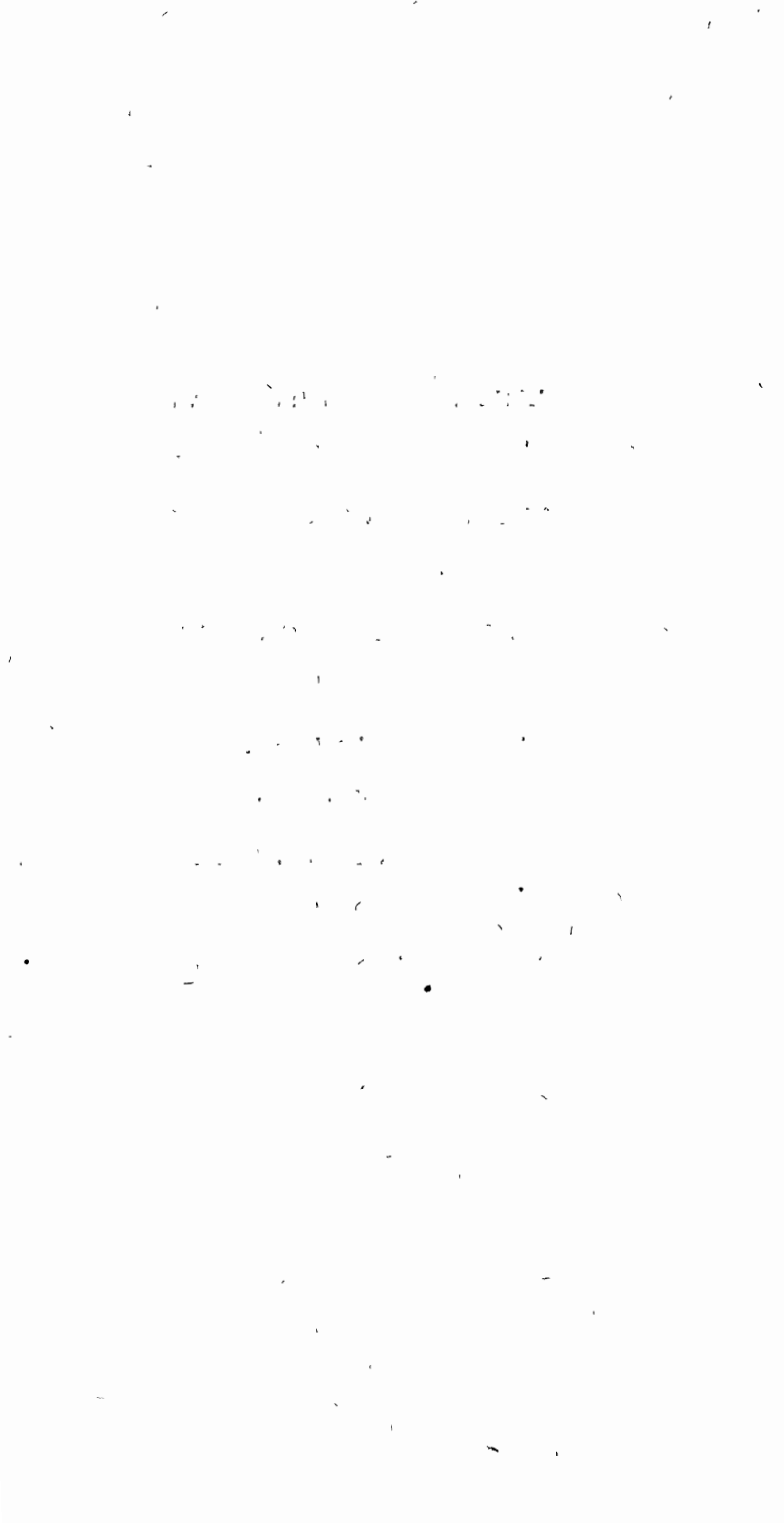

MINUTES OF THE HOUSE.

TRENTON, TUESDAY, January 8, 1867.

This being the time designated by the Constitution for the assembling of the Legislature, the House of Assembly met this afternoon at three o'clock, at the State House.

Mr. George B. Cooper, Clerk of the last House of Assembly, called the members to order.

Mr. Custis having received a majority of the votes, was declared elected Speaker of the House of Assembly.

The Clerk appointed Messrs. White and Nixon to conduct the Speaker elect to the chair.

The Speaker then addressed the House, as follows :

Yellow Members of the House of Assembly

It is fitting that I give expression to my appreciation of the honor conferred in your selection of me to preside as Speaker of this House, and to my heartfelt thankfulness therefor. But permit me to say that, whilst I appreciate the honor, I also appreciate the responsibility, and bear in mind that the honor will become shame if I discharge not faithfully and unselfishly the obligations imposed thereby, and accepted in my assumption of the office, for it is not a matter of personal interest simply, but to some extent the honor of the state is involved, and the interest of every citizen. There is in this that which excites anxiety as I enter upon the discharge of these duties, but there is in it also that which gives me confidence, for as you all are jealous of the honor of the state and deeply interested in whatever concerns the welfare of the people, I may with assurance look to you for that forbearance, advice and assistance, without which, every desire and every effort of mine must fail, and especially do I ask such forbearance whilst the duties and requirements of the position are unfamiliar to me.

And now at the very threshold of our work, it is meet that we consider calmly the responsibility which attaches to each of us as members of the Legislative body of the state. The people have confided to our hands, for the time being, their material, and to no little extent their educational and moral interest. With us they have lodged the power of protecting and developing them, or of retarding and destroying them. By wise legislation we can give impetus, strength and development to these interests, by unwise legislation we may render them insecure, may break down existing institutions which are necessary for their promotion, and may prevent the development of new ones.

The power of the Legislature can have no better illustration than in the considerations of our complete control over the railroads, canals and highways of the state. These are the channels through which trade and commerce flow. Without them these touch not our borders, but pass by on the great highways of the river or ocean, or through channels which others have provided outside of us. They are necessary for the passage of the raw material to our manufactories, and the conveyance of their product to the markets of the

world; without them manufactories can be sustained to a very limited extent only, and that only upon our immediate borders. They are necessary to convey the products of the farm to the great centres of population; without them agriculture is a profitless labor, and the land remains untilled.

Besides these highways have proved to be the forerunners of the highest civilization. Intellectual activity and moral elevation are prompted in proportion to the facility with which each mind and heart is brought in contact with the minds and hearts of the great mass of the world. Cut off from the centres of intellectual and moral culture, man becomes narrow-minded, contracted in all his conceptions, and dead to all the influences that purify and exalt human nature.

A glance at the map of our state, with a limited knowledge of its history and statistics, will verify all this. The early settlements of this as of all other states, were confined to close proximity to navigable waters. They extended towards the interior but a little way and that slowly, and only as some special inducement in soil, mines, water-powers, &c., was presented, and highways were opened for the easy passage of horses and other beasts of burden. But early in the history of railroads, and of canals in this country, the foresight and public spirit of some of our citizens devised, and wise legislation opened the way and encouraged them to prosecute the building of the Delaware and Raritan Canal, the Camden and Amboy Railroad and branches, and New Jersey Railroad; and to-day we find, scattered all along these highways, villages, towns and cities, of from five to one hundred thousand inhabitants, which are the centres of vast commercial and manufacturing interests, bringing wealth, prosperity and power to the State, whilst at the same time they are the great centres of churches, colleges and schools, with their mighty power for the elevation and enlightenment of the people. But until within a few years, other interior sections of the State possessed not the advantages of such avenues of transit, and consequently remained almost an unbroken wilderness, until the Camden and Atlantic, the West Jersey, and the Raritan and Delaware Bay Railways partially opened up the southern and eastern, and the Morris and Essex Canal, Morris and Essex, New Jersey Central and New York and Erie Railroads the northern and western sections of the State. Now these sections are being rapidly peopled; villages are rising at every few miles, mines are being opened the land is

being subdued, and churches and schools are rising everywhere, within easy access to these avenues.

These things are a direct and sure result of these improvements, whilst a desolate territory is as surely the result of a lack of them. And yet in our hands is placed the exclusive power, for the time being, of fostering those we have and opening the way for others as the way for these was opened, or of crippling the power of those that exist for prompt, safe and cheap service to the people, and of interdicting others that may be sought, and which, if secured, result in a history such as that which has been developed in other cases.

And thus it is with our educational and charitable institutions. 'Tis ours to foster the universities, colleges and scientific institutions of the State, and to protect, aid and direct to the highest results the education of the masses through our common schools, or by unwise legislation to cripple or destroy them. Again, to us is confided in no small degree the security of life and property through our control over the laws that provide for the administration of justice, the punishment and reformation of criminals, the security of titles; &c.

When we thus consider the character and magnitude of the interests committed to our keeping by the people, and bear in mind not only our responsibility to them but to God also; who is working out His high and holy purpose through state and national legislation, as well as through less pretentious means, and to be the servants of whom in His work is our highest duty and greatest glory—when we consider these things, surely we should enter upon our work with subdued spirits and an earnest desire for the highest wisdom we are capable of receiving.

