Seventeen days in Haiti

The question struck me as I looked out the window as the plane descended into Port-au-Prince on March 25. It was simply: How can anyone on earth live like this?

I had come to Haiti with members of my congregation from Lifechurch in Allentown, Pa. Our destination was an orphanage Lifechurch runs in Croix-des-Bouquets, Santos 19, a community within Port-au-Prince. Our church is in the process of opening a free clinic in this community.

But the main mission on this 17 day visit was to help as many Haitians as possible as they struggle with the aftermath of the catastrophic earthquake that struck the island on Jan. 12.

We went to work right away, heading to a village where most of the 147 families were living under bed sheets and struggling to find shelter from the sun under scrawny trees.

I came across a young mother who had a baby boy who couldn't have been a few months old. When I asked to hold the baby, I noticed his entire back had been bitten by mosquitoes and it had started to scab over. My translator explained the boy slept on the ground with no protection from bugs. I almost broke down right there.

Instead, we went out to look for supplies to build a makeshift home. We came back about an hour later with two-by-fours, and a shovel. We dug holes and placed the wood in the ground and then wrapped the tarps around the poles to create a bed. The mother was extremely thankful. For a few supplies and a bit of our time, she had the Taj Mahal of that village.

Soon after, we met a boy no older than three who had been burned. With no medical attention, the burn had become infected. I asked a fellow Lifechurch member if she could help. She brushed away a tear and replied: Yes. We promised the mother we would



return to help the boy and went to find some supplies. My congregation member cleaned the burn and patched up the boy. We returned 10 days later and the burn was nearly healed. My fellow church member choked up. She couldn't believe what she was able to do.

The entire trip was filled with scenes like this. This type of help was needed everywhere I went, and not once did we turn anyone away. If we had it, it went to the people of Haiti.

I cried for most of the four hour flight home. I kept thinking how much more I could have done if I had only been able to stay a few more days. They were the most depressing – and fulfilling – 17 days of my life.

State Direct Deposit pay stubs are on the Web

State employees, do you currently have Direct Deposit? Are you tired of the hassle of keeping track of your pay stubs? Just think; the shredding, the filing, the lack of space, the unnecessary mess. You can eliminate all of that (and save a tree or two) with New Jersey's *Pay Stub on the Web*! The State of New Jersey is making payment history available to state employees with electronic funds transfer (EFT), commonly known as direct deposit, with "Pay Stub on the Web." This newest feature is an online application that enables a New Jersey state employee to access his/her pay stubs, beginning with 2005 payment history, via the web. Now when you want to see your pay stub, you simply view it online. You can print it out if you wish, save it to your computer, do neither or both! It's all up to you. Any time you need your pay stub, it is available for you to view, right on the web! And if you try it out and decide it's not for you, you can cancel this feature at any time and go back to receiving your paper pay stub. There's no risk, so why not try it out?

Want to know a little more about how it works and how you can benefit from Pay Stub on the Web? Check out the attachment on DMAVA INTRANET under Human Resources (PayStubOnTheWeb.pdf) which is a simple tutorial that explains how you can use "Pay Stub on the Web" to view, print, and save your current and past pay stubs for your personal records. Remember, this feature is only available to employees with direct deposit. As we mentioned in the past, direct deposit is offered to all state employees and it is encouraged that our employees consider taking advantage of direct deposit with all that it has to offer.

On the way to work one day this week, a small delivery truck next to me was from a local eco-friendly dry cleaner. Now, I own very few clothes that need dry cleaning – allergies and innate dislike of paying other people to clean my clothes – but I do own a few things that need dry cleaning. The smell that permeates clothing after a trip to the dry cleaner is a definite turnoff.

Research into green dry cleaning started me off with the fact that the old method is actually not dry at all but has clothing is bathed in the liquid solvent perchloroethylene, or "perc" and a detergent. Problem is: the Clean Air Act has listed perc as a hazardous air pollutant.

