ammunition, and for payment of losses by military companies not otherwise accounted for, and the disposition of said proceeds.

At the close of the fiscal year 1879, an application was received from Brevet Brigadier General J. Madison Drake, commanding Gatling Gun Company A, saying that his command "has in its possession a historic brass field piece, captured from the British about one hundred years ago," which had been *rebored* and bushed in a safe manner, and requesting, in order that it might be used on patriotic occasions, that a light limber and gun carriage on which to mount it, be furnished by the State. The application was referred to the Major General commanding the National Guard, who returned it with the endorsement: "I see no objections in furnishing the limber and gun carriage to Captain Drake on the same conditions and responsibilities that the Gatling guns are issued to him, and therefore approve of this application." By your direction the limber and carriage were made at the Arsenal, and turned over to General Drake, for the purpose applied for, upon the usual terms of issues.

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In Statement N of the appendix, will be found in detail a list of property dropped from the accounts of officers of the National Guard during the year. This property was dropped only upon affidavits and statements made by the officers and approved by your Excellency.

No brigade parade of the Second Brigade of the National Guard has taken place during the year. That of the First Brigade was held at Pompton, on the 31st of May. The exercises consisted of a review and a sham battle. A day more suitable for military operations in the field could not have been chosen. A large number of military officers, with the staffs of the Commander-in-Chief and the Division Commander were on the ground. The brigade was warmly praised for its splendid appearance and discipline. Thirty thousand (30,000) rounds of blank cartridges were issued from this department for the occasion, of which number four thousand five hundred and forty-eight (4,548) were returned unexpended. Efforts were made to recover shells after firing, with but indifferent success, only two thousand four hundred and ninety-nine (2,499) being received at the Arsenal. It was reported that camp followers had gathered them up, and none could be found a few days after the exercises. The total loss of shells was twenty-two thousand nine hundred

and fifty-three (22,953). Transportation for the brigade, to and from, was furnished by contract for the sum of eight hundred dollars (\$800). The usual amount of ammunition has been supplied to the Washington Headquarters Association, at Morristown, for firing salutes during the year. A statement of all ammunition expended in firing salutes will be found in the appendix.

The limitation of time for the loan of arms to the Washington Continental Guards, of Princeton, extended by a concurrent resolution of the Legislature, will expire on the 12th of March, 1881, at which time the arms and accoutrements now in the possession of the company, will be required to be returned to the Arsenal, unless the Legislature otherwise directs.

Early in the year a shovel musket, forwarded to your Excellency by Joseph Holland, of Newark, was referred to the Acting Chief of Ordnance for examination and report. It was examined, tested, and a report submitted to your Excellency on the 4th of January. When it was received it was in a very bad condition from rust. It was cleaned and returned to the inventor. The specifications, with the report, were returned by your order.

Prior to the year 1869 uniform clothing was furnished by the State to the New Jersey Militia under authority of the act of the legislature, approved April 6th, 1865. In consideration of which the act provided for twelve (12) parades during the year by all the militia, for which service, every officer, non-commissioned officer, musician and private was entitled to receive from the State the like pay as was received by officers, non-commissioned officers, musicians and privates of the regular army of the United States, which pay should be credited to the account of each soldier performing duty, until his clothing should be paid for in full before he could receive pay for such service. No additional clothing could be supplied until the first issue was paid for. This law provided for a service uniform, plain and durable, for the whole military force. This plan for furnishing uniforms did not prove satisfactory to the militia after a trial of four years, when on March 9th, 1869, the act of the legislature was passed, giving to each company of the National Guard, in lieu of the provisions for uniforms, the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) per annum, to be expended under certain restrictions and regulations, for the purpose of procuring drill rooms and armories, for the purchase of uniforms, and to defray other expenses incident to the several military organizations. This law virtually abolished the service uniform for the National Guard, and gave the regimental boards the authority to establish a uniform for each company of the National Guard, subject to the approval of the Commander-in-Chief. The result was that each regimental board adopted a uniform of its own pecu-

