

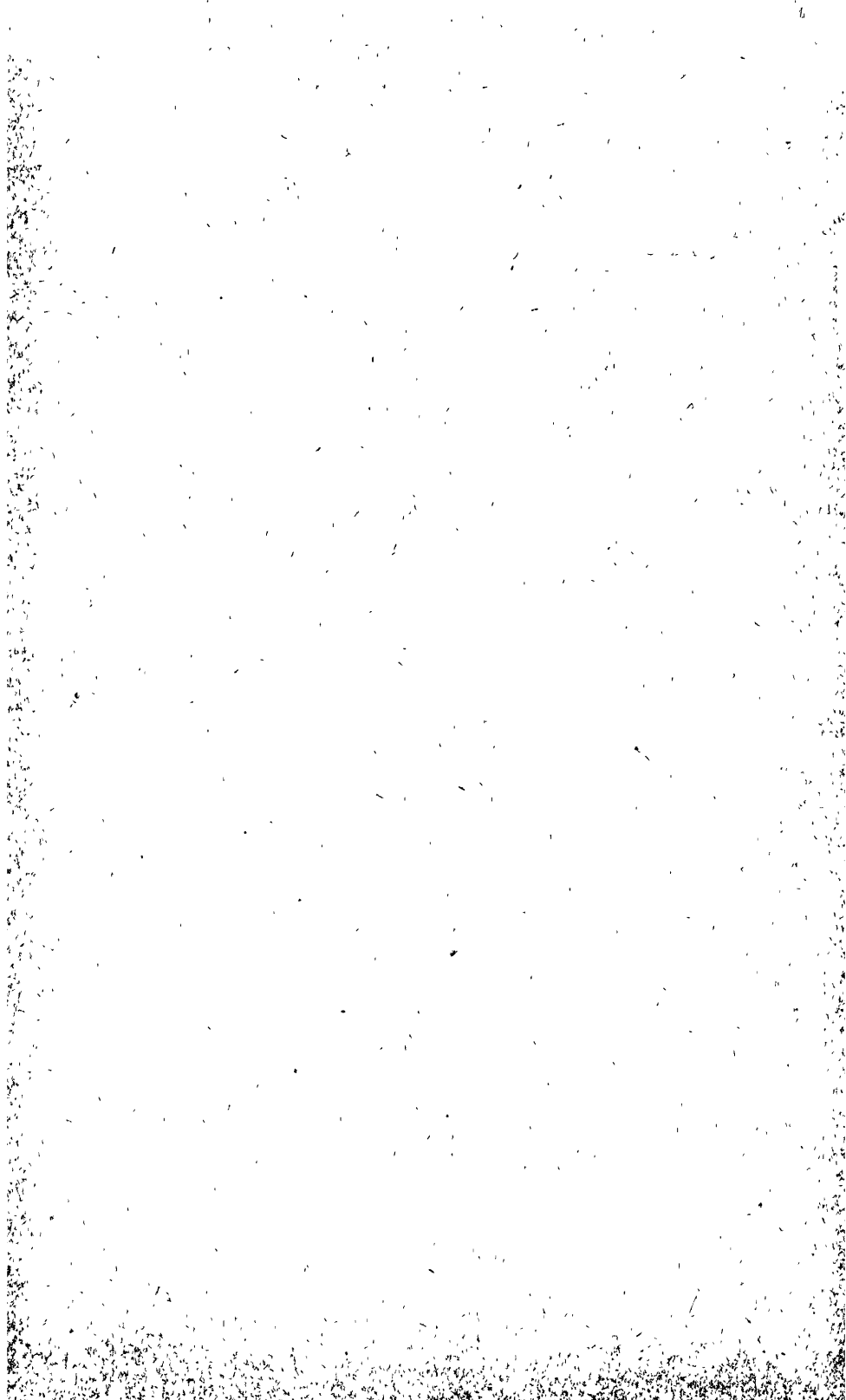

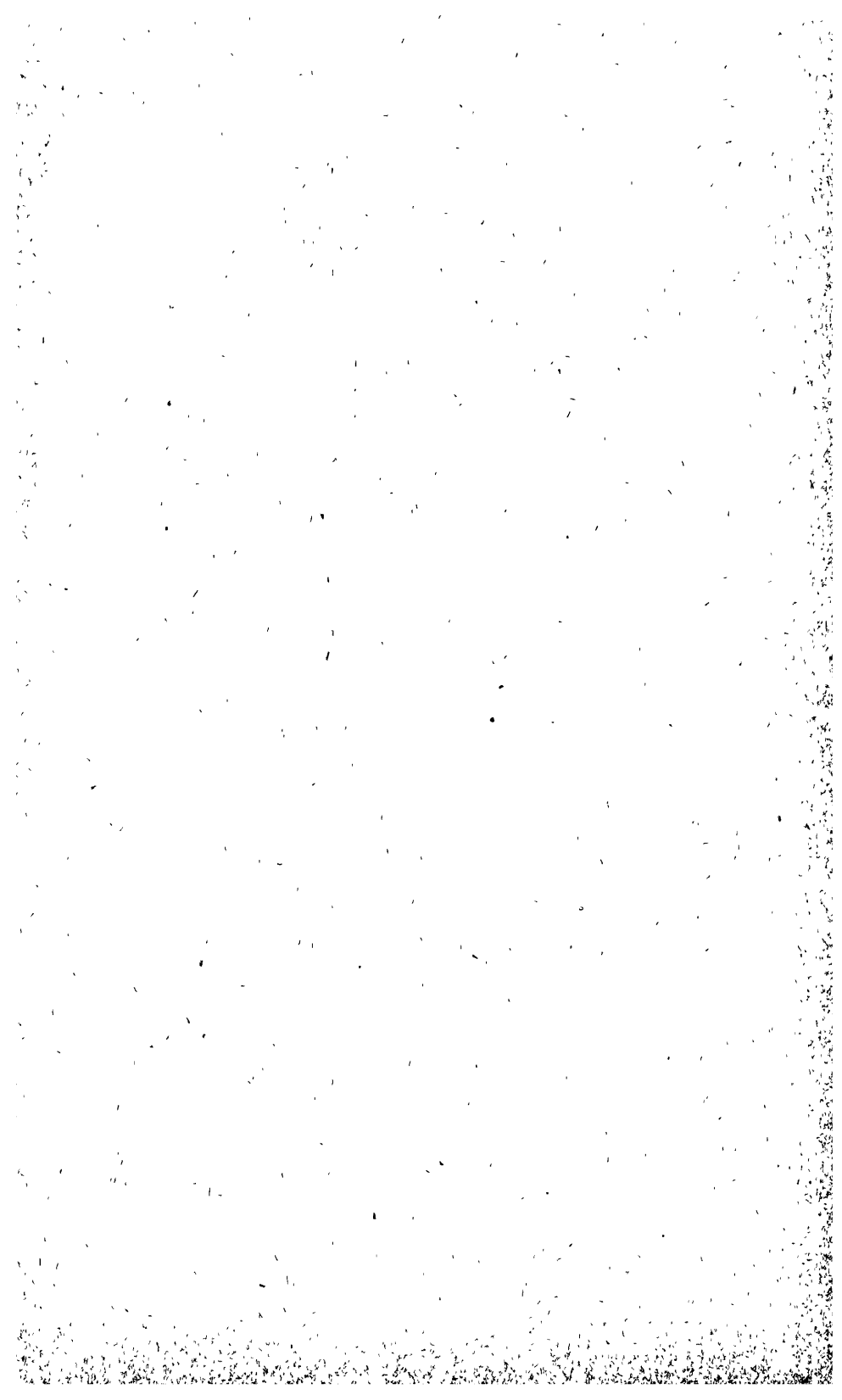

# MINUTES.

STATE OF NEW JERSEY,  
HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY,  
TRENTON, January 14th, 1890. }

At 3 o'clock P.M. the House met.

This being the day designated by the Constitution for the assembling of the One Hundred and Fourteenth Legislature of the State of New Jersey, and 3 o'clock P.M. being the hour appointed for the organization of the House of Assembly, the House was duly called to order by John J. Matthews, of Union county, Clerk of the last House.

Prayer was offered by the Rev. Dr. Dixon, of Trenton.

Mr. Heppenheim, receiving a majority of all the votes cast, was declared elected Speaker.

The Clerk appointed Messrs. Voorhees and Marsh as a Committee to Conduct the Speaker elect to the Chair.

The Committee presented Mr. Heppenheim, who took and subscribed to the oath of office.

Upon taking the chair, Mr. Heppenheim addressed the House as follows:

GENTLEMEN OF THE ASSEMBLY—In entering upon the discharge of the duties of the high office to which you have elected me, I desire to return you my sincere thanks for the distinguished honor conferred, as well as for the confidence reposed in me by you. In accepting this office, I am profoundly sensible of its duties, obligations and responsibilities, and pledge you to discharge them to the best of my ability, invoking at the same time the hearty coöperation of every member of this House in assisting me to maintain the high standard established by my predecessors. I trust that the session that we are about to inaugurate will prove to be a great benefit to the people of this State, whom we are sent here to represent. From all parts of the State comes the cry for ballot reform. Bribery, intimidation and other election evils I trust will be rendered impossible in our State by laws passed at the present session of the Legislature. Taxation should bear equally upon all property, corporate as well as individual. This question should receive careful and immediate attention. It will be our duty to enact such laws as may be necessary to raise additional revenue to pay the expenses of our State government economically administered. This revenue, however, should not be raised by the imposition of a direct State tax upon the property of individuals, which is already too heavily burdened by local taxation. We should also carefully consider the matters presented by the great laboring interests of the State asking for remedial legislation.

For this legislation we can unitedly labor, irrespective of party ties. Let us bring our session to as speedy a termination as will be consistent with the public demands, and when the gavel falls on the day of final adjournment I sincerely hope we will have earned the gratitude and thanks of the people of this Commonwealth.

#### ANNUAL MESSAGE OF THE GOVERNOR.

*To the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:*

GENTLEMEN—In obedience to the Constitution, I have the honor to communicate to you the condition of the State, with my recommendation of several measures which I deem expedient.

#### THE FINANCES.

The financial condition of the State for the year ending October 31st, 1889, is shown in detail by the reports of the Comptroller and Treasurer.

The item of disbursements on account of military, of \$123,516 04, includes \$29,992.19 expended for cloth, uniforms, &c., of which one-half will be deducted from future allowances to the regiments, and, also, \$3,361.35 expended for camp equipage and like articles which continue in use from year to year.

The whole of the balance to the credit of the State Fund, October 31st, 1889, has been required to meet disbursements, appropriations and payments to the Sinking Fund for debt maturing January 1st, 1890. This latter amount was \$103,389 instead of the usual payment of \$90,000. There has been paid since October 31st the sum of \$12,812.11 on account of appropriations to the Soldiers' Home, in payment for work completed there. In consequence of these and other demands, it has been necessary to continue the temporary loans, which amount to \$400,000.

Besides these estimated receipts there are several contingencies under which the State may reasonably expect to receive considerable sums of money during the year.

There is an unadjusted claim of a considerable amount against the Morris Canal and Banking Company or the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company, its lessee, for taxes of back years, which has been the subject of much consideration, and which, it is hoped, may be soon satisfactorily adjusted by the action of the State Board of Assessors.

No conclusion has yet been reached in the case of the State against the Morris and Essex Railroad Company, the Delaware Lackawanna and Western Railroad Company, lessee, and which, under the act of 1887, was submitted to arbitrators, one to be selected by the company and the other by the State. I am, however, able to report that the testimony has all been taken, and that arguments of counsel on both sides are being submitted upon the controlling points in difference between the company and the State. We may look for a speedy decision of the questions which will settle the rights of the parties and furnish the rule upon which the computation of the amount to be paid is to be made. This latter work, in view of the exhaustive examination of the accounts already made, can take but a short period, and we may look, therefore, for a speedy adjudication of this claim, certainly before the adjournment of the Legislature. The

claim of the State amounts to \$1,165,099.10 as of December 31st, 1887. This includes all classes of charge objected to by the company. If, however, its objections, other than those which go to any recovery, should all be allowed there will still be due the State, without interest, \$287,341.38.

There is now pending before Congress a bill to refund the tax paid by the State at the outbreak of the war. Such a bill was passed by both houses of the last Congress. In the event of such a bill becoming a law New Jersey would be entitled to receive \$382,613.90.

The Legislature in 1867 made a grant of certain lands under water in Jersey City to the Morris Canal and Banking Company, said grant being by metes and bounds, for which the said company or its successors or assigns were to pay annually the sum of \$25,000, having a right under the said act to pay into the treasury of the State, at any time, the sum of \$357,142 in lieu of said annual payment, it being the capitalization thereof at seven per cent. The Lehigh Valley Railroad Company as the lessee of the Morris Canal and Banking Company, on the twentieth of December, 1889, paid into the treasury the sum of \$357,142 referred to in this grant. They also, under the fourth section of the act of March 31st, 1869 (Rev. p. 983), desiring "a paper capable of being acknowledged and recorded, made by and in the name of the State," conveying the land so granted to them by the act of 1867, with the benefits accruing by the fourth section of the act of 1869, paid the further sum of \$48,000, being the consideration mentioned in said section. They also, at the same time, paid an accrued rental amounting, up to that date, to \$23,767.12. The \$357,142 is included in the item of riparian leases, amounting to \$978,246.81 in the above enumeration, which item should be reduced by that amount, and it should be added to the item of cash, to which should also be added the sums of \$48,000 and \$23,767.12, together with the further amount of \$2,800 received from a grant made since the end of the fiscal year, making the amount of the securities, leases and cash on hand belonging to the School Fund at the present time \$3,790,876.25 at par value. As the market value of many of these securities is largely above par, it is estimated that the fund at present exceeds \$4,000,000.

A moment's consideration shows that this fund is assuming dangerous proportions. It has already exceeded the amount required to answer any purpose which was originally contemplated or which can be practically attained. The amount expended for the maintenance of the public schools is now over \$3,000,000 per annum, a sum which, of course, can never be produced from the income of a fund, and which must consequently be raised largely from a School Tax. The tax is not now an onerous one; is cheerfully paid by the people of the State, and serves a most useful purpose in maintaining the public interest in the successful operation of the schools. Why, then, should the State go on disposing of its lands under water, and accumulating the proceeds in the fund, when it is in debt for the building of its insane asylum, and when the crowded condition of the State Prison demands relief, either by the erection of an intermediate reformatory or additional buildings, and when the asylums, the Reform School, Industrial School for Girls and Home for Feeble

Minded absolutely require more accommodation for the unfortunate or the wayward, which pressing necessities might be met by the application of such revenue to their demands?

#### RIPARIAN COMMISSIONERS.

The principal of the grants, leases, and leases turned into grants during the year ending October 31st, 1889, amounts to \$225,986.32. The amount paid to the State during the year as rental on leases made by the Legislature or by the Commissioners, was \$57,519.60. The principal of grants and capitalization of leases for lands disposed of from the commencement of the system to October 31st, 1889, is \$3,349,585.18. The amount received for rentals during the same period is \$1,041,520.59.

There has been, since the end of the fiscal year, paid into the treasury, not included in the above, \$75,155.12, and there is pending before the commissioners for action, transfers which represent a principal amount of \$64,314, and grants or leases ready for delivery, but not delivered, \$55,337.15.

I again call the attention of the Legislature to the fact that this last item of bonds of the several counties refers to certain instruments made by the counties respectively, acknowledging receipt of so much money, with a promise to repay it when it shall be called for by the United States. The other item of Centennial stock represents the contribution made by New Jersey to the Centennial in 1876. Both of these so-called securities are entirely valueless as assets, and should not be carried on the books, and published from year to year as available property of the State. Some provision should be made directing their classification as items of property held by the State Treasurer, but should



no longer occupy the misleading character of securities of the State Fund, and swell to the amount of their par value the apparent resources of the State.

There are two bonds of one thousand dollars each, still in the hands of the Treasurer, and which were left with him by the Treasurer of the Children's Home at its discontinuance. In the absence of any law he is without authority to use or make any disposition whatever of them, and I renew my former recommendation for the passage of a law turning these bonds over to the State Fund.

#### SINKING FUND.

The Commissioners received for interest and rent during the year, \$26,364.43. They received for real estate sold, \$7,300. The total receipts for the year, including the amount of annual appropriation from the State and balance on hand October 31st, 1888, were \$208,669.40. There has been a loss on the sale of real estate over the cost of the same, during the year, of \$4,749.97. The Commissioners have paid \$102,000 of the principal of the debt during the year. There was paid, on account of interest on bonds, \$76,254. The total payments were \$186,554.47. Balance cash on hand October 31st, 1889, was \$22,114.93. The total amount of the Fund is \$577,653.27. This includes \$3,995 for interest uncollected; \$212,060.22 for real estate at its cost, and \$6,066.44 for amount due on decrees of foreclosure. How much of the first and last items may be collectible is uncertain, and the actual value of the real estate cannot be ascertained except by sale.

#### ELECTION REFORM.

Each party is pledged in its platform to some measure of ballot reform. Let it not fail in a struggle for party advantage or in an effort to secure the adoption of some cherished system. If the subject is to be approached and dealt with in the spirit of partisanship, and not in that of patriotism and statesmanship,—if parties are to divide upon matters of detail,—we may be no nearer the solution of the problem than we were one year ago.

There is danger to be apprehended from too determined insistence upon one or another scheme or plan, from an unwillingness to accept some immaterial feature, or an unyielding assertion of some particular provision.

The zeal displayed by some in the uncompromising demand for certain provisions, not necessary to correct the admitted evils, excites the suspicion that they aim not so much at reform in the ballot as to strike at the organization of the political parties. The success of such an effort, if possible, is not desirable. The existence of parties is a necessary incident of a representative government. Difference of opinion as to the policy to be pursued in the administration of public affairs, among people who have, by the right of suffrage, the power to direct that policy through chosen representatives, naturally brings those of the same thought together. The success of a party as a rule depends upon efficient organization. A tidal wave of popular opinion or excitement may occasionally sweep one party from, and carry another into, the control of affairs, but success generally depends on the united intelligent action, which is the result of thorough organization. It is fashionable for theorists to decry the operation of so-called political machinery. While it is true that it may sometimes be employed to improper purposes, yet its legitimate use is attended with beneficial and desirable results; the elucidation of principles; the dissemination of argument; the ascertainment of those entitled to vote; the correction of registry; the prevention of fraudulent voting and getting out the vote—that vigilance, which is the “price of liberty,” are the attendant fruits of a well-ordered, healthy, active, efficient party organization. An eminent jurist has recently said: “To them (parties) we look for that activity in the advocacy of opposing views; that watchfulness over the assertion of authority; that keen debate, as to the course most conducive to well-being; essential to the growth of public institutions. That voice of the people which, when duly given and properly ascertained, directs the action of the State, is largely brought to declare itself through the instrumentality of party.” To maintain its organization, each party will earnestly strive, and no party man can be expected to honestly favor measures which tend to impair or destroy its efficiency.

Whether the evils, which all admit to exist, can be corrected by the adoption of systems in force elsewhere, may depend much upon the conditions which exist here. The ballot is no experiment with us; it has long been in use in this State in the exercise of the right of suffrage. It is hampered with no property or educational qualifications; it depends on manhood and citizen-

ship. Certain incidents have attached themselves to the use of the ballot here which cannot, in any innovations, be disregarded. In correcting one evil we must not inaugurate another. The ballot must be free as well as secret. In every country where the people, under the guise of an election, have deprived themselves of important rights, the machinery of such election has been under the active control of the government in matters of detail, and such result has come from the abuse of that power. While no danger of such extreme results may exist, evils of a lesser magnitude may be fastened upon the body politic by the same abuse. Provisions which make the choice of the voter dependent upon the action of the State officers are not to be adopted without grave consideration and efficient restraints, and not at all, unless ample provision is made for the failure of such officer to fully perform the duty imposed upon him by law.

All are agreed as to the evils which ought to be corrected; the means to effect such result can be devised if we are willing, without blind subserviency to our own plan, to examine and select the one which is least objectionable, is best suited to our system of government, and which gives best promise of securing a pure, free and secret ballot.

The end to be sought is legislation which will secure the ascertainment of those legally entitled to vote; the prevention of colonization and the impersonation of the voter; the selection of competent, honest election officers; the prevention of intimidation and the corrupt use of money, and the absolute certainty that the ballots of the voters only are deposited in the box and are honestly counted and returned. If these results can be obtained, all that properly relates to ballot reform is accomplished; any other aim is outside of pure reform and for some ulterior end.

Great stress is laid upon the assumption that these results have been practically reached in England and her colonies, where the so-called Australian system is in force. With some this system seems limited to the nomination by petition, the use of the official ballot, and the isolation of the voter. But it must also be borne in mind that in all the countries where these favorable results have been obtained, other laws have also been in force, directed to securing a correct and comprehensive registry, preventing personation, securing honest election officers, requiring publicity of election expenses, as well as providing by summary proceedings, for the judicial examination of charges impeaching the election on the ground of fraud, corruption or intimidation, with power to annul the election by the determination of judicial officers. These laws are of a stringent character, and there is no doubt but that their rigid enforcement has a large, if not a con-

trolling, share in the correction of the evils at which they are aimed. We cannot confidently expect the same result from the adoption of any one of the remedies.

In the attempt to adapt these remedial laws to our elections, it must also be remembered that in England and in the colonies there are certain provisions regulating the use of the ballot, the effect of which have an important bearing upon the results obtained, but the adoption of which would be unwise here, because they violate our system of suffrage, and undermine the principle on which it is based. These provisions relate to the identification of the ticket with the individual who votes the same, so that it can be ascertained by investigation how each man has voted—a feature and procedure which at once destroy the secrecy of the ballot.

In some of these countries, also, certain property and other qualifications are required with reference to certain elections, while in Massachusetts an educational qualification exists, which applies to adopted citizens, and which limits the right of suffrage to those who can read and write the English language. These difficult conditions must all be considered in deciding upon the adoption of any system which is to be accepted, on the ground of its successful operation elsewhere.

All seem agreed on the plan that the voter, while preparing his ballot, should be provided with the means of doing the same alone, and the prevention of solicitation within a certain distance of the polls. These provisions give the voter an opportunity to prepare, arrange, or select just such ballot as he desires to vote, without interference from any one, and protects him, so far as any mechanical or physical arrangements are possible, from the oversight which has been the attendant aid of intimidation or corruption. I had faith in the use of the official ballot as a corrective of corrupt practices, but I am not blind to the serious objections which are urged to its exclusive use as a legal ballot. It is the constitutional right of every citizen of this State to vote for whomever he sees fit, for any elective office. This right exists up to the moment of casting his vote, and it should not be restricted by provisions which require a nomination of the person through certain forms of procedure, to be made days or weeks prior to the election. Neither should it be hampered by intricate provisions, depending upon the proper discharge of duty by public officials, with reference to details which involve the choice of the individual for whom the citizen desires to vote. In countries where it has been adopted and used, so far as I have been able to ascertain, the election has been confined to that of a few officers. It has never been in operation where the number of

offices to be filled anywhere nearly equals the number which we, in this State, every spring have to vote for in our townships and cities. The trial ticket printed during the last session of the Legislature demonstrated that the use of the official ballot might be cumbersome, in consequence of its necessarily large size.