Especially should we desire to be saved from levity, from passion, from every impure motive, and every corrupting influence.

In this connection it may not be improper for me to advert to the circumstances in connection with the legislation of last year, that are fresh in the minds of all, and in which so many of us are personally interested. We bear in mind the indiscriminate charges of bribery and corruption made by the press with few exceptions; the searching investigation by the grand jury of this county, into the truth of these charges; and the whispered finding of many bills which were reconsidered, and the trial of two of the members of this House upon

bills that were sustained, and the conviction of one and sentence to severe punishment.

In view of the character of the legislation of last year no just mind can approve of the indiscriminate charges of the Press. The book of laws bears evidence of some wisdom, and much regard for the honor and obligations of the state, and for the interests, material, intellectual and moral of the people, and also much of patriotism. But few wise or beneficial measures failed of being perfected, and few that were of questionable character found advocates enough to give them the sanction of law. There is something worthy of approval, however much there may have been worthy only of the severest condemnation, and a true appreciation of the relation of the Press to the people, and the moral responsibility imposed by that relation, would suggest and demand a more enlightened and more equitable criticism. Nor can we approve of the lack of discrimination in the presentment of the Grand Jury, it gave the color of truth to the charges that included all in one common condemnation, and which whilst manifesting zeal for the honor of the state and for purity in legislation, lacked the element of justice to individuals. Nor can less be said of the conviction of one among the indicted, and his sentence to severe and degrading punishment than that the sense of justice of the people, if not shocked by the conviction as a crime scarcely complete upon evidence meagre and indecisive to the last degree, surely cannot be satisfied. But all this makes plain to us the jealousy of the people in reference to the character of their Legislators and the security of the interests committed to them, and should impress us with the high requirements of the position we occupy, and lead us to seek that spirit which is in harmony with the purest morality and most exalted patriotism and which in its outworking is above suspicion as well as beyond reproach.

Indulge me in one more reflection. I have considered our position with reference to the state in itself considered but while we cherish with jealous pride our state organization and seek especially the prosperity, happiness and security of our people, we remember that we are a constituent part of that one great whole, the United States of America; and whilst in that fact we find our highest glory, and chief security for the maintenance of all that is dear to us in our state organization, we should also realize a higher obligation and a more solemn responsibility. As a people we are working out

the mighty problem of human government. Under the guidance of the King of kings, to whom be praise for all that to which he called us, it was given to our fathers to apprehend the true relation of man to God and to one another, and the true function of government. The protection of man in that relation, and to assert them in those immortal words: "All men are created equal, and are endowed by *their Creator* with certain inalienable rights, that to secure these rights, governments are instituted among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed." In these few sentences more than the wisdom of the ages is condensed. 'Tis the wisdom of the infinite mind, being the essence of revelation on these points.

To defend and illustrate these truths, our nation has passed through years of bloody conflict and suffering untold. And though through the fire of battle they have been blazoned as it were upon the heavens, so that all men have been led to contemplate them; and though through bitterness of spirit and scalding tears they have been graven on the hearts of the people as truths pertaining to each and demanding acknowledgement by all, we yet are called to bear something of conflict, though it may be no longer of arms, something of care, anxiety, privation and loss, ere they be accepted by all and we reap their legitimate fruit, "peace on earth and good will toward men." Through the enlightened and faithful discharge of our duties as legislators for our own state, we may strengthen the people to bear what yet may remain of conflict or loss, and may hasten the day of rest through all the land, and the enjoyment of the fruit of the triumph of truth by all the people.

We live in a day and occupy a position of great responsibility: let us realize it and bear it as true men. I now invite you to proceed with the business of this session.

The Committee on Rules through their chairman Mr. Moore, offered the following:

Committee on Rules ask leave to report the following rules for the government of this House.

R U L E S .

Of the Meeting of the House.

1. Any member or members less than a quorum may meet and adjourn the House, from day to day, when necessary.

2. Every member shall attend in his place precisely at the hour to which the House was last adjourned; and in case of

neglect he shall be subject to a reprimand from the Chair, unless excused by the House; nor shall any member absent himself from the House for more than a space of a quarter of an hour, without leave previously obtained.

3. In case a less number of members than a quorum shall be present after the arrival of the hour to which the House stood adjourned, they are hereby authorized to send their Sergeant-at-Arms, or any other person or persons by them authorized, with a warrent duly executed, for any or all absent members, as the majority of such as are present may agree, and at the expense of such absent members, respectively, unless such excuse for non-attendance shall be rendered as the House, when a quorum is convened, shall judge sufficient. Immediately after the appointment of the Standing Committees, the members shall arrange among themselves their several seats appropriated to their counties; and in case of disagreement the same shall be decided by lot.

Of the Duties of the Speaker.

4. He shall take the Chair at the hour to which the House shall have adjourned, and immediately call the members to order; and on the appearance of a quorum shall cause the journal of the preceding day to be read, which may then be corrected by the House.

5. He shall preserve order and decorum, and in debate shall prevent personal reflections, and confine members to the question under discussion; but he shall not engage in any debate, nor propose his opinion upon any question, without first calling on some member to occupy the Chair. When two or more members rise at the same time he shall name the one entitled to the floor.

6. He shall decide questions of order, subject to an appeal to the House, when demanded by any four members; on which appeal no member shall speak more than once, unless by leave of the House.

7. All questions before the House shall be stated by the Speaker, and distinctly put in the following form, to wit: "As many as are in favor (the question) will say Aye;" and after the affirmative is expressed, "those of the contrary opinion, No." If the Speaker doubts, or a division be called for, the House shall divide; those in the affirmative of the question shall first rise from their seats, and afterwards those in

the negative; and in case of an equal division the Speaker shall decide.

8. All committees shall be appointed by the Speaker, unless otherwise specially directed by the House.

9. All acts, addresses and joint resolutions shall be signed by the Speaker; and all writs, warrants and subpoenas issued by order of the House, shall be under his hand and seal, and attested by the Clerk. If the Speaker be absent, a less number of members than a quorum may appoint a Speaker pro tempore, who may sign any warrants or perform any act requisite to bring in absent members.

10. He shall have a general direction of the Hall, and he may name a member to perform the duties of the Chair; but such substitution shall not extend beyond a second adjournment.

Of the Order of Business.

11. After the reading of the journal, the business of the first meeting of each day shall be conducted in the following manner, to wit:

I. Letters, petitions, memorials, remonstrances and accompanying documents, may be presented and disposed of.

II. Reports of Committees may be read.

III. Original resolutions may be offered and considered; items of unfinished business referred; motions to reconsider and to appoint additional members of committees made; and leave of absence, leave to withdraw documents, and leave to introduce bills asked.

Leave for Bills and to introduce Bills.

IV. Bills and joint resolutions, on a third reading, may be taken up.

V. The House shall then proceed in the order of the day, preference being always given to the unfinished business of the preceding sitting; after which bills and joint resolutions, on a second reading, shall be taken in their order; and the House, in its afternoon session, will proceed to business as though there had been no adjournment of its morning session, excepting that original resolutions, and leave to introduce bills of committees, be the first business of the afternoon sitting; and shall, on demand of the majority, proceed with the order of the day.

12. The Clerk shall make a list of all public bills and joint resolutions. He shall keep a separate calender of private bills. No bills for granting, continuing, altering, amending, or renewing a charter for any corporation, other than a municipal corporation, shall be placed on the calendar of public bills. All bills, public and private, shall be numbered according to the time of their introduction into the House. They shall be taken up and considered in the order of time in which they were reported; or ordered to a third reading as appears by the calendar; and the calendar shall be proceeded in until all the bills thereon are called up, before the commencement of the calendar anew.

13. All messages shall be sent from this House to the Senate by the clerk or Assistant Clerk.

Of Decorum and Debate.

14. When a member is about to speak in debate, or communicate any matter to the House, he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to the Speaker, confining himself to the question under debate, and avoiding personality.

15. If any member in debate transgress the rules of the House, the Speaker shall, or any member, may call him to order; in which case the member so called to order shall immediately sit down, unless permitted to explain. The House shall, if appealed to, decide on the case, but without debate; if there be no appeal the decision of the Chair shall be submitted to. If the decision be in favor of the member called to order, he shall be at liberty to proceed; if otherwise, he shall not be permitted to proceed without leave of the House; and if the case require it, he shall be liable to the censure of the House.

16. If a member be called to order for words spoken in debate, the person calling him to order shall repeat the words excepted to, and they shall be taken down in writing at the Clerk's table; and no member shall be held to answer, or be subject to the censure of the House for words spoken in debate, if any other member has spoken, or other business has intervened after the words spoken, and before exception to them shall have been taken.

17. No member shall speak more than twice on the same question, without leave of the House.

18. While the Speaker is putting any question, or addressing the House, none shall walk out of, or across the hall; nor in such case, or when a member is speaking, shall any one entertain private discourse; nor shall any one while a member is speaking, pass between him and the Chair.

19. No member shall vote on any question, in the event of which he is particularly interested; nor in any case where he was not within the bar of the House when the question was put.