liar style, without regard to cost and suitability for active service. The uniforms cost nearly double the price of State uniforms, were of finer material, much handsomer, and answered very well for ordinary parades and drills, but for the active service of the summer campaign of 1877, during the labor strikes, were found to be unsuitable, and so badly worn and damaged by this service, especially the trowsers, that new ones had to be procured. This expenditure for a new supply occasioned great pecuniary embarrassment to many of the companies, running them into an indebtedness that made it impossible for them to supply new uniforms and defray other necessary expenses of their organizations from the annual appropriation of five hundred dollars (\$500) per year. By way of relief from this embarrassment, and in a measure to compensate the National Guard for the extraordinary and valuable services rendered during the strike, the legislature passed an act, approved March 14th, 1879, authorizing the Quartermaster General, under the approval of the Governor and Commander-in-Chief, to furnish the regulation uniform *adopted by this State*, at the contract price, and to notify the Comptroller of the Treasury, on or before the first Monday in April, of the sum charged against each company for uniforms so furnished, and that *one-half of the amount* so reported should be by the Comptroller deducted from the annual appropriation for such company. This act authorized the Quartermaster General to furnish each company of the National Guard with a regulation uniform without providing him means for the payment of the expense for furnishing them, and under the interpretation given to the act by the accounting officers of the treasury it contained no authority to draw money from it to meet the expenditures contemplated by the act. Nothing, therefore, was done under the act in the way of furnishing uniforms except the adoption of a bill of uniform dress by the State Military Board, which was published in General Order No. 7, series of 1879. An amendatory act, approved March 10th, 1880, enacts, "that whenever any existing company of the National Guard is to be furnished for the first time with the regulation uniform adopted by this State, the Quartermaster General is hereby directed to purchase, under the approval of the Commander-in-Chief, and to furnish the same at the contract price, upon the requisition of the regimental or battalion commander, properly approved; the cost of the uniforms shall be paid by the Treasurer, upon the warrant of the Comptroller; and it shall be the duty of the Quartermaster General to notify the Comptroller of the Treasury on or before the first Monday in April of each year, of the sum charged against each company, battalion and regiment, for uniforms so furnished, issued to them by the Quartermaster General,

and that one-fourth of the amount so reported shall be, by the Comptroller of the Treasury deducted from each of the two next succeeding annual appropriations for such company, battalion or regiment." This act was mandatory upon the Quartermaster General to purchase, under the approval of the Commander-in-Chief, and to furnish the uniforms, and to deduct from each of the two next succeeding annual appropriations for each company one-fourth of the amount of the cost of the uniforms so furnished and issued to such company.

The act of 1879 provided for the deduction of one-half for the first year. The act of 1880 in view of the present embarrassment of the companies, gives them two years for the payment of one-half of the cost of uniforms. The board met in January and March last, to consider the matter of uniforms for the National Guard, to be furnished under the act of 1879, and after careful and mature consideration, having before them a number of uniforms and a variety of samples of material of different shades of blue cloth, weight and finish, adopted a uniform which conforms in every material point with the bill of dress adopted and published in General Order No. 7, 1879. Cloth of the quality required by the sample adopted, could not be purchased on the market in sufficient quantity. It had to be made. A contract was made with Messrs. Sullivan & Vail, of New York city, upon the most favorable terms, after negotiations with several parties in this State, who agreed to have the goods manufactured and delivered to the contractor for making the uniforms, in quantities as might be required, and within the time named, under a guarantee that the State would see that the contractor should pay for the cloth as the uniforms were delivered, accepted and paid for by the State. This arrangement proved to be entirely satisfactory to Messrs. Sullivan & Vail, and to Mr. Cowan who subsequently became the contractor, while it was of great advantage to the State in the certainty of securing a quality of cloth uniform in color and fabric of the best quality. Contracts were made with the Scovill Manufacturing Company for furnishing the buttons of a good quality of gilt and at the most reasonable rates. By the terms of the contract for making uniforms, by reference to the contract and specifications it will be seen that the State would furnish to the contractor the buttons upon payment of the cost price. This course was adopted at the suggestion of the State Military Board in order to secure a good button, and was believed to be of advantage to the State, imposing only a slight additional labor upon this department. On the 11th of March, 1880, circulars containing specifications were mailed to a number of the principal tailoring establishments of this State, New York city and Philadelphia, inviting proposals for making

The contract was awarded to William D. Cowan, of Newark, N. J., at fifteen dollars and ninety-nine cents (\$15.99) per uniform, comprising coat, trowsers and cap, he being the lowest bidder, for furnishing the regulation uniform in such numbers and in such quantities as might be required. Requisitions properly approved in compliance with law, were received from the

First Regiment for three hundred (300) uniforms.

Third Regiment for four hundred and ten (410) uniforms.

Sixth Regiment for four hundred and sixty-four (464) uniforms.

Seventh Regiment for three hundred and eighty-four (384) uniforms.

Ninth Regiment for three hundred (300) uniforms.

