To His Excellency George C. Ludlow, Governor and Commander-in Chief:

I have the honor to submit a report of the most important operations of this department for the year ending October thirty-first, (31st,) eighteen hundred and eighty-three (1883), with such suggestions and recommendations as the demands of the service seem to require. A more detailed statement of the daily operations will be found in the appendices under their appropriate heads. Upon the office of Quartermaster General, by law, devolves the duties of Commissary and Paymaster Generals, as well as Chief of Ordnance. As Quartermaster General it is my duty to provide clothing, camp and garrison equipage, subsistence and transportation when required for encampments, parades, reviews and rifle practice. As Ordnance Officer, to provide and issue ordnance and ordnance stores, arms and ammunition to the uniformed companies of the National Guard, also ammunition and targets for armory and range practice.

The supplies necessary are obtained by purchase by contract, and in the open market, and by manufacture at the State Arsenal; clothing and equipage by contract awarded to the lowest responsible bidders, and upon receipt at the Arsenal a rigid inspection is made, and if not equal to sample and in conformity to contract is rejected—otherwise accepted and paid for by the State upon warrants approved by the Governor. Ammunition for small arms is put up at the Arsenal; shells and primers are purchased in the open market. Bullets are manufactured by machinery of the

most approved character. Great skill and care are exercised in putting up ammunition, to have it equal and uniform throughout, to obtain the greatest degree of accuracy. Our employees, after several years of service, have attained to great skill in the manufacture of cartridges. Besides the labor in issuing and receiving, and packing stores, a very large amount of work is required in the repairs and cleaning of arms and ordnance.

The duties of this Department have been largely increased within the past few years by rifle practice, as well as under the provisions of the several acts of the Legislature authorizing the loans of arms and ordnance and other military stores to the Grand Army of the Republic, and reunions of Veteran Associations, and the issue of clothing, camp and garrison equipage for the use of the Grand Army for encampments, and Grand Army Posts. This devolves a greatly increased amount of labor and expense in the issues and receipts, cleaning, and the repairs of stores turned into the Arsenal. A detailed statement of these transactions will be found in a subsequent part of this report. There are at this time some seventy (70) Posts of the Grand Army in this State, composed of veteran soldiers of the late war, and their number is steadily on the increase. Many of these Posts have been already supplied with arms and equipments, and it is believed that all will ultimately make application. They are required to give bonds before they can be furnished. Army Posts being thus furnished are required to make annual reports to this office, and to furnish such other information of the nature and condition of State property in their possession as may be required.

These Posts are incorporated under the general law of this State relating to corporations, and have provided themselves with a hall or place of meeting, with, I believe, in every instance where arms have been furnished, a suitable and safe place for the custody of the arms, and that they are in good condition. The property loaned to the Grand Army for temporary purposes, such as parades and encampments, is returned to the Arsenal with commendable promptness, and in as good condition as could be expected considering the nature of the stores and the casualties of such service.

This Department, upon the approval of the Commander-in-Chief, in 1874, obtained from the United States Government three thousand four hundred (3,400) stands of Springfield rifles, then of the most approved model, made with the greatest amount of care and of the very best material, on account of the quota due the State from the United States under the law of Congress of 1808 for arming the whole body of the Militia. This Act appro-

priates two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000) per year for this purpose. The credit to this State on this account with the United States Government was the accumulation of some fifteen years, the result of saving, in order to secure from the Government the most improved arms for the National Guard.

After nearly ten years of service these rifles are in fair condition for service, yet they by no means possess the beauty and finish of new ones. There have been a number of valuable improvements made to this arm, such as sights, safety notch and grip, which are of great advantage in long range shooting. We have had these improvements applied to our rifles as far as practicable and our limited means would permit; yet the time is not far distant when the service will require, in order to keep pace with the improvements of the age, an entirely new and improved arm. The lifetime of a rifle with reasonable care is about twenty years, without regard to the improvements in arms by new inventions. This will require a large expenditure, and, it is feared, too large, to be indulged in at the expense of the State, in addition to the necessary and proper expenditures for the support and maintenance of the National Guard at its present numerical strength.