20. Every member who shall be in the House when the question is put, shall give his vote, unless the House for special reasons shall excuse him. All motions to excuse a member from voting shall be made before the House divides, or before the call of the yeas and nays is commenced; and any member requesting to be excused from voting, may make a brief verbal statement of the reasons for making such request; and the question shall then be taken without further debate.

21. Petitions, memorials, and other papers addressed to the House, shall be presented by the Speaker, or by a member in his place; a brief statement of the contents thereof shall be made by the introducer, and if called upon he shall declare that it does not, in his opinion, contain any indecent or reproachful language, or any expressions of disrespect to the House, or any committee of the same.

On Motions.

22. Every motion shall be reduced to writing, if the Speaker or any member desire it.

23. When a motion is made and seconded, it shall be stated by the Speaker; or, being in writing, it shall be handed to the Chair and read aloud by the Clerk, when it shall be deemed to be in possession of the House and open to debate; but it may be withdrawn at any time before a decision or amendment.

24. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received but

1. To adjourn.
2. A call of the House.
3. To lay on the table.

4. For the previous question.
5. To postpone indefinitely.
6. To postpone to a day certain.
7. To go into a Committee of the Whole on the pending subject immediately.
8. To commit to a Committee of the Whole.
9. To commit to a Standing Committee.
10. To commit to a Select Committee.
11. To amend.

Which several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they are stated, and no motion to a day certain, to commit or postpone indefinitely, being decided, shall be again allowed on the same day, and at the same stage of the bill or proposition.

25. A motion to strike out the enacting clause of a bill or joint resolution shall have precedence of a motion to amend; and if carried, shall be considered equivalent to its rejection.

26. A motion to adjourn shall be always in order except when the House is voting, or while a member is addressing the House, or immediately after the question to adjourn has been negatived; that, and the motion to lay on the table shall be decided without debate.

27. Any member may call for the division of a question, which shall be divided if it comprehends questions so distinct that one being taken away the rest may stand entire for the decision of the House; a motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible; but a motion to strike out being lost, shall preclude neither amendment nor a motion to strike out and insert.

28. When any motion shall be made and seconded, the same shall, at the request of any two members, be entered on the journal of the House.

29. When a motion has been once made and carried in the affirmative or negative, it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing party, to move for the reconsideration thereof on the same day, or the next day of actual session of the House thereafter; all motions may be reconsidered by the same majority that carried them; but bills to

be reconsidered must have the same majority that would be necessary to pass them.

30. When a blank is to be filled, the question shall first be taken on the largest sum, greatest number and remotest day.

31. The yeas and nays shall be entered on the journal on every question taken in the House, when moved for and seconded by five members; and in taking the yeas and nays the names of the members, including the Speaker, shall be called alphabetically.

32. The previous question shall be in this form: "Shall the main question be now put?" It shall only be admitted when demanded by a majority of the members present; and its effect shall be, if decided affirmatively, to put an end to all debate and bring the House to a direct vote upon amendments reported by a committee, if any; then upon pending amendments, and then upon the main question; if decided in the negative to leave the main question and amendments, if any, under debate for the residue of the sitting, unless sooner disposed of by taking the question, or in some other manner. All incidental questions of order arising after a motion is made for the previous question, and pending such motion, shall be decided, whether on appeal or otherwise, without debate.

33. After the Clerk has commenced calling the yeas and nays on any question, no motion shall be received until a decision has been announced by the Chair.

34. The following Standing Committees shall be appointed at the commencement of the session, until otherwise ordered:

A Committee of Ways and Means.

A Committee on the Judiciary.

A Committee on Agriculture.

A Committee on Education.

A Committee on Elections.

A Committee on Engrossed Bills.

A Committee on Municipal Corporations.

A Committee on the Militia.

A Committee on Claims and Revolutionary Pensions.

A Committee on Corporations.

A Committee on Legalizing Bounties.

A Committee on Miscellaneous Subjects.

Which several Committees shall consist of five members each.

A Committee on Unfinished Business, to consist of three members.

A Committee on Incidental Expenses, to consist of three members.

Joint Committees.

The following Committees, of five members each, shall be also appointed to act conjointly with corresponding Committees to be appointed by the Senate :

A Committee on the Treasurer's Accounts.

A Committee on the State Prison.

A Committee on the Public Printing.

A Committee on the Library.

A Committee on the Lunatic Asylum.

A Committee on Public Grounds and Buildings.

A Committee on Commerce and Navigation.

A Committee on Federal Relations.

There shall also be appointed a Committee, of two members, to act conjointly with a corresponding Committee to be appointed by the Senate, to be called a Committee on Passed Bills.

35. The several Standing Committees of the House shall have leave to report by bill or otherwise.

36. No Committee shall sit during the sitting of the House without special leave.

37. All Committees appointed at the first sitting shall continue to act during every subsequent sitting of the same legislature, or until they have reported on the business committed to them, or have been discharged.

Of Committees of the Whole House.

38. In forming a Committee of the Whole House, the Speaker shall leave his Chair, and a Chairman to preside in Committee shall be appointed by the Speaker.

39. The rules of proceeding in the House shall be observed, as far as practicable, in Committee of the Whole, except that a member may speak oftener than twice on the same subject, but shall not speak a second time until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken; nor shall a motion for the previous question be made therein.

40. All amendments made in Committee of the Whole shall be noted by the Clerk, but need not be read by the Speaker, on his resuming the Chair, unless required by the House.

Of Bills and Joint Resolutions.

41. All bills and joint resolutions shall be introduced by motion for leave, or on the report of a Committee, and the member offering the same shall endorse his name on them, that the Committee may confer with him, should they so desire.

42. Every bill and joint resolution shall receive three separate readings in the House previous to its passage; but no bill or joint resolution shall be read twice on the same day, without special order of the House.

43. All bills and joint resolutions, after the first reading, shall be printed for the use of the members, unless otherwise ordered by the House.

44. All bills and joint resolutions may be made the order of a particular day, on which day they shall be taken up in preference to others on the calendar; and the calendar of private bills shall not be taken up until the calendar of public bills shall have been gone through with.

45. All bills and joint resolutions previous to their final passage by the House, all petitions, motions and reports, may be committed at the pleasure of the House.

46. All bills and joint resolutions ordered to be engrossed shall be executed in a fair round hand; and no amendment

by way of rider shall be received to any bill or joint resolution on its third reading.

47. On a motion to strike out any item in the incidental bill, the question to be submitted to the House shall be: "Shall the item be retained in the bill?" and a majority of all the members of the House shall be necessary to adopt the same.

48. After an order for the second reading of any bill on the private calendar, the applicants for said bill shall, at their own expense, furnish the usual number of copies for the use of the members, unless the printing thereof be dispensed with by a special order of the House.

49. On the question of the final passage of all bills and joint resolutions, the yeas and nays shall be entered on the journal of the House.

50. Whenever a bill or resolution that has passed the House shall be carried to the Senate, all papers and documents relating thereto, on the files of the House, shall be carried with such bill or resolution to the Senate.

Of Rules.

51. No standing rule or order of the House shall be rescinded or changed without one day's notice being given of the motion therefor; nor shall any rule be suspended except by a vote of a majority of the whole number of members of the House.

52. When an Assembly bill is returned amended by the Senate, the report thereof by the Secretary of the Senate shall be taken as the first reading, and the same be entitled to a second reading, without a motion for that purpose; after its second reading the question shall be: "Shall the Senate amendments to Assembly bill No. — have a third reading?" If ordered to a third reading the amendments shall be read, but these readings shall be on different days; the question shall then be, "Will the House of Assembly concur in the Senate amendments to Assembly bill No. —?" upon which question the vote shall be by ayes and nays; if concurred in by a majority of the whole House, the bill shall be re-engrossed, the amendments embodied therein, and the re-engrossed bill examined and reported upon by the Committee on Engrossed Bills, and read in open Assembly, to the end

that it may be known to be correctly engrossed, and then signed and certified as other bills.

53. Cushing's Manual shall in all cases, when not in conflict with the rules adopted by the House, be considered and held as standard authority.

JOINT RULES AND ORDERS

Of the Senate and House of Assembly, of the Session of 1867.

1. In every case of an amendment of a bill agreed to in one House, and dissented to in the other, if either House shall request a conference and appoint a committee for that purpose, and the other House shall also appoint a committee to confer, such committee shall, at a convenient hour, to be agreed on by their respective Chairmen, meet in conference, and state to each other verbally, or in writing, as either shall choose, the reasons of their respective Houses for and against the amendment, and confer freely thereon.

2. After each House shall have adhered to their disagreement, a bill or resolution is lost.

3. When a bill or resolution which shall have passed in one House is rejected in the other, notice thereof shall be sent to the House in which the same may have passed.

4. Each House in which any bill or resolution shall have passed, shall transmit therewith to the other House all papers and documents relating to the same.

5. When a message shall be sent from either House to the other, it shall be announced at the door of the House by the Doorkeeper, and shall be respectfully communicated to the Chair by the person by whom it is sent.

