QUARTERMASTER-GENERAL'S REPORT.

STATE OF NEW JERSEY,
Office of the Quartermaster-General,
TRENTON, January 14, 1862.

To his Excellency CHARLES S. OLDEN, *Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the State of New Jersey*:

In pursuance of an act entitled "An act for the more effectual organization of the militia," approved March 22d, 1860, and also "An act for the defence of the State," approved May 10th, 1861, I have the honor to submit to your excellency the following report. It will contain, as usual, a particular return of all the arms and equipments belonging to this state, the number loaned out, in whose hands, and whether they remain under proper responsibilities, including all the camp equipage in the state arsenal.

The war, in which the government of the United States is involved for the preservation of the Union, has greatly increased the operations of this department during the past year, the details of which are also submitted. The peace and extraordinary prosperity which the state and nation have so long enjoyed had lulled the people and government into a false security, from which they were suddenly aroused by the proclamation of the President of the United States, on the 15th of April last, calling for troops to defend the capital of the nation from invasion.

Our militia law had become to a great extent distasteful to the people. No encouragement had been given by the state to the organization of an efficient militia system. The laws had become obsolete, or ineffectual. Very few military companies existed, and our arms were limited and mostly inferior to the improvements of the present day. This was our condition at the date of your excellency's proclamation of the seventeenth day of April last. On account of the agitated state of the public mind, and the extent and ramifications of a rebellion, the magnitude of which history does not furnish a parallel, and the exposed situation of the arsenal, the following order was issued to one of the military companies of this city:

Capt. WILLIAM R. MURPHY, *Capt. Co. A, National Guard, 1st Regt. Mercer Brigade:*

SIR:—You will consider yourself, and company under your command, detailed for special service. You will report forthwith to the quartermaster-general of the state, and act under his orders until otherwise directed.

By order of the commander-in-chief.

R. F. STOCKTON, *Adjutant-General.*

In obedience to this order, Capt. Murphy reported himself and command for immediate service. On the same day I directed him to take military possession of the arsenal, with special instructions to perform guard duty, and to allow no one within the arsenal walls without special permission.

The manner in which this corps performed the duties assigned them reflects great credit upon its officers and men. The arsenal had now become the depot for all of our military operations. The young gentlemen composing this company performed all the duties of a military garrison, and, at the same time, rendered important service in arming and equipping the troops for the field, for the period of three months' service, from the 16th of April to the 16th of July, in which seven regiments, four of militia and three of volunteer, were fully armed and equipped.

The expenditure for this service is believed to be a fair and legitimate charge against the United States government.

Immediately upon the proclamation of your excellency, of the 17th of April, calling for forty full companies, composing four regiments of militia, to serve for three months unless sooner discharged, volunteer companies reported rapidly at this place, for clothing, arms, and accoutrements.

The state was without camp or garrison equipage. Vacant houses were rented for the accommodation of the companies of the third and fourth regiments. They were billeted at the different hotels and boarding-houses for weeks. For the accommodation of the first and second regiments temporary barracks were hastily erected within the arsenal walls, and two mess-rooms, each some hundred and fifty feet long, with a commodious kitchen, for the subsistence of these regiments. Subsistence was furnished by contract.

The first regiment was clothed at Newark, by authority from this office, at the expense of the state.

The second regiment was mostly clothed by a committee of liberal and patriotic gentlemen of Jersey City, at their own expense, without any instructions or authority from the state, and have not as yet made any claim for repayment of the expenditure.

The third and fourth regiments were clothed entirely by the state.

The entire brigade was armed and equipped at the arsenal.

In consequence of the destruction of the railroad and bridges between Philadelphia and Baltimore, and that no time might be lost thereby in forwarding the troops, when ready for marching orders, fourteen steam transports were chartered and fitted up at this place, at great expense, for the transportation of the command of General Runyon to Annapolis.

The fourth regiment embarked on the afternoon of the 3d of May, the first, second and third on the morning of the day following, and arrived at Annapolis on the fifth day of May.

The entire force under the command of Brigadier-General Runyon was recruited, clothed, fully armed, equipped and transported to Washington within the short space of twenty days from the date of your excellency's proclamation.

Appended herewith will be found a statement, in detail, of the number and kind of property, of every description, furnished by the state to each of the four regiments of the three months' militia.

The whole expenditure made in organizing, equipping and transporting the four regiments of three months' men, amounting to the sum of \$167,128 46, may be stated as follows :

On the 14th of May a proposition was made to the quartermaster-general of the U. S. army, on behalf of the State of New Jersey, to furnish the three regiments of volunteers called for from this state, under the requisition of the President, the necessary clothing, camp and garrison equipage, as specified in general orders, and to be inspected and paid for in accordance with the customary rules of the service, as observed towards other contractors, which proposition was accepted on his part, and ratified and approved by your excellency on the 17th day of May.

Immediately thereafter sealed proposals were invited, by advertise-

ments published in the newspapers of the cities of Trenton, Newark and Camden, for furnishing and delivering at the state arsenal the necessary articles to be made and finished after sealed samples furnished by the quartermaster's department of the United States, and to be seen at the office of the undersigned.

Contracts were made in all cases with the lowest bidders for the articles required, upon terms deemed reasonable, considering the great demand at that time for all army goods, and the limited time within which they were required to be produced.

Within twenty days the necessary supplies were furnished and delivered at the arsenal; and, on the 28th of June, the three regiments were forwarded by railway to Washington, amply provided with every appointment necessary for service in the field.

The expenditures incurred under this head may be stated at \$177,417 89.