The effect of this official ballot to prevent corruption is theoretical, proceeding on the assumption that no one will risk his money unless he knows how the party votes. The evidence as to its practical corrective effect on the corrupt use of money is far from satisfactory; while its exclusive use, so far from preventing the evil, may by fraud be turned into an aid to the corruptor. If one ballot can, by any means, be taken from the polling place and put into the hands of the person engaged in buying votes, he is enabled to mark the ballot as he wishes, give it to his purchased voter, who, by bringing out the fresh one he has received, thus furnishes the evidence that he has voted as he agreed to do, and so on until the purchasable element has been voted, and each proved that he has kept his corrupt bargain. Many plans are suggested to prevent this fraud, all of which contemplate a marking of the ballot, but the most effective one seems to be that of numbering the ballot, a practice which identifies the ticket with the voter and destroys its secrecy. The greatest barrier to working this fraud lies in the vigilance and honesty of the election officers; but if there is one judge who is corrupt, the machinery can be at once put into operation. The futility of all laws, as preventive remedies, if the election officer is dishonest, is shown in the case of the Queen against Birdsall, 1 Q. B. D. 425.

In Connecticut they have adopted the use of an official envelope in voting. The compulsory use of an official envelope has long been recognized as a useful measure in the prevention of election frauds. To be of any benefit, however, its use must be compulsory, for if not required, the corruptor or intimidator may require that it should not be used; and any one using it is at once credited with desiring to conceal the way he has voted. As it does not appear to be generally understood, it may be well to describe the use more in detail. Counterfeits are rendered well nigh impossible by having the paper of which the envelopes are made contain a water-mark. The envelopes are made and furnished by the State in such numbers to each election district as may be necessary for the number on the registry, with a small percentage in addition in case of accident or mistake; the voter is required to put his ballot in the envelope which he receives from the election officer, and vote it as thus enclosed; and the election officers are required to return and account for all envelopes furnished them not found in the box.

Many theories connected with the administration of law seem justified, on argument, as promising the very best results, which, on trial, are found to be defective, if not entirely useless, to accomplish that for which they are intended. On the other hand, measures which seem to be open to serious objection are found, on trial, to accomplish not only more than was expected, but all that could be desired. Three years ago the State adopted a ballot-box, a sample of which was exhibited, and which, from its trial, seemed to give reason for the claim that its use in election districts would render some crimes well nigh impossible. Whether from defective manufacture, or difficulty in keeping the same in order, or from some other cause, the use of this box in many parts of the State has been discontinued, and some fraudulent practices are even charged as having been perpetrated with the aid of this very box.

The desire to use the official ballot seems to be widespread; it is possible that its use may by experiment be found not to be inconvenient, and to effect results which are claimed for it, but for the reasons stated and others which can be urged it should not be the exclusive legal ballot to be voted. There is nothing to prevent the trial of the official ballot, and also the official envelope at the same time. Experiment would very soon demonstrate whether it was wise to continue the use of either, or both, or only one.

It is claimed for the use of the official envelope that it prevents the use of duplicate and tissue tickets, and the crime known as "ballot-box stuffing," unless it be accompanied by the crime of making a correspondingly false poll list. And right here we are confronted by the fact that many of our election crimes and abuses, particularly such crimes as "ballot-box stuffing" or false count, could not be committed if the officers of election were honest, vigilant and intelligent. If, on the other hand, our board of election officers are corrupt, ignorant and inattentive, we may look in vain for honest elections to be brought about by mechanical and physical means. The use of the compartment plan and the practical exclusion of the public will only afford increased facilities to dishonest judges to carry on fraudulent devices.

In England, and the colonies where the system which is now so popular is in force, the elections are conducted before an officer, who is civilly the most important person in the community, or one selected by the highest civil authority. In these countries also the greatest attention is paid to the registry lists, some two months prior to an election being devoted to the making, correcting and perfecting the list of voters. The greatest publicity attends all the proceedings, and every person has an opportunity

to intervene for the purpose of securing a correct list, the final action taken being the result of a judicial examination of objections and claims to the right of persons on the list to vote.

Another important factor of the system in effecting the reforms claimed is the statute known in England as the Corrupt Practices Act. It was passed as a consolidation and amendment of existing laws in 1854, being chapter 102 of the 17 and 18 Victoria, and in 1883 was amended and enlarged by chapter 57, 46 and 47 Victoria, known as "the corrupt and illegal practices prevention act." These laws define with great minuteness what shall be held to be corrupt or illegal practices, embracing almost every known form of influencing a vote save by argument, and restricting the amount and limiting and defining the objects for which money may be legitimately expended in a political contest. Not only are the objects and amounts specified, but the persons who can lawfully spend money in elections are limited; no money is allowed to be paid after fourteen days after election, and every one, including the candidate, is required, within thirty-five days after an election, to make a declaration, specifying with particularity what sums he has received, and from whom, with an itemized account of how the same has been disbursed. This statement is required to be published in two newspapers in the county within ten days after it is made. A failure to make it deprives a party of his right to his office until made, and a false statement subjects one to loss of office, to indictment, and on conviction to punishment for perjury. There are also provisions for a judicial enquiry by an election court composed of two judges, or by a commission appointed for that purpose, of allegations which impeach the election for fraud, corruption or illegality. In addition to these investigations conducted on the motion of the public prosecutor, a defeated candidate or any one or more voters may, by petition to the High Court of Justice, contest the election of the person returned, which question is tried by the election court. If on the trial it is found that corrupt or illegal acts have been practiced by the candidate or his agent, or by others with his knowledge, consent or approval, such finding or judgment avoids the election, and the party found guilty is committed for action by the Grand Jury and trial in case of indictment. These proceedings are summary and are continued from day to day until finished. The effect of an adverse finding is to disqualify the party from holding the office either under that election or a subsequent one for several years.

While this act relates to parliamentary elections, its provisions are applied to municipal elections by the act of 1884, 47 and 48

Victoria, chapter 70, and what are practically the same statutes also exist, I believe, in the colonies.

We have, therefore, as parts of the system, as indicated by the English law, not only the Ballot Act of 1872, 35 and 36 Victoria, chapter 33, but the Registry Act of 1878, 41 and 42 Victoria, chapter 26, and the Corrupt and Illegal Practices Prevention Acts of 1854 and 1883.

As to the relative effect of these acts it is said in a note to Wigmore on the Australian Ballot System, page 19, speaking of the official ballot, "as to preventing bribery it is not such a success as we should like; it has done a good deal; nevertheless, the most of our bribable electors, especially in the country, make it a curious point of honor to vote the way they have been paid to. The Corrupt Practices Act is far and away more effectual than the ballot."

I have gone thus fully into this question, not to deter the experiment of any factor of the system or its equivalent which may appeal to the best judgment and does not infringe any constitutional right, but to give the reasons for my opinion that no radical or satisfactory reform can be effected by the adoption of any plan which does not secure not only the isolation and protection from interference of the voter in preparing his ballot, but also honest, competent, vigilant election officers; a comprehensive and correct registry law universally applied; a limitation of election expenses and their complete publicity, and summary proceedings enquiring into the conduct of the election, which will deprive a person from the enjoyment of office procured by corrupt and illegal practices.

While our constitutional provision makes each House the final judge of the election of its own members, a judicial inquiry into the election of members of the Senate and General Assembly might be had under laws providing more comprehensive and summary proceedings, to investigate charges of fraud, corruption and intimidation, with a determination thereon by judicial officers as to which of the candidates under the evidence is entitled to a certificate of election.

With reference to other elections such laws can be passed and made effective, but care should be taken that the proceedings and determination of the investigation be conducted before the party is installed into office, and such event should be postponed until a decision of the charges. Attempts have been made to enact such laws which are now on our statute books, the value of which is questioned in consequence of some such oversight, which raises a doubt as to their constitutionality.



## CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT.

A concurrent resolution, proposing amendments to the Constitution of the State, was passed by the Senate and General Assembly at the last session.

It originated in the Senate, and was afterwards passed by the House. The amendments were entered on the Journal of each House, with the yeas and nays taken thereon. They were published, as required by the Constitution, and the same are respectfully referred to you for action. It is, of course, competent for this Legislature to adopt any, or all, or none, of these proposed amendments.

The first proposes to strike out that clause of the Constitution which prohibits the Legislature from passing any private, local or special laws regulating the internal affairs of towns and counties. The second proposes to strike out the further provision as follows: "The Legislature shall pass no special act conferring corporate powers, but they shall pass general laws, under which corporations may be organized and corporate powers of every nature obtained, subject, nevertheless, to repeal or alteration at the will of the Legislature." The attention of the Legislature has been repeatedly called to the difficulty which the first provision referred to above has entailed upon different municipalities of this State. A reference to the session laws will show that a large part of the legislation of each session has been devoted to the passage of general laws seeking to remedy existing evils or meet local wants, and an examination of the reports will show that a large portion of the time of our Supreme Court, and the Court of Errors and Appeals, has been taken up in the consideration of the acts which have been passed, so as to provide relief without violation of the constitutional inhibition. In a great number of cases the efforts of the Legislature has proved unsuccessful, and localities and municipalities which are laboring under provisions which entail hardships upon the inhabitants, seem to be without remedy, as no proper classification can be made without including places which do not require the particular legislation sought for by others.

In my judgment, relief can be obtained for the municipalities by the first amendment. The second proposed amendment would re-empower the Legislature to pass special laws conferring corporate powers, with the restrictions that they should not be exclusive, and should not grant the right to lay down railroad tracks. This would again throw open to all kinds of special legislation with reference to corporations, the door which was happily closed. It is presumed that the second amendment was pro-

posed because it was thought necessary in accomplishing the object of the first amendment, viz., to enable the Legislature to pass special laws with reference to municipal corporations. Such impression, if it existed, was erroneous, as it was decided in *Pell v. Newark*, 11 Vroom 71, that this part of the Constitution did not refer to municipal corporations, a construction which has never since been questioned. The adoption of the first without the second would leave the Legislature free to act, with reference to municipal corporations.

The third amendment proposed is for the purpose of correcting the manifest mistake which was made by the Legislature in adopting the former amendment with reference to the appointment of judges for the Court of Common Pleas.

#### SALARY OF GOVERNOR.

The salary of the Governor is less than that of any of the prominent officers of the State, civil or judicial. It is entirely inadequate to meet the demands made upon him as the Chief Magistrate and representative of a great State. Under the Constitution no change can be made in the salary during the term of office of any public officer, and I recommend the passage of a law before the term of office of the next Governor commences, making the salary commensurate with the dignity, importance and requirements of the position.

#### STATE BOUNDARY.

The commissioners appointed on the part of the State to fix and determine, in connection with a similar commission on the part of New York, the boundary line between the two States, have completed the work assigned to them in a manner which must prove highly satisfactory. The lines have been clearly defined, so that hereafter there may be no disturbing questions arising from dispute as to ownership of the lands under the waters which divide the two States. A permanent monument has been constructed in Raritan bay and the boundary line marked at different points by buoys out to the ocean. The line through the Kills, and the North river and New York bay cannot be so distinctly indicated, but is susceptible of being defined by monuments and maps. The line adopted is practically the middle of the channel in New York bay and runs to the eastward of Ellis' and Bedloe's Island and the Robin's Reef light-

house. The work of the commissioners is completed with the exception of filing the maps.

#### RAILROAD COMMISSION.

I renew my recommendation that the State Board of Assessors, be invested with the powers and duties of railroad commissioners, confining those powers to such as pertain to the relations between the corporations, their employees, the people and the public interests.

#### FISHERIES.

I am in receipt of a communication from his Excellency, Governor Beaver, of Pennsylvania, enclosing a certified copy of an act of the Legislature of Pennsylvania, approved May 22, 1889, entitled "An act for the protection of shad, sturgeon and game fish in the River Delaware." He calls my attention to the fact that, by the provisions of the 12th section of this act, it is provided that no part of the act shall be considered valid or operative until the Legislature of New Jersey shall approve of the same by enacting a similar act in whole or in part. I herewith transmit for action the statute of Pennsylvania.

#### NATIONAL GUARD.

From the last annual muster and inspection, the strength of the National Guard is shown to be 320 commissioned officers, 3,962 enlisted men, a total of 4,282. Two new companies, "F," Sixth Regiment, Atlantic City, and "G," First Regiment, Dover, have been added to the force, which now consists of fifty-seven companies of infantry and two Gatling gun companies, organized into seven regiments and three battalions, and comprised in two brigades and one division.

In pursuance of the authority given by the last Legislature, I directed the whole division to take part in the parade in the city of New York on the 30th of April, the centennial celebration of the inauguration of Washington as President of the United States. It is gratifying to report that the troops of New Jersey, on that occasion, showed themselves the equal of the National Guard of any other State in the Union. Their soldierly appearance and bearing deserved and received the ecomiums of all. While the troops of other States were mostly brought to the city of New York the

night before the occasion, those of New Jersey were taken from their own regimental armories, or from the place of their company formation, starting that morning and returning that night. So promptly was this gathering carried out, that the New Jersey troops reported to the Commander-in-Chief, General Schofield, that the column was formed and the troops ready to march sometime before the hour fixed for them to do so. This is especially gratifying, as it proves that the National Guard of New Jersey can, on a short notice, be placed ready for service at any point within this State.

The First Brigade, under command of General Steele, was encamped at Sea Girt from July 8th to 13th, inclusive. The brigade practiced at the rifle range during the week of the encampment, and the Second Brigade at different times during the year.

In pursuance of authority given by the last Legislature, an interstate rifle match was arranged to take place at the range at Sea Girt in the first week of September, a trophy being offered to the winning team. The team representing this State was made up by competitive practice, as an additional incentive to the men during their rifle practice, and it was attended with very gratifying results. The match was lost by only two points; the successful team being arbitrarily selected from the marksmen of the New York National Guard.

Under the act of last winter, I appointed Messrs: James Smith, Jr., of Newark, and William L. Dayton, of Trenton, as agents of the State, to acquire by purchase, for the public use of the State, as a military encampment, the tract of land at Sea Girt, which has been under lease for some time. The agents report that they have been unable to agree with the owners of the land and encumbrances, and further that the owner of the fee has been enjoined from making conveyance of the tract for the purpose of a rifle range and encamping ground.

This will render it necessary to appoint commissioners to appraise the value of the lands and encumbrances, as further provided for by the act referred to.

#### SOLDIERS' HOME.

By the report of the managers it appears that there were 431 inmates on the 31st day of October, 1889, being an increase of 64 over the number there at the same time last year. There were admitted during the year, 440; discharged, 324; expelled, 7; died, 45. The average number of inmates was 411. Since the

home was opened there have been 16,125 cared for by the institution. The total receipts for the year, as reported by the Treasurer, amounted to \$55,994.92, of which \$18,772.32 was received from the United States Government. Although it appeared, by the report of the managers, that there was a balance on hand of \$931.85 on the 31st of October, 1888, it would appear, from the Treasurer's report, that he had paid out \$3,826.03 more than his receipts for the year, and that he was to that amount in advance. The total disbursements for the last fiscal year amount to \$54,031.74, leaving a balance due the Treasurer of \$1,862.85.

The buildings have all been erected, but the Commissioners have been unable to entirely complete the work which devolves upon them. Many of the bills which were unpaid at the end of the fiscal year, have since that time been liquidated, and in a short time the work of the Commissioners will be entirely finished.

#### PILOT COMMISSIONERS.

It appears by the report of the Commissioners of Pilotage that there have been no very serious accidents or loss of life or property during the year.

The Board report an entire failure of the change in the apprentice system which was made some six years ago, and ask for the passage of a law providing that the Board shall be permitted to select men from the boat keepers, a plan adopted and in use by the New York Board of Commissioners of Pilotage.

#### STATE BOARD OF HEALTH.

The operations of this Bureau have been so extensive, and its reports are so exhaustive and voluminous, that any attempt to summarize its work would be very unsatisfactory. The work has been conducted on scientific and instructive lines, and the results will prove of great value to the State.

#### PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

The total amount appropriated in the State for school purposes during the school year (not fiscal year) is \$3,323,067.02. Of this there was levied by the State school tax, \$1,939,235, being \$68,180 more than was levied in the previous year. There was levied by the township tax for school purposes, \$47,224.04, and by dis-

trict and city taxes, \$1,204,345.94, and of this last amount \$678,548.22 was levied for building and repairing school houses. One hundred thousand dollars has been apportioned, *pro rata*, to the school districts of the State, from the income of the School Fund, and to this must be added, to make the total amount named above, the interest of the Surplus Revenue Fund, still available in sixteen of the counties, and amounting this year to \$32,262.04. The total value of the school property is \$8,300,610.

Thirty-two new school houses have been erected during the year, seven of these to replace old buildings, making the increase in the total number of school houses only twenty-five, and these furnish accommodations for but 1,972 additional school children, while the last school census shows an increase over the previous year of 4,362 children of school age.

There are now in the State 1,642 public schools, in which there were enrolled during the past year 227,441 pupils, and employing 4,299 teachers. The school census, taken in May last, numbered 392,209 children, while the present school buildings will accommodate but 211,514.

The forthcoming report of the State Superintendent of Public Instruction will show that too large a percentage of our children is unprovided with school accommodations, and a lack of sufficient school-room is reported from nearly every one of our larger cities.

For many years the school districts, other than cities, have been permitted, by statute, to borrow from the State School Fund, for the purpose of building new school houses, giving, as security for the loan, the bonds of the district. In 1886 the rate of interest on these bonds was reduced to five per cent., and since that time many districts have availed themselves of the benefit of these statutes, and as a result the school houses of the State have been much improved. An act was passed last winter which was intended to afford to cities the privilege of borrowing from the School Fund for the same purpose, but no loans have yet been made under this act. The Trustees of the School Fund are anxious to assist localities by making these loans wherever they are needed, and they have never refused an application that has been properly made.

#### NORMAL AND MODEL SCHOOLS.

During the school year ending in 1889, 255 pupils were in attendance at the Normal School. The number graduated from the advanced course was 19, and the number graduated from the

elementary course, 41; total graduates, 60. The whole number in attendance at the Model School during the year was 445; graduates, 14.

I have no report of the whole number in attendance at the Barnum School, at Beverly, but there were ten graduated in June last.

The Principal of the Normal School reports a demand for increased building accommodations. The management especially urges the necessity for the construction of a proper building for manual training, which has been made a part of the school curriculum of the State. This demand is respectfully submitted to your consideration, with the suggestion that a portion of the income of the school fund could be properly appropriated to this purpose.

#### THE STATE AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE.

The Board of Visitors report that Rutgers Scientific School, the State Agricultural College, is faithfully discharging its obligations to the State. During the last two years a new department of work has been organized in the interests of agricultural science. The Professor of Chemical Geology is investigating the soils of the State; the Entomologist, engaged for the purpose, has rendered valuable assistance to our farmers in preventing the depredations of insect pests; the Botanist is carefully studying the horticultural and agricultural interests of the State, and has rendered valuable assistance to our farmers by his papers, reports and bulletins; and the Biologist is investigating the oyster industries, with results already attained that promise to be of great use to this industry, so important in our State. A series of experiments upon the five leading breeds of dairy cattle has been commenced and will continue through three years or more. The breeders' organizations of the leading breeds have coöperated with the College station in furnishing three approved specimens of each breed. Useful results are confidently expected to follow.

The forty scholarships belonging to the State are already filled. In addition to these, twenty-nine young men, residents of New Jersey, have been recommended for free scholarships by the County Superintendents of their several counties, and have asked for and are receiving tuition free of expense. The new dormitory which is now building, at a cost of some \$75,000, a gift from a trustee of the college, will accomodate certain students who are on State scholarships, as well as those in the classical course.

## DEAF MUTE SCHOOL.

There have been under instruction at the School within the past year one hundred and twenty-three (123) pupils, and the average attendance has been one hundred and three (103). The number now enrolled is one hundred and ten (110). There are now employed seven teachers in the literary and four in the industrial department.

Increased provision has been made for the manual and industrial training of the pupils, and gratifying results have been obtained. The supply of books and other needed educational apparatus has been largely increased.

There has been received from the State on account of maintenance, \$27,224; of repairs, alterations, &c., \$5,000.

I recommend that the property, which has become very valuable, be sold. The ownership by the State of such a tract in the heart of a growing city takes its value out of the taxable property and increases the burden on the taxpayer. The estate could no doubt be disposed of for a sum sufficient to produce the same quantity of land elsewhere and to erect buildings more commodious and better adapted to the purposes of the school.

## BLIND AND FEEBLE-MINDED.

The State supports the blind children in the institutions of New York City and Philadelphia, there being forty-four in all, thirty-three being in New York and eight in Philadelphia. The amount paid during the year to the New York institution was \$6,907.16; to the Philadelphia institution, \$2,537.26.

I sent to the care of the Pennsylvania Industrial Home for Blind Women, one patient during the last year, but had some hesitation as to whether the present condition of the law covered the case. These industrial institutions have been established for the purpose of instructing the blind in manual training, so as to enable them to acquire skill and proficiency in some industrial branch and to enable them to have some means of livelihood. There is a similar institution now opened and in successful operation in Elizabeth, of this State, being incorporated under the laws of the State, under the name of the New Jersey Industrial Home for the Blind. It has thus far received assistance in contributions of the charitable, but has been mainly self-supporting. The managers propose to manufacture brushes, mattresses and cane chairs, and they have during the time which they have been in operation, had these industries in successful progress. The



blind readily acquire skill in these and similar branches of industry, and a person soon becomes so proficient as to be able to not only contribute to, but defray whatever expenses he or she may be to the institution.

I would recommend the passage of a law, similar to the one now in force, giving the Governor the power to send children to the asylums, which would authorize him to send blind adults to institutions where manual training is a feature, and to graduate the allowance to be made by the State according to the circumstances of each case.

There have been one hundred and forty-four feeble-minded children taken care of at the expense of the State, being an increase of thirty-six over last year; seventy-six of these have been sent to and maintained at the Pennsylvania Training School for Feeble-Minded Children, at Elwyn; four at the Connecticut Institution for Imbeciles, and sixty-four at the Educational Home for Feeble-Minded Children, at Vineland, N. J. The amounts paid for the maintenance and support of these children were as follows: To the Pennsylvania institution, \$19,176.58; to the New Jersey Home at Vineland, \$12,457.15; to the Connecticut institution, \$1,166.40.