The money value of the annual quota payable in arms by the United States is four thousand three hundred and eighteen dollars and six cents (\$4,318.06), quite inadequate under the appropriation of two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000.) At this rate it would take the accumulation of at least fifteen (15) years, when our present rifles would be quite out of date and unserviceable to supply a sufficient number for re-arming the National Guard of this State.

Various bills have been introduced in Congress upon the recommendation of the chief of Ordnance of the United States for several years past to increase this appropriation to meet the necessary wants of the Militia. The Act reported by the Military Committee of the Senate at the last session of Congress seems the most practical and the most likely to pass. It provides for an annual appropriation of six hundred thousand dollars (\$600,000) for furnishing arms and equipments for the Militia of the several States. It seems so liberal and necessary to the well being of the Militia that I have copied the Act and extracts from the report of the Senate Committee, explanatory thereof, with the remarks of the Chief of Ordnance of the United States relating to the importance of its provisions from his report of the 30th of June, 1883, and would respectfully recommend that the attention of the Legislature be called to its importance, and by their action to request the co-operation of our Senators and Members in Congress in aid of the passage of so important a measure.

EXTRACT FROM THE ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CHIEF OF ORDNANCE
TO THE SECRETARY OF WAR, 1883.

It is difficult to realize the fact that more than half a generation has passed since the close of the war, and yet that simple fact has a vital bearing for weal or woe on the status of the militia and the arms-bearing force of the country. Recruits for the army must be between sixteen and thirty-five years of age at the time of their enlistment. In the militia every able-bodied male citizen who is of the age of eighteen and under forty-five years shall be enrolled. The war having lasted four years, the million of men in the service at its close must have been between the ages of sixteen and thirty-nine, those at sixteen being raw recruits, those at thirty-nine being hardened veterans of many campaigns, the mean age being twenty-eight in 1865; if to this be added the eighteen years since the war, the mean age of the soldiers mustered out at the end of the war would be forty-six at the present time, an age about the maximum required for the militia. But even those who were sixteen at the end of the war would now be thirty-four, within one year of the maximum limit required for the army. It thus appears that in another decade the last remnant of that grand army will have passed beyond the limit of active military service. All the field experiences of the greatest war of modern times will then be lost to the future, and the country's dependence will rest solely on a people whose success in war may have to be gained through reverses and disappointment.

The remedy for this state of affairs is simple and plain. Substantial encouragement should be given to the formation of volunteer organizations in every State, district and city, by liberal appropriations made by Congress to supply the arms, equipments, tents, ammunition, and other ordnance stores. A well digested system of organization, and a proper recognition of successful efforts in enforcing strict discipline and perfect drill, would go far to keep such organizations in heart and in the confidence of the country.

The act of 23d of April, 1868, makes an annual appropriation of \$200,000 "for the purpose of providing arms and equipments for the whole body of the militia." The bill (S. 1596) reported from the Senate Committee on Military Affairs during the last Congress, is so liberal and important in its provisions that I venture to insert it here in full, in the hope that it may receive the

attention it deserves. I strongly recommend the passage of such a law. The bill is as follows :

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America, in Congress assembled :

That section sixteen hundred and sixty-one of the Revised Statutes be and the same is hereby amended and re-enacted so as to read as follows :

SECTION 1. That the sum of six hundred thousand dollars is hereby annually appropriated, to be paid out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated, for the purpose of providing arms, equipments, ammunition, ordnance stores, and tents for the militia.

