Nonagricultural wage and salary employment increased on a seasonally adjusted basis by 37,200 to a record level of 3,179,300 during January, continuing the expansion which began earlier last year.

January's gain brought the cumulative recovery of nonfarm jobs since April 1983 to 101,200, surpassing New Jersey's September 1981 prerecession peak by 65,800. Department analysts attributed most of the substantial over-the-month increase to mild weather during the survey week, consumer confidence, and lack of post-holiday layoffs. Analysts also cautioned that the January data are based on a somewhat lighter sample response rate than usual from employers and are subject to revision next month based on more complete reporting.

Nonmanufacturing employment climbed by 30,000 since December to a record high seasonally adjusted level of 2,456,100 in January, on the strength of over-the-month increases in construction, trade, and transportation/public utilities.

Construction employment increased by 11,800 in January to 123,300, the highest level since June 1974 as a result of better-than-expected activity in residential building, heavy construction, and special building trades.

Employment in wholesale and retail trade increased by 16,400 over the month in response to continued high levels of consumer spending. The trucking industry contributed to an increase of 3,100 in transportation/public utilities, indicating an increased demand for transportation and warehouse services as the economy expands.

Factory jobholdings increased by 7,200 from December to a seasonally adjusted level of 723,200 in January, due to sizable increases in the apparel, food/kindred products, and miscellaneous manufacturing industries. The women's/juniors'/children's outerwear and undergarments segments contributed to the upturn of 2500 in apparel.

The increase of 1700 in miscellaneous manufacturing was due to strength in the toys, sporting, and athletic goods segment of the industry. Employment in food/kindred products increased by 1000 as better-than-expected levels of activity were recorded in most of the industry's components.

The manufacturing workweek contracted by 48 minutes, but this was normal for this time of the year. After seasonal adjustment, the average factory workweek of manufacturing production workers remained unchanged from December at 40.9 hours in January.

The Department of Labor survey also revealed that the average production worker in New Jersey's manufacturing industries earned \$386.78 during January, \$5.51 less than December because of the reduced workweek, but \$22.97, or approximately six percent, more than a year ago.

