Askey, a professional narrator of audio-visual productions, has recorded books and magazines for the Talking Book Publishing Company of Denver since 1975. He also does commercials for radio and television. Narrating tracks for industrial films and slide shows for productions and advertising agencies are included in Askey's list of activities. A former councilman and mayor, Mr. Askey resides in Longmont, Colorado, with his wife Jacqueline.


### **Adult Education**

The Thomas A. Edison State College, located in Trenton, with branches throughout the state, is designed to provide the education and the facilities for the mature individual to acquire the credits to qualify for a college degree. As New Jersey's State College for adults, Edison State College is uniquely designed to provide the senior student with flexible and alternative means of earning a degree. Edison does not require classroom attendance as the only method for earning college credits. The following are some of the means by which credits may be acquired:

- normal life experiences including hobbies or special interests
- training and learning acquired outside the formal classroom
- day or night school courses taken at other schools or colleges
- specialized on the job training
- courses by mail for disabled.

### Lightweight Headphones



Lightweight headphones are now available from the National Library Service. Each headphone, as well as being lighter, also has a smaller earpiece which should make them more comfortable to most people. These new headphones will not reproduce stereo sound and can only be used with National Library Service equipment. If you need or use an NLS auxiliary amplifier for the hearing impaired, you must use the standard NLS headphones. The lightweight headphones are not designed to be used with the amplifier. National Library Service guidelines specify that a reader may borrow a set of standard headphones or the lightweight headphones, but not both. If you already have standard headphones from the Library and wish to use the lightweight headphones instead, please call the Library at 1-800-792-8322 and ask for Machine Lending. You will be asked to return your old set and a new set will be sent to you. If you do not have headphones but would like a pair, please call Machine Lending to borrow them.

To buy stamps by mail, call your local post office for an order form. Fill it out, include a check or money order and mail it to your local post office. No stamp is required. Your stamps will be delivered in three days.

It is also available in large print or tape done at commercial speed from the Governor's Committee on the Disabled, 108-110 N. Broad Street, Trenton, NJ 08625.

Effective March 16, 1987, the Dixon Homestead Library of Dumont will no longer be a Service Center Library. 
