Dear Governor and Members of the Legislature:

Pursuant to N.J.S.A. 52:17B-5.5, I am submitting the nineteenth annual report on crime in New Jersey. This information is based on crime statistics submitted to the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting System by every New Jersey law enforcement agency for the year 1985.

Also included in this publication are 1984 and 1985 statistics collected in conformance with the Prevention of Domestic Violence Act. Gathering the particulars of the domestic violence incident is a necessary step toward combating this serious crime against society.

Effective law enforcement requires accurate crime statistics in order to identify the extent, type and location of criminal activity. Criminal justice administrators and planners have long recognized the Uniform Crime Reporting Program as the vehicle to accomplish this objective.

The success of the Uniform Crime Reporting System during 1985 could not have been realized without the cooperation extended by each of the 586 law enforcement agencies of the state, the New Jersey Chiefs of Police Association and the County Prosecutors Association.

It is in the interest of more effective law enforcement to over 7 million residents of New Jersey that the nineteenth annual report is submitted.

THE NEW JERSEY UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING SYSTEM

DEFINITION

The New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting System is based upon the compilation, classification, and analysis of crime data reported by all New Jersey police agencies in accordance with the regulations prescribed by law.

DEVELOPMENT

The New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting Law (N.J.S.A. 52:17 B-5.1 et seq) was enacted on May 16, 1966, and became effective January 1, 1967. Responsibility for the establishment, direction, control, and supervision of the Uniform Crime Reporting System was assigned to the State's Attorney General. The Attorney General authorized the New Jersey State Police to collect and collate the crime data received from law enforcement agencies within the state.

At the request of the Attorney General, the New Jersey State Police researched crime systems in operation throughout the nation in order to establish a firm foundation from which to grow. The most logical approach was the paralleling of the federal crime reporting system. There was a distinct need for a compatibility feature that would enhance both the state and federal systems through the data entry at both levels.

This compatibility has, as its nucleus, the standard classification of offenses established by the Federal Bureau of Investigation. Regardless of the label placed on a particular offense in the various states' systems, i.e., felony, misdemeanor, disorderly persons, if the incident meets the federal standard it will be reported as an offense.

The terms "crime" and "offense" are used interchangeably in this publication, and refer to an act committed in violation of a law which is reportable under the guidelines of the Uniform Crime Reporting Program.

The Committee on Uniform Crime Reporting of the New Jersey State Chiefs of Police Association has served the program in an advisory capacity since 1966. The contributions of this committee have proven valuable to the success of the program. This committee works in close harmony with the State Police as a means of improving the quality of reporting through recommended program standards, policies, and procedures.

COLLECTION OF CRIME DATA

As required by statute, all law enforcement agencies in the state submit monthly and annual summary crime reports to the program. During the year 1985, offense and arrest data were received from 482 full-time municipal police departments, twenty-two (22) part-time municipal police departments, and the New Jersey State Police (acting as the reporting agent for the 54 municipalities without local police services). In addition to the 482 full-time municipal police departments there are nine police departments contracted by other municipalities.

In addition to the above agencies, arrest data were received from the state's twenty-one (21) prosecutors, sheriffs' departments, four (4) county police departments, and four (4) county park police departments. In order to incorporate all New Jersey law enforcement agencies under the system, the ten (10) other state agencies with law enforcement responsibilities, as well as thirteen (13) college campus police departments were incorporated within the program. Collectively, a total of 577 law enforcement agencies submit their reports to the New Jersey State Police.

METHOD

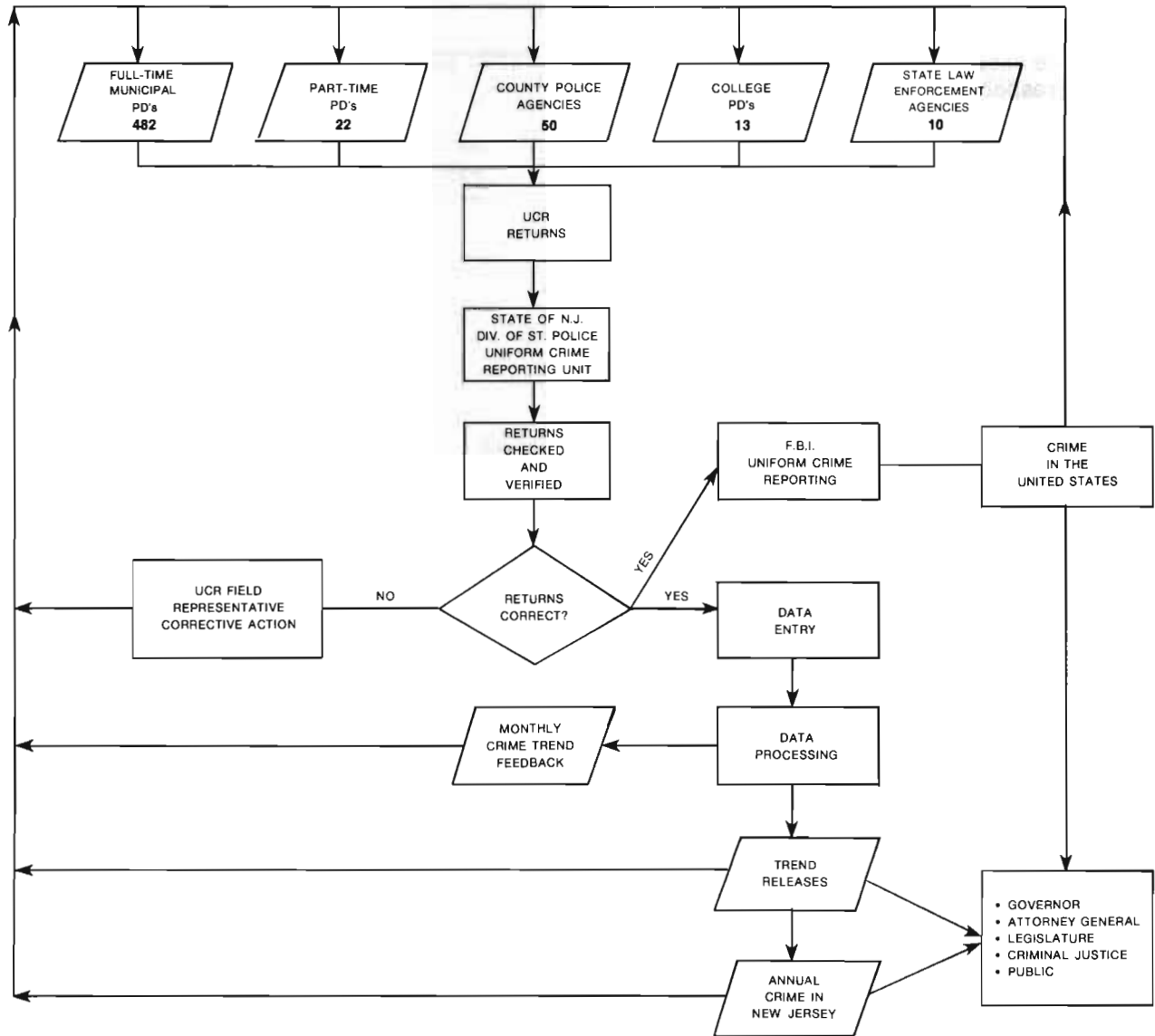
The Uniform Crime Reporting Guide, which was revised during 1977, has been distributed to all contributors. It outlines reporting procedures in detail, and is complete to the extent of providing examples and illustrations. Field representatives provide additional instruction and clarification when required.

All reported offenses are related to the municipality in which they occur rather than to the agency which may conduct the investigation. The clearance is credited to the municipality in which the offense occurred. Each contributing agency is responsible for compiling its own reports. Law enforcement agencies report the number of known offenses according to the following categories: Homicide (Murder and Manslaughter), Rape, Robbery, Burglary, Larceny-theft, Motor Vehicle Theft, and Arson. The "Crime in New Jersey," and the Federal Bureau of Investigation's "Crime in the United States" publications,

exclude manslaughters, simple assaults, and arsons from the "Index" offenses. These are further referred to as "violent" and "nonviolent" crimes as graphically illustrated in Section VII under "Municipal and County Offense and Demographic Data," and Section II, "State Summary and Offense Analysis."

All reported offenses are compiled from a record of all criminal complaints received by police from victims or other sources, or discovered by the police during routine operations. Complaints determined to be unfounded are eliminated from this count. Analytical data pertaining to specific crime categories are also reported, i.e., total adult and juvenile arrests made during the month. Police killed or assaulted, and arson data are also collected monthly. Police personnel information is submitted on an annual basis.

VERIFICATION PROCESSES

The uniformity and accuracy of data gathered from 576 contributors must be safeguarded through various ways. Although guidelines and instructions are provided each contributor, they are not the panacea for the accuracy being sought.

The reports received by the Uniform Crime Reporting Unit are recorded and examined for mathematical accuracy and reasonableness of the interpretation of the offense classifications. Improper classifications, changes in reporting procedures, or actual change are identified in this manner. Errors of a minor nature are corrected by direct telephone contact with the contributors, while all other errors are resolved through a personal visit by a field representative to the reporting agency.

Further verification is accomplished through the analysis of statistical data accrued from the reports submitted. Fluctuations in crime rates noted from previous submissions are verified by the field representatives through their municipal counterpart.

FUNCTION

Police executives make use of this data in administrative, planning, and operational determinations for their respective jurisdictions. The State Police Uniform Crime Reporting Unit provides assistance to municipal police agencies through the individual analysis of statistics as they relate to specific crime problems within their jurisdiction. Police executives also use this data for identifying manpower and equipment needs. The Uniform Crime Reporting Program requirements not only have increased police efficiency in reporting and recordkeeping areas, but have helped police in their day to day operations.

Although the data collected on the offenses of manslaughter and simple assault are not presented in the annual report, they are required for the federal system. However, this data is processed and available for special research purposes.

PROFILE OF NEW JERSEY

New Jersey is situated between the major industrial markets of New York and Philadelphia and can be classified as the "Crossroads of the East." The geographic location of the state has been a major factor in its growth and development. The many miles of super-expressway facilities within the state connect New Jersey directly with the neighboring states of New York, Pennsylvania, and Delaware. Additionally, New Jersey as a corridor state, accommodates large volumes of traffic from both the eastern and western part of the United States.

The state is politically comprised of 21 counties which contain 567 incorporated municipalities. Nationally, New Jersey, although 46th in size, ranks ninth in population and first as the most densely populated state in the country. In addition to this density of 1,002.5 persons per square mile, New Jersey still has many miles of rural areas and sparsely settled communities. The areas of density show a heavy concentration around the major urban centers and those areas most accessible for commuting.

STATE, COUNTY AND MUNICIPAL PROFILES

The presentation of state, county and municipal profiles in this section is offered for the purpose of projecting, for the consideration of the reader, a group of recognizable factors which may affect the amount and type of crime that occurs from community to community. Selection of the areas of information to be related to individual municipalities was based on the immediacy and completeness of data available.

Population statistics presented here, and throughout this publication, were obtained from the Department of Labor, Division of Planning and Research, Office of Demographic and Economic Analysis. The adjusted 1984 census counts of population were used in this publication.

Character of municipalities by urban, suburban and rural classifications, and square miles, were compiled by the Department of Community Affairs, Division of State and Regional Planning, Bureau of Statewide Planning. Following is a list of categories used and a description of each category.

- URBAN CENTER Densely populated with extensive development.
- URBAN-SUBURBAN Near an urban center but not as extremely developed and more residential areas.
- SUBURBAN Predominantly single-family residential, within a short distance of an urban area.
- RURAL Scattered small communities and isolated single family dwellings.
- RURAL CENTER High density core area with surrounding municipalities rural.

Certain other socio-economic factors present in varying degrees in all communities may have an influence on resulting crime rates. Obvious difficulties in the identification, documentation and measurement of these factors, however, precluded their application in this report.

Those factors presented were listed to affirm their existence within the county and community and to provide a base for consideration in the evaluation of that community's crime experience.

CRIME FACTORS

In order to provide a meaningful statistical profile of crime within the State of New Jersey, each law enforcement agency must provide the Uniform Crime Reporting Unit with data that depicts specific crimes that are occurring within their jurisdiction. There is a need for compatibility with the National Uniform Crime Reporting System and, therefore, categories of offense classifications used within the state are identical with those of the National System. This results in equitable conclusions being drawn from the data submitted.

Reported Part I offenses and arrests are recorded in the municipality where they occurred, regardless of the outside investigative agency which may investigate, arrest, or otherwise dispose of the case.

The factors which influence crime rates are dependent upon characteristics of the community. When attempting to interpret the crime statistics presented herein, one should be aware of the social structure and factors that lead to or cause criminal behavior.

Crime rates in this publication are based on the stable population of the municipality. Fluctuating seasonal population figures are too inaccurate to be used as a measurement for determining crime rates. Municipalities with high seasonal populations may indicate a higher crime rate per one thousand than may be normal for a municipality their size. This would also be indicated in municipalities that experience high population increases due to special events or commuters.

Set forth below are some of the factors which, by type and volume, will affect the crime that occurs from place to place:

- Density and size of the community population and the metropolitan areas of which it is a part.
- Composition of the population with reference particularly to age, sex, and race.
- Economic status, including job availability, and mores of the population.
- Relative stability of population, including commuter, seasonal, and other transient types.
- Climate, including seasonal weather conditions.
- Cultural conditions, such as educational, recreational, and religious characteristics.
- Effective strength of law enforcement agencies.
- Administrative and investigative emphases of law enforcement.
- Policies of other components of the criminal justice system (i.e., prosecutorial, judicial, correctional, and probational.)
- Crime reporting practices of the general citizenry.
- Attitudes of the public toward crime reporting.
- The administrative and investigative efficiency of the local law enforcement agency, including the degree of adherence to crime reporting standards.
- Cooperation of adjoining and overlapping police agencies.

THE POLICE POINT OF VIEW

The New Jersey State Police Uniform Crime Reporting Unit surveyed various police agencies of the state, attempting to ascertain their opinion concerning factors contributing to the increase or decrease of specific crimes in their municipality. One of the goals of the Uniform Crime Reporting Unit is to assist police in reducing crime by first identifying its extent, type and location. The following viewpoints are offered with the expectation of reaching this goal.

ROBBERY

Decreases:

- More stringent sentencing requirements under the State Criminal Code.
- Increased communications technology has led to better communication and increased exchanges of information between police departments.
- Highly visible foot patrols being deployed in commercial areas and densely populated residential areas.
- Use of Anti-crime Units in high robbery areas.

Increases:

- Resort areas have shown an increasing seasonal population.
- Our highly mobile society provides easy access to areas which were previously difficult to reach.

BURGLARY

Decreases:

- Better deployment of police manpower, such as highly visible foot patrols in high density crime areas, and increased patrols during probable times and at probable locations of burglaries.
- More stringent sentencing requirements under the State's Criminal Code has been a deterrent.
- Crime Prevention Programs are being stressed in many communities and citizens have been taking a more active part by reporting suspicious persons or circumstances.

Increases:

- Extreme increases in population in certain areas has led to new housing in suburban and rural areas.
- Husband and wife are both working; leaving homes frequently unoccupied for long periods of time.

LARCENY

Decreases:

- Public awareness programs contribute to the decrease in thefts from parked vehicles.
- Improved or additional lighting deter criminal acts from occurring in parking areas.
- "Safe Streets" Programs and Anti-crime Units have been established in many municipalities.

Increases:

- Shoplifting is a theft that police have little or no control over. Store security forces are under the control of the store administration, and their policies vary from strict enforcement, arrest and prosecution, to only a warning. Policy change has been directed toward prosecuting the offenders rather than warning them, causing to some extent an increase in the number of shoplifting offenses reported to police.
- Certain types of property such as tape decks, radar detectors and radios are popular and present resale opportunities.
- Youth gang activity on the increase resulting in thefts from motor vehicle.

MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT**Decreases:**

- Stronger sentencing of career criminals has been effective.
- Modern ignition systems and anti-theft devices act as a deterrent.
- Better lighting in parking lots has helped decrease motor vehicle thefts.

Increases:

- The tremendous replacement cost of auto parts has contributed significantly to the increase in motor vehicle thefts for the purpose of auto parts resale.

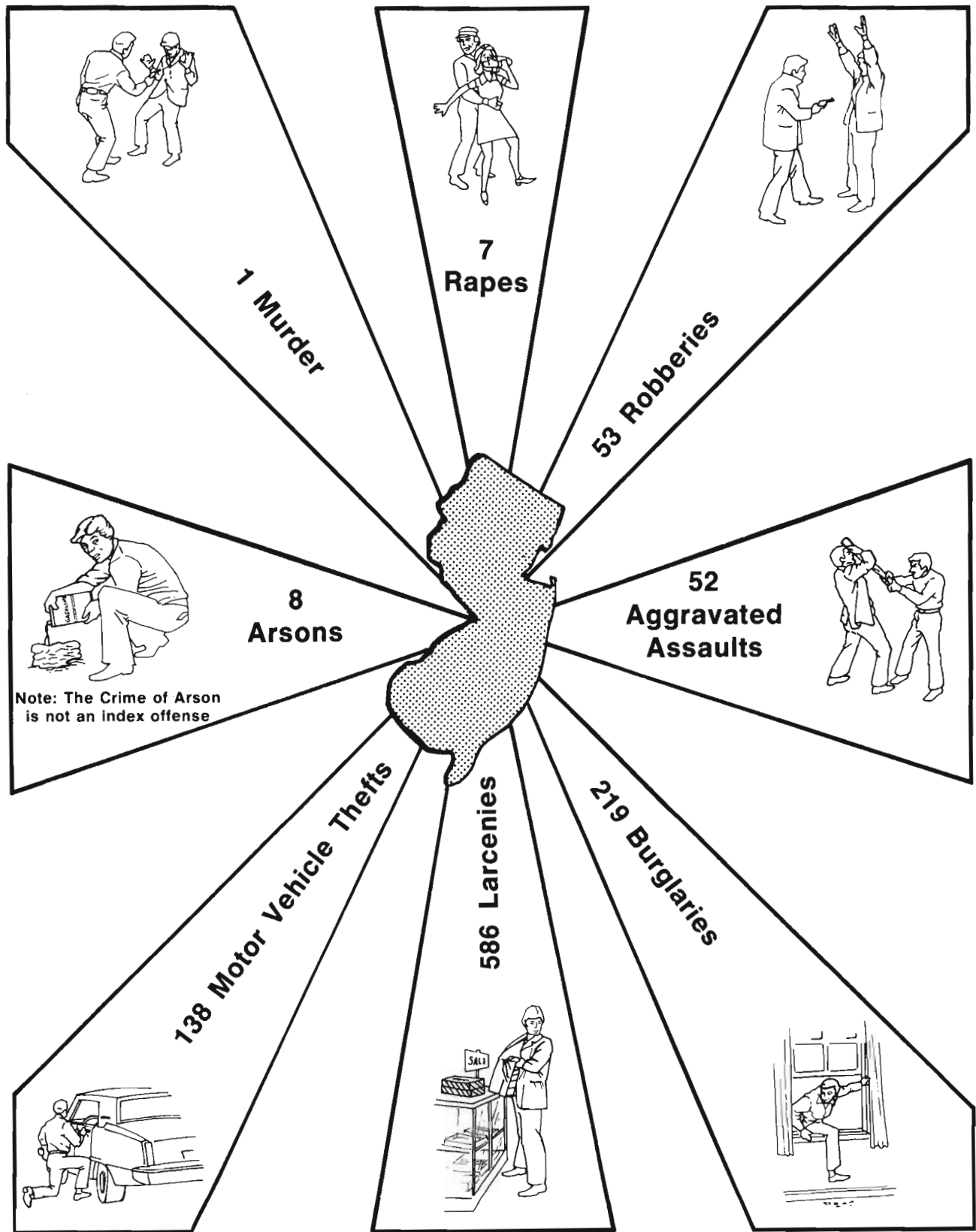

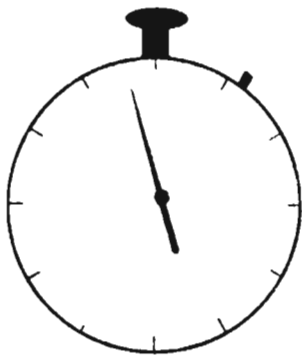

This mode of display should not be taken to imply a regularity in the commission of these offenses; rather, it represents the annual ratio of crime to fixed time intervals.

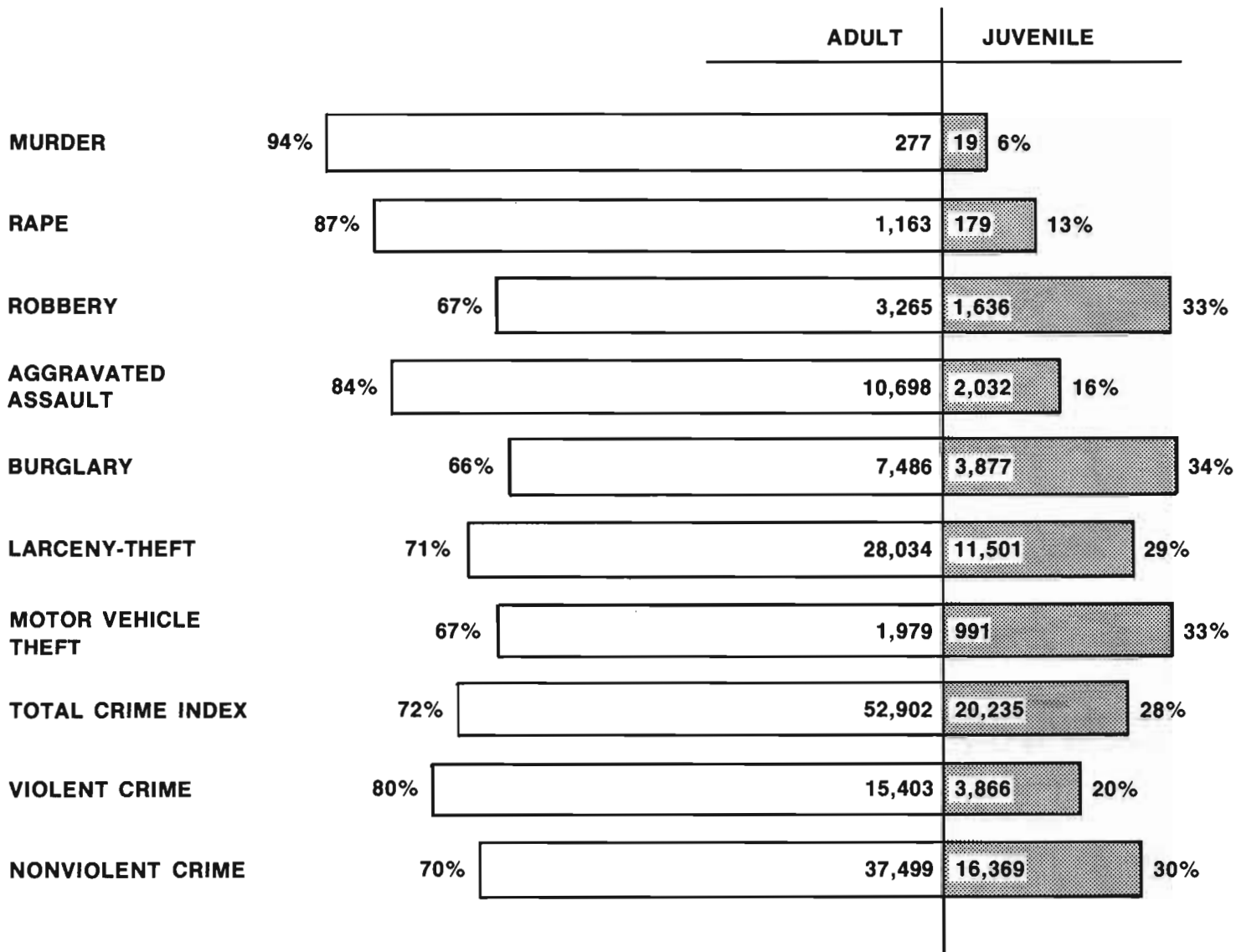

STATEWIDE CRIME SUMMARY—1985

CRIME INDEX—VOLUME/RATE

- There were 385,331 Index offenses reported in 1985, a 6 percent increase compared to 1984.
- The crime rate of the state is 51.3 victims for every 1,000 permanent inhabitants, an increase of 5 percent compared to 1984.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- August with 37,646 offenses reported, recorded the highest incidence of Crime Index offenses while February was the lowest with 25,855 offenses.
- The total value of property stolen amounted to \$419.5 million in 1985, a 17 percent increase from 1984.
- Value of property recovered was \$158.6 million, resulting in a recovery rate of 38 percent.
- Stolen motor vehicles accounted for 58 percent of stolen property and 92 percent of the recovered property value.

CRIME INDEX ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- A total of 76,439 persons were arrested for Index offenses, which represents a 1 percent increase compared to 1984.
- Adult Index arrests increased 1 percent and juvenile arrests decreased 1 percent.
- Crime Index arrests accounted for 21 percent of the total arrests in 1985.
- Males accounted for 80 percent of the Crime Index arrests and females accounted for 20 percent.
- Fifty-three percent of the Index arrests were white and 47 percent were black.
- Hispanics accounted for 11 percent of the arrests for Index offenses.
- Police cleared 19 percent of the Index offenses and juveniles accounted for 28 percent of these clearances.

VIOLENT CRIME SUMMARY

This category consists of the following Index offenses: Murder, Rape, Robbery, Aggravated Assault.

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 41,135 violent crimes reported in 1985; a 4 percent increase compared to the 39,615 violent crimes reported in 1984.
- Violent crimes accounted for 11 percent of the total Crime Index.
- The violent crime rate increased 4 percent to 5.5 victims for every 1,000 permanent inhabitants.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- The highest number of violent crimes were reported in August with 3,841 offenses while the lowest number was reported in February with 2,881.
- The value of property stolen as a result of violent crime was \$9.3 million.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- Arrests for violent crime offenses increased 3 percent to 19,287.
- Violent crime arrests accounted for 25 percent of the Index arrests and 5 percent of the total arrests during the year.
- Adults arrests for violent crime increased 3 percent while juvenile arrests show no significant change when compared to 1984.
- Adults accounted for 71 percent of the violent crime arrests while the remaining 29 percent were juveniles.
- Males were responsible for 89 percent and females for 11 percent of the violent crime arrests.
- Forty-two percent of those arrested were white, 57 percent were black, and less than one half of one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 13 percent of the arrests.
- Forty-seven percent of all violent crimes were cleared and juveniles accounted for 20 percent of these clearances.

NONVIOLENT CRIME SUMMARY

This category consists of the following Index offenses: Burglary, Larceny-theft, Motor Vehicle Theft.

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 344,196 nonviolent crimes reported in 1985, a 6 percent increase compared to the 324,783 reported in 1984.
- Nonviolent crime accounted for 89 percent of the total Crime Index.
- The nonviolent crime rate increased 5 percent to 45.8 victims per 1,000 inhabitants in 1985.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- The largest number of nonviolent crimes were reported in August with 33,805 while the lowest number was reported in February with 22,974.
- The total value of property stolen as a result of nonviolent crime amounted to \$410.1 million.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- There were 57,152 nonviolent crime arrests, this represents no significant change when compared to 1984.
- Nonviolent crime arrests accounted for 75 percent of the Index arrests and 15 percent of the total arrests during 1985.
- Juveniles were responsible for 39 percent of the nonviolent crime arrests and adults 61 percent.
- Adult nonviolent crime arrests increased 1 percent while juvenile arrests decreased 1 percent.
- Males represented 77 percent and females 23 percent of persons arrested for the nonviolent crime.
- Fifty-six percent of all persons arrested for nonviolent crimes were white and 43 percent were black.
- Hispanics accounted for 11 percent of the arrests.
- Sixteen percent of all nonviolent crimes reported were cleared in 1985 and juveniles accounted for 30 percent of these clearances.

TOTAL ARREST SUMMARY

- There were 370,417 persons arrested in 1985 which represents a 3 percent increase compared to 1984.
- The arrest rate for 1985 increased 2 percent to 49.2 persons arrested per every 1,000 inhabitants.
- Adults arrests increased 4 percent to 272,434 and juvenile arrests increased 1 percent to 97,983 in 1985.
- Adults accounted for 74 percent and juveniles 26 percent of the total state arrests.
- Persons under 21 years of age accounted for 46 percent of all arrests.
- Males accounted for 83 percent and females 17 percent of the total persons arrested during the year.
- Sixty-seven percent of the total persons arrested in 1985 were white and 33 percent were black.
- Hispanics accounted for 10 percent of the arrests.

POLICE OFFICERS KILLED AND ASSAULTED SUMMARY

- There were 4 police officers feloniously killed in the line of duty in 1985.
- One police officer was killed in the line of duty as the result of a motor vehicle accident.
- There were 4,371 police officers assaulted during the performance of duty in 1985.

CRIME IN NEW JERSEY, UNITED STATES AND THE NORTHEAST REGION

- The Crime Index in New Jersey increased 6 percent, while the Northeastern States increased 2 percent and the United States increased 4 percent.
- Violent crime in New Jersey increased 4 percent, while the Northeastern States increased 3 percent and the United States increased 5 percent.
- Nonviolent crime in New Jersey increased 6 percent, while the Northeastern States increased 1 percent and the United States increased 4 percent.

MURDER

DEFINITION

Murder is defined as the unlawful killing of a human being with malice aforethought. Any death due to a fight, argument, quarrel, assault, or commission of a crime is included. This Index offense is counted by police on the basis of their investigation without regard to findings of a court, jury or the decision of a prosecutor. Attempts to kill, and assaults to kill, are scored as aggravated assaults and not as murder. Suicides, accidental deaths, negligent manslaughters, and justifiable homicides are not counted, nor reflected in the murder classification.