Special pains were taken to have the uniforms to fit the men. The contractor was required to take every man's measure for each garment, and tag each article with the name of the man, his company and regiment, for whom it was intended. The coat was made from twenty ounce dark blue castors, the cap of the same color, but of lighter weight, and the trowsers of twenty ounce light blue. They have been well made and neatly trimmed with light blue facings and fire gilt buttons. They are neat and serviceable, and give to the soldier a more attractive and soldierly appearance than the more fanciful and expensive uniforms. They have given entire satisfaction. The cost of uniform, including every expense, is sixteen dollars and twenty-four cents (\$16.24). The cost of fatigue uniforms heretofore furnished by the Regi-

mental Boards, comprising coat, trowsers and cap, was at an average of about thirty dollars (\$30) each.

The Comptroller of the Treasury was notified on the 5th of April of the cost of the uniforms, and deductions of the first one-fourth were made from the annual appropriation of the following named regiments:

Under the authority of the Commander-in-Chief, the contractor proceeded at once with the work of making the uniforms for three regiments, the third, sixth and seventh, composing the Second Brigade, which have been supplied at this date. The total number received at the Arsenal from the contractor is

The total amount paid on account of the uniforms furnished is nineteen thousand two hundred and fifty-nine dollars and forty-nine cents (\$19,259.49).

The State is in need of great coats for the use of the National Guard, when ordered out for service in cold weather, in cases of emergency, or on parades of ceremony as frequently occurs under the call of State or local authorities to join in parades of ceremony, the inauguration of the Executive, the celebration of anniversaries, the dedication of monuments or the unveiling

of statues. Requisitions have been received for the loan of more great coats for use in different parades to take place in December next than can be filled. The first Brigade, sixteen hundred strong, has been invited by the authorities of the city of Newark, to join in the parade on the 16th of December next, on the occasion of the unveiling of the Kearny statue. This invitation cannot be declined by the brigade under a proper sense of obligation, as that city furnishes the First and Fifth Regiments of the Brigade, with splendid quarters for drill and armory purposes, free of cost. During four months of the year in this climate a great coat for a citizen soldier is an absolute necessity for outdoor parades, and men should not be ordered out upon duty unless furnished with comfortable clothing. The State has only seven hundred and fifty (750) in store at the Arsenal. They are loaned only for temporary duty during inclement weather, and are required to be turned into the Arsenal promptly after such duty has been performed. This department should be provided with a number sufficient to equip one brigade for any occasion requiring great coats.

The legislature at its last session passed a concurrent resolution, "that whenever a reunion shall be held at any place within the State, of the members of any one of the regiments of this State engaged in the late war of the Rebellion or reunion of the Grand Army of the Republic, the Quartermaster General is hereby requested to send a capable and trustworthy person connected with his department to attend the same, taking with him to the said reunion the colors of said regiment borne by them during the war, said colors to remain in the custody of said person until the close of the reunion, and to be by him safely returned to their depository at the Capitol."

In September the following request was received by your Excellency, from the Executive Committee of the King's Mountain Centennial, for a State flag (as one of the original thirteen States), of an unusual size, with the coat of arms of the State, to decorate the rostrum on the occasion of the centennial celebration of the battle of King's Mountain, North Carolina, on the 7th of October:

To His Excellency, Governor of the State of New Jersey;

DEAR SIR:—In order that the thirteen original States of the Union be conspicuously represented in the Centennial Celebration of the battle of King's Mountain, it is desired by the Association in charge of the celebration to have the rostrum decorated with the flag of each of these States. I therefore request that your Excellency will have forwarded to me by express the flag of your State, reduced to three feet in length by two and a-half in width. As the ceremonies of the occasion will begin on the fifth of October, it is important that the flag be received by the first of that month. Sincerely hoping that your Excellency will be with us on this occasion of re-union and good feeling, I am, with great respect,

Not having such a flag on hand, by direction of your Excellency, a suitable one was made and forwarded to the Committee.

The encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic was held at Bonaparte Park, Bordentown, commencing August 16th, Applications were made by Department Commander, George W. Gile, under date of July 20th and 27th, for the necessary camp and garrison equipage and ordnance stores for the use of the members of the association while in camp. For the safe

keeping and return of the property he submitted a bond in the penal sum of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000), executed by the Department Commander with sureties, William J. Sewell, Edmund E. Read, Thomas H. Dudley and George M. Wright. Upon the approval thereof by your Excellency, the stores were issued as required. Freight and cartage were paid by the Grand Army. The stores were returned on the 24th of August. The expenses of men employed in issuing and receiving these stores, and the materials consumed in putting them in order, amounting to \$642.62, have been paid by the State. The indebtedness of the Grand Army of the Republic to the State is summed up for the encampments of 1879 and 1880 as follows:

Bills for the amount of expenses and damages have been presented and payment demanded, but the reply is that the association has no funds. Good and sufficient bonds were taken, and are on file in this office as required by law. It is believed that this claim will not be paid unless through legal process. Proceedings have not been instituted as notice has been received that an application will be made to the next legislature for relief. In the meantime this expenditure is necessarily, but improperly charged to the National Guard. If the amount should be collected the money must be paid into the Treasury of the State, while the cost of the encampments goes to swell up the amount of expenses of the National Guard.

