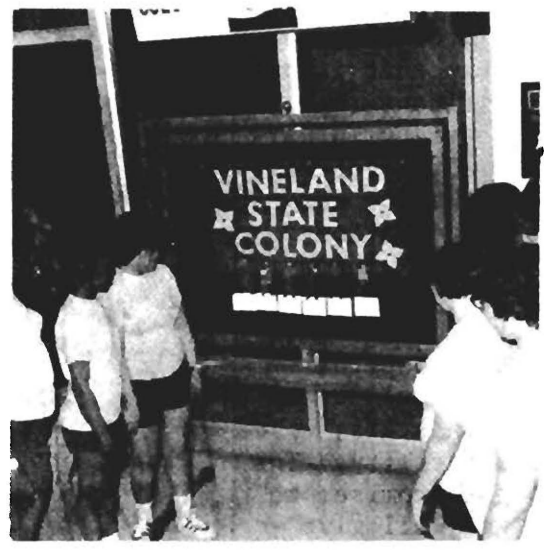

OUR GIRLS AT THE REGIONAL OLYMPICS

On Saturday, May 19, a group of Colony and Main residents journeyed to the Glassboro State College campus to compete in the Regional Special Olympics.

This year's Special Olympics Southern Jersey Regional Meet was divided into two basic groupings: Group A was designated for the retarded, sponsored by the Kennedy Foundation and Group B was the Tournament of Champions for the physically handicapped, sponsored by the State of New Jersey.

Forty-two Olympians participated from the State School, accompanied by approximately sixteen chaperones. The final tabulation of ribbons that they won were: seventeen first place, thirteen second place and twelve third place-for a grand total of forty-two prize ribbons.

The six Colony Olympians, accompanied by their coaches, Miss Janice String and Mrs. Betty Jones, also did an outstanding job at Glassboro. A total of six ribbons were won at the Meet: four first place and two second place ribbons. This was the first time that the Colony residents participated in the Special Olympics and the residents and staff were delighted with the results.

Everyone joins in praise of the excellent showing our girls made at the South Jersey Meet at Glassboro. The next meet is scheduled for June 23 and all the participants are eagerly looking forward to the competition.

Keep up the good work girls! Good Luck!