6. After a bill shall have passed both Houses, it shall be delivered by the Clerk of the Assembly, or the Secretary of the Senate, as the bill may have originated in the one House or in the other, to a Joint Committee on Passed Bills, of two from each House, appointed as a Standing Committee for that purpose, and shall be presented by the said Committee to the

Governor for his approbation, it being first endorsed on the back of the bill, certifying in which House the same originated, which endorsement shall be signed by the Secretary or Clerk, as the case may be, of the House in which the same did originate, and shall be entered on the journal of each House. The said committee shall report the day of presentation to the Governor, which time shall also be carefully entered on the journal of each House.

Mr. Falkenbury presented the following:

To the Honorable the Senate and General

Assembly of the State of New Jersey :

The Petition of THE MORRIS CANAL AND BANKING COMPANY respectfully sheweth :

That your petitioners ask that your Honorable Bodies will pass the Bill, before the Legislature, entitled, "A further supplement to the act, entitled 'An act to form an artificial navigation between the Passaic and Delaware Rivers,' passed December 31st, 1824."

That your petitioners, upon the passage of the Bill as presented, and when the same shall become a law, will accept the said supplement, and pay the sums therein provided for to the State of New Jersey.

That among the reasons for the passage of the said Bill, your petitioners would most respectfully urge the following :

THE MORRIS CANAL is 103 miles long, running through the central part of the State, and passing over a mountain more than *nine hundred feet high above the level of tide-water*,—about one half of its length is through the rich Iron Ore districts of New Jersey.

The “Morris Canal and Banking Company” was chartered in 1824. The Legislature that passed the charter considered it a work very difficult to construct, and if constructed, that it would be of *great* benefit to the people of the State, as may be seen by the following preamble to the charter :

“WHEREAS, The construction of a Canal, to unite the river Delaware, near Easton, with the tide-waters of the Passaic, will be of great public benefit and advantage to the people of New Jersey ; *Now, therefore*, in order to secure to the State the results of this public work, and also as an inducement to a company to engage in this important undertaking, and in consideration of the risk and expenditures which they may encounter in its execution and operations ; Therefore, *Be it enacted, &c.*”

The Company commenced the work soon after the charter was granted. They found it exceedingly difficult and expensive, much more so than the Legislature had anticipated—for the Legislature thought it would require the enormous sum (so considered at that time), of one million of dollars to make the Canal. The Company expended FOUR MILLIONS of dollars before they got the Canal fairly opened for business. They had to make an immense lake on top of the mountain to store up water to feed the Canal,—and they had to devise some other method besides locks to overcome the great elevation, to get over the mountain.

Since the first opening of the Canal \$2,300,000 more have been expended in enlarging and improving it, making a total expenditure of \$6,300,000 on the Canal and its appendages,

Of this amount \$3,000,000 have been *entirely sunk and lost to the Stockholders*, but at the same time the people of the State have the benefit of a Canal which cost \$6,300,000,—and on which was transported during the last season about 900,000 tons of freight,—of which 250,000 tons was Iron and

Zinc Ore from New Jersey mines. Were it not for the Morris Canal, these ores would be worth little more than the stones in the farmers' fences. Now millions of dollars are received every year for the ores sent to market on the Morris Canal.

The Canal was at first constructed on too small a scale and the business was not remunerative. The Company failed to pay the interest on its mortgage debt, it passed into hands of receivers and was sold out in 1844.

The new Company proposed to make it remunerative to the Stockholders by making it useful to the public. To do this they would need large depot grounds with still waters, at Jersey City, for handling, storage, and reshipments of articles transported on the Canal. The Jersey Associates claimed to be the owners under a legislative grant from the State, of the only grounds suitable for that purpose at Jersey City.

The Company bought those grounds of the Associates in 1845, before expending any considerable amount of money upon the Canal. After securing these grounds they asked and obtained of the Legislature permission to issue \$1,175,000 of Preferred Stock on which to raise the money required to give the Canal a large capacity. This Stock was all sold, realizing to the Company the full amount of the same. In addition to this the Company borrowed on its Bonds, \$1,000,000.

This money has been all expended in giving the Canal its present capacity, and none of these last expenditures would have been made if the Company had not supposed they had a perfect title to the lands they bought of the Associates of the Jersey Company. Of this money \$310,000 has been expended on piers, wharves and basins at Jersey City, and the old Company had expended \$150,000 at Jersey City for the same purposes, making in all \$460,000 expended for piers, wharves and basins at Jersey City. And \$290,000 of it has been expended on *these very grounds* which the "Wet Basin" bill, also now before the Legislature, proposes to take from the Morris Canal and Banking Company, and give to persons who have not the shadow of a right to any portion of those grounds.

They did at one time make claim to a riparian right to a small portion, but even that claim they did by an agreement

dated the 19th day of November, 1863, release to the Morris Canal and Banking Company.

In case the grounds embraced in the said "Wet Basin" bill should be taken from the Company, it will not only take away what has cost them \$290,000, but will also deprive them of all access to one side of other piers and wharves which have cost 180,000—thereby taking away one-half their value, and making in all at least \$38,000 of money expended in good faith in exact conformity with the provisions of their charter, and for the sole purpose of carrying into effect the objects which the Legislature had in view in granting their charter, which will be thereby taken from them.

But that is the least of the evils that will result either to the Stockholders, or the People of this State, by so unjust a procedure.

It is the use of these piers, wharves and basins that secures to the Canal a large part of its present trade, and upon which the future growth of that trade must depend. To deprive the Company of them, will deprive the Canal of so much trade as is now accommodated by their use, and of all possibility of the future growth of that trade.

The Canal has now a capacity to carry 1,000,000 of tons eastwardly, per season, and may be made capable of carrying 1,500,000: of the 900,000 tons transported on the Canal the last season, about 575,000 tons went eastwardly, of which 150,000 tons was accommodated by the use of these piers and wharves at Jersey City. This amount required the use of all the piers and wharves now constructed.

By the erection of sufficient piers, wharves and basins the trade may be increased 425,000 tons per annum, with the present capacity of the Canal, or 900,000 tons with the Canal properly improved.

To accommodate this amount of business will require six times as much room as the Company has at this present time, and that is more than can be erected on all the premises which the Company now claim to be the owners of at Jersey City.

It is therefore evident that to take away these premises will diminish the trade of the Canal to an extent that will render it unrenumerative, and the Canal will be allowed to run down, be out of repair and every way inefficient, and in

the end the stockholders will loose their money, and the people of New Jersey the use of the Canal.

The Morris Canal is a work of which the State ought to be proud, and to foster in every proper way. *There is no other at all like it in the world.* Instead of overcoming the elevation by locks, it is mostly done by *Inclined Planes*, by taking the boat out of the water and raising it a hundred feet high at a time, and this is done without detaining the boat at all. A mile of Canal including a plane is passed over by the boat in the same time that a mile of level canal is passed over, *thereby literally annihilating elevation so far as time is involved in overcoming it.*

The Morris Canal by its successful use of inclined planes, has given to New Jersey a world-wide fame. Many civil engineers from foreign countries on their arrival in America, inquire for *New Jersey* in order to see the Morris Canal.

The Emporer Napoleon has within a few years caused special inquiries to be made into the whole operation of these planes.

Ought the legislation of New Jersey to be favorable or unfavorable to such a work.

The people of the State of New Jersey have a residuary interest in this Canal. By the terms of the charter (Sec. 26,) the State can take the Canal at the end of 99 years, (or 57 years from now,) by paying a fair value for it.

And if the State does not take it, at that time, the charter is to continue 50 years longer, and then the Canal is to become the property of the State without pay.

The Committee on the Judiciary to whom was referred the petitions of Amos M. Atwell, Charles H. Scott and George E. Cutter, for the impeachment of Peter N. Horsley, a Justice of the Peace, in the county of Hudson, for misdemeanors in office.

Beg leave to report, that we have examined said petition, and the affidavits and proofs annexed to the same, and that we have also read the presentment of said Peter N. Horsley, by the Grand Inquest sitting in and for the body of the county of Hudson, made to the Court of Oyer and Terminer, of said county, on the twenty-fifth day of January, A. D. 1867, presenting said Horsley for disreputable practice as a Justice of the Peace, thereby bringing contempt upon the Judiciary of the State, &c.

And we do hereby report that it appears to us that said Peter N. Horsley was indicted, tried and convicted in the Hudson County Court of Oyer and Terminer, for a misdemeanor in office as a Justice of the Peace, and that he has been again presented by the Grand Jury of Hudson county for disreputable conduct as a Justice of the Peace of the said county of Hudson, and thereby bringing disgrace upon the Judiciary of the State.

And we do further report, that in the trial of the cause of James W. McKay, and Cornelius D. Wyncoop, against Amos Atwell, that said Justice acted in a shameful and disgraceful manner, taking the part of the agent of the plaintiffs and acting as Justice, also, that he refused to enter in his docket proper and necessary motions, thereby greatly oppressing the defendant, and that after the trial of the cause and before the appeal was sent up, the said Horsley did strike from the name of the defendant, the middle letter, in the state of demand so as to make it correspond with the summons, thereby committing a high misdemeanor in office.