Naturally, in this ecologically aware world there is a search for "greener" way to dry clean clothes. An online search found an article from the Wall Street Journal about four new ways of cleaning those special garments. They even tested those methods at four cleaners located in Dallas, Chicago, New York and Montclair, N.J. To check out the results, visit <http://online.wsj.com/article/SB122834783552077505.html>.

Not everyone has access to alternative dry cleaners in their neighborhood, so if you don't want to dry clean with perc, what is a person to do? More online research gave me this information.

Other suggestions included: home drying cleaning kits. While these kits are not chemical free, and don't give the same results as your local cleaner, they do not contain perc.

Or, modern front-loading washers are not only more effective in energy savings, they often have better gentle cycles for clothing that you would normally only hand wash.

And if all else fails – when shopping, check the care tag and make sure the majority of your purchases are wash and dry items.

New scholarship program for children of fallen military

WASHINGTON (April 30, 2010) - The children of military personnel who died in the line of duty since Sept. 11, 2001 can apply for an educational scholarship similar to the new Post-9/11 GI Bill. Benefits are retroactive to Aug. 1, 2009.

The scholarship, which is administered by the Department of Veterans Affairs, is named after Marine Gunnery Sergeant John David Fry, 28, a Texas native who died in Iraq in 2006 while disarming an explosive. He was survived by three young children.

"The Fry scholarship represents this nation's solemn commitment to care for children whose mothers and fathers paid the ultimate price for our country," said Secretary of Veterans Affairs Eric K. Shinseki.

VA begins accepting applications for the Fry scholarship on May 1, 2010. For more information or assistance applying, call toll-free 1-888-GIBILL-1 (1-888-442-4551), or visit the VA GI Bill Web site at www.gibill.va.gov.

VA estimates nearly 1,500 children will receive benefits under the Fry scholarship program in 2010. Recipients generally have 15 years to use their benefits, beginning on their 18th birthdays.

Eligible children attending institutions of higher learning may receive payments to cover their tuition and fees up to the highest amounts charged to public, in-state students at undergraduate institutions in each state. A monthly housing allowance and stipend for books and supplies are also paid under this program.

VA will begin paying benefits under the Fry scholarships on Aug. 1, 2010. Eligible participants may receive benefits retroactively to August 1, 2009, the same day the Post-9/11 GI Bill took effect. Eligible children may be married. Recipients are entitled to 36 months of benefits at the 100 percent level.

When dependents also serve in the military, the reserves or are Veterans in their own right, eligible for education benefits under the Montgomery GI Bill for Active Duty, the Montgomery GI Bill for Selected Reserves or the Reserve Educational Assistance Program (REAP), then they would relinquish their eligibility under those programs to receive benefits under a Fry scholarship.

Vietnam Remembrance Day ceremony slated at memorial

The New Jersey Vietnam Veterans' Memorial Foundation will hold its annual Vietnam Veterans Remembrance Day ceremony on May 7 at 11 a.m.

In 1991, New Jersey legislators created May 7 as a unique day to honor all those who served in the military from 1959 to 1975 during the Vietnam Era. More than 200,000 New Jersey residents served in the armed forces during that time.

The guest speakers will include former Governor Christine Todd Whitman and her husband, John Whitman, a Vietnam veteran whose leadership was influential in the completion and dedication of the Memorial.

This year also marks the 15th anniversary of the New Jersey Vietnam Veterans' Memorial. On Veterans Day of 1982, a group of New Jersey Vietnam veterans realized the need for a state memorial. The New Jersey Vietnam Veterans' Memorial was dedicated on May 7, 1995. The Vietnam Era Educational Center was dedicated on Sept. 27, 1998.

Governor Whitman was the first woman governor of New Jersey, serving from 1994 until 2001. She later served as administrator of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency from 2001 until 2003.

John R. Whitman is President of Sycamore Management Corporation which he helped found in 1995. Whitman graduated from Yale University and received his MBA from the Harvard Business School.

During this year's ceremony NJDMAVA will be awarding New Jersey state medals, including the Distinguished Service Medal, Meritorious Service Medal, Korean Service Medal and Vietnam Service Medal.