#### MORRISTOWN INSANE ASYLUM.

It appears by the report of the Board of Managers that there have been under treatment at this institution during the past year 1,122 patients; that there remained on the 31st day of October, 1889, 857 patients, of whom 427 were males and 430 females, and 723 public and 134 private patients. The average number under treatment was a fraction over 907.

The total receipts for the maintenance of the institution for the year, including the balance on hand at its commencement, were \$247,093.47; the total expenditures amounted to \$246,863.69, leaving a balance October 31st, 1889, as reported by the Treasurer, of \$229.73.

The managers report that the medical department, under the able management of the resident physician and his corps of assistants, and the business department, under the warden as general manager and those under his direction, have demonstrated that the dual system is not only practicable but useful, and the best mode of governing an asylum for the insane.

They again urge the desirability of a change in the existing arrangements, with reference to dining rooms of the institution, and the construction and use of assembly dining rooms, one for each sex.

The improvements which have been heretofore authorized are well-nigh completed, and the system of sewerage is in operation and entirely satisfactory.

#### TRENTON INSANE ASYLUM.

The number of patients during the year at this institution was 947—474 males and 473 females. There were 169 discharged during the year, of whom 64 had recovered, 29 improved, 6 unimproved, 2 not insane, 68 died, leaving remaining there on the 31st of October last, 778.

The total amount of receipts, including balance on hand October 31st, 1888, by the Treasurer's report, was \$225,614.86, of which \$20,000 was a transfer, in anticipation of payment, on account of appropriation for new building. The total amount disbursed was \$207,343.10, of which \$31,935.80 was expended on account of new building, the balance being chargeable to maintenance account. The balance on hand October 31st, 1889, was \$18,271.76. The amount received from farm, garden and dairy during the year was \$3,191.32.

#### INSPECTION OF FACTORIES AND WORKSHOPS.

The Inspector of Factories and Workshops reports that the present force of the department is sufficient to properly inspect and enforce the different laws coming under the jurisdiction of the department, provided further legislation is passed by way of amendments, making the present laws operative.

He calls attention to the Compulsory Education law, and the non-compliance with the same on the part of some of the city and township authorities, hoping that the Legislature will make it mandatory upon the authorities of every school district to enforce this most salutary law.

The statistics of the report will show the work accomplished during the past year, and it is very gratifying, as it is evident that the present force can, during the coming year, bring under the supervision of the department all the factories in the State employing minor help.

The third annual Convention of the Factory Inspectors of the United States was held at Trenton, August 6th to 9th, 1889. The following States were represented, viz.: Massachusetts, Ohio, Wisconsin, Connecticut, New York, Maine, Rhode Island, New Jersey and Pennsylvania. Many valuable papers upon sub-

jects in connection with the inspection of factories were read by several of the delegates.

#### BUREAU OF STATISTICS.

The Chief of the Bureau reports that the subject which has been under special consideration and investigation by the Bureau has been the collection of data respecting the active trade life of the New Jersey workmen engaged in the glass, hatting and pottery industries, paying particular attention to the diseases to which these particular trades are subject.

He calls attention to the question of mortgage indebtedness in our State, with reference particularly to that upon our farming land. A commencement has been made in some counties to obtain the statistics upon this question, but the work has not as yet been completed. This is a subject which is now receiving great attention at the hands of statisticians and might be made a work of great importance. In order, however, to be of any assistance in the solution of the questions which present themselves as economic problems, the examinations and reports should be thorough. The statistics gathered here and there can, of course, never be relied upon as data in solving any such problems. A thorough examination and report upon this question would require an additional appropriation for the Bureau.

I therefore recommend, in addition to the appropriation to carry on the regular work, a special appropriation be made to pursue the inquiry as to the mortgage indebtedness of the inhabitants of the State, upon such lines as shall meet the approval of the Governor.

#### GEOLOGICAL SURVEY.

The Geological Survey of the State has been continued through the year, and its work has been, as heretofore, to develop and make public the natural products and resources of New Jersey.

Pursuant to the act of the last Legislature (Chapter CXXXVIII, Laws 1889); the publications of the Geological and Topographical Surveys have been distributed to the several public free schools of the State.

The first volume of the Final Report of the State Geologist, upon the topography, magnetism and climate of New Jersey, has been issued; and the second volume, upon the natural history of the State, including catalogues of the minerals, plants and animals, is now in press. The other volumes will follow as rapidly as they can be properly prepared.

The field work of the year has been largely devoted to the investigation of some of the intricate problems in our structural geology.

Active operations for the drainage of the lowlands in the Passaic river and its branches, just above Little Falls, have been begun, and when the contemplated improvements have been made it is expected that the freshets, which have damaged so much property and been so injurious to public health, will no longer occur.

#### NEW JERSEY AGRICULTURAL EXPERIMENT STATION.

The work of the station is now carried on in the new laboratory.

In addition to the important work done in analyzing the many brands of fertilizers which are sold to farmers in this State, the station has this year conducted important experiments, in both the laboratory and the field. It has analyzed feeding stuffs and studied and analyzed various farm and dairy products. Experiments have been made upon wheat, corn, oats, potatoes, and peach trees, and to test the fertilizing value of the different kinds of plant-food and the best forms and methods in supplying it. Investigations regarding the economic value of the lucern plant have been continued. Some 12,000 copies of the bulletins of information, published almost as often as one a month, are distributed to our farmers. An active participation in the meetings of the farmers' organizations, and frequent papers and lectures by members of the staff of the Station, have helped to render familiar to our farmers the best results and applications of agricultural science in other parts of our own country and in other lands.

#### STATE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE.

The President of the Board calls my attention to an examination of the causes of the decline in the value of the farming interests of the State, and urges a more liberal appropriation for the dissemination of information with reference to this subject.

#### STATE PRISON.

There were, in confinement October 31st, 1889, 997 prisoners, being an increase over the number at that time last year of 116; at the time of making the report of the Supervisor there were 1,026; the total number during the year up to the above date

was 1,410; the daily average was 965, of whom 929 were males and 36 females.

There was expended for maintenance the sum of \$72,798.48, a per capita cost of twenty and sixty-hundredths cents per diem and \$75.44 per annum. The total expenditures were \$154,565.55, a per capita cost of \$160.17 per annum. The earnings for the year were \$54,985.94. The increase in the maintenance account over that of the previous year was \$5,797.72, while the daily cost of maintenance was reduced from 47.35 cents to 43.88 cents, the increase in total expenses being due to the increased number, and the reduction in the per capita cost to a more rigid economy. The earnings show a decrease of \$2,301.19 on those of last year, to be accounted for partly by the failure, during the summer, of one of the largest contractors, in consequence of which some of the men were idle. The average earnings per diem per man was 42.56 cents as against 39.81 for the previous year. All of the contracts expired during the year and new contracts, under the piece-price plan, have been made, which it is expected will be of material advantage to the State.

The claim of the State against the firm of Downs & Finch, which failed, was \$2,318.29 for work actually done, and an additional amount for penalties for non-fulfillment of contracts; the whole matter was finally compromised by the payment, by the receiver of the firm, of the sum of \$6,000 in full of all demands.

The State Prison proper has accommodations for 700 convicts. Owing to the increased number, every available place is occupied; four are in the large cells, while the cells in the new wings, although intended for but one prisoner, are in many places compelled to accommodate two. It is an evil which should be remedied at once. Not only is the present enforced crowding against the intention of the law, but it is injurious to the health, morals and discipline of the prisoners. There is an urgent necessity, not only for cell room, but for a detached building for the use of a hospital; happily no contagious disease has broken out, but if such a calamity should occur there is really no place to properly quarantine the sick. Although an appropriation has been made for the purpose of providing improved facilities for water and drainage, no money has been available for that purpose, and this crying necessity has not been relieved. The moral instructors also urge the want of proper accommodations for religious services.

All of these subjects demand prompt action by the Legislature appropriating the necessary sums and furnishing the money required to meet the same.

The Inspectors and Supervisor testify to the gratifying results which have ensued from the careful management of the institution.

#### REFORM SCHOOL FOR BOYS.

The whole number of boys admitted to this institution since its commencement, July 6th, 1867, has been 2,052, 1,680 of whom have been discharged or gone out under the rules of the school, leaving remaining on the 31st of October last, 327. This is an increase of 74 over the number there one year before; 145 boys were sent to this institution during the past year. There was received during the year, on account of maintenance from the State, \$52,157.50; from the farm and other industries, \$3,349 61, which, with the balance on hand October 31st, 1888, of \$823.82, in all amounting to \$56,330.83, is amount received on maintenance account during the fiscal year.

The total amount of expenditures and expenses during the same period were \$54,573.66, leaving a balance on hand October 31st, 1889, of \$1,757.17. There was also consumed at the institution products of the farm and live stock of the value of \$4,816.83.

The Trustees and Superintendent join in an urgent appeal for more accommodation; the buildings are already crowded, and the school would seem to require another dwelling-house for the proper care of the inmates. They refer to the fact that many boys are sent to the Reform School who should be in some other reformatory institution, in consequence of their advanced age and vicious habits, and refer with approval to the plan suggested of the establishment of an intermediate reformatory, as supplying a need not only desirable in itself, but as giving relief to their own institution.

The trustees urge the repeal or amendment of certain sections of the law with reference to the Reform School, for the particulars of which I refer to the report, recommending the suggestions to the consideration and action of the Legislature.

#### STATE INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL FOR GIRLS.

At the time of the report there were fifty-two girls at the State Industrial School, and thirty-two under indenture, making a total of eighty-four under the control of the Trustees.

The Trustees again urge with great earnestness their want of sufficient accommodation; they say that another building with the proper appurtenances is absolutely required for the proper maintenance and administration of the establishment. This is apparent when it is considered that there are 52 girls now in the school, and the building was originally planned for the custody of only 35.

I respectfully urge these views upon your consideration.

The total receipts were \$10,620.38; expenditures, \$8,547.16; balance, \$2,073.22.

#### PRISON SYSTEMS.

The crowded condition of the State Prison and Reform School for Boys brings the establishment of an intermediate reformatory prominently before you, independent of the many cogent reasons which can be urged for adding such an institution to our penal system. The Legislature last winter authorized the appointment of a commission to take the subject into consideration, and to report on a plan and site for a building. Their report will, no doubt, be presented at your present session, and I urge an appropriation and measures to meet the same, in order that its erection may be commenced at once. Such an institution will not only save many a youth and person convicted for the first time, or of an offense not involving moral turpitude, from association with confirmed criminals, but afford relief to our now overcrowded prison and reform school.

At the last session of the Legislature a law was passed authorizing the conditional release of convicts on good behavior. It is found to be inoperative, but an act will be presented for your consideration which in my judgment obviates the objections raised to the present statute. It is a system which meets the favor of those who have made a study of the proper management and treatment of criminals, and if properly guarded, is a measure which will, in my judgment, be attended with good results.

Your attention is called to the reports of the Reform School and of the State Charities Aid Association on jails and station houses, by which it will appear that the law requiring the separation of adult and minor prisoners is not strictly complied with and that there is not always proper provision for the separate accommodation of witnesses who are detained in custody. Some stringent law should be passed making it obligatory upon the Board of Chosen Freeholders of the respective counties to comply with the provisions of this law.

The National Prison Association holds annual sessions in different parts of the United States. Its deliberations are directed to the consideration of questions as to the best methods of management of prisons and reformatory institutions, and its efforts have been attended with great benefit to the convicts and to the community. Delegates have been appointed from time to time to attend these meetings, but as no provision has been made they have been obliged to bear their own expenses. I would recommend the passage of a law to reimburse those who have represented the State during the last three years, and make provision for the future.

#### STATE CHARITIES AID ASSOCIATION.

The work done by this excellent organization cannot be too highly commended. The members devote time, energy and intelligence to the examination of our jails, almshouses and asylums, and of the poor in their homes, and give their aid and experience to the amelioration of the conditions which they find require or are susceptible of improvement. Their reports are very full and I would recommend that their suggestions be made the special object of legislative inquiry and action.

The Committee of this Association on Almshouses and Poor Houses and Children call attention to the necessity for the passage of a law for the prevention of keeping children in the almshouse for any length of time; there are at present in one county almshouse over 250 children. This is an evil which requires immediate attention. These children brought up in this manner are simply educated to be paupers and vagrants, to be always at the care and expense of the State. They recommend the passage of a law similar to the one passed in Pennsylvania in 1883, by which it is made unlawful to retain children between two and sixteen years of age in an almshouse for a longer time than sixty days, and making it the duty of the officers or persons in charge to have them placed in some respectable family or proper institution, and authorizing one or more counties to act in the establishment and maintenance of an industrial home for the care and training of such children.

They also call attention to the fact that the boards of chosen freeholders have not entirely complied with the law requiring the complete separation of the sexes in the almshouses. When we consider that many of the inmates of these establishments are persons who have not the full enjoyment of their mental faculties, and are not under the restraints which control others, and regard



the consequences which are brought continually to our attention from the neglect to carry out the provisions of such a law, our manhood is shocked that such conditions are permitted to exist, with only the petty excuse furnished by false notions of economy.

#### HOME FOR FEEBLE-MINDED WOMEN.

This institution is one of the most worthy of the charities of this State. The home is located at Vineland. The total number cared for during the year was 28, of which number there have been discharged 5, leaving at the close of the year 23. One has since been admitted. The report shows that they need more room and additional accommodations and further improvements. This institution has furnished a home for the weak-minded women who would otherwise have been placed or retained in the city or county almshouses, and exposed to temptations which their unfortunate mental condition render them illy able to resist. It appears by the report of the State Charities Aid Society that there are now in almshouses in this State eight feeble-minded women who should be placed in an institution of this kind, but who cannot be received for want of accommodations. This is a call which appeals to humanity and good government, and one which ought to be promptly responded to whenever the condition of the State Treasury will authorize the expenditure. The receipts for the fiscal year, including the balance on hand at its commencement, was \$5,923.65. Total disbursements, \$5,667.97, leaving a balance of \$255.68.

On the 24th of September I was called upon to announce, through general orders, the death of Quartermaster-General Lewis Perrine, who had held that position for nearly half a century, and whose discharge of its arduous and trying duties during the civil war and since, entitles him to the respect and esteem in which he was held by his associates and the people of the State.

The State has also, during the year, sustained a loss in the death of Prof. George H. Cook, the State Geologist, whose long and valuable services to the State have done so much to bring her natural resources to public notice. Fortunately his work in connection with the Geological Survey was well-nigh completed. It will always be an invaluable contribution to the State, and a monument to his ability and fidelity.

I cannot permit the pleasant relations which have existed between myself and the State officers, whose duties have brought

them into constant intercourse with the Executive, to close, without expressing to them my appreciation of the kindness, assistance and consideration I have ever received at their hands.

The trust which, three years ago, was reposed in me by the people of my native State, I have endeavored to discharge with fidelity to her interests and her honor, and will, in a few days, surrender to my successor, with the prayer that the Great Ruler of Nations will continue to bless this State and its people with "Liberty and Prosperity."

In pursuance of the resolution, the Speaker appointed as a committee on the part of the House Messrs. Mullone, Schroth, Stull, Snyder and Wyckoff.

Mr. Marsh offered the following resolution, which was read and adopted.

*Resolved*, That a committee of three be appointed by the Speaker to procure the attendance of clergymen to open the House with prayer.

In pursuance of such resolution the Speaker appointed as a committee Messrs. Stull, Perkins and Wyckoff.

Mr. Marsh offered the following resolution, which was read and adopted:

*Resolved*, That a committee of three be appointed to procure bill files for the use of the members.

In pursuance of such resolution the Speaker appointed as a committee Messrs. Marsh, Murphy and Snyder.

The Governor's Message was then taken up.

On motion of Mr. Potts the reading of the Message was dispensed with, and the usual number of copies ordered to be printed.

Mr. Klotz offered the following resolution, which was read and adopted:

*Resolved*, That the House of Assembly accept the invitation to attend the reception tendered to Governor-elect Abbott by the Democratic Society of New Jersey, for Monday evening, January 20th, 1890.

Mr. Marsh moved that when this House adjourn it be to meet to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock,

Which was agreed to.

Mr. Marsh presented the following protest, which was received and referred to the Committee on Elections, when appointed:

*To the Honorable Members of the House of Assembly of the One Hundred and Fourteenth Legislature, State of New Jersey:*

GENTLEMEN—

*Whereas*, By an act of the One Hundred and Thirteenth Legislature the Assembly Districts of the State, including the three embraced in Camden county, were made to conform to certain specific lines clearly defined in said act; and

*Whereas*, In this enacted specification the Second Assembly District of Camden county was provided to consist of the Fifth, Sixth and Seventh Wards of Camden city and a certain defined portion of the township of Stockton, in Camden county; and

*Whereas*, Subsequent to the passage of said act, the city council of Camden, by ordinance, did readjust the boundary lines of the Sixth, Seventh and Eighth Wards in a manner resulting in the formation of two new election precincts in the Sixth Ward which were not of the said Sixth Ward at the time of the passage of the act forming the new Assembly lines of the State, including the Second District of Camden county; and

*Whereas*, A major portion of one of these new precincts formed by the said ordinance of the city council of Camden was made to consist of a portion of the Eighth Ward of said city, to wit: That portion of the Eighth Ward formerly embraced between the points beginning at Kaighn avenue and the West Jersey Railroad; thence, southerly, to Little Newton creek; thence, along the middle line of said Little Newton creek, westwardly, to the middle line of Broadway; thence, along Broadway, north, to the middle line of Kaighn avenue; thence, eastward, to the place of beginning; and

*Whereas*, This or no other portion of the Eighth Ward was included in the Second Assembly District of Camden county by the act of the One Hundred and Thirteenth Legislature; and

*Whereas*, On the contrary, the Eighth Ward, including that portion heretofore described, was by the act of the One Hundred and Thirteenth Legislature made an integral portion of the First Assembly District of Camden county; and

*Whereas*, The city council of Camden, by subsequent ordinance, did proceed to elect and qualify election officers, who persisted in holding an election in the unlawfully added portion of the Eighth Ward and in returning the ballots therein cast to the Board of County Canvassers as lawful ballots cast in the Second Assembly District of Camden county; and

*Whereas*, The said county canvassers did count and credit all ballots cast in the said unlawfully added territory for one John Harris, as lawful ballots of the Second Assembly District; and

*Whereas*, By the herein-defined subterfuge, and the unlawful disregard of the enactment of the Legislature of the State of New Jersey, the said John Harris in part claims to hold a certificate of election from the lawful Second Assembly District of Camden county to the One Hundred and Fourteenth Legislature;

I, as a citizen of the State of New Jersey, and a resident of the lawful Second Assembly District of Camden county, do respectfully protest to the validity of the certificate held by the said John Harris, and do petition your honorable body to decline its acceptance until the foregoing allegations can be legally established.

"Resolved (the House of Assembly concurring), That the Senators and Representatives of this State, in the Congress of the United States, be and they are hereby urgently requested to vote for and use their influence and efforts in their representative capacity to secure the selection of the city of New York as the site and location of the World's Fair to be held in 1892, as such selection will not only afford great facilities for the exhibition of the manufactures and products of this State, but will also prove

conducive to the ultimate success of the undertaking; and that the able and incontrovertible arguments of Chauncey M. Depew and others of the State New York, before the Congressional Committee in the city of Washington, on this subject, are hereby most cordially indorsed and adopted as the sentiments of the people of New Jersey, believing that a favorable decision will redound to the honor and credit of the entire Republic."

*Mr. Speaker:*

I am directed by the Senate to inform the House of Assembly that the Senate has passed the following Concurrent Resolution:

"*Whereas*, Both political parties represented in the Legislature of this State have in their platforms and public enunciation of principles declared in favor of ballot reform and such legislation as might be necessary to secure secrecy and purity of the ballot in the exercise of the right of suffrage; and

"*Whereas*, The two Houses of the Legislature represent the two great parties of the country, and it being desirable and imperative, in obedience to public sentiment and the will of the people, and in accordance with the wise suggestions of the Governor of the State in his inaugural message, that harmony and unity of action should facilitate the necessary legislation, which should not be retarded by partisan policy with a view to the political advantage of either party; therefore, be it

"*Resolved* (the House of Assembly concurring), That a joint committee be appointed, consisting of four members of the Senate and six of the House of Assembly, each party to be equally represented in number, whose duty it shall be to prepare and draft a bill for enactment which shall provide and secure all necessary safeguards for the exercise of the right of suffrage in absolute secrecy, without fear of intimidation, and to prevent as far as possible, bribery or corruption at the polls; to provide for official ballots printed at the public expense, the right of nomination by petition and the true and honest return and count of the votes when cast, and to secure proper and complete facilities

to all citizens of every condition to exercise untrammelled the constitutional and inherent right of manhood suffrage; and

“Resolved, That the said committee, when appointed, shall, after due notice by them given, meet at stated times during the session of the Legislature in the Senate Chamber to hear all citizens interested and the representatives of all political or industrial organizations of the people whose interests or condition may be affected, with a view to obtaining wise suggestions and collating for embodiment of the bill the best known means and methods for the suppression of existing evils, with a due regard to the rights of every citizen,”

And that the committee report at the earliest possible day of this session.

Mr. Mullone, of the Committee on Inaugural Ceremonies, submitted the following report :

*Mr. Speaker*—The Committee on Inauguration would respectfully report that the inaugural ceremonies took place at Taylor Opera House, Tuesday, January 21st, in accordance with the programme laid down by the Joint Committee on Inauguration, and in the presence of the Legislature, Justices of the Supreme Court, State officers and a large assemblage of people, Governor Abbett delivered the following

#### INAUGURAL ADDRESS.

*Gentlemen of the Senate and General Assembly :*

I assume for a second time the duties of Governor of the State, fully appreciating the high honor conferred upon me and deeply impressed with the grave responsibilities imposed by the duties of the office. I shall devote my best energies to advance the prosperity of the State and to secure to the people the blessings of good government and a wise and economical administration of public affairs.

I take a just pride in the exalted position of our State among her sister commonwealths, in her material growth and prosperity, in the increase of her population and in the conservative and moral sentiment of her people. An imperative sense of duty, however, impels me to present for your consideration certain facts and questions demanding legislative action, together with my own views as to the proper mode of dealing with the conditions thus presented. You will, in the exercise of your independent judgment, act as you deem for the best interests of the State. My duty in acting upon proposed legislation will always be performed after a most careful and respectful consideration of your views, and with a disposition to yield in matters of detail, when no principle is involved, in a difference of views between the Legislature and the Executive.

#### FINANCES.

The most important question presented is the present financial condition of the State and the best mode of dealing with it. The Legislature and the people should look squarely at the facts as they are; the whole truth should be told and considered. The people should know the truth, so that they may intelligently commend or criticise the action of the law-making power in the measures presented by it for the solution of the question. The Legislature should know the situation, so that it may act promptly and efficiently.