And we would further report in the trial of Charles H. Scott, under the Landlord's and Tenant's act, that the said Horsley made the summons against Scott returnable at nine

o'clock in the forenoon, and on the day said summons was returnable, said Scott and his attorney appeared before said Justice to try said cause, at about five minutes before nine, and said Justice informed said Scott and his attorney, that the cause had been tried, and a judgment rendered against said Scott, and a dispossessory warrant issued to turn him out of possession, that said Scott and his attorney and some of the by-standers, took out their watches and some of them marked 9 o'clock, A. M. when the clock of said Horsley was about fifteen or twenty minutes to ten, that the attorney of said Scott demanded to see the papers in the cause which the Justice refused, and he did remonstrate with said Justice that his proceedings were void, and he requested him to open the same, which he refused to do, and said attorney insisting upon his rights to see his papers, and remained in said Justice's office for the trial of the cause, said Justice drew a commitment to commit said attorney for contempt of court, which a constable present refused to serve, when said Horsley made the attempt to appoint a citizen a special constable to convey said attorney to jail, which said citizen refused to do, whereby the said Peter N. Horsley committed a high misdemeanor in office as a Justice of the Peace.

And said committee further report, that said Peter N. Horsley married James Cutter, the son of George E. Cutter, then being under the age of twenty one years, and your committee believe that said Horsley knew said James to be under the age of twenty one years, and that said Horsley wilfully requested said James W. to state to him that his age was twenty-one years, in order that he might marry him, said marriage being without the consent of the parents or guardian. Whereby, the said Peter N. Horseley committed a high misdemeanor as a Justice of the Peace.

Your committee recommend that said Peter N. Horsley, be impeached for high misdemeanor in office as a Justice of the Peace and for acting in such a disgraceful and shameful manner, that he brings disgrace and reproach upon the office of Justice of the Peace, and we also recommend the passage of the following resolution :

Resolved, That Peter N. Horsley, a Justice of the Peace in and for the county of Hudson, in the State of New Jersey, be impeached for high misdemeanor in office, and for acting in his judicial capacity in such a manner as to bring disgrace and reproach upon the office of Justice of the Peace.

His Excellency Marcus L. Ward, Governor of the State of New Jersey.

DEAR SIR:—I desire to make a statement to you and the Court of Pardons in the case of Charles F. Ruh, now in the State Prison, having been convicted for indirectly attempting to bribe me to vote for the Newark Railroad. I have always been uncertain as to whether or not it was Mr. Ruh who spoke to me about this bill. Very many people conversed with me on this subject, and when I went before the Grand Jury, the question was suddenly asked me without my having time to reflect upon the matter, and as an immediate answer was required, I stated my impression was that Mr. Ruh talked to me about this bill. After I left the Grand Jury, I began to turn the matter over in my mind, and I felt that I could not be positive that Mr. Ruh was the man that made me the offer, so I stated under oath at the trial. I was surprised when the jury convicted him because I never meant to say at the trial that I could positively swear that Mr. Ruh ever made me any offer. The more I think of the case the more I am convinced that my impressions stated before the Grand Jury that Mr. Ruh was the man, was erroneous. I am not intimate with Mr. Ruh ; I never spoke to him three times in my life, and

I fear that injustice has unwittingly been done to him through my instrumentality.

I earnestly hope and pray that he will be pardoned at once.

GOVERNOR WARD’S VETO MESSAGE.

“A further supplement to the act for the punishment of crimes.”

STATE OF NEW JERSEY, }
EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT,
TRENTON, January 30, 1867. }

To the Honorable Senate of the State of New Jersey :

GENTLEMEN:—I herewith return with my objections, Senate Bill, No. 15, entitled “A further supplement to the act entitled ‘An act for the Punishment of Crimes.’”

This bill is intended to repeal and to be a substitute for the second and third sections of the act now in force on the same

subject, and entitled "A supplement to the act entitled 'An act for the Punishment of Crimes,'" approved April 3, 1855.

The second section, so repealed, prohibits as a crime the giving or offering of any bribe to any member of the Senate or General Assembly, to influence his opinion, behavior or vote. It also prohibits as a crime, the acceptance of such bribe. The provisions of this second section appear to be substantially re-enacted in the first, second and third sections of the bill now proposed as a substitute. These three sections, standing by themselves, I entirely approve. The fourth and fifth sections, however, appear to me of so objectionable a character, that I am constrained to withhold my assent.

First.—The third section of the act now in force is, by the proposed bill, repealed, and at the same time no substitute or similar provision is enacted. This third section is intended to prohibit an offence not apparently within the terms of any section of the law, viz: the offence of giving or withholding a vote upon one legislative proceeding or measure in consideration of a vote to be given or withheld upon another. This offence is made by the third section now proposed to be repealed a misdemeanor, punishable by imprisonment or fine. It is evidently a mode of bribery more insidious and dangerous than the direct offering and acceptance of a gift. It induces, in fact, corrupt action on two matters or proceedings, while a direct pecuniary bribe operates or may operate, but upon one. The section in question is intended to promote impartial action upon every legislative matter by itself, upon its merits, and unbiassed by agreements to vote for or against another, with which the matter to be acted on has no proper or legitimate connection. I can see no good reason why this third section should be repealed, and the corrupt practice it is designed to prohibit become exempted from express legal restraints.

Second.—The fourth section of the proposed bill provides that any person charged with either of the offences specified in the first or second sections thereof, may, if indicted and tried for such offence, be a witness on his own behalf on such trial. This is an innovation upon the established mode of procedure in criminal cases, which, if adopted at all, should be of general application. It may well be doubted, I think, if the prevention of crimes and the administration of justice would be aided, by allowing accused persons on their trial to testify for themselves. But, however this may be, I cannot

assent to a law which confers upon the persons named in this bill, and indictments for the crimes it is intended to punish, privileges or rights not conferred upon others.

It does not appear why a Governor or a member of the Senate or Assembly when indicted for bribery in his office should have, or should expect, privileges in his defence not granted to those charged with no public confidence or trust. A distinction would thus be made hitherto unknown in our legal tribunals, and at variance with the recognized principle that all men are to be held "equal before the law."

The corruption of legislation by bribery is most dangerous to our republican institutions, and I see no reason why those guilty of that crime should be favored above all other criminals. Few of those who would take a bribe in violation of their oath would hesitate to take the oath that would rid them of the punishment.

Third.—The fifth section of the proposed bill repeals the second and third sections of the act now in force, and thereby exempts from punishment those persons, if any there be, who may have become guilty of the crimes which these sections prohibit. No reason appears why any person now liable to be punished for bribery under either of these sections should be exempted by the Legislature from the penalty of this crime. That this exemption is but incidental to and not the primary object of such repeal is a reason, I think, why the repeal, if made for the purpose of substituting other and similar provisions, should be more guarded in its terms and effect.

Fourth.—The fifth section of the proposed bill further enacts "that all and every provision of the statute or common law within the purview of said second or third sections of this act be and the same are hereby repealed."

A repeal so general and broad in its terms may include in its operations results and inconveniences not intended and not apparent from the bill. An indiscriminate abrogation of all adjudications heretofore made by our courts and included in the terms "common law," by which bribery as a crime has been expounded or defined, seems not to be required to correct any existing error or to supply any existing defect in the law as it stands. If any specific correction is to be made or any defect to be supplied, legislative provision to that end

may be readily made in such form that its precise scope and effect can be better seen and considered.

For reasons above stated I have been constrained to withhold my assent from the bill, and do accordingly return it herewith.

Mr. Perrine presented a minority report of the Committee on Judiciary as follows :

REPORT.

The undersigned, a minority of the Committee to whom was referred Assembly Bill No. 4, entitled "An act to repeal an act entitled 'An act to ascertain by proper proofs the citizens who shall be entitled to the right of suffrage,' " approved April 4, 1866, beg leave respectfully to report that they dissent from the recommendation of the majority of the Committee that "the bill do not pass," for reasons which they propose herein to explain.

The undersigned regret that the majority of the Committee do not assign any reason in support of their recommendation, and that in a matter so deeply affecting the rights of the people, the House should have so summarily and arbitrarily sustained their recommendation, without furnishing an opportunity for debate upon the merits of the bill, especially as it is well known that a large number of the people of the State, and a large minority in the House are favorable to its passage.

The undersigned have considered the provisions of the act intended to be repealed with great care, and feel satisfied that it tends to impose difficulties upon the exercise of the elective franchise which are unnecessary ; that it establishes no better mode of proof in respect to the right of persons to vote than the old election law does, but to the contrary, it places the

right of voting within the determination of a majority of the Boards of Registers, who are not chosen directly by the people, who may willfully or by mistake so arrange the registry lists as to exclude legal voters from the right of voting. The undersigned need not recapitulate the various defects in the law which they desire to have repealed, as they are recognized and admitted by those who favor its retention upon the statute book. They claim that these defects only relate to the manner of administering it and can be remedied by a supplement, but the objections of the undersigned relate to the substance of the law and not to the mere manner of its execution.

First. It is in their judgment unconstitutional.