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 407 murders reported to law enforcement agencies of the state in 1985, a 1 percent increase compared to the 402 murders reported in 1984.
- Murders accounted for one-tenth of one percent of the reported Index offenses, and 1 percent of the violent crime.
- The murder rate remained the same at .1 victims per 1,000 inhabitants.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

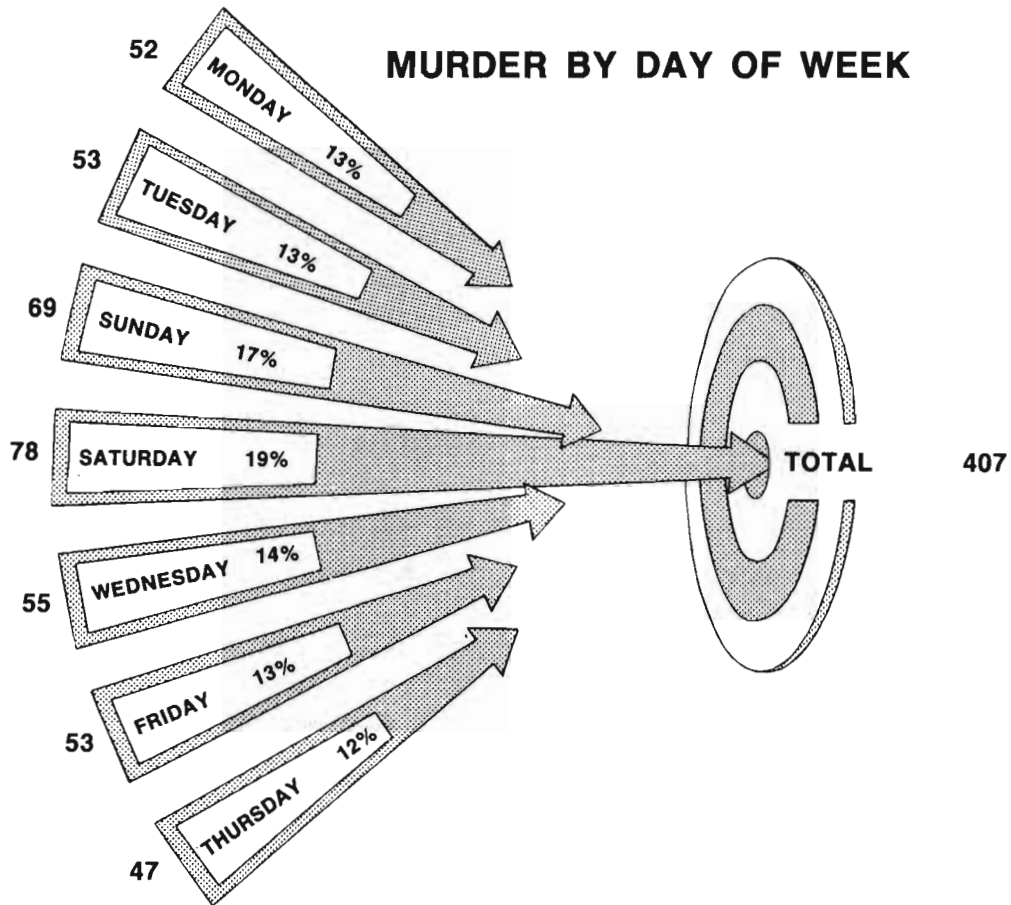
- The age group of 20-29 accounted for 28 percent of all murder victims.
- Firearms were used in 40 percent of the murders where the weapon is known. Knife or cutting instruments accounted for 32 percent, while physical force accounted for 9 percent.
- In murders where the relationship of the victim and offender is known, 53 percent were friends or acquaintances, 23 percent were relatives, and 24 percent were strangers.
- Felony murders accounted for 36 percent of the known murder circumstances. Robbery was the motive in 46 percent of the 100 felony murders.
- Saturday was the highest day of the week for reported murders with 78, while Thursday was the lowest with 47.
- May recorded the highest number of murders, with 43, while June was the lowest with 23.
- Fifty percent of the murders occurred in private residences, 24 percent on highways or streets, and 9 percent in commercial houses.
- The total value of property stolen as a result of murder amounted to \$38,853.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- A total of 326 persons were arrested for murder in 1985, a 2 percent decrease.
- Adult murder arrests decreased 7 percent (from 303 to 283) and juvenile arrests increased 54 percent (from 28 to 43).
- Sixty-four percent of persons arrested for murder were black, and 36 percent were white.
- Hispanics accounted for 15 percent of the arrests.
- Seventy-three percent of the murders were cleared in 1985 (296 out of 407). Juveniles accounted for 6 percent of those cases cleared.
- Males accounted for 90 percent and females 10 percent of those arrested for murder.

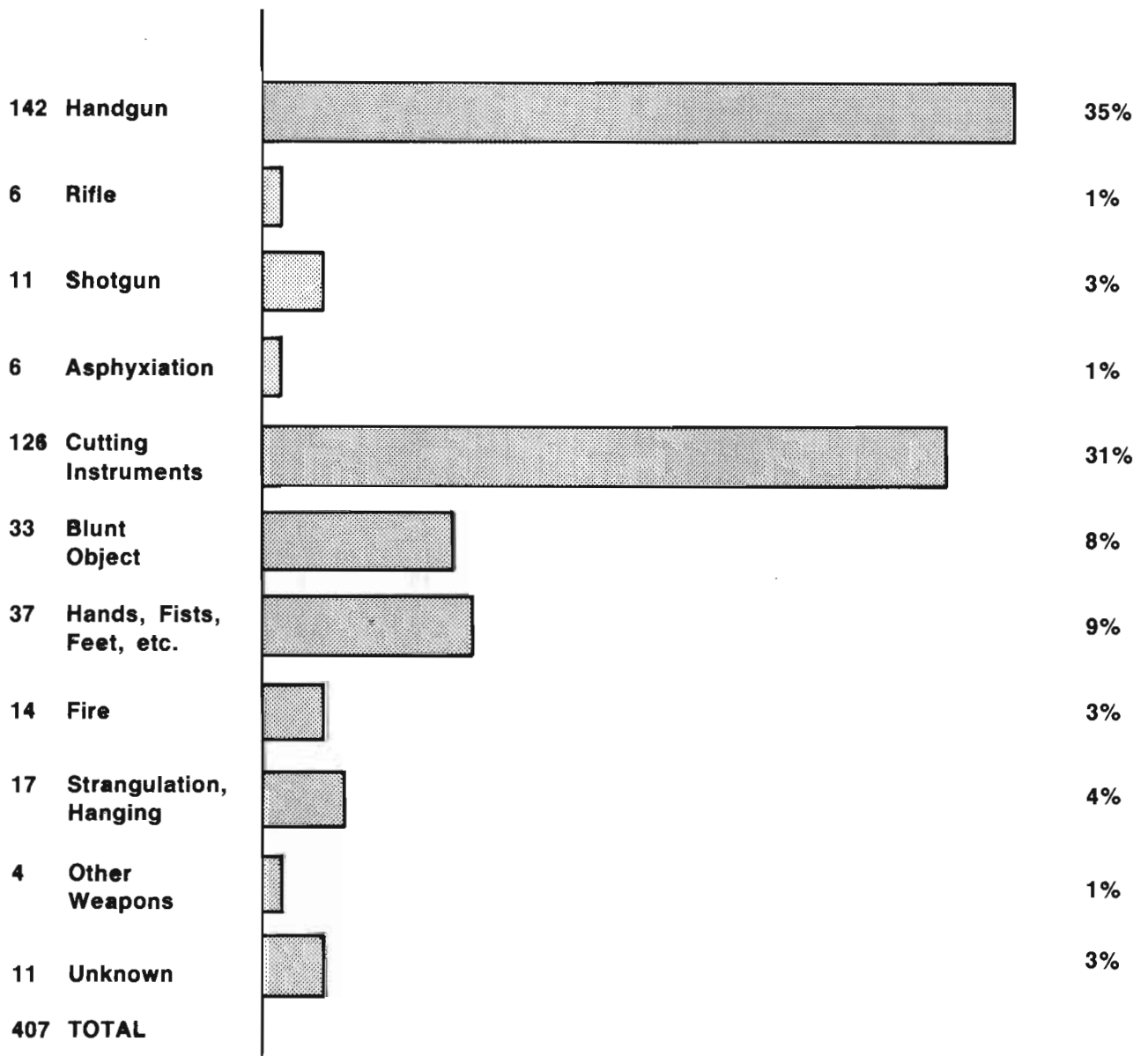

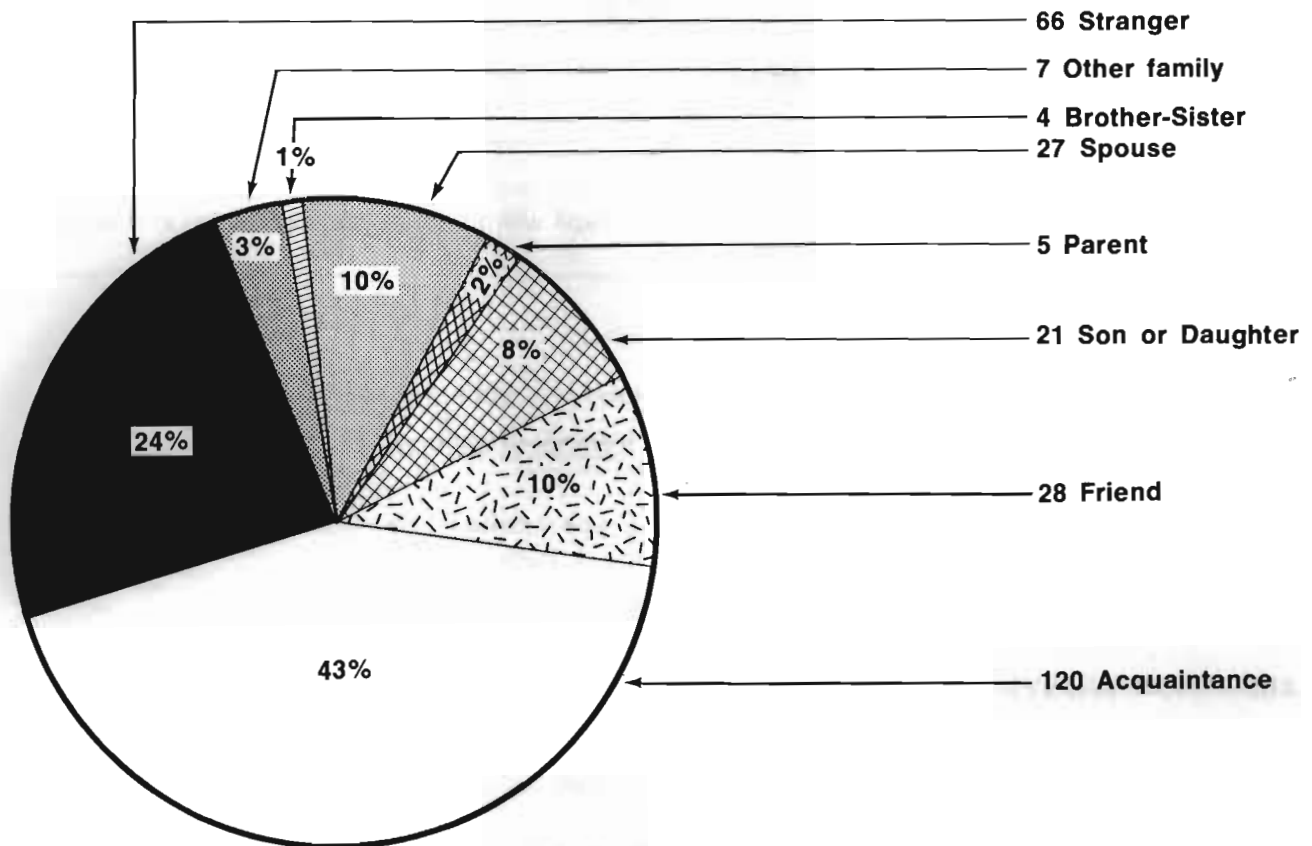

MURDER—Distribution by Type of Weapon



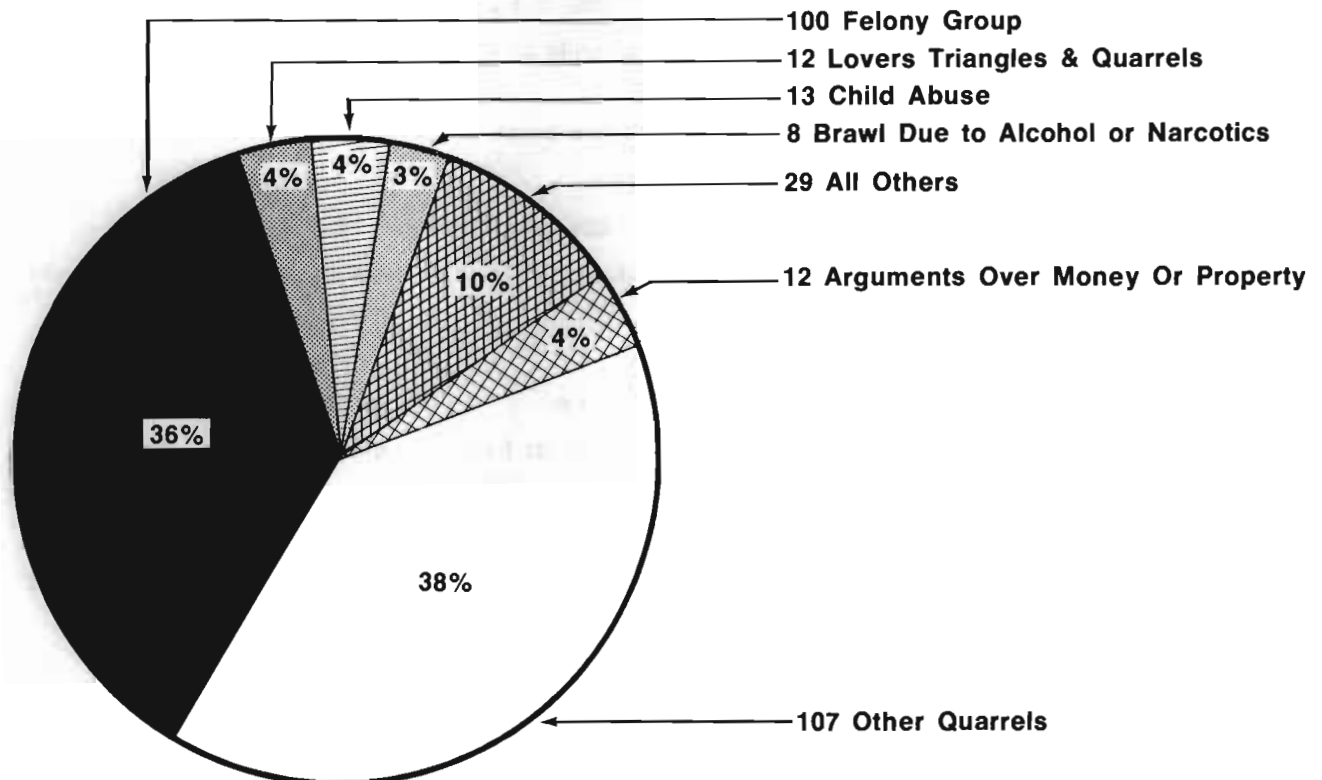

RAPE

Definition

Rape is defined as the carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will. All assaults and attempts to rape are counted, but carnal abuse, rape without force (statutory rape) and other sex offenses are not included.

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 2,424 reported rapes in 1985, a decrease of 1 percent compared to the 2,439 in 1984.
- Rape accounted for six-tenths of one percent of the total Crime Index and 6 percent of all violent crimes.
- For every 1,000 persons in the state, there were .3 rape victims. When calculated on the estimated female population, the rape rate increases to .6 per 1,000 females.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Seventy-nine percent of the rapes were forcible, the remaining 21 percent were attempts to rape.
- The total value of property stolen as a result of rape, amounted to \$44,491.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- A total of 1,329 persons were arrested during 1985, a 4 percent decrease compared to 1984.
- Adult rape arrests decreased 1 percent, while juvenile arrests decreased 12 percent compared to 1984.
- Fifty-nine percent of the arrested perpetrators were black, and 41 percent were white.
- Hispanics accounted for 12 percent of the arrests.
- Twenty-five percent of all persons arrested for rape were between 18 and 23.
- Fifty-five percent of all rape cases were solved during 1985. Juveniles accounted for 28 percent of those cases cleared.

ROBBERY

Definition

Robbery is defined as the felonious and forcible taking of the property of another, against his will, by violence or by putting him in fear. The element of personal confrontation is always present in this crime. Under the program, all assaults or attempts to rob are included.

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 19,267 robbery offenses in 1985, a 6 percent increase compared to 18,217 in 1984.
- Robbery accounted for 5 percent of the total Crime Index and 47 percent of all violent crime.
- The robbery rate was 2.6 victims per 1,000 population.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Highway robberies accounted for 76 percent of all reported robberies.
- Banks and gas station robberies increased 62 and 21 percent respectively.
- Total value of property stolen during robberies amounted to \$9,239,859.

