

HEREAS by a late Publication, inserted in the New-Jersey Gazette, called Hints humbly offered to the Consideration of the Legislature of New-Jersey in the future Choice of a Governor, figned Cincinnatus, being apparently defigned to have an undue Influence in the ensuing Election of a Governor of this State, and though in an ironical Way, fully and clearly implies not only a Slur upon the Seminary of Learning in this State, and the President and Tutors thereof, but also a tacit Charge against the Legislature of this State, as being greatly descious in Prince of Learning and Ludenove in the Chair of Control of the Chair of as being greatly deficient in Point of Integrity or Ability and Judgment in the Choice of a Gos

vernor, and an express Declamation against our excellent Constitution; and also an unjust, salse and cruel Defamation and Aspersion of His Excellency the Governor; all which evidently tends to disturb the Peace of the Inhabitants and promote Discord and Consussion in the State, and to encourage those who are districted to the present Government.—And not-withstanding the Freedom of the Press ought to be tolerated as far as is consistent with the Good of the People and the Security of the Government established under their Authority; yet good Policy as well as Justice requires, that those who write as well as those who speak any Thing that directly tends to encourage the Enemy and disaffected, and to discourage and disquiet the Minds of the good People of this State, ought to be detected and brought to such Punishment as may be agreeable to Law and Justice; therefore,

OUR Committee appointed to join a Committee of the Assembly, in a free Conference on the Subject-Matter of a Resolution of Congress of the 1779; and of the Memorial of William Pennington, an Officer in Colonel Lamb's Regi-

ment of Artillery, beg Leave to report-

1st, That it is the Opinion of the Conferrees, that it is improper for the Legislature of this State, in its separate or State Capacity, to undertake a Compliance with the Resolution of Congress of the 17th of August, 1779, for making further Provision for the Officers and Soldiers enlisted for the War in this State, who shall continue in the Service till the Establithment of Peace.

2d, That whatever Provision may be necessary and proper ought to be made by Congress, and that they be requested to devise some general Mode for making Compensation to the Officers and Soldiers of the Army for the Damages they have fustained by the Depreciation of the Continental Currency, and thereby to fulfil their original Contract with them.

3d, That the Legislature of this State will cheerfully carry into Execution any Provision which Congress may make for the Widows of such Officers and Soldiers as have lost or may lose their Lives in the Service, when the Amount of fuch Provision is ascertained,

and a Fund provided by Congress for the Payment thereof.

4th, That the Difficulties attending the divided Mode of supplying the Army lately recommended by Congress, which are strikingly exemplified in the Memorial of William Pennington, an Officer in Colonel Lamb's Regiment of Artillery, be urged to Congress as Reasons strongly operating against a Perseverance in that unequal and very exceptionable Mode of Provision.

5th, That a Representation be transmitted to Congress on those Subjects, and which may also, in the most pointed and explicit Manner, express the Disapprobation of the Legislature of this State to the Establishment of Half-pay for the Officers during Life, or to any military Establishment whatsoever in Time of Peace.

of the LEGISLATURE REPRESENTATION The of the State of NEW-JERSEY,

SHEWETH, THAT the Legislature of this State are sincerely disposed to adopt and carry into Exccution all fuch Requisitions of Congress as appear to them likely to prove beneficial to the Union, and not injurious to the State; but that they confider the separate and State Mode of making further Provision for the Officers and Soldiers enlitted for the War, recommended in your Resolution of the 17th of August last, in many Respects improper and disproportionate, as a Measure that, if carried into Execution, would not only be productive

of great and unnecessary Expence, but dangerous to the Peace and Well-being of the Union, and are therefore under the disagreeable Necessity of declining a Compliance therewith.

With Respect to the Impropriety of the Measure, we beg Leave to observe, That we conceive it hath a natural Tendency to produce Murmurs and Discontent in the Army, Con-

fequences that should ever be studiously avoided and carefully guarded against.
While the Legislature of each State separately pursues Measures for making such Provision for their own Troops as may be conceived adequate and proportioned to the Ability of the State, and in such Manner as appears most suitable for the Troops themselves, and most expedient and least detrimental to the State, both the Amount and Mode of the Provision so made will be different in different States; and those Proops for whom least is done, having a just Claim to equal Merit and of Consequence entitled to equal Rewards, on comparing their Situation with that of their fellow Soldiers with whem they have ferved in the same Camp, endured the same Fatigues, and been exposed to equal Dangers, will feel themselves aggrieved, will murmur and complain: Besides, a very superficial Acquaintance with human Nature, will serve to shew that Men are not always actuated in the Purfuit of an Object merely by its real and intrinsic Value, but that Prejudice or Caprice too frequently influence the Choice-For this Reason the different Modes adopted by the different States, which, on Account of their different Situation, Circumstances or Government, are unavoidable, supposing the Amount of the real Value of these various Provisions equal, may still furnish Pretext for Complaint.