The Soldiers' Children's Home, still under the charge of this department, is well cared for. The buildings and fences are in reasonably good condition, requiring only slight repairs. They would be better, and greatly improved by a coat of paint. They are in the occupancy of two careful families. Fires are maintained during the winter and inclement weather to keep up a proper degree of dryness and the pipes from freezing. Water is cut off whenever it can be done with a proper regard to protection from fire and the necessary use of the families occupying the premises. The lawn and shrubbery have required some expense to keep them in good order during the past summer and to protect the trees and grounds from trespassers. A few additional trees have been planted out, the care and nurture of which will add in time greatly to the appearance and value of the property. The expense connected with the building and grounds during the year, has been four hundred and sixty-seven dollars and four cents (\$467.04). The estimated expense for the coming year is five hundred dollars (\$500).

The total expenditures on militia account for the year are seventy-nine thousand two hundred and twenty-five dollars and sixty-nine cents (\$79,225.69), this includes expenses of the State Arsenal, which have been unusually heavy, rent of Brinton, Stockton and Columbia rifle ranges, and nineteen thousand two hundred and fifty-nine dollars and forty-nine cents (\$19,259.49) paid on account of the new regulation uniforms furnished under the act of 1880, as appears by the following statement:

The expenses on account of the Militia for the year 1880, are ten thousand four hundred and forty-nine dollars (\$10,449), more than those for the year 1879. This excess accrues by reason of the expenditure of nineteen thousand two hundred and fifty-nine dollars and forty-nine cents (\$19,259.49), on account of the new regulation State uniform, from which should be deducted the amount stopped from the annual appropriation, seven thousand five hundred and forty-three dollars and forty-eight cents (\$7,543.48), showing a total of eleven thousand seven hundred and sixteen dollars and one cent (\$11,716.01), an extraordinary expense over those of the preceding year. Aside from this expense the total expense would be sixty-seven thousand five hundred and nine dollars and sixty-eight cents (\$67,509.68), less

by one thousand two hundred and sixty-seven dollars and one cent (\$1,267.01) than the expenses of 1879.

The expenses of the State Arsenal during the past year for repairs and alterations necessary for present purposes is one thousand nine hundred and fifty-nine dollars and thirteen cents (\$1,959.13), an excess over 1879 of eight hundred and forty-five dollars and four cents (\$845.04). The buildings are old and dilapidated, erected in 1797, for a prison and occupied as such until the completion of the present State Prison in 1837, when by an act of the legislature they were declared to be the public arsenal, and five hundred dollars appropriated for altering and fitting them up. Little was done at that time to render it a fit place for storage of ordnance, and no more has been expended upon it since than was required to keep it in repair and adopt it to present needful uses. It is a disgrace to the State, and does not comport with her characteristic liberality towards her public buildings. A new arsenal is greatly needed, designed and constructed, with a view to the essential requirements of an arsenal. Any attempt to remodel it in its present dilapidated condition would cost as much as the erection of a new one.

In the report of the Commission on Prison Labor of last year, we find under the problem "*to diversify the employment of convicts,*" a recommendation "to enable this to be done and for the urgent needs of the State Prison, in other respects, hereinbefore mentioned, that the present State Arsenal and the grounds pertaining to it, be added to the prison and fitted for its use." Should this be done, it will be necessary to make some provision for a new arsenal, and where it is to be located is a question to be settled in the discretion of the legislature. The State has two vacant properties both well located for the purposes of an arsenal. The first is that known as the Soldiers' Children's Home, a rectangular lot at the corner of Hamilton and Chestnut avenues, Chambersburg, four hundred and ten (410) by seven hundred and fifty-seven (757) feet, with an exterior boundary of two thousand three hundred and thirty-four (2334) feet, and an area of nearly seven (7) acres and bounded by four streets in a growing neighborhood at a convenient distance from the Clinton street depot of the Pennsylvania Railroad. The building consists of a centre one hundred and forty one (141) by forty-seven (47) feet, with two wings fifty seven (57) by thirty-four (34) feet each, and the entire length of the building, two hundred and forty-five (245) feet, three stories high. It can be strengthened and utilized at much less cost than the construction of a new one of an equal capacity for storage. Other buildings would be required, such as shops, cannon house, stables, etc. An exterior wall would be necessary to enclose either the whole or such part of it as should be devoted to military stores. The other vacant lot,