There was received on the third of August a requisition from the President of the United States, calling for five additional regiments of infantry, of ten companies each, and one company of artillery, to be organized and equipped upon the same terms that the three last regiments were furnished, with an order of the Secretary of War that each regiment should be furnished by the state with a baggage train. On the eighth day of September a regiment of riflemen, of twelve companies, and one company of artillery, was added to the last requisition; the whole to be organized as speedily as possible, and forwarded by regiments or companies as soon as fully armed and equipped.

Orders were immediately issued to contractors for the requisite stores to be furnished under the contracts already existing, modified by a condition that they should receive in payment for the goods fur-

nished such securities as the state should have or receive from the federal government in payment of the expenditure. There was a very general response and acquiescence, on the part of the contractors, to the modified terms of the contracts.

The supplies were furnished promptly, fully equal to government samples, and to the entire satisfaction of the inspectors.

It is believed that no delay in the equipment of troops was occasioned by reason of a single failure on the part of a contractor to deliver the goods within the time limited in his contract. Clothing, camp and garrison equipage were supplied as fast as recruits were received and mustered into service.

Five regiments were armed with state muskets, altered from flintlocks to percussion during the last summer; the ninth regiment, with the new model Springfield rifle-muskets, furnished by the government.

At the request of the Secretary of War, clothing was furnished in part to the Halsted cavalry, a statement of which will be found in another part of this report.

In consequence of the difficulty and delay in procuring the necessary supplies from the quartermaster's department at Washington, our troops have been obliged to draw their clothing almost wholly from this department.

The first regiment of volunteers has been furnished with new camp and garrison equipage. Under the head of issues to regimental quartermasters will be found a statement of the property furnished to different regiments in the field.

Your excellency will find herewith attached, a statement of the whole amount paid, in detail, for every description of expenditures incidental to the enrolling or mustering troops into the service of the United States, together with a statement designating the names of all the contractors, and the articles furnished by each.

Notwithstanding the extraordinary demands made upon the arsenal for the arming and equipping five entire regiments for the United States service with state arms, there have been one hundred and twenty-four uniform companies furnished with arms and accoutrements, between the 23d day of May and the 1st of January.

The war for the suppression of the rebellion has excited the military ardor of our people to an unusual degree, and it has been impossible to meet the increased demand for arms.

It is believed that the federal government will very soon be in the receipt of an ample supply to re-arm the New Jersey volunteers, when, we are assured that, having no further use for them, they will be returned for distribution to the military companies of this state.

The following arms are in the use of the active militia, issued upon the bonds of the commissioned officers, with one or more sureties for the safe keeping and return of the same to the arsenal, when required. It is believed that the securities are amply abundant to secure the state against loss, and that the arms are kept in as good condition as possible.

Arms in the hands of the active militia, December 31, 1861.

- 1,583 rifled muskets.
- 2,109 percussion muskets.
- 2,292 flint-lock muskets.
- 308 Zouave rifles, sword bayonets.
- 584 rifles.

Under the authority of the act of May 10th, 1861, authorizing the alteration of the arms of the state to make them effective, a contract was made with Messrs. Hewes & Phillips, of Newark, for the alteration of flint-lock muskets to percussion, at the rate of \$2 95 per musket, and a second contract with Messrs. Field & Horton, of this city, at the same rates. Under these two contracts there have been altered 7,481 stand.

The following work has been done in the machine shop, under the charge of Mr. John Lathrop, during the months of September, October, November and December :

- 2,666 muskets rifled.
- 2,214 muskets browned.
- 900 muskets, flint-locks, cleaned.
- 520 rifles cleaned.
- 1,018 muskets and rifles repaired.
- 452 muskets and rifles polished.
- 2,000 wipers altered.

The arsenal buildings were found to be insufficient for the accommodation of the increased business of this department, it therefore became necessary to make such alterations and additions thereto as were absolutely required for the service. A large and commodious building has been erected, twenty feet wide by one hundred and fifty feet long, and two stories in height. The first is occupied as a machine shop, in which has been placed machinery for altering, rifling, repairing and polishing arms.

The second story is used for storage. Heretofore ammunition has been stored in the arsenal in very limited quantities, and at too great a risk to the safety of the buildings. The necessity for keeping on hand a large supply of ammunition, for any emergency, has occasioned the erection of a convenient and substantial magazine in the most remote corner of the arsenal grounds.

If the present state of things is to exist longer, and the same military operations are to be continued at the arsenal, other alterations and improvements will be required.

The rooms are inconveniently small and cramped, without light or ventilation, by reason of heavy brick partition walls and arches, which may be removed at a very inconsiderable expense, rendering them

more airy and commodious. A portion of the buildings will require, during the present year, new roofing and flooring.

I would respectfully recommend the erection of a small building for a laboratory, to be fitted up with the necessary tools and machinery for the manufacture of balls and ball-cartridges, for issue to the active militia of this state for target practice upon the payment of the cost price, and as a means of preparation to meet any emergency that may arise out of the present troubles.

Credit is due to Captain W. R. Murphy, in charge of the military property at the arsenal, for the fidelity and promptness with which he has performed the laborious and responsible duties of arming and equipping the New Jersey troops; to the inspectors for the honest and impartial manner they discharged their delicate and responsible offices; to the clerks in this office and the employees at the arsenal for their willingness to give their services at unusual hours, day or night.

Before closing my report, permit me very respectfully to acknowledge my obligations to your excellency, for valuable counsel and advice in important and responsible matters pertaining to this department, and my grateful recollection of the unwavering kindness, confidence and courtesy you have ever extended towards me in my official intercourse.