SEC. 2. That said appropriation shall be apportioned among the several States and Territories on the books of the Ordnance Department by the Chief of Ordnance of the Army, under the direction of the Secretary of War, according to the number of representatives or delegates to which each State and Territory respectively is entitled in the Congress of the United States ; *Provided, however,* That each State and Territory shall only be entitled to the benefits of so much of the appropriation apportioned to it as the proportion of the number of the regularly enlisted, organized, and uniformed active militia, as determined by the report of the Secretary of War made on the preceding first Monday in February, bears to the maximum number of active militia for which such State or Territory is entitled to the benefits of this act. And the amount of said appropriation which is thus determined not to be available shall be covered back into the treasury.

SEC. 3. That in time of peace the number of active militia for which each State and Territory shall be entitled to receive its apportionment of the appropriations made by this act shall not exceed six hundred regularly uniformed commissioned officers and enlisted men for each representative and delegate to which such State or Territory is entitled in the Congress of the United States.

SEC. 4. That the purchase or manufacture of ordnance, ordnance stores, and tents for the militia under the provisions of this act shall be made by the Chief of Ordnance of the Army, under the direction of the Secretary of War, and they shall be received for and shall remain the property of the United States, and be annually accounted for to the Chief of Ordnance of the Army by the Governors of the States and Territories, for which purpose the Chief of Ordnance of the Army, under the direction of the Secretary of War, shall prescribe and supply the necessary blanks, and make such regulations as he may deem necessary to protect the interest of the United States.

SEC. 5. That all arms, equipments, ordnance stores, or tents which may become unserviceable or unsuitable shall be examined by a board of officers of the Militia, and its report shall be forwarded by the Governor of the State or Territory direct to the Chief of Ordnance of the Army for the action of the Secretary of War, who shall direct what disposition, by sale or otherwise, shall be made of them ; and the proceeds of such sale shall be covered into the Treasury of the United States.

SEC. 6. That for all the purposes of this act the District of Columbia shall be accounted and treated as a Territory entitled to one delegate in Congress.

The following quotations are from the Committee's report which accompanies the bill :

“That in addition to the resolution instructing us to consider the propriety of increasing the annual appropriation for the Militia, there have been referred to us a large number of petitions from the officers of the Militia relative to an increase of the appropriation and other amendments to the existing Militia law.”

And again :

“ A simple statement of fact appears to be a sufficient response to the resolution of the Senate. That an appropriation fixed in 1808 to provide for seventeen States, with a population of eight millions, is inadequate to provide for thirty-eight States with a population of fifty millions, needs no argument. The Chief of Ordnance has for many years urged Congress to increase the appropriation ; it was considered and favorably reported to the Senate by this committee in the Forty-fifth Congress, and we think it would be difficult to conceive any reasonable argument against it. * * * It will be perceived that no provision is made as to the mode of apportioning the appropriation between the States, no requirements for the accountability of property furnished, or limitation on the disposition that the States may make of it. The greatest defect of the law, however, is that it does not allow the furnishing of tents and other articles necessary to provide for camps of instruction. To this omission of the law is largely due the disparity between the different States in the strength and efficiency of the militia. * * * We accordingly report herewith a bill to increase the annual appropriation to \$600,000, and making provisions for its apportionment, and for the care, accountability and disposition of property issued under it. We also provide in the bill that each State shall only receive such proportion of the amount apportioned to it as the actual number of its active militia bears to a fixed maximum, and we believe this provision wisely calculated to foster and encourage the formation of volunteer organizations in those States where but few now exist.”

There have been no material changes in the law relative to the organization of the militia since its original enactment in 1792, and it is obvious that many of its provisions are now obsolete and many amendments desirable.

Expenses of National Guard during the year 1883, fifty-eight thousand three hundred and fifty-four dollars and sixty-nine cents (\$58,354.69), less a credit of one thousand three hundred dollars (\$1,300), proceeds of sales of stores, &c. deposited with the State Treasurer, making the actual expense to the State fifty-seven thousand and fifty-four dollars and sixty-nine cents (\$57,054.69.)