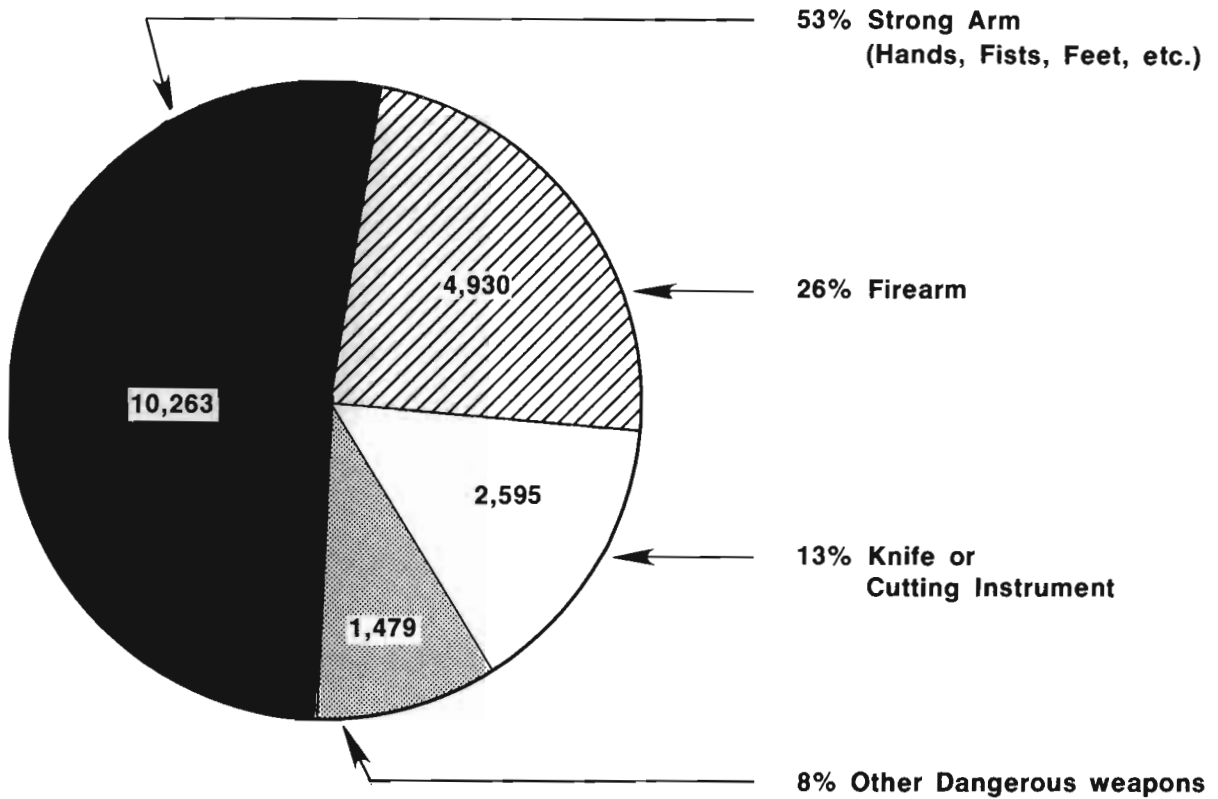

AGGRAVATED ASSAULT

Definition

Aggravated assault, as defined under the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting System, is an attempt or offer, with unlawful force or violence, to do serious physical injury to another. Attempts are included since it is not necessary that an injury result when a firearm, knife, or other weapon is used which could result in serious personal injury if the crime was successfully completed.

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 19,037 aggravated assaults reported during 1985, an increase of 3 percent when compared to 1984.
- Aggravated assaults accounted for 5 percent of the Crime Index and 46 percent of all violent crimes.
- The rate for aggravated assault remained the same, 2.5 victims per 1,000 population.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Physical force (i.e. hands, fists, and feet) was used in 31 percent, and other dangerous weapons (i.e. clubs, bricks, tire irons, etc.) were used in 30 percent of all reported aggravated assaults.
- Aggravated assaults, committed with a firearm, increased 7 percent compared to 1984.

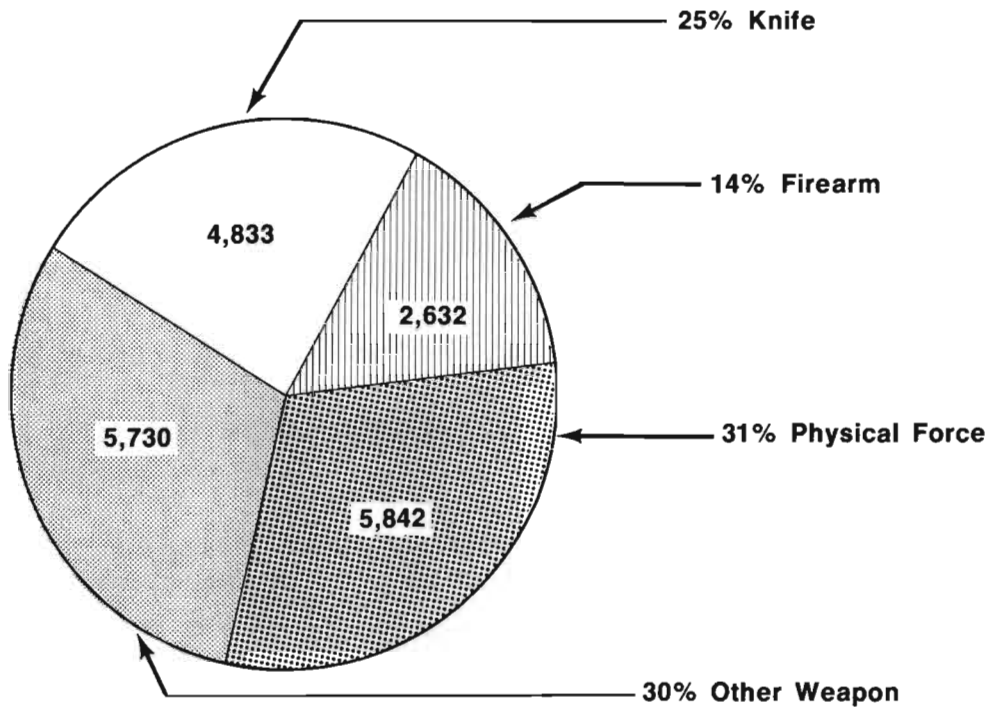

BURGLARY

Definition

Under this program, burglary is defined as an unlawful entry or attempted entry of any structure to commit a felony or larceny. Data collection for this offense is further categorized as forcible entry, unlawful entry (where no force is used) and attempted forcible entry.

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 79,981 burglary offenses reported in 1985, an increase of less than one half of one percent.
- Burglary accounted for 21 percent of the total Crime Index and 23 percent of all nonviolent crime.
- The burglary rate per 1,000 population decreased 1 percent to 10.6 in 1985.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- During 1985, 72 percent of all burglaries involved forcible entry, 16 percent were unlawful entry where no force was used, and the remaining 12 percent were attempts to forcibly enter.
- Residences were targets in 66 percent of the reported burglaries.
- Sixty-four percent of the nonresidential burglaries, where a time could be established, occurred at night.
- Stolen property value as a result of burglary statewide, amounted to \$73 million, for an average loss of \$913.
- The average loss as a result of a residential burglary was \$928, while nonresidential burglary loss was \$883.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- Burglary arrests decreased 1 percent in 1985 with 12,499 persons arrested.
- There was no significant change in adult arrests, while juvenile arrests decreased 2 percent.
- Males accounted for 95 percent and females 5 percent of the burglary arrests.
- Juveniles accounted for 48 percent of all burglary arrests.
- Sixty percent of burglary arrests were white, and 40 percent were black.
- Hispanics accounted for 13 percent of the arrests.
- Fourteen percent of the burglaries statewide, were cleared and juveniles accounted for 34 percent of these clearances.

LARCENY-THEFT

Definition

The definition of larceny-theft, as provided under this program, is the taking of the property of another with intent to deprive him of ownership. All larcenies and thefts resulting from pocketpicking, purse-snatching, shoplifting, larcenies from motor vehicles, thefts of motor vehicle parts and accessories, bicycle thefts, etc., are included here. Embezzlement, unlawful conversions, larceny by bailee, frauds or bad checks are not included.

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 213,983 larcenies reported in 1985, a 6 percent increase compared to the 201,807 in 1984.
- Larceny accounted for 56 percent of the total Crime Index and 62 percent of all nonviolent crime.
- The larceny victimization rate increased 6 percent to 28.5 victims for every 1,000 population in 1985.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Thefts of motor vehicle parts and accessories and thefts from motor vehicles, collectively accounted for 37 percent of all larceny-thefts reported.
- Pocket-picking increased 43 percent in 1985 compared to 1984.
- All classifications, except purse snatching, increased compared to 1984 figures.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- Larceny-theft arrests decreased 1 percent in 1985, with 41,796 persons arrested.
- Juvenile arrests decreased 3 percent and adult arrests showed no significant change compared to 1984.
- Males accounted for 71 percent and females 29 percent of the arrests.
- Fifty-five percent of all persons arrested for larceny were white, 44 percent were black.
- Hispanics accounted for 10 percent of the arrests.

MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT

Definition

In Uniform Crime Reporting, motor vehicle theft includes all thefts and attempted thefts of a motor vehicle. This includes the theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle which is defined as a self-propelled vehicle that runs on the surface and not on the rails. This definition excludes taking a motor vehicle for temporary use, such as family situation, or unauthorized use by others having lawful access to the vehicle. The motor vehicle theft category includes the subheadings of autos, trucks and buses, and other vehicles (motorcycles, mo-peds, etc.)

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 50,232 motor vehicle thefts reported in 1985, a 16 percent increase compared to the 43,127 reported in 1984.
- Motor vehicle thefts accounted for 13 percent of the total Crime Index and 15 percent of the nonviolent crime.
- The motor vehicle theft rate of 67 victims per 1,000 population represents a 16 percent increase compared to 1984.

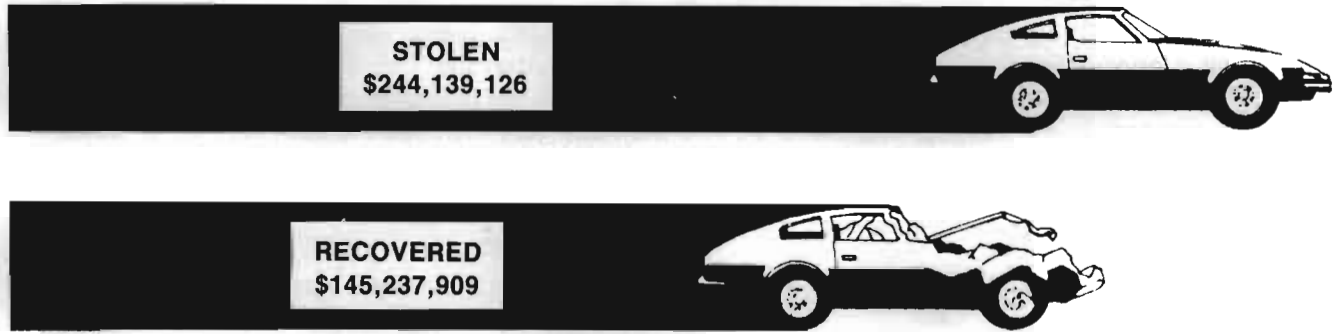

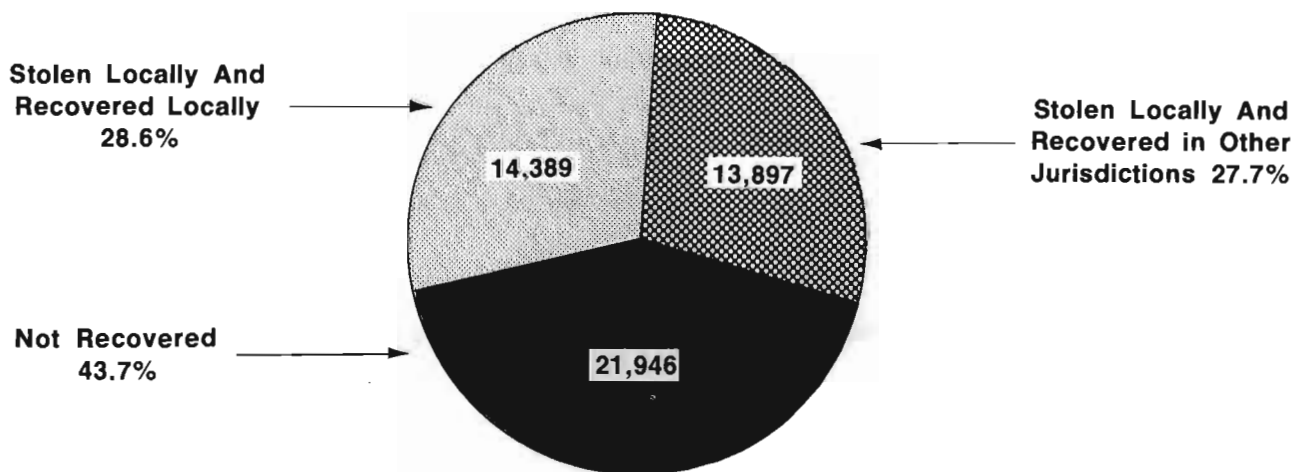

ARSON

Definition

Arson is defined by the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting program as any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property of another, etc.

Only fires determined through investigation to have been willfully or maliciously set are classified as arsons. Fires of suspicious or unknown origins are excluded.

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 2,819 reportable arsons in 1985, which represents a 2 percent decrease compared to 2,881 in 1984.
- The arson rate remained the same, 0.4 victims per 1,000 population.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Fifty-six percent of the arsons were structures, with residences accounting for 59 percent.
- Mobile property including motor vehicles, accounted for 31 percent of the arsons in the state.
- Other property (timber, crops, etc.) accounted for 13 percent of the reported arsons.
- The total value of property damage due to arson, amounted to \$423 million for an average dollar value loss of \$149,881.
- The average residential loss was \$11,167 while the average loss to industrial/commercial structures was \$1,682,593.
- The average motor vehicle loss was \$3,185.
- There was one industrial arson with over \$400 million property damage.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- Arson arrests numbered 732 in 1985, representing a decrease of 5 percent when compared to 1984.
- Adult arrests increased 1 percent, while juvenile arrests decreased 12 percent.
- Males accounted for 88 percent and females 12 percent of the arson arrests in 1985.
- Juveniles accounted for 42 percent of the arson arrests.
- Seventy-one percent of the persons arrested for arson were white, 28 percent were black.
- Hispanics accounted for 11 percent of the arrests.
- The arson clearance rate was 23 percent, and juveniles accounted for 35 percent of the clearances.

ARREST SUMMARY FOR NON-INDEX OFFENSES

MANSLAUGHTER

Definition

The unlawful killing of a human being, by another, through gross negligence. Arrests relating to traffic fatalities are included.

- There were 39 arrests reported by law enforcement agencies of the state for manslaughter during the year. This represents an 11 percent increase compared to 1984.
- Adults accounted for 79 percent and juveniles accounted for 21 percent of the arrests.
- Males accounted for 87 percent of the arrests and females 13 percent.
- Sixty-seven percent of the persons arrested were white, 33 percent were black.
- The Hispanic ethnic origin accounted for 5 percent of the arrests.

SIMPLE ASSAULT

Definition

Simple assault, as defined under the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting System, is an assault or an attempted assault where no weapon is used and which does not result in serious or aggravated injury to the victim.

- There were 33,072 simple assault arrests in 1985, representing a 2 percent increase when compared to 1984.
- Of the total, 26 percent were juveniles and 74 percent were adults.
- Males accounted for 82 percent and females 18 percent of the persons arrested for simple assault.
- Sixty-four percent of the persons arrested were white, 35 percent were black, and less than one half of one percent were other races.
- Nine percent of the persons arrested were Hispanic.

ARSON

Definition

Under this program, arson is defined as the willful or malicious burning, or attempting to burn, with or without intent to defraud; a dwelling house, building, ship or vessel, motor vehicle or aircraft, contents of building, personal property of another, etc.

- There were 732 arrests reported for arson offenses, a 5 percent decrease compared to 1984.
- Juveniles accounted for 42 percent and adults 58 percent of persons arrested for arson.
- Eighty-eight percent of the total arson arrests were males while 12 percent were females.
- Seventy-one percent of the persons arrested were white, 28 percent were black, and 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 11 percent of those arrested.

FORGERY AND COUNTERFEITING

Definition

The definition of forgery and counterfeiting is the making, altering, uttering or possessing or attempting to make, alter, utter or possess, with intent to defraud, anything false which is made to appear true.