The estimated income of the State for the present fiscal year, according to the Comptroller's report, is \$1,335,000. The estimated expenditures for ordinary State purposes is fixed by him at \$1,370,000. In addition to these ordinary expenses, the Legislature has heretofore made appropriations for various purposes, without providing any means for payment thereof. With the present sources of revenue and the present rate of expenditures there is no surplus to pay these appropriations. The present revenue of the State must be used for the payment of the ordinary expenses of government. The executive, legislative and judicial departments must be maintained. The asylums, prisons, reformatory and other institutions of the State must be cared for. The present income of the State being only sufficient to pay the ordinary yearly expenses, some other means must be provided for the payment of extra or unusual appropriations. At the end of the fiscal year, October 31st, 1889, there was a deficiency of \$559,673.57. This amount is deduced from the following figures presented in the Governor's last message and in the report of the Comptroller:

It is probable that a portion of this sum may not be needed during the present fiscal year, but the whole amount must be provided for if the present obligations of the State are to be liquidated. The State will certainly require of the above amount at least \$450,000 during the present fiscal year to meet its accruing obligations. Provision should be made at once for the payment of the \$400,000 of temporary loans upon which the State is paying, at present, interest at the rate of five per cent. per annum. The State owns shares of railroad stock which, at the price paid by the school fund for other similar shares, are worth \$471,750. The assets, if used, would yield nearly enough to liquidate the deficiency. These securities can be sold or transferred, without additional legislation, by the action of the Governor, Comptroller, Treasurer and Trustees for the Support of Public Schools. This transfer would give the school fund a four per cent. investment

on the money paid for these shares, a higher rate of interest than can be realized upon new investments of this fund. There has been a hesitancy upon the part of the State to dispose of these assets, even to pay temporary loans, a hesitancy which, in my judgment, has been wise, because the Legislature should provide for the payment of the expenses of the State government from other sources, and leave these securities for any great emergency demanding their use. Such an emergency does not now exist. If, however, the Legislature fails to provide for this deficiency, I shall then deem it wise to use these securities to extinguish the temporary loans, in order to stop the payment of interest thereon. I most urgently urge the Legislature to take such action as will obviate the necessity of using these securities for this purpose.

Not only should the present deficiency be provided for, but laws should be passed to raise money for purposes for which no provision now exists. The State Institutions for the insane, for criminals and for reformatory purposes demand the expenditure of money for additional accommodations. This demand should receive the prompt attention of the Legislature. The condition of affairs in the State Prison calls for immediate action; it is demanded by every consideration of humanity and by the best interests of the State. There are now over 1,000 inmates of the State Prison undergoing punishment. The accommodations are only sufficient for 706. The provision of the law which demands separate confinement of each prisoner is necessarily violated. It is impossible for the prison authorities to obey this law. If the people of the State knew, as do those in charge of the prison, the result of this crowding of prisoners, and the placing of more than one in each cell, there would be an imperative demand for legislation which would carry into effect the law requiring the separate confinement of prisoners. If the Legislature will investigate this subject a condition of things will be found to exist which should not be tolerated one moment beyond the time necessary to remedy the evil. Intermediate State prisons must be built or provision made for the county institutions to care for certain classes of criminals, or there must be an extension of the State Prison so as to afford additional room. The extension of the State Prison would probably require the expenditure of at least \$100,000, because not only is the prison accommodation insufficient, but the number of criminals is increasing as the population of the State and of the great cities adjacent to it multiplies.

Various suggestions have been made as to legislation to meet the present deficiency, and also to provide revenue sufficient to increase the accommodations in the State institutions. I will refer to some of the most important.

1st. It has been proposed that a direct State tax be levied on the ratables of the State, exclusive of property used for railroad and canal purposes.

2d. That the money arising from future grants or leases of lands of the State under water shall be used for these purposes.

3d. That the tax upon railroads and canals, for State uses, be increased either temporarily or permanently, so as to derive additional income therefrom.

4th. That the revenues from miscellaneous corporations be increased.

5th. That a collateral inheritance tax and a tax upon legacies be imposed.

There are other possible sources of revenue, but they are so uncertain as to amount and as to the time when the State will receive any benefit therefrom, that I do not deem it wise to depend upon them for the present exigency. There are litigations with corporations pending from which the State may possibly derive considerable money. Every effort will be made to hasten the determination of these controversies, and I may hereafter communicate specially to the Legislature in relation to this subject.

There is also a possible revenue to be derived from legislation of the Congress of the United States with reference to the refunding tax paid by the States to the United States during the civil war. A bill is now pending in Congress which, if it becomes a law, will entitle New Jersey to \$382,613.90. If the State should receive this money it could be used for the purposes above enumerated.

Some of the suggestions above mentioned and others were considered by me in messages to the Legislature during my previous term of office. Without repeating them at this time, I ask the attention of the Legislature to those messages which deal with possible sources of revenue.

#### DIRECT STATE TAX.

The individual taxpayers of the State were relieved from the imposition of a direct State tax for governmental purposes by legislation passed during my former term of office. I still entertain the views expressed in 1884.

Under an honest and economical administration of the government, I do not think any such tax is necessary. In view of the heavy burdens which already rest upon the people by local taxation, the imposition of such a tax would bear with great

hardship upon individual taxpayers, and especially upon those engaged in agricultural pursuits. Such a tax should not be resorted to unless it is absolutely necessary. In my judgment it is neither necessary nor expedient. The people of the State have expressed their sentiments with clearness against the imposition of a direct tax, and upon my own convictions and in obedience to their will, I shall feel impelled to resist to the full extent conferred upon me by the Constitution, any effort to reimpose such a burden upon the people.

#### LANDS UNDER WATER.

The lands under the navigable waters beyond high-water mark are the property of the State. Under the Constitution and legislation thereunder, the proceeds of grants and leases of this property in the past and all that may accrue in the future under the Act of April 6th, 1871 (Laws 1871, p. 98), and under the Act of April 2d, 1872 (Laws 1872, page 61), are pledged irrevocably to the school fund. It was originally contemplated that this fund would, in time, be sufficient to relieve the people of a State school tax. It never can do so. It would take \$40,000,000 invested at five per cent. to yield sufficient income to relieve the people of this tax, which amounts to over three and one-tenth mills. The State school tax for this year amounts to \$1,939,235. The School Fund amounted October 31st, 1889, to \$3,379,404.31; the income from this fund last year was \$203,416.04. Over \$400,000 has been paid to this fund since October 31st, 1889. The State is not able to obtain over three per cent. on new investments of this fund. The money spent for educational purposes in this State amounts to over \$3,400,000 *per annum* (a).

This sum does not provide for the education of all the children of school age. The school census of 1889 showed 392,209 children.

In September, 1889, the total number of pupils enrolled in the public schools was 227,441. Those educated in private schools were estimated at 45,765. This would leave without school accommodations nearly 120,000. The highest interests of the State demand that accommodations for the education of every child should be provided; this would further increase the expenditures for school purposes by the State and localities.

The figures given above demonstrate that the revenue from the school fund is insignificant when compared with the amount needed for school purposes.

The enormous amount of the present school fund, the difficulty of its investment and the danger of loss of principal and interest present serious questions as to the wisdom of increasing this fund. The interests of the State imperatively demand that the money to be derived from future grants and leases of this property should be used for the payment of the indebtedness of the State and to meet absolutely necessary appropriations.

The paramount consideration in future dealing with this fund rests upon the financial condition of the State and its pressing necessities for extraordinary expenditures. The honor of the State is involved in the payment of its obligations. A great State should not keep its creditors waiting; it should not borrow money on temporary loans while it has this property in lands under water. We owe over half a million dollars. We have property which we are selling, the proceeds of which would enable us to gradually liquidate this indebtedness. Is it not financial wisdom and for the best interests of the State to use the revenue from this source to meet the obligations of the State? This proposition does not touch the school fund as it now exists. That is protected by the provisions of the Constitution. All that legislation on this subject could do would be to devote money which arises from this source by future sales and leases to the payment of State obligations. I recommend to the Legislature to amend the acts of 1871 and 1872, and pledge the money to be derived from these lands in the future to State purposes.

While it is true that the present deficiency arises from appropriations made by previous legislatures, which failed to provide the means for raising the money for their payment, yet this does not relieve the State from these obligations. The legislatures in the past did not see fit, in their wisdom, to provide for the payment of certain appropriations. They have left the execution of that duty to you. Many, if not all, of the appropriations were made for purposes demanded by the necessities of the State, from a high and exalted patriotism and in the exercise of a broad and liberal charity towards the afflicted. If the State owns property

which it can constitutionally use to pay the debts growing out of these appropriations, I know of no reason which should prevent the use of these funds for the payment of obligations incurred by former Legislatures. I do not deem it wise legislation to make appropriations without providing in the act the means to raise the money therefor, unless there are existing sources of revenue to pay the same. The Legislature should be unwilling to take the credit of making appropriations for legitimate and praiseworthy purposes unless it is ready to assume the responsibility of providing the money to meet them. It is very easy to appropriate money and leave to others the responsibility of paying it in the future, but it is not just to those who come after us, nor is it wise as a matter of State policy. I shall deem it my duty to veto all such appropriation bills. I ask your earnest coöperation in the effort to break up this objectionable practice, by refusing to pass any act appropriating money unless there is revenue to meet it or the act provides some means of paying it.

#### INCREASING THE RAILROAD TAX.

The Comptroller estimates that during the present year about \$950,000 will be derived from the State tax of one-half of one per cent. on property used for railroad and canal purposes. An additional tax of one mill on this property would yield \$190,000. This sum would soon relieve the State from all difficulty and enable it to meet the demand for extensions of State institutions.

Whether it would be fair or just to raise this money from this source, depends upon whether the railroad and canal companies of the State are now paying taxes equal to those of individuals. If the tax on these corporations, under the present law, imposes upon them burdens equal to those borne by the individual taxpayers, then it would not be just to impose this additional burden.

Upon this point I submit the following facts to the Legislature as bearing upon the question:

These corporations, in addition to the \$950,000, will pay, under the estimate of the Comptroller, about \$320,000 for municipal purposes, or a total tax of \$1,270,000. These corporations pay the tax of one-half of one per cent. upon all of their property used for railroad and canal purposes, including the value of their franchises. The additional State tax, which is appropriated to county or municipal purposes, is derived from only a small portion of their property. There is exempt from this tax, which is one for municipal uses, the main stem of the railroads, the waterways of the canals and the franchises and personal property of



these corporations. There is left, subject to this tax for municipal uses, only the real estate used for railroad and canal purposes outside of the main stem of the railroads, and the waterways of the canals. I annex hereto a statement marked "A," which separates the totals of values taxed in the years 1884 to 1888, inclusive, into items of main stem and waterways, franchises, personal property and real estate other than main stems or waterways. The total of all these items pays a State tax of one-half of one per cent; the last item pays an additional tax for the use of localities. This additional tax is limited to not exceeding one per cent. If the local rate is less than one per cent., this item only pays the local rate; if the local rate exceeds one per cent., the corporation gets the advantage of the one per cent. limitation. This statement also shows for each year the total tax that is assessed for State uses and the total tax that is assessed for local purposes. The estimates of the Comptroller show the amount of these assessments that will probably be collected after appeal and review by the Courts. The figures in the statement show that the increase of railroad property is not sufficient to more than meet the natural increase of the ordinary expenses of the State.

This statement, under the heading of 1885 and the item of Main Stem, shows \$81,066,800 of real estate. To ascertain the amount of tax which this property would pay if subject to full local rates, it is necessary to apportion this value of "main stem" among the several taxing districts in the State. I present to you, in the statement hereto annexed, marked "B," an apportionment of this amount among the taxing districts of the State, which, I believe, is accurate. It has been prepared from various official sources and data, which can be verified by an examination of the records and papers in the office of the State Board of Assessors. My limited time and examination have rendered it impossible for me to now present to you an apportionment of the "main stem" among the localities for the other years. The result obtained from an examination of the records of 1885 will, however, apply substantially to the other years contained in the statement marked "A." The small percentage of difference in these years will not practically change the conclusions to be drawn from the data given.

The statement hereto annexed, marked "C," shows the result of this apportionment in detail in thirty districts, which are the principal taxing districts of the State: it embraces all the cities of the State except Gloucester City, and includes also other important railroad and canal points. These thirty districts contain thirty-five per cent. of the entire main stem of the railroads and

of the waterways of the canals, and eighty-one and six-tenths per cent. of property used for railroad and canal purposes outside of main stem and waterways.

The annexed tables show that the advantage to these corporations is greatest where the local tax rate is highest.

The entire real estate used for railroad and canal purposes in these thirty districts was assessed, in 1885, a total tax of \$594,397.05, which includes both the tax of one-half of one per cent. and the additional tax for local uses. A tax, at the local rates, on the real estate used for railroad and canal purposes in these thirty taxing districts, would yield the sum of \$1,489,399.23. The difference between this latter sum and the total tax assessed under the act of 1884 is \$895,002.18, which is the value of the exemptions and limitations in these thirty taxing districts, secured to these corporations under the act of 1884. This advantage certainly exists, as stated, unless it can be demonstrated that the valuations of real estate in these districts by the local assessors is only about forty per cent. of its true value. The valuation of real estate by local assessors in these districts certainly reaches over six per cent. of its full value. If we take the basis of sixty per cent., this exemption would amount to the sum of \$299,242.49 in these thirty districts. This latter sum is obtained by taking from \$895,002.18 the sum of \$595,759.67, which latter sum is forty per cent. of the \$1,489,399.23 above mentioned, and by assuming that the railroad and canal property is assessed at its full value.

There are 245 other taxing districts in the State, containing property used for railroad and canal purposes. An examination of the local tax rates therein for 1885, shows the following results:

In these 245 taxing districts there was located in 1885 sixty-five per cent. of the real estate of the main stem of the railroads and of the water-ways of the canals. This real estate was valued at \$52,680,983.20. These corporations pay on this property a tax to the State of one-half of one per cent., amounting to \$263,404.92. This property is exempt from all local tax.

In the same 245 taxing districts there was also located 18.4 per cent of the real estate used for railroad and canal purposes other

than main stem and water-ways. This was valued at \$6,812,049.82. It paid a tax of one-half of one per cent. for State purposes, and a tax for local uses at a rate not exceeding one per cent.

This latter amount is all that these corporations paid on a total valuation of \$59,493,033.02 of real estate in these 245 taxing districts. This would give an average tax rate of 6.11 mills, or \$6.11 on each \$1,000 of valuation. The value to the companies of these exemptions in these 245 taxing districts under the act of 1884, amounts to \$112,267.30.

If the claim is made by the corporations that in these districts the local assessors do not tax real estate at its true value, and that the State assessors do tax railroad and canal property at its true value, the question still remains as to the practical result of this difference, if it really exists. If the local assessors assess only sixty per cent. of the value of real estate in these districts, then the companies would be discriminated against therein to the extent of \$78,110.40. This would still leave in the whole of the 275 taxing districts an advantage to the companies over individuals of \$221,132.09, or over \$30,000 more than the \$190,000 which would be obtained by the additional State tax of one mill on railroad and canal property.

By the above statement it will be seen that the franchises and personal property of the railroad and canal companies to the extent of \$71,638,188.64 are left entirely free from any local tax.

In view of the above facts, if the necessities of the State require this additional revenue, it is for the Legislature to consider whether or not the imposition of this additional tax of one mill on railroad and canal property cannot be levied without doing injustice to these corporations.

#### MISCELLANEOUS CORPORATIONS.

The estimated amount of tax from this source for the ensuing fiscal year is \$225,000. These taxes, in many cases, can be judiciously increased without injury to the corporations or the

business interests of the State. The tax imposed upon some of the corporations under the present law does not bear a fair relation to that imposed upon others. The tax upon certain classes of corporations ought to be increased so that from this source at least \$300,000 can be secured.

#### COLLATERAL INHERITANCE TAX AND TAX ON LEGACIES.

Other States of the Union derive a substantial revenue from these sources. There is no reason why they should not yield a revenue in this State. It is an imposition which will not be injuriously felt if a limitation is made so that the tax shall not be imposed upon amounts less than two thousand dollars. I recommend the imposition of these taxes.

#### EQUAL TAXATION.

I am in favor of equal taxation upon individual and corporate property. I favor the continuance of the method of taxing railroad and canal property under the present system of assessment by a State Board of Assessors. The classification of this property under these acts and the mode of imposing the tax have been held to be constitutional by the highest court of our State. The peculiar character of the property involved makes the present system a necessity, if honest and fair results are to be obtained. The experience of the past six years has, I think, convinced all those acquainted with the working of the present system, that the interests of the State are safer in the hands of a State Board of Assessors than they would be under any other system. The State Board is non-partisan. It constitutes a tribunal where both the State and the corporations may be heard, and its decisions may be reviewed by judicial tribunals in whom all our citizens have entire confidence. The provisions of the act should, however, be extended so that localities which are affected by the action of the State Board shall have a right to review their proceedings.

The general tax acts as affecting other classes of property should, however, be revised.

There are inequalities of assessment and violations of the law by local tax assessors in many localities, which in my judgment demand legislation. This legislation should provide, in certain cases, for a review of the work of the local assessors by State and County Boards. There are undoubtedly unfair valuations made

by some of the local assessors, and some tribunal beyond local influence should have the power to remedy unfair assessments which result in some cases from neglect of duty, and in others from a wilful violation of the law by these officers in order to favor individuals or localities. Unfair assessments by local officers may render them personally popular and secure their continuance in office, but this advantage is gained by a violation of their oaths of office and at the expense of property owners in other localities.

The revision of the general tax laws should not be dealt with in a hasty manner. Legislation on this subject should be the result of thorough investigation and careful thought. I recommend to the Legislature the appointment of a non-partisan commission to examine this subject and report to the next Legislature the defects in the present tax laws and their practical administration, and the remedies for securing in reality what the Constitution demands—"That property shall be assessed for taxes under general laws, by uniform rules, according to its true value."

In considering this subject of equal taxation, the Legislature, or such commission, should also consider the taxes imposed upon railroad and canal property, as classified under the Act of 1884, and should report such modifications of the existing laws as will compel these corporations to pay equal taxes with individuals. Equal taxation of the railroad companies can be secured by repealing the exemptions and limitation given by the Act of 1884, and, in the assessment of the tax for local uses, allowing the companies credit for the tax of one-half of one per cent. which they now pay to the State upon all their property. If, under such an amendment, injustice would be done to these corporations by reason of local assessors failing to assess the property of individuals at its full value, the proper remedy therefor would be to give to these corporations the right to appeal to some judicial tribunal or some State board, to compel the local assessors to do their full duty under the Constitution and their oath of office. I am opposed to any attempt to impose unfair burdens upon the great interests represented by the railroad and canal companies of the State. I ask, however, on behalf of the people, that the Legislature will by appropriate legislation, subject this class of property to equal taxation with that imposed upon the property of individuals.

#### BALLOT REFORM AND HONEST ELECTIONS.

The best sentiment of the country in all the States demands ballot reform and honest elections.

The safeguards which the law has thrown around the ballot have been found insufficient to prevent fraud, the intimidation of the voter and the corrupt use of money in elections. The oaths of election officers have not always prevented them from tampering with the ballot-box, and receiving and counting fraudulent votes. The great mass of election officers are honest and conscientious in the discharge of their duty, but there are a few who will violate their oaths of office and run the risk of punishment, to change or attempt to change the result of elections. There are citizens entitled to the ballot, who, notwithstanding the penalties of the law, deliberately sell their votes, or demand money for voting in accordance with their political convictions. Men of high standing contribute large sums of money, which, in many instances, is used by disreputable party agents to bribe voters or election officers. The penalties of the law seem impotent to stop these practices. This condition of affairs is an evil that every honest citizen should use his best energies to stamp out by radical measures.

Different systems and modifications of systems have been tried in different communities. The experience of these communities will enable us to exercise an intelligent judgment in securing legislation in our State which will give us pure elections, expressing only the honest sentiment of the masses.

Without reproducing and contrasting the various opinions of distinguished men, and of organizations which favor this reform, I present for your consideration the conclusions which I have reached, after the most careful investigation and study of what has been written and said upon this subject, and of what has been accomplished under the laws of other States and countries.

Every law on this subject should embrace the following essential features:

*First.*—Registration of every voter in the State, with a registry list subject to judicial revision.

*Second.*—Absolute secrecy of the ballot.

To secure this there should be an enclosure within which the voter shall be free from all influence, supervision or control. In that enclosure there should be a compartment which he must enter and where, in secret, he would have the opportunity to prepare his ballot. From this compartment he should proceed directly to the ballot-box with a folded ballot. This he should offer to the election board, who should deposit it in the box in the same condition, subject only to rejection for legal reasons. If the ballot is rejected it should be returned to the voter without inspection.

*Third.*—There should be an exclusively official ballot, printed and distributed by the State, so that one ballot cannot be distinguished from another when it is folded and ready for voting. The law should prohibit the use of any ballot except the official ballot.

*Fourth.*—Provision for judicial action by which an election in any precinct may be set aside and a new election ordered therein, whenever the judge or court shall be satisfied that there has been fraud, bribery or other illegal practices which would affect the result, or where, by reason of death or resignation of any candidate, the failure to supply voters with tickets, or for any other cause, the electors have been deprived of a fair opportunity to express their choice at the ballot-box. All such proceedings should be summary. When a new election is ordered it should be called for the earliest possible day. The court or judge should be empowered to make a final certificate of election whenever such new election changes the result.

*Fifth.*—The right of nomination by petition should be given when a certain percentage of the voters ask therefor.

*Sixth.*—No ticket should be printed or distributed unless the parties nominated thereon have signified in writing their acceptance of such nomination.

*Seventh.*—Provision that certain judicial officers shall provide for the printing and distributions of official ballots where there has been failure to act on the part of the proper officers.

*Eighth.*—All forms of intimidation, bribery or illegal practices should be declared to be criminal. Every voter should have secured to him the opportunity to vote, and sufficient time should be allowed him therefor. It should be made a crime to infringe upon this right or to impose any penalty or disadvantage upon the voter exercising such right.

*Ninth.*—There should be a limitation of the amount which may be legally spent in or for any election. An election should be declared void if such limit shall be knowingly exceeded by a candidate, or by any person acting for or in his behalf with his knowledge. An election in any precinct should also be declared void wherever any judicial officer shall ascertain that such limitation has been grossly exceeded in that precinct, even without the knowledge of the candidate, if the vote of such precinct might change the result of the election.

