## Drumthwacket to Glow Red for 14th Annual National Wear Red Day

I encourage everyone to wear red this Friday and become part of the *Go Red* movement."

Through the efforts of *Go Red for Women*, more than 670,000 women have survived heart disease and stroke since 2004. In addition, awareness that heart disease is the number one cause of death in women has increased from 34 percent in 2004 to nearly 60 percent today.

## Key Facts in the Fight Against Heart Disease in Women

An estimated 44 million women in the U.S. are affected by cardiovascular diseases.

90 percent of women have one or more risk factors for heart disease or stroke.

Women have a higher lifetime risk of stroke than men.

80 percent of heart disease and stroke events may be prevented by lifestyle changes and education.

Fewer women than men survive their first heart attack.

The symptoms of heart attack can be different in women vs. men, and are often misunderstood.

In February 2016, more than 1,300 New Jersey businesses, schools, towns, organizations, clubs and other locations "went red" for National Wear Red Day. Approximately 90 Garden State landmarks, buildings and properties illuminated