- There were 1,245 arrests reported by the law enforcement agencies of the state for forgery or counterfeiting during the year. This represents a 2 percent decrease compared to 1984.
- Adults accounted for 91 percent and juveniles accounted for 9 percent of the arrests.
- Males accounted for 72 percent of the arrests and females 28 percent.
- Sixty-six percent of the persons arrested were white, 33 percent were black, and less than one half of one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 6 percent of the arrests.

FRAUD

Definition

In Uniform Crime Reporting, fraud is the fraudulent conversion and obtaining money or property by false pretenses. This includes bad checks, confidence games, etc., except forgeries and counterfeiting.

- There were 7,368 arrests reported during the year for fraud, a 2 percent increase compared to 1984.
- Adult arrests represented 95 percent and juveniles 5 percent of the persons arrested.
- Males accounted for 56 percent and females 44 percent of the persons arrested for fraud.
- Sixty-nine percent of the persons arrested were white, 30 percent were black, and one percent were other races.
- Five percent of the persons arrested were Hispanic.

EMBEZZLEMENT

Definition

The definition of embezzlement is the misappropriation or misapplication of money or property entrusted to one's care, custody or control.

- There were 104 persons arrested for embezzlement, a 22 percent decrease compared to 1984.
- Ninety-two percent of those persons arrested were adults and 8 percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 61 percent and females 39 percent of the persons arrested for embezzlement.
- Sixty-six percent of the persons arrested were white, 32 percent were black, and 2 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 8 percent of those arrested.

STOLEN PROPERTY (Buying, Receiving, Possessing)

Definition

Included in this class are all offenses of buying, receiving, and possessing stolen property, as well as all attempts to commit any of these offenses.

- In 1985, there were 9,829 arrests reported for stolen property, an increase of 12 percent compared to 1984.
- Of the total, 63 percent were adults and 37 percent were juveniles.
- Eighty-nine percent were males and 11 percent were females.
- Fifty percent of the persons arrested were white, 49 percent were black, and less than one half of one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 15 percent of the arrests.

CRIMINAL/MALICIOUS MISCHIEF

Definition

Criminal/malicious mischief is defined as the willful destruction, injury, disfigurement, or defacement of property without consent of the owner or persons having custody or control.

- There were 14,171 arrests for criminal/malicious mischief; no significant change when compared to 1984.
- Juveniles accounted for 61 percent and adults 39 percent of persons arrested for criminal/malicious mischief.
- Males accounted for 91 percent and females 9 percent of the arrests.
- Seventy-five percent of the persons arrested were white, 24 percent were black, and 1 percent were other races.
- Nine percent of the persons arrested were Hispanic.

WEAPONS: CARRYING, POSSESSING, etc.

Definition

Under the program, this offense includes all the violations of regulations or statutes controlling the carrying, using, possessing, furnishing, and manufacturing of deadly weapons or silencers, and attempts.

- There were 7,876 arrests reported for weapon offenses; a 5 percent decrease compared to 1984.
- Of the total, 72 percent were adults and 28 percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 94 percent and females 6 percent of those arrested.
- Sixty-two percent of those arrested were white, 37 percent were black, and 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 14 percent of those arrested.

PROSTITUTION AND COMMERCIALIZED VICE

Definition

Prostitution and commercialized vice are sex offenses of a commercialized nature and attempts. Included in this category are prostitution, keeping a bawdy house, procuring or transporting women for immoral purposes, etc.

- There were 2,385 arrests reported for prostitution and commercialized vice during 1985, representing an increase of 29 percent when compared to 1984.
- Ninety-seven percent of the arrests were adults with the remaining 3 percent being juveniles.
- Females accounted for 76 percent and males 24 percent of the arrests.
- Sixty-three percent of those arrested were black, 36 percent were white, and 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 6 percent of the arrests.

SEX OFFENSES

Definition

Sex offenses, as defined under the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting Program, do not include rape, prostitution and commercialized vice. Included in this class are offenses against chastity, common decency, morals, and the like; attempts are also included.

- There were 2,360 sex offense arrests during 1985, representing a decrease of 6 percent when compared to 1984.
- Adults accounted for 77 percent, and juveniles 23 percent of the arrests.
- Ninety-six percent were males and 4 percent were females.
- Seventy percent of the persons arrested were white, 29 percent were black, and 1 percent were other races.
- Ten percent of the persons arrested were Hispanic.

DRUG ABUSE VIOLATIONS

Definition

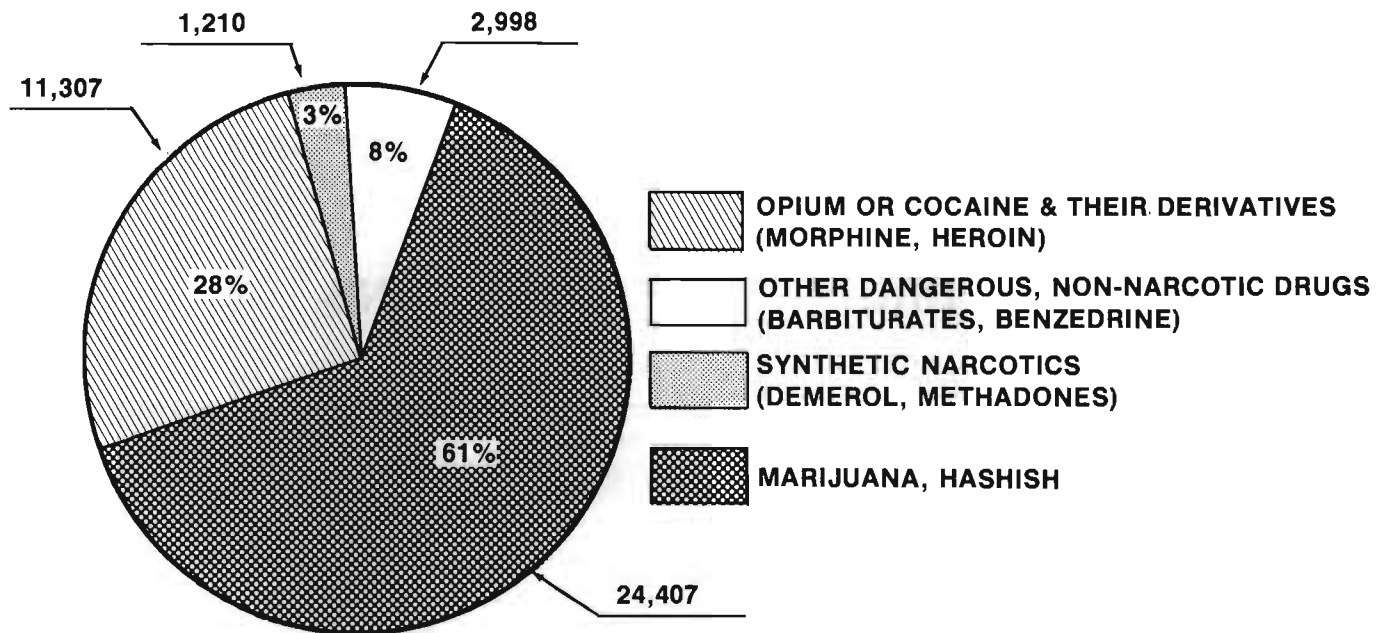
Under the program, drug abuse violations are defined as the unlawful sale/manufacturing, possession/use of the below listed narcotics and drugs:

- a. Opium or Cocaine and their derivatives (morphine, heroin, codeine).
- b. Marijuana, hashish, etc.
- c. Synthetic narcotics—manufactured narcotics which can cause true drug addiction—(demerol, methadones).
- d. Other—dangerous non-narcotic drugs (barbiturates, amphetamines, hallucinogens).





- There were 39,922 arrests reported by the law enforcement agencies of the state for drug abuse violations; no significant change compared to 1984.
- Adults accounted for 84 percent and juveniles 16 percent of the arrests.

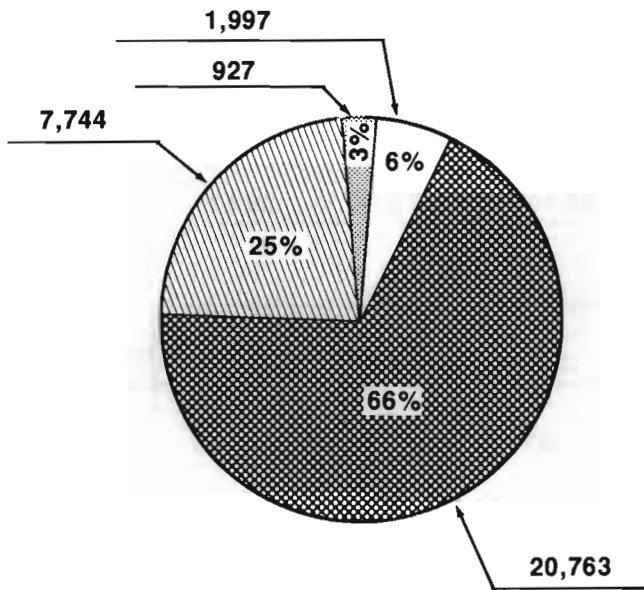
- Fifty-seven percent of persons arrested for drug abuse violations were between the ages of 16 to 24.
- Males accounted for 88 percent of the arrests while females accounted for the remaining 12 percent.
- Sixty-three percent of the persons arrested were white, 36 percent were black, and less than one half of one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 14 percent of those arrested.
- Arrests for possession/use of drugs accounted for 79 percent of the arrests, and the remaining 21 percent were for the sale/manufacturing of drugs.
- Arrests for marijuana/hashish represented 66 percent of the possession/use category and 43 percent of the sale/manufacturing category. Overall, they accounted for 61 percent of the total drug abuse violation arrests.

TOTAL ARRESTS 39,922**



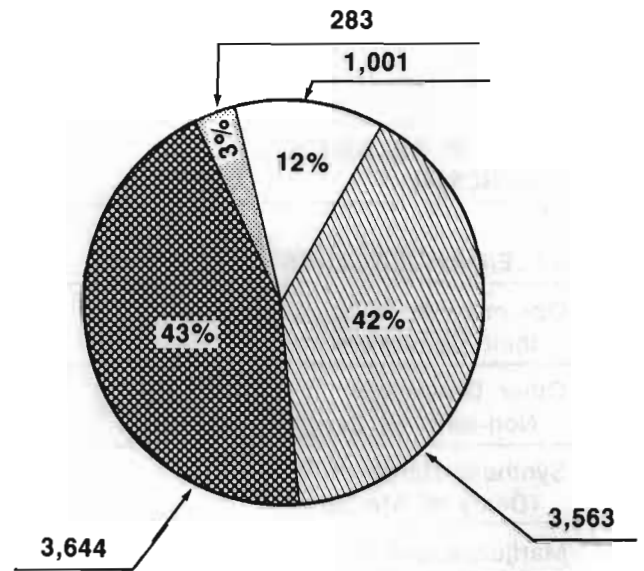

GAMBLING

Definition

Gambling violations are defined as the promoting, permitting, or engaging in illegal gambling.

- There were 555 gambling arrests reported during 1985, resulting in no significant change when compared to 1984.
- Ninety-eight percent of the arrests were adults and 2 percent were juveniles.
- Males represented 86 percent and females 14 percent of the gambling arrests.
- Seventy-three percent of the persons arrested were white, 26 percent were black, and less than one half of one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 35 percent of the arrested.

OFFENSES AGAINST FAMILY AND CHILDREN

Definition

The definition of offenses against family and children, is the nonsupport, neglect, desertion, or abuse of family and children.

- There were 5,940 arrests for offenses against family and children during 1985, representing an increase of 5 percent from the previous year.
- One percent of the arrests were juveniles, and 99 percent were adults.
- Males accounted for 93 percent and females 7 percent of the arrests.
- Fifty-nine percent of the persons arrested were white, 40 percent were black, and less than one half of one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 8 percent of the arrests.

DRIVING UNDER THE INFLUENCE

Definition

Under the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting Program, the offense of driving under the influence is defined as the driving or operating of any motor vehicle while drunk or under the influence of alcohol or narcotics.

- There were 33,782 arrests reported for driving under the influence in 1985, a decrease of 3 percent compared to 1984.
- Ninety-nine percent of the arrests were adults and only 1 percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 90 percent of the arrests while females accounted for the remaining 10 percent.
- Eighty-six percent of the persons arrested were white, 13 percent were black, and 1 percent were other races.
- Eight percent of the persons arrested were Hispanic.

LIQUOR LAWS

Definition

Included in this category are state or local liquor law violations, with the exception of "driving under the influence."

- There were 16,095 arrests reported for liquor law violations, an increase of 22 percent over the previous year.
- Adults were responsible for 67 percent of the arrests while the remaining 33 percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 83 percent of the liquor law arrests while females accounted for the remaining 17 percent.
- Eighty-five percent of the persons arrested were white, 14 percent were black, and less than one half of one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 5 percent of those arrested.

DISORDERLY CONDUCT

Definition

In this category are placed all charges of committing a breach of the peace (disorderly person).

- There were 41,820 arrests for disorderly conduct in 1985, an increase of 4 percent compared to 1984.
- Seventy-three percent of the arrests were adults while the remaining 27 percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 84 percent and females 16 percent of the disorderly conduct arrests.
- Seventy-three percent of the persons arrested were white, 26 percent were black, and less than one half of one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 9 percent of the arrests.

VAGRANCY

Definition

In this category are persons charged with vagabondage, begging, loitering, etc.

- There were 163 arrests in this category during the year, a 55 percent decrease compared to 1984.
- Juveniles accounted for 24 percent of the arrests while adults accounted for the remaining 76 percent.
- Males represented 82 percent and females 18 percent of the arrests in this category.
- Seventy percent of the persons arrested were white and 30 percent were black.
- Seven percent of the persons arrested were Hispanic.

ALL OTHER OFFENSES

Definition

Included in this category are all violations of state and local laws, except those offenses that can be categorized into one of the specific crime classifications previously mentioned.

- There were 68,334 arrests reported for all other offenses during 1985, a 9 percent increase compared to 1984.
- Adults accounted for 80 percent and juveniles 20 percent of persons arrested for all other offenses.
- Eighty-four percent of the arrests were males while 16 percent were females.
- Sixty-nine percent of the persons arrested were white and 30 percent were black, and less than one half of one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 8 percent of those arrested.

CURFEW AND LOITERING LAW VIOLATIONS

Definition

In this category are juvenile arrests made for violations of local curfew or loitering ordinances.

- There were 1,725 arrests reported for curfew and loitering law violations during the year; this represents a 17 percent decrease compared to 1984.
- Males represented 80 percent and females 20 percent of the arrests.
- Eighty-one percent of the persons arrested were white and 19 percent were black.
- Hispanics accounted for 5 percent of the arrests.

RUNAWAYS

Definition

For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, this category is limited to juveniles taken into protective custody, under provisions of local statutes, as runaways.

- There were 6,461 runaway arrests reported in 1985, a 10 percent increase compared to 1984.
- Females accounted for 59 percent and males accounted for 41 percent of the arrests.
- Seventy-two percent of the persons arrested were white, 27 percent were black, and less than one half of one percent were other races.
- Eight percent of the persons arrested were Hispanic.

- Middlesex County law enforcement agencies reported 23,835 Index offenses during 1985, a 4 percent increase compared to 1984.
- Violent crime increased 6 percent and nonviolent crime increased 3 percent.
- The crime rate of 38.6 victims for every 1,000 inhabitants revealed a 2 percent increase when compared to the previous year.
- Murder increased 46 percent (from 13 in 1984 to 18 in 1985) while burglary decreased 2 percent when compared to the previous year.
- Total stolen property values amounted to \$31.4 million, with 36 percent of this being recovered.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- Total persons arrested, 24,188 in 1985, reflected an increase of 3 percent when compared to the previous year.
- Adult arrests increased 5 percent while juvenile arrests registered no significant change.
- The total clearance rate for index offenses was 20 percent; juveniles were responsible for 30 percent of those cases cleared.