*Tenth.*—The law should provide for publicity of election expenditures, and a candidate should be required to publish and file of record, immediately after an election, an itemized statement, under oath, of all the moneys expended at such election by him or with his knowledge. The failure to file such a state-

ment should vacate his office and render void his election. The court should be given the power to compel the appearance of any person before it to be examined, under oath, concerning political expenditures, and also to require, on such examination, the production of the books and papers of corporations, associations or individuals.

*Eleventh.*—It should compel everyone offering a bribe or receiving a bribe, either as a voter or as an election officer, to testify in regard thereto, with a provision that such testimony should not be used against such witness in any criminal or other proceeding whatever.

The act should provide, so far as the Constitution will permit, for the disqualification thereafter of any voter or other person violating any provision of such statute.

In considering legislation on this subject, we must bear in mind the provisions of our own Constitution. Our Constitution requires no educational or property qualification to entitle a citizen to suffrage. In these respects it is different from the Constitutions of some of the other States. The law should contain no provisions which would unduly hamper the voter in the exercise of his right of suffrage. I am satisfied, however, from a careful examination of this subject, that there is no practical difficulty, even where the voter may lack educational qualifications, in teaching him to mark or use an official ballot without the intervention of an election officer. There could hardly be found a voter of average intelligence who would not be able to mark ballots, such as I understand have been used in the State of Indiana. In that State the official ballot has upon the same ticket, but in separate columns, each set of candidates nominated by the different political parties or by petition. A device, symbol or figure of some kind is printed at the head of each of these columns, which devices, symbols or figures also designate the political parties and petitioners. A mark or a hole punched through this device, symbol or figure may be made effective in expressing the will of the voter, where he intends to vote for an entire ticket embraced in one column. Where he selects candidates from the different columns other devices may be used, as for example, duplicate non-official tickets which would enable him to designate each candidate for whom he desired to vote.

I find in the laws of some of the other States a provision requiring two additional election officers who are authorized to intervene or "assist" the voter in the marking of his ticket where he states that he is unable to do it himself. The employment of these officers seems to me dangerous and improper.



The fact that these election officers were sworn officials would no more prevent them, if dishonest, from destroying the secrecy of the ballot or practically intimidating a voter by their knowledge of his ballot, than would the official oath of a dishonest election officer prevent him from tampering with the ballot-box or knowingly receiving fraudulent votes.

These election officers would become the political agents of the different parties, and every voter who accepted their intervention would feel that there was no secrecy as to his ballot, and that such election officers might expose to others how he had exercised the right of suffrage.

In districts where there were dishonest election officers, men might be bribed to vote a certain way and be instructed to ask the "assistance" of these officers. Such an official could inform the bribe-giver how the elector voted, and thus practically nullify the law.

It would be an aid to bribery and would destroy the secrecy of the ballot. It would be much safer to trust to the illiterate voter, or the voter physically disqualified, to ascertain some mode of expressing his choice, than to destroy the essential feature of such a system of reform by making the secrecy of the ballot depend not upon the law but upon the conscience of the election officer. In some States these extra election officers mark the ballots. Any such marking by them is a destruction of secrecy. When a ticket is marked, the mode of marking it and the place where it is marked can be so controlled by dishonest election officers that the ballot can be traced and the action of the voter ascertained. The voter may be practically intimidated by his fear of just such illegal action. These extra election officers might exercise a dangerous power which would affect the secrecy of the ballot and intimidate the voter. Their employment would also entail heavy expenses upon the localities called upon to pay for their services.

The law in some of the States restricts the distribution of official ballots to the polling places through such extra election officers. I do not see any good that can be accomplished by such a provision. I fail to see the danger in the distribution of official ballots before election, if voters desire to obtain them and mark their ballots at their homes. I cannot see any danger in this, because every official ballot should be made absolutely void if any mark or designation were placed thereon by which it would be possible to identify such a ballot or distinguish one ballot from another.

The extra official ballots required for such distribution would not entail any more expense than would the printing of duplicate

ballots, which it would be necessary to use for the instruction of the voter, to enable him to mark his ballot in the secret compartment in the enclosure surrounding the polling place. Such a distribution prior to election would not affect the final and independent action of the voter, because, although he might have an official ticket which he had marked at his home, he would still be required, before voting, to enter the private election booth, within which he would find other official ballots ready for his use, if he desired them, and which he could mark there as he pleased. No other person than himself could know after he entered that booth whether he used the official ticket which he had prepared before he entered it and shown to others, or whether he used another which he had found in the booth. It might be a wise precaution to require some distinctive act on his part while he was inside the private election booth, which would take some appreciable time, so as to obviate the objection which has been made, that he might enter and immediately come out, so that it would be known that he had not changed his ballot. The provision which, in my judgment, would meet this objection to the right of the voter to mark his official ballot away from the polling place, would be to insert in the law a provision requiring him to enclose the ballot he intended to vote in an official envelope, which should be found only in the election booth. The enclosure in the envelope of either the ballot which he brought with him to the booth, or the one which he found therein, would require an independent act on his part, which would secure the absolute secrecy of the ballot. It seems to me that with such a provision the voter might safely be entrusted with an official ballot which he might mark at his home, if he desired so to do. I know that this is objected to by many sincere friends of ballot reform, on the ground that there is danger in the distribution of official ballots before election, and that many of them think it absolutely necessary to compel the voter to exercise his judgment only within the election enclosure, either by himself or through the assistance of sworn election officers. After the most careful thought I cannot see the dangers which they apprehend from permitting the voter to mark his official ballot away from the polling place, provided it is done under the safeguards suggested herein.

Although my own convictions are clear, I shall cheerfully yield them on this point, if the Legislature shall deem it wise to limit the distribution of official ballots to the polling places.

The wholesale bribery of voters is the most dangerous evil that threatens free institutions. The secrecy of the ballot will not appreciably prevent the use of money to purchase voters. The

bribe-giver will confidently and safely rely upon the promise of the elector to vote the ticket agreed upon. The claim made that there would be no bribery where the ballot was secret, because the bribe-giver would fear that the voter would cheat him and vote some other ticket, rest upon theoretical speculation and not upon practical knowledge of the class of men who sell their votes. There is an old adage that there is "honor among thieves"—the same kind of honor would, in nine cases out of ten, deliver the purchased vote as promised.

The provision of law for limiting election expenditures, and permitting the public to know by verified statements the extent thereof, with severe penalties for violation of the law in these particulars, is of vital consequence if real electoral reform is to be secured. Only a certain amount of money can be honestly spent in an election; such expenditure needs no concealment. Under the present system men of large wealth, who are often pecuniarily interested in the result of an election, secretly contribute large sums of money for election purposes. It is impossible to prove that these men know that this money is to be used illegally, but the moral sense of every one is convinced that such a contributor is willing that it should be so used. If these contributions were no longer secret, but known by every one, an aroused public sentiment would soon ostracise such men, and find means to prevent their acts or punish them criminally. The result of raising large sums by one political party is almost certain to lead the others to attempt to do the same thing. In such a case it becomes a contest of money on each side, where candidates are sought and often selected, not for their honesty and intelligence, but for their ability to make or secure from others heavy contributions of money. The limitation of election expenditures, and the publicity thereof, would do more than anything else to prevent the raising and use of large sums of money to bribe voters and election officers.

Universal registration of voters is demanded by the same consideration that requires the present partial registration of voters in this State. It may not be so easy to import voters into a district not now subject to registration as in the great cities of the State, but there is a well-grounded belief that it has been done in the past, and will be done in the future unless prevented by a registration law which will apply to every voting district in the State. The registration of all voters, subject to judicial revision of the list in court, where every proper party can have a hearing, would practically prevent colonization and fraudulent voting.

The great political parties of the country and of the State are represented by the respective majorities in the Senate and House

of Assembly. A joint committee should be appointed for the consideration of this question. It should be dealt with as one in which honest men of all parties are equally interested and upon which all parties should unite.

The highest aim of all parties is good government, and this cannot be secured without honest elections. The safety of the State, pure government, the perpetuity of free institutions, all rest upon the purity of the ballot. Honest differences of opinion as to the best way to secure this great reform should be discussed in a spirit seeking to gain the desired result, and where each one is willing to yield individual judgment, if necessary, in order to give the people practical relief by the best possible legislation.

#### AGRICULTURE.

The State Board of Agriculture has presented for consideration the fact that farming in New Jersey is not as profitable as formerly, and have made certain suggestions as to legislative action which they believe will improve the condition of the farmers of the State. They also suggest an increase of the allowance to their Board, so that it will amount to six thousand dollars per annum. In view of the economical administration of the Board, and the great good they are capable of doing in disseminating information and dealing practically with questions affecting the farming interest of the State, I would recommend this increased allowance, and, also, that the Legislature should have its Committee on Agriculture institute an examination into the condition of this interest, the causes of its depression and the measures best suited to relieve it. Such an examination could be made by visits of all or a part of the committee to different portions of the State, so that the farmers might be personally heard without incurring the expense of meeting the committee at the capital.

One of the causes of complaint in certain portions of the State, and which should receive special consideration, is the discrimination by common carriers against the citizens of New Jersey in fixing charges for transportation across our territory. Notwithstanding the adjacency of our farming districts to the great markets of the East, it is claimed that some of the transportation lines discriminate against the interests of our people by carrying agricultural and dairy products from the great West for distances and at rates which practically reduce the value of our farms, and that these discriminations are made for the advantage of the companies and other States, notwithstanding it is known that they inflict grievous injury upon our citizens.

If, on investigation, these charges shall be sustained, you should legislate to protect our own citizens to the full extent of your constitutional powers.

I shall deem it my duty to investigate this subject, to devise measures of relief, and do all in my power to restore to the farming interests of the State that prosperity which they formerly enjoyed.

#### EDUCATION.

The common school system of the State should be fostered and extended, so that no excuse could exist for ignorance. Every child should receive a fair education. The State should see that school-houses and teachers are provided for all. It is the duty of parents to educate their children, but if they fail to do it the State should perform this duty. The school fund of the State might be loaned at a low rate of interest to localities called upon to increase their school facilities. This would be a beneficent use of this fund, which now yields an income of only about \$200,000 per annum. The heavy burden which our citizens willingly bear to raise the millions of money now expended for educational purposes, shows the deep interest of the people in the cause of education, and their high appreciation of its advantages. There are still, however, over 100,000 children without school accommodation, and I earnestly urge the passage of laws which will provide school facilities to educate every child in the State.

#### MUNICIPAL EXPENDITURES.

The Legislature should deal with the matter of municipal expenditures in the cities of the State. They are a heavy burden, and in many instances no adequate return is made for the taxes imposed. Reform is imperatively demanded in the working of the municipalities, and the extent of taxation imposed upon property therein. One of the surest methods of lightening these burdens, is in the passage of an act limiting taxation for municipal purposes.

#### OTHER INTERESTS.

The manufacturing, mining and fishing industries of our State should be protected and fostered by wise and prudent legislation.

The great interests of labor have received, in our State, substantial recognition in the past, and will, I am confident, always receive at your hands a full and fair hearing, so that grievances may be redressed, and the suggestions as to practical legislation

affecting the interests of this great body of our people, receive careful and proper attention. The wise and conservative action in the past of the wage-workers of our State entitles them to generous recognition by legislation at your hands.

I favor equal rights for all, and exclusive privileges for none. I am opposed to monopolies of every description, and shall favor legislation which will prevent combinations to control the prices of the necessities of life, for the benefit of the few at the expense of the many.

I shall, from time to time, communicate with you by special message, when, in my judgment, such action will be for the interests of the State. I shall personally examine all matters in which the State and the people are interested, and if I find abuses existing I shall call your attention thereto, endeavor to suggest a remedy, and ask your aid in correcting the evil.

I shall take pleasure at all times in uniting with you in perfecting such measures as will increase the prosperity of the State, lighten the burdens of the people, and secure a pure, honest and economical government.

I shall bring to the discharge of my duties an earnest desire to act in all things for the best interests of the people, and shall ask your cordial coöperation to enable me to deal successfully with matters requiring legislation.

I pray God to give me wisdom to see, and strength to perform every duty, so that my acts may be acceptable to Him and pleasing to the people.

There are 275 taxing districts in the State containing railroad and canal real estate. In the above 30 districts is found 81.6 per cent. of the total value of the real estate of railroads and canals other than their main stems and water-ways, and 35 per cent. of the total valuation of all the main stems and water-ways contained in the whole 275 districts.

On motion of Mr. Mullone, the report and Inaugural Address was ordered to be spread upon the minutes of the House.

On motion of Mr. Potts, the rules were suspended, and the resolution in regard to the distribution of the Legislative Manuals was reconsidered.

The same gentleman offered the following amendments to said resolution, which were, on motion, adopted:

Strike out "Clerk," and insert "Sergeant-at-Arms."

Add at end of resolution the following: "*provided*, that the Sergeant-at-Arms shall accept from Clerk his receipt taken for Manuals delivered, and shall credit each member with such Manuals delivered."

Mr. Mullone presented to the House the following memorial from the Hudson County Ballot Reform Association:

*To Governor Leon Abbett and the Honorable the Legislature of the State of New Jersey:*

The Hudson County Ballot Reform Association, in behalf of its members, and of the thousands of voters, mostly from the Democratic counties of Hudson and Essex, whose names it has already received to its petition for the passage of a genuine ballot reform bill, desires to express its sincerest gratitude to Gov. Leon

Abbett for the noble stand he has taken in his inaugural message in favor of purity of elections.

The eleven essential principles he has laid down in that statesmanlike document must become the guide of the Legislature, if it honestly desires to follow the chief executive of the State to the high level he has assumed on this, the most important question which will be submitted to its deliberations.

The following are the eleven essential principles:

First—Registration of every voter in the State, with a registry list subject to judicial revision.

Second—Absolute secrecy of the ballot. To secure this there should be an inclosure within which the voter shall be free from all influence, supervision or control. In that inclosure there should be a compartment which he must enter and where in secret he would have the opportunity to prepare his ballot. From this compartment he should proceed directly to the ballot box with a folded ballot. This he should offer to the election board, who should deposit it in the box in the same condition, subject only to rejection for legal reasons. If the ballot is rejected it should be returned to the voter without inspection.

Third—There should be an exclusively official ballot, printed and distributed by the State, so that one ballot cannot be distinguished from another when it is folded and ready for voting. The law should prohibit the use of any ballot except the official ballot.

Fourth—Provision for judicial action, by which an election in any precinct may be set aside and a new election ordered therein whenever the judge or court shall be satisfied that there has been fraud, bribery or other illegal practices which would affect the result, or where by reason of death or resignation of any candidate, the failure to supply voters with tickets, or for any other cause the electors have been deprived of a fair opportunity to express their choice at the ballot box. All such proceedings should be summary. When a new election is ordered it should be called for the earliest possible day. The court or judge should be empowered to make a final certificate of election whenever such new election changes the result.

Fifth—The right of nomination by petition should be given when a certain percentage of the voters ask therefor.

Sixth—No ticket should be printed or distributed unless the parties nominated thereon have signified in writing their acceptance of such nomination.

Seventh—Provisions that certain judicial officers shall provide for the printing and distribution of official ballots where there has been failure to act on the part of the proper officers.

Eighth—All forms of intimidation, bribery or illegal practices should be declared to be criminal. Every voter should have secured to him the opportunity to vote, and sufficient time should be allowed him therefor. It should be made a crime to infringe upon this right, or to impose any penalty or disadvantage upon the voter exercising such right.

Ninth—There should be a limitation of the amount which may be legally spent in or for any election. An election should be declared void if such limit shall be knowingly exceeded by a candidate or by any persons acting for or in his behalf with his knowledge. An election in any precinct should also be declared void whenever any judicial officer shall ascertain that such limitation has been grossly exceeded in that precinct, even without the knowledge of the candidate, if the vote of such precinct might change the result of the election.

Tenth—The law should provide for publicity of election expenditures, and a candidate should be required to publish and file of record, immediately after an election, an itemized statement, under oath, of all the moneys expended at such election by him, or with his knowledge. The failure to file such a statement should vacate his office and render void his election. The court should be given the power to compel the appearance of any person before it to be examined, under oath, concerning political expenditures, and also to require, on such examinations, the production of the books and papers of corporation, association or individuals.

Eleventh—It should compel every one offering a bribe or receiving a bribe, either as a voter or as an election officer, to testify in regard thereto, with a provision that such testimony should not be used against such witness in any criminal or other proceedings whatever.

No bill can or will receive the support of honest voters of either party which does not contain all of these essential principles.

The Hudson County Ballot Reform Association is aware that Governor Abbot thinks there would be no danger if the official ballot were handed to the voter previous to the election, nor would there be if the voters could be depended upon to get their tickets themselves, mark them according to their own convictions uninfluenced by bribery or intimidation, and vote them without showing them to a second person. If the average voter could be depended upon to do this there would be no occasion for ballot-reform measures at all, and the evil of our present system, admitted by all and so graphically described by the Governor in his message, would not exist.

It is because absolute secrecy must be attained to banish bribery

and intimidation from the polls that the entire act of voting must be done within the polling place itself, free from every possibility of observation.

The duplicate ticket printed on different colored paper, freely distributed before election, will afford ample opportunity to the most deliberate as well as to the most illiterate to mark the ballot according to his own judgment or the advice of his friends, and any one with the intelligence of a child can copy the marks on the official ballot in the privacy of the booth. A ballot in the Indiana style, as indicated in Governor Abbett's message, is simple and short, and after the stub is removed, before voting, contains absolutely no number or mark by which it might afterwards be identified. Such a ballot could be distributed by the present poll clerks without any additional expense whatever to the State for such distribution.

The Hudson County Ballot Reform Association desires especially to emphasize its agreement with Governor Abbett that no ballot clerks should assist any voter in marking the ticket. Well does the Governor in this print say:

"These election officers would become the political agents of the different parties, and every voter who accepted their intervention would feel that there was no secrecy as to his ballot, and that such election officers might expose to others how he had exercised the right of suffrage."

Absolute secrecy is wanted, not the promise of secrecy on the part of any official whatever.

Nor would the illiterate voter, left to his own contrivance, be in the slightest degree hindered in marking his ballot according as he desired. The briefest instructions would be all that is necessary to show him what to do, and the same facility he exhibits in his every-day business in making his mark for his name would enable him to fulfill this important duty of citizenship as intelligently as the best educated voter in the State.

The blind or otherwise physically disabled, whose disability is necessarily patent to the inspectors of election, may safely be permitted to take some friend whom they know and have confidence in, into the booth to mark the ballot for them. Such slight service would be cheerfully rendered by such friend.

With these provisos, a ballot reform bill, as indicated in Governor Abbett's message, will secure a system of elections in which each of the two principal political parties of the State will be able to cast its full legitimate vote, in which the election of the successful candidate of either of these parties will be beyond every suspicion of bribery, intimidation or fraud, which will be cheaper to the State, simpler and more practical than the present system

in the State of Massachusetts, and which will win the approval of every honest man throughout the State and Nation.

Though based on the Australian method, it will be practically a New Jersey system, owing its efficiency to the inspiration of Governor Leon Abbett, and its form to other distinguished men of this State.

In his message Governor Abbett expressly states that he will cheerfully yield the only point on which ballot reformers are bound to differ with him, if the Legislature shall deem it wise to limit the distribution of official ballots to the polling places.

The Hudson County Ballot Reform Association will stand with Governor Abbett, defending his courage, his manliness and the sincerity with which he has redeemed the pledge made to this association, and defying the few who may see fit, for selfish or dishonest purposes, to oppose the Governor's efforts in behalf of genuine ballot reform, and to array themselves against such men as Grover Cleveland, Governor Campbell, of Ohio; Governor Wilson, of West Virginia; Chauncey F. Black, of Pennsylvania, and the other great Democratic leaders who have pointed out the way for all good and true citizens, be they Democrats or Republicans, to follow.

MR. SPEAKER—I am in receipt of the resolution of the House of Assembly, requesting the Attorney-General to give an opinion in writing as to the legality of the action of the city council of Camden, in changing, by ordinance, the boundary lines of the



wards constituting the Second Assembly district, so as to make the said Second Assembly district embrace a portion of the Eighth ward, which was not included in said district as described in the redistricting act of 1889.

I am informed that the common council of the city of Camden, by an ordinance passed on the 29th day of August, A. D. 1889, changed the boundary of the Sixth, Seventh and Eighth wards in the city of Camden, and, by means of such change in the boundaries of said wards, annexed to some or one of them, a portion or portions of territory which were not comprised within the boundaries of said wards or any of them, on March 27th, 1889, or on July 4th, 1889; and you ask me to say whether, in my opinion, the ordinance above mentioned was a legal ordinance, and also whether it is effectual to alter and change the boundaries of the Second Assembly district of the county of Camden, as such district is constituted and defined in the amending act of March 27th, 1889 (*P. L. 1889, 115*).

In my opinion, the common council of the city of Camden were, by an act entitled "An act concerning ward and district lines in cities of this state," approved May 9th, 1889 (*P. L. 1889, 442*), endowed with full legislative power to divide the territory of the city of Camden into wards, and to change and alter such division and the boundaries of said wards, from time to time, in their discretion; and the ordinance in question, if passed in conformity to the prescriptions of the charter of said city, is a lawful exercise of the legislative power of the common council, and is a legal instrument.

In answer to the second question, I have to say that the said ordinance is not effectual to change the boundary lines of the Second Assembly district in the county of Camden.

The Legislature of the State of New Jersey is sovereign, in the exercise of its legislative authority, and has the exclusive power to regulate the election of members of the General Assembly, subject only to the prescriptions of Article II, Section 3, Clause 1 of the Constitution of the State, which clause prohibits the Legislature from apportioning the members of the General Assembly among the counties of the State, save at its first session after each recurring census or enumeration, taken by the government of the United States.

The Legislature is not restricted by the Constitution in exercising the power of dividing into Assembly districts those counties to which more than one member of the General Assembly shall be apportioned. The power of the Legislature to divide and define Assembly districts is sovereign, supreme and exclusive, and no subordinate municipality can, by its legislative

action, repeal, alter or amend an act of the Legislature dividing a county into Assembly districts, or in anywise alter or change the boundary line of such districts, as defined in the act of the Legislature (*Gardner v. Newark, 11 Vroom 297*).

The act of March 27th, 1889, defines the Second Assembly district in the county of Camden, and locates it and its boundaries as being and constituting that portion of the territory of the county of Camden contained within the limits of the Fifth, Sixth and Seventh wards of the city of Camden and the Second and Third precincts of the township of Stockton.

The limits of these several portions of territory, at the time of the passage of this act, were well known and located, and were also defined by existing ordinances of the city of Camden and the lawful legislation of the town committee of the township of Stockton, and the Legislature, in its definition of the boundaries of the Second Assembly district in Camden, referred to the then existing limits of the aforesaid wards and precincts.