known as Camp Perrine, is equally well located, possessing, however, some advantage for transportation, but would cost more on account of the buildings at the Soldiers' Children's Home. This is a triangular lot containing about ten (10) acres, on the east side of the railroad and canal, directly opposite the prison, with a frontage of nine hundred and fifty-seven (957) feet, and on the south a frontage on Cass street of four hundred and twelve (412) feet, and intersected by Jenny street with a frontage of one hundred and ninety-two (192) feet, cutting off a corner of about half an acre. Its location affords unusual facilities for transportation by the construction of a spur from the main track of the railroad into the arsenal grounds, from and to which a large amount of heavy stores could be moved with less expense than by wagon transportation. Its exterior boundary is two thousand five hundred and sixty-eight (2568) feet. It presents advantages, if a wall is properly constructed, for easy defence, which should be considered in the location of an arsenal, against attacks from whatever cause. The uneven surface of the ground is no more than is necessary for furnishing materials in grading to bring it to a proper grade with the adjacent streets for good drainage. Plans and drawings for the necessary alterations and buildings and a comparative statement of the relative cost of construction of an arsenal of equal capacity on either lot have been made and are at your Excellency's service whenever required.

ACTING PAYMASTER GENERAL'S ACCOUNT.

At the date of my last annual report there was in my hands as acting Paymaster General, the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150). Since that date three (3) men have been paid twelve dollars (\$12) each, leaving a balance at this date of one hundred and fourteen dollars (\$114). Eighteen men remain unpaid, the amount due them being one hundred and eighty-nine dollars (\$189).

An appendix to my report is given, containing the following statements :

SIR:—Proposals will be received at this office on or before the 22d day of March, for furnishing one thousand (1000) uniforms, more or less, for the use of the National Guard of this State, in accordance with specifications herewith inclosed.

The uniforms required will comprise the following named articles:

1000 Uniform coats.

1000 Uniform trowsers.

| 1000 Uniform caps.

Bidders will be expected to estimate for furnishing uniforms made from Pomeroy's goods, as provided in the specifications, manufactured for this purpose by Sullivan & Vail, at 329 and 331 Broadway, New York city. Bids for any other cloths will not be received. Buttons will be furnished to the contractor by the State at cost price.

The whole, or any part of the supplies may be bid for, and bidders are requested to state in their proposals, upon what dates and in what quantities, they can make the deliveries.

Bidders to whom the contract is awarded, will be required to execute a contract with satisfactory security for the faithful performance of the same.

The contractor will be required to take the measure of the men, and each garment made to fit and tagged with the name of the maker and that of the soldier, with his company and regiment. Uniforms will conform to the style, workmanship and finish of the samples deposited in this office. Deliveries will commence on the 1st day of May, and the whole delivery made on or before the 1st day of July next ensuing. Each article will be subject to a rigid inspection, and bidders are informed that a full compliance with the specifications will be insisted upon, and that no article, inferior in any respect, to the standard samples, will be accepted.

Every article will be inspected, and if not found fully equal to the sample and not fulfilling the requirements of the contract, will be rejected.

Payments will be made as soon after the acceptance of each delivery as possible, withholding ten per centum from each payment, until the whole number of articles contracted for, shall be delivered, inspected and accepted by the State.

SPECIFICATIONS FOR UNIFORMS.

COATS.

Material, dark blue cloth (Pomeroy's National Guard, 20 oz. blue castors); lining for body and sleeves, light drab silesia; for skirt, black worsted serge.

Facings of light royal blue cloth, buttons, State regulation, fire gilt, made by the Scovill Manufacturing Company, according to samples in this office; single-breasted frock coat, nine (9) gilt buttons in front, standing collar, one and one-quarter ($1\frac{1}{4}$) inch to one and one-half ($1\frac{1}{2}$) inch in height sloping up and backward, in front, with rounded corners; faced from each corner four (4) inches back with facing cloth, with one small button at end and number of regiment in centre, as per pattern.

Cloth facings and pipings on the collar, shoulders, cuffs and back of skirt, of light royal blue, as per sample, shoulder straps of same material as coat, let into seam at the point of shoulder, faced as above, with one small button and button-hole at collar, as per pattern.