Expenses of National Guard during the year 1882, sixty-nine thousand two hundred and fifty-two dollars and eighty-three cents (\$69,252.83.)

Cost of uniforms during the year 1883, nine thousand dollars and forty-three cents (\$9,000.43.)

Cost of uniforms during the year 1882, three hundred and sixteen dollars and ten cents (\$316.10.)

Number of marksmen's badges furnished during the year, for the year 1882, one hundred and eighty-two (182); number of bars, four hundred and twenty-two (422), making the total number of marksmen six hundred and four (604.) The previous year six hundred and seventy-four (674) qualified as marksmen, showing a falling off of seventy (70.)

RECEIPTS FROM UNITED STATES.

Under the act of Congress of April 23, 1808, appropriating annually the sum of two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000) for arming the militia, there were received the following stores from the United States Ordnance Department, during the year, on account of the quota of the State :

The amount to the credit of the State at this date is twelve thousand one hundred and three dollars and forty cents (\$12,103.40.)

THE NATIONAL GUARD.

The National Guard has continued to receive the thoughtful care and attention of your Excellency during your administration, and before its close the whole Guard will have received the new regulation uniforms adopted by this State, furnished under the act approved March 10, 1880, providing for the issue of uniforms under certain conditions. Your Excellency has contributed much to its comfort as well as efficiency by a sound and liberal policy. Besides uniforms of the best quality, overcoats and blankets have been provided for the use and comfort of the Guard in inclement weather. It has never been in a more efficient condition, nor its clothing and equipments so complete, nor its appearance so becoming a soldier, and creditable to the liberality of the State as at the present time. Much credit is, however, due to the experienced and very competent officers in command, who have labored with a becoming zeal to elevate the efficiency of the Guard to its present status, so that it will now compare favorably with that of any other State.

A new company has been organized in Paterson, composed of admirable material. This newly organized company of infantry has been supplied with arms, upon the officers giving the proper bond, with sufficient surety as provided for in the act for the organization of the National Guard, and by direction of the Major General commanding (Special Orders No. 3, February 12, 1883.)

The companies with one exception have made the annual returns required by law. Books of accounts of all issues to officers of the National Guard are kept in the office, and settlement made annually; and no officer is entitled to his discharge upon tending his resignation unless his accounts are settled. All matters of detail affecting the comfort of our soldiers while on duty

are arranged, and rules which operate for the advantage of the troops universally are established by this Department. Every care is taken that they shall be well armed, equipped and clothed. The annual returns show the strength of the regimental and battalion organizations to be as follows :

In the case of Battery B, a credit stands on the books of this office for armory rent for two months and twenty-two days, amounting to two hundred and twenty-seven dollars and seventy-eight cents (\$227.78.)

Affidavits have been submitted by the commanding officers and others of Batteries A and B and Company B, Third Regiment, but they have not yet been acted on. The Commandant of Company A, Ninth Regiment, has filed an affidavit as to loss of old stores, but fails to account for the losses occurring in the last years of the existence of the organization.

EXPENSES OF THE NATIONAL GUARD.

By the following statement you will observe the expenditures on militia account for the past year are fifty-seven thousand and fifty-four dollars and sixty-nine cents (\$57,054.69), of which three thousand nine hundred and twenty-nine dollars and thirty-

five cents (\$3,929.35) is for the purchase and repairs of arms, ordnance, clothing, camp and garrison equipage, twenty-seven thousand seven hundred and sixty-five dollars and thirty-four cents (\$27,765.34) is for armory rent, by act of the Legislature; nine thousand dollars and forty-three cents (\$9,000.43) was paid for uniforms, and sixteen thousand three hundred and fifty-nine dollars and fifty-seven cents (\$16,359.57) was for current expenses.