It was the duty of the Legislature, at the passage of the act, to fix and define the limits of the Assembly district, and it performed that duty by a reference to the then existing boundaries of portions of territory, then and theretofore well known and accurately defined by competent authority. Clearly, no legislative action of the common council could, directly and specifically, change the boundaries of the Assembly district in question; nor could the common council indirectly change such boundaries by changing the boundaries of wards in the city of Camden, or by any other device. I am, therefore, of the opinion that the Second Assembly district, in the county of Camden, is composed of that portion of the territory of the county of Camden which, on the 27th of March, A. D. 1889, was contained within the limits of the Fifth, Sixth and Seventh wards of the city of Camden, and the Second and Third precincts of the township of Stockton.

Your Judiciary Committee, to whom was referred certain proposed amendments to the State Constitution, report:

First. The proposed amendment to Article IV, Section 7, clause 2, subdivision 3, with a recommendation that the same be agreed to, the same being for the abrogation of the constitutional inhibition of local laws regulating the internal affairs of towns and counties.

Second. The proposed amendment to Article VII, Section 2, clause 2, with a recommendation that the same be agreed to, the same being for the correction of what is evidently a clerical error in said section.

Third. The proposed amendment to Article IV, Section 7, clause 2, subdivision 8, with the recommendation that the same

The following memorial was presented to the House by Mr. Zimmermann:

*To the Honorable the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:*

The undersigned, your memorialists, respectfully represent that they now live and have lived in Bergen county, New Jersey, for twenty years, with the exception of five years, when we were

forced to leave on account of bad health. Our lands were flooded through the unlawful acts of a railroad company, and one of the most available and valued tracts of land in the State of New Jersey was rendered worthless.

The facts in the matter I, Louis Koch, will give you here in brief, and beg for your attention:

In 1869 I bought the place where we now live, and moved there with my whole family in 1870. The D., L. & W. R. R. Co. were then building the Boonton Branch through our meadows, and destroyed the drainage of about 2,000 acres of land, which had been sluiced for over 100 years. The damage was partially repaired, and in 1874 a supplement to an act of 1848 of the Kingsland and Sawmill Creek Company was passed with the approval of the railroad company, and one of their officers was made a director of the said Kingsland and Sawmill Creek Company, of which I am president. Sluices and ditches were all put in perfect order; the land was dry and the neighborhood healthy until 1877, when the railroad company allowed tide water to flow through their land on our drained lands, which destroyed all our meadows, and made the whole neighborhood unhealthy. A conspiracy was formed to ruin me; law suits followed; the Board of Health closed some openings, which were again opened; an appeal to the State Board of Health, by the inhabitants of this vicinity was disregarded. It seemed as if my lawyers had sold out, and that some of our public officers were in league with the railroad company against honest taxpayers. After finding that we could not get justice nor protection, we were obliged to leave our home in search of health. In 1887, after repeated propositions to adjust the matter, I again sued the railroad company for damages, but the suit has not been tried yet. What causes and justifies such delay? Last December the railroad company was indicted by the Grand Jury for keeping up a nuisance in keeping our lands under water and making the neighborhood unhealthy. Why is the indictment laid over?

It is an urgent necessity to stop this nuisance and loss of property. We have hay cut on the meadows since last June and cannot get it on account of the water. Our loss on hay alone amounts to over \$600 per year, and all our neighbors lose accordingly. We all pay heavy taxes and are not protected by our courts; in consequence thereof our little community here loses over \$10,000 yearly in hay alone. This is one of the reasons why the farmers in this vicinity are losing ground. I have a wife and four children. Shall we be protected in our rights, or will we be left a prey to corruption and misrule? I had nicely provided for my family before we were forced to leave on account

of sickness. I had forty-eight head of cattle, four horses, two yokes of oxen and all the necessary machines to work the place, and by good management we lived good and cleared about \$500 per year, all expenses paid, while now we are not allowed to work the land and reap what grows on it.

My wife was the very picture of health until 1877, and now she is in a sad condition, but would recover if she did not worry over her children and the position we are placed in through this base conspiracy. The land in this vicinity is very valuable for building purposes if we are protected against this outrage, for there is not a healthier place near the city of New York than this if things are kept in order. We are only seven (7) miles from Hoboken ferry.

I was induced to bring my wife back here through my lawyers saying that the case would surely be tried then, but through some kind of work it has not been tried yet, and here we are in the midst of misery and corruption, willing to work, pay our taxes and honest debts, but at the mercy of a corporation that seeks to obstruct the progress of the people of New Jersey in their industry and welfare. Thirteen years in law for one cause is too long, and if combined with sickness, as in this case, it is enough to ruin any family.

Will not your honorable body, in conjunction with our governor, use your influence and power to bring this uneven and terrible contest to a close and protect the people of New Jersey against such usurpation and worse than slavery? The State of New Jersey needs some reform for the better and more just government of its people, and to that end the people of New Jersey and my family join me and pray, &c.

The undersigned officers and members of the South Orange Building and Loan Association do hereby respectfully protest against the passage of an act now before your honorable bodies, which said act requires the payment by every building and loan association of ten dollars per annum each, as a compensation to some person for examining the books, &c., of the building and loan associations in this State.

We present the following objections in detail: The members of this association become such of their own accord; they can withdraw from the same at any time, by complying with the requirements of its constitution. They have the freest access to the books of the association. There are no *secret* meetings, either of the shareholders or of the directors. The officers and directors are subject to fines for non-attendance at any meeting. The only salaries paid is to the secretary, amounting to thirty-six dollars per annum, and to the treasurer the sum of twenty-four dollars per annum. The treasurer is held by a bond in a sum which is

more than ten times the amount which he may at any time have in his hands.

We claim, without fear of contradiction, that the losses sustained by the building and loan associations in New Jersey are far less, in proportion to the amount handled, than are met with by the financial institutions of the country.

Finally, the report of the Board of Statistics of Labor and Industries shows the existence of 210 associations; a fee of \$10 each, therefore, amounts to \$2,100. This continued for twelve years aggregates \$25,200—a sum so great as to materially affect and injure the building and loan associations in this State.

SIR—The boundary lines of several counties of the State, heretofore established and defined by legislative acts, as appear in the Revised Statutes, viz., of Hudson, Essex, Union, Middlesex and Monmouth, in the waters adjoining the State of New York, are to a great extent general and indefinite.

The agreements made with the Commissioners of the State of New York, November 1st, 1887, and December 23d, 1889, establish the boundary line in these waters by fixed monuments and lines.

It has occurred to me to suggest to you whether it would be advisable for the Legislature to revise the boundary lines of these counties so that they will conform to the lines now fixed.

GENTLEMEN—Your Committee, to whom was referred the memorandum of the progress made in the Geological Survey of New Jersey, and the reasons for continuing the same, would respectfully report:

That, in their judgment, it would be wise to ask the Legislature to continue the appropriation for this purpose of \$8,000 per year, for five years, as anything less than the complete term would not avail to give us an adequate value for the money expended. They are induced to make this recommendation for the following reasons:

This survey was originally intended to be a geological survey, and the work so far done in that direction in the region of marl and clays, the iron district and the study of the water shed, has abundantly demonstrated the value of such work. That this has inured to the benefit of individuals or corporations who took advantage of the information thus furnished is no more valid argument against the continuance of the work than it is against the topographical survey that surveyors, engineers, contractors and railroad companies have profited by the information given by that survey. The purpose of any such public work is to furnish reliable and profitable information, and the State gains by the increase of wealth due to the development of her resources.

The precedence that has been given to the topographical survey was justified by the demand for it, and by the fact that it was a necessary foundation for an exact delineation of the physical geography of the State. And while Professor Cook referred to

this survey as nearly completed, none would have welcomed the continuance of the geological survey more warmly than himself. There still remains very much to be done in more accurate study of the clay region to determine and fix the character of the clays, and to establish a standard by which this may be determined in order to keep our clays in the market in face of competition from foreign clays.

There is also similar work to be done in the study of the rocks in which our ores are deposited, in the study of soils and their distribution, and the study of water supply, which is a question of ever increasing interest to all sections of the State.

In the judgment of your Committee these matters are of importance in an educational way as well as from a business point of view.

We would recommend that the office of the State Geologist be in Trenton, and that for this purpose a suitable room or rooms be set apart in the State House for the geological museum and for the office of the State Geologist. This office should be a bureau of information where application could be made by all who need information of this nature. A similar provision is made in New York State for such a bureau of information, and New Jersey should be abreast of her sister States in these matters.

We would recommend the continuance of the work with substantially the same organization, under the direction of a competent State Geologist, because the work as hitherto prosecuted has been highly creditable to the State, and owing to the severe economies practiced by Professor Cook in pushing the work it has been done at a very small cost considering its value. We have every reason to assume that the work will be equally well done by those who have been Professor Cook's assistants and have been trained under his eye. There is much material in hand, incidentally gathered, which would in a measure be lost if the work were now abandoned. Eventually it will be necessary for the State to have such a geological survey, and it can be better done now than by suffering the organization of the office to be broken up.

Whether we estimate the total cost in relation to the taxable property of the State or to the value of the information obtained, it is trifling as compared with either.

If the question be asked, why cannot those interested in the development of the various industries combine to obtain this information, viz., the owners of the clay region to have the clays more thoroughly analyzed, the owners of the iron mines, and the farmers to have their industries investigated and mapped out, the water syndicates to study that which touches their interests,

the question carries its own answer with it. Such owners will not combine, or the knowledge which they obtain they would keep for their own private use. As well might we ask the railroads and engineers to combine to make a topographical map of the State.

The prosecution of such work must be done by the State, and what enures to the benefit and increase of wealth of her citizens enures to the benefit of the commonwealth, for the people are the State.

We submit herewith a draft of an amendment to an act entitled "An act to complete the geological survey in this State."

A Supplement to an act entitled "An act to complete the geological survey of this state," approved March thirtieth, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four.

1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey,* That the annual appropriation of eight thousand dollars per annum for the completion of the geological survey of this state, made in the supplement to this act, which was approved May second, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, be further continued for five years.

2. *And be it enacted,* That whereas the office of state geologist, formerly held by George H. Cook under this act, is now vacant, said office shall henceforth, from time to time, be filled by the appointment thereto of a competent person by the board of managers of the geological survey, who shall hold office during the pleasure of the board, such appointment to be subject to the approval of the governor; and the person so appointed state geologist, and his assistants, shall have the same authority and perform the same duties as if he had been named and appointed in this act, subject at all times to the direction of the board.

3. *And be it enacted,* That this act shall take effect immediately.

#### MEMORANDUM OF THE PROGRESS MADE IN THE GEOLOGICAL SURVEY OF NEW JERSEY, AND REASONS FOR CONTINUING THE SURVEY.

##### *I.—Maps and Physical Geography.*

The topographical survey of the State, which has done so much credit to the geological survey and proved its worth in so many



ways, was undertaken because the accurate delineation of the surface features was considered necessary to discover the geological structure. This was proven by the work in the clay district of Middlesex county, and in the mapping of the terminal moraine across the state. Excepting this clay district, the geological work has not been advanced to that state where the geological formations may be traced out accurately upon the topographical survey sheets. This great work is yet to be done. The geological map of the State, on a reduced scale, which accompanies the atlas sheets, gives the geological boundaries, taken largely from the maps of the State published in 1868 on a scale of two miles to an inch. The new geological map ought to be on at least as large a scale as that of the topographical sheets, or one mile to an inch. Further, a geological map ought to show the nature of the surface, that is, the ledges and the rocks in them, the areas of glacial or boulder drift, the clays, gravels, sands, peat swamps and the soil. The best geological map is, at the same time, the best agricultural map, and, to some extent, a forestal map. In Europe, the latest geological surveys furnish maps giving all of the surface features in shape as well as in kind. A thoroughly well-made map of this degree of detail is important to our farmers, and to all who wish to know about the nature of our soils and of their capabilities. The accurate delineation of the characteristics of the surface is valuable in the study of our climate, and identification of places most suited to be the homes or residences of people seeking healthy sites. Medical climatology demands such maps, and they would, in many localities, solve the great question of water supply from artesian and bored wells, and help to do so everywhere. In a word, a complete geological map of the State ought to show every acre of tillable land, and indicate the extent and boundaries of areas best suited for agricultural use and development, the areas to be put or kept in forest, and the desirable and healthful points for permanent residence or transient resort.

## *II.—Structural Geology.*

General structural geology is now fully understood to be the only safe basis on which to found all local and special studies in geological economics. Not only is it essential to the proper localization and limitation of all special investigations, but it is the only safe clue to the larger and profounder questions which arise in the local studies themselves.

For example, it has been found that all the results heretofore obtained in the study of the great gold field of California,

whether by the State or National Surveys, are radically defective for the lack of a systematic knowledge of the geology of the Sierra Nevada.

Accordingly, the National Survey has been forced to ignore past work done at great cost and begin *de novo* with an elaborate general survey of the structural geology of the whole field.

A further instance of the value of general geology is to be found in the admirable results and extraordinary practical utility of the work of the National Survey in the silver-lead district of Leadville, Colorado, which could never have been achieved if a broad general survey of the region had not been first executed.

The rapid improvement of modern metallurgy is bringing into prominence the archæan field of New Jersey. Greater productiveness and increased value of the products are features of the immediate future, and to all future development a sound survey of the structural geology is really necessary.

The geological survey ought to be continued in order to complete its studies in the archæan rocks, or the crystalline rock region of the Highlands. Acknowledged by geologists to be the best field in our country, it should be surveyed with care, and the geological structure be made out so that the people may understand it and direct their mining operations intelligently and successfully. This work has been in progress, using the new topographical maps, for one year, and the results already are great and promising still better things. No other area of crystalline rocks in our country can be studied to such advantage, and New Jersey ought to have the credit of doing this work first, even as she has that of her topography.

The geology of South Jersey needs to be gone over and to be studied carefully, in the light of the additional facts derived from the many borings made recently for artesian wells. Two years ought to be given to this interesting field.

### *III.—Economic Geology.*

A geological map should, in the magnetic iron-ore region of the State, include observations on the lines of magnetic declination. As is well known, the iron ores are generally located by means of the indications so given.

The revision of the clay report is necessary, both in the description of the field, and in the examination of the clays and a study of their uses and value. The work is in progress, but it cannot be done fully within the limit of time remaining to the survey under the present act of appropriation.

*IV.—Geological Collections, Correspondence and Records.*

A geological survey implies collections of scientific and economic values and a repository for them. The State Museum at the Capital needs the care of such an organization and a home. The advantages of such a public exhibition of the natural products and mineral staples of the State is self-evident.

A geological survey or an organization of the kind is also needed to answer the many inquiries relative to soils, ores, water supply, &c. These questions of economic geology are asked from without by capitalists, who seek investments in the State, as well as by our own citizens. And their number increases as the years go on. Shall not the State give this information for its benefit? It will be understood that the answers cannot be read out of a book as well as from an intelligent statement emanating from one who keeps abreast of advances and developments in the natural resources of the state. The annual presentation of the mineral statistics of the state here finds a place.

The facts cited make it evident that the geological survey has by no means exhausted the field before it, and the reasons for its continuance appear to be as cogent now as ever before, or more so, by reason of the unsettled questions which it has raised.

*To the Senate and General Assembly:*

I herewith transmit for your information a certified copy of an award made by the arbitrators in the matter of difference between the State, and the Morris and Essex Railroad Company and the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad Company; its lessee, in regard to alleged taxes in arrear arising under the charter and supplements of the Morris and Essex Railroad Company.

This award is made under the authority of Joint Resolution, No. 1, entitled, "A joint resolution relative to the arbitration of alleged taxes in arrear under the charter and supplements of the Morris and Essex Railroad Company," approved March 25th, 1887.

The practical result of this arbitration, if the Legislature passes the act recommended therein, will be that the State will surrender its right, under the sixteenth section of the charter of the Morris and Essex Railroad Company, authorizing it to purchase and acquire the railroad and property of that company, upon the terms set out in its charter and the supplements thereto. On the other hand the Morris and Essex Railroad Company will voluntarily surrender its special contract in relation to taxation, and it must also agree to submit itself to the operation of the provisions of all constitutional general tax laws applicable to all railroads, passed or to be passed. The company will also release the State from all liability to refund or repay taxes paid under the general tax laws since and including the year 1884, and will pay the State a net set sum amounting to \$235,000.

If the Legislature refuses to pass the act suggested by the arbitrators, then the State will receive the net sum of \$235,000, and also receive from the Morris and Essex Railroad Company an instrument releasing the State from all liability to refund or repay taxes paid by the company to the State under any general tax laws since and including the year 1884.

The suggestion of the arbitrators which involves a settlement of all questions between the State of New Jersey and the Morris and Essex Railroad Company and its lessee, is in accordance with the views of public policy upon this subject heretofore settled by legislative action.

In the act entitled, "An act for the taxation of railroad and canal property," approved April 10th, 1884, provision was made in section thirty-one, "That any corporation in this state having the right by contract to any different imposition of taxes, either state or municipal, than that provided for in this act, are hereby authorized to execute and file in the office of the secretary of state an instrument, to be first approved by the attorney-general, waiving the benefit of any such contract, whereupon they shall be bound by the terms of this act, or an amendment thereto, or any further act of the legislature, and upon filing any such instrument the State agrees to surrender its right to take the property of any such corporation under any law now existing; *provided*, that any such corporation shall execute and file such instrument within six months from the time of the passage of this act."

In 1888 this act was revised and amended by an act entitled, "An act to revise and amend 'An act for the taxation of railroad and canal property,' approved April 10th, 1884, which said act was approved March 27th, 1888. Section twenty-seven of this act is exactly the same as section thirty-one of the act of 1884.

The wisdom of adjusting these questions between the State and these corporations by mutual agreement will not be disputed, if done in accordance with the spirit of the acts of 1884 and 1888, as above set forth. Without legislation the powers cannot, however, be exercised on the part of the State, because the limitations of time in the acts of 1884 and 1888 have expired.

I am still of the opinion expressed by me in 1884 that all special contracts on the subject of taxation should be extinguished. I am prepared at all times to invoke every power of the State to secure such extinguishment, if the corporations will not voluntarily assent thereto. The Morris and Essex Railroad Company and its lessees, I am advised, are willing voluntarily to extinguish their contract on the subject of taxation if the State will release its right to take the property of that company upon payment therefor, under the sixteenth section of its charter.

It is with satisfaction that I present this matter to the Legislature, as it involves the right of the only corporation whose contract on the subject of taxation has been affirmed by the Supreme Court of the United States.

The decision of the arbitrators has fixed the amount which the State will receive for back taxes in dispute, and if the State and the Company can now agree upon the terms of the proposed act and the form of the agreements to be executed to carry out the adjustment, all matters of difference between the Company and the State will be finally settled.

AWARD.

WHEREAS, By virtue of a joint resolution relative to the arbitration of alleged taxes in arrears under the charter and supplements of the Morris and Essex Railroad Company, the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey submitted all matters in difference between the State of New Jersey and the Morris and Essex Railroad Company and the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad Company, its lessee, of alleged taxes in arrears arising under the charter and supplements of the Morris and Essex Railroad Company to the arbitration of two arbitrators, one of whom should be chosen in writing by the Governor, who duly chose Frederick W. Stevens as arbitrator, and the other arbitrator to be chosen by the said companies, in writing, who duly chose John F. Dillon as arbitrator; and

WHEREAS, The appointments of the said arbitrators were duly filed in the office of the Secretary of State within thirty days from the passage of said joint resolution, and the arbitrators duly took an oath of office; and

WHEREAS, Under orders made by the arbitrators, the State formulated in writing its complaint setting forth its claims of alleged taxes in arrears, to which the said companies made answer; and

WHEREAS, Under the authority given to the said arbitrators in said resolution, they caused the said parties to take their respective proofs touching the matters contained in the complaint and answer and said joint resolution, which were submitted to the arbitrators as aforesaid; and

WHEREAS, The said arbitrators have examined the said proofs and heard the counsel of the respective parties thereon, and duly considered the same;

Now, THEREFORE, We, the said arbitrators, do hereby make our award, in writing, as follows:

That in full payment and satisfaction of all alleged claims of the State against the Morris and Essex Railroad Company and the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad Company, its lessee, in respect of taxes in arrears from the organization of the Morris and Essex Railroad Company down to and including the year 1883, the said Morris and Essex Railroad Company and the said Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad Company, its lessee, shall pay to the State of New Jersey the sum of three hundred thousand dollars (\$300,000).

And it is further ordered and awarded in respect of the taxes since 1883 down to and including the year 1889, as follows, to wit:

That if the State shall, as contemplated, pass an act at the present session of the Legislature surrendering the right given by the sixteenth section of the charter of the Morris and Essex Railroad Company, passed January 29th, 1835, or by any of the supplements thereto, to purchase and acquire the railroad and property of the Morris and Essex Railroad Company, as set forth and contained in said charter and supplements, in consideration that the company shall surrender the special contract in relation to taxation as provided in section fifteen of said charter of January 29th, 1835, and the third section of the supplement thereto of March 3d, 1865, or in any of the supplements to said original charter, and shall agree to submit itself to the operation of the provisions of all constitutional general tax laws applicable to all railroad companies, passed or to be passed, and shall release the State from all liability in respect of refunding or repaying taxes paid under general tax laws since and including the year 1884, then the above award is to be credited with the sum of sixty-five thousand dollars (\$65,000).

It is further awarded that if the Legislature of New Jersey shall pass no such act as the one above contemplated at the present session thereof, then the above award is to be credited with the said sum of sixty-five thousand dollars (\$65,000), provided the said railroad companies shall file with the Comptroller of the State a release to the State of New Jersey of all claims against the State for or in respect of refunding or repaying taxes paid by the said companies, or either of them, since and including the year 1884.

The amount above awarded shall be paid by the said railroad companies to the Treasurer of New Jersey as follows: \$100,000 within thirty days after the rising of the present session of the

Legislature; \$100,000 within thirty days thereafter, and the balance within thirty days thereafter.

In reaching this award the arbitrators deem it proper to add, each for himself, that it has been the result of a careful examination of the voluminous testimony embracing complicated transactions running through a period of about forty years. Many of the questions involved, especially those relating to net earnings, cost of road, time of payment, and others, are complicated, and, to a large extent, unadjudicated. In consequence of different constructions put upon the charter and acts relating to the subject by the State and the company, there was a wide difference between them, the State claiming that the company was in arrears about \$500,000, exclusive of interest, and the company claiming to have paid the State not only in full, but about \$240,000 besides. The arbitrators acquit the company and its officers of any intention in the reports which have been made from time to time of a design to defraud or wrong the State.