Second, It is burthensome to the voters by imposing upon them the necessity of using the time necessary to their business in order to ensure a correct registration of their names and residences.

Third, It is oppressive to the tax payers of the State by increasing the expenses of elections to about three times as much as they were under the former election law.

That the law sought to be repealed is unconstitutional the undersigned think cannot be questioned, for the plain reason that it imposes a condition upon the right of suffrage not contained in the Constitution. In that instrument it is declared that "Every white male citizen of the United States of the age of twenty-one years, who shall have been a resident of the State one year, and of the county in which he claims his vote, for five months next before the election, shall be entitled to vote for all officers that now are or hereafter may be elected by the people." Here, then, are contained all the conditions necessary to the right of voting; but the law under consideration adds another. It requires, in addition to them, that to entitle the white male citizen of the age of twenty-one years, being a resident of the State one year, and of the county five months, to vote he shall also cause his name and residence to be registered at least five days before the election, and if he fails to do so he forfeits his right to vote. There is nothing more clearly established as that the provisions of the Constitution of a State are paramount to any law enacted by its Legislature conflicting with them. The Constitution cannot be amended or altered, excepting in the manner prescribed by its own provisions. No act of the Legislature can add to, or take anything from it; and as a means of securing

its inviolability, every member, previous to taking his seat, is sworn or affirmed to "support" it. The Constitution of a State is a compact or agreement between the body of the people, or a majority of them, and the individuals within its jurisdiction. It is as binding upon the former represented by the three branches in which the government is divided, as it is upon each of the latter, and therefore it is clear that the former cannot in any way alter the terms of the agreement by which the latter are declared to be entitled to vote, excepting by a formal alteration of the agreement in the manner prescribed in the instrument itself. By the law under consideration, the failure to be registered from any cause, whether intentional or not, disfranchises a citizen who is constitutionally qualified of his right to vote under the guarantee of the Constitution, and the undersigned take this opportunity to relate a circumstance coming under their personal cognizance as members of the committee on elections, whereby it was proved that no less than thirteen legal voters in the township of Cinnaminson, in the county of Burlington, were not registered in conformity to the law, and would have been deprived of their constitutional right to vote if it had not been for the urgent request and solicitation of a large number of citizens, urging them to disregard the law in this respect, which they did.

That this law imposes an unnecessary burthen upon the voter needs no other proof than a knowledge of what he has to do under it, if he would be certain by his own personal care to secure to himself the enjoyment of this great right. *First*, he must ascertain on the Tuesday or Wednesday three weeks next preceding the election if his name and residence has been entered upon the registry; then, on the Thursday next preceding the election, he must find, if in the alterations which the registers are authorized to make, his name has not been misspelt or omitted, and if his residence is correctly stated; and again on the day of election he must appear to cast his vote. Here is clearly a loss of time which few laboring men or men of business can afford to incur. In sparsely settled election districts the distance from the extremities to the centre covers several miles, and upon an average it will require at least a half day to travel back and forth, especially by those who are forced by want of means to travel. The preservation of this inestimable right to the poor man is made exceedingly onerous and burthensome, while to those in easier circumstances it may be a matter of mere pastime and pleasure.

The third proposition, that it is oppressive to the taxpayers of the State, is equally manifest from the fact that three days service of the Registers in their respective districts previous to the election, the transcribing quaduplicate lists, of preparing blank instructions, &c., and printing the same, are all in addition to the expenses of election under the previous law and when computed will be found to amount to a considerable sum.

It is said that this law is intended to prevent frauds at elections; but the undersigned are not aware that frauds at elections in New Jersey have been so common or frequent as to require the passage of a law so obnoxious to the provisions of the Constitution and to the principles of justice and equality. If so, however, and it is necessary to prevent frauds, that the registry of votes should be made a condition precedent to the right of voting, an amendment to the Constitution to that effect should be passed by the Legislature and submitted to the people. But looking at this law in its principal provisions, it seems to the undersigned that it opens the way to greater frauds than any which may be devised and effected by individual effort. The Board of Registry and the Board of Inspection are composed of the same persons; not appointed by nor answerable to the people of the several districts. They are appointed by the Boards of Freeholders of the several counties, or by the Common Councils of cities, and in cases of vacancy by the Governor of the State. It is not difficult to conceive, therefore, that gross frauds may be perpetrated by them upon the rights of voters. It is only necessary that the Board of Registry or a majority of them should register the names of persons not entitled to vote or omit the names of those really entitled to vote, in order that the election in any district may be carried according to their will. They being at the same time the Inspectors and Judges of Election, they have the power to admit or reject votes in accordance with their pre-arranged determination, and there is no redress except by a suit at law at the expense of the injured parties.

For these reasons the undersigned object to the recommendation of the Committee against the repeal of the said law, and regret that the House, without affording time for the minority of the Committee to be heard, should have so summarily adopted the said recommendation of the majority. They, therefore, respectfully ask that this report be entered

upon the minutes of the House, and that the usual number of copies be printed for the use of the House.

The Committee on State Prison, through their Chairman, Mr. Moore, presented the following:

Mr. Moore presented the report of the State Prison Committee which states that the committee had examined the books and vouchers of the keeper and had found them to correspond. The apparent discrepancy in the accounts of Mr. Walker, the late keeper, was accounted for by the fact the fiscal year expired three months before the expiration of Mr. Walker's term of office. The increase of expenses occurred on account of the Bigelow contract having been set aside by the courts. The committee have examined the prison, its cells, and workshops and found them all in

good order. The wants of the prisoners are properly provided for and their health as good as can be expected in the present overcrowded condition of the prison. There are now 150 more convicts within its walls than were ever confined there in any previous year. More cells and workshops are urgently needed. Much inconvenience was caused by having female prisoners confined in the same wing with the males. The committee recommend the immediate building of a new wing for the females, and a chapel in which the instructors and instructed might be brought face to face. They refer to the Inspector's report with regard to the inadequate amount of shop room. If this were supplied the prison would soon be in a condition to pay its expenses. In regard to the general management and the manner of appointing officers they also refer to the Inspector's report submitting to the serious consideration of the House the changes therein suggested. There is no proper provision for the insane convicts now nine in number. The committee refer to the present system of supplies being under the entire control of the keeper, and think that a great saving may be effected by advertising for proposals for contracts. A hospital is also recommended. The reports of the Inspector and keeper are referred to for financial statements. There are now confined in the prison five-hundred and seventy nine prisoners. The committee are satisfied by a careful inspection of the books that the discrepancy alluded to was a mere clerical error. Messrs. Moore, Bruere, Pickel and Newell Committee.

In consequence of this appropriation the Society, as will be seen by their late annual report, have made arrangements for the purchase and distribution of the work at half of its original publication price to the several Agricultural Societies of the State to be used as premiums. The State Society has also determined to supply free of charge a copy of the said work to all societies in the State whose object is wholly or in part the encouragement of fruit culture.

These liberal arrangements have been made by the State Society in consequence of the appropriation made in its favor by the State, never supposing a single moment that this Legislature could or would attempt to withhold the two remaining installments of any appropriation made by its predecessor. Your Committee therefore recommend that

Resolved, That we, the officers and members of Post No. 1, Grand Army of the Republic, Boonton, Morris County, New Jersey, do hereby return our sincere and hearty thanks to the Legislature and Governor of our State, and to Hon. John Hill, the originator of the resolutions for this happy recognition of our services in perpetuating free government in our common country, and assure them that we shall prize this mark of esteem most highly, and shall bear the afflictions caused by the ravages of war with more cheerful hearts ; as we see our services appreciated by a grateful people.

Resolved, That New Jersey, though centured during the war by her sister states for her apparent want of devotion to the sacred principles for which her sons were contending upon the bloody fields of battle, has, by her recent acts redeemed herself most gloriously, and by the presentation of this Testimonial to her honorably discharged soldiers' and sailors' has taken a front rank among the loyal States, in recognition of the services of the men who fought to preserve the Union from destruction, and we hail it with a lively satisfaction, not simply for the intrinsic value of the Testimonial, but as a bright omen for the future.

Resolved, That although we much prefer peace to war, should the tocsin of war be again sounded in our land, and our country should again call us to action we stand ready and willing to march again to the field of battle and strike a final lasting blow for the supremacy of the Constitution and Laws.

To the Honorable the Legislature of the State of New Jersey :

We, Francis O. Matthiessen and William Alfred Wiechers, of Jersey City, in the county of Hudson, in said State, respectfully represent, that we are owners of lands on the shore of Communipaw bay, at Jersey City; that besides being simple riparian owners, we are owners of a wharf which was built forty-two years ago; that said wharf was *located* by the Associates of the Jersey Company when they made their map at Jersey City in 1804, and when those Associates, in the year 1825, sold to George Dummer, the proprietor of the Jersey City glass house, (from whose family we bought) the said Associates in the deed stipulated for a right to run their

ferry boats to our wharf in stress of weather. The Morris Canal Company claim a right to cut off our wharf, and have for several years cut it off, under deeds derived from the same Associates bearing date twenty years after our deed; Dummer's deed being given in 1825, and the Canal Company deeds in 1845.