These expenses have been increased by the passage of the act approved January 30, 1883, entitled "An Act to authorize the payment of the sum of one thousand dollars to the paymaster of the Sixth Regiment, Infantry, Second Brigade, National Guard of the State of New Jersey, for Company B, of said regiment, its appropriation for the years one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine, and one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one." This act authorized the Comptroller of the State of New Jersey "to draw his warrant on the treasury in favor of the paymaster of the Sixth Regiment, Infantry, Second Brigade, National Guard of the State of New Jersey for the sum of one thousand dollars, for Company B of said regiment, being the amount of appropriation of money to which said company would have been entitled for the years one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine and one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, if the muster rolls of said company for said years had shown the standard number of men required by law." They have been further increased by the act approved March 14, 1883. The second section of this law enacts: "That any regiment or battalion of the National Guard, the constituent companies whereof are stationed in different cities, towns or villages, may be assembled for instruction and drill in the school of the battalion six times in each year; and it shall be the duty of the Quartermaster General, upon requisition of the commandant of any regiment or battalion so assembling, to furnish transportation for the various companies thereof to and from the place of rendezvous." The total amount paid during the year on account of this service is two hundred and forty-four dollars and eighteen cents (\$244.18.) But one regiment has availed itself of this law.

The Third assembled at Asbury Park on the twenty-seventh of June. Special trains for the companies from Elizabeth, Rahway, New Brunswick and Keyport were furnished by the State. The day was spent profitably in field exercises, including skirmish drill and parade.

In the following statement will be found an item, "Act approved March 23, 1883, \$6.76." This amount is erroneously charged against the National Guard. The title of the act is,

“An Act concerning the loan of military property,” and it provides that when any arms, equipments, ordnance, camp and garrison equipage, or other military stores, or any of the battle flags of New Jersey troops are issued or loaned by the Quartermaster General of this State, in accordance with any law of this State, to any veteran association, or to any independent military organization, it shall be the duty of the Quartermaster General to keep an accurate account of the expenses of transportation and the other expenses incident to the carrying out the purposes of such law.” This account has been kept separate in this office, and the amount should not be charged to the account of the National Guard.

There is also charged in the statement the sum of eight hundred and nineteen dollars and nine cents (\$819.09), under the head of “Joint Resolution approved March 8, 1883.” This item is for medals prepared and presented to the “officers and men of the New Jersey battalion, to commemorate their good conduct at the centennial anniversary of the battle of Yorktown.”

RENT OF RIFLE RANGE.

The amount paid during the year on account of rent of Brinton Range is three thousand dollars (\$3,000).

CONDEMNED STORES.

By order of the Commander-in-Chief, a public sale was held on the 15th of December, 1882. The articles sold consisted of great coats, uniform coats, trowsers, hats, caps, etc., etc. The amount realized on the sale was one thousand two hundred and forty-five dollars and fifty cents (\$1,245.50). Another sale was

held at the State Arsenal on the 3d of September. The property sold consisted entirely of condemned ordnance stores. The net amount realized on this sale was three hundred and ninety-eight dollars and nineteen cents (\$398.19).

ACCOUNTS OF OFFICERS.

Fifty-eight (58) affidavits have been received during the year, from former and present officers and sureties of disbanded as well as existing companies, and other officers formerly and now of the National Guard. A number of muskets and rifles remain charged against company officers who are not now in the service of the State. A statement of them is herewith presented as follows :

The above named property cannot be recovered and returned to the State. It must be considered lost or destroyed. In some instances the officers and sureties on the bonds are dead, or removed from the State, so that their whereabouts are unknown at this office. Under these circumstances the property cannot be fully and satisfactorily accounted for. The charge remains on the books of this office against the respective Company commanders. It can only be removed by a legislative enactment. I recommend that the subject be submitted to the Legislature, that the proper measures may be taken to have the accounts closed, and charged off the books.

BRIGADE PARADE.

Previous to the inspection and muster the First Brigade paraded in Jersey City, on Wednesday, May 30, as escort to the Grand Army of the Republic. The manner in which the brigade performed this duty reflected great credit upon its officers and men. These parades are authorized by law, and tend to excite the military ardor of our National Guard to a high degree.