MONMOUTH COUNTY

VOLUME/RATE

- During 1985 there were 20,865 Index crimes reported, representing a 1 percent increase compared to 1984.
- There was an 11 percent increase in violent crime and a 1 percent increase in nonviolent crime.
- A victimization rate of 39.9 persons per 1,000 inhabitants reflected no change from 1984.
- Murder decreased 59 percent (from 22 in 1984 to 9 in 1985) while motor vehicle theft increased 24 percent.
- Stolen property values, as a result of Index offenses, totaled \$16.1 million; of this 29 percent was recovered.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- There were 28,168 persons arrested during the year, reflecting a 4 percent increase when compared to 1984.
- Adult arrests registered a 5 percent increase while juvenile arrests increased 9 percent.
- The total clearance rate for Index offenses was 25 percent; juveniles were responsible for 29 percent of those cases cleared.

MORRIS COUNTY

VOLUME/RATE

- A total of 12,572 Index crimes were reported to the police of Morris County, a 2 percent decrease when compared to 1984.
- There was a 13 percent decrease in violent crime and nonviolent crime decreased 2 percent.
- There were 30.1 victims of Index offenses for every 1,000 persons during 1985, a 3 percent decrease compared to 1984.
- Rape increased 16 percent, motor vehicle theft increased 15 percent, and robbery decreased 18 percent.
- Total stolen property values amounted to \$12.2 million during the year; of this total 21 percent was recovered.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- During the year police of the county made 15,118 arrests; this represents a 4 percent decrease when compared to 1984.
- Adult arrests decreased 1 percent during 1985 while juvenile arrests recorded a 13 percent decrease.
- The total clearance rate for Index offenses was 18 percent; juveniles were responsible for 26 percent of those cases cleared.

OCEAN COUNTY

VOLUME/RATE

- During 1985 there were 16,613 Index crimes reported, an increase of 6 percent compared to the previous year.
- There was an 11 percent increase in violent crime in 1985 while nonviolent crime recorded a 5 percent increase.
- There were 44.7 victims of Index offenses for every 1,000 inhabitants, a 4 percent increase when compared to 1984.
- Murder decreased 46 percent (from 13 in 1984 to 7 in 1985) while aggravated assault increased 17 percent.
- Stolen property values totaled \$11.4 million, with 28 percent of the total being recovered.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- Police of the county made 18,601 arrests during 1985, reflecting a 1 percent increase compared to the previous year.

- There were 36.5 victims of Index offenses for every 1,000 inhabitants of the county, a 2 percent increase when compared to 1984.
- Robbery increased 15 percent and rape decreased 21 percent.
- The dollar loss of stolen property amounted to \$1.4 million; the recovery rate was 35 percent.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- Police arrested 4,197 persons for criminal offenses during the calendar year 1985, a 2 percent increase.
- Adult arrests recorded no significant change while juvenile arrests increased 18 percent.
- The total clearance rate for Index offenses was 24 percent; juveniles were responsible for 23 percent of those cases cleared.

SOMERSET COUNTY

VOLUME/RATE

- During 1985 there were 7,645 Index offenses reported in the county, an increase of 10 percent.
- Violent crime registered an increase of 2 percent while nonviolent crime recorded an increase of 10 percent.
- For every 1,000 inhabitants 36.6 persons were victims of Index offenses, an increase of 9 percent compared to 1984.
- Rape increased 89 percent (from 19 in 1984 to 36 in 1985) and robbery decreased 10 percent.
- The total dollar loss of property stolen amounted to \$6.3 million, with 30 percent of this recovered.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- Police arrested 7,556 persons in 1985, a 1 percent decrease when compared to 1984.

- The county's victimization rate was recorded at 50.4 persons for every 1,000 population, for an increase of 5 percent.
- Murder increased 182 percent (from 11 in 1984 to 31 in 1985) and robbery decreased 18 percent.
- Stolen property value amounted to \$34.4 million, with 47 percent of this being recovered.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- Police of the county arrested 23,230 persons during 1985, an increase of 5 percent compared to 1984.
- Adult arrests registered a 2 percent increase and juvenile arrests increased 11 percent.
- The total clearance rate for Index offenses was 15 percent; juveniles were responsible for 33 percent of those cases cleared.

WARREN COUNTY

VOLUME/RATE

- During the year police of the county reported 2,133 Index crimes, a decrease of 3 percent when compared to 1984.
- Violent crime registered a 3 percent increase while nonviolent crime decreased 3 percent.
- The Index crime rate was 25.0 victims per 1,000 inhabitants, a 3 percent decrease compared to 1984.
- Motor vehicle theft increased 16 percent while larceny decreased 6 percent.
- The dollar loss of stolen property amounted to \$1.8 million, of which 25 percent was recovered.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- There were 4,193 persons arrested during the year, a 6 percent increase when compared to 1984.
- Adult arrests registered a 5 percent increase while juvenile arrests increased 7 percent.
- The total clearance rate for Index offenses was 25 percent; juveniles were responsible for 31 percent of those cases cleared.

CRIME INDEX FOR POPULATION GROUPS—1985

The presentation of crime statistics by population groups was made for the purpose of projecting, for consideration, the relative crime experience of communities of varying populations. Although the individual municipalities within the various groups may be geographically separated, their inclusion into a specific group was predicted by the similarity in population with the other municipalities within the group. Municipalities within the same group may differ widely when all factors are considered, but they do share the common bond of population size. The grouping of communities in this manner allows recognition of variances in the crime volumes, rates and clearances between the established groups.

SECTION VI
CRIME IN THE CITIES

CRIME IN THE CITIES

This section deals with serious crimes reported in the large urban cities of the state. These cities represent 21 percent of the population and historically account for one third of the reported Crime Index of the state.

This analysis involves the latest ten year period (1976-1985) and endeavors to further identify crime trends in these urban areas.

The cities included in this analysis have been categorized as urban municipalities (i.e., densely populated with extensive development) by the New Jersey Department of Community Affairs, Division of State and Regional Planning, Bureau of Statewide Planning.

The criteria used in the selection of these cities were (1) to be classified as urban character and (2) have a population of 50,000 or more inhabitants.

For further comparative analysis, the urban cities were subdivided into two distinct groupings.

Group number one consisted of the state's six largest urban centers with populations of 80,000 or over and is categorized as the "Major Urban."

The second group included the "Major Urban" and the additional urban communities with populations of 50,000 or more inhabitants, and is referred to as the "Urban 15."

Distribution

- Six major urban centers—Camden, Newark, Jersey City, Trenton, Paterson and Elizabeth—collectively represent 13 percent of New Jersey's total population. These same urban centers, during the period 1976 through 1985 accounted for 24 percent of the state's total crime.
- The six centers from 1976 through 1985 accounted for 50 percent of all violent crime and 21 percent of the nonviolent crimes in the entire state.
- The 15 urban municipalities represent 21 percent of the state's total population.
- For the period 1976 through 1985 these 15 urban municipalities accounted for 33 percent of New Jersey's total Index, 60 percent of all violent crime, and 30 percent of the state's nonviolent crime.
- Nearly 7 out of every 10 robberies reported occurred in the "Urban 15" cities during this ten year period.

Percent Change

- During the ten year period (1976-1985), the Crime Index in New Jersey has decreased 3 percent, while the "Urban 15" cities increased 3 percent and the six major urban cities increased 2 percent.
- Violent crime in the state increased 41 percent, the 15 urban cities increased 39 percent and the six major cities increased 33 percent.
- Nonviolent crime in the state decreased 6 percent, the "Urban 15" decreased 3 percent, and the six major cities decreased 4 percent.

STREET CRIME

There has never been a clear-cut definition for street crime within the criminal justice system. The nation's clearing house for the collection and dissemination of criminal statistics, the Federal Bureau of Investigation, has no criteria in the categorization of specific crimes to be designated or defined as "street crimes." More and more this media term has been confused with the violent crime group of murder, rape, robbery, and, aggravated assault.

Although any particular crime can and does occur on the street, this analysis, because of reporting constraints within the Uniform Crime Reporting System, is limited to defining street crimes as those offenses which occur, or are most likely to occur, on streets, highways, parking lots, etc. These crimes include highway robbery, purse-snatching, theft from autos, theft of auto parts and accessories, theft of bicycles, and, motor vehicle thefts. All are crimes against property and only one, highway robbery, falls in the violent crime group.

- During the ten year period 1976-1985, the "Urban 15" cities accounted for 36 percent of the street crimes in the state.
- Three out of every four highway robberies occurred in the "Urban 15" during the ten year period.
- Almost half of all motor vehicle thefts during the survey span occurred in these 15 urban municipalities.
- Fifty-two percent of all purse-snatchings were perpetrated in the "Urban 15" cities.

The accompanying table reflects percent distribution of street crime for the "Urban 15" cities for the years 1976-1985.

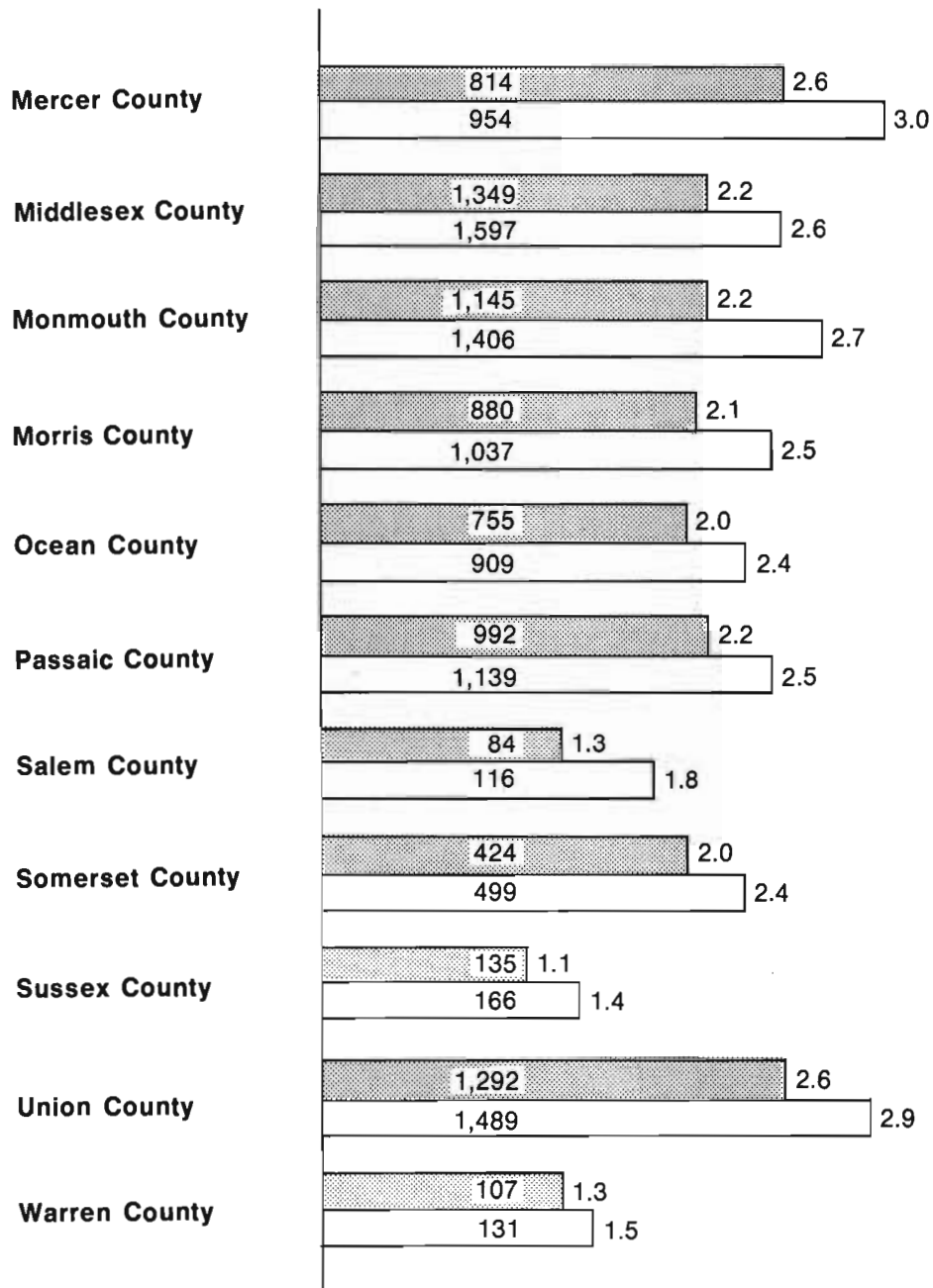
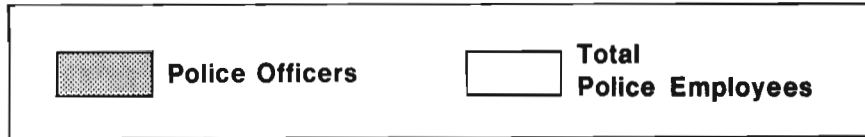

POLICE EMPLOYEE DATA

The Uniform Crime Reporting Program of New Jersey incorporates the collection of pertinent data relating to the police of the state. Information regarding police employee strength, and trends are discussed in this section.

Individual listings of full-time state, county, university and college police departments are shown in tables within this section. Listings of municipal police departments will be found in Section VII.

The determination of police strength for any given area or municipality should be subject for serious consideration. Such consideration, however, should be based on the numerous factors which create the need for police services. For example, the increased need for police service in a municipality which has a highly mobile or seasonal population, differs from a municipality which has a relatively stable population. Some other factors, discussed elsewhere in this publication, relate to size, density of population, geographic location, character, and proximity to metropolitan areas. The tables and charts shown in this section should not be interpreted as recommended strength for any given municipality.

TOTAL POLICE EMPLOYEES

Total police employees are defined as the total number of full-time police officers and civilian police employees (clerks, dispatchers, mechanics, etc.) employed by all law enforcement agencies in the state.

- During 1985, there were 38,739 full time police employees in New Jersey. This represents a 4 percent increase compared to the 37,075 full time police employees in 1984.
- The number of full time police officers increased 3 percent, from 28,153 in 1984 to 28,958 in 1985.
- The number of full time civilian employees increased 10 percent, from 8,922 in 1984 to 9,781 in 1985.
- Seventy-five percent were sworn officers and the remaining 25 percent were civilian employees.

MUNICIPAL POLICE EMPLOYEES

This category consists of the number of police employees, including civilian personnel, employed full time by municipalities of the state.

- During 1985, there were 20,443 municipal police employees, an increase of 3 percent compared to the 19,883 in 1984.
- There were 2.7 municipal police employees for every 1,000 inhabitants of the state; no change since 1976.
- Essex County reported the largest increase in municipal police employees, an increase of 5 percent (126 employees).
- Atlantic County recorded the highest police employee rate; 4.9 per 1,000 population; (this rate is computed on the static population and does not take into account the large influx of seasonal and recreational population.)
- Hunterdon County recorded the lowest police employee rate of 1.3 per 1,000 population.

OTHER POLICE (State Agencies)

In addition to the State Police, there were nine other state agencies reporting to the System. These agencies consist of: Bureau of Forest Service, State Parks Security Services, Department of Corrections, Department of Human Services, Division of Criminal Justice, Division of Fish and Game, Office of Weights and Measures, Palisades Interstate Park and N.J. Transit Police. No rates were computed due to the variations in the types of police service rendered and their statewide jurisdictions.

- Together, these agencies reported a total of 8,084 full-time police employees; an 8 percent increase compared to the 7,471 police employees in 1984.
- There were 4,120 sworn police officers in 1985, a decrease of 1 percent compared to the 4,174 in 1984.
- These agencies reported 3,964 civilian police employees in 1985, representing a 20 percent increase compared to the 3,297 reported in 1984.
- Fifty-one percent were sworn personnel, while the remaining 49 percent were civilians.

