The Pinelands Planning Commission has drafted standards for the review of applications to build in the Pinelands as directed under the Governor's Executive Order #71. The Commission will consider adopting these standards after reviewing public comments.

The Commission has determined that the main county library in each of the seven Pinelands counties would be the most accessible location for the public to obtain sources cited in the reference document to the Interim Standards. The staff has contacted each of the main county libraries during the week of June 4-8 and has indicated the information which is available as shown on the attached chart.

To supplement the existing resources, we are sending those items on the chart which you do not have in your library as well as the Interim Standards and the references noted. We are also sending additional sources listed in the standards, which include:

The following is a point-by-point citing of sources and references to be used for each of the proposed standards. The sections of the standards treated in this manner include only the "Land Use Consideration" section and the section relating to "Criteria for Adequate Design."

Land Use Considerations

"Prior to the completion of the plan, construction and development will not be approved for applications which fall in the following categories:

- 1. Sites with seasonal high water tables less than five feet below the natural grade level, unless the project is not dependent on on-site waste disposal, in which case water table depths of 3-5 feet will be considered if all other conditions are met."
 - Applicant will furnish a copy of the review by the appropriate local Soil Conservation District (SCD) which indicates the height of the seasonal high water table at the site. Soil Conservation District (SCD's) offices in the Pinelands District are:

- "2. Sites which are dependent on on-site waste disposal systems where percolation tests conducted in accordance with Chapter 199 indicate a percolation rate of under 10 minutes to the inch."

- "3. Sites the development of which would, in the Commission's opinion, generate a need for off-tract improvements such as street improvements, water systems, sewerage, drainage facilities and other utilities."
 - Applicant will provide the Commission with letters from the appropriate municipal and county officials to what extent the proposed development will require off-tract improvements.
- "4. Sites which the staff determines are in the process of appraisal for acquisition by local, county, state and federal agencies."
 - Applicant will provide letters from the State Green Acres office, as well as appropriate local and county authorities stating that the site in question has not been appraised for public acquisition for open space purposes. For information on properties under appraisal by state, contact:

- "5. Sites which lie within 1,000 feet of the center line of a nominated or designated national or state wild or scenic river, or rivers listed on the final list of potential national wild and scenic rivers."
 - The following are designated state wild and scenic rivers:
 - a. Mullica River from Atsion Lake in Wharton State Forest, Burlington County to Rte. 542 crossing at Pleasant Mills; includes tributaries, with the exception of the SleeperBranch and the Nescochaque Creek.
 - Cedar Creek Cedar Creek in Ocean County, from the headwaters to Barnegat Bay.

- The following rivers are nominated for study for inclusion as <u>state</u> wild and scenic rivers. Tributaries as well as the main stem of the river are included, except where otherwise noted.
 - a. Toms River includes the main stem from Barnegat Bay to Route 528. This particular nomination does not include the tributaries.
 - b. Tuckahoe River
 - c. Dennis Creek
 - Mullica River entire river, except that portion which lies upstream from Medford Road.
 - e. Bass River the segment between the hamlet of Hampton Gate and its confluence with the Mullica River.
 - f. Nescochague Creek and Great Swamp Branch the segment from Route 206 to its confluence with the Mullica River.
 - g. Wading River and its tributaries the East Branch (Oswego River) and the West Branch The Wading River from the confluence of the East and West Branches to its confluence with the Mullica River, the segment of the East Branch downstream from the reservoir at Sim Place and the segment of the West Branch downstream from Rte. 563 at Speedwell.
 - h. Rancocas Creek the segment from Browns Mills downstream to its confluence with the Delaware River.
 - i. Great Egg Harbor River the segment beginning below the dam at the hamlet of Penny Pot and terminating at Great Egg Harbor Bay.
- The following are on the final list of potential federal wild and scenic rivers. These potential designations include all tributaries.
 - a. Cedar Creek Lanoka Harbor to Bamber Lake.
 - Great Egg Harbor River Great Egg Harbor Bay to south of Mays Landing.
 - c. Tuckahoe River Great Egg Harbor Bay to Tuckahoe.
 - Middle River Great Egg Harbor Bay to north of Corbin City.

- e. Great Egg Harbor River Weymouth to Atlantic City Expressway.
- f. Mullica River Great Bay to headwaters.
- g. Wading River confluence with Mullica River to East & West Branch.
- h. East Branch Oswego River E. & W. Br. to Sim Place Reservoir.
- i. West Branch Oswego River E. & W. Br. to Rt. 563.
- j. Batsto River Mullica River to Hampton.
- The Review Board office in Toms River will have a map showing the designated potential and nominated wild and scenic rivers. In order to determine that the proposed site does not fall within the 1000 ft. limit, the applicant will provide a survey prepared by a licensed land surveyor which shows the relationship of the property to the center line.
- "6. Sites where it can be verified to the Commission contain unique habitats which are essential to the protection of the Pinelands ecosystem or which harbor endangered or threatened plant and animal species, or registered "specimen trees" as approved by the Division of Fish, Game and Shellfisheries."

- "10. Sites where residents health and safety will be threatened by forest fire or smoke or where the implementation of the proposed action will curtail the use of fire in the maintenance of the Pinelands ecology as referenced by the Bureau of Forestry."

Criteria for Adequate Design

"Where applicable, the applicant must demonstrate that, both during and after construction, the proposed action either directly or indirectly:

- Will prevent increases in on-site or downstream flood flow velocities and volume from stormwater runoff. SCS standards should be utilized in making these determinations."

- "*2. Will utilize best management practices to avoid impacts on ground and surface water quality of pollution from point and nonpoint sources."

- "4. Will not reduce natural floodwater storage capacity of floodplains, bogs, swamps and other wetlands."

- "5. Will not divert the flow of streams and natural drainage areas, except in cases of agricultural uses."

- "7. Consistency with Executive Order #71 requires that a variety of design techniques be utilized to maintain the scenic, aesthetic and cultural resources of the Pinelands. During the planning period the Commission will encourage applicants to incorporate these and other design factors in their final plans:
 - a. utility lines placed in existing vegetative cuts or underground.
 - b. indigenous vegetation used to visually obscure development or construction from public roadways.
 - c. limited removal of existing vegetation.
 - d. limited selective pruning and removal of dead trees.
 - e. limitations on present and future use of fertilizers, pesticides, herbicides, road salts, etc.
 - f. appropriate visual and vegetative buffering of stream corridors, wetlands and main roadways through the use of indigenous vegetation.
 - g. protection of areas recognized as wildlife corridors and necessary to the movement of wildlife through the site to adjacent habitats and open space areas."