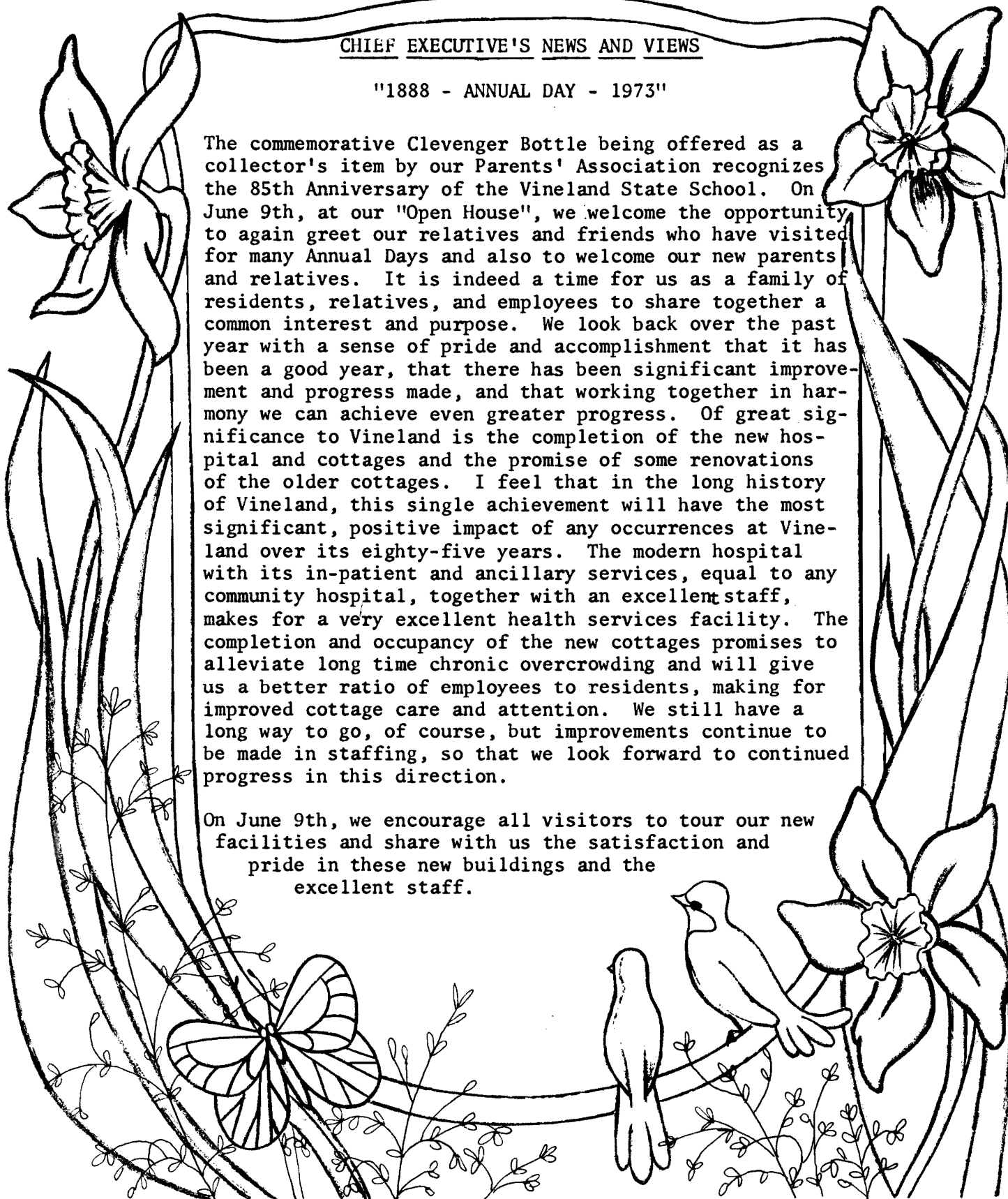

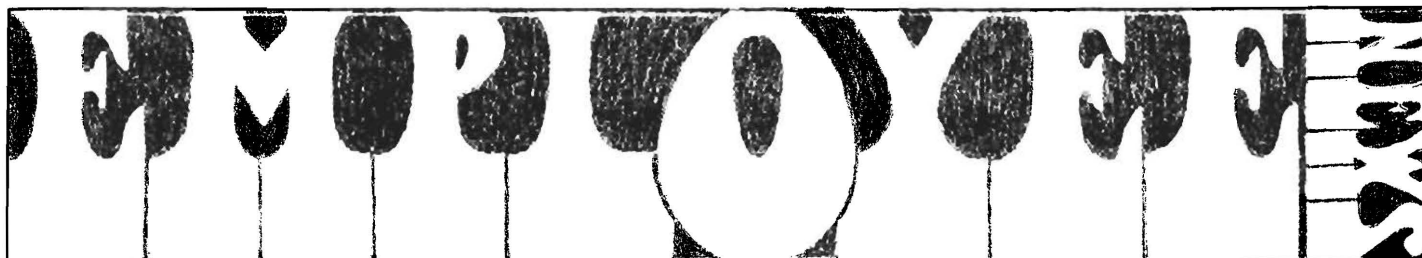
CHIEF EXECUTIVE'S NEWS AND VIEWS

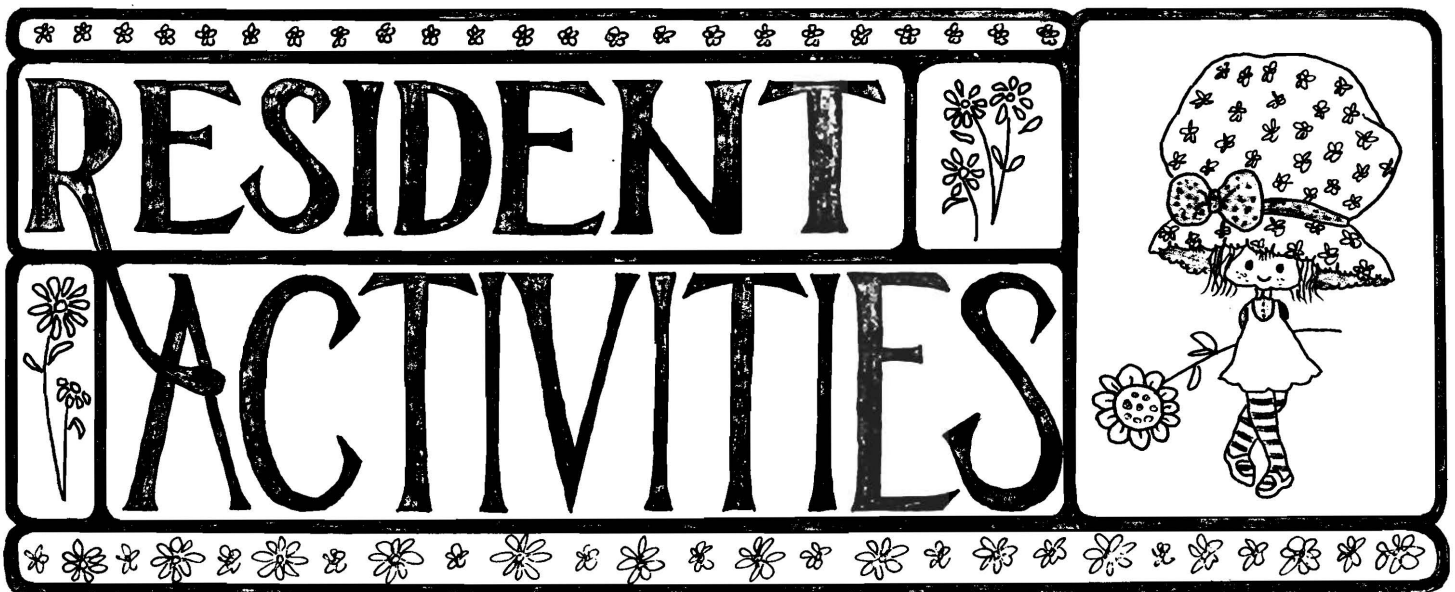

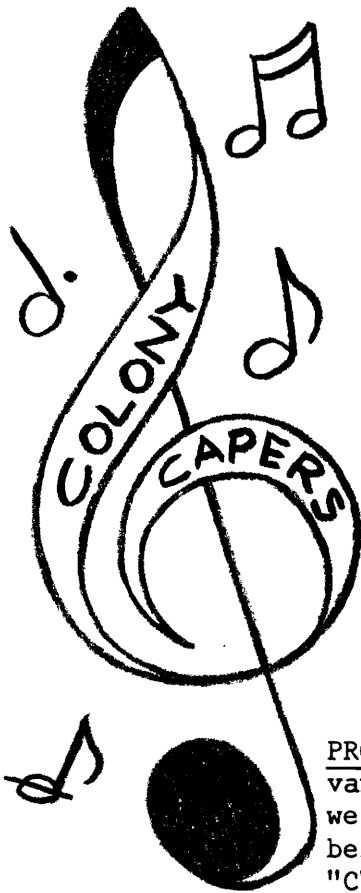
HOLLYWOOD-VINELAND STATE SCHOOL- The newest movie stars at the Vineland State School reside in Giles Cottage, which was the fortunate cottage to receive a Super 8 movie camera projector donated by parents. Either Mrs. Powers, Giles Supervisor, or one of her staff takes movies of one of the special occasions in which the Giles residents participate. It is the showing of these personal movies that is the "reel" delight for the residents. During the month of April the Easter Parade and the receiving of the individual Easter baskets were filmed and previewed.

SHOPPING PARTICIPANTS- The Reeves' residents, as well as residents of other cottages, have been doing in-town shopping under the guidance of cottage staff. The Reeves' staff extended this program to other residents who normally were not taken in town because of behavioral problems. This type of program is being used to reward good behavior and a marked change has been noted in many of the girls who desire to participate. The girls usually spend four or five hours window shopping, purchasing items and eating out at Newberry's or one of the other restaurants.