MUNICIPAL CIVILIAN POLICE EMPLOYEES

The personnel of each department differ as to the demands and responsibilities placed before them. Many police officers are fully occupied with clerical tasks and are not free to perform active police duties. Employing civilians in police departments to perform clerical duties is in line with the thinking of many police administrators who recommended the use of civilians in this capacity, thus freeing the sworn personnel for actual police related services.

- There were 2,865 municipal civilian police employees in 1985, a decrease of 2 percent compared to the 2,932 in 1984.
- Fourteen percent of all municipal police employees were civilian.

MUNICIPAL POLICE OFFICERS

This includes the number of sworn police officers employed full-time by municipalities of the state. The police employee rate per 1,000 population presented here should not be construed as being recommended ratios. The determination of police strength for any municipality should be based on the numerous factors which create the need for police services. These factors, as crime, vary in type and degree from place to place. Some examples are: seasonal population, geographic location, density and composition of the population.

- There were 17,578 full-time municipal police officers in 1985; this represents a 4 percent increase compared to the 16,951 full-time municipal police officers in 1984.
- The number of full-time municipal police officers was calculated at 2.3 per 1,000 population; no change since 1974.
- Eighty-six percent of all municipal police employees were sworn officers.
- The largest numerical increase occurred in Essex County; an increase of 221 municipal police officers, or 10 percent.
- The largest numerical decrease occurred in Hunterdon County; a decrease of 15 municipal police officers, or 12 percent.
- Atlantic County, with 3.8 police officers per 1,000 inhabitants, recorded the highest rate of full-time municipal police officers. (This rate is computed on the static population, and does not take into account the large influx of seasonal and recreational population.)
- Sussex County recorded the lowest rate of full-time municipal police officers with 1.1 police officers per 1,000 inhabitants.

COUNTY POLICE, SHERIFFS, AND PROSECUTORS

The functions of county law enforcement vary widely throughout the state. The operation of one sheriff's department may be limited exclusively to civil areas and the administration of the county jail, or they may be actively involved in criminal matters throughout the county.

County police departments are varied in their activities as well, in that some are responsible for enforcement throughout the county, while others may have as their primary mission the policing of county parklands. The responsibilities of county prosecutors' officers include criminal investigations, trial preparation, court presentation and special probes. Because of the difference in the types of police service rendered, rates for county law enforcement agencies are not presented here.

- County law enforcement agencies reported a total of 6,327 full-time police employees in 1985; an increase of 6 percent compared to the 5,947 in 1984.
- There were 4,640 full-time sworn police officers employed by county agencies in 1985. This represents an increase of 4 percent compared to the 4,447 in 1984.
- The county police agencies reported 1,687 civilian police employees in 1985; a 12 percent decrease compared to the 1,500 in 1984.
- Seventy-three percent were sworn personnel while the remaining 27 percent were civilians.

STATE POLICE

The State Police total includes personnel from the Marine Police, Alcoholic Beverage Control Enforcement Bureau, and Capital Police. The breakdown for each bureau is depicted on the State Police Personnel chart.

The New Jersey State Police is empowered to provide all phases of law enforcement throughout the state. It also renders, upon request, police services to all the law enforcement agencies in the state. No rates are used due to the variations in the nature and extent of the police services performed by the State Police.

- The New Jersey State Police reported 3,315 full-time police employees; an increase of 3 percent compared to the 3,233 in 1984.
- There were 2,315 State Police officers in 1985; an increase of 1 percent compared to the 2,293 in 1984.
- The State Police reported 1,000 civilian employees in 1985; an increase of 6 percent compared to the 940 in 1984.
- Seventy percent of the total State Police employees were sworn personnel, while the remaining 30 percent were civilians.

POLICE OFFICERS KILLED AND ASSAULTED

The killing or assault of a police officer has a deleterious effect on society that reaches far beyond the overt act. Such occurrences constitute an immediate threat to the well-being of the community and serious breach of the internal security of the country. Today a young man who considers a career in law enforcement must also consider the very strong possibility of being killed or assaulted by a member of the very same society he is sworn to protect. This deplorable situation should be a subject of serious public concern, for in truth, an attack on a police officer is an attack on society. The violence directed against law enforcement officers acting in the line of duty is clearly demonstrated by the following information.

POLICE FELONIOUSLY KILLED

VOLUME/TREND

- In 1985, four New Jersey police officers were feloniously killed while in the performance of their duty. All four murders were cleared.
- On March 14, 1985, a Plainfield plainclothes police officer, while assigned to a robbery task force, accompanied by another police officer, came upon a suspect who fit a radio broadcast of a person wanted for a previously reported shooting. While detaining said suspect the officer was overpowered by him. For no apparent reason, the suspect shot and killed the officer with her own .38 caliber service revolver. The suspect was then shot and killed by other police personnel at the scene. This is the first New Jersey female police officer killed while in the line of duty.
- On August 28, 1985, a plainclothes state police detective, accompanied by several state and municipal police personnel, was in the process of executing a search warrant during a raid involving a narcotics investigation. Upon entering the premises, the state trooper was shot and fatally wounded by a single shotgun blast. The assailant was apprehended.
- On November 26, 1985, two Essex County Sheriff's officers were off duty at a local tavern in the City of Newark when three subjects armed with handguns entered and announced a robbery. The two men identified themselves as police officers and exchanged gun shots with the robbery subjects. The two officers were shot; one was fatally wounded and the second officer remained in critical condition until his death on December 18, 1985. The three subjects were apprehended shortly after the incident.

ASSAULTS ON POLICE OFFICERS

Police assault statistics are important to the police administrator who attempts to identify the causative factors of this type of criminal activity. Many factors contribute to police assaults, and circumstances vary from place to place, it is therefore extremely difficult to identify specific reasons for these assaults. The following information illustrates the frequency of these events, and any attempt at analysis of these assaults should include consideration of the unique variables present in each jurisdiction. Due to the broad field of services performed by many state and county police agencies, no assault rates are computed for total police officers.

VOLUME/TREND

- There were 4,371 police officers assaulted in 1985, no significant change compared to the 4,381 in 1984.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Twenty-seven percent (1,159) of the officers assaulted, sustained injury.
- Personal weapons, such as hands, fists and feet were used in 91 percent of all police assaults.
- Twenty-nine percent of police assaults occurred when officers responded to disturbance calls.
- Thirty-one percent of the assaults on police officers occurred during the four hour period of 8:00 p.m. to 12:00 midnight.

CLEARANCES

- The police of New Jersey were successful in clearing 99 percent of the assaults directed at them.

ASSAULTS ON MUNICIPAL POLICE OFFICERS

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 3,751 municipal police officers assaulted during 1985, a 1 percent decrease compared to the 3,795 assaulted in 1984.
- The assault rate, for every 100 municipal officers, was 21.6; a 4 percent decrease compared to 1984.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Twenty-six percent of the municipal officers assaulted, sustained injury.
- Personal weapons, such as hands, fists and feet were used in 91 percent of all municipal police assaults.
- Thirty-three percent of municipal police assaults occurred when officers responded to disturbance calls.
- Attempting Other Arrests accounted for 22 percent of municipal police assaults.

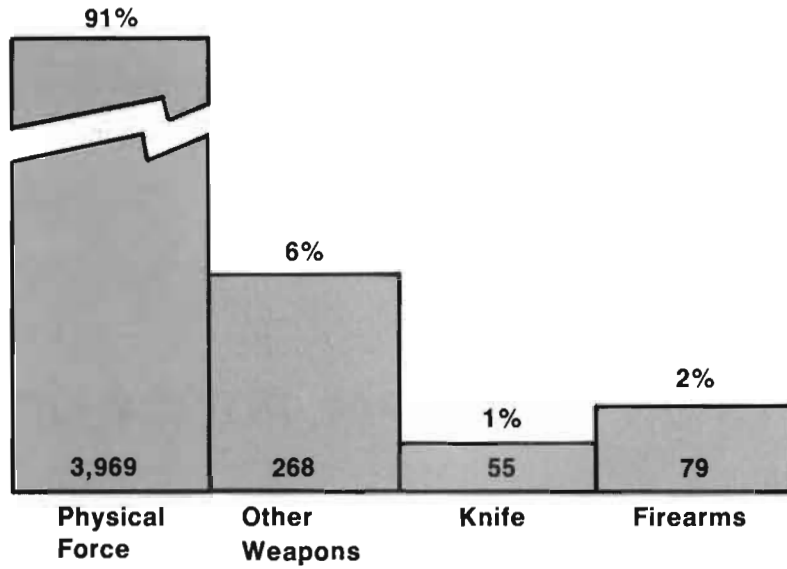
OTHER POLICE OFFICERS ASSAULTED

The following law enforcement agencies are dealt with separately and, are not included when computing municipal assault rates; the services performed by these agencies vary greatly from the functions of municipal police agencies.

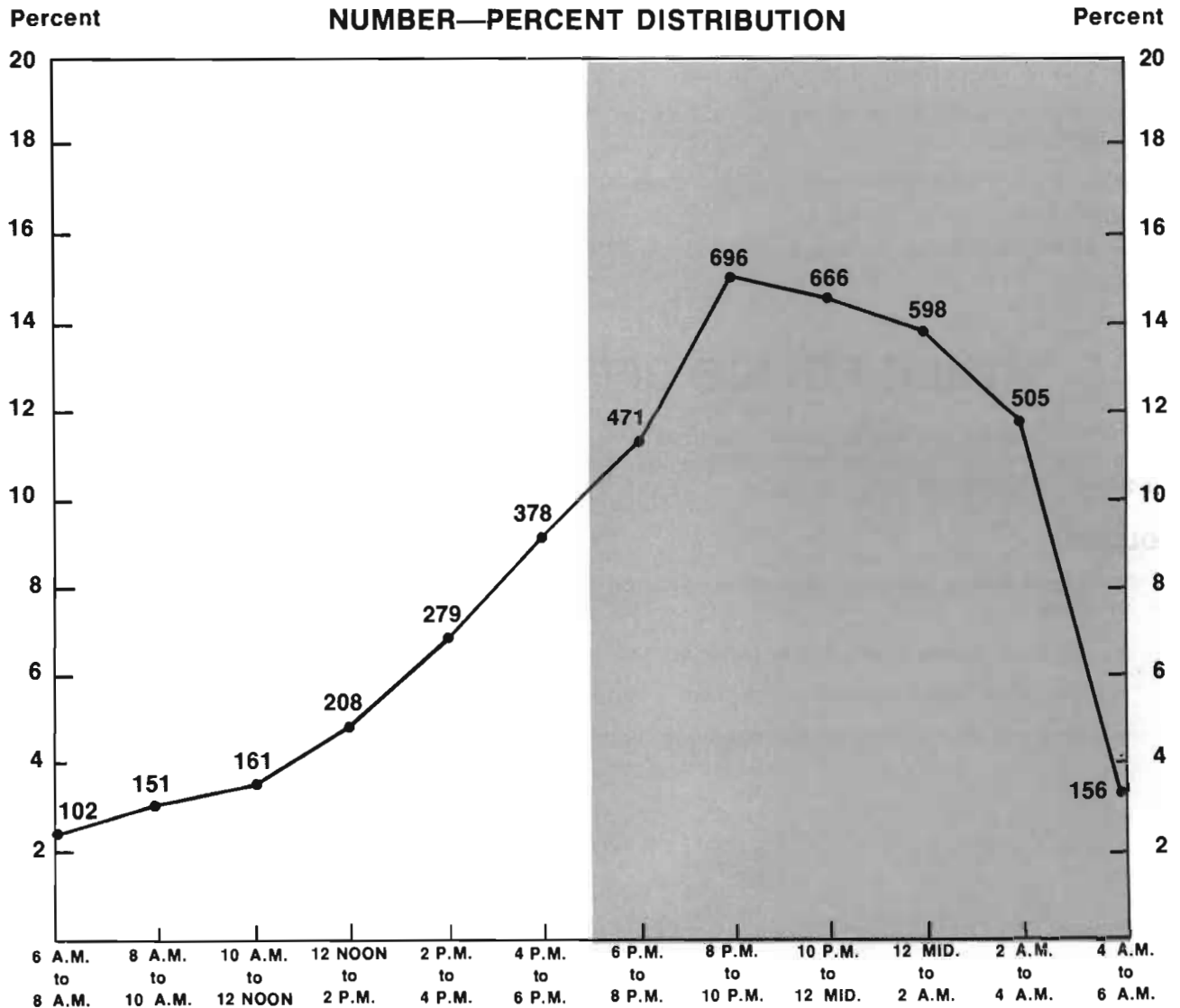
VOLUME

- County law enforcement agencies reported 333 officers assaulted, with 99 sustaining physical injury.
- The New Jersey State Police reported 145 officers assaulted, with 27 sustaining injury.
- Other state agencies, with police powers, reported 131 officers assaulted and 48 sustaining injury.
- University and college police agencies reported 11 officers assaulted with 9 sustaining injury.

SECTION X
DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

INTRODUCTION

The violence within the American domicile has been recognized for decades by elements of government and society with little done to correct the problem. Only in the recent past has government made more than a cursory examination of atrocities occurring within the home. The Domestic Violence Act of 1982 provided the means to gain a meaningful insight into this issue.

The State of New Jersey, through its legislature, has sought to alleviate the root causes of violence in the home, as well as other relevant problems in this complex, changing, interdependent society. Our legislators agreed we can no longer wait for the resultant damages to become irreparable before examining them and implementing a remedy. Piecemeal reactions were deemed inadequate, and they enacted legislation to gather the information necessary to provide a clearer picture of this social disorder.

One of the goals in mind is the development of data identifying violence occurring behind closed doors. These revelations might be helpful in the eventual prevention or marked reduction of this horrible interaction. Hopefully this data can be utilized by society through our governing bodies to lessen the incidents of domestic violence. Through an enlightened society, the possibility exists of controlling this sad commentary on contemporary America.

As stated in this document, reported domestic violence acts increased 17 percent over 1984. This increase is partially attributed to the willingness of victims to come forward; the improved investigative and reporting procedures by the police; and the improved method of processing domestic violence complaints through the courts. All of these improvements are the result of the combined efforts of many organizations and individuals, too numerous to mention. The message being communicated is that domestic violence will not be tolerated in our state!

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE STATISTICAL SUMMARY

Highlights of the 1985 domestic violence statistics are listed below:

- There were 41,076 domestic violence offenses reported by the police in 1985, a 17% increase compared to the 35,050 reported in 1984.
- Assaults occurred in 65% (26,805) of the reported offenses in 1985.
- The total arrests (8,333) for 1985 increased 24% over 1984.
- Arrests were made in 20% of the offenses reported for 1985.
- The most frequent day of domestic violence occurrences was Sunday (7,690).
- For the third consecutive year, the most frequent hours of domestic violence incidents were between 8:00 p.m. and midnight, when 31% of the offenses were reported.
- Children were involved or present during 55% of all domestic violence offenses occurring in 1985. Specifically, 12% were involved and 43% were present.
- Wives were the victims in 45% (18,425), and female friends were the victims in 31% (12,742) of the reported domestic violence offenses in 1985. Overall, females were victims in 85% (34,914) of all domestic violence offenses; the same percentage as in 1984.
- The number of domestic violence complaints that had prior court orders issued against the offender increased from 4,213 in 1984 to 6,079 in 1985. This is a 44% increase.
- Alcohol and drugs were involved in 44% (17,945) of the reported offenses occurring in 1985. Alcohol involvement alone accounted for 39% (16,045) of the total domestic violence offenses reported.
- Persons age 60 or over, were victims in 3% (1,343) of all reported domestic violence offenses that occurred in 1985.

- For the third consecutive year, assault was the most prominent of the eleven types of domestic violence offenses (26,805). Females were victims in 86% (22,986) and males in 14% (3,819) of the domestic violence offenses involving assaults.
- Wives were the victims in 45% (18,425), and female friends were the victims in 31% (12,742) of the reported domestic violence offenses in 1985. Overall, females were victims in 85% (34,914) of all domestic violence offenses; the same percentage for the third consecutive year.
- Harassment was the second highest reported domestic violence in 1985 (12,160).