I am directed by the Senate to inform the House of Assembly that the Senate has passed the following concurrent resolution, requesting Congress to take steps for the removal of explosives from Ellis Island :

WHEREAS, It appears that there is great danger apprehended from the storage of explosives on Ellis Island, in the Bay of New York, it appearing that at times there are several hundred thousand pounds of ammunition stored in the magazine on that island ; and

WHEREAS, Said magazine is within half a mile of the densely populated part of Jersey City, and not much over a mile distant from New York and Brooklyn, there is well-founded apprehension, in case of accident, that there would be immense destruction of property and life, not only in the city of New York, but in this State and on vessels in the harbor, and it appearing that the danger far outweighs the advantages of the location of the magazine on Ellis Island ; therefore, be it

The annual report of the commission shows a careful and conscientious investigation and consideration of the questions submitted to them.

The report is also accompanied by a draft of a bill which is intended to carry out the recommendations of the commission.

REPORT.

*To His Excellency, Leon Abbett, Governor of New Jersey:*

The undersigned commissioners, appointed by the Governor in pursuance of chapter 216 of the Laws of 1889, respectfully report as follows:

On May 6th, 1889, the following act having been duly passed by both houses of the General Assembly, was approved by the Governor:

“AN ACT relating to the state reformatory.

“WHEREAS, it is deemed advisable that there shall be a state reformatory in this state for the custody and imprisonment of criminals between the ages of sixteen and thirty, who have not been previously sentenced to a state prison in this or any other state or country, and of persons convicted for the first time of crime not involving moral turpitude; therefore,

“1. *Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of New Jersey*, That the governor shall appoint five persons as a board of commissioners, who shall be authorized to visit and examine any of the intermediate reformatories erected and in operation in other states, and shall make report to the governor of their inspection and judgment as to the best institution and system.

"2. *And be it enacted*, That they shall thereafter select from any available property owned by the sinking fund a suitable site for a state reformatory, and in case there is no suitable site among such properties they shall select one elsewhere; they shall make a report of the site selected and the value thereof to the governor and comptroller, and if approved of by them, in case the same does not belong to the sinking fund, they shall procure an option of its purchase in behalf of the state, and for a price not greater than the sum so approved of.

"3. *And be it enacted*, That the said commissioners shall be authorized to employ an architect or architects, and to procure plans or designs for the construction of suitable buildings for the state reformatory, which shall have a capacity of not less than five hundred prisoners, and to be so constructed as to admit of the classification of prisoners; they shall report to the governor the plan which they shall be of the opinion is the best adapted to the purpose, with an estimate of its probable cost; the governor shall report to the next legislature the said plan and estimate.

"4. *And be it enacted*, That the said commissioners shall be entitled to receive their traveling and other official expenses, which, with the cost of such plans and estimates, shall be paid, under the approval of the governor, by the treasurer, on the warrant of the comptroller.

"5. *And be it enacted*, That this act shall take effect immediately."

On or about January 3d, 1890, your predecessor in office, Governor Robert S. Green, appointed the undersigned as commissioners under this act, and a commission was duly issued to each of us, under the seal of the State. At the request of the Governor, the commission met at the Executive department on Tuesday, January 7th, and organized by choosing Charlton T. Lewis as Chairman and Robert W. Elliott as Secretary. We now report as our general conclusions:

*First.* That, on the whole, the best institution and system now in operation in any other State of the Union as an intermediate reformatory are the institution known as the New York State Reformatory, at Elmira, and the system of government and discipline there practiced.

*Second.* That among the available property owned by the Sinking Fund, there is one, and only one, suitable site for a State Reformatory, namely, the property known as the Edgar farm, in the city of Rahway, Union county; that this site is, in our judgment, better adapted to the purpose than any available property which has been offered to the commission for sale by

private owners, and that we cordially recommend the appropriation of it for the erection of such an institution.

*Thirdly.* That the plans which, in our opinion, are the best adapted to the purpose of such an institution are substantially those which are appended to this report. They have been prepared and submitted by J. R. Thomas, architect, and embody the ideas and arrangements which have been found most useful in similar structures, freed from certain errors and defects which experience has revealed in prisons and reformatories hitherto constructed. We believe that they combine economy of construction and conduct, with convenience and security, in a degree not hitherto attained; and that by utilizing the labor of State prisoners and of the inmates of the reformatory, the entire structure can be completed in two years, at a cost to the State of three hundred thousand dollars.

In support and in explanation of these conclusions, we respectfully submit the following facts and considerations:

The only intermediate reformatories of the class contemplated in the act above recited, and which are now in successful operation in other States, are the New York State Reformatory at Elmira, the Pennsylvania Industrial Reformatory at Huntingdon, and the Massachusetts State Reformatory at Concord. Each of these has been visited and carefully inspected by the commissioners in a body, with the guidance and aid of the officers in charge. We have, upon the ground in each case, investigated the plans and the construction of the buildings, the laws regulating the commitment, maintenance, employment, instruction and discipline of prisoners, the methods of keeping records and accounts, the condition and products of the industries carried on, the practical workings of the system in all these respects, and the results thus far attained in the reformation of convicts. The first institution of the class in which reformation was distinctly set in view as the principal object of confinement, was erected in New York, under a law passed in 1870. Upon the completion of the buildings, the general principles of its administration were defined by an act passed in 1877, and since several times amended in details, and the reformatory has now been in successful operation for twelve years. The Massachusetts Reformatory was opened in 1885, and the Pennsylvania Industrial Reformatory early in 1889. In each of these the Elmira system has been adopted, with some modifications, and except in a few details, of education, discipline and labor, all that is most valuable in them is modeled after the New York institution. The buildings at Elmira are, on the whole, admirably adapted to their purpose, but were built without careful regard to economy, and have since

been enlarged in disregard of the original plan, so that their cost has been far greater than would now suffice to construct an edifice of the same capacity and utility. The buildings at Concord are those of the State Prison converted into a reformatory, and are not in all respects so well constructed for the purpose. Those at Huntingdon have been built on imperfectly digested plans and apparently at a needless cost.

The principal differences in the laws which govern these several institutions relate to the selection of inmates. The law of Massachusetts, in this respect, was at first conspicuously imperfect, permitting the commitment to the institution of all classes of prisoners, including those guilty of the most aggravated felonies, as well as tramps, vagrants, stubborn children and common drunkards, and without any limitation to exclude persons advanced in life, or habitual or professional criminals. The law has been amended in this respect, but still permits the commitment to the institution of large numbers of criminals who are very doubtful subjects of its discipline; and it seems clear that the law of New York, which contemplates the commitment to the reformatory only of those who have been guilty of a serious offense, and yet of none except first offenders, and those who are comparatively youthful, is in all respects preferable. But even in New York we find that the spirit of the law has not been carefully observed by the courts, and partly because of a lack of careful discrimination in the infliction of sentence, and partly, perhaps, because of the crowded state of other penal institutions, a considerable number of habitual or professional criminals have been sent to the reformatory, and have been kept there to the injury of its proper work. It seems essential to the best results in such an institution that the subjects of its discipline should be selected with care. It is impossible by statute to lay down any fixed rule, founded either upon the nature of the offense, the age of the offender, or the number of previous convictions, which shall secure a proper selection. It is much better that a careful consideration of each particular case shall be made by the court passing the sentence, and that those offenders shall be committed to the reformatory, and those only, who, on such an investigation, are found to be probably susceptible of moral influence and capable of receiving such discipline and education as may fit them to become self-supporting citizens.

Apart from the law regulating the selection of inmates, the most important differences between the systems of discipline prevailing in the New York and the Massachusetts institutions respectively, are to be referred to the differences in character and policy between the heads of the respective institutions. No



doubt a large discretion must necessarily be left to the competent superintendent of such an institution, but your commission have been profoundly impressed by the fact that an experiment has been tried on a large scale in the Massachusetts Reformatory, which has no parallel, so far as we are aware, in any other penal institution. The prisoners are allowed a freedom of social intercourse which is without precedent, and which has been regarded by many experienced students of the subject as questionable, if not fraught with peril. The highest class of convicts, who have won this position in the institution by a considerable period of good behavior, industry, and diligence in study, and who constitute a large percentage of the whole, are permitted to form clubs and societies, which assemble without the supervision of officers, and conduct their literary exercises and their amusements on fixed evenings of the week, in halls furnished for the purpose. After several years of experience, the officers of the institution declare that the liberty thus granted has never been abused, and that the results of it have been eminently beneficial; that these societies are a support to the moral order and good discipline of the institution, as well as a powerful stimulus to its intellectual activity. And this is said to be true in spite of the fact that the institution was originally peopled by a large detachment of prisoners from the State Prison. If it had begun with a small number of carefully selected subjects, and had gradually grown by the commitment of suitable persons selected for it by the courts, the same public spirit might have been still more easily built up, and the excellent result would have been less surprising.

While the law of Massachusetts for the selection of subjects for the reformatory seems to us inferior to that of New York, there are some respects in which the Commonwealth of Massachusetts has embodied improvements in the statute law relating to prisoners which experience has proved to be valuable, and which have, as yet, no complete parallel in the legislation of any other State. We refer particularly to the provision made for the supervision by a State agent of all juvenile offenders, and for the appointment in any city or town of the Commonwealth of a probation officer. It is the business of these officers carefully to inquire into the character and offense of every person arrested for crime, in order to ascertain whether the accused may be expected to reform without punishment; and in case he is satisfied, on investigation, that the best interests of the public and of the accused would be subserved by placing him upon probation instead of consigning him to prison, the court, upon his recommendation, may permit the accused to be thus released upon probation, upon such terms as it may deem best, always having

regard to the reformation of the prisoner. A person thus released upon probation is subject to the supervision of the probation officer, who becomes, in a certain sense, responsible for his good conduct, and who may at any time re-arrest him, with the approval of the police authorities, without any further warrant, and bring him again before the court for sentence. The State Agent for Juvenile Offenders and his assistants have similar powers over all persons of tender age who are accused of crime, wrong-doing, or vagrancy, and may take charge of them and find places for them in which the influences upon their characters are likely to be much more beneficial than those in which they would be subject in a county jail. The combined work of these officers for a series of years has had the effect of diminishing vagrancy and crime in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts to an extraordinary degree, and it forms part of a system of penal jurisprudence which is so vast an improvement upon the methods commonly practiced that it deserves the careful consideration of all other civilized Commonwealths.

The act providing for the release on parole of prisoners whose conduct and character indicate that they are fitted for it, which is now pending in the Legislature and has been received with so much favor, seems to indicate that the State of New Jersey is ready for a general revision of its criminal jurisprudence on the lines of the best modern practice. While such an act cannot, of course, be justified merely by the desire to relieve the penal institutions of the State from their over-crowded condition, it is, we believe, a wise measure, in the interest of a more intelligent and statesmanlike method of dealing with crime than has been hitherto practiced. It seems to us that while the establishment of a State reformatory is a pressing necessity and will be of great value to the community, yet it can only be made useful in the highest degree if it is a part of a comprehensive system of dealing with the criminal classes which contemplates the utmost efforts in the reach of society for their entire elimination; and such a system must keep in view certain principles which have come to be admitted by all special students of the subject of crime, but which as yet have had little influence on the legislation of most civilized communities. The first and highest of those principles is that criminal jurisprudence, to accomplish its best ends, must have regard less to the particular offense which has been committed than to the person who has committed it. Hitherto it has been customary in penal laws to attempt to graduate punishments in accordance with the supposed enormity of offenses, these offenses being crudely defined by certain vague and general names. This custom has grown out of the tradi-

tional and antiquated notion that imprisonment, when inflicted by law, is a sort of retaliation for the offense which has been committed against the law—that the law, in short, in punishing an offense, avenges itself by inflicting an equivalent for the offense upon the offender, yet in reality this notion is admitted to have no foundation. The object of the infliction of punishment is the welfare of society, which must be protected by the restraint of persons who would be dangerous to its peace and prosperity, and must be further protected, if possible, by the reformation of the offender. These two ends—the restraint of a criminal from the practice of criminality, and his reformation in order that he may be restored to honest and self-supporting industry—are the only ends which a wise statesmanship can hold in view in its penal laws; and this being admitted, it is the evident duty of the Legislature and of the administrator of the law to study not the offense, but the offender, and to inflict precisely that punishment, and no other, which is best adapted to restrain the offender, where there is danger of further acts of crime, and to reform him. All students of criminal jurisprudence are now agreed that the old notion of deterring prisoners from crime by the terror of punishment has broken down entirely, and must be abandoned. Prisons, then, should be retained only for those whose restraint is required by the interests of society, or those of whom there is hope that imprisonment will reform them. It is doubtful whether, in a large proportion of cases, the effect of imprisonment has not been to make criminals, rather than to reduce their number; and, in any case, it is the part of wisdom to keep men out of prison, when imprisonment would injure them.

The great work which can be accomplished in a nation by a well digested and firmly administered prison system is illustrated by the recent history of crime in Great Britain. It is now about forty years since reformatory schools for the reception of boys and girls who had fallen into crime began to be established in Great Britain, and from that time to the present the entire system of prisons and jails throughout the country has been made the subject of careful study on the part of the Government, and has been improved by successive acts of Parliament until a complete reformatory system has been introduced in all the prisons, and every local jail has been brought under the same central administration. The result of these combined efforts is seen in the fact, shown by official statistics, that for forty years the number of criminals and the number of crimes of every grade in England and Wales have steadily and continuously declined, and during the last five years the average number of persons sentenced for both felonies and misdemeanors has been less than

one-half what it was from 1841 to 1845, although the population of the kingdom has increased about seventy per cent. It is clear that the prison system of England, on the whole, steadily diminishes the number of criminals, while in most of the States of the Union there is no comprehensive system of dealing with prisoners, or none which is equally effective. Yet, even in the English prisons, we believe that no such results have been obtained in the reformation of criminals as can be shown in the experience of the reformatories at Elmira, in New York, and at Concord, in Massachusetts.

It is impossible in this report to recount at length the principles of discipline which shall control the administration of such an institution as it is proposed to establish. Experience has shown that a large proportion of those who are first arrested for crime are susceptible to moral influences, and can be rescued from criminality if they are brought under the power of an institution thoroughly organized for the purpose. The means which it possesses for this purpose consist, first, of physical training and improvement, including exercise, cleanliness and diet; next, of industrial education intended to build up the habit of industry, and also to confer such special skill as will render the pupil capable of self-support, and, finally, of the education of the whole man, including the development to the utmost extent of his intellectual capacities. It is an ascertained fact that less than one-fifth of one per cent. of the crime in the United States is committed by persons who can be called educated. In addition to these influences, every moral and religious power which can be brought to bear on the prisoners should be utilized for their benefit. As the result of twelve years' experience in the Elmira Reformatory, it is now claimed that not less than eighty per cent. of those who have been subjects of education in that institution, and who are now free, are doing well, are supporting themselves and are free from criminal habits and associations. All precise statistics upon such a subject are open to criticism, but it seems to be a well-ascertained fact that the proportion of criminals who have been restored to independence and to respectable citizenship through the agency of this institution is very large, including, perhaps, a decided majority, at least, of all those who have been subjects of its work. Such an institution must be regarded, not merely as a vast charity, which is an honor to the community instituting it, but further, as one of the best investments of money which can be made by any government for the benefit of the people.

In order to define as clearly as possible the nature, extent and organization of the proposed institution, the commission have

embodied in the annexed draft of a bill the legislation on the subject which they deem necessary and appropriate at the present time; and they respectfully present it as a part of this report, for the consideration of the Governor and Legislature.

THE PROPOSED STATE REFORMATORY, AT RAHWAY, N. J.

The main structure, facing the north, will consist of a center or guard room building, and connected therewith an executive building in front, and east and west wings or cell-houses.

On the basement or ground floor of the center building is located the inmates' large dining hall, access being had to same directly from each cell-wing, and also by a corridor from the main kitchen located in building at rear. Upon the next or principal floor will be the guard-room, opening into each cell-wing and commanding a complete view of their various corridors. Upon the guard-room floor will be what is commonly termed a cage, constructed of wrought-iron bars in open work, through which all persons entering the prison proper must pass. Connecting with this cage are corridors similarly constructed leading to each of the two front corner turrets, one of which is designated "key room," where all the keys of the institution are to be kept; and the other as "armory," where the fire-arms of the guards will be placed when not in use. The rear of the guard-room is thrown out in the form of a half octagon, from two sides of which new prison wings can in the future be constructed and commanded the same as the two front wings.

Above the guard-room the chapel or assembly hall is located, the inmates' access to same being by stairways from each cell-wing, and for managers, visitors and others by elevator and stairs from the executive building.

Each prison wing is to contain two hundred and fifty-six cells, making a total, as at present proposed, of five hundred and twelve cells, with an L connected with corridor of east wing in which will be placed six additional cells for solitary confinement, one of which will be a padded cell. These solitary cells will be constructed of chilled boiler iron; the residue of cells will be built of brick, with stone floors and ceilings and grated wrought-iron

doors. There will be an iron bucket niche built into wall of each cell and connected with ventilating flue. There will also be another ventilating flue connected with each cell near its ceiling, all of these connecting with a large ventilating duct in attic, where the air is rarified, these in turn being connected with ventilating cupolas, insuring complete ventilation.

The hospitals will be in the upper portion of wing pavilions, one to be used as a general hospital and the other as an epidemic hospital, with the necessary connecting rooms, all being reached from the prison corridors by elevators and staircases placed in the circular turrets. The other turrets of cell-wings will be used for wash-rooms, baths, broom-closets, etc.

The front or executive building will have upon its main floor the Warden's office, Manager's room, reception-rooms, book-keeper's room and vault, with sleeping-rooms for clerks and others in the second story; the library, Chaplain's room, etc., in the basement.

At the rear of the center or guard-room building, and connected therewith by a corridor, will be a building with a superstructure three stories in height and a cellar underneath for the storage of vegetables. In the first or ground story of this building (which is on a level with inmates' dining-hall and connected therewith) are placed the inmates' or main kitchen, officers' kitchen, grocery store-room, meat-room, refrigerator-room, bakery, bread-room, flour store-room, heavy grocery store-room, general stores and the laundry. In the second story (which is on a level with guard-room floor and connected by corridor therewith) will be the officers' dining-room and pantry, officers' sitting-room and toilet, six school-rooms, receiving-room for inmates, with bath, etc., clothes-room, tailor shop and connecting toilet. In the third story will be the officers' assembly and reading-rooms and officers' sleeping rooms, with shoe shop at rear with separate entrance.

The buildings are to be constructed of stock hard burned brick, laid in the best quality of cement mortar, in a very substantial manner, with a minimum amount of ornamentation. The roofs are to be of slate. The guard room, the cells and the corridors connected therewith will be fire-proof.

The yard wall is to be constructed as indicated, with three entrance gateways, and a watch tower at each of the four corners. In this enclosure, in addition to the buildings named, will be a building for electric light plant, heating and power boilers, etc.; also, buildings for trade schools, workshops, stable, etc.

The residences for the Warden and the Deputy will be in separate buildings in front of the enclosure.

The entire buildings are to be heated with steam, with a complete system of ventilation.

All of the buildings named and the yard wall, it is estimated, will cost three hundred and ninety thousand dollars (\$390,000) if built without the aid of prison labor, but it is believed that the yard wall can be entirely built by prison labor, and that the common laborers' work upon the building can be done by prisoners, in which case it seems reasonable to assume that the cost can be brought to three hundred thousand dollars.

BILL FOR AN ACT TO ESTABLISH THE NEW JERSEY REFORMATORY.

1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey*, That the governor shall appoint five persons who shall act as a board of building commissioners for the erection of an industrial reformatory, in the city of Rahway, in Union county, and during the time that they shall act as such commissioners they shall receive no pay except their traveling and other official expenses, which shall be paid under the approval of the governor by the treasurer on the warrant of the comptroller.

2. *And be it enacted*, That the said building commissioners shall be known as the building commissioners of the New Jersey reformatory, and the said reformatory shall be known as the New Jersey reformatory.

3. *And be it enacted*, That the said building commissioners shall be authorized to set apart for the use of the reformatory and take possession of the property in the city of Rahway belonging to the sinking fund and known as the Edgar farm, or so much thereof as in their judgment may be necessary, and may add thereto by purchase any adjoining property which may be necessary to the completeness of the site, at a cost not exceeding five thousand dollars.

4. *And be it enacted*, That the said building commissioners shall be charged with the general superintendence of the grounds and of the design and construction of the buildings thereon, and shall have power to appoint an architect, a superintendent and other necessary agents and assistants, provided that the plans for buildings which they shall adopt shall be approved by the governor, and shall have a capacity of not less than five hundred prisoners, and shall be so constructed as to admit of the proper classification of the prisoners.

5. *And be it enacted*, That each of the said building commissioners, before entering on the duties of his office, shall give his bond to the people of the state of New Jersey in the penal sum

of twenty thousand dollars, to be approved by the comptroller and filed in his office, conditioned for the faithful performance of the duties imposed on him by this act.

6. *And be it enacted*, That the treasurer is hereby directed to pay to the order of said commissioners, upon the warrant of the comptroller, such sums of money as may be necessary for the purchase of additional land and for building and furnishing the reformatory, at such times as the same may be required; and the said commissioners shall make to the comptroller a detailed report of all moneys received and expended by them in pursuance of this act on or before the first day of January next, and from time to time whenever the comptroller shall require such report.

7. *And be it enacted*, That the said building commissioners shall be authorized, in the building of the reformatory, to employ any number, not exceeding two hundred, of the prisoners now or hereafter under sentence of imprisonment in the state prison, subject to such rules and regulations as shall be approved by the inspectors of the state prison; *provided*, that the prisoners so employed shall be selected from time to time by the supervisor of the state prison, and during such employment shall be subject to all laws and lawful regulations governing the inmates of the state prison, as far as the same shall be applicable, and all such prisoners during such employment shall be regarded as in the custody of the principal keeper of the state prison.

8. *And be it enacted*, That whenever the said reformatory shall be completed and ready for occupation, the said building commissioners shall certify the fact of completion to the governor; and the governor shall thereupon, by the advice and consent of the senate, appoint a board of five managers of such reformatory, who shall perform the duties required of them by this act, with no compensation other than reasonable traveling and other official expenses; they shall hold office for ten years, and shall classify themselves, by lot or otherwise, so that the term of one of their number shall expire with each second year, but any vacancy which may occur in the board shall be filled for the unexpired term by appointment by the governor.

9. *And be it enacted*, That the said board of managers shall have personal charge and superintendence of the reformatory, and shall appoint a warden, physician, chaplains, teachers and a clerk, who shall receive salaries to be hereafter fixed by law; and may remove any of them for cause after a hearing upon written charges; the clerk shall be the secretary of the board of managers; all other officers and workmen shall be appointed by the warden, subject to the approval of the managers, and removable at their pleasure, but may be suspended for cause by the warden



subject to the action of the board of managers at their next meeting; any of the managers may be removed by the governor for cause, after an opportunity to be heard on written charges.