No parade of the Second Brigade has been had during the year.

SALES AND AMOUNTS RECEIVED FOR LOSSES AND DAMAGES.

The amount received during the year on this account has been two thousand seven hundred and fifty-five dollars and twenty-one cents (\$2,755.21). The account is stated as follows :

UNIFORMS.

The amount paid for uniforms for the National Guard during the year is nine thousand dollars and forty-three cents (\$9000.43).

The cloth was purchased of Sullivan, Vail & Co., at a fair price and charged up against the contractor at cost price. The bills were paid only upon your approval. By the law, approved March 10, 1880, the State is required to pay the entire cost of the uniforms, deducting one-half thereof from the two next succeeding annual appropriations due to the companies. By the act for the organization of the National Guards, "all uniforms issued to each company shall be left at the company armory for safe-keeping." They are charged to each company, and are required to be turned in or accounted for. In some instances the uniforms have not been kept at the armory, and in some cases it is believed that company officers allow their members to take their uniforms to their homes, thus very often involving a loss.

GREAT COATS.

Early in the year I purchased fifteen hundred (1,500) yards of sky-blue cloth for great coats. This quantity is sufficient to make five hundred (500) coats, which it is proposed to do at once. The cloth remains in store at the Arsenal, from whence it will be forwarded to the contractor as soon as the contract for making the coats is given out. The cloth was paid for in February, and is included in the expenses of the Militia.

ORANGE RIFLES.

The following Joint Resolution was passed by the last Legislature, and approved February 23, 1883 :

"That the Quartermaster General be, and he hereby is, directed to loan to The Orange Rifles, a military organization located and established at the city of Orange, New Jersey, one hundred and fifty stands of arms, with the necessary equipments thereto appertaining; *provided, however,* That the said The Orange Rifles first enter into bond, with two or more sureties, to the said Quartermaster General in an amount equal to the value of said arms loaned, to return said arms to the State of New Jersey when the same may be required."

The condition having been complied with and a proper bond filed, an issue of eighty (80) muskets, bayonets and gun slings was made on the 16th of March.

ARMS LOANED TO SCHOOLS AND ACADEMIES.

The total number of arms in possession of schools and academies, issued under the law and by authority of the Commander-in-Chief, is three hundred and eleven (311). The institutions of learning against which these arms are charged, and the number in each, are as follows :

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SALUTES.

The usual amount of ammunition has been supplied to the Washington Headquarters Association, at Morristown, for firing salutes during the year. The salutes fired at Trenton during the year have been: February 22d, at the State House grounds by authority of the following resolution of the House of Assembly, adopted February 5th: "*Resolved*, That the Quartermaster General of the State be requested to fire the usual salute at the Capitol Grounds on the 22d day of February next, in tribute to the anniversary of the birth of George Washington." March 1st, a national salute at the State House, in observance of the bi-centennial of the first regular session of the Legislature. July 4th, a morning and evening gun and national salute at the State Arsenal.

STATE WAR CLAIMS.

No progress has been made during the year by the accounting officers of the Treasury of the United States in the adjustment of the claims of this State against the United States for expenses incurred in organizing and equipping troops for the United States service. By my exertions, aided by voluminous documentary evidence and written explanations made up under my direction by the clerks in this Department, I have collected from the United States on account of these claims against the Government, the large sum of one million three hundred and ninety-six thousand one hundred and forty-one dollars and fifty-six cents (\$1,396,141.56). Before closing my report of the transactions of this office in connection with these claims, I wish to state that the different sheets arising on their settlement, embracing the suspended and disallowed accounts of all the instalments, have been received and are on file.

STATE ARSENAL.

The current expenses of the State Arsenal have been two hundred and ninety-eight dollars and thirty-six cents (\$298.36); extraordinary expenses one thousand two hundred and thirty-four

dollars (\$1,234), the amount of premium paid for insurance on buildings and contents, for an insurance of one hundred and ten thousand four hundred dollars (\$110,400) for five years, principally on the contents.