And we beg Leave further to observe, that the Mode of Provision recommended, will be highly unequal and disproportionate in the different States, both as to the Terms and the Means of Supply-That the Terms will be unequal must, we conceive, evidently appear, if we confider that the States which furnish an over Proportion of Troops, compared with what the other States furnish, will be faddled with the Expence of an over Proportion of Supplies, when the States that fall short in the first Instance, will in Proportion be relieved in the latter, than which Nothing can be more unjust, or more likely to produce Discontent among the different States, to say Nothing of the Tendency it must naturally have to prevent their completing their respective Quotas: Besides, as an over Proportion of Officers have been raifed from this State, especially if we take into the Account the detached Corps not included in the Establishment, the separate Provision will for that Reason

be doubly hard upon this State.

That the Means of Supply will be disproportionate in the different States may be readily conceived, if we advert to the Situation of each State as being more or less the Seat of the War, and subject to the Incursions and Depredations of the Enemy-The Losses and Expences thence accruing to some of the States in the Union has been enormous, and their Abilities to furnish Supplies doubtless diminished in Proportion. Nor should we on this Occasion forget the extreme Fatigues and Hardships the Militia of those States have endured; the Time they have necessarily spent in the Defence of the common Cause to the Neglect of their domestic Employments, whereby their providing even for themselves and Families hath been rendered extremely hard and difficult; nor indeed can we suppose they are much less entitled to the Approbation and Gratitude of their Country than our Continental Troops themselves, though we most freely acknowledge our Gratitude to the latter, and have the highest Opinion of their Merits. But when we consider the Disadvantages some of the States lie under with Regard to Trade and Commerce, being obliged to purchase most of the imported Articles they use or furnish to their Troops from some of their Sister States, the Inequality appears still more obvious and striking, that the divided Mode of Supply under Consideration will be productive of great and unnecessary Expence; we imagine, after what hath been already remarked, needs little or no Illustration. We would however obferve, that the States bidding against each other, as in all Probability they will do in order to retain their Officers and Soldiers in the Service, will have a still further Tendency to enhance the Expence of the War.

The Truth of some of the Observations we have made, hath already been experienced by the Legislature of this State, when endeavouring to comply with and carry into Execution the former Requilitions of Congress, relative to clothing their Troops, and furnishing them with certain Articles for their better Subsistence. That we conceive a like Reasoning will hold good with Respect to the Provision recommended by Congress to be made for the Widows of fuel Officers and Soldiers as have lost or shall lose their Lives in the Service of the States. With Regard to those unfortunate Women we have to declare, that we fincerely sympathize with them in their Sufferings, and that we are not only willing and

defirous

defirous to contribute our full Proportion to their Relief, but will most readily carry into Execution any Provision that Congress shall make for that Purpose, on a Plan that will be

general and uniform throughout the States.

Gratefully fensible of the Merits of their Troops, and viewing with Concern their Sufferings in the Cause of Liberty and of their Country, the Legislature of this State are earnestly defirous that Provision may be made for affording them ample Compensation for the Damages they have fultained by the Depreciation of their Pay, and for fulfilling the original. Contract with them: This they prefume would be fatisfactory to the Troops themselves, and strictly conformable to Justice: More they can have no Right to ask, and less we would not wish them to receive.

But though not deficient in Gratitude or Justice to our Troops, nor unwilling even to be generous in a due Degree, we beg Leave to express, in the most explicit Terms, our utter Disapprobation of a Half-pay Establishment for Life, or of any other military Establishment whatsoever in Time of Peace. We consider it as contrary to the very Spirit of a Republican Government, as introductive of the Practice of Penfioning, which has always been held in the utmost Detestation by a free People, as creating a Distinction in the Community, invidious in its Nature, dangerous in its Tendency, and productive of Inconvenience and Injury to the Officers themselves, as well as to the Community at large: It is so much the more dangerous in that, if it once takes Place, it will ever after be claimed by the military as Matter of Right, and gradually improved upon until confidered as Part of our Systems of Government, and rendered equally permanent with our Constitutions themselves.

In a Word, we consider it as one Step towards Tyranny and absolute Government, and evidently tending to produce Discord and Dissention among the States themselves; the Officers, mixing in the Councils of the States, will be under a constant Temptation to cherish Measures leading to military Operations, thereby to open the Way to their former Stand-

ings, and a Living more agreeable to their Wishes.

For these Reasons, among many others, we hold ourselves bound by every Tie of political Obligation openly to declare to Congress, that it is impossible for us to think of adopting a Meafure pregnant with fo many Evils, and that in this Declaration we speak not only our own Sentiments, but those of our Constituents.