PROGRAM-PRACTICE NEWS-The entire music department held full rehearsals for the June Open House Program three times per week up to the final dress rehearsal. The scenery was completed by the Arts & Crafts Dept., appropriately complimenting the theme of the show, "Gay Nineties Revue." The costumes were completed and tastefully designed by the Sewing Room staff. Their originality will add immensely to the general appearance of this year's June Open House Production.

SOCIALIZATION SELF-HELP- 15 Bassett residents have been enrolled in a self-help program. Mrs. Trail and her staff have devised a program which assists and instructs these children in the basic areas of brushing teeth, washing hands and face, combing hair, dressing, and developing socialization skills. As a girl graduates from this program, other residents are enrolled.

SING-ALONG- The Giles' staff has introduced "Operation Sing-Along" directly before meals when the girls are all seated waiting patiently for lunch or supper to be served. During these times, the cottage supervisory employees sing along with the girls. The response from the girls, plus the employees' response, has been one of sheer enjoyment and fun. This activity provides a measure of relaxation for the residents before enjoying their noon and evening repasts.

NAPKIN PROGRAM-The V.S.S. Parents' Association introduced a new Napkin Program in "F" and "H" Cottages. The residents have become aware of proper usage and enjoy their availability.

COOK'S CORNER

COMBINATION SEAFOOD SALAD

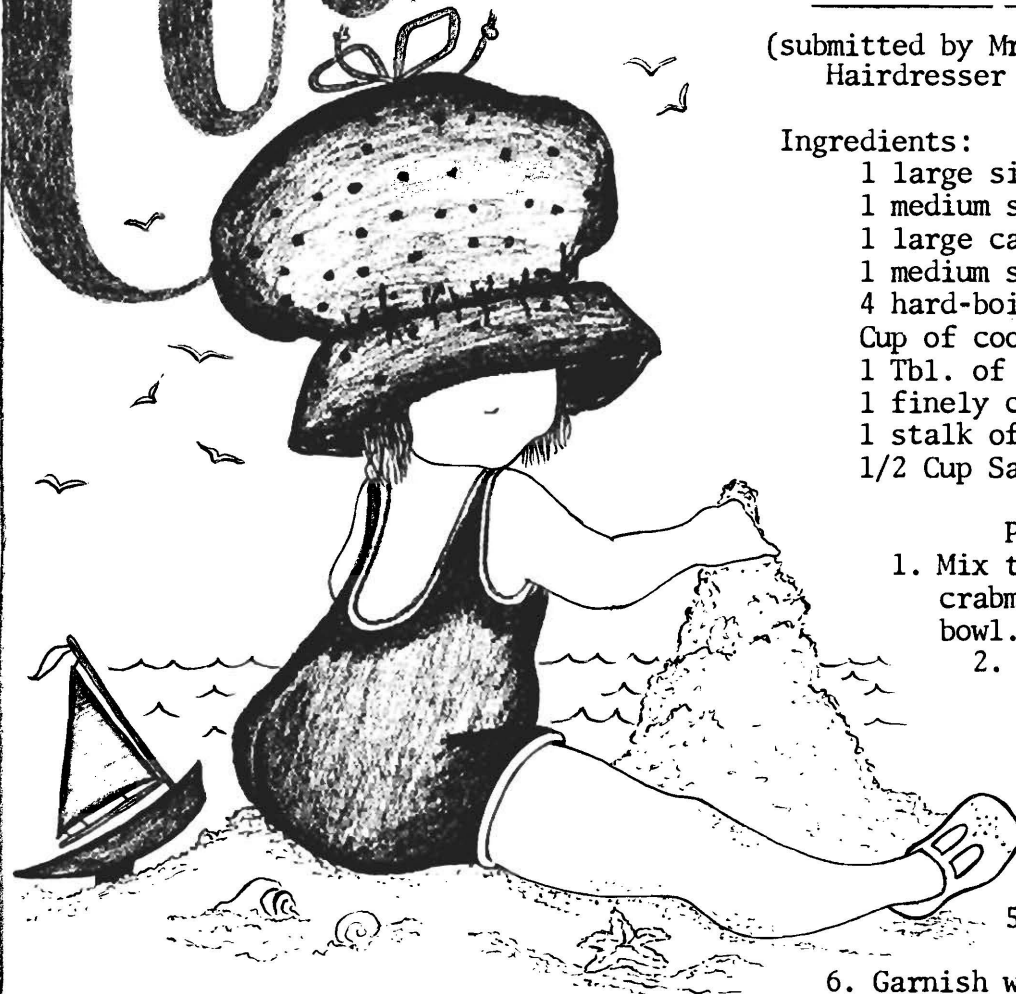
(submitted by Mrs. Ruth Petway,

Ingredients:

- 1 large sized can of tuna
- 1 medium sized can of shrimp
- 1 large can of crabmeat
- 1 medium sized can of salmon
- 4 hard-boiled eggs
- Cup of cooked elbow macaroni
- 1 Tbl. of sweet relish
- 1 finely cut small onion
- 1 stalk of celery
- 1/2 Cup Salad Dressing (Miracle Whip)

Procedure:

1. Mix together tuna, shrimp, crabmeat and salmon in a large bowl.
2. Cut up hard-boiled eggs, onions and celery and add to seafood.
3. Add cooked macaroni, relish and salad dressing
4. Salt and pepper, if desired.
5. Arrange on a large platter.
6. Garnish with lettuce, parsley and stuffed olives.
7. Sprinkle on paprika



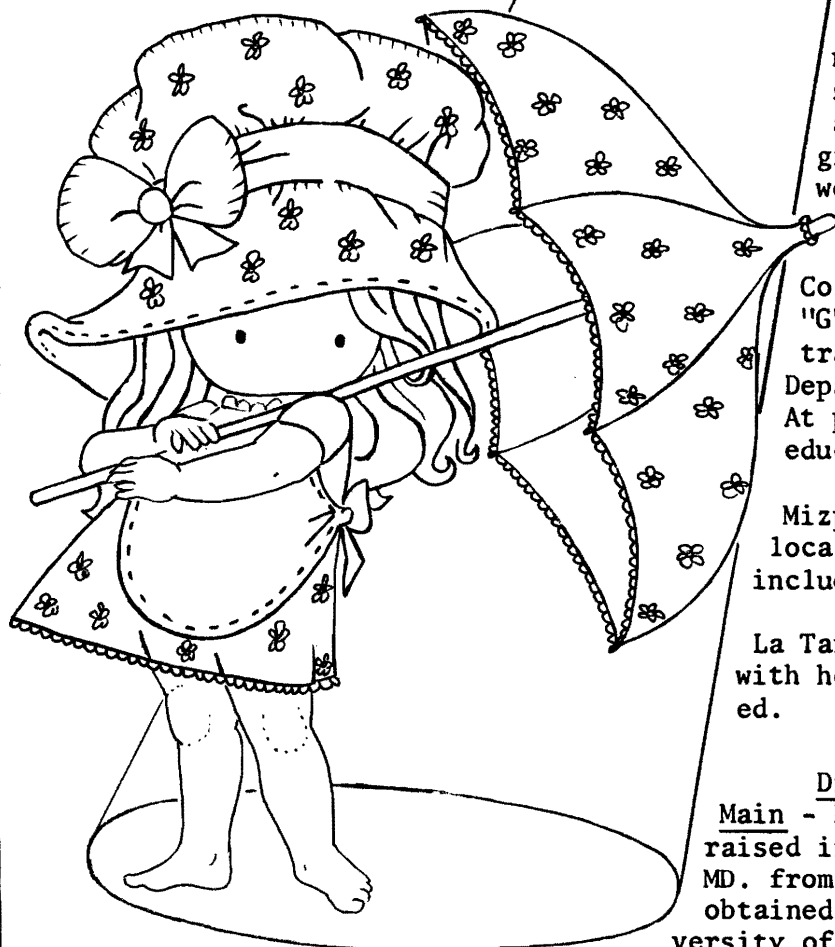

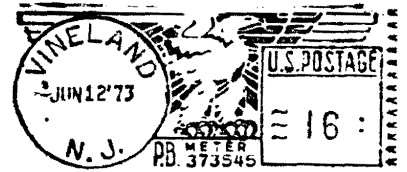