10. *And be it enacted*, That the said board of managers shall receive and keep in said reformatory every male criminal who shall be legally sentenced to said reformatory; and any court having jurisdiction may, in its discretion, sentence to the reformatory any male person between the ages of sixteen and thirty convicted of a crime punishable by imprisonment in a state prison, and not known to have been previously sentenced to any state prison or felon prison in any state or country, when such court is of opinion that such person is a suitable subject for reformatory discipline; and every sentence to the reformatory shall be a general sentence of imprisonment to the New Jersey reformatory at Rahway, without specifying or limiting the duration of imprisonment; the term of such imprisonment of every such person shall be determined by the managers of the reformatory in pursuance of this act, but shall in no case exceed the maximum term imposed by law for the crime of which the prisoner was convicted.

11. *And be it enacted*, That when the reformatory is ready for occupation, and whenever thereafter there shall be unoccupied room therein, the said board of managers may make a requisition upon the inspectors of the state prison, who shall thereupon select from the convicts between the ages of sixteen and thirty, who are in their judgment suitable subjects for reformatory discipline, a number not exceeding the number named in such requisition, and shall transfer them to the reformatory, and the said board of managers are hereby authorized to receive and detain every such convict during the term of his sentence to the state prison, subject to all laws relating to commutation of sentence in such state prison for good conduct, and the provisions of this act shall apply to all convicts so transferred; and the said board of managers may make a requisition upon the trustees of the New Jersey state reform school, who shall thereupon select from the boys in their custody, not less than sixteen years of age, such as are in their judgment suitable subjects for reformatory discipline, a number not exceeding the number named in such requisition, and shall transfer them to the reformatory, and the said board of managers are hereby authorized to receive and detain every such boy during the term for which he might have been detained in the said state reform school, subject to the provisions of this act.

12. *And be it enacted*, That the said board of managers shall have power to use such means of reformation in the said reforma-

tory as they shall deem expedient, and may employ the inmates under sentence in mechanical labor, and may form them into classes for industrial or literary education; they shall, under a system of marks or otherwise, determine, by a uniform plan, the credit or standing of each prisoner from time to time; and when it appears to such managers that there is a reasonable probability that any prisoner may be set free and will remain at liberty without violating the law, and that his release on parole is not incompatible with the welfare of society, they may issue to him, under such general rules and regulations as they may ordain, a permit to go on parole outside of the reformatory buildings and enclosure, remaining, while on parole, in the legal custody and under the control of the board of managers, but subject to be taken back and confined within the reformatory at the discretion of the said board; and full power is hereby conferred upon said board of managers to retake and re-imprison any convict thus on parole; and the written order of said board, certified by its secretary, shall be a sufficient warrant to authorize any officer to whom it is addressed to arrest and return to the actual custody of the reformatory any such paroled prisoner, and it is hereby made the duty of all officers to execute said order; and the said board of managers shall have power to make all proper rules and regulations for the employment, discipline, instruction, education, removal and temporary or conditional release and return of all convicts in said reformatory.

13. *And be it enacted*, That when, in the belief of the said board of managers, any convict imprisoned in such reformatory, or on parole, has given satisfactory evidence of reformation and can be trusted to remain permanently at liberty, they shall issue to such prisoner an absolute release from imprisonment; but no petition or other form of application for the release of any prisoner shall be entertained by the managers; nothing in this act contained shall be construed to impair or affect the power of the governor and the board of pardons to grant a pardon or commutation of sentence in any case.

14. *And be it enacted*, That the board of managers may appoint suitable persons in any part of the state to assist them in the supervision of prisoners released on parole, and to make such reports and render such assistance to them as they, by general rules and regulations, may require; and such persons shall be subject to direction and removal by such managers, and shall be paid a reasonable compensation for their services and expenses from the earnings or other funds of the reformatory.

15. *And be it enacted*, That this act shall be regarded as a public act and shall take effect immediately.

*Hon. William C. Heppeneimer, Speaker of the General Assembly:*

SIR—I herewith return to the General Assembly, in which it originated, Assembly Bill No. 357, entitled "Supplement to an act entitled 'An act respecting prosecutors of the pleas of the state,'" approved April sixteenth, one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, together with my objections thereto.

This act on its face purports to be for the purpose of increasing the compensation of prosecutors in counties having a population not less than sixty-two thousand and not more than sixty-five thousand. Section three expressly provides that "nothing in the act contained shall in anywise be construed or held as reducing the salary of any of the prosecutors of the pleas in any of the counties of this State."

The limitation of population is purely arbitrary, and it makes the act applicable to only one county of the State.

This act, as worded, is so clearly special that I am compelled to veto it. It relates to prosecutors now in office if they file their assent thereto. This provision does not make the act 'general'; it is still a special act and in violation of paragraph eleven, section seven, of Article IV of the Constitution.

In the case of *Woodruff v. The Freeholders of Passaic, 13 Vroom, 533*, the Court held in a case involving the constitutionality of a law relating to the fees of prosecutors, that an act might be framed, based upon some general principle, such as population or business, which would operate uniformly and without inequality upon all the officers of this class. This bill, however, does not operate uniformly and without inequality upon all the officers of this class. This bill, however, does not operate uniformly and without inequality. It will operate only in one county, and will increase the fees for the prosecutor therein, and as to the present prosecutor it must have his assent thereto before it is operative.

This act is also unconstitutional (so far as the record shows), because it is a private, local or special bill, of which no public notice has been given of the intention to apply for its passage as required by paragraph nine, section seven, Article IV of the Constitution, and Chapter I of the Laws of 1876, passed in pursuance thereof.

I have also grave doubts whether such an act, dependent as it is upon the will of the subject, is a legislative act, within the letter and spirit of the Constitution.

ARTICLE IV.

Strike out paragraph 3, section 1, and insert a new paragraph, as follows;

3. Members of the Senate and General Assembly shall be elected on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November (or on such other day as the Legislature may by law prescribe), in the year eighteen hundred and ninety-two, and every second year thereafter, and the two houses shall meet separately on the second Tuesday in January next after the said day of election; if vacancies happen, by resignation or otherwise, the persons elected to supply such vacancies shall be elected for the unexpired terms only.

Strike out section II, and insert a new section, as follows:

Section II. 1. The Senate shall be composed of one Senator from each county in the State, elected by the legal voters of the counties, respectively, for the term of four years.

2. The Senate meeting in the year eighteen hundred and ninety-three shall be divided as equally as may be into two classes; the seats of the Senators of the first class shall be vacated at the expiration of the second year thereafter, and the seats of the Senators of the second class at the expiration of the fourth year thereafter, so that one class may be elected biennially.

Strike out section III, and insert new section, as follows:

Section III. 1. The General Assembly shall be composed of members elected biennially by the legal voters of the counties, respectively, who shall be apportioned among the said counties as nearly as may be according to the number of their inhabitants at the first session held after the taking of each United States census, and when made, shall remain unaltered until the taking of another United States census; but each county shall at all times be entitled to one member, at least; and the whole number of members shall never exceed seventy-five.

Strike out paragraph 7, section IV, and insert a new paragraph, as follows:

7. Members of the Senate and General Assembly shall receive annually the sum of three hundred dollars during the time for which they shall have been elected, and while they shall hold

We, the undersigned, citizens, residents and property owners of the county of Union, respectfully present our earnest protest against the enactment of Assembly Bill No. 112, as amended by the Senate, now pending before your honorable body. The effect of this bill, if enacted, will be to legalize, so far as the Legislature has the power to do it, a practice which is under the ban of the civilized world, and is nowhere legalized, except on the shore of the Mediterranean sea and in the State of Louisiana.

Book-making and pool-selling and other lottery and gambling institutions have ruined millions of the human race of both sexes and all ages, without ever benefiting a single human being.

We have two race-tracks now, lately established in Union county, at both of which pool selling and book-making are constantly carried on, and the result has proved an evil, and only evil, to the good people of this county. Hundreds of laborers and mechanics, heretofore honest and industrious, now leave their work day after day to gamble on these races. Boys and young men, in numbers that are appalling, are their constant attendants, and peculation and embezzlement among the clerks and employees in the cities of Rahway and Elizabeth, directly attributable to the pool-rooms and race-tracks, have already brought desolation to more than a score of once happy homes.

The grand jury of Union county has found true bills of indictment against the persons responsible for these iniquities in our county, and we can stamp them out here unless the Legislature comes to their rescue by the enactment of this bill.

Against their doing this we solemnly protest.

Mr. Stull, from the Committee on Lunatic Asylums, presented the following report:

TRENTON, NEW JERSEY, May 19th, 1890.

*To the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:*

GENTLEMEN—The Joint Committee on the State Lunatic Asylum at Trenton respectfully report that, in pursuance of the duties devolved upon them, they have visited and carefully inspected the Asylum buildings and grounds, and have investigated with care the general management of the institution.

Public attention having been directed to criticisms upon this Asylum, published by authority of another State Association, your Committee have felt called upon to make known formally to the Legislature the results of their examination and inquiries.

The main Asylum building is a composite structure, begun in 1846, increased by extension in 1861 and by additional wings in 1865. While the buildings, at the time of their erection, were, no doubt, not intended to be fire-proof, they are constructed of Trenton brown stone so as to be as nearly free from the danger

of fire as is common in buildings erected for a like purpose. The expense of constructing a perfectly fire-proof building of the great size required for Asylum purposes, seems to have precluded the general adoption of such a plan in other parts of the United States.

In the old and in the new building just finished, great care has been taken to avoid the danger of fire and to provide the means of combating it should the occasion arise. An abundant supply of water is readily accessible in each hall, with water pipes prepared for hose attachment, with a constant supply of water in the reservoirs of the two buildings, both of which can be used at any point, amounting to twenty-eight thousand (28,000) gallons, with a head capable of throwing a stream thirty (30) feet. At least two, generally three, and in some cases four, exits are provided for each hall. It is true that the room doors of the patients are necessarily locked at night, but watchmen are constantly on guard, and the unlocking of the doors would require but a few minutes of time to accomplish.

The new building has been erected with more care to avoid the unnecessary use of wood work, and seems to your Committee a model of careful, provident structure well adapted to its purpose. Three exits by stairways to the ground are provided for each corridor. Constructed without extravagance, this edifice is a credit to the State. Its first object was to provide accommodations for the chronic insane patients. A system of large dormitories and general dining halls, large corridors and day rooms to be used in common by the patients, each sex, of course, being kept apart, was adopted as distinguished by the method of classification and separation of individual patients which prevails in the main building. While less expense per patient is thus incurred, it is found that the new building is regarded by the inmates with more favor, and residence there is generally preferred by them.

The ventilation of the Asylum buildings, both old and new, calls for special comment and approval. It is the opinion of the committee that in no large institution of this State does the air appear to be more pure and less tainted with the usual odors which are so common a feature of large hospitals and other asylums. In the main building, by means of a large fan operated by steam power, a constant flow of air is introduced into the corridors and rooms, and drawn out near the floor, in such quantities that the whole volume of air in each room is constantly and rapidly changed. The water-closets in both buildings are so connected with a heated flue that a strong current of air is, without interruption, carried from the inside of the building through



and out of the ventilating shaft. The system of ventilation in the new building, although operated without the means of steam power, has proved a success, and the atmosphere of that building is notable for the absence of disagreeable odors. Your Committee are of the opinion that the systems of ventilation and sewage, adopted in both buildings, provide every reasonable precaution against the danger of poisonous gases reaching any of the inmates of the house, which science and experience have suggested.

The water supply of the institution is of exceptional quality. Spring water of the purest kind is furnished in great abundance. The general health of the inmates, bearing in mind the hospital character of the institution, has been good during the last fiscal year. Very few deaths have occurred from acute diseases, apart from those resulting from the exhaustion of high maniacal excitement. The common grounds of the Asylum, as far as practicable, are used for exercise and recreation. Open-air courts, inclosed by high fences, have been provided for both men and women. The new airing court for men, at the extremity of the west wing, constructed and laid out by use of the regularly employed labor in and about the institution, with a total extra expense not exceeding five hundred dollars (\$500), embracing two acres of ground, is a valuable addition and calculated to contribute largely to the comfort and health of the patients.

With the general management of the institution your Committee cannot but express their satisfaction and feel it a duty to publicly acknowledge their high appreciation of the sacrifice of valuable time, care and attention bestowed by the Board of Managers, who, without any compensation, have given to their duties faithful and conscientious services.

As the cost of maintaining our insane is a matter of interest to the Legislature, your Committee would call attention to the following statistics, which appear in the State Comptroller's Report of this year:

At the close of the last fiscal year there were seven hundred and sixty-one (761) patients in the asylum.

In addition to the above expenditures for the support of patients, the sum of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) was, during the past year, paid out of the treasury on account of the appropriation for the new building made by the Legislature in 1887.

Adverse criticism having been published by authority of a State society upon the fact that autopsies were not made in the Trenton Asylum, your Committee, in reporting it to be true, would respectfully submit that such a course of action meets with their full approval, independently of the fact that there is no law which would justify such procedure. The sources of a diseased mind are not, in the opinion of your Committee, to be necessarily found by a dissection of the body after death, nor do the requirements of science demand or justify the mutilation after death of the forms of those unfortunate beings who are wards of the State and under its care, not because of crime or evil done by them, but because, as afflicted children, our brothers and sisters in humanity, we are under the deepest obligation to protect and provide for them with kindness while living, and when dead to respect their remains and lay them away reverently and tenderly.

Mr. Marsh, chairman of the special committee appointed to investigate the management of the State Prison submitted the following report:

*To the Honorable the Speaker and House of Assembly:*

The special committee appointed pursuant to the resolution of Mr. Mullone, adopted April 2d, to investigate the management of the State Prison, respectfully beg leave to submit this their report:

They have given a personal examination to the prison, and have heard many witnesses, including citizens, officers and prisoners.

With reference to the charge made in the resolution under which your committee were appointed, that admission to certain parts of the prison had been refused to a member of this House, your committee are of the opinion that under the circumstances such refusal was excusable. A misunderstanding on the part of the Matron, to whom the member had failed to disclose his official identity, afforded an excuse for the conduct of Mrs. Patterson in denying him such admission, she not knowing him to be a member of the House.

The resolutions also charge violation of the laws relative to the stamping of prison-made goods. For the purpose of informing themselves as to the ground for such charges, your committee made a personal inspection of the various work-shops in the prison, and the goods manufactured therein.

The contracts for such work were entered into prior to the time of our appointment.

The existing law (see P. L. 1887, page 242,) is clear in its provisions. It provides, in substance, that it shall be the duty of the contractors, or of their managers or superintendents, to stamp in a legible and conspicuous manner all goods with the words "Manufactured in New Jersey State Prison." Wherever it is impracticable to stamp each article, or if the articles manufactured are usually put up in packages, it is sufficient, under the law, to put a stamp, label or tag upon the packages, showing where the articles were made.

The duties of the officers of the prison are defined in the following language of the act:

"It shall be the duty of the principal keeper, supervisor and board of inspectors, to insert in every contract for convict labor hereafter made, on behalf of the state, such terms, covenants and provisions as will bind the contractor to comply with the requirements of this act."

Such provision we found inserted in all contracts now in force.

The examination of the committee was made in all of the departments and disclosed the fact that each shirt and pair of trousers were tagged, that socks and matings were put up in packages and tagged, and that all of the larger size of shoes were each stamped on the inside, while the smaller sizes were put up in boxes which were labeled. Criticism was particularly directed against the method of stamping the brushes made in the prison. The committee found that the method followed was to stamp the brush on the face-side thereof, near the outer edge, with a cold stamp. On behalf of the contractor it was urged that this was the most conspicuous place in which to place the stamp and the one most readily observable.

Your committee were impressed with the fact that the prison is not self-sustaining, but that in the cost of maintenance there is an annual deficit of from \$10,000 to \$20,000, to which must be added about \$75,000 for salaries. This deficit, your committee believe, is largely to be attributed to the expenses necessarily resulting, in a large measure, from the increased number of prisoners and keepers, and also to the maintenance of the present system of employment of prison labor. The system in force makes necessary an increased number of keepers, and the amount



received from the labor of convicts is not so large as under the old system.

With reference to the general management, conduct and discipline of the institution, your committee are of the opinion that the same is to be commended. Several witnesses were examined, including prisoners, and your committee concluded that the management by the principal keeper and matron is marked with strictness and fairness, and humane methods in discipline prevail, and are followed with good results.

Your committee also examined the books of the Supervisor and his methods of management, and they wish to state that he also is entitled to commendation.

Through the honesty and watchfulness of these officers, your committee are led to believe that the institution is conducted in as good a manner and as economically as possible under existing laws.

The Members of the House of Assembly, preceded by the Speaker and Clerk, then proceeded to the Senate Chamber, and after the announcement by the Speaker that in accordance with his duties he had adjourned the House of Assembly without day, the President of the Senate declared the One Hundred and Fourteenth Legislature adjourned without day.

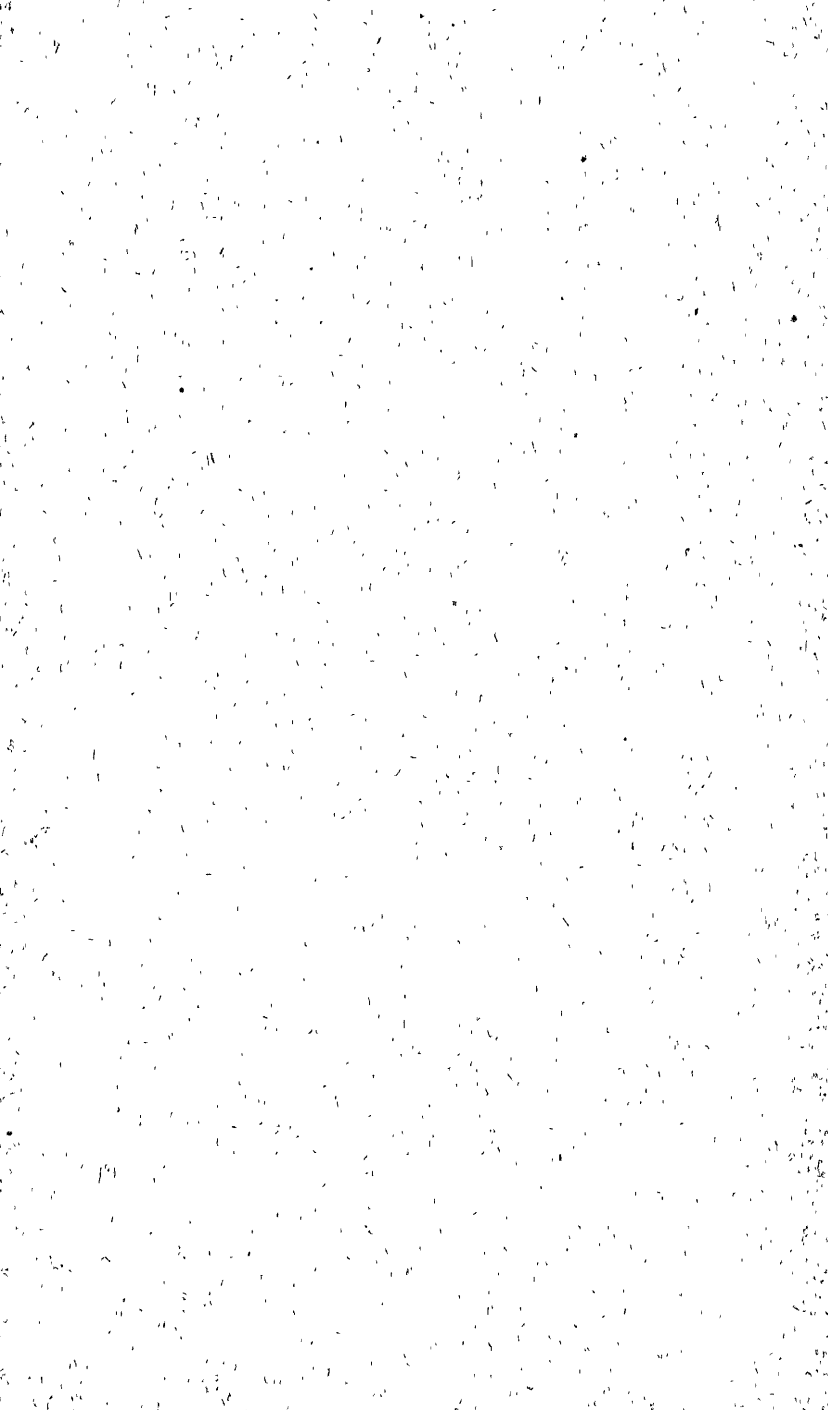

## SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTIONS.

*Resolved* (the House of Assembly concurring), That the Senators and Representatives of this State, in the Congress of the United States, be and they are hereby urgently requested to vote for and use their influence and efforts in their representative capacity to secure the selection of the city of New York as the site and location of the World's Fair to be held in 1892, as such selection will not only afford great facilities for the exhibition of the manufactures and products of this State, but will also prove conducive to the ultimate success of the undertaking; and that the able and incontrovertible arguments of Chauncey M. Depew and others of the State of New York, before the Congressional Committee in the city of Washington, on this subject, are hereby most cordially indorsed and adopted as the sentiments of the people of New Jersey, believing that a favorable decision will redound to the honor and credit of the entire Republic—103, 106.

WHEREAS, Both political parties represented in the Legislature of this State have in their platforms and public enunciation of principles declared in favor of ballot reform and such legislation as might be necessary to secure secrecy and purity of the ballot in the exercise of the right of suffrage; and

WHEREAS, The two Houses of the Legislature represent the two great parties of the country, and it being desirable and imperative, in obedience to public sentiment and the will of the people, and in accordance with the wise suggestions of the Governor of the State in his inaugural message, that harmony and unity of action should facilitate the necessary legislation, which should not be retarded by partisan policy with a view to the political advantage of either party; therefore, be it

*Resolved*, (the House of Assembly concurring), That a joint committee be appointed, consisting of four members of the Senate and six of the House of Assembly, each party to be equally represented in number, whose duty it shall be to prepare and draft a bill for enactment which shall provide and secure all necessary safeguards for the exercise of the right of suffrage in absolute secrecy, without fear of intimidation, and to prevent, as far as possible, bribery or corruption at the polls; to provide for official ballots printed at the public expense, the right of nomination by petition and the true and honest return and count of the votes when cast, and to secure proper and complete facilities to all citizens of every condition to exercise untrammelled the constitutional and inherent right of manhood suffrage; and

*Resolved*, That the said committee, when appointed, shall, after due notice by them given, meet at stated times during the session of the Legislature in the Senate Chamber to hear all citizens interested and the representatives of all political or industrial organizations of the people whose interests or condition may be affected, with a view to obtaining wise suggestions and collating for embodiment of the bill the best known means and methods for the suppression of existing evils, with a due regard to the rights of every citizen. And that the committee report at the earliest possible day of this session—104, 106, 154.