I have repeatedly called attention in my annual reports to the bad condition of the buildings, and their unsuitableness, and the necessity for a new Arsenal, constructed upon an improved plan, and with the requisites necessary for a proper storage, and transaction of the business. The building was erected nearly one hundred years since for a State Prison, and occupied as such until 1837, since which it has been used for an arsenal. An act appropriating five thousand dollars (\$5,000) for necessary repairs was passed late in the session of the last Legislature, but after the adjournment it could not be found, and it therefore failed to become a law. It is believed it would be poor policy to attempt to remodel the present buildings with a view to permanency, or to make them convenient or even safe for an arsenal. They are too far gone into decay and are not worth the expense. They are no longer fit for occupancy, and are positively dangerous in their condition. I obtained an estimate last year from a practical builder of the probable expenses for repairs and such alterations as are necessary to place them in a condition safe and fit for use. I copy from his estimate as follows:

The machine shop requires new roof, box cornice and window frames, sash and doors, and new floors for first and second stories, and ceilings. Estimated cost, one thousand one hundred and forty-six dollars (\$1,146).

The brick building will require new roof, gutters and cornice, and ceilings for first, second and third stories; girders strengthened and eased; side walls furred and plastered; all doors and windows to be repaired, and new elevator; new work painted. Estimated cost, four thousand six hundred and eighty dollars (\$4,680).

Stone building, part of which is in three stories and the balance in two, will require new joists and floors throughout, making three stories on the same level; new window-frames, sash and doors; new roof and cornice. Estimated cost, four thousand dollars (\$4,000).

The dwelling-house and offices will require new ceilings and side walls plastered, and new work painted throughout. Five hundred dollars (\$500).

The exterior walls repaired and pointed and coping reset, and new entrance gates. Estimated cost, three hundred and fifty dollars (\$350).

New stable, four hundred dollars (\$400).

Total estimated expenditure necessary for the purpose amounts to eleven thousand and seventy-six dollars (\$11,076).

I am convinced that it would be to the best interests of the State to build a new arsenal, upon plans adopted providing for the essential requirements, with convenient store houses as near fire proof as possible, with machine shop, laboratory for putting up cartridges, and a magazine upon a different location, with more ground; the buildings sufficiently remote from each other that in case of explosion to prevent fire from communicating with the whole. The present grounds are too small, and the buildings are necessarily in close proximity. A fire or explosion in one would involve all in conflagration. The State has a lot in the Borough of Chambersburg, on the opposite side of the canal from the present arsenal; and, although it does not possess the natural advantages that could be found elsewhere, yet it has the advantage of being located on the railroad and canal. This is a triangular lot containing about ten (10) acres, on the east side of the railroad and canal, with a frontage of nine hundred and fifty-seven (957) feet, and on the south a frontage on Cass street of four hundred and twelve (412) feet, and intersected by Jenny street with a frontage of one hundred and ninety-two (192) feet, cutting off a corner of about half an acre. Its location affords unusual facilities for transportation by the construction of a spur from the main track of the railroad into the arsenal grounds, from and to which a large amount of heavy stores could be moved with less expense than by wagon transportation. Its exterior boundary is two thousand five hundred and sixty-eight (2,568) feet. It presents advantages, if a wall is properly constructed, for easy defence, which should be considered in the location of an arsenal, against attacks from whatever cause. The uneven surface of the ground is no more than is necessary for furnishing material in grading to bring it to a proper grade with the adjacent streets for good drainage.

ACTING PAYMASTER GENERAL'S ACCOUNT.

The state of this fund is the same as at the date of my last report, namely, a balance of one hundred and fourteen dollars (\$114). Eighteen men remain unpaid, the amount due them being one hundred and eighty-nine dollars (\$189).