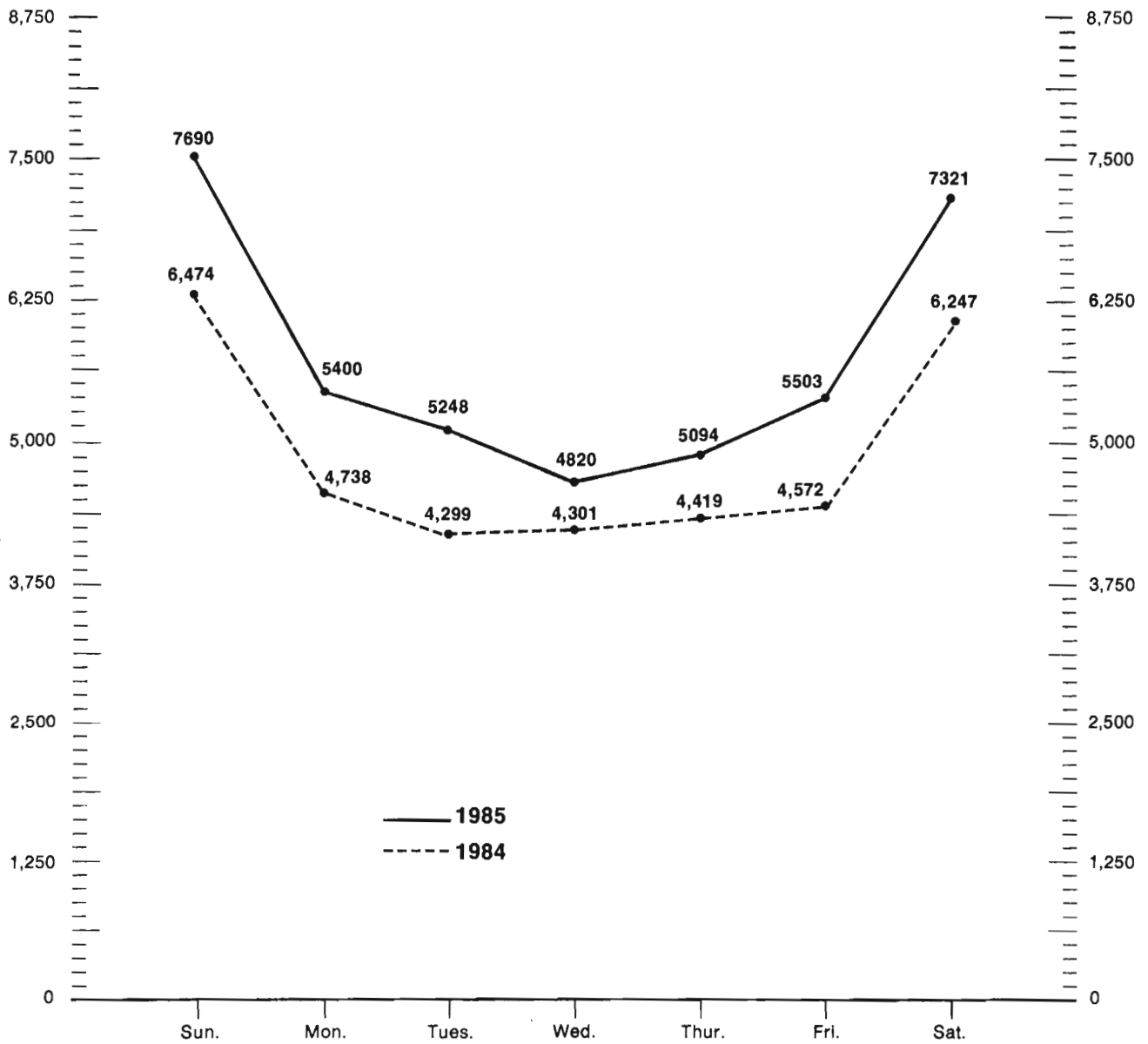
- Fifty-eight percent (23,709) of all domestic violence complaints resulted in injury. This is a 12% increase when compared to the 21,173 that occurred in 1984.

- Domestic violence offenses involving a gun increased 31%, from 301 in 1984 to 393 in 1985.

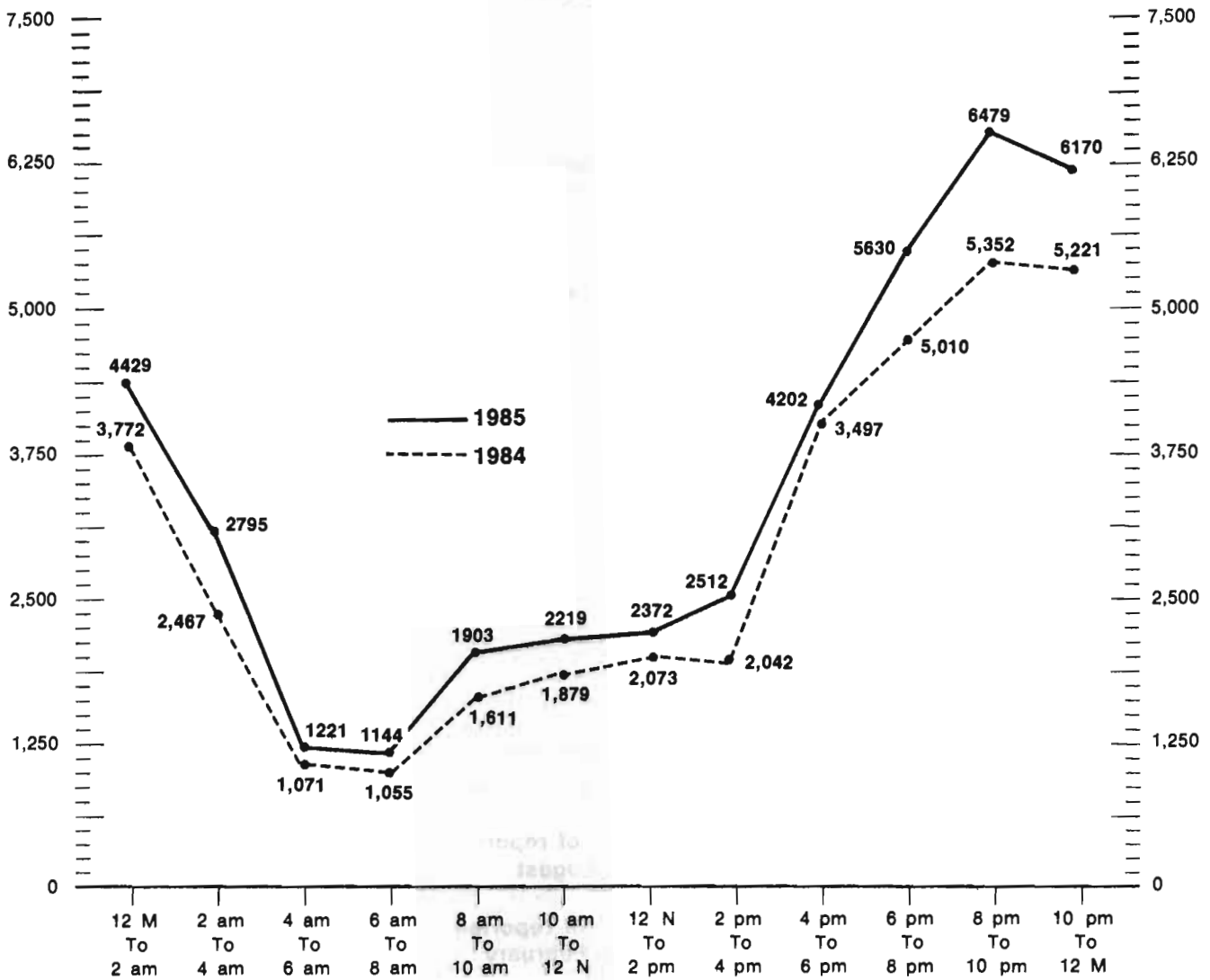

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE OFFENSES BY DAY OF WEEK 1984/1985



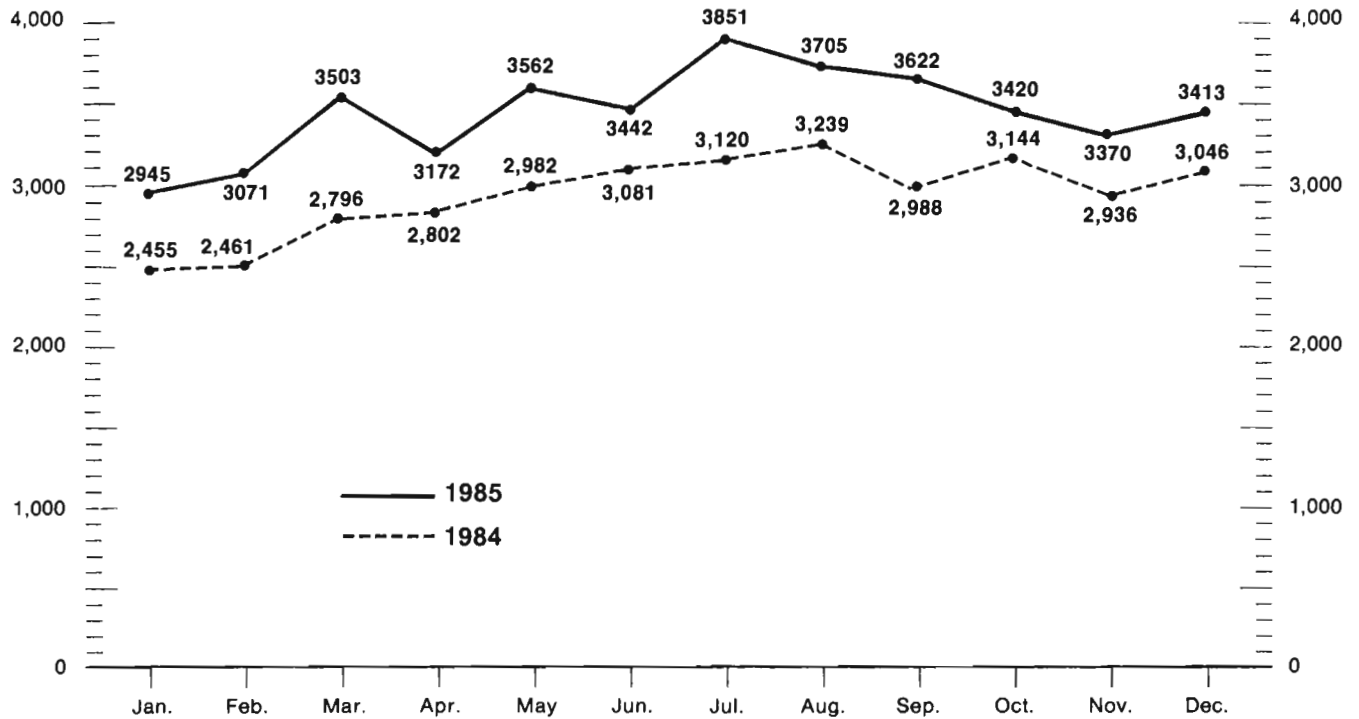

GLOSSARY OF TERMS

ADULT	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, a person aged 18 or over.
AMERICAN INDIAN or ALASKAN NATIVE	A person having origins in any of the original peoples of North America, and who maintains cultural identification through tribal affiliation or community recognition.
ARREST RATE	The number of arrests reported for Part I and Part II offenses for each unit of population, generally per 1,000.
ASIAN or PACIFIC ISLANDER	A person having origins in any of the original peoples of the Far East, Southeast Asia, the Indian subcontinent, or the Pacific Islands. This area includes for example; China, India, Japan, Korea, the Philippine Islands, and Samoa.
BLACK	A person having origins in any of the black racial groups of Africa, characterized by dark skin pigmentation.
CLEARANCE	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, the solution to a particular crime, usually by the arrest of the offender.
CLEARED BY ARREST	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, an offense is cleared when the offender has been identified, sufficient evidence has been obtained to formally charge and the offender has been ordered to appear in court.
CRIME INDEX	The sum total of seven major offenses used to measure the extent, fluctuation and distribution of crime in a geographical area. The following crimes make up the index: Murder, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft; these offenses are referred to as Index offenses.
CRIME RATE	The number of Index offenses reported for each unit of population per 1,000.
CRIMES AGAINST PERSONS	Consists of the following Index offenses: Murder, rape, and aggravated assault.
CRIMES AGAINST PROPERTY	Consists of the following Index offenses: Robbery, burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft.
DAY	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, the hours from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m.
ETHNIC ORIGIN	Having or originating from racial, linguistic, or cultural ties with a specific group.
EXCEPTIONAL CLEARANCE	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, an offense is cleared in this manner when an offender has been identified, located and sufficient evidence to charge has been obtained but there is some reason beyond police control which prohibits the offender from being brought before the court.
HIERARCHY RULE	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, each crime or attempted crime is counted in only one offense category. If several offenses are committed, simply glance down the list of Part I offenses and stop at the first offense you recognize from the facts given; this offense is the correct classification for this criminal activity.
HISPANIC	A person of Mexican, Cuban, Central or South American, or other Spanish culture or origin, regardless of race.

JUVENILE	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, a person under the age of 18.
JUVENILE CLEARANCE	Those crimes where the offenders are identified as juveniles.
NIGHT	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, the hours from 6 p.m. to 6 a.m.
NONVIOLENT CRIME	Consists of the following Index offenses: Burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft.
VIOLENT CRIME	Consists of the following Index offenses: Murder, rape, robbery, and aggravated assault.
WHITE	A person having origins in any of the original peoples of Europe, North Africa, or the Middle East.

CALCULATIONS OF RATES AND TRENDS

1. **Crime Rate per 1,000 Inhabitants**—This represents the number of Index offenses per 1,000 inhabitants.

For example: What is the crime rate for a municipality with 513 Index offenses (murder, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft), with a population of 8,280?

$513 \text{ (Index offenses)} \div 8,280 \text{ (population)} = .061957 \times 1,000 = 62.0 \text{ (crime rate per 1,000 inhabitants)}$

2. **Crime Trend**—A crime trend shows the extent to which crime increased or decreased. This is done by comparing a period of the current year with the same period of a previous year.

For example: A municipality experienced 264 Index offenses in 1980 and 513 Index offenses in 1981. What is the percent of increase?

$513 \text{ (1981 Index offenses)} - 264 \text{ (1980 Index offenses)} = 249 \text{ (numerical increase)}$

$249 \text{ (numerical increase)} \div 264 \text{ (previous year)} = .943 \times 100 = +94\% \text{ (percent increase)}$

Note: If there were more Index offenses in 1980 than in 1981, we would have a percentage decrease.

3. **Number of Police Personnel Per 1,000 Inhabitants**—This is calculated in the same manner as crime rate.

For example: A municipality with a population of 8,280 and 28 police personnel. How many police officers are there per 1,000 population?

$28 \text{ (police personnel)} \div 8,280 \text{ (population)} = .00338 \times 1,000 = 3.4 \text{ (police personnel per 1,000 inhabitants)}$

Note: This formula can be applied to either total police personnel or just police officers per 1,000 inhabitants.

4. **Police Assaulted Rate**—This is calculated at a rate per 100 police officers.

For example: A municipality with 25 officers had 5 of them assaulted during the month. What is the police assaulted rate?

$5 \text{ (police officers assaulted)} \div 25 \text{ (police officers)} = .2 \times 100 = 20 \text{ (police assaulted per 100 police officers)}$

5. **Clearance Rate**—This refers to the percent of Index offenses cleared (solved), over a specified period of time.

For example: A municipality with 513 Index offenses in 1981, cleared 95 of these offenses. What is the clearance rate?

$95 \text{ (Index offenses cleared)} \div 513 \text{ (Index offenses)} \times 100 = 18.5 \text{ (percent cleared)}$



To reduce crime, you must first identify its extent, type and location