The Canal Company deeds are not *for any specific land* as our deeds are; nor are their deeds confined to the basin south of South street, of which they have been in possession for the last eight years; but their deeds are for all lands under the water in Communipaw bay and Hudson river *south* of South street and *east* of the extension (*indefinitely* to the south) of the old western boundary of Jersey City.

This claim has no southern limits and is as good for land a mile south of the Central Railroad depot as for the wet basin which lies between that depot and South street.

While we admit the absolute title of the State to lands under water, the State holds all these lands as trustee for the people. As among those for whom the State is trustee we claim the interposition of the State to protect our rights of navigation against this Company.

It may be said that our rights of navigation are secure *now* as this Company has opened their bulkhead one hundred and fifty feet wide so as to give a passage way out. But we appeal to the Legislature—we appeal to any honest minded citizen, whether we or they can trust this Company to keep open this passage way. When they originally sunk the cribs forming the basin, they left a passage-way of 150 feet wide in the *same* westerly bulkhead. This, however, they closed up with rock, about the time we bought our property, so as to prevent us from using that original gap for navigation. They went further, and when we had spent about \$100,000 in partially erecting our refinery, they sunk 400 feet of crib work in front of our wharf, and were going to sink more cribs and enclose our wharf all around. This we tore up. They sued us. They failed in their suit. They agreed to open another gap of 150 feet where the present one is. They delayed to do this for above 2 years and a half, and the present gap was not opened till months after our wet basin bill of last winter was vetoed. Though we can now navigate to our wharf, it is at the pleasure of this Company. We are

persuaded they will fill it up unless they are ejected from the State's property.

The provisions introduced into their bill in the House in the House do not relieve us. Their grant is immediately in front of our wharf and only 60 feet distant from it; so that they may pretend that we must navigate around any structure they put on the north line of their grant. A glance at the map will show this.

We beg the Legislature not to consign us to the tender mercies of a corporation who have been guilty of the greatest injustice to us, as well as gross imposition upon the State.

But we have no idea they will ever accept *any* grant of the State. They have said in a *printed* memorial that they would accept their bill, if passed *as presented*. But it is now amended, and they will not hold themselves bound to accept the *new* bill, as their offer was to accept the bill *as presented*. The *new* bill takes off say twelve acres, and in a material point, they will contend, that the bill is altered. They offered \$20,000 per year for sixty-two acres, and this will, they will say, give them but fifty acres. This will be a pretence, yet we feel we are not unjust in saying they will resort to this pretence. What security have the State if this Canal bill grant is made, that the Company will accept it? It has none. This Company claims to own this very land and extensive and undefined lands to the south—for *their claim is of all land under water in Communipaw bay and Hudson river*, which the associates conveyed, and the associate's conveyance is without any southern limits. In any other grant the State may make to the south, it will be met by claims of this Company. If they do not accept the grant they are pretending to apply for, within the *ninety days after the Legislature adjourns*, which they are allowed by their bill to consider of it, the State, next year will be where it is this—owning large property out of which it should have revenue, *in possession of claimants* who have enjoyed the same for eight years without compensation, and any new proposal to lease will be opposed by this Company under the old but exploded claims.

Every year this false title will be set up. New members each year will be deluded to the end of the session with the idea of the Company's having acted in good faith, and on the belief that their title was good. Yet, we hope to be pardoned for stating our belief, that none of their acts have been

in good faith, or founded on any belief of title. As to the good faith heretofore—their basin was constructed *by night*, and while the office of Chancellor was vacant—when they could not be enjoined. This has been proved in the courts. They do not need the basin for their canal; if they did, it would have been used for their canal boats at some time during the last eight years they have been in possession. Yet the *first time*, and we challenge contradiction, that they have ever had their boats laid up in the basin was on the occasion of the legislative visit; and then, doing their utmost, their boats did not occupy one-sixtieth part of the land under water they have now in possession.

Compare our offer to the State with theirs. Was ours not made first? Was it not *bona fide*? Would the State have ever been *offered* a cent of revenue by any one else? But what are the offers? Ours is to take the fifty-two acres *for sixty years* at \$25,000 rent. Theirs, to take the *fee simple* for \$20,000 rent. At the end of our lease *we* must buy the State out at the *then* value of the property, less the warehouses.

At the end of the Canal Company's charter, the *State* must buy out the *Canal Company* at the then value of the property.

This, every one knows, will never be done, as without submitting such a law to the people, it would be void, as contracting a debt beyond \$100,000, contrary to the State Constitution. This provision of their present bill will furnish a pretence not to accept the grant.

The property if in our hands, is not by our bill exempted from taxation. By their charter, all the company hold for canal purposes *is exempt from taxation*.

If they have the grant, the navigable waters will be appropriated, if they appropriate it as they say is necessary to canal boats less than ten feet wide, which cannot live in the basin without being lashed together. If we have it, it will be appropriated to commercial purposes, and the commerce of New York would be attracted to our shores. *Their* scheme has been to make building lots of it; and *their largest stockholders*, they admit, have mapped it all out into lots, and the legislature have seen the map. It is said this plan has not had the formal sanction of the board; but what scheme of the largest stockholders of a company will lack that when the time comes to carry out the plans of the largest stockholders.

Whatever be their plans they refuse to disclose them. They come under no obligations to the State as we do in the bill. We propose to devote these lands to public purposes—to commercial purposes. If these lands are improved for commercial purposes it will enhance the value of the remaining lands under water belonging to the State.

We have presented the subject to the Legislature this year and last year. We have called a public and general attention to the value of these lands as a public resource, until the people are thoroughly roused to the vast interest the State has in the matter. We ask no thanks. We ask simple justice for ourselves, and have endeavored to show the people of the State that it is *their* interest to do us justice.

If this Canal Company is so meritorious a corporation as to be entitled to the grant in preference to those who have pointed out this public resource, it is because they have been enjoying the public property for the last eight years without compensation, because they took possession by night, because they availed themselves of the closing for a year of the Chief Court of the State; and the only Court of the State that could enjoin their unjust work? Before they had half done their work, the Municipal Corporation of Jersey City, in December, 1859, protested against it by public resolution, but they were powerless. The office of Chancellor was vacant, and no power in the State could be invoked to stop the iniquity. As corporators in the wet basin bill, and as a guarantee of our intention to carry out the obligations imposed upon us by the bill, we propose to lodge, instantler, with the State Treasurer, twenty-five thousand dollars in United States 5-20 bonds, bearing interest, to be appropriated to the rent provided for in Senate bill No. 1, as it becomes due.

One word more; it is supposed that a grant made to us will injure the Morris Canal Company in their business. We herewith lay before the Legislature maps showing that they have now in possession (exclusive of the wet basin south of South street), *fourteen acres and one-half of pier, basin and wharf room*, and this is so far in excess of the wants of said Company, that instead of using it for Canal purposes, they let out great parts of this area for wholesale and retail coal yards.

The minutes of yesterday's proceedings were read and approved.

Mr. Murphy from the Special Committee presented the following:

The Committee to whom was referred the petition of the ladies of New Jersey asking that the words "white male" might be stricken from the Constitution, would, after a fair hearing and explanation of the subject, respectfully report that they find it a question of the highest importance, and worthy of great consideration. Prejudice against female suffrage has so long governed the American people that the question has not had that investigation its merits properly demand. Your committee feel that the time has arrived when the question should be carefully considered, and the people have the opportunity of giving an expression of opinion on this most important matter. If intelligence should be a qualification for the right of suffrage—or property, or a residence for a term of years—either or all of these would seem to be not sufficient reason to deny women the right of the elective franchise. In fact, in the examination of this subject, your committee have failed to discover any reason why women should not vote. They pay taxes to support the government, and are subject to all its laws, yet taxation without representation we all agree is tyrannical.

We fought Great Britain for seven long years to free ourselves from this bondage, and for eighty years and more we have been practising the same thing on a class we claim as our best and truest friends. Her right, therefore, should not longer be withheld. As a matter of justice, it should be granted.

This subject, also, is worthy of great consideration, when we remember that to-day a great moral question is now agitating the public mind, and more difficult of solution than even the reconstruction of the state. From time immemorial a curse has afflicted the human family that has no parallel. History furnishes us with no nation that has been exempt from

its blighting effect. And as the years roll on, it gathers volume and power, until to-day it comes like a mighty army, crushing out the life-blood of the nation and encircling within its deadening folds the brightest ornaments of society and the loveliest of the human race. It has been fought by the church and the State, but never conquered. It has been wounded only to gather new life and determination for a more vigorous contest. To-day, in the State of New Jersey—the pride of all her sons—it wears a spectral crown, and defies even the action of this Legislature.

Excise bills are sent here to be passed by towns and cities, which they have not the moral courage to pass themselves; which if they did the parties passing them would be driven from power at the first subsequent election. The best mind of the State have no practical remedy, and find themselves only mourning at the sad devastation they are daily witnessing. Give to women the right of suffrage and you have the only remedy for this blighting pestilence. Like the magician's wand, its power would be instantly felt, and health and peace and order would be given the nation. New Jersey would then, indeed, be a land of promise and a land of hope. The great curse of the human family would be so mangled and mutilated that if it had any life, it would be recognized only to be despised and avoided.