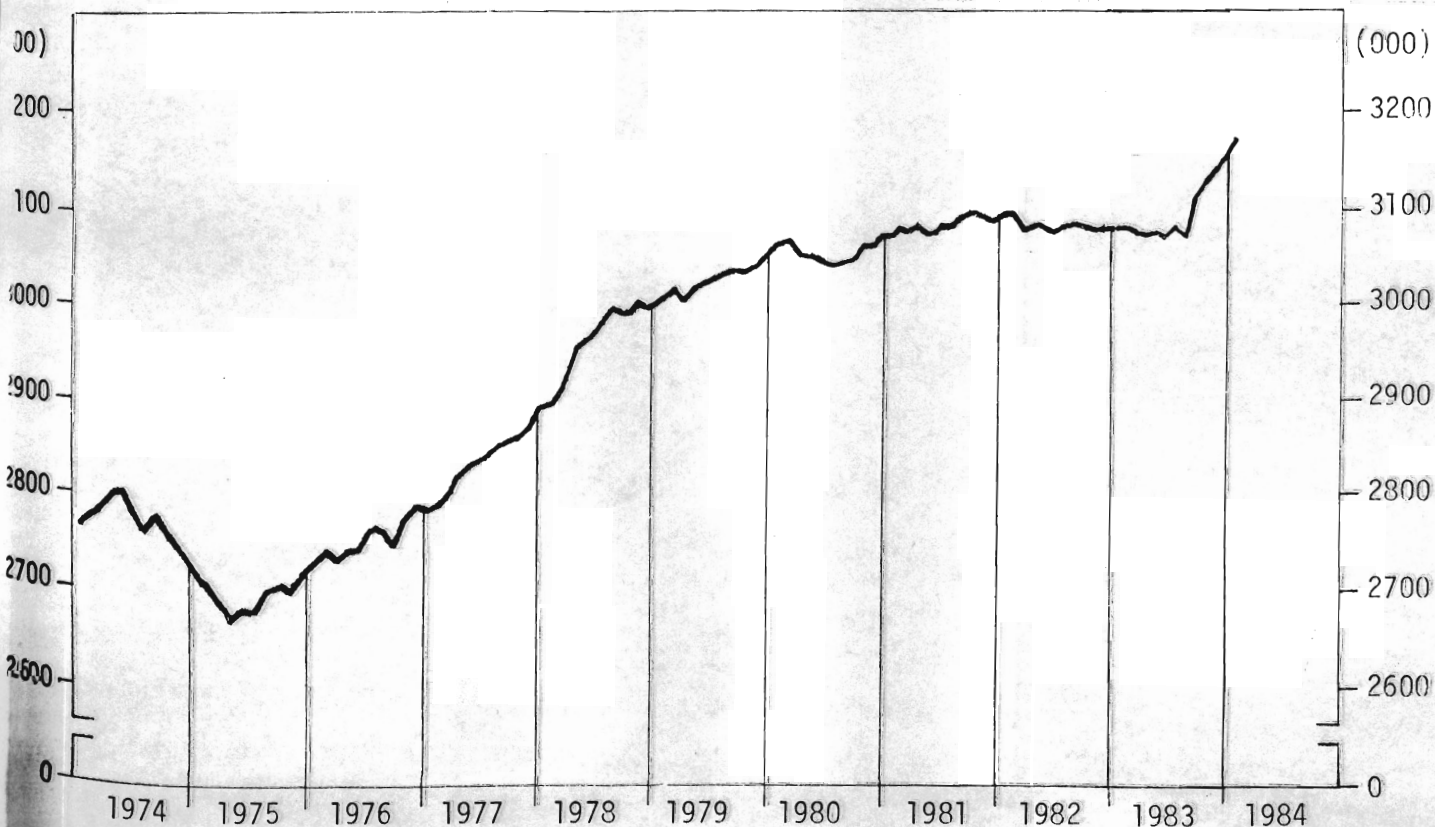
LABOR AREA COMMENTS (Not seasonally adjusted)

Total nonagricultural wage and salary employment decreased less than expected in all ten of New Jersey's major labor market areas. The largest over-the-month decrease occurred in the Newark Labor Market Area, down by 12,200, due primarily to decreases in the nonmanufacturing sector. The Atlantic City and Vineland-Millville-Bridgeton Labor Areas recorded the smallest decline, both registering a loss of 600, with decreases in non-manufacturing responsible for most of the decline in each area.

Note: Preliminary review of employment reports submitted by employers in connection with their quarterly unemployment insurance tax payments suggest that the monthly sample survey may have missed some hiring during the early stages of the recovery, especially during the second quarter.

If this turns out to be the case, it will be reflected in upward revisions to the nonfarm employment statistics when the next annual benchmark adjustments are completed in March.

TECHNICAL NOTES

Nonfarm Wage and Salary Employment

Employment data refer to persons on establishment payrolls who received pay for any part of the pay period which includes the 12th of the month. The data exclude proprietors, the self-employed, unpaid family workers, farm workers, and domestic workers in households. Salaried officers of corporations are included. Government employment covers only civilian employees; federal military personnel are excluded.

Persons on an establishment payroll who are on paid sick leave (when pay is received directly from the firm), on paid holiday or paid vacation, or who work during any part of the pay period but are unemployed or on strike during the rest of the period, are counted as employed. Not counted as employed are persons who, during the pay period which includes the 12th, are laid off, on leave without pay or on strike for the entire period, or who are hired but do not work during the period.

Average Hours and Earnings

Hours and earnings data are derived from reports of payroll and man-hours for production and related workers in manufacturing. When the reported pay period exceeds one week, the payroll and man-hour figures are reduced to a weekly basis.

Average hourly earnings for manufacturing are on a "gross" basis, reflecting not only changes in basic hourly rates, but also such variable factors as premium pay for overtime and shift work, and changes in output of workers paid on an incentive plan. Excluded from average earnings are irregular bonuses, retroactive items, payments of various welfare benefits, and payroll taxes paid by employers.