Woman has no sympathy with the causes of crime and debauchery. Her instincts are pure, and naturally incline to the right of all questions of good order, good government, and that principle in man which is noble and elevating in his character. Give her the ballot and you instantly bring into action that earnest penetration of mind which will not be satisfied with an exaltation to office of those who are not worthy their representation.

Your committee have as yet failed to discover why, if woman help to man in household affairs, in the education of children, in the many business relations of life, and in all that appertains to the best interests of the church—why she should stand wanting when her attention is turned to the affairs of state. In striking out the word "white" your committee think that little need be said. It is evident that sooner or later this must be done.

The National Government in the organization of the Southern States, have set a noble example of doing justice to

a race heretofore dishonored and despised, but who, through the four years that imperilled the life of the nation, won for themselves a name that shall live untarnished on the page of history.

If ever a people have won for themselves a right to the elective franchise, these black men of our country did, when to uphold the ensign of our nation and perpetuate the principles of our glorious institutions, they faced the iron hail at Fort Wagner, Port Hudson, Richmond, and a hundred other fields, where they gave themselves a willing sacrifice, and suffer to-day the scorn of their former oppressors.

If we are willing to sympathize with the suffering masses of Europe—if the struggling sons of Hungary and Italy are worthy of our sympathy and recognition—if the down-trodden masses of Ireland, who have been suffering for centuries under the iron heel of despotism, and are now vainly struggling to gain for themselves the right of self-government, excite within us any meed of approbation, surely these sons of toil, who have been so instrumental in saving for us the nation's life, cannot be longer denied a voice in the government under which they live, and which they have helped to perpetuate.

Never before has the state had so good an opportunity of doing justice to these men. Never before were the people so ready and willing to endorse the right of citizenship on the "discharge papers" from the successful strife through which they have passed. They are worth the name of citizens to-day. Give them the elective franchise, you make them better citizens still. You attach them to all the interests of the state and elevate them to that condition in life that call for nobler ambition and a higher aspiration for all that good and desirable in life. Longer delay is a punishment they do not deserve. Give them the ballot and the state is honored by rendering justice and adding lustre to its reputation.

The investigation of this question is not only instructing, but is overwhelming in the conclusion that the hour has arrived when the people should have the privilege of expressing their opinion on this most important question. In several of the Northern States, the question is now fairly before the people for their action, and your committee would recommend the adoption of the following resolution;

Resolved, That the Judiciary Committee be and they are hereby instructed to report the bill calling a convention to

alter the Constitution, to consider this and other matters, that the question may be fairly brought before the people for their action.

To the Honorable the General Assembly of the State of New Jersey.

I herewith return Assembly bill No. 128, referred to me for my opinion as to whether the proviso of the sixth section thereof, for the payment \$50,000 per annum to the State, with a deposit of bonds to the amount of \$10,000 as security, is constitutional or not, and whether the money would be at all times collectable by the State.

It will be answered that by the language of the *proviso* referred to, the \$50,000 per annum, is to be paid solely in consideration of the grants made and contained in the sixth section. There are the General Grants of Power to the Company to build and maintain dams, canals, locks, &c., to create water power, "to sell and lease the same" and generally to construct, maintain and use a great navigable highway upon and along the Delaware River.

If the provisions were, that the \$50,000 should be paid in consideration of all the grants and powers contained in the whole act, and thereby given the company, including that of "*eminent domain*" confined by a subsequent section, it would be a serious question whether they were not against the plainest principles of organic law. The power of *eminent domain* can only be exercised to take private property to public use,

upon the ground that in the opinion of the Legislature the particular use for which it is taken, is necessary for the public good, and the Legislature may not authorize the taking of private property upon any other consideration; certainly not upon the mere consideration of the payment of money into the Treasury. Such a course would be an indirect condemnation of the private property of particular citizens for the benefit of the State Treasury; there is however, no grant or delegating of the power of eminent domain to the company, to enable them to take the private property of the owners of land or materials contained in the sixth section, and hence the *proviso* referred to is confined to the grants made in that particular section; it cannot be said to be unconstitutional nor against organic law.

It is true, a simple and direct sale of the corporate rights and privileges granted by the Legislature to the company, for the sum of \$50,000 per annum, but, however startling this may be in principle or dangerous as a precedent, we can not on that account merely declare it to be beyond the power of the Legislature. Indeed we are not without precedent in New Jersey, which seems to authorize such legislation, and we can only trust to the wisdom and discretion of our representatives to see to it, that dangerous principles are not established and great powers entrusted to irresponsible hands. Upon the question of collection, it is not necessary to say that the deposit of Bonds to the amount of \$100,000 of any kind (and no particular description of Bonds is named in the section), would be wholly inadequate as security for the payment of \$50,000 per annum, this should certainly be considered before the Legislature concludes the irrevocable contract contained in this grant; and it might be provided, for greater security and facility in the collection of this money, that in default of its payment for a specified time after it becomes due, the grants contained in the act should cease and the powers and property of the company revert to the State. This with the present liability of the individual stockholders for the amount of stock subscribed by each would probably be sufficient to insure the State from loss.

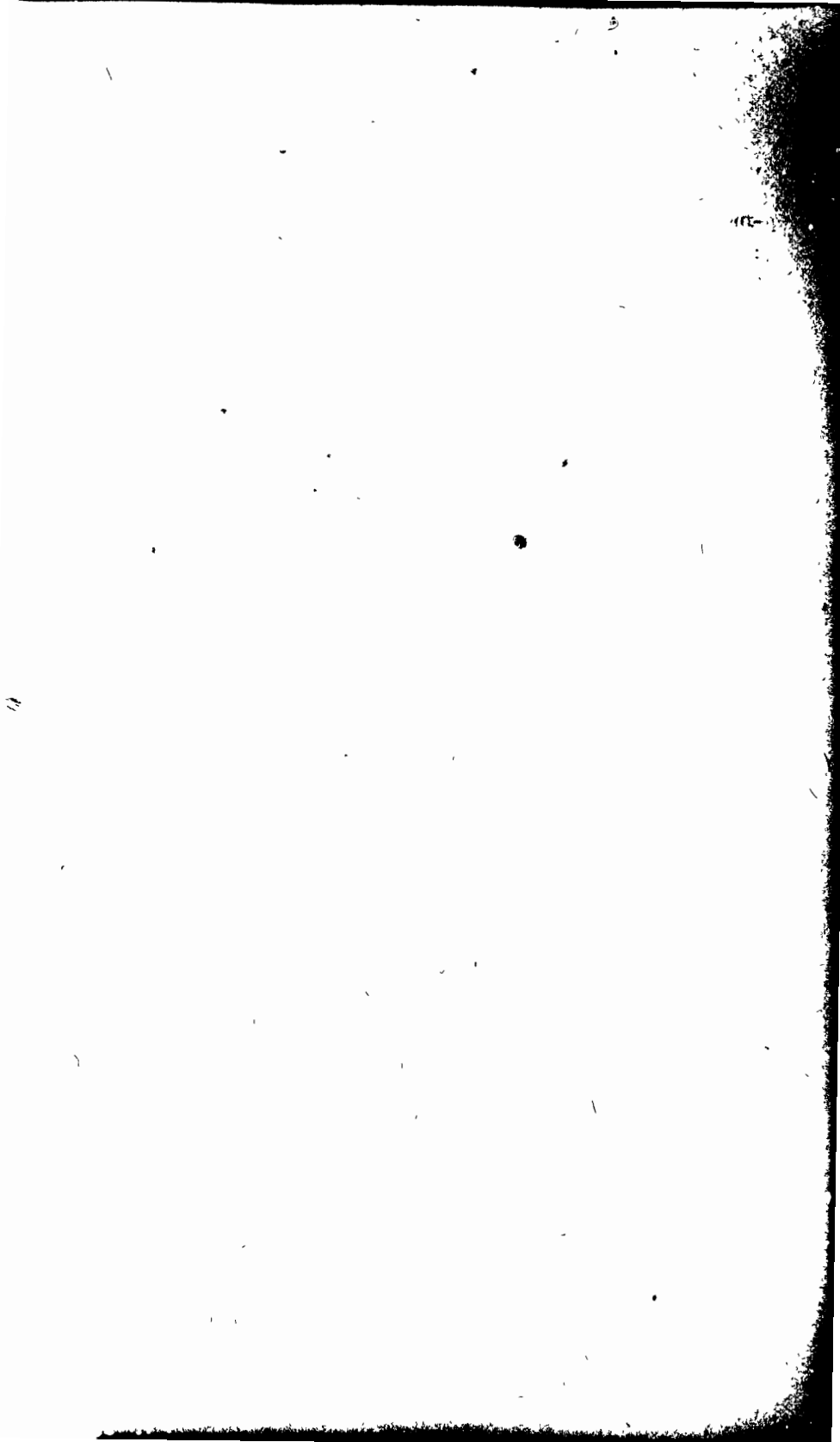
